Deadline changed for nuclear project

The date for utilities to sign on as partners or customers of the Mescalero Apache nuclear fuel storage project has been pushed back from May 3 to May 12.

Duane Schmoker, consultant to the tribe on the spent nuclear fuel rod proposal, said some of the original 33 utilities led by Northern States Utilities in Minnesota haven't signed up yet.

The consortium, in partnership with the tribe in neighboring Otero County, expects to submit a license application by late 1996. Plans call for up to 40,000 metric tons of commercial nuclear waste to be shipped to the reservation for temporary storage.

The Mescalero first rejected and then approved the proposal in elections in late January and mid-March.

Spring cleaning starts in Ruidoso

The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority and the village of Ruidoso are sponsoring a spring clean-up this week.

Trash containers for residents and businesses will be positioned at the authority garbage transfer station on Gavilan Canyon Road next to the Humane Society shelter, and at the free parking area, 1900 Sud-derth Drive.

Although white goods can be left at both sites, individuals are encouraged to bring them to the transfer station. Used motor oil also can be taken there, but no other hazardous waste material will be accepted.

Planning director has heart surgery

Ruidoso Planning Director Cleatus Richards underwent angioplasty surgery at Saint Joseph's Hospital in Albuquerque Tuesday after suffering from a heart attack a week earlier.

The surgery went well, planning department secretary Roseanna Painter reports, and Richards may be sent home as early as this weekend.

Richards, 52, will be absent from city hall for at least three weeks, Painter said.

Ruidoso schools plan for loss of Mescalero students

Ruidoso school officials are planning for a no-growth 1995-96 school year, after the Mescalero tribe president said he wanted his people to attend school on the reservation by August.

The school system could lose \$1.3 million if Mescalero starts its own middle and high schools next year, said Ruidoso Schools Superintendent Mike Gladden at a Community Involvement meeting Wednesday.

"I had a conference with (Tribal President) Wendell Chino where he informed me, in his words, that he would have the vast majority of the students currently attending the Ruidoso and Tularosa school districts attending school in Mescalero by August," Gladden said.

Approximately 469 Mescalero students attend Ruidoso schools, amounting to nearly 20% of those enrolled.

The tribe currently has only a gradeschool in portable buildings on the reservation.

No official written notice has been given by the tribe, but Gladden said the school must take Chino's comments seriously.

Tribal education liaison John Shendo said tribal leaders will not comment publicly on the situation.

Earlier this year, tribal leaders sent a stinging letter to Gladden that accused Ruidoso students of

racial bias against Indians. Citing strained relations between Mescalero and Ruidoso in the letter, the tribal council did not offer its free ski program to children outside the reservation this year.

Gladden said he asked Chino if the students could be withdrawn over a period of years, in order to lessen the financial impact on the schools, but Chino responded that most students would be attending school on the reservation by August.

Gladden and Susana Murphy, Tularosa school superintendent, met with Alan Morgan, state superintendent of schools, Thursday.

"We felt it was important for him (Morgan) to be on record as hearing about the possibility of the drastic impact that this could have on both districts," Gladden said. "We were on record as letting him know that the two districts might be having to approach the State Department of Education next year to ask for supplemental emergency funds if the impact is as great as we expect."

Because the district receives \$2,700 in state funding for each of the 469 Mescalero students currently enrolled in the schools, \$1.3 million could be lost if they all were to leave, said Caron Snow, Ruidoso Municipal Schools business manager.

With the anticipated loss of Mescalero students, the tentative 1995-

96 district budget will register as a no-growth year, Snow said.

In the 1994-95 school year, 2,324 students were attending Ruidoso schools. The tentative budget projects 2,327 students for 1995-96, a growth of only .15%, or 3.5 students, for the school district.

"We are estimating (in the tentative budget) that we are not going to see any growth," Snow said. "It won't be until next year's 40th day enrollment count, where funding is actually determined, that we will know if we will need to seek emergency funding from the state."

Past budgets have indicated much larger growth. Based on the past five years, Ruidoso's school population rose 6% per year. If that trend continues, the school system could make up the difference even if the Mescalero students do leave, Gladden said.

Because of the possibility of funding cuts, school staff members have indicated nervousness about their jobs, Gladden said.

"I have talked to the staffs at each of the schools and told them that this is a challenge we accept and we will try to keep the present staff levels regardless of the situation," he said.

Asked about the effect of the situation on the current collective bargaining sessions between the Ruidoso Education Association and the Ruidoso Municipal School District, Gladden said it should prove to be "interesting."

County pays \$122,500 to fired worker

A wrongful termination suit filed in August 1989 by a former employee in the Lincoln County assessor's office resulted in a \$122,500 settlement this month.

"It's over with. I'm not happy with it, but I just got fed up with it," said Joe Wheatley, 66, who had worked as a field assessor during a period when Julia Zamora ran for office. She was elected and served one, two-year term.

Wheatley contended he was fired


by Zamora because he ran against her in an assessor's election, something she acknowledged in testimony.

"I didn't come anywhere close to getting back what I lost," Wheatley said. "I lost my New Mexico retirement and some of my social security contributions."

A lower court decision against Wheatley was appealed to the State Supreme Court, which ruled unanimously in his favor. The Supreme

Court criticized District Court Judge Robert M. Doughty, a previous county commission and Zamora.

"We settled out of court, because the case was sent back to the judge who ruled against me in the first place," Wheatley said. He was hired in September 1984 and served in the department for five years without a blemish on his record before being fired by Zamora, he said.

Commissioners consider pay raises

Commissioners will take another look at Lincoln County's budget Tuesday, trying to decide what kind of raise county employees should receive.

The meeting will begin at 9 a.m. in the county courthouse in Carrizozo. Budget items are expected to be discussed about 10:30 a.m.

In the general fund, taking into consideration an anticipated \$200,000 transfer to the county road department, revenues are riding about \$65,000 ahead of projected expenditures.

Revenues are estimated at \$4,133,624 and expenses at \$4,068,787.

In figuring the impact of a raise for the county's 100 employees, each percentage point raise would cost the county \$22,314 (\$18,128 in

wages and \$4,186 in benefits). Before the final budget figures were in, County Manager Carolina Cooney was recommending a 6% raise at \$133,882.

Early indications that the Zoo Senior Citizens program had become self-supporting were wrong, Cooney said. Money received to finish the Corona Center was entered on the revenue side, but the \$65,000 was not listed on the expense side, she said. However, the \$30,000 in county support required by the program that serves hot meals to the elderly is lower than previous years, she said.

Other items of interest on the agenda include:

— a status report from lobbyist John Underwood on the requests for proposals for the use of Fort Stanton, formerly a state hospital.

— selection of a Community Development Block Grant. Commissioners have said they will push for improvements to the Health Clinic in Carrizozo instead of building a Senior Citizens Center in San Patricio or creating a mobile health unit to serve rural areas. The health center may be the focus of a grant application.

— a public hearing to reconsider a special per front foot road assessment in subdivisions for extraordinary maintenance.

— designation of emergency vehicles.

Commissioners, sheriff face off on jail transports

If Lincoln County Commissioners stick to their guns tomorrow, jailers instead of deputies will provide local transportation for county jail prisoners in 1995-96.

Sheriff's deputies now drive prisoners to court dates and medical appointments, plus transfer them from county jail to state prisons and back. Scheduling problems have existed for more than two decades and have continued under the terms served by McSwane, the sheriff said Thursday during the second commission annual budget session.

McSwane failed to change the minds of the majority of the board members. Commissioners tentatively decided Monday they would switch the transport responsibility to the jail, moving a van and \$9,000 of McSwane's transport and extradition allocation for 1995-96 into the separate, commission-controlled jail budget.

Some of the scheduling problems occur because jailers have been asking verbally for transport instead of filling out a form that dispatchers can use to schedule, McSwane said.

During a telephone interview Wednesday, McSwane said he didn't like the way complaints about scheduling were handled. Instead of coming to him, county employees kept a tally of missed appointments and other items that later were used to blind-side him during a county commission meeting, McSwane contended.

Coordination problems between the jail and sheriff's office have resulted in missed appointments for prisoners, head jailer Wayland Hill told the commissioners Monday. Prisoners ended up spending extra days in jail at a cost to the county, Hill alleged.

McSwane said the type of transport the commission wants to take over only accounts for 10% of the trips each year, but commissioners plan to take 50% of the amount budgeted.

Commissioners assured McSwane Thursday that if more money was needed during the year to fulfill his statutory duties for court-ordered prisoner transportation, the commission would supplement his budget.

McSwane said his deputies drove 31,068 miles and spent 1,188.5 hours transporting prisoners under court order. Small trips that the jailers will be assuming, accounted for 3,158 miles and 288 hours.

His court-ordered trips already have exceeded budgeted totals, he said. "Sometimes I have four deputies going in four different directions (with prisoners)," he said.

"When I turned over the jail to the commission (two years ago), it was understood that there would be problems with prisoner transportation," McSwane said. "There always have been. The problem is going to continue. There are appointments we can't make because of the deputies' prime obligation to the people of the county in law enforcement."

The mood became more conciliatory as McSwane and commissioners agreed that adding an extra jailer to help with transport also will help the jail maintain better security and a schedule of two employees per shift.

But McSwane pointed out that the main reason he was willing to give the commission responsibility for the jail was that it was habitually understaffed.

"I gave it to the commission, because they were not willing to give me enough manpower to operate it safely and I didn't want to be personally liable for the situation," he said. "Once they found out (the situation first-hand), they went up on manpower."

Chairman Monroy Montes agreed, saying that the county will try the new approach and if it doesn't work, the board will change it. At least commissioners are trying to solve the problem, he said.

McSwane warned that some short-trip transports still require an armed guard and sometimes, more than one person. He will not use jailers on his court-ordered transports, because he hasn't trained them and does not supervise them, McSwane said.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said he likes the idea of the jail handling the local trips to free up time for deputies to deal with more important duties.

In other cuts from McSwane's requested \$939,659 budget, commissioners nixed salary step increases for dispatchers and rejected an increase for a part-time transport officer.

Sheriff budget cuts debated

Defending his fiscal record during a budget session Thursday, Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane argued it's unfair to say his budget has doubled since 1991, even though the bare figures might suggest that.

County Commissioner Wilton Howell had noted the increase from half a million to \$942,000 at a budget meeting Monday. He noted that the county jail had been removed from McSwane's jurisdiction about two years ago.

McSwane pointed out the budget was formulated differently then and didn't include the cost of workman's compensation

and capital outlay for new vehicles. Since 1991, a large 911 emergency communication center has been added to his responsibilities and the county's contribution for insurance premiums has gone up from 60% to 80%, he said.

Salaries and other benefits have increased by \$126,900 and overall operational expenses is down by \$26,641, McSwane said.

Drug grant dropped

McSwane asked commissioners to reconsider their decision not to apply in 1995-96 for a \$90,000 grant to pay for a narcotics enforcement unit. The county annually has been con-

tributing about \$26,000 to gain the grant.

McSwane isn't convinced the program would be as effective or would be approved by the state if the Ruidoso Police Department applies, he said. That department has only cooperated briefly with the sheriff's office on the program in previous years, he contended.

Because of the commission's decision to abandon the grant, McSwane moved the two deputies whose salaries were paid by that money into the column with regular deputies. The two deputies hired most recently will be laid off, if no other money can be found to keep them.

Streets prioritized

A list of the 26 Ruidoso roads most in need of repair was approved by the Village Council Tuesday night.

The streets will be scheduled for repairs as the budget allows.

Not all the village's 160 miles of paved and 35 miles of unpaved streets have yet been prioritized, said Alan Briley, assistant village manager, but they will be by next April.

"We know these are the worst we have," he said.

The prioritized streets are divided into three categories; the first listed under each category will be the first ones to receive work. Those left undone after funds are exhausted will be upgraded the following year, Briley said.

Base course and dirt streets, pegged to be brought from poor into good condition, are:

- Old Lincoln Road, from Blazers Mill to Torreón Loop;
- Kaibab, from Coconino to end;
- Alamo, from Coconino to end;
- San Miguel, from Mary to Otero;
- Ridge Road, from High to Mountain;
- Ranier, from University to Mount Blanc;
- Maple, from Redwood to end of pavement;
- Oak, from Fir to Deodar;
- Seoclar, from Oak to Candlewood;
- Candlewood, from Deodar to Oak.

A bull elk was shot early Friday by a Ruidoso resident who said he was just trying to scare it off after it kept hanging out in his yard.

State game warden Ron Moore killed the elk several hours later and salvaged its meat.

Potential charges against Jeff Morgan, 30, of Santa Anita Drive include illegal taking of an elk and discharging a firearm within city limits. Both are misdemeanors. The former would be filed in magistrate court by the state Game and Fish Division and carries a possible \$1,000 fine and/or 60 days in jail.

Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox said his department intends to charge Morgan in municipal court with the firearms violation.

"If he hadn't hit the elk, he sure might have hit one of the four houses around him," Moore said of Morgan's decision to use a rifle in a populated neighborhood.

Moore said the elk had lost his fear of man, because people in the neighborhood had been feeding him.

The elk may have moved into the ridge area above Grindstone Canyon to sample the heavy grasses, even without special feeding by residents, Moore said. But the animal probably would not have kept coming back.

Moore initially said that Morgan didn't realize in the dark that he had shot the elk with his .22 caliber rifle. Not until later in the morning did he see that it was wounded.

But Morgan said he knew right away the elk was wounded.

"We called the head game office in Roswell about five minutes after it happened," Morgan said. "We called about 6:40 a.m., but no one got out here until about 10 a.m."

"It was still alive then and I thought maybe they could do something for it. I knew I had screwed up big time."

"It was completely an accident," Morgan said the five to eight-year-old elk had been visiting the neighborhood for about four months.

"At first, we thought it was real neat. We took pictures of it. But then he started destroying the yard and chasing our dogs off," Morgan said. His children were afraid to use their playhouse in the backyard, because the elk was there for hours at a time. "He's not scared of people at all."

"We've tried everything to get rid of him," Morgan said. "I've hit him with a rock before and he just stood there and looked at me. He just would not leave. We hung bars of lava soap out there, because he wasn't supposed to like the smell. I put bug spray on the grass. We put pepper out there and raw eggs. I guess he liked it."

"I'm stupid, I made a mistake. I got a stupid idea."

Although he knew it was illegal to shoot in the city limits, Morgan said he had shot in the air before and the elk didn't move.

"I was going to shoot over him to scare him off and it hit him," Morgan said. "It just freaked me out. I guess it broke his back. I definitely did not want that to happen."

"I guess a lot of the neighbors liked him, but the ones who took care of their yards didn't. He bit off a neighbor's fruit trees at the root and destroyed them. A bunch of neighbors were feeding him. He

wasn't scared at all. You'd get within five feet and he'd just stomp toward you. In hunting season, he wouldn't have had a chance."

The death of the elk is one more example of the unhappy results when people feed wildlife, Moore said.

"The elk are all over town this year," Moore said. "They have no fear of anyone. They're not afraid to come right back into the yard after you scare them away. This spring is the worst I've seen in six years in terms of animal-people conflicts."

"If wild animals are causing a problem, people need to contact us (or the Ruidoso Police Department) to see what avenues are available. We don't want people shooting at animals to scare them away."

Moore said Morgan would receive some consideration because he contacted the game commission and told the truth.

The male elk's rack was in the velvet stage, but already showed five points, Moore said.

"I marked the lines — know where they all are," he concedes.

In fact, the water distribution technician knows so well where the water feeds the various lines (he helped add service to hundreds of homes through the years) that his work continued through his dreams.

"If I know what will be happening the next day," Sanchez explains with some prompting, "I think about it all night, and figure how to cut off the water line."

But Sanchez's berth of water pressure knowledge will be off with him fishing for the next few weeks — and running a home-based wood yard thereafter — as he indulges in his first taste of retirement.

Ken Perryman, one of the water department's 19 employees who has been tagging along with Sanchez for the past eight months, will be taking his place.

"He has learned a lot," Sanchez said of Perryman, "but, I don't know, I'm still learning too."

The 50-year-old Capitan resident hung up his uniform for good on Tuesday and said goodbye to his department and the rest of the village staff Wednesday at a luncheon in his honor. He was bestowed with a gold Seiko watch and hailed for his good works.

The occasion was the icing to a successful career with the village; Sanchez provided for his wife and children as well as put his son through law school with his earnings, he said.

Always steady and sure, San-

chez came from Arabella to work for the village's street department when a mere 16-years-old. He is one of the first village employees to retire with 25 years (rather than at the suggested age threshold) under its public employee retirement system.

"I guess I kind of enjoyed it here," he admitted.

Ostriches, emu and librarians may seem a strange combination, but all were represented at Ruidoso conventions last week.

More than 600 librarians and their families converged on the Ruidoso Civic Events and Convention Center Thursday, Friday and Saturday for the New Mexico Library Association's 1995 conference.

New technology exhibits, book-sellers, encyclopedia companies and children's activity displays filled the convention center. Sixty-three exhibitors demonstrated cutting edge library systems and library-related resources.

This year's Library Association conference theme was, "The Future is Now, Are You Ready For The Year 2000?"

Keynote speaker and humorist author Will Manley gave a presentation called, "I'm Just Road-kill on the Information Highway." Lowell Catlett, professor of Agricultural Economics at New Mexico State University, spoke about the use of information in a futuristic context.

Workshops at the conference included such topics as library-based family literacy programs, working on the computer Internet and improving community relations.

Across town at the Enchantment Inn, 200 members of the New Mexico Ratite (defined as a bird with a flat breastbone) Association

(NMRA) gathered last weekend to discuss the growth and future of their industry.

NMRA represents ostrich, emu, and rhea ranchers, who believe that the American market for meat and leather products is on the verge of an explosion.

Meat from these birds is particularly popular in Europe, where it is available in restaurants and grocery stores, states a brochure by the American Ostrich Association. Ostrich is a red meat and is similar in appearance and taste to beef, yet is considerably lower in fat, calories and cholesterol with a high protein content.

Demand for ratite products is in Europe, interest is increasing domestically because of health-conscious consumers, the brochure says.

Besides ratite meat, by-products include exotic leathers, oils, and feathers.

Many more conventions and gatherings are on the way to the Ruidoso area this summer, including the Ruidoso Area Ham Radio Fest in May with 2,000 people expected, the Lions Club State Convention in June with 500 or more participants, and a convention of the New Mexico Dairy Producers in July. The 1995 Realtors Association of New Mexico State Convention will be in Ruidoso in late September, with more than 1,000 Realtors and their families expected to attend.

Sweat beads upon your forehead and every fiber of your being screams out for liquid refreshment, when suddenly you see a water cooler and a sign that says "Have a drink on us." No, it's not a mirage and no, you haven't entered the Twilight Zone — you've discovered Sierra Blanca Pure Water.

Dave King and Norman Smith recently opened Sierra Blanca Pure Water at 1096 Mechem behind Lincoln Towers in the old Bank of Ruidoso drive-up facility.

"We put the dispenser out for the walkers and joggers on the path," King said. "It gives them a chance to quench their thirst and taste our water."

King was previously the president of Sun World Federal Savings Bank and Smith has lived in Ruidoso for 20 years.

"We have an attendant on duty and people drive up and get their bottles filled," King said. "If you don't have a bottle, we sell them here also."

The company also sells water dispensers. The dispensers, depending on style and size, range in price from \$12 to \$80.

The cost for a gallon of Sierra Blanca Pure Water is 35 cents.

Free standing, coin operated, reverse-osmosis water vending machines are stationed at all Ruidoso Rich Gas locations, Capitan Chevron and outside the Sierra Blanca Pure Water office for after hour purchases.

The company is currently starting a home delivery service, King said.

The main office of Sierra Blanca Pure Water is open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Saturday. The phone number is 258-5903.

Language of Russian art is universal

The Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs opened an exhibition of Russian art from the Museum of Horsebreeding in Moscow, Russia last week. Helping to open the show was Vasily Vladimirovich, dean of zoengineering at the Moscow Timiriazev Agricultural Academy. The Museum of Horsebreeding operates under the academy. Vladimirovich was interviewed at the Museum of the Horse's annual gala.

Russian Vasily Vladimirovich is enjoying his first visit to the United States. Since his arrival last week to oversee the opening of "The Imperial Russian Horse: Equine Art From The Reign Of The Czars," Vladimirovich has been touring parts of Lincoln County.

"My first experience with America has been with Ruidoso and in my opinion, to know the country better, you must visit the countryside, because that is where the people are more open," Vladimirovich said. "The locality of Ruidoso is wonderful, with the mountains of Sierra Blanca, the forests, and the clean streams."

One of Vladimirovich's favorite stops was in Lincoln, where he visited the Lincoln Heritage Trust Museum.

"I've heard the name Billy the Kid since my childhood and read about him in books," he said. "Seeing Lincoln and touching American history is very exciting."

Russian Horsebreeding

Horsebreeding is part of Vladimirovich's job at the Moscow Timiriazev Agricultural Academy, where he is dean of 16 zoengineering departments and a professor in

the genetics and animal breeding department.

"Our teachers and professors teach the agricultural sciences and horsebreeding is one of the directions of the student's preparation," Vladimirovich said. "The Museum of Horsebreeding is a part of my facility and it was created especially for studies in agriculture."

Art collections in the museum help the students become acquainted and familiar with the different breeds of horses, he said.

"With the examples of outstanding stallions and mares, plus what took place in the creation of some breeds, the high art gives the students inspiration," Vladimirovich said. "There are about 300 portraits of horses, and 60 sculptures on exhibition at the Museum of Horsebreeding."

The exhibition at The Museum of the Horse, on display through Sept. 10, features a collection of paintings and bronzes on loan from

the Russian museum, created by renowned 19th and early 20th century Russian equine artists.

The same, but different

The names are similar, but Vladimirovich said there are distinctive differences between The Museum of Horsebreeding and The Museum of the Horse. The Russian museum was organized solely as an educational and study tool, without the infrastructure of the Museum of the Horse, he said.

"I was surprised with the computer equipment here and with the very wide aspects of activities and events," he said. "This presentation is a sign of the high level of organization and relations among the Ruidoso businesses and people."

Until the many changes in Russia recently, the Museum of Horsebreeding was funded by the state. Now, Vladimirovich hopes to take

some promotional ideas back to Russia with him.

Horse racing in Russia

Historically, different forms of horse competitions have been part of Russia for centuries. They started with war horse competitions, determining strength and endurance of massive animals bred exclusively to carry fully armored men into battle.

"Since even armor couldn't stop a bullet, cotton uniforms replaced battle armor and the large war horses were no longer needed," Vladimirovich said. "Eventually, horses were bred for speed and racing competition."

Horse racing and track betting in Russia is a very popular sport, with about 30 active tracks in the country. The most famous is the Moscow Hippodrome.

"The most popular form of horse racing in Russia is horse-trotting," Vladimirovich said. Horse-trotting competition involves a horse pulling a light, two-wheeled carriage with a seat for the jockey.

"Riding competitions such as those in Ruidoso are more popular in the southern part of my country," he said.

Hope for the future

"The expertise of your remarkable new director, Jay Wright, is very useful," he said. "I hope our communication and cooperation will increase connections for both sides in the future."

"The language of art is universal and this exhibition is near to the hearts of Americans like it's near to the hearts of Russians, and now, in this exhibition, our hearts are together," Vladimirovich said.

Capitan boys and girls defend District 6-AA track titles

Saturday's District 6-AA track meet belonged to Capitan.

The Tigers captured both the boys' and girls' district titles and had the top individual point getters in Michael Fish and Chris Worrell.

To complete the sweep, boys coach Ed Davis and girls coach Pam Allen were named district coaches of the year.

"It was a good day for Capitan, all around," Davis understated.

The Capitan boys used a solid team effort to outdistance second-place Cloudfcroft by 28 points, for their fourth straight district title.

For their district championship, Tiger girls had only 10 points to spare. They defeated Cloudfcroft 123.5 to 113.5.

"They did super," Allen said of her girls. "I was overwhelmed. I knew they would run hard. I'm very proud of them."

Fish makes big splash

Senior Michael Fish made his presence felt in his first full day of competition since injuring his leg at the start of the season. Fish took first place in four events and second in another. He accounted for 26 Tiger points.

"Every time he'd take a step, I'd flinch," Davis said.

Fish had little, if any, practice time on the track leading up to the district meet. He was too busy receiving treatment on the injured leg.

His 110-meter high hurdles race was Fish's first full run over the hurdles of the season.

Apparently he hasn't missed a beat. Fish was second in the high

hurdles with a time of 16.7, and first in 300-meter hurdles with a time of 42.4.

Davis said it was mostly Fish's decision whether or not to run.

"I wasn't going to push him," Davis said. "We just kind of left it up to him."

The Tigers, however, got off to a quick start before Fish made his presence felt.

After the field events and the 1600-meter run, Capitan had scored 75 points already. That meant the Tigers were sitting in good shape when it was time for the finals of the sprints and relays - traditionally strong events for Capitan.

"Everyone went out and performed well," Davis said. "They've done an outstanding job - both the boys and the girls."

The Tigers also got top performances from junior Neil Montes, who won the 1600-meter run (4:56.7). Montes beat Cloudfcroft's runner, who had defeated Montes handily at Tularosa's Memorial Relays just a week earlier.

Eighth-grader Raymond Harris cleared 5-10 (state qualifying height) in the high jump for fourth place, and a trip to state.

Capitan qualified three of four relays for the state meet, with second place finishes in the 400-meter, 800-meter and medley relays.

In all, a dozen Tigers will represent Capitan in 10 events at the state meet in Albuquerque next weekend.

Girls rely on pride

Allen's bruised and sore girls team relied on its Tiger pride to pull out the victory.

"We're kind of like some veteran racehorses," Allen said. "We limp and hobble around, and then someone shoots a gun off and we run like crazy. Then we limp and hobble around some more."

Tiger sprinter Worrell was one of those hobbling around not too long ago, but she showed no signs Saturday of a knee injury incurred several weeks earlier. Worrell scored 18.5 points for Capitan by winning the 100- and 200-meter dashes. She was also ran legs on the Tigers' 400-meter and 1600-meter relays. Both relays took first place.

"She ran well. She's still sore," Allen said of Worrell.

Capitan will send a pair to compete at state in the shot put. Mandi Aldaz and Shelby Gowen swept the event. Aldaz also took first in the discus with a career best of 93 feet, 11 inches.

Joni Autrey posted a personal best in the 800-meter run. She won the event in a time of 2:36.9.

All those who finished first or second, or met the qualifying standard in an event, qualified for the state meet. Jessica Robertson will go also, because she ran a 13.4 in the preliminaries of the 100-meter dash.

Nine Tigers in individual events and Capitan's four relay teams will make the trip to Albuquerque next weekend for state.

Of her team Allen beamed, "They motivate me. They don't complain or moan or bellyache. They just do their job."



Tell commissioners Tuesday how you feel about county's role

It looks like the Lincoln County Commissioners are planning to make some sweeping changes in the role of county government, as they prepare next year's budget.

When the commissioners slashed funding for special community projects last week, Chairman Monroy Montes said county government's main responsibilities should be the health, safety and welfare, as well as promotion of economic stability, of the community.

The problem with that statement is, everybody defines those responsibilities differently. Groups seeking funding, such as a counseling center and White Mountain Search & Rescue, may well argue that they help preserve the health, safety and welfare of this community. Others could say that by injecting money into programs that offer employment, the county is fostering economic stability. Where should the line be drawn?

If the commissioners are looking at adopting a more conservative philosophy, the public should be involved in the debate.

We urge citizens who have an opinion on this subject to attend tomorrow's county commission meeting in Carrizozo. The best time to speak is approximately 10:30 a.m. This may be the last time to offer opinions on the budget before the process is too far along to change.

We also urge the commissioners to hold a special meeting with the Ruidoso Village Council, as the council has requested (and any other government in the county that requests it). A healthy discussion between these two entities would, at the least, help foster cooperation. At best, it could result in less duplication of local government services, and therefore savings for taxpayers — a goal the commissioners seem to be advocating.

The Ruidoso golf team sets the standards for teams all over the state. We have the best courses, the best coaches, the best equipment, and some of the best players, but we didn't get this way by waiting. If you want to see Ruidoso have a baseball team, don't sit around and wait another five years. Find an eager group of kids, some supportive parents, organize some fundraisers, and find a coach who has half the heart of a single Ruidoso golf coach. With a little bit of hard work, I guarantee you'll have a successful program. Sure, Ruidoso could use a baseball team, but it's senseless to abolish one program to make room for another.

In closing, I would like to agree with one fact Mr. Sinclair stated — Les Carter is a hell of a coach, but did you know that he also happens to coach the girls' GOLF team?

The buffalo were gone. Hundreds of thousands of Native Americans had been forced to give up their traditional culture and move onto reservations. Five trans-continental railroads were built. Thousands of miles of telegraph wire had been strung from one end of the country to the other. Not only the physical, but the imaginative geography of the country had been rapidly conquered and violently installed.
