### Nuclear storage deadline May 3

Officials with Northern States Power Company in Minnesota said Wednesday that May 3 is the deadline for 33 utilities to decide whether to join the Mescalero Apache nuclear initiative.

Northern States is the lead power company in a consortium dealing with the Mescalero in a plan to build a temporary spent fuel rod storage complex on tribal land.

The Mescalero approved the project in March in the second of two referendums on the plan.

"If enough utilities are interested in carrying forward, they will sign off on the letter of intent, which will be the foundation of the contractual agreements between the tribe and the utilities," said Scott Northard, project manager for Northern States.

The consortium expects to submit a license application to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission in late 1996. The plan calls for up to 40,000 metric tons of nuclear waste to be shipped to the reservation.

### Train cuts off man's fingers

A Carrizozo man lost several fingers Wednesday when a train ran over them.

A railroad worker said he saw Joe Day Padilla, 42, trying to climb between two parked railroad cars on a long train, to get from his home to town. The worker warned Padilla that the train was about to start up, related Carrizozo Police Chief Duane Vinson, but Padilla went ahead and started climbing over a rail car coupling.

Padilla fell when the train started up, but luckily the rail worker saw it and radioed the engineer to stop, Vinson related. The train only moved about 16 feet. Had it moved further, "it was quite a long train," Vinson observed. "There would have been parts of him from here to Tucumcari."

Padilla lost three fingers and part of his index finger when his hand landed on a rail in the fall. Vinson found two, but they were too flattened to reattach. Padilla was taken to Lincoln County Medical Center.

Vinson noted that Padilla is suspected to have been intoxicated. "He had a bottle of vodka with him, and he didn't break that," Vinson said.

## Doctor awarded \$600,000 in local hospital anti-trust lawsuit

After listening to witnesses and evidence for three weeks, an eight-member jury Friday awarded Dr. Arlene Brown \$600,000 in her anti-trust suit against a hospital management firm, a local hospital administrator and two doctors.

Brown filed a defamation and anti-trust suit in June 1993 in U.S. District Court in Albuquerque.

Named as defendants were Presbyterian Health Care Services, the management company that operates the county government-owned Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC); LCMC administrator Valerie Miller; Sierra Blanca Medical Associates; Dr. Vickie Williams, D.O. (doctor of osteopathy), and her husband, Gary Jackson, D.O.

"The jury found in favor of Brown in her anti-trust claims, on her claims for interference of con-

tractual relations and for defamation," said Brown's attorney, Tom Bird, in Albuquerque. "The total damages are slightly under \$600,000."

"More than anything else, the decision vindicated me," Brown said after learning of the verdict Friday. "This has been an attack on my ethics and capabilities."

"I spent 2.5 years in an atmosphere of trial by innuendo and none of it was real."

Once the jury verdict is converted to a judgment and that document is filed, Brown can request that the judge issue an injunction to restore her privileges at the hospital, Brown said.

"We'll be asking for that," she said Friday.

Miller released a prepared statement issued on behalf of the defendants:

"This jury verdict, in our view, is contrary to the evidence presented at trial and to the law that governs these types of cases. Under federal and state law, decisions about

physician peer review are properly made by physicians and hospitals, not juries. Presbyterian, Mrs. Miller and Dr. Williams will pursue an appeal to the Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver, Colo."

Hospital board Chairman W.C. "Dub" Williams, who is also a state representative, also released a statement.

"We disagree with the jury's verdict, and we do not believe that anyone, including any doctor or our hospital administrator, conspired against Dr. Brown," Williams said. "No one tried to drive Dr. Brown out of the obstetrics business, and the jury made a mistake in deciding otherwise."

"The board made the decision to take away Dr. Brown's obstetrical privileges. We made the decision based on the findings of three doctors who studied the situation and decided that Dr. Brown had failed to consult with specialists on complicated obstetrical cases when she was required to do so."

## Film company raves about fort

The verdict was full speed ahead for Jordan Rivers after viewing Fort Stanton as a possible new home for her Brentwood Entertainment company.

She told a group of village and county officials and business people Tuesday evening that she's been looking for a site to relocate her company from California for six years.

"Then I opened an issue of The Hollywood Reporter and the ad about the fort was staring up at me," she said during a reception at The Museum of the Horse.

She's ready to use 100% of the fort and thinks she can turn it into a profit-making film center for New Mexico, Rivers said.

Besides the 100 local jobs she foresees (in addition to 100 new residents she would bring from California), Rivers said an up note for the county and state is her dedication to restoring and preserving the historic fort.

"I love Fort Stanton, and it fits so well with what I want to do — to get out of California to get away from the crime, the pollution and the taxes," she said.

Rivers asked for suggestions from the community in preparing her offer to lease the fort from the state, and in winning the governor's favor. She will be competing with other companies interested in using the fort. Rivers said she would supply background material

on her company to establish her financial credibility.

### Plans for Brentwood

Shortly after taking office in January, Gov. Gary Johnson announced he intended to close Fort Stanton, which was being phased out as a training center for developmentally disabled clients and into a hospital for long-term care.

He said the overhead to run the fort was too high for the state and the returns too few. He urged finding a private company or companies to lease the fort, which was converted to a medical center 100 years ago.

Two weeks ago, the last of the employees, except a skeleton maintenance and office crew, left the miniature community as the fort officially closed.

Rivers said she envisions the rebirth of a mini-town there with a viable health and dental clinic, fire department and day care center.

"We would be part of the county community, buying houses, putting our kids in your schools, participating in parades and staging annual events at Easter and a haunted house at Halloween," she said.

By creating everything she needs to film on-site and renting facilities to other film companies, the fort would support itself, she contended.

"I thought of New Mexico before

and when I plugged in all of the criteria, southern New Mexico came up, but I was always told that there was nothing down there," she said. That's the same response that has stopped other film companies from coming here. Once she has a film processing lab and sound stage, others will follow her, Rivers said.

"Many film people chose to live in this state, but they have to fly back to the coast to film," Rivers said.

Non-union labor would be a plus for Rivers. To make the film center work, she needs people who are willing to pitch in and help in several capacities, she said.

Diversity of scenic background also is an advantage, with caves, White Sands, mountains, valleys, pine trees, desert and scrub within easy drives, many on the 1,300 acres that goes with the fort.

She plans to distribute films, charging much less than eight existing large distributors, something that should attract many smaller film companies, she said.

Part of the money from tours, watching filming in progress and attendance at special stunt events would go toward fort restoration, Rivers said, something that probably wouldn't be included if a medical treatment or juvenile detention center moved into the facility.

She was saddened to see the poor condition of some of the historic buildings, "but we can work with what we have there now and then work on funding to restore the other parts."

She's willing to assign a staffer to coordinate restoration efforts and to find additional revenue sources for the work, Rivers said.

"I believe I can bring in enough to do that, but I believe the state and county have a stake in restoring it, too," she said. "I'll make it easier for you than any other (lessee)."

She plans to have a long-term stake in the fort, at least 20 years.

"I want to retire here," she said. "Something about Fort Stanton touches my heart. I want to make sure we can restore and maintain it."

One of the services that would have to be expanded is the airport, Rivers said. While Sierra Blanca Regional Airport is conveniently located a few miles from Fort Stanton, it currently has no commercial carrier.

"We can't ask stars to fly into El Paso and drive for another 2.5 hours, even in a limousine," she said.

The large cafeteria at the fort is perfect for feeding film crews, she said.

### Rivers' background

A professional writer for the past 15 years, Rivers said she could stay in California and sell screenplays for a living, but she's looking for more than that in a career.

"I recently sold a screenplay to CBS that will appear this fall starring Patrick Stewart (from the 'Star Trek: The Second Generation' television series)," Rivers said. "The great part is that I wrote it for him, but most of the time studios want to use Tom Cruise even if the lead is suppose to be middle-aged."

Her company has produced mostly short films, but would like to move into feature length movies, she said.

Phil Baskins, Rivers' attorney, said he was confident they could put together a proposal to offer the state within 60 days.

"That's because we know what we want and we've been looking six years," Rivers said. "However long it takes the state to make up its mind, I can't see any other company coming in with as many jobs, 100% use, preserving and restoring and with a pay off within 18 months."

"The moment we get there, we will put it into use and get right into making a film. I'd like to be at the fort by Christmas."

"Dr. Brown didn't sue the board or those doctors. Medical evidence at the trial supported the reasonableness of the board's decision. Legitimate concerns about quality patient care, and nothing else, were the basis for our decision."

During the trial that began March 20, Dr. Brown claimed she lost her obstetrics privileges at the medical center for reasons that could not be defended on medical grounds, Bird related. Brown contended her privileges were revoked for anti-competitive reasons.

Brown claimed officials at LCMC participated in a scheme to promote the business of certain hospital-recruited doctors who were in competition with Brown.

The hospital previously had imposed a restriction on Brown's hospital privileges, requiring her to obtain specialist consultation when possible in complicated or high risk obstetric cases.

According to Brown, both women had successful deliveries.

The jury found that hospital officials wrongfully terminated Brown's privilege to practice ob-

stetrics.

Brown was awarded \$112,000 in damages for conspiracy, which automatically triples under anti-trust law. She was given \$7,500 in damages for interference with contract and \$30,000 in damages for defamation. Three defendants, Miller, Williams and Presbyterian, also were individually assessed punitive damages of \$75,000.

Dr. Jackson and Sierra Blanca Medical Associates were exonerated by the jury.

The defamation damages stem from Brown's allegation that the hospital wrongfully released information to a medical data base that her privileges had been terminated for incompetence, malpractice and negligence.

The award on interference with contract was tied to the jury's decision that the defendants tried to dissuade other doctors from going into business with Brown.

Some of the animosity between hospital officials and Brown may have stemmed from 1991 when Brown declared bankruptcy, wiping out a \$400,000 debt to the hospital, Brown's attorney said.

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## Annexation group looks up canyon

Ruidoso's ad hoc annexation committee may add to its priority list pockets of unincorporated land surrounded by the forest and village in the upper canyon.

The committee, which can only make recommendations of annexation to the Village Council, held a meeting at city hall Tuesday morning.

Village Planner Cleatus Richards told the five committee members of the heretofore unidentified land pockets. The land, near Perk Canyon in Thunderbird Heights, receives village sewer and water service.

The area was not platted properly by developers, Richards said. He has notified the landowners they need to come to the Planning and Zoning office and collectively replat

the entire area.

The committee previously listed four priority areas, all of which receive some village services.

Prioritized areas, which include Sleepy Hollow, the airport, Black Forest, Paradise Canyon and Gavilan Canyon, are being sent letters from Richards allowing the property owners to request annexation.

Committee members passed the list on to the Village Council, which encouraged them to further their annexation feasibility study and impact analysis of the land tracts. The study involves reviewing costs to the town of providing sewer and water, service availability, and how much the areas would add to tax rolls.

"We may not want to push annexation, but we need to be aware of the conditions in that area," Richards said.

The overall study of surrounding land pockets, including undeveloped land tracts, is necessary to determine development potential and the impact on village water

and sewer systems, Richards said.

Along with water conservation concerns, committee members said they must also consider the village's wastewater treatment infiltration problems. The numerous joints in the wastewater lines are in serious need of repair, estimated to cost \$1.2 million. Allowing developers to build and tap into the system without expanding the entire sewer system may be unfeasible, Richards said.

Last month, the council approved a committee recommendation to forbid extension of utilities to developments outside Ruidoso. Currently, recipients of village utility service outside of city limits pay double the rate charged to village residents. Their services will continue, but these residents are being asked to petition for annexation.

The committee further recommends that annexation fees be waived for property owners linked to the village by utilities that request incorporation in Ruidoso. Annexation application fees, depending on acreage, range from \$150 for

one acre to \$400 for 10 acres, plus \$25 per additional acre.

The policy change requires a public hearing in May, Village Manager Gary Jackson said.

The committee includes Richards, village councilor Robert Donaldson, councilor Frank Cummings, P&Z Commission Chairman Mike Radziewicz and commission member Leroy Nowell.

Jackson recommended the committee also study previous service commitments to residents outside Ruidoso.

Jackson noted the village made an agreement with the state environmental department in December 1992 to provide sewer and water service to 25 residents whose well water was affected by a gas spill beneath the former JR's (Sully's) Food Mart (now the Alto Store.) The subsurface spill has since been removed.

Lines were installed by the environmental department for the affected upper Gavilan Canyon area, but only eight or nine residents have tapped into the service.

## Animal shelter seeks funding

The Lincoln County Humane Society plans to seek out contracts with more local governments because its Ruidoso shelter is operating in the red.

About 66% of animals treated and given shelter come from Ruidoso.

The Village of Ruidoso is the only local government entity that gives money to the full service private animal shelter, totaling \$30,000 last year. The shelter brought in about \$9,000 through fines, services and licenses. The shelter's thrift shop and donations brought the total funding to \$47,569. But it cost \$66,058 to keep the shelter running last year.

Coping with an average annual deficit of approximately \$21,000 is one of the reasons the full service humane animal shelter is seeking the help of the Ruidoso Village Council in securing funding from other local government entities.

At their Tuesday night meeting, the councilors agreed to seek a joint powers agreement between other government representatives and the humane society shelter. The council will also consider increasing the village's monthly contribution of \$2,500.

## Five teachers and food service director resign

Ruidoso school board members accepted the resignations of five teachers and the district's food service director at Tuesday's board meeting.

"This is the time of year when the board listens to the superintendent's hiring recommendations and examines teacher evaluations, after principals have conferences with teachers.

"If a principal feels like he is not going to recommend a teacher for re-hire, he will normally tell them at the conference," said Ronnie Hemphill, school board president. "That gives that teacher a chance to gracefully bow out if that's what they choose to do.

"It's more resignations than we've seen in the past," he said.

Those resigning are Richard Felts, Ruidoso high school and middle school band director (who requested to teach band beginners); Jaime Roland, Ruidoso High math teacher and girls basketball coach (who only wants to resign as coach); Sid Wright, Ruidoso High government teacher and boys basketball coach; Murry Avery, Ruidoso High agriculture education teacher; Amy Duncan, White Mountain Elementary teacher; and Marcia Merrell, food service director.

All board members except Susan Lutterman voted to accept all of the resignations. Lutterman voted against accepting Roland's resignation.

Resignation letters cite various reasons.

Band director Richard Felts described several problem areas in his letter, including a lack of basics being taught to band students by his predecessors and a conflict with Ruidoso Middle School principal Paula Papponi. The letter said Papponi reprimanded Felts in front of students and parents and undermined his authority.

Papponi declined to comment on Felts' resignation letter.

Roland's letter said that she had decided to retire from coaching.

"I regret that I have chosen to leave the Lady Warriors with an unfinished product but I believe that it is best to leave the project to someone with more energy," Roland's letter said.

Roland also indicated that if a math teaching position was open

for next year she would like to continue in that capacity.

Paul Wirth, director of instructional services, said that a state rule links teaching and coaching positions at the original time of hiring.

"What was happening was that a teacher would coach for a year and then say they just wanted to teach," Wirth said. "The schools were ending up with plenty of teachers and no coaches so the state initiated the Farmington Rule."

Wright resigned his position as high school government teacher and Avery resigned as high school agriculture teacher. Neither indicated why they chose to resign.

Food Service Director Marcia Merrell said via a telephone interview that she was leaving because of differences in philosophy.

The 10-year-old shelter is in need of approximately \$2,500 more per month in outside funding to operate as a full service facility, shelter director Jim Riggins told the councilors.

The shelter's thrift shop is losing its rent-free site behind Arby's, Riggins said, because the property owner died and her estate is being liquidated. The shelter's board of directors is seeking to relocate at another visible, non-commercial property.

Sheltering animals is only one priority of the humane society's charter, Riggins added. Others are education, legislation, spay/neuter subsidy, wildlife rescue and rehabilitation, animal rights efforts and more.

But a lack of funds and a busy shelter — about 120 animals are sheltered in the facility per month — prevents full pursuit of its other goals.


Shelter officials believe contracts with the Capitan and Lincoln County governments are warranted

because animals come from those areas.

"Donations are not the best way to run, what is in essence, a government utility no more optional than wastewater treatment or solid waste disposal," Riggins said. "Turning an animal away that comes from outside the city limits is not an option."

Councilors praised the humane society's operation, noting that before its establishment about 10 years ago, animal control was a serious problem in Ruidoso.

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
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## OBITUARIES

### Corinne Swearingin

After a courageous and hard-fought battle, Corinne Swearingin died Saturday, April 8.

Corinne is a descendant of William B. Richards, who fought in the Texas Revolution against Mexico. Her great-grandfather, "Pa Billy" Richards, fought for the Confederacy in the War of Northern Aggression. Corinne is also a descendant of the McLennans, after whom McLennan County, Texas is named (Waco is the county seat).

Corinne was born in Lubbock, Texas on Sept. 25, 1925 to Ike F. and Hazel Richards Kennedy. Both parents and a brother, John Ike, preceded her in death.

Educated in the Lubbock public schools, she graduated from Texas Technological College (now Texas Tech University) in 1945.

After graduating from Texas Tech, Corinne taught school in Olton, Texas. She moved to Ruidoso in 1946 to join her family, which had moved from Lubbock in 1945. She taught school in Capitan in 1946.

In November 1946, Corinne met Dan Swearingin while both were collecting hymnals after church. At that time, Methodist services were held temporarily in the rock building which sits next to the Shell sta-

tion on Sudderth Drive. In December 1946, ground was broken for the present Methodist church. On October 18, 1947, they were the first couple married in the newly finished sanctuary.

She and Dan operated the Dan Dee Cabins, a Ruidoso landmark, until 1953. They then operated a general insurance agency until 1958, when they opened Dan D. Swearingin and Associates, Inc., as a general insurance and real estate agency. In 1968, Dan left the company to engage in full-time real estate appraisal. They moved to Albuquerque in 1970 so Dan could appraise larger properties.

Dan and Corinne moved back to Ruidoso in 1982, remaining in the real estate appraisal business which their only son, David D. (D.D.) Swearingin, III joined in 1981. Dan retired from the appraisal business in 1992.

Corinne kept working full-time and was "editor-in-chief" in the real estate appraisal office until her death.

Corinne was active in the Beta Sigma Phi sorority from 1947 until her death.

Corinne was very active in activities of the local Methodist church — singing in the choir in the early years, teaching an adult Sunday school class, serving as communion steward, heading the worship committee, being a link in the prayer chain, and serving on

the administrative board. Of the original 28 charter members of this church, Corinne was the longest standing surviving member.

Corinne was always willing to serve her Lord wherever and whenever she could. She and her late mother Hazel coordinated and helped serve many a meal for funerals and "church suppers" over the years.

She leaves her husband Dan; son D.D. and his wife Dawn; her aunt Johnnie Bees and husband O.B. Bryan; her great aunt Dorothy Lomax; cousin Dorothy Sue Clendenin; the Angel, Bryan, Harvey, Lomax, Richards, and Robertson cousins; and countless friends to rejoice in the lives and joys they shared.

Funeral services were held at the Community United Methodist Church in Ruidoso on Wednesday, April 12. Officiants were the Reverends Charles Crutchfield and Tom Richardson. Interment was in the Forest Lawn Cemetery in Ruidoso.

## Capitan ups water and sewer rates

Starting in May, Capitan water rates will jump 24% and sewer rates will go up by one-third. The board of trustees Monday approved increases in both services. To cover part of the cost of purchasing badly needed water rights for the village, water users will have to pay \$3 a month more.

It's been 14 years since the last water rate increase, said Village Clerk Deborah Cummins. The increase means residential and commercial users will pay \$15.50 a month instead of \$12.50. That should generate \$28,000 a year, enough to cover the annual payment on bonds sold to buy water rights.

Residential sewer rates will increase from \$6 a month to \$8, plus an automatic \$1 per month increase each year for the following three years. Commercial rates will go up from \$7.50 to \$10 a month, plus the automatic annual increase.

Other residential options that were rejected included a \$2 increase (from \$6 to \$8) and a \$4 increase (from \$6 to \$10 a month).

The sewer rate increase is needed because maintenance of the wetlands treatment area is costing

the village more in power and testing than anticipated, officials said.

"We're pumping 25,000 to 30,000 gallons of sewage into the wetlands a day and that's a lot," Cummins said.

Although the per gallon charge for those who use more than 4,000 gallons of water per month will remain the same at \$1.98, the threshold for the next rate increment was reduced from 25,000 gallons to 20,000 gallons.

Over 20,000 gallons, the rate is \$8.03 per thousand. At 100,000 gallons, it's \$5.03 per thousand.

Dr. Herma Reimann, environmental consultant to the village, said trustees should consider a rate structure that would penalize heavy users and reward those who stay under a certain percentage of the minimum.

The village owns 740 acre-feet of water rights to cover a five-year period. An acre foot is equal to the amount of water it would take to cover one acre of land one foot deep.

But at the end of 3.5 years, the village already had consumed all but 160 acres of rights, Cummins said. That has to last Capitan two years.

"We're pumping more water than we own the rights to," Cum-

mins said. The village has to either stay within its five-year allocation or purchase more rights. If that can't be accomplished, the state can assess a penalty and force the village to lease rights, she said.

In previous "normal years," the village would pump 3.2 million to 3.8 million gallons a month, but in July of last year, the amount jumped to eight million and then to nine million in August, some to fight major forest fires in the area.

"We've had more water taps in the last six months than in the two or three previous years," Cummins said. "There are 806 vacant lots within the village we're obligated to supply water to, and if they all are developed, I don't know what we'd do."

Trustees voted unanimously to purchase 33.5 acres of water rights for \$209,126. The village will use \$25,000 in reserve as a down payment and borrow the rest from the New Mexico Financing Authority at 5-6% interest. The annual payments on that debt will be covered by the rate increase, Mayor Norm Renfro said.

The priority date on the water rights is 1853, which means the village would have priority over most other users in a drought.

## Vet's attorney asks for dismissal

A written motion to dismiss charges against the veterinarian who treated Doo Dominate, a quarter horse that broke its legs in the 1994 All American Futurity, is due today before the state racing commission.

The prosecution's response to that motion is also due today. Both will be presented to hearing officer Bruce Gerry.

Harold Mitchell of Bristow, Okla. is charged with practicing medicine without a New Mexico license and injecting illegal drugs into Doo Dominate. Doo Dominate's owner and trainer also face charges.

A variety of witnesses testified for more than six hours Monday, April 3 at Mitchell's hearing before Gerry. Mitchell did not attend the hearing.

In a somewhat unusual move, Mitchell's attorney, Kenneth Martinez, made a motion for dismissal of charges and then left the hearing, surrendering his opportunity to cross-examine witnesses.

Martinez argued that Mitchell has already surrendered his license and, therefore, was no longer under the commission's jurisdiction. Mitchell surrendered his license after charges were filed.

Martinez also accused the state racing commission and the state's attorney general's office of a conflict of interest.

Martinez accused the state Attorney General's Office with conflict of interest because it serves as the racing commission's legal adviser. The attorney

general's office is prosecuting the case for the racing commission, a branch of the state government.

Mitchell's attorney accused the racing commission of a conflict of interest by contending the commission acts as both judge and jury.

Because of these reasons, Martinez argued, there was no need for the hearing.

"They're going on the assumption that the hearing was not legal," said Wayne Conwell, a New Mexico State Racing Commission investigator. "His attorney left before it (the hearing) started. I've seen that tried, but not often," said Conwell, who testified at the hearing.

State Assistant Attorney General Victoria Amada said there is no conflict of interest because the prosecutor and legal adviser are in different divisions of the attorney general's office.

Amada also argued that Mitchell should not be able to avoid prosecution because he turned in his license.

"The ability of the licensee to resign or surrender a license while disciplinary actions are underway, thereby cutting off the jurisdiction of a disciplinary panel, has been rejected also," Amada said at the hearing.

There is no New Mexico case law for precedent, and Amada cited a Colorado case involving a dentist.

Gerry took the motions for dismissal under advisement, and gave both sides 10 days to file their written responses.

After receiving the motions,

Gerry will make a ruling on them. If he rejects Martinez's motion for dismissal, Gerry will make a ruling on the violations and make a recommendation to the racing commission. Mitchell will not be allowed to testify.

The commission will then either uphold or reject Gerry's recommendation and assess penalties if needed.

"I suppose if he accepts their motions (for dismissal), then the hearing is invalid," Conwell said, and the prosecution may be dropped.

Amada declined to comment about the case until after Gerry makes his recommendation public at the racing commission's next meeting Tuesday, April 18.

Doo Dominate's owner, Osvaldo Rodriguez, and trainer, Antonio Hernandez, each face six to eight charges. The charges allege the men ran the horse when they knew it had a physical problem, thereby endangering the life of jockey Billy Peterson and the horse. They also face charges for duping the betting public and for using Medivacaine, a numbing drug, illegally before the race.

Prosecution evidence indicates the horse already had a broken leg before the race began.

Doo Dominate broke down Sept. 5 about a 100 yards from the finish of the All American Futurity, the world's richest quarter horse race where the winner takes home a \$1 million purse. He was euthanized after the race.

Rodriguez's and Hernandez's hearing is scheduled for May 1.

## 'Cats scratch Warrior golfers

The Ruidoso boys golf team couldn't take advantage of its home turf in excellent weather conditions Wednesday.

The Warriors took second place in their own Ruidoso Invitational held at the Inn of the Mountain Gods golf course. Lovington's Wildcats won the team title with a qualifying score of 387. The Ruidoso girls' team finished second to Lovington's team.

"Monday the weather was awful," assistant coach Kent Beatty said, referring to the Warriors' match in Albuquerque. "Today (Wednesday), we didn't have that excuse."

Ruidoso's Eric Stephens was the individual medalist with a score of 80. He defeated John Lambert in a sudden death playoff. Stephens parred hole #1 for individual honors.

"Eric did a great job for us today," Beatty said, noting Stephens had only one poor hole all day.

But the other Warriors struggled, especially on the greens. "We didn't putt that well," Beatty said.

Even though Ruidoso was playing on a local course, Beatty said the Warriors haven't had much practice or tournament play on the Inn of the Mountain Gods course. It's one of the more difficult courses around, with a 72.1 course rating.

Beatty said he was a little disappointed the Warriors didn't shoot a target score Wednesday. Golf teams need to shoot three target scores to qualify for the state tournament. A target score is the course rating multiplied by four plus 50. For example, the team target score at the Inn of the Mountain Gods is 398 (72.1 x 4 + 50).

In four tries, Ruidoso has shot the team target score once this season, at the St. Pius Invitational. The Warriors have six more tournaments this year. Last year's team shot eight qualifying scores.

Beatty isn't too worried about his team making the state tournament.

"Potentially these kids are as good as we've had. They just haven't been down the road as much," Beatty said. "We'll be much more competitive in the Leroy Gooch Invitational."

The Gooch Invitational takes place Monday, April 17, and Tuesday, April 18. Twenty-five boys and 24 girls teams will compete in the state's largest high school tournament. For the boys competition, the first day will be played on Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club. On Tuesday, the teams tackle The Links of Sierra Blanca Golf Course. The girls will play both days at Cree Meadows.

Ruidoso girls' team was led by Heather Stephens who tied for second in individual honors with a 107. Kelly Lawellen of Lovington shot a sizzling 99 to take top honors.





### The bear/trash problem and potential solutions

As more bears return to the dumpsters of Ruidoso for the season, the complaints are starting up again, too.

There are people out there who believe the bears should be rounded up and hauled away. Maybe we should cage them at Fort Stanton as the fort's new use? The whole idea is simply ridiculous. The bears were here first, they're here to stay, so we must find ways to get along and minimize problems.

There are things we can do to make life among bears easier:

- keep garbage inside until the day or night before scheduled collection (the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority director said in March that he'd have these schedules within a month; in the problem area of Upper Canyon in Ruidoso, trash is picked up on Wednesday morning);
- and split open garbage bags when they're dumped, so bears can't drag bags up on the hillside to eat, as they prefer to do.

While these are things individuals can do, the Solid Waste Authority plans to take a closer look during its meeting today at what it can do.

Already, about 100 heavier duty dumpsters are being installed in Upper Canyon.

Small dumpsters in isolated areas may be removed, so a few people would have to take their garbage a little further. Heavy dumpsters may be put in place of the more numerous light dumpsters in these areas, as well as along main street.


Also, SWA plans to increase the number of employees who pick up trash near the dumpsters.

Ruidoso has dumpsters, while some other communities in this county have door-to-door trash pickup. Which type of service is best for bears? SWA director Joe Lewandowski says Cloudercroft tried to switch to door-to-door service and it made things worse, because part-time residents take out the trash when they leave and it's not always on trash day.

If the dumpsters are better, how much would individual rates go up if bear-proof lids are installed? Quite a bit, apparently — those lids cost \$350 each, Lewandowski says, and Ruidoso alone has 1,500 dumpsters. What would be the extra man-hour cost of putting locks on the dumpsters, translated into cost per customer? In areas where these exist, some people are inevitably too lazy to unlock the dumpsters and they just leave their trash next to dumpsters.

We hope the Solid Waste Authority can get a dialogue going with forest and wildlife officials, to assess the various ideas, costs and advantages. Maybe signs on dumpsters, explaining the detriments to bears of bad trash habits, would help. The county and municipalities in the SWA could send out questionnaires with their customer bills at little cost. What are customers willing to pay? Are they willing to put up with the minor hassle of locks? Some areas already have individuals who have taken on the task of locking dumpsters each night, and Lewandowski said groups who want to do this are welcome to call him.

The problem isn't just with trash all over the street and yards. It's even sadder that we are habituating wild animals to our garbage, and they are losing their fear of humans. Mother bears teach cubs, and the problem becomes generational — until a bear is shot.

### Response to El Paso editorial

As the executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, I would be remiss in not responding to John Laird's column which appeared in the *El Paso Times* (4/6/95) in which he and Mr. Tom Springer, a Cloudercroft retiree, related the "positives of Cloudercroft" as opposed to the "negatives of Ruidoso."

I would like to begin by stating that I have always been an admirer and supporter of Cloudercroft since moving to Ruidoso from Texas almost 20 years ago. We consider Cloudercroft as our "sister community" and are proud of the partnership that we have with them through the Apache Trails Promotion Council and their outstanding Chamber Director, Kathy Swope.

Most of what was stated in Mr. Laird's column can be "taken with a grain of salt," for as we all know, everyone is entitled to their opinion and vote in this country. However, Mr. Springer's comment that "Ruidoso is a tiny, peaceful mountain community gone bad" is at best highly inflammatory.

Ruidoso does concede to experiencing a very positive growth rate these last few years by our increase in the collection of gross receipt and lodgers tax dollars, as well as a 25% increase in building permits, none to my knowledge generated by "apartments being built here with particle board."






The pastor, Charles Hail, is a native of New Mexico and has been here for over 8 years, making him one of the longest term ministers in Lincoln
