## On the spot

### Ski area hit with foot of snow

The biggest snowfall of the season struck Ski Apache Wednesday night, dumping a foot of snow in 24 hours by 7:30 a.m. Thursday.

"It's super, super snow," said Patricia Morrison, Ski Apache's director of marketing and public relations. "It's going to set up so beautifully." The ski area has a base of 38 inches mid-way.

Snow continues to fall today. Schools in Ruidoso and Mescalero are closed. Hondo school started two hours late.

For the first time beginning Saturday, Ski Apache will offer half-day lift tickets on weekends, not just weekdays. Half-day tickets are \$25 versus the full-day \$35 price.

### Inmate charged with card fraud

Gregory Norville, 28, a Camp Sierra Blanca prisoner, has been charged with fraudulent use of a credit card.

Norville allegedly charged at least \$300 for boots and clothes with someone else's credit card number, stolen from a Ruidoso real estate office Dec. 29 where Norville was a maintenance worker on a work release program.

He has been moved to the county jail in Carrizozo.

An investigation into Norville's actions continues. Another inmate's name as well as more fraudulent credit card purchases may be involved, state police officer Steve Standridge said.

Norville will appear before Judge Gerald Dean, Jr., in Carrizozo Friday morning, Standridge said.

### Power knocked out after car accident

Power was knocked out to about 500 homes in the White Mountain subdivision area for 1.5 hours late Tuesday after a Cadillac knocked over an electrical power pole.

Driver Timothy Puller, 27, of Las Vegas, Nev., was cited for careless driving after he hit the pole on Cavilan Canyon Road in Ruidoso about 11:45 p.m., said Sheriff James McSwane.

The pole fell on top of the car, but Puller and two occupants were uninjured.

Puller was also cited for driving on a suspended or revoked license, said Deputy Larry Cearley. The owner of the 1994 four-door sedan was listed as T. Weathers of Ruidoso Downs.

## Boy glad to see New Year after liver transplant

Michael Malis is greeting the new year with a seemingly permanent smile stamped onto his ruddy, 11-year-old face.

The smile beams not so much out of contemplation of the earth's ceaseless turning, but with thanks to football. Glorious football. Ask the boy about that sport and he'll tell you that if he had it his way, he'd spend all his days tossing the ball or watching the Broncos play.

Still, the root of the boy's passion can be traced to a one-on-one tango with father time — in the guise of death — a little more than five years ago.

Friends and strangers rallied to Michael's aid, allowing him to see this and other glorious New Years.

To this day, five years after that marathon fundraising and the eight-hour surgery, the Malis family continues to hear new tales of generosity intended to help their son.

"A lot occurred in town that we're still learning about because we were up in Denver (for much of that time)," his mother Suzie says.

In October of 1989, Michael's future looked grim. Suffering from acute liver disease, his stunted body was jaundiced and his nerve-endings were riddled with rickets. He suffered constant nose-bleeds, his abdomen was extended and he

itched like mad.

The six-year-old knew his life teetered among serious variables far outside his control. The playing of sports was a mere fantasy. Not only did Michael desperately need a suitable liver to replace his bogus one, but his family was also in need of more than \$100,000 to pay for the surgery. More money was needed to cover the cost of transport back and forth to University Hospital in Denver and the vital medicines that would allow a transplant to succeed.

The community rose to Michael's needs, and issued loving support to the Malis family.

"It was a really hard time," explains Suzie, while seated beside Michael and husband Mike at their Agua Fria home just west of Ruidoso Downs. "They (the doctors) say Michael has to have the transplant to live, and the next minute they say we have to have the money for the transplant."

Gathering \$100,000 just to get the boy's name on a list appeared impossible, Mike said. The family had already liquidated all their assets as their youngest child's health problems continued to spiral downward. The problems apparently began with aspiration pneumonia at birth and a brain hemorrhage at five months of age, followed by his long haul with

liver disease.

The Malis family's church, Trinity Mountain Fellowship, responded by establishing and donating money to a special Michael Malis Fund. Soon after, then-Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. proclaimed a "Michael Malis Day."

Fundraising events followed, and the local press and Roswell broadcasts, which reported on these activities, helped perpetuate the giving spirit which had apparently seized this community.

Car washes and bake sales were held in Michael's name, not only in the Ruidoso area, but all over the state. The Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs pledged 10% of its new membership proceeds to the fund; Joan Stauffer, who was booked to perform at the museum, pledged her fee to the Malis fund; members of the First Baptist Church put together a spaghetti dinner; workers at the U.S. Forest Service (which Mike works with in Alamogordo) heard of the boy's plight and raised funds through a hot dog sale in their cafeteria.

"We were down and out and people really pulled together to help us and we're so grateful," Mike says. "He wouldn't be here now."

Some of the financial gifts have poignant tales behind them: a family in Denver donated Christmas

## US West searches for 911 answers

U.S. West officials are struggling to find answers to what went wrong when the mother of a dying rural Ruidoso Downs child couldn't get through to 911.

"We're digging in to see what happened on this particular circuit, doing a complete reconstruction of everything that happened," company spokesman Louis Belmont said.

The company has acknowledged that one of their two trunk systems for the Ruidoso Downs area malfunctioned Dec. 19, the same night a Biscuit Hill woman attempted to call 911 when her baby quit breathing. The sheriff's office confirmed her complaint the following day, after trying to call 911 from her residence.

The woman, Dornie Robinson, told police she placed three calls to the 911 service, but not one of them connected. She then screamed for a neighbor's help and the two took her 18-month-old to the hospital in

her vehicle. The baby was pronounced dead that night at Lincoln County Medical Center.

A circuit alarm system is in place for both 911 trunk cable lines to warn the phone company if a problem occurs, Belmont said. But without knowing what exactly happened to the particular circuit, which has since been restored, it is difficult to determine if the alarm notification was triggered or what the response was, he said.

"Usually, a display will give sign of a problem, or the display will give the cause of the problem and even isolate it. Sometimes it will even be self-diagnosed," Belmont said.

"We need to find out what was known and when," he added. If a day went by (without notification when was the problem noted and why the delay?)

Additionally, he said, questions still remain regarding whether

## Nuclear storage hot topic at legislator's gathering

Don't look to the New Mexico State Legislature to block plans to store nuclear waste on the neighboring Mescalero Apache Reservation, Ruidoso residents were told Tuesday.

Dub Williams, Lincoln County's new state representative, told 30 people at a town meeting that the state has no power to stop the project.

The prospect of storing spent nuclear fuel rods on the neighboring reservation was the most-discussed issue by those attending Williams' last meeting before he starts the legislative session Jan.

17. Water conservation and inventory, educational funding and the future of gambling in the state took a back seat to the subject of storage of radioactive waste. The meeting was sponsored by the Young Republicans of Lincoln County.

Williams said he has always opposed the storage project, if for no other reason than his lack of faith in the government's definition of "temporary."

The storage facility is considered a 40-year temporary solution until the U.S. Department of Energy builds a permanent repository for the waste.

"In World War II, our federal government put an excise tax on us for entertainment and cosmetics for the duration of the war and we're still paying it today, although according to my calculations, the war has been over for 50 years," he said.

"My big argument is that when the federal government says something is temporary, it could be 40 years, or 100 years. I believe that the people who have generated the waste and benefited from the low power prices should store the spent rods in that state until there is a permanent repository.

"The trouble is that those states are highly populated areas and politicians listen to those voices."

The treaty that created the Mescalero Reservation as a sovereign nation restricts the state's ability to interfere, he said.

"The states have very little to say," he said. "It has to be resolved between the federal government and the tribe."

But Hazel Haynsworth, president of the Ruidoso Upper Canyon Association, an activist group fighting the storage project, reminded Williams that the proposed contract is to be signed by the Mescalero and 33 private utility companies. The federal government isn't part of the deal, even though the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission will be responsible for issuing re-

quired licenses and for supervising the handling of the fuel.

The Mescalero have signed a letter of intent with the utilities to apply for a federal storage license.

Sue Randle, a candidate for the Ruidoso school board, asked whether the state could become involved because the project might impact the Tularosa water basin.

Long-time storage opponent Bob Walters said even though above-ground and dry storage is planned, containers used to ship the fuel rods will have to be decontaminated with water that will create a waste stream.

# Fire ruins new house

A state arson investigator will look into the cause of a fire that destroyed a Ruidoso Downs house early Tuesday morning.  
Manuel Guzman, his wife and son were going to move into the house at the end of this week.  
"It's unfortunate that it happened but as long as we are all right, that's the important thing," said Guzman, who works at Ruidoso High School. "We feel very fortunate that we were not involved in the house. The house can be replaced. Our lives cannot."

Firemen were alerted to the fire at 1:34 a.m. when they received a call from someone who said they thought a deserted building was on fire. When firemen responded to the call they found a house that was under construction in flames instead.

Volunteer firefighters battled the blaze that devastated the almost-finished three-bedroom house at 376 West Circle, situated about a quarter of a mile from Highway 70 in the Heights division of Ruidoso Downs.

Flames were shooting so high that you could see them from the highway, said Nick Herrera, Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department chief. The house was fully engulfed when we arrived at the scene.

Herrera and five other firemen fought for more than 2 1/2 hours to extinguish the fire. Backup water trucks were brought in from the Ruidoso Fire Department as the firemen attempted to keep the fire from spreading to a home less than 50 feet away and a large outbuilding less than 30 feet away.

We were real concerned about the fire spreading, Herrera said. It was a very hot fire and the potential was there for it to jump to the other structures.

Herrera said electricity and gas lines had not been hooked up to the house.

We don't know what started the fire, Herrera said. The State Fire Investigation Bureau is sending an arson investigator to help determine the cause.

Tired firefighters were still cleaning up at 10 a.m. Tuesday morning as they kept a watchful eye on the charred and smoldering structure to be sure it would not flare up again and endanger the homes surrounding it.

It's a real shame, Herrera said. But at least no one was living in the house.

# Toddler's cause of death released

State medical investigators say 18-month-old Matthew Mozaleski died of acute tracheitis.

Mozaleski's mother could not access 911 for help when a phone cable malfunctioned Dec. 19, so she drove Matthew from rural Ruidoso Downs to the hospital in Ruidoso. The boy died later that night.

Acute tracheitis is a severe inflammation or infection of the upper airway that supplies air to the lungs, said Dr. George Mizell of the Office of Medical Investigator.

The symptoms are similar to pneumonia, Mizell said. Acute tracheitis can progress very rapidly, even in a day's time, he said.

Matthew's mother Dorrie Robinson said the boy first appeared to have difficulty breathing the Sunday night before his death. She took him to Dr. Arlene Brown Monday morning. Robinson said Brown found the child's lungs to be clear, diagnosed a mild ear infection and prescribed antibiotics. Robinson

was told to bring Matthew back the following Friday.

On Wednesday, Dr. Brown also described acute tracheitis as an "extremely rapid disease" and confirmed that it would present itself with common cold symptoms. She declined to comment further until she sees the medical examiner's report.

Mizell said the disease is difficult to diagnose because of its appearance as a cold, with coughing and wheezing.

The boy continued breathing laboriously throughout that Monday, Dec. 19, Robinson said. He suddenly stopped breathing around 9:30 p.m. When she attempted to contact help through 911, the call failed to connect properly. She tried a second and third time, and finally decided to take the child in her vehicle with a friend's help to the Lincoln County Medical Center.

The boy was pronounced dead by doctors about a half-hour later.

Matthew was buried over the Christmas holiday in Huntington Beach, Calif. by his mother and father, Mark Mozaleski of Ruidoso.

# Ruidoso, county stalled on E911

Ruidoso residents may soon have enhanced 911 services, but little progress has been made for the rest of the county.

Both the Ruidoso and county systems have the equipment and network consoles to track the addresses of 911 calls, and residents have been paying for the service for more than three years, a state 911 board member says.

But neither jurisdiction has completed gathering the necessary database to make the system work. So they continue operating with a "basic" 911 emergency system.

Ruidoso's task has been complicated by the duplicate street names and addresses in Ruidoso, and the county's efforts have been bogged down by job turnovers and the vast, rural expanse of its territory.

The recent failure of the 911 relay system, apparently tied to a breakdown of a cable circuit that joins the database headquarters in Albuquerque to bases in Ruidoso, has focused attention on the status of E911.

Currently, 911 dispatchers in Lincoln County (Johnny Romero in Ruidoso and Connie Hopper in Carrizozo) only receive the phone number of a person who calls for help. Ruidoso dispatch covers the villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, and a small area east of the Downs. Carrizozo's dispatch hand-

les the rest of the county.

When people call 911, their numbers become locked into a computer system, enabling the dispatcher to call back for information if contact with the caller is lost.

The enhanced system, called E911, automatically provides critical information about the source of the call: the phone number, address, resident's name and the specific agency most capable of providing an emergency response.

Most of the state already has E911, said Bob Gunter, the state government's 911 program manager/engineer. Those that are still lagging may take another six to 12 months to get the system on line. The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office is one of the furthest behind, he added.

Gunter said there was no deadline for gathering the information established in the state's 1989 E911 act, which underwent three revisions in 1993.

Capability for the enhanced system network in Ruidoso and Lincoln County exists due to a 1993 dual state grant: \$331,480 in equipment (this also covers the basic system already in place) and a maintenance grant for \$42,000.

For three years, Lincoln County telephone customers have paid into a statewide fund for the service, comprised of a 25 cent equipment fee and 26 cent network and data fee. The monthly charge is collected

by the local phone company as a tax for the state fund.

Ruidoso is ahead of Lincoln County in installing the data into the system, but still has some lengths to go, Gunter said.

Recording the data begins with contacting telephone customers and verifying phone book information.

"Johnny (Romero) has done a better job gathering data than most communities across the state," Gunter said.

Romero is in the process of putting together a database, which she hopes will put the system on-line in February. Her most recent efforts, made in conjunction with the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission, is in identifying duplicate streets which must be given new names.

A commission workshop on the package is planned for Jan. 9. The package will be presented at a village council public hearing Jan. 23 and for final council approval Jan. 31.

While Gunter issued kudos for Romero's efforts, he reproved the county for their seemingly "lack of commitment" to installing an effective database.

The responsibility for putting together the Carrizozo-based portion of that system rests on the shoulders of Sheriff James McSwane and county commissioners, Gunter said. County of-

ficials came to the last 911 state board meeting, but had never attended previous ones over the past two years, Gunter said.

Sheriff James McSwane said he just learned the responsibility was his. Both he and Dr. Bernie Reimann, former local E911 committee chairman, said the "take charge" management style and abrupt resignation last spring of former county manager Andy Wynham contributed to this confusion.

Wynham, who had assumed the sole responsibility before his resignation, apparently reassigned some of the responsibilities to people outside of the sheriff's office, McSwane said, who then assumed the job was being taken care of. Reimann, who resigned from his post last winter after a falling out with Wynham, said commissioners apparently diverted county employees from their jobs of assigning addresses to rural areas before they were finished.

"I think there has been a misunderstanding whose responsibility it was to ensure that information is entered into the data base," McSwane said, but added that he now recognizes the responsibility is his. He said a communication officer will be assigned full-time to get the system running properly, but it will take many months to get the system on-line.

something malfunctioned on the part of the other 911 players — GTE, the local phone company, the 911 equipment or the 911 dispatch.

Apparently, one of the fiberoptic cable lines failed, Belmont said. The lines route 911 calls to the emergency service headquarters in Albuquerque, which, in turn, reroutes them back to the appropriate 911 dispatch in Ruidoso or Carrizozo in seconds.

The remaining trunk system was operating, and appears to have handled two other calls made that night without a hitch.

GTE, which maintains local phone service, contacted US West the day after learning of the problem, after they were notified by the Ruidoso police and the sheriff's office in Carrizozo. Both have 911 dispatch offices.

Belmont said the US West restored the cable line that same

Tuesday. Local GTE manager Eddie Nichols said the line wasn't repaired until Wednesday morning.

Nichols said the call left Ruidoso without incident, but became trapped or lost in the routing of US West lines. Likewise, 911 dispatch coordinator Johnny Romero said the call never reached the dispatch, which is always manned by at least two people and usually by three. Even if the call had suddenly been disconnected before it was ans-

wered, the caller's number is automatically locked into the 911 computer, Romero said. There is no record of Robinson's call.

Until the line was repaired by US West, GTE manipulated the system by "bussing it out" to have incoming 911 calls directly routed to the functioning cable line, Nichols said.

Belmont said an additional trunk may be the best system

safeguard against such telecommunication failure. However, he added, "there is no absolute, fool-proof way of preventing" a failure.

The company takes precautions and trains people to identify problems, Belmont said. "But eventually," he said, "there is the possibility that something might malfunction."

911 dispatch coordinator Romero said she performs daily checks on the system by calling it.

Although her calls only cover the 257 and 258 exchanges, she has her granddaughter in Agua Fria call from the Ruidoso Downs 378 vicinity as a check.

"We're trying to minimize problems as much as possible," he said. "For every one call like this with a fatality, there are 9,000 that go through without a hitch."

"Overall, the system works very well — works better than calling the sheriff or a seven digit number."

money they felt they couldn't use; the parents of a local boy who had drowned in a pool delivered Suzie their child's piggy bank — a big, five gallon water container filled with coins he had been saving for a bicycle.

"I didn't want to take it, but they insisted," Suzie recalls.

More than the necessary funds were raised, and so Michael's parents set up a trust fund at the Ruidoso State Bank that they draw on for his anti-rejection medication,

as well as medication for his pancreas and liver.

There is still a threat of rejection — always will be — and Michael has more than once been airlifted to Denver from bouts of pancreatitis and various illnesses brought on by his immuno-suppressed status.

Nonetheless, the buoyant fourth grader's life is "100% better," Suzie says. As Michael puts it, "I feel pretty good."

It is apparent that the boy is thriving, as he fills his days with

friends and sport — little league baseball, skiing and football.

"He has no fear," Suzie says. "He was held down so long that now he wants to go out and do everything."

Michael's parents have put the brakes on the serious contact with football teams, but have accepted his play with friends and neighborhood pals — as long as his general health appears good.

"In the first year, I really panicked (about him playing sports)," Suzie says, "but he'd much rather do that than anything else."

"Who will be responsible for the side waste stream has never been addressed by the Department of Energy or the Mesalero," he said. Walters previously served on a Ruidoso village committee researching the issue.

Both U.S. Rep. Joe Skeen (R-New Mexico) and U.S. Sen. Jeff Bingaman (D-New Mexico) have been active in trying to block the project, he said.

Haynsworth said her group is mounting a campaign to educate other communities and to show state officials the strong feelings against the project. She said State Sen. Tom Rutherford (D-Bernalillo) intends to introduce a bill to throw obstacles in front of the proposal to transport the fuel to the reservation.

Rutherford could not be reached Wednesday for more details on the bill and Williams was not familiar with the particulars. However, Williams warned the federal government may threaten to cut off highway construction money or money for education if the state tries to block the storage project.

### Water

Williams said he was pleased to be appointed to the legislative committees for education and for agriculture and water resources.

"Water is the key to the future of this community and the state," he said.

Williams said he would like stricter state regulations governing the purchase and use of water rights, and he applauded the Lincoln County Commission for pushing the state engineer to conduct a statewide water inventory.

Walters urged Williams to back the inventory by voting to use some of the state's budget surplus to finance the work. He said matching money may be available from the U.S. Congress.

"We can't have a comprehensive land use plan until we know the water situation," Walters said, referring to the county's current push for zoning and a land use plan.

### Education

Williams said he will support more programs aimed at helping students learn a trade, whether or not they are headed to college.

However, he cautioned that he will have to balance educational needs with available dollars since nearly half of the state's budget already goes to education. If a state lottery is started, some of the money generated could be used on one-time projects, but could not be counted on as a continuing source of support, he said.

### Gambling

"Gambling is an important issue, but every person has a slightly different answer," Williams said.

He has been lobbied by residents of Angel Fire, a ski community where the majority voted against the constitutional amendment designed to legalize video gaming and a state lottery.

The reasons many Angel Fire residents are against gambling are the same reasons he hears from opponents in Ruidoso, Williams said.

"They moved there for the beauty of the area and the laid-back life. They believe gambling will disturb that environment," he said.

The Angel Fire gambling opponents want a local option vote in each community where gambling is being considered.

"Then you in Lincoln County who voted for it are going to say you already approved it in Ruidoso and let's get on with it," he said.

The outcome of the election has been challenged on the basis that a constitutional amendment should cover only one issue. Amendment 8 covered a lottery and video gambling. Williams said he would rule the election count void, if he was a judge.

In any case, the state Legislature has the power to act on the mandate from voters and approve gambling and a lottery, he said.

"The state Legislature wanted people to have a say and 70% said they wanted gaming," Williams said.

Ruidoso should be a shoo-in under almost any of the criteria mentioned in previous legislative debates, he said. That includes being close to existing gambling (at Casino Apache), a racetrack (at Ruidoso Downs) and having a hotel with more than 100 rooms.

Williams said he won't make up his mind about criteria until after he attends a session in Santa Fe next week that will feature officials from communities all over the country already dealing with gambling.

Property which was valued in 1994 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1995 or subsequent years, EXCEPT FOR: 1. mobile homes, 2. livestock, and 3. land used for agricultural purposes.

If for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's office. All nongovernmental entities (property owners) which claim to be exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1995 if the exemption was not claimed in 1994. Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land use for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by nongovernmental

entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February.

If you made improvements to your real property and: 1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and; 2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued; you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by that assessor. If you believe your property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report, on forms provided by the assessor, a signed statement which:

1. describes the property affected, 2. states the cause and nature of decrease in value, and 3. states the amount you contend the value has decreased. This statement must be filed with the county assessor no later than the last day of February.

If the veterans exemption was claimed and allowed in 1994 no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1994 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor. If the head-of-family exemption was claimed and allowed in 1994 no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. # Capitan

## School budget cut tied to Fort Stanton staff cuts

It's not just employees who are worried about the future of Fort Stanton Hospital.

The Capitan school district has a big stake, about \$135,000 or 13.5% of its budget, in the hospital's continued operation. As the hospital switches from caring for developmentally disabled clients to patients requiring long-term nursing care, it may cut dozens of employees.

About 45 of the district's 562 students come from families that depend on employment at the hospital, according to Capitan District Superintendent Diana Sonnemaker. The school district receives \$3,000 in state funding for each student.

Recent reports indicate that hospital staff cuts will occur as Fort Stanton attempts to rebuild its patient count. With a new governor taking over, no one is certain whether the hospital will continue

to benefit from the support shown by the state Legislature in the past.

"Our district is really concerned about what's going to happen with Fort Stanton," Sonnemaker said Wednesday. "We have a lot of students up there and if the fort does not continue in its present condition with all the employees, it's going to make a major financial impact next year."

"We won't lose enough kids in a specific grade level to reduce the staff or to eliminate one teacher. If you lose two or three in a class, that's not enough to reduce the teaching staff."

Until the Legislature finishes its 60-day session this year and new Gov. Gary Johnson indicates the direction he may follow with the hospital, the school district administration doesn't know how to prepare for next year, she said. The Legislature will begin its session Jan. 17 in Santa Fe.

Multiply the estimated 45 students that could be lost by \$3,000

— the amount received by the district from the state and other sources for each full-time student — and the result is \$135,000 the district may not receive in an already bare-bones \$1 million annual budget, Sonnemaker said.

"We'd still have to keep the budget as it is, we still have the buildings to run and heat and cool, and the same programs to offer and the same teachers to hire, but with less money," she said.

The fort always has played a major role in the economy of Lincoln County, starting out as a center of commerce and defense, converting to a Merchant Marine hospital for lung diseases and eventually into a resident care and training center for the mentally retarded.

The latest transition was initiated in response to a court order to remove the developmentally disabled clients from the hospital and place them in community programs that more closely resembled

"normal" living. The long-term nursing care beds are to be filled primarily with geriatric and brain damaged patients.

In searching for a new mission for the hospital, one of the other uses mentioned was as a regional juvenile detention center.

### Bells are ringing again

The first two days of the new semester after the Christmas and New Year holidays went smoothly, even though a great deal of schedule changing took place, Sonnemaker said.

About 10 new students were enrolled, some transferring from other districts within the county.

### Need help

Capitan school officials want parents to monitor their children better when they attend or participate in extra-curricular activities. "We want to get more parents

involved, so when their children are at school basketball games or dances and other things along that line, that parents help to monitor their own children," Sonnemaker said. "We have kids running in and out of gymnasiums with no one there to watch them. The parents don't know where they are. They could go outside and fall and get hurt; or they could be somewhere where they shouldn't be and disrupt other fans."

### Clean-up underway

Sonnemaker said parents and others also can help district employees in their effort to clean up the grounds and building interiors.

"We need extra eyes," she said. "If parents see things, we probably have driven by a hundred times, let us know, whether it's trash sitting there or a fence that's down."

"It won't hurt our feelings. We want to keep a decent and clean campus."

## Parks offer camp permit

New Mexico State Parks will offer a special, seven-day camping permit at a reduced rate now through March 31, 1995.

The permit allows campers to stay at a state park campground for seven consecutive days for the price of five days. People with annual camping permits get a special rate for hook-ups, receiving seven days for the cost of five days.

The special permit must be paid in full at the time of purchase and refunds are not available. However, "rain checks" may be issued for unusual circumstances or unused services, but must be used by May 1, 1995.

"We hope that this special offer will encourage people to visit our state parks during the winter months," said Noe Villarreal, acting parks director.

In addition to the reduced camping rate, park managers in southern New Mexico may waive the 14-day stay limit at Brantley Lake, Harry McAdams, Leasburg Dam, Oliver Lee Memorial, Pancho Villa, and Rockhound state parks through March 31, 1995, if campsites are available.

Visitors to state parks where the 14-day stay limit has been waived, will be required to change campsites within the park every 14 days. All other parks will observe the 14-day stay limit.

## More EPA grants

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has expanded its environmental justice grants program. Environmental justice aims to address the disproportionate impacts of pollution in minority and low income communities.

The purpose of the grant program is to provide assistance to communities and to raise public interest and knowledge on issues of environmental justice.

Projects should either identify communications improvements in a community, motivate the public to be more conscious of local environmental justice issues, develop an environmental justice practice, or teach about risk reduction and pollution prevention in communities dealing with environmental justice issues.

Grant application is open to community groups, grassroots organizations, churches, schools, universities, tribal authorities, or other non-profit organizations.

# Ruidoso's marathon man takes on ultimate challenge

Imagine jogging at least four hours to complete the New York City Marathon — all 26.2 miles of it.

Imagine training for six months with the hope you can just complete that run — jogging 25 to 40 miles a week.

Imagine enduring the leg cramps, dehydration and feeling of total exhaustion during and after the race.

Then imagine wanting to do it again.

Bob Clarke, 63, wants to do just that. He looks forward to running the New York City Marathon for the third time.

But for now, Clarke has a greater challenge on his mind.

## The ultimate challenge

Clarke has taken his love for running and training to a higher level — so to speak. Two years after his first marathon, Clarke participated in his first Mount Taylor Winter Quadrathlon.

The quadrathlon combines biking, running, cross country skiing and snowshoeing over a 43-mile course that takes participants up to the Mt. Taylor summit (elevation 11,301 feet) and then back to Grants (elevation 6,500 feet).

For his first quadrathlon, Clarke paired up with his friend Dennis Pabst, a Dexter teacher. Clarke completed the 13-mile bike rides and 5-mile runs while Pabst covered the five miles of skiing and two miles of snowshoeing. They took first place in their division, men's 40-49.

He said he still needs to refine those skills. Quadrathlon participants use "skins" for the uphill climb. The rubber skins over the skis allow the skier to move forward and then prevent the skis from sliding back as the skier climbs a hill.

Clarke describes the uphill skiing portion of the race "like an extreme aerobic exercise." The hard part is coming down because the skier has to control the skis and master the turns as well.

Participants snowshoe their way to the summit. "It's more like running with big shoes on," Clarke said of snowshoeing. Once you're at the top, you simply circle the flag and begin your descent.

"The overall winners are unreal," Clarke said. "They can fly over that mountain."

## Hitting the wall

Although the quadrathlon might sound more difficult, Clarke said the marathon is harder even though it takes less time.

Clarke completed his second trip through the five boroughs of NYC this past Nov. 7 — the 25th anniversary of the event.

"I was pleased and privileged to be able to even finish it," Clarke said. Even though he was disappointed with his time, Clarke was pleased overall with his performance.

He completed the run in a time of five hours, 41 minutes and 30 seconds. It took him an average of 13 minutes to complete a mile. It was more than an hour slower than his first NYC Marathon time of 4:28 in 1987, but what mattered to

Clarke was finishing. "After you run a marathon it's like nothing else in your life. It's hard to describe," Clarke said.

Clarke was slowed in training this year with a sore heel. The nagging injury never really went away.

"I was never able to get in over six or seven miles a run," Clarke said. Nor was he able to do a longer run of 18 to 20 miles a month before the marathon as his final preparation for the race.

As a result, Clarke "hit the wall" around the 14-mile marker of the race. He started getting severe leg cramps because of the lack of conditioning.

"My legs were just really dead. I had expended all of the energy in them," he said. "When you start getting the cramps, I learned from 1987, you shut it down — back down your pace."

Clarke did just that and he continued to rehydrate himself with water and Gatorade at the water stations along the route. Clarke said the legs give out before the cardiorespiratory function does.

"It gets to be a real survival thing for awhile there, but in the last few miles I got my second wind," he said. "It's not really a second wind — I was never winded, but my legs came back."

"When you get to the last four miles, when you're coming back down Fifth Avenue, when you can see and smell Central Park, it just boosts you right up," he said.

Waiting for Clarke at the finish line was his wife, Eva, and a host of volunteers to congratulate and help all the runners recover.

"There's nothing like the first one (marathon) because you don't know what it's going to be like," he said. "The second is good because you have that experience you can benefit from. You try to remember the mistake you made the first time."

All of this stemmed from an aspiration Clarke had when he took up running in 1984.

"I started running for health. I just got into running," Clarke said. He went to some of the shorter races and started following the sport in the popular runners magazines.

"As a runner you can aspire to it. To run a marathon was an ambition," he said.

"I enjoy this. This is something not very many people can do. And I get great satisfaction at doing something like that," Clarke said.


There is an old saying about winter weather: "When the days begin to lengthen, the cold begins to strengthen."

# Three arrested on cocaine charges in Ruidoso

Seven grams of cocaine were arrested and three Ruidoso men were arrested last week during an operation supervised by the Lincoln County Narcotics Enforcement Unit.

Angelo Vega, who heads the enforcement unit, said county deputies and Ruidoso police officers were acting on a search warrant when they entered a home at 511

Grindstone Canyon Road in Ruidoso in the early afternoon of Dec. 30.

The officers seized two eight-ball bags of cocaine, scales and less than \$500 in currency for a total street value of \$1,000, Vega said.

An eight-ball equals about 3.5 grams of cocaine.

Arrested in the incident were: William Clyde Surratt, 30. He

was charged with trafficking cocaine, possession with intent to distribute and possession of drug paraphernalia. His bond was set at \$25,000.

- Dennis Foster, 38, who was charged with possession of paraphernalia. His bond is \$1,000.

- Harold Dixon, 39, who was charged with possession of cocaine

and possession of drug paraphernalia. His bond was set at \$2,000.

A warrant also was issued for Norma Pinkston, 29. Vega said the charges pending against her are trafficking cocaine, possession with intent to distribute, and conspiracy of trafficking cocaine.

### Williams needs to get legislative ducks in row

Everyone knows state representative-elect Dub Williams is a nice guy, but very soon he will have to take some stances that make some constituents decide he's not so nice.

So far, we aren't sure what those stances will be. His public discussions after his election sound much like his talk before the election: vague.

Before the Legislature opens its 1995 session Jan. 17, Williams needs to decide what position he will support concerning the implementation of video gambling. Does he support a local option vote? Angel Fire residents are lobbying for it; Williams says many Ruidoso residents have told him they feel they already cast their opinion on gambling in November. And what sort of businesses should be allowed to have gambling? In what communities?

In the end, Williams will have to do what he thinks is right, because there will always be people who don't agree.

Williams says he wants to wait until attending some legislative hearings Jan. 11-13, then decide his position on gambling issues. If he's indecisive about it, then it would be a good idea for him to also attend the Jan. 5-7 hearings to gather even more information. Many gambling specialists from around the country will talk at this first round of hearings.

Many people at Tuesday's meeting with Williams in Ruidoso talked about concerns with the proposed nuclear storage site on the neighboring Mescalero Apache reservation. Williams said the state has little control over the issue. But he's not familiar with one legislator's plan to introduce a bill on the subject. He needs to get familiar with all the issues and possibilities surrounding this complex issue, because it's obviously on the minds of his constituents.

Williams said water rights will be a big issue in this Legislature, but he didn't say why and he didn't have any specifics about what he'd like to see happen, beyond a water resource inventory.


By now, Williams should have figured out some of the bills he wants to introduce, but he hasn't told us about any of them.

We haven't even heard any specifics on Williams' area of expertise, education (he's a former teacher). He will be on the Legislature's education committee (along with the ag and water resources committee), so he will have extra influence in this area if he chooses to exert it.

Williams needs to get his ducks in a row quickly, because the issues are going to erupt quickly this year.

And, while we don't expect him to be Santa, the money WILL be dished out for many needed local projects, so we'd like to get our share.

In the final analysis, he needs to represent his constituents the best way he knows how. That will require some strong stances, not vague comments.

Neither Mr. Hodges nor Malik prompted, or even wanted, me to compose this letter. But, I felt that it should be known that the matter of Malik's punishment has been settled appropriately.

I beseech the people in this community to take a step back and analyze how they might have reacted in this same situation. Yes, obscene gestures and words have no place in the arena of high school athletics. Neither does racism.

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### Angel Fire doesn't want gambling

TO THE EDITOR:

The concern of the residents of Angel Fire continues as we hear that the Legislature is pursuing working on gaming regulations, even though the State Supreme Court has not yet ruled on whether Amendment 8 is constitutional. We see that the gaming proponents have a lot of clout with some of the legislators.

Since Angel Fire voted 70.5% against the amendment, you can see that the majority feels strongly about not wanting the video games of chance in our community. If the Supreme Court rules Amendment 8 constitutional, then we are asking that the Legislature give us a choice and provide for a local option, precinct-wide vote on whether video gambling will be allowed in our community.
