Ruidoso named top vacation home site

Ruidoso has been named one of the top seven second home/vacation home markets in the nation, by U.S. News & World Report.

The magazine's annual Home Guide notes that 70% of the homes in Ruidoso are vacation retreats.

Ruidoso has a median home price of \$105,000, with prices ranging from older two-bedroom cabins for \$35-\$60,000, to deluxe mountainside retreats that top \$800,000, the magazine says.

This is the first time vacation retreats are included in the annual Home Guide. The top markets were chosen with the help of the editors of Vacation Publications, which puts out several travel and retirement magazines; real estate giants Century 21 and Coldwell Banker; and local experts.

To be contenders, communities had to feature a variety of recreational activities in more than one season. Considering many vacation homes are retirement homes, safety, taxes and local culture were also considered.

The Home Guide will be available on the newsstands Wednesday, magazine officials said. The press release did not say whether the seven communities were ranked #1-#7.

Alcohol poisoning hospitalizes boy

A 14-year-old Carrizozo boy nearly died Friday from alcohol poisoning.

He was found at 6:23 p.m. lying lifeless in the street in front of former Carrizozo police chief Charlie White's home, Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane said.

"CPR was started by deputy Larry Cearley. He found a pulse and the boy began breathing," McSwane said. The boy was taken to Lincoln County Medical Center and was released over the weekend.

The hospital reported a blood alcohol level of .46, McSwane said. The measurement shows the grams of alcohol in 100 milliliters of blood. The legal limit for an adult is .08.

"That's probably one of the highest levels I've heard about in 20 years as a cop," said White, who recently was named DWI program coordinator for the county.

McSwane said he is investigating how the boy obtained the liquor.

Domestic violence law awaits signing

Tracking incidents of family violence is an elusive venture in Lincoln County, because the state has no law criminalizing spousal beating.

New Mexico has assault and battery in its criminal code, but there is no such charge as "domestic violence," noted Mary Ann Copas, state coordinator for New Mexico's Coalition Against Domestic Violence. Without a legal statute, it's impossible to measure the success of prevention programs, she contended.

"There's really no official reporting method for it," she notes, "so statutorily, it is not a crime in of itself."

A new law may be on the horizon, however. It passed through both the House and Senate and now awaits the signature of Governor Gary Johnson.

Copas worked for nearly a year on the proposed family violence legislation, Senate Bill 512. It adds a new criminal category of "assault with intent against a household member" to the existing assault and battery laws.

The legislation is suddenly receiving strong opposition from political action groups — especially the New Mexico Christian Coalition and Coalition for Promoting Responsible Government — making the future of the bill rather cloudy.

"Most of the negative comments are from people choosing to misread the statute," Copas argues.

The opposition groups have

argued that the family violence law would open the door for frivolous suits by children against their parents for being spanked or disciplined.

Copas, who spoke to Johnson on Tuesday, said he was non-committal about signing the legislation.

She expressed surprise over the negative response, saying it was never expected for legislation which "is so straightforward — the amount of controversy simply isn't justified."

The statute, she explains, does not increase the level of misdemeanor charges or attempt to make them felonious.

"It just creates a statute for tracking purposes," Copas says, "and uses the existing language regarding assault and battery."

State law dictates batterers can be charged with the petty misdemeanor charge of assault (physical or verbal threat of violence) or battery (the actual applied force). Each is punishable by up to six months in jail or a \$500 fine. The violent offender can also be charged with aggravated battery (temporary disfigurement or disfigurement due to battery), a misdemeanor punishable by up to a year in jail or a \$1,000 fine.

The legislation does not make reference to children because statutes with stronger teeth and harsher penalties already exist regarding child abuse, Copas said. Any prosecution for violence

Mescalero reservation's sewage, landfill violate accepted health standards

The stench is unmistakable even 20 yards away: sewage.

The brownish green water of the Mescalero Apache sewage effluent evaporation lagoons lies still in the afternoon sun. The lack of a ripple testifies that floating devices designed to aerate the water are not functioning.

At some points, the liquid waste drains over the side of one lagoon into another where a fence, designed to keep people out of a ponding area, is nearly submerged. Behind a row of bushes and weeds at the edge of the lower lagoon, the Tularosa Creek runs its course about 30 yards away down to its namesake city at the foot of the Sacramento Mountains.

The owner of any sewage treatment facility is responsible for its maintenance and repair, said Indian Health Services spokesman Richie K. Grinnell, director of environmental health and engineering.

A half-mile east of the lagoons and across U.S. 70 near a housing cluster, smoke swirls in the sky from an open garbage and trash pit, smoldering from a fire earlier in the day.

Dodging hot spots, a man scavenges at the bottom of the 20 foot deep ditch for items that can be recycled.

Federal regulations prohibit the open burning of garbage, said Ed Kelly with the state Environment Department in Albuquerque.

"That's considered an open dump and should be closed down, but the state has no jurisdiction," he said. "That's up to the Mescalero or the Environmental Protection Agency."

Corrections to these problems are overdue, said Russ Warwick, former IHS officer at Mescalero.

No one knows how often contaminants from the overflowing lagoons may have been carried

downstream off the reservation into fishing areas and past domestic wells, Warwick said. He's also worried about the safety of children who may wander into the unfenced lagoon area and come in contact with disease-causing organisms in the effluent.

Warwick said he's bothered by the apparent lack of maintenance provided by the tribe.

"It worries me that they're talking about taking care of high-level radioactive waste and they haven't been able to properly run a landfill or sewage system," he said.

Last week, the tribal council banned Warwick and fellow environmentalist Dave Dale from the reservation, contending their presence is "injurious to tribal members."

Since leaving Mescalero and the IHS, Warwick has become active in the movement against the proposal to store on the reservation spent nuclear fuel rods from commercial power plants.

Although the Mescalero Apaches are a sovereign nation, they are required to follow the same standards as other communities, said Gladean Butler from the external affairs

Ruidoso has wastewater problems, too

Left in the wake of this year's state legislative session is Ruidoso's concern about how to fund \$1.2 million in vital repairs to its wastewater treatment system.

The 16-mile-long clay piping system, which carries liquid waste for treatment, has a series of cracks and crumbling joints which allows the infiltration of 900,000 gallons of river and groundwater daily, Village Manager Gary Jackson explained.

The infiltration of already clean water represents about 35% of the system's daily capacity and \$180,000 is thrown down the drain annually for the need-less treatment.

The village had requested full funding for the capital outlay project from the state government, and has yet to learn if Gov. Gary Johnson will veto what little the Legislature appropriated (\$180,000, and potentially another \$100,000 from severance tax funds).

Now the village is determining the best means to tackle the job: bonding the cost or budgeting it through three years of phased repairs, Jackson, who is in the midst of budget sessions, said.

The village has a total bonding capacity of \$5,490,917; as of June 1994, the village has an

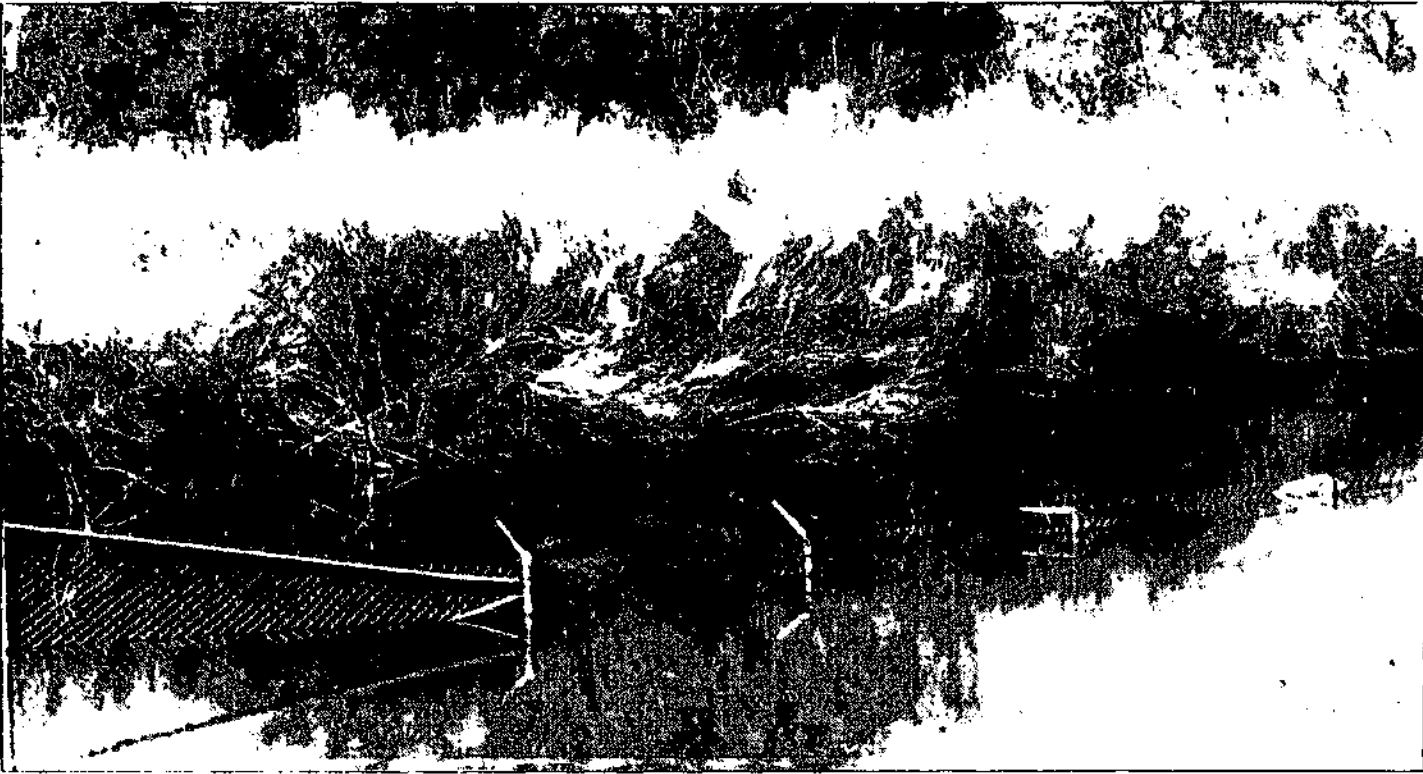

division of the EPA office in Dallas.

However, because of their unique status, enforcement responsibilities are hazy (see related story on page 2).

The Mescalero's liaison with the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) said the problems are about to be corrected. Thora Padilla, director of the office of environmental protection for the tribe, said money has been allocated by the federal department of Indian Health Service (IHS) to correct the long-standing problems (see related story on page 3).

Lack of maintenance

Despite calls to Mescalero Vice President Fred Peso over a period of one week, he provided no response or information for this report.

The Mescalero community sewage treatment facility was constructed under an EPA grant in the early 1970s, according to Richie Grinnell of the IHS.

"When the Indian Health Service constructs facilities for an Indian tribe, the ownership of those facilities, and the related operation and maintenance responsibilities, are transferred to the tribe," Grinnell wrote in response to questions submitted to the IHS by *The Ruidoso News*.

"The IHS has provided no funding to repair or update this facility," he wrote. "The service has provided funding for the construction and expansion of two smaller sewage systems on the Mescalero

reservation."

Grinnell noted that the IHS is not a regulatory agency and has no role in enforcement of environmental regulations. It also does not monitor or test sewage effluent that may flow into the Tularosa stream behind the reservation.

IHS officials pointed to the EPA as being responsible for enforcement of the Clean Water Act and Resource Conservation and Recovery Act on Indian reservations.

Warwick, who has a bachelor of science degree in environmental health science from Indiana State University, said he filed report after report about the potential health problems at the lagoons, the garbage ditch and the reservation water systems, but was rebuffed by the tribe and seemingly ignored by the IHS.

"There are no controls on what is dumped (at the open pit), no gate attendant," he said. "The smoke goes right up to a housing area and who knows what the residents may be breathing."

Similar pits exist at three of the tribe's recreation areas and another at Cow Camp #1, although no burnings occur, he said.

While serving as a lieutenant with the U.S. Public Health Service-IHS, he was stationed at the Mescalero Indian Hospital starting in May 1989.

"As the Mescalero service unit sanitarian, I was responsible for the environmental health and safety program on the reservation," he said. But he quickly became frustrated.

"Rules, regulations and standards did not apply, even when it was a matter of public health and safety," Warwick said of the tribal administration. "They don't want oversight, to be accountable or restricted."

Warwick said he had no enforcement powers.

"I was simply an adviser, making recommendations," he said. "It was frustrating to go into facilities year after year and see no improvements made. Usually things got even worse."

Problems weren't just limited to the sewage and trash pit, Warwick said.

In his files are copies of letters written over a period of three years to the tribal administration citing possible lagoon spills into the Tularosa and the Carrizo streams, and about the need to boil water from some of the reservation water systems because of samples showing contamination by harmful bacteria.

"The EPA was always sending letters telling the tribe just what had to be done," he said. "They'd contact me later asking if anything had been done. It usually hadn't. If (the reservation) had been a municipality, (the EPA) would have marched in and fined them."

Fifteen water quality violations were reported on the reservation in 1991, plus 13 in 1992 and nine in 1993, said Len Pardee of the EPA water supply division. In 1994, after Warwick left the reservation, the reported violations dropped to one for the year.

Drinking contaminated water could have caused diarrhea,

Government agencies confused about jurisdiction over reservation problems

As a sovereign nation, Mescalero apparently doesn't fall under any particular agency's watchful eye.

Glen Saums, house program manager with the state Department of Environment, emphasized the state has no jurisdiction over sewage holding lagoons or open ditch burning.

Jeff Lewellin, acting director of the department's surface water bureau, Steve Pierce of the surveillance and standards division, and Saums said last week that they find out about effluent spills when

citizens call them.

"When we find out about the discharge of the lagoons — and we have heard about them over the years — we have referred that directly to the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency)," Saums said. "I know they have had conversations with the Indian Health Services (IHS). While the EPA is the regulator for the discharges, the IHS is responsible for the function of the lagoons."

After several spills were reported, the state environment department studied the Tularosa River in the middle of the summer of 1987, Pierce said.

"The Mescalero would not allow us to do any sampling whatsoever on their reservation," he said. "The National Fish Hatchery did allow

us to sample the inflow and outflow (above the community lagoons)."

The tests covered a one-week period and results were clean. The department has never gone out to test in direct response to a spill, he said. The office has no jurisdiction over domestic wells southwest of the reservation, he said.

"We're short-staffed," Pierce said. "We've just recently gotten back to full staff, just three people who test the rivers in the whole state (about 6,000 miles of perennial rivers)."

"If we can't even get on the reservation to sample, we can't possibly do anything in the way of remedial action," Lewellin added.

Gladean Butler, of the external

Sewage, garbage improvements planned on reservation with government money

Federal money has been set aside to pay for correction of two long-standing environmental problems on the Mescalero Apache reservation.

Indian Health Services (IHS) recently approved money for a comprehensive sewage disposal study for Mescalero, according to Richie Grinnell, director of environment, health and engineering for IHS. The exact amount of the grant was not available.

The IHS will help the tribe acquire professional engineering services to perform the study, Grinnell wrote. The IHS anticipates funding the recommended improvements when the study is done, if the money is available, he said.

Thora Padilla, a liaison person hired by the tribe in November to

oversee the improvement projects, said she's excited about the plans.

A member of the Mescalero tribe, Padilla said she has a background in natural resources as a forester.

"We recently received funding this year from the (IHS) to fix both of those problems," she said. The first step will be to advertise for and then hire an engineer.

She wasn't sure when the money to combat the problems was approved, but said it's slow going when dealing with the bureaucratic process.

In both the lagoons and the garbage ditch, the engineer will assess what can be done and offer alternatives to the tribe, she said.

"The man who did the report (former IHS officer Russ Warwick)

was in the capacity to do something about it," Padilla said. "That's where we ultimately got our funding, from IHS (as a result of Warwick's reports).

"There's a whole system you have to go through to get funding from IHS and it's slow, very slow. We've wanted things done for awhile, but it was hard to get them to act."

She acknowledged that lack of maintenance has been a problem in the past.

"I've already developed a plan to institute our own maintenance and operations," Padilla said. "Part of that will be to get certified people to run our different systems."

Warwick said no employees are properly trained to run the system. He suggested that while Padilla and the tribe are waiting for the

money, some simple steps could be taken to improve the situation. They're the same steps he recommended in a letter to Sara Misquez, assistant to Mescalero President Wendell Chino, dated Sept. 9, 1992.

His recommendations include:

— Fencing off open garbage ditch and maintaining operation hours to control access, prevent burning and to provide supervision of what goes into the dump.

— Cutting the weeds and trees around the lagoons to increase wind action and evaporation to help with treatment of the effluent.

— Repairing sprinklers in the area so that lagoon level could be lowered by using some of the effluent to irrigate.

— Installing a fence, locked gates and warning signs at lagoons to improve safety.

outstanding \$3,545,000 in bonding debt, leaving a net total of \$1,946,917 for the bonding of future capital projects, village finance officer Lee Ann Nichols said.

The preliminary 1995-96 fiscal year budget, which will be contained at approximately \$16 million, will be completed in late May, and the package finalized July 20, Jackson said.

Each time the system overflows, the city runs the risk of a \$10,000 fine per violation from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

When the summer monsoons begin, and a good 35,000 people are in town, the treatment lines quickly fill to capacity.

"These peak times push the system beyond what it can handle," Jackson said, adding, "The combination makes the manholes overflow when it (the wastewater) is not permitted to go beyond the line."

That's where the risk of fines comes in. Jackson said fines have been levied in past years. He was uncertain of the fines paid, as they were issued before his time as village manager.

Williams noted that the legislature was up against a very tight budget, and communities across the state asked for funding for \$1.4 billion in projects while only \$80 million in capital

outlay funds was available.

Ruidoso had requested a total \$8.8 million for the state to fund both the wastewater system repairs and a multi-recreational facility, with \$1.2 million requested for the wastewater lines.

Although the allocated monies are a help, Jackson said he and other village personnel who had defended Ruidoso's requests at legislative hearings felt disappointed.

"We really felt we had a strong package," he said.

With its worsening condition and wastefulness of the "brittle clay, collapsing, crumbling lines deep in the ground," funding the wastewater repairs is essential, Jackson explained.

Village funds repairs have been done in bits and pieces over the last three to four years, he said, costing the village \$500,000 since 1991. The monies represent infiltration repairs, as well as engineering costs and a special camera which has recorded the site and severity of leaks.

Jackson is leery of the phased work process, explaining that as work is done on one section of the system, other portions with brittle piping have fractured from increased pressure and allowed seepage.

"The real key is to attack (the entire job) in the shortest period of time that money will provide," Jackson concluded.

affairs office of the EPA in Dallas, said last week there has been a coordinated effort by the EPA's water supply division to correct the lagoons.

"They're aware of the problem and have been working with the IHS," she said. "They identified a solution and the project already has been implemented. Of course, you have to go through the planning stages and the write-up of the project, but it already has been approved and funded."

The EPA could have gone in and

imposed a fine, but another way of handling such a situation is to identify a means of correction, she said.

"A lot of our programs (are) actually implemented through a partnership relationship with IHS," Butler said.

She wasn't aware of how long the EPA has been working on a solution.

Mary Wilson from the same office said Wednesday that she determined the lagoons were never licensed, because they were not designed to discharge, only for set-

ting and evaporation.

Staffers she talked to said they just found out about the lagoon problem the previous week.

While the EPA sets minimum standards, it does not always have enforcement power on a reservation, especially when no license is involved, the two women said.

Wilson said the garbage ditch also falls into "a gray area" for enforcement, although open pit burning of garbage and trash is prohibited by federal law.

Business taxpayers are discovering some not-so-welcome surprises as they file their income tax returns this year because Congress tightened the rules for claiming certain routine expenses effective for 1994 and later years.

Some of the changes include:

- deductions for business meals and entertainment expenses are reduced from 80% to 50% of allowable costs;
- travel expenses for a person accompanying a taxpayer on a business trip (a spouse, for example) are now deductible only if the companion also works for the employer and has a valid business reason for the travel;
- and no deduction is allowed for memberships in clubs primarily organized for entertainment, recreation, or other social purposes. The club dues ban includes country clubs and recreational and athletic clubs. However, dues paid to most professional, business, civic, and public service organizations remain deductible.

IRS looking closely at earned income

Some taxpayers may have to wait longer for tax refunds if they have claimed the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC).

The IRS is reviewing many if not all, tax returns that claim the EITC as part of an ongoing effort to reduce tax fraud. Some taxpayers simply have to wait up to eight weeks or more to receive this money, while other taxpayers whose 1994 tax return included EITC are receiving a follow-up questionnaire from the IRS, which may further delay the refund.

The questionnaire (IRS Form 9598) requires that specific documents be returned to the IRS along with the completed form. For example, a copy of the birth certificate for each child listed on the return must be sent with the form.

Long's United Drug store now open in Sierra Mall

Scientists explore recycling, reprocessing nuclear fuel

While nuclear power companies move ahead on plans to store waste on the Mescalero Apache reservation next to Ruidoso, New Mexico scientists are exploring other alternatives.

Experiments on transmutation of spent nuclear fuel are being conducted at Los Alamos National Laboratory. The process recycles spent fuel produced by power plants, reduces the amount of material and lowers its radioactive life.

Last month, Gov. Gary Johnson said he plans to take a leadership role in urging the Department of Energy to concentrate on finding alternatives to storing the waste. He specifically mentioned transmutation as a possibility.

A spokesman for his office last week said the governor has no plans to travel to Washington D.C. on that mission until after April 7, the deadline for him to act on bills passed by the State Legislature.

Nuclear waste presents a staggering national problem and is accumulating at a faster rate each year, Johnson said. Two features of nuclear waste set it apart:

— Its radioactivity lasts for long periods of time, ten or hundreds of thousands of years.

— Its inherent radioactivity, and the general public's fear of its potential harming effect, magnify the problem.

Although Department of Energy officials have said the government will accept ownership of the accumulated commercial power plant waste in 1998, the nation is a decade or more away from opening a permanent repository.

A specially assigned nuclear waste negotiator failed to reach agreement with Indian tribes to allow temporary storage on their lands. However, the Mescalero Apaches and 33 utilities have gone ahead with a contract of their own.

If the site and facility are approved by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, and transport by railroad is allowed, spent nuclear fuel rods could arrive at the reservation in the first five years of the next century.

Transmutation

The concept being explored at Los Alamos is based on using a high-energy proton beam that

shoots sub-atomic particles (neutrons) into radioactive atoms.

When the waste atom absorbs a neutron, it is converted to a different atom, one that could have a shorter half-life or even be non-radioactive.

The process "burns" the spent fuel, according to details released by project leader Charlie Bowman.

The storage time for the material remaining after this process could be greatly reduced, from hundreds of thousands of years to several centuries, he said.

"This considerable waste stream reduction in both mass and half-life clearly brings commercial and nuclear waste storage and secure disposal into a regime of greatly increased confidence," Bowman said.

The system promises significant safeguards and non-proliferation advantages, Bowman added.

Weapons plutonium could be burned until it is entirely gone, and a potential exists to burn commercial reactor spent fuel down to levels that do not require radioactive storage for hundreds of thousands of years.

Transmutation is under active study in the United States, Japan, Soviet Union and France.

However, members of environmental groups — who favor the shutdown of nuclear plants until a solution for their waste is determined — warn that the transmutation process may be economically and technically unreachable. Many proposals have been advanced, but to date none have survived serious examination, they say.

Reprocessing rejected

Reprocessing also has been proposed as an alternative to storage. But it's considered to be unfeasible from an economic standpoint, said Mark Holt of the Environment and Natural Resources Policy Division of the Library of Congress Research Service.

The Clinton administration also stands against reprocessing.

"The reprocessing program does not meet with the president's non-proliferation objectives, so there is nothing to give you on reprocessing," said Joanne Johnson of the U.S. Department of Energy.

Reprocessing of spent fuel is used to recapture uranium 235 (the number designates the concentration level) and plutonium created

during a reactor's operation, Holt wrote in a report published in 1991.

"The recovery of this fuel by mechanical, chemical and electrical methods is called reprocessing," he stated. "Until 1977, conventional thinking held that spent fuel would routinely be reprocessed to provide material for new fuel rods, reducing nuclear fuel costs and conserving uranium resources."

Construction of a large commercial reprocessing facility was stopped near completion at Barnwell, S.C. A commercial reprocessing plant near West Valley, N.Y. operated from 1966-72. Waste still located at the facility may cost an estimated \$3.4 billion to contain, according to Diane D'Arrigo of Nuclear Information Services in Washington D.C.

"In April 1977, because of concern over the potential diversion of reprocessed plutonium for weapons and to set an example for other nations, President Jimmy Carter banned commercial reprocessing in the United States," Holt said.

Although President Ronald Reagan lifted that ban in 1981, low uranium prices in the United States and other factors have made

commercial reprocessing economically unattractive. No plants currently are planned, D'Arrigo said.

Reprocessing in the U.S. now is carried out only by the Department of Energy for military purposes, Holt wrote. However, commercial reprocessing plants operate in four countries, including France and the United Kingdom, and 16 countries have reprocessed or plan to reprocess.

"This has led to extensive international movement of irradiated fuel, and will soon lead to an escalation in the always-risky transport of radioactive waste and plutonium," according to Nicholas Lenssen, author of Worldwatch Paper 106, published by Worldwatch Institute in Washington D.C.

The process of reducing the most potent component of nuclear waste actually increases the amount of waste with lower levels of radioactivity, Lenssen noted.

Overall, reprocessing expands the volume of radioactive waste 160-fold over the original irradiated fuel, according to the British Central Electricity Generating Board.

Domestic violence common locally

Judges of the magistrate, district and municipal courts in this county each say their dockets are filled with domestic violence cases — between 100 to 300 a year — and about 90% involve battery.

District Court Judge Richard Parsons said state courts are required to file domestic violence matters under the obtuse heading of domestic, which includes divorces and legal separations, so the violent ingredient of many cases is lost in the shuffle.

"Typically, they come in looking like raccoons," Judge Parsons said of the battered women appearing before him, "and a day or a month later, they come in and try to drop the case."

The victims' abrupt change of heart may be due to fear of retaliation, or the need for the man's income for the family's survival, Parsons said. Unless the violence is witnessed by a police officer, the case is often dropped if the victim won't testify.

At least 222 domestic violence victims sought help from the Ruidoso Police Department last

year, but only 22 alleged abusers were arrested. In the other cases, the disputing couples were simply separated and said they would work out their problem.

Unlike other states, (i.e. Colorado and Connecticut) where police officers must make an arrest when a domestic violence call is made, New Mexico state law only requires an arrest if the violence is apparent or the officer determines the situation is threatening.

The Center of Protective Environment in Alamogordo, Ruidoso's closest long-term shelter, keeps track of Lincoln County and

Mescalero visitors.

The counts include shelter stays of up to 90 days at confidential locations. In the 1991-92 year, 25% were from Mescalero, 6% from Lincoln County; in 1992-93, 29% were from Mescalero, 8% from Lincoln County; and in 1993-94, 30% from Mescalero, 8% from Lincoln County.

The majority of the Lincoln County visits were made by Ruidosians, after being referred by the Family Crisis Center, the police or sheriff's office, said Josie Jaramillo, the shelter's executive director.

Crisis center helps abused in Ruidoso area

Dr. Birgit LaMothe, Ph.D., counsels approximately 65 domestic violence victims a year through her volunteer work with Ruidoso's Family Crisis Center.

The center offers free domestic abuse counseling sessions each Monday at noon.

Long before a fist is raised, verbal abuse can destroy personal esteem, making many spouses feel trapped, ashamed or afraid, LaMothe said.

When the hitting starts, it's a bit of relief for some women, said LaMothe.

"The victim says 'I'd rather get hit than be psychologically abused,'" LaMothe explained. "Words can hurt so much more — you're worthless, can't balance a checkbook, you're ugly, fat, stupid — it goes on and on, year in and out, and the spouse is maligned, denigrated."

This pain and anger is not at all an uncommon pairing, LaMothe said, and it is in-

creasingly being played out in front of children, who are prone to being the abused or abusers of tomorrow.

The abuse often includes implications like, "If you would only do what I told you...." It's the blame-the-victim cycle, LaMothe said.

The victim tries harder to please, and the abuser tries to control his anger. Too often, however, either party lacks confidence to find help and the violence escalates.

An abusive person feels the need for power and control in the relationship and will use violence to get it. He is not the macho man of lore, but rather "a wimp" who "can't hold his own with his boss or friend, so he takes it out on his family," LaMothe alleged.

Many victims have reasons to not pack up and end a relationship, which include religious

convictions, children, finances, education, shelter or fear, she explained. Or maybe the barraging messages — that the victim is only half a person without the abuser — have sunk in and hit home.

"We can't indiscriminately advise people to split up," LaMothe said of her counseling sessions at the Family Crisis Center. "We go the route where we think we can save the relationship and place a strong focus on self-esteem."

Support services work to empower the person to make decisions about their own life, said Paul (who, as a matter of policy, refused to give his last name). Paul is the only male volunteering with the center since it was started by Dr. Arlene Brown and about 10 other area women.

"I saw one young lady who got beat up and it looked like he'd taken her eyeball and jammed in

a golf ball and then pulled the lid over it," Paul recalled. "Every time she cried her tears were red; it was awful."

Victims can access the shelter's services by contacting the police department, which immediately puts them in touch with the center volunteer for that day or night. The volunteer — most empathize with first-hand experience — arranges to meet with the victim at a neutral setting, at the police station or hospital, and will transport the person to the shelter and, later, district court for a restraining order.

"We're here just to provide services, not to judge," said Paul, who estimates the 10-year-old center sees about eight to 16 people a month.

An annual spaghetti dinner co-sponsored by the Altrusa and Rotary clubs in November raises money to help shelter victims.

Driveway changes get P&Z hearing tonight

Residents can speak out tonight about proposed changes to a Ruidoso driveway design law at a 6:30 p.m. Planning and Zoning Commission hearing at city hall.

Changes are suggested for single family and duplex developments. They would require the driveway entrance to have a six-foot section paved from the edge of the public road, with a three-inch, 8% grade dip in the center. A minimum 18-inch drainage pipe would be required under the driveway.

After the hearing, commissioners will review a request for more go-carts and a new racetrack at Ptrackers on Carrizo Canyon Road.

Ray Eidson, owner of the amuse-

ment park, wants to build a new 30-foot wide track for 10 go-carts on the west side of his property along Carrizo Creek.

He already maintains one track with a similar number of go-carts on the east side of the property.

The new track will require the construction of a new bridge, as well as the widening of an existing bridge by 30 feet.

The proposed building area is above flood elevation, Planning Director Cleatus Richards said.

Also at the meeting, commissioners will:

- review a variance to consolidate two lots on Spruce Drive for construction of a driveway;

- hold a workshop on annexation procedures and requirements.

against children would take place under the appropriate statute, she said.

"My hope is they are simply misreading the statute — to think anything else would be...horrible," she said.

"We're trying to get a handle on domestic violence as a problem," she said, "and not have it relegated to some lower level — like how some people now view it."

Related legislation awaiting the governor's signature includes:

- SB727, qualifying New Mexico for federal crime bill funding by not requiring victims of sexual assault pay for forensic exams;

- SB726 frees the victim of domestic violence from prosecution costs;

- SB512, the Family Violence

Protection Act, broadens the description of 'family member' in existing state criminal statutes to include former boyfriends, allowing officials to legally restrain stalkers and stop harassment;

- and HB334 requires jailers to notify the arresting agency when an accused abuser has been released, and requires the arresting agency to then "make a reasonable attempt" to notify the victim.

Only about 15 states now list domestic violence as a crime, Copas said.

New Mexicans put together a grassroots program helping shelter abused women as early as 1968. The coalition was established in 1981, providing shelter and counseling, and it now does abuser and victim counseling.

"This state has actually done quite well providing services," she said. The state lacks solid legislation for "all the cliché reasons — not wanting to talk about it. It's not fun, not pretty, and if you can avoid it, do so if you can."

The New Mexico Coalition Against Domestic Violence runs secret shelters, providing meals, beds and support services in 28 communities on a \$4 million budget. Services last year were offered to 22,700 people, with 7,200 staying in a shelter. The balance received counseling services.

"Some victims never come through the courts, or the police may never file a report on a case, or the victim might not want to press charges but goes to counseling," Copas said, explaining other ac-

counting obstacles for family violence.

Figures from the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, based in Colorado, estimate four million women were battered in the United States last year, "but that might be a conservative number," Copas said.

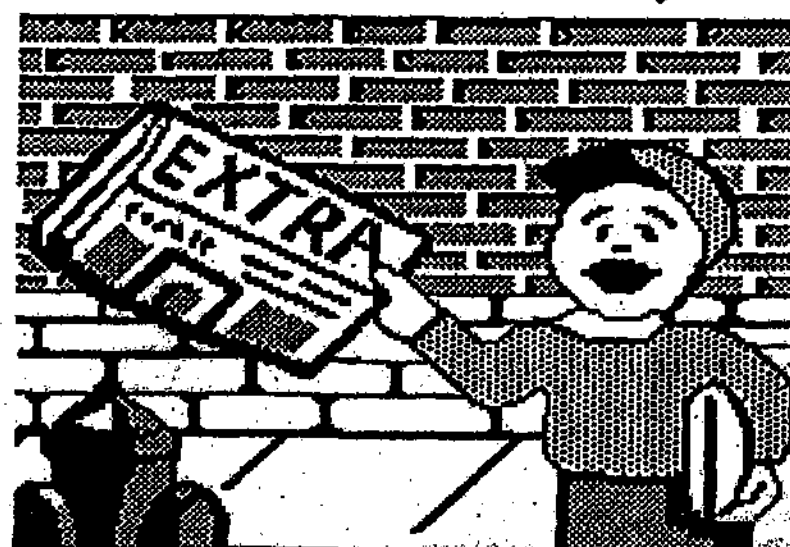
"I've seen figures saying a woman is battered every 15 seconds, and have seen every nine seconds and 18...Yes, figures are important, but I don't want people to get bogged down arguing stats. It's not the issue," Copas concluded.

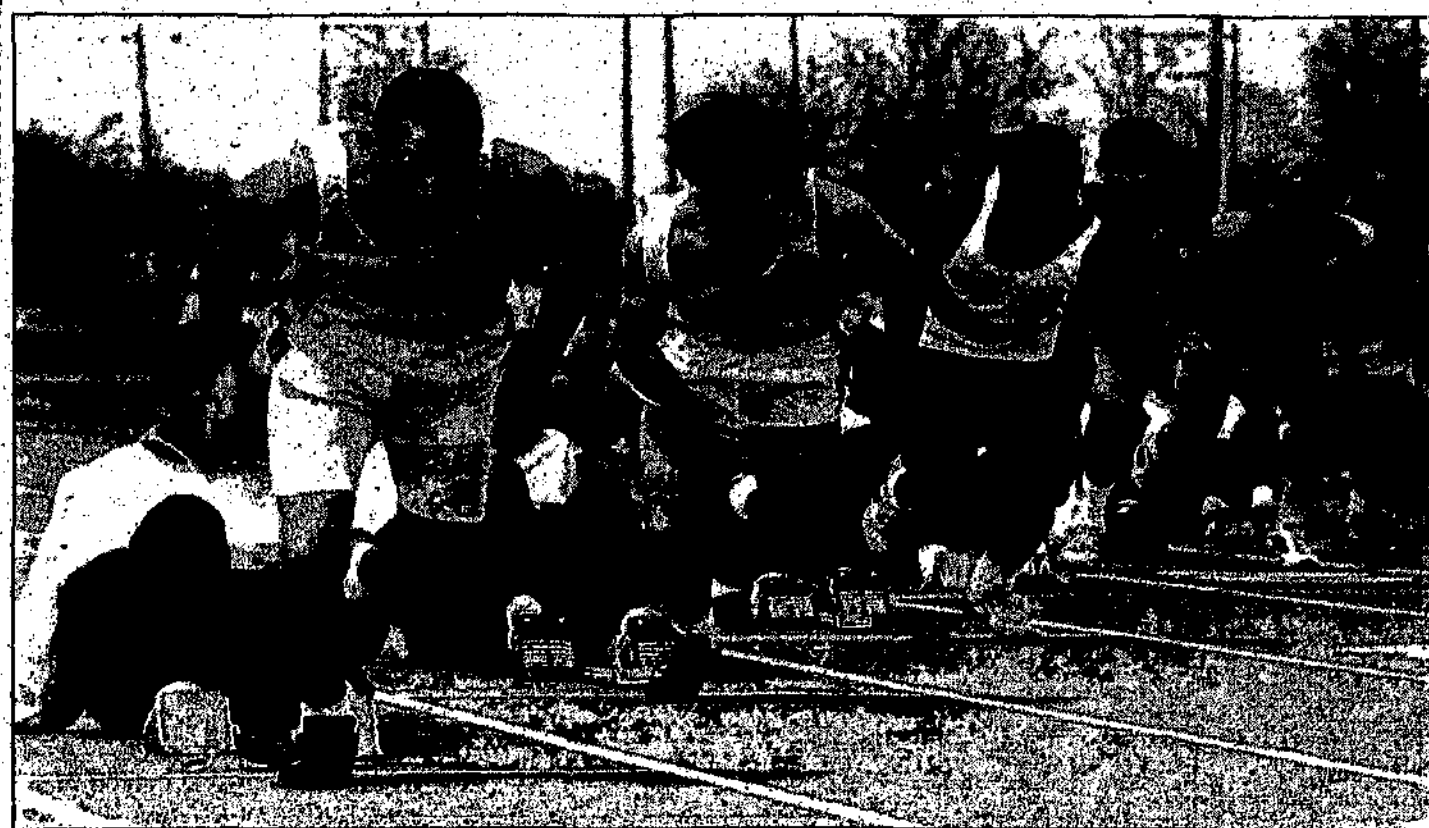

Ruidoso forced into Cinderella-role at Goddard meet

Much like Cinderella, the Ruidoso track team had to leave before the final dance in order to catch a coach back home Saturday.

But unlike the fairytale beauty, the Warriors left early to make it to a different dance - the prom dance.

The Warriors, who were competing in Roswell, missed 10 final running events of the Goddard Invitational so they could get home in time for prom night.

The way Ruidoso track coach Ronny Maskew figured it, he and the Warriors would have time for both the invitational's final events and the prom. But the sluggish pace of the track meet kept that from happening.

Preliminaries didn't end until 1:40 p.m., which meant the finals didn't start until 2:40 p.m.

"We were doing extremely well until we had to bring them (the competitors) back," Maskew said.

The return before the meet ended meant the Warriors didn't run those who qualified in the following events: the 400-meter run for both boys and girls; the 800-meter run for both boys and girls; the boys and girls medley relays; the boys 3200-meter run; the girls 1600-meter run; the boys and girls 200-meter dash; and the boys and girls 1-mile relays.

Up until they left, many of the Warriors were posting personal bests. The week of practice since their last meet has helped the team improve, Maskew said.

"We couldn't believe the improvements in times," he said.

Maskew's shining example of improvement is David Hufstodler, who chopped 1/2 second off his time in the 110-meter high hurdles. Hufstodler took third place with a time of 15.17. His previous personal best was 15.6. Hufstodler was third also in the 300-meter hurdles (41.16).

Bridget Tam continued to pace the girls team. She was second in the 3200-meter run with a time of 12:18.79. Maskew thinks his freshman standout could have finished second as well in the 1600-meter run.

"She's doing extremely well for a freshman - she's just such a competitor," Maskew said of Tam.

The Warriors' relay teams have also made dramatic strides, Maskew said.

The 400-meter girls relay, consisting of Chrystal Sumlin, Lyndsay Willard, Mandi Lewallen and Priscella Rojas, was fifth with a time of 57.53. Ryan Trout, Ricky Pacini, Brandon Eamello and Trey Brantley teamed together to take fifth in the boys 800-meter relay (1:38.38).

Ruidoso has had several pleasant surprises. Junior Angelica Figueroa had the invitational's second-best discus toss of 108-11. In fourth place was Monique Ramos, who threw the discus 105-11.

Senior Malik Waters and Melissa Miller boosted Ruidoso's high jump efforts. Both competed in their first meet for the Warriors since finishing the basketball

(Waters) and cheerleading (Miller) seasons.

Waters cleared 5-10, which was good enough for second place. Miller, who started practice Tuesday, was fourth with a jump of 4-10.

Others earning points for Ruidoso were Kyle Humphreys, fourth place in long jump; and Trey Brantley and Jeremy Axelson, tied for sixth place in high jump.

The Odessa Permian boys team ran away with team honors. The visitors from Texas outscored their nearest competitor by 55 points. Goddard captured the girls title.

Maskew was pleased with how the Warriors performed, and the veteran coach thinks the competition against larger schools helps.

"The better competition you compete against, the better off you'll be," Maskew said. "I just hope we have another good week of practice."

Ruidoso travels to Roswell again Saturday for the Roswell High School Invitational.

Fortunately for Maskew and his Warriors, this time they don't have to worry about the coach turning into a pumpkin.

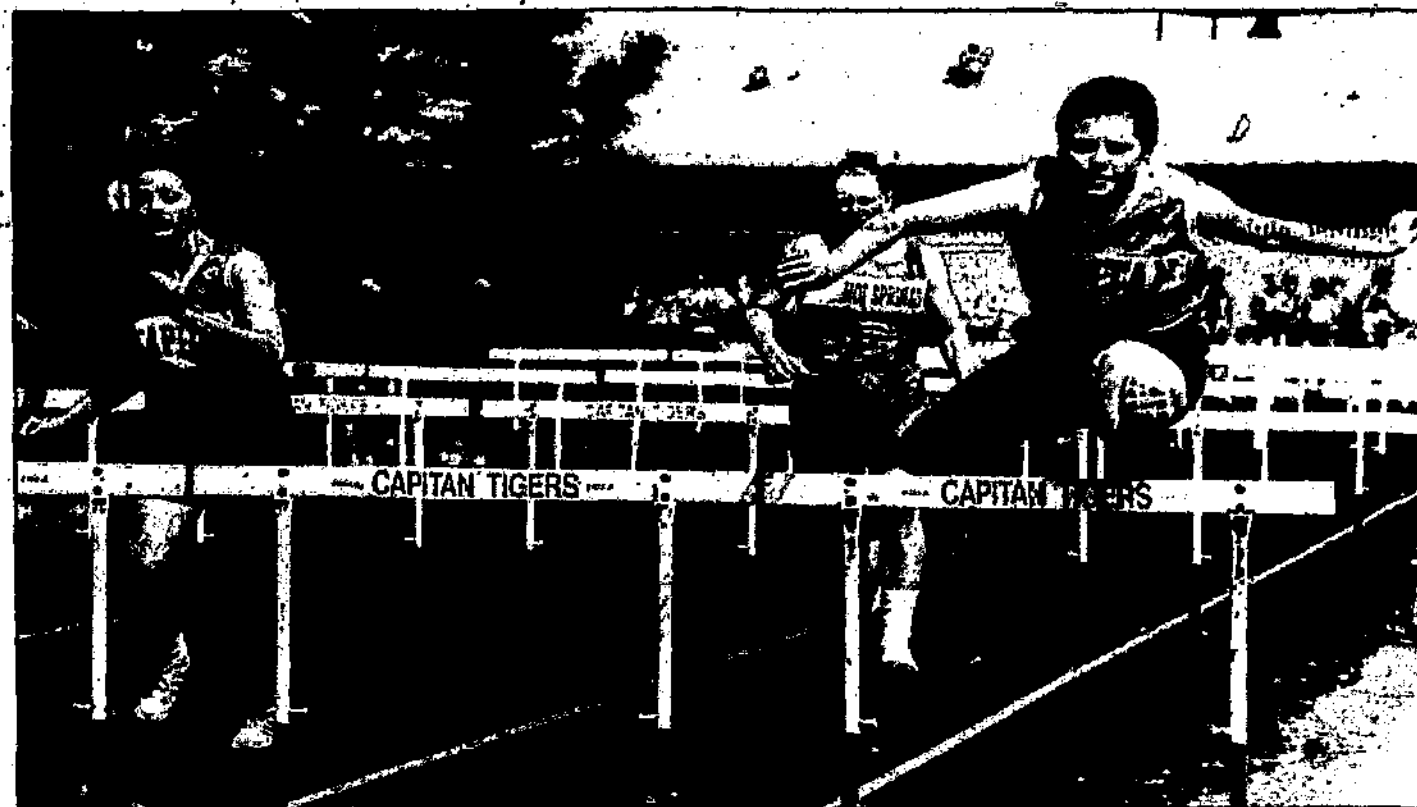

Tigers dominate own invitational

After Saturday's Capitan Invitational, Tiger track coaches Ed Davis and Pam Allen learned what their teams need to work on in the final month of the season.

For the boys, it's more conditioning. For the girls, it's better timing. Fortunately for both teams, neither is a daunting task.

"We can blow people away in the first 300 meters, but we lack the conditioning for the end of races," Davis said. "We're not in shape."

For Allen and her Tigers, it's a matter of honing their already strong relay skills.

"It was the first time our sprint relay had run all year, and it was a little bit bumpy, but we'll get that worked out," Allen said.

Fans and coaches at the meet might disagree with Allen. The Tigers didn't look rusty as they swept all four relay events.

Chris Worrell, Trisha Seidel, Jessica Robertson and Amy Cline teamed together to win the 400-meter relay (53.6) and the 800-meter relay (1:55.3).

Joel Autry and Veronica Royball joined Cline and Worrell for the 1600-meter relay. The Tigers won that with a time of 4:34.32. In the medley relay, Robertson, Royball, Autry and Catherine Sidwell won it with a time of 4:45.49.

Capitan's sweep of the relays

plus first-place finishes by Worrell in the 100-meter dash (13.03), by Andra Fish in the 100-meter hurdles (19.82), and by Coye Robbins in the 300-meter hurdles (55.3) — led the Tigers to an easy team victory. Capitan won the invitational with 103 points. Second-place Hot Springs scored 80 points.

For the boys, the difference between second and third place in the team standings was less than a foot. In the final event of the meet, Clouderoff's 1600-meter relay team beat the Tigers to the tape by about eight inches. The second-place relay finish gave the Bears a second-place team standings finish.

Despite the outcome, Davis could find no fault in his Tigers' effort.

"I thought they did a tremendous job," Davis said.

Capitan was again without senior standout Michael Fish, who pulled his left hamstring a couple of weeks ago. A specialist will check out Fish's leg this week, Davis said. The Capitan coach doesn't know when Fish will return to competition.

The Tigers also missed three teammates who were participating in FFA activities. Junior Neil Montes, one of Capitan's top distance runners, was one of the three at the FFA activity.

Capitan took first place in three events. The Tigers' 400-meter relay

team of Wayne LaBelle, James Tacey, Jayson McSwane and Kali Bagby won, as did McSwane in the 300-meter hurdles (43.63) and Rodney Sedillo in the 800-meter run (2:13.46).

Both Tiger track teams will compete at the Roadrunner Conference Meet Saturday in Hagerman.

River safe from gas spill now

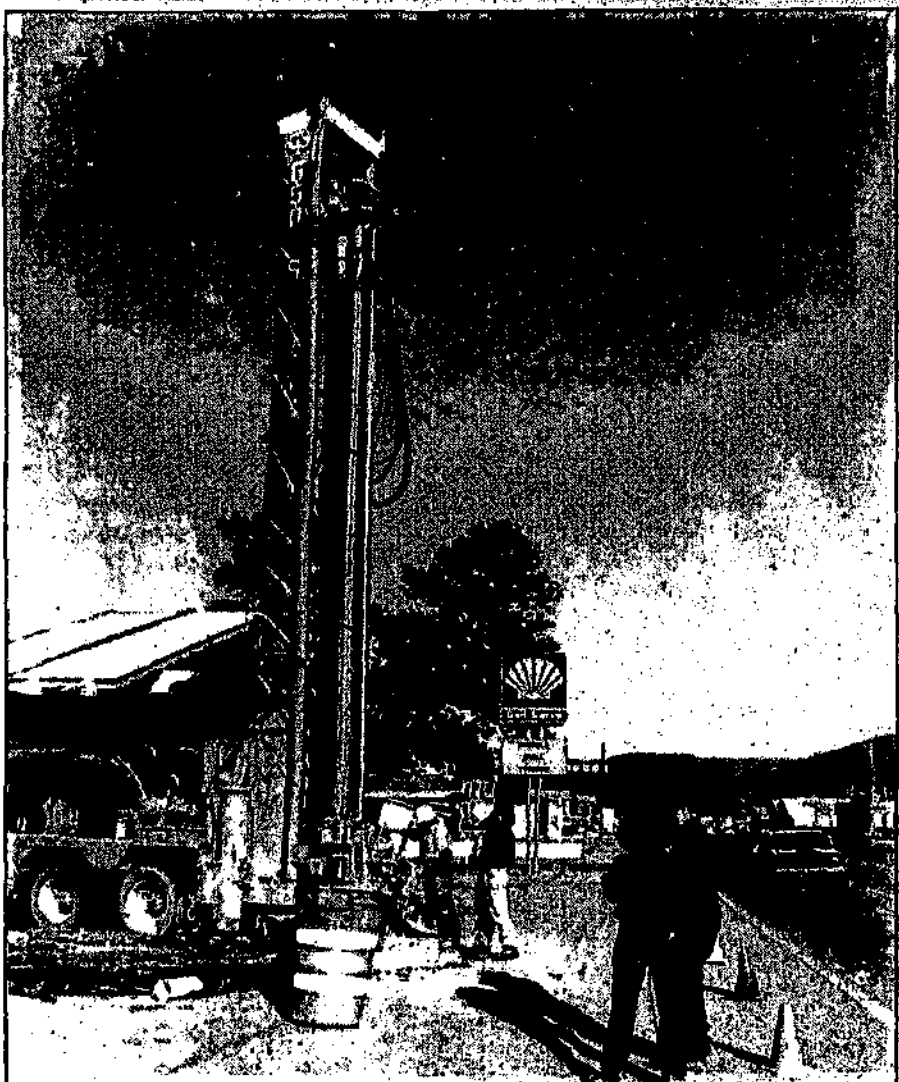

Extraction pumps recovering gas from a huge, 17-year-old spill in Ruidoso have immediately reduced the threat of the toxins seeping into the Rio Ruidoso.

The 12,000 gallon leak came from an old underground storage tank below the Sudderth Drive Gateway Shell Station.

"Once we start cleaning up we recover a lot (of gas) in the beginning," said geologist Rose Thompson from the state environmental department, adding, "The threat basically goes away."

Clean-up began about three weeks ago with the mechanical drilling and physical digging of extraction wells. The total subsurface cleansing will take about four years, Thompson said.

State environmental department officials gained the necessary clean up permits for the Shell spill earlier this month. Most of the reclamation wells dug by contracted workers are on Reese Drive properties; the gas below these yards will soon be pumped into a temporary storage tank placed behind the Sudderth Drive Shell Station. Much of the gas will be recycled, and, later in the process, vapors from the ground will be extracted and incinerated.

The state budgeted \$625,000 for the project, and contracted the work to the environmental engineering firm of Daniel B. Stevens and Assoc. The work will be considered completed once the groundwater returns to the standards of the state's water quality commission, Thompson said.

The Gateway Shell spill, which is estimated to have a depth of 16 feet, is identified by the state environmental depart-

ment as the largest and most serious leak from an underground storage tank in Ruidoso.

Another aging spill of approximately 4,000 to 5,000 gallons exists across the street from the Shell Station at the Exxon Station.

That spill has converged with the Shell spill, and after years of seeping through the gradient soil, has inched ever closer to the river — about 200 feet away, Thompson told the Planning and Zoning Commission in late January.

Because the Exxon spill is from a separate source, it is being handled through a different contract, she said.

The leaks came from gas station underground storage tanks which have since been repaired or replaced, Thompson said.

The area's residents and commercial employees obtain drinking water from the city, explained P&Z director Cleatus Richards, although some homeowners use their private wells for irrigation.

Not until 1989 did the federal government mandate environmental guidelines regulating the storage systems, Thompson said.

But since then, daily and yearly tank tests detecting leaks have been required. And tanks that have not been upgraded must be replaced by 1998 with new, double walled tanks that have superior leak detection systems, she added.

Nine other gas spills in Ruidoso are being investigated, said Thompson, but those spills are minor in comparison to the one below the Shell station.

One 1,000 gallon spill lies along Sudderth Drive not far south of the Gateway spills, below the Dale Texaco Station.

"We'll be doing more work — still defining the extent of contamination," Thompson said of the additional spill sites, adding that "they probably are not a very big problem."

Another seven sites in town were contaminated below the ground, and these spills have already been treated, Thompson said.

These spill sites are mostly at gas stations, but also include locations that had private company tanks to gas up fleet trucks or cars, she said. Among these sites were Ruidoso's old City Hall and Carrizo Lodge.

Family mourns beaten pet cat

Finding their pet cat dead in the road March 13 was hard enough for two small Ruidoso children.

But learning that he was murdered by one of the neighborhood kids was a cruelty difficult to accept.

"It was really devastating for them," said the children's mother, Becky Jones, a George P. White Drive resident. "I didn't know how to explain the violence."

Jones contacted police, who gained a confession from a 10-year-old boy in the neighborhood. His mother had said, "not my boy" when the officer and Jones went to the perpetrator's door.

But the boy, upon questioning, admitted to throwing rocks and sticks at the cat, hitting him several times. He did not know, however, that he had killed the pet, Jones said.

Being only 10, there was not much the cat's owners or police could do. Jones didn't really want legal action anyway, she said. Rather, she just wanted to let his parents know of his behavior and to get him some counseling if needed.

"As I told the police sergeant," Jones related, "If it's a cat today, will it be a human being 10 years from now?"

According to Ruidoso's Animal Control Officer Peggy Williams, who just returned from a vacation and was not fully aware of the incident, about 95% of cases involving

cruelty to animals are due to ignorance.

She called most animal abuses "subtle cruelty," or simple ignorance about the animal's need for shelter even when it has a shaggy coat, or its ample need for water or shade from the hot sun.

"It's not often that you see an out and out cruelty," Williams said. She added that understanding the motives of the aggressive child "depends on his age and where his head is at...I don't know if he was associating (his actions) with cartoons or hitting the cat not thinking it would hurt him...."

Williams said parents must convey to children the harmful impact of throwing objects at animals.

"There is a correlation between animal cruelty by children and their getting into more serious things down the road," she said, adding, "The children need to be talked to and told the animals do feel this pain and it is not funny."

The Jones' bright orange cat, named O.J., was found with his teeth smashed out, laying dead by the side of the road late in the afternoon, Jones said the family's immediate assumption was their pet had been struck by a car during his daytime prowls.

Soon after, Jones said they learned O.J. had also suffered from a broken leg and actually died of massive internal injuries.

The kids held a funeral ceremony for him the following day,

burying him in their back yard. They made him a plaque marking his span of life, and read poems.

Jones said that it was about three days later that neighborhood kids approached the family and told them of the neighbor boy hitting the feline with rocks and sticks. The cat finally got away from the assault, dragging himself under a porch.

Later, he must have crawled out from under the house and lay by the road.

He had been dead awhile when the Jones' kids, on their way home from school, found his stiff body.

Seeking recovery from the jarring sight of O.J., Jones said she took her son (it was actually his pet) to the animal shelter last week to consider adopting a similar looking cat.

"It didn't work — he took a look and broke out crying," she said, and further explained her boy has kept O.J.'s collar hanging in his room as a keepsake.

Jones said her real concern is that the neighboring child receive therapy for his abusive behavior.

"If he needs counseling, then his mother should get him into counseling," she said. "It was an extreme cruelty what he did."

She added that, after the police intervention, the boy's mother said she and her child would come over and talk with the Jones family.

"I haven't seen or heard from her yet," she said.

Lone Tree chooses board member

Lone Tree Inc., a not-for-profit Christian ministry based in Capitán, has named Gerry Falls of Elephant Butte to a three-year term on its board of directors.

Lone Tree has three camps in New Mexico where more than 3,000 young people and adults attended a variety of programs last year, said board Chairman Tim Worrell, of Capitán. Two of the camps are at the base of the Capitan mountains. These offer western-style adventures including horseback riding and rodeos, rappelling and rope climbing, archery and games. The

aquatic camp programs include swimming, water skiing, parasailing, jet skiing, and the blob (a catapult).

Founded in 1980, the purpose of Lone Tree is to use adventure activities to teach biblical principals that relate to everyday life, Worrell said. Campers gain skills and build character. The teachings are non-denominational and the camp cooperates with individuals, churches, and civic groups, Worrell said.

Lone Tree also has a special program where they take high school students into Juarez, Mexico to

build homes for families who now live in cardboard shacks. In three days, 19 students complete a simple 11 by 23 foot home.

"We're glad to have Mr. Falls working with us," Worrell said. In addition to his position as CEO of his family company for several years, he brings experience from being on the board of directors for the YMCA and Chamber of Commerce in Albuquerque, and now serves as a director of the state Better Business Bureau and the Truth or Consequences Chamber of Commerce, Worrell said.

scones are her specialty, exhibiting both form and function.

New spring stars appear in the east to steal the glory of the winter groups still shining in the west. Mars, high in the south in early evening, marks the dividing line between seasonal domains.

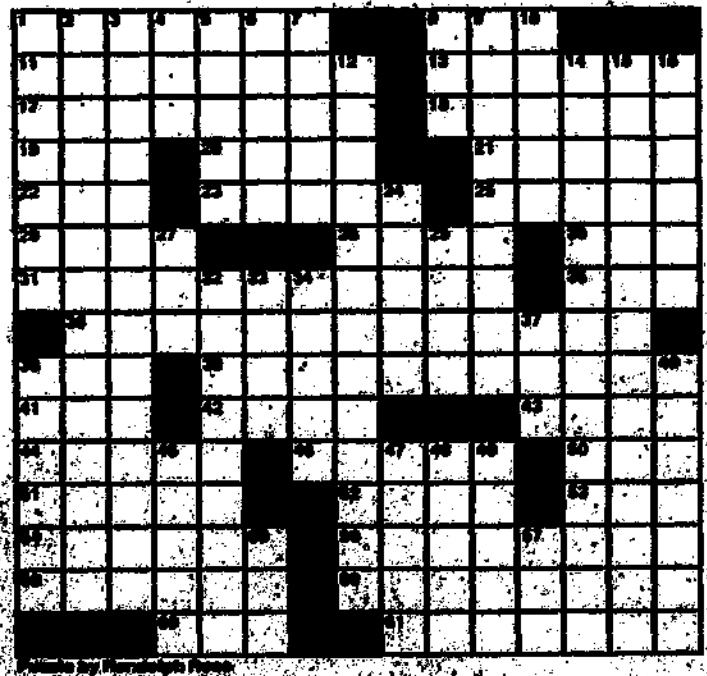

Fort's future on county's agenda

The future of Lincoln County's rural events center, its road department and the historic Fort Stanton complex will be discussed during the County Commission meeting Tuesday.

Two proposals for Community Development Block grants also are on the 28-item agenda to be covered, starting at 9 a.m. in the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

The Lincoln County Medical Center with support from the state Public Health division is asking for a \$250,000 CDBG grant to acquire a mobile clinic van and equipment to provide primary care, dental services, immunizations, health screening and other programs on a regular schedule in different rural communities. Another \$50,000 is included for other expenses.

The second Community Development Block Grant request is for

\$260,000 to construct a senior citizens center in Hondo Valley.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley is on the agenda to look at the assessment for extraordinary road maintenance, recently increased from 10 cents to 20 cents per frontage foot.

"When I made the motion to increase the assessment, I said we needed to take a look at it, that the way it was being applied may not have been fair," Nunley said Friday. "We'll be defining what extraordinary maintenance means. In my mind, it means paving, chip sealing, installation of culverts, restoring washed out or long-neglected roads. It does not mean maintaining a dirt road."

Ann Buffington is on the agenda to present the first-ever request for funding by the County Historical Society. The group seeks \$5,000 for a part-time clerk to research and index the county's archives.

POOP SCOOP

Heart disease plagues canine and feline friends just as it does humans.

Spring brings an increase in diagnoses of heart disease that may not have been apparent during sedentary winter months.

Heart disease can take the form of defective valves, tumors, defective muscle tissue or infection with adult heartworms, said Jim Riggins, manager of the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter.

Symptoms include a persistent dry cough, abdominal distention, weakness and difficulty breathing, especially during physical activity.

The most common complication of heart disease occurs when fluid is retained. Pressure builds up and causes leaking of fluids. In the right side of the heart, fluids will leak into the abdomen or body cavities, he said.

More serious, when pressure builds on the left side of the heart, veins supplying the heart with oxygenated blood from the lungs will leak fluids directly into the lungs, causing restricted breathing and related complications.

Early detection is vital in treating heart disease, especially in cats where the onset is often sudden, Riggins said. In both species, heart disease left untreated probably will become progressive. After treatment, many animals return to normal lives with restrictions on physical activity.

In addition to standard treatments with drugs, changing diet and restricting salt intake (which causes water retention) can help.

Some hidden sources of high concentrations of salt in the home are water softeners or municipal water systems high in naturally occurring or additive salts. Check with your local water company. Acceptable levels are below 450 parts per million.

With warmer weather on its way to Lincoln County, adult volunteers would be welcome to visit and exercise the abandoned pets at the humane society shelter. Please coordinate your visit with Riggins by calling 257-9841.

Please, celebrate Public Health Week and immunize children

There's an official week in honor of just about everything in this country, but we feel it's worthy to emphasize the need for children to be immunized during National Public Health Week, April 2-8.

Approximately 200 young children (22.5%) in Lincoln County have not been properly immunized against eight childhood diseases, despite the fact that the shots are free.

So what are the reasons why parents don't immunize their children? Lincoln County public health nurse Theresa Luna reports hearing some pitifully poor excuses: "I forgot," or "My kid has a runny nose," or "I can't stand to see my child in pain" from the shots.

If you forgot how often your child needs shots, here's a rundown: at the age of two months, four months, six months, 12-15 months, and four years (a series of five visits). After that, all they need is a tetanus booster in their teen years.

By the way, a runny nose doesn't matter. You can get shots whether you're sick or not.

Luna has been giving shots to children for nine years and has never seen any unusual reactions to the vaccinations. The worst that can occur is a light fever and a little bit of swelling (alleviated by a compress or bath).

It's hard to understand how a parent would trade the pain of a shot for the pain of measles — a horribly high fever, unbearable itching, two weeks in the hospital on oxygen and IV. Or the pain of the consequences that could be permanent — hearing or vision loss.

A recent outbreak of measles in Albuquerque proves that the danger is real to those who are complacent about immunizing their children.

Just 32 years ago, parents didn't have the choice between the pain of the measles and the pain of a shot. Before the measles vaccine was approved in 1963, an average of 500,000 mothers had to watch their children suffer from this disease. An average of 400 had to bury their children each year.

It's a wonderful choice to have, and it's free. Celebrate Public Health Week and call your public health nurse for free shots. Call 258-3252 in Ruidoso or 648-2412 in Carrizozo.

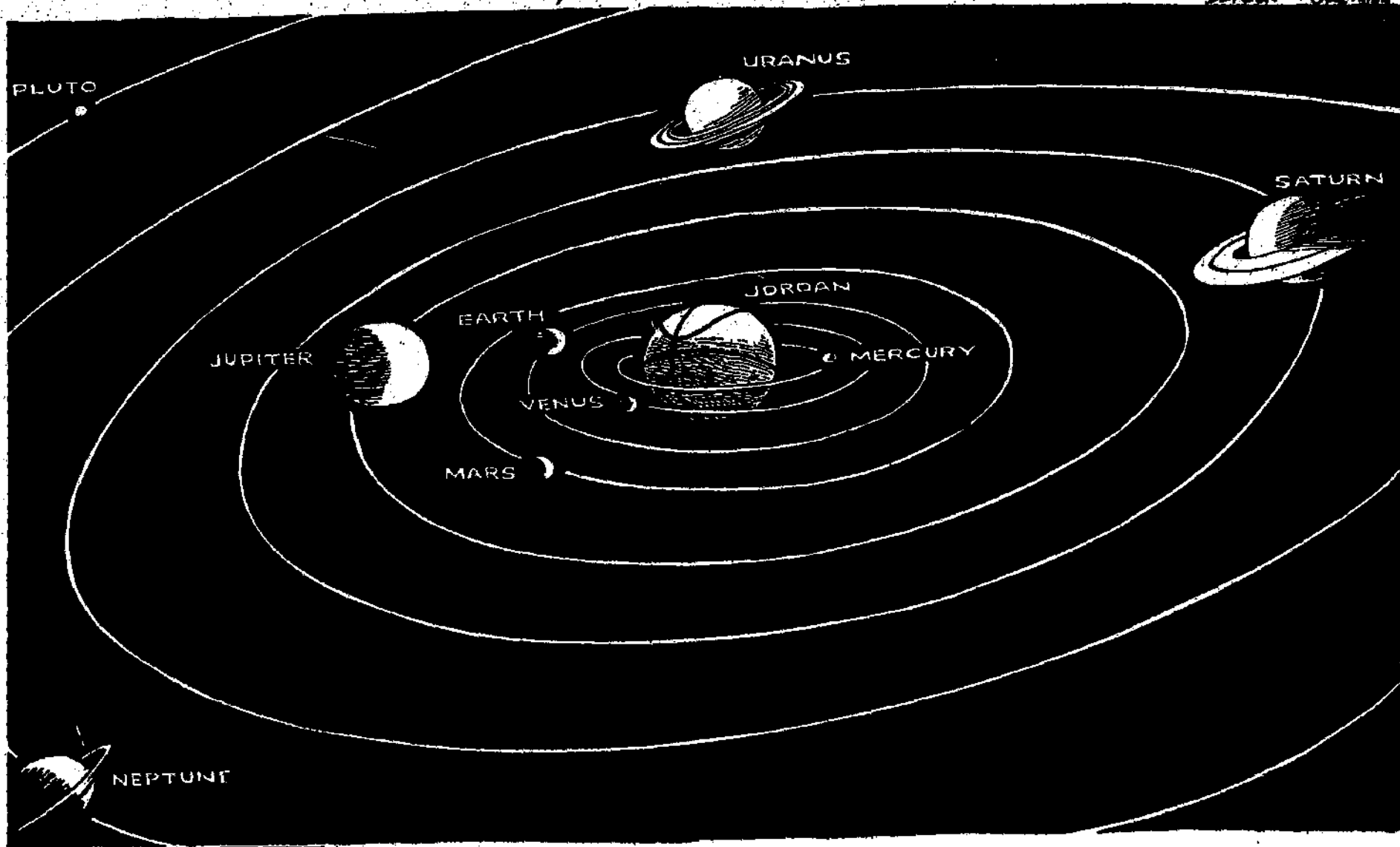

We don't have to accept majority vote decision

TO THE EDITOR:

An open letter to the Apaches who voted 'no'.

Originally I thought I would bite my tongue and view your tribe's re-vote on nuclear waste storage as a bad dream, but I cannot ignore my dismay with recent actions of your Tribal Council. I believe your leaders have behaved irresponsibly and in so doing, let you down. In their arrogance, ignorance or greed they have acted in a most irregular manner and placed not only your health and safety in harms way, but the welfare of thousands of others at risk.

In my letter to this paper at the end of January, I suggested that the Tribal Council faced a predicament. Obviously unhappy with the outcome of the first vote, I believe they took extreme steps to tilt the re-vote to get their way.

THE TRIBAL COUNCIL CAUSED THE PREDICAMENT.

To send one of their members on a door-to-door campaign with a petition seeking a re-vote was the first step in a comedy of errors. To presume that the concept of "let's vote it again and get it right this time" would go unnoticed and not be criticized was naive. The radio blitz paid for the Tribal Council on the day of the re-vote, contaminated any chance of having a fair referendum. It is no wonder the council is taking a pounding of well-deserved criticism. Just imagine the fireworks if the executive branch of the U.S. government were to launch an attack on the Republican Agenda with federal funds. A re-vote on the question of nuclear waste storage should never have been considered.

The Ruidoso News in editorial comment suggests that, now that the re-vote is over, "those against the project must accept the majority position." Nothing could be further from the truth for several reasons:

1. Your leaders' radio ads promised that having nuclear waste on your homelands would be "safe." Wendell Chino, Fred Pess and Freddie Kaydabanne (HUD) lack the knowledge or expertise to make such a promise. No one knows what might happen if you bring together such a massive amount of radioactive waste from all over the nation to be con-

centrated in such a small area. There is no experience to rely upon and therefore the best promises the Tribal Council can make are based on hypothetical guesswork. If safe, then why would Pennsylvania Power & Light's Herbert Woodchick write "PP&L continues to explore all options in seeking a solution to allow removal of Susquehanna's used fuel at the earliest possible date." There are 31 other members of the consortium hoping to solve similar problems by dumping on Mescalero land.

2. The ads stressed the point that no gases or liquid contaminants would be present. They made no mention of the fact that radioactivity has no odor and can contaminate soil and water as well as humans. This type of misleading advertising is the work of spin doctors, not wise leaders.

3. The ads promise hundreds of jobs. This may prove to be overly optimistic as there is no end product in this project. Logic would suggest that as soon as the protective bunkers are complete, the elaborate security system finished and the radioactive wastes in place, that you are not going to see hundreds of Apaches working. Rather, it is likely that management would want as few people as possible to be exposed to the potential risks. In this case money has been confused with the promise of job opportunities, and at best any long-term jobs created will be neither challenging nor productive. Due to the risks involved, mechanical robots would be better suited for the work.

The department of your tribal leaders has attracted adverse and detrimental national attention. Considering that scientists from Los Alamos Labs recently determined radioactive contamination and wastes in Nevada might explode and not consider safe, I respectfully suggest that this is not the time to abandon your fight to protect your homelands. I believe you have been treated as second class citizens by your leaders. Again, I suggest that your Tribal Council faces a predicament — to modify its behavior or find the sovereignty of your tribe being challenged at every turn.

Know that you are not alone and have many supporters. I believe you are right and your leaders sadly wrong. I extend to you my friendship and respect.
