### ON THE SIDE

#### Mescalero ban two Ruidoso residents

Two Ruidoso residents have been officially banned from the neighboring Mescalero Apache reservation.

A resolution passed March 23 by the tribal council and signed by President Wendell Chino declares that Dave Dale, head of the Sacramento environment group, and Russ Warwick, former Indian Health Services officer on the reservation, are "permanently enjoined from entering any (Mescalero) lands."

The council determined that the presence of the two men is "injurious to tribal members and to the interests of the tribe."

Both Dale and Warwick have been active in the effort to stop temporary storage of radioactive nuclear waste on tribal land.

"That's really interesting, because (pro-nuclear storage tribal members) were shouting at me (during the election on the issue March 9) that I was nothing," Dale said Monday. "I guess I'm more than that if they've taken this action."

#### Williams speaks at Republican dinner

State Rep. Dub Williams (R-Glencoe) will address the Lincoln County Republicans at their "First Monday" dinner April 3.

Williams will talk about his first session in the Legislature, which closed March 18.

## Council hears about Ruidoso's road woes

Assistant village manager Alan Briley contracted groans from Ruidoso councilors Tuesday night after telling them of roadway construction delays.

Briley then tossed them an idea that made them groan even deeper: How about doing the entire state Highway 48 expansion project at one time, rather than in two, 30-month phases spread out over five years?

"All six miles could be done at once, inconveniencing all (motorists and businesses) at once," he offered, sharing the state engineer's suggestion with the councilors. "It could be done in (2.5 years) as opposed to five years."

Briley had a lot of news about roads at Tuesday's meeting.

#### Main Street delays

The tandem moan was in response to Briley's news that the resumption of Main Street improvements will not begin April 1, due to questions from contractors that need answers from the highway department.

Construction of nine crosswalks with inlaid bricks and road painting, the last touches to the main street facelift, are likely to take 60 to 90 days, he said.

Briley said the village may consider an alternative material to the paved bricks, possibly speeding up the work so Sudderth would be closed for a shorter period of time.

#### Highway 48 schedule

Councilors will not consider the

shortened Highway 48 construction period until the highway department formally asks for it.

At this point, Briley said, it is just a suggestion offered because of the projected delays in the first phase of the project.

The first phase will soften the road grade, add a turning lane plus add two more lanes at some points, from Mechem Drive to White Mountain Drive. State engineers told Briley that right-of-way maps for the stretch will be ready in June. Then the state must go about acquiring 2-3 parcels so the road can be straightened and widened, so the project won't proceed for another year, or until the fall of 1996.

Work on the first phase is expected to be completed in 1998, a year after the second phase of the project is scheduled to get underway.

The second phase, which will also level the road's grade and add a climbing lane, will cover the length between White Mountain Drive to Ski Run Road.

#### New street signs

Also in relation to street work, Briley told the councilors 240 new street signs, with better visibility from long distances and at night, will start being installed next week. The signs, which come with the changes made in February to more than 50 duplicate street names and addresses, will replace the existing carved wooden stumps.

## Commissioners push for quick action at Ft. Stanton

Insisting on a voice in the future of Fort Stanton, Lincoln County Commissioners Monday told state officials to speed up the search for a new use for the historic complex.

The target date to start advertising for a company or companies to lease the fort was moved up two months, to May 1, at the urging of commissioners.

They also won assurances from state General Services Department (GSD) Secretary Steven R. Beffort and Health Department Secretary Alex Valdez that the county will have input in the national advertisement for proposals.

The state cabinet members and key staffers flew to Fort Stanton to meet with commissioners, state and local elected officials, and a few employees of the facility. It was closed Friday as a state hospital.

A second meeting was scheduled for April 12 in Santa Fe. By that time, a draft of the Request for Proposals (RFP) is scheduled to be ready for county commission input. If a final version is approved by May 1, advertising in The Wall Street Journal and some national magazines will begin.

Before reaching an agreement, Commissioners Bill Schwettmann and Wilton Howell asked why the date for issuing the RFP had been moved back to July from the original target of April 1.

"An RFP is a formal process," Valdez said. "It should be prepared by June or July of this year and we should see a resolution by September or October."

Howell told the secretary, "It was my understanding all along April 1 was the RFP date. To put it off is like rescuing a drowning man and then letting him lie on the river bank for an hour and a half before starting CPR."

"The longer (the fort) sits idle, the harder it's going to be to revive."

And the longer it takes to find a new use, the less likely that former employees will be available to fill the jobs, Howell added.

Since no state departments are interested in operating the fort, Howell and Commission Chairman Monroy Montes urged Valdez and Beffort to let the county find a new user.

"We need a facility to answer the problems of the youth," Howell said, proposing that a regional treatment center could be created by a coalition of southern New Mexico counties using money already set aside to close or convert the fort.

Schwettmann went a step further by suggesting the state deed the fort to the county and give it

money to market the complex. But Beffort said the state considers the fort a place of historic significance and currently is not interested in selling it or turning it over to the county.

"The facility reverts to the general services department at the end of this fiscal year (June 30)," Valdez said.

The role of the GSD is to provide support services for public bodies, and that includes property control matters.

Howell said he has heard that some of the long-term health care companies that have looked at the fort would be offering jobs with such low pay that workers still would be eligible for food stamps, and that's not the type of operation the county wants to see.

#### Several firsts

The state is carefully preparing the RFP document, because it will be the first time it has submitted an RFP for national exposure, Valdez said.

It's also the first time anyone can remember a layoff of state employees as significant as the 176 workers at the fort, he said. And it is the first time a large state facility has been shut down.

Although the meeting started out with commissioners accusing state officials of "posturing" and Beffort retorting that commissioners were taking an "adversarial" approach, the mood leveled off after a short break.

John Underwood, lobbyist for the county and a former state legislator, said the county wanted to become partners with the state in finding a new use. Some sort of verbal agreement about the county's role needs to be worked out, he said.

State Rep. Dub Williams (R-Glencoe) and State Sen. Pete Campos (D-Santa Rosa) also encouraged cooperation between the county and the state.

Without that cooperation, "months will go by and we will still be looking for answers at Christmas," Campos said. "The Department of Health may not even be in the equation after June. The county needs to be involved not only in writing the RFP, but in selecting the final user."

#### RFP goals

Beffort contended the state has responded quickly to the situation at the fort.

"We were here within days of the legislative session ending, but we want a long-term solution, not a bandage," Beffort said. "The facility

is a national treasure and (proper care and preservation) has to be included."

The \$500,000 set aside in Gov. Gary Johnson's 1995-96 budget for the fort is to be used to improve, maintain and market the fort, he said. A prospectus with information on the fort, statistics about the county and photographs must be prepared. Videotapes also may be incorporated.

The RFP will be for the entire facility that includes 72 structures and 1,300 acres as well as its own landfill, water system, sewage treatment, fire department and antiquated boiler system, said Larry Martinez, deputy secretary of the health department.

"We want meaningful jobs that add value to the economy, not entry level," Beffort said.

Montes said he wants at least a 15-year lease to ensure some stability. If the lease was proposed for more than 25 years, it would require approval from the State Legislature.

Beffort pointed out that it costs about \$700,000 a year to operate the fort on a minimal basis, just enough to keep pipes from freezing and with barebones staff. The state plans to go ahead with already allocated remodeling of cottages, he said. A roof is to be repaired on the recreation center.

"I have been told that (the fort) must be leased for fair market value and the state is not to subsidize it in any way (while it is under lease)," Valdez said.

Although Beffort preferred giving companies at least 120 days to respond to the RFP and to visit the fort, commissioners said that was too long a delay. Montes pushed for no more than 90 days to respond.

The RFP is needed because so many companies have expressed an interest in the fort, Valdez said.

"We were surprised by the number," he said. "To ensure the process was fair, we had to go with RFPs. If the Department of Health had its druthers, the RFP would be written for a health based use, but the fort belongs to the state and we are obligated to look at the overall welfare."

Valdez said if the county intends to be part of the coalition responding to the RFP for a youth treatment center, a conflict of interest might exist and commissioners might have to be excluded from input in awarding the lease. But Montes said the commission could have another county act as the lead

## Film companies respond to fort ad

Lured by an advertisement detailing the Fort Stanton facility, two separate filmmakers are headed this way to check out Lincoln County on location.

Stan Monks, a Ruidoso Art and Film Board member, received response to the advertisement last week, about two weeks after placing the \$1,710 ad in the Hollywood Reporter.

The one-time ad detailing Fort Stanton was financed by the Lincoln County Commission, Village of Ruidoso, and Capitan trustees, after being proposed by Monks as a great use for the historic spread of buildings the state no longer wants to use.

Monks said one of the respondents, representing Brentwood Entertainment of Los Angeles, com-

mented that, "When I saw your ad, I thought it was the answer to a prayer."

Apparently, the company has been looking for a Southern New Mexico studio location for a year.

Six people representing the company — administrators, architects, attorneys and cameramen — will be arriving in Lincoln County April 10, 11 and 12 to review the vacated fort.

# Chief seeks more officers

If they get a federal grant and matching village funds, Ruidoso police plan to embark on more community oriented policing.

Police Chief Lanny Maddox told the Village Council Tuesday that the proposed \$73,000 federal grant coupled with the \$18,000 match he's seeking from the village would "enhance our ability to meet the community's needs and keep the officers on the street but not behind a desk typing up reports."

Spending more time with the public is a department priority, Maddox said. Already, officers are meeting with business owners to find out their particular needs and concerns.

Maddox has already received a grant through the federal crime bill to hire one more police officer for a year. That money should be available later this spring.

Councilors approved giving an \$18,000 match if the second federal grant is approved. They put their stamp of approval on the application for money under the latest federal crime bill. If approved, the federal money should be available July 1, Maddox said.

The new money would be used to hire one entry level police officer and three part-time typists, plus buy dictaphones, and pay maintenance costs.

Officers would be able to call in reports and record them on dictaphones and later the new typists

would put them on state-approved report forms for the record. Four officers could then be on the street an additional 20 hours each week, Maddox said.

The part-time clerks will work four hours per shift, covering 12 hours per day, seven days a week.

Councilors also approved amendments to the promotional step pay policies for police officers, plus replacement of a standardized promotion test with one more specified for small communities.

Also at the meeting, councilors approved an annexation ad hoc committee's recommendation to amend the village ordinance and stop allowing extension of water and sewer lines for developments outside city limits.

# Downs council wants to keep right-of-way

Discussion about turning Friedenbloom St. into a private road dominated the Ruidoso Downs council meeting Monday night.

Lincoln County Commissioner Wilton Howell made the request. Howell owns a tract of property that the easement runs through. He said the road is unsuitable for traffic and comprises 15-20% of his property. He plans to develop a mobile home park on the site.

The dirt road has been used by residents of a mobile home park to go through Howell's property to Highway 70 for decades.

The council denied Howell's request, after at least a half-dozen residents of the neighboring mobile home park opposed the loss of the public right-of-way. Village attorney Bob Beauvais said the road was public even though the village never purchased the right-of-way, because of years of public use and village maintenance.

Other council business included:

- lodgers tax requests for \$2,000 for the Aspen Fest motorcycle rally, \$5,000 for the Museum of the Horse and \$5,022 for a publication about Ruidoso Downs and an ad in *The Ruidoso News*' Summer Visitor's Guide were all granted. A request for \$2,500 from *Guest Life*, a publication placed in hotels, was denied;

- and a sign permit application for AllComm Communications was approved.

The next Ruidoso Downs council meeting is at 7 p.m., April 10 at Village Hall.

# Trinity Site tours unescorted Saturday

Trinity Site, where the world's first atomic bomb was exploded in 1945, will be open to the public on Saturday, April 1.

Trinity is located on the northern end of the 3,200-square mile White Sands Missile Range, between the towns of Carrizozo and Socorro. For the April Trinity Site tour, there will be two ways of entering the restricted missile range.

Visitors can enter through the range's Stallion Range Center which is five miles south of Hwy. 380. The turnoff is 12 miles east of

San Antonio and 63 miles west of Carrizozo. The Stallion gate will be open from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Visitors arriving at the gate between those hours will receive handouts and will be allowed to drive unescorted the 17 miles to Trinity Site. The road is paved and marked.

The second way of entering the missile range is by traveling with a caravan sponsored by the Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce.

# Brother disputes suicide ruling

Although the state medical investigator in Albuquerque has ruled that Chad Jeffers' death was a suicide, his family insists the fatal shooting March 8 was accidental.

Phil Jeffers said he should know. He was the only other person in the room at the time.

"My brother was the coolest guy in the world," Jeffers said Monday. "He was getting married and was just accepted (at a college) in Utah."

A week before the incident, Jeffers said he and Chad were discussing the suicide of a high school student in Capitan and his brother said "That's so stupid to do," Jeffers recalled.

"I know the shooting was not intentional," Jeffers said. "We're trying to get the ruling removed from the death certificate. I was the only one there and I feel responsible for clarifying what happened."

Suzanne Fetsco, director of operations for the Medical Investigator's Office in Albuquerque, said if the family has information to add, she's sure Dr. Michael Ward, who determined the cause of death, would listen.

"We don't ever lock ourselves into a corner," she said. "If the family has additional pieces to add, we will consider them. But right now, based on everything we have gathered, the determination is suicide. There was some question whether he knew the gun was loaded, but it's our position that if a person puts a gun to their body, whether or not they believe it is loaded or unloaded, and pulls the trigger, there's a reasonable anticipation of harm."

The state has no classification such as accidental suicide.

Jeffers contends Chad thought the gun was unloaded and never thought he would be hurt.

"I believe he did not know another shell was in the (.38 caliber) revolver," Jeffers said. "I saw him

dump them on his leg.

"I was sitting five feet away and we were talking about my brother Drew."

Chad had unloaded the shells and dropped them on his left leg, Jeffers said.

"He was smiling. I started to light a cigarette, he put the gun to his head (temple)," Jeffers said. "It didn't hit me (that the gun had fired) until I saw blood."

Jeffers said he yelled and then ran upstairs to ask a friend, Matt Niehaus, to come down and stay with Chad while he went to another house on the ranch east of Carrizozo to tell his mother. She called 911.

Danny Sisson, local field investigator for the medical investigator's office, had reported a different version of the events leading up to the shooting.

Sisson stuck by his information Monday, saying he gathered the data from the sheriff's report and interviews.

hall and describe their house.

The confusing addresses needed to be revamped so police could find people who called. The changes will be fed into the E911 computer.

## Priority road repairs

Briley also informed the council that the street department has created a three-category, priority ranking system for upgrading the village's 180 miles of paved and 35 miles of dirt streets.

The priority streets will be scheduled for work as the budget

allows.

"We want to create a quantitative situation," Briley said of the ranking.

The first category is poor to fair for dirt or gravel, which needs to be upgraded to a base course gravel.

The second includes the good gravel streets that have all utilities in place (streets must have all utilities in order to be considered for paving). These streets will be scheduled for paving.

The third is poor to fair paved streets that need repair.

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# Free child shots emphasized next week

The health offices in Ruidoso and Carrizozo are making a special effort to encourage child immunizations during National Public Health Week, April 2-8.

The staff of the Public Health Department of Lincoln County offers services at 104 Kansas City Road in Ruidoso and at Hwy. 54 and 4th in the courthouse annex in Carrizozo.

Any child over two months of age can receive free immunizations regardless of the family's income level, provided they are accompanied by a parent or guardian and bring their shot record with them.

On Mondays the Ruidoso clinic offers immunizations from 8:30 until 11 a.m. on a first come first served basis, and at other times during the week by appointment. The Carrizozo office offers immunizations on Tuesdays and Thursdays by appointment.

Children need to receive immunizations against eight childhood diseases — diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, polio, haemophilus influenza type b, measles, mumps, and rubella. The Hepatitis B vaccine is also being offered and recommended, although it is not required.

According to information from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Centers for Disease Control, the national immunization level among young children is about 50%. In New Mexico the rate is about 65% which is up 50% from last year. Lincoln County is at about 64%. The state goal for immunizations for young children for 1995 is 90%.

The recent outbreak of measles in New Mexico was due to unvaccinated children.

applicant. Montes said he wants assurances that the fort's greenhouse will be maintained and that enough manpower will be left at the fort to ensure its security and the safety of historic artifacts.

Ervin Aldaz, former Fort Stanton hospital administrator, said the new secretary of cultural affairs is aware of the need to protect the artifacts and to assign someone to be responsible for keeping them in the county. Cultural Affairs Secretary Gary Morton, a Lincoln County-based artist, is sending someone to inventory the pieces.

To date, 13 different entities have toured Fort Stanton and expressed interest in leasing parts of it, said Alex Valdez, secretary of the state Health Department.

He gave Lincoln County Commissioners an update Monday. The entities included a resort developer, the New Mexico Film Commission, several long-term health care groups, a psychiatric hospital, a language training center and several juvenile justice or treatment groups.

Shannon Brazel, president of the local chapter of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, said half of

the former employees who took other state jobs are waiting to hear about the possibility of moving back to Fort Stanton. Many commute to their homes in Lincoln County each weekend and the issue needs to be resolved, she said.

Last Friday, 176 employees were laid off, although many actually left earlier in the week by accrued leave time. By June 30, only about 24 workers will remain at the fort. Eleven of those have been transferred to the General Services Department.

Valdez and Ervin Aldaz, former administrator of Fort Stanton as a hospital, defended the placement efforts of the state.

"I wish none had to leave, but since they had to, it opened up all types of options," Aldaz said. "Some received promotions and things turned out well. Even though it has been difficult, too many have come to my office saying Thank God, I

have a job, even though it may not be in the beautiful community here."

Valdez ensured laid off employees the first right to jobs opening up in the health department, Aldaz reported.

Aldaz later handed out a sum-

mary that showed out of 203 employees, 51 employees transferred within the health department, nine are seeking state employment, 13 accepted employment with other state agencies, 18 found other jobs, eight filed for retirement, 40 were not interested in applying for positions and 64 were interested only in local employment.

## Bonito Lake opens April 1

Don't be surprised to find fishing enthusiasts elbow to elbow Saturday at Bonito Lake when the 1995 season opens.

"Get your license early because there will be lines starting Friday night," said Jim McGarvey, who works at Western Auto - one of the two places in town that sells fishing licenses.

McGarvey, a long-time fisherman, predicts the fishing will be excellent at Bonito Lake this weekend. Bonito is one of several local fishing spots stocked by the Department of Game and Fish.

"If they can throw the pole in the water, they can catch a fish," McGarvey said of Bonito Lake.

A variety of new bait, lures and equipment is available to help catch that big one.

"There's more new things than you can shake a stick at," said Ben Hanson, state Department of Game and Fish public affairs officer.

In the Ruidoso area, all the fishing spots are cold water.

"Our fishing up here is primarily stocked trout fishing," McGarvey said.

Hanson said the most popular bait for trout fishermen continues to be Powerbait, a scented cheese-food that comes in a variety of colors. Salmon eggs are also popular and good for stream fishing.

For warm water fishing, new hard-bodied baits with soft plastics are helpful for catching bass and catfish. Hanson said new soft plastics impregnated with crayfish or worms are good for catching just about anything.

The most popular artificial lures are the Panther Martin spinners for stream fishing, and Pistol Pete's for bubble and fly fishing in lakes, McGarvey said.

In terms of equipment, both Hanson and McGarvey think new advances in equipment have made it easier for fishermen.

"The rods and reels are much easier to use, especially the spinning reels," Hanson said.

Most of the improvements in closed-face and open-faced spinning reels occurred 15 years ago. For those who haven't picked up a rod and reel since then, the new reels are easier to cast.

"Anytime you get the fish to bite it's going to encourage people to fish," Hanson said.

Because the trout in local fishing spots are smaller, McGarvey recommends lighter equipment, from the fishing line, to the rod, to the lure.

"Really, the secret to fly-fishing is keeping a light line on your rod," said McGarvey, who has been fishing since he was three years old.

Trout tend to be nibblers, McGarvey explained. They "touch and go" around the bait. A lighter,

more flexible rod is easier to cast and allows the fisherman to feel the action on the fly. It's also less stress on the fly fisherman who routinely casts his rod.

A two to six-pound line is ideal for trout fishing, McGarvey said, because the trout might see a heavier line. He also recommends using the equipment rated ultra light to medium. The lighter the rod, the more flexible, and thus easier to cast.

For those who want a thin, strong but expensive fishing line, Hanson said the new Kevlar lines are sensitive and easy to cast. They can withstand a 30-pound test.

"You're talking about pulling trees out now," Hanson said.

For those who want to learn new techniques, Hanson suggested checking the library for videos, books and other resource material.

Local and visiting fishermen also can try asking their comrades for tips while waiting in line for a fishing license at Western Auto or Wal-Mart.

McGarvey says to be prepared for a busy and bustling opening weekend, especially at Bonito Lake.

They'll have campfires going at 4:30 a.m., McGarvey said, getting ready for the 6 a.m. start time Saturday when the season opens at Bonito.

And that's no April Fools.

## Before the big one gets away, check fishing tackle, equipment

It's already beginning. It usually starts with the arrival of the spring issue of the catalog announcing this year's line of new fishing equipment. This first sign is enough to start many folks thinking about heading to the lake to try and catch a fish. Before heading out, there are some things you need to do.

Starting April 1, you will need to get a new fishing license. For those living in New Mexico, the cost of a fishing license is the same as last year. An annual fishing license is \$9 and with a trout stamp or validation, \$14.50.

Junior anglers (ages 12-14) and seniors (65 and older) get a break on the price and can get an annual license for \$2.25, or with a trout validation the cost is \$5.25 (vendor fee included in price).

Combination hunting and fishing licenses are available also. If you are going to be fishing in waters on Bureau of Land Management or U.S. Forest Service land, don't forget to get a habitat stamp.

Once you have a license, the next most important question is, "Where are the fish biting?"

Getting the answer is simple. By calling the Department of Game and Fish's toll free number, 1-800-ASK-FISH, anglers can get the latest fishing information 24 hours

boat including the registration, and be sure to schedule time off from work.

When something has been stored for awhile, it needs to be checked over before being used, and fishing tackle is no exception. Inspect rods to see if all the eyelets are still secure and intact. Reels need to be lubricated, the drag set and old brittle line should be replaced. Check lures to make sure they are working properly and hooks to make sure they are sharp.

If you have a boat, you need to check it out and make sure you have all the proper equipment and it's in good working order. It's important to have a personal flotation device for each passenger, a fire extinguisher, a length of rope, a bailing bucket, an oar or paddle and signaling device such as a whistle.

Check the engine to make sure it's running well. You don't want to ruin a weekend by having it not start or quit running while you're in the middle of the lake. Check the boat registration to make sure it is current and if not, contact the Department of Motor Vehicle.

Last but not least, talk to the boss and get some time off. The worst thing is having great fishing gear and then not getting a chance to use it. Make this year a good one and get out to the old fishing hole more often.

## Race nominations continue to increase

Nominations for the major quarter horse races at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track continue to increase from 1994 levels as the 1995 summer meet approaches.

"Our six major futurities and

derbies are up an average of 25% from last year," said Scott Wells, general manager of the Ruidoso Downs track. "This reinforces our belief that horse owners everywhere realize the importance of outstanding facilities, cool summer climate and an excellent racing sur-

face. Of course the bottom line is still purse dollars, and we're extremely happy to see such growth."

A nomination is the first of a three-part process for entering a horse in a race. After paying the nominating fee, owners then pay sustaining fees and, lastly, the entry fee. At any time an owner can drop a horse out of the nominating process by simply not paying the next sustaining fee.

Nominations secretary Vicki McCabe likened the nominations procedure to a weeding out process. Owners will pull a horse out of the process if they feel the horse isn't fast enough or because of injury.

The most recent payment deadline was March 15. When comparing this year's number of nominations to last year's number, Wells said the track has more owners sustaining their nominations.

"If the attrition is normal, then we'll be up significantly," Wells said.

The increased nominations mean better purses. Wells said 95% of the nominating fee goes directly to horsemen's purses.

"For the All American Futurity, the world's richest quarter horse race, McCabe has 505 sustained

nominations - a 10% increase from last year. The All American Derby has shown a 45% improvement.

The Ruidoso Quarter Horse Futurity has 246 nominations, a 23% increase from 1995. The Ruidoso Quarter Horse Derby is up 35%.

Also up is the Rainbow Futurity with 290 nominations, a 12% increase. The Rainbow Derby shows a 25% increase.

It seems the legislative defeat of video gaming at racetracks has had little effect on the nominations.

"I was concerned that people would go elsewhere, but it's not true according to the nominations," McCabe said. "We're real pleased."

Wells said Ruidoso Downs' uniqueness among racetracks in this part of the country makes it popular among horse owners and race fans.

"There are plenty of new facilities and new races, but Ruidoso Downs is like the Saratoga of the Southwest. We're old, we have rich purses, and we're steeped in tradition. This is the place to escape during our short season," Wells said.

Opening day for the 1995 racing season is Friday, May 12.







The governor decided to close one of the county's biggest employers, Fort Stanton.

As we approach the summer months, you can feel anticipation in the air for a good tourism season. ### New state abortion regulation a curse

TO THE EDITOR:

"The where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." A new regulation in effect in

New Mexico since Dec. 1, which increases public funding for abortions, is viewed as a mixed blessing by some and a curse by others.

Under the old regulation, New Mexico's Medicaid Program "has been paying for fewer than a dozen abortions a year" in cases of rape, incest, or when the mother's life is endangered (*Albuquerque Journal*, 7/30/94). Under the new regulation, women may obtain an abortion if the procedure is considered "medically necessary." According to the *New Mexico Human Services Register*, Vol. 17, No. 85, Nov. 28, 1994, the procedure is medically necessary, among other reasons, "if a treating physician certifies that the pregnancy...has a profound negative impact upon the physical or mental health of an individual" (p. 5). According to new regulations, abortions in New Mexico will increase to between 2,400-3,500 per year. \$400,000-\$600,00 of our tax dollars are expected to be spent this year for abortions (*Albuquerque Journal*, 7/30/94). A single woman with one child who earns up to \$18,204 is now "entitled to public funds to obtain an abortion" (*Albuquerque Journal*, 11/29/94).

I view the new regulation as a curse, which will have a profound, negative impact upon the physical, mental, and spiritual health of many New Mexicans. It is a paradox that those of us who do not block entrances to abortion clinics are now being forced inside. The present policy discriminates against religious persons and other conscientious objectors to abortion in our state.

House Bill 76 and Senate Bill 52, which would have restored the old regulation, have been tabled. It is hoped that Gov. Gary Johnson will, by executive order, overturn the new regulation. If your heart is not into abortion, you must speak now, or your treasures will be into abortion. Contact your state senators, representatives, and the governor.

### Why I voted against balanced budget amendment

TO THE EDITOR:

I did not support the Balanced Budget Amendment legislation. This is not because I oppose sound fiscal policy for the federal government. In fact, quite the opposite is

true.

The deficit reduction efforts in 1987, 1989, 1990 and 1993 have all had my support. And I hope to have the opportunity to support more serious deficit reduction efforts during this term of my service in the Senate. I share the goal of most Americans to reach a balanced budget at the earliest possible date.

But a recent change in House rules raises the real risk that Congressional adoption of the Balanced Budget Amendment will be transformed into just another cynical political act.

In early January, the House of Representatives adopted a rule requiring a three-fifths vote of the House to approve any income tax rate increase included in any legislation proposed in the Congress. The stated purpose of this super-majority rule was to stop all such increases.

The view held by all serious non-political authorities on the budget deficit is that we cannot balance the budget without revenue increases. It is a fact that all of the significant deficit reduction bills that have passed the Congress since I joined the Senate in 1983 have included revenue increases, and four of the last five deficit reduction bills have passed Congress with less than a three-fifths vote.

During the period between now and the year 2002, when the Balanced Budget Amendment is likely to become effective, the House rule requiring a super-majority to enact federal income tax rate increases will be in effect. The super-majority rule applies to the 54% of revenues that come to the federal government through personal and corporate income taxes — the only progressive taxes we have. This will work to protect the wealthy from, but force the working families of America to carry more of, the burden of bringing our budget deficit down to zero over the next seven years.

The last two times the Congress has raised the federal income tax rates in deficit reduction bills, rates were raised only on wealthy tax payers and corporations. The effect of the House super-majority rule is to take precisely these taxes off the table, while leaving the taxes paid by the middle class on the table — Social Security taxes, Medicare taxes, gas taxes, excise taxes for alcohol, tobacco, telephone service and transportation; and fees for government-backed mortgages, veterans benefits, military COLAS, and student loans.

So, in truth, the House rule will

mean that if we try to accomplish a serious down-to-zero deficit reduction by the year 2002, as the Balanced Budget Amendment purports to require, we can do it only on the backs of working families while we exempt federal incomes paid by the wealthy from any increase. That is not fair, it is not right, and I believe it will be unacceptable to the vast majority of the American people.

New Mexico would be particularly hard hit. We are not a wealthy state and we have very few taxpayers who will be fairly treated under this new set of ground rules.

At this time our state Legislature in Santa Fe is struggling with the question of a gasoline tax. A Balanced Budget Amendment adopted with the House Rule in effect almost certainly ensures that we in Washington will be adding substantially to the gas tax as one of the only available sources of revenue. The same can be said of Social Security taxes and other regressive taxes.

During consideration of the bill I offered a measure that would invalidate the super-majority rule during that seven-year period the Balanced Budget Amendment gives the Congress to try to balance the budget on its own. My amendment was tabled on a party line vote. A pending lawsuit by 15 House members of the defeat of the Balanced Budget Amendment may still derail this plan to handicap the middle class in the balancing of our budget.

The Congress has considered the Balanced Budget Amendment in the past always in the context of sharing the burden of deficit reduction across all people and all the states. With the House Rule still in effect, passage of the Balanced Budget Amendment would mean that when we try to bring our budget deficit down to zero, average working families and poor states like New Mexico will bear an unfair share of that burden. I will not abide that unfairness.

## Speaker's goal is to keep children on right track in life

Alcohol, drugs, sex, failure in school, depression and suicide are all problems of students that can make parents feel frustrated and powerless.

Dr. Peter Benson is president of a national research organization dedicated to promoting the wellbeing of children. He will speak at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center at 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, April 5.

His presentation is called "Healthy Communities - What Kids Need to Succeed."

Benson, president of Search Institute, is a consultant to the U.S. Department of Education and the U.S. Department of Justice. He authored eight books on children, adolescents, and the community forces shaping their lives.

Benson has surveyed more than 275,000 students in 600 communities. He found that students who were leading healthy, productive lives had "developmental assets."

In his book, *What Kids Need to Succeed*, Benson identifies 30 developmental assets that he says every young person needs in their lives.

Benson breaks down the assets into two main categories. The first is internal assets: the attitudes, values and abilities and qualities that he says belong in the head and heart of every child. The second as-

set is external: things in the environment that support, nurture, set boundaries, and involve young people in structured time with caring adults.

Benson compares the positive developmental assets with at-risk behaviors and concludes, "Young people with the positive assets are much less likely to get involved in these problem behaviors."

Benson's findings suggest that families, schools, churches, media, businesses, government and other segments within the community must work together to address common concerns, share resources and create a better world for young people.

"Communities have a tremendous effect on the journey of

children into adolescence, because adolescents spend decreasing amounts of time with their families and increasing amounts of time in peer, school, church, and other community contexts," Benson said in a press release.

Researchers offer six steps to assure positive outcomes for children and youth:

- increase bonds between family members, schools and students, and between young people and positive groups and activities;
- teach life skills such as the ability to say no, conflict resolution, how to make friends and decision-making;

- set and consistently enforce expectations like family rules, school policies, organization rules and public laws;

- provide children with support including unconditional caring, love, listening and encouragement;

- provide children with high expectations for success;

- and provide all children with opportunities for meaningful participation.

Parents may feel that the list is easier said than done, which is why Benson is touring the country to help parents and communities in the process of raising children.

Benson's lecture is sponsored by Drug-Free Schools and Communities, and the Region Nine Education Cooperative. For information call Kathy Echols at 257-2368.

# Arts community alive and thriving in Lincoln County

Performing arts, museums, music, galleries — the Ruidoso area has come into its own as an arts center in New Mexico.

## New McGary Studios

Dave McGary, known internationally for his bronze sculptures of Native Americans, opened a new 13,000 square-foot finishing studio and gallery this year in the heart of Ruidoso.

McGary's career has escalated in the past several years, allowing him to grow from a small studio employing eight people to its present operation, employing more than 30 artisans and an administrative staff of six.

McGary will host a grand opening at his new studio from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday, April 2. The open house will give art enthusiasts the opportunity to tour his finishing studio and see first-hand the unique finishing techniques of metalwork, patina and paint that make McGary bronzes highly sought after.

"I started sculpting in clay around age 12," McGary said. "As you can imagine, my interest in art wasn't too highly regarded on a working ranch in Wyoming where everyone was expected to make substantial contributions in time and labor."

"I was always slipping off from what I was supposed to be doing for the ranch, to go experiment with art."

Expressions in Bronze, the new gallery, showcases McGary's new works and includes bronzes that span the breadth of his 20 years of sculpting experience. At the age of 16, he was given a grant to study the art of bronze casting and sculpting in Pietrasanta, Italy. McGary was heavily influenced there by the Renaissance period, evidenced by his attention to both detail and human anatomy. His sculptures of First Americans depict proud warriors clad in regalia representative of the items worn and used by Indians during the 1800s.

"Through my work I hope to im-

print footsteps in time so these people, their culture, beliefs and traditions are not lost on the current or future generations," McGary said.

McGary was recently commissioned by the Anna C. Stradling Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs to sculpt *Free Spirits at Noisy Water*, a 255-foot-long landscaped monumental tribute to seven classic horse breeds. The Thoroughbred, Quarter Horse, Appaloosa, Paint mare and foal, Arabian, Morgan and Standardbred

will all be sculpted in times the size of life. Each bronze will be painted and patinated to faithfully depict each breed.

R.D. Hubbard, Museum of the Horse chairman and art collector, commissioned the monument in 1994 from McGary, who expects to complete it just prior to its unveiling and dedication on July 15 of this year.

"Dave McGary was selected because his concept was so unusual," Hubbard said. "We wanted something monumental in size and concept, and McGary's piece is just that. The scope of the project is spectacular."

The gallery is open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and from 12 noon to 5 p.m. Sundays. Studio tours are at 10:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Wednesdays and Fridays. The gallery and studio are located at 2002 Sudderth Drive. The phone number is 257-1000.

## Museum of the Horse

Anne C. Stradling's Museum of the Horse, located in Ruidoso Downs, has become well-known for bringing fine exhibitions of art to the area.

Several noteworthy events have happened during the past year at the museum, including the addition of Jesse (Jay) G. Wright as museum director in August. Wright has a bachelor's in Philosophy and a master's in English from Loyola University in Chicago and a master's in Art from Notre Dame.

He has extensive experience in the capacity of museum director. Wright has been director of the South Bend, Ind. Art Center, the Michael C. Rockefeller Art Center Gallery at the State University of New York, Canton Art Institute in Canton, Ohio, Philbrook Art Center in Tulsa, Okla., and the J.B. Speed Museum in Louisville, Ky.

Wright was instrumental in the creation of *That's All Folks*, an exhibition of Warner Bros. cartoons, cels and drawings which was on display at the Museum of the Horse from November of 1994 until late

January of this year. It was the only stop for the show outside a major metropolitan area.

Currently on display at the museum, through April 2, is *River Presence — River Presents*, an exhibition of 60 individual works, all with a theme related to rivers, by 27 Southern New Mexico artists from the Pecos River area.

*The Imperial Russian Horse — Equine Art From The Reign Of The Czars*, opens at the museum on April 22, and will run through Sept. 10. The exhibit is a collection of paintings and bronze sculptures created by celebrated 19th century Russian equine artists.

## Art Co-op opens

Jewelry, stained glass, bronze sculptures, stoneware, paintings, furniture, Southwest designed clothing and much more is all under one roof at the new Lincoln County Artisans Co-op, (LCAC), located at 2915 Sudderth, one half block east of the main post office.

Opened in November, the co-op was started by a group of local art-

ists who wanted to have a gallery and retail for their works in Ruidoso. The group contacted local contractor Jim Crown, who has a background in promotions, and with Crown's help, the LCAC gallery was born.

Response has been fantastic, Crown said. "We started with 16, but we now have 31 members."

Many of the artisans have their own studios in the inspirational mountains and communities that surround Ruidoso, but the co-op requires members to participate in the daily operations of the gallery and keep a minimum inventory on display.

"The gallery is unique to the area in that it is operated on a daily basis by the participating artisans themselves," Crown said. "Whenever possible, they are on duty and demonstrate their particular art form or craft to the public."

LCAC Gallery accommodates two permanent artisans of diverse talents — Harry Slabaugh, who crafts rustic Southwest Territorial furniture, and Philip Guerra, a Native American who makes traditional Navajo jewelry of his own design and also repairs jewelry. Works on display include paintings, etched and stained glass, functional furniture, porcelain and stoneware pottery, silversmith jewelry, functional wood pieces, weaving, leather work, baskets, sculptures, Native American art and clothing, and other creative works.

## Ruidoso Little Theater

Theater is alive and thriving in Ruidoso. With a new, larger location at 2691 Sudderth, next to the main post office, The Ruidoso Little Theater is bringing comedy, drama, and local talent to visitors and residents.

The theater's first performance in the new facility, which seats 100 people, was the comedy *Return Engagements* in March of 1994. Woody Allen's *Play It Again Sam* was next, followed by Neil Simon's *The Odd Couple — Female Version*. The most recent play performed at the theater was the romantic comedy *Mary, Mary*.

## GARBAGE MAKES HISTORY THE MAKING OF THE LINCOLN COUNTY SOLID WASTE AUTHORITY

The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority ("LCSWA") was formed in 1989 by the municipalities of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Carrizozo, Corona, and the County of Lincoln, in response to tough changes in state laws and regulations regarding the operation of solid waste landfills.

Because of the new regulations, over half of the states landfills closed, including the old Fort Stanton landfill, and suddenly solid waste disposal became a critical issue. LCSWA was the first organization in New Mexico formed to cope with the situation. What were we going to do with our garbage?

After three years of hard work, LCSWA is now hauling our garbage to New Mexico's first regional landfill, the Otero/Lincoln Landfill, south of Alamogordo. It opened January 15, 1994. It took the cooperation of ten local governments and a lot of patience to get there.

LCSWA picks up your garbage, operates the Capitan Landfill, is a full partner in the Otero/Lincoln Landfill, runs the transfer station, hauls the garbage in its own 18 wheelers, and has set up a recycling system that is becoming a model for others to follow.

## LCSWA GOALS FOR FUTURE

**Improve service:** garbage is still a tough business to do well, we'll keep doing our part, please give us a hand by following the rules and using common sense.

**Stop illegal dumping:** illegal dumping costs a lot of money, we are serious about enforcement and violations carry stiff fines, a dumpster site is not a landfill!

**Recycling:** we want to double or triple our volume and show recycling makes economic as well as environmental sense! Curbside Service this spring!

**Keep rates low:** most places pay lots more for the same services, local government can do it, with your help.

## Spencer plans \$14 million performing arts center at Alto

By Christmas 1996, Jackie Spencer hopes to deliver a \$14 million present to the people of Lincoln County.

Architectural plans are taking shape on a nearly 400-foot-long performing arts center being developed by Spencer on 78 acres in a meadow between the Sacramento and Capitan mountain ranges near Alto.

Spencer said she envisions a grand kick-off on July 4th of this year as ground is broken on the project.

Designed by Antoine Predock, the 500-seat center is planned to be a cultural jewel used to showcase ballet, symphony orchestras and

other musical performances, Spencer said. The philanthropist's positive impact on the county has been felt before in a swimming pool and golf course built for the town of Carrizozo. But this time around, instead of catering to the physical body, Spencer said she is directing her attention to the creative soul of the community.

During a recent interview at her Alto home, she explained how she first conceived the project, which was announced about three years ago as a companion piece for Ruidoso's civic events center and convention hotel.

Although she grew up in Denver, Colo., Spencer attended college in Connecticut, where she said she was exposed to and learned to ap-

preciate music on all levels, from symphony orchestras to musical theater.

About 10 years ago, she decided it was time to create a special place where those performances could be available to the community she now calls home. Years earlier, she had been instrumental in bringing the Houston Symphony Orchestra to Lincoln County, but acoustics and seating were primitive in available facilities.

"I was visiting my daughter in Boston and it was the Fourth of July. For something to do, we went to the park behind Beacon Street right along the Charles River," she said. "In the park, there was a big

## Track officials set eyes on '95 season

They came to the post Jan. 17. Everyone broke cleanly from the gate, but by mid-February it was anyone's race.

Down the stretch they came! They weren't horses, but rather legislative bills dashing toward the finish line - surely a photo finish.

Whether or not Ruidoso Downs Race Track will continue its physical improvements and new marketing strategies depended upon the results of that photo finish - which of the several proposed gambling bills would make it to Gov. Gary Johnson's desk?

When the results of the race were posted, Ruidoso Downs and the other racetracks found themselves out of the money by a nose. Gambling legislation for racetracks didn't make it to the governor's desk.

Regardless, the ponies will run this summer as they have officially since 1947. Sixty-eight racing dates are scheduled, including the 37th running of the All American Futurity, the world's richest quarter horse race.

But instead of the 1995 racing season being another step in the track's revitalization, it appears to be the track's last hurrah.

At least that's what track owner R. D. Hubbard has said. Because video gaming machines weren't legalized at horse racetracks, the 1995 season could be Ruidoso Downs' last. Hubbard hasn't announced his final decision about the track's fate for 1996.

The legislative outcome hasn't slowed season ticket sales or horse nominations, and track employees are preparing for the upcoming season like any other season.

"We are intent to have a great summer season. We're going to put on a grand show," said Joan Chase, Ruidoso Downs Race Track office manager.

### Return to racing's roots

The track received major physical improvements since Hubbard's purchase of it in August 1988. Now, it's ready for some final cosmetic touches and more marketing promotions.

The track's general manager Scott Wells promises more than just a day at the races this summer. "Our facility is so dramatically improved compared to what it was when I was here 10, 12 years ago," Wells recalled.

"We're going to really stress the family entertainment aspect of racing," Wells added.

Wells said the industry's roots are in family-style entertainment from county fairs where racing got its start.

"I grew up in racing," Wells said. "My dad operated a small, bush track in Oklahoma years ago before pari-mutual racing."

Wells plans to revive some of those entertaining ideas from the past.

Fans at Ruidoso Downs can get close to the track - a unique feature, Wells said, and one he plans to exploit.

"You can almost reach out and touch a horse that's running along the outside rail," Wells said. "You're incredibly close to the action. We can engender that feeling

here at Ruidoso much better than we can at a gigantic place like Hollywood Park or Santa Anita," he said. "Here things are much more intimate, and the people here are horse people, even the tourists."

But that's not close enough for Wells.

"We're going to take the fan closer to the game than they have ever been able to be," Wells said.

Fans will be in the winner's circle and at the starting gate. A microphone will allow fans to eavesdrop on the conversations in the starting gate, thus gaining a sense of the excitement before the gates open.

They will also receive insider's tips from track announcer Luke Krytbosch.

Wells says fan education is his forte. He trained horses for 17 years. He possesses an understanding of the game he'd like to share with fans.

"The more the fans learn about the game, the more they appreciate it. The more they like to play," he said.

Wells hopes these promotions will heighten the entertainment value of his product.

Some of the physical improvements for the 1995 season include: better signage, a picnic area and playground, new theatre-style seating and the Ruidoso Race Horse Hall of Fame.

### The past season

A drop in the track's handle resulted in a \$1.6 million loss last year. Comparing the 1993 season to 1994 season, fans wagered less dollars, a lot less dollars. For the season, the handle was down 27.9%. On a day's average it dropped 25.8%.

Still, more than 236,000 people passed through turnstiles for the season - a daily average of 3,474. In 1993, the daily attendance was 3,496.

These numbers seem to back up Chase's theory.

"There's only so many gambling dollars out there," said Chase, the track's office manager. Earlier this year, Indian reservations and pueblos were granted the right to full casino-style gambling by Gov. Gary Johnson.

Chase said video machines were critical to the track's survival because they would supplement the horseman's winnings which would, in turn, draw a higher quality of horses. Better horses mean increased attendance and interest and bigger handles.

"We're still going to put on a good summer meet," Chase said. "We want to go on and on, but we must be able to compete in the world of gambling."

Ticket sales and nominations remained steady even on the Monday after the end of the legislative session, Chase said.

The question that now remains is whether or not 1995 marks the new beginning or the final chapter of racing at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

"I want to make this place a highlight of a small racetrack that does big things," Wells said. "And on the other hand, I don't want to be the person that came in here thinking that he was fulfilling a lifetime dream, and then has to put a padlock on the place."

band shell and Arthur Fiedler and the Boston Pops were giving a wonderful concert and even shooting off cannons, very dramatic. At least 5,000 people were listening, everybody sitting on the ground or a few people at little tables drinking wine.

"I loved the white cement (band) shell with the gold decoration on the back. It was so elegant with the Charles River quietly flowing by and the beautiful sunny day. I thought, 'We should have this out on our mountains, because our mountains are much more beautiful.'"

She formed a non-profit foundation and started putting money aside each year, in part from a family inheritance from majority stock in the Wall Street Journal.

"I wanted to have the money before I started," she said. "It's a \$14 million building now, possibly more later. That's not as big as some of the big theaters, but it's going to be elegant, because that's my taste, simple and elegant. It's going to be white stone."

Predeck is looking for just the right marble in Turkey, Spencer said. Cradling an example of a similar marble from Colorado, she pointed out the rough side, which reminds her of the sparkle and softness of snow on the Sacramento Mountains.

Spencer changed the development site of the 53,000 square-foot performing arts theater about two years ago, primarily because she thought the land off Airport Road near Rancho Ruidoso offered more

space to create the perfect setting, she said.

"At 330 yards in length, the building is very long, but because of the size of the property and the vastness of the country, it's not too big," Spencer said.

Although she plans to hire a professional staff and booking agent, and has appointed a board of directors, this project is her baby and it's a private, non-profit venture, Spencer said.

"I'm actually doing this for myself and anybody else who wants to come along is welcome," she said. But she's also thinking of ways to reach every group of citizens in the community.

"What I'm planning is, if we have a musical performance Saturday night, we'd have another show on Sunday before noon for families," she said. "I want to make sure working people can come. They adore the arts and music, but don't always have access."

Spencer doesn't plan exclusively

on classics in ballet or music. She wants to schedule choral performances, modern dance, barber shop quartet competitions and any other type of music she finds intriguing. Once a year, she hopes to book a New York show.

"I see all kinds of music except opera," which already has a center in Santa Fe, she said.

"The architect said it would take 12 months from the time he signed the contract to finish the plans, which means around June 10-July 10," Spencer said. "Probably, we'll have a picnic and a fireworks display out there on July Fourth to celebrate. There are no pine trees and the Bonito Fire Department has agreed to come over and stand by."

Construction could take 12-15 months.

Before turning Predeck loose on the design, Spencer visited performing centers in Texas, Colorado and California to come up with her concept. However, her concept only partially translated to the final plans. Predeck had ideas of his own. At times, Spencer said they've come to verbal blows over design points.

Considered one of the top seven architects in the country, Predeck earlier this month won three awards from the Albuquerque chapter of the American Institute of Architects for his work on buildings at the University of California and University of New Mexico and for a private residence in Manhattan Beach, Calif.

For Spencer, Predeck and associate Doug Friend designed a sleek

wedge-shaped building surrounded by gardens with waterfalls and pools where patrons can wander among trees and flowers at intermission or enjoy an occasional outside performance from a stage at the back of the building.

The design allows drivers to drop off passengers at the front and then continue on to park in the 250-space lot. During inclement weather, they could pull through a special protected section cut through the building.

An irregularly shaped glass dome acts as foyer and will be illuminated with indirect lighting to create a glowing effect, Spencer said.

"I wanted a chandelier and he (Predeck) said the whole foyer is a chandelier," Spencer said.

The stage is situated under the high point of the wedge, which also hides the backdrop storage area. The back wall will be constructed to allow it to be opened to the outside and a spectacular view of Sierra Blanca, she said. Toward the lower end, guests can congregate at intermission in the lobby or stroll through the outdoor patios and gardens, while patrons gather in their private lounge.

The actors' wing of the structure will include four star dressing rooms, several smaller changing areas, a courtyard and a lounge.

Spencer plans an opening she said Lincoln County residents will never forget, with fireworks and Christmas trimmings. It's only fitting, she said, for a center that will bring pleasure and culture to the county for generations.

Local hospital tops in nation

Lincoln County Medical Center is operating in the black and growing.

Last December, staff members were excited to learn that the hospital was named one of the nation's "Top 100 Benchmark Hospitals." The designation by an independent study group looked at the hospital's quality of care as evidenced by factors ranging from financial performance to patient mortality.

The 39-bed medical center was compared with 1,119 others in the category of rural hospitals with fewer than 250 beds.

To expand the range of care available to patients, Hospital Administrator Valerie Miller within the last few months has recruited two new family practitioners, Drs. Roy Seidel and Jeremiah Hall. Orthopedic surgeon Barry Cromer started last October. Dr. Juergen Rebstock's addition as a general surgeon rounds out the list and compliments those physicians already in the community.

Although Ruidoso's population may not justify some specialties on a full-time basis, 11 visiting specialists work out of the hospital, Miller said. Their specialties deal with ophthalmology, neurology, cardiology, dermatology, cancer, plastic and reconstructive surgery, ear, nose and throat, illnesses of

the digestive system, bladder and kidneys.

"We expanded our emergency room coverage to 24 hours," Miller added. "Previously, coverage was from 6 a.m. to 2 a.m."

A new advance life support crew also has been added to the emergency services, with four fully staffed ambulances now available to residents or visitors in need.

"Most of our equipment purchases over the last year were replacements," Miller said.

Changes behind the scenes that patients may not notice directly, but that help in handling diagnoses and procedures, include automating the laboratory, introducing a new radiology management system and pharmacy management system, and adding high tech ultrasound.

"We continue to pay the county's contribution to state Medicaid as sole provider," Miller said. "We take the money out of the one mill levy (a special annual tax approved by voters for the operation of the hospital and purchase of new equipment).

"We also continue to provide \$1.2 million in free care."

Miller reported that the Carrizozo Health Clinic, which is managed by the hospital, ended the year with a \$82,000 gain, which will be reinvested in equipment. Looking toward the future, Miller

ler said the hospital administration and board of directors has been investigating the creation of a primary care delivery network in conjunction with the clinic.

It would be a cooperative effort with Home Health Care Services of

Lincoln County and the public health office.

"It's still in the initial stages," she said. "We plan to apply for money to purchase a van under a Community Development Block Grant."

Ski Apache stays flexible with market

While some ski areas struggle to stay afloat, Ski Apache continues to be a financial success thanks to experienced and flexible direction by its general manager, Roy Parker.

Parker has managed Ski Apache since 1964. A long-time veteran of the business, Parker knows of the ski industry's recent woes.

"I don't have a crystal ball for the future. The ski business hasn't been growing in the last five to six years," Parker said. "The monsters are doing well but the smaller areas are hurting."

Ski Apache isn't a "monster," but it isn't one of the smaller ski areas, either. And it has stayed solvent and successful, Parker said. The last time the ski area lost money was in the 1971 - a disastrous year for all New Mexico ski resorts because of the little snowfall.

What is Parker's secret? "Flexibility," Parker answered. The management has been willing enough to adapt and to scale back during certain years, he said.

This year is no exception. With the drastic devaluation of the peso, the ski area doesn't expect to see the Easter holiday crowd it has in the past. Mexican nationals make up anywhere from 60-70% of that holiday traffic, said Ski Apache marketing manager Riker Davis.

As a result, Ski Apache will close

for the 1994-1995 season April 9. "It doesn't behoove us to stay open through Easter weekend," Parker said.

Last year's ski season was another case in point. With improved snowmaking capabilities, Ski Apache crews were able to coat the lower half of the mountain with manmade snow despite a somewhat poor natural snow year.

Snowmaking is also critical for building a base early in the season and for maintaining coverage in high traffic areas during the season, Parker said.

This year, crews started making snow Nov. 1 and continued up until Christmas. The ski area received enough natural snow throughout the season that it hasn't had to resume snowmaking efforts.


Ski Apache will have been open for 137 days this season - the same as last year - when it closes April 9. As of late March, it averaged 1,863 skiers a day, according to Parker's reports.

Parker said he plans no major physical improvements during the 1995 off-season. Summer work consists of the usual repairs and maintenance of lift lines, removal of tree stumps, shaping up of trails and the cutting of one new trail from the top of eight to Deep Freeze.

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

Parker said most of the improvements won't be noticeable to skiers. "There's never an end to the work. We're rounding off rough edges," Parker said.

### Marketing Ski Apache

For marketing manager Riker Davis, nothing sells better than snow. Yet, even during good snow years, Davis can't be sure if skiers visit Ski Apache because of the present skiing conditions, or because of a ski package deal their travel agent arranged for them.

Davis oversees the rental and retail shop operations, and handles most of the outside marketing operations for the ski area. He's worked at Ski Apache since 1977, and for the last 10 years has helped marketing director Patricia Morrison.

During the summer, he will travel to ski shows and travel agent exhibitions representing Ski Apache.

"The more ski-specific, the more we're interested," Davis said of the shows. "We try to limit our focus on a qualified audience of skiers."

Davis said one of the best shows of this type is the Dallas SkiFest held the first weekend in November each year. Up to 16,000 ski enthusiasts attend the three-day event.

"It's a significant expense to our marketing budget, but that's obviously our backyard," Davis said.

And Davis is adamant about protecting Ski Apache's backyard, an area he defines as San Diego to New Orleans and everything in between south of Albuquerque.

Davis would be wasting time and money trying to market San Francisco, New York and London, he explains, because Ski Apache is not a destination spot.

"The huge difference between us and them is slope-side lodging," Davis said. The "thems" are resorts like Aspen and Vail where tourists can fly in and stay at a lodge at the foot of the ski area.

In contrast, Ski Apache has a "drive-in market," Davis said. People drive to Ruidoso, stay in lodging in Ruidoso, and then drive up to the ski area.

Ski Apache could create some slope-side lodging, but Davis said that is unlikely. It would require coming to an agreement with the U.S. Forest Service, and besides, there is no shortage of beds in the Ruidoso/Alto area, Davis said.

"Our focus is on skiing, not on real estate or the restaurant business," Davis said, adding it's been the philosophy of the Ski Apache management to re-invest profit into its product, skiing.

Davis has explored other marketing strategies with mixed results. Last summer for the first time, he visited with lots of travel agents and set up commissioned ski lift ticket packages for them to sell.

Davis mailed a folder with all the information to 3,000 travel agents. Some agents took advantage of the deal and booked a number of packages, but the major-

# Forest seeks to protect biodiversity, expand on recreational opportunities

Lincoln National Forest officials have a wide range of duties, ranging from improving biological diversity of the ecosystem to improving recreational opportunities. This requires a staff with a broad range of expertise.

Recreation is one of the high interest areas for visitors to this 1.1 million acre forest. One of the biggest improvement projects in the works for the 375,000-acre Smokey Bear Ranger District is the reconstruction and upgrading of the Three Rivers Campground on the west side of the forest.

The campground is one of seven maintained in this forest district. There are also six maintained picnic areas and two pavilion/vista areas.

Three Rivers campground improvements are being combined with improvements to the nearby trailhead, said Sam Tobias, a recreation staff officer. Trailhead improvements may be completed in early May.

Additionally, plans for a wildlife interpretation kiosk are in the works for the camping area, informing visitors about wetlands plants and the region's tropical birds.

with the Southeastern New Mexico Trail Coalition, U.S. Bureau of Land Management, local hiking enthusiasts and several bike shop owners to make these trails.

"We're encouraged by the participation of key players in town working to expand this opportunity," Tobias says, adding the new trails may be regional trails looping together off road distances.

The Lincoln Forest has 225 miles of maintained hiking trails in the Smokey Bear district, with more than half (150 miles) in wilderness areas where bikes are not allowed.

Tobias says the district will hire 15 to 18 youths in Lincoln County to help maintain the trails this summer, and continues to accept the help of volunteers.

"We're working to meet the demands for recreational activities in the area while protecting the land," Tobias says.

### Wildlife Observation

One of the Forest Service's goals is to take wildlife off the United States Fish and Wildlife Service sensitive, threatened and endangered species lists.

According to Larry Cordova, a wildlife biologist with the Smokey Bear Ranger Station, critical cool season (spring time) grasses growing from March through May are in danger of being lost. Due to a century of overgrazing, water table depletion and suppression of cyclical fires, these grassy areas within the pinon and juniper ecosystem have appeared brown until the rains and warm season grasses move in.

Also found in this delicate habitat is the sensitive grama grass cactus and the endangered hedgehog cactus.

ity didn't. And that surprised Davis, who said the booking process was a relatively easy one.

"We will continue to work with travel agents, but we won't spend as many dollars or hours courting them," Davis said.

Davis finds the best marketing tool is simply getting the Ski Apache name in front of its consumers.

"That's the constant focus, getting our name out," Davis said.

Davis saw his fastest growing market for the last four years slow tremendously with the devaluation of the Mexican peso. Texas is still Ski Apache's biggest marketing area.

"With the peso in the situation it is in now, we don't expect to see the numbers of Mexicans as we would have this spring and next winter," Davis said.

Expansion, if anywhere, is to the southeast and Florida, Davis said. "Just as long as we're getting our name out there," he added.

"The key to replenishing the grasses is changing the way we manage livestock," Cordova says, adding that Greg Grey of the range management division is focusing on this effort, which is part and parcel to the ecosystem restoration projects.

Several other plants and creatures within the forest district (living within the grasslands as well as the Ponderosa pine forests and along wetlands) are listed as sensitive, threatened and endangered, Cordova says, and efforts to monitor and improve habitats are ongoing. These include the bald eagle (six winter in Ruidoso, and efforts are being made to restore the wetlands where they stay), northern goshawk, occult little brown bat, Sacramento prickly poppy, Mexican spotted owl, Sacramento Mountains thistle, Southwestern willow flycatcher, New Mexican jumping mouse, Goodding's onion, Sacramento Mountain salamander, Villard's pincushion cactus, and Kerr's milkvetch.

Cordova says there is a "fair population" of Mexican spotted owl — at least 20 pairs — in this area's multi-storied Ponderosa Pine canopies, and the Forest Service has historically monitored their territorial presence. This is done by imitating the bird's "hoots" during the evening hours and waiting for a response call. The biologists might also bait the area with "mild and

scope out the praying bird's activities.

During the morning hours, they return to the same locale and try to locate the nest to determine the reproductive status of the owl, which mates with the same partner for life and normally returns to the same general area to nest during the Feb. 1 to Aug. 31 breeding season (after wintering in lower elevations).

"We put together a map placing their location," Cordova explains. This is used in conjunction with project plans or activities for the area. "We put together a proposal of critical habitat and put aside the areas of nesting and dispersal habitat area for the young."

While the Forest Service will restrict noise-generating activities in the nesting areas, Cordova says the agency's recovery plan is to "ultimately take them off the threatened list. We want to protect their habitat and to manage it for future use." Also in the works for the wildlife

officers, Cordova says, is the surveying of Cedar Creek and its potential as a fishery. A college student will be hired to research the health of the stream.

The Forest Service is helping develop a brochure and map listing birds nesting in Lincoln County.

The pamphlet is being put together by the Lincoln County Bird Club and a local graphic company. They hope to complete it by late May or early June.

Additionally, for the third straight year, the Forest Service will be holding a "Hooked on Fishing" contest for youths up to 12 years of age at the end of May or in early June.

The casting contest, to be held at Ruidoso's Two Rivers Park, is a cooperative effort between the state's Department of Game and Fish, the Village of Ruidoso, and Mesilla Valley Fly Fisherman's Group.

The one-day event, which needs volunteers, introduces children to fishing etiquette and teaches them how to tie flies.

Interactive management

The efforts of the Forest Service require an interactive management approach.

Every facet of every forest activity is interrelated, say Smokey Bear Ranger District officials. So what happens at the District office in Ruidoso talk about plans for im-

proved campgrounds, nature preserves, and forest health, they speak in a comprehensive manner.

"The Service used to do certain projects to improve only one resource (at a time)," explains Dick Edwards, the district's ecosystem management coordinator. "Now we look to improve many (interests) and look at the effects over large areas."

This "biodiversity" approach tying all resources together is progressive, because it is designed to consecutively improve forest health in each passing season, Edwards says.

"You can't talk about the watershed without talking about ecosystem management," he says.

The key efforts of the Forest Service, Edwards explains, are the

restoration of areas in unsatisfactory condition, management of resources and meeting the recreational needs of people.

"We want to manage resources so that we can sustain all renewable and non-renewable resources forever," he says.

An ongoing project of the station is the restoration of the pinon and juniper pine ecosystem.

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
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
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
