Governor signs Indian compacts

Compacts between the state and 11 Indian tribes that legalize gambling on Indian lands in New Mexico were signed early Monday by tribal leaders and Gov. Gary Johnson.

The compacts allow for a limited amount of gambling at the state's racetracks, Johnson said, meaning 12 hours per day during existing race days.

Johnson said the threat of a lawsuit to prevent the compacts "may have been an inevitability," and prompted him to sign the agreements quickly.

Last week Johnson said he planned to sign the compacts on Friday, but delayed the signing because of criticism from the Legislature.

Wendell Chuno, chairman of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, said he was grateful to Johnson for signing the agreements, adding that it is "a momentous occasion."

"Gov. Johnson is not opening up statewide gambling, but is opening the doors to economic and social opportunity," Chuno said.

Chino said the compacts were good, and "we will not be intimidated by the press and media because we think we are right."

Chino said he will be prepared with his legal counsel to fight any attempts to negate the compacts.

"This is a very important document for our people," he said.

As of Friday, about 450 people had called the governor's office to complain about the compact, said a spokesman, and "nearly 100%" of the calls came from Ruidosoans who said casino gaming should be allowed at racetracks, too.

Racetrack supporters meet tonight at 7 p.m.

Supporters of the race racing industry will meet at 7 p.m. tonight at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center to continue planning strategies to assure passage of Senate Bill 526.

The bill seeks casino gambling on Indian lands, equal to gambling on Indian lands.

Legislative hearings on SB526 begin Wednesday and Thursday. Ruidoso Village Manager Gary Jackson and Mayor Jerry Shaw will address the gaming committee that will consider the bill.

The Ruidoso Village Council will consider a resolution Tuesday supporting SB 526.

Weather

The forecast for Tuesday calls for cloudy skies with a 50% chance of additional rain and mountain snow and a high in the low 40s.



Ruidoso burglaries, other crimes on rise, police say

Residential burglaries along with more white collar crime of embezzlement both increased significantly in 1994.

"I guess times are getting harder, and people just don't have money," said Detective Wolfgang Born, who sighed in explanation of the 23 embezzlement cases, a 43.5% increase over the previous year's count.

But it is the rise in burglaries

that have been most unnerving to some residents.

There were 39 more burglaries in 1994 than in 1993, a 16% increase, making a year-end total of 243 cases, said Police Chief Lanny Maddox. These breaking and enterings caused an estimated loss of \$208,629 in personal property, a 18.2% or \$38,000 increase from the previous year's losses.

Police said 58 (24%) of those burglaries involved juveniles who were arrested, and 23 of the break-

ins took place during the Aspenfest festival in October.

"The fact that a number of the arrested juveniles is part of the reasoning for getting the compulsory school ordinance passed," said police Chief Lanny Maddox, talking about a new village school day curfew law. A nighttime school day curfew was also put in place in August.

Maddox and Born both said they believe juveniles are involved in a number of other burglary cases still

under investigation.

Regarding embezzlements, the largest amount of theft involved \$30,000 from a local travel agency. One individual was held suspect for that incident and required to make restitution, police said.

The most sensational may be the two embezzlement cases of at least \$2,500 by the city water department's two employees; Mary Wimberly, the department's customer relations supervisor, and Paula Giarrantano, the customer rela-

tions clerk.

Police were called to investigate the situation last summer when the finance department discovered discrepancies in credits issued to cash paying customers.

The suspected thievery may have taken place over a period of years, Village Manager Gary Jackson said, adding that the two amounts of \$2,500 is what they have been able to verify as missing.

1994 dry, but not drought

Sierra Blanca may be covered with snow now, but 1994 was a dry year during key water demand times, say experts who deal with the soil, water and agriculture in the south central mountains of New Mexico.

Still, the foul-smelling water that Ruidoso residents faced at the end of summer doesn't mean the village was dealing with a drought, said Hollis Fuchs of the U.S. Soil Conservation Office in Carrizozo.

"Although 1994 was dry during critical periods, it was above average in precipitation," he said. "The timing of the precipitation for agriculture was really bad. Also, 1994 was an unusually warm year with above average temperatures for several months. This affected the snowmelt and evaporation/transpiration. Rainfall wasn't so bad in 1994, with a total of 24.93 inches, but precipitation in the form of snow in 1993-94 was much lower than normal.

"Without much water stored as snowpack and with warm temperatures, spring runoff was over quick-

ly. And in spite of extra rain in May, water supplies for Ruidoso dwindled."

Fuchs said the 1993-94 snowpack at 5.8 inches was the lowest since official snow surveys began in the Rio Ruidoso-Rio Bonito watersheds in 1988.

"Unfortunately, such short-term records don't tell us much," he said. Although part of the snowpack measurement is depth, it's the density of the pack that tells how much water it will yield, he said.

The high was 25 inches in the early 1990s. This year to date, the snowpack measures 11 inches, as submitted by Keith Kessler, who manages the Bonito Lake recreation area and water supply for the City of Alamogordo.

Fuchs said the density of snow locally is higher than many areas further north.

"Being so far south, the temperatures are higher and the snow melts a little even as it falls, so there's a higher percentage of water," he said.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration uses 30-year and other long-term averages

in looking for trends in precipitation. Those trends for Ruidoso show an increase in precipitation in 10-year increments since 1942, rising from a low of 20.34 inches in 1952-61 to 24.98 inches in 1982-91 (see related chart).

Fuchs said no recorded evidence indicates an overall negative change in precipitation for the area.


"But some things have changed," he said. "Everybody uses more water nowadays. More people reside within watersheds. There are rooftops, parking lots and roads."

Watershed rehab

Disturbance in the watershed above the village is reducing the amount of water reaching Ruidoso and a growing population is sucking up at a faster rate the water that does arrive, Fuchs said.

A long-term fix for the problem will require more than a water storage and treatment facility at Grindstone Dam, he said, referring to a Ruidoso project expected to

Mescalero pow-wow Feb. 17, 18

BLM/Rio Bonito land swap finished

The Bureau of Land Management has acquired 546 acres near the historic settlement of Lincoln.

In exchange, the BLM transferred 5,826 acres of public land in Valencia County to the Lincoln Valley Land Company.

The final transaction brings the total BLM acquisition in the Lincoln area to 1,020 acres. In return, 31,804 acres in other counties were deeded into private ownership. Two previous transfers took place in December of 1992 and 1993.

Plans for the Rio Bonito land call for some recreational development.

The Lincoln County Commission initially opposed the transfers, and managed to secure commitments from the BLM to put some public land in the county back into private hands.

Free house numbers offered

Ruidoso residents needing new house numbers can pick up free numbers at city hall.

The Village Council changed about 50 street names and addresses recently, prompting the need for new signs.

The numbers at city hall are four inches in height and reflective, as the new town ordinance requires.

The changes were made so emergency personnel can find homes easier. Previous duplicate street names and house numbers made it difficult to rapidly respond to emergencies.

The street department has ordered new street signs, which will start going up later this month, officials said.

Local departments get new officers

Four local law enforcement agencies received money for a new officer from the federal government's community policing grant program.

Planning officials discuss driveways

Building contractors' complaints about driveway grading requirements have prompted the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission to review the existing ordinance.

At last Monday's meeting they scheduled a workshop for 2 p.m. Feb. 20. The public's suggestions are welcomed.

Also at Monday's meeting, the commission approved:

— a request by Foxworth Galbraith to expand its lumberyard's outdoor storage onto adjacent land it is leasing. The site lies next to the Hollywood Mart and post office. Commissioners approved the lumberyard's new storage and driveway, but the state Highway Department must determine an access point.

Legislative committee hears Ruidoso money requests for projects Tuesday

A request for \$8.9 million in state funding for Ruidoso projects will be scrutinized by a legislative subcommittee tomorrow.

The 8 a.m. hearing with the capital outlay subcommittee of the House Taxation and Revenue Committee is a critical one, said Village Manager Gary Jackson.

"The governor has indicated that he is not going to approve much funding for capital projects," Jackson said, "so it is imperative that we show the citizens (of Ruidoso) do foot the bills for operations we do have."

Ruidoso is requesting \$7.7 million for the first phase of a recreation center and \$1.2 million for repairs to the cracked wastewater treatment system.

All other state funding requests from Lincoln County, as submitted to the House in a bill sponsored by

Representative Dub Williams, will be also scrutinized Tuesday.

The village received \$675,000 from the state last year for construction of the Grindstone water storage project. The appropriation represented about half of the project's cost, Jackson said.

The community has historically only gone to the state for capital funding as a "last resort" after exploring independent funding sources, Jackson said. The village government has one of the highest per capita debts in the state, as well as the highest gross tax receipt rate — points looked on kindly by the Legislature because it shows the community is doing what it can on its own.

Jackson's will be describing Ruidoso requests, together with Mayor Jerry Shaw, assistant Village Manager Alan Briley and parks and recreation department director Debbie Jo Almagar.

Each request will have 10 minutes, so presentations must be condensed and concise, Jackson said. Ruidoso's team will display project specifics while trying to emphasize that, as a resort community of 4,600 year-round residents, the village must have an infrastructure to serve as many as 30,000 at any given time.

"We could literally talk for hours about each request," Jackson said.

Plans for the first phase of the \$7.7 million recreation center include a multi-purpose room, two racquetball courts, a two-court gymnasium with running track, and rooms for gymnastics, aerobics and weightlifting.

A joint powers agreement between the village government and the school board allows the rec center to be constructed on school lands. Officials hope this will show the local cooperation in effect.

Proponents visualize aquatic

competitions and gymnastic meets, as well as baseball games and community dances — none of which can be scheduled now due to the lack of facilities or space.

The first phase of the project only covers the cost of the main building. The second phase, which will cost an estimated \$4.5 million, includes the pool, baseball field, and soccer field complexes.

Jackson said the \$1.2 million request for the wastewater system is essential to the community. The daily infiltration of over 900,000 gallons of ground and river water into the system's 16 miles of clay piping is costly. Jackson explained the infiltration represents about 35% of the system's capacity and \$180,000 is spent annually treating already clear water.

"The degree of infiltration is really excessive," Jackson said, adding that underground photos of the inflow makes it look like a "waterfall."

Lincoln County narcotics task force ranks third in southeast N.M., commissioners told

Although it's one of the smallest narcotics task forces in the Southeast New Mexico region, Lincoln County's two-man unit ranks third in drug seizures.

Steven D. Lasater, enforcement coordinator for the Region VI Drug Enforcement Cooperative, told county commissioners Wednesday that most of the counties in the region have five or six officers.

Yet, the Lincoln County unit is responsible for 18% of the marijuana confiscated, 66% of the cocaine (12,213 grams) and 13% of the arrests.

"For 2.5 officers out of 35 total, that's a great performance," he said. His region covers the counties of Otero, Eddy, Chaves, Lea and Lincoln.

Commissioners recently asked Angela Vega, task force director, and Sheriff James McSwane to submit a report on the unit, its ac-

tivities and accomplishments.

"As you know, there has been talk of using all deputies on narcotics cases and not funding the task force," said Commission Chairman Monroy Montes.

The county contributes \$26,466, the cost of one deputy, toward the unit's operation. Commissioners wanted some justification for continuing financial support.

The federal government chips in \$115,000 and the Ruidoso Police Department contributes an officer.

According to the breakdown submitted by task force commander Angela Vega, the unit worked 105 cases in 1994.

Of the 105, 34 are ongoing investigations and four are closed. Of the remaining 67 cases, 63 arrests have occurred and four warrants are outstanding.

Of the 63 arrests, 44 cases are pending disposition, 18 resulted in convictions one ended up as an acquittal, Vega's report said.

Fifty-five percent of the 105 cases took place in the unincorporated part of Lincoln County, 41% took place within Ruidoso, 5% in Ruidoso Downs and 1% in the state of Texas.

The unit removed \$342,262 of drugs from the street, Vega said, mostly marijuana (131 pounds) and cocaine (284 oz, 12 grams).

The unit was instrumental in recovering \$40,200 of stolen property; received \$14,802 from auctioning confiscated property; and expects to clear another \$18,500 from pending auctions, Vega said.

Among the stolen property recovered were 90 vacuum cleaners, Vega said. Two military vehicles confiscated were transferred to the road department.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley asked Lasater if the county was winning battles, but losing the war on drugs.

"We'd see a lot worse if we didn't win some battles," Lasater said.

"Lots of loads come through here. Our intelligence says only 90% leaves, so that means 10% stays in the community and that's a lot of cocaine."

Task force operating money contributed by communities throughout the region will drop from 30% to 26% next year, Lasater said.

The state also is talking about expanding the goal of the task forces to include violent crimes and gang activities, he said.

"We're going to apply as a region this year and are seeking a fiscal agent to handle the grant," Lasater said. "The agent (lead government entity) will get 10% for cutting the checks. That will lessen the burden on a lot of the municipalities and there will be less paperwork."

"Things look good for funding," Montes told Lasater and McSwane to hold on to the report for budget time this summer to help show the program pays for itself.

Commissioners hear zoning complaints

Lincoln County Commissioners expect to hear many of the same opposition remarks at every hearing about zoning.

But the commissioners say they're willing to listen, because they know it's an important issue to the county.

They emphasized during a meeting Tuesday that they're a long way from initiating zoning, however, either through maps designating land use zones or through a comprehensive land use plan.

What they are trying to do now is update an existing zoning ordinance by amending it. By itself, the document is useless. Only when the maps and land use plan are added would zoning take effect. At least one more hearing must be conducted on the ordinance before the commission can take action, Commission Chairman Monroy Montes said.

As at other meetings when the ordinance has been discussed over the last few months, opponents lined up to express their frustrations.

Hap Canning of Capitan said, "Who wrote it? Why is it needed and what's wrong with things the way they are?"

He specifically objected to language in the ordinance about "regulations enforcement officers" and "inspections."

"It looks like we're pitting neighbor against neighbor," he said. The cost of enforcement to ensure compliance could be prohibitive, he contended.

Zoning is just a way to create employment and government control at a great cost to the taxpayer, Canning said.

He recommended letting each of the county's five commission voting districts decide whether to initiate zoning. Those in Ruidoso may want it, but he and his neighbors don't need it, Canning said.

"I believe it will reduce the value of my property," he said. "I consider it a taking (of his property) and I should be compensated."

Jerry Carroll of Oscura said he's "dead set against zoning in any shape for any portion of the

unincorporated portions of the county.

"I came here like many others to get away from regulations," he said.

He repeated a previous request to put the issue to a countywide vote, saying he has petitions circulating that call for an election on the issue.

"If you pass this, we are going to force you into a special election and we'll get this thing killed," he said. "I don't believe you need it. It eliminates 90% of your rights to do as you see fit on your property."

"If this passes, we'll see you in a different court."

Montes said five years ago he also opposed zoning "based on the misconception that it was regulations and control."

Since then, he has learned that zoning protects existing land use and ensures that it can continue without intrusion from other uses, Montes said.

The zoning ordinance was scrutinized at length when originally adopted in 1988, he said. "It's not a bad document. There were lots of

public hearings and changes at that time," Montes said.

Ralph Romero, chairman of the county Planning and Zoning Commission, said the maps to go with the zoning ordinance can be limited to just a few basic zoning designations, such as federal and state land, and agricultural, residential and commercial use.

Planning coordinator Patsy Sanchez said she met with U.S. and state forest officials and firefighting groups last week. They would like wording in the ordinance regarding "defensible space" around houses; and developments. The term refers to land without highly combustible vegetation.

Local lawyer Gary Mitchell said he wrote the ordinance while serving as county attorney. The issue at the time was to provide protection against a large company that wanted to ship in waste from other areas and bury it in Lincoln County, Mitchell said. Commissioners also wanted to exercise some local control over state and federal lands, he said.

Judge finds probable cause in Downs shooting

Judge Fridam Butts found probable cause Friday against two men accused of a Ruidoso Downs drive-by shooting late last month.

Victor Baca, Jr., 21, and Nicholas Gonzales, 20, now await a district court hearing with Judge Richard Parsons.

Baca is in the custody of his uncle in Ruidoso while awaiting further hearings on the felony charge of shooting from a motor vehicle. He was also charged with two misdemeanors: negligent use of a deadly weapon and reckless driving.

The judge did drop one of the felony charges against Baca — ag-

gravated assault with a deadly weapon — and reduced Baca's bond from \$20,000 to \$5,000.

Gonzales, who is accused of violating probationary conditions set on a previous charge of assaulting a police officer, is still being held at the Lincoln County Detention Center in Carrizozo on charges similar to Baca's.

The men are accused of shooting at three teens in a Ruidoso Downs trailer park Jan. 27.

Ruidoso Downs Police found 14 semi-automatic spent shell casings at the Willow Tree Trailer Park the night of the alleged incident and received descriptions of the suspects from the victims. One girl

said she was the former girlfriend of Gonzales.

None of the girls testified they were frightened during the shooting incident, and their cool, detached demeanor, plus occasional scoffs and giggles, undermined the state's aggravated assault charge against Baca, Judge Butts said.

Also on Friday, Judge Butts found probable cause to hold a Ruidoso man for alleged domestic violence against his wife.

According to the victim, Tracy Slaten came home drunk and angry Jan. 15 "because his Cowboys had lost" the conference football playoff. He allegedly grabbed his wife of one year by the hair and neck and went

for a loaded gun in a bedroom closet. He allegedly threatened to kill her, forcing her to flee with her infant child to a neighbor's house. Meanwhile, he could allegedly be seen staggering around the perimeter of the neighbor's house, waving the gun, cursing and threatening her.

A short time later police testified they found him outside with the gun tucked in the back of his pants.

Butts refused to lower Slaten's bond of \$35,000, as requested by defense attorney Scott Keys, and he's still being held in Carrizozo while awaiting an appearance before the district court.

provide adequate water during heavy demand periods for the next 20 years.

"We need to think in terms of treating the whole watershed," Fuchs said. Fire suppression, roads built by the mining industry, logging activities and other human disturbances have replaced meadows and old growth with water guzzling flora substitutes and erosion, he said.

"If you look at old photographs and talk to oldtimers, they'll tell you there used to be lots of big open meadows and big, big pines," he said. "There's been a shift toward thick, woody vegetation."

Precipitation patterns

"People who pay attention to the weather realize that about 50% of the time, the annual precipitation is below the long-term average," Fuchs said.

However, drought years are exceptionally dry and occur only about 10% of the time, he said.

"Generally, when our precipitation is 25% or more below average for a year, a drought is considered to have occurred," Fuchs said. "In that sense, 1994 was not a drought year at most locations."

Conversely, exceptionally wet years also occur about 10% of the time, he said.

In 1993, most of Lincoln County experienced a dry fall and winter, followed by a wet May in 1994. But the summer proved dry and the fall only produced average moisture.

"For agricultural producers, 1994 was a drought year, because moisture conditions were unfavorable at critical times for warm season plant growth," Fuchs said. "Also, snowfall and watershed yields were below average. The annual precipitation as recorded, however, was less than 25% below average and therefore, didn't qualify as a drought year."

Drought years

Ranchers learn that to stay in

business, they have to be prepared for dry spells, Fuchs said.

"How well we deal with drought depends on how well we're prepared for it," he said. "Precipitation, our watersheds, and our water supplies can't be taken for granted."

Fuchs said severe droughts occurred in 1909-10, 1917, 1922, 1933-34 and 1955-56. Lesser droughts were recorded in 1924, 1945, 1947-48, 1950-51, 1964 and 1970.

"The drought of 1909-10, which affected a large area, was particularly severe at Ancho, a tiny settlement on the railroad 22 miles north of Carrizozo," he said.

Normally receiving about 13.5 inches of precipitation, Ancho received only four inches from July 1909 until December 1910. That's 70% below normal for 17 months, Fuchs said.

"Most of the livestock in the area were lost and some people lost everything they owned," he said.

A long term drought occurred during the 1940s and 50s. In Lincoln County as a whole, six consecutive dry years were recorded, 1950-56, some with severe drought, Fuchs said.

Capitan experienced an even longer dry spell, covering 15 years from 1942-56.

"Thirteen of those years were exceptionally dry and only two, 1944 and 1949, had normal precipitation," Fuchs said.

Wet and wild

Relief from droughts often is delivered with the heavy hand of torrential rains, biting winds and flash floods.

During 1941, the county recorded the highest amount of precipitation for the county in all loca-

tions, Fuchs said.

"Capitan received almost 31 inches," he said. "At White Tail, south of Ruidoso on Mesalero tribal lands, more than 62 inches registered. This is the most precipitation ever recorded at any official station for one year in New Mexico."

He listed extremely wet years as 1931-32, 1941, 1957-58, 1984, 1985 and 1986. Exceptional years included 1965, 1969, 1972 and 1978.

"A long wet spell occurred from 1978-90. For 12 of those 13 years, precipitation was well above the long-term average. The one dry year was 1989," Fuchs said.

For an accurate picture of the county's situation, it's best to measure in several locations, he said. Ruidoso can fare significantly better than Carrizozo some seasons.

"We've all seen it rain hard in one place while it remained completely dry a quarter mile away," Fuchs said.

"Generally, the south central mountains of Lincoln County receive unprecedented above-average precipitation most of the time since 1978, with a dozen wet years," Fuchs said. "According to records, it's been over 20 years since the last widespread significant drought year and nearly 40 years since we've had a really severe one."

"I think the message is, we can't afford to be lulled into thinking it won't happen again. We're due."

Wimberly and Giarrantano, both long-time village employees, were sentenced for the third-degree felony charges in district court. Giarrantano pled no contest to embezzlement over \$2,500 on Oct. 21 and was placed on probation for 18 months. She is required to pay back \$15 a month, and she was ordered to pay a \$2,500 restitution fee, said Assistant District Attorney, Viola Rhodes. Wimberly pleaded no contest for embezzlement of \$2,500 — also a third-degree felony — on Jan. 20. She was placed on probation for two years and ordered to pay restitution costs of \$2,500, she said.

Born said there may be different individual "stresses" prompting people to dip into their company's accounts and steal money.

"These days both people in a couple are working, and they still can't make ends meet, so they make take \$10 here, \$20 there, intending to pay it back," he suggested. "But then it gets to be too much..."

Most of the cases involved petty amounts at first, he said, and accumulated to a few hundred dollars.

About five of the reported cases, Born said, took place at one local bank. Most of these, however, proved to be errors in bookkeeping, with only one actual case for \$1,000 involving actual theft. Born said the money was removed from one of the cash drawers. The case has not been resolved, although there is a suspect, he said.

Another significant statistical increase is the 70% increase in

reported rapes or incest. Ten cases were reported this past year as opposed to the three in 1993.

Born said that one of those cases involved the fondling of a child by his grandfather, a man who allegedly had sexually abused his daughter for a number of years several years back. Police investigated the situation, but found that the statute of limitations had expired and were unable to press charges. Most of the other cases involved women who were allegedly intoxicated and raped by acquaintances. Police question the veracity of a couple of these incidents, he said.

Police also reported a 10.6% rise in assaults — a total 169 cases as compared to the 151 of last year. Police said 51 of these cases involved domestic violence disputes, an approximately 5.3% increase over the previous year's count.

Larcenies increased by 25 reports for a total of 270 cases, or a 9.25% increase. These crimes reflected the loss of \$28,252 in missing property — an increase of

\$26,600, or 20.7%.

In all, the police documented 1,207 offenses in 1994 — an increase of 977 offenses versus 1993, or a 10.6% increase.

"This is indicative that our services are needed more this year than last year," Maddox said. The department, located on Wingfield Street, staffs 15 patrol officers and three detectives.

Other significant 1994 increases are the 65 accidents with injuries (over the 42 reported in 1993 — a 35% increase) and the 384 property damage accidents, 26 more than the previous year, or a 6.7% rise.

Categorical decreases include the 28 reports, or 56% fewer complaints of fraud/forgery, which stood at 64 last year; the 18 fewer criminal damage reports totaling 180, and the three fewer motor vehicle thefts — 16 as opposed to 19.

Maddox added that many of the cases were solved, with the arrests of 499 adults, a 7.2% decrease and 143 juveniles, a 8.9% decrease, for various offenses.

Also on the rise, Maddox noted, were DWI arrests. They rose to 142, or 21.8% over 1993's 111 arrests.

"We've been utilizing a state DWI grant that equips us with road block equipment to do blitzes," he said, adding that keeping drunk drivers off the streets, as well as would-be burglars, is a department priority.

"Officers going out and being proactive rather than reactive is an advantage to ensuring the welfare of the people of Ruidoso," he said.

Drivers warned to stop for buses

State law requires all traffic to stop when a school bus flashes its lights and displays a stop sign. But Ruidoso police say some motorists have been ignoring the law, arguing they have been unaware of the law or that its lack of enforcement made it dismissible. So, this is a warning, police say:

sonally from his position as president. While many in his tribe live in poverty, Chino uses the tribe's Lear jet and receives other perks, Geronimo said.

He also pointed to what he characterized as lack of environmental and health protection by tribal leaders, by allowing burning of potentially harmful materials at a dump on the reservation.

"How can we take care of nuclear waste if we can't take care of one dump?" he asked.

He contended Chino and the council violated the Mescalero Constitution and U.S. Constitution by shutting out media during a general tribal meeting on the nuclear issue before the election.

A different approach

While Geronimo sets his sights

on recalling Chino, nuclear storage opponent Rufina Laws said she's more comfortable focusing on the nuclear issue.

"I can't say one way or the other whether recall is the best approach," she said during a separate meeting with the media after Geronimo left.

Although she was disappointed to hear about the effort to set aside the election, she wasn't surprised.

"At the time I was celebrating the election results, there was still a part of me that was apprehensive," she said. The petitions "just came sooner than I anticipated," she said.

"This is an issue in which you can't sit on the fence. You have to take a position. It is divisive for the tribe," Laws concluded.

She pinned responsibility for the push to set aside the election on the shoulders of tribal council members.

"I don't believe the assertion that they are not involved," she said. "Our victory left the council stunned and the nuclear industry scrambling."

She thinks Yucca Mountain, designated as the future permanent repository for the rods, will never be built.

"That leaves Mescalero as the best option right now," she said. "It's the only government entity that's said, 'Bring your waste.' It's the only referendum so anticipated by the world, and now that the Mescalero voice has been heard against it, the council still can't accept the voice and will of the people."

"I believe the nuclear industry is behind the petition drive and that the tribal council is not in control of the government. I believe (the tribal government) is very unstable."

Domenici chairs water, energy subcommittee

Sen. Pete Domenici will serve as chairman of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Energy and Water Development this year.

The subcommittee produces the annual Energy and Water De-

velopment Appropriations Bill. The bill sets funding levels for Sandia and Los Alamos national laboratories, atomic energy defense activities, arms control and verification efforts, the Advanced Computational Technology Initiative for the oil and gas industry,

and water projects.

Domenici will retain membership on the following appropriation subcommittees: Commerce, Justice, State and Judiciary; Defense, Interior and Related Agencies; and Transportation and Related Agencies.

It's been two months since the Ruidoso girls' basketball team won a game. And it's been at least that long since the Warriors have been healthy, free of injury or illness.

That's why it was no surprise for coach Jamie Roland to have three junior varsity players on the court during parts of Ruidoso's varsity game against Socorro Friday night. Socorro eventually posted a 47-32 District 3-AAA victory.

With starting guards Mandi Lewallen and Tawnya Reynolds sidelined by sickness, Roland substituted creatively, using varsity players out of position and junior varsity players, who are limited to six quarters of junior varsity and varsity action a night.

The makeshift Warriors trailed by only two points at halftime, 19-17. But Socorro's experience got the better of Ruidoso in third quarter. SHS outscored Ruidoso 12-5 behind Rebecca Ybarra's eight points. Ybarra led all scorers with 18 points.

Amber Livingston's nine points led Ruidoso. Bailey Bishop and Angelica Figueroa added eight each for RHS.

The Warriors' 2-2-1 half-court press kept Ruidoso close in the first half. Ruidoso forced a half dozen Socorro turnovers and converted them into easy scores. But Socorro countered the press and Ruidoso couldn't adjust.

The Warriors also had trouble hitting the outside shot against Socorro's zone in the third quarter. Ruidoso couldn't set up its press because it couldn't get the ball to fall through the cylinder.

After the game, Roland described her team as "allergy-infested." Starting forward Figueroa was slow due to sickness, and key substitute Genevieve Botella didn't play because she was running a fever.

Roland hasn't been immune, either. The Warriors' coach was nearly hospitalized with asthmatic bronchitis Tuesday. She missed

Ruidoso game at Santa Teresa, a 68-30 loss to the Desert Warriors.

Despite the setbacks and the team's 2-17 mark, Roland said her team has progressed.

"We always look for the things we've accomplished," Roland said. She listed perseverance, attitude and skills improvement as some of those accomplishments.

The Warriors play their final regular season game Saturday, Feb. 18, when they host Hot Springs in a district contest.

The Warriors almost snapped out of their losing streak at Cobre Feb. 3. Ruidoso scored 17 points in the fourth quarter to rally from a 9-point halftime deficit.

Ruidoso trailed Cobre 38-37 with nine seconds to play when they threw away the ball and an opportunity to score the go-ahead basket.

The one-point loss to Cobre was a vast improvement over the last time these two teams met. The Indians waltzed away with a 55-25 win.

Livingston had one of her best games to date against the Indians. The junior forward scored eight points and swept the boards for 16 rebounds.

Who really is endangering wildlife

When I talk to various groups, organizations and individuals about wildlife, one of the topics that often comes up is "endangered species." When asked why some species are in danger of extinction, most people respond that humans are killing them. As they answer, I can almost see the pictures they conjure up of a hunter out there with a gun, blasting away at all kinds of animals. Hunting has had an impact, but there also many other human activities that have been far more deadly.

Take the American bison for example, hunting was a major cause in its decline. Of course, I'm not talking about regulated sport hunting, but hunting for profit or market hunting.

Railroads build after the Civil War opened up the western plains, home of 60 to 100 million buffalo. This provided a means to ship large numbers of hides from the western prairies to eastern market places. Herds of buffalo, at times numbering as many as 4 million animals, migrated across the plains searching for forage. This made them easy prey for market hunters and literally millions were slaughtered for their hides.

The devastation of the buffalo herds was not only very profitable, it was also encouraged by U. S. Government policy as a way to subdue the Plains Indians. Buffalo were their mainstay and extermination of the herds led to their defeat.

Competition for prairie grasses was another reason for the demise of the buffalo. Cattlemen, attracted by the rich grazing of the west, moved huge herds of cattle that took over range once occupied by buffalo. Finally, there remained one small herd of 250 animals living at Yellowstone Park.

There is another story that is truly a black mark on American history, the passenger pigeon. Billions of these birds once darkened the sky, traveling in huge flocks that could cover an area a mile wide and 240 miles long.

Once again, market hunting started the extinction of the passenger pigeon. Millions were smoked out of roost trees, netted and sent to cities for food. Even with the heavy toll taken by market hunters, passenger pigeons might still be around today except for their nesting and feeding habits. They required hardwood forests within their range to supply nuts and acorns for food and shelter for nesting. Their fate was sealed when these forests were

cleared by loggers.

Then there are other species that were never hunted and still face extinction, such as the black-footed ferret and the California condor. These species were never abundant to begin with and have possibly become too specialized to survive in our modern world. Specialization leads to vulnerability.

The black-footed ferret depends on prairie dogs as almost their sole source of food. Programs were carried out to eradicate prairie dogs and eliminate their competition with livestock. The downfall of the prairie dog led to the demise of the ferrets. The only known colony is now in a captive breeding program in Wyoming.

All California condors are also in captivity for a breeding program to try to re-establish their populations. Their problem is their extreme sensitivity to human disturbances. They require large areas of wilderness free of the slightest encroachment by man. California has attracted masses of people which have crowded the condors into smaller and smaller areas.

An even greater threat to wildlife than hunting is the degradation and changes in our environment brought about by agriculture, industry and increasing human populations. The bald eagle, peregrine falcon and osprey have low population numbers because of these of the pesticide DDT. Residues of this chemical in their bodies cause these birds to produce eggs with thin shells that crack during incubation. Pollutants have been added to our streams, soils and groundwaters.

The answer most people give to the question, "Why are some animals endangered?" is right. Humans are killing them, but which is the culprit—profit, the plow, the chemical factory, the chainsaw or the hunter?

How to turn, turn, turn - learning the physics of skiing

(This is the third part of a series about taking ski lessons at Ski Apache. In parts one and two, published last Monday and Thursday, I wrote about my adult level I class. Part three covers the morning session of my adult level II class. The series concludes Thursday, Feb. 16.)

It's a stunning day with brilliant sunshine and warm temperatures, a perfect day for another ski lesson. Five new classmates and I arrive near chairlift 2 for our adult level II class. The only side effect I felt after my first day of lessons was some pretty tight calf muscles. Of course that's from those pesky ski boots. Other than that, the dip in the hot tub seems to have massaged away other muscle soreness.

Darrell Winter, who lives in nearby Nogal, is our teacher. He's a second-year instructor with lots of personal skiing experience.

In the morning class we're going to review what we should have learned in the level I class, refine our traversing skills and work on our turns. The goal is for us to make sharper turns so we can try steeper slopes.

Once at the top of Easy Street, Darrell reviews what all of us learned the first day: feeling comfortable in your boots and on your skis, balance, traversing with an edge and gliding, wedge turns.

We practice these skills with several different drills. For gliding wedge turns, we follow Darrell as he snakes his way down the slope. Turning your toes inward or outward turns the skis so you can make the lazy "S" down the slope. Darrell makes progressively sharper turns and we practice following his ski tracks.

After some of those runs, it's time to try it without our poles. Let me tell you, none of us are real thrilled about giving up our poles. For some reason, poles give you a false sense of security. They

won't save you from wiping out - just give you one or two things to pick up after you have bit the snow.

Anyway, Darrell takes away our poles and uses them to set up a slalom course. Okay, so it is not like the slalom course we saw at Lillehammer for the Olympics, but it sure looks that way from midway up the slope on Easy Street.

We all make it through the slalom course, and it is a lot easier than it looks. This is a great exercise because you really have to concentrate on adjusting your skis and keeping your balance.

After working on the lower half of Easy Street, we make our way to the steeper portion of the run. Here, we practice traversing the slope and making edges. I find this skill hard to do. I can traverse across a slope, but have trouble leaving an edge in the wake of my skis.

It's important to establish the edge of the downhill ski for control of your skis and speed. Without an edge, you slide down the hill.

If you have a vague grasp of physics,

you should be able to understand the forces involved when making turns. I love physics, my problem is I just could never do the math used to solve the problems.

As you start a turn, you should transfer pressure from what was your downhill ski to the other ski because that ski will be the your new downhill ski when you complete your turn. During the turn, centrifugal force makes it feel like you're being pushed away, when really you're not. The reaction is to lean into the turn, toward the mountain. If you do this, that's exactly where you'll go - into the mountain and into the snow.

Well, that's what happens to me. My first wipeout is a good one. As I ski down the steeper part of Easy Street, working on my turns, I complete the first turn all right, but then bail out of the second one when I get going too fast. Darrell says I leaned too much into the turn. Instead of keeping my nose over my downhill ski.

All in all, it was a good wipeout. I check all my joints and everything

feels OK. And, I avoid a yard sale - that's when your glasses, poles, skis and scarves spew all over the snow. I am glad to get my first fall over and done and out of the way. One more fear is put to rest.

We work on our turns up until our lunch break. As I make my way to the main lodge, I keep thinking to myself, 'Keep your nose over your downhill ski.' Hopefully, it is a concept I'll grasp that afternoon.

Reformed alcoholic comforted many

Seven-year-old Paul Gallegos never dreamed that when his father gave him whiskey he would begin a 44-year descent into alcohol addiction.

"My father would take me with him to help with hauling wood during the winter," Gallegos said. "He gave me shots of whiskey to keep me warm."

What Gallegos did not know was that his father was a functioning alcoholic, the kind who don't show signs of being addicted because they don't drink to get drunk — they drink to stay stable on the job.

"A functioning alcoholic could be the lawyer with liquor on his desk, a priest, a laborer who is allowed to drive a truck, you just never know," Gallegos said.

When Gallegos was 11 years old, his father died in a V.A. hospital. The next year Gallegos dropped out of school to work and help support his family. When he was 16, he joined the Army, where his drinking continued. After leaving the Army, Gallegos worked in a civil service job and began drinking more and more.

"I was drinking beer at first," he said. "Then I started drinking whiskey and finally ended up drinking cheap wine."

Gallegos spent 18 years in civil service as a functioning alcoholic, but the addiction was taking its toll.

"I was having seizures and had several DWI arrests before they finally fired me," Gallegos said. "It was in 1973 that an Alamogordo judge sentenced me to a year in jail on a DWI."

Gallegos said the sentence saved his life. The judge offered him the option to enter an in-patient treatment facility and he accepted.

Entering the V.A. Hospital at Ft. Lyons, Colo., Gallegos discovered the hospital had a federally funded pilot program designed to train recovering alcoholics.

"The program was started to try to motivate people who were addicted to alcohol or drugs to become substance abuse counselors," Gallegos said.

The time spent in jail, coupled with the treatment, gave Gallegos time to re-evaluate his life and priorities.

"Ft. Lyons was also a mental health facility and seeing those patients snapped me back to reality," he said. "I thought about where I was headed and decided to become a counselor."

After Gallegos graduated from the college-level counseling program, he began a career that would span 20 years. His occupation eventually led him to become the first alcohol abuse counselor in Ruidoso. He worked at The Counseling Center until his retirement this year.

Gallegos observed that, because drinking is socially accepted, it is easy for people to become dependent on alcohol.

"People develop a tolerance to alcohol and it's a small step from social drinking to abuse," he said.

Once a person is addicted mentally and physically, they will require a lot of treatment, Gallegos said.

"For people in a chronic stage of alcoholism, 98% of those type of people require both in-patient and out-patient treatment," he said.

Treatment removes the alcoholic from influences enabling them to drink, Gallegos said.

"If you are an alcoholic and you are around people at work who are always inviting you out for a beer or a martini after work, that kind of temptation needs to be removed," he said.

The signs of alcoholism can include loss of motivation, financial problems caused by spending money on alcohol, black-outs, memory loss, shakes, and even hangovers, Gallegos said.

"The liver can only process one ounce of alcohol an hour," he said. "If you are drinking more, your liver can't handle it and you end up with a hangover, or liver damage if it's over a period of time."

"Alcoholism has no respect for race or age," Gallegos noted. Patients coming to The Counseling Center are evenly spread with regard to ethnic background.

"The center sees just about an even mix of Hispanics, Indians, and whites," he said.

The Counseling Center is federally funded and operates on a sliding scale payment basis. It can provide services for alcohol and mental health problems, but refers drug abuse cases to Zia treatment center in Alamogordo.

The center has a 24-hour hotline people can call collect, 1-505-8680. The number during normal working hours is 257-5038.

Middle-of-the-night calls were common occurrences for Gallegos. Through the years, he helped many people who were threatening suicide or were suffering.

"Once in awhile I meet them in the store or around town, and they will be with their families and they will come up to me and say, 'Thank you,'" Gallegos related. "That always makes me feel great."

Gallegos related a humorous situation about a woman who called him asking for immediate in-patient treatment.

"It was the middle of the night in the dead of winter, and a lady called wanting to go into the detox hospital in Albuquerque," he said. "Because it was a woman, I had to have another woman with me, so I conned my wife Eleanor into going with us."

"Because the facility was first come first serve, by the time we ar-

rived there were no beds left and we ended up driving around in the snow with this woman begging us to stop at a bar so she could get a drink," Gallegos recalled.

Stopping was not an option for Gallegos, and the woman eventually received the help she needed.

From a life of chronic alcoholism to a life of helping others deal with their problems, Gallegos says he has much to celebrate.

"One of the things that makes my life so positive all the way is that I know alcoholism is treatable," he said. "By being a living example, I keep my life happy."

Gallegos will face a different kind of trial soon. He will undergo surgery for a heart problem within the next six months, and afterwards will probably move from Ruidoso to a town at a lower elevation.

For a man who has helped so many over the years, it's a sure bet that many prayers and best wishes will go with him.

Big Brothers, Sisters offer helping hand

She may not wear a cape or costume, but in her own way, Mary Allen is a crusader against crime and for children.

Moving to Alto from Houston in July, Allen was concerned about the local juvenile crime statistics and decided to establish a Lincoln County Big Brothers/Big Sisters agency.

"There is a lot of concern and talk about the increase in juvenile crime in our area," Allen said.

Allen is convinced that juvenile crime numbers will decrease with the initiation of a Big Brothers/Big Sisters program.

"We are now in the planning stages of working and taking the names of volunteers," she said. "We already have 28 people who are interested in participating."

Eastern New Mexico University in Ruidoso will initially be home to the local office for Big Brothers/Big

Sisters of Lincoln County, Allen said.

Big Brothers/Big Sisters primarily serves single-parent children ages 6 to 17 who are experiencing adjustment problems or loneliness, Allen said.

The volunteers serve as role models and mentors to their school aged little brothers and little sisters, she said.

Nearly five million children in the United States are growing up without adequate adult support, say the group's officials.

School records give a picture of the need in the Lincoln County area for the Big Brothers/Big Sister service. Students from single parent families make up 50% of the students in Ruidoso schools; Carrizozo has 17%, Hondo, 34%, Corona, 14% and Capitan schools 23%.

Joseph Rendon, a worker with the Children, Youth and Families Department in Ruidoso, can testify

to the effectiveness of Big Brothers/Big Sisters. Rendon, who moved to Ruidoso from San Antonio in January, said he had a Big Brother at a crucial time in his life.

"I was eleven years old and we were living in San Antonio when my father passed away," Rendon said.

"My mother got me into the program. My Big Brother was stationed at Kelley Air Force Base and during the two years that he was there, we would go fishing and he would take me on the base to watch the planes; stuff like that."

"Because he was a guy, I was able to tell him things I just couldn't tell my mother."

"It helped me a lot and I'll never forget him," Rendon said.

Rendon said that his Big Brother influenced him strongly, even to his eventual choice of vocation working with the Children, Youth and Families Department.

"I plan on being a Big Brother

once the program is started," he said.

Big Brothers and Big Sisters must be at least 18 years old.

"He or she must be willing and able to see the Little Brother or Little Sister about once a week, and make a commitment to the program of at least one year. The volunteer needs no special qualifications or experience, since he or she is not a counselor or a substitute parent, but rather a very special friend. This special relationship involves listening, understanding and acceptance," says the group's bulletin.

The program helps children develop a better self-concept and confidence, say Big Brother/Big Sister officials.

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Legislators seek to compensate White Sands ranchers

Three members of the New Mexico congressional delegation introduced legislation Feb. 2 to establish a commission to compensate people who lost their ranches or mining claims in 1942 when the White Sands Missile Range was created.

The White Sands Fair Compensation Act of 1995 was introduced in the Senate by Senator Pete Domenici and in the House of Representatives by Congressman Joe Skeen. Senator Jeff Bingaman is an original co-sponsor of the Senate bill, while representatives Bill Richardson and Steve Schiff co-sponsored the House measure.

The bill would establish a nine-member White Sands Fair Compensation Commission appointed by the Secretary of Defense to provide compensation to people who lost their ranches or mining claims to the government when WSMR was created.

The commission would evaluate the history surrounding this issue, and evaluate claims submitted by owners (or their heirs) who relinquished their property. The bill would authorize the appropriation of funds to pay outstanding claims.

"The plight of the White Sands ranchers has meant the difference between raising cattle and sheep as pets or as food," Domenici said. "This bill is an attempt to force the federal government to make good on the agreement it makes when it leases public lands. There are good reasons to compensate the White Sands ranchers for the value of their ranches, including the federal lands that once made up their pre-World War II holdings."

Skeen added, "The time is long overdue for the federal government to completely compensate these New Mexicans who gave up their lands, their livelihood, and their

homes to the government more than half a century ago. This is an important piece of unfinished business that the United States must take care of, as we commemorate the 50th anniversary of World War II."

"By giving up their lands, these New Mexico ranchers and miners made a significant contribution to the U.S. effort to win World War II and to our national defense program," Bingaman, a member of the Armed Services Committee, said. "We will continue to support this measure to provide fair compensation for their assistance."

In 1975, the ranchers and miners, who gave up their claims to the public lands that went into creating the White Sands Missile Range during World War II, were paid only for their private land holdings and not the total unit value of their ranch holdings, which includes leased public lands. Ranchers have said this method of compensation is inconsistent with established policies by the Internal Revenue Service, which taxes them on the basis of their total ranch value.

This bill is the third attempt since 1984 by members of the delegation to get compensation for those New Mexicans.

During World War II, President Franklin Roosevelt issued an Executive Order temporarily withdrawing public lands in south-central New Mexico for a bombing range, thus suspending the property from laws regarding grazing, mining and general use.

After World War II, the government kept the ranches for use in testing and developing missiles. In 1975, the government declared a permanent possession of the lands for WSMR.


In those days the people of Alaska felt very close to "the States" and made much of all special days of the year.

Transport of school lunches risks poison, expert says

Students eating lunch at Sierra Vista Primary School in Ruidoso run the risk of food poisoning because food is transported from an outside location.

Fifty-two pupils attending Puckett Elementary School in Carlsbad on March 17, 1993 began showing signs of food poisoning after eating lunch. The food, prepared and transported from Alta Vista Middle School, was discovered to be the source of a gastrointestinal illness called *Staphylococcus aureus*, says a State of New Mexico Department of Health memo. Students began showing signs of the illness, characterized by nausea, vomiting and abdominal cramping, three to four hours after eating taco meat served that day for lunch. One student required hospitalization.

Since the incident, the Carlsbad school district has stopped the practice of preparing and shipping food from one school location to another, said Barry Birch, an environmentalist with the Carlsbad Environment Department.

"What we preach is that the safest way to provide food is to cook it and serve it on site," Birch said. "63% of all food borne diseases can be traced to improper cooling down and reheating procedures."

Because of their young age, students at Sierra Vista Primary School run a higher risk than others of suffering serious symptoms, said Carl Stubbs, with the Ruidoso Environment Department.

Food is delivered to the primary school from Nob Hill Early Childhood Center, five miles away, even though White Mountain Intermediate School is located next door.

"If we tried to use the White Mountain kitchen they would be serving lunch at 3 o'clock," Mike Gladden, Ruidoso superintendent of schools, explained. "It's not set up to take care of that kind of volume."

Stubbs said the Nob Hill kitchen staff must observe strict time and temperature regulations on food preparation.

"We look at when the food was prepared, the temperatures, the procedures and the serving temperatures," Stubbs said.

Cafeteria manager Mell Jaramillo said that all kitchen personnel are food service certified. Logs are kept with records of food temperatures, time leaving the kitchen and time of arrival at Sierra Vista Primary. She said there was a 15-minute transportation time for the food.

Special food service hot and cold

warmers are used to insure that the food remains at the proper temperatures, but Birch says the danger remains.

"All I know is that the Carlsbad school district recognized that having a satellite location preparing the food increased the danger of food poisoning and that was why they stopped the procedure," he said.

Carlsbad had also been observing the temperature and time regulations, but something went wrong.

"We're devastated that in following those procedures, that we introduced the bacteria," said Tom Ford, district program manager at the state Environment Department in Carlsbad.

Sierra Vista Primary is the newest school in the Ruidoso district, and students began attending classes for the first time this year.

Gladden explained why a kitchen was not included in the initial plan for the primary school.

"A kitchen is a real high dollar item and instead we went for additional classrooms and the multi-purpose room. We got everything we possibly could."

"The next time that we have a bond issue and can ask the voters, adding a kitchen will be a high priority," Gladden said.

Poop Scoop

Last week, the focus was on preventing a cat from breeding, but when the advice comes too late, Jim Riggins offered a few hints for proper care.

Riggins, who is manager of the Lincoln County Humane Society, said a pregnant cat, or queen, normally can care for herself when she is properly fed and protected. But sometimes, human intervention is essential.

The queen will behave normally until the final week of her pregnancy, which is about 60 days after conception.

"In the final week, the stomach will drop dramatically and she will seem restless and appear to be searching for something," Riggins said. "She is. This is when she should be introduced to a maternity box. A paper lined cardboard box in a quiet out-of-the-way place is ideal. Cut an entry slot in the front of the box, but leave a four-inch lip to prevent kittens from escaping."

The onset of labor will bring a vaginal discharge and the queen should be shown and placed in the box. She may not stay, but may walk around between contractions, he said. Hard labor and the birth of the first kitten should come no more than one hour after the queen's water breaks.

According to local veterinarians, waiting too long for veterinary intervention at this point is the most common source of trouble for bir-

thing cats.

"There should be no more than two hours between the birth of kittens," Riggins said. "If the queen seems listless and ill an hour after the last kitten, chances are there still are some unborn kittens in the mother and a vet should be consulted immediately."

"Kittens are born in a protective membrane and are joined to the placenta by an umbilical cord. The mother should remove the cord and membranes and vigorously lick the kittens to stimulate their body functions. If she does not, it is up to the owner to remove the membranes, cut the cord about an inch from the body and vigorously rub the kitten with a towel to stimulate respiration."

If the kitten does not breathe, Riggins said to hold it gently in your palms as you would a pistol, making sure not to block the nostrils, then swing the kitten overhead and down a few times to free the airways of mucus or blockage.

After birth, the mother and kittens should be left alone for a few days. The mother may not have much of an appetite right away, but should be given all the food that she craves to eat.

Do not clean the maternity box at first. After a few days, the mother will welcome the house cleaning.

New kittens should begin on semi-solid food at four weeks and standard diets between six to eight

weeks, Riggins said. This is also when they should see their vet for initial check up and vaccinations.

County subdivision road charges aren't such a bad deal

This week's county commissioner hearing concerning an increase in subdivision road maintenance assessments drew quite a large crowd. Most of the people didn't like the increase.

When you look at the fact that subdivision roads make up 13% of the county road miles yet use up 49% of the road budget, it seems fair that subdivision residents should pay more than the rest of the county's residents. We all may use county roads, but town residents use them much less frequently, and no one uses the subdivision roads except subdivision residents, their visitors and lost tourists.

Subdivision residents currently pay anywhere from \$6 to \$300 in extra taxes due to the assessment; this will double to \$12-\$600. It's likely they'd pay much more if they had private roads and hired someone to plow them, grade them and sometimes chip and seal them.

The problem may lie in the way the assessment is charged. Subdivision residents pay according to the number of linear feet they have along the road; thus, the \$12 to \$600 variance. While they would pay according to these feet if they used private contractors, in the big picture, the amount of roadside property doesn't correspond to the road usage.

However, residents who don't like this assessment method need to talk to their state representative about introducing a bill to change things, not the county commissioners. The county is simply following state law.

What residents can say to the county (and a few did this week) is that they don't want all that extra maintenance on their roads, such as mowing. While there would still be a certain amount of extra maintenance due to the higher usage, the assessment might increase at a slower rate in this situation.

Even without this extra care, the new doubling of rates is reasonable considering the large county subsidy the road department needs.

To make sure the rates are justified for each subdivision, the county has promised to review the amount of maintenance each subdivision receives. Although state law says the rates can't vary from one subdivision to another, the county's review may weed out some that really don't get any extra maintenance.

Overall, subdivision residents get a pretty good deal for the amount of money they pay for road maintenance, especially with the management improvements instilled by county road manager Bill Cupit. They should be aware that many counties across the West, strapped for money and facing more and more subdivision developments, now refuse to accept subdivision roads into the county road system. In this county, if subdivision builders follow the rules, the county will accept ownership and take care of it in perpetuity. If the residents don't like the rules, they can always ask to take back ownership of their roads.

The reservations didn't start its 24-hour gambling, etc., until after the track had closed for the season. Right now the gambling might be a big draw — but I believe when the track opens this spring a lot of people will be bored with the casino by then.

I, for one, am an avid horse racing fan and to me, casino gambling is BORING. I have lived here for five years and I've been to the Inn a total of three times, but I've gone to the track at every opportunity and every day when I'm not working.

There isn't anything that can beat the excitement of watching the gates slam open and your favorite horses thundering towards the finish line. I don't go to the sports theater much because I'd rather watch the horses live and in the flesh. I wish we had more live racing days — Ruidoso could easily stay open March through November, and with the mild winters we've had the past few years, year-round racing. (I know the dates are regulated by the state agencies and not the tracks themselves, but it's another angle to look at.)

And why not utilize the grounds in the off season? Put a sportsman park in the center of the track — soccer fields, baseball diamonds, a horse show ring, a rodeo roping arena — similar to Billito in Tucson, Ariz. Or maybe a smaller training track and allow the horsemen to rent or lease barns and train here year-round.

I feel that the summer people will come to the track during the live racing and then go home or to their hotel/motel rooms, clean up, go to dinner and then maybe go to the casino and the clubs around town.

The avid track goers who have been coming here for 50 years (be-

fore gambling) to attend the races in the cool pines of Ruidoso are going to continue coming in spite of the gambling.

What's hurting New Mexico's racing industry the most is the new racetracks being opened in Texas and Oklahoma, and a lot of the Texas and Oklahoma trainers are staying home and racing instead of traveling so far from home. Maybe if New Mexico would "sweeten the pot" in the more prestigious races it would draw the out-of-state trainers and owners back to New Mexico.

Reservation isn't sovereign nation

The governing body of the reservation may say that they are sovereign and want nuclear waste, but it is our land that they have to haul the waste across. It is also, along with theirs, our lives and livelihood, should there be an accident.

Think about it. What means of transportation is there that has not had some serious accidents? Whether it be by air, road or train; there will be an accident sometime. To say there will not be, is to say Highway 70 is not dangerous.

The American Indians as a people have always been thought of as great respecters of nature and guardians of nature's well being. The residents of Mescalero have truly come through this time to save the land and water of our state. Let's hope they keep up the fight and maybe the danger of being exposed to nuclear waste will pass.

But people, we need to start raising our voices now to the state and U.S. elected officials. Let your voices be heard; for the people who generate this waste should keep this waste at the site and not transport it in any way to anywhere. For example, recently the majority of New Mexico citizens voted for gambling and a state lottery. Opponents looked for a loophole and asked the State Supreme Court for assistance. The supreme court decided that the citizens of this state were not intelligent enough to understand what they were voting for, if there were more than one thing on a ballot. They basically invalidated the majority voice.

Now our governor will sign compacts providing gaming monopolies to Native Americans. Unregulated gambling monopolies for Native Americans would certainly come at the expense of existing gambling such as the horse racing industry. In some communities in this state, the horse racing industry is directly

tied to the tourism industry, so a loss for the racing industry would be a loss for hotels, restaurants, retailers, etc. (Native American monopolies are not what we voted for and would not provide enough revenue to the state, to compensate for revenue lost from the economic damage this will do to existing businesses, not to mention state revenue losses brought about by the corresponding increase in unemployment).

Also, proposed cuts to next year's federal budget will greatly decrease grant funding to the state of New Mexico (which would result in a state income tax increase to offset the loss of revenue to the state, even though we voted for a state lottery in order to avoid income tax increases).

Our "public servants" have made unauthorized decisions which will ultimately cost us a lot of money. There are many words to describe what they have done, that would apply, were they in any field or industry other than politics. You can't fight "city hall" (or in this case, the roundhouse), or can you? Our state government is violating our constitutional rights, so why don't we (all New Mexico citizens) file a suit against the state government, to remove from office any public servant not serving our interests and to recover the actual monetary damages that will result from their actions?!



"Siamese Twins"

Dao and Duan are literally Siamese twins, for the land where they were born — joined at the pelvis with only three legs between them — is Thailand, formerly called Siam.

The orphan girls were sent to America in April 1993 to be evaluated at The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, where a surgical team led by Dr. James O'Neill has performed more than a dozen successful separations of Siamese twins (also called conjoined twins). Conjoined twins occur when a single fertilized egg divides imperfectly. Complete division would have produced identical twins.

Nova follows the saga of checkups, conferences, CAT scans, and protracted surgeries that attempted to turn the inseparable duo into distinct individuals in "Siamese Twins." Nova embarked on the risky project as the patients and the doctors themselves did — totally unsure of the outcome.

THE TREE OF IRON

The Tree of Iron, a one-hour documentary, presents convincing evidence that complex technologies needed for iron smelting existed in Africa far earlier than previously expected.

When Europeans first explored the interior of East Africa, at the end of the nineteenth century, they found a thriving iron technology already in place, with thousands of furnaces built of burnt earth and mud. Legends told of the origins of iron making and rituals attested to its importance. But

Not yet three years old when they came to the United States, Dao and Duan were typical toddlers, except that where one went the other had to follow. Duan was the stronger and more assertive of the pair and seemed destined to thrive at the expense of her much weaker sister. Though each twin had full control of one leg, Duan had dominant use of the shared third leg.

Though some twin separations are relatively straightforward, Dao and Duan's case posed special problems. In addition to sharing the pelvis and the third leg, tests showed that the girls' spines and lower colons were fused and that each twin had just one kidney, which shared a single bladder.

"Siamese Twins" will be broadcast Tuesday, February 14th at 7:00 p.m. This episode repeats Saturday, February 18th at 9:00 p.m. and Sunday, February 19th at 12:00 midnight on KENW-TV.

The furnaces were small and looked primitive to western eyes, and so stories about ancient iron making were seen as fanciful folk tales.

During the last decade, clues from oral testimony, archaeological evidence, and the recreation of a traditional iron furnace have enabled anthropologist Peter Schmidt to challenge the notion that African technology was primitive and inefficient.

The Tree of Iron will be broadcast Sunday, February 19th at 6:00 a.m.
