

Attempted murder case settled

Sabrina Wilson, 24, pleaded guilty but mentally ill Monday to attempting to murder her ex-boyfriend in 1993, assistant district attorney Viola Rhodes said.

With her plea, Wilson admitted to forcibly entering Joseph Garcia's Glade Drive bedroom in Ruidoso which he shared with his two young children and holding a cocked pistol up towards him as he slept.

Garcia woke and was able to disarm her, but in the process the gun discharged and sent a bullet through the wall, police said. No one was injured.

Police explained that Wilson and Garcia had been living together for about two months, but had ceased cohabitating for approximately six months before the attempted murder. They did maintain telephone contact, however.

A jury trial had been scheduled for this week, but Wilson and public defender Gary Mitchell plea bargained on Monday. She was sentenced by District Court Judge Frank Wilson to six years in prison for the first-degree felony charge of attempted murder, and six years for aggravated burglary, a second-degree felony. Eight years of the total 12-year sentence were suspended.

Jeffers shooting death ruled suicide

The death of 20-year-old Chad Jeffers March 8 has been ruled a suicide by the medical investigator.

Initially, Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane said it appeared Jeffers died in an accidental shooting at his family's ranch near Carrizozo.

Medical Investigator Danny Sisson said that, based on the results of an autopsy and interviews, he ruled the death a suicide.

"This involved a contact wound (to Jeffers' temple). The barrel was touching the wound," Sisson said. Jeffers, his brother and a friend "were sitting there talking about suicide. He unloaded the gun, except for one shell, dropped (the other shells) on the table and then knocked them to the floor. When his brother reached over to retrieve them, he fired."

State-funded projects in Lincoln County dwindle

In contrast to the bounty of last year when the New Mexico Legislature was playing with a \$300 million surplus, state pickings were slim for Lincoln County this year.

"Every time I turned around up there, Lincoln County was catching it for some reason or other," said Tony Elias, executive director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District.

In all, Lincoln County governments received a maximum of \$555,000 this year, compared to \$1.93 million last year and \$645,000 in 1993.

The governments could receive much less than \$555,000, however, since Gov. Johnson has until April 7 to approve the expenditures and he has shown he is not adverse to line item vetoes.

The Lincoln County Commis-

sion, which had asked for \$125,000, received zero dollars for improvements at the county fairgrounds in Capitan. A request for \$500,000 as the first phase of improvements at the county rural events center in Glencoe was denied, too.

The county technically got money for one project, the Corona senior center, since it owns the senior center.

The town of Capitan didn't fare well at all. On top of the denial for money for the fairgrounds, the Village of Capitan requested money for two projects and received nothing.

And the Legislature approved \$24,700 for computers after the Capitan School Board requested \$100,000 — but the governor vetoed that.

The Ruidoso School District lost second-year funding of \$74,200 for an alternative program for disrup-

tive students.

"We will continue to keep the program in operation," said Ruidoso Schools Superintendent Mike Gladden, although "We're disappointed that he saw to cut the request."

County Manager Carol Cooney said she kept being told by legislators that the county still hadn't used up its full capability for levying gross receipts tax or for bonding.

"That's the 'help yourself first' philosophy, but Ruidoso is taxed to the maximum and it didn't fare too well, either," Cooney said.

After receiving a pittance of what it requested for wastewater system improvements (at the most), the Village of Ruidoso faces Environmental Protection Agency fines because too much groundwater filters into its wastewater

Racetrack officials turn attention to 1995 season

The fate of the Ruidoso Downs Racetrack is left to question following the failure of racetrack video gambling legislation.

So is the future of track employees, the presence of the Museum of the Horse and construction plans for the Resort at Sierra Blanca hotel.

Since the end of the state legislative session Saturday, track officials have turned their attention to promoting a superior racing season, said track manager Scott Wells.

Wells spoke with track owner R.D. Hubbard after the session closed. Hubbard could not be reached by *The Ruidoso News* Wednesday for comment.

"His (Hubbard's) instructions to me were to focus on running the races, and that we would very carefully and deliberately re-assess our position. We're focusing on the future," Wells said.

Asked whether or not layoffs of the 500 track employees has been discussed, Wells said "not at this time," and added, "We have a core group of employees whose enthusiasm for the coming season is just like mine."

Wells did not know if the track would be open next spring, however. Hubbard said in late February he would be forced to close the track this year or next if the legislature did not approve casino gambling for the tracks.

"As far as I know, a decision has not been finalized," Wells said Wednesday.

Hubbard's prediction was based on the loss of \$2.8 million at the track over the past two years, a loss he attributed to the advent of video machine gambling on the nearby Mescalero Apache reservation. With Gov. Gary Johnson's sanctioning of full casino gambling in Indian compacts, track officials pre-

dict a further decline in track betting.

Hubbard and his wife Joan Dale also said that, with a closed track, they would have no choice but to pull their investments from the Ruidoso area. These interests include the Museum of the Horse and plans for a \$15 million resort hotel.

Based on those announcements, which have yet to be amended, the future of the hotel looks rather grim. As noted by Jon Sherry, the local director of resort development for Hubbard Enterprises, "I don't know — I guess that if there's no track and no museum, then there's no hotel either because there will be no tourists."

Sherry said he is waiting for a meeting with Hubbard to assess the feasibility of the resort hotel plans.

Jay Wright, Museum of the Horse director, said his operations

Fort Stanton ends 100-year history Friday

All of the patients are gone and on Friday, most of the staff of Fort Stanton Hospital will be gone, too, ending its 100-year history as a medical center.

All but 26 employees were notified about two weeks ago that their last day on the job is Friday. For the past two months, they have been preparing to comply with Gov. Gary Johnson's decision to close the fort as a center for developmentally disabled clients and long-term care patients.

Eleven employees will stay with the maintenance crew under a contract signed Monday with the General Services Department's property control division, Hospital Administrator Ervin Aldaz said.

"A lot of people were concerned," Aldaz said. "Me especially, because this is home. Even though I won't be here, I'm very concerned that things be taken care of."

Aldaz will be among those leaving. A fourth generation employee, he's been at the helm nearly 20 years.

"I'll be working in the central office at Santa Fe in the new quality assurance division," Aldaz said Tuesday. "I'll spend three-fourths of my time there and one-fourth at the fort helping to close the place down."

He doesn't plan to move his family.

"I live on my family's 1870 homestead and I'll never sell that,"

he said. "We love the school system and my wife has a good job there."

At age 43, he's only four years away from state retirement.

Efforts continue

Lincoln County Commissioners and other local elected officials have been invited to attend a meeting Monday at the fort to discuss its future.

State Sen. Pete Campos (D-Santa Rosa) said just because the New Mexico Legislature has adjourned, doesn't mean efforts to find a new use for the fort will stop.

Five bills proposing studies of possible uses or actual conversion for the fort all bogged down in the appropriation committees of the House and Senate.

Just as the governor put the fort on the fast track for closing, Campos is working with several of the state cabinet secretaries to fast track Fort Stanton into the hands of a private company or public agency "so that we can reopen the facility as soon as possible," he said.

"We will stay in close communication with the various state departments and put together a request for proposals (RFP) and see if we can't get someone into the facility within six months," Campos said. "This was the agreement toward the end of the session as we saw that the government and different departments did not want to assume the responsibility for the

Ski Apache to close April 9

Despite a successful spring break week, Ski Apache will close for the season April 9, said general manager Roy Parker.

"That's the plan at this point. It doesn't behoove us to stay open through Easter weekend," Parker said.

He cited the combined effect of the Mexican peso's devaluation and the late Easter holiday. Easter weekend is two weeks later this year than it was in 1994.

"We've not seen many Mexicans since January," Parker said, adding that the drop in the peso's value is more serious than people realize. Since Dec. 20, 1994, the peso has lost nearly 50% of its value.

Ski Apache marketing manager Riker Davis estimated that, in the past, 60-70% of the skiers in town for Holy Week and the Easter holiday usually hailed from Mexico.

"We expect it to be pretty quiet the last week of March and the first week of April," Davis said.

Spring break business remained brisk this week, even though the peak week is past. The total num-

ber of skiers topped 33,500 for the nine-day period from Saturday, March 11 to Sunday, March 19, Parker said.

As has been the trend this year for holidays, the numbers for spring break were better than last year, but not as good as two years ago. During the 1992-1993 season when the mountain received a comparable snowfall, 38,000 skiers hit the slopes during spring break week.

"We're not displeased at all," Parker said of this year's spring break numbers.

As the season winds down, the snow base has stayed above 50 inches despite warmer temperatures in the day and no new snow since March 11.

Parker did downgrade the skiing conditions from "excellent" to "good" earlier in the week. Some of the lower trails and novice areas are showing the wear and tear from the high traffic of the busy spring break week.

"The base is solid from the snow and rain mix we had in November," Parker said. "The key is the cold nights — as long as it's below freezing (at night), it's OK."

system. The village has no bonding capacity left to fix the problem itself.

State Sen. Pete Campos (D-Santa Rosa) said he tried to balance the number of projects each of the four counties in his district received, but it's a matter of political punch and Lincoln County just didn't have it this year.

"I didn't feel very good about how Lincoln County fared," he said. "But San Miguel County has three representatives and three senators, one with 23 years experience, a total of six representatives. Lincoln, DeBaca and Guadalupe counties each have one representative and one senator."

The possible final dollars show the difference (although Gov. Gary Johnson has two more weeks to veto or approve the expenditures).

San Miguel County is waiting to hear about \$3,996,000 in projects approved by the Legislature, including \$2 million for a pool in Las Vegas. The governor already approved another \$550,000. Three projects totaling \$75,000 were vetoed.

That compares to \$250,000 for three projects in DeBaca waiting to pass the governor; \$490,000 in Guadalupe County (another

\$100,000 for hospital planning was vetoed); and \$550,000 for six projects in Lincoln. The governor vetoed three projects in Lincoln County totalling \$148,900 and closed Fort Stanton Hospital, which employed more than 200 people.

Approximately \$214 million in state funds were available for local government projects this year, compared to the \$300-320 million last year. The state could make up to \$100 million more available this year by selling severance tax bonds, although that total amount is unlikely. Prisons promised by Gov. Johnson will be funded out of the \$214-314 million, too.

This wasn't a good session to be a freshman, Campos added, referring to State Rep. Dub Williams (R-Glencoe), elected last November.

"I believe he made every effort. I've had no chance to talk to him since the session was over, but seniority and experience really made a difference," Campos said.

Nuclear protection

The Legislature allowed a bill submitted by State Sen. Tom Rutherford (D-Albuquerque) that proposed state oversight of nuclear waste to die in committee.

The bill was introduced to give the state some control over the proposed transportation of highly

radioactive spent nuclear fuel to a temporary storage site on the Mesquero Apache reservation.

"People were saying they didn't want to be involved in monitoring a nuclear facility or extending state powers to that extent," Campos said. "So it was partly the (Indian) sovereignty issue."

Although the legislative session ended Saturday, the nuclear issue, Fort Stanton and gambling for racetracks won't disappear, he said.

A special session of the Legislature may be called, Campos said.

"My feeling right now is that we look to see within the next month what issues are affecting us," he said. "The gaming issue still is one that's very significant, so there could be a need for a special session."

A bill that would have provided video gambling at racetracks died on the House floor as time ran out Saturday in the regular session.

"Whether we can get all parties to agree to that I don't know," Campos said. "What we're doing now is evaluating the significant issues to see whether we can combine several for a special session. Usually a special session is called for one issue, but if there are two or three significant matters that would be devastating to New Mexico or have a significant economic effect to the area, we'll find a way to address them."

Fifth day tally

On the fifth day since the session closed, Lincoln County and its municipalities were still in the running for six projects.

The projects and dollar figures are:

- \$180,000 for wastewater (sewage treatment) system improvements in Ruidoso (\$1.2 million requested);

- \$180,000 for water system improvements in Ruidoso Downs (\$220,600 requested);

- \$70,000 to construct and equip a police and court complex in Carrizozo (\$100,000 requested);

- \$65,000 for improvements to the Corona Senior Citizens Center operated by the county (\$83,400 requested);

- \$50,000 for a Corona Municipal School activity bus;
- and \$10,000 for street improvements in Corona.

Ruidoso Village Attorney John Underwood said Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs could each receive another \$100,000 for their water treatment projects, if the governor approves the sale of state severance tax bonds.

Other requests from governments in Lincoln County that were denied any funds included:

- \$200,000 for village hall additions and \$500,000 for water storage improvements in Capitán

- \$250,000 for golf course improvements and \$250,000 for a new fire truck in Carrizozo

- \$7,773,000 for a recreation center in Ruidoso

Correction

Actually, the Legislature approved \$180,000 for Ruidoso Downs wastewater system improvements, and \$180,000 for Ruidoso wastewater system improvements.

Lincoln sidewalk funding removed

Don't plan to stroll on new sidewalks in the historic settlement of Lincoln, at least for another year.

In the last moments of the legislative session Saturday, members of the House swooped down on \$50,000 appropriated for the sidewalks in 1994 and transferred the money instead into a street paving project in the Santa Fe district of House Appropriations Committee Chairman Ben Lujan, a Democrat.

"It's not punishment," said Tony Elias, executive director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District. "It looks that way, because (Lincoln County) had such bad luck. Not only didn't it get anything (money from the Legislature), they started taking stuff away."

This isn't the first time the Legislature has by-passed the sidewalk project because of a mix-up.

In 1993, the Legislature put aside the money for the sidewalks in the settlement of Lincoln, but in retying the bill, someone thought it referred to the County of Lincoln. By the time the bill emerged as law, the money was headed to the town of Carrizozo as the county seat of Lincoln.

Carrizozo town officials gratefully accepted the money and found a use for it — improving the sidewalks.

The \$50,000 was again allocated for the Lincoln sidewalk project in 1994, but by the end of 1994 nothing had yet been spent, even though an architect had been working on a design, Elias said.

"I got a copy of the bill (taking the money away) Saturday. It's

nothing unusual. They do it fairly often," Elias said. The bill takes unspent money for new projects and extends spending periods for some other projects.

"They look at the Department of Finance and Administration budget report, see that money was appropriated in 1994 and zero was expended. They say, 'Let's take and spend it or the balance for something else,'" explained Elias, who monitors legislative issues for Lincoln County and other southeastern New Mexico counties. His agency also is coordinating the sidewalk project.

Because both the Santa Fe paving and Lincoln sidewalk projects fall under the state Department of Highways and Transportation, his agency is going to submit the bills for the sidewalk design to the highway department and hope to pay for it with other available state money, he said.

"At least, we should be able to get the design done and then we can go back and fight for more money next year," Elias said.

Lincoln County Commissioner L. Ray Nunley, who has championed the sidewalk project, said he's angry.

"Without checking, the money was taken and given to a project in the Santa Fe district of the chairman of appropriation committee," Nunley said. "I'm very disappointed and fairly angry that they would take it without asking, since we've been working on the project for over a year and actively for four months. We have an architect who is 50% complete on the work and the money just vanished."

"According to Tony (Elias), nothing can be done. The money is gone. Be assured, they will hear about it next year."

Last few minutes of '95 session tense

The last moments of the 1995 legislative session — when a racetrack gambling bill was on the verge of approval — was a bit like watching a marathon.

But the runner — in this case House Bill 1090 — was tripped before reaching the high noon deadline.

"That ended gambling in New Mexico (apart from the tribal casinos and a lottery) in this session," said Rep. Dub Williams (R-Glencoe), who sponsored the original bill.

The "oldest freshman legislator" described his first session at the capitol yesterday as an "exciting, educational, rewarding, frustrating, disappointing, successful and worthwhile experience."

The last hours of the session were more on the frustrating and disappointing end. Williams recalls thinking the racetrack and fraternal organization lobbyists "were ready to jump out of the gallery" when the clock struck 12 Saturday.

Jon Sherry, director of resort development for R.D. Hubbard Enterprises, was among those in the gallery.

"The whole gallery — the fraternal and race horse men, the breeders and farmers — all watched the clock in utter disbelief," Sherry recalled Wednesday. "We had the votes. We were very close to a photo finish." House Speaker Ray Sanchez (D-Albuquerque) "held the bill, kept looking at the clock, and waited 'till seconds before 12 to introduce it."

Sherry, racetrack lobbyist John Hauschild and others had versed those on the floor about what the bill contained while it

was being drafted by the Legislative Council. The bill was on Sanchez's desk about an hour before the session ended, Sherry said.

The failure of HB1090 tells a "tragic side" of the legislative game, Williams said.

Williams said that after the bill passed 37-31 in the House, a couple of days before the session's close, it was sent to the Senate for confirmation.

"They put almost as many amendments on it as our original bill," he said of the senators' Friday changes.

Thereafter, the House voted down the amended bill. It was later combined with another bill, to allow video gaming at clubs alongside the tracks and reduce conflicts between the two bills.

The Senate approved that version by a vote of 27-10 around noon Saturday, then adjourned.

But in the House, because several legislators indicated they wanted to debate the bill, there wasn't time to vote.

The House then tried to debate a bill on off-track wagering, but too much debate erupted over that, too. Sanchez moved to adjourn.

"Folks in the gallery were hanging off the chandeliers waiting for a vote that never came," Williams said.

HB1090 was an excellent bill, Williams contended, but because gambling "is something that will change the course of New Mexico," the final 25-30 page bill did require time to study.

"There's a lot of folks up there who are opposed to gambling — period," Williams added — and he was only one of 112 legislators who had an opinion on the matter.

Ruidoso, Downs spring clean-up week of April 24

Gather old yard junk, unwanted appliances and other clutter. Spring clean-up is set for the last week in April.

Representatives from Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs agreed Monday to schedule the annual cleanup for the week of April 24.

Roll-off containers, able to accept non-commercial waste of all types, will be stationed around the two villages, said Joe Lewandowski, manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

The coalition of the county and its five municipalities is responsible for the collection and disposal of garbage and trash in the county.

A few members at the meeting Monday reported dumpsters needing repair or painting. Lewandowski said the organization has worked on 1,916 containers to date, but some had to be repainted several times because of graffiti. The crew handles a minimum of 75 a month, he said.

Garbage truck drivers are to log the site of any defective containers, but repairs are handled on a priority basis and it may take a while, he said.

Next month, he will be assigning a full-time crew to pick up pine needles on a regular schedule so residents will know when a truck is scheduled.

A crew also will take the chipper around to cut up yard waste and limbs, he said. Many pick-up trucks full of pine needles and yard waste are being dumped at the transfer station (where garbage is transferred from collection trucks through a compactor and into transport trucks to be taken to the landfill) now that people are aware they can dump it for free. The trip saves them the cost of plastic bags.

To buy or not to buy
Or a decision by member Bill

Schwettmann, a county commissioner, Lewandowski was directed to get an appraisal on the administration and recycling building being leased by the authority.

The building is owned by Texas-New Mexico Power and the authority has leased with an option to buy for three years.

Schwettmann said an appraisal is needed to establish whether the purchase would be a good deal for the public.

Out of each \$700 monthly lease check, \$200 has been going toward the purchase price. Lewandowski said it probably would cost the authority about \$70,000 to buy the building on Second Street in Ruidoso Downs.

The appraisal is to be completed before the board's meeting in April, in preparation for budget workshops in May.

To serve the town of Carrizozo, which will be coming on line by June, the board approved the purchase of 600 plastic carts for door-to-door collection.

Out of five bidders, Lewandowski recommended paying \$30,600 to Ameri-Kart out of Kansas. Although not the lowest bidder, they handle the same brand as he uses in Capitan and Ruidoso Downs. That means replacement parts would be interchangeable.

Southwest Disposal, the private company serving Carrizozo now, offered to sell the 325 carts being used, since its contract will expire when the authority takes over in June.

But Lewandowski said he didn't see the need for the extra carts, and many will need repairs that are too time consuming.

The lowest bidder was Roto Industries at \$19,536, but that company's delivery was promised within 60 days while Ameri-Kart promised a 30-day delivery.

facility and that the dollars were not there.

"We must be sure (the new use) is a viable industry. And the county needs to be involved. It will be a national RFP, but we want local input."

As of last Friday, 129 of the fort's estimated 200 employees (on Jan. 1) had not found employment and faced being laid off.

They already left the fort for employment with the state Department of Health, some other state agency or in the private sector, Aldaz said. Twenty more are

waiting to hear about jobs this week.

Many of the 129 have chosen not to move, Aldaz said.

"We brought in some national experts two weeks ago to train them in therapeutic foster care and also to be behavior specialists, which they qualified hands down for because of their previous training."

"There were four agencies that are in that business and were part of the training and they're going to come down and start taking applications and screening our staff to see which ones they want to utilize in this part of the state."

Still other employees have chosen to file for unemployment and wait to see if any new use for the fort will be found, he said.

Some have signed up with the Department of Labor and are going to take advantage of an opportunity for more training, retraining or general education courses paid for by the state, he said.

Seven employees retired.

The employees facing layoffs don't plan to get together after work Friday, Aldaz said, adding, "There's nothing to celebrate about a funeral."

Two years ago, Dave Anderson started a summer junior tennis league for children five to 15 years old. Little did Anderson know he would be reaping the fruits of that labor as head tennis coach for Ruidoso High School this year.

The National Junior Tennis League has been sponsored by the United States Tennis Association and the village's Parks and Recreation Department.

Anderson's goal from the beginning has been to introduce tennis to young people, and then give them league and tournament experience playing the game.

"By the time they get to high school, most of the kids have a background in every other sport except tennis," Anderson said.

Eight children participated that first year in 1993, and Ruidoso took

fourth in its division at a regional tournament. The next year saw the program mushroom to 90 participants. The team improved to a second-place finish at the regionals.

Anderson doesn't know what this summer's program will produce, but if he gets another Myro Romero or Rachel Beddoe out of the group, Anderson will be pleased.

Romero and Beddoe are two products of the summer league who are now promising tennis players for the Warrior girls team. Romero is a freshman and Beddoe is just an eighth grader.

Beddoe had never picked up a racket before entering an NJTL tournament in Ruidoso last summer. Romero has played for the last two years.

They join seniors Noelle Beechie and Jennifer Graham, junior Corey

Garcia and sophomore Erica Malis to form the core of the Warriors' team.

After serving as assistant coach last year, Anderson takes over as head coach of both the boys' and girls' teams this year. He's a long-time veteran of the courts. In 1978, Anderson teamed with Saul Castillo and won his first pro-am tournament right here in Ruidoso.

Former USTA and Ruidoso High player Mickey Roller is assisting Anderson, a certified tennis instructor. Anderson said Roller's experience as a player in regional USTA tournaments will benefit the Warriors.

The boys team is even younger than the girls team, Anderson said.

Texas transfer Chad Harris is only a sophomore, but brings experience and leadership to the program, Anderson said.

"He promotes tennis for us real well. He's a tremendous asset," said the Ruidoso coach, who noted that Harris has good concentration and tournament experience.

After Harris, freshman Zack Carey plays the No. 2 spot for the Warriors, followed by No. 3 Alberto Ruiz, a sophomore and No. 4 Shaun Cobb, a junior.

"They've showed a lot of promise," Anderson said of his boys team.

Anderson hopes a tough schedule will better prepare his Warriors for district play. In the District 4A-AAA are Artesia, Lovington, New Mexico Military Institute, Portales and Tucuman. Lovington and Portales are the traditional powerhouses of the district.

"They generally will place someone in state every year," Anderson said.

Ruidoso didn't even receive money for the engineering and architectural fees already paid by the village and the school district, Jackson said. Jackson said he had hoped the state would at least pay for those fees and the initial groundwork on the proposed athletic fields.

Project supporters need to get back together and look at alternative funding, Jackson suggested. The Parks and Recreation Commission will meet in the next couple of weeks to start that process. He added that project supporters should not give up.

There's no doubt, however, PARC will have to be creative when looking for money. One option might be to break down the multi-phase project further into sub-components, Jackson said.

The village can't sell bonds for the center because it's hit its bonding capacity. The village also faces

a \$1.2 million price tag to stop infiltration of fresh groundwater into the sewage system, but legislators offered only \$180,000 to help.

"It's just a real unclear picture as to our future," Jackson said, because of the other issues the village faces.

Despite the uncertainty, Jackson remains optimistic. The proposal itself is an accomplishment because it's a cooperative effort supported by a variety of community groups, he said.

"It's a good project. It's a valuable project and it's a needed facility," Jackson added.

The proposal includes a gym and separate rooms for gymnastics, racquetball courts, weights, aerobics, video games and offices; another multi-purpose room; plus a baseball field and soccer fields. An indoor pool is proposed for a second phase.

All would be constructed next to the White Mountain school, and the school would lease the property to the village for \$1/year.

Currently, the community has an outdoor pool but no rec center.

The Ruidoso girls' golf team opened the 1995 season at Onate High School in the Jimmy Oliver Invitational on Monday.

"We used it as a scrimmage," Warrior coach Les Carter said. "We were pleased. We saw a lot of areas we could improve on."

As a team, Ruidoso shot a 441. Cecilia Fuentes led the way with a 104. She was followed by Katie Lukens' 110, Heather Stephens' 112, and Leslie Girth's 115.

Battle with cancer changed Becker's coaching style

In this second of a two-part series, Capitan boys' basketball coach Ron Becker talks about what circumstances have formed his perspective and coaching philosophy.

Becker has coached basketball for 24 years. He has taught students about the game's strategies and the larger lessons about life.

But it wasn't always this way for the former Lobo standout.

One on One



precipitate good play on both sides...Realizing that their life is just like my life. And during the game I want to beat them. I want my kids to play well. I want my kids to feel good about what they've done. But when it's over, I want my kids to appreciate the fact that the other team has the same kinds of ambitions and to understand that their life is just as important to them as ours is to us.

"I think we were put here to live it to its fullest, to live with enthusiasm and abundance and try to enjoy it."

Q - Did you always feel that way?

A - "No. No, I always wanted to feel that way. But I felt that way more after I thought it was going to be taken away. I did some growing and maturing of my own. To this day I think that happened because that was a way that I was put in place. The worse thing is to have that lesson taught and not do anything about it, to keep that lesson just to yourself."

Q - Did it change how you coached?

A - "Yes. I used to want to win everything, and I didn't give a damn how I did it. I didn't care. I just wanted kids to learn to do all these things I'd been talking about."

Q - How many years did you coach the old way?

A - "Oh, about half of the years

I've been coaching. And we were successful the old way, but we've been a lot more successful the other way — not caring about winning and losing; caring about playing hard and doing all these things so we might win. But teaching these things along with basketball has made things successful in different ways, and far beyond whatever occurred before.

By that I mean, some of the best friends that I have in this world today are former players...I have some great friends the old way, but have a lot more the new way. Does that mean that I've lost some people? Yeah. Yeah, I've turned some people off I'm sure, no doubt. But I think, in the long run, I'm much happier with the way I work with kids now than I was before."

Q - What was the experience that changed your perspective?

A - "Well, it was a fight with cancer that did that. A really bad one. It was a tough road. It started when I was in Carrizozo. I coached during that."

"Did it make me a better person? Yeah. Did it make me perfect? Gosh, no. I still screw up all the time and do wrong things, but it made me better with the kids that I work with. I still lose kids. There are still kids who don't like the way I do things, but that's because I expect them to do what they're asked to do."

"When you come out for a team, it's not your right, it's a privilege to

play on an extracurricular athletic team. That's upheld by law in court. And so, you have to earn that privilege. You have to be willing to come in and do what you're asked to do. When a kid decides he's not going to play, it usually involves that concept.

"In the old days, there was no problem there. You did what you were asked, and you didn't question it. Today, kids question it — too much."

"I think it's OK to question, but we're not in a philosophical classroom when we go to the basketball court. We're not in the area so that we can talk philosophy of the game. If you want to talk philosophy of the basketball game, come over to my room before school or after practice and I'll sit down and we can talk all night. And maybe you can change my mind, but you're not going to do it on the practice floor."

Q - What does it take realistically to build a successful high school program?

A - "What it takes is lots of cooperation. Lots of it from a lot of different people. What it takes is when you hire someone to do a job to let them do it. And it takes great organization on the part of the people that are hired to do it, and a

strong belief in teaching fundamentals and in teaching ethics, values. Because I think ethics and values are things that can help you to be successful. Fundamentals will allow you to play the game well, but ethics and values will go way beyond."

"A successful high school athletic program teaches a lot more than how to play. It teaches how to act in class. It teaches you how to treat your parents."

Q - Do parents have unrealistic expectations?

A - "I think parents aren't able to evaluate their own children's performance, realistically. I think they think their kid is better than they are."

"I watched my daughter participate in a free-throw contest over in Ruidoso — the first time I've ever watched my daughter compete in anything. And I found myself sitting there, wanting her to do well. She didn't do as well as she wanted to do, and I felt for her. But, I wasn't disappointed that she didn't win..."

"I just think that parents should be really thankful their kid is healthy enough to play and enjoy watching them do that. Enjoy it..."

Q - What affect does professional sports have on student-athletes today?

A - "I haven't read any studies on it, but I can tell you this. Because of basketball being on television so much, I see kids trying to do things with the ball they can't do because their hands aren't big enough, and they're not tall enough, and they're not strong enough or quick enough, and they're getting that from television."

Q - What about fans' behavior?

A - "Well, I've heard people say, 'I bought a ticket I can do whatever I want.' I think that's wrong. I don't even think it's right at the professional level, but it's surely not right at the high school and junior high level. Just because you purchased a ticket doesn't give you the right to go and be obnoxious. What that does is give you the privilege to enjoy young people in their pursuit of

excellence. You should enjoy that and feel very privileged to be there. Be thankful that you're alive and able to do it.

"I think a lot of it is, we do not appreciate life. We do not appreciate what God has given us. He's given us a place to live and everything we need to enjoy it. Why don't we just sit back and enjoy it? I don't know."

"I wish I could do it better and I'm working real hard to do that. God gave us a great place to live and a life, how precious is that? And we've lost sight of that."

What we've lost perspective of is the value of life. One of the most important things you can teach kids in athletics is to be polite, courteous, kind, thoughtful. Does that mean you can't be competitive? No, but it does mean you can be competitive with some guidelines."

Q - So it's finding a balance?

A - "Yeah, between wanting to play well and being able to ap-

Stocking necessary for walleye fishing

New Mexico has many areas that provide an angler with the opportunity to catch fish, and most anglers have their place. They can tell you what works best during any time of the year and where the really big ones are found. What many people don't know is, it takes a lot of hard work to provide good fishing in our state, especially when it comes to walleye.

This year, like every spring for the past 24 years, biologists from the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish will be collecting eggs from walleye. The spawn collected produces tiny walleye fry that are stocked back into New Mexico waters. Walleye were probably first stocked into New Mexico waters in the mid-50s and spawn taking operations are credited with making the program so successful.

For the next few weeks, crews will be at Conchas and Ute lakes collecting walleye eggs. The operation involves setting gill nets in areas of the lake walleye use to spawn. The fish are then taken out of the nets and placed in holding pens. When enough fish have been captured and the large females are ready to spawn, the egg gathering part of the operation begins.

First, eggs are gently stripped from a female into a pan containing a small amount of lake water. The milt from the male is added and the wing feather of a turkey is

used to stir the eggs and milt together for fertilization. Once fertilized, the eggs are placed in shallow trays and transported to Rock Lake Hatchery in Santa Rosa. At Rock Lake, the eggs are transferred to glass jars that have a constant supply of running water. It takes seven to 10 days of careful attention before the eggs hatch.

This artificial process is necessary to sustain walleye populations around the state. In the first place, walleye naturally spawn in the shallow water at the edge of lakeshores, normally along rocky shorelines or gravel bars. This keeps the eggs from being buried in silt and wave action.

Unfortunately, during this time of year, water from our large reservoirs is often needed for other purposes, such as agriculture. The resulting draw down of the lake

level leaves eggs high and dry on the bank.

In addition, it is believed that the walleye's natural spawning techniques aren't very successful. Some studies reveal that only about 1% of the eggs laid hatch, and few of the fish survive long enough to reproduce. In our artificial system, nearly 100% of the eggs hatch and the survival rate to a reproductive age is nearly 5%.

This may seem to be a low survival rate until you look at what happens to the baby fish. The first months of life are extremely difficult for a young walleye.

Walleye fry are easy prey to a variety of fish and other aquatic wildlife. Because their mobility is extremely limited, their only defense is to hide from predators among rocks and aquatic plants. Often they hide in shallow water and sometimes find themselves trapped in pools on shore if the lake level drops too quickly for them to get to deeper water. Even after the fry put on weight and inches, it will be some time before larger fish quit considering them as prey.

That nice walleye you hook this year may be one of the fish spawned and hatched by our biologists. This may seem like a lot of work to keep walleye in New Mexico, but one bite of their tasty flesh will show it's worth it.



March 24, 1916

Dr. Johnson reports a nine pound baby girl at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Leslie, born Monday morning. John A. Haley, editor of the Carrizozo News and Postmaster of that town, was a visitor to Capitan Tuesday and while here paid the Mountaineer a call. 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

Mentally ill always last on agenda

TO THE EDITOR:

For five years I have been observing that horses in New Mexico are being treated better than our people who suffer from serious mental illness (these neglected citizens did not ask to be mentally ill).

Fifteen years ago, the mentally ill were taken out of institutions and left to fend for themselves. Their families and friends have been trying to help them, but in 1988, Dr. E. Fuller Torrey rated our State "0" for housing, as well as low ratings for support services. At all the meetings my wife and I have attended, serving as volunteer-advocates for the mentally ill, this topic of SAFE, SUPERVISED HOUSING FOR THE MENTALLY ILL is always last on the agenda. Even our Legislature deals with this issue at the end of the session.

Horses — and horse owners, as well as racetracks — are dealt with early on, so that the racing industry can have their air-conditioned vans, top quality feed, and excellent living conditions. Of course, they are given the benefit of no sales taxes on their horses' needs. Even now, the racing industry wants to control all receipts they may receive from additional gambling in order to "level the playing field."

Our mentally ill will continue to be homeless, unsupervised, living in substandard conditions, or in jail, prison, or the State Mental Hospital. At present, 60% live with aging parents. What happens when the parents die? I personally know of many without any family support.

If our mentally ill citizens (most of whom receive only \$448 per month to exist on) could receive help from the State to match the amount they can pay for room and board — \$350 per month — safe homes could be provided to meet their basic needs. Residential support services would make the difference between being institutionalized or living in a homelike situation, where help with medication and daily living skills could enable them to remain stabilized.

Which should come first — gambling, horses, or people who need help? Private clubs and charities do put money back into the community by helping people in their own area, but the for-profit industries that take the local economy away to their own out-of-state for-profit en-

terprises" leave destruction behind. The local citizens must pick up the pieces.

So, in closing, I urge all of you to set aside an hour or two on a beautiful Ruidoso spring day, put on some comfy old clothes and a pair of work gloves, grab a few large trash bags and be proud of yourself for doing your extra bit for your community. Who knows, you just may get some of that exercise your doctor keeps bugging you about!

Be careful and I'll see you along the road!

The real way to say Ruidoso

TO THE EDITOR:

Perhaps the writer of a previous

letter to the editor should have done a little more research into the correct pronunciation of the name of our fair village.

Since *ruidoso* is a Spanish word, I consulted *The University of Chicago Spanish-English/English-Spanish Dictionary* and it shows that the correct pronunciation is really *rrwi-do'-so* (adj. noisy; loud; sensational). The dictionary explains the sound of this *d* this way: "There is a tendency in modern Spanish to move from the fricative [d] (similar to the sound represented by the *th* in *mother, this, then*) to zero articulation." This makes it even more difficult for us non-Spanish speakers to pronounce the word correctly.

Both *Reeadoso* and *Ru-i-doso* (long *u*, soft *i*) are technically incorrect. Our Hispanic friends probably gave up on our getting it right a long time ago!

Can't understand Indians' situation

We were allowed to bring only \$20 each out of Europe and arrive with 5 cents. Relatives lent us \$50, we took any job we could get and paid the loan back in four months.

With great impatience we waited the required five years of residency (still in force) and studied American History and government, took the necessary exams in order to become American Citizens, and were sworn in at the Federal Court, a proud day.

None us have ever taken welfare of government aid. We have all worked hard in this great land of opportunity and have achieved financial stability and comfort if not riches, and raised responsible law abiding citizens in our families. This is a typical 40-year history of

thousands of war destroyed immigrants.

My question is this. After 150 years, why are we still hearing about how badly the Indians were treated 150 years ago because they lost in battle? There have been so many nations led by evil leaders and dictators who have lost in battle since then, and no one is trying to pacify the losers, nor the winners being propagandized with guilt. Were not the Apache Indians fighting with other Indian tribes, stealing their land and marauding helpless families on farms in Mexico and New Mexico for hundreds of years before the white man came?

Please explain to me why the tribes should own millions of acres, and pay no taxes? Why tribal council members be touted as millionaires and own a Lear jet, yet tribal members live in poverty? Why should the average hard working American citizen taxpayer pay for the welfare checks of tribal members while their rich tribal brothers pay no taxes? Why is there a fine four-lane highway leading to the Indian gambling establishment turn-off while the poor American taxpayer bumps down a rough two-lane highway into his town? How can a tribal council contribute \$20,000 to a politician, while the American taxpayer pays for roads and welfare programs for tribal members? Does not the American taxpayer provide education for tribal children, transportation to and from the reservation, healing of the sick in off-reservation hospitals? Yet even in dire emergencies, an American cannot be admitted to a reservation hospital. Why is it that thousands of Indians who left the reservations have prospered in the American culture? Why do we get begging letters from poverty Indian reservation members when their brothers have obvious wealth?

Please help me to understand what is happening here, and I apologize for so many questions or for any mis-information. But it seems to me there is a lot of mis-information everywhere.
