County won't apply for grant

Because they couldn't agree on what project to submit for a possible Community Development Block Grant, Lincoln County Commissioners won't apply for the grant at all.

Instead, they're proposing \$45,000 in local grant match money be combined with other county dollars to expand and improve the Carrizozo Health Clinic.

"There was no (majority) support for either (grant) project, the senior citizens center at San Patricio or a mobile health van as suggested by the hospital," Commissioner Wilton Howell said Tuesday.

"Instead of running after a grant, the money is there and we take care of ourselves. Lincoln County has that ability," Commission Chairman Monroy Montes said.

Complaint settled with deputies

Lincoln County deputies who objected to being on call during their lunch hours will receive a one-time compensation payment and an annual contribution to an early retirement fund.

A threatened \$900,000 lawsuit was averted by the settlement. A \$15,000 payment will be divided among all the deputies, and they will each receive one week of paid vacation this year.

The biggest impact will be an annual lump \$25,000 county payment to the state early retirement fund.

Payments will come from the county's general fund, not the sheriff's budget as threatened by the county commissioners. Part of the settlement also stipulated that lunch hours are free time and that deputies are not on call.

Councilors reject ban on skateboards

Skateboarders were assured by Ruidoso councilors Tuesday that their right to roll along downtown sidewalks will be left intact.

The youngsters were also commended by the council for their demonstration of solidarity, after they appeared en masse at the Tuesday council meeting.

Councilors said the boarders will be included in a skateboarding committee assigned to assess the young athletes' needs.

The council voted unanimously to reject a merchant's request that skateboarding be banned from main street walkways.

"There's no need to pass another ordinance," Mayor Jerry Shaw said to the audience packed with skateboarders and their supporters. Forty-four people raised hands in support of the skateboarders, while only five raised their hands against.

Shaw's words echoed those of Councilor Robert Donaldson, who said, "I'm tired of passing laws affecting the good kids and good adults," and those of Councilor Leon Eggleston, who argued, "I plan to roller blade to work, roller blade to the bank; I don't want to be penalized (with a law) that I can't go through main street on roller blades."

The council's decision included Village Manager Gary Jackson's recommendation that a committee be formed to find a desirable and safer spot for the skaters.

Many materials for building a decent skating ground could be found in-house, said Councilor Frank Potter. Jackson said the village owned a couple of undeveloped parcels of land that could be used

as a park, and at least one local utility has grant money available for such a cause.

"Truly, where are the kids going to go to do things?" Jackson asked.

Youth as well as parents, councilors, village staff members and park department officials will sit on the committee.

"It's true that we do have other places to skate, but not with lights," explained skateboarder Amber Lundquist. James Gieb and Lundquist also explained that skateboarding requires a smooth surface.

Gieb asked people to respect skateboarding as a sport, not dismissed "as just something we do."

Terri Sodd, owner of Mountain Arts, originally proposed the ban to the council.

Sodd complained that the kids gather out in front of the stores after school and stay after dark, intimidate pedestrians, damage buildings and have verbally abused her when she asks them to move. Two others, Covered Wagon owner James Ross and a downtown employee, spoke in support of Sodd.

Problems have increased over the past two months, Sodd said, and she fears the safety hazard will worsen with the arrival of summer vacationers.

Ross said he's seen as many as 30 skateboarders coming down the walks at speeds up to 20 mph.

However, more merchants at the meeting spoke in favor of the skateboarders than against them, saying the kids are both courteous and polite.

Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox said 22 calls regarding skateboarders have been made to

Commissioners chop out charity budget requests

In a financially conservative mood Monday, Lincoln County Commissioners slashed their way through budget requests from programs such as handicapped child care and university computers.

Part of their effort during the 14-hour session was directed at paring down the \$1.46 million difference between estimated 1995-96 revenues of \$7,331,000 and projected expenses of \$8,797,000.

But they also were expressing a new philosophy about the role of county government.

"I think the feeling was there all along that no one was comfortable with giving away \$100,000 like has been the custom in the past," said Chairman Monroy Montes. "It's a bad precedent we inherited and now we're trying to get rid of it."

"When Lincoln County goes to Santa Fe and asks for money, we're accused of looking for pork. But if someone here comes to the county and asks for money, it's a special project."

"I'm saying, let's call it pork at all levels. It's time to stop it and put every special program on notice that we don't have the responsibility to provide for every little thing that comes up. Our responsibility is the health, safety and welfare, as well as the economic stability, of our community."

Several requests were cut in half or totally dropped, County Manager Carolin Cooney said Tuesday. By the time commissioners finished with their proposed reductions about 10:30 p.m. Monday, the total special program requests of \$192,315 dropped to \$135,262.

"I don't think any of the programs will suffer," Montes said.

Commissioner Wilton Howell said his goal is to drop a mill from the annual tax bill, equal to about \$300,000 from the county budget. With a substantial jump projected in taxable property value, some belt tightening on the side of the commission could accomplish that aim, he said. One mill is equal to \$1 for every \$1,000 of taxable property value. In New Mexico, property owners are taxed on one-third of the market value of their holdings.

"It's time to think about the taxpayers for a change," Howell said. "Some commissioners are thinking along this line and we need the support of residents out there who are of a same mind."

Budget cuts

Budget reduction action proposed by commissioners included:

— cutting a \$10,000 request from Eastern New Mexico University for computers in half to \$5,000. The university received \$10,000 last year.

— cutting a \$20,000 request from The Counseling Center down to \$10,000, the same as last year.

— rejecting a request from the Easter New Mexico Fair for \$2,500.

— not tampering with a \$17,046 request from the Public Lands Use Advisory Council.

— halving the \$4,500 request of White Mountain Search and Rescue.

— cutting in half \$5,000 in requests submitted by the village of Corona and the town of Carrizozo.

— reducing an \$8,000 request

from the Big Brother, Big Sister organization to \$2,500 for seed money to start a program locally.

— denying a request from Lincoln County Historical Society for \$5,000.

— denying a request from Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services for \$8,800 to buy a patient monitoring device.

— denying a request for \$3,200 for a family literacy project.

— approving \$2,500 of a \$5,000 request from Zia Handicapped Therapy Respite Care, a service to families who care for children with severe disabilities.

Totals weren't changed for items that involve contracts or delivery of services, such as the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, soil conservation districts, management of the county fairground and professional associations, Cooney said.

Representatives from the village of Ruidoso didn't attend the budget session, but sent a letter asking for a joint meeting later. Commissioners indicated they weren't interested in a meeting.

In reviewing budgets under the county manager, commissioners

tentatively approved \$24,000 for a new accounting clerk and only did minor trimming in the proposed planning and zoning division, ambulance and emergency management budgets, Cooney said.

Commissioners were pleasantly surprised to learn that the Zia Senior Citizens Centers program requires no county support this year. Revenue from clients and from state and federal sources are sufficient. Director Cheryl LaBelle said she plans to change the management structure of the centers to be more cost effective.

Montes complimented Cooney on her budget presentation.

"Last year, the (former) manager came in, told us about the budget and glossed over things," Montes said. "Then (during the year), it went out of whack. (Cooney) came in, gave us the figures and left it up to us. This was government at its best. It was open and nothing was done in secret. I'm real happy with the process."

Cooney said she would update budget figures for the commission's second budget session at 8 a.m. today in the commission room of the county courthouse in Carrizozo

Sheriff hit with budget cuts, too

It was a rough budget session for Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane Monday, but he's ready to fight back at a second meeting with county commissioners today.

Monday, commissioners decided not to apply for a grant to continue the special drug enforcement task force that operates out of McSwane's office.

They also informally agreed to relieve his deputies of the responsibility of transporting jail prisoners to medical appointments and other in-county trips. That job now will fall to the jailers, and with it will come a transport van and half (\$9,000) of McSwane's transport and extradition money. The sheriff's office would continue to handle court-ordered prisoner transport.

Shedding his usual unflappable demeanor Wednesday, McSwane took aim at three of the five county commissioners.

"Obviously, they are receiving pressure to hinder my activities to reduce narcotic sales," he said during a telephone interview. "The biggest battle I've lost in the battle against narcotics has been with the commission discontinuing that (narcotics enforcement unit) money."

"I realize that since the program began in 1991, personal pressure has been applied not to work narcotics in Lincoln County. They can make every excuse they want to, but there are three commissioners who simply don't want to be bothered with it: (Chairman) Monroy

Montes, L.R. Nunley and Wilton Howell."

The pressure against the enforcement unit may have come from families that have been negatively affected by its activities, he said.

Before the commission decision, he planned to apply for another narcotics enforcement grant to continue the program started several years ago, McSwane said.

The county would have received \$77,166 in grant money and the county match would have been \$26,732, basically the cost of one officer, said County Manager Carolin Cooney.

"It's a sad situation, but I will continue with the task force as long as I have a budget. They will not tell me how to direct my men," McSwane said.

The program has been a point of controversy for quite some time, Montes said.

"Every other meeting, we had a task force commanding officer or the sheriff or someone trying to justify the program," he said. "It doesn't have 100% support among commissioners and without that support, the operation is hampered. By getting rid of it, we're putting the burden back on all the deputies to be interested in drug control."

Howell agreed, saying, "This way all 13 deputies will concentrate on stamping out illegal drugs, not just two of them. They don't do traffic and they don't like to do DWI. I don't know of a better cause than to have them all target illegal drugs."

County may drop special road work

The future of paved roads in Lincoln County sparked debate among county commissioners Monday as they attempted to pare down the road department's proposed 1995-96 budget.

Commissioners two months ago approved an annual maintenance assessment increase from 10 cents to 20 cents per front foot on subdivision roads. This week the four who voted in favor of the increase were still smarting from the sharp and unrelenting criticism they received from residents in rural developments who didn't like the fee increase.

Commissioners tentatively cut \$110,000 from the \$900,000 budget, eliminating work that normally would have been covered by the revenue generated from the annual front foot assessment. The assessment is expected to be dropped by the board next month.

In eliminating higher level maintenance and improvements on surfaced roads, commissioners contended they were responding to complaints about the assessment. They said they will leave it up to residents of subdivisions to figure out how to pay for improvement projects.

All chip seal work (a type of surface using chips of rock and hot mix, but not true asphalt) has been

removed from the budget. About \$150,000 worth of chip sealing equipment is slated to be sold, said County Manager Carolin Cooney.

Bill Schwettmann, a commissioner who lives in Alto subdivision and is elected from a district containing most of the subdivisions in the county, asked whether the county would carry through with a five-year plan and chip seal designated roads.

"They are not in the budget, but we could use the money from the sale of the equipment to contract out some of the work," Cooney said.

The budget contains more money (\$20,000 compared to \$14,000) than last year for hot mix patching, but Schwettmann said patches are an unsatisfactory alternative.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said the roads in Alto, the largest subdivision in the county, don't need repair right now.

But Schwettmann disagreed, pointing to High Mesa Road.

"You have a hell of an investment (in the Alto roads) and you're going to just let it go," he said.

Most of the surfaced roads are in subdivisions, and Chairman Monroy Montes said commissioners received no encouragement from subdivision residents to include an assessment or budget increase to cover the projects.

"I suggest the subdivisions figure it out," he said.

Schwettmann said Alto residents weren't the ones who complained about the increase. The complaints primarily came from residents of subdivisions with dirt and gravel roads.

"They (Alto residents) sure didn't show up to support us," Commissioner Wilton Howell replied.

He and Commissioner Stirling Spencer said it's up to residents of subdivisions such as Alto to incorporate as towns, to be annexed into Ruidoso or to form their own paving districts and tax themselves for improvements and extraordinary maintenance.

"I pay \$1,600 in property taxes because I live in Ruidoso, compared to if I lived in Alto outside the city limits," Howell said. "I'd be paying \$800 there. That extra (property tax) money pays for police and road work, because that's a big ticket item."

Schwettmann said he thinks the approach of the other four commissioners is wrong.

"If I don't die, I think I'll be able to say you're wrong later," he said. "You're moving back into the 19th century, not forward into the 21st century."

Schwettmann voted against the 10 cent increase in the road assessment, not because he objected to paying, but because of the inequity of using the same charge against those living on dirt, gravel and sur-

faced roads, he said.

Schwettmann asked what will happen when Ranches of Sonterra is finished and developers ask the county to take over miles of surfaced roads. The subdivision is the newest development in the county and sits on the north side of Sierra Blanca Airport Road.

"Why tell developers they have to have paved roads if you don't intend to accept them for maintenance?" Schwettmann asked. "Why not tell them to put in dirt roads?"

Spencer said the county did not require surfaced roads and is not obligated to take over maintenance on surfaced roads. It has the option of rejecting them.

In other items related to the road department, Cooney said:

— \$30,000 has been budgeted for a road manager's position in case commissioners decide to hire a replacement for former manager Bill Cupit, who left two months ago.

— all road department employees will be required to inventory their equipment each month in an effort to encourage more conscientious treatment of equipment.

— commissioners no longer are willing to supplement the department's budget from the general fund, which added up to more than \$200,000 in prior years.

Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox said Tuesday that his department would apply for the grant if the county won't allow the sheriff to handle it and if the city council concurs with filing an application.

McSwane said the enforcement unit has been very successful and commissioners have seen a report with the related figures.

"I sat before that commission and heard that I've been negligent, heard that I'm not doing the job, heard that I'm not complying with (regulation), but I think probably

the most negligent thing I've seen the commission do is delete the task force."

McSwane said the narcotics work also has been helpful in solving other crimes.

Personal reasons

McSwane said some commissioners apparently still resent his refusal to divulge who blew the whistle on the practice of paying commissioners mileage costs to attend meetings at the county seat of Carrizozo. State law says commissioners should not be paid for

meetings at their home base, in most cases the county courthouse.

By issuing a resolution changing the home base of each commissioner to be his district, commissioners eliminated the violation.

Howell, Nunley and Montes "have been persistent in trying to find out who told me," McSwane said. "I have an ethical responsibility not to disclose that, because the information was received confidentially."

"I feel part of this problem with the commission is part of that. I was told by Commissioner Nunley that because I wouldn't disclose it, I had stepped out on a weak limb

and it broke out from under me."

Nunley remembers saying that statement, but doesn't recall that it was connected to the travel reimbursement situation.

"I said that during a meeting, but it had nothing to do with the mileage. I haven't given that a sec-

ond thought. It's over," Nunley said. Of the three commissioners who collected the reimbursement (Montes, Nunley and Bill Schwettmann), he was the only one who repaid it.

"It has nothing to do with it (sheriff budget cuts)," Nunley said. "All I want is efficiency in government."

Howell echoed the call for efficiency, saying that in 1991, the sheriff's budget was about half a million and now it's close to \$1.5 million, without much difference in manpower or performance.

Mescalero given money for housing

The Mescalero Indian Housing Authority has been awarded \$3.4 million in federal funds to develop 32 dwelling units at the Mescalero Reservation.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) will spend \$7.9 million for low-income housing in three New Mexico Indian communities.

"These housing funds will help alleviate the shortage of decent housing for low-income residents of Indian communities in New Mexico," said U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici (R-NM).

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Chamber gets CVB contract

The Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce has been selected to run a village Convention and Visitor's Bureau (CVB).

The CVB selection committee recommended the Chamber win the bid over Grindstone Graphics and Times West Communications. The council agreed Tuesday.

"It was a close contest," said Mayor Jerry Shaw. "All three proposals were outstanding."

Shaw sits on the committee with fellow councilor Robert Donaldson; Dick Gilliard, executive director of the Albuquerque CVB; Bill Chance, chairman of the Ruidoso Lodger's Tax Advisory Committee, and Terri Waterfield, the purchasing agent for the village.

The Chamber maintains an existing contract with the village to promote the village through advertising and marketing. An additional contract with the Chamber now has the Sudderth Drive office serving as a visitors center.

The CVB contract will consolidate the existing contracts with Ruidoso's convention center marketing and other services.

The consolidated services and coordinated promotional efforts to book conventions will help the village ride through both good and bad times, Councilor Frank Potter said.

Village Attorney John Un-

derwood will now draw up a contract. If for some reason negotiations fall through with the Chamber before the contract signing, Underwood said the RFP award would then go to the next highest ranked of the three contenders.

Once completed in draft, the council and public is free to view the contract, but until then the village refuses to disclose the RFPs and the committee's scores to the public.

This is consistent with state law, Jackson and Underwood said, which distinguishes bid awards from RFP awards. Releasing details of the proposals during the negotiation process would "put bidders at a competitive disadvantage," Jackson said.

The three submitted RFPs detail the individual organizations' qualifications and creativity, and how they would use \$300,000 in advertising Ruidoso to tourists. Additional budgetary parameters were offered showing how they would market the village and convention center, and also serve as a visitor's center.

Also at the meeting, councilors approved the recommendation of Jackson to enter into a contract with Management Associates, Inc., for its professional services and expertise regarding collective bargaining. Ruidoso firefighters and laborers, voted last week to join a union.

RHS netters seek revenge

Thursday it was wind. Saturday it was snow. By Sunday, the Ruidoso tennis teams were simply glad the week was over.

The Warriors dropped matches against Artesia and Portales to end their toughest week of the season. The Ruidoso girls slipped to 2-5 in dual match play, while the boys team fell to 1-6.

Gusting, 45 mph winds didn't assist the Ruidoso cause Thursday at Artesia. The girls lost a 5-4 decision to the Bulldogs.

The Warriors might have pulled out the win except Ruidoso lost two of three matches that went three sets. The No. 2 doubles team of Noelle Beechie and Corrie Garcia picked up Ruidoso's only three-set match victory, a 2-6, 6-3, 6-3 win over Artesia's team of Harrison and Barhart.

Ruidoso's No. 1 doubles team had a chance to give the Warriors the pivotal win, but Myra Romero and Audra Allison squandered a 4-1 lead in the third set. Artesia's Vapessa Munoz and Valerie Romo won five straight games to take a 6-3, 3-6, 6-4 victory.

The disappointing loss has the Warriors crying for revenge. They'll get their chance Saturday when they host Artesia at 10 a.m. in the final regular district match of the season.

"The girls really want to win," Ruidoso coach Dave Anderson said. "They felt like they got robbed" in Artesia.

Ruidoso's boys also lost to Artesia, 7-2. The Warriors did get some inspirational play from Shaun Cobb, who won his first varsity match. Cobb downed Laramie Hammer, 7-6 and 6-3. He then teamed with Aaron Beyer for a doubles victory, 6-3, 1-6 and 6-4, over Stephen Jenkins and Hammer.

"He played way above his ability," Anderson said of Cobb. "Shaun tried some new tactics to throw off his opponent and it worked."

After surviving the wind in Artesia, Ruidoso hosted Portales Saturday morning. The match was delayed because of snow flurries.

When it did start, the No. 1-ranked Rams had little trouble with the Warriors.

"They're real tough - as tough as we expected," Anderson said. Portales cruised to a 6-3 win in girls play, and an 8-1 win in the boys.

Ruidoso's Leaf Anderson picked his first varsity win of the season against Portales. He defeated Tod Horton, 6-3 and 6-0. For the girls, Warriors Allison, Carol Ann Logsdon and Erica Malis recorded victories.

After Saturday's match, the Warriors prepare for the district tournament hosted by New Mexico

Military Institute on May 6. Ruidoso's top two singles players and top two doubles teams will battle for the district title and a berth to the state tournament.

The Warriors compete in one of the best districts in the state against state contenders Portales, Lovington and NMMI.

"It's a tough, grueling competition for state," Anderson said.

With the season winding down, Anderson said he's been particularly impressed by senior Noelle Beechie. Anderson noted that Beechie has been staying late after practice to improve her game.

"She's been a good leader and role model," Anderson said of his lone senior. Anderson hopes Beechie's example will rub off on his younger players as they go into the final weeks of play.

Girls put Tiger tradition on the line at district track meet

It's not unusual to hear of a coach who takes his or her team on a bus ride before a practice. The players ride around for an hour, then get off the bus and have practice.

It's a coach's way to prepare the squad for a road meet or game. But how often do you hear of a coach riding around in a car before a contest, just so he or she can prepare?

Capitan track coach Pam Allen is considering such an option. This week, that's the bus ride, Allen said, referring to District 5-A track meet hosted by Capitan on Saturday.

Allen went on to explain that it's on the bus ride to a track meet when she usually figures who is going to run in what events.

With injuries to a couple of key runners and the district title on the line, Allen wouldn't mind that bus ride early Saturday morning to help her sort the Tiger lineup.

There's more to track than just running, jumping and throwing as fast or as far as you can. A coach has to consider the order of the events, the health of the athletes, the number of points to be won and, of course, the strategy of the other coaches.

Take the relays for example. Allen is convinced Capitan won the 1600-meter relay state title in 1990 because she switched her first and second runners for the finals.

"Just because you run four kids and they go around in 52 (seconds) - it's how you match up in addition to how fast. It makes a difference of who runs against who," Allen said.

Some coaches lead with their fastest runners and end with their slowest. Others start with slowest and end with the fastest. And still other coaches stagger the swiftest with the less fleet-footed.

Allen prefers to match up

with her competition when she can, but she also considers the strengths and weaknesses of each runner.

"Some kids can give a baton, and not take it," she said. Allen's method and some talented Capitan athletes have produced 13 state relay titles in the last four years. As a team, the Tigers have won the district title six of the last seven years, and finished in the top three at the state meet in the last six of seven years.

Two of those talented Tigers are Amy and Jessica Cline. The Clines won their first state title as eighth graders. They were two of the four legs on that 1600-meter relay team Allen switched around.

"There's a boatload of state championships between those two," Allen said. "They've had a phenomenal career."

The Tigers started the season looking to bring home more hardware by the end of it. But injuries to Jessica Cline in the basketball season, and more recent ones incurred by Chris Worrell and Trisha Seidel, have dimmed the Tiger hopes.

Worrell and Seidel are Allen's two fastest sprinters. Seidel might return in time for the state meet. Allen said the sprinter has taken her injury hard, but she's coming back mentally.

"It's kind of like a lesson in life - you just have to get up and go on," Allen said.

Worrell will see some action Saturday. Allen will run her in the 100- and 200-meter dashes and the 400-meter relay.

Capitan's sprint relay (400-meter) has worked hard to smooth out some wrinkles, Allen said. Worrell's return to the lineup is bound to help.

Allen has eight athletes to choose from for the 1600-meter relay. Jessica Cline's back running 400s. She and sister Amy will probably join either Worrell, Catherine Sidwell, Joni Autrey, Monica Johnson, Krin Autrey or Erin Autrey.

Allen said it will be a tough call to determine who runs the 1600-meter relay (someone start the bus).

For the 800-meter relay, the Tigers will put up Veronica Roybal, Jessica Robertson, Michelle Wilson and Amy Cline. Sidwell and Worrell could also run a leg for Capitan.

"We can put in four kids who can generally beat four kids from somewhere else," Allen said.

The Tiger field event performers will have their last chance to qualify for state on Saturday. Mandi Aldaz already has qualified in the discus. She will try to qualify in the shot put. Shelby Gowen hopes to make the cut in both the discus and shot put.

Hurlers Coye Robbins and Andra Fish hope their hard work will pay off as well.

"Stacie Sidwell will pick up some points for us in the distance runs," Allen added.

Capitan will need some top performances if the Tigers are to defend their district title. They also have to hope nagging injuries don't hobble their efforts.

When talking to Allen, you get the impression that somehow this unusually successful team will find a way on Saturday.

"Our kids will run hard," Allen promised. "They take care of business. They communicate with their teachers. They treat each other well. They're courteous in public, and I think our community sees that," Allen said.

She's right. When the Tigers take the field Saturday, they'll be decked out in new orange and black sweatsuits donated by the community.

"We were overwhelmed by the gesture of support from our community, and we're extremely grateful," Allen said.

With her Tigers on the mend, all Allen needs now is someone to drive a bus around Saturday morning - that way the veteran Capitan coach can figure out her winning formula.

He's (Wright) in good shape, and with Eric we don't generally have to worry about him," Wall said.



I believe if the Apaches of today who complain of no job opportunities looked in the local paper they would find many minimum wage jobs in the local area. (By the way I currently hold one of those minimum wage jobs and contribute to paying my way through school.) Is it possible they don't want these jobs but would rather live off the white man's government subsidy programs — college education, medical care, no U.S. government taxes on the reservation, etc?

It seems to me that a strong work ethic could be instilled in the Apache children without exposing them to the dangers of the MRS. This could happen by strong family units and a push for a higher education on the reservation. The MRS, on the other hand, is the "white man's" way of taking advantage of the Native American population. There was no state willing to take the MRS, the "greedy Caucasian" government sent applications to Native American tribes, and the Apaches fell for it.

The "white man" knows by trial and error the dangers. Just remember Oak Ridge, Tenn., Three Mile Island, Rocky Flats, and in our own backyard, Los Alamos. There the radioactive dumping is now linked to the high rate of cancer.

Your statement about distrust of the "white man" seems twisted. You don't trust the "white man." After negotiating contracts, you are willing to store the "white man's" most hazardous garbage (because the untrusting "white man" tells you it's safe). Your statement about whites being greedy is a contradiction. The Mesquero appear to be the greedy ones. They are allowing the "greedy" white land takers, when they disagree as much as I do, to take the MRS to court, and throw millions of dollars in their face.

Easy solution to bears in dumpsters

TO THE EDITOR:

Thank you for drawing attention to the bear/trash problem. My family has owned an old cabin in the Upper Canyon since the 1930s, and we have watched the trash problem grow year by year since the dumpsters were deployed.

Last year, I installed hasps on my dumpster which I lock with inexpensive spiral chain repair links. The hardware cost me about \$12 at retail and required perhaps an hour's labor. The locks have proven effective even when the bears have inverted the dumpster. I would expect that the government could do a similar (and much more professional) job at a cost under \$25 per dumpster.

One other requirement is that the loader operator step down and spend about two minutes releasing the locks and reinstalling the link in the hasp to permit relocking by the first user after emptying. A couple of minutes per dumpster once a week seems a small price to pay to correct a failed system which has changed trash disposal to trash dispersal.

Officials consider "fast food" school lunches

Ruidoso school officials are considering having fast food restaurants serving at the middle and high schools, in an attempt to increase the number of students who eat school lunches.

About 25%, or 150 students out of 600, eat at the high school every day, said Marcia Merrell, food service director for the school system.

The school district is conducting feasibility studies about the possibility of "food courts," where commercial fast food enterprises operate from the middle and high school.

Students would pay higher prices for restaurant food, and the school would get a percentage of the cost. That money would cover losses from the in-house school lunch program.

The concept has been successful in other parts of the country, said Mike Gladden, superintendent of schools.

"We lose a lot of students at the high school because they go off campus to eat lunch," he said. "Middle school students have a closed campus so some of them just don't eat."

Many of the lunches provided by fast food enterprises already meet nutritional guidelines by offering what is known as "Type A" lunches (containing the nutritional benefits required by federal guidelines). They also offer ala-carte items like baked potatoes, pizza, and hot dogs that give students variety and choice along with nutrition, Gladden said.

"We want the food to interest the students while providing the proper nutrition," he said.

Private food service

Another possibility being explored by school officials is the feasibility of using a private food service contractor specializing in servicing schools.

"The big companies get a better price on commodities," Gladden said. "We plan on visiting some of

the other school districts who are serviced by the food service companies."

Gladden said marketing was a necessary aspect of school lunch programs that wasn't currently being addressed in the Ruidoso schools.

"Big food service companies know how to market the product," he said. "We've even talked to one company that meets students getting off of the buses and offers them breakfast burritos."

Changing times

Gladden said change is difficult for some people involved in the food system, but times have changed.

"It's a challenge for any school district," he said. "In addition to everything else, many of the federal subsidies previously available are gone, causing increased costs for the schools."

The school district has not raised lunch prices in several years, Gladden said.

Currently, secondary school students pay 45 cents for breakfast and \$1.25 for lunch. Lower grades pay 45 cents for breakfast and \$1.10 for lunch.

Food director problems

The school district has had three food service directors during the past four years. The third, current director Marcia Merrell, resigned effective at the end of this school year.

One director left to open a restaurant, and the other left for personal reasons after two years on the job, Gladden said. Merrell, who was hired at the beginning of this school year, resigned recently after meeting with Gladden.

"It was a mutual decision between Mr. Gladden and myself," Merrell said.

Merrell said she will finish out the school year in Ruidoso and will probably take a job in El Paso, Texas next year.

Before the Ruidoso school job, Merrell had experience working as a food service director of a veterans hospital in Big Springs, Texas and the Veterans Medical Center in Waco, Texas, but not with a school system.

Merrell, a registered and licensed dietitian, said she has tried to incorporate healthy eating habits into the school menus.

"I'm a professional dietitian," Merrell said. "My focus is on nutrition for the students and the school system's focus is on making money."

Caron Snow, Ruidoso Municipal Schools business manager, disagrees with Merrell.

"Her comment surprises me," Snow said. "Because last year we told her specifically that we are not in the business to make money, but we do want to at least break even."

Food service directors are expected to project the number of students who will eat school lunches, Gladden said.

"The reason you hire a director is to increase participation to where they (the meals) are paying for themselves," Gladden said. "We've increased cafeteria workers' salaries and benefits, but student participation has not increased."

"We experienced an almost 5.8% enrollment growth and you should expect an increase in participation," Snow said. "We felt that Marcia could not only increase participation, but provide leadership."

Participation has not increased, even with the enrollment growth, Snow said.

"The problem really is at the high school," Merrell said. "I tried to make the meals more attractive but with the open campus policy, let's face it, the kids want to get off campus for a while and go to Sonic."

"I've also heard the kids say they don't want to eat with the freshmen, which is not much of a comment on the quality of the food."

Budget transfers

"We've had to transfer about

\$60,000 from the operational budget to the food service budget just to cover costs," Gladden said.

Merrell was allocated a budget of \$340,000 for salaries, benefits and purchase of food, he said.

Merrell said she is frustrated partly because she had no input into the budget process for the school's food program.

The tentative budget was prepared last April before Merrell was hired, Snow said. The \$26,000 per year director's position was not included because there was no plan at that time to hire a director, as two food service managers had indicated interest in managing the program.

Food service managers operate the day-to-day operations at the various cafeteria sites and are accountable to the director, who oversees the entire operation.

The state recommends that school systems have a food service director, and monies were shifted from the operational budget to cover the cost of hiring one, Snow said.

Merrell said the cafeteria workers were not consulted about the budget, and yet are expected to provide nutritious meals.

Snow countered that the staff does have input.

"We've had numerous meetings with her," Snow said. "I can provide the agendas of those meetings. We've talked about special functions and I've given her copies of the budget. I don't know exactly where her comment comes from because of the number of meetings we've had in just the last few months."

The meetings are all after the fact, Merrell said.

"When the budget was originally prepared I was not yet hired," she said. "Then I'm supposed to live with that budget."

Merrell, Gladden and Snow all agreed that the food director position can be overwhelming.

Autrey said she aspires to a full-time career in music, but right now, finishing high school is her main occupation. She's thankful for the



The search is on for a new Lincoln County Fair Queen.


All local beauties are invited to a clinic at 7 p.m. May 12 at the county fair building in Capitan.
