Racing officials plan charges in horse's fall

Woman, son killed in U.S. 70 collision

A Ruidoso woman and her six-year-old son were killed early Saturday when the car she was driving collided head-on with a semi truck.

Linda Putz, 29, and her son, John Sullivan, were headed west on U.S. Highway 70 near Glencoe about 4:30 a.m. when her 1981 Subaru veered into the eastbound lane, said a report by State Police Officer Steve Standridge.

Theral Gregory, 45, of Oklahoma City, Okla., was going east in a 1994 Kenworth truck when he saw the car coming toward him. He applied his brakes, but couldn't avoid the oncoming car.

Mrs. Putz and her son were not wearing seat belts, the report stated.

Mike Gladden, superintendent of the Ruidoso School District, said crisis management counselors will be on hand Monday at Nob Hill Early Childhood Center, where Sullivan was a member of the preschool class of Eva Clark and Kathy Jones.

Putz was a 1985 graduate of Ruidoso High School and was employed at Schlitzsky's Deli. Owner Janet Goodwin said her business is setting up an account at First National Bank of Ruidoso in the names of the woman and her son. The money will be used to help defray the funeral expenses.

Also investigating the accident were Officer Robert Fahom and Sgt. Robert Holguin.

Open house for Capitan school board candidates

The New Mexico State Racing Commission plans to file administrative charges against the owner, trainer and veterinarian of a horse that broke its legs in the All American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs Racetrack Sept. 5.

The horse, "Doo Dominate," was euthanized after the race. The racing commission alleges the horse had a broken leg before the race and the three men knew it.

The owner and trainer, Osvaldo Rodriguez and Antonio Hernandez, are both Mexican Nationals from Juarez. Rodriguez is the publisher

of a Juarez newspaper, El Diario de Juarez.

The winner of the All American Futurity gets the biggest purse in any quarterhorse race in the nation, \$1 million.

"This (case) is under scrutiny (by people outside of the racing commission) because it's a big race. There are a lot of people looking at it and wondering what we're going to do," said Wayne Conwell, a racing commission investigator who researched the case. "It's the Kentucky Derby of quarterhorse racing."

During Conwell's seven years with the commission, no one has

ever been punished for this kind of infraction, Conwell said.

One of the five racing commissioners, probably vice chairman Bruce Gerry, will be the hearing officer for the racing commission hearings, tentatively scheduled for Feb. 13 and 14, Conwell said.

The owner and trainer each face 6-8 charges, Conwell said. The charges revolve around allegations the men ran the horse when they knew there was a problem with its physical abilities, thereby endangering the life of jockey Billy Peterson and the horse, Conwell explained. The men also allegedly duped the betting public and face

another charge for using an illegal numbing drug, Medivacaine, on the horse.

The veterinarian, Dr. Howard Mitchell of Bristow, Okla., faces 3-4 charges based on allegations he practiced medicine here without a New Mexico license, and injected illegal drugs into the two-year-old horse before the 11th race, Conwell said.

Official charges were not yet filed Friday.

Two horses in the Sept. 5 All American Futurity had to be euthanized after the race. "Ghost with the Most" suffered a severe injury to its left leg. A racing commis-

sion investigation found no wrongdoing in that incident.

Conwell said it's unusual for two horses to suffer such injuries in a race, but not unheard of. Investigations of those two horses were the only ones conducted on 1994 races, Conwell said.

A lengthy investigation into the Doo Dominate case included interviews with veterinarian Jack Sales, who said he treated the horse from just before the Aug. 19 time trials until Sept. 5.

Sales told investigators he X-rayed the horse after the time trial.

Bill would cut all state video gambling

Rep. Richard Knowles (R-Roswell) introduced a bill last week that would make many forms of low and high-stakes gambling illegal in New Mexico.

House Bill 29 strikes portions of the state's Bingo and Raffle Act that allows various forms of pull tabs and bingo games that have been employed by many churches and charitable organizations to raise money.

The bill is co-sponsored by Rep. Max Coll (D-Santa Fe). Knowles said, because he wanted bi-partisan support for it.

The bingo and raffle law has been widely interpreted to allow for many forms of video gambling.

Knowles said. "Our laws and the federal law have been interpreted by Indians to allow them to go to full-scale gambling," he said.

Indian gaming as well as video gambling in fraternal and charitable groups would be made illegal, he said, if the bill becomes law.

The bill would make no changes to the current law that permits the state fair and other charitable groups from holding bingos and raffles.

Knowles said the bill "levels off the existing gaming laws throughout the state so that we New Mexicans are able to approach gambling in an even-handed manner."

Tribe cites discrimination, denies ski program

Mescalero Apache President Wendell Chino said Ski Apache will not offer its discount program for Ruidoso schoolchildren this year, citing discrimination against Indians at the Ruidoso schools.

Chino wrote a letter to school district Superintendent Mike Gladden Friday, saying the tribal council voted unanimously Jan. 13 not to offer the program.

The program allows Ruidoso, Capitan and Hondo Valley schoolchildren to ski for only \$4 once a week for a month, usually beginning at the end of January. Lift tickets for children under 13 are usually \$22, or \$35 for those over 12.

The Mescalero Tribe has a U.S. Forest Service lease to operate Ski

Apache.

"The decision to decline your request was based on the fact that Mescalero Apache children attending Ruidoso schools are verbally attacked by non-Indian students about the fuel storage project," Chino wrote. He was referring to the tribal council's plans to build a temporary storage site for spent nuclear fuel rods on the reservation. About 500 Mescalero students attend Ruidoso schools. Mescalero has no high school.

"The Tribal Council is also aware of the limited participation in the school athletic programs by the Mescalero Apache students," Chino wrote.

"The Tribal Council is very much aware that there is no appreciable improvement in reducing dis-

crimination against our Indian students in the school," Chino continued. "The Tribal Council is also cognizant of the poor community relations existing between Ruidoso and Mescalero, therefore, there are sufficient reasons for the Tribal Council to decline your request."

"We do not believe that further discussion of your request is necessary. We consider the matter closed."

Several Ruidoso groups, including the village council, have issued written statements opposing the nuclear storage project.

Chino said Sunday the ski program is also cancelled for other schools involved in the program, such as Capitan and Hondo, although the tribe's problems lie mainly with Ruidoso. The other

smaller schools have joined in with about 1,000 Ruidoso students in the past, and it wouldn't be feasible to run the program just for the smaller schools' students, Chino said.

Superintendent Gladden said the school district has a policy to remain neutral on the nuclear storage project, and it is never discussed officially.

Gladden denied the allegations in Chino's letter. He said the school goes out of its way to encourage Mescalero youth to join in sports, by offering them a bus ride home to the reservation after sports activities. The school district also hosts annual Native American Appreciation Days.

Paul Wirth, Indian affairs coordinator at the school, said he's around the schoolchildren half of

each schoolday and he's never heard children talk about the nuclear storage project.

Both men said they hadn't heard the letter's concerns raised at the past, either at the school board's bi-annual meeting in Mescalero last fall or at a December meeting with tribal education director John Shendo, Jr. and other tribal leaders.

"I am appalled by (Chino's) statement," Gladden said. "Ruidoso schools have and will continue to strive to meet the needs of all students, regardless of ethnicity."

"I just feel like we do everything we can to appreciate the culture, and we won't stop doing that."

Gladden said the school district

Ruidoso tax revenues indicate strong 1994 growth

Village revenues from Ruidoso's gross receipts tax, lodging tax and building permit all showed significant increases in 1994.

The gross receipts tax revenues for the last half of 1994 show a nearly 11% increase over 1993, an indicator of sales growth.

And lodging tax revenues are up 7% in the same January - December calendar year period.

Building permits revenues are also up for 1994, having risen 11% over those issued throughout 1993.

"All economic indicators are

looking positive," said Village Manager Gary Jackson.

The village just released the tax tallies for the last calendar year, as well as fiscal year comparisons.

Ruidoso has a 6.8125% gross receipts tax, similar to a sales tax. Gross receipt taxes bring in the most revenues for the village, Jackson explained. After being collected from merchants by the state, a little less than half of the revenue comes back to Ruidoso, he said. Surplus revenues are fueled into the village cash reserve account for the next fiscal year's budget.

Compared to the \$5,046,367

gross receipts collections made in 1993, the village gathered \$5,583,210 in the taxes through 1994.

Ruidoso also collects a 4% tax on hotel and motel room rentals, and receipts from this lodgers tax are used to promote tourism.

The lodgers tax collections are handed over to the village a month after they are collected.

"The trend is up for all the months we collected," said Bill Chance, chairman of the village's Lodgers Tax Committee, "and we project an on-going trend of 15 or 20% over the previous year."

At the close of 1994, the village collected \$354,713 from lodgers as opposed to the \$332,595 drawn the year before.

"We're looking to continue those positive numbers," Chance said. "You can almost look at the people on the streets and see why."

He cited a "good marketing plan" and the village's being "blessed" by good weather.

The village's promotions have been contracted to the Chamber of Commerce, Chance explained, and the lodgers tax committee studies and allocates funds to promote special functions.

Helping fuel the revenue portion of the village's approximately \$15 million budget, are fees from building permits.

Throughout 1994 year, 520 building permits were issued by the village — a 25.60% increase over the previous year.

Jackson said the value of the building permits had also increased by 11.25% — values of \$19,551,232 over the \$17,574,271 of 1993. A good chunk of the 1994 value total came in December with the issuing of a permit for a \$2,579,580 building — the proposed Holiday Inn on Highway 70.

Skeen relishes majority power after 30 years in minority

For the first time in his 30-year political career, Republican Congressman Joe Skeen is tasting what it's like to be part of the party in power.

"From my point of view, it's exhilarating to be in — the real magic word is — the majority, for the first time in some 30 years of being involved in politics," he said Friday during an interview from his office in Washington D.C. "I was in the New Mexico Senate for 10 years and then here. I've always been in the minority in these legislative bodies. To be in the majority is just wonderful."

Serving as chairman of the congressional Agriculture Committee is even more wonderful, said Skeen, who owns a ranch in Lincoln County. That committee, coupled with the Interior Committee on which he also serves, will deal with many of the major issues facing New Mexico this year.

"(Being chairman is) a great responsibility and one I take very seriously," he said. "You're able now to mold and shape and have a great deal more influence over the thing, but it still takes everybody else, including the other side, to row the boat in the same direction."

About reports that some Democrats are trying to divert attention away from the Republican agenda to block its progress, Skeen said, "They're used to being the ones with all the oars and now their oars are not all in the water. But we've got to get back to the business of rowing together."

Western agenda

Having Republicans at the Congressional helm should benefit those in New Mexico and Lincoln County pushing for changes to the Endangered Species Act and those opposing rangeland reform, he said.

"We're already experiencing the effects, absolutely," Skeen said. "The Endangered Species Act is going to be overhauled, looked at, shaken out and made something of a practical nature, rather than one

that is totally theoretical left in the hands of the purists.

"We need to understand what in the world we are trying to do with it and how can we make it compatible with progress and the need to use the resource base for our own use."

"To use the (Act) as an impediment to doing anything is just unacceptable. We're already in the motions right now of moving that around."

Those discussions are taking place in the Interior Committee, he said.

As far as the Interior Department's thrust to institute rangeland reforms and to increase the charge for using federal land to graze livestock, the tide is turning, Skeen said.

"That's what I told Secretary of the Interior (Bruce) Babbitt when we met two days ago," he said. "We have a bill in to extend the idea that in New Mexico and the so-called Western States, public lands be transferred to the states, as they were all the others states when they entered the union."

Skeen was one of the co-sponsors who introduced a bill last March providing for the transfer to the state of federal land now controlled by the Bureau of Land Management. He plans to reintroduce the bill this year.

All transfers would be subject to state acceptance. Wilderness areas, wilderness study areas and areas of critical environmental concern would be exempted from the bill and would remain under federal jurisdiction.

"I think we stand a good chance of passing it this year," Skeen said. "It's about time we came under the same treatment as other states."

The Western states' unclaimed land wasn't put up for homestead when they entered the union, because the area didn't receive 30 inches of rainfall a year and crops couldn't grow, Skeen said.

His fellow representatives from the East don't view him as a radical right fringe of the GOP because of the lands issue, he said.

"No, but they think it's a very

unique view, because they've always viewed (public land) as their ownership," Skeen said. "I said, 'Fine, then where in your state can I in New Mexico say I own part of it, maybe Central Park in New York.'"

The Western states are tired of subsidizing the operation of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), Skeen said.

"We put the fencing in to control the grazing, the water in to control and distribute. We drilled the wells to settle the water question, but the BLM still is dictating policy and wanting to jack up the grazing fees when (ranchers) are barely making a living now," he said.

"It's time for them to either relinquish these lands back to the states and let them do what they will, or make them available for purchase by those grazing."

"We're shipping back \$200 million to the federal government from resources we use (on public lands) over and above what it cost them to operate the BLM in our state," Skeen said. "We'd like to have that \$200 million scattered out among these counties."

Skeen said Babbitt understands "there's a tremendous amount of public land, and if we're going to make this government more efficient, we could do away with a lot of the land management. The bureaucrats, good as they may be, do not manage those lands. It's the people with the permits on it that do."

Nuclear waste storage

Skeen, who has been active in the opposition against a proposal to store spent nuclear fuel rods on the Mescalero Apache Reservation near Ruidoso, said changes may be ahead in the Department of Energy (DOE).

"There has been talk, nothing chiseled in stone, about the DOE once again taking over total responsibility for that program and limiting the site to that one location at Yucca (Mountain) in Nevada," he said.

Such a move in Skeen's estimate

would wipe out any private compact reached between the Mescalero and power companies. A letter of intent has been signed by 33 companies and the tribal council to temporarily store the rods on tribal land. A referendum may be set for Jan. 31 to allow tribe members living on the reservation to either approve or reject the plan.

"They'd be taking the monetary gain aspect out of it, so there would not be a great enticement," Skeen said. "One of the big draws all along has been the rewards in steps along the way. They are revamping the program, but they have to do something about high level waste."

Other issues

By serving on the National Security Committee, Skeen will also be involved with the futures of the military bases, proving grounds and research laboratories in the state, Skeen said.

"We have a very unique, vertically integrated system from pure science right up to manufacturing and testing," he said. "Spaceport will be one of the biggest things to hit the state of New Mexico. It's a new mode of transportation through space and will be the way things are shipped in the next 40 years."

"We're in competition with California and Florida, but we have a 5,000 foot lead on them, because we're more than 5,000 feet above sea level."

Other comments from Skeen included:

— he is watching closely discussions and state action regarding the future of Fort Stanton Hospital in Lincoln County, now scheduled to be closed, throwing more than 200 people out of work.

"We hope to accomplish something that really is meaningful and plays a good role in the state operation of health facilities," he said.

— as the session evolves, he may introduce other bills involving projects at the laboratories and testing grounds in the state.

"I don't want to say that I've got a whole stack of legislation, be-

cause I don't," he said. "I think the less you put in, the better off the country is. There ought to be a law that for every bill passed, we must repeal two. We paint ourselves into a corner a lot of times."

Skeen said he's looking forward

to another year representing New Mexico.

"They're the greatest people to represent in Congress, because they're interested, responsive and appreciative," Skeen said.

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

Stories mold artist's wind spirits

As fast as she can fire the kiln, Adrian Henry's wind spirits are snapped up by buyers.

One of Lincoln County's many cottage industries, Henry's Earthfolk art has attracted a loyal following over the past four years, doubling her volume each year, she said.

Added to the business mix last May was Cathie Eisen, who started out helping with Henry's backup work and then branched out into her own designs.

"She showed a real flair, so I added a studio out in back for her," Henry said.

Eisen's wind bells, etched with horses reminiscent of the graceful equines depicted in ancient cave art, are accented with feathers and rawhide.

"I used to draw the horses when I was a kid in school," Eisen said. "I've refined them, but left a primitive edge. I'm going to be doing more like the petroglyphs."

Petroglyphs are designs that were pecked into rocks. Those in southern New Mexico were left behind by an ancient people called the Mogollons.

Eisen has carried the horse designs into other applications, including wall plaques framed in old wood and barbed wire. A cow skull with the painted form of a buffalo on its forehead, trimmed in feathers, buckskin and beads, is her favorite work to date.

Wall pockets, small clay receptacles for dried flowers molded by Eisen and Henry, are etched with horses, faces and feathers.

Both women also produce notecards with their trademark designs.

Many of Henry's wind spirit sculptures emerged from stories she told her son to explain the howling winds while they were living in a rocky canyon area.

"There are wind spirits that dance in the trees and sing songs from far away," Henry said. "Wind

shepherds that gather seeds and plant them across the land. Guardian angels to watch over and protect, and blanket spirits that dance with joy, all born of the good earth's clay.

"No matter what color we are or how we clothe ourselves, we are basically spiritual beings wrapped in an earthsuit to endure this world, the elements and emotions that surround us. My sculptures are simply interpretations of these earthsuits."

With flowing layered robes, some of the spirits remain faceless. The haunting expressions of others are illuminated by hidden lights.

Depending on size and the particular design, figures will run from four inches to 12 inches in height and from \$6 to \$125. Special orders for sizes up to four feet tall can cost as much as \$600.

"Feel free to place the sculptures outside," Henry said. "They have survived the 110-degree heat in Lubbock (Texas) and freezing

temperatures in Ruidoso."

Working in clay has taken up more and more of her life, Henry said.

"My mother told me as a child to get my jeans out of the mud pile and I haven't yet," she said.

When Henry's not firing her kiln or sculpting figures, she may be singing up a storm in local bistros like the Hide-Away or Si Señor. She writes many of the songs she performs.

Other Henry signature pieces include terra cotta moons, sculpted with faces, that can be hung in a sunny window. Filled with liquid potpourri, they're an attractive way to scent a room, she said.

Henry trained with sculptors John Sherrell of El Paso (Texas) and Steve Stephens of Lubbock. She's appeared in 16 exhibitions since April 1991 and is represented by 32 stores or galleries. To visit the Earthfolk studio, call (505) 258-4670 for directions and an appointment.

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Apache student sues school after being forced to cut hair

The Ruidoso School District, a former head football coach and his assistant are being sued by a 16-year-old Mescalero Apache high school football player, because the player was required to cut his hair.

Before the second to last game of the football season on Oct. 28, 1993, Matthew Poncho contends he was told by coach Mike Gaston and assistant coach Kevin Clawson that he couldn't play unless he cut his hair.

Up to that point, he had played with long hair. He allowed it to grow because he participated in religious dances of the tribe, Poncho said in a November 1993 interview in *The Ruidoso News*.

The suit was filed in First District Court in Santa Fe last week on Poncho's behalf by his uncle, Joseph Geronimo.

The family asked the court to award punitive damages and

other compensation for the "humiliation" Poncho suffered.

Ruidoso Superintendent Mike Gladden said Friday he had received a notice of the family's intention to sue last year, but thought the matter subsequently had been resolved.

"I haven't received notification (of the suit) at this time, so I really don't know enough to comment on that," he said. "Our insurance carrier will appoint (an attorney to represent the district)."

Gaston now works in San Antonio, Gladden said. Clawson still is employed by the district.

Poncho was a freshman in high school at the time of the incident. He acknowledged in 1993 that he did not tell the coaches about the religious significance of his hair length. He also said that another tribe member on the team had been allowed to play without a haircut after his parents appealed and because he was a tribal dancer.

The boy's mother, Frances Poncho, said she was shocked to see her son with short hair. He was living with his uncle at the time.

"The first I ever knew is when I saw my son crying (after the game), because he didn't want to take off his helmet," she said then.

Geronimo said he wanted to make sure this type of incident never happens to any Mescalero child again. He said it destroys their identities and self esteem.

At the time of the incident, Gladden apologized to the family and tribe. He said the district's athletic code does not require players to cut their hair as long as it can be drawn back and safely contained under the helmet. He called Gaston's action a misinterpretation of the athletic code.

Poncho is being represented by Alamogordo attorney Charles Burton.

Legislature, governor bicker over plans for 1995 budget

The 1995 Legislature got off to a swift start last week as Gov. Gary Johnson presented his agenda of cutting taxes and government, and declaring war on crime.

Key elements of his legislative plan include:

- Repeal of the 6-cent gasoline tax
- Lowering of income taxes amounting to about \$68 per year per taxpayer
- Removal of the gross receipts tax on prescription drugs
- Construction of a new \$100 million medium security prison in an unpopulated location
- Pay raises of 3% for teachers and state employees
- Elimination of the State School Board
- A \$2.7 billion state budget that would spend millions less than what is proposed by the Democratically-controlled Legislature

The Legislature has proposed pay raises of 6% for teachers and state employees, claiming teachers need more money in order for the state to attract more qualified people to the education system and bring teacher salaries up to

regional averages.

While Johnson's address was praised by Republicans, Democrats complained Johnson stole the Democratic thunder by patterning his budget after the budget drafted by the Legislature.

Democrats also said Johnson was misleading the public by claiming taxes are too high in the state, government is too big and teachers are overpaid.

Sen. Eddie Lopez (D-Santa Fe) said Johnson's tax plan will benefit the rich more than the middle class.

"The upper income people will receive most of the relief," Lopez said, noting that Johnson has recommended that people who earn more than \$100,000 per year get a tax rate lowered from 8.5% to 8%.

"The only respect this millionaire governor has is for the rich," said Sen. Richard Romero (D-Albuquerque).

Romero also criticized Johnson for putting too much emphasis on prisons and not enough on improving education.

Sen. Gary Reagan (D-Hobbs), a former district court judge, said the Legislature has worked hard to get

tough on crime. In 1994, it passed mandatory jail terms for people convicted of three violent crimes, stiffened penalties for drive-by shootings and allowed courts to try 15-year-olds as adults, he noted.

Legislators recessed on Thursday for a long weekend and will reconvene today to begin a second full week of this 60-day session.

Some of the bills that have been introduced in the first week:

- A dozen bills calling for repeal of the state's six-cent gasoline tax
- Several bills calling for income tax reduction of varying amounts
- Repeal of the state's open meetings law
- A ban on state funding for abortions unless they are medical emergencies
- Mandatory recycling of car batteries
- Full day kindergarten in public schools
- Mandatory bottle and can recycling
- A constitutional amendment limiting legislative terms to eight years (two four-year terms for the Senate and four two-year terms for the House).

because it pulled up very sore, and found an incomplete fracture in the knee bone. Sales said he recommended to the trainer that the horse not be run in the All American Futurity, and told both the owner and trainer there was a great likelihood the horse would break down if it ran. Sales reported being surprised to see it running despite his recommendation.

Mitchell was apparently brought in to care for the horse soon before the race, and several people said they saw him use acupuncture treatment on it at the grounds.

The owner and trainer both told investigators the horse had an abscess in its left knee, but figured the jockey of the horse would refuse to run the race if there was a serious problem. They denied using illegal drugs on the horse.

Only two drugs can be legally found in horses during races: Lasix

(to get rid of excess moisture in the body so cells bleed less) and Phenylbutazone (a minor pain reliever). Horses in big-money New Mexico races are always tested for drugs after the race, Conwell said.

Jockey Billy Peterson (who was not seriously injured in the fall) told investigators that just before the race, the horse acted like it couldn't feel anything and it didn't know what was going on. When it wouldn't go into the gate, he hit it hard with a whip on the shoulder and received no response. He said the horse "broke slow" from the gate at the start of the 5:19 p.m. race. It fell about 100 yards before reaching the finish line.

The horse still earned \$29,000 for being in the race, but it would have earned that anyway for being entered in the race if the owner had backed out at the last minute, Conwell said. The track has not paid off the owner yet, he added; if the

racing commission concludes cheating was involved, that purse will be forfeited.

The horse was insured for \$12,500, said Conwell, about average for its caliber. The insurance company approached the owner after the trials to recommend raising that insurance, but the owner declined, Conwell said. He noted that a vet check is required for the increase, including a check of the front legs, and a broken leg would show up in the check. Conwell didn't know if the insurance company paid off the owner yet.

The racing commission is not considering charges against the racetrack, Conwell said. A track steward who heard Mitchell might be practicing medicine at the track warned Mitchell to stop, Conwell noted.

Track manager Scott Wells told investigators he had no knowledge of a pre-existing injury to the horse.

Knowles said the unsanctioned gambling that is widespread in the state should be eliminated so that the state's citizens can decide what they want to do regarding gambling without being pushed into it.

"We haven't decided where we want to end up.

"If the combination of the two laws opened that gate and allowed an uncontrolled situation, then someone has got to close the gate," Knowles said.

Although many of the gambling activities are illegal, Knowles said law enforcement authorities do not make arrests because they are swamped addressing more violent and criminal activities.

"The problem we have in law enforcement is that it is a victimless crime," and as a result, "right now it's out of control."

Outlawing various forms of gambling would relieve the state of the pressure to approve gambling because many communities want it so they can compete with gambling on

Indian lands.

"I visualize some well thought out bills to allow this (gambling) on a limited basis against a background of what we want to do and how we want to get there," Knowles said.

Knowles is confident the bill will progress and get a fair hearing despite likely opposition from fraternal and charitable organizations, as well as Indian tribes.

The bill has been sent to the House Judiciary and House Appropriations Committee.

makes a formal request for the program each year, to let it be known the district doesn't take the discount for granted.

Chino said Sunday that "some of the council members heard from their own constituents" about the problems he outlined in his letter. At least one council member's family has also experienced discrimination at the Ruidoso schools, Chino said.

"Some of (the problems) are just long-standing," Chino added.

This is not the first time the school's request for the program

has been denied, but it is the first time such allegations came along with the denial, Gladden said.

Last year, the denial was based on a lack of snow on the ski mountain, and the district understood, Gladden said. The last denial before that was when Gladden became superintendent five years ago, after the tribe had a falling out with the Tularosa school, Gladden recalled. The tribe asked Ruidoso to allow all its Indian students to come to school here, but the school district concluded it didn't have enough room at that time, Gladden said.

Nearly all of the ski area lies on the Lincoln National Forest, with

the rest on the Mescalero reservation. When the ski program was denied before, forest officials said they checked the ski permit to see if the action violated the permit. They concluded it didn't, noting the program is not required.

"Certainly, we don't agree with the Mescalero Tribe doing this," said the forest's local district ranger, Jerry Hawkes. "I remember it caused a pretty uncomfortable situation last time it happened. We got a lot of calls."

Acting forest supervisor Don DeLorenzo said, "Very clearly, we would not want to see public lands being drawn in as part of the issues between neighbors."

Ruidoso's wrestlers got just what they needed Saturday — plenty of practice against quality opponents.

Unlike other tournaments, the Ruidoso Team Tourney on Saturday was a round robin event. Each team wrestled five dual matches.

"We got a lot of time on the mats," said Ruidoso wrestling coach Gerald Ames. "We needed that wrestling time."

Other tourneys are set up in a double-elimination format. If a wrestler loses twice, he is done for the day. The team-tourney format guaranteed five matches for each wrestler. Ames' young Warriors wrestled for the whole day.

As a team, Ruidoso finished in fourth place of six squads with a 2-3 record. Powerhouse Carlsbad easily won the team title with a 5-0 record.

Ruidoso was led by senior Matt Bates (160 pounds) and junior Beau Jarvis (134 pounds). Both finished with 4-1 records. Jarvis is now 14-7 on the year while Bates sports a 12-8 mark.

Shaun Cobb (142 pounds) also wrestled well for the Warriors. He posted a 3-2 record, improving his overall mark to 4-8.

Bates' only loss was to his nemesis, Walter Crebbs of Roswell. Crebbs eked out a 4-3 win on Saturday to maintain his 7-0 record against Bates.

After a disappointing showing last weekend in El Paso, Jarvis responded with a solid performance Saturday. Ames said Jarvis' confidence seems to be returning and the junior is wrestling better in tight matches.

But after the matches, Ames talked mostly about his younger wrestlers.

"They've just improved so much — all of them in the last couple of weeks. We're not getting pinned

like we were," Ames said.

Ames singled out freshman Jason Lopez as an example. In the Thursday night dual meet against Roswell, Lopez's opponent pinned him. Lopez came back Saturday and lost 16-15 to the same wrestler.

"That's what we're doing — taking those baby steps," he said.

Saturday's matches did deal Ruidoso one setback. Heavyweight Eustace Gallerito injured a rib in the Carlsbad match. Gallerito is out indefinitely, Ames said. Rib injuries are particularly painful, especially in wrestling.

Gallerito had just returned to action this week after recovering from a broken foot. He had won two matches before defaulting because of the injury.

Roswell downs RHS

In a dual match, Roswell coasted to a 47-17 win over Ruidoso. Jarvis, Cobb and Gallerito picked up the only wins for the Warriors.

"We stayed off our backs quite well," Ames said of his team's performance Thursday night.

Ruidoso is back in action Wednesday when it hosts New Mexico Military Institute. One of the Warriors' wins Saturday was against NMMI. The teams square off at 7 p.m.

The Warriors' week concludes when seven teams visit Ruidoso Saturday, Jan. 28 for the Ruidoso Invitational.

Turnovers trip up Warriors

If Ruidoso girls basketball coach Janie Roland had a voice in Saturday night's game against Santa Teresa, she might have talked her team to victory.

But with a voice that was nothing more than a hoarse whisper, all Roland could do was use sign language and tell assistant coach Mike Hedin what instructions to tell her Warriors in the final critical moments of the District 3AAA contest.

Ruidoso, which had led the entire game, committed four turnovers in the last three and 1/2 minutes of the game. The miscues opened the door for Santa Teresa and the Desert Warriors walked away with a 49-45 victory.

"I wish I had a voice because I could have talked them into the motivational level I wanted," Roland said.

Instead, the young Warriors unraveled. They scored only two points and surrendered 10 points to the Desert Warriors in the final four minutes.

"They got eager — wanting it so bad — they reverted to what they did against Socorro," Roland said.

Against the Warriors, Ruidoso turned the ball over 31 times in a 68-29 loss Friday night in Socorro.

However, Ruidoso was a different ballclub for the first three quarters of its game versus Santa Teresa.

On offense, the Warriors picked up the Santa Teresa squad with excellent passing and took care of the ball, committing only 10 turnovers.

Assists led to Ruidoso's first three buckets. They had a balanced inside/outside attack. When freshmen guards Mandi Lewallen or Tawnya Reynolds weren't burying perimeter jumpers, forwards Angelica Figueroa and Amber Livingston were hitting underneath.

Figueroa, who finished with 14 points, was also tough on the defensive boards. The Warriors snagged 14 defensive rebounds in the first half, limiting STHS to one shot each trip.

The solid defensive and offensive play gave Ruidoso a 30-27 advantage at halftime. The Warriors opened up their biggest lead of the game midway through the third quarter. Junior Chrystal Sumlin found Figueroa underneath for an easy basket and the Warriors led, 36-28.

But the Desert Warriors hung around to rally in the fourth quarter.

After pulling within five, 41-36, Santa Teresa applied full-court

pressure, resulting in an immediate Ruidoso turnover. Christine Hernandez scored, cutting the RHS lead to 41-38.

Sumlin stole the ball and scored from the baseline for Ruidoso, but STHS's Hernandez and Georgina Borden combined to score seven points and give the Desert Warriors the lead with less than three minutes to play.

On Ruidoso's next offensive possession, Figueroa found Lewallen on the wing. The freshman guard nailed the 15-footer to tie the game. Lewallen, who has been hot of late, finished with 10 points.

India Hernandez put STHS up by two when she hit an impossible fall-away shot from the baseline.

Sumlin had a chance to tie the game with 47 seconds, but missed both free throws. The Warriors let Santa Teresa run 40 ticks off the clock before fouling Lizette Morales. Morales' two free throws sealed the win for the visitors.

"It's a different kind of letdown than last (Friday) night's loss,"

Roland said. "They now know they can hoop. They can back up each other. They can play a whole game."

Roland said her team demonstrated that it is understanding more concepts and utilizing more fundamentals. The first-year coach was also pleased with the play of Lyndsey Willard, Bailey Bishop, Gemma Botella and Angela Simms off the bench.

"Role playing is just as important as having a starting position," Roland said. Players off the bench have to maintain or lift the momentum, she said, adding those four players did just that.

Still, Roland has her concerns. "If we ever rise to the level of intensity and dominance that I see them perform in practice, we'll be more successful," Roland said.

The Warriors, who are 2-12 overall and 0-4 in the district, now have a week to prepare for Hot Springs. Ruidoso visits the district-leading Tigers Saturday, Jan. 28.

Heading into the final period, Ruidoso used hustle and determination to rally from a 14-point deficit. Two free throws by senior guard Malik Waters trimmed the Socorro lead to 79-71 with 3:19 left in the game.

On Socorro's ensuing possession, Jonathon Pino was fouled. Pino missed the front end of a one-and-one. But the Warriors couldn't find the handle on the rebound, not just once but twice.

"After the game, I said, 'We're fine. I told them (the team) to go home, get some rest and come back ready to play Santa Teresa,'

Wright said. "We didn't shoot well and we didn't play as well as we did against Portales."

Had they played as well, Wright said the outcome would have been different.

Socorro coach Gilbert Peralta was glad to escape with a win.

"They are capable of beating anybody," Peralta said of Ruidoso. "It's one of the better Ruidoso teams I've seen in eight years. I just wanted to get the win, whether it was by one point or whatever."

Despite its effort, it seemed Ruidoso couldn't buy itself a break in the fourth quarter. Whenever RHS was on the verge of taking control, Socorro asserted itself or the ball bounced the other way.

Waters led all scorers with 33 points. Gabe Aguilar added 23 points for Ruidoso.

All five Socorro starters finished in double figures. Kenneth Greenwood paced the SHS Warriors with 28 points.

The Warriors picked up their first District 3AAA victory with an 86-67 win at Santa Teresa Saturday night.

Aguilar paced Ruidoso with 25 points. Waters added 22 points and forward Todd Young pitched in 10 for the Warriors.

New security chief takes charge at local prison camp

Standing rail straight with a handshake of iron, Dee Standridge seems to fit his new role as Camp Sierra Blanca's chief of prison security.

No surprise that he spent 10 years in military aviation before joining the New Mexico Department of Corrections 11 years ago. For the last eight years, he has served in supervisory capacities at the medium security Southern New

Mexico Correctional Facility in Las Cruces under Warden Don Dorsey. His extensive background and training in security is what attracted Camp Sierra Blanca (CSB) Warden Sandra McFadin, who took over at the minimum security prison in Lincoln County 1.5 years ago. She found problems in security procedures and began a search for a new security chief after several escapes occurred and a local man was murdered.

One of the inmates, who walked

away from the prison and was apprehended three days later, is charged in the elderly man's death. "The state compiles a list of eligible candidates for jobs," McFadin said. "It puts you in competition statewide with other qualified candidates. They rank them and we select from the top five."

"I was in the market for someone high in the security category, someone who could quickly pick up on what our needs were. I wanted someone with a high degree of professionalism in his manner and performance."

"I interviewed the top five and found (Standridge) to meet all of those qualifications."

"Warden McFadin extended the opportunity to come over and examine the camp and consider this position," said Standridge, who recently turned 40 and is single. "I went to Roswell to view that prison, but it was evident to me that due to the geographic location and other factors, this job would be more challenging."

He pointed out that escapees from the minimum security prison in Roswell, because of the vast plains uninterrupted by vegetation,

tend to be easier to track. "Here, they can step out the back door and they could be gone," he said.

Standridge also has a relative in the area. His brother, Steve Standridge, is a state police officer based in Ruidoso.

As the new chief of security, Standridge said he intends to give the uniform staff a new perspective on security, "to refresh them on the cautions that they need to be aware of on a daily basis," he said. "I want to give them an incentive to be proud of the uniform they wear, an incentive to come to work and not just view it as a job."

"I plan to give them some training afforded me while serving in medium and maximum security prisons that I think will be beneficial, even at a minimum security prison."

Although Standridge preferred not to discuss specific changes in security, he said he intends to create a safer environment for inmates.

"I want the inmates to feel they are safe here," Standridge said. "I'm taking a good hard look at the predator-prey situation through the inmate classification or disciplinary

measures." One of his immediate concerns is drugs at the prison.

"I don't care what prison you're at or how maximum the security, there's always a drug problem," Standridge said. "Generally, that's one of the main reasons an inmate will walk from a minimum security facility. They're incurring debts from drug use and are being threatened."

"Someone strong sees someone with three to four months left and strong arms them to work for him. It builds pressure to walk."

The other big pressure to escape is an inmate's love life, McFadin said.

"I can address the first, but not the second," Standridge said.

However, employers who use the inmates on work release programs can help by keeping in touch with Standridge or McFadin, if they discover an inmate is depressed about his wife or girlfriend, officials said.

"The captain is going out to meet each employer," McFadin said. "Communication will increase our awareness and it doesn't mean anything will happen to the inmate. We can just respond better and be more aware of the potential."

Standridge added, "Employers are better able to spot changes of habit and I can clue them in as to what to look for. We have a business here and it's the people business. I'm concerned for their welfare."

Another new employee recruited by McFadin will join the correction officer staff.

Sgt. Martin Zamora recently transferred to this camp near Fort Stanton Hospital from the state penitentiary after seven years there.

"He comes highly recommended with high performance marks from those who work with him, as well as supervisors," McFadin said.

Reviewing some of the changes initiated or being initiated at the prison, McFadin said the Bureau of Land Management has not yet closed a road through the prison to some of its property, although she had expected that job to be completed a few weeks ago.

Only 20 persons asked to have their names added to a new computerized community escape alert telephone system, McFadin said. She has also added 26 flood lights around the prison to improve nighttime visibility.

Scenic byway group seeks public support

Supporters of a New Mexico Historic and Scenic Byway designation met Friday to plan ways to seek public support.

The same committee studying a Convention and Visitors Bureau is also working to help gain approval of the scenic byway designation for Highways 70, 48 and 380, also known as the Lincoln County Loop.

"The more local support we have, the easier it will be to get funding," said Javier Reinmann, chairman of the committee. "The next step is to get letters of support from the public."

Reinmann distributed a sample letter of support at the meeting. The letter, addressed to Ruidoso Mayor Jerry Shaw, asks for approval of the route, possibly to be named the 'Billy the Kid' route, as a New Mexico Historic and Scenic Byway.

"It is my hope that the region's designation application will be accepted early in 1995," the letter states.

If the designation becomes reality, the route would be eligible for funding from the Federal Highway Administration for scenic byway signs and road improvements.

Reinmann said the designation could also enable construction of a tourist center.

"We have a consultant, Dick Seely, who has prepared some information," Reinmann said. "He will meet with Javier Gonzalez (from the New Mexico Transportation Department) next week to discuss the matter."

Customers will have a shorter grace period to pay past due utility bills if the Ruidoso Downs Village Council approves a measure at tonight's council meeting.

The change will cause utility bills to become due on the 15th of each month, and services will be terminated if not paid by the 25th. At the present time, utility bills are past due after the 25th but then a 14-day notice is sent out before service is terminated.

Also on the agenda is a resolution opposing the immediate shut-down of Fort Stanton Hospital. The resolution asks the state to grant a 90 to 120-day stay on any shut-down; the opportunity to meet with

members of the Legislature and the governor to discuss alternatives; and the formation of a task force to propose possible uses for the facility.

Ronnie Hemphill, Ruidoso School Board member, will report on the progress of the proposed new recreation center at tonight's meeting.

Joan Bailey, director of the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce, and Bill Allen, from the Ruidoso Lions Club, will request for use of lodgers tax revenues.

The meeting is at 7 p.m. today, Monday, Jan. 23, at the Ruidoso Downs Village Hall on Downs Drive.

CVB group asked to plan with lodgers tax group

Village of Ruidoso attorney John Underwood asked the Convention and Visitors Bureau (CVB) Ad-Hoc Committee Friday to include the Lodgers Tax Committee in its plans.

The Lodgers Tax Committee must be consulted before sending a request for proposal to the village council, Underwood said.

He noted that lodgers tax funds will have a direct impact on the proposed Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Committee members were ready to send their draft RFP for services to the village council until Underwood reminded them that, under state law, it must first go to the lodgers tax committee for approval.

"As a matter of courtesy, I would go to the Lodgers Tax Committee and get either their blessing or not, and then both could go to council," Underwood said.

The RFP will ask respondents for detailed outlines, proposed budgets and qualifications to manage and market a convention and visitors bureau. The purpose of the bureau would be to increase the number of tourists and conventions coming to Ruidoso.

Bill Hirschfeld, committee member, said that a special Lodgers Tax Committee meeting would probably be called and then the proposal could go to the village council.


There will ever remain a bond of brotherhood between our country and the Philippine Islands — and especially between the people of New Mexico and those of that famous island nation.

Robert Burns, one of the most beloved poets of all time, was born on a farm near Alloway, Scotland, Jan. 25, 1759.

Similar to Abraham Lincoln, who was greatly inspired by Burns' poems, Burns had very little schooling, yet through a love of reading he developed a mastery of words, which, together with his God-given insight into the human heart, enabled him to write poems and songs which have become more beloved with the passing of time.

While following the plow, he would often be reading and singing from a book of ancient Scottish ballads; and from this his neighbors called him "The Singing Plow-Boy."

Every New Year's Eve, his spirit returns to us through his song, "Auld Lang Syne."
"Should auld acquaintance be forgot,
And never brought to mind."

Should auld acquaintance be forgot
And days of Auld Lang Syne.
"Auld Lang Syne" in the early Scottish dialect means "Old Long Service" or "Our Former Days," or "The Old Times We Knew."

One of Burns' most famous poems is "To a Field Mouse," in which he apologizes to the mouse for turning him out of his winter home. "I'm truly sorry man's dominion Hath overthrown earth's social union And justifies that ill opinion That make thee startle at me, Thy poor earth-bound companion and fellow mortal."

The 25th is also the birthday of Willie Randolph of Ruidoso, who will be 94, and likewise the birthday of Tommie Sue Dunahoo of Roswell who is a poet and ginger and a true birthday mate of Robert Burns.

On the way home on the evening of the 18th, I was welcomed home by a band of western bluebirds, flying to and from the cedar trees, their red, white and blue colors shining in the late afternoon sun of mid-January.

Poop Scoop

A few precautions in advance can prevent a great deal of heartache later for pet owners who plan to be out of town and leave their animals in the care of others.

Jim Riggins, manager of the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter, said several animals he was ready to put up for adoption have been reconnected with their owners at nearly the last minute, because someone recognized them.

"The small town environment really points out the need for extra precautions," he said. "When we've taken some of our adoptable animals out into the community for a veterinary or grooming appointment, someone recognized the animal."

"Generally, they will have information about the person they believe to be the owner, such as an address, or more commonly, the fact that they live in Texas, or have been out of town for weeks."

The humane society routinely tries to track down the owners of any stray animal impounded at the shelter. When no information is available or it leads to dead ends, such as an out-of-town veterinarian who destroys records after only one year, the animal becomes the property of the shelter and can be placed for adoption, Riggins said.

"This type of scenario is fully preventable by performing a few simple steps before leaving town without your pet," he said.

Riggins recommended:
— picking a trustworthy caretaker, someone willing to do all the work necessary to find your animal if it is lost. Arm them with the location, operating hours, phone number, holding period and reclamation fees of all area animal

shelters. Leave enough money to bail out an animal, if it escapes and is impounded.

— have both your rabies tag and license on your pet.

— sign a release form for your veterinarian to treat the animal in

case of emergency.

— local veterinary clinic spokesmen also asked that owners let them know who will be watching the animal, so the information can be added temporarily to the rabies tag information and the animal's

file. — check up on your pet for your own peace of mind.

Cheaters should be punished if guilty

It's unfortunate that some people don't play fair. It happens in horse racing, and it happens just about everywhere except maybe monasteries and heaven.

There are reasons why it's illegal to have all but two drugs in a horse's system when it's racing in New Mexico. We got a reminder a few days ago when the State Racing Commission decided to seek administrative action against "Doo Dominate" owner Osvaldo Rodriguez, trainer Antonio Hernandez and veterinarian Howard Mitchell.

They allegedly cheated and injected a Novocain-like drug in the horse's leg, allegedly with the full knowledge the horse had a broken leg (X-rays before the race revealed hairline and chip fractures, and vets recommended the horse not be run), and then ran it in the All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs Sept. 5. It broke both legs in the race and had to be euthanized.

While it's bad enough they allegedly knew enough to realize the horse might die from the race, they also knew enough to realize jockey Billy Peterson could be seriously hurt, too.

These kind of people could give horse racing — or anything they cheat in — a bad name. It's good the Racing Commission allowed investigator Wayne Conwell and others the time and resources to investigate out what happened, so the commission can now take action. Each of the men face several charges that each carry a \$5,000 fine and/or five years racing license suspension.

The commission has found no wrongdoing by the Ruidoso Downs Racetrack officials. It's good the track was investigated, also, so it could be exonerated.

If the existing damning evidence holds out in commission testimony, a finding of guilt by the Racing Commission that results in a suspended license would send the message out that something happens to cheaters in the horseracing industry, and the industry helps to police itself, too.



Schoolday curfew unfair to students

My name is Stephanie Perry. I am a senior at Ruidoso High School. I am writing in response to the schoolday curfew approved by the Ruidoso Village Council. I totally disagree with this in every way. The problem does not lie in the schools, but with the dropouts and the people who graduated in previous years.

If you look at the situations that these people are blaming this preposterous curfew law on, the majority of the crimes are committed by dropout students with absolutely no family life, young adults who have nothing better to do and no place to go. If a large group of students "skip" school then Mr. Elder, the discipline officer, deals with them. If a couple of buddies skip, then they usually go home, kick back and relax. They do not drive around the neighborhoods, dressed all in black with ski masks trying to find a place to "hit."

All this is doing is punishing the children who are in school and getting an education. With our new principal, Mr. Hodges, we basically have the "you mess up — you are out of here" policy.

If we are trying to build the perfect world where no one got hurt, then we also need to look at other age brackets. For instance, the elderly citizens of our community. Older people have a higher risk of being in an auto accident at night due to their poor eyesight. So should we give them a curfew of not being out after dark? When you are outside and it is lightning, does this mean a law needs to be passed making everyone go inside for fear of being hit by lightning? No, that would be just about as stupid as this curfew thing.

How will the police tell the tourists from the students? Will they stop everyone who looks like a teenager, or all teens with New Mexico license plates and no one with out of state plates? I understand there must be laws or this world would be chaotic, but please use logic when you are dealing with this type of situation. If you are going to affect the lives of young adults then those young adults might be able to shed a different light on the subject matter.

I hope you will print this in the paper, so the voice of the young people can be heard.

No nuclear waste in New Mexico

This is our second letter in an attempt to help enlighten our fellow citizens on the potential hazards of

high level nuclear waste transport and storage in New Mexico.

How do you feel about the proposed storage of high level nuclear waste or any nuclear waste in our great state? Have you ever wondered why they want to move it here?

According to the U.S. Council for Energy Awareness, there are currently 111 nuclear power plants in the U.S. with each producing about 30 tons (60,000 pounds) of used fuel annually. Additionally, there is currently 20,000 metric tons (one metric ton = 2240 lbs., so that 20,000 metric tons = 44,800,000 lbs.) of spent fuel storage at 70 nuclear plant sites around the country. Thirty-two of these nuclear power plants are looking to New Mexico as the solution to their high level nuclear waste storage problem.

Plutonium 239 and uranium 233 (which do not occur in nature) are produced in nuclear reactors by nuclear power plants and are often referred to as "spent fuel," "used nuclear fuel" and "high level waste," to name a few. Because these bars are highly radioactive, they must be handled with mechanical manipulators operated by remote control.

Plutonium 239 has a half-life of about 24,400 years, is used as a fuel in nuclear reactors and as an explosive ingredient in nuclear weapons. The two atoms most easily produced in quantity for nuclear weapons are the nucleus of uranium 235 and the nucleus of plutonium 239. The fissioning of all the atoms in 1 kilogram (2.2 pounds) of either uranium 235 or plutonium 239 — a chunk about the size of a golf ball — would yield energy equal to that released by 17,000 tons of TNT.

Gamma rays, x-rays, and beta radiation are injurious even in small amounts. They can destroy tissues and cause cancer, leukemia and cataracts. Radiation destroys blood cells, resulting in decreased ability to fight infection, anemia, and hemorrhage. Sex cells are particularly subject to radiation damage. They may be rendered infertile or the heredity factors they contain may be altered, resulting in mutations in offspring. Additionally, the effects of radiation are cumulative; that is, a number of small doses of radiation over a period of time have the same effect as a large dose.

If we do not act now, New Mexico, our children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren will inherit a "nuclear waste legacy" which we could have prevented.
