

Lightning sparks three county fires

Three dry lightning-caused fires burned 3,200 acres of grasslands in Lincoln County Monday and Tuesday before they were brought under control by Tuesday night.

"This is the mark of the multiple fire season," said Bill Duemling, a service forester with the New Mexico State Forestry. "We're in kind of a critical period right now, and it will be that way until summer rains start."

Officials may label the county an "extreme fire danger" area if good rains don't come soon, Duemling said. Heavy fuels contain only 9% moisture at this time.

The Shortest Fire just north of Fort Stanton burned 505 acres, mostly on the G Bar F Ranch. A small portion of the fort reservation was burned.

About 50 people from the Nogal, Bonito, Capitan and Lincoln fire departments, plus Bureau of Land Management and Forest Service crews, helped fight the blaze. The Smokey Bear Hot Shot crew and air tankers also assisted.

The Circle and Radio fires both erupted about 55 miles northwest of Roswell near the Lincoln County line, Duemling said. No homes were threatened.

BLM engines, six fire departments from Chaves County, two Mescalero engines and a state forestry crew helped fight the blazes, adding up to 42 people.

The Radio fire was the largest of the three, torching 2,600 acres of state and private land. The Circle fire burned 600 acres near the Circle F Ranch.

Trailer home destroyed by fire

A trailer home at the corner of Juniper Circle and Fir Drive in Ruidoso was destroyed by a fire Wednesday night.

No one was home at the time of the 9:30 p.m. blaze, said firefighter Thomas Chavez. The trailer at 186 Juniper Circle was rented by Liz Silva and owned by Alfonso Lucero.

The home was engulfed by flames when 15 firemen arrived, but they contained the flames within 15 minutes, Chavez said. The cause is being investigated.

Pink Lady earns her own day

Not everyone is granted a day to call their own, but Nell Trout is different.

Today has been proclaimed "Nell Trout Day" because the petite woman dressed in pink has volunteered the equivalent of 10 years, or 21,000 hours, to the Lincoln County Medical Center's hospital auxiliary.

The proclamation was made by Mayor Jerry Shaw at a Ruidoso Village Council meeting.

And tonight — nearly two weeks after the surprise declaration — the hospital is throwing her an honorary dinner for all she has given so freely.

Ever since 1979 when she first joined the auxiliary, Trout has donated that ever-recognizable pink cover shirt and tended to donations at the hospital's Thrift Shop.

"Now we're called pink people," she says of the LCMC auxiliary's

100 active members. "See, we have men in our organization too."

The 77-year-old Trout ("I usually tell people I'm 29 and holding, but I don't tell how many times") has sorted through reams of boxes and bags of goods left for resale at the little Nob Hill shop. She stocks the items and sells them, and even brings clothing home to wash and mend for the shop.

Broken toys are delivered to her husband, Paul, dubbed "Elfin" by her fellow pink people for his magical abilities at repairing little play things.

Proceeds from the shop's sales have helped fund equipment and supplies for the hospital, and education for staff.

"We bought the hospital's first mammogram (machine)," Trout says, brimming with pride.

Reaching into the dark recesses of the donated bundles has not come without risks and revelations, Trout relates.

"Once there was a box full of sheets and at the bottom was a rubber rat," she recalls, her face fully animated.

"She cleared the way and made another entrance to the store," when uncovering the rat, chuckled Dorothy King, the auxiliary president.

"You never know what's in those sacks and boxes," Trout adds.

Another time, Trout recalls finding a diamond ring in a pocket of clothing.

"I called the man who brought it in," she confirms.

Trout takes her fame in stride, but concedes she's a little embarrassed by all the attention shining her way this year. Not only did she receive her own day from councilors, but she was also honored by the New Mexico Hospital Health Association at a banquet and was featured in "All's Well in Lincoln County" for her services.

Last summer, she was also named the volunteer of the year by the Lincoln County chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution. And during the last decade she has been named Beta Sigma Phi Woman of the Year, and the auxiliary volunteer of the year.

"Life goes like that for me," the retired Jal schools home economics teacher says, shaking her head in dismay. She acknowledges good health has allowed her to volunteer so much and says she is grateful.

King, who says Trout is "irreplaceable," has suggested that her pink friend "speed up and down Sudderth Drive" on Nell Trout Day.

But Trout says that, apart from tonight's supper, she has no special plans for the day.

"Just plain ol' work," she says.

Sheriff seeks to run Ruidoso PD

Law enforcement in Ruidoso could become more cost efficient if run by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, Sheriff James McSwane said yesterday.

He plans to seek a full commission contract with Ruidoso by approaching the village council and county commission, possibly later this month, he said.

If granted, the contract would place all Ruidoso Police Department activities under his authority, he said.

"Combining both agencies would probably be more efficient, and in this case, cheaper," McSwane said. He added that, if issued a contract, he would likely keep Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox on staff as a chief deputy, though at half the salary Maddox now enjoys.

Reached by telephone after McSwane's pronouncement, Maddox said he had no comment. But Village Manager Gary Jackson said, "If permission is given (by the county commission) for him to make the proposal, then we are open to his proposal. But I emphasize we are very proud of the Ruidoso Police Department. I feel it is an excellent police department and it performs its services to the citizens of Ruidoso extremely well."

Somewhat startled at the news, County Commissioner Wilton Howell scoffed, "He has enough trouble running his own department much less then taking over another."

Howell added, "He doesn't even own a damned radar gun that I know of."

McSwane's suggestion of a contract came in reply to a village council discussion regarding the high cost of police department response to calls outside their jurisdiction. Maddox reported his men responded to 50 such calls last year at a cost of approximately \$51,000. This year, the average department

response to county calls is 50% less.

"(This) reflects my concerns of assuming liabilities through the sheriff's reluctance to authorize full county commissions to the Ruidoso Police Department's officers, and that more discretion is being used prior to responding to calls outside our jurisdiction," Maddox wrote the council.

McSwane said commissioning the police officers makes the sheriff liable for their actions.

"I'm not fully commissioning the officers because I can't, legally, unless they only answer to me," he explained. "Basically, once they are commissioned by me, they are my employees."

If a contract is drawn, McSwane said he would work within the department's budget, but at a lower cost. He added that, depending upon council and county commission agreements, possibly all the department's manpower could stay on staff as deputies.

State law also requires cities to provide law enforcement, but this service can be contracted to the sheriff's office, McSwane said.

McSwane said he believed Maddox's complaints about the lack of full commission were valid, and that his contract suggestion is made in "an air of total cooperation."

He said he would like the contract and was currently looking at potential cost savings in order to draw up his proposal.

If the RPD spent \$51,000 on 50 response calls, he said he strongly believes he could serve and protect Ruidosians for much less money.

"I'm sure that with salaries alone, I could reduce the cost to the city. With the chief's salary alone, I could make a \$20,000 savings to the city," he said.

McSwane, who was elected to office and has served as sheriff for the past 6.5 years, earns \$33,500 a year. Maddox, serving with the

County finishes budget sessions

A last ditch effort by Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane to save his special drug enforcement task force failed at Monday's county commission meeting.

McSwane asked the commissioners to reconsider their decision to not apply for a grant and continue matching county funding for the task force.

The county would have received \$77,166 in grant money and the county match would have been \$26,732.

Commissioners decided to stay with their initial decision not to fund the task force.

While McSwane may have lost his appeal, Jim Riggins, director of the Humane Society of Lincoln County, got the commissioners to change their minds and give \$6,250 in funding for his facility.

"We just wanted the Humane Society to have some assistance

from the county," Commissioner Wilton Howell said after the meeting.

The Humane Society is losing a major source of funding because its thrift shop is closing Saturday. The building being rented by the shop has been sold.

The final county budget was approved with projected county government expenditures of \$3.9 million and projected revenues of \$4.1 million, Howell said.

Other commission activities included:

- approval to give a letter of support to Dr. Arlene Brown, who is asking for state funding for a county-wide health needs assessment;

- and approval of a proclamation designating the week of May 14-20 as Emergency Medical Services Week.

The next meeting of the county commissioners will be at 9 a.m. Tuesday, June 6 at the County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

Convention, visitors bureau contract protested

Written protests have been filed charging two members of the Convention and Visitors Service (CVB) selection committee with conflicts of interest.

The two companies that did not get the CVB contract, Times West Communications, Inc. and Grindstone Graphic & Marketing Services, are charging Village of Ruidoso Councilor Robert Donaldson with a conflict of interest. One company also charges fellow committee member Bill Chance with conflicts of interest.

The companies seek to have the men's RFP evaluations declared invalid, then have a recount conducted.

Village of Ruidoso Attorney John Underwood has concluded that neither man has a financial conflict of interest, as defined in the State

Procurement Code. Underwood released a packet containing the protests and his decision Monday. The CVB will combine advertising budgets and resources for the Ruidoso Convention and Civic Events Center and the Visitors Center. The Visitors Center is currently located at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

After responding to a Request for Proposal (RFP), the chamber was notified April 25 that it had been selected to operate the CVB for the village.

The CVB proposals showed how each entity would utilize \$300,000 to advertise the Ruidoso area to visitors. Details of the contract between the village and the chamber will not be released to the public until a draft is completed, officials said.

The protest letter from Grindstone Graphics & Marketing Ser-

vices, signed by Mark and Laura Doth and Laura Price Reynolds, states that on Wednesday, April 26, they discovered Donaldson had a business relationship with Mike Reveley, president of Sun Country Mortgage Company.

"Mr. Donaldson confirmed in the recent council meeting that he is an independent contractor for Sun Country Mortgage Company - and therefore derives income from his association with the Reveleys," the letter states.

Anne Reveley was consulted by the Chamber regarding the establishment of a CVB because of her previous expertise with CVB operations in El Paso, Texas, said chamber director Joan Bailey.

Tracey D. Jeffers, president of Times West Communications, Inc., cited the same conflict of interest for Donaldson.

Donaldson, who works as a loan

officer out of the Sun Country Mortgage offices, responded to the charges in a letter to Village of Ruidoso Manager Gary Jackson.

"I do not work for or get paid by Mike Reveley or Sun Country Mortgage, in fact I pay half my commissions to Sun Country Mortgage for the right to work out of their office. This covers my overhead, accounting and any expertise that I need. I am an independent contractor," Donaldson's letter says.

Donaldson's letter also states that he had no prior knowledge that Anne Reveley was working as a consultant on the chamber proposal.

Michael Reveley sent a letter clarifying Donaldson's independent contractor position.

Underwood's determination noted that Donaldson declared any possible interest conflicts at the April 25 meeting and it was decided

that he could vote on the awarding of the CVB contract.

Another letter by Grindstone Graphics, dated May 1, asks that selection committee member Bill Chance's grading of the RFPs be withdrawn.

The letter alleges that because Chance is a member of the chamber and was nominated to that organization's board of directors, his participation in the CVB selection process should not have been allowed.

Before the contract was awarded, Chance knew he didn't get elected to the chamber board, Underwood noted, and there is no evidence Chance even sought to be on the board since the chamber nominating committee chooses candidates.

Grindstone Graphics and Times West Communications have the right to appeal Underwood's determination.

Ham-Fest hits town

Ham operators and dealers from across the southwest will meet this weekend at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center for the Third Annual Ham-Fest.

Sponsored by The Sierra Blanca Amateur Radio Club, the Ham-Fest features the latest in ham radio technology, said club president Dusty Rhodes.

"We will have 50 tables filled with ham radio equipment," Rhodes said. "We will also be giving amateur radio tests for people who want to get their ham radio licenses."

The Ham-Fest will feature a seminar on operations of new digital radio/computer systems and people are encouraged to bring their used equipment to trade for new equipment, Rhodes said.

The Third Annual Ham-Fest is from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Sunday at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center. Admission is \$6 for adults and free for children under 12.

New traffic light changes driver patterns, men observe

The new signal light on Mechem Drive has eliminated one hazardous traffic situation, but it seems to have created another in its place.

The week-old stoplight stays red for so long that people leaving Furr's grocery race through the Sierra Blanca Mall parking lot to avoid the vehicle backup on Mechem Drive, complained property owner Howard Varnadore to the Planning and Zoning Commission.

At the planning commission's Tuesday meeting, Varnadore requested the commission approve construction of a fence along the south side of the property at the southwest corner of the movie theater. He complained that the cars and trucks seeking a short cut worsen the pavement's condition and threaten the safety of pedestrians outside the mall.

The commission tabled the request until June 19, saying it was premature to consider a "drastic" change to the mall's traffic circulation.

The stoplight's timing will soon be changed from a regular time in-

terval to a "total loop activation," said Village Assistant Manager Alan Briley. The re-configuration will allow the light to continuously stay green if no traffic is waiting at the intersection, and should be completed this weekend.

The new four-way light, installed at the Mechem Drive/Cree Meadows Drive intersection by the state highway department, has created the third most intense intersection in town, Commissioner Scott Ingram observed.

Commission chairman Mike Radziewicz said P&Z views the 10-year-old mall as one development, even though there are different property owners. Changing the site plan would require documented agreements from all the property owners.

"It's the nature of the mall development to have circulation of traffic," commissioner Chay Rennick added. Installing a fence or even a speed bump would constrict that circulation.

Century 21/Aspen Real Estate broker James Paxton, who spoke in support of Varnadore's request,

said the misuse of the parking lot was a pre-existing problem, "but the traffic light has compounded the problem."

Cars leaving Furr's have always had a difficult time turning left onto Mechem, the businessmen said. But now cars queuing behind the stoplight occasionally block Mechem.

Motorists try to escape the lot by passing around Furr's, bouncing over the rutted pavement adjoining the northern side of the mall (where Beckers Mountain Laundry and Sierra Blanca Cinema are located) and then cutting over to the easement owned by Century 21.

"It's a private parking lot with private businesses treated as a thoroughfare," Paxton complained.

Varnadore said he had a verbal agreement to his idea from all the mall's business owners, and he would obtain documented agreements before coming back before the commission next month.

Commercial driveways

Also at the meeting, commissioners decided to require new

commercial developments and multifamily developments to install a six foot wide cemented landing area at driveway or lot entrances.

The landing area, which must have an 8% grade and a three-inch, trench-like dip through its center, is consistent with a draft ordinance for single and duplex developments.

Unlike the single and duplex developments, however, the more intense developments will have to maintain the driveway slopes at a 12% grade. (The slopes of single and duplex developments do not have a restriction beyond the land-

ing area). Additionally, developers of the commercial sites must provide a traffic survey of the proposed lots and driveways, and if commissioners feel it is warranted, a traffic impact analysis (TIA) will be required.

The ordinance change was sent back to the commission by the village council May 9 after Radziewicz and Briley told them they had not properly addressed code changes for the larger developments.

The entire, re-drafted ordinance will be reviewed again at a continued village council public hearing May 30.

RPD for 10 years plus less than one as its chief, is budgeted to earn \$46,500 in 1995/96.

The sheriff's 15-member office has a total proposed budget of \$1 million for fiscal 1995/96, McSwane said. His deputies' pay ranges from \$22,000 to \$26,000, he said.

The 21-officer RPD has proposed a \$2.85 million budget for fiscal

1995/96, including a new corporal and federally funded patrol officer. The step pay ranges between \$25,000 and \$33,409. The budget also include another 10 officers in dispatch (a new dispatcher is included in the budget) and an animal control officer.

The Ruidoso Police Department receives more calls for service than the sheriff's office.

Corrections

Two items in the May 15 issue of *The Ruidoso News* pertaining to the village budget were mistakenly reported.

Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs fund the Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant, and 64% of the treated septic sewage at the plant comes from those communities. The other 36% comes from other areas of Lincoln County, not Ruidoso Downs as reported.

A quote regarding the village cemetery that said, "We'll dig them up and bring them over to Carrizozo," was wrongly attributed to Councilor Robert Donaldson. Councilor J.D. James actually made the statement. Additionally, he said "Let's" instead of "We'll."

Alcohol, drugs injure unborn babies

This week has been declared "Alcohol and Other Drug-Related Birth Defects Awareness Week" by The Arc, a national organization on mental retardation. "Fetal alcohol syndrome (FAS) is the leading, 100% preventable cause of mental retardation," said Kathy Echols, drug prevention coordinator for Region Nine and chairperson for the state FAS Prevention Committee.

Alcohol use by mothers during pregnancy often leads to FAS, causing mental, physical and behavioral birth defects in their babies. Because many high school girls will soon be starting families, it is important for them to understand the risk involved in drinking while pregnant, Echols said. Drinking alcohol while pregnant can also lead to an infant's low birth weight, poor muscle tone, sleep disorders and other defects,

Echols said. "The more alcohol a woman drinks, the more risk she takes in delivering a baby with FAS," Echols said. "However, no one knows if there is a safe level, so the best advice is not to drink throughout pregnancy." FAS manifests itself after a child is born. It becomes most noticeable when the child enters school. Call 247-2368 for more information.





The Wind Runs Out of Breath

After so many days and nights of racing down the valley, the West Wind fell down from exhaustion about noon on the 14th like an exhausted distance runner.

You might say that the wind has run out of breath. This is not the strongest blast of wind I have seen here in the storm vale. But it is the longest stretch of continuous west wind, and it is unusual in coming in the month of May, usually the still and quiet time of birds building their nests and raising their young and of green grass and wildflowers everywhere.

We should remember, though, that this is the land of unusual weather.

Last year at this time we had the heaviest hail storm I ever saw, anywhere, and floods in the river.

Yet somehow the western spirits take care of us.

Children of Mother Earth Hanging In There

The wind blows away what little moisture is left in the ground, causing the trees on the hillsides and mountain meadows to ration their new growth.

The river trees, with their feet in the water, can laugh at the drought - unless the drought becomes severe.

But the wild apricot, wild peach, mountain ash and even the oak brush are rationing the moisture that remains stored at their roots.

The leaves are only half-size on some of the trees, and the new growth on the pinon and cedar is holding back.

The Sweet Bloom of the Sour Berry Bush

Right here in the mid-section of the Ruidoso Valley is where you might say the desert and the mountains meet.

Here you will see cactus, yucca, mescal, and a little mesquite growing side by side with pine and cedar.

One of these desert plants that grows here is algerita bush. The word comes from the Spanish "agritas," which means "little sour ones," from the little crimson berries which appear in late summer.

Right today you may be walking through the hillsides or mountain meadows, and you will suddenly inhale a fragrance like honey floating on the warm, dry air.

Then you will see a bush covered with small blossoms of bright sunlight yellow.

This is the algerita bush, desert cousin to

the English holly.

The crimson berries, slightly sour, make wonderful jelly. And the leaves lend a south-western touch to Christmas wreaths.

So the algerita bush sends its honey fragrance to you, on the driest days, cheering the mountain world as if saying, "Hang in there; better days ahead."

The Driest Year

The driest year here at Storm's Crossing was 1971. The river was dry above and below; and the stream just barely ran through the vale through the moss, from one small pond to the other, with small frogs sitting on the edges calling out "agua, a-a-gua, a-a-gua" (water, water, water.)

High on the hillsides the oak brush refused to leaf out - except in a few widely scattered places where the moisture of the previous winter brought a few bushes to leaf. They waited until the July rains before they leafed out.

A Light Shower

Just at 11:30; thunder boomed overhead and down came the large drops onto the thirsty land. Mother Earth sent up a prayer of thanks.

Clouds are still floating around the sky here in the early afternoon; and there is a breath of moisture in the air.

Let us rejoice and be glad and give thanks to God.





Nightmare on main street continues

The nightmare on main street continues — but hopefully, the nightmare is almost over.

Officials had hoped to finish up improvements in the downtown area before the busy summer season officially begins Memorial Day. But that won't happen.

A month of traffic headaches are imminent. They're expected to start Tuesday, when 1.5 blocks of the four-lane highway is shut down to two lanes while stamped concrete crosswalks are laid across the highway. This will happen in four sections, each for a week at a time. The sections run from Country Club Drive to Winner's Circle bar, and from Winner's Circle to Fern Street. Two lanes of each section will be shut down for a week at a time, creating four weeks total.

Why didn't this get started earlier? Village of Ruidoso Assistant Manager Alan Briley said he got a letter March 24 from the contractor, D&S Construction of Santa Teresa, to discuss overlay and crosswalk issues. It seems obvious D&S could have tried to resolve these issues much earlier, since the project has been at a halt since late last year.

Instead, the company waits until late March to make concrete proposals. Then the state and federal officials have to discuss the ideas and approve them.

Since the project began, D&S has asked for and received \$200,000 worth of change orders and cost overruns. Some may be due to problems with engineering plans, such as the planned overlay to cover up existing highway striping when the road doesn't really need an overlay. The overlay plans are being dropped in favor of simply erasing the stripes and creating new ones. But other problems seem to be due to poor planning on D&S's part, if the information we're getting from village officials is correct.

The only work that remains is the laying of the crosswalk, restroom construction, replacement of some broken lights on the sidewalk portion of a crosswalk, and replacement of about 10 trees that died. Luckily, only the crosswalks will delay vehicular traffic.

Another bright side is that, if D&S doesn't keep on schedule this year, the company will be fined \$750 per day because scheduled construction time has run out. The company has no time left to do the scheduled crosswalk work, but the other work lies outside the contract so the company can do that work without getting fined. Therefore, unless D&S can do the crosswalk work in the time allotted for the other work, the company will be fined for the crosswalk work.

D&S has been fined before for its delays — on another village project. The company was hired to do an airport runway overlay about the same time it was hired to do the main street improvements. The company has been fined about \$50,000 for airport delays, Briley said.

Let's just hope that D&S works out its longstanding problem of being without a minority subcontractor. The sub scheduled to do the crosswalk work applied for a minority license, but was denied, and now the denial is being appealed. This problem could cause yet another delay, although a local contractor may be able to step in if he's not busy already.

All we can say in conclusion is, were thankful we can almost see the light at the end of the tunnel and we're sure some lessons have been learned for the next highway project in this town.

Fort Stanton's closing forces Capitan schools into red

It seems as if Gov. Gary Johnson deliberately has initiated action and vetoed projects to hurt the Capitan school district, Superintendent Diane Sonnemaker Billingsley said last Thursday.

If Fort Stanton state hospital had not been closed by the governor in March, the Capitan School Board would be looking at \$115,000 extra in its budget this year, instead of a \$13,000 deficit.

Despite program cuts, more money per student from the state and other money-saving measures, the district may be in the red during the 1995-96 school year, the superintendent told board members Thursday.

Last year, the district was funded by the state on an enrollment of 552.5 full-time equivalent students (FTE, a weighted measurement depending on the

types of programs offered, grade level and other factors). That figure generated \$2,250,888.

This year, the superintendent anticipates 33.5 fewer students because of the fort's closing, creating a 519 FTE. That should produce \$2,237,547, or a \$13,341 decrease. The state is paying more per student than last year or the difference would be greater, she said.

To balance its budget, the district is seeking approval from the state to temporarily use money in its carry-over line item for recurring operational expenses, something usually not allowed. Billingsley said she hopes more students will show on the first day of school, allowing her to repay the carry-over fund.

However, even if a new use is found for the fort and students flooded into the district, it would occur after the 40th day count (in October) on which the state bases

its reimbursement, she said. A new lease at the fort is not expected to be in place until January 1.

The district would be in even worse shape if new students come after October, because it would have to serve the additional students but it would not be given any money from the state to meet that goal.

The hits from Johnson's budget cutbacks and decisions came on several fronts for the district, Billingsley said.

Transportation money also will be reduced, because the state no longer will pay for mandatory inspection of buses. And the transportation reimbursement will be based on a new enrollment formula, which hurts small rural districts that must travel many miles to pick up and deliver fewer students than in urban areas, said Frank Silva, district transportation contractor.

"While we're losing money, some

districts are gaining as much as 23%," Billingsley said. "The big schools benefit, because it's based on the number of kids transported, not on the number of miles, and we travel lots of miles."

The state also pulled 4.2% of the overall transportation budget for all districts and is holding it in Santa Fe until officials see how the year progresses. The district may get \$10,000 back later, or it may revert to the state's general fund, Silva said.

Letters exchanged

Billingsley didn't try to hide her bitterness about Johnson's budget decisions that have hit the district hard.

She wrote the governor in March, questioning why he had knocked out the \$24,700 second phase of a technology plan for the district, which had been approved by the state Legislature. The

original request was for \$100,000.

She pointed out that the district also was hurt by his decision to close Fort Stanton and cut 200 jobs in the community.

"What do you suggest we tell our students and our parents when they ask why we are not able to prepare our students for their future?" Billingsley asked the governor.

Johnson responded in an April 17 letter that the district received a \$100,000 computer grant in 1994, plus two additional \$10,000 technology allotments.

He indicated that state educational goals are to be met only if money allows, and said "It doesn't seem fair to provide more funds to selected school districts when all are in need."

Billingsley fired a letter back to the governor dated May 5, taking exception to Johnson's "fairness" statement.

"This is exactly what you did," she told Johnson. "And if you believed it was unfair, why did you approve funds for" and she listed seven Albuquerque schools that received a collective \$575,000 for computers, and three other large schools that were given \$350,000 for a total figure of \$925,000.

She also asked him why 90% of the money allocated for computers was given to school districts in the northern half of the state, 62% to schools in Albuquerque.

"Is the governor purposely ignoring students and their technology needs in the southern half of the state?" she asked.

Salaries and benefits account for 80% of the Capitan district's \$2,443,859 operational budget. To keep that cost from increasing no more than \$19,956, teachers and other staff agreed to take a step down on their pay scales.

County officials debate Fort Stanton request for proposals

The state may consider the rental rate for Fort Stanton one of its top considerations in selecting a new use for the former state hospital, but the county is more interested in long-term economic impacts.

Lincoln County Commissioners met last week with lobbyist and former state representative H. John Underwood, who is working with state officials to put together a Request for Proposals (RFP). The document is a formal solicitation that outlines criteria for the lease of the historic complex southeast of Capitan.

"I think the state is just looking to pay the bottom line, the monthly costs," Underwood said. The annual cost of running the sprawling 1,320-acre fort is more than \$1 million. The complex with about 80 buildings was closed as a state hospital in March.

Commissioner Wilton Howell said he'd like to see more emphasis placed on the average salary paid and number of jobs provided.

The danger of using an average salary as criteria is that five very high-paying jobs could outweigh 50 lower paying positions, Underwood said.

However, going by just the number of jobs also is not fool proof, said County Manager Carolin Cooney. One hundred minimum wage jobs would be given the same selection rating as 150 professional jobs under that approach, she pointed out.

Commissioner Stirling Spencer urged fellow commissioners not to

become too specific in their criteria wording.

"We can just put that we're seeking the highest level of employment and leave it up to them to show how they would provide that," he said.

Vivien LaMothe, director of Lamp Inc., said commissioners also should consider giving more weight to companies that provide services, which could attract other companies to the area. That could result in more substantial long-term economic returns, she said.

LaMothe heads a film company and has shown backing for a California-based production group interested in creating a film laboratory, distribution and production operation at the fort. She contends such a lab would draw film makers to the southern part of the state.

The state General Services Department (GSD) is putting together the RFP. It will take over responsibility for the fort from the Department of Health on July 1, the beginning of the 1995-96 fiscal year.

Kay Roybal, who is handling the RFP project for the GSD, listed seven selection items, a possible eighth and left room for five more from the county.

Selection items specified by the state are:

- terms of lease, including length
- rental rate
- plans for community involvement and level of employment of local residents
- plans for repair/modification/improvements of buildings to maintain the historic

integrity of the entire site

- fire protection and security of the site
- protection of the environment in and around the site
- and comprehensive plan for normal routine maintenance of buildings around the site.

Water use was inserted as a possible selection item.

Commissioners said the RFP should put the bidders on notice that they would be responsible for water and sewage at the fort. The lease should specify a maximum

amount of water that can be used.

Howell said he'd like to see more weight given to maintaining the historic integrity and improving the buildings.

Ann Buffington of the county Historical Society said she would like to see more weight given to applicants that intend to open part of the facility to the public for tours or other activities.

It would be too restrictive to require tours, Underwood said.

One of the main things that need to be added to the RFP is that the

company that leases the fort will be able to use what's left of the 1995-96 maintenance budget of \$500,000 and about \$750,000 for renovation and remodeling of buildings with the state's concurrence, he said.

"I think that will really help attract some bidders," Underwood said.

Chairman Monroy Montes said an applicant willing to operate the volunteer fire department that already is equipped also should be graded favorably.

Companies should receive higher

scores if they can demonstrate proven track records in business and submit business plans, Montes said. Proposals that use all parts of the fort, including the pastures and farm area, also should receive higher scores, he said.

"If we add too many criteria, it will dilute all of them down," Schwettmann said.

Although the majority of the commissioners said they also would be willing to consider a lease with an option to buy the fort, Commissioner L. Ray Nunley disagreed.

"I don't want to see a historic site in private hands," he said. "Besides, I can't see the legislature approving a sale."

Although commissioners want a majority of the votes on the selection committee, the state will not grant that request, Underwood said. He should know how many seats the state is willing to give by the commission's meeting June 6, he said.

Cooney said an even more difficult aspect may be deciding who should serve on the selection committee from the county.

"We've come a long way in any event," Montes said. "At one time, we weren't even a player. Now we are strongly suggesting what course to follow."

Commissioners kept Underwood on the job for another month at a reduced amount of \$2,000. To pay the full \$3,000 per month would have required going out for bid on professional services.

Underwood said at the outside, a lease should be in place by Jan. 1.







Experience Española, heart of northern New Mexico culture

It's not easy being that town up the road from Santa Fe, but for New Mexicans in search of mostly untainted northern New Mexico culture, Española will surprise you.

"There's so much to see up here, it will boggle your mind," says one 20-year resident. "When people come visit, part of me wants to tell them about everything and part of me wants to keep it to myself."

Consider:

- You can see Santa Fe's attractions from Española — at a fraction of the cost.

- Española is the hub of the eight northern pueblos.

- This area is the heart and soul of northern New Mexico Hispanic folk art — santo carving and painting, weaving and furniture making.

- Located along the Rio Grande, surrounded by the Sangre de Cristo Mountains, the Jemez Mountains and the Pajarito Plateau, Española offers a wealth of outdoor possibilities.

And here's something you won't read in the tourist literature: The area has a spiritual quality that defies description. It's no accident that in and around Española are Santa Cruz Church, the mother church of northern New Mexico; Sikh Dharma New Mexico, an ashram community founded there in 1971; Ghost Ranch, since 1955 the national adult study center of the United Presbyterian Church; Christ-in-the-Desert Monastery, built in 1964 by Benedictine monks; Dar al-Islam Mosque, built in 1980 for Islam education.

"God is everywhere, but this is his postal address," Yogi Bhaajan, leader of American Sikhs, has said. He even wrote a poem: "Land of Enchantment glistens with God's light. Within this sanctuary, I have built my dome."

Great-Great is Española/ God's real home."

Much of what we know as the history of New Mexico started here. In fact Stewart Udall has said, "Here in the valley of Española is the most interesting history of all."

Spanish colonizer Don Juan de Oñate, his soldiers and his wagon train of settlers arrived here in 1598 and celebrated their new colony with a bullfight, jousts and a religious play.

Pueblo people had lived in the valley for hundreds of years and had well established villages, an ancient cultural tradition and disciplined agricultural practices, working large fields in common and setting aside food for widows, orphans and disabled people. They anticipated lean years by storing enough surplus to see them through.

Oñate decided the Tewa pueblo called Yunge, at the confluence of the Rio Grande and the Rio Chama, would be Spain's first capitol in these parts and renamed it San Gabriel. The displaced villagers moved across the Rio Grande to the village of O'ke, which Oñate renamed San Juan. And in a scene that would repeat itself a few years later on the east coast, the colonists relied on their Indian neighbors for food. In this case, the extended hospitality wasn't voluntary.

The Spaniards lost no time planting their own fields and for a century the Española Valley was the bread basket of New Mexico. To the Indian staples of corn, beans and squash the Spaniards added chile, tobacco, tomatoes, cabbage, onions, lettuce, radishes, cantaloupes and watermelons. Later they would plant grapevines and fruit trees.

The newcomers also tried to impose their religion on the unwilling Pueblo people. As this area was the capitol of the Spanish colonists in

New Mexico, so it became, in 1680, the capitol of Indian resistance. Pope, the leader of the Pueblo Revolt, which drove colonists from New Mexico for 12 years, was from San Juan, and another leader, Domingo Naranjo, was from Santa Clara.

Following his reconquest in 1692, Don Diego de Vargas directed colonists from Zacatecas to a river valley, 30 miles north of Santa Fe. The new settlement was Santa Cruz.

In 1733 the people began building their church, Santa Cruz de la Cañada, and finished it 15 years later. Built as a fortress against Apache attacks, the windowless church was a spiritual and physical sanctuary with a high wall around the churchyard. (In 1918 it gained windows and exterior plaster.)

Fray Andres Garcia, the church's first priest, was the first santero known to have practiced his art here, creating the balustrade, at least three santos and the altar screen. In the next century, Rafael Aragon, one of the most gifted santeros who ever lived in New Mexico, painted

two screens in the church. The silver trim on the cross indicates the parish's wealth in its day.

Despite severe weather at that time and attacks by Comanches, Utes and Apaches, the colony flourished, eventually becoming New Mexico's second biggest town. By 1776 Santa Fe had 2,000 people, Santa Cruz residents numbered 1,389 and outlying villages had sprouted in Chimayo, Cordova, Las Trampas, and Truchas.

Just as citizens today resent Washington D.C., so the spirited people of the Española Valley resented the powers in Santa Fe. When they got word in 1837 that the Mexican government, through its Santa Fe arm, planned to levy taxes on them (they had until then served in militias in lieu of paying taxes), they revolted and drove off troops sent to contain

the outbreak.

In 1852, after New Mexico had become a territory, Rio Arriba County was one of the first counties organized — as a narrow strip from Santa Cruz to the Arizona border. The boundary has changed several times since then.

Santa Cruz began to wane under the American government and when the railroad bypassed it, it shrank and Española got its start.

The Denver & Rio Grande Western Railway Co. in 1878 began building south from Antonito and in 1880 opened its narrow-gauge line as far as Española and later acquired track to Santa Fe. This operation, from Denver through Alamosa to Santa Fe, came to be called the Chili Line, for the diet of its passengers.

In 1938, the Española train station was aglow with movie stars as a scene from "The Texas Ranger," starring Jack Oakie, Fred McMurray and

Jean Parker was filmed here. But the glory days of the Chili Line would soon be over as passengers and shippers relied more on cars and trucks. The Chili Line made its last run

August 30, 1941. A remnant of

the D&RG's narrow-gauge network survives in Chama as the Cumbres & Toltec Scenic Railroad.


In recent years, Española has taken some ambitious steps to enshrine its culture at the same time it reaches out to visitors. The city has embarked on a \$25 million project to create a plaza. It will eventually have a convento and mission museum, a Native American Center and a Commemorative Spanish Colonization Center.

"We've always been in the shadow of some other New Mexico city," says former Mayor Richard Lucero. "But we have the oldest missions in the U.S. We still have the matachines and Penitente rituals. We have to make sure that what happened in the last 400 years doesn't get lost."

Española Area Attractions

• **Santa Cruz Church**, one mile east on N.M. 76, is one of the oldest churches in the U. S. — nearly 100 years older than the better known Santuario de Chimayo. Restored in 1979, the church houses some of the Southwest's finest examples of Spanish-Colonial religious art. Ask to see the church at the rectory when services aren't underway.

• **The Bond House Museum**, in the home of an early merchant, combines adobe with Victorian architecture.

• **San Juan Pueblo**, five miles north, maintains its traditions in a tree-shaded village on the Rio Grande. During San Juan Feast Day on June 24, which is open to visitors, the plaza fills with up to 100 dancers. For good pueblo food try the Tewa Indian Restaurant, open 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. weekdays.

• **Don Juan de Oñate Monument Center**, 6 miles north on N.M. 68, features historic and cultural exhibits.

• **Velarde**, 12 miles north on N.M. 68, is the heart of apple country. The Española Valley produces more than a quarter of the state's apple crop. Horticulturists say the apples' quality is excellent; the area's warm days and cool nights make for a sweeter firmer apple. You can buy them at the Española Farmer's Market and Velarde's roadside stands. For apples, wines, crafts and other produce, come

to the Northern Rio Grande Apple Fiesta, Sept. 23-24.

• **Medanales**, 9 miles north on U.S. 84, is famous for its weavers and wood carvers.

• **Poshouinge** is a Tewa ancestral site about 19 miles north on U.S. 84. A half-mile Forest Service trail takes you up a mesa where you have a view of the pueblo's room-blocks and adjacent fields. This is also a fine view of

the Chama River Valley.

• **Ghost Ranch**, a Presbyterian conference center 33 miles north on U.S. 84, has trails and three museums open to the public.

• **Ojo Caliente Mineral Baths**, 21 miles north on U.S. 285, is a tonic to

the stressed-out. Billy the Kid thought so. Aunt Clara thinks it's gotten too slick and liked it better back when baths cost \$3 and the plaster fell off the ceiling.

• **Santa Clara**, 2 miles south on N.M. 30, is known for its pottery and for the artwork of Pablita Velarde. Santa Clara Canyon is striking for bright green foliage against red canyon walls. It has developed camp-

forms a green pool and you can swim. Because of its proximity to Santa Fe, it's best to visit during the off-season.

Area Distractions:

• **Abiquiu**, a 240-year-old village north of Española, is best known as the home of Georgia O'Keeffe. As a result, village residents have been pestered for years by O'Keeffe groupies and rubbernecks. A worn sign at the village entrance pleads for visitors to respect privacy and not take photos. A further outrage a few years ago was the vandalism of the village morada. Not surprisingly, people here don't relish visitors. Give them a break and drive on by.

• **Hernandez**, six miles north on U.S. 84, is indeed the site of Ansel Adams's famous photograph, but you'll find the place much less quaint and romantic than it was when "Moonrise" was taken.

• **Chimayo**, with its legendary Santuario, weavers and excellent restaurant (Rancho de Chimayo), is a picturesque place deserving of its attention. But to avoid the mobs, visit during the off-season — early spring or late fall.

ing sites, picnic tables and fishing lakes. All require a permit, available at the entrance.

• **Nambe Falls**, 8 miles south and east on U.S. 84-285 and N.M. 4, is actually three waterfalls in a narrow canyon; the tallest is 100 feet. Each

Española: Visitor Tips

Dining: Jo Ann's Ranch O Casados, on the main drag, has gotten plenty of kudos, all deserved, for its northern New Mexican cookery and home-grown chiles and corn tortillas. El Paragua has long been regarded as one of the town's best restaurants, but Aunt Clara thinks they're "resting on their laurels." Anthony's at the Delta offers traditional restaurant fare (steak and fish) in a lovely setting. P'o Suwae Geh at Pojoaque Pueblo's Poeh Center between Española and Santa Fe serves excellent Indian food (I recommend the Feast Day Combo and the Posueage Taco.) Year in and year out, Matilda's serves good, basic fare. Angelina's food isn't on par with these others, but Aunt Clara got a kick out of the decor.

Lodging: Española has four b&bs — Inn of La Mesilla (753-5368), Puerta del Sol (753-6484), and Casa del Rio (753-2035). Aunt Clara particularly liked breakfast at the Casa del Rio and the resident dog, cleverly called "Dog." Something new is

Rancho de San Juan, a country inn and restaurant on 225 acres north of San Juan Pueblo (753-6818). And there is a wide variety of motels. Top-of-the-line is Inn at the Delta with kiva fireplaces and Jacuzzis (1-800-995-8599).

Shopping: Check out the Chimayo Trading Post, the last real trading post in the area — authentic, old timey atmosphere with the expected selection of pottery, rugs, jewelry, santos, retablos, books and Chimayo weavings. The businesses and fruit stands at Velarde offer a fine selection of local produce, fruit, wreaths and ristras. (Loretta Valdez's wreaths and dried arrangements can be found in some pricey, out-of-state department stores.) The O'ke Oweenge Crafts Cooperative at San Juan Pueblo features traditional work at reasonable prices, but the inventory is up and down. For Santa Clara and San Ildefonso pottery, go to the pueblos, south of Española, and visit shops scattered throughout the pueblos.

Wineries: Try Black Mesa Winery in Velarde and La Chiripada in Dixon.

Fishing: San Juan, Santa Clara and Nambe pueblos all have fishing lakes, by permit from the pueblo.

Bargains: Priced out of Indian Market? Go to the Eight Northern Indian Pueblos arts and crafts show at Santa Clara Pueblo on July 15-16. It features many of the same artisans, at better prices. The pueblo is 10 miles south of Española on N.M. 30 and 4 miles west on N.M. 502. Also watch for the Española Farmer's Market. Most people don't realize the valley is filled with small farms whose produce is good.

Dates: San Juan Feast Day, June 24; Northern Rio Grande Apple Fiesta, Sept. 23-24; Española Valley Arts Festival, Oct. 8-9. For more information: Ask the Española Chamber of Commerce (753-2831) for the brochure "Española Valley." Other handy numbers: San Juan Pueblo, 852-4400; Santa Clara Pueblo, 753-7326.







Lasso the Wild West!

Walk in the worn wagon-wheel ruts of the Old Santa Fe Trail. Tour former haunts of Billy the Kid, Doc Holliday, and Jesse James. Capture a piece of nostalgia with a drive along historic Route 66. Experience the dramatic outdoor playgrounds of the southern Rockies and the Great Plains. And explore ghost towns where rattlers outnumber residents.

Las Vegas

In a town where Pat Garrett saved Billy the Kid from a lynch-mob, Doc Holliday ran a wild gambling parlor, and a windmill was used for vigilante justice, it should come as no surprise that Las Vegas was one of the toughest areas on the frontier. And with some 900 buildings on the National Register of Historic Places, much of its Wild West history still remains for you to explore.

EXTRAS: A short drive to the northeast will take you to the adobe remnants of battle-worn Fort Union—originally built to protect the settlers and travelers of the Old Santa Fe Trail.

Angel Fire

At 8,500 feet, the mountain resort of Angel Fire hugs the lush Sangre de Cristo Mountains. While known best as a skier's paradise, Angel Fire offers an unbeatable year-round escape for the whole family. You can tee off on its PGA-rated, championship level golf course, pan for gold in the pine and aspen-filled Moreno Valley, or horseback ride in the surrounding foothills.

EXTRAS: Just miles north, Eagle Nest Lake presents the perfect oasis for boating and fishing. Drive a couple miles further and you'll find yourself in Elizabethtown, a ghost town of the 1870s gold boom.

Cimarron

With the Old Santa Fe Trail skirting the edge of town, Cimarron was a magnet for outlaws and still boasts perhaps its most intriguing landmark: the St. James Hotel. Riddled with bullet holes, the old hotel put up for the night the likes of Wyatt Earp, Jesse James, Davy Crockett, Buffalo Bill, and Annie Oakley.

EXTRAS: The Palisades Sill, a striking natural rock formation sculpted by the Cimarron River 40 million years ago, is just west of town at Cimarron Canyon State Park.

Springer

Just off the Old Santa Fe Trail, Springer is home to the Santa Fe Trail Museum, which is located at the historic Old County Court House. The museum commemorates the thousands of pioneers who traversed the Santa Fe Trail.

EXTRAS: A short drive to the northeast will take you to the front steps of Dorsey Mansion, an incredible 36-room Victorian log and masonry home built in 1880. Nearby, many birds of prey—eagles, hawks, and falcons—make their home at the 3,600-acre Maxwell National Wildlife Refuge.

Raton

Set among meadows and mesas just south of the Colorado border and historic Raton Pass, Raton was the first stop in New Mexico on the Mountain branch of the Old Santa Fe Trail. Be sure to tour the Downtown Historic District of the old mining and railroad town where much of the original Victorian architecture from the late 1800s still stands.

EXTRAS: A scenic drive to the east takes you to a must-see: Capulin Volcano National Monument, one of the few places in the world where you can walk into a volcano.

Clayton

Clayton's Rabbit Ear Mountains were the first visible western mountains for weary travelers on the Old Santa Fe Trail. Clayton Lake and the surrounding area are home to hundreds of sets of dinosaur tracks including an unusual set of handprints from the flying Pterodactyl.

EXTRAS: along the Santa Fe Trail through the sweeping plains of the nearby Kiowa National Grasslands, you can follow the deep ruts left by covered wagons more than 150 years ago.

Tucumcari

As the "Gateway to New Mexico," Tucumcari sits astride the heart of historic Route 66, America's Highway. But well before the time of the automobile, its surrounding mesas were used not as highways, but as hideouts for notorious outlaws including one of the last old-fashioned train robbers, Black Jack Ketchum.

EXTRAS: Just northeast of the city, vast Conchas Lake stretches 25 miles in length and offers a bevy of water sports including boating, fishing, and swimming.

Santa Rosa

Santa Rosa lives up to its nickname "The City of Natural Lakes." Be sure to visit its most famous: Blue Hole, an 81-foot deep, bell-shaped artesian spring that is a mecca for scuba divers and photographers.

EXTRAS: Puerto de Luna, one of several abandoned Spanish settlements in the area, is a pleasant drive south.

Get down and dirty in Carlsbad cave crawls

Crouched in the elbow of a small cave, we're talking about ghosts and hodags. The darkness is total — not one photon of light moving about.

Veteran cavers and even geologists tell of seeing lights or hearing voices when they knew they were alone in a cave. One party threw ropes down a crevice and pulled them back with inexplicable knots. The mischief of hodags.

Hodags, says National Park Service ranger Danny Cantu, are cave dwelling creatures with one eye and four legs. They're the movement you detect at the fringe of your vision; turn to look and find nothing. Hodags, Cantu says, feed on fear and adrenalin, so you shouldn't show fear in a cave.

We all laugh, turn our miners' lamps back on and continue with the tour. During the second tour, on my stomach in the mud, I wasn't laughing.

Wild cave tours, led by rangers, are new at Carlsbad Caverns within the last two years and, the Park Service hopes, offer a new experience to a different set of visitors. Outdoor types who have snickered at Carlsbad's elevator, paved trail and underground lunchroom now have some adventures they can relish. This is also one for families with teenagers who think family outings are boring.

Our first tour was to Lower Cave, which lies below the developed portion of the caverns. At the

assigned meeting spot, the first four people to show up were cavers from Georgia. Small, young and wiry, they made me wonder if I'd bitten off more than I could chew. A real caver, I'm told, can fit through a space the size of a coat hanger. The Georgia Cavers looked like they could do that with room to spare. Then people like me joined the group, look-

ing tentative and wider than a coat hanger. I relaxed.

As Cantu and ranger Sam Franco handed out miners' hats and kneepads we got the requisite lecture about the delicacy of cave

formations: No touching, no meandering off the trail, no picking up souvenirs. They talked a lot about the cave bug. No, this isn't the hodag. The cave bug's venom turns you into an enthusiastic caver.

"These things can be addicting," Cantu said. "When you get into that first hall, that first segment, that first chamber, you get bitten by the bug."

Getting to Lower Cave meant descending 50 feet into the darkness on a ladder. If this seems difficult, consider that back in the 1920s the first visitors dropped into the caves in a guano mining bucket powered by a none-too-reliable engine; brakes consisted of a plank jammed against the flywheel.

After the ladder it was a fairly easy walk on marked trails to see "cave pearls,"

formed like their ocean counterpart around a grain of sand or limestone, cave popcorn (where dripping, mineralized water hits the floor and sprays) and formations like the Texas Toothpick. At

one point we had the option of crawling through a short passage or walking around.

For years writers have come to the caverns and exhausted their bank of superlatives and no wonder! Imagine a vast coral reef in an ancient sea here that, over the millenia, turned to limestone. Geologic movement pushed it up. An infinite number of raindrops has since worn, smoothed and shaped the porous limestone, picking up minerals along its path and redepositing them at whim. The resulting needles, pillars, curtains and towers have been the stuff of postcards and shutterbugs for 75 years.

This was a pretty short, easy tour. At the end the Georgia Cavers said, "Is that it?" I felt the same way; after the ladder descent it was a little wimpy. However, this is a great tour if you want to try caving but aren't sure you'll like it.

Other easier tours are Left Hand Tunnel, a half-mile walk in an undeveloped portion of the cavern, and Slaughter Canyon Cave (formerly New Cave), an undeveloped back country cave 23 miles from the caverns.

For the hardy adventurer, the park offers Spider Cave and Hall of the White Giant, which require crawling, squeezing and occasional fancy footwork.

At Spider Cave I was wishing for a wimpier tour.

Carlsbad Area Attractions

• White's City (20 miles south of Carlsbad and just outside the caverns' entrance): This place is full of wicked indulgences. Our favorites: Mrs. White's homemade ice cream and the store's big chocolate turtles.

For collectors, Whites City's Million Dollar Museum has it all — a first-rate collection of dolls and dollhouses, guns, swords, a room full of mounted longhorns, household and farm implements, clothing, buttons, wagons, music boxes, clocks and china. There is also a one-horse open sleigh, some hilarious old arcade machines and a "tummy exerciser."

• Carlsbad: The Living Desert State Park, with its exhibits of desert plants and critters and

paved walkways, is a pleasant outing with a great view of the Pecos River Valley. Take an evening or morning stroll on the city's 4.5-mile Riverwalk along both sides of the Pecos; this riverfront park must be the envy of every town in the state. The Eddy County Courthouse, designed by John Gaw Meem, features area brands around the doors.

• Guadalupe Mountains National Park (35 miles south of Carlsbad Caverns on US 62-180): This 76,293-acre park is a taste of the Chihuahuan desert with diverse flora, deep canyons and rugged mountains, which you can see from 80 miles of trails. McKittrick Canyon is a favorite for fall hikes; two miles takes you

to the picturesque limestone house of a former resident. At The Pinery is the ruin of a stagecoach station on the old Butterfield Mail Route. For more information, call 915-828-3251 or see the hiking guide "Trails of the Guadalupe."

• Fishing: The Pecos River, with its holes, brushpiles and undercut banks, is a good place for catfish; you can also find white and black bass, crappie and walleye. Also try Brantley Reservoir, 15 miles north of Carlsbad (also good for boating and camping), Carlsbad Municipal Lake and Bataan Lake in the city, and Six-Mile Dam Lake, six miles south.

• Dining: "The best restaurant in Carlsbad is up the road in Artesia," claims Aunt Clara, laughing loud-

ly at her own joke. True, La Fonda (a block off NM 285 on Artesia's main drag) for years has been one of New Mexico's best restaurants. But in Carlsbad you can also try Lucy's (after Lucy's Gold Margarita, you'll smile all the way home), The Flume Room, Ricardo y la Family and Heavenly Yogurt.

• Hidden Gems: Let it not be said that Carlsbad is unhip; at Lasting Impressions you can get body piercing, tattoos and Harley clothes.

For more information: Call the Carlsbad Chamber of Commerce (800-221-1224) and ask for "Discover Carlsbad." Carlsbad Caverns, 785-2107 (taped information) or 785-2232.

This is a maze cave two miles from the caverns proper that requires a half-mile hike to the entrance. Then you slither, creep and scabble on your belly for 50 feet through a tight crawlway before coming to a chamber where you can stand up. This is where I was introduced to a part of myself I wasn't happy to meet.

Cave literature warns visitors to Spider Cave, "This trip is not for people afraid of tight spaces." No problem, I thought. I've been in caves, tunnels, mines and lava tubes without a twitch.

This was a little different. During the crawl in, the people in the lead kept stopping. As we came to one particularly tight spot, the woman ahead of me, who was a bit stout, said gamely, "Think thin." Then she dived into the hole and stopped short, her caboose filling the void, just as my husband and park ranger

Rosie Peragine reached my position.

Suddenly, I couldn't move forward or backward and my little space quickly filled with me and a growing panic — and some well-fed hodags. So this was claustrophobia!

Fortunately, it passed in a few minutes and probably had a lot to do with Peragine's and my husband's calm. Their voices somehow distracted me long enough to get a grip. Then I found that as long as I kept moving, the tight squeezes didn't bother me, so for the rest of the tour, I stayed at the end of the line and made sure the small passages were clear of people so I could crawl through quickly.

Peragine and ranger Rijk Morawe say it's not uncommon for people on cave crawls to learn they have a touch of claustrophobia. "Usually we can talk them through it," Morawe says, although now and then someone

Things to do on NM 285

The stretch between Vaughn (some would say Clines Corners) and Roswell has been called the dullest road in New Mexico (and possibly the longest between pit stops). To help you entertain yourself (or your kids), here are some ideas:

1. Watch for hawks and kestrels, the nation's smallest falcons. They hunt from electric poles and lines. You may also see burrowing owls perched on fences.
2. Watch for antelope. They often graze alongside sheep — they must speak the same language.
3. The state's cleanest rest stop (with new-fangled, composting toilets) is at Mesa.

makes a hasty exit.

For all that, I still enjoyed this tour. From the long crawlway we emerged into a room dubbed Blood River, for the wet, red stains on the walls, Morawe told us we were standing underneath the arroyo we crossed at the cave entrance. After that we threaded our way through narrow passages to see the Gnome, a stalactite that looked like a giant Georgia O'Keeffe skull, followed by the Mace Room, with its floor-to-ceiling assemblage of delicate pearly straws, knobs and spirals.

It probably took more than a century to form a half inch of these straws, during dry times, Morawe said. They may have formed a little more quickly during wetter times.

In case we thought that stalagmites and stalactites were the sum of cave formations, in the Medusa Room Morawe introduced us to heligmites and helictites, coral-like anthrodites and a few other -ites in lacy curtains and fanciful spirals. Morawe also demonstrated candle power; in total darkness, one candle throws a surprising amount of light.

All good things must end. I'd been psyching myself up for the crawl out but my big test didn't happen. Without realizing I was in the

final passage I slithered through without fanfare and suddenly punched through into daylight.

Driving back to Albuquerque that night, as fatigue and darkness played tricks on my vision, I imagined I was driving through a cave.

Visitor Information: The basic cave entry fee, good for three days, is \$5 for adults, \$3 for children 6 to 16, and \$2.50 for Golden Age Passholders. Wear a jacket or sweater and comfortable shoes. (The latter seems like obvious advice, but believe it or not, we saw women in spike heels.) To avoid the crowds, visit from September through April.

Wild Cave Tours: Maximum of 8 to 20 participants, depending on cave. Children under 6 not allowed; for Hall of the White Giant and Spider Cave, no children under 12. Children must be accompanied by adult. Fees in addition to the entry fee range from \$4 to \$12 per person. NPS provides miners' helmets and kneepads; each participant provides 4 AA batteries and gloves. These tours fill up quickly so reservations are a good idea; for Slaughter Canyon Cave, reservations are required. Call 505-785-2232, ext. 429.

Puye: rooms with a view

If you've been to Bandelier and Mesa Verde national monuments and think you've seen cliff dwellings, here's something new. Puye Cliff Dwellings at Santa Clara Pueblo offer rooms with a view. Knock-your-eyes-out views. By the time you've hiked up a short trail to Top House Ruin you can turn around and see the Sangre de Cristos, the Jemez Mountains and Pajarito Plateau. And Aunt Clara pronounced the cliff dwellings "better than Bandelier."

Puye, built around 1250 A.D., was one of the largest prehistoric villages in New Mexico, with up to 1,500 people by its peak in the 1400s. The soft, volcanic tuff of the cliffs here is honeycombed with small caves and storage spaces, scraped out by the Santa Clara ancestors and fronted by walled homes. After Puye was abandoned in 1577 because of drought,

the walls collapsed, but some restored buildings give you an idea of what it was like.

You're free to wander along the cliff face and enter the cave rooms. Watch the rock above the caves for petroglyphs. In many places, foot-steps of the trail are etched deep into the rock, so you know you're following the footsteps — exactly — of the original residents. For a bit of excitement, you can reach the higher tiers on long, pueblo-style ladders. This was fun except for Aunt Clara's crabbing that I was too slow. (Don't want to climb? There's a road to the top.)

On top is the appropriately named Top House Ruin, a big archeological site with a warren of small rooms around a plaza. Fees: \$5 per person, \$4 for seniors and children; \$15 extra for video or movie cameras (still cameras free).

Raton is a jumping-off place to history, nature

A town named for a small, ferocious rodent might not seem like much of a vacation spot at first. But you're far more likely to encounter elk, antelope, wild turkey, mule deer and even bald eagles than you are to meet up with the town's namesake.

Perched on the New Mexico-Colorado border right below Raton Pass, Raton is a great jumping-off point for exploring nature, playing outdoors and getting your hands on western history.

From ancient times, when prehistoric people crossed the 7,622-foot pass to hunt bison; to the 18th century, when Spaniards traded here with Apaches and Comanches; to the entrance of Gen. Stephen Watts Kearny's Army of the West in 1846 in the peaceful takeover of New Mexico; to the march of Union soldiers who crossed the pass to defeat the Confederacy at the Battle of Glorieta, Raton's location has proven strategic.

Formerly known as Willow Springs, it served as a forage stop for the U.S. Army from Civil War days and as a watering place for traders, mountain men and homesteaders who paid 25 cents a bucket.

But it was a vital link on the Mountain Branch of the Santa Fe Trail that so many travelers, after passing through Uncle Dick Wooten's toll gate on Raton Pass, came to know this place of caprock and mesas. Even now, it is


possible to walk along Fifth Street, a boulevard of imposing Victorian houses, and imagine the creak of the covered wagons as they made their way along this very road.

Signs of the trail are still visible here, in the adobe ruin of the Clifton House, a Barlow & Sanderson Stage stop five miles to the south of town; and in the wagon wheel ruts on the property of the National Rifle Association's Whittington Center.

The city of Raton actually got its start when the first Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railroad engine chugged across Raton Pass in December, 1878. A tent and boxcar city sprang up alongside the tracks, followed by the construction of hotels, saloons and shops to serve railroaders and travelers. These late 19th century structures, their gargoyles and pressed-tin ceilings lovingly preserved, now make up Raton's **Downtown Historic District**.

Raton's self-esteem, like that of most western towns of any substance, demanded the construction of a grand opera house. Opened in 1915, the gilt-edged rococo-style Shuler Theater on Second Street has shown legitimate theater, opera, vaudeville and movies on its stage. George M. Cohan, Paul Robeson and John Phillip Sousa performed there. The lobby is decorated with WPA murals by Ratonian Manville Chapman in scenes from local history. More WPA murals are on view at the post office, too.

This is one community that still

retains the flavor of an authentic western small town, and it runs pretty much as it always has, on mining, ranching and railroading.

People here are proud of their city's Christmas decorations, especially their drive-through, larger-than-life-size City of Bethlehem "Christmas Park," their Memorial Day flag display on the courthouse lawn and their Fourth of July fireworks display.

It's a place where, when you meet someone over coffee at Johnny's Bakery (where you can order your cinnamon roll baked or fried) and the person shaking your hand says, "Glad to know you," he really means it. As retired Latin teacher Thelma Nord says, "You never need to be bored in Raton." And she ought to know. She's lived here more than 50 years.

Raton Area Attractions

- The Downtown Historic District, on First Street, includes antique shops, galleries, the Raton Museum and the railroad depot, in Spanish Mission Revival style. It makes for a delightful afternoon of browsing. Ask the Chamber of Commerce for a brochure guide to the walking tour.

- The Shuler Theater, once an opera house, still entertains. Today, at the ornate 480-seat theater, it's possible to catch an enormous variety of entertainment, from the superb classical concerts of the Music at Angel Fire series to Chinese acrobatics, steel drums and ballet.
- The Santa Fe Trail is visible on the north end of town at the foot of Moulton Avenue and along U.S. 64 to Cimarron.

- The National Rifle Association's Whittington Center, 10 miles south on U.S. 64, is a 33,000 acre facility with rifle, shotgun and pistol ranges.

- Sugarite Canyon State Park, 8 miles northeast on N.M. 72 and 526, offers stunning wildflower displays from late May until July. At Sugarite you can camp and hike around Lake Maloya, likely to attract a small but dedicated bunch of fisherman most days, or go a little higher and hike the lovely Ponderosa Ridge Trail. Sugarite, a former coal camp where more than a thousand people lived, now has a small coal mining museum and camp ruins to explore. Your chances of viewing deer here at dawn and dusk are excellent and it's difficult

to ignore the wild turkey.

- Johnson Mesa, along N.M. 72, is another place where wildflowers carpet the rich grasslands in spring. In 1893, after the coal miners at Yankee went on strike in sympathy with the striking railroaders and the Blossburg mine was closed, the miners walked up to Johnson Mesa and homesteaded through the bitter winters. Today, the old stone church that was the center of mesa life is always open; across the way is the cemetery holding the graves of so many young children. All across the mesa are ruins of homesteaders' cabins, and today, this place is inhabited mainly by antelope, coyote and rabbit. At the end of the mesa is Folsom, where a cowboy discovered Folsom Man.


- The York Canyon Mine road, on the south end of town, is at dusk the best place to view a herd of magnificent, stately elk.

- Maxwell Lakes National Wildlife Refuge, 26 miles south on I-25, offers fishing, biking and picnicking. Be sure to bring the binoculars because this is eagle habitat.

- Capulin Mountain National Monument, 28 miles east on U.S. 64-87, was active 10,000 years ago — a moment in geologic time. It's a rare symmetrical volcano.

- Lodging: Raton has one b&b, The Red Violet Inn (1-800-624-9778) and a wide variety of motels. For more information, call the Raton Chamber of Commerce at 1-800-638-6161.


NORTHWESTERN NEW MEXICO

Tent Rocks beckon hikers

Near Tent Rocks, about 7 million years ago, a nearby volcano erupted through an aquifer.

This is how University of New Mexico volcanologist Gary Smith describes the result: "The reaction was quite dramatic — lava, sediment and water vomited out to the surface. This was really soft soupy stuff... a drooly, gurgly layer." When students laugh, he says, "Geology is a colorful science."

And this is a colorful place.

The creamy walls of the canyon are pyroclastic surge deposits, Smith tells his students — dunes propelled along the ground by violent eruptions. Explosion after explosion coated the area with different types of layers. The gurgly stuff — pumice and tuff — eroded into unearthly spires, turrets and pedestals in colors from white to pale salmon.

Volcanology is more than learning the physical processes of eruption, explains Scott Baldrige, a Los Alamos Laboratory geologist. The lavas hold information about the deep earth. "You can't drill as deeply as these lavas are generated. They come from miles and miles down."

You can see it all on an easy half-mile walk through a narrow canyon. The more adventurous can climb up behind Tent Rocks for a striking view of the area. Serious hikers can continue up the trail 14.5 miles to Bear Springs Peak in the Jemez Mountains. However, don't climb the tent rock formations themselves — they're fragile.

Over time, Smith explains, the interaction with water decreased and the eruptions got drier until the volcano's final act was to exhale huge volumes of ash. Remaining lava "piled up around the volcano like toothpaste from a tube, forming a lava dome similar to but much larger than the one that has grown in the throat of Mt. St. Helens over the last decade," he says.

Access: Tent Rocks is 40 miles southwest of Santa Fe and 50 miles northwest of Albuquerque. From I-25 take the Cochiti Dam exit to N. M. 22 and follow the signs to Cochiti Pueblo. Turn right at the pueblo water tower, painted like a drum, to Forest Service Road 266 and travel 6 miles to the trailhead. For more information call 761-8705 in Albuquerque.



Past and future meet in Socorro

Anybody who thinks the Wild West just unfolded in places like Dodge City, Tombstone and Leadville should give Socorro its due.

At its rowdy peak in the 1880s, as money and minerals poured into town from nearby mines, little Socorro was relieving the miners, cowboys and soldiers of their lucre as fast as they could pack it in. With more than 40 saloons and their gambling parlors, bawdy houses and opium dens, the town never closed. Every man kept a gun in his belt and the rampant lawlessness prompted vigilante lynchings and lashings to keep order.

The past and the future rub shoulders in Socorro. Where else can you see a Civil War-era fort, a ghost town and a world-renowned scientific facility all in the same day? Add to that the state's premier bird watching and you find Socorro is more than a gas stop on the way to Las Cruces.

Socorro has had more lives than a cat and a longer and livelier history than most of New Mexico's cities.

Twelve pueblos originally farmed this part of the Middle Rio Grande Valley. In 1541 the Piro village Teypana offered much-needed corn to Don Juan de Oñate who had just passed through the desert on his way to colonize northern New Mexico. For their aid, or succor, he named the place Socorro.

Spaniards returned in 1626 to establish a Catholic mission called Nuestra Señora de Pilabo del Socorro at the pueblo Pilabo. With help from Indian people two priests built a church with massive, five-foot-deep walls, carved vigas and corbel arches. Indian craftsmen fashioned a solid silver altar rail and communion vessels from nearby silver deposits. Spaniards observed then the potential for farming and mining but Apache raids discouraged much settlement.

In 1680 the Pueblo Revolt swept the colonists to El Paso, along with some loyal Piro, who founded another Socorro, Socorro del Sur. Before they left, a priest had some Piro bury the church's altar rail, communion vessels and other sacred objects. But a map of the site was lost and the Mexican government spent years trying to recover the treasure. A million-

dollar reward in 1880 failed to produce the vessels.

In the reconquest, Don Diego de Vargas found the pueblo at Socorro deserted, but the irrigation ditches still flowed and although the church was burned, its walls stood. Not until the late 1700s did settlers attempt to revive the colony. They rebuilt the church but were still harried by Apaches and Navajos. A miracle during one of these attacks inspired a name change.

In 1800, Apaches attacked the village and people took refuge in the church. Women prayed frantically inside while men fought from the church's doors. The settlers were getting the worst of it. Suddenly, the Apaches ceased fighting and fled. When a captive was asked why, he said they saw an apparition at the door — a giant man with wings who brandished a sword.

Parisians renamed the church San Miguel, after the saint who rescued them that day.

Socorro remained little more than a dismal collection of adobe huts surrounded by corn and wheat fields until New Mexico became a territory. Then the village became the seat of a new county that stretched from Texas to California.

When the U.S. government built forts here, citizens became defense contractors, beginning a time-honored tradition in New Mexico. Millers supplied the Army with flour, using water from the town's spring to power their mills.

Fort Craig in 1862 slowed the Confederate invasion of New Mexico. As Texas rebels led by Gen. H.H. Sibley tried to skirt the fort, Union soldiers engaged them at Valverde. Both sides suffered about 200 casualties but the ill-equipped Confederate force lost badly needed supplies. Still they pressed on to the north, where they were routed at Glorieta. Until the Apaches were subdued, the soldiers also protected travelers on the Camino Real as well as Socorro and the village grew steadily.

Silver was discovered in the Magdalena Mountains in 1866 but transportation was costly. On August 12, 1880, people climbed on their roofs to watch a black, smoke-belching serpent rush

Socorro Area Attractions

• A walking tour, described in the "Socorro County Guidebook," available free from the Chamber of Commerce, takes you past Socorro's many historic landmarks. My personal favorite wasn't on the official tour; a gardener with a sense of humor or a recycling bent had turned a row of toilets into planters.

• **San Miguel Mission**, one of the nation's oldest churches, features five-foot-thick adobe walls, carved vigas and two bell towers. Residents celebrate the church's saint's day the first weekend in August. The church is open daily to visitors.

• **New Mexico Tech** on the town's west side offers several draws — its park-like campus, its lush golf course with tree-lined fairways (considered one of the best 18-hole courses in the state) and the state's largest mineral museum with 10,000 specimens.

• **San Antonio**, 9 miles south on I-25, is the scene of two legends. One is the Owl Bar and Cafe. A trip to Las Cruces isn't complete without a stop for the green chile

cheeseburger. And across from the post office is the foundation of Gus Hilton's store, bank and hotel. Son Conrad got his first taste of the hospitality business as a bellboy here and bought his own hotel at age 32. The store's wooden bar reportedly survives in the Owl.

• **Las Quebradas (The Breaks)** is a BLM Back Country Byway — a 24-mile tour over good dirt road through canyons and desert. There are no trails; just pick a drainage for a good cold-weather hiking place, dramatic desert scenery and a sample of Chihuahuan desert. (Take U.S. 280 east from San Antonio for 11 miles and turn north on County Road A-129.)

• **Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge**, 18 miles south on I-25, is best known as a winter haven for snowbirds. Here's a secret: There's a lot to see the rest of the year too and the crowds are thin. During the summer and fall you can see pelicans, cormorants, snowy egrets and coots, among others. The 57,000-acre refuge also harbors more than 400 species of mammals,


reptiles and amphibians.

You'll see more if you go on a guided tour. (They're free.) And take binoculars. If you tour on your own, look everywhere — overhead,

in treetops, snags, brush, water, banks and posts. We saw six bald eagles keeping company in a treetop. A pheasant sauntered across the



down the valley. The Santa Fe Railroad arrived, setting off a 14-year boom.

Prospectors, speculators and opportunists swarmed in, filing 3,000 claims for gold, silver, copper, iron, lead, coal, zinc, manganese and antimony. Socorro became capitol of the state's richest mining district. At the same time agriculture flourished. Not only could farmers grow nearly anything here, there were markets for crops in local flour mills,

breweries and wineries. And ranchers proliferated, along with rustlers.

In 1889, in the midst of its boom, the state founded New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology, giving the state not only generations of mining engineers and geologists but a first-rate golf course.

Boom turned to bust in 1894 after the government ended the silver standard. Socorro shrank but survived on the stability of its agriculture, transportation and its college.

road. Wild turkeys grazed in a field. A green-wing teal snoozed under a tree. A harrier stood on a post. The visitor's center is open from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekends. For information call 835-1828.

- **Fort Craig**, 25 miles south of Socorro on I-25, was one of the West's largest forts. From 1854 to 1885 it saw one Civil War battle and numerous Indian campaigns. Ten-foot earthen walls enclosed troop quarters, hospital, bakery, warehouses and library. The U.S. Bureau of Land Management has partially stabilized the fort's ruins and it's open to visitors. For information call 835-0412.

- **Magdalena**, 25 miles west on U.S. 60, in the last century was not only a mining town but the nation's biggest cattle shipping center. At one point cowboys covered the down's paved streets with dirt because cattle wouldn't walk on asphalt. Nearby is the ghost town of Kelly (turn south at the Forest Service ranger station).

- **The Very Large Array (VLA)**, 54 miles west of Socorro on U.S. 60, is the world's most powerful telescope, where scientists from

around the world listen to the stars. You don't have to be an astronomer to marvel at the site of 27, 82-foot, saucer-shaped antennae aligned across the Plains of San Agustin, a 60-mile long former lake bed ringed by mountains. The visitor's center is open from 8:30 a.m. until sunset and you can take a self-guided tour. For information call 772-4255.

- **Two other scientific facilities** are Langmuir Laboratory, a mountain-top retreat where scientists study lightning, and the Joint Observatory for Cometary Research, operated by NASA and Goddard Space Flight Center. From U.S. 60, turn at the Water Canyon Campground.

- **The San Mateo Mountains**, 30 miles southwest of Socorro off N.M. 107, stretch from the Plains of San Agustin to the Rio Grande Valley and offer uncrowded hiking and camping. Within the San Mateos is the Apache Kid Wilderness, 44,650 acres of rugged terrain with three 10,000-foot peaks and 68 miles of trails. For more information call the Socorro Chamber of Commerce, 835-0424, and ask for the "Socorro County Guidebook."

Socorro: Visitor Tips

Dining: Enjoy some history with your meal at the Val Verde Steak House, a Socorro landmark. For good Mexican food in thoroughly pleasant surroundings, try the Sombrero. And I probably don't need to remind you about the Owl.

Lodging: The Eaton House is a b&b in the 100-year-old adobe home of E. W. Eaton, one-time

mayor and leader of the town's vigilantes (835-1067). In San Antonio is the Casa Blanca (835-3027). Socorro has a wide variety of motels.

Dates: San Miguel Fiesta, first weekend of August; Socorro County Fair, Labor Day weekend; Fat Tire Fiesta, last weekend of September.



Sci-fi moonscape of Bisti enchants visitors

The terrain rolls and swells into broad cuestas, rising and then dropping abruptly into sandstone cliffs. Sagebrush, some grassland and stubborn pinon hugging gaunt mesas offer the only greenery.

From the road the visitor begins to glimpse shale and sandstone spires, pinnacles and toadstools shaped and reshaped by erosion until they resemble the scenery of a science fiction movie. In these pink, orange and ghostly white badlands the Navajos call the Bisti and De-na-zin not even sagebrush can get a foothold.

Bisti means "badland" in Navajo. De-na-zin means "standing crane"; legend has it that cranes used to rest here on their migratory flights.


About 70 million years ago, a warm shallow sea covered the state from northwest to southeast. It teemed with fish

and giant marine lizards. On land were coastal plains, deltas, swamps, rivers and jungles. One of the jungle denizens was none other than Tyrannosaurus rex.

Over time the sea receded, leaving behind layers of sandstones and shales. Mountain ranges erupted as continental plates shifted. Geological processes converted the vegetation to coal and preserved as fossils the remains of forest and swamp creatures, a wide variety of fish, turtles, crocodiles, lizards, dinosaurs and primitive mammals.

During field studies in the 1980s, University of New Mexico paleontologists found that at least one-third of the area fossils, including several large dinosaurs, had never been found anywhere else.

Not only do these two areas, about 35 miles south of

Farmington, contain a world-class assortment of fossils but thousands of archeological sites document human occupation of the area from the sophisticated, pre-Columbian Anasazi to the first Navajos in the seventeenth century.


Given their wealth of earth and human history, Congress designated the 3,946-acre Bisti Badlands and the 24,000-acre De-na-zin as Wilderness Areas in 1984. They're managed by the U.S. Bureau of Land Management.

There are no developed trails, but you can follow Gateway Wash from the parking lot into the badlands.

A few words of caution: These formations are crumbly stuff; climbing on them will hasten their demise and yours. Also, don't pick up fossils or petrified wood. It's tempting,

but it impedes scientific study and besides, what would you do with them anyway? And carry plenty of water.

Access: From N.M. 371, 30 miles south of Farmington or 46 miles north of Crownpoint, take a gravel road east for 6 miles to the Bisti Wilderness access. To reach De-na-zin, from N.M. 371 take County 7500 to the wilderness entrance or, from N.M. 44, turn at the Huerfano Trading Post, north of Cuba, to County 7500. For more information call 327-5344.

Roswell invites you to a UFO festival

Roswell would rather be known for attractions other than its reported UFO crash site but since 1980, when the book "The Roswell Incident" appeared, public curiosity has grown until the words "Roswell" and "incident" are forever wed.

"If you are given a lemon, make lemonade," Stan Crosby told the Roswell City Council in January. This was how Crosby and other backers of the Roswell UFO Festival persuaded city officials to fund the "Roswell UFO Encounter '95."

In case you're from some planet other than the one whose ship crashed here and you missed the movie "Roswell," here's a recap:

On a stormy July night in 1947 the late rancher W.W. "Mac" Brazel saw an explosion followed by a fiery ball plummeting to earth. The next morning he rode out with a neighbor expecting to find a plane crash. Instead, they reported unusual metallic debris. A ship had gouged a 500-foot-long furrow and then wedged itself into the hillside. Several miles from the crash site they reportedly found an escape pod and four, small bodies with large, pear-shaped heads, skinny arms and legs and hands without thumbs. They wore gray flight suits.

After Brazel contacted the sheriff and Roswell Army Air Force Base, the

military cordoned off the area and removed debris and bodies. Air Force officers issued a press release saying that it had recovered a flying saucer and media across the country reported it. The Air Force quickly reversed itself, saying the discovery was a metallic weather balloon and its hexagonal radar deflector.

To commemorate this event (or legend, take your pick) and have a little fun, Roswell will host on July 1 and 2 a UFO festival that organizers hope will be an annual event. Activities include a tour of the crash site at the Corn Ranch (\$15), the Great UFO Float Race, a UFO-related arts and crafts show, an alien costume contest, a laser light show at Bottomless Lakes State Park, and shows at the Robert H. Goddard Planetarium.

If you can't make the festival, don't miss the city's two (yes, two!) UFO museums. The International UFO Museum and Research Center (400 N. Main, 1 to 5 p.m. daily, free admission) and the UFO Enigma Museum (6108 S. Main, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Saturday, \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children) feature exhibits, videos and information about UFOs and the famous "incident."

Book tips viewers to Watchable Wildlife

At the end of the road we parked and before we even got out of the car, antlers appeared above the brush, like instant branches. Soon the buck was looking down at us. In a moment he was gone. Then two more racks surfaced in the same spot, followed by curious stares.

One of the joys of outdoor New Mexico is the chance glimpse of wildlife. A new book, "New Mexico Wildlife Viewing Guide" by Jane MacCarter, increases your chances.

MacCarter wrote the book as part of the New Mexico Watchable Wildlife Project, a national multi-agency partnership coordinated by Defenders of Wildlife. A series of guides identifies the best viewing areas in 16 states, with more planned.

"Wildlife isn't necessarily always far away; it's often right in our own back yards,"

MacCarter writes. "Wildlife watchers need only to be guided to good vantage points."

Here are some prime sites in New Mexico:

- The confluence of the Red River and the Rio Grande in a spectacular gorge is a BLM Wild Rivers Recreation Area and Back Country Byway north of Questa. Watch for mule deer, elk, coyotes, eagles and red-tailed hawks. A Gunnison's prairie dog village lies near the sign for La Junta Overlook. At dusk ringtails may approach primitive campsites at the bottom of the gorge.

- The Valle Vidal, between Costilla and Cimarron, is the year-round home of more than 1,700 elk. You may also see black bear and mountain lion. Near McCrystal Creek Campground a herd of bison grazes but may be difficult to see.

- At Dripping Springs Natural

Area in the Organ Mountains outside Las Cruces, the oasis draws a wide variety of wildlife. You stand a good chance of seeing desert mule deer, coyotes, golden eagles and prairie falcons, among others.

- Fort Bayard, east of Silver City, is home to Coue's white-tailed deer, a small deer not usually seen in New Mexico. You can also see elk, coyote, mule deer, wild turkey and the occasional black bear, javelina, badger or bobcat.

- Clayton Lake State Park, north of Clayton, offers good waterfowl viewing at Chicano Point. Here and at Kiowa National Grassland are pronghorn antelope.

- Capilla Peak in the Manzano Mountains is a prime place to watch migrating raptors, especially in the fall. In a typical year observers count about 4,000 raptors here, MacCarter writes.


She offers these tips for wildlife watchers: Dawn and dusk are usually the best times of day but reptiles and amphibians are more active in the warmest parts of the day. Use binoculars or a spotting scope. Keep your distance; move away if an animal stops feeding and raises its head sharply, appears nervous, stands up suddenly or changes its direction of travel. Never touch sick animals and never touch or remove what you might think is an orphaned infant — Mom is usually not far away. Keep a safe distance from bears, rutting elk, mountain lions and bison. Keep your voices low and respect private property.



Historic Albuquerque-Gallup race thrilled onlookers

In 1916, ten years before Route 66 was even a gleam in anybody's eye, the more adventurous tourists were driving their flivvers across the National Old Trails road and leaving their money along the way.

Soon after the first call of "gentlemen, start your engines" was heard in Indianapolis, New Mexico car enthusiasts held a Fourth of July road race from Albuquerque to Gallup. This was no small under-

taking. Pocked with sand traps, arroyos, sharp lava and roaming livestock, the road was more of a track fit only for horse and wagon. Locals with a good team could make pocket money pulling tourists from mudholes.


Homesteaders were still arriving in covered wagons, but their wagons mixed with some 4,250 cars in the state. The "autoists" reported enthusiastically each out-of-town excursion to the local newspaper.

In May 1916, the Albuquerque Automobile Racing Association and Gallup boosters announced a Fourth of July race with a \$1,200 purse — \$700 to the first place winner, \$300 for second place and \$200 for third. The entry fee was a steep \$40. Gallup businessmen had put up \$500 of the purse. By their reckoning, it was a cheap "means of starting over-the-country tourists this way."

The average time then over the 174 miles from Gallup to Albuquerque was 13 hours over a road that mostly followed the railroad tracks. A Gallup newspaper reported, "Automobiles and Fords are able to go somewhere but not get back."

Race organizers were encouraged that one party in a Hudson reported a time of nine hours between the two cities, which "indicates the highway is right for speed," said one newspaper. Organizers examined the route and decided it was passable but lacked signs of any kind. They promised markers by race day.

On July 1, nine drivers drew positions. Gallup citizens were pleased to have two cars entered — Leo Leyden's Paige-Detroit and a Buick that "can hit it along at 40 mph where the roads are not



too crooked or rough," according to the Gallup Independent.

From Albuquerque, Lloyd Cunningham entered his Maxwell. Other cars entered were a Hupmobile, a Haynes, a Chalmers, two Buicks, an Overland, and a Reo.

The race began on the holiday at 8 a.m. from downtown Albuquerque, and contestants left at three-minute intervals.

Mechanical problems and mishaps eliminated cars. A Buick refused to start because of magneto trouble. The Chalmers took a curve too fast just outside the city and turned over. The Overland hit a telephone pole near Grants. Amazingly, there were no injuries.

The Reo made it to Grants and disappeared. The other Buick dropped out after using up all its spare tires.

Leo Leyden had "modified" his Paige by adding 500 pounds of ballast instead of using straps to hold the springs down, according to the Gallup Herald. But almost from the beginning he was cursed with bad breaks. Thirty miles out, he had a blow-out. Twenty miles later, he lost six minutes when a horse-team blocked the road. Leyden jumped from his racer and led the team across himself. At 100 miles, he stopped for a drink of water and spilled some of it on an electrical connection. That cost him 15 minutes getting the Paige restarted.

In Gallup, crowds began gathering at the finish line around noon, hours before the cars were due.

Soon people lined the street from one end of town to the other.

A mile out of Gallup, Cliff Ulyatt thought he had the race. Then engine trouble in his Hupmobile denied him the purse. Cunningham bore down.

At 3:02 p.m., Cunningham hit the finish line "like a streak of lightning," the Herald said. Without seeing one tire spin off his Maxwell, he roared in on a rift. The winning time: 6 hours, 53 minutes, 31 seconds, more than two hours off the previous record.

Ten minutes later, Leo Leyden screeched into town, clipping corners. He claimed second place and \$300 with a time of 6:56:10. The Haynes was third with 6:58:23, the Hupmobile fourth with 7:27.

The finish, according to one news account, "furnished 30 minutes of the most intense excitement Gallup has ever experienced." Organizers declared the race, with no major injuries to either participants or bystanders, a success.

That summer, teams of mules and men labored on the highway out of Albuquerque. "By another

year, the road between here and Albuquerque should be a veritable boulevard," the Gallup Independent predicted. It would be 1937 before boosters got their boulevard — Route 66.

Seeing Route 66: My favorite portion of the old highway is west of Albuquerque. From I-40 take the Laguna Pueblo exit and follow the old road from Laguna through Cubero to McCartys. At Cubero is Wallace and Mary Gunn's Villa de Cubero, the first motel built west of Albuquerque. Lucille Ball stayed here during her divorce from Desi Arnaz; J. Robert Oppenheimer and his associates came here to relax from the pressures of early Los Alamos; and Ernest Hemingway stayed here while writing *The Old Man and The Sea*. You can also exit I-40 and drive from Prewitt to Gallup. For a good guide to the Gallup portion of Route 66, see Sally Noe's "66 Sights on Route 66." For a guide to the Grants area see Sherry Robinson's "El Malpais, Mt. Taylor and the Zuni Mountains/ A Hiking Guide and History."

- 1 tablespoon chopped basil
- 3 cloves garlic, chopped

- Black pepper, to taste
- 3 Roma tomatoes, chopped
- 1/2 cup diced, red onion

In a 1-1/2 quart saucepan, heat 1 quart of water to boiling. Blanch zucchini 2 minutes. Rinse with cold water and drain on paper towels.

In a large bowl, combine vinegar, brown sugar, cilantro, basil, garlic and pepper. Toss zucchini, tomatoes and red onion with dressing.

Cover and refrigerate at least 2 hours, to allow flavors to blend. Makes 1 quart.

Nopalita Salad

- 3 avocados
- 1 medium onion
- 1 pound nopalitos
- 3 tomatoes, diced
- 1/4 cup cilantro, chopped
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- Salt, to taste
- 2 tablespoons juice from pickled jalapeños
- Fresh lemon juice

Chop avocados, onion and nopalita into uniform-sized pieces. Combine in a medium-sized bowl. Place salad in center of lettuce leaf. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Serve chilled. Serves 4.

CILANTRO-LEMON VINAIGRETTE

1/3 cup olive oil
3 tablespoons lemon juice
1/4 cup or more cilantro
Large dash black pepper
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 chopped, green onions
1/4 cup parsley, chopped
1 clove garlic

Place all ingredients into a food processor or blender. Mix until all greens are chopped and the ingredients are well incorporated. Chill until serving time.

Corncakes with Onion

1 cup Masa Harina
1/4 cup white flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon ground cumin
1/2 teaspoon cayenne
1 egg
1 cup milk, or as needed
1/4 large onion, grated
Vegetable oil

Stir together first 6 ingredients. Blend together egg and milk and add to dry ingredients; stir vigorously. Add enough milk to resemble pancake batter. Cook as you would pancakes. Serves 4 to 6.

Baked Garbanzos

4 tablespoons olive oil
1 medium onion, chopped
1 large clove garlic, chopped
1/2 teaspoon oregano
1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
2 cans (14 ounces each) garbanzos, drained
1/4 to 1/2 cup canned, chopped, green chilies
1/4 cup whipping cream or half and half

For garnish: chopped cilantro, chopped scallion greens, lime wedges, tomatoes or lettuce

In a medium frying pan, add oil and onion; sauté until tender. Add garlic, oregano, cumin and pepper. Stir to combine.

Meanwhile, place garbanzos into a food processor and puree until you get a texture resembling oatmeal flakes. Add to the onion mixture and cook 5 minutes over medium heat. The garbanzos are done when thoroughly blended with the onion and the sides begin to turn brown. Stir in green chilies and cream, and allow to simmer 2 minutes.

Spread into a shallow, 1 quart casserole. Sprinkle with Monterey Jack cheese and bake at 300° for 15 minutes, or until cheese is melted and bubbly. Serve with garnishes. Serves 4 to 6.

Corn Off The Cob

Cooking fresh vegetables with milk is a traditional way of cooking among old village cooks.

4 ears white corn, kernels sliced from cob, about 2 to 2-1/2 cups, or canned or frozen corn
2 tablespoons butter
3 green onions, chopped
2 to 4 tablespoons chopped canned green chilies
1/3 cup heavy cream
Salt and pepper, to taste

Melt butter; stir in onions and chiles and cook just enough to wilt the onion. Add cream and allow to boil up for 1 minute; add corn. Cover and simmer 2 to 3 minutes. The finished dish should be fresh-tasting and creamy. Add salt and pepper, to taste. Serves 4 to 6.



Dried corn husks, the traditional wrapping for tamales, can also be used as "boats" to hold a sauteed vegetable mixture.

FULL OF BEANS

Garbanzos, also known as chickpeas, make an excellent side dish or addition to salads or soups.

Pinto beans are one of the most popular beans varieties. Used in soups and also in refried form, beans are an inexpensive source of proteins.

Dried beans should always be soaked before cooking. This reduces the cooking time and helps with digestibility.





Chipotles in Adobo Sauce

This recipe can be used in almost any dish, including breads, sauces, salad dressings or pasta. It has a distinct smoky flavor with a warm heat.

- 7 to 10 medium-sized, dried chipotle chiles, stemmed and slit lengthwise
- 1/3 cup onion, cut into 1/2-inch slices
- 5 tablespoons cider vinegar
- 2 cloves garlic, sliced
- 4 tablespoons ketchup
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3 cups water

Combine all ingredients; cover and cook over very low heat about 1 to 1-1/2 hours, or until chiles are very soft and liquid has been reduced to 1 cup. Place in a blender and purée until smooth. Push through a fine sieve to remove any seeds. This will keep in an airtight container for several weeks in the refrigerator. Makes about 1 cup.

The drying process intensifies the flavor and aroma of chiles. They are an indispensable ingredient in Southwestern cooking.

- 6 cloves garlic, roasted and peeled
- 2 chipotle chiles in adobo sauce
- 1 teaspoon adobo sauce
- 1/2 cup dry-roasted peanuts

- 1/2 teaspoon ground allspice
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- Pinch ground cloves
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1-1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon peanut oil

Remove stems and seeds from ancho and guajillo chiles. Roast and rehydrate the chiles.

Blacken tomatoes. Sauté onion in oil over low heat, until slightly browned. Dry-roast pumpkin seeds in sauté pan about 5 minutes, or until they have finished popping. Place into a blender and purée with the tomatoes to form a paste. Add remaining ingredients (except oil), plus 1/2 cup of chile water; purée. Heat peanut oil, until almost smoking. Refry sauce, sizzling for 3 to 5 minutes, stirring continuously. Makes about 5 cups.

Smoked Chile Barbeque Sauce

A combination of flavors that are, at once, smoky, hot, spicy and a little sweet.

- 1 cup rice vinegar
- 1 cup cider vinegar
- 2 teaspoons ground cloves
- 1 teaspoon ground allspice
- 2 tablespoons ground coriander
- 1 medium onion, diced
- 1 head roasted garlic, peeled and chopped
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup molasses

- 1 cup chipotle chiles in adobo sauce, puréed
- 1-1/2 bottles tomato ketchup
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Combine rice vinegar, cider vinegar, cloves, ground allspice and ground coriander in a saucepan. Cook over medium heat and reduce by half.

In a large pan, sauté onion and garlic in olive oil, until soft. Add sugar; dissolve. Stir in molasses and reduce slightly. Add the vinegar mixture, puréed chipotles in adobo sauce, ketchup and Worcestershire sauce. Cook over low heat for 1 hour. Strain through a sieve. Makes about 5 cups.

Jalapeno Ketchup

- 1 medium onion
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 1 tablespoon toasted oregano
- 1 cup rice vinegar
- 2 roasted jalapeños
- 1 cup red chile sauce
- 2 cups roasted Roma tomatoes, puréed
- 1/2 bunch cilantro, chopped
- Salt, to taste

Sauté onion in oil, until soft. Add sugar and cook to a glaze. Add cumin and oregano, deglaze with vinegar; reduce. Add remaining ingredients. Simmer 1 hour. Cool and purée. Add water, if too thick or too hot. Makes about 5 cups.

Mole Pablano

This is probably the most traditional of Mexican recipes, although it may seem complicated to prepare, it is well worth the effort.

- 10 to 12 pound turkey, cut up
- 16 medium dried chiles mulatos
- 5 medium dried chiles anchos
- 6 dried chiles pasillas
- 1/4 cup sesame seeds, plus garnish
- 1/2 teaspoon coriander seeds
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil, plus more if needed
- Heaping 1/3 cup unskinned almonds
- 1/3 cup raisins
- 1/2 medium onion, sliced
- 2 cloves garlic, peeled

- 1 corn tortilla, stale or dried
- 2 slices firm white bread, stale or dried
- 1 large tomato, roasted or boiled, cored and peeled
- 2 ounces Mexican chocolate, roughly chopped
- 10 black peppercorns
- 4 cloves garlic
- 1/2 teaspoon anise seed
- 1 inch cinnamon stick
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 2-1/2 quarts chicken broth
- Salt, to taste
- 1/4 cup sugar

Stem seed and carefully devein the dried chiles, reserving 2 tablespoons of the seeds; tear into flat pieces. Measure out the sesame seeds, coriander seeds, almonds,

raisins and onion. Lay out the garlic, tortilla and bread.

Place tomato into a large bowl and break it up; add chopped chocolate. Pulverize remaining spices, using mortar or spice grinder; add to tomato. Have oil and broth at ready access.

In a medium skillet, over medium heat, dry-roast the chiles (make sure you proceed with this step in a well-ventilated space), sesame and coriander seeds, one kind at a time, stirring each until lightly browned. Add to the tomato mixture.

Cook onion and garlic, stirring frequently, until well-browned. Drain well and add to tomato mixture.



Coriander is the seed of the cilantro plant. It offers a unique, subtle taste and is well-suited for desserts, salad dressings or stews.





Furr's

Fry the tortillas and bread, separately, until browned. Tear into large pieces and add to tomato mixture.

Stir tomato mixture thoroughly and scoop 1/4 into a blender, along with 1/2 cup broth. Blend until very smooth, adding a little more liquid, if needed. Strain through a medium sieve. Repeat process with remaining batches.

Purée drained chiles in 3 batches; adding 1/2 cup broth. Strain through sieve into a separate bowl.

Heat 1/4 cup oil in a large kettle (at least 8-quart) over medium-high heat. Dry turkey pieces with paper towels and brown in oil in several batches, 3 to 4 minutes per side. Remove to a roasting pan. Set aside at room temperature, until sauce is ready.

Pour off excess fat from kettle. Return to heat for a minute. Add chile purée and stir constantly, until dark and thick, about 5 minutes. Add the other bowl of purée and stir several minutes longer, until mixture thickens. Stir in 5 cups of broth, partially cover and simmer gently 45 minutes, stirring occasionally. Finally, season with salt and sugar and, if the sauce is thicker than heavy cream, thin with a little broth.

Preheat oven to 350°. Pour sauce over turkey, cover and bake until the bird is tender, about 2 hours. Remove turkey from pan; set aside to cool. Spoon off fat from sauce.

Remove skin and cut meat from bones into large pieces. Lay out on 2 or 3 large baking dishes.

To serve, pour sauce over the turkey, cover and heat in 350° oven for 15 to 20 minutes. Immediately before presenting the mole, spoon some sauce from around the edges over the turkey, to give it a glistening coat, then sprinkle with sesame seeds.

Makes enough sauce for one whole turkey.

Roll as thin as possible, cut and fry in deep fat until a delicate golden brown. Spooning the hot oil over the top during frying is the secret to making them puff evenly.

Cut into small squares, they make sopaipillas. Cut large and round, with a hole pinched in the middle, they make buñuelos.

Topped with the following sauce, buñuelos are served as a dessert.

6 tablespoons piloncillo
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup wine
1/2 cup seeded raisins
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Combine all ingredients and boil until it begins to thicken. Pour over hot buñuelos and serve at once.

Mexican Chocolate



There are a variety of ways to make Mexican chocolate. This recipe is a quick version.

4 cups milk
1/2 cup boiling water
1-1/2 squares chocolate
2 tablespoons sugar
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/8 teaspoon nutmeg
Pinch of salt
1/4 teaspoon almond extract
or 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
5 marshmallows

Scald milk. Boil chocolate, sugar, spices and salt in water for 5 minutes. Add scalded milk and marshmallows and beat until dissolved. Reheat and add extract. Beat until foamy.

Pine Nut Cookies



1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup plus 2 tablespoons powdered sugar, divided
2 tablespoons grated orange peel
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 cup flour
1 cup pine nuts, finely chopped
1/2 teaspoon crushed anise seed
Pinch of salt


Heat oven to 275°.

In a medium bowl, beat butter, 2 tablespoons powdered sugar, orange peel and vanilla until creamy.

Stir in flour, nuts, anise and salt until well mixed. Shape spoonfuls of dough into 1-inch balls. Place balls on ungreased baking sheet 1 inch apart. Flatten slightly.

Bake until edges are light golden brown, 30 to 35 minutes.

Roll warm cookies in remaining 1 cup powdered sugar; cool. Roll in sugar again. Store in an airtight container. Makes about 4 dozen cookies.



2 cups crushed piloncillo
1 tablespoon vinegar
1 tablespoon butter
1/2 cup milk
1 cup pine nuts
Few drops almond extract

Mix sugar, water, vinegar and butter. Boil until syrup threads when dropped from spoon. Add almond extract; cool slightly. Add pine nuts and beat until creamy. Drop from tip of spoon on oiled paper or pour into a buttered pan and cut into squares. Pecans may be substituted for pine nuts.
