Leaders report on best, worst of times

The coming year will be a time of uncertainty for R.D. Hubbard's enterprises in the Ruidoso Downs area.

Until Hubbard sees whether the New Mexico Legislature approves gambling for racetracks during its 1996 session, plans for a resort hotel are on hold and operational costs at Ruidoso Downs Race Track will have to be cut, said Mark Wilson, president of Hubbard Enterprises.

To help the track cut its losses during the coming season, employees were told Tuesday morning that their paychecks will be cut by 10%, Wilson said.

Wilson was one of several community leaders who spoke Tuesday at the annual Community Update luncheon sponsored by *The Ruidoso*

News. The sold-out event was held in the Ruidoso Civic Center.

"We didn't get the job done (at the state Legislature), but the game's not over," Wilson assured the attentive crowd. "We're in overtime. We'll be back in January and have an excellent chance."

Wilson alleviated fears of some community leaders when he said the Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs will never be moved. He said a broader base of community support will be needed to maintain the quality of programs and displays, however.

The track will also try some new approaches this summer to boost business, Wilson said.

To help avoid the \$1 million loss experienced by the track last year, seven races from Santa Fe Downs will be simulcast each Thursday and Friday starting June 15, he said. The races will follow seven simulcasts from Ruidoso Downs to Santa Fe. The total number of live races at the local track will be dropped from 10 to seven on those two days, he said.

"We're hoping to give our fans more wagering opportunities," he said.

Simulcasting will continue into early evening from racetracks in Texas, he said.

"I think it will be an exciting opportunity for you to get out and

support the track," Wilson said.

On Saturday and Sunday, the criss-cross of simulcasting with Santa Fe also will be run, but the number of local live races will increase to 11 or 12, he said.

Other new focuses will be a group sales program, the opening of the Ruidoso Race Horse Hall of Fame and a supervised playground for children.

The choice of a 10% pay cut was preferred over the option of laying off employees at the track, Wilson said. The employees were ensured

that if gambling is approved for the track next year, the action will be reversed, he said.

In line with the theme voiced by master of ceremonies Don Dutton, "It was the best of times and the worst of times," (taken from F. Scott Fitzgerald's "Great Gatsby" novel), other speakers emphasized the positive.

Home sales still up

Doug Siddens, president of the Board of Realtors, stressed a theme

of growth. Last year's real estate sales hit \$92.6 million, the highest reported since the boom of 1985 at \$79.8 million, he said.

Despite uncertainty about the fate of Hubbard's enterprises and the closing of Ft. Stanton as a state facility last month, sales are up 8.85% during the first three months of 1995 over the same period last year.

"This is exciting when you think of the turmoil we have been through in the past year," he said.

County property values skyrocket

Property values in Lincoln County have jumped by \$44 million over 1994 and should go even higher before the final figure is set for 1995.

County Assessor Patsy Serna said the 16% increase, from \$279,022,612 to \$323,484,826, reflects more than 100 new homes built or under construction in the Alto and Ruidoso communities, along with a countywide re-evaluation.

"The market is good in Ruidoso," Serna said. "Some land is selling for outrageous prices. We had two small undeveloped lots in Upper Canyon on the river that sold for \$90,000 and \$95,000."

All of the new houses may not be credited to the final value figure, Serna said.

"We have to determine if they were 50% completed on Jan. 1," she said. "If not, they will be credited to the 1996 tax roll."

Commissioners may rescind subdivision road tax

A road assessment tax imposed two decades ago to pay for extraordinary maintenance on subdivision streets may be repealed by the Lincoln County Commission next month.

Since commissioners increased the tax from 10 cents per foot of road frontage to 20 cents earlier this year, complaints from property owners in rural subdivisions have poured into the county office.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley Tuesday said he wanted to reconsider the increase.

"When I originally made the motion, I said at the time that I thought the assessment for the most part was unfair and it needed work," Nunley said. "I think as a

commission, we have tried to do that."

The major problem has been defining what constitutes extraordinary maintenance, he said.

"I consider it maintaining or putting in a chip seal surface, maintaining or putting in paving or repairing and rebuilding neglected or damaged roads with culverts or whatever. So when you pay the tax, you see something in return," Nunley said. "I don't believe blading four or five times a year is extraordinary maintenance."

Only \$47,000 is generated annually from the assessment on subdivision roads, he said.

Commissioner Wilton Howell said he preferred going a step further by repealing the entire assessment.

"My statement is that maybe it's

time we readjusted our ambitions and scale back (road work)," he said. "Let's remove it (the assessment) entirely."

He offered a motion to set a hearing to consider repeal. It passed unanimously.

Howell later said residents of at least one subdivision in the county are considering creating their own road tax district. That may be the way to go in the future, he said. Residents could set their own levels of maintenance and improvements.

The county road department has been restructured since former manager Bill Cupit resigned to run a family business in Las Cruces.

"We've redefined what it's doing as a department," Nunley said.

But Commissioner Bill Schwettmann, who has pushed for the county to upgrade its equip-

ment to handle chip seal roads, said the new definition may be wrong.

Step backwards

When several commissioners indicated they were interested in selling new chip sealing equipment recently purchased by the county and never used, Schwettmann balked.

The season for that type of work isn't until June through August. That gives plenty of training time, he said.

"That equipment has an indefinite life and it would be very remiss for us to neglect the millions of dollars involved in asphalt roads now," he said. "I believe in private enterprise, but I still think the way we do our funny books, we can do it cheaper."

Most of the subdivisions in the county are in Schwettmann's commission district. He lives in Alto, which has asphalt surfaced roads.

County Manager Carol Cooney said when repairs and resurfacing are needed in the few subdivisions with chip seal roads, the work can be done by a private contractor.

Chip seal was a priority 1 1/2 years ago, Nunley said. But after money was set aside for the equipment purchase, the enthusiasm seemed to ebb.

"I agree with (Spencer), we're a dirt road county," Nunley said.

Only 26 miles of subdivision roads are chipped sealed, Commissioner Chairman Monroy Montes said.

With Schwettmann voting nay, the commission agreed that Cooney

could seek bids on selling the county chip spreader and truck, setting a minimum price of about \$150,000.

Commissioners also gave Cooney the OK to auction some old road department equipment at the county's annual June event, including a water truck and tank, and a John Deere blade.

Also at the meeting, commissioners decided to rebid a tractor trailer rig and three dump trucks for lease purchase by the county. They said the \$265,620 price was too high for the trucks, although it was the second time the trucks were bid. Commissioners told Cooney to write more general specifications and leave it up to the dealers what they think would be the best piece of equipment for the job.

Grants for San Patricio senior center, mobile clinic debated

Lincoln County Commissioners played political ping pong Tuesday with projects competing for a grant application.

Although the final decision was left open pending more data, the winner appears to be the Lincoln County Medical Center's mobile health clinic with support from the District IV New Mexico Public Health Office.

Commissioners have until May 19 to submit an application for a Community Development Block Grant. The grant is funded by the federal government and allocated by the state.

The mobile unit, designed to deliver primary health care to rural areas of the county, would cost about \$250,000 with another \$50,000 requested for staff and expenses. The county would contribute vehicle maintenance.

However, advocates of a proposal to construct a 4,000 square-foot senior citizens center in San Patricio for \$260,000 aren't out

of the running yet. The current site in San Patricio is leased.

Commission Chairman Monroy Montes and Commissioner Wilton Howell both favored that project, saying an investment in a building that appreciates in value is better business than investing in a vehicle that will be nearly worthless in 10 years.

Howell started off the motions by proposing the senior center as the grant project, using a portion of the Glencoe Rural Events Center as the site.

But when County Manager Carol Cooney pointed out senior centers can't share facilities, Howell dropped specifying a site in his motion.

The amended motion failed 2-3, with Commissioners Bill Schwettmann, Stirling Spencer and L. Ray Nunley voting nay.

Then Nunley offered a motion naming the mobile unit as the grant project. Howell jumped in with an amendment to table the decision until the next meeting when more information would be available about the need for such a unit.

That amendment passed 3-2 with Schwettmann and Nunley voting against it.

Nunley's amended motion to approve the mobile unit then passed, but only for a moment. Spencer quickly proposed rescinding the motion and tabling all action until the May 2 meeting. That motion passed 3-2 with Nunley and Schwettmann opposed.

"A great number of elderly in the county have difficulty getting their blood pressure checked and other routine care," Nunley said. "I'm leaning toward this over the senior center, because of the number of people it serves over the county."

Nunley offered to seek money from the state Legislature next year for the senior center.

Howell said until a needs assessment is finished, he'd be reluctant to vote for the mobile unit.

Mobile unit explained

Dee Rush, representing the medical center, told commissioners that the county outside of Ruidoso has been designated as medically

underserved by the federal government, because 51% of the population falls into that category.

Based on census information, 64% of the residents outside of Ruidoso don't earn at least twice the federal poverty income.

A needs assessment survey has been authorized and is scheduled to begin next week to gather more specific data on who would be served by a mobile unit. The goal is to reach 18-20 small settlements outside of Ruidoso.

The mobile unit would use a motor home stocked with medical and dental equipment and staffed with a driver, a registered nurse, a receptionist, a social service representative and either a nurse practitioner or a physician's assistant. A dentist or dental hygienist would be on board at times.

The hospital would try to obtain federal outreach grants to continue the van's operation, Rush said.

"We have to determine the operational costs before we get the van, although history shows it's usually a break even situation," Rush said. Charges are on a sliding scale and

insurance can be handled through the hospital, she said.

The mobile project doesn't compete with home health care businesses, Rush said. Patients must come to the unit for service. It's a better approach than setting up in a storefront once a week, hauling everything back and forth, she contended.

If the program continues beyond the life of the vehicle, money from the annual hospital tax levy would be used for repair or replacement, Rush said.

No similar system exists in New Mexico, Rush said, although mobile units have been successful on the East Coast.

Two or three funded with state money have been attempted and failed in New Mexico, one because of problems with the operators, she said.

"For the number of small communities in this county, we think this approach is well suited," Rush said.

Rush said she could have some preliminary data ready by the commission's next meeting May 2.

Senior center needed

A church owns the current San Patricio senior center, and the seniors can't conduct fundraisers, said Montes. They also have to shut down for funerals.

The new building would be approved for handicapped access, opening attendance to many who cannot come for meals and functions now, said San Patricio senior center director Terry Alanis.

The county already has set aside money for acquisition of land, which would be a plus in the application, she said.

The church may grant a 99-year lease on land it owns, Alanis said. Some private land west of the church also is available and a portion of a new building could be leased out as the community post office, generating revenue. The third possibility is to locate the center on part of the Glencoe Rural Events Center property.

Regional hearings on the projects submitted by each county are set for June 12 and June 19.

Forty-one new homes were built in the hot sales area of Alto in 1994, and 74 improved properties

were sold.

Ranches of Sonterra, a subdivision that opened last year north of Ruidoso, promises to be an upscale

settlement that will contribute to Ruidoso's future as a multi-faceted recreation/retirement community, Siddens said.

In late September, the New Mexico Realtors Association will bring 1,000 people to town for its annual convention, he said.

Ruidoso's future is secure, because of the quality of life available here, Siddens said.

Town Improvements

Gary Jackson, Ruidoso village manager, pointed to several significant projects, including:

— the state Department of Transportation and Highways will spend \$30 million around Ruidoso in the next five years on improvements to State Road 48 (Mechem Drive) and U.S. 70;

— Country Club Drive is scheduled to be closed May 1 where it intersects with Cree Meadows Drive and a traffic light will be added at Cree and Mechem;

— installation of restrooms and stylish parking directional signs are to begin this month as part of the \$1.5 million MainStreet sidewalk renovation project;

— the Grindstone Dam water project is on schedule and should be ready by the May 31 target date. Coupled with higher water levels in Alto Lake, the village anticipates plenty of water for seasonal residents this summer.

Schools grow

Mike Gladden, superintendent of Ruidoso schools, said the district has experienced a 25% growth in staff in the last 10 years. With 250 staff members, the district is the largest employer in Lincoln County, he noted.

Teachers place among the top five districts in the state for average salary and that fact attracts and holds good teachers, Gladden said.

Enrollment has grown by 6.5% over the last three years, hitting more than 2,400, he said.

This school year, Sierra Vista Primary School opened and a special program was initiated to keep pregnant students in high school, including day care for their babies.

New businesses

Joe Hayhurst, mayor of Ruidoso Downs, spoke of new businesses moving into his community, including a 51-unit Day's Inn Motel and a new car wash. Smith's grocery also is looking, he said.

The face of the community is changing with clean up efforts and construction of a new city hall, Hayhurst said.

A senior citizens meal program is being offered in conjunction with the county.

Hospital honors

Tom Battin, president of Ruidoso State Bank and a board member at the Lincoln County Medical Center, sat in for board

president and state Rep. Dub Williams, who could not attend at the last minute.

Battin reviewed the physicians and specialties added to the hospital's roster in the last year and previewed a plan being developed to offer contractual care for local employee groups by summer.

He noted the hospital was recently ranked among the top 100 in the nation, the only hospital in New Mexico on the list.

Major exhibits

Jay Wright, director of the Museum of the Horse, said to watch as work progresses on the installation of Dave McGary's monumental sculpture "Free Spirits at Noisy Waters" at the entrance to the mu-

seum.

He touted a major exhibit from the Moscow Museum of Horse Breeding set to open this month, and said a brochure is nearly completed about all the educational and cultural programs scheduled for the year.

R.D. and Joan Hubbard, through their foundation, have contributed \$5,820,000 to the museum, Wright said.

"Very few museums have that base to start from," he said. While more than 500 members and volunteers help support the museum, he also will try to increase corporate sponsorships this year.

"Cultural attractions also impact the economy of a community, because that's one of the things people look for," he said.

"We're still working on permits for additions, decks and storage units. Out in the county, a lot of people don't take out permits and we have to pick up the improvements and construction by word of mouth."

Property owners will see an increase in their values this year. Most should have received their notices by now, she said.

"We used to do a countywide re-evaluation on even years (by state law), but they changed it to odd years and...this is the first since 1992," Serna said. "Each subdivision was handled differently depending on the sales in the area and other factors."

Her office has been bombarded with calls from people comparing last year's values to this year, Serna said.

"That's good, we want them to call, especially if they think they have information we should know," she said.

Higher values don't necessarily mean higher taxes, Serna noted. If the budgets of taxing bodies such as the Lincoln County Commission, Ruidoso Village Council and

Ruidoso School District don't increase, the higher property value figure for the county will bring down tax rates.

In most cases, Serna expects county property owners to pay about the same as last year. New Mexico property owners are taxed on one-third of the market value of their property.

Serna must send her figures to the state Revenue and Taxation Department by June 15. That department certifies the totals and send them on to the state Department of Finance and Administration, which is responsible for setting tax rates as budgets are submitted from each taxing entity.

The tax figures should be ready for release by the second week in September, she said.

A few county property owners probably celebrated when they received valuation notices that didn't show any values.

Those notices are the result of printer error. It doesn't mean the owners are off the hook, Serna said.

"They need to notify us so we can send out a notice with the proper figures," she said. If they don't, a tax bill still will be in the mail next November.

Commissioners split over Glencoe rural events center funds

A split on the Lincoln County Commission over the Glencoe Rural Events Center surfaced again Tuesday as commissioners haggled over \$36,000 worth of improvements.

Commissioners who last year opposed the purchase of the center nearly killed improvements that backers said are needed for it to succeed.

The state gave the county the \$250,000 to buy the building. Commissioners Stirling Spencer and Bill Schwetzmann, who voted against the acquisition, have contended the center will be a financial burden and may never be self-supporting.

Bids on painting, an electrical upgrade and installation of heating in some sections of the building were opened March 31, said center director Linda Wallace.

She recommended that the painting portion of the project be rebid, because of confusion over what was being requested.

The two remaining projects should be awarded to Pine River Construction with a low bid of \$36,000, she said. The county previously allocated \$38,000 for improvements.

Schwetzmann said he thought an extra \$40,000 from the state (in addition to the \$250,000 purchase price) was to be applied toward the first year of operation, budgeted at about \$60,000, not improvements.

County Manager Carolin Cooney said that \$42,000 has been spent out of \$60,681 budgeted for the fiscal year ending June 30. The center was acquired by the county about six months ago.

Schwetzmann pushed for all items to be rebid. He also wanted to seek more money from the state

next year.

It might be better to sell the center at a price equal to the county's investment, Spencer said.

"The problem with this entity is that it has shown us — for several years before we bought it and now — that the use is negligible," Spencer said.

That doesn't mean he isn't willing to invest in economic development if there is a chance for a return, Spencer added.

"If we are not supporting accepting bids to improve the building, then we are going backwards," Chairman Monroy Montes countered. "If we don't upgrade the heating and electric, we're ensuring failure, because we're limiting its use to summer only. A bid of \$36,000 is a good investment."

Wallace reminded Spencer that the previous owners never actively sought other functions. They used

the barn for annual horse sales.

Frank Potter, president of the annual Lincoln County Cowboys Symposium, said the event draws 50,000 people a year and the rural center is the only place in the county large enough to accommodate the weekend event.

He said several other activities, such as the Aspenfest car show and the Golden Aspen motorcycle rally, may soon outgrow their sites in Ruidoso and come to the center.

Without more electrical outlets and heat, she can't promote the center to gun and car shows that have shown an interest, Wallace said.

"We've owned it six months without heat and I'd like to try it six months with heat," Commissioner Wilton Howell said. "It's not a fair run to date."

If more functions aren't booked after a full year, he'd go along with

disposing of it, Howell said. But later he said a referendum of the property, because it exceeds \$25,000 in value.

The motion by Howell to award the bids to Pine River out of Albuquerque passed 3-2, with L. Ray Nunley and Schwetzmann voting nay. Nunley had been the swing vote in purchasing the center last year.

After the meeting, Spencer said he voted for the motion because a better electrical system and heat would enhance the value even if the county later sells the building.

Background of split

The idea of purchasing the center, a former horse sales barn owned by a group that included millionaire race track owner R.D. Hubbard, stirred controversy when

it first was brought up in late 1993.

When the center was purchased last year, Schwetzmann and Spencer represented the views of primarily rural voters and Capitan residents, who saw the center as a threat to the county fairground. Some also contended the purchase was a favor to Hubbard's group.

Those in favor of the center contended that with some improvements, it could attract large attendance events that wouldn't fit anywhere else in the county.

Earlier this year, the county asked the state Legislature for \$500,000 for the first phase of improvements totalling \$1.8 million. But it was the wrong year, with a new governor and a tight budget. As with most projects proposed by the county to the 1995 Legislature, it suffered a quick death.

Amusement park expansion approved by planners

With a 5 to 1 vote, Ray Eidson was given the Planning and Zoning Commission's nod Monday night to enlarge his amusement business next to homes on Carrizo Canyon Road — but not without some misgivings.

"I have no problem with Mr. Eidson having a go-cart track — I just don't want it in my kitchen," said long-time resident Arlene Chavez.

Eidson's proposed track for 10 go-carts on the west side of Carrizo Creek will be about 40 feet from Chavez's family home, she complained.

Eidson's plans include construction of a new 30-foot wide track and a bridge across Carrizo Creek, plus a 30-foot enlargement of the existing bridge. The approval of the now be forwarded for a Village Council final decision April 25.

Also advanced to the council is

the P&Z's 5-1 approval of an ordinance change for new driveway developments.

The change is supported by the Lincoln County Homebuilders Association. It would require contractors to pave a six-foot section of driveway from the edge of a public road, with a three-inch, 8% grade dip in the center. A minimum 18-inch drainage pipe would be required under the driveway.

Commissioner Van Patton voted against the changes, arguing it is not fair to require driveways off unpaved village roads to be paved.

Eidson's Funtrackers on Carrizo Canyon Road was formerly a cement business, and commissioners noted that he has vastly upgraded the site and maintained a nice, family oriented activity.

The road contains several other businesses alongside older homes. It is zoned a commercial district as requested by a majority of residents

when rezoning took place in 1988, explained Planning Director Cleatus Richards. The area was also zoned commercial for 10 years prior to that review. The commercial zoning creates the opportunity for higher property values.

Residents said the high use and noise is what bothers them most. The business is open from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. during the summer, plus most weekends and holidays during other seasons.

Chavez complained that from inside her bedroom she can hear conversations from the park's golf course. Escaping noise from the track will likely be more disruptive, she said, even if a solid, eight-foot high sound retaining wall separating the track is built, as stipulated by the P&Z.

Additionally, she complained, the light from the existing amusement will flood into her two-story house.

"This is a classic case of a clash of uses in the changing of uses," said Commissioner Chaz Rennick, who issued the sole dissenting vote against the conditional development variance. "It's hard to imagine a greater clash."

Commissioner Patton said such clashes may be inevitable.

"I'm afraid that this is what the village of Ruidoso is headed to, with more and more (business) property developments in residential areas...But do we restrict someone in an area zoned commercial?" Patton said.

The amusement development falls at the "far edge of permitted uses" in the C-2 district, so it is incumbent upon Eidson to demonstrate his business will be compatible with the neighbors, Rennick said. This he failed to do, Rennick said prior to casting his vote.

Also at the meeting:

— Commissioners approved a variance to consolidate two lots on Spruce Drive for construction of a driveway.

— Richards reported Country Club Village owner and Texas resident Glenn Neans has updated the village on his construction plans, as requested.

Neans said he will have all subdivision development completed prior to December 30.

Neans cited delays in refinancing his project, which is planned to include 80 new housing units across from Cree Meadows Country Club. A written loan commitment will allow commencement of construction as early as April 15, Neans said.

He added that he plans to build a minimum of 10 units this summer and additional units based on market demand.

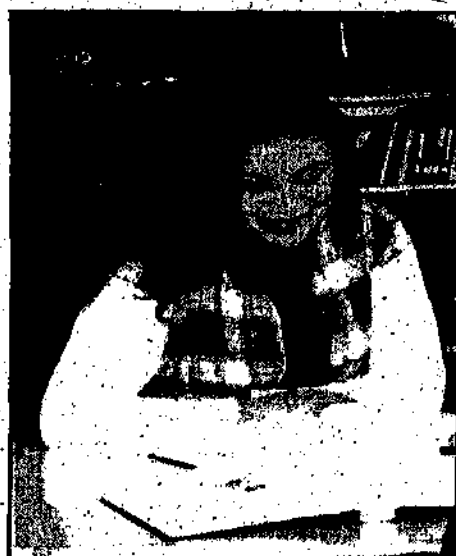

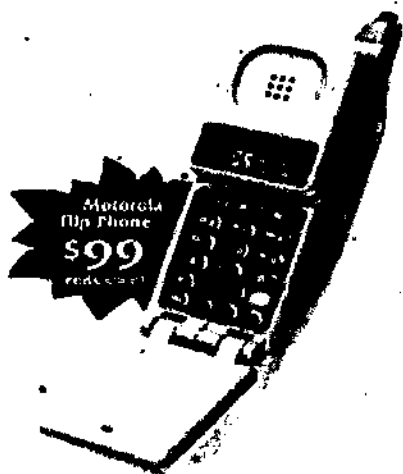

Underwood tapped to help steer Fort Stanton's future course

For another month, lobbyist H. John Underwood, former state representative from Ruidoso, will lead the Lincoln County Commission's fight for Fort Stanton's future.

Commissioners Tuesday extended Underwood's contract for another month, through May 10. He'll be paid \$3,000 for the extra 30 days.

By that time, commissioners hope they will have a final draft of a request for proposals (RFP) for a lease of the fort complex southeast of Capitan. The RFP will be advertised nationally.

Underwood and County Attorney Alan Morel will attend a meeting April 12 with state officials from the General Services Department and Health Department to review an initial draft of the RFP and offer input on possible changes.

"Three months ago we weren't a player, but we were steadfast that (the closing of the fort as a hospital) would impact the county and that we wanted input," said Commission Chairman Monroy Montes. "Through the efforts of (county manager) Carolin Cooney, John Underwood and others, we have gotten the attention of the various department secretaries."

The next month may be the most important 30 days since county officials learned last January that the

hospital would be closed. All patients have left and only a skeleton maintenance staff remains to care for the historic facility.

Commissioners said the RFP should reflect:

— a preference for a long-term lease beyond 25 years;

— the creation of a significant number of jobs to replace the 200 lost with the hospital closing;

— that the jobs should not be limited to entry level and should pay well enough that families don't need food stamps to survive;

— that a certain percentage of employees should come from Lincoln County;

— and that a viable service of value to this state is preferred.

Underwood said the county shouldn't place too many limits on the origin of employees, because it would be an advantage for the local economy if a company brings in highly trained and well paid personnel.

He also urged the commission to allow 120 days to advertise and get responses. Montes had pushed for 90 days.

"I believe the state representative and senator did all they could to change the minds of state officials, but high overhead and low output closed it," Underwood said of the hospital.

Underwood was contacted by the county commission Feb. 10 while

lobbying for racetrack interests in Santa Fe.

Five bills were introduced in the Legislature to convert the fort to other uses. Two bills included state money in excess of \$3 million. Those two bills, one for a juvenile detention center under the Department of Children, Youth and Families and the other for DWI treatment under the Corrections Department, went to finance committees and were ready for passage, Underwood said.

But the heads of the departments "adamantly did not want the money and said it would be line item vetoed," he said. "They didn't want the facility, because of the high overhead. They preferred privatization."

At that point, Underwood shifted his focus to working with General Services (GSD) Secretary Steven R. Belfort and Health Department Secretary Alex Valdez. At the beginning of the 1995-96 fiscal year, the fort will be switched from Valdez' jurisdiction to the GSD.

The two secretaries agreed that \$500,000 for the next year of operation for the fort and \$750,000 previously secured for remodeling would be used to advertise the fort's availability and to improve its appearance.

"We felt it needed to be as shiny as can be to present to private

entities," Underwood said.

At a meeting March 27 at Fort Stanton, state officials rejected the idea of turning the money and the fort over to the county to handle the search for a new use.

A memo was drafted detailing a commitment from the state to involve the county in the search and

decision process.

"I think you may be surprised who responds," Underwood said.

To avoid conflict of interest, the county cannot act as a lead agency on any application.

Commissioner Wilton Howell and Montes are advocates of a

youth treatment center as a joint project with other southern New Mexico counties.

Underwood reminded county officials that the fort still is a state owned facility "and I suspect they will want the majority of votes, but I'll try to get you as many as possible."

Sanchez endorsed for head cage job

Ben Sanchez will be recommended for the head boys basketball coaching position at the next Ruidoso School Board meeting April 11, said Ruidoso Athletic Director Les Carter.

"We were very satisfied with Ben and the job he's done. As athletic director my recommendation would be not just to have him as interim coach, but as head coach," Carter said. "We've got some stability with Ben because he's been here."

Sanchez was named interim boys' coach March 6 when Sid Wright was asked to resign from the position.

"I'm very excited about it," Sanchez said of the opportunity to coach the Warriors. "I'm chomping at the bit to get to work. We have a lot to do this summer."

Sanchez has a career head coaching record of 108-47. Prior to accepting a teaching and coaching position at Ruidoso in Oct. 1994, Sanchez coached at Mena High School in Albuquerque where his teams compiled a 33-17 record in five years.

Sanchez started the year as the Warriors' junior varsity coach. His team finished with a 14-10 overall record, and took third place in the district play and the district tournament.

After being named interim head coach, Sanchez directed the varsity Warriors to district playoff wins over Cobles and Hot Springs. Socorro eliminated Ruidoso in the district playoff semifinals. The Warriors finished 10-16 overall.

Sanchez said his philosophy emphasizes using athletics as a tool for education, and his coaching style focuses on the game's fundamentals.

"I really believe that basketball or athletics in general is a tool in the educational process," Sanchez said, adding his program strongly emphasizes academics.

"I don't think you can be a good team unless you can go out and develop basketball skills," Sanchez said. "It (basketball) is a game of repetition and rhythm, and you have to put time in it."

"We definitely have our work cut out for us - it's a chore at any place to build a program," Sanchez said. But he believes the material to build a successful program at Ruidoso already exists at the school.

Sanchez came to Ruidoso in late October. According to high school principal Ron Hodges, Sanchez was offered the head coaching job in July, but Sanchez turned it down.

"I didn't accept the position at that time because I was in the process of getting engaged," Sanchez said. He added Ruidoso needed an answer, and he wasn't ready to give it to them.

Sanchez started the 1994-95 school year at Mena as teacher and head basketball coach. He said he resigned in early October to come to Ruidoso.

Mena Athletic Director Gus Brock said Sanchez filed an equal employment opportunity complaint against the school. Brock declined to talk about the complaint. EEOC officials in Albuquerque said cases aren't public record unless they go to federal district court.

Sanchez also declined to comment about the issue.

"If I thought it had anything to do with the future of this program, I would comment," Sanchez said.

Ruidoso's Fowler is newest commissioner

The State Racing Commission's newest commissioner, Ruidoso's Eddie Fowler, believes there is life after the legislative session for the horse racing industry in New Mexico.

"New Mexico has a big future in racing and I'm excited about it," Fowler said from the office of his Ruidoso business, the Win Place and Show package liquor store and night club.

Gov. Gary Johnson appointed Fowler to the commission March 27. Fowler, who replaces Ruben Miera, will serve until Jan. 1, 1999.

The horse racing industry's future, Fowler admitted, depends on what percentage of the gaming dollar it gets.

Specifically, if the tracks are allowed to have video gaming machines on live race dates, Fowler thinks New Mexico's horse racing industry could compete with the likes of California, New York and Kentucky.

Fowler disagrees with those in the industry who blame Johnson for the failure to approve a video gaming bill for tracks during this year's legislative session.

Johnson made it clear he'd sign such a bill if it came to his desk. Fowler noted Johnson never deviated from that pledge.

"I disagree with anybody who says the Governor is not for horse racing. He is for our industry," Fowler said of the state's third largest industry.

Fowler thinks a video gaming bill for the tracks will, pass in the future, in part, because the spokes of the industry wheel are moving in the same direction. He says this is the first time this has happened since he's been in horse racing.

"I think the one thing we did learn was as a whole industry to

pull together and work as one team," Fowler said, referring to horsemen, breeders and track owners.

The State Racing Commission is the governing body for the horse racing industry.

"Our main purpose is to have the best quality product for the state," Fowler said.

The commission meets monthly at various locations throughout the state. Since his appointment, Fowler has been busy reading the rules book.

"It's about five inches thick. I'm still reading," Fowler said.

Fowler has owned and raced horses for 27 years. He is a Roswell native who moved to Ruidoso in 1987.

"That's my love - horse racing," Fowler said. "I don't think there's a better feeling than to see your own horse coming down the stretch and come across first."

"Ruidoso has always been my second home," Fowler said. "When I was little, whenever we went anywhere it was to Ruidoso."

Fowler graduated from Roswell High School and New Mexico Military Institute before attending New Mexico State University. He lived in Clovis for 20 years, serving as a city commissioner and mayor pro tem for two years.

Fowler is the first state racing commissioner from Ruidoso since Gary Mitchell served in the 1980s. Fowler is currently president of the New Mexico Horseman's Association, a position he'll resign from now that he's on the state commission.

He and his wife, Mary Beth, have lived in Ruidoso since 1987. The Fowlers have two children: a son, Dean Fowler of Ruidoso, and a daughter, Texas resident Cathy Marshall.

Roland's vision for the Warriors

Ruidoso girls' basketball coach Janie Roland is a walking women's basketball history book.

She played six-on-six girls basketball in Oklahoma. She was part of basketball before there were widespread athletic scholarships for women, and before the National Collegiate Athletic Association held national championships for women.

Roland has played basketball on every level since she was a child, including high school, junior college, college, semi-pro and professional ball. She's either played, coached or promoted basketball for 37 of her 42 years of life.

Yet, like every other first-year coach, she faces the same uncertainty that comes during contract renewal time.

Was her coaching good enough this past season for the school board to offer her another 1-year coaching assignment for the 1995-96 season?

If given the opportunity to coach at Ruidoso again, Roland already has in mind what the next steps for the program will be.

Right angle approach

Roland is the third girls basketball coach in five years at Ruidoso. Her Warriors didn't return a varsity player from a team that was 7-16 the year before. Ruidoso finished 2-19 overall this year.

"You can't change what hasn't been done in two or three years," Roland says. "I see this big vision of where things can go, and it's going to take time."

So how long will it take? Roland said maybe 360 degrees in four years. Call it the right angle approach, says the high school math teacher: 90 degrees a year for four years.

If the Warriors are built into a successful team, it's going to take more than Roland's knowledge of the game and the opportunities she provides the players to learn the game.

"Motivation has to come from within. It's not the sole responsibility of the coach to motivate," Roland says. "I don't need the basics on how to start this, what I need is basic believers."

The first year

Roland spent her first season with the Warriors teaching fundamentals, evaluating personnel and giving her players a sense of what to expect from her.

"I felt like we were shortchanged

because of the lack of a preseason," Roland says as she reflects on the season.

Roland, who coached the volleyball team in the fall, had only three weeks to prepare her team for the start of the season.

"I was breaking down old habits and building up new habits," she says. The Warriors had to start from scratch, and because of their coach's emphasis on fundamentals, the players were not as conditioned as Roland would have liked.

"The kids did as well as could be expected, considering how much we threw at them," she says. "We had to halve it and quarter it for them to digest it."

She commended the players for sticking with the team through a tough losing season.

"I've been a pioneer in women's basketball, that's why I know how they feel about being pioneers in building the Ruidoso girls' program," she says.

The honeymoon is over

Roland promises next year's players will notice a change in her expectations - the expectations will be higher.

"I want young ladies who will come to my gym and be ready to work. There have to be certain things which are non-negotiable," Roland says.

Some of those non-negotiables which Roland started implementing this year include: players' participation in a weight and conditioning program; players' attendance at practice and games; players' attention to academic play and no substitutions during play time, substitution policies or practice policies.

Her future non-negotiables include loyalty and dedication.

"No one is asking you to like our decisions, just respect them," Roland says of her philosophy and coaching style, adding, "And, there is a method to our madness."

What will it take?

Call it what you will, Roland says the turning point of the program will come when the players believe in the team concept and have the faith to achieve it.

"If you believe it's going to work then it will - maybe not in your lifetime at this high school, but maybe in your little sister's lifetime," Roland says. The hardest part about being a believer is tuning out the non-believers because they make you second-guess yourself.

There's no question it bothers

Roland that some players challenge coaching decisions.

"How can an athlete at any age - 14, 15, 16 and up to age 22 - be qualified to evaluate the ability or knowledge of a coach?" she asks. "What background do they have? Where do they get their credentials? Where does it come from? It has to come from somewhere else."

Roland has theory as to where that source originates. She calls the source the "ignorance committee" - a group she defines as individuals who lack information or have an abundance of misinformation.

"It seems every athletic team that has ever existed has had some sort of ignorance committee that has followed the team around and been insistent on creating petty negatives for coaches," Roland says.

"Fortunately, it also seems that every athletic team that has ever existed has an approval committee which consists of people who make it worthwhile," she adds. "One member of that approval committee can come along and wipe out what 10 members of the ignorance committee can do."

A complete turnaround in the program depends on talent, commitment and determination. Players, coaches and community all have to sacrifice, Roland says. They've got to work together and support each other.

"If you're not willing to build these qualities within yourself - these qualities of dedication, loyalty, commitment and sacrifice - perhaps my program is not right for you," Roland says.

The larger picture

While playing organized basketball, Roland has been a member of a championship team as a freshman in high school and twice as a junior college player. She's been named to countless all-star team, coached at a top 25 NCAA Division I college for nine years and traveled across the country and around the world because of the game.

But what's important to her is the larger picture.

"Let's use sports as a tool for life - it's not life itself, because if sports is taken away from us we still have life," she says. "If we use it as a tool, then winning and losing is not all that sports are about."

But unfortunately, all coaches are aware that winning keeps their jobs and teaching tools for life doesn't, Roland observes. "You need to teach them how to win and how to lose, but you need to teach them how to live."

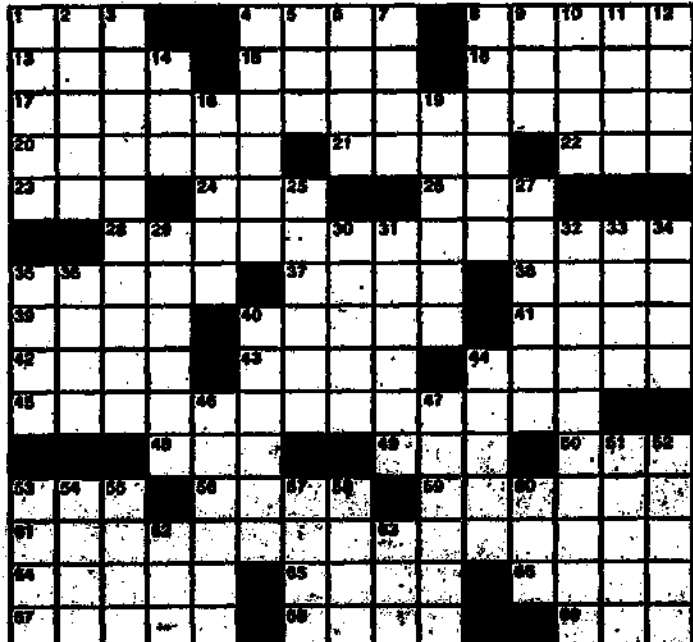

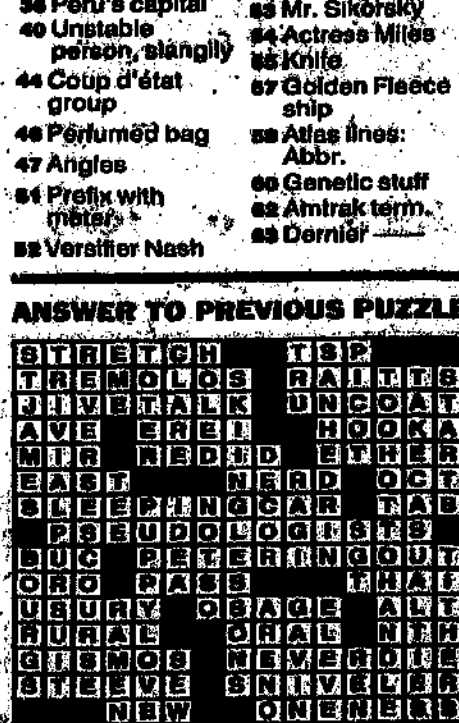

He was born Oct. 23, 1925 in California.

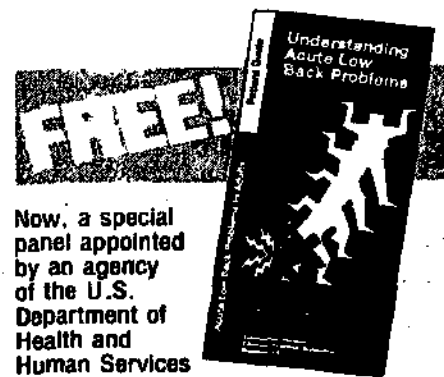
He moved to Carrizozo three years ago from Texas and was a retired engineer for General Dynamics. He was a member of the Trinity United Methodist Church in Carrizozo.

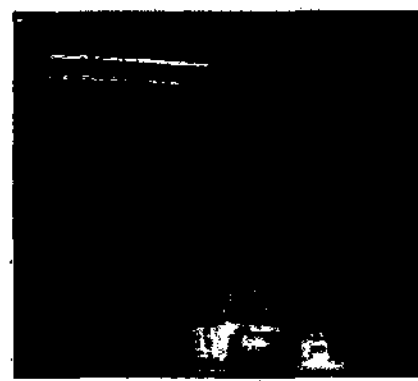

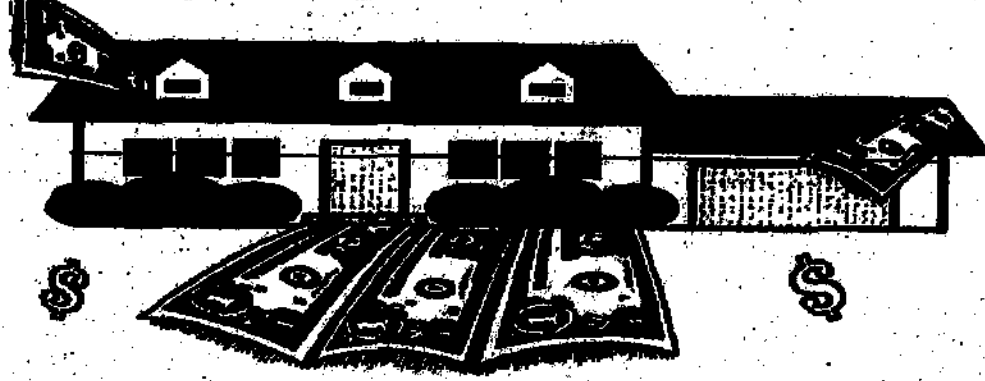

Fight state engineer for your water rights

The first court hearing was held at the end of March concerning the state engineer's efforts to change priority dates of underground water rights in the Pecos River system.

Only 11 people or groups showed up in Roswell to protest the change, even though it will affect more than 100 ranches, subdivisions and municipalities in this county. The only municipality represented at the hearing was Ruidoso, an attorney tells us.

Some people think this problem went away in 1979 in the L.T. Lewis case. At that time, the court ruled that underground water rights run with the surface water rights, many of which were established just after the Civil War.

But the fight isn't over, and this case lingers on, thanks to the state engineer. He wants to lower priorities of this area's wells within the river system so Texans will get more water, to satisfy a court order that not enough Pecos water ends up in Texas.

Please, file a protest in this case immediately if your water comes from the Rio Ruidoso, Hondo, and Bonito. And write your congressmen and ask them to get the state engineer in line and stop trying to hurt people in his own state.

Misinformation abounds with Glencoe Rural Events Center

TO THE EDITOR:

Someone gave me a letter to Governor Johnson, asking him to line item veto a part of Senate Bill 8 introduced by Senator Pete Campos that sought authorization to issue Severance Tax Bonds to provide for various Lincoln County projects.

The part that they wanted to line item veto was funds to build an indoor arena at the Glencoe Rural Events Center. They claimed it was a "boondoggle" from birth, that it would be a total waste of taxpayers' money to expand the facility, and that it should be sold as a money loser.

This is just one of the many protests I have heard from around the community about the Glencoe Rural Events Center. It leads me to believe that a lot of our citizens here in Lincoln County have not understood what the potential of the center means to the economy of our county, if it would be allowed to develop and grow to its full potential.

In my many years of residence here in Lincoln County, I have watched it grow from a small mountain summer resort to what it is now, and I have known and worked with the men that were responsible for a lot of this growth.

If it had not been for these individuals investing their time, dreams and money, the mountain town of Ruidoso would not be as it is now and a lot of our citizens would not have the opportunity to live and enjoy the life they are now living here.

You may ask, who were these men? I will tell you that one of them was a little man from Arizona known as Gene Henley who came, looked, bought and developed the little mountain racetrack known as Hollywood Park, later changed to Ruidoso Downs into one of the top quarter horse racetracks in the nation. To go along with that, he developed a race called "The All American" that at one time was the richest horse race in the world, and even now the richest quarter horse race.

This race has become as important to the quarter horse industry as the Kentucky Derby has to the thoroughbred industry, and it brings a lot of attention to Lincoln

County and the little mountain town of Ruidoso.

There are breeders in every state in the union trying to breed a colt to win it, or to sell in the All-American Sales, and at this moment there are a lot of breeders in our state and nation worried about the future of this race and horse racing in New Mexico.

That is why it's so important now that gambling is here, that the racetracks have the same opportunity at the gambling dollar as anyone else in order to compete, therefore allowing horsemen to get a percentage of the dollar for their purses in order to survive.

All you have to do is to look at other states that have gambling, such as Nevada, and you will find that horse racing without some help cannot compete.

That brings attention to another one of these individuals that has come here and invested an enormous amount of money and time to help the growth and economy of our little village. This man is Dee Hubbard and his wife and organization. They have unselfishly developed projects such as the racetrack, Museum of the Horse, etc. by spending huge amounts of money on nationwide advertising. Advertising what? Again, Lincoln County and Ruidoso. If things will only halfway develop right, there is no telling what is on their drawing board.

Years ago I worked with a man here in Ruidoso that's been completely overlooked. This man's obsession was skiing. That's all he talked — if we only had a ski run, he would say, we would really have something here in the winter. He helped to develop the first one over in Eagle Creek, along with the first Aspenade and lots of other things. This man was Bill Hart.

His efforts caught the eye of another individual, Robert Anderson. With Robert Anderson's effort and money, the ski run was developed and our ski industry was started. Then after racing and skiing was established, here came other investors and Ruidoso has grown into what it is now — a bustling, thriving, popular resort center blessed by mountain beauty and natural air conditioning, and a place where it seems that everyone wants to live.

The one thing that sells up here is entertainment. The racetrack and ski run have proven that. So anything that will provide top notch entertainment to me is a winner.

The one thing lacking in our community for years is an indoor arena where you can ride and rope in any kind of weather and have any kind of event that you would like, such as horse shows, sales, car shows, motorcycles, any event where you can accommodate big crowds and keep them out of the weather.

It's been needed here a long, long time. With the location of the Glencoe Events Center on a main highway, if it's promoted and advertised properly, it could be another industry such as skiing and racing and could get big, big. There is no thought of trying to compete with any other community in our county connected with this.

In Texas there are a lot of these type of things that are owned and operated by the county for the good of everyone and it could be done here if it would only have the chance to be developed. It would fill a space that has been long overdue to be filled. I sincerely hope that I may have explained a few things that have been overlooked.

Report from oldest freshman legislator

TO THE EDITOR:

This is a report from Rep. Dub Williams (R-Glencoe) on the 1995 Legislative Session in Santa Fe.

The session was absolutely a fascinating experience for a person that was the oldest freshman in the House of Representatives. There are several highlights and bits of information I would like to share with the voters of District 56.

1. As usual, there were an extremely high number of requests for the less than \$80 million available for local projects around the state. There were \$1.4 billion (yes billion) in requests for projects by communities around the state.

2. One of the governor's priorities is building prisons around the state. There is little understanding about the "Duran Decree." The decree was a court decree that came through the courts as a result of the prison riots of the early 1980s. The Duran Decree costs the State of New Mexico between \$7,000 and \$8,000 per

prisoner per year more than surrounding states, a total of between \$25 million and \$35 million annually. With the building of prisons, the "Duran Decree" will be removed for a savings of between \$25 million and \$35 million annually.

3. With crime the governor's top priority, education, his second priority, will be funded at higher levels in future years, if New Mexico's economy keeps growing over future years. Education receives 45% of the total state budget, which is a high commitment to our children's education.

4. Signing of the gaming compact with the Native Americans by the governor:

The Native Americans on the reservations and pueblos have been gaming over the past few years without the signing of the compact. The signing of the compact with the Native Americans was an executive decision. It was the Legislature's obligation to pass a gaming law to cover that activity in the state off the Native American reservations. The Legislature failed to meet that obligation basically, because of poor planning and timing. Legislation for off-reservation gaming failed in 1995.

5. Voters need to know that the Legislature's business is conducted by committee. Which committees and how many committees will determine the success of your legislation. As they say in the Legislature, "I stand for questions."

It was an exciting, educational, rewarding, frustrating, disappointing, successful and worthwhile experience. Everyone needs to understand the system and share the experience.

We all want the government out of our lives and less taxes to pay, but we do not want our programs cut — an impossible task.
