Local school board elections Tuesday

Tomorrow is election day for residents of all five Lincoln County school districts.

Voters in the Corona, Carrizozo, Capitan, Hondo and Ruidoso school districts will decide Tuesday who will serve on their local school boards. Corona voters will also vote whether to continue a mill levy to fund school improvements.

Ruidoso's school district has had a low turnout of voters in past school board elections. On Feb. 2, 1993, only 10% of 4,094 Ruidoso registered voters cast ballots.

Capitan fared better with a 30% voter turnout; Corona had 51%; Carrizozo 40% and Hondo 20%.

The polling place for each district is:

- Capitan: fair building
 - Carrizozo: high school administration building
 - Corona: village hall
 - Hondo: high school
 - Ruidoso: civic center
- The polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Zoning on county commission agenda

Oscura resident Jerry Carroll wants assurances from the Lincoln County Commission that a recent survey sent to landowners won't be used to form a zoning plan.

Commissioners are considering changes in county subdivision regulations and finishing the elements of a zoning ordinance.

Carroll is worried that a land use plan being put together by the county Agricultural and Rural Affairs Committee to fight against intrusions by federal agencies also will be used to advance the cause of zoning.

The commission meeting will begin at 9 a.m. Tuesday in the Ruidoso Civic Events Center.


Subway thieves get \$5 in coins

No casino, no track, owner says

R.D. Hubbard says he'll close the Ruidoso Downs Racetrack before next year's season if the track doesn't get full casino gambling approved by the state.

In the worst-case scenario, the track could close before its scheduled May 1995 opening, and plans for a new luxury hotel will go down the drain with it.

"We all got a little awakening Thursday," Hubbard said, referring to a party he co-sponsored Thursday in Santa Fe. Hubbard had just met with Governor Gary Johnson before the party, and the meeting didn't go so well. Word quickly spread at the party amongst invited legislators and Lincoln County leaders.

Johnson told Hubbard he is considering signing a compact that would legalize casino gambling already taking place on Indian lands. The compact also states that the Indians would give a percentage of the take to the state — only if the racetracks are limited to casino gambling a few hours a day during the racing season.

"It puts the racetracks out of business," Hubbard said bluntly Saturday.

Hubbard and other racetrack supporters are behind a bill scheduled to be introduced in the Legislature today. The bill would allow casino gambling at the tracks, 24 hours a day.

"The tracks feel that if we're given an equal playing field (with the Indians), the state's taxes would be more than double what they hope to get from the Indians," Hubbard said.

The Legislature could approve the racetrack bill even if Johnson signs the Indian compact as proposed, but then the state wouldn't get part of the Indian profits. The Legislature also wants a say in the compact, and the state attorney general is looking into the Legislature's rights in that matter.

If the tracks have more limits than the Indian casinos, that will be it for the Ruidoso Downs track, Hubbard said. The only question will be when.

"We're going to run some figures here right away and see what it would cost us to run through Labor Day," Hubbard said. "I'd guess we would probably run through this year and shut her down after Labor Day, but I can't say that for sure until I see the figures."

Hubbard wants to know the outcome of gambling bills by the end of the regular legislative session March 17, instead of waiting on a potential special session. Then,

there would be time to make a quick decision about the fate of the track, which is scheduled to open in the middle of May.

The annual addition of more gambling at nearby Inn of the Mountain Gods on the Mescalero Apache Reservation has substantially hurt the track's earnings, Hubbard said. He believes there is "absolutely" a direct relationship between the two.

"They're still coming to the racetrack — they're just not betting as much," Hubbard explained. Instead, people save their pocketbook for the Inn. Hubbard acknowledges that Mescalero President Wendell Chino hates it when he makes such statements, "but it's just a fact."

Three years ago, the track's losses were a half-million dollars. Then it lost \$1.2 million. "But last year was the worst," Hubbard said. \$1.6 million. Between the track and the Links at Sierra Blanca golf course, he lost \$9.4 million since buying the track in 1988.

"We had it headed in the right direction at one time," until the neighboring casino expansion began, Hubbard said. "It's going to be worse this year because (the Inn) didn't have tables (craps and black jack) last year."

While the Indian casinos will cut the track's earnings by an estimated 25%, Hubbard said, the lottery likely to be approved by the Legislature this year will amount to another 20% hit, based on lotteries' effects on tracks in other states.

"Nobody can survive" with those kind of hits, Hubbard concluded. He noted how Missouri riverboat casinos have cut earnings at his Kansas racetrack by 45%, and he's trying to get casino gambling there, too.

Ruidoso village councilors have hoped for years they could negotiate with Hubbard to construct a new luxury hotel on village property by the golf course and civic center. They finally signed a lucrative contract late last year. But as hopes dim for the racetrack — this area's biggest tourism draw — so do the prospects for the hotel.

"Without a racetrack, I don't think it would be very smart to build the hotel," Hubbard said.

Hubbard said he has no opposition to other businesses outside the reservations that may attempt to get legalized gambling. The governor stated last month he would support gambling machines at racetracks and non-profit fraternal organizations, but hasn't said publicly he would support it elsewhere.

Party somber as news hits

As R.D. Hubbard's words circulated about the room, the festive mood of Thursday night's "Resort of Ruidoso" party in Santa Fe darkened.

The multimillionaire, whose special Ruidoso-based interests and those of Santa Fe Racing, Inc. had sponsored the legislative get-together, told his guests in private conversations that if the racetracks were not granted equal gaming rights with the state's Indian-run casinos he would close the Ruidoso Downs Racetrack.

"I really wouldn't have a choice," Hubbard said soberly. "There's just no economics that makes it work except a level playing field."

Everyone knew his losses — actually, the entire racing industry's losses — had been in the millions since the reservations had started up video gaming. But, still, his message hit the Ruidosoan guests like a bombshell.

"It can't happen; it would devastate our economy," they all said in shock. Yet they knew full well the man meant what he said.

Cocktail glasses still clinked and hors d'oeuvres were nibbled, but as the nattily dressed legislative folks from across the state strolled into the Eldorado ballroom, they were greeted by friendly-faced village

and racetrack officials turned impassioned lobbyists.

"We've got to get the word out; Ruidoso depends on that track for survival," Mayor Jerry Shaw said, working the room as intently as John Underwood, the village-retained lobbyist.

"Ruidoso was built from that track," she said, adding that the state first paved Sudderth Drive because of all the traffic coming from the racetrack.

"It put Ruidoso on the map," she said.

She spoke with many of the 60 or so legislators who showed:

"We've got to get the word out; Ruidoso depends on that track for survival."

Senator Pete Campos (who represents this district and is a member of the Legislature's gaming committee), John Arthur Smith (chairman of the gaming committee), Ben Altamirano (chair of

the House Appropriations and Finance Committee), Manny Aragon (Senate president pro tem), Representative Ben Lujan (House majority whip), and local Rep. Dub Williams. None were committal, though all bent their ears and offered comments like "We're on your side," or "Well, if the track closes, there has to be another use for it."

Campos said in further conversation, "I'm hoping that in the future, as we move along (with the new gaming legislation), we'll be able to enhance the way of life — in particular the quality of life — already established in communities like Ruidoso."

Such comments would up the ante and quicken the pulse, causing the lobbying cantor to increase into a seismic roar — loud enough to deaden the romantic vibrations of "Moon River" keved on the piano by Doug Montgomery.

Legislators, passing off sound bites and pleasant, though evasive responses, would then mosey along into the thick of the 300-plus crowd, admiring the array of Ruidoso displays.

Sen. Campos asked for village priorities from Shaw, while seated near the booth presenting the village's pinned-for \$7 million recreation center, plus videos and litera-

Petitions seek to overturn nuke storage election

Mescalero Apaches who voted against a proposal to store nuclear waste on tribal land say they're angry because they suspect someone is trying to bypass election results with a petition drive.

Several tribal members called *The Ruidoso News* to complain about the tactic.

"The people are happy about the decision and now someone is trying to get around it," said one man, who asked not to be identified. "If this is changed now, it will show we are under a dictatorship."

Rufina Laws, the most out-

spoken storage plan opponent at the reservation, said her kitchen was crowded Friday with members worried that proponents of the storage proposal may be trying another approach to move ahead with the project.

But Mescalero President Wendell Chino said Saturday that he knew nothing about the petition.

"I don't know anything about a petition," he said. "I was gone yesterday, but as far as I know it was not initiated by the tribal council."

Chino said he was not surprised the Mescalero rejected the storage proposal. It failed last Tuesday by

490 to 362 votes, in spite of promises that the project would generate billions of dollars in direct and indirect benefits for the tribe.

"I think if the tribal council or myself wanted to proceed, we didn't have to put it to a vote," he said. "We could have proceeded under our constitutional authority, but we wanted the people to decide."

"So, I don't look at it as a defeat."

Silas Cochise, who acted as nuclear storage project manager for the tribe, said Sunday that he hadn't heard anything about a petition.

"I've been out of town, but I don't think it would have been started by (workers at the project information center) without talking to me first," he said.

Jennifer Sundayman-Byers, who operated the storage initiative information center on the reservation, said Monday that she has nothing to with any petition and that her staff is in the process of closing the center.

Laws said her group, Humans Against Nuclear Waste Dumps (HANDS), will fight any effort to reopen the issue.

The 33 utilities that signed an agreement to store waste on Mes-

calero lands are already are looking elsewhere.

Members of the Skull Valley Band of the Goshute Tribe in Utah have indicated they are interested. The 118-member band occupies a 17,000-acre reservation about 80 miles west of Salt Lake City in the desert.

No stranger to industries that present risks, the reservation is surrounded by three toxic waste dumps, a government-run disease testing ground, an Army base that stores 40% of the nation's chemical warfare ingredients and other environmentally threatening enterprises.

Loss of racetrack could cripple economy

Ruidoso officials say the loss of the Ruidoso Downs Racetrack and halt of R.D. Hubbard-funded attractions would cripple the local economy, citing the loss of gross receipt taxes collected during the summertime racing months as a prime example.

"It would be devastating," said Mayor Jerry Shaw. "The domino effect of no track, and without (the planned Resort at Sierra Blanca) hotel, and no airline...we'd have trouble attracting people to the convention center....It would be awful."

A free-for-all of gambling interests have invaded the state capitol since the state's Supreme Court overturned Amendment 8. Voters approved the amendment last November, which stated "certain games of chance" would be allowed in private businesses.

"It's going to be tough enough to get it at the racetracks, let alone anywhere else," Hubbard predicted.

Hubbard recalled how he and his wife decided to buy the Ruidoso Downs Racetrack in 1988, in a community they had grown to love, and started getting revenues back on track.

I had no intention of getting in the racetrack business at all, but I was afraid Ruidoso was going to close, so I decided to get involved.

But you just can't afford pouring good money after bad, and see no end of the rainbow.

Village officials had hoped ground would be broken on the planned \$15 million Hubbard-funded resort this spring, but without the track, the millionaire is putting a hold on its development.

Resort and racetrack personnel had projected jobs for approximately 200 people, and tax revenues of \$500,000 during the first year of the hotel's operation.

Hotel officials had also planned to conduct regional advertising to attract tourists to the area, and to attract commercial airlines to the Sierra Blanca Airport.

Hopes for a \$7 million Ruidoso

recreation center would be futile, "because we wouldn't be able to pay the operating costs," said Ruidoso Village Manager Gary Jackson.

In fact, without the track, the village would have a difficult time paying current operating costs and would likely have to make cutbacks after timely reviews, Jackson said.

Gross receipts taxes pay for 55% of the village's general fund — the operating costs that pay for police, firemen, street maintenance and library personnel.

"There could be some major issues, affecting jobs and service,"

Jackson said.

Gross receipts, which are the greatest source of revenue in the village and collected in the largest amounts during the summer racing season, also pay a substantial portion of the village's outstanding bonded debt of approximately \$15 million.

Payments on the Grindstone lake dam, which has been bonded with gross receipt tax collections, and existing debt on the airport capital improvement projects would also become pressing.

The repayment of the bonds have been guaranteed by the vil-

lage, Jackson said, and although "we're not in any threat of not paying them, if, for any reason, we did get into a difficult position, we'd have to make the cuts in operating costs."

According to Ruidoso Village Councilor Frank Potter, Ruidoso has approximately 900 businesses, most of which cater to tourists.

"We've been real lucky over the last two years," he said. Ruidoso has turned around with new sidewalks and main street improvements, and lots of new restaurants.

"It takes a lot of people to support these businesses and we're not

in any position to take any percentage of loss (with gross receipts)," Potter said.

Potter added that without the 500 racetrack employees, schools would likely experience a decrease in enrollment, just as banks would feel a huge bite in their seasonal transactions and deposits.

"The domino effect would be far, far reaching in a village that depends on tourism 100%. And it's one thing to talk about the loss of one business in town, but we're talking about business in the whole town," Potter lamented.

ture demonstrating the \$1.2 million wastewater treatment request (manned by village manager Gary Jackson and assistant Alan Briley).

"At this moment, our number one priority is for the track to get gaming," Shaw said, "because the domino effect of losing the track, no resort hotel or airline...it will be devastating."

Over by the Museum of the Horse display, which was augmented by an Ann Stradling horse saddle and a "Ruidoso Rosie" plastic horse, Village Councilor Frank Potter pounded Rep. Cisco McSorley for racetrack support.

"The Indian gaming is hitting us like a freight train and we're in deep trouble if we don't get it (full gaming rights)," Potter said, about two inches from the legislator's face.

McSorley excused himself from the demanding situation, saying he'd already signed on to Rep. Max Coll's bill that would wipe out all gaming in New Mexico.

"Then horseracing will be a thriving industry again," McSorley said.

"That will never work," Potter challenged. The governor is ready to sign on to full Las Vegas-style gaming rights with the Indians — who have donated him with about \$200,000 in campaign money — so the Coll bill seemed to Potter like a wish blown back into time.

"There's no chance of taking it away once it's already there," Potter said.

"Oh, yes we can," McSorley said with confidence, prior to escaping Potter's grilling.

"I can't believe we all voted for someone we thought supported us," Ruidoso Councilor Joe Gomez said of the governor with remorse.

"It's amazing," said Robert Rivera, a Santa Fe Racing representative. "Right now the Indians are involved in an illegal activity (with the card tables) and with one signature, the governor is going to legitimize it while the racing industry has been following the rules all along."

While in sight of the Ruidoso Downs Racing display, the man who had granted seed money to much of Ruidoso's growth was mired in a tete-a-tete with legislators, informing them of his afternoon meeting with the key, but missing, party guest: Governor Gary Johnson.

Hubbard had told Johnson of his needs, and the freshman told Hubbard to expect support for video gaming, but only during the racing season — and only an hour before the horses broke through the gates and up to one hour after their finish.

The limited provision was far from satisfactory to Hubbard. Indian gaming, matched by the expected state-wide lottery, will likely draw even more from racing handles, say racing officials. This led Hubbard to inform his Ruidoso Downs staff — a mere two hours before the fifth annual racetrack legislative party — of potential layoffs.

Museum of Horse may be lost with racetrack

Joan Dale Hubbard, spouse of R.D. Hubbard, first came to love horse racing when she experienced the excitement of the races at Ruidoso Downs.

He (R.D.) introduced me to the races; she reminisced Thursday night while at the Resort of Ruidoso legislative-lobbying party. He brought me there on a date. I'd never been to the races before in my life.

The long-lashed brunette, dressed in a gold laced embroidered suit, spoke of her affection for the Ruidoso area as if already long gone.

I love that town; it's one of the few places we have friends, have neighbors. It's a wonderful community, a beautiful place to be in the summer," she said, but added, "With the track closed down, my soul will be gone in that town — no doubt."

The Hubbards, who have spent many of their summers together in Ruidoso since marrying in 1972, let it be known earlier in the evening that they wouldn't stand for another year of million-plus losses at the racetrack.

We just started coming every year," she continued, "and finally came back and thought, 'You can live a lot of places, but Ruidoso's home.' And when the track was in trouble, we were kind of running around saying 'Someone ought to do this and someone ought to do that,' and then we thought, 'Well, maybe it's our turn to do that.'"

"And we did do those things, spent millions, and had things stayed the way they were when we did that, this track would be in great shape."

But a direct investment of \$8 million over the last six years, not

to mention an additional \$6 million for the Museum of the Horse and \$2 million for the Links Golf Course, appears for naught with casino gaming next door on the Mescalero Apache Reservation. The Hubbards say the Inn of the Mountain Gods has continually cut into racing handles, and if full casino rights are granted to the tribe by the governor, greater losses at the track are expected.

"We're just not going to do it anymore," she said of the \$1.6 million loss last year, with \$1.2 million in similarly hefty losses the previous year. The money funneled in to cover the losses gives a grand tally of \$20 million spent at the racetrack in just six years' time. Including the museum, golf course and racetrack, the Hubbards have invested \$35 million in Ruidoso.

The Hubbards have resolved their only option is to pull their financial interests out of the community if the Legislature does not grant the state's four racetracks full gaming rights.

The people of Ruidoso have to absolutely inundate this Legislature and the governor in particular. They have got to understand the ramifications; racing is a multi-faceted industry — employing thousands — and to give up racing, especially quarter horse racing, is to die."

Hubbard, who locally owns five two-year-olds and five three-year-old quarter horses out of more than 50 of the equestrian beasts nationwide, went on to say, "I really enjoy the people involved with the track — we have something in common; our love of the horse. They bring up their horses in the summer and if I don't win I want them to win."

"It's the greatest high when you win," she added, "and the greatest low when you lose. It's like waiting

to be shot when the gate opens."

Their time and money was all for nothing, Hubbard said, if equal gaming rights aren't matched with the reservation's gaming privileges.

She spoke affectionately of tribal leader Wendell Chino, though with caution, because as she said, he is a tough competitor.

"He's our friend. When we first got into the business, we went out to talk with him, and he and (wife) Rita came to the track; he gave trophies away for Kachina stakes;

they've been to our house for dinner. We're friends — they're wonderful people.

"We have a good relationship with him and we don't want to damage that. He's a very smart man, he's done a marvelous job out there — there's no question about that, whether you like him or not. In fact, Wendell's going to be the museum's person of the year, I mean, you can't ignore him."

"But, I agree with Dee — competition breeds competition. Our prob-

lem is we're regulated."

She said their most profitable track — they own one in Oregon, another in Arizona, two in Kansas, and one in California — was Hollywood Park, outside of L.A. It's the site where they would likely move the Museum of the Horse.

"Most anywhere would kill for a museum like that," she said, adding, "We're not going without a fight, and neither is my husband...I know we're going to work out a deal, and you're the ones who are going to do it."

Track repercussions would be statewide, manager says

The loss of the 50-year-old horse racing industry in New Mexico would have a catastrophic effect on the state with vast repercussions, says Ruidoso Downs Racetrack Manager Scott Wells.

"We're not just talking about the loss of 2,000 jobs at Ruidoso Downs, we're talking about the loss of 10,000 jobs statewide," Wells explained. "How much is New Mexico willing to spend to encourage an industry with 10,000 jobs at stake?"

A state government-commissioned study concluded the racing industry is the 4th largest

retail industry in New Mexico. The tracks draw nearly 1.5 million people a year to the state, generating \$20 million in gross receipts taxes for the state's general fund.

The Ruidoso Downs Racetrack has a payroll of \$2,371,000, which includes wages for concessionaires, and pays out almost \$11 million in purses, taxes and salaries each year.

The Downs generates close to \$6 million in purses; \$2.3 million of that comes from the track's purses required by state law, and \$3.6 million is purses contributed by horsemen.

It also spends \$797,000 with Ruidoso area vendors, \$330,000 on concessionaire goods (much of it purchased regionally), \$304,000 to the New Mexico Horsemen/Breeders Association, \$111,000 in state parimutuel taxes, \$110,000 in local property taxes and \$159,000 in state gross receipts taxes.

The Ruidoso track also garners 80% of its proceeds from out-of-state tourism dollars, as opposed to the 20% found at the state's other tracks.

Wells said the industry has been paying taxes since 1938; Ruidoso Downs racing started in the early

1940's and grew "phenomenally" with the invention of the All American Futurity in 1959.

But now the industry is seriously threatened by the Indian reservation casinos, and will continue to take millions in losses if not granted a "level playing field," Wells said.

"Break it down in as many different aspects as you want, but equal is equal and anything else is unfair."

"Why should one businessman compete with one hand tied behind his back while someone else is given unfair opportunity?" he asked. "The Indians used our

cliente to build their business, and now they threaten to put us out of business with the offering of extras that we're not allowed to offer."

Wells added that a staff meeting held at the Ruidoso Downs Racetrack today will inform employees of "possible layoffs later this year, with the possibility of permanent layoffs."

But, as he added optimistically, "We really believe that once they're given a chance to assimilate all the facts, the Legislature and the governor will see fit to give a long-standing New Mexico industry a chance to compete on an equal basis with what is being allowed only minutes from our doorsteps."

New Mexico legislators focus on juvenile crime bills

Juvenile crime has taken center stage in the 1995 Legislature, with a spate of bills that range from caning of graffiti vandals to dress codes for schools.

A small furor has been created over the proposal by a Roswell senator to use caning as a juvenile punishment, but it is only one of a number of proposals that could affect the handling of young people.

A recent opinion poll conducted by an Albuquerque television station showed about 80% favored punishment by caning of the repeat graffiti vandals, or placing them in old-fashioned stocks in public places, according to Sen. Emmitt Jennings, R-Roswell.

Jennings, the sponsor of the caning bill, has also introduced bills into the Legislature that would allow:

- public school boards to enact dress codes,
- district courts to jail kids for skipping school,
- and the state to construct a boot camp for juveniles who are first-time offenders.

Fort Stanton Hospital near Ruidoso could become part of the juvenile justice plans if it is converted to a boot camp, according to Sen. Pete Campos (D-Santa Rosa). Such a possibility is being discussed as an alternative to closing the facility like Gov. Gary Johnson has ordered, Campos said.

Gov. Johnson put forth a num-

ber of proposals this past week that would toughen the laws and procedures governing juvenile criminals.

Johnson suggested that juveniles:

- be sentenced beyond the current limit of two years,
- must serve their full sentences,
- be returned to jail if they violate their parole,
- and not be turned over to law authorities for minor offenses such as fishing without a license.

Johnson said this week that too much of the state's resources are being wasted on petty offenses and that serious juvenile offenders are only given a slap on the wrist or locked up for short periods of time.

Also this week, Sen. Skip Vernon (R-Albuquerque) introduced

a bill that would lower the age at which a juvenile can be tried as an adult, from 15 to 14 years of age.

"We must send a strong message to these juvenile criminals," Vernon said. "Our patience is gone. Our society can no longer afford to extend the benefits of leniency to these juvenile gangsters."

Jennings said he is simply trying to respond to the needs in his district and around the state for the apparent lack of control and adequate punishment for juvenile offenders.

"I have met with judges in the Roswell and Carlsbad areas," Jennings said. "They all have been frustrated with the inability to handle juvenile problems with the way the laws are written."

"All (bills) are at the request of

judges so they can handle the juveniles in a more appropriate manner," Jennings said. "If it's a matter of law and order, so be it."

The dress code authority contained in his Senate Bill 397, is a tried and true method of helping cut down on gangs and gang-related activities, he said.

"The one on the dress code was put in and tried in other areas," he said. "It has been found that the amount of gang-related activity decreases. Plus, the clothing budget decreases for parents."

The current laws on truancy lack teeth, Jennings said. His truancy bill, Senate Bill 398, would allow district court judges to jail a child for "willful violation" of the state school attendance law.

SB 398 would also allow the judges to put the juvenile in jail during the hours the student would normally be in school.

"One of the judges in Eddy County is frustrated with his inability to discipline truant kids. This is in response to his problem," Jennings said.

The boot camp proposed by his Senate Bill 396 would be for first-time juveniles over the age of 13 who have committed a felony.

The program would last for six months and would include drug abuse counseling and treatment, general education classes, manual labor and physical training classes.

Jennings also has a bill that calls for electronic monitoring of juvenile offenders.

Rural subdivision landowners upset at county road assessments

Butch Nolen and his neighbors around Capitan are fuming over a proposal to increase a subdivision road maintenance assessment.

They not only don't want the Lincoln County Commission to raise the per front foot assessment, they'd like the county to drop the levy entirely. They've run newspaper advertisements urging a large turnout at the commission meeting Tuesday in Ruidoso.

"It's unfair," Nolen said Tuesday. "There's no allowance for someone who lives in one house

who may be on a corner and have 4,000 feet of road, compared to someone with a 20-30 acre tract on a cul-de-sac. They both use the public roads in the subdivision, but the one guy may be looking at a \$2,000 to \$4,000 assessment on a lot that cost \$2,000, while the other won't hardly be taxed at all.

"Half of my road is on the route to the (public) landfill. There needs to be a tax levied for everyone."

County Road Manager Bill Cupit told commissioners at their January meeting that the existing 10 cent per front foot assessment may have to be increased to as much as

50 cents or \$1, if commissioners want to recover more of the costs associated with road maintenance.

The assessment was enacted in 1970 as a one-cent per foot charge and was increased to 10 cents in 1981.

Commissioners wanted to hear public input before deciding whether or how much to increase the per foot assessment. It could be as little as a few pennies and has to be based on actual maintenance costs last year, commissioners have said.

"First they have to justify it, then come up with means and

method," Nolen said. "I think everybody is willing to bear their fair share. They should pass something per household so all pay equally. I think the intent is being abused."

Commissioner Wilton Howell pointed out that the county is subsidizing the road department's \$1.2 million budget to the tune of \$350,000 a year out of the general fund.

"That's because, 47% of the road department's budget goes into road upkeep in subdivisions," he said. "We could pare back the road department, do only the main roads and school bus routes, and let them

contract with private contractors to blade and put in gravel."

Nolen, along with E.J. Fouratt, Duane Williams and former commissioner Bill Elliott, contend all property owners should pay.

"Everybody uses county roads. Basically, this is a user tax," said Nolen, who operates Butch's Service Center.

The intent of the law was to focus on concentrations of population, because that's where roads usually need most upkeep, Howell said.

Citing the wording in the statutes, Nolen said an assessment

can be enacted if a commission anticipates "such a prospective population density to require extraordinary maintenance."

But in Capitan, with the possible closing of Fort Stanton Hospital by the state, population may slump instead of increase, Nolen said.

"We feel we've lost population and have nothing to request extraordinary maintenance," he said. "Some may require that, but (commissioners) are applying (the assessment) across the board."

The commission meeting will begin at 9 a.m. Tuesday in the Ruidoso Civic Events Center.

U.S. bill would stop feds from passing buck

The Senate approved a bill Jan. 27 that would ban the federal government from passing onto localities the costs of the rules, regulations and programs it imposes.

The legislation passed the Senate, 86-10, after several days of long debate. Sen. Pete Domenici (R-New Mexico) was the principal co-sponsor of the Unfunded Mandate Reform Act of 1995 (S.1). The bill was previously unanimously approved by the Budget Committee, which he chairs.

The bill, sponsored by Senator Dirk Kempthorne (R-Idaho), severely restricts the federal

government's ability to impose unfunded mandates upon state and local governments, as well as private business.

The bill includes an amendment offered by Domenici designed to ensure that federal departments and agencies provide an economic impact analysis when it proposes a rule or regulation on the private sector.

The analyzes must include the effects of the mandate on the national economy, productivity, economic growth, full employment, creation of productive goods, and international competitiveness of United States goods and services.

Republicans announce platform

The House and Senate Republican caucuses announced a joint Legislative platform Feb. 1 to present where they stand on issues of importance to New Mexico.

The four-page document, which covers issues from taxes to crime and economic development, is the result of long hours of caucus by

both chambers, with input and advice from the governor and his departments.

Highlights include a call for repeals of the 6-cent gas tax and felon "good time," as well as a call for an open vote by the full legislature on term limits and a manifesto of New Mexico state rights regarding public lands.

Poop Scoop

It's not just spring when a young cat's fancy turns to love.

In North America, all cats breed during a season that stretches from mid-January through September.

"During this period, every unspayed female cat not kept exclusively indoors will either be pregnant or nursing kittens," said Jim Riggins, manager of the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter. Unfortunately, many of the adult cats and kittens end up being abandoned and dumped at the shelter to face an uncertain fate and possible death.

"This is a national tragedy as animal shelters across the country begin to be flooded with unwanted kittens, many sick and not afforded the necessary veterinary care," he said.

In spite of that situation, Riggins said shelter workers would rather see the unwanted animals brought to them instead of being abandoned to a life of misery.

"Cats have a high feral survival rate," he said. "And although, they more often than not live a life of parasites, disease and misery, they do survive to breed and produce many more feral cats."

They can breed several times each season, since the gestation pe-

riod is only 63-67 days.

"Cats automatically are fertile immediately after weaning a litter of kittens, even if the kittens were removed artificially by humans or predator," Riggins said.

"Many well meaning and good hearted people who feed large numbers of feral cats, and watch their numbers grow, feel good about helping to preserve this quantity of life," he said. "Quantity, however, cannot replace quality of life and quantity is something to be alarmed about, not proud about, in the United States."

Studies have shown that one female cat and her female offspring can produce more than 6,000 cats in a four-year period, he pointed out.

"At that rate, if only 25 female cats were breeding in Ruidoso, we would have to absorb on average of more than 30,000 cats per year if breeding was unrestricted," Riggins said. "Since this figure is astronomical, and we obviously do not see that many cats, it shows the monumental toll that disease, exposure, cruelty, starvation, and predation take on these predominantly unwanted hordes."

The solution to the problem is simple at the outset, more gut-wrenching at the other end.

"The first step is to immediately

spay any cats you own," Riggins said. "Even if your animal already is pregnant, she can be spayed with a moderate additional fee to your veterinarian. Male cats possibly are more damaging to overpopulation, because they can breed daily, so neutering male cats also is a must and the least expensive solution."

"If you are feeding feral cats, call animal control for humane methods of capturing the animals and removing them from the breeding cycle," Riggins said that's especially important for females that are visibly pregnant.

"If people are completely against the idea, even though it does perpetuate suffering, then they owe it to the animals to take financial responsibility," Riggins said. "They should have the animals spayed, vaccinated and placed under veterinary care. Complete unwillingness to do either of the above steps is simply denial of an epic national and local problem."

Once kittens arrive, owners should either keep all eight or nine offsprings and have them neutered and vaccinated, or find a non-abusive home with owners willing to neuter and care for the kitten.

Riggins said the original litter owner should follow up on the home situation when the animal is six months of age to insure that it is neutered.

Hazel was a teacher of home economics at Hondo High School, and was a resident of Lucero County for 41 years.





Council approves village visitor center RFP

A request for bids from marketers interested in advertising, promoting and operating a convention and visitors bureau (cvb) has been approved by the Ruidoso Village Council.

The request for proposals (RFP) will be published in various publications this week. It was written by a council-appointed CVB ad hoc committee.

The RFP concludes seven months of study about how to best provide a consolidated and comprehensive marketing program for tourism in Ruidoso.

A location for the visitors bureau has not yet been established. Currently, the site is at the chamber of commerce building on Sudderth Drive, which is not handicapped accessible.

Each bidder must provide a site for the visitors bureau. The location

and handicapped accessibility will be considered by the yet-to-be-established selection committee.

As recommended by the Lodgers Tax Committee, the selected marketer will have a contract to dispense funds for advertising and marketing. It will be a three-year contract renewable at the end of each year. The recipient will also give a monthly and quarterly review to the LTC.

Also at Tuesday night's meeting,

the council:

- rejected bids for alterations to the library and senior citizens building. All three bids were above the architect's estimate of \$60,000;
- approved a request from Lincoln County officials to support efforts to prevent the closing of the Fort Stanton long-term nursing care facility;
- approved changes the council had made throughout the past six months to the village budget.


"We also make what we call the



In practice, Joshua Hodges' arm was always a little too strong. But with a district basketball game on the line, the junior forward was as perfect as Superbowl MVP Steve Young hitting Jerry Rice for a score.

With four seconds left in the game and Ruidoso trailing Cobre 76-75, Hodges passed the ball three-quarters of the court to teammate Malik Waters. Waters caught the ball just outside the 3-point line, checked the game clock, used a couple picks set by Zack Turner and drove to the basket for the winning score. Waters scored and drew the foul with one second left for a 77-76 Ruidoso lead. Waters missed the free throw, but it didn't matter — the damage was done and the game was won.

"It's a play we've worked on a couple times in practice," Wright said, noting that Hodges sometimes overthrew Waters. "He threw a perfect pass when it counted."

Waters' winning basket capped off a 14-point Warrior rally in the second half. Ruidoso's 10-0 run at the end of the third quarter got the visitors back in the game.

"The team was just outstanding," Wright said. "This takes us to another level."

The victory was critical for Ruidoso if the Warriors were to stay in the hunt for the District 3-AAA title. The previous night, Ruidoso lost to No. 1-ranked Silver, 89-67. The Warriors led 27-26 at halftime before suffering a sluggish second half. In the third quarter alone, Wright called four timeouts in an effort to stop Silver's momentum, but to no avail.

Despite the outcome at Silver, Wright thinks his team found a new confidence.

"We had a special feeling going into Silver — if we played well we'd be happy. We had a sense of togetherness we've never shared. Just walking into the gym, we felt a lot of pride and confidence — a confidence that we could play with anybody," Wright said.

In addition, AQHA's champion three-year-old and champion three-year-old filly, I Hear a Symphony, won the All American Derby (G1) and was runner-up in the Rainbow Derby (G1) at Ruidoso Downs.

Champion three-year-old colt Heza Fast Man also raced at Ruidoso Downs. He was a second-place finisher in the All American Derby. He gained national recognition for taking second place in the All American Futurity (G1).

Lowell Neumayer, general manager of Ruidoso Horse Sales, said horses sold here won or placed 107 stakes races in 1994. One of those was Noblesse Six, winner of the \$1 million All American Futurity last Sept. 6. Noblesse Six cost \$23,000.

"Since 1988 we have sold four All American Futurity winners," Neumayer said.

The Ruidoso Horse Sales will hold the 1995 Super Select and All American Sales Sept. 1-2, 1995. The Super Select session will be simulcast to buyers in Los Angeles, Houston and other areas.

Each Thursday at noon, members of the local Fraternal Order of Police meet to discuss police and community relations, problem areas, and fundraising ideas.

Members say the meetings are helpful planning and brainstorming sessions.

"We have a lot of plans and ideas for activities and community involvement," said Chris Condon, president of Sierra Blanca F.O.P. Lodge #26 in Lincoln County. "The lodge sponsors a scholarship in the field of law enforcement for members or their family members, and we are currently working on our annual Valentine's Dance fundraiser."

The Sierra Blanca Lodge has more than 50 members on the roll, said Condon, who is also a Ruidoso Downs police officer.

Condon said the organization is also trying to do more educational activities in the local schools, and is looking into sponsoring a class to teach gun safety.

The F.O.P. Valentine's Party this year will be at 7 p.m., Saturday, Feb. 11 at Win, Place and Show in Ruidoso, with proceeds going to F.O.P. community endeavors.

Before 1916, policemen throughout the nation held little hope for improving their own conditions, states an informational release from the national F.O.P. office.

Police were working 12-hour or longer shifts for low wages when veteran police officers Martin Toole and Delbert Nagle met in Pittsburgh, Pa. to discuss the formation of an organization for the social welfare of police.

Within the first week of May, Nagle drew up a petition for the "United Association of Police," a name changed at the first meeting on May 14, 1915 to the Fraternal Order of Police (F.O.P.) because some members felt the original name sounded too much like a union.

F.O.P. organizers met with then-mayor of Pittsburgh, Joseph G. Armstrong, who was informed that a union was not the intention of the Order, and that "the word strike is ruled out completely because we

who are obligated to protect life and property will see that obligation fulfilled regardless of all else."

Armstrong, having strong pro-labor leanings, responded, "I don't see a thing in the world wrong with this. You'll have my hearty approval and full cooperation."

With the mayor's endorsement, the F.O.P. spread rapidly throughout Pittsburgh. Today, the organization has more than 225,000 members and 1,847 local lodges across the United States.

The F.O.P. has developed pension systems and continues to push for legislation benefiting law enforcement officers and their families.

The Lincoln County lodge also supports national events like the

Blue Ribbon Campaign, said Condon. The campaign is a memorial to officers killed in the line of duty. Law enforcement officers and the public tie blue ribbons to their car antennas. The blue ribbons also serve as a reminder that the job of

keeping the peace involves danger and sacrifice.

Sierra Blanca F.O.P. has a long running relationship with the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC), too.

"We, as well as the national

F.O.P., work closely with the center," Condon said.

The NCMEC is dedicated to finding missing children. The president of the F.O.P. serves on the board of directors and members serve as volunteers in a program

where they are trained to help law enforcement agencies in child abduction cases.



Explores the Most Human Thing There is About Being Human

When you talk to someone, how do you know what word to say next? Instead of greeting a friend with "Good morning!" why don't you ever say "Morning good!"? Why do you say things the way you do, and why do people understand what you mean?

You might answer: 1) you learned how to talk from your mother; or 2) what's the big deal? — it's only words!

It turns out that the answer is enormously complicated — and far more interesting than that. The human language is one of life's great mysteries, and experts have been puzzling over it for centuries. But because most of us take talking for granted, we don't think much about what language is or how it works, where it comes from, or why we are the only creatures on earth that have it.

The Human Language, a fast-paced, entertaining, and intellectually eye-opening three-part series, goes deeply into the mystery of language — the most human thing there is about being human — and into how and why and where we get it, and what we do with it when we do.

It's not simply fate that scored Cindi Clayton two businesses when only 25 years old. Converse with her for five minutes, and you'll find that her infectious energy and wit have much more to do with her success.

"I don't really believe in luck," Clayton, now 28, explains. "It's just where opportunity and preparedness meet."

The Arkansas native recognized that fine point in life when acquiring the Condotel, a business which manages over 200 units — including Crown Point and Champion Run — 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

So, as the former student of chemistry figures, "The opportunity was there and I was ready to meet it." She adds that the business venture and intense work load "has helped me from getting bored."

At the Condotel's same 1103 Mechem Drive location, Clayton also owns and manages the Rocky Mountain Ski Shop, which will be offering mountain bikes this summer.

Her financial backer, Rick Evans (a local broker) obviously became sold on her potential when he both encouraged her to go into self-employment and then offering her financing.

"I only had a mere \$75 in the bank, and a lot more on my credit cards," said Clayton, who had been working as an assistant vice president at Pioneer Savings Bank (she was offered her initial job at the bank when seeking a car loan).

But as the self-described workaholic explains, she was willing to take the risk, and it's been the type of challenge to which she has always aspired.

Clayton, who moved to Ruidoso in 1987 to visit her mother and learn how to ski, is constantly looking for ways to improve customer service and make life easier for those visiting Ruidoso.

"Just look at the color of that wall," says Dr. Sandra Davis as she gives the grand tour of the new Centre for the Healing Arts. "The first time we painted it, it came out awful because we did it before the electricity was on and we had to redo the whole thing."

The way Davis describes it, you'd almost think she enjoyed having to repaint the wall, simply for the adventure. Her philosophy seems to follow that ideal.

"I was blessed with a lot of energy," she said.

Davis, who moved to Ruidoso four years ago, is a chiropractor who has

now fulfilled her dream of building a center where various forms of alternative healthcare could be practiced.

"It was a dream I've had ever since I moved here," she said.

The Centre for the Healing Arts opened in November and now has seven different alternative healthcare providers.

Davis said one thing she has learned is that hard work and a dream go hand in hand.

"There are no giveaways in this world, I don't care who you are," she said.

"This town is an inspiration to me," she said. "I encourage people to get involved.



"I'm a little league basketball referee again this year," she added. "This is my third year as a referee; it's something I really enjoy."

Lutterman is active at St. Eleanor's Catholic Church as a lay reader and belongs to Alpha Alpha Beta Sigma Phi,

an international organization dedicated to helping the less fortunate.

One thing that shines through when talking with Lutterman is her overwhelming sense of pride for the Ruidoso area. With a family steeped in this area's past, she has much to be proud of.

"Ruidoso is my community and I have a lot of history here," Lutterman said. "I'm the great-granddaughter of Ike and Lula Wingfield and my son Zak is the 5th generation to be born in Ruidoso."

Lutterman is never so busy that she fails to appreciate the beauty of the Ruidoso area.



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
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
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Lisa Maue

Lisa Maue grew up in the Kennedy era and knew she wanted to do some kind of social work because of the president's urgings.

She's found her calling in a unique form: teaching disabled people how to ski at Ski Apache.

"I really enjoy working with people and getting to know them," Maue says. Her ski students come back year after year, and she gets to know their families well because the whole clan often comes along for their family vacation.

It can be hard, though. Sometimes they don't come back, and Maue knows they've died from their disability after

seeing them deteriorate year after year.

"When you start seeing that pattern develop, it's hard to keep it uplifting," Maue admits. But she's developed a talent for that.

Maue believes just about anyone can ski, no matter whether they have muscular dystrophy, one leg or they're blind. She notes that skiing takes less motor skills than walking.

Teaching people with a variety of disabilities means each individual has his or her own needs, and Maue uses her sociology and psychology background to help. But actual technique is a hit-and-miss situation, because there aren't any handbooks.

Maue's been director of the Ski Apache handicapped skiers' program for two years and a coach for six. Last season, she spent all her time with administrative duties, away from the slopes. She couldn't handle being away from the people, and has made sure she gets to work with the students sometimes this season.

Before joining the handicapped skiers' program, she was a Ruidoso Ski Team coach for five years, but she got tired of the traveling.

She feels she gets as much from her students as they do. When she sees them skiing, it's a high she can't get anywhere else.

Freda McSwane

When you're married to the local sheriff, everybody knows your name, but some people may not know that Freda McSwane has also carved out several careers for herself.

While raising four children, she has taught piano, served as a legal secretary for three defense lawyers and, more recently, for the assistant district attorney.

In what spare time she had left, McSwane joined her husband in organizing the Sheriff's Posse Auxiliary six years ago.

For the past three years, the couple has coordinated Santa Cops, a group of law enforcement volunteers who collect, wrap and distribute gifts for children at Christmas.

Born in Brownfield, Texas, McSwane attended Texas Tech for two years. She later added college courses in business and criminal law. She married James McSwane while they still were living in Texas. They moved to Capitan, then spent several years in Santa Fe before moving back to Lincoln County in 1987.

Immediately after resettling in



Morris moved to Ruidoso 15 years ago and immediately became involved in community activities.

She's currently the chairperson for the annual Aspenfest celebration, and is a member of the Chamber of Commerce board. She's on the board of directors for the American Cancer Society, the state chairperson for Chio Omega (a nursing sorority), a member the

Altrusa Club (a women's service organization), and involved in Shriners. She was secretary/treasurer of the athletic booster club for 10 years while her children were in school here.

"I guess I'm so involved in the community because I love Ruidoso and the people of Ruidoso," Morris said.

Born in Los Angeles, Morris moved to Albuquerque at the age of three. Her mother owned a dress shop and her father was on the board of regents at UNM.

Morris returned to California after finishing high school in Albuquerque and getting her nursing degree. She

later came back to Albuquerque and worked in the cardiac and oncology units of Presbyterian Hospital for nine years.

While living in Albuquerque, Morris worked with the crisis center and a home for pregnant teens called the Rainbow Center, where she provided counseling.

Morris, a graduate of UCLA with a degree in nursing, worked in the banking industry for 16 years before recently returning to the medical profession.

Married for 26 years to Mike Morris, a teacher at Hondo School, she has four children.

Kathy Osborne

Church and community have been the main focuses of Kathy Osborne's life.

"I'm very involved in the Gateway Church of Christ, where I teach Sunday School," Osborne said.

For 15 years, she was active in the White Mountain Search and Rescue group.

"I've worked with Santa Cops (which distributes toys to children at Christmas) since the start," she said. "That's probably my main project and it gave us the idea for Christian Services when my father said he wondered what people do the rest of the year."

Osborne also volunteered for the government side of the community by serving on the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission for 1.5 years.


Born in Denton, Texas, she moved to New Mexico in 1974 with her parents, but returned to Texas to finish high

But Osborne will be leaving the company soon to try her hand at real estate.



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
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Anne Reveley

The Reveleys had left for Ruidoso to go skiing an hour before the house caught fire and exploded. On their skiing trips the Reveleys usually didn't take their two youngest children, Starnes and Connor. But this time they did, thankfully.

When Reveley looks back on the accident, she wonders if fate brought her family to the high country.

"We decided to make a change and Ruidoso just seemed like the place to go," said the El Paso native.

She's as busy as ever now — volunteering at Sierra Vista School, holding offices in the parent councils at Nob Hill and Ruidoso Middle School, coaching soccer, and teaching Sunday school at Ruidoso Word Ministries.

The only difference now is she makes sure her volunteer activities can include her children.

Reveley started out as a runway model in New York City. She started her own successful fashion consulting business, Annie Inc., when she returned

to El Paso. Reveley also produced fashion segments for an El Paso television station and volunteered her time in a number of community activities.

She draws inspiration from Jesus Christ and her mother, who taught Reveley to give back to the community.

As vice-president of the Parent Council at the middle school, Reveley was in charge of raising money for the school outdoor education program. In two months, the Parent Council raised \$7,000 to offset the equipment cost of the activities.

Reveley also helps market her husband's business.

Susan Ruch

Susan Ruch has made her mark on Ruidoso. As the owner of the Attic and Friends Complex on Mechem, Ruch designed and oversaw the construction of the shopping center in 1983.

The Attic and Friends is currently the home to five stores, including two of her own: one called Emily's, a gift shop named after her daughter, and another called The Attic, a fashion and accessories store.

Ruch grew up on a ranch in Texas, then graduated from Texas Tech with a degree in ranch management.

Living in Ruidoso for 21 years, Ruch's fashion business has been well

received in the community. Her employees sing praises about the way she has helped them learn the different aspects of the retail business, and the fact that she has always made time for local organizations.

"There are actually a lot of different facets to my business," she said. "I'm kind of a numbers person so I like the numbers, the advertising, the fashions and the people."

Ruch also said she enjoys going to the different fashion markets to look for new styles and accessories.

"I go to market about six times a year," she said.

Aside from operating a shopping center and two retail businesses, Ruch is busy raising her two children, Emily, 14, and Skylar, 11.

She is active in sports, including softball and skiing, and practices yoga. Ruch said she enjoys reading historical novels, collecting southwestern art, and writing poetry.

"The thing I like best about Ruidoso is the climate."



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
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Jerry Shaw

While self-assured and creative, it's not ego that helped Jerry Shaw, Ruidoso's first female mayor, ascend to her high-profile position.

"This all started because I care so much about Ruidoso," she explains of her plunge into politics more than a decade ago. "I really felt I could make a difference."

Cultivating a deep concern for the village's welfare came without effort, she explains, and it may be an intrinsic quality shared by many.

"Most people live here because they want to be here — they're not sent here — so we end up caring a great deal,"

Shaw observes.

Shaw, who's motto may be "let's get on with it," first ventured into the public eye as the premiere female village council member after working on the Retail Merchant's Committee with the Chamber of Commerce.

"I looked back on all that we did (i.e. pursuit of midtown crosswalks and holiday activities for children) and thought 'Gee, we really made a difference here,'" she says of her current path in life. "So I started thinking about running for the council in 1994."

Since then Shaw has doggedly pursued greater economic development

for the community while keeping an eye on the village's beauty and cleanliness. Currently, she is focused on the interrelated issues impacting Ruidoso's infrastructure: the health of the racetrack, securing gambling in the area, and promotion of tourism in conjunction with the Convention and Civic Events Center. The mother of two and grandmother of three is also pining for construction of a multi-purpose recreation center, which she believes would benefit the community tremendously.

Shaw's greatest political skill may be in recognizing the need for setting priorities.

Jeri Sparks

Jeri Sparks draws her inspiration from the pioneer women of the Great Plains. She admires their fortitude and their strength.

"The first women who came west were the backbone of society," Sparks said. Pioneer women concerned themselves with raising their children, supporting their husbands and building a caring community.

The same could be said of the modest Sparks.

A mother five children, Sparks and her husband, Wyatt, co-own Ruidoso Land Surveying. She handles most of the accounting for the business, but also dabbles in drafting. The surveying busi-

ness affords her the opportunity to work outside and meet people, both of which she enjoys.

When she's not busy with her family or the business, Sparks volunteers her time in the Ruidoso School District or at the Church of Christ.

"The challenge for me is working full-time and not being home all the time," she said. "I think that's the big challenge for all women."

When she does get home, Sparks would prefer to spend time with her kids — Kody, 17; Kent, 16; Kyle, 14; Kammi, 11; and Kara, 8. She would prefer to talk about their day, but that's not always possible. She might have to

run the kids to practice or go to church to prepare meals for needy families.

Sparks has lived in New Mexico since she was two years old. She grew up in Tularosa and lived in Silver City before she and her husband decided to move to Ruidoso.

Sparks likes Ruidoso because it's a strong Christian community and the people care about each other.

Sparks says she's not real assertive, even a little bit shy. Those are just two traits among many she shares with the pioneer women of the 1800s she looks up to — traits which also include modesty, hard work, being the backbone of a community.



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


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Karen Tillman



Karen Tillman decided to retire three years ago as director of special services in the Ruidoso schools. Now, she only works about 60 hours a week.

What?

"If you ask me what my biggest problem is, I'd tell you I overcommit myself," Tillman admits.

It's obvious Tillman loves working with students and families, and she just can't help herself.

Right now, she's an educational consultant with — that's right — five jobs: Title 7 Indian education program coordinator for the first three grades in Ruidoso; administrative consultant for special education in Tularosa; college success class instructor at ENMU-Ruidoso, with an emphasis on helping

Native Americans; disabilities coordinator for the Lincoln County Head Start program; and a local monitor for the state's foster care program.

One suspects she has a very, very detailed executive planner book. Her friends joke that she needs a wife to organize things. But she wouldn't have it any other way.

"I absolutely adore what I do — I can't think of a better place to work than in schools," Tillman says. "It's just such an upper."

Tillman is such a positive person that sometimes her friends call her "Pollyanna." But she doesn't mind, explaining that negativity "cuts you off at the pass — you can't see the possibilities."

Tillman has been a major communication link between the communities around Ruidoso, especially between Ruidoso and the Mescalero Apache Reservation. As director of special services at the schools, she became friends with many Mescalero families and has watched their children grow. She's proud that one of her Title 7 Mescalero students is now the first certified teacher at Ruidoso, currently a student teacher at White Mountain Elementary.

Tillman recently completed a training booklet about Mescalero culture for non-Native American educators. What's her best tip for encouraging different cultures to get along?

"Our common ground is respect," she says with a smile.

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
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
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
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
