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Someone tries to hotwire plane

Someone tried to swipe a 1980 Piper twin engine plane parked at the Sierra Blanca Airport, police report.

According to Ruidoso Police Detective Wolfgang Born, the plane's owner found the door locks popped on the mechanical bird on Christmas Day, seven days after last visiting it.

The owner, a Waco, Texas resident, also found that the dash board had been removed and the would-be thief had attempted to hot wire the plane.

Born said that whoever inflicted the approximately \$1,000 of damage to the craft was apparently "familiar with airplanes."

Christmas fatality east of Capitan

A driver who attempted to avoid hitting a deer was killed Christmas Day as he was heading east on State Highway 247 about 8 p.m.

Terry Porter, 38, of Estancia was ejected from his vehicle and died at the scene, according to a report by State Police Officer Charles Devine.

The accident took place 40 miles east of Capitan in Lincoln County. The road connects Capitan to Roswell. No liquor was involved. Porter was not wearing his seat belt, Devine wrote in the report.

Porter apparently tried, but was unable to avoid the deer, which also was found dead. After striking the animal, Porter lost control of his 1988 Ford pick-up, Devine noted. The vehicle left the road, turned over and Porter was ejected. The report does not indicate the nature of his fatal injuries.

Burglar strikes on Mockingbird Lane

Two Mockingbird Lane homes were apparently burglarized sometime between Nov. 11 and Dec. 28, Ruidoso police report.

Police said they responded to the call of one homeowner who found that a VCR, teal colored ski pants and food was missing from her house. The kitchen was also ransacked.

After responding to the victim's complaint, the officers noticed a door had been left open at a residence next door. After seeing screwdriver marks on the door, the officers investigated, finding that a VCR had been removed after its cable had been cut. Police said the kitchen also appeared to have been ransacked.

County revisits zoning control

Although Lincoln County passed a zoning ordinance in 1988, the document never was effective because specific zones were never designated.

Without control over the last six years, businesses have opened next to homes; land next to ranches and farms has been subdivided; and the county has lacked protection from negative activities such as toxic waste dumping.

The prospect of gambling and a new nuclear industry in their backyard apparently has nudged the current five-person commission, including three members who live in population pockets, to take another look at the zoning maps.

Commissioners have asked the county Planning and Zoning Board to review the existing zoning document, suggest changes and send it back to the commission for its January meeting.

The zoning board will meet at 7 p.m. Friday, Dec. 29 in the commission room of the county courthouse at Carrizozo.

In October of 1980, a three-person county commission passed the zoning ordinance just before the majority left office. However, the next set of commissioners did not favor zoning; so the maps required to activate the new zoning were never completed and land use zones were never established.

That left the county with subdivision regulations only. The

regulations deal with conditions tied to development, but do not cover compatibility with surrounding land use.

Commissioners appear ready to amend the zoning ordinance and to approve maps to go with it, said county Planning Technician Patsy Sanchez.

"I been pushing every commission I've worked with — and that's been four — to do it," she said. "Whatever it is we have, we need something that gives us a little control at the very least. (Current commissioners) asked us to look at it, so I assume they're for it."

The tough part will come with a series of public hearings on the zoning maps, she said.

"The coloring of the maps will be done only after a series of public meetings as commissioners decide what zones to create and where they will be placed.

"That's the most critical time for people to attend. It's important for people to come and give input on their areas."

Sanchez has asked the commission to consider creating zones for potential environmental hazards and other unique situations; for mining (requiring land reclamation performance bonds); for historic sites; for agriculture and special uses; and to provide for placement of public utilities.

Sanchez has recommended one of the goals be to eliminate conflicting language that might lead to inconsistent interpretations of rules.

Robbers beat clerk on Christmas Eve

Two men entered the Inn of the Pine Springs in Ruidoso Downs Christmas Eve, beat up the night clerk and robbed the hotel, police said.

The assailants are still at large. Police said approximately \$600 was stolen.

"They took the money from the register and my wallet, but at least they didn't take my life," said the victim, David Krattiger. "I'm just grateful that I'm still here and not dead or mangled up any worse than I am. It gave me a lot to be thankful for this Christmas."

Ruidoso Downs police received a call at approximately 2:21 a.m. from Krattiger, who said he had been robbed. Officer Chris Condon responded to the call and found the front door of the hotel open and Krattiger bleeding from the head and face.

"I was half asleep on the couch when suddenly someone was jumping on my back and hitting me in the face," Krattiger said.

It was difficult to focus on who was hitting him, Krattiger said, but

he was able to ascertain that the assailants were two clean-cut looking Hispanic men between the ages of 25 and 40 who spoke with accents.

Krattiger said one man held him face down on the couch and beat him while threatening to kill him. At one point the man attempted to tie Krattiger's hands behind him with a pair of shoelaces but was unable to do so, Krattiger related. While Krattiger was being assaulted, the other man pushed the cash register off the counter, causing it to open.

Hotel manager Tony Wilcoxson said he was asleep in a back room throughout the incident, and was unaware of the robbery and assault until police arrived on the scene.

Krattiger was transported to the Lincoln County Medical Center where he was treated for numerous lacerations to his face and head, and a broken nose. He was released later that same morning.

Ruidoso Police said that they are continuing the investigation but at the present time have no suspects.

Firemen need new Jaws of Life

Automobile accident victims across the nation have been saved because of a device called "The Jaws of Life," a special tool designed to extract people trapped in crushed vehicles.

The Ruidoso Downs Fire Department is trying to raise \$5,000 for a new Jaws of Life unit to replace the 16-year-old one currently in use.

"The old one is pretty well shot," said Nick Herrera, Downs fire

chief. The fire department has already raised half the money, but is asking for donations from private individuals or businesses to raise the rest.

"All contributions are tax deductible," Herrera said. "And you never know, it may save your life someday."

Donations towards the purchase may be made at Ruidoso Downs Village Hall.

Giving feels great to volunteer seniors

Andy Brode delivers about 20 meals each week to the elderly and disabled in the Ruidoso area.

Volunteers like Brode in RSVP (Retired Senior Volunteer Program) are quick to point out they gain by giving.

"I just feel that this is something I have a right and a need to do," Brode explained. "If I couldn't do it, I'm sure someone would do it for me, so I'm glad to help. And besides, it's very rewarding to help someone else."

Wanda Fox, one of the people on Fox's route, appreciates the help.

"I'm very thankful for this," Fox said. "The cooks are doing a good job. There's a nice variety of food and I like that."

RSVP volunteers like Brode and Ken Hardin say they can see the results of their efforts in the improved lives of their neighbors. And the challenges and activities of their new careers give them a feeling of being needed.

Sandee Dutchover, director of Ruidoso's Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP), is on a mission to find more such energetic and creative older people to help community programs.

RSVP has helped older Americans keep contributing to their community long after their professional careers have ended.

Ruidoso has recently established its own RSVP program operating from the senior citizens center. Local retired senior volunteers are needed to serve on a regular basis throughout the area.

Funded by grants and fundraising, RSVP also receives technical assistance and training from the Corporation for National Service.

Volunteers choose their assignments from many options provided by the RSVP office, Dutchover said, from teaching first aid and literacy skills to conducting employment workshops or passing along business expertise as retired executives.

Dutchover hopes the many retirees in this community will respond to the need.

"We already have quite a few host stations around town," said Dutchover. "The problem right now is getting volunteers to staff the stations."

Host stations — places where volunteers work — include the Ruidoso Police Department, the Humane Society of Lincoln County, the Ruidoso Public Library, Lincoln County Food Bank, Sierra Vista Primary School, White Mountain Elementary School, Nob Hill Early Childhood Center, Meals on Wheels and the Ruidoso Senior Citizen's Center. Workers are also needed to help at the RSVP center.

Dutchover envisions more programs in the future, such as adult basic education, tax aid and consultant services, hospice care, home repair, home visitation, long-term home care and neighborhood watch.

Volunteers are reimbursed for, or provided with, transportation and other expenses. They're also covered by accident and liability insurance while on assignment.

"We only have about 12 volunteers at the present time," Dutchover said. "But the program is new, and I'm sure once word gets around and people realize what the benefits of being a volunteer are, more people will become active in RSVP."

The program was established nationally in 1971. It is run through the Corporation for National Service and the National Senior Service Corps.

County group may challenge attorney general's opinion

An attorney general's opinion, declaring mid-term raises for elected county officials to be illegal, may be challenged in court by the New Mexico Association of Counties.

Association Executive Director Donna Smith said Tuesday the executive board will meet after the first of the year to decide whether to seek a court ruling.

Attorney General Tom Udall on Friday said elected county officials may not accept pay raises mid-term.

Smith said he is relying on case law and opinions from a time period when county commissioners and other elected county officials served two-year terms. Most counties now use four-year terms in line with the executive branch and other state elected positions that are allowed mid-term increases.

An opinion was requested from Udall by the Lincoln County Commission last April after the board,

in a 3-2 vote, approved raises for elected officials. They were following the lead of several other counties around the state, which cited a state "equity" statute that requires all elected county officials to benefit from any raises granted.

At the time, County Attorney Alan Morel warned that the state constitution prohibited such a move and would prevail over a state statute if challenged.

The constitution specifically forbids county commissioners to benefit from raises they approve, he said. Commissioners with years left to serve on their terms could approve raises, but only those commissioners or county officials who are newly elected or re-elected would be able to collect the raise.

If Udall's opinion stands, some county officials across the state may have to repay money. That wouldn't apply to officials in Lincoln County, because commissioners set the effective date of the raises locally at Jan. 1, 1996.

County ranks 7th in state in federal land payments

Lincoln County ranks seventh in the state this year in money it will receive from the U.S. Forest Service for its cut of income from local forest revenues.

Lincoln County will receive \$53,979 as its piece of the pie this year.

By law, the Forest Service pays states 25% of the money it collects from timber sales, grazing, recreation, minerals and land uses. The money goes to the states and counties where the 189 million acres of national forest lands are located, and is used for schools and roads. The service will pay out \$309 million to reimburse 41 states and Puerto Rico.

New Mexico will pick up \$1,458,715 from the \$941 million in receipts collected in fiscal year 1994, said Jack Ward Thomas, chief of the forest service.

The payments do not include 25% of the 1994 national grassland revenue. Those payments are based on calendar year 1994 receipts and will be paid in March 1995.

The three states receiving the largest payments are Oregon at \$120 million, California at \$51 million and Washington at \$32 million. New Mexico ranked 20th.

Counties collecting the top dollars in New Mexico are Catron at \$499,297, Rio Arriba at \$285,466 and Taos at \$115,749.

Fish hatchery won't be managed by Mescalero anytime soon, official says

The fish hatchery on the Mescalero Apache Reservation near Ruidoso is on a list of federal facilities that could be managed by Native American groups.

U.S. Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt recently said he is considering negotiating management agreements with several tribes, including some in New Mexico.

His remarks came during a speech at the National Congress of American Indians, where he told the audience that his department is preparing to negotiate for Native

American groups to manage some federal facilities, parks and public lands.

Besides the Mescalero fishery, Babbitt also mentioned as possible candidates the El Malpais National Monument, now administered by the National Park Service and El Malpais National Conservation area, handled by the Bureau of Land Management.

But Jim Hutcherson, the associate manager for fisheries for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Albuquerque, said there are no immediate plans for any transfer of responsibility for the hatchery in Mescalero.

"It's been discussed for the last 10 years," he said. "The tribe has shown no inclination to take it over. But it is located on their reservation, so it would be a candidate."

Hutcherson said he has not seen a copy of Babbitt's speech.

"The concept is not new, but it hasn't been seriously discussed recently," he said.

Fred Peso, vice president of the Mescalero Tribe, said the possibility of taking over management of the hatchery was discussed years ago.

"We did look into it then, but we haven't done anything on it," Peso

said. "We have no opinion on it at this time."

Hutcherson said the hatchery at Mescalero produces about 95,000 pounds and a half-million fish a year to be used for stocking lakes and streams on the Mescalero Reservation and pueblos along the Rio Grande.

Authorized by the U.S. Congress in 1963, the hatchery produced its first fish crop in 1965. A staff of 4-6 employees handles the operation.

Rainbow trout are the main product, but recently, the hatchery also has begun to raise the endangered Gila trout.



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Downs hires officer

Ruidoso Downs Village Council approved the hiring of a new full-time police officer for the police department at the council meeting Tuesday.

Alex Hinson, a 32-year-old ex-Marine, was hired to fill a vacancy in the department.

"I feel that Alex will be a fine addition to our staff," said David Hightower, Ruidoso Downs police chief. "He excelled in all aspects of the testing process and we are glad to welcome him aboard."

Hinson relocated to Ruidoso

Downs a year ago from Florida.

"I moved to this area to get my children out of a bad area," said Hinson. "I want to give something back to the community."

Hinson is also bilingual, Hightower said, reading, writing and speaking Spanish fluently.

The new officer will begin his duties immediately and will undergo an intensive in-house 10-week training program, said Sergeant Dana Terlecky, who will oversee his training.

County holidays set

Lincoln County employees will celebrate 12 holidays next year. Commissioners approved a calendar that allows time off primarily on Fridays and Mondays, and creates special two-day holidays by changing the time for observing the birthdays of President Abraham Lincoln and George Washington.

Vacation days include: Martin Luther King Day on Monday, Jan. 16; Good Friday on April 14; Memorial Day on Monday, May 29; Independence Day on Tuesday, July 4; Labor Day on Monday, Sept. 4; Columbus Day on Monday, Oct. 9; and Veteran's Day on Friday, Nov. 10.

Lincoln's Birthday, normally celebrated in February, will be observed by Lincoln County on Friday, Nov. 24 to give employees a four-day Thanksgiving weekend.

Washington's Birthday, also in February, will be observed on Tuesday, Dec. 26 to give employees a four-day Christmas vacation.

K-Bob's robbed

K-Bob's Steakhouse on Highway 70 in Ruidoso was burglarized sometime between Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, said Cliff Herring, K-Bob's general manager. Thieves removed the safe by breaking through a wall to gain access.

"It was a pretty good Christmas up until we discovered the break-in," Herring said.

Both police officers and K-Bob's management refused to discuss the contents of the safe.

Dana Terlecky, Ruidoso Downs Police sergeant, said the empty safe was discovered several miles up

Turkey Canyon in Ruidoso Downs by some people who were horseback riding Monday. The safe has yet to be removed.

"I have no idea how someone moved it but they did," Terlecky said. "This thing is extra-heavy and it looks like it was dropped off the back of a truck. I was knee deep in mud and couldn't budge it."

Terlecky said the safe will be extracted from its muddy resting place sometime soon.

The investigation continues under direction of Ruidoso Police Detective Jim Biggs.

Discipline for the body and soul

In a old bowling alley converted into a makeshift gym, about a dozen students mill about, waiting for class to start.

Instructor Brett Maul turns on a heater in the corner of the large room. The heater spits out warm air, but it does little to take away the chill.

The class begins its warm up and stretching on a linoleum floor in front of a wall of mirrors. Directly behind them, large plastic sheets draped from the ceiling section off the northwest quarter of the bowling alley.

In the northeast corner, a competition ring sits on top of what used to be four bowling lanes. Dusty bowling shoes still sit in their appropriate cubicles below the counter.

Welcome to the U.S.A. Tae Kwon Do Center of Ruidoso, where the less-than-ideal surroundings don't bother instructors or students.

What matters here is self-improvement, self-confidence and discipline.

Maul has operated the Ruidoso facility since June, 1991. Twenty students make up the core of his classes held twice a week for one-and-a-half hours. This past June he took over Tae Kwon Do school in Roswell and runs classes there two nights a week also.

Maul started his Tae Kwon Do training in 1982 when he was 16 years old. An excellent athlete, Maul also played high school football for Ruidoso and ski raced.

But it was his Tae Kwon Do instructor, Warren White, who made the greatest impact on Maul.

"He's still the only coach I ever had that treated not just myself but everybody else with the same respect," Maul said.

It's this sense of respect for everyone, regardless of talent or ability, Maul hopes to pass down to his students.

Like his students, Maul became interested in Tae Kwon Do for self-defense purposes. But sometimes, he admits, they come to learn for other reasons.

"Most people come in here to learn how to fight and what they end up learning is ways that they don't have to fight," Maul said. "The greatest misconception of it is, that it promotes violence when it's the reverse of that — it promotes peace, not violence," he said.

Tae Kwon Do is one of more than 2,000 styles of martial arts, ranging from Judo to American collegiate wrestling to Aikido to Karate. All of them have a similar

philosophical background, Maul said.

The Koreans developed Tae Kwon Do. It dates back to 500 A.D. and its roots go back even further to an ancient art form called Tykon.

"All martial arts stress self-improvement — physically, mentally, spiritually — all of it. They all do it through the discipline of working out," Maul said.

He admits that Tae Kwon Do is the most offensive-oriented of the martial arts. But that's because Korea was used as a bridge between Japan and China, Maul explained.

"It just came to a point where they got tired of being walked over," Maul said of the Koreans. Despite its historical roots, Maul said, Tae Kwon Do is not meant to be used "unless it's the last resort."

Maul said students of Tae Kwon Do should employ the mental and philosophical components of the art to avoid a confrontation.

Maul experienced a perfect example of this last summer. A man came into the center and challenged Maul, a third-degree black belt, to a fight.

"I put my hands behind my back and said, 'Take your best shot, go ahead.' The guy said, 'No, I want to fight you.' I told him, 'Go ahead, hit me, I'm ready,'" Maul recalled.

Nothing happened; no punches were thrown.

"I was going to let him punch me right in the face, but I knew he

wouldn't because, see, from that unaggressive position there's no way that anybody could bring themselves to do something like that," Maul said.

The best way to stay out of physical confrontation is to give the confronter a chance to do it, but show no fear and no aggression, Maul said.

An understanding of this philosophy takes years of training and confidence-building.

Students start their training at the white belt level and eventually progress through four more belts before testing as black belt, which has 10 different degrees itself.

Maul earned his black belt in 1990, after eight-and-a-half years of belt testings and training.

"It (earning a black belt) takes anywhere from three-and-a-half years to a lifetime — depending on what you put into it," Maul said.

To earn his fourth-degree black belt, Maul said he would need to finish his bachelor's degree and probably a master's degree first because Tae Kwon Do emphasizes higher education also.

It's difficult to take a "snapshot" of the sport because Tae Kwon Do develops the physical, spiritual and mental parts of the person. If a person is interested in taking classes, he or she shouldn't sit in for just one class.

Maul said classes progress differently each year. The path changes.

Sometimes students work on self-defense. Sometimes they prepare for competitions or belt testing. Sometimes they concentrate on their "poomses" or forms.

Poomses (pronounced "poom-ay") are the most important part of training, Maul said.

"They are a series of set moves in a pattern that deal with speed, power, focus and personal expression," he said.

More than 1,300 different singular moves exist for the poomses combinations.

Maul credits the demands of the sport with turning around his life.

He's become more disciplined and chosen a "healthier path in life."

Maul said he now does things that help him grow. Instead of those things that keep him from growing.

"If you would have asked me years ago if I was going to own two schools and then have the other jobs I have on top of it, I would have laughed. There's just no way I could have ever even conceived that because I've become more disciplined," Maul said.

"It's a way of life; it's much more than a sport," he concluded.

Ruidoso River — The recent snow melt has brought up water levels and created excellent fishing conditions on the river right through town. The upper canyon is also accessible and fishing is good using wet flies for brown trout.

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

The Santa Cops are among these bright spots during the holidays. Led by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, Sheriff Jay McSwane and his wife Freda, Santa Cops gather up presents for those hard-strapped for money this holiday season, then wrap the presents up and deliver them.

Police and others around the community join in to help — Ruidoso police, Ruidoso Downs police, Capitan police, Ruidoso Downs Fire Department, the ambulance crew, and civic groups:

Now the Santa Cops are doing their part to help out the environment a little bit, too, with the assistance of Ruidoso Rent-All. The company is mulching Christmas trees for \$5 and giving the proceeds to Santa Cops to help pay for all the presents.

It's a waste to send trees to the dump, and this way a useful end can come to their short lives. Donators can take the mulch home or leave it.

NAFTA and the devaluation of the peso

Since the passage of NAFTA, New Mexico exports to Mexico have risen substantially from \$28 million in 1992 to more than \$100 million in 1994. Our Department of Economic Development tells us Mexico is now New Mexico's #2 trading partner.

It is hard to gauge just what this statement means because we do not know how much of the dollar value of our exports was really produced in New Mexico or how much is exported from Mexico back to us from the Maquilladora plants in Mexico.

That is, if we are exporting computers, most of the components came from somewhere else. All we did was assemble the product. Our export figures count the total value of the item as an export rather than just the value added in New Mexico. The Trade Division in Santa Fe doesn't keep statistics on imports from Mexico so we really have no measure of net benefit to New Mexico. The trade statistics are, therefore, just feel-good smoke and mirrors.

From a national perspective, when NAFTA was passed, America enjoyed a \$9 billion balance of payments surplus with Mexico. At present, that figure has dropped to about \$1 billion. This has occurred despite reports from the Clinton Administration that auto exports and exports of other goods and services have soared. The truth then is that we are buying more goods from Mexico than we are exporting goods to Mexico. The decrease in the positive balance of payments means that we are exporting jobs. To be specific, we have exported on the order of 200,000 jobs.

On Thursday, Dec. 22, just in time for Christmas, both in Mexico and the United States President Zedillo has removed government support for the peso. By Friday morning, the peso fell in

value against the dollar by 20%. What does this mean? U.S. exports imported by Mexican companies are paid for in U.S. dollars. The U.S. dollar now costs 20% more in Mexico. Therefore, the price of exports sold in Mexico will rise by 20%.

The reverse of this happened in the United States in the mid-70s when the import tariff on Japanese cars was reduced. The Japanese companies simply kept their prices up and fattened their bottom line and there was no pressure from American companies to require Japanese companies to lower their prices because it would have increased price competitiveness in favor of Japanese cars and reduced sales of American cars.

From the perspective of the Mexican worker, their wages are not going to rise by 20% tomorrow. In effect, they have just experienced a 20% pay cut on already low wages, which should lead to some social unrest in a country already facing social unrest in Chiapas and elsewhere.

Now that Mexican imports have increased to the United States since the passage of NAFTA, and our treasury has foregone the collection of import tariffs, and the U.S. balance of payments surplus is dwindling, Zedillo has delivered the coup de grace by making Mexican products 20% cheaper for Americans and American products 20% more expensive for Mexicans. The Mexican product will not be significantly cheaper in the American market because it would drive down prices of American goods, as in the example using Japanese cars. Or, if they are significantly cheaper, it will put competing American companies out of business by zeroing their bottom line.

Salinas and Zedillo are to be congratulated for their vision. NAFTA eliminates the import tariffs and Mexican imports now flood our markets because the peso devaluation has made them 20% cheaper. We have foregone tariff col-

lections as a source of income to pay off our national debt and as a mechanism to protect our own manufacturers against what will likely become unfair pricing.

All of this will accelerate the conversion of our positive balance of payments to a negative balance of payments in 1995. Again we will be exporting our nation's wealth and our jobs. All of this at a time when all of Latin America is clamoring for entrance to our markets and we have opened our door through NAFTA and GATT.

If trade pacts were to come, they should have come slowly so that people and economies can adjust. Swift changes lead to instability in the lives of all people and it is a fact that the swift changes that have overtaken the world since the demise of the Soviet Union have led to international instability and an increase in refugee streams.

On the bright side, if the devaluation of the peso leads to increased job opportunities in Mexico, we may see a decrease in the refugee stream of illegal Mexican immigrants into the United States. However, if there is a 20% price escalation in the Mexican marketplace, and Mexicans are unable to afford the necessities of life, the devaluation of the peso should lead to an increase in economic refugees from Mexico to the United States in the year ahead. In either event, Americans will pay the price and Mexico will benefit.

For American investors who have moved billions of dollars into Mexico on the tide of euphoria and hope, they have just enjoyed the loss of 20% of their investment. Can you imagine — the loss in value of the American stock markets of 20% in one day, equivalent to a drop in the Dow-Jones average of about 700 points. Orange County, move over.

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




