Public hearing set for proposed county zoning

In the last two weeks, Jerry Carroll drove into Carrizozo twice from the small settlement of Oscura to tell county officials to keep their hands off his property rights. The resident of the small settlement at Lincoln County's western edge contends zoning isn't needed. He asked county commissioners Friday to let voters decide whether they want zoning in the county. "I would like the issue placed on the next regular election or put to a special election," Carroll said. "No more action (should) be taken to

implement it until we find out whether the voters say yes or no." Carroll offered to collect signatures on petitions to show support for an election. He asked County Attorney Alan Morel to research whether all of the currently unincorporated portions of the county could vote to incorporate to escape any zoning laws the commission may enact. Commissioners listened, but didn't respond to Carroll's request, except to set Feb. 7 as the date for the first of several public hearings on proposed changes in a zoning ordinance.

Commissioners also scheduled Feb. 7 public hearing on revisions to the subdivision regulations. A questionnaire to help pinpoint appropriate zoning for different sections of the county has been assembled by Patsy Sanchez, county planner zoning coordinator. If approved by the commission, the questionnaire will be mailed to the 11,267 property owners in the unincorporated areas of the county. The proposed changes to both ordinances still are being drafted by the Planning and Zoning Commission. During a Planning and Zoning

Commission meeting Dec. 29, Carroll pushed to dropped the ordinance completely. "Everything this does can be covered by (existing) laws," he said. "If you don't want trash and a smell next door, you have the solid waste ordinance. If you don't want a rifle range, there's a law against reckless endangerment." Carroll wasn't alone in his opposition at that December meeting. Most of the 14 residents attending said they wanted the same thing. "Repeat the whole thing," said Paul Wetzel of White Oaks. "This will be our other war. It's

going to be stopped," predicted Joe Thornton. In an interview Friday, Ralph Romero, chairman of the zoning commission, said most people he talks to don't actively oppose zoning. They just wonder how it will affect them and their property. He said the main message he wants to convey, especially to ranchers and farmers, is that zoning can be used to protect an existing way of life against the encroachment of incompatible uses. Zoning would also allow property with commercial value to be

Deputy overtime still debated

If the sheriff loses a threatened lawsuit by his deputies, the court award will come out of his annual budget, Lincoln County Commissioners warned Friday. Sheriff James McSwane contends his procedures regarding lunch breaks and on-call hours comply with the federal Fair Labor Standards Act. However, the deputies recently sent a letter of intent to sue the county. They contend they have been working nine hour days, because they are on call during the lunch hour. They all wear beepers. "I honestly believe that doesn't restrict their freedom," McSwane said. "We're in litigation based on your opinion," Chairman Monroy Montes said. County Attorney Alan Morel said in 1993, deputies signed a letter stating their lunch hours were free time when they could conduct personal business in their county vehicles and dress in civilian clothes. "I can't help their perception or if they feel that the process is actually being implemented or not,"

Morel said. "If we owe the deputies, whether it's \$25, \$2,500 or \$250,000, we'll take it out of the sheriff's budget," Commissioner Wilton Howell said. Montes reminded McSwane that he was asked by the commission at its December meeting to contact the federal labor department or any other necessary sources to ensure he was within guidelines. Morel was his source, McSwane said. Everything seemed resolved in 1993, McSwane added, but since the birth of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department Association the issue came up again. The association is the local union, which is scheduled to enter into contract negotiations this year for the first time under the new public employees collective bargaining act. Union view Deputies feel they work nine hours to get eight hours pay, said Johnny Johnson, a sheriff's office dispatcher and president of the employee union, during an interview last week. "They (the county) have never given us any indication that they

accept responsibility that there is a violation, but they did make us an offer, which in my way of thinking is the same thing," he said. "I honestly don't think they took us seriously until the letter of intent," Johnson continued. "The insurance company is involved now and it's the same one that has settled the same thing at several places, including Clovis." "If we all just settle down and no one gets excited or crazy, we can work out the problem." Fred Mahrer, the Albuquerque attorney for the Fraternal Order of Police (FOP), is helping the employees argue their point, Johnson said. And the point isn't new, Johnson said. "This didn't happen with just this (sheriff's) administration," said Johnson. "It's been the last two at least. The deputies under (former sheriff Tom Sullivan) had a bunch of comp time accumulated and none of them claimed it. They just kind of let it go." "They had the same scenario under (former sheriff Don) Samuels. So basically, they're just tired of writing it off." Please see Sheriff, page 2A

Curfew pondered Tuesday

A proposal to curb juvenile crime with a weekday curfew will be considered by the Ruidoso Village Council at 6:30 p.m. tomorrow. Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox designed the law to reduce an increasing juvenile crime problem by enforcing school attendance. Since first presenting the proposal to the village council in November, Chief Lanny Maddox has redrafted the measure to respond to village councilors' concerns. The refined proposal still emphasizes school attendance, but distinguishes exceptions to the rule. Homeschoolers and tourists are exempted. Those deemed unable to benefit from instruction because of mental and physical disabilities would also be exempted. Only resident children on the street or at places of entertainment who are supposed to be at school would be stopped and questioned, escorted back to school or issued citations, Maddox said.

Gambling hearings continue this week

The state Legislature held three days of hearings last week to listen to experts talk about gambling, and the hearings continue this week.

The first session was held Thursday through Saturday. State Representative-elect Dub Williams, R-Ruidoso, said he will attend the Jan. 11-13 hearings.

Specialists from the gambling industry and officials representing states with legalized gambling are talking to legislators, providing background information as legislators prepare to enact gambling legislation.

The Legislature will write up legislation for a state-wide lottery and video gaming after voters approved Amendment 8 in November. The Legislature's regular 60-day session begins Jan. 17.

The state Supreme Court still hasn't decided whether it was legal to combine the two forms of gambling under one amendment.

School board meets Tuesday

Cochise appointed to oversee tribal nuclear storage project

The Mescalero Apache Tribal Council has appointed Silas Cochise to evaluate a proposed temporary spent-fuel storage facility on tribal lands neighboring Ruidoso.

Cochise will also have responsibility for the project's public information.

Cochise will work full-time on the storage proposal. He will be taking over some of the responsibilities previously carried out by project consultant Miller Hudson, who will pursue new business opportunities in Denver.

Cochise has been a member of the ten-person Mescalero Tribal Council for 12 years. He serves on the council's education, land assignment, natural resources and rodeo committees, and he serves on the New Mexico Indian Commission, a policy advisory group. In addition

to his Tribal Council duties, Cochise worked in range management for the Bureau of Indian Affairs' Department of Natural Resources.

For 10 years he directed the reservation's Alcohol Rehabilitation Program — a successful program sponsored by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism.

Cochise and his wife Inez live on the reservation. They have four sons, four daughters and eight grandchildren. Silas Cochise is a great-grandson of the famed Chiricahua Apache Chief Cochise.

Cochise will remain in this position until the tribal referendum vote. If the tribe approves the plan, Cochise will continue with his position until final ratification of the agreement by the Tribal Council and the utilities. After the agreement is ratified, Cochise will be assigned to the Fuel Storage Company.

zoned that way from the start, Romero said.

Existing nonconforming uses would be allowed to continue, called "grandfathering." But if the specific use was interrupted, it could not be reinitiated.

In addition to the hearings on the subdivision regulations and zoning ordinance, commissioners said they will conduct sessions about the maps showing zoning designations, and on a proposed land use plan.

The five villages in the county would not be covered by the ordinance. Some already have their own zoning laws in place.

Sanchez has estimated the basic cost of implementing zoning, without legal fees, at \$10,627.

The existing zoning ordinance was approved in 1988, but never implemented.

As it stands, the zoning ordinance is useless. After being passed in 1988 by commissioners on their way out of office, it was

shoved into a back drawer by their successors. Without a comprehensive land use plan and the zone maps, the ordinance could not be enforced, county officials were told by the state.

Two years later in 1990, the majority of the then three-man commission wasn't interested in pursuing zoning.

But five years later, the tide is turning, driven by forces beyond the control of the expanded five-man commission board.

Video gambling, endorsed in November by state voters, may become a reality this year in New Mexico. Commissioners have appointed a special task force to research possible impacts on the county.

A proposal to store spent nuclear fuel rods on the Mescalero Apache Reservation in the neighboring Otero County appears to be moving forward and could generate pressure for more housing construction and subdivisions as high paying jobs materialize, commissioners warn.

Johnson said money is not the primary issue.

"It's not that they want to receive a bunch of money," he said. "They want to get the situation resolved and in getting it resolved, if there is some recovery of money, they won't turn it down."

Other bargaining issues

When they reach the bargaining table, the employment situation of dispatchers also will be a major focus, he said.

"Dispatchers always are dumped on, they're second class citizens in the department," Johnson said. "Dispatchers haven't been given the same opportunities as the rest of the staff in the courthouse. They're still not up to the same pay level as detention officers, even though this commission raised them last year."

"We're left with the lives of the people in our hands, but we are looked down upon. I believe most

sheriffs have deputy mentalities, because most were deputies at one time."

Johnson said dispatchers have not been allowed to take a 30-minute break allowed by federal law on an eight-hour shift.

"That's one of the issues that as soon as we get the deputy situation

ironed out, we will get to the commission with this one," he said. "If it's a violation, it needs to be corrected."

Johnson said collective bargaining should begin soon on a contract for sheriff's employees. Dave Heshley, the representative of the state FOP, and some local association officers will handle the bargaining.

As far as other issues, group insurance with the county paying the premium has been mentioned, he said.

"Everyone in the association will write up 10 things and then we'll put them together," he said.

Johnson, who is minister of the Carrizozo Assemblies of God church, said it wasn't his idea to take on the union presidency at a time when collective bargaining and other issues promise to keep it a hot seat.

"I take it as obligation. Man's injustice to man needs to be corrected," Johnson said.

County zoning law specifics

The proposed county zoning ordinance would:

- create agricultural zones for ranching and farming, recreation and wildlife habitat;
- establish different zones for residential use covering single family dwellings, multiple family units and institutions such as hospitals, alcohol centers and corrections centers;
- create different commercial zones for agricultural businesses, gas and oil exploration, professional offices, retail,

industrial assembly and manufacturing;

- set up an airport zone for the existing Sierra Blanca Regional Airport and any future additions;

- establish a building code, building fees and a new position of building inspector;

- cover special use permits for cases with unusual circumstances;

- and implement regulations for signs.

Sen. Domenici proposes balanced federal budget

The first legislation offered in the 104th Congress Wednesday was a proposed constitutional amendment requiring a balanced budget, backed by U.S. Senator Pete Domenici, R-NM.

The amendment would require balanced federal budgets beginning

in the year 2002 unless three-fifths of the House and Senate voted to allow a deficit.

The Constitution requires a two-thirds vote of both the House and Senate to adopt an amendment.

Then three-fourths of the states must ratify it.





The revised proposal also says school officials will fax police the names of all students absent, suspended or expelled by 10 a.m. each school day.

County Juvenile Probation and Parole Officer Jane Parnell and Ruidoso Schools Superintendent Mike Gladden have endorsed the proposal.

Parents would have to take time out of their days to appear at court if their children are snagged for truancy. Parents of violators would be given a warning on the first violation, a \$50 fine on the second and a \$100 fine on each subsequent violation. Violating students would be identified and the proper school officials and guardians would be summoned to court for a hearing on the matter.

By regulating truancy as a town ordinance rather than in response to the state statutes, Maddox said violators will be heard in the municipal court system rather than the overburdened magistrate court. This would allow for more immediate attention to a child's delinquency, Maddox contended. He added the proposal is not an attempt to replace state law, but rather a "reflection of it."

Police report that 216 burglaries were committed in 1994 through the end of November — a 13% increase over January through November 1993. Final 1994 statistics are not yet available.

Of the 52 burglaries committed this past October — a record month for Ruidoso — 46 were residential burglaries and half of those were attributed to juveniles.

Approximately 27% of area crimes were committed by juveniles in 1994 through November. Maddox said roughly 50% of those arrested were new offenders.

Police say a nighttime curfew placed on youths in August has already had a proven impact on the juvenile crime rate.

— a request for endorsement of a caravan that will travel to Santa Fe to protest nuclear waste dumps in front of the New Mexico Legislature. Hazel Haynsworth of the Anti-M.R.S. Campaign made the request.

County Briefs

Raises for elected officials rescinded

In two swift votes Friday, all elected officials in Lincoln County were knocked out of salary raises approved last April and due to take effect this month.

In reaction to an attorney general's opinion that the 7% raises would be illegal for elected officials in the midst of their terms, commissioners voted unanimously to rescind their previous approval of salary increases.

The attorney general cited a provision in the state constitution that prohibits elected officials from benefiting from any raises they approve.

After the raises were rescinded, Commissioner L. Ray Nunley proposed the pay increase only for those officials newly elected or re-elected Nov. 8. That would include Nunley, Chairman Monroy Montes, Commissioner William Schwettmann, Treasurer Joan Park and County Clerk Martha Proctor.

The motion failed 3-2. Nunley voted against his own proposal with commissioners Wilton Howell and Montes. Commissioners Schwettmann and Stirling Spencer voted for approval.

After the meeting, Nunley said he wanted to offer the opportunity for the commission to approve a raise, but "I didn't want to vote myself a raise."

Commissioners appoint seven of nine to Public Lands Use Advisory Council

Lincoln County Commissioners appointed seven of the nine members Friday for their new Public Lands Use Advisory Council (PLUAC).

Four of the seven are connected to ranching or farming. The commissioners pledged at a previous public meeting that the board's membership would not be dominated by agricultural interests.

Ranchers Duane Frost and Joel Bonnell were appointed to PLUAC as representatives of the county's Agriculture and Rural Affairs Committee. Commissioner Stirling Spencer appointed Rex Wilson, another rancher who had taken a lead in pushing for the formation of the PLUAC.

Commissioner William Schwettmann tapped U.S. Forest Service employee David Koch from his district and Chairman Monroy Montes named Israel Miranda, a Hondo Valley farmer.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley selected barber Bob Hollis and Commissioner Wilton Howell picked lawyer Don Dutton.

Down to the last two at-large appointments, majority votes couldn't be mustered on several nominees, most from agriculture backgrounds and one from the state environment department. Commissioners agreed to come back with more names by the next meeting.

Rural property owners may see rise in county road assessments

Property owners along county roads in subdivisions may see their annual maintenance assessments jump, under a proposal being considered by Lincoln County Commissioners.

Chairman Monroy Montes said Friday the commission has the power under state statutes to recoup up to half the cost of annual maintenance on roads that require extraordinary care.

Currently, Lincoln County charges 10 cents per linear foot of lot line abutting a road in some subdivisions. But County Road Manager Bill Cupit said it costs more than \$1/linear foot to care for chip seal roads, and it costs even more for asphalt.

Commissioners agreed to hold a public hearing Feb. 7 to consider increased assessments. They said the new assessment may vary according to the type of road. Cupit is to come back with estimates on different maintenance costs, because the charge must be based on last year's actual maintenance expense.

Commissioner Wilton Howell proposed the hearing be conducted in Ruidoso, since many of the affected subdivisions, including Alto, are closer to Ruidoso than the county courthouse in Carrizozo. Commissioner Stirling Spencer tried unsuccessfully to amend the motion to keep the meeting at the courthouse.





New biofeedback center opens

Imagine being able to communicate with your own body — to get an objective report of where anger registers in your muscles, how your physiological systems respond to stress, or what your brain is doing.

Mary Ahearn uses computer-driven biofeedback equipment to help people see what their body is really doing so they can reduce tension, blood pressure and stress.

“Biofeedback is a powerful tool for learning to manage stress.”

Ahearn operates the new Biofeedback Center of Ruidoso. She lists 15 years of counseling experience, 10 years as a Wall Street investment adviser and a masters degree in counseling from Columbia University in her background.

Biofeedback involves the use of sensors placed on different parts of the body. The sensors pick up the electrochemical changes occurring in the brain and register those changes on the equipment.

“Biofeedback is a powerful tool for learning to manage stress and enhance performance,” Ahearn said. “It gives you objective, immediate information about what your mind and body are doing. Because you have immediate informa-

tion, you can change a thought and affect your body immediately.

“Just as a batter knows immediately how he did on the last pitch, with the instant feedback provided by the biofeedback technology, we know if what we are doing is working,” Ahearn said.

An article by Ahearn published in *Pathways*, a traditional healing newsletter, describes some of the current applications of biofeedback.

“Biofeedback has been around since the 1960s, but the advent of microprocessors has now enabled us to give people real-time feedback about blood pressure, heart rate, breathing, brain activity, temperature and other bodily functions not normally controlled voluntarily,” Ahearn writes.

“Biofeedback is currently being used to treat migraines, tension headaches, blood pressure problems, digestive disorders and cardiac arrhythmias. Neurofeedback, or brain wave biofeedback, is being used to treat substance abuse, stress, to teach relaxation and to enhance peak performance,” Ahearn’s article said.

Another area of biofeedback application is treatment for Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD), a disorder of behaviors, thinking, organizing, figuring and remembering that affects an estimated 5%-15% of America’s children, Ahearn said.





The First Snow of the Year

By mid-morning this low-flying cloud had hidden the hills on either side of the canyon, and now the mist began to freeze, casting the pinons and cedars in frosty white.



They began singing their little chirping "Song of the Snow" as they scratched and kicked the snow away to reach the feed scattered along the pathway.

With their dark blue coats clearly outlined in the falling snow, a dozen or so Stellar Jays joined the snow birds in their feast in honor of the first snow of the year.

All the other birds have flown to warmer climates or are hidden in their cold weather homes nearby.

The tame cottontail rabbit came out from under his cedar bush and came hopping across the snow, feeding a minute or so with the jays and snow birds, and then went under the feeding table where he began munching on his small stack of alfalfa hay, looking out at the falling snowflakes with his large bright eyes.

I named him "Red Neck" because of a reddish-orange spot on the back of his neck.

He is the first cottontail rabbit, of the many who have made their home around the house, who does not run away when I pass by the feeding table.

PooP Scoop

Don't just consider it special pampering; grooming can be extremely beneficial to the health of a dog or cat.

"The old saying that if you look good you feel good doesn't just apply to humans," said Sandra Ford, assistant manager of the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter.

Local pet groomers see a noticeable difference in the attitude of the animals they groom, Ford said. They're happier and more outgoing, she contends.

"Of course, there are certain breeds that need more grooming attention than others in dogs," Ford said. "Poodles, cocker spaniels and schnauzers are a few of the higher maintenance pets."

Mills passed along the following tips.

Watch out for mats developing in the coat. They are irritating for the pet and can become a health risk by holding moisture and para-

sites. Infections can set in with devastating results.

If a dog has accumulated a coat full of mats, have it completely shaved, even in winter. Add a sweater for cold weather protection.

Cats usually can take care of their own fur, but longer haired felines need to be brushed regularly to keep mats from forming. Mills also advised shaving for heavily matted cats.

"Cats have thin skin and if a mat gets hung up on something, or even if owners attempt to brush the mat out, the skin can tear," Mills said. It takes three to four months for the hair to grow back.

If a cat is neglecting care of its fur, that behavior often is a sign of a serious health problem. A visit to a veterinarian may be in order.

If pet owners enjoy grooming their own animals, Mills urged they not skimp. Buy a good shampoo, never one designed for humans.

"It's too drying for your animal's skin," she said.

Brushing of teeth is another im-

portant element of pet care.

Pets can develop cavities and periodontal disease. They should have an annual check-up, be fed hard dry biscuits or rawhide chews, and should have their teeth brushed at least once a week.


Use a soft child's toothbrush or a washcloth. Mix one half baking soda and one half salt. Sometimes a bit of garlic makes the mixture more palatable.

Don't use toothpaste. Ford said dogs don't like the foam and they may get an upset stomach. Some commercial toothpaste for pets is available.

By keeping brushing time under 10 minutes, a pet shouldn't fuss and eventually should get used to routine.

Start by gently handling the pet's mouth a few minutes at a time once a day. Then use a dry toothbrush to allow the pet to get used to the feel. After a couple of weeks, add paste.

Lincoln National Forest supervisor retires

After 42 years with the federal government, Lee Poague has retired as supervisor of the Lincoln National Forest.

Don DeLorenzo, wildlife staff officer, will be acting director until the service has advertised the post and interviewed candidates. It could take 90 days to hire a new supervisor, said Merle Glenn of the Alamogordo Forest Service office.

Poague's career with the U.S. Forest Service began in 1957 when he was hired as a research forester at the Southern Forest Experimental Station in New Orleans.

Since then he has served in various capacities on the Quachita, Georgia, Prescott and Coronado national forests and with national forests in North Carolina.

Named supervisor of the Lincoln National Forest in July 1989, Poague said he has found his job both rewarding and frustrating.

"Many of the decisions we have been making on the Lincoln are due to external influences," he said. "We often are hampered by processes and planning."

He said he has been challenged with managing sensitive issued in the last five years such as drastic cuts in timber harvest, newly adopted county land use ordinances, range reform, budget changes, balancing the needs of the public with the demands of special interests. Most recently, that includes the "reinvention" of the Forest Service as the federal government attempts to streamline the operations of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, cut the number of its offices and employees.

"The pendulum will swing back. I don't know when, but some people say when two-by-fours are five dollars a piece."

But Poague won't be here to see that day. With his wife Gloria, he's settling in Arkansas to help with the care of his aging mother. Poague's father died Jan. 2.

Poague predicts the time will come when the Forest Service gets past what he calls "single use missions," when the interests of one group or issue rules out use of forest land by others.

Tigers fall in Smokey Bear finals

The season's worst winter storm delayed, but didn't prevent, the 18th annual Smokey Bear Tournament in Capitan.

After two-hour game delays on Thursday because of the weather, the tournament was back on schedule Friday and crowning its 1995 boys' and girls' champions by Saturday night.

Wednesday night's snow and ice slowed some of teams' progress to Capitan on Thursday, but athletic director Norman Cline said school officials never really considered cancelling the tournament.

"Most of the teams I had contacted were on their way. Reserve was the only team that had any trouble," Cline said.

Reserve, which is located near the Arizona/New Mexico border, forfeited its first-round games on Thursday.

Eunice made it in time, but ended up forfeiting its opening games. A car skidded into the Eunice school bus when the teams were on their way back to Capitan after checking into a Ruidoso hotel.

No one was injured in the accident, but Eunice coaches decided to stay in Ruidoso for the night.

Cline said the circumstances didn't negatively affect the tournament.

"People look forward to it (the tournament). Even with the bad weather, we had good crowds," he said.

Steers take boys' title

With an 85 points per game average, most would agree the Magdalena Steers have too many weapons for their opponents.

Saturday night against Capitan proved no different. The Steers charged to an early lead and never

relinquished it on their way to a 80-53 win over Capitan in the boys' championship game.

"They play hard. They have a good defense. They shoot well," Capitan coach Ron Becker said of Magdalena after the game.

The Tigers played hard and defended well, but had trouble shooting from the field and even the free-throw line.

Capitan struggled shooting the ball all night. Senior Michael Fish scored Capitan's first bucket of the game halfway through the first period. Keith Cox tied the game at six with a pair of free throws, but that was as close as the Tigers would get.

Magdalena scored the next 10 points to take a 16-6 lead. The Steers' defensive pressure and a pair of Tiger turnovers triggered the run.

Whenever Capitan rallied, Magdalena's sensational guards, Ruben Martinez and J. J. Apachito, asserted themselves offensively and defensively. Martinez and Apachito combined to score 20 of the Steers' 28 second-quarter points and Magdalena increased its lead to 44-24 by halftime.

"We're there at the half if we shoot better in the first quarter," Becker said of his team.

A 14-0 run at the start of the third quarter extinguished any Capitan hopes for getting back in the game.

About the only thing Magdalena coach Dean Overcast had to worry about was Capitan's home crowd. His 9-0 Steers are a top 5 Class A program. They average 85 points a game while giving up only 50. Twenty points is as close as anyone has gotten to the Steers all year.

Overcast said his team's quick start was critical in neutralizing the Capitan crowd. Once the Steers took the crowd out of the game, Overcast said his team's defense and conditioning would win the game. He was right.

Apachito finished with 25 points. Magdalena also got 15 points from Martinez and senior guard Marcus Pino. All three made the all-tournament team.

Capitan post player Keith Cox was a bright spot for the Tigers. He muscled his way to 14 points. Jon Ugalano and Josh Peralta both added seven points.

Peralta joined Fish and Neil Montes on the all-tournament team for the Tigers.

Becker said he was pleased with all three players' play throughout the weekend.

"Keith Cox got better as tourney progressed," Becker said, predicting junior forward will continue to improve his post moves.

Tigers advance easily

The Capitan boys must have resolved to play better in the new year. The Tigers coasted past Carrizozo (74-42) and Eunice (61-46) — both solid ballclubs — to get to the championship game.

Becker said the team met before the tourney, discussed its goals and made a commitment to finish the season strong.

"We just talked about what we wanted to accomplish in the new year," Becker said. "I hope we've learned that playing hard is more fun than not playing hard."

The Capitan coach said the team played the hardest it's played all year against Carrizozo. And versus Eunice, the Tigers had only one turnover in the first half.

Indeed, Capitan looked like a team that has refocused its desire since its last game before the Christmas break.

Peralta led the Tigers against the Grizzlies with 17 points. Fish added 15 while Montes had 12 points. Billy Sheehan scored 14 points for Zozo, which also got 10 points from Willie Silva.

Capitan used a balanced scoring attack against Eunice as well. Fish led with 19 points. Peralta and Cox each had 11 points.

Capitan is 5-7 overall.

Capitan girls take fourth

There is no sense of panic in Capitan girls' coach Norman Cline's voice when he talks of his Tigers.

After his team's fourth-place finish, he is still as patient as ever.

"We're pretty much on track. Our goal is to be playing well in district play, which is in a couple of weeks," Cline said.

Capitan is now 4-6 overall after going 1-2 over the weekend. The Tigers dismantled Carrizozo, 75-25, before falling to Hope, 41-25, and Animas, 37-33.

Cline hopes his team's loss to Animas will make the Tigers stronger down the road.

"Learning how to play the last two minutes of a tight ballgame is important and I thought we did well," Cline said.

"Overall, we played pretty well," Cline said. "We played awfully hard too."

Seniors Jessica Cline and Amy Cline both made the all-tournament team, as did junior Chris Worrall.

Two feet of snow improves skiing

When all the snowing was done, the first major winter storm of the season left 24 inches of new powder and ideal skiing conditions on the slopes of Ski Apache.

The snowfall from Wednesday and Thursday improved the settled snow depth from 25 inches midway on the mountain to 46 inches. Surface conditions are powder and packed powder and all 54 trails and 10 lifts are open.

Meteorologists at the National Weather Service in Albuquerque said a storm of this magnitude at this time of year is not unusual.

The storm came on shore in Southern California and swept across Arizona. It was somewhat warmer and wetter than usual because of its southern origins, said meteorologists at the National Weather Service in Albuquerque.

The mountains in New Mexico received lots of snow despite a fairly high freezing elevation of 6,600 feet. As moist air moves toward mountain ranges, the elevation of the land forces the air to rise, which, in turn, causes the air to drop its precipitation.

Taos Ski Valley (48 inches) and Sandia Peak (38 inches) received the most snowfall of the 10 New Mexico ski areas. Santa Fe Ski and Sipapu both got 28

inches of snow, followed by Ski Apache and Ski Rio with 24 inches, according to the New Mexico Ski Report produced by Ski New Mexico.

Southwestern portions of the state received up to 1.7 inches of the rain. Snowfall from Gallup to Albuquerque to Las Vegas ranged from two to five inches. Cloudercroft reported nine inches of snow.

Skiing — Ski Apache is open daily. The mountain received 24 inches of new snow last Wednesday and Thursday. Settled snow midway on the mountain is 46 inches. Conditions are "excellent." Surface conditions are groomed and packed powder. All 10 lifts and 54 trails are open.

Bates, Jarvis lead Warrior wrestlers

Ruidoso's only veteran wrestlers fared well at the Carlsbad Tournament held Jan. 6 and 7, which came as no surprise to wrestling coach Gerald Ames.

Ames took nine wrestlers to Carlsbad — just two of the nine have varsity experience. Ames was also without heavyweight Eustace Gallerito who broke his foot playing basketball.

Senior Matt Bates and junior Beau Jarvis led the Warriors in the 16-team tourney. Bates finished with a 3-2 record and Jarvis posted a 2-2 mark.

The 160-pound Bates scored the only points off last year's state champion, Troy Owens, of Carlsbad. Owens ended up pinning Bates after taking a 6-4 lead.

"He's really improving all the time and getting his confidence up," Ames said of Bates. "He belongs right up there with the top two or three wrestlers."

Ames said Jarvis wrestled well, but made two costly mistakes. The 134-pound Warrior beat Roswell's Peter Pullaski in his first match. West Mesa's wrestler pinned Jarvis to send him to the loser's bracket. Jarvis won his next match before being eliminated by a Hanks wrestler.

Terrell LaCour, Jason Lopez, Sean Cobb, Cody Sparks, Lalo Espinosa and Brian Moore wrestled at the tourney and all lost out in two matches.

"They got a lot of experience. They learned a lot," Ames said of his inexperienced wrestlers.

The Warriors welcome back senior Julian Flores who regained his eligibility for the second semester. Flores will wrestle at either 106 or 112. Last year, Flores was a state runner-up in the 112-pound division.

Ames expects Gallerito to return to action in three weeks. But the Warrior coach learned that returning letterman Johnny Flores and Jose Prieto are not eligible to wrestle this semester.

Phone company, village and county need to take quicker action on 911

Three weeks after a desperate mother tried to use 911 and it failed her, we're still waiting on US West to tell us what happened.

We'll probably never know if the mother's child could have been saved, had 911 worked when she tried to call Dec. 19. In the end, the mother brought the toddler from her rural Ruidoso Downs home to the hospital in Ruidoso, and by then it was too late because the child had stopped breathing.

If an alarm system is in place to warn the phone company when a part of the system has failed, as US West officials say, what went wrong with that system? As users — and funders — of the system, as people who depend on it in life-and-death situations, we have a right to know, and to know quickly. US West should want to do everything in its power to keep our faith in 911.

By the way, Lincoln County and Ruidoso haven't done much to help our faith in the system in general. It's been more than a year since they were lucky enough to have the state pay for local Enhanced 911, but so far, we don't have the service — even though we're paying for its operation.

Lincoln County officials are just now figuring out who's responsible for implementing the system, which is operated by the sheriff's office.

We're glad to hear Ruidoso is moving forward with implementing the E-911, which will automatically give emergency dispatchers the name and address of the caller in case they're incapacitated. Preparing for E-911 is somewhat complicated in Ruidoso because some streets and addresses are duplicated.

Half of those duplications were solved in a village council public hearing at the end of November. Village officials are to change street names, and they are urging residents to fix their addresses on their homes, too.

Quick changes could be a matter of life and death. But it's hard to expect residents to feel this is an emergency when the village road department hasn't even bothered order the new street signs yet, let alone put them up.

State using unfair tactics against water rights holders

TO THE EDITOR:

The State Engineer, Eluid Martinez, and his legal staff are presently seeking to void water rights along the Rio Hondo, Rio Ruidoso, and Rio Bonito by means of what I believe is a nefarious, underhanded, and covert policy, through a devious legal strategy that is sweeping in its implications. The issue and their methods are complex and I will attempt to describe this matter by giving its historical development.

On Feb. 9, 1989, an amended order was entered by the court which adjudicated certain water rights in the Rio Hondo, Rio Bonito, and Rio Ruidoso, and priority dates in the late 1800s. These priority dates were also assigned to supplemental wells. The state engineer now seeks to amend the priority dates of the supplemental wells to the dates the wells were drilled under the Templeton Doctrine and has sent 250 water users show cause orders as to why he should not reprioritize the priority dates of the supplemental wells.

The Templeton Doctrine stems from a 1958 case that says that a priority date for a supplemental well can only have the same priority date as the ditch whose water it supplements, and if the well is constructed at the point of diversion of the ditch and captures the same groundwater that otherwise would have flowed to the river and discharged into the river upstream of the ditch diversion point. Supplemental wells drilled along the ditch but downstream of the ditch diversion point could not capture the same water that was captured by the diversion structure and cannot, therefore, have the same priority date.

Most water users who received the show cause order own wells that were not drilled at the diversion structures of any of the ditches. Therefore, under the Templeton Doctrine, the state engineer is challenging the priority dates of many of the wells in the Rio Ruidoso, Rio Bonito, and Rio Hondo as well as similar wells throughout the Pecos River Basin.

There is a broader and deeper background to the efforts of the state engineer that can be constructed from history and recent events that reveal, in my opinion, a nefarious effort to void water rights.

In 1852 the United States Government entered into a treaty with the Mescalero Apache Tribe guaranteeing them reserved land on which to settle. In 1873, the reserved land was chosen and de-

scribed and was signed over to the Mescalero Apaches by Ulysses S. Grant. In exercising their rights to the use of land, the Mescaleros in more recent years have begun using water for purposes of economic development. The Inn of the Mountain Gods is the best known project, whereat the tribe impounded the waters of the Rio Ruidoso for a lake without a permit from the state. This was upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court.

In the mid- to late 1850's, settlers began arriving and farming the Hondo, Ruidoso, and Bonito valleys. In 1905, the railroad arrived at Tularosa and to satisfy the thirst of their steam engines they had a law passed by the New Mexico legislature that allowed the transfer of water from the Rio Bonito to the Tularosa basin. In 1928, to augment their supply for the engines and the line camps, they constructed a dam on the Rio Bonito. These water rights later were sold to Alamogordo when diesel engines arrived. All of these water diversion activities took place before there was any quantification of the water resources within the greater Pecos River catchment area. There was also no control over the allocation of the water resources by the state engineer.

Because of the development activities upstream and the trans-basin diversion of Rio Bonito water, the Rio Ruidoso, Rio Bonito, and Rio Hondo no longer flowed for three months in the summer. To solve this problem, farmers and ranchers drilled supplemental wells to augment the flow of the river into their ditches.

Development activities have continued in the upper reaches of the Rio Ruidoso and Rio Bonito. Recently, developers were granted permission to subdivide the old Barnham Ranch in the Rio Bonito drainage into 144 five-acre lots. The purchasers of each lot will have the right to drill domestic wells and extract up to three acre-feet for domestic and non-commercial purposes. The rivers do not particularly care to what purpose upstream diversions will occur. The approval of the development was the same as granting up to an additional 721 acre-feet of diversion on the Rio Bonito.

Neither the state engineer nor any public agency has quantified the surface and groundwater resources of the Rio Ruidoso, Rio Hondo, and Rio Bonito catchments. All of the water use activities on the Rio Hondo and its tributaries affect the flow of the Pecos River.

The Pecos River Compact was entered into on Dec. 3, 1948. The compact set the amount of water to be delivered to Texas on the Pecos River. The Pecos River Compact was 50 years late and a dime short because water use had developed so extensively in the lower Pecos Val-

ley.

Farming began in the Pecos River Valley at the instigation of Charles Eddey, a federal land surveyor who raised investment capital for the construction of McMillan Dam. The Carlsbad Irrigation Project was established in 1902 by private interests and was bought out by the Bureau of Reclamation in 1905. The water rights were sold to the Bureau of Reclamation. The Bureau of Reclamation invested significant capital to the Lake McMillan and Lake Avalon impoundment structures to ensure that floods would not wipe them out. In 1932, the Carlsbad Irrigation District was formed under an Act of Congress. The Carlsbad Irrigation District operates as an agent of the Bureau of Reclamation and collects payments for retirement of debt and maintains the civil works. Water rights can be taken by the Bureau of Reclamation if the fee is not paid and can be sold on the courthouse steps.

The Carlsbad Irrigation District administers irrigation on 25,055 acres of land and has storage rights in Sumner, Santa Rosa, Avalon and Brantley (replaced McMillan in 1988) reservoirs.

In addition to surface water, farmers discovered large underground water reserves in the Roswell area. To control groundwater development in the Roswell area, the state engineer closed the Roswell basin pursuant to the 1931 Underground Water Act. Adjudication of water rights in the Pecos River were completed in the Hope Decree of 1933.

In 1974, the State of Texas filed suit against New Mexico, claiming that it had been shorted deliveries on the Pecos River since 1952. The court found that New Mexico was in violation of Article III of the Pecos River Compact that stated that the State of New Mexico would not permit man-made civil works that would allow additional diversion of water for the Pecos River. The final amended decree in this case was filed in the 1988. Since then, the state engineer and the New Mexico legislature have been trying to increase the delivery of water to Texas.

The state engineer has developed a multifaceted strategy to accomplish this goal. I believe not all of the strategy has been made public. The state engineer strategy has involved the:

1. Purchase of water rights appurtenant to wells.
 2. Leasing of water rights from farmers in the Carlsbad Irrigation District.
 3. Reprioritization of water rights appurtenant to supplemental wells.
- The first two strategies are well-known and have been publicized by the state engineer. The last

strategy has not been publicized and is the most reprehensible.

The first and last strategy are based on the fact that the court considers all wells drilled after 1948 to be in violation of Article III of the compact. The state engineer recognizes that groundwater is connected to surface water flow in the Pecos and that by shutting off the wells, the groundwater levels will recover and discharge of groundwater into the Pecos River may once again occur. This will help New Mexico meet its delivery obligation.

These strategies will not deliver wet water to the Pecos River anytime in the near future. They are strategies that do, however, show the court that New Mexico is making a good faith attempt to comply with the decision of the court. Compliance is impossible. The Pecos River Compact may have to be revisited to develop a more equitable apportionment formula compact. If the court does not issue a summary judgment in favor of water users, we may be justified in lumping the court into this conspiracy.

In conclusion, it is my belief that the actions of the state engineer must be terminated and that he and his cronies need to be replaced by our new governor. New Mexico needs progressive leadership in water resource quantification and use. Penalizing farmers and ranchers and destroying their property rights and their investment is detrimental to the economy and well-being of our citizens. We can't allow the state engineer to sell Lincoln County farmers and ranchers down the river to Texas.



What Can We Do About Violence?: A Bill Moyers Special

It has become a hot-button issue: America's young people are being killed in record numbers. The growing frequency of violence against youths — committed by both juveniles and adults at home, at school, and on the streets — is both frightening and polarizing the nation.

To help combat youth violence in America, many of the nation's public broadcasters — along with some of their commercial counterparts, private foundations, community organizations, and corporations — have formed a powerful alliance. The "Act Against Violence" campaign, a two-year effort coordinated by The Public Television Outreach Alliance, the Nitty Gritty Cities Group (convened by WTVS/Detroit), and Bill Moyers' Public Affairs Television, will employ these resources: TV and radio programming; community- and school-based activities; print materials and publications; and computerized on-line resources. The campaign will be launched with a four-hour special hosted by Bill Moyers, **What Can We Do About Violence?: A Bill Moyers Special**.

What Can We Do About Violence? will replace the public's fear, panic, and anger with new opportunities for awareness, unity, networking, and communication among communities and individuals across the country. The program will feature documentary reports on the growing numbers of people who are mobilizing to confront violence in an effort to stop it, and will give personal testimony by community leaders and youths on the front lines of the struggle.

The program will cross the nation to showcase approximately 15 programs in California, Florida, Hawaii, Illinois, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, New York, Ohio, Oregon, Tennessee, Texas, and Utah that demonstrate the effectiveness of a variety of approaches to the problem. These include adult mentoring, conflict resolution, parent training, peer education, alternative sentencing, violence prevention counseling, teen volunteerism, school-based services, community policing and activism, drug and alcohol abuse rehabilitation, and firearm safety.

What Can We Do About Violence?: A Bill Moyers Special airs Monday, January 9th (Part I) and Wednesday, January 11th (Part II) at 8:00 p.m. on KENW-TV. Each episode is two hours long.
