U.S. Forest Service warns homeowners of fire danger

U.S. Forest Service officials advocated a new philosophy on forest fires at a meeting in Ruidoso Wednesday: homeowners beware.

"We need to tell the public the truth. We can't prevent all fires. We can't even suppress all fires. Fire occurs. They must be prepared and plan ahead. It's too late when a fire already has started," said Russ Johnson, deputy fire management officer with the San Bernardino Forest in California.

Because homes have been built near forests without planning ahead to aid firefighting efforts, more homes and businesses may be lost in the future, said Gene Dowdy, director of the Forest Service's national fire protection operations.

Federal agencies don't have the money to protect every threatened home, Dowdy said. Last year, fire suppression cost the nation \$1 billion.

"It was a very expensive year and protecting structures accounted for a high percentage, and that raised a red flag," Johnson agreed.

"Protection of life, property and resources was our job," Dowdy said. But the service legally is not charged with structure protection, not even for its own buildings, he added. That responsibility should

sit with each community as it realizes the potentially devastating economic impact a fire could cause, Dowdy said.

For decades, U.S. Forest Service officials thought they were right to preach fire prevention and suppression, Dowdy explained to put fire suppression history in context.

Homeowners in forested areas thought they were right not to cut down trees and to leave as much natural vegetation as possible, Dowdy said. Locally, that philosophy has been encouraged by Ruidoso village government, which requires permits to cut healthy trees with trunks that measure five inches or more in diameter at a point five feet above the ground or trees on slopes in excess of 10%. No more than 20% of the trees on a lot may be removed unless they are replaced with new trees.

But today, those approaches no longer work. Because the firefighters and foresters were so good at their jobs, the nation's forests are crowded with trees and cushioned with layers of dried ground debris, Dowdy said.

And because people want to live in the forests, urban development has crept to the borders of the national forests, perpetuating the same fire-prone conditions on private land, Dowdy said.

Forest Service employees have been directed to start looking at

forest management in a broader holistic perspective, with less focus on saving property and more on whether fire will benefit or harm the resource, including wildlife, he said.

"Houses are insured and can be replaced; a condor cannot," Dowdy said.

Dowdy and Johnson met with local foresters, soil conservation and natural resources officials in Ruidoso Wednesday to discuss the new direction.

Forest Service officials hope to see firefighting plans developed for a community such as Ruidoso and surrounding forest land based on a ranking of the risk, the hazard and the resource in each square of a superimposed grid.

The fire protection assessment grid would look at hazards including fuel (such as fallen trees and thick dead ground cover), severe degree of slope and other topography features. It would look at risks, including the potential to ignite, and the number of homes and people. And it would consider values such as unique resources.

"The public will need to be involved in talking values," Johnson said. "How much risk are homeowners in an area willing to accept to keep from cutting vegetation? Would they install a water tank or sprinkler system?"

BLM concludes fireman was right

A U.S. Bureau of Land Management investigation has concluded that a state official had good reason to turn away the assistance of a Lincoln County road grader at a May 15 fire.

A New Mexico Division of Forestry engine foreman told the grader operator he was uncomfortable with his aid because the grader operator had no firefighting experience and would have been alone in dangerous conditions while building the fire line.

Residents complained that more livestock, fences and forage were lost in the Radio Fire because the grader operator's assistance, offered early on during the blaze, was turned away. The fire burned 5,600 acres in eastern Lincoln County.

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New Ruidoso water supply on line at Grindstone

Concerns of inadequate water pressure and low supplies in Ruidoso should be reduced once the Grindstone Treatment Plant is on line, officials say.

The new water plant is scheduled to begin operation Thursday, said Assistant Village Manager Alan Briley. It can treat one million gallons of water per day.

Plant operators and summer weekend, especially July 4th, the sometimes-quadrupled population demands up to six million gallons of water a day. Storage water is then

water supply on the day the plant engineers promised.

Prior to construction of the new treatment plant, the 35-foot-deep Alto Lake (fed by Eagle Creek) handled all the area's water needs, which average two million gallons a day during low tourism seasons.

Alto's plant can treat up to 2.5 million gallons of water per day; Grindstone can treat up to one million gallons per day.

During holiday and summer weekends, especially July 4th, the sometimes-quadrupled population demands up to six million gallons of water a day. Storage water is then

used to supplement the supply. The man-made Grindstone Lake

was created with \$11 million in village gross receipt tax bonds when the Rio Ruidoso was dammed in 1987. The lake contains nearly 1,000 acre-feet of water, about 10 times more than Alto Lake, said water department director Richard Sanchez. (There are 325,851 gallons to an acre foot.)

The addition of Grindstone could serve the water needs of approximately 8,000 people, Sanchez said. But the number would actually be less, he figured, as many commercial businesses would tap into the plant.

Both the Alto and Grindstone

systems will interconnect to serve the Ruidoso area's 35 water pressure zones. The two plants should fulfill the area's water needs for "many years" to come, Sanchez said.

The national average of per person residential water use is 100 gallons per day, The American Water Works Association reports. New Mexico's average daily use is higher; between 125 to 140 gallons is poured per person, per day, Sanchez said.

The village is a member of the association, which is highly regarded by national water works officials, said Village Manager Gary Jackson.

Also wrapped in the Grindstone plant construction package is the relocation of a one million gallon storage tank. Revitalizing the tank's potential will increase the area's treated storage capacity from 16 to 17 million gallons.


The tank had been under-used due to its low elevation position, but has been reassembled up near the 101-foot-deep Grindstone reservoir lake. The higher elevation will provide improved water pressure to different locations in the city, Briley explained.

The pumping system at the Grindstone plant will intake reservoir water at three different levels, unlike the Alto plant, which is fed at one level. This will help assure better drinking water during periods of lake turnover and peak demand, explained Briley.

And with a new storage tank, typical loss of pressure at the southern end of town should be alleviated.

Construction of the plant fulfills the top 1993/94 priority of the Ruidoso Village Council. Its plan to increase village water supply was brought to the state Legislature during the 1994 session, and with the help of Ruidoso's former state

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Final budget hearing Tuesday

Ruidoso councilors are scheduled to wrap up the proposed \$17.5 million, 1995-96 village budget Tuesday.

A public meeting and council vote on the package will be held at 7 p.m. They are scheduled after a 3:30 p.m. public hearing on permit fees to move buildings, and a continued hearing on driveway slope standards.

Councilors will also consider the Convention and Visitors Bureau contract and the possible deletion of portions of the MainStreet construction contract at the meeting.

The proposed budget, which has \$5.2 million general fund, provides for eight new full-time employees and 17 new vehicles.

The spending package includes \$761,836 for capital purchases. This includes improvements to the regional wastewater treatment plant, construction of airport hangars and installation of an aircraft localizer.

The plan does not include new service fees or increased tax rates, saving the property tax rate at 368 mills.

Bond considerations

Councilors are also scheduled Tuesday to vote on whether to proceed with administrative steps for reparation of a \$6.55 million bond issue. If approved, a financial adviser will be retained to study the issues, calculate how much each project would cost, and help explain

the structuring of debt service payments.

Councilors will then vote on a bond resolution at their June 13 meeting and, if approved, a public election will be scheduled in August for the public's final year or year on the new projects.

Proposed projects that would be funded with general obligation bonds include \$1 million for new soccer fields, a baseball diamond and jogging track; \$350,000 for the expansion of city hall; \$1.6 million for a new library complex and an expanded, remodeled senior center; and \$100,000 for storage at the Civic Events Center.

General obligation bonds may also be issued for \$1.5 million in wastewater line repairs, \$1.2 million in water line upgrades and \$800,000 to expand tank capacity of the Grindstone Treatment Plant from one million gallons a day to two million.

The village currently has an outstanding debt of \$1.15 million, which will retire in 1997. If new debt is issued for all these projects by early 1996, the current property tax rate of 9.619 mills will remain the same, Village Manager Gary Jackson said.

This current tax rate (what property owners are already paying) translates to \$721 in annual taxes on a \$75,000 home. For a \$50,000 home it is \$481, and on a \$100,000 home it is \$961.

The proposed projects will be separated into different ballot issues if an election is scheduled.

The ranking would aid the Forest Service and other firefighting agencies in deciding how much effort to put into fighting a fire. The system would help pinpoint areas where higher intensity fires could be expected.

"By knowing what's out there, the decision may be not to try to confine or contain a fire," Johnson said. "By knowing that fuel treatment (elimination of accumulated ground debris and weakened trees) may be needed in one of those squares, there may be an advantage to allow that section to burn and take a stand somewhere else."

The Forest Service hopes to spark interest in planning groups, local governments and homeowners to take steps to decrease the risk and plan ahead, Dowdy said.

"It gets us out of the clearing being big brother and puts the control back into the landowner's hands," he said.

In the new holistic approach to managing the country's forests, the individual homeowner will play a pivotal role, he said.

"People want to do what's right," Dowdy said. "They care about the environment. We talk fire pattern. People talk about seeing wildlife."

By using educational materials aimed at adults, the Forest Service and related agencies can try to change attitudes and show homeowners they can improve the environment for wildlife with some selective tree cutting and brush clearing — not just around their homes, but on vacant lots and

county or city-owned land, Dowdy said.

Ruidoso is a perfect example of a town that has homes wedged into lots thick with trees, bordering a national forest that also has become crowded with too many trees and brush.

Many Ruidoso homeowners have built on slopes that encourage rapid burning and wind-driven flames. This have created a situation that is prime for a high intensity, highly destructive fire, Dowdy said.

He told local representatives that one of the first steps is to find a community group that will spread the word and encourage homeowners to cut down trees or trim back branches that tower over their homes, to clean away ground debris and shrubs, and to take other steps to prevent a forest fire from swamping their houses.

Absentee lot owners must be encouraged or required to clean their land and not allow it to be a stepping stone for fire, Dowdy said.

To help the effort, officials with the state forestry division, the national Forest Service, natural resources, soil conservation and other related agencies must be ready to offer advice to communities and individuals, he said.

"Fire is inevitable," Johnson said. "Whether it brings good or bad results can be influenced by man."

legislator John Underwood, \$570,000 for the project was granted. The rest was appropriated through village funds.

Already, the village is considering doubling the Grindstone plant's treatment capacity to two million gallons per day. The work is estimated to cost \$800,000.

John Carollo Engineers drew plan specifications for the plant last summer, and after gaining state and environmental approvals, the village put the project to bid this winter.

Drew Engineers began the construction in January and stayed with its five-month schedule.

"It's phenomenal," Jackson said.

More expansion?

Already, the village is considering doubling the Grindstone plant's treatment capacity to two million gallons per day. The work is estimated to cost \$800,000. Potential for expansion was included in the plant's design, so engineers wouldn't have to start from scratch and costs could be lessened.

Councilors are considering bond-

ing for the turbidity rather than spending an estimated \$370,000 to upgrade the 300,000 gallon capacity Upper Canyon plant.

That plant has been closed since last summer after an excess of polymers used to meet Environmental Protection Agency water turbidity (clarity) standards caused a massive fish kill in the Rio Ruidoso. The EPA fined the village \$10,000 for killing an estimated 1,500-3,000 fish.

"The employees were trying to meet the turbidity requirements with polymers, which is extremely difficult to achieve," Jackson said. When the polymers backwashed from the plant, they became attached to the fish gills. The polymers attracted silt from the river which clogged the gills and eventually suffocated the fish, Jackson said.

The Upper Canyon plant successfully met the turbidity standards and produced a very high quality water until standards were doubled in recent years by the EPA, Jackson said. Achieving the standard without reconstructing the plant is impossible, so the plant has remained closed, Jackson said.

The estimated \$370,000 cost for the Upper Canyon improvements does not include aesthetic costs and the possible need to purchase Upper Canyon land for improvements.

Expansion of the Grindstone plant would provide four times as much water as the Upper Canyon plant, and at a cost of 51 cents per gallon as opposed to \$1.48 per gallon, Jackson said.

In any case, the Upper Canyon plant won't be mothballed, Jackson said. At the least, it will likely be used as a pumping unit.




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

Skateboard group holds first meeting

A new committee of skateboarders and village staff members will be holding its first meeting at 6 p.m. Tuesday in city hall. The committee is charged with establishing a skateboard park. Committee members include skateboard fanatics Amber Lundquist, Leah Brown, Marshall Thompson and Wes Temby. Also on the ad hoc committee are: Audeen Franklin, downtown merchant; Debbie Jo Almager, parks department director; Alan Briley, village

assistant manager, and Village Councilor Leon Eggleston, a confessed roller blade aficionado. The committee was formed after some downtown merchants complained to councilors that skateboarders were a threat to pedestrians and property, and a liability concern. The two merchants who complained to the council at an April meeting requested the skateboarders be banned from using the downtown sidewalks. More than 40 students and skateboarders also appeared at the meeting with the merchants, re-

questing their right to skate the sidewalks be preserved. They argued that skateboarding is a sport, and if they are forbidden to use the sidewalks (which are public property), they would have nowhere else to go. The council rejected the merchants' ban request, but made a motion to form a skateboard committee. Prior to the meeting, merchants had made only about 11 calls to police in a year's time complaining about the skateboarders. None complained of damage. But over the

past three weeks police have received about nine complaints, Detective Wolfgang Born said. Two or three more reports have complained of damage. Police arrested a 17-year-old male Wednesday for allegedly pulling up flowers outside of one business. Born said the youth admitted to the damage and implicated others as well. "Skateboarders are starting to be a nuisance to merchants," Born said. "Not all skateboarders, but a handful."

State health dept. hosts local meeting May 31

State health officials will conduct a meeting in Carrizozo May 31 to identify the health needs of the county for the department's planning and budgeting process.

The meeting from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. in the county commission chambers of the Lincoln County Courthouse is one of a series of 10 meetings being staged in May and

June throughout the state by the department. The results of the meetings for the last four years have been used as a means of determining whether programs are relevant and adequate. Health Department Secretary Alex Valdez said the department wants to continue to obtain the broadest public input, because the

challenge of meeting health needs in New Mexico is becoming more difficult. Pending changes at both the federal and state levels, primarily budget cuts, mean the department "will have to do more with the same amount or fewer resources," Valdez said. "There will have to be an even greater emphasis on the development of systems of health care."

Prior to each meeting, a session is conducted with the department's community contractors and staff to allow them discuss program issues with management. The other nine meetings are scheduled in Los Lunas, Bloomfield, El Rito, Columbus, Dexter, Mora, Mosquero, Fort Sumner and Moriarty.

L.C. Solid Waste Authority in black

The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority will remain in the black next year, if revenues and expenses stay within amounts approved Monday.

Manager Joe Lewandowski told board members that he is projecting revenues of \$1,762,493 and expenses of \$1,626,575 in his 1995-96 budget. The state requires that 1/12th of the budget, or \$135,548 be held in reserve, leaving an additional positive balance of \$370. A coalition of the county and its five municipalities, the authority was formed about five years ago to collect and dispose of garbage on a county-wide basis. The majority of its revenues comes from residential and commercial regular collection fees, estimated at about \$1.2 million for 1995-96. Another \$51,079 is anticipated to come from fees at the authority's

construction debris landfill in Capitan and \$50,000 from the use of new "roll-off" collection bins used by builders and others with large loads. "The roll-offs produced \$4,800 in one month and I haven't even advertised them yet," he said. For the first time, the authority will be operating without a grant from the state for recycling. However, Lewandowski expects the program to generate about \$89,917 in sales. Since it was started, the program has collected more than \$200,000 in grant money, more than many large cities in the state, he said.

Over the last 18 months, the price of some recyclable materials has increased dramatically, he said. In 1994, the price for a ton of newspaper was \$30. Now it's \$198. Cardboard went up from \$42 a ton to \$205. "Volumes collected locally won't decrease and probably will go up, he said.

Overall, he projected a slight decrease in revenues for the authority operation, from \$1.84 million in the current year to \$1.76 million in 1995-96. But expenses are expected to stay within \$85 of this year's figure at \$1,626,574. Included in the projected \$302,384 in wages under general operation and \$55,120 under recycling for the authority's 20 full-time and four part-time employees is \$35,000 for a new manager. Lewandowski will be leaving this summer. The deadline to apply for his position is 5 p.m. Friday.

Overtime at \$31,255 edged up by about \$2,000. It's needed to provide regular collection routes on holidays and to cover vacations, Lewandowski said. Authority members approved the preliminary budget, which will be sent to the state for review and returned with suggestions for final action.

Streakin Kas draws inside post

For Daniel Lucas, home isn't necessarily where the heart is.

Lucas resides in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida and owns a breeding farm in New Market, Maryland. But he'll be at Ruidoso Downs Sunday to watch his 2-year-old Streakin Kas try for the biggest win of his young career in the Grade I \$382,356 Ruidoso Futurity.

The Ruidoso Futurity is the first leg of Ruidoso Downs' rich Quarter Horse Triple Crown, which will be followed by the Rainbow Futurity on July 23 and the \$2 Million All American on Labor Day.

Streakin Kas was the fastest of the ten qualifiers for the Futurity when he won the second division of the Trials at the Downs on opening day. The Texas-bred drew the inside post position for the 350-yard dash, which will be worth \$157,812 to the winner.

"We've never had a horse qualify for a race this big," said an excited Lucas from his Peace and Plenty Farm in Maryland. "This would be the thrill of a lifetime for us."

Lucas has owned and raced horses for more than 20 years, and breeds Thoroughbreds at his farm outside of Baltimore. More than three years ago he moved all of his quarter horse mares to well known quarter horse owner Jim Helzer's farm in Texas.

"Quarter horses are one of my great loves," explained Lucas, a physician who works for a multi-state health care company based in Florida. "I've never been without one. But it's impractical to race them in Maryland or Florida. That's why I moved them to Texas."

With an 18,220 qualifying time for the Futurity, Streakin Kas was the fastest of the 145 horses who ran the trials against the brisk head wind on opening day.

Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath trains the son of Streakin Six, and will also saddle Strikin Dash, the fifth fastest qualifier for the race. Jacqueline Spencer of Alto owns Stikin Dash.

Gilbreath has named Kip Didericksen to ride. A five-time national champion quarter horse jockey, Didericksen recently ended his

self-imposed retirement because of weight problems. He rode last weekend at Les Bois Park for the first time in 2 1/2 years, where he won the Northwest Challenge Derby. Strikin Dash drew the number six post position.

Other Futurity hopefuls include Spencer Peterson's Willow Beda Chick, the second fastest qualifier (18.30) who will be ridden by his son, Billy Peterson.

Trainer Jack Brooks, a six time All American Futurity winner, will saddle the trio of Heavenly Note, Just Luther, and Bug N Bully - the sixth, seventh and eighth fastest qualifiers respectively.

The Ruidoso Futurity will be Sunday's ninth live race. First race begins at 1:15 p.m.

Payne pitches a champion horseshoe

When viewed from behind, Dorothy Payne looks like a trim teenager in shorts. But long-legged Dorothy is no teenager; she's a physically fit great-grandmother and a national and world champion horseshoe pitcher.

On May 19, Payne defeated women from all over the U.S. to win a gold medal - her third - in horseshoes at the U.S. National Senior Sports Classic V (USNSSC), formerly the U.S. National Senior Olympics, at San Antonio, Texas, May 17-24.

Back home in Carrizozo, Payne relived the excitement of her fifth biennial Senior Sports Classic.

There were 16 people in Payne's age bracket (70-74). They were split into two groups and played a round robin. Payne had to play seven preliminary games.

She handily won all seven prelims, breaking a sweat only when one score reached 19-18. Dorothy's next pitch, a three-point ringer, won the game 21-18. And she never looked back.

The top three scorers from the two preliminary groups advanced to the final match. As highest scorer in her preliminary, Payne was definitely a medal contender.

The final top six also played a round robin. Payne breezed through her first three games, defeating each opponent 21-0.

"I skunked 'em," she whooped, blue-green eyes sparkling.

In the fourth match, her opponent managed 10 points.

"I guess I wasn't paying attention," she said.

But against her fifth and final opponent, Payne regained her concentration and skunked that opponent too.

The gold medal was Dorothy

Payne's - her third at the biennial USNSSC games. She had won golds in 1987 and 1991 and a silver in 1989.

Cheering Payne on were her Lincoln County teammates, bowlers Ann Burns and Fabian Valderrama, as well as Ann's husband Walt and Dorothy's friend Barbara Ward, all of Carrizozo.

Ann Burns was wearing a gold medal also, as top bowler for her age group in the U.S. at her first Senior Sports Classic. Valderrama bowled well but didn't medal.

Road to San Antonio

Athletic competition has always been a part of Dorothy's active life. A runner in elementary school in White Oaks, the Lincoln County native played basketball and ran track at Capitan High School.

As an adult, she bowls and plays golf, and even ran track at state and national senior games. She regularly walks six miles to visit her sister-in-law and bicycles to the grocery store.

But her first love has always been horseshoes.

"I've pitched since I was a kid, maybe 10 or 12. I lived on a ranch and every day after work my dad pitched with me and my brothers and sisters. We used regular horseshoes, too, not the tournament kind," she said.

As an adult, Dorothy's interest in horseshoes continued. She and her husband, Bud, joined the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association (NHPA), and played at sanctioned tournaments in different states.

They were instrumental in having 10 horseshoe pits constructed at the Carrizozo Country Club, and started a local NHPA affiliate, the Carrizozo Buzzard Ringers.

After 13 years of sanctioned

competition against opponents of all ages, champs Bud and Dorothy have amassed enough trophies, medals, ribbons and plaques to fill three rooms of their Carrizozo home. Dorothy points out a gold medal from World Games held in Utah in 1991.

"There were some tough women from Canada," she remembered.

But tough competition brings out the champion in Payne.

"She's always cool, no matter how tough it gets," said husband Bud, himself a state champion and world competitor.

Like many athletes, Dorothy carries lucky charms to every match. "It's my lucky horseshoe," she avowed.

"Here's my lucky jewelry," she added as she fingered tiny turquoise and silver horseshoe-shaped earrings, matching pendant and hat pin. "And my horseshoes are hot pink, my favorite color. Hot pink paint is hard to find, so nobody else pitches horseshoes that color!"

Last Don B. returns for Governor's Handicap

Ruidoso Downs racing fans will be treated to the long awaited appearance of multiple stakes winner Last Don B. when the 8-year-old returns to the mountain racing strip to carry the high weight in Saturday's \$10,000 Governor's Handicap.

Last Don B. was assigned 122 pounds among the nominees to the 7.5 furlong Governor's which will be the ninth of 10 live races on Saturday.

The Ruidoso Futurity Consolation, offering a total purse of \$68,535, shares top billing on Saturday's card. The day's first live race begins at 1:15 p.m. and will in-

clude a simulcast of the program from the Downs at Santa Fe.

Owned by Phoenix restaurateur Leonard Monti, Last Don B. arrived at Ruidoso Downs following the completion of another successful season at Turf Paradise, where he was voted 1994 Horse of the Year after winning the Phoenix Gold Cup and several other added money tests.

Trainer Lynda Tanner nursed the earner of \$328,607 through a series of foot problems during his 1995 winter-spring campaign in Phoenix.

Jockey Manny Ortiz, who had a successful season at Turf Paradise

also, has returned to ride Last Don B. in his first appearance at Ruidoso Downs since 1993. Although he was stabled here last year, a series of mishaps kept the popular runner out of the Ruidoso Downs starting gate in 1994.

A stiff challenge to Last Don B. can be expected from Misting Rain, a 7-year-old John Bagset trainee who won his first start of the Ruidoso season May 13 in 7.5 furlong allowance.

The well traveled Kentucky-bred also recorded a win at Sam Houston racetrack in May of 1994, and a another against \$40,000 claimers in

February of 1994 when he was haltered by his current owners.

As the ninth race Saturday, the Governor's Handicap will follow the Ruidoso Futurity Consolation.

Feet Down First and Topless Chick are the probable favorites for the 350-yard Futurity Consolation. The two fillies each qualified for the consolation with an 18,505 identical clocking in the Futurity Trials which were contested on opening day, May 12.

The 10 fastest Futurity qualifiers will be featured in the Ruidoso Futurity finals on Memorial Day.

Bonito Lake erosion improvements nearly done

Visitors to Bonito Lake will find it's an easier task to reach the shoreline now that new steps, retaining walls and other improvements have been completed.

Since 1993, Bonito Lake Area Manager Keith Kessler and Scot Chapman, who handles utility facility maintenance, have been designing improvements, overseeing construction and getting knee deep in dirt themselves.

Both men are employed by the City of Alamogordo, which manages West Lake Campground and Bonito Lake and owns the water rights. The lake is located about 15 miles northwest of Ruidoso.

Kessler showed two years of work to members of the South Central Recreation, Conservation and Development (RC&D) Council Tuesday. The council was one of the agencies that contributed money for the work.

"The goal was to put in stairs and retaining walls to stop soil erosion," Kessler said. "A secondary benefit was to provide safe access for the general public."

Using in-house labor, Kessler and Chapman were able to cut the cost of a gabion basket retaining wall by half, to about \$9,000. The wall is constructed of baskets that are wired together and filled with rocks. They provide fishing access for handicapped visitors who might otherwise find it difficult to navigate the uneven dirt shoreline.

Where once visitors used to tear up vegetation while they streamed down the hillside from the parking area to lake, steps encourage them to stay on designated pathways. Railroad ties function as erosion control devices and terraces.

Work started in 1993 when officials first obtained \$25,000 from the New Mexico Soil and Water Conservation Bureau.

"The award had been pushed hard by the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District," Kessler noted.

The city of Alamogordo matched that with \$25,000 and the South Central RC&D pitched in with \$11,250. Upper Hondo then added another \$25,000 of its own to the pot.

Over the two year period, the city budgeted \$75,000, funneling most toward the parking lot at the mouth of Kraut Canyon.

"Our long-range plan for the lake is to try to control public use through centralized parking with a trail system to different locations," Kessler said. "That's still another year down the line."

The city has marked \$25,000 in its 1995-96 budget for more stairs, "most around where the Bonito River enters (the lake) near Kraut Canyon," he said.

Doing as much work as possible in-house, buying the material and equipment, and closely monitoring contract labor has brought the projects to completion at bargain

prices, Kessler said. Jerry Lovelace Construction, Randy's Landscaping and Jack Ward Construction have worked on parts of the projects.

The job wasn't always simple. "It's difficult working on slopes and trying not to destroy stuff along the bank," Kessler said.



Who's to blame for Mikey's death?

TO THE EDITOR:

Who's to blame for Mikey's death?

His name was Mikey, at least that's what the kids called him. He wasn't much to look at, kind of dirty. And he wasn't very bright, but he was friendly, and giving of his time, and very patient with the kids.

No one knew where Mikey came from, he wasn't much of a talker. He just showed up one day to play, and kind of stayed. But he was his own man, and would leave for a time, not telling anyone where he went. On one of these excursions, on a Saturday night, Mikey went wandering, possibly looking for trouble, and he found it. Trouble was a porcupine. We knew Mikey wasn't very bright, had he been he wouldn't have tried to bite the quilly bully. What he got for his lapse in judgment was a mouth, throat, nose and snout full of porcupine quills. They were inside his mouth, in the roof of his mouth, in his tongue, completely through his lips, going in the outside, coming out the inside. They were in his gums, in his jowls, his nose, and in his neck from his ears to his chest.

Mikey came back, looking to the kids, and the people in the house for help. So they called the Lincoln County Humane Society/Shelter. They got a recording giving the hours of operation, and telling them to call the police department if it was important. They had gone through this process the day before, when Mikey was just alone, and had been told that the animal control officer was off and it wasn't important enough to call her out.

But, surely, this was different. Mikey was in so much pain, he was dehydrating, as he couldn't drink. So, the people called. The dispatcher told them again that the animal control officer was off; it wasn't an emergency, so there was nothing they (the police department) could do.

So, the people called me. Since my husband works for the police department, they thought I might know of something to do. I called, and talked to the same dispatcher, and was told the same thing. When I asked if one of the officers could come and get Mikey and get him some help, I was told that they couldn't transport animals in their police units.

We finally reached someone at the shelter, who said we could bring Mikey in if we could get him there within the next 15 minutes, but that they would put him in a cage and not do anything until Monday afternoon, which would have been more than 24 hours. We called a local veterinarian,

who was very kind about calling back and giving advice, and who would have met us at the office and taken care of Mikey. The charge just to come was \$30, sedation \$20, and as many quills as Mikey had would have been at least \$40, plus the antibiotics, wound cleaning and dressing, etc. That would have been at least \$100.

My friend and I both are barely getting by, so we discussed it, never dreaming that Mikey wouldn't be taken care of Monday, and decided to do what we could ourselves. I had some canine tranquilizer, topical anesthetic, and antibiotic cream; the doctor told me the proper dosage, so we tried. Mikey couldn't swallow the tranquilizer-pain killer, either in pill or liquid form. The topical anesthetic stung, made him crazy, and drove the quills in deeper. Mikey needed a shot which we couldn't give. So, we got the pliers and pulled, applying counter pressure as the doctor had instructed. We worked for hours. We extracted the quills in Mikey's neck, so he could finally rest his head on his paws and rest. We extracted at least 100, but when we got to the ones that were all the way through, it was just too painful for him. Up to that point, he never even whimpered, even when the blood was dripping down his face. So we stopped. Mikey carefully rested his head on his paws and slept.

Now it's Monday. Is the animal control officer coming to get Mikey, and get him some help? No! She has a prior commitment to a Special Olympics function. My friend took him to the shelter at about noon. There was someone there, but when she pounded on the door, they wouldn't come. She left him in one of the outside runs, feeling confident that at 1 p.m. he would receive treatment. When she called at 2 p.m., she was shocked to hear from the director that Mikey had been put down. The explanation was that the quills are poisonous, and had begun to affect Mikey, and he was old to begin with. This was truly a shock, as the doctor had told me that the only life-threatening aspect of the quills was the dogs' inability to eat and drink, or the possibility of infection at the quill site if left for days. But, otherwise, it would have still been a good outcome had they been removed on Monday.

But Mikey was old, and not purebred, and not handsome, and had no tags, so there was no money to be made for the village in citations to the owner.

I called the doctor again today, before writing this letter, to recheck the facts given to me before. Not one, but two veterinarians stated that the quills do not emit poison, that they've treated dogs who've had quills for three to four days,

with perfect outcomes. In their opinions, there was no reason to end Mikey's life.

Mikey was just an old, scruffy mutt. Nothing special. But his story is indicative of how people are changing, not only in this village, but everywhere. They can't be troubled, not only to go out of their way, but to even do what should be done within the scope of their job. Kindness, loyalty, friendliness, gentleness, and doing the right thing are lost on these people, be it on behalf of a scruffy old dog in pain, a child who has been abused, or people in general. It has become a world of "What's the easiest and best for me?"

I've only lived here for three years, and the change in the attitude of the officials, and many of the people here, is glaring. I was so impressed with the warmth and caring attitude that was prevalent when we first came here on the part of most everyone here, from neighbors to the shelter people, to the mayor and council. I've watched that attitude more and more become one of "what's it going to cost me to do what's right? If what's right isn't what I want, then, since it's within my power to do so, I'm going to do what I want, I don't care who it hurts." And I'm as guilty as everyone else in Mikey's story. I should've tried to scrape the money together somehow to take care of Mikey.

I only knew him for a short time, but he taught me something that I had forgotten. The next time something or someone needs my help, I hope that when I think I've done all that I can, and it isn't enough, I'll try harder.

But where do you go to try harder, when you've followed the correct procedure, and contacted the correct agencies, and they won't respond? What if it were a person, as it was in Philadelphia? Who do you have to be, what do you have to do, to get the correct response from the people whose job it is to respond?

Over the past year, I've seen many other cases of incompetency, injustice, and abuse of power, but because those qualities have been pervasive in the infrastructure, I felt I would be putting my husband's job in jeopardy. Though many times I wanted to speak out, I kept quiet. Being personally involved with Mikey's pain was the last straw. My apologies to my husband, who knows nothing of this letter.

parent household with my younger sister, we were always short of money and it took all my mother's ingenuity to keep the three of us sheltered and fed. This was in the 30s and 40s when no social or volunteer agencies existed to assist children who were essentially on their own for most of the day during summer school break. There was no money for vacations so my sister and I never knew what they were.

In the late 40s, when I was in my teens, my mom remarried and my new stepfather introduced us to the experience known as "taking a vacation." It developed that his brother and three sisters and their families were all in the habit of going from northern Oklahoma, where we all lived, to Red River, N.M. I immediately fell in love with the high country and could imagine no finer existence than living full time in such a magical place.

Life intervened and I went to college, entered the military service and served for 30 years before retiring. I kept my dream, however, of one day living in the high country; or at least having an arrangement whereby I could take off to the mountains whenever the mood struck me. While in college in El Paso and later with repetitive assignments to Fort Bliss, I discovered Ruidoso and rekindled my love affair with the high country. I know my five children feel I'm more than a little dotty on the subject as does my long-suffering wife but they humor me.

After retiring from the Army, I became an elementary school teacher and taught for a number of years in El Paso. During every break, I visited Ruidoso and ultimately bought a time share place. I retired from teaching last year and in April, 1995, I finally stretched the budget and rented a long-term place in Ruidoso where I can visit anytime I wish.

I am, of course, far removed in age from the teenager who first developed such a strong attachment to the mountains but, as I drive up from the lowlands, it is as though the years fall away and I feel young again.

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Twenty-two years after the Supreme Court's decision in Roe v. Wade, it's time America knew the truth about the pro-life position.

The Facts of Life.

Americans overwhelmingly elected openly pro-life candidates to Congress in November, proving that a pro-life position is not a political liability and, in fact, accurately reflects the strong will of the People.

The Clinton team thought America wanted abortion-on-demand, not tighter restrictions.⁷ They thought we wanted more access to abortion;⁸ not less. They thought we wanted taxpayer funding,⁹ not a call for personal responsibility. They thought we wanted new ways to abort;¹⁰ not a ban on RU-486. They thought we wanted to silence protesters;¹¹ not new informed-consent laws. They thought we wanted abortion for anyone.¹² They thought they knew what we wanted, but they were wrong.


Fact: *Americans recognize the convenient deception of pro-choice advocates.*

Abortion has been packaged by its supporters and the major media as a remedy for rape, incest and especially for pregnancies of poor teenage minority women without the means to support another child. But hard facts belie their noble pretension. Reality shows abortion's most frequent customer to be a white female (65%);¹³ over 19 years of age (78%)¹⁴ and unmarried (78%).¹⁵ Half have no other children.¹⁶ Abortions for health reasons? Only 3%.¹⁷ For rape and incest? Just 1%.¹⁸ The fact is, American law today allows abortion for *any* reason and for




U.S. House of Representatives




United States Senate

no reason. Only a very small percentage falls into the so-called "hard-case" categories that pro-abortion forces have used skillfully as a ploy to justify abortion-on-demand. Yet the American people have made it abundantly clear that they oppose unrestricted abortion.

Fact: *Pro-life means compassion.*

For years the pro-life movement has supported Crisis Pregnancy Centers (CPCs) which assist women, and their mates, in handling unintended pregnancies. These centers provide for the woman's emotional

Just imagine how many women they could help with the \$75 million in tax money the Clinton administration has pledged¹⁹ to Planned Parenthood International to promote abortion overseas over the next 5 years.

Fact: *Abortion hurts...and rhetoric just masks the pain of regret.*

Immediately after an abortion, many women report a feeling of relief...which is all abortionists want you to hear. What you won't hear of is the guilt and depression that frequently follow. A national poll found that at least 56% of women experience a sense of guilt over their decision, though the pollster himself acknowledged that many women will not even admit having had an abortion.²⁰ In fact, a five-year study shows that 25% of women who have had abortions sought out psychiatric care, versus just 3% of women who have not had abortions.²¹ Further, numerous studies reveal that women who have had an abortion experience a high incidence of depression, stress, low self-esteem, suicidal feelings and substance abuse.²² It goes without saying that we want to save babies from abortion. Let it be said we're helping save the mothers, too.

Fact: *You can help end abortion-on-demand in our lifetime.*

How? Deplore violence at abortion clinics. Deplore the violence of abortion itself. Work to promote abstinence-based sex education in your schools. Talk to your friends and neighbors. Find and support your local Crisis Pregnancy Center. Write your congressman. Don't let the media tell you something you know in your heart is wrong. Then don't give up until abortion is not a choice anyone really wants to make anymore.

Ruidoso tops list for fire protection in southwest, state forestry officials say

If fires break out across the Southwest, Ruidoso will be near the top of the list for commitment of firefighting equipment and manpower, according to state forestry officials.

The community is considered at great risk for a fire, because of the thick vegetation in and around the town, said Bill Duemling of the Forestry and Resources Conservation Division of the state Department of Energy, Minerals & Natural Resources Department. But it is the value of the property endangered by a fire that has the area ranked second in priority for commitment of resources, he said.

The first priority is around Pine Top on the Mogollon Rim in Arizona.

"From a natural resource management and protection standpoint, the trend is totally unacceptable. At West of the U.S. Forest Service said in a booklet about protecting a home from wildfire. "We see more and more of our wildland protection forces being pressed into structural protection at the expense of the natural resources. Our firefighting costs continue to climb because of the need for more equipment and personnel to save structures. Increasingly, fire commanders have to sacrifice control of a wildfire to defend buildings."

Local hot spots

Looking at potential hot spots in the Ruidoso area, Upper Canyon and the east side of Mechem Drive, especially north of Cochera Restaurant, are the prime candidates for a rip-roaring fire, Duemling said.

Houses built on slopes also are in areas of high exposure.

"Anywhere there is a slope of more than 10%, it's time to worry," Duemling said. "And Ruidoso has lots of areas where houses are built on slopes and become part of the natural fuel (for a fire). Fires love to run uphill and if the wind gets behind it..."

Duemling and officials with the U.S. Forest Service and other conservation-related agencies have been meeting with Lincoln County and local community officials to encourage an awareness of the fire danger and to suggest steps to decrease the exposure. The Lincoln National Forest surrounds the town of Ruidoso and several other communities are located in heavily wooded areas.

"We're also thinking about starting a program used years ago called Red Flag watches and warnings," Duemling said. "The Forest Service used to put out red flags on high wind days as a warning not to burn, even in a residential fireplace."

Other conditions that would result in flags being posted are dry lightning, periods of unusually low relative humidity, very dry and unstable air, very strong and shifting winds and the first lightning after an extremely dry period.

"Dry windy conditions have hampered the control of several recent wildland fires," Duemling said. "Although trees, brush and grasses are coming out of dormancy and greening up, fire danger still is high throughout the state. Substantial fine dead vegetation is available to burn, especially in forested areas."

Several fires in the Sacramento Mountains have occurred on north-facing slopes that usually are moist due to shading, and are less likely to burn than other areas, Duemling said.

Fire protection agencies get very concerned when the north-

facing slopes are burning this early in the fire season," he said.

Around the house

Property owners planning to build a home should factor wildfire protection into the house's location, design and building materials, Duemling said.

New installation of shake roofs is prohibited in Ruidoso since that material is considered the number one fire risk for homes.

State forestry agents will help landowners identify safe building sites or, after the fact, will advise on how to improve the defensible space around an existing home, Duemling said.

Defensible space can be created by removing or thinning heavy accumulations of trees and brush around a home, by cleaning forest litter and needles on or around structures, and by treating combustible building materials with fire retardant substances, he said.

The prime objective is to decrease the amount of fuel for a fire. That doesn't mean homeowners must live with a barren landscape, he said. Some plants are more fire resistant than others.

A safety zone or fire break around the house can be created by using fire resistant plants. The safety zone can consist of low grasses, border plantings, flowers and vegetables.

Low branches should be trimmed from trees to reduce the chance of fire leaping from ground cover into the trees, referred to as ladder fuel.

A minimum of 30 feet is needed for a true safety zone, but that should be increased to as much as 100 feet as the slope of the lot increases, he said.

Other advice offered by Duemling includes:

- remove all tree limbs for 15 feet around chimneys as well as dead branches overhanging the roof.

- remove accumulated leaves, needles and other dead vegetation.

- remove dead wood, and thin or remove older trees beyond the 100-foot defensible circles. However, homeowners should obtain a permit from the city building division before cutting down trees.

- cured grass should be kept well-trimmed around all structures. Weeds and other debris should be removed.

- sweep gutters, eaves and roofs on a regular basis. Keep enough garden hose available to reach all parts of the roof.

- stack firewood well away from a home or outbuildings.

- install smoke detectors.

- pinpoint ample safety exits in case of fire.

- enclose areas under the home or deck to prevent embers from

blowing under. All flammable items should be removed.

- install a fine metal screen over attic vents and louvers to prevent burning bits from entering the attic.

Ashes from fireplaces should be placed in a bucket, soaked with water and allowed to sit for 24 hours before being deposited in a cleared space or disposal container, Duemling said.

Local authorities should be contacted for clearance if a controlled burn is planned.

The great outdoors

Even when no fire restrictions are in effect, recreational users of forested areas should confine their fires to developed campsites or well-built campfire rings, with ample bare soil separating the fire from surrounding vegetation.

Other suggestions include:

- never leave a fire unattended.

- keep ample water near the fire to protect against escape.

- put the fire dead out, dousing it with water or smothering it with dirt without pine needles and twigs.

- if smoking in wildland areas, confine the activity to developed areas or a space clear of vegetation. Crush the cigarette out when finished.

- avoid parking your car in tall grass. Hot catalytic converters can ignite grass fires.

Area homeowners start four blazes burning lawn debris

Four times in the past week, the Ruidoso Fire Department was called to douse blazes set by summer homeowners.

The part-time residents were burning lawn debris, a practice forbidden by village ordinances. Fire officials warn the illegal practice is a serious threat to the community's safety during this dry spring season.

Village ordinances ban any form of open fires. The restriction includes campfires, fireworks and leaf burning.

"People are coming into town from places where they're allowed to burn needles and grass," said Assistant Fire Chief Robbie Hall. "But it's not allowed in Ruidoso."

Fire officials posted warnings of extreme fire danger last week and will keep the signs displayed until significant moisture arrives.

"That doesn't look like it will be anytime soon," said firefighter Thomas Chavez, who also serves as

the village code enforcement officer.

Chavez issued a \$50 citation to one of the lawn burners, Roswell resident Steve W. Lloyd, for the fire he set at his Church Road residence.

Greater fines up to \$500 can be issued, Chavez warned, and will be for the mishandling of fire anywhere in the village.

An open fire ban has also been issued in the Lincoln National Forest, the local Roswell District of the U.S. Bureau of Land Management, and on the Mescalero Apache Reservation through the Bureau of Indian Affairs until further notice. Violators of these bans may also be cited with fines as high as \$500 or six months in jail. Fireworks are also banned on these lands.

Just two weeks ago, an open campfire crackling in Grindstone Canyon spread beyond its ring and blazed out of control.

"It got away from some kids camping and burned their car plumb to a crisp," said Hall.

"Turned it into a little pile of metal."

Six village youths were responsible for the early morning fire, which also burned about 1/10th of an acre of land. They were cited and referred to juvenile authorities, Chavez said.

Fireworks caused another early May fire. Chavez said a small grass fire near the 200 block of Country Club Road was apparently started by a Roman candle. The colorful flares were fueled by the night's whipping winds, and the blaze was sparked. It was quickly contained by the fire brigade.

Hall explained that barbecue grilling is the only burning allowed outdoors in the village. Only barbecue grills are allowed in the designated grills, he said, and residents are asked to exercise extreme caution when using them.

Residents are also asked to dispose of ashes properly. Hall says ashes should be left in the grill to cool for a minimum of five to seven days before disposal.

Fire restrictions cover public, private lands in this county

The municipal fire danger warnings are tandem to those of the state forestry, U.S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Indian Affairs and National Park Service, which all imposed fire restrictions this month.

The BIA restrictions have been coordinated with the Mescalero Apache Tribe, says John Andrews of the state forestry.

Although some of these agencies' bans are worded differently, they all are intended to make people more aware of current fire danger and practice common sense.

"They're all basically saying, 'Hey, folks, it's really dry out there,'" explains Bill Rogge of the state forestry.

Campfires are banned unless they are lit in developed campgrounds with designated fire pits, or on unincorporated private land with the written permission of the property owner.

The state ban includes use of charcoal, coal or wood for cook-

ing outdoors on state or unincorporated private lands, except with the property owner's written permission. The federal forest, BLM and BIA ban allows these burning materials only in designated fire pits or grills at developed campgrounds.

Additionally, the Mescalero reservation fire restrictions ban refuse and lawn burning unless permission is obtained from the forestry office.

Level one restrictions also prohibit smokers from burning tobacco anywhere other than in a car with an ashtray on paved roads, or in designated areas.

On the federal forest, BLM and BIA lands, people can smoke where flammable materials have been cleared from a three-foot diameter space.

"This is basic stuff that people should be doing anyway," Rogge explained. "Be safe — that's basically what we're saying. People shouldn't be smoking in the forest without clearing away all the pine

needles anyway. People shouldn't flick cigarettes out the window of their car. If they do and a fire starts, they can be charged."

All the agencies allow stoves using petroleum, kerosene, gasoline or gas for cooking outdoors.

Violators of the federal fire restrictions are subject to a fine of not more than \$500 or imprisonment for not more than six months, or both.

Violators of the state forest and private land fire ban are held liable for the cost of the fire suppression. They are also charged with a petty misdemeanor.


These are part of the level one restrictions, Rogge said. If the drought continues, the agencies may enforce level two restrictions which ban all fires and outdoor cooking as well as the use of fireworks which the county allows on private land. Level three restricts access to certain land and forest areas.

Fireworks are never allowed in the forest.

State among top 10 relocation spots

Construction figures up and down

Ruidoso building permit applications rose in April, up 13.3% from April 1994.

The strongest figures came in the commercial arena, with five new permits issued in 1995 through April versus none in January-April 1994.

A total of 144 building permits for homes were issued this year through the end of April. Last year through April, 115 permits were issued.

However, the total value of the homes and businesses needing permits dropped 15.8% in April versus last year.

Business license applications

from the village were another positive sign, with 27 applications for new business licenses this April versus 16 in April 1994.

Commercial construction activity appeared strong in April, while residential activity was weak.

Village of Ruidoso figures indicate that building permits for single family home construction was down, from \$5,570,942 last April to \$4,758,212 this year, a drop of 14.59%.

Residential alterations and additions were down from \$917,679 last April to \$670,903 this April, a 26.89% drop.

Last April there was no new

commercial activity. This April, \$143,715 worth of construction was underway, mostly from improvements and expansion of a go cart track at 1700 Mechem.

Total building permit value figures were \$6,666,743 last April versus \$5,613,238 this April.

The Village of Ruidoso Downs had 12 building permits issued during April, with a total construction value of \$164,581, an increase of 4.84% over last April's figure of \$7,966.

Three new business licenses were applied for in Ruidoso Downs this April. Numbers were not available for last April.

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


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BIA reorganization follows long, complicated road

The Mescalero Apache Tribe and other Indian nations should play a broader role in managing their reservations under proposed restructuring of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, federal officials say. Toward that goal, U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici (R-New Mexico) is co-sponsoring legislation he says will help resolve some of the continuing problems at the BIA. The Bureau of Indian Affairs Reorganization Act of 1995 is based on recommendations from a joint task force created four years ago by the secretary of the interior to develop a reorganization plan.

The task force, called the Joint Tribal/BIA/Department of Interior (DOI) Advisory Task Force on the Reorganization of the BIA, is co-chaired by Wendell Chino, president of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, and Dr. Eddie Brown, former assistant secretary of Indian affairs at the Department of Interior.

"I align myself with those who view the BIA as a detriment rather than a benefit to Indian people," Domenici said. "We have a special trust relationship with Indians in America, but far too often this trust has been neglected by a cumbersome bureaucracy."

On May 18, Domenici attended the Senate Indian Affairs Committee's first hearing to collect testimony on the task force's recommendations. Chino and Brown testified at the hearing. The recommendations fall into four general categories: organizational reform, regulatory reform, education reform and budget reform.

Just how the agency will be revamped has been debated for more than four years. Two months ago, U.S. Secretary

of Interior Bruce Babbitt, who has jurisdiction over the BIA, told agency officials to drop the plan they were working on because it has failed to win support from tribal representatives. Babbitt ordered the BIA to instead work out a plan with U.S. Sen. John McCain (R-Arizona) and his Senate Committee on Indian Affairs.

The Clinton administration lent its endorsement to suggestions by Indian leaders to accelerate the transfer of some of the agency's governing authority to tribes.

McCain has promised to deliver tribal self-determination and self-governance in line with recommendations from an Indian-based task force. He pledged to accomplish that goal within one year.

The BIA has been ordered by three different groups to decentralize, reduce staff and place more control in the hands of tribes. Those groups include the U.S. Congress, President Clinton's National Performance Review program, and the joint task force.

Decentralize theme

The theme of recommendations issued by the task force focused on decentralizing the agency and bringing control down to the tribal level.

"The bureau has committed to implementing the task force's recommendations," said Diane Maybee, of the National Performance Review (NPR) project team for the BIA. "At the present time, we have agreed to all but six of the recommendations with the promise to re-examine those six previously rejected."

"The most important of the six was the recommendation to allow tribes to design their own area offices. We initially disagreed with that, because we were faced with the national performance review (NPR) mandated reduction."

Vice president Al Gore headed up the NPR, which examined all federal agencies and made specific recommendations for reductions. That took six months.

"As a result of that, several executive orders came out for the reduction of the federal work force," Maybee said. "All agencies were mandated to make specific reductions in certain targeted areas."

The Chino-led task force did not pay attention to the performance review report in coming up with its recommendations, however, Maybee said.

"They felt they had a congressional mandate to do their thing and didn't have to pay attention to the NPR," she said. "In the middle was the BIA, with the directive coming from their boss, the department and the Office of Management and Budget. So we had to come up with a streamlining plan that would satisfy both the NPR and the task force recommendations."

Now those plans may be scrapped for a new version from McCain's group in conjunction with Domenici's legislation based on 44 recommendations from the task force, which has met 22 times in the past four years.

Before Babbitt's directive, both the BIA and tribes agreed with the task force recommendation to consolidate administration at the support center in Albuquerque.

The task force recommended a 38% reduction in central Washington D.C. office personnel. About 185 jobs could be eliminated as a result of the transfers, with the savings given to tribal programs.

At 11 meetings conducted with Indian groups to develop proposals on how to meet both NPR and congressional mandates, "The tribes resoundingly rejected any of the options we developed that were not in sync with the task force recommendations," Maybee said.

Moratorium requested

To buy more time to work out some alternatives with the tribes, Babbitt agreed to ask Gore for a one-year moratorium on meeting the NPR mandates, Maybee said. And now he has turned to McCain for help. McCain's home state has 21 tribes.

McCain has promised to pull together bipartisan, congressional backing, tribal goals and input from the Interior Department.

He blamed the inadequacy of BIA supervision for a legacy of poverty, ill health, alcoholism, unemployment and hopelessness among Indian families.

The BIA was created in 1824 as an arm of the former War Department. Transferred under the Interior Department in 1949, it has been responsible for managing the trust funds and social and education programs for the federal government, programs provided to Indian groups as compensation for past injustices.

But little of the agency's annual \$2 billion budget ends up at the tribal level, because of its top-heavy administration, McCain contends. Serving 2 million people, the BIA employs more than 13,000 people, or one worker for every 160 Native Americans under federal jurisdiction.

Sloppy accounting also has been criticized. A 1994 General Accounting Office report said the federal government has spent \$16 million in the past five years trying to reconcile Indian trust accounts that total about \$2.3 billion.

Mann has said it's time to give authority directly to the tribes to redesign the bureau.

To date, 29 of the 550 federally recognized tribes have signed "self-governance" agreements with the BIA, and 11 others are negotiating with the agency.

"For some reason or another, this great country, in times of international emergencies, likes to play the part of super social service agency. Take the countries in Africa - population out of control and many children exposed to suffering. Our country responds without hesitation. But when tribal leaders try to present the needs of Indian people, the United States does not look at our people with the same sensitivity. Instead, the United States thinks Indians ought to continue to be victims of further budget cuts. This is wrong. This is an injustice that we need to face up to and challenge. If it is not too difficult to take care of a people who have created their own problems, then there should be dollars to take care of Indian people who have given up vast portions of their land to make this great country what it is today."

Key task force ideas

Some of the key recommendations submitted by the advisory task force for the reorganization of the Bureau of Indian Affairs are:

- Decentralize authority to the tribe/agency level. Develop specific plan to reduce central office operations by 50%.
- Each area to develop its own restructuring plans with tribal involvement.
- Create new Office of Economic Development.
- Redistribute resources as a result of central office decentralization.
- Restructure area offices, allowing tribes to design them to fit their needs.
- Implement a new process for rulemaking. Change the existing procedure for reviewing and publishing directives.
- Decentralize educational programs and administration to tribe/school level.
- Reformat the budget to increase tribal control. Provide increased tribal budget flexibility. Make sure tribes are given a copy of the entire budget.
- Create \$7.5 million Indian Self-Determination Fund.
- Require continued oversight by tribal governments to ensure implementation of task force recommendations.

BIA task force recommends local control

If recommendations submitted by a special reorganization task force are followed, Native American tribes will be able to design Bureau of Indian Affairs services delivered on their reservations and pueblos.

The task force's report was submitted two months ago to congressional committees on appropriations and to the New Mexico congressional delegation, according to Bennie Teba, economic development specialist for the Santa Clara Pueblo. Teba served on the Joint Tribal/BIA/Department of Interior (DOI) Advisory Task Force on the Reorganization of the BIA.

Mescalero Apache President Wendell Chino, who co-chaired the task force, declined to comment on the reorganization and what it may mean for the Mescalero reservation next to Ruidoso.

If implemented, the task force's recommendations will have local impact through additional resources, Teba said.

Some of the money will come from savings realized when the cen-

tral office in Washington D.C. is streamlined and functions are consolidated, Teba said. The Albuquerque office would be changed from line management to technical assistance. More authority would be passed to the tribal level.

Each tribe, band or pueblo submitted their own plans, based on their individual needs, Teba said. They want to be able to reduce some services and increase others to stay within the overall dollars available.

Local plans may change under Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt's new directive to work with U.S. Sen. John McCain (R-Arizona), although tribes have resisted any proposals that were not in line with recommendations from the restructuring task force, according to BIA officials.

On the Mescalero reservation in Otero County bordering Ruidoso, the BIA employs about 79 permanent staff members and has 50 temporary employees. They work in more than 10 departments, ranging from social service to law enforcement.

No details of where local money would be concentrated or cut back were available from the Albuquerque office of the BIA.

Representatives of the BIA at Mescalero did not return numerous phone calls from *The Ruidoso News*.

The task force was created by Congress and appointed in 1990 by the secretary of the interior after tribes criticized the DOI for start-

ing to reorganize the BIA without consulting with Indian tribes:

To ensure the task force's efforts were tribally driven, yet also a partnership with the department, 36 of the 43 members were Native Americans, five were BIA employees and two were DOI employees. The group met for the first time in January 1991 and completed 22 sessions before issuing recommendations in December 1994.

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The life and times of Judge Mike Line

Ruidoso judge Mike Line has been familiar with the law for many years, but his biggest trial came outside of the courtroom.

Last October, Line discovered a lump in his breast while taking a shower. The lump was discovered to be cancer, which has since been treated with both surgery and chemotherapy.

"The prognosis is excellent," Line said. "The doctors said I was a rare bird because I found it in the shower — but most men just ignore it."

Doctors told Line that one out of 100 men get breast cancer and because they don't seek treatment, the disease moves into other areas of the body.

"It's been an enlightening experience for me," he said. "It's good to know that they caught it in time."

Line did curtail some of his many activities during treatment, but now is back to his normal busy schedule as lawyer, municipal judge, school instructor and active school supporter.

Line's career began in his hometown of Snyder, Texas. After graduating from the University of Texas at Austin and Texas Tech Law School, he opened a private practice and served as a county attorney, municipal judge, and city attorney in the town, located 90 miles south of Lubbock. He also taught law courses at the junior college in Snyder.

Line now teaches a two-year paralegal studies course and college level business and business law courses under the auspices of Eastern New Mexico University at Ruidoso.

When Ruidoso State Bank needed an in-house lawyer in 1988, Line applied for and got the job. Within 90 days, he became bank president and became involved with community activities.

Line was a member of the now-defunct Economic Development Corporation (funded by Lincoln County and Ruidoso) and worked with the organization for three years. He also was president of the MainStreet organization when plans and funding were being assimilated for the downtown renovation project. Line said now that the project is nearly finished, he is happy with the results.

"You've got to break some eggs to get results sometimes," Line said. "Many people downtown were set in their ways, but now that the project is finished and I see shops open at night with more and more people, I think things are coming around."

After a two-year stint as bank president, Line decided to return to his law practice. He worked with attorney John Underwood for three years before being elected municipal judge in March of 1994.

Line's jurisdiction as a municipal judge covers first offense DWI cases and petty misdemeanors

including shoplifting, domestic violence, assault and battery, disorderly conduct, possession of marijuana under two ounces, and interference with an officer.

"We get some fairly gritty offenses when you get down to some of the DWI and domestic violence cases," Line said. "But the offenses have to happen within the Village of Ruidoso city limits."

With three children in the Ruidoso school system, both Line and his wife Karan are deeply involved in local school activities. He was recently presented the *Friend of Ruidoso Schools* award by the Ruidoso school board.

The Line family was given the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce Family of the Year award at the chamber's fundraising barbeque May 20. Chamber members select the Family of the Year by ballot.

Line and his wife started the cheerleading program at Ruidoso High School several years ago.

"We took the kids to the national finals in Dallas two years in a row," Line said. "The last time they placed 24th out of more than 180 teams nationally and last year, they won the state cheerleading competition."

Line's daughter Robin was awarded a cheerleading scholarship at New Mexico Jr. College in Hobbs, where she is a member of the Thunder Cheer Squad.

Football is another of Line's passions.

"The first year I went to college I played football for Abilene Christian College," Line said. "The year after I left they won the national championship."

Line laughed as he described his chagrin at having left the team before its victory.

"I wish I'd have stayed, but I heard the lure of the big city of Austin and couldn't resist leaving," he explained.

Because of his previous football experience, Line has been deeply involved in the high school football program, providing watermelon feeds, steak dinners and getting t-shirts for the team.

Because he is a municipal judge, Line often sees problem areas with young offenders, so he has started a youth court at the middle school as a deterrent to juvenile crime. The youth court started in September and more than 30 kids are involved, he said.

By going to the middle school and working with seventh and eighth graders, youth court allows students to really see how the court process works, Line said. The students are their own judge and juries in the program, which doesn't deal with juvenile violations but rather violations of school rules.

"I think there's a lot of work to do at the middle school," Line said. "That's where the rubber meets the road."

"Kids now are hardened by the

time they are 9th or 10th grade," he said. "They're tough, they've seen it all and heard it all, but they are still a little bit pliable when they're in 7th and 8th grade."

Youth court is a productive way for middle school students to see how the court process works, Line said.

"The benefit of youth court is that the students get to judge one another," Line said.

Three mock trials were completed as practice and the program was ready to go when Line's cancer was discovered and the youth court was put on hold. Line said that since he is better, youth court should resume during the next school year.

Line also serves on the Blue Ribbon Committee, a group of volunteers who work with the school board to help solicit support for special needs in the schools. He is active in the YES/Drug-Free Schools program.

Yet another of Line's activities is

serving as chairman for the Southeastern New Mexico Juvenile Task Force, created by the legislature to help prevent juvenile delinquency and establish halfway houses and other facilities for juvenile cases, Dona Ana, Otero, and Lincoln counties have joined together to form the southeastern region of the task force.

"We've built eight prisons in the state since the original one in Santa Fe," Line said. "We are still using only the original juvenile facility and the state is trying to rectify that with the task force."

Line may have to sentence people to jail time in his work as municipal attorney, but the job has a fun side, too.

"My favorite thing right now is doing marriages," he said. "I've done a lot of weddings."

It's a good thing Line is feeling better now, because with his busy schedule and community involvement, he doesn't have time to be sick.

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

In Search of Tradition, Culture, and Inevitable Change

Song Journey is a personal exploration of an enduring Native American tradition: the pow wow. The program follows the pow wow trail from Tulsa to Saskatchewan in search of a deeper understanding of Native traditions and culture — and how traditions change and adapt through time.

Each year, from May through September, thousands of Native dancers, singers, families, friends, and onlookers celebrate culture, tradition, and community at pow wows all over the United States and Canada. From Arizona to Florida, from Washington to Canada, the pow wow trail winds through almost every North American Native community. Some pow wows are small local gatherings, while others (known as contest pow wows) offer monetary prizes and national recognition for the best dancers and singers, as well as opportunities for many to see artists with international reputations perform.

Traditionally, women sing standing behind the men at the drum, but Song Journey reveals changes in some pow-wow protocol as some women choose to expand their traditional roles.

The pow wow combines the past, the present, and the future as we see children and elders dancing to the same beat. Song Journey celebrates tradition, but even more important, it recognizes that tradition is a thriving, living, and changing thing that has an everlasting life all its own.

POOP SCOOP

Although southern New Mexico's climate is considered dry by most standards, when the rainy season begins, pesky mosquitoes may be close behind.

The mosquitoes may carry heartworms that can be transmitted to canine pets with one sip of blood.

Jim Riggins, manager of the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter, said now is the time to have your veterinarian test your dog and start prevention treatment.

When the mosquito tries to feed, it expels heartworm larva into the host animal. The heartworms affix themselves to the lining of the heart where over the next several months, they grow to maturity. That's when health problems begin.

Heartworms deprive dogs of their energy, ambition and often their lives. Even the most successful cure is distressing to live through and often leaves a dog permanently weakened.

Tests are needed, because animals already infected with adult heartworms could die or be seriously impaired by the medication.

Heartworm prevention is easier than it was a few years ago when a large tablet had to be ingested every day without fail. Now a once-a-month treatment costing between \$10-\$30,

depending on the size of the animal, is available.

Although an owner may treat an animal May through October, that seasonal approach requires retesting before starting each course of treatment. When dogs are on the medication year around, they only have to be tested once every three years.

The new test, which measures the animals' resistance to the infection, also is more expensive than the previous test, which simply detected the organisms in the bloodstream.

Thriftshop closed

Just a reminder that the humane society thrift shop is closed, because the building was sold by the owners.

Be sure to hold onto lightly used items for the annual garage sale that benefits the spay and neuter fund at the shelter. The sale is staged in mid-August at *The Ruidoso News*. Items are accepted during the two weeks before the sale.
