### Man pleads guilty to slaying elderly Lincoln resident

David Michael Crawford, 25, was sentenced last week to life plus 17 years in prison for the murder of Clarke Pflingsten of Lincoln in August 1994.

Crawford pleaded guilty to the charge of capital murder. He offered no statement at his sentencing by 5th District Judge W.P. Johnson.

Last year Crawford, a former Roswell resident, walked away from Camp Sierra Blanca, a minimum security prison in Lincoln County. He then apparently hitched a ride with the 84-year-old Pflingsten.

Several days later, Crawford was arrested in Roswell driving Pflingsten's pickup. He later led law enforcement officials to the body of the elderly man, who died from injuries apparently associated with being run over by a vehicle.

First-degree murder carries a maximum sentence of 18 years. Capital murder requires a life sentence, about 33 years. With good time, Crawford could be eligible for parole in about 25 years.

### Guv approves five projects for county

Bills containing money for five Lincoln County projects survived Gov. Gary Johnson's scrutiny last week and were not among the estimated 207 he vetoed.

State Rep. Dub Williams (R-Glencoe) said he received that good news over the weekend.

Williams' bill that will allow local school boards to give credit for athletic periods starting during the school day also was passed.

Local projects to receive state funding include:

- Ruidoso will receive \$180,000 for wastewater system improvements;
- Ruidoso Downs will receive \$180,000 for water system improvements;
- Carrizozo gets \$70,000 for a police/court complex;
- and Corona scores twice with \$50,000 for a school activity bus and \$65,000 for remodeling of a senior citizens center.

## Commissioners consider request for state lands predator control

Ray Powell might look at Lincoln County's invitation to talk about predator control as the fox asking the chicken to stop by for lunch.

As New Mexico public lands commissioner, Powell came under fire from ranchers Tuesday during a Lincoln County Commission meeting for a policy banning state-funded animal damage control (ADC) agents on land under his jurisdiction.

Powell said he decided to continue the ban started by his predecessor until he had time to review the impact.

Commissioner Wilton Howell said the best way to ensure the commission is getting accurate information would be to invite Powell to attend the commission's meeting May 2. Before agreeing to join

Chaves County in its protest of Powell's approach, commissioners need more information, he said.

Chaves County Manager Hubert Quintana said his commission has proposed to Powell that Chaves and Lincoln counties be used as a control area to allow predator control agents to operate and see what happens.

"They would keep track of the number of predators killed and the number trapped by accident to really evaluate the impact of ADC," Quintana said.

Ed Moreno, assistant commissioner lands commissioner for public affairs, said Friday the invitation from Lincoln hadn't arrived, but that Powell would consider a meeting.

### Powell's view

The most recent data collected and presented by the predator con-

rol agents is being analyzed by the department, Moreno said.

"The commissioner is very concerned about accountability," Moreno said of Powell. Two weeks ago, Powell met with Chaves County officials, the state head of ADC and woolgrower representatives.

"They have started talking again about how to resolve the issue," Moreno said.

Negotiations revolve around four criteria set by Powell: that a plan be biologically sound, that it be specific to the targeted animal, that the program be as humane as possible and that it provides producers an opportunity to protect their investment.

"What the commissioner wants to do is to work with people to resolve this on a management

## Juveniles break sheriff's budget

The flood of juvenile offenders in Lincoln County has nearly exhausted the sheriff's budget for part-time labor to transport them to holding and detention centers.

Sheriff James McSwane told county commissioners Tuesday he has been using dispatchers and other full-time employees to help.

"There's not much left in part-time help and I'm saving it for any major incident," McSwane said. "I've transported several juveniles myself. We've had an overrun of transport because of all the juvenile activity. There's been 20 in the past three to four weeks and several adults."

By state law, the sheriff is responsible for transporting prisoners back and forth to court, no matter what agency arrests them.

Reports filed for reimbursement show from Feb. 2-15, the sheriff spent \$2,277 on transport. From March 1-27, \$1,187 was spent, for a total of 28 trips for the 1.5 months.

Some of his part-time labor was used to supplement for a dispatcher who was ill, he said.

"I'm trying to reduce the cost of part-time employment so I don't have to ask for more at the end of the year," McSwane said.

Commissioner Bill Schwettmann said department overtime might be reduced if part-time people were used for transport instead of full-time employees.

The job of hauling juveniles to

centers outside the county and back to court in county is a burden to his office, McSwane said. Six were moved last Monday, some to Truth or Consequences, three to Albuquerque.

"I would agree that we need a maximum juvenile facility in Lincoln County," McSwane said.

Commissioner Wilton Howell said he understood some of the transport is necessary because the local jail is full.

"I hear a lot are in jail because of parole or probation violations instead of being sent to prison in Santa Fe," he said.

When he ran the jail up until about two years ago, he kept enough cells available to earn money from Otero County for housing their prisoners, McSwane said.

Although commissioners approved the report for reimbursement, they asked County Manager Carolin Cooney to set up a meeting with local district, magistrate and municipal judges, as well as parole and probation officers.

### Other sheriff's business

Commissioners approved \$17,000 in annual Law Enforcement Protection money allocated to the sheriff's office by the state for equipment and training.

Each sheriff's office in New Mexico also received \$300 per certified officer, 16 in Lincoln County, for a total of \$21,800.

**Commissioners to discuss improving fire safety of county residents**

Within the next 90 days, Lincoln County Commissioners will meet with officials from the U.S. Forest Service, the State Forestry Division and State Fire Marshal's office and representatives of other elected boards in the county to discuss fire safety and forest management.

Commissioner Stirling Spencer Tuesday told other board members that fires could become a big problem in the county this year because of trees and other vegetation close to homes that are surrounded by the Lincoln National Forest.

The problem is the most severe in Ruidoso, where vegetation has thickened and Ponderosa pines have been weakened by the parasitic dwarf mistletoe plant. Rain would help, but often brings with it lightning that can start fires even in the middle of a downpour.

Spencer asked the staff to schedule the meeting at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center.

**Emergency vehicle designation ignites debate on legitimate uses**

To lessen Lincoln County's liability and ensure that abuses are not occurring, the county commission wants to approve each vehicle designated for emergency response.

Such designated vehicles, by law, are allowed to exceed the maximum speed limit and use flashing emergency lights as long as they do not endanger lives.

"I'm in the mind that the fewer out there, the less the chances of an accident," Commission Chairman Monroy Montes said Tuesday. Fire trucks, pumpers and ambulances would receive the designation, but cars driven by volunteers may not, even if a vehicle bears a state license, commissioners decided.

Commissioner Wilton Howell said he received complaints that Howard Puckett of the Bonito volunteer fire and rescue group used a state-licensed vehicle for personal business as well as emergency uses.

Puckett said at one time the vehicle belonged to him, but he donated it to the fire department and it is now covered by county insurance. He does drive it for non-emergency matters, Puckett said. But he justified that use by saying he is on call for emergencies 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The vehicle carries medical, firefighting and extrication equipment, he said.

Being able to use emergency lights saves time getting to an accident or fire scene, said Bill Elliott, a former commissioner. "I had heartburn about the vehicle he drives too," Elliott said. "It came up when I was a commissioner. I don't know whether it is abused or not."

Montes said he doesn't want to discourage volunteers. He noted that out of the many volunteer fire and emergency departments in the county, only Bonito showed up to ask for designation of vehicles other than the main units. Montes said he wants all of the departments to come with a list of the vehicles they want designated before the commission takes any action.

**Lincoln County receives 911 money for Mescalero to implement system**

An application to the State Board of Finance by Lincoln County resulted in \$150,089 of additional Enhanced 911 emergency alert equipment designated for Mescalero.

Hearing about the award last Tuesday, County Commission Chairman Monroy Montes said the money will help the tribe implement a 911 telephone alert system.

"I'm tired of seeing remarks all the time that there is no cooperation between Lincoln County and the Mescalero," he said. "This is an example of the county doing something to enhance emergency response to save the lives of Mescalero residents."

Although the reservation abuts Ruidoso in Lincoln County, it lies within the boundaries of Otero County.

Although the office already had been approved for a COPS FAST three-year grant of \$69,854, commissioners told McSwane he could not accept the money.

The program would have hired one officer for the sheriff, who would work with community organizations such as Crime Watch groups. The county would have been responsible for 34% of the total costs, or \$11,670 each of the three years, McSwane said. Lincoln was one of 17 counties in the state selected.

But commissioners didn't like the idea of having to pick up the permanent position at the end of the grant period.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley questioned whether the position would duplicate work already being done by the D.A.R.E. officer who leads a drug awareness and avoidance program in schools.

He said he applied for \$28,000 for the D.A.R.E. program this year, but only received \$18,000. He'll try again next year for the full amount.

Montes said he'd vote for D.A.R.E. and acceptance of the law enforcement money, "but item B (COPS FAST) doesn't inspire me."

The motion to that effect by Commissioner Stirling Spencer passed 5-0.

Joan Bailey, director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, will give her quarterly report to trustees at tonight's Ruidoso Downs village council meeting.

Also on the agenda for the meeting:

— trustees will decide on the hiring of Tinnie Swanner as deputy clerk/finance officer;

— vote on a mobile home variance request from Gary Ford;

— hear and decide about a charge of \$2,300 to get the new Ruidoso Downs computer system fully operational;

— and monthly reports will be presented from police, fire, animal control, court, code enforcement and maintenance departments.

The village council meeting is at 7 p.m. tonight at the Ruidoso Downs Village Hall. For additional information call 378-4422.

basis, not political basis," Moreno said.

"It's our belief that there probably are problems that need to be addressed, but not (problems) that are so widespread or pervasive that they require a shotgun approach," Moreno added. "Right now, we're leaning toward a very focused target policy that addresses specific areas and possible specific ranches where predation is known to be occurring more than other places."

Ranchers can take other action when a predator problem is severe, he said.

"Under state policy, the lessee has the authority to do whatever it takes to protect livestock and that includes doing their own trapping, and hiring someone to act as personal contractor," he said. It's a different situation when the program is funded with public money and yet is not accountable, he added.

Many of the predators other than coyotes (such as mountain lions and foxes) are covered by state game and fish rules. Categorized as fur-bearing animals, they can be hunted and trapped two-thirds of the year, Moreno said.

"We had wanted a policy in place by this lambing and calving season, which is too far along now to do anything, but legislative issues got in the way," Moreno said.

## Ranchers' problems

Rory McMinn, chairman of the Chaves County Commission and a rancher, told Lincoln commissioners Tuesday that he can attest firsthand to the negative economic impacts from Powell's policy.

He asked Lincoln commissioners to join his county by sending a joint resolution to Powell, asking for a change or to set up the two counties as a test area.

Because most ranches are a checkerboard of private, state and federal land, a uniform approach to predator control needs to be applied, he said.

"It's difficult to have control on federal and private land, but not on state land," he said. "It's a hit or miss situation."

He contended that his county has experienced \$150,000 in annual losses from predators. He said he has been told that poorly controlled predation along with other market forces have contributed to the failure of several ranches.

Lincoln County is one of three counties in the state where ranchers voluntarily pay 26 cents per head of livestock each year to supplement federal predator control allocations.

A representative of the state woolgrowers association said "government repression" and predators have resulted in the loss of 50% of the sheep population in the state over the last six years.

Possible legal action is being discussed by Chaves County, but I

want to avoid that," McMinn said. Attempts to get Powell to explain his decision have been fruitless, he said.

State-owned land constitutes about one third of Chaves County, he said. Howell said it accounts for about one-tenth, or 301,800 acres, of Lincoln County's 3.1 million acres.

"I'm concerned that (joining Chaves County) could lead to a legal battle," Howell said.

Lincoln Commissioner Stirling Spencer, a rancher, urged commissioners to approve a joint resolution pleading the case of ranchers, asking Powell to take another look at his policy and asking him to respond to the commissions.

### Zia Senior Centers streamline, but won't cut back county services

After viewing more than a half-dozen other senior citizens operations in the state, Cheryl LaBelle has returned with some new ideas on how to improve the Zia Senior Citizens centers she operates for Lincoln County.

When she brings the county commission her proposed budget, it will reflect management restructuring such as changes of duties and responsibilities, new job descriptions, more flexible operation hours and consolidation of some functions, she told commissioners Tuesday.

Under the food management section, Ada Hendryx, LaBelle's assistant and manager of the Carrizozo center, said inventory control changes will be initiated, bids will be sought quarterly instead of monthly, requisition forms will be required and the agency will track the average cost of meals by the month instead of annually.

"Then if there is any problem with an inventory item, we will be able to spot it right away," Hendryx said. "We feel there will be better pricing, freshness and control. Although we order quarterly, items will be delivered monthly so that no more freezer space will be needed."

Commission Chairman Monroy Montes said he wanted to dispel any rumors that the commission planned to cut back on the Zia program, which operates centers in Corona, San Patricio, Capitan, Carrizozo and cooperatively with Ruidoso Downs in that village. He realizes that the hot meals serves at these centers may be the only one of the day for many senior citizens, he said.

"This is the one program that impacts the county on a daily basis," Montes said. "The county only contributes a small portion and we're asking you to be even more efficient. I want to assure you we'll be asking the same of other departments."

# Charges dropped against man who shot Ruidoso intruder

John Blackmon faced up to three years in prison for shooting Alan Ryan. But after Thursday's preliminary hearing in Ruidoso's magistrate court, he was freed from the aggravated assault charges.

Judge William Butts found no probable cause for the charges against the 21-year-old Blackmon after hearing the testimony of four witnesses to the early morning, Feb. 16 shooting at 208 Hart Street.

Rather, Butts indicated Blackmon had reason to believe he might receive a serious beating from Ryan, who admitted to the court he has been imprisoned for previous acts of violence and battery.

Blackmon's brother Manuel, 19, and the two women who lived at the shooting scene — Amber Turner 19 and Freda Trujillo, 18, — testified the intoxicated Ryan had been harassing and threatening Turner and Trujillo for nearly two weeks, keeping them captive in their house on two occasions and cutting their phone lines.

"I have no doubt these four people were in fear for their lives," Judge Butts said. Butts concluded the victim was not welcomed in Trujillo and Turner's dwelling and that Blackmon was rightfully armed.

The hearing was manned by extra police officers and lined with metal detectors.

Judge Butts warned the witnesses, as well as their families who were seated in the courtroom, that lingering animosity presented a "dangerous and a very volatile situation here which presents a danger to the community."

And he told the group to call the police whenever in a threatening situation — something Trujillo and Turner said they did not do because they felt it would have little impact on Ryan's actions.

"Don't take the law into your own hands — it could ruin your life," Judge Butts reprimanded.

The women explained how they had requested the Blackmon brothers stay at the house with them out of fear of Ryan, and that on the night of the shooting, he entered the Hart Street house without invitation, threatened and choked Trujillo.

Trujillo said Ryan repeatedly accused her of "narcing" on him and had said, prior to the night of the shooting, that he planned to kill her boyfriend in Alamogordo for ratting on him.

Trujillo said after he barged his way into her bedroom, and cursed her while squeezing her neck with his hands, the 22-year-old Ryan went back out into the house's main living area. Witnesses said he claimed things were coming to a head "now," then charged at Blackmon.

Blackmon told him to "chill out,"

but fired the single, Ruger .9mm bullet when Ryan was about 15 feet away. He then called for police and an ambulance.

"All have testified that Alan Ryan is dirt," the assistant district attorney, Reed Thompson of Alamogordo argued for Ryan, "but it is clear cut in the testimony that he was not armed. I ask the court to look at the claim of self defense and ask whether Mr. Blackmon acted appropriately with an un-armed man."

Blackmon's attorney, public defender Gary Mitchell, countered, "Four people were afraid of what Mr. Ryan might do — two were deathly afraid...There are laws against stalking people; there are laws against keeping someone captive in their house."

The bullet penetrated Ryan's left arm and lower abdomen. His injuries required surgery at Albuquerque's Presbyterian Services. Ryan told the court his arm would be operated on again this month. He was just released from the hospital late last month.

After limping up to the witness stand, Ryan stared down Blackmon. The staring contest continued for a long 30 seconds and was only interrupted by the resumption of proceedings. Mitchell asked Ryan what his glares at Blackmon were meant to demonstrate.

"I'm angry with him," Ryan explained to the court.

## Probable cause found in hotel robbery

Ruidoso Magistrate Judge William Butts found probable cause Thursday to charge a Ruidoso man with the robbery and beating of a hotel clerk.

Kevin Jefferson, a 25-year-old Ruidoso man, is charged with beating and robbing a night clerk at the Inn of Pine Springs on Christmas Eve.

Judge Butts found probable

cause for the charges of aggravated battery, robbery and two counts of conspiracy against Jefferson, and forwarded the case to District Judge Richard Parsons.

Jefferson has been held at the county jail since being arrested in January. Police allege he robbed the inn and repeatedly kicked the night clerk in the head as he slept on the couch.

If found guilty of the charges, he could be sentenced to up to 10 years in prison.

Jefferson allegedly committed the crime with a 17-year-old juvenile who Judge Parsons found guilty of robbery and assault charges last month. The boy was transported from Springer to testify against Jefferson at Thursday's hearing.



For the last two weeks Ruidoso track coach Ronny Maskew has seen something in his Warriors that others might miss if they only looked at a meet's final team standings.

Maskew has seen improvement, and that improvement has been enough for the veteran track coach to make a prediction about the Warriors' upcoming meet this Friday.

"We're going to do real well this Friday at our invitational," Maskew said, after his team's performance at the Roswell Invitational. "We have a good chance to be very competitive."

He even went as far to say Ruidoso has a good chance to win its quadrangular meet featuring Artesia, Lovington, Socorro and the Warriors.

"As coaches, it's hard to explain why we're so encouraged," Maskew said. A lot of it has to do with individual performances - performances that don't always score points at larger meets.

One example, Maskew noted, was Becenti Platero's performance in the 1600-meter run at Roswell Saturday. Platero shaved 20 seconds off his best time and ran a 5:29.

"There are some who are not getting points for us (at the larger

meets), but we're expecting them to do well," Maskew said.

Ruidoso should get an idea of how much it has improved when it competes against just Class AAA teams for the first time this season. Every meet this year has included some schools with larger enrollments.

Maskew likes having his team compete against the bigger schools. He said it makes his team stronger by the end of the season. But there's no doubt Maskew and the Warriors are looking forward to Friday's meet when they compete against teams their own size.



# Fallen roof doesn't faze potluck

It takes more than a roof being ripped off to stop a potluck dinner at the Church of Christ in Capitan.

About 40 members of the congregation were gathered in the church dining hall for a monthly dinner about 12:30 p.m. Sunday when they heard a noise like thunder.

When a few went outside to

look, they saw the church's two-year-old roof ripped off and flipped over on the other side of the building.

"Most of the people didn't even stop eating," said Dolores Earwood, wife of pastor Leslie Earwood. "Everyone was very relaxed even when the lights went out. Finally, we said it's time for everyone to leave."

The ceiling remained intact and no debris fell inside, she said Monday.

The church is covered by insurance. No damage figure was available Monday.

"No one was hurt," Earwood said. "We were lucky that the children were not out playing, because that's the area where the roof landed."

Capitan police officer Carlos Britos said the Earwoods contacted his department and notified Otero Electric Cooperative that the power supply on the roof was knocked out.

A trailer just two lots down from the church at the corner of Lincoln Avenue and Fifth Street also suffered roof damage from the high wind, he said.

# Inn of Mountain Gods fire kept under control

A fire fanned by high winds broke out on the roof of the Inn of the Mountain Gods Sunday.

Dale Webb of the Bureau of Indian Affairs fire department based in Mescalero said his men arrived at the scene within minutes of the fire being detected about 4:30 p.m.

No guests were in the five-story hotel structure at the time, officials said.

The Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs fire department also showed up to help.

"Some men were working on the roof earlier in the day, but we're not sure what might have happened," said Webb, who is an arson investi-

gator. "It started against the stairwell, so a cigarette could have been dropped or a torch that they may have used to soften some of the material. We got there right away. With the high winds I thought it might be a bad one."

Webb was headed to the scene Monday to try to determine the cause.

The fire was confined to about a 50x50 foot section of the roof of the five-story section of the inn, said Ruidoso assistant chief Robbie Hall.

It took about a 1.5 hours to ensure the blaze was out.

# Police, Ruidoso man in standoff

A Ruidoso man threatening suicide by knife kept police busy negotiating by telephone outside his house for nearly five hours Friday.

The situation was safely defused at approximately 3:45 p.m. when police stormed the 422 Del Norte Drive residence and dragged 36-year-old Mark Clark out of his house kicking and cursing.

Police detective Jim Biggs said Clark is being held in protective custody at the Carrizozo County Jail on a \$10,000 bond awaiting a psychiatric evaluation, and has been charged with assault (domestic). He was transported there after undergoing an examination by doctors at Lincoln County Medical Center Friday night.

Biggs said five officers surrounded the house Clark shares

with his mother from approximately 10:30 a.m. to 3:45 p.m., after receiving his 911 call warning officers he would kill himself if they came inside his home.

Clark allegedly threatened his mother that morning, engaging in a domestic dispute that ended when he raised his hand at her. No physical violence occurred, but the woman fled the house, Biggs explained.

Soon after his mother left, Clark called the emergency dispatch, explaining his intent to kill himself.

Police then got on the line with Clark from outside his house, and learned he feared his mother had been falsifying his income tax return, and had also cut up his credit card, Biggs said.

Police have received a number of calls recently from Clark with complaints of child custody problems and suspicious concerns regarding information tampering with his personal papers, Biggs said.

Officers finally ended the standoff when Clark came outside and invited Biggs to join him inside the house. Biggs saw Clark held a steak knife behind Clark's back, and told him to get rid of it, which he did by tossing it on the couch.

Once inside, Biggs asked Clark if he had any more weapons; Clark showed Biggs he didn't. The other officers stormed the residence and forced him into the police cruiser, Biggs explained.

### We will survive

It was heartening to hear at Wednesday's Community Forum that, despite the bad news about the Ruidoso Downs Racetrack and Fort Stanton, this is still a healthy, growing, and vibrant community.

The news that the track might close without expanded gambling threw much of the community into shock. But apparently, it didn't throw new homebuyers into shock. Last year was the biggest ever for real estate sales, and sales are up 8.85% the first three months of 1995 versus 1994 — during the time the Legislature was considering the fate of expanded gambling.

We noted in a separate story Thursday that property value totals in the county jumped at least \$44 million last year, too.

The news from Hubbard Enterprises President Mark Wilson that the Museum of the Horse is staying here put one fear to rest (earlier in the year we heard from R.D. Hubbard that the museum was likely to go if the track did). We'd like to think that the museum wouldn't fare that well near L.A. anyway, since so many museums already populate that area. But here, residents and visitors place a high value on the Museum of the Horse. New museum director Jay Wright has made his personal imprint by offering a wealth of enticing shows and programs, and we heard more about his plans at the Community Update luncheon.

The state highway department must think we face growth, too, since it plans to invest \$30 million in area highway improvements over the next five years. School enrollments have grown, new businesses are investing here, and existing businesses such as the hospital are investing in improvements.

The worst news we heard, of course, was that track employees have been told they must take a 10% pay cut. This is another example of the dedication of some people in this community to the track, to take a hit like that. We hope it doesn't last long, because if there's one thing this community isn't known for, it's a low cost of living for the average worker.

Some people want the growth here to stop. Unfortunately for those who love it the way it is, this community cannot stay the same. A community either stays stagnant and dies, or grows and survives. We're glad to hear that, despite the hard times, this community will survive.

### What? Nuclear waste in New Mexico?

An official in New Mexico, listing some of the advantages of being part of the nuclear age, recently spoke of increasing good jobs, annual income for residents, new schools and roads for his community.

All these things, the official said, would be available to the communities that sought them. "Truck drivers, carpenters, road construction, welders, concrete production — we're talking about 200 to 500 jobs," the official said.

You might think, at first glance, that the official was a spokesman for Los Alamos National Laboratories. Los Alamos, after all, has become the wealthiest community in the state through its crucial role in the nuclear age.

The comments, however, were made by Fred Pese, Mesquero Apache vice president.

Pese talked about future benefits to his community after a second vote on the tribe's nuclear-waste storage plan. The second vote, unlike the first, found a majority favoring the plan.

Within the tribe, the storage plan has split many families and friends. Rufina Laws, a leader of the opposition to the plan, suggested that the outcome of the second vote was never in doubt, because the election wasn't honest.

As long as tribal leaders control the elections and paper ballots are used, she said, elections will be meaningless.

Laws and other opponents intend to continue their fight against the plan, which calls for nuclear-power utilities to store spent nuclear fuel on the reservation. The fuel would be placed

in huge concrete lockers. Actual construction of the lockers — assuming the storage plan gets by all the roadblocks that opponents will erect — is years away.

Everyone in the state is justified in viewing the holding of a second election with suspicion. If at first you don't succeed, the watchword seems to be, try, try again.

In an effort to head off the storage plan, some legislators pushed bills designed either to prohibit the spent fuel from ever entering New Mexico, or to set various conditions on it.

Gov. Gary Johnson said the state would have to do a full assessment of the environmental issues involved "in order for the state to decide the course of any action, if any, it will take."

It's the state government's job to protect its citizens from hazards such as radioactive materials.

But it's unfair for the state as a whole to apply a double standard when it comes to the benefits to New Mexico of the nuclear age — whatever people may think of the Mesquero elections.

In Los Alamos, radioactive waste has been disposed of in wildly irresponsible ways over the years.

Moreover, the national laboratory operates behind a veil of secrecy — necessary in many, but not all, cases — which has kept residents of the state from knowing just how dangerous the work on "The Hill" really is. We do know that waste has been dumped in canyons and that radioactivity has been released on unsuspecting citizens.

Few people have responded by calling for a shutdown of the labs. In fact, anytime federal budget cuts threaten the well-being of Los Alamos or other nuclear-related facilities in the state, New Mexico's congressional delegation falls all over itself — as it probably should — to try to keep the federal dollars coming in.

Occasionally, someone tries to get New Mexicans to believe that Los Alamos' true role is in environmental cleanup techniques, or cancer research. But everyone knows — and Los Alamos officials don't really make a secret of it — that its role in the national nuclear scheme centers on weapons.

Critics of the lab's work exist, generally in small groups, but for the most part, the political and economic establishment of the state protects Los Alamos as if it were Fort Knox.

So it might seem odd that when the Mesquero Apache tribe decides to embark on a project to store waste from nuclear power plants, powerful state interests act as though something unusual is happening in New Mexico — which has been home not only to Los Alamos but also to Sandia National Laboratories, Air Force bases, a missile-testing range, and highly dangerous uranium mining.

You can argue that we should have nuclear sites all over the state, or that we should not have any. It's harder to argue that we should have one set of standards for some people and another set of standards for other people.

### A response on nuclear storage TO THE EDITOR:

The people of New Mexico have been deceived. Certain elected officials killed a bill that the people of our state supported. In doing so, they also killed a concept that the people voted for last November, namely gaming.

Their particular plans can only come to the surface if we ask them face to face. Their combined agenda, though almost incomprehensible, obviously harbors some underlying motive. Perhaps campaign war chests have motivated our governing body to snub the voters and totally ignore the overwhelming pro-gaming calls and letters that flooded the capital throughout the session from all over the state. (If you question this overwhelming action, just ask the secretaries who took the calls and opened the letters.)

The precedent set here is more disturbing than the immediate effect this lack of legislation has on

the people of New Mexico. We now have a legal compact with a group of people living within the borders of this state that gives them a comprehensive "right" to take gaming dollars from our citizenry, use it to their own advantage (including potentially huge campaign contributions), and return little to the general welfare of the state.

In addition, the compacts provide practically no oversight from our state. This lack of oversight opens the doors to widespread corruption and possibly the intervention of organized crime. In contrast, the industry that has been "put out to pasture" by this lack of action has continually contributed substantial revenues and has been so keenly scrutinized by the racing commission that corruption has been virtually non-existent.

In scrutinizing the overall issue, the following questions come to mind: How is it that the Indian population in this state, while claiming "sovereignty" votes in all the general elections, has full representation in the Statehouse, and can lobby as if they were a private

business? How can they sign compacts with the elected governor and then have their representatives speak out and vote against others who are only asking for fair competitive opportunities?

Do they deserve this sort of affirmative action? Should they be repaid for the mistreatment of the past? If these inequitable practices which threaten the livelihood of a great many New Mexicans continue, is a new type of Indian/Anglo conflict inevitable?

I do have compassion for the plight of the American Native people as I do for other oppressed or previously oppressed people of this country and other countries of the world. I am not nor have I been the oppressor. I defeat conflicts, but know too well that the wars of today and of days past were inevitably caused when people of a geographical area fragmented into separate groups of ethnic, religious, political or economical factions.

Is this the direction that this type of unfair maneuvering will take us?

I truly hope not. I do hope, how-

ever, that we will think this through on a deeper level. Realistically, gaming, the tourism industry, and all other industries in this state are components of our "farm." Our elected officials should choose to lead all of the participants in this farming operation, strive to even out the opportunities, and spend their collective expertise creating the infrastructure needed to facilitate this venture, thus promoting an all-inclusive team effort. Only then will we all win.

We voted yes (for a nuclear waste storage site on the Mescalero reservation) because we are tired of what you White people try to do to us — tell us what to do and what not to do! We have a right to do what we want on our reservation whether with or without Joe and Rufina and the rest of the no's. We don't need them.

What makes you think we won't have any funds set up? If it is set up for our own children, that would be great so that they can look forward into the future for themselves. There are a lot of elderly that will be gone and will not be able to provide for their children so I think for myself and it is a great plan — like it or not "my decision," "my own head" to use the way I please. Too bad you are not Indian to get a bite of the dinero that the Tribe will get, but I'm happy that my children will, as promised!

This part of the letter is directed to (letter to the editor writer) Mr. Joseph Ruchard Duquette: It will be up to Mr. Wendell Chino to have a recall election. It is none of your concern or business to go along with this recall. The people themselves have voted on their own opinion and like I stated to (letter writer) Teri Sodd, you all have no business with the tribal affairs. What we decide is our business and not yours.

There is no way Wendell Chino will ever be dumped because he is the main source that got us water and electricity in our homes and had more homes built for our people, and got all the enterprises for us — the Inn of the Mountain Gods, Ski Apache, sawmill and now the big money maker, nuclear waste storage.

Mr. Chino does care a great deal so he worked hard day and night to get all these enterprises for us. Joe and Rufina talk about non-Indians getting jobs on the reservation but I wonder if they ever check to see why. Why? I would like for these two to come out and make a report on their people re: Jobs. They talk on TV, radio about all kinds of trouble and let everyone know about the Tribe's business, but never mention anything about guaranteeing any tribal member of what they will give or provide.

We do want money but we do not want to help the state to build another prison. We don't want killers, drug addicts and whatever around on the Reservation. If you want a prison, build it on your own land not Indian land. Why not look for investors yourselves and build your own. You're looking at a bigger money maker yourself so check into that yourself. Our children will enjoy more than you think and I still say they will enjoy more and better things and better education than we have now. If they get their education and not let investigators tell them what to do, they will be better off.

We need special Legislative session

Senator Bingaman at least honored me with a reply, even if it smacked of being something prepared for instant mailing to proponents of the measure: it was negative to the idea of any form of limitation. Senator Domenici kept his silence over the matter of term limitations, although he, or his office, has responded to all other matters I have raised with him. However, and by what I have seen elsewhere, Pete is firmly opposed to any form of term limitation.

What makes our and other states' congressional delegates opposed to term limitations? I suggest it boils down to one thing — they are on to a super good thing and, by jiminy, they want to hang on to it come hell or high water. Their protestations as to the "need" we have or their expertise and the value of the seniority they have marked up, are, by the record, hollow and completely untenable.

When one considers the comparative lack of first-hand knowledge or experience most long serving congressmen have of things affecting the world at large, it is presumptuous of them to lay claim to any deep understanding of things that affect our daily lives. As for the value of seniority, I suggest the longer the average congressman stays in Washington, or a state legislature (even including one like ours that meets once per year or a limited time), so they increasingly lose touch with reality.

They not only become persuaded of their being "special people," as one senator described himself and his colleagues, but in their arrogance they see nothing wrong in using their seniority to, veritably, loot the system. This has been done by manipulating internal perks (the congressional bank or the post office, for example), or ignoring the national need for spending restraint by carving off huge chunks of "pork" to ingratiate themselves with the folk back home.

As for holding on to a good (monetary) thing, we all by now know the details of the big pay raise our congressional representatives voted for themselves, including the automatic annual increase provision, which obviated the need of embarrassing public airings of future pay raises. However, it may not be so well known that, by now, the pension remuneration factor, which goes hand-in-hand with pay raises, has enabled long serving congressmen to hit a financial "jackpot." Last week, I learned that most congressmen with 20-odd years service have accumulated well over \$2 million in their pension fund, while some are well into the \$4 million figure.

With such largesse available to them, it is easy to see why our "spe-

cial people" are unwilling to give up their good thing without a fight. In fact, it would be unreasonable for us, including myself, not to concede that point. However, and in the interest of better government, it is necessary that we, the electorate, should ensure that they be forced to return to the "real world" after a reasonable period of representational work on our behalf.

I agree with the 12-year maximum term of service for both houses, but as it affects the House of Representatives I feel the 12-year limit should comprise three terms of four years each. A couple of weeks ago, in a letter asking for campaign support, Steve Schiff made the case for increasing a congressman's term of service when he wrote, "One of the most difficult parts of serving in the U.S. Congress is that the campaign (to be re-elected) never ends." He is absolutely correct, and we taxpayers are not getting our money's worth out of our congressmen when a good part of their time and attention has to be focused on winning re-election in just two years time.

We, who believe in the need for term limitation, may have lost a battle in the House this week, but I remind you that the war still goes on. It would seem the next battle will take place in November, 1996, at which time our ballots can make a big difference as it affects those senators or congressmen who have set themselves against the wish and will of the people.

Misinformation about Indians

TO THE EDITOR:

Misinformation reigns! Yes, Indians do pay taxes.

"Please help me to understand what is happening here" is the plea of Helen Nisbet in a recent letter to the editor. Well, I'm not sure either. But I do believe your letter gives us a clue. Misinformation, and uninformed opinions which so often appear on this page tend to promote negative attitudes towards certain populations in our area. And our neighbors in Mescalero have received more than their fair share.

The letter in question only echoes thoughts presented in different words in a number of other letters. It also touches on comments I have heard spoken many times before. Words and phrases such as "welfare programs for tribal members, government aid, responsible law abiding citizens, lost in battle, evil leaders and dictators, marauding helpless families, millionaires," and the one I hear most often in my business, "and (tribal members) pay no taxes," all, whether written or spoken, promote poor relations and lead to hostile, unwarranted, and destructive attitudes towards our neighbors. That their response might appear somewhat defensive at times should certainly be expected.

I cannot address the history of Indian activities in this area nor can I comment at length on the history of, or legal status of, the reservation system long ago established by our federal government. Volumes have been written on these subjects and the library contains many books about the history of Native Americans.

But one thing I do know; Indians pay taxes. Every time they come to Ruidoso, to buy anything, they pay gross receipts tax. And, just like any other citizen who works or receives income subject to the tax code, Indians must file a federal income tax return. They are subject to the same regulations and laws. There is no separate statute that says if you are a Native American you do not have to file a tax return.

New Mexico state tax is different. An enrolled member of an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo who lives on the lands of the nation, tribe or pueblo of which he is a member and who earns all of his income from work on those lands is not required to file a New Mexico income tax return. Lands include formal and informal reservations, dependent Indian communities, and Indian allotments, whether restricted or held in trust by the United States. All of these conditions must be met to not file a state tax return.

For instance, if a Mescalero Apache lives on the reservation but works in Ruidoso, he or she must file and pay New Mexico tax on those earnings. Or if a Hopi lives in Mescalero and works on the reservation, then those earnings are subject to state tax. Please remember that the sovereign status accorded to Indian tribes and nations by the federal government plays a dominant role in what tribes can and cannot do in relation to their host states.

I have been a business owner in Ruidoso for the last 12 years, and as a community, we seem to enjoy flogging ourselves from time to time. I guess it is really easier to point fingers at others and the Indians make a convenient target. In doing so we seem to forget not only a different culture we should embrace, but the substantial and positive economic impact that Mescalero has on our community. Let's admit that we enjoy the fruits of labor at a great ski area, a resort hotel with gambling sufficient for anyone, an acclaimed golf course, and other Mescalero Apache enterprises. They realize the importance of jobs for coming generations of their citizens and are trying to secure that for the future.

While we have complained about the failing real estate industry, the fall in oil prices, the destruction of the agricultural industry, the closing of Fort Stanton, and the threats of others to fold up their various tents, the Apaches press on to further their own economic development. And my business, as well as many others in this area, benefit from that economic expansion.

So, Ruidoso, let's not point too many fingers at others and waste our time hurling verbal stones at our neighbors or ourselves. Some things that happen on the reservation are, in fact, none of our business. We have plenty of problems here to deal with. And we also have many opportunities for living the good life while sharing cultures and improving our economic base.

Fomenting poor relations with our neighbors is akin to shooting ourselves in the foot. It hurts and just does not pay off in the long run. I challenge everyone to learn more about Native Americans and their unique position in our country and community. Let's promote ourselves, our various cultures, and our economic opportunities and activities. But lets not do it at the expense of others. We all deserve better than that.

Land should stay with fed gov't

TO THE EDITOR:

The U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management manage our trust lands in Lincoln County. These lands are held in trust by the U.S. for the people of the U.S. The Forest Service operates at a loss because it is managed for the benefit of the people today and preserved for future generations.

The Forest Service budget for Lincoln County is approximately \$1.5 million. This includes full and part-time salaries of \$1 million, plus approximately \$500,000 for vehicles, equipment, travel and training, utilities and other forest projects. These figures do not include large fires, road maintenance, engineering and other maintenance of facilities.

Income to Smokey Bear Ranger District from grazing fees, special use permits, fuel-wood sales, Christmas trees and other sources is approximately \$200,000.

Fire protection and recreational activities are free (they are paid for through our taxes). How can you place a value on this national heritage?

The B.L.M. management is a very vital part of the federal land management. It is managed more for the dollar, but it still is a multiple-use system and isn't managed for the maximum dollar. B.L.M. land is leased to ranchers for \$1.99 per animal-unit month (this is one cow for a month's grazing). A.U.M.s sold for 1994 were \$4,900. Fees collected were \$188,730. A.U.M.s went down to \$1.81 on March 1, 1995.

An interesting comparison is the Fort Stanton pasture, which was

divided into 4 parcels and leased to the highest bidder for a period of three years. The highest bid for one A.U.M. was \$16.36; lowest, \$10.20. Compare this to \$1.81 A.U.M. and you can see that even B.L.M. land is managed for the benefit of the people.

Lincoln County received from Taylor Grazing (from Forest and B.L.M.) \$48,778.15, plus from P.I.L.T., \$340,938 in 1994. P.I.L.T. funds are monies given to counties to replace loss of taxes on public lands. When you divide this by the 1,103,482 acres of forest and B.L.M. land in Lincoln County, you see the county is receiving better than \$.35 per acre from the U.S. Privately owned range land is taxed at \$.04 per acre. This means the Federal land is returning more to the local county budget than private lands. Private land in Lincoln County (approximately 1,705,437 acres), at \$.04 an acre equals \$63,217.48.

All revenues from federal land in New Mexico (gas, oil, and mineral royalties), are split 50-50 with the state. 25% of grazing fees on forest lands go back into range improvements.

Forest Service and B.L.M. personnel are people who buy homes, raise children, pay taxes and put their pay back into the local economy. They are professionals to whom I say, "thank you."

Some people say they don't benefit from federal lands. These figures I have used are available to everyone and not made up by me.

Our state land (called public land) can't be used unless you are a hunter. The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish pays approximately \$1 per acre for the right to hunt on state land. This land is trust land for the state universities and other schools, held by the state (that's us); but we can't use it.

Do you want the state of New Mexico to manage your land? Not I! I have seen too much state politics. This land is our heritage and the heritage of future generations. If we ever lose this we'll never get it back.

The New Mexico Game and Fish received over \$19 million in total funds from license sales, taxes from hunting gear and funds from federal programs. Most hunting and fishing is done on federal lands. People pay taxes and help the local economy with the use of this land.

The benefits we receive from federally-owned lands can't be measured in dollars. What would you take for your American citizenship and your constitutional rights as an American? This land belongs to the people of the U.S. Let's keep it that way.
