Open campfire restrictions lifted

The Lincoln National Forest and state forestry division have both dropped their open fire bans in southeast New Mexico. Officials are still warning campers that some areas of the forest remain dry. They urge people to use caution when they choose locations for campfires.

Assistant Fire Chief Robby Hall said a small grass fire occurred in the Gavilan Canyon area around 4 p.m. Sunday, and another tiny one occurred around 9 p.m. in the Grindstone Canyon area. Following the Grindstone call, firefighters were alerted to possible flames from fireworks on 3rd Street but there was no fire at the scene, Hall said.

Burglars steal from vacation home


An El Paso couple returning to their Ruidoso vacation home Monday morning found it burglarized of approximately \$2,350 worth of items, police said. Missing belongings at the Singing Pines Road house included a \$1,000 antique washing machine, a \$500 RCA television, a \$150 roaster oven, a \$200 electric grill and a \$50 blender. The couple was last at their Ruidoso home June 1.

Teenage runaway found next day

A 15-year-old Ruidoso girl who reportedly ran away from home Friday night was found by her mother in the Midtown area Saturday night.

Police said the girl's mother reported her missing a little after midnight when she failed to come home. She learned the next day that her daughter had been at a Gavilan Canyon Road house, where she drank vodka and passed out naked on the floor, police said.

The mother found her at approximately 8 p.m. the next day near the creek behind Casey's Cabins, police said, and took her into the police station to have officers talk to her. The girl refused to say who supplied her with alcohol.

Merchants welcome holiday

Merchants in Ruidoso have received a welcome infusion of tourist dollars during the past week.

"We've had lots of people from all over the country," said Wayne Morgan, who owns The Ruidoso Store in Midtown. "We had good holiday traffic and I'm happy." The July Fourth holiday week is one of Ruidoso's busiest tourist weeks of the year. Village officials experience the highest water usage during this time period.

Mexico's peso devaluation has had a negative impact on the area economy, Morgan said, but other factors may be offsetting the loss. "There's no doubt that the Mexican National customers are not spending like they used to," he observed. "The Mexican National numbers and dollars are down, but it's being made up by folks from other parts of the country who are discovering Ruidoso."

Furr's Supermarket on Mechem Drive had a busy holiday weekend too, said store manager Greg Stewart.

"Business was fantastic," he said. "We're doing just great and we're way up over last year." A law allowing Sunday liquor sales as of July 1 may have boosted sales figures, but it's too early to know, Stewart said.

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce figures show a steady increase in visitor inquiries. "We've had a tremendous response this month," chamber official Wanda Griffice said. "The July Fourth weekend is usually the second biggest weekend, with Labor Day being the first because of the All American Futurity."

The chamber houses the local visitor center, and it answers telephone and mail inquiries. During the Fourth of July weekend, the chamber office had 619 walk-ins and 259 phone calls, Griffice said.

In June, the chamber fielded 4,569 phone calls and 2,963 walk-ins, a 21% increase compared with 2,357 walk-ins and 3,889 phone calls in June 1994.

Local gambling operations gave mixed reviews: while Casino Apache officials say they're doing well, those at Ruidoso Downs Race Track say they're hurting.

Casino Apache on the Mescalero Indian Reservation experienced a strong influx of people during the holiday weekend, casino assistant manager Elgin Toclanny said.

"The casino was packed," he said. "We had a couple of big winners also, one for \$227,000 on Monday and another for \$38,861 on Sunday, so there was a lot of excitement."

Ruidoso Downs Race Track figures show a total attendance of 12,871 July 2-4.

The combined three-day handle (total monies bet) was \$13,312,90. "We were down 25.6% in attendance from last year," track manager Scott Wells said. "And the handle was down 33%."

"The casino (at Mescalero) is killing us." While July Fourth is a good time of year for merchants, some say this year is not doing well as a Please see Shops, page 3A

Coloradan hits jackpot at Casino Apache

Bells on a Quarter Mania slot machine rang wild at Casino Apache Monday afternoon when Susie Ingram hit it big. The Colorado Springs woman won \$227,136.81 after her 10th quarter pulled up four matching reels on the machine at the Inn of the Mountain Gods on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

"I can't stop laughing about it," said Ingram, a self-described nickel and dime gambler. "It's so unbelievable." The jackpot money will be used for the college education of her two children, Ingram said. Jeff, 15, wants to be an archaeologist, and Sara, 11, is a gymnast and hopes to work with animals.

Annual checks of approximately \$11,000 will be paid to Ingram for the next 20 years, casino manager Eljin Toclanny said.

Ingram's win is the largest yet at the five-year-old casino, Toclanny said. Ironically, the second-biggest win came the day before, when a Texas woman won

\$38,861 from one of the casino's 450 slot machines.

Ingram, who has been spending vacations at her family's Lupine Loop house since she was a little girl in Midland, Texas, came into town Saturday for a four-day stay. She had been out at the casino for about 45 minutes and was down about \$30 when luck rang in the reels.

"I was just sitting in the chair by the machine with the siren going off and with a smile like an idiot," she recalled.

Within seconds, casino officials came by to check out the commotion as a crowd of strangers surrounded the lucky woman. Ingram asked someone to find her mother, who was absorbed with the lever pulls at a different machine that had swallowed a bunch of her coins.

Once located and told the news, Ingram's mother, Turla Leath, thought it was a joke. But then she started to cry.

"She gets emotional about money," Ingram jested.

Ingram's husband offered a more

tempered response, saying "good job, babe" via telephone from rainy Washington. He works for the Olympic Committee.

About the same time the slots assured her future college education, 11-year-old Sara was bemoaning the theft of \$13 from her back-

pack at the Ruidoso swimming pool.

"I told her not to worry about it because I had great news," Ingram related.

Sara saw the wide grin on her mother's face, and guessed, "You won big, didn't you!"

Companies deny signing up for nuclear storage project

A news release last month overstated the number of power companies that signed up for a nuclear waste storage project with the Mescalero Apache Tribe.

At least six utilities on the list of 23 provided by the Mescalero and Northern States Power contend they have not signed on as partners in the venture, and they don't plan to join the project at this time.

Scott Northard, storage project director for Northern States, said Thursday that the inaccurate list stemmed from a misunderstanding of some of the verbal commitments.

In May, Northern set a deadline to sign up for the storage project,

then twice pushed it back. After the third deadline on May 19, it took Northern more than a month to release the inaccurate list.

"The numbers will continue to fluctuate," Northard said. "However, the consortium has the number of utilities they need and a solid core of support."

"We did have verbal commitments from some utilities and we thought we had a final list. Some have reconsidered and we are trying to redo the list so that it is final. Some other utilities are interested in participating that weren't on the list and will be added."

Mona Grimsley of Wolf Creek Nuclear Operating Corp. in Wolf Creek, Kan., said her company sent

a letter last month to Northern States clearly stating it would not participate, but the letter apparently was ignored.

Northern States, based in Minneapolis, Minn., is the lead utility in a consortium dealing with the Mescalero.

"We have a call into Northern States now," Grimsley said Wednesday. "Wolf Creek doesn't have an urgent need for storage."

Wolf Creek estimates it has enough storage space to last until the year 2010. Legislation pending in the House of the U.S. Congress that would allocate money for federal interim storage plants "would do the trick for us," Grimsley said. "If that doesn't proceed, we'd proba-

bly be more interested. And we certainly support those utilities who are moving forward."

Susan Gallagher of Union Electric Co. in Fulton, Mo., said Northern States officials apparently incorrectly took a verbal statement of support by a Union vice president as a commitment.

"The fact we ended up on the list was an error," she said. "The timing is not appropriate for us. We will not need storage until 2004 or beyond."

The Union nuclear plant is 10 years old and "like all utilities, we're trying to do cost crunching. We had to back out of financial support. The names on that list either are equity partners or financially

supporting the project in some way."

Neil McDermatt of PECO Energy Co. in Philadelphia said his company is no longer an equity partner. The company dropped out of the project for economic reasons, he said.

Richard Gallagher of Northeast Utilities in Berlin, Conn., said although the company participated in the early investigative stage of the Mescalero project, it no longer is involved.

Kelly Smith of Yankee Atomic Energy Company, a closed nuclear plant on the road to being decommissioned, said that company has no financial or contractual obligation to the Mescalero project, al-

though company officials feel it is a logical option if the Department of Energy doesn't build an interim storage plant elsewhere.

Ray Golden with Florida Power & Light in Sarasota said his company was never a player in the project.

Northard contended in an interview last month that the number of utilities signing on is not important. It's the amount of spent nuclear fuel ready to be stored on the Mescalero reservation that determines the bottom line for financial feasibility, he said.

Northern States wants to see a guarantee of 20,000 metric tons, he said. Fuel could begin arriving by the year 2002.

Lincoln County Commissioners stop payment on check for sheriff's attorney

Taxpayers shouldn't foot the bill for Sheriff James McSwane to consult a private attorney every time he and the county commission disagree, Commission Chairman Monroy Montes contends.

He wants to see McSwane personally pay a \$900 attorney bill. The sheriff used the attorney when he was trying to persuade commissioners to let him keep his narcotics investigation unit for the 1995-96 budget year. It was partially funded by grants.

The bill was submitted by McSwane to the county office for payment. He proposed taking money from a line item for professional services in the sheriff's budget.

When Commissioner Bill Schwettmann signed the check authorization this week, criticism rolled in from Montes and Commissioner Wilton Howell. County

Manager Carol Cooney was out of town, Schwettmann said, but she had approved the check.

Until commissioners have a chance to hash out their different views on the subject, the check has been put on hold. Howell said he may call for an attorney general's opinion.

All five commissioners have criticized McSwane for hiring a private attorney to represent him in the disagreement over the future of the narcotics investigation unit. They said the county attorney is on the county's payroll to offer legal advice to all county officials.

"If every elected official in Lincoln County was able to hire their own attorney, it would bankrupt us," Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said Wednesday.

But opinions differ on whether McSwane was directed to pay for the bill himself or take it out of his office's budget.

"I left the meeting with the impression that it was not to be paid

out of the county line item for attorney fees," said Cooney. "It was brought up in the meeting to be paid out of the sheriff's budget."

"When Schwettmann signed the check, he pulled it to just make sure all (commissioners) were on the same wave length at that (May) meeting," Cooney said. "Apparently, they were not."

In reviewing the tapes of the special meeting between the sheriff and the commission last May, Howell was the first person to bring up the possibility of payment out of sheriff's budget, she said. But as the discussion progressed, different options were mentioned and no vote was taken concerning a definite direction, she said.

"I know Monroy didn't want it paid out of anywhere (from county money)," she said. (Commissioner Stirling Spencer) said he didn't think the county should pay for it and it should come out of the

sheriff's budget and if the sheriff had to cut some service, he would have to answer to the taxpayers."

Howell said he agrees with Montes.

"I think it's a misappropriation of funds," Howell said. Schwettmann "had no authority to sign it. It was the consensus of the commissioners that the county was not going to pay."

"County taxpayers' money is the county taxpayers' money, whether it's the road department or the sheriff's department. There was no authorization that it be paid out of county funds, period."

McSwane said he recalls commissioners telling him to pay the bill, and he took that to mean out of his budget.

"What I understood the majority of them were saying was, it would come out of my budget, and it did," he said. "They gave me a budget to operate on and I'm doing it."

Texan fined for stealing tree in Lincoln Forest

An El Paso man camping with a church group in the Lincoln National Forest learned firsthand over the weekend that violating commandments can be an expensive proposition.

Ismael Gutierrez, 44, was

charged Sunday with removing or transporting wooded material without permission.

Hoot Murray, enforcement officer with the U.S. Forest Service, said Gutierrez pleaded no contest to the charge and forfeited a \$200 bond so he would not have to return to Lincoln County for a court appearance.

The statutory bond for the of-

fense is \$500, but after hearing the circumstances, Magistrate Judge William Butts lowered it to \$200, Murray said.

An off-duty El Paso police officer saw Gutierrez loading a three-foot high Douglas fir in the back of a truck at South Fork Campground. The officer reported what he saw to the campground host, who called the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.

Deputy Orlando Luna was dispatched to back up Murray.

"He (Gutierrez) was very cooperative, although at first he said he was climbing, grabbed the tree and pulled it out of the ground," Murray said. "It had a pretty good root system."

"His wife later said to me, 'I hope this teaches him a lesson. I told him not to steal the tree.'"

Fireworks dazzle July 4 crowd

Applause and squeals of delight could be heard in between the sounds of the rockets' red glare and the bombs bursting in air Tuesday near Ruidoso's airport.

Downs man sentenced in plea bargain over girlfriend's assault

A Ruidoso Downs man, charged with putting a rifle to his girlfriend's head June 21 and threatening to kill her, was sentenced Friday to a month in jail and 1.5 years of probation.

Just prior to the defendant's court appearance, the victim of Joaquin Avalos sought to drop the aggravated assault and negligent use of a firearm charges against him.

But Assistant District Attorney Viola Rhodes refused. She explained to the court that it is com-

mon for domestic violence victims to back down from their accusations by the time a case gets to court.

Rhodes did accept a plea agreement with public defender Noel Orquiza, however. The felony aggravated assault charge was reduced to the misdemeanor charge of attempted aggravated assault. The attorneys recommended a year of probation.

Avalos, 44, who is the father of his victim's daughter, pleaded no

contest to the charges.

Magistrate Judge William Butts sentenced Avalos to the recommended probation, but added 30 days in jail to the penalty. Butts then credited Avalos for the 10 days he has already spent behind bars.

Butts also sentenced Avalos to 180 days of probation for the negligent use of a firearm charge.

The judge noted that Avalos has been in his court before on domestic violence charges.

Vandals harass man charged with illegal killing of bull elk in Ruidoso

Vandals apparently dumped bags of garbage on Jeff Morgan's lawn early Tuesday morning, Ruidoso police said. Morgan is charged with illegally shooting and killing a bull elk in his yard.

The same morning, after he and his wife left the Winner's Circle bar in downtown Ruidoso, Morgan told police he encountered a woman scrawling "Elk Killer" in the dusty rear window of his 1986 Blazer. Scratches were also found on the car's hood, police said, and the driver's door was spayed with urine.

Morgan identified a suspect for the car defacement, but is clueless

about who dumped the trash in his yard. Police are investigating.

The garbage appears to have been gathered from various dumpsters around town, police said.

Morgan is due to undergo a magistrate court jury trial on Tuesday, July 18 for the alleged unlawful killing of an elk with a .22 caliber rifle April 28.

The elk had been munching on plants outside his Santa Anita Drive home when Morgan said he tried to scare him away with gunfire. The five to eight-year-old bull was found dead in Morgan's yard the following morning with a fatal gunshot wound.

Morgan, who is being defended

by Noel Orquiza of Alamogordo, will also answer to a petty misdemeanor charge for discharging a firearm within city limits during the alleged early-morning shooting.

Morgan asked the court last month for a jury trial on the misdemeanor charges.

Magistrate Judge William Butts will preside over the trial. Butts said jury selection will begin around 9 a.m. on July 18. Six jurors and one alternate will be selected. The trial will immediately follow, and should be completed by 5 p.m., Butts estimated.

If found guilty of both charges, Morgan could face a maximum penalty of one year in jail and/or a \$1,500 fine.

Ross blames Midtown skateboarders for part of his business woes.

"I really believe we've had some negative impact from these skateboarders being on the street,"

Ross said. "There's been a lot of people who have expressed their unhappiness with practically being run down by them."

Losing much of the Mexican National business has also given Ross cause for concern.

"The peso devaluation hurt us terribly, especially during January,

February and March," he said. "During those months, business was off as much as 50% during the week but people from Lubbock, El Paso and other regions bailed us out during the weekends."

This year, business started picking up on Memorial Day weekend, Ross said.

Gliding Bunny wins Rainbow Derby

Overwhelming favorite Gliding Bunny gave owner Richard Parrish his second stakes win of the holiday weekend at Ruidoso Downs Race Track Monday.

Gliding Bunny overcame a slow start to overtake Ligation in the final stages of the Grade I \$132,648 Rainbow Derby and win the prestigious race by a neck.

Gliding Bunny was sent off as the 4-5 favorite in the field of 10 three-year-olds after posting the fastest qualifying time in the June 16 trials. In Monday's race, Gliding Bunny broke awkwardly from the 10 post and trailed early leader Ligation in the early stages of the 440-yard dash. Approaching the grandstand, Gliding Bunny pulled even with Ligation under strong urging from jockey Jacky Martin, then edged away at the wire. The time was :21.94 over a fast track.

The victory gave owner Parrish a rare stakes double as he also captured Saturday's Jockey Club Handicap with the thoroughbred Son of Sol.

"This has been a great weekend for us," admitted Parrish, who has nearly 80 thoroughbred and quarter horses at his Meadow, Texas farm 30 miles south of Lubbock, where he also grows cotton. On Friday of this week, he also qualified his two-year-old thoroughbred Full Connection for the Rio Grande Futurity.

"This is only the second Grade I stakes we've ever won, so we're really thrilled," continued Parrish. "Gliding Bunny is the fastest horse I've ever been around, or even seen. But he's had some hard luck in some of the bigger races. He broke slow in the Ruidoso Derby, and the same thing happened in Houston." The victory was worth \$54,748 to Parrish.

Outsider Imajewel Dash upsets Dash Its Couper in Rainbow Derby Consolation

Imajewel Dash sent off a 16-1 outsider and rallied strongly in the final stages of the \$23,776 Rainbow Derby Consolation to defeat favorite Dash Its Couper by 1 1/4-lengths, Sunday at Ruidoso Downs. Trained by Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath and owned by Michael and Beth Harper of San Antonio, Imajewel Dash gained entry to the starting gate for the 10-horse field only because her stablemate and probable favorite Ronas Sound, also owned by the Harpers, was scratched Saturday morning.

"There's nothing wrong with Ronas Sound," said Gilbreath regarding the filly who won the Ruidoso Derby earlier this year. "But she needed a break. She's eligible to run in a lot of other races this year."

Fortunately for Gilbreath and the Harpers, Imajewel Dash was

more than ready to step out of her role as understudy. "She really didn't surprise me," said Gilbreath, who also saddled third-place finisher Kuhl Kuhl and also-ran JW Champ. "She's been wanting to be a good mare. She's run a couple of close thirds, and all she needed was a break. I think the fact that she was on the outside and stayed out of trouble helped her."

Winning jockey David Lidberg is better known for his success with thoroughbreds, but jumped at the opportunity to ride Imajewel Dash.

Imajewel Dash broke well from post 10 in the 440-yard dash, but trailed early leader Dash Its Couper 100 yards out of the gate. Midway down the straightaway, the 3-year-old filly assumed control of the lead and never looked back to win handily in a time of :21.79 over

a muddy track. The win was worth \$5,787 to the connections of Imajewel Dash. Dash Its Couper finished a neck in front of Kuhl Kuhl for the place and show positions.

NOTES: Ole White Lightning shattered the 44-year-old track record for 250 yards when he clocked a :13.25 in the sixth race Sunday.



Top horses to clash in Rainbow Futurity trials

The 1995 racing season will reach its mid-point this week, and Thursday's program of Rainbow Futurity trials may provide one of the most exciting afternoons of the summer.

The program begins at 1:15 p.m. and will feature 141 two-year-old quarter horses entered in 15 divisions. The 400-yard tests allow little room for error or tardiness, as the 10 contenders with the fastest times will earn a coveted spot in the starting gate for the Grade I \$541,200 Rainbow Futurity.

The final will be run at Ruidoso Downs on Sunday, July 23, and is the second jewel of the Quarter Horse Triple Crown. The Triple Crown began with the Ruidoso Futurity on May 28 and concludes with the \$2 million All American Futurity on Labor Day.

Carlos Marquez' Real Six Time, winner of the first jewel in the trio, will be back to try for a berth in the Rainbow as he heads the field for the first division.

Other noteworthy contenders include Spencer Peterson's Willow Beda Chick, who will be saddled by trainer Fred Danley in the 13th Division. The son of Chics Beduino finished third in the Ruidoso Quarter Horse Futurity, and earlier in his career he was third to Run Em Up in the West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park.

Run Em Up, the powerful winner of the West Texas Futurity and Two-year-old Quarter Horse of the Meeting at Sunland Park, drew into the fifth and final Division. Trained by Tim Guidry, Run Em Up will try to make up for his bad luck in the opening day Ruidoso Futurity Trials, when he stumbled at the break and tossed rider Kenny Hart.

Seven sophomores will contest Friday's \$4,500 featured 440-yard dash for quarter horses. The sprint will be the sixth of seven races on the card, which begins at 1:15. Devious Dimples will break out of the one post with Christopher Zamora aboard, while First Down Hussey will make her local debut from the outside post. Funistrada will be gunning for her third straight win and will have Casey Lambert in the irons. The trio is top weighted at 120 pounds each.

The \$10,000 Guaranteed Master

Salls Handicap, an 870-yard sprint for three-year-olds, will be Saturday's featured race and the first half of this weekend's stakes doubleheader. Nominees and possible starters for the sprint include Challenger Six, Narbonne High, Sign of True Hops, Stamen, Streakin Victory, TJ Streaker, Tollagain and Way Cool.

Older fillies and mares will be in the spotlight Sunday in the \$10,000 Guaranteed Henriette Wyeth Handicap. This one-mile race is named in honor of renowned local artist Henriette Wyeth. Downs track appeals rejected

A state racing commission committee has recommended the commission reject the appeals of two horse owner/trainers at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The review committee and hearing officer recommendations will be forwarded to the New Mexico Racing Commission at its next meeting, which will be held in Ruidoso Downs July 18.

Owner/trainer Harold Ray Ashford, Jr. appealed a stewards' ruling that stated Ashford had failed to insure that his horse, Opening Remark, was delivered to the test barn in a timely manner after a May 23 race.

Ashford also appealed a stewards' decision that stated Ashford's horse, Final Frontier, interfered with number five horse Fancys Zevi in the 5th race on June 2. Ashford's horse was disqualified to second place while Fancys Zevi was moved to first place.

Owner/trainer Richard Parrish appealed a stewards' decision not to disqualify the number three horse, Proud and Jivey, which Parrish felt had bumped into his horse, Full Connection, during the 7th race held May 29.

This new law states that whoever commits the crime of graffiti to real or personal property when the damage is greater than one thousand dollars is guilty of a fourth degree felony and shall be required to perform one hundred eighty hours of community service within a continuous eight month period immediately following his/her conviction and shall be required to make restitution to the property owner for the cost of damages and restoration as a condition of probation or following any term of incarceration as a condition of parole. A fourth degree felony as defined in New Mexico State statute is any crime punishable by eighteen months in a state penal institution, a five thousand dollar fine, or both.

John Meigs came to the Hondo Valley of southern New Mexico in 1952 to join his friend, Peter Hurd.

He bought one acre of land and a small adobe house for \$100 and began his career as an antique scout, decorator and art collector.

Meigs has spent the last 43 years at Ft. Meigs building and collecting incessantly. Ft. Meigs now covers 12 acres, with nine buildings, thousands of square feet of enclosed space and an English meadow, nestled between the scrub juniper and cottonwoods of the high Sonoran desert.

Although Meigs had a stroke within the last few years, he says it hasn't slowed him down.

Judith Gouch met Meigs around 1970 through her father, an El Paso antique dealer and close friend of Meigs. After the death of her father, Meigs took over a paternal

role in her life.

When El Paso psychiatrist and photographer Ben Passmore came into Gouch's life, Passmore also came into the life of Ft. Meigs. Passmore immediately started shooting pictures there and Gouch, switching from painting to photography, followed suit.

The photographic exhibit represents a kind of longitudinal picture of the place and its creator. Some of the same objects are seen in different juxtapositions, depending on Meigs' whim at that moment.

Ft. Meigs is located in San Patricio east of Ruidoso off U.S. Hwy. 70, and open to the public seven days a week. Meigs is there most of the time and says he loves

Deseo

Deseo, the Spanish word for desire, was named by Sarah Aguayo, a stenographer at the Titworth Company Store. Established in 1916, the post office was located in Paradise Valley about 12 miles north of Capitan. Aguayo was a member of a prominent pioneer Spanish-American family. One of the

homesteaders in the community of Paradise Valley, Walter Sellars, made an application to be the postmaster of the new office. With the help of Capitan postmaster Clara Jacobs, he was granted permission to establish an office to be known as Deseo. About 50 families in the valley received their mail at this office, which occupied the corner of a small store Sellars operated in part of his residences. The Deseo office survived for only four or five years. Mrs. R.H. Taylor was acting postmaster when the office closed.






We got another chuckle when we heard about the man who was concentrating so hard on his work that he actually welded himself inside a horse before he realized what he had done.

How to spot an activist environmentalist

There's trouble here in Rio City, and it begins with a capital "E" and that spells "Environmentalism."

I have long intended to refute some local environmentalists' claims and answer for my fellow Ruidosans the question: How does a Ruidosian know an activist environmentalist when he/she hears one? Are there any of them in Ruidoso? Do environmentalists pursue the truth? What can we "other citizens" do about political environmentalism? What is their agenda?

The following is my four-paragraph overview of national activist environmentalism as described by Dr. D.L. Ray in 1990. You can think for yourself and decide how much of it applies to Ruidoso activist environmentalists.

William Rucker (Anchor Press) wrote in 1982 that current U.S. environmentalism has gone way beyond conservationism, a philosophy of nature that some of us have known in the past. According to Ron Arnold (Free Enterprise Press, 1987), it incorporates real negative elements of anti-development, anti-progress, anti-technology, anti-establishment (even anti-racial/Indian here in Ruidoso), and above all, anti-capitalism. It seems to seek development of a society totally devoid of industry and technology - an impossible return to yesteryear.

To be sure, there are people who are angry with those who let the atomic genie out of the bottle in the 1940s; however, no one can put that genie back into the bottle. Nuclear energy is here to stay.

As a movement, environmentalism has shown itself to be activist, adversarial, punitive and coercive. It is quick to resort to force (usually legislative) but some of its more zealous supporters also engage in physical violence - Earth First! and Greenpeace for example.

Activist environmentalists' leaders (usually paid) may be referred to as "political" environmentalists to distinguish them from those of us who believe in using real, objective, scientific data, not untrue "scare" information. They usually preach a reverence for the purity of nature using these same untrue scare stories of looming man-made catastrophe. These type of environmentalists continue to push for, and insist on, an unachievable pristine perfection - whatever the cost. It's an approach that ensures their job security.

Some observers summarize activist environmentalists to be mostly white, middle to upper income, and predominantly college-educated. They frequently exhibit a vocal "do-good" mentality that may cover their strong streak of "elitism," in that only they know what is best for others; and, they expect others to comply with their positions.

These characteristics may also be coupled with a belief that the end justifies the means and that violence and coercion are acceptable tactics to force their views on others.

What motivations drive these activists who try to force others to their lifestyle and ways of thinking? One can only guess. It certainly isn't democracy.

Repeatedly over the past several years, the Ruidoso public and Mescalero Apache Tribe have been subjected to a litany of unproven and untrue catastrophic and impending disaster scenarios from mostly unqualified and/or well-meaning individuals, both local and out-of-state. Contrary, but true, facts published in this newspaper seem to have no impact against them.

Did we not learn from Germany during this century, that if lies and untruths are repeated often enough, a whole nation will begin to believe them? This approach is still valid, for that is what environmentalists have done/are doing to you regarding nuclear energy matters. The nuclear fears you may have right now are probably traceable to that long-term, and continuing, campaign of misinformation.

Let's review the nuclear power plant spent fuel rod history. Originally, the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) based the whole U.S. nuclear power industry on the reprocessing of spent fuel rods; i.e., the recycling of nuclear material just as we recycle many other non-nuclear materials here in Ruidoso today.

However, President Carter's shortsighted and naive ban on fuel rod reprocessing in the 1970s (an unsuccessful attempt to convince other countries NOT to reprocess their own fuel rods and thus not obtain any weapons-grade plutonium) left the U.S. with no place or plans to store the spent fuel rods. Political environmentalists have ensured we have no such storage place today because they want to prevent us from enjoying the peaceful use of nuclear energy by thwarting the transport and storage of spent fuel rods.

Isn't it ironic that only in the U.S., false fears of nuclear waste and the hysteria created by environmentalists' misinformation may cause our nation to turn its back on nuclear power?

Not surprisingly, there was a privately-funded fuel rod reprocessing plant at Barnwell, S.C. ready to operate at the time of Carter's prohibition against reprocessing. The plant was never commissioned and millions of dollars of private investment was lost.

Even though President Reagan later lifted Carter's ban on rod reprocessing, most qualified observers thought the decision came too late, for these reasons:

1. Understandingly, private industry is now snake bit.
2. Obviously, such reprocessing plants also produce manufacturing nuclear wastes so these would contribute to other nuclear waste products such as those which will be stored at the WIPP near Carlsbad. However, rod reprocessing nuclear waste would still probably be a smaller storage volume than the spent fuel rods.
3. There is now an extensive legal apparatus set up around nuclear waste and laws have been enacted concerning the way high level waste should now be handled (per political environmentalists' scare tactics). Although we can easily make laws, we essentially cannot "unmake" laws.
4. Thousands of people whose jobs now depend on nuclear wastes (including the federal government), and scores of businesses and industries, are committed to the current non-reprocessing reality.

5. DOE and Nuclear Regulatory Commission officials have told this writer that uranium ore has been found to be much more abundant, and thus cheaper, than was originally thought. Therefore, reprocessing of spent fuel rods would be more expensive than making fresh fuel rods.

But where can the spent fuel rods be stored tomorrow? There is no place, because the nuclear power plants were never designed to store increasingly large numbers of rods for long periods - there just is not enough room. In the meantime, more used fuel rods must necessarily be generated from more than 100 commercial reactors.

However, these same environmentalists don't seem to be concerned with the continued manufacture and transport of more NEW fuel rods - just spent ones. Have you ever wondered just how the new rods get to the power plants? The answer is, by truck, and not in 130-ton containers. There have been no reports that anyone has ever been hurt by this fuel rod transportation method, nor that a wreck has ever contaminated a highway. Is this dangerous?

And how about our U.S.-designed nuclear power plants, where the spent fuel rods must be temporarily stored now? Have any operators or neighbors been harmed? That answer is also none - including the Three Mile Island, Penn. incident where, according to Dr. D.L. Ray, no living creature was harmed by the radioactivity and no environmental damage occurred.

The same cannot be said for the coal industry, where the health effects of coal burning kills about 50,000 each year (Anita Warren, 1989). There have been no deaths from modern nuclear power if one discounts the primitive power plant at Chernobyl, USSR, which, unlike Three Mile Island, had no reactor containment building.

Then what can we common, everyday, sensible, New Mexican taxpayers do about activist environmentalists' coercive tactics towards us and our government?

1. Let your voice be heard in the legislative branches to NOT act precipitously on expensive "cares" for unproven environmental ills. Insist on evidence.
 2. Don't yield to the political environmentalists' arguments that action must be taken in advance of understanding the problem "just in case." (A la ozone layer?) Keep in mind that political environmentalists have a job to protect, and they depend on continued - even contrived - crises. Again, insist on facts.
 3. Always keep a sense of perspective. This old earth has been through a lot, such as drastic changes, without any help from humans. The earth will continue to change, for it has never been stable or remained the same for long.
 4. Remember that humans and animals cannot live on earth without using natural resources and altering the earth to some degree. This has been going on since before the cave men and women.
- Our 1990s responsibility is unchanged. We should continue to be good and reasonable and mindful stewards of our home earth's environment.



McGary to wed Aug. 26

The unveiling of Dave McGary's masterpiece, "Free Spirits at Noisy Water," isn't the only thing on the mind of the world famous bronze artist this summer.

He's also in love.

"We've had a whirlwind romance," McGary says of his fiance Molly Kosco, whom he has been dating for six months after seven years of friendship. "I proposed to her in Paris."

Molly and McGary first met while she was working at one of his galleries in Texas. She has been working as an art consultant for the last seven years, he says, and was most recently living in Scottsdale, Ariz.

"She's a genius with design and color," he declares.

The couple will marry Aug. 26 at Ruidoso's Episcopal Church of the Holy Mount, and a reception will follow at their 20-acre Nogal home, Enchantment Ranch.

The home, where McGary has lived for the past several years, has also contained a foundry. But with the opening of his elegant Ruidoso studio and gallery in April, he and Molly have been able to redesign the home for living, only.

"We've also redone our guest house

so collectors can come stay while their pieces are being worked on, and have a nice time in Ruidoso," he explains.

While starting a new life together, Molly will head an educational foundation McGary is establishing, called the McGary Foundation of Unlimited Horizons. It will sponsor educational opportunities for Native American Indians.

"I've always been taught by the Native Americans to give back; I've been blessed with my talent, and with the foundation I hope to return some of my good fortune back to the Native Americans," he says.

With the couple's desire to start a family, plus his need to complete a 30-month back order for his collectors, McGary says he will produce only one new image this year, which will come out in the fall.

In past years, McGary has produced two to three new images annually, and the work has typically sold out the day it hits the market.

But McGary will continue to be extremely selective with monumental projects like *Free Spirits*.

"A project needs to be real special," he says. "It takes two years and I only have 10 or 15 to do in my lifetime."

Life's going well for bronze sculptor Dave McGary.

His grandest artistic endeavor to date, "Free Spirits at Noisy Water," is coming together inside his new Suderth Drive gallery.

McGary, 37, has enjoyed national praise for his painted bronze portraits of Native Americans for the past 13 years. But his latest sculpture holds a special place in his heart.

"Monumental-wise, it's very exciting for me. And it's been challenging artistically and technically," McGary relates.

The 255-foot-long, eight-horse sculpture, valued at \$1.5 million, is truly a tribute to the role the horse has played in the development of the American West.

The landscaped equine scene was commissioned by R.D. and Joan Hubbard, owners of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track and the founders of the Museum of the Horse.

"The original design only had seven horses, but I put in a colt as a gift to Mrs. Hubbard," McGary says.

McGary has been infatuated with the technical side of casting since he was a boy in Cody, Wyo., when an art teacher taught him to cast jewelry while he was in the seventh grade.

Eventually, he moved on to larger items. While also working three jobs, the teenage McGary put together his first foundry at his mother's home in Durango, Colo.

The six-foot, four-inch teen chose athletes as his first subjects — and just about anything with movement.

He honed his skills at sculpting anatomical form when he was 15, while studying with bronze master Harry Jackson just outside Florence, Italy. Jackson, a foundry owner, had offered McGary a scholarship after the boy's grandmother showed him his work.

Jackson hoped to preserve the ancient methods of lost wax casting that were dying out in America. He was a stickler for detail, and insisted the young artists (three other scholarship winners were with McGary) learn anatomy.

With McGary's decision to go abroad, he dropped out as a sophomore in high school. "I'm one fortunate dropout," he confirms.

A year later, McGary moved to New Mexico and went to work for the Shidoni Foundry in Santa Fe, where he also cast his own works.

For awhile he ventured away from Jackson's tutelage, and casted elongated, almost abstract pieces. But by the late 1970s, he had returned to precise anatomy, except for slight exaggerations for perspective.

While developing his own techniques in Santa Fe, McGary became friends with Kevin Yellow Mountain, who invited McGary to meet his uncle, Gerald Red Elk, the Sioux tribe's historian.

McGary stayed one month with the tribe in Little Eagle, S.D., and absorbed every bit of information and emotion he could about the people.

"It changed my whole life," McGary says.

On the reservation, McGary found subjects that would make him a master of realism among contemporary artists of the American West.

He moved to the Hondo Valley in 1981 and opened his own facility, but within a year, McGary chose to return to South Dakota. He stayed with the Sioux for another year and established the solid friendships that continue with visits today.

When McGary returned to Lincoln County, he found a home in Nogal and turned half of it into a foundry. He later opened a studio in Ruidoso's Gavilan Canyon. Earlier this year, he opened a

new gallery and studio in downtown Ruidoso.

Using his desire to glorify and detail the proud Sioux and educate people about their role in history, McGary began applying paint to his bronzes as the Greeks did thousands of years ago.

Initially his new approach met a lot of resistance, but his style is copied now.

"They say imitation is a compliment, but sometimes, I don't know," he says playfully.

By 1982, the awards started rolling in as he gained recognition at national art competitions.

Among his more prestigious displays are two of his bronzes which have been on exhibit in the Old Executive Office building in the White House, and the lifesize work called "Long Soldier" outside the New Mexico state capitol building.

McGary has dug in to meet the increasing demand for his work, developing his elegant studio in Ruidoso and enlarging his staff to 45.

"They're my backbone," he says. "I can't stand up without them."

Though he could afford to live anywhere in the world, McGary has chosen Ruidoso as his home.

"Ruidoso is the ideal community," he says, noting the climate and scenic beauty. "It's a nice place to call home."

People here are down-to-earth and supportive, he explains, and the forested area gives him the privacy he needs for rejuvenation after extensive travels.

"Working in this area helps me keep my own creative originality," he explains.

Sculpture's creation involves many steps

Dave McGary's concept of seven breeds of horses racing across a New Mexico landscape will be realized on July 15 when the bronze sculpture, Free Spirits at Noisy Water, is unveiled at the Museum of the Horse.

To truly appreciate the size of one of the largest equine sculptures in the country, it helps to understand the elaborate process of its creation.

Free Spirits at Noisy Water began as an inspiration McGary shared with R.D. and Joan Dale Hubbard, who are the founders of the Museum of the Horse.

McGary planned and researched the sculpture, then an architectural rendering is drawn showing (in procession) a Thoroughbred, quarter horse, appaloosa, paint mare and colt, Arabian, Morgan and Standardbred on a landscape setting. The breeds will be 1.5 times life size.

McGary began by making a small clay version of each horse, called a maquette. A skeleton of each piece, called an armature, was made. It was then covered in clay. The maquette is about one-eighth the size of the finished sculpture.

When McGary felt the maquette was as close to the breed as he could make it, he called in experts on each of the seven breeds to critique the accuracy of each maquette.

McGary painted rubber on the maquette to make a rubber mold. Plaster was applied to the rubber mold to create a "mother" mold that was used to support the pliable rubber mold.

Plaster was poured into the rubber mold to make a plaster maquette. This plaster maquette was sent to Terrell O'Brien of Lamesa, Texas, where it was "pointed up," or enlarged to 1.5 times its life size.

O'Brien took the measurements of the plaster maquette and figured what the measurements of the larger, finished piece would be. To illustrate, O'Brien cut the plaster maquette into quarter-inch cross sections. He then enlarged these pieces into two-inch cross sections of styrofoam. He pieced the sections together onto a metal armature to make a styrofoam horse. He covered this in clay.

The clay-covered styrofoam horse was brought back to McGary's studio in Ruidoso and was resculpted into what McGary wanted the finished piece to look like. At this point, the breed experts were once again consulted.

The clay horse was divided into approximately 60 sections. A rubber mold, and a plaster mold to support the rubber mold, was made for each of the sections.

Each mold was peeled off the clay in sections. The molds were sent to either the Eagle Bronze foundry in Lander,

Wyo., or Loveland Sculpture Works foundry in Loveland, Colo., where they were filled with wax. Approximately 60 impressions in wax are made. Sprues were then attached to the wax pieces. Sprues are channels attached to the various wax pieces through which the molten bronze is later poured once the

wax has been burned out.

The wax pieces with sprues attached were dipped in liquid ceramic and dried. This was then heated to 1,800 degrees and the wax inside was burned away.

Molten bronze heated to 2,200 degrees was poured into the ceramic mold. After the bronze cooled, the ceramic mold was removed by hammering on the sprues. This shattered the ceramic, causing it to fall off the bronze.

Welding began when the bronze pieces were brought together onto an engineered armature. This armature was designed so that the horses were

able to balance on one foot. It was also designed to withstand high winds. The sprues were cut off and ground down. Then the seams were removed and imperfections were corrected. This is called chasing.

McGary and his team of experts visited the foundries to provide "quality control" by checking to make sure the highest standards were being maintained. The foundries then made any adjustments before shipping the fully-assembled piece.

The horses were brought back to Ruidoso for final corrections and the acrylic patina processing. Patina enhanced the aging process and changes the color of the bronze. The bronze was heated and acrylic paint was added to the metal. The heat opened the pores of the bronze and acrylic paint became a part of the top layer of metal.

The horse was then highlighted and eyes, hooves, socks, etc. were painted on. A protective coat was added.

Soon, the horses will be ready to be transported by a special crane to the Museum of the Horse, where they will each be welded onto a base in the landscape setting created in front of the Museum of the Horse. Highland Construction of Las Cruces created the surroundings for the horse. A mountainous environment with New Mexico flora will be spread across 255 feet along U.S. Highway 70.

The horses will appear to be racing across the landscape, with the special grace and beauty they alone possess.

Some monumental statistics

— *Free Spirits at Noisy Water* is made up of eight running horses. Each is cast at 1.5 times life size.

— Seven breeds of horses are represented: Thoroughbred, quarter horse, appaloosa, paint, Arabian, Morgan and Standardbred.

— *Free Spirits at Noisy Water* measures 255 feet long by 36 feet high.

— The average time required to create one giant figure in the monument is 18 weeks.

— Each horse is hollow, poured in

about 60 pieces and then reassembled. The final weight of each figure is between 3,000 and 5,000 pounds.


— Two foundries, Eagle Bronze, Inc. in Lander, Wyo. and Loveland Sculpture Works in Loveland, Colo., have been working around the clock to cast the massive figures.

— The "mountain" where these horses will run free required 94,500 cubic feet of dirt.

— Almost 1,500 cubic feet of cement is required to anchor the horses.

Welding horses can be tricky

When one employee inadvertently welded himself inside the cavity of a horse's bronze body, Monty Paddleford knew the sculpture "Free Spirits at Noisy Water" would be a project he would never forget.

Dealing with 5,000-pound sculptures that are as long as 17.5 feet and as high as 15.5 feet guarantees some special problems. But Paddleford, owner of Eagle Bronze Foundry in Lander, Wyo., had handled even larger sculptures before and figured he was up to the job.

But there are also hitches, if only minor — like the man who welded himself inside one of McGary's horses.

How does this happen? Intense concentration on the job took his mind away from practical thoughts. The man was concentrating on welding the complex armature, a series of support rods that are diagonally braced inside the horse's frame.

"There are more in these (horses) than any other piece we have done, because of the way they are mounted," Paddleford said. "Most (support rods) have to be fit to the individual horse itself. We cannot prefabricate them and then stick them up inside the horse.

"They (workers) have to be real contortionists to weld some of this," he

said. "In fact, we can only use smaller guys to do some of the welding on the inside of these, because of the confined space."

The trapped employee was at the point of finishing up one of the support rods, welding a long diagonal brace at the back end, Paddleford said.

"When he crawled (in) and laid that brace and one other supporting brace inside the horse, he was so focused on getting the welds the way they are supposed to be and where they are supposed to go, he didn't realize that he had welded himself in there," Paddleford said. "He actually twisted his knee in order to get out of there. It was either twist his knee or cut the brace out and he didn't want to cut the brace out."

The armature in each of the horses worked on by his foundry was a maze of diagonal braces, he said.

"It was a complex armature, because the horses were large and mounted on a single leg. That presents a whole different problem with the handling," Paddleford said. "That, coupled with the fact that we didn't have a lot of room to feed the main armature up the legs.

Paddleford, a metallurgist by degree, had to purchase a special precipitation-hardened stainless steel, an ultra-high strength steel, to construct the armature for the legs.

"We'd never had to use that kind of strength (in steel) before. It required different welding techniques and a bunch of other things we had to gear up to do.

"It's been a real adventure. I think they're going to look really nice. I really like the mare and filly. That's my favorite."

Eagle Bronze's staff engineer determined the balance points on the delicately poised giants.

"We actually laid out the photographs on his computer program and he was able to predict where the center of balance was going to be," Paddleford

said. "From that, we designed the armatures."

The engineer took an average of two days on each horse and five hours working the figures on the computer, he said.

From the time the mold arrived at the foundry until the 60 sections of bronze were welded together to form the horse, about 15 different foundry employees worked on each horse, he said.

Horses attract curious looks from passing motorists

The first hint of the magnificent feeling of motion in Dave McGary's Free Spirits at Noisy Water came as the unfinished horses were being hauled from the foundries.

The owner of one of the foundries, Monty Paddleford, related how he felt

the first time he witnessed the sight.

The semi carrying three of the horses had just left his Eagle Bronze foundry in Lander, Wyo.

"On the first trio sent down, the driver had gone into town to get some gas after loading," he said. "I was pulling out to get onto the main highway, when I caught a glimpse of the horses

out of the corner of my eye.

"I had such a sense of motion as they went by, it validated Dave's (McGary) whole approach."

Frank Morris of Triple L. Inc. out of Lander was the driver of that first rig.

"I stopped every 100-150 miles to check the straps," he said. "We used three-inch nylon mesh straps that can (restrain) 3,000 pounds per foot. Then there are two-inch straps and log chains and boomers, a clamping device that cinches everything down."

The horses were open to public view as they headed down the highway. And the public viewed all they could, honking, waving, pointing and even video recording the journey, Morris said.

"They weren't in cartons or wrapped. The wrapping would just have blown off," Morris said of the horses. "They are strapped down on a flatbed with their pedestal-type stand that is chained to the bed of the trailer."

Motorists really got an eyeful in Denver, when Morris had to scramble across the highway to retrieve one of the horse's ears.

"They had me routed on the east side of Denver instead of the west side," Morris said. "To get to my route, I had to go under an underpass that had only 15.1 feet clearance instead of 15 feet, nine inches."

"I almost cleared it, but one ear fell

off onto the road and I had to dodge cars and go chase it," he said. "Boy, did I get the looks."

The ear was reattached when the horse reached Ruidoso.

Once at the entrance to McGary's studio, "Expressions in Bronze," another problem had to be tackled — how to get them through the back shipping door.

"If you move around a 3,000 to 5,000-pound structure, that's an endeavor," said production manager Rebecca Ortwein. "So one of our people here, Dave Perkins, a welder and an artist himself, he's very good at coming up with these structures so that we can move things around."

"He built this (square frame) structure, which fits through our entrance. In that, you can move the piece every which way, so we have it hanging on this frame and can move it a little any way, up-down, right-left, within that square structure and move it like that into the building."

From a distance the maneuver, which takes at least a half-dozen men, looks like someone trying to fit an oversized couch through a house door.

Only when you stand near the statues does their size bring home the enormity of the project designed by McGary. They will be shrouded in secrecy until July 15, when 18 weeks of processing and nearly two years of planning come to life.

Murphey headlines July 15 entertainment

Recording artist Michael Martin Murphey and his Rio Grande Band will perform at the Museum of the Horse at 9:30 p.m. on Saturday, July 15, after the unveiling of Free Spirits at Noisy Water.

The Rio Grande Band features David Coe on fiddle, mandolin and alto sax; Leroy Featherston on drums; Gary Roller on bass; Don Woodbury on steel guitar; Frank Sweich on keyboards and Murphey's son Ryan on acoustic and electric guitars.

"The Bard and the Balladeer," cowboy poet Waddie Mitchell and cowboy singer Don Edwards, will also perform at Saturday's gala.

The Ruidoso News interviewed Murphey by telephone prior to one of his performances in Reno, Nevada. When he's not on the road, he lives in Taos.

"I've been involved with horses all my life," Murphey said. "I like anything that has to do with horses and that's why I did the 'America's Horses' album."

"America's Horses," Murphey's latest album, is a compilation of horse songs. The album is not yet available commercially but will appropriately be for sale at Murphey's Museum of the Horse concert. Proceeds go to benefit the American Quarter Horse Association.

Murphey has 10 horses at his ranch in Taos. They aren't racehorses but he trains them in another kind of competition.

"My horses are reigning horses, quarterhorses that do reigning moves," Murphey said. Reigning horses are trained to do specific moves but are not "trick" horses, he explained.

"Free reigning is probably the fastest growing sport in horse shows right now," he said. "We don't do anything that is not good for the horses' anatomy, or anything that the horse doesn't do naturally."

"We do standard application moves — spins, sliding stops, side passes; all the moves a horse needs to know, whether you're training him for cutting or for trail riding or cow work."

Murphey said he is paying homage to his musical roots with the traditional direction his music has taken on his recent releases.

"I basically did the same thing that Linda Ronstadt did when she put out her mariachi album," he said. "Eric Clapton did an album of blues music and I've tipped my hat to my roots, but I'm still committed to being a songwriter and doing original material of my own, so it's like coming full circle."

"I was perceived at one time as being a pop artist because there was really no room for the singer-songwriter types in country music when I started in the early 70s."

Things began to change in the 80s, Murphey said, but now country is becoming narrow again while pop music is opening up.

"Fortunately, I've been able to make the transitions," he said. "I just basically try to keep on doing what I've been doing and try to find a home for it."

"Hopefully you do evolve, but I've always been a Southwesterner in my music."

The resurgence of interest in traditional cowboy music is probably sparked by an attraction to the lifestyle, Murphey said.

"Is it more fun in the long run to walk around L.A., breathe smog and wear a black leather jacket with earrings in your nose and be exposed to gangs and drug dealers? Or is it better to live out in the country, pull on cowboy boots and live in a place like Ruidoso?"

"I think a lot of young people are finally deciding that they don't want to be involved in a self-destructive lifestyle, and are turning to the western lifestyle where life is closer to nature, and they are looking for the music that goes with it."

New Mexico is a passion with Murphey, who feels that more people should be educated about its potentials.

"New Mexico has the second-largest amount of private grazing land in the United States and is a livestock-loving state," he said. "The thing that is attracting people into New Mexico is this kind of life, and I think we need to

make sure that this kind of life is preserved and that there's plenty of opportunity for people to participate in it."

Free Spirits at Noisy Water is a step in the right direction, Murphey said.

"We're tipping our hats to the right thing when we build a monument to horses and the love of livestock and the outdoors," he said. "To me, that's more important than putting up a statue of some general."

Ridin' a musical range

Murphey's musical career began at the age of 13 when he learned to play music on a plastic toy ukulele given to him by his parents. His grandfather was so proud that he bought him a new guitar. At the age of 16, Murphey played his first performance as a singing cowboy wrangler at Sky Ranch in Lewisville, Texas. While attending UCLA, he was a member of the folk-rock group, the Lewis and Clark Expedition.

Moving back to Texas in 1971, Murphey's first big break as a solo artist came while he was performing in cafes in the Dallas area. A painter heard Murphey's music and while painting the house of record producer Bob Johnston in Nashville, the painter told Johnston about the young musician.

Johnston, who produced such acts as Bob Dylan, Johnny Cash and Simon and Garfunkel, immediately recorded Murphey's first album, "Geronimo's Cadillac," on the A&M record label. The single from the album, also titled "Geronimo's Cadillac," became a top 10 single and quickly turned into an anthem for the Indian rights movement.

Since his first album, Murphey's prolific career has spawned 23 albums and many top 10 hits. He wrote and re-

corded 1975's hit single "Wildfire," played on radio stations more than two million times, and "Carolina In the Pines," played more than one million times. "What's Forever For," written by Rafe Vanhoy and recorded by Murphey, reached number one on the country charts in 1982.

Murphey has earned his place as a great country musician as well as a supporter of the cowboy way of life. He was voted "Best New Male Vocalist" by the Academy of Country Music in 1983; he's a three-time winner of the Cowboy Hall of Fame Award and he's the national spokesman for both the American Quarter Horse Association and the High School Rodeo Association. Murphey is part of the Holistic Resource Management Institute, which encourages environmentally sound ranching.

Murphey's latest project, "The Sage Brush Symphony," recorded with the San Antonio Symphony, is scheduled to be released in September.

Mitchell personifies image of American cowboy poet

Waddie Mitchell is the quintessential cowboy poet; tall and lanky, with lively blue eyes and a handlebar moustache.

From his earliest days on the ranches where his father worked near Jiggs, Nev., Mitchell has been immersed in cowboy poetry.

Mitchell spoke to *The Ruidoso News* about his life as a cowboy poet in a telephone interview from his home in Jiggs. He'll join cowboy singer Don Edwards to perform at Saturday's gala celebration.

"Jiggs consists of a school that has 11 kids in it, a dance hall and a bar," Mitchell said. "What more do you need?"

When he was 14, Mitchell was allowed to hang out with cowboys in the bunkhouse. Since there was no electricity, radio or TV, at night they would swap stories and recite poems, he said.

"When I was growing up we had these old cowboys around," Mitchell said. "When you live in close

Edwards seeks to preserve cowboy way with music

Michael Martin Murphey calls Don Edwards "one of the finest pure cowboy singers I've ever heard."

Edwards will perform with cowboy poet Waddie Mitchell as "The Bard and the Balladeer" at the July 15 gala celebrating the unveiling of Free Spirits at Noisy Water.

Presenting an alternative viewpoint through his music is as important to Edwards as preserving the cowboy music of yesteryear.

"It's not just doing the things of 100 years ago," he said. "It's combin-

ing the old with the new and using that influence today to talk about contemporary issues with a rural mentality rather than an urban one.

People are frustrated with the urban mentality and are looking for heroes and role models, Edwards said.

"I see it all the time and I've been in this business for 35 years," he said. "Every so often, it seems that the one root thing that people in America latch onto is the cowboy

proximity like that with the same folks month after month, one of your duties is to entertain each other, and I suppose that's where the whole tradition of cowboy poetry started.

"We would sit around at night and do strange things like talk to each other."

Mitchell quit school when he was 16 to make his living as a cowboy.

"I've never done anything else," he said. "I never had a paper route, never was a brain surgeon, never pumped gas or sacked groceries, in fact I never made money without horses or cows until I started telling cowboy poetry."

Mitchell draws his material from his past, and events and people that spark his interest. He has attended three Lincoln County Cowboy Symposiums, he said.

"I enjoy Cowboy Symposiums because it gives me a wellspring of experiences and feelings to draw from," Mitchell said.

Asked about his future plans, Mitchell laughed.

"We would sit around at night and do strange things like talk to each other."

"Someday I hope to own my own ranch," he said. "I'm hoping for the opportunity to go broke on a ranch by myself instead of helping somebody else do it."

Mitchell has appeared on the "Tonight" show and at the Library of Congress where he has presented his poems to captivated audiences. He has written and published several books of cowboy poetry, including his latest collection, "Waddie's Whole Load" and has recorded several albums of poetry, including "Buckaroo Poet" and "Lone Driftin' Rider." "The Bard and the Balladeer" an album of music and poetry, was recorded with Don Edwards.

Mitchell also received the Nevada Governor's Arts Award for Literature and was an original inductee into the Cowboy Poets and Singers Hall of Fame.

way, because the cowboys were America's version of the knight in shining armor.

"People still see the strength, character and morals in the cowboy and cowboy music."

Traditional cowboy music has had a resurgence in popularity recently, Edwards said.

"If there is one thing that gives me inspiration, it's seeing a younger generation being involved in and liking traditional cowboy music."

This is not Edwards' first visit to the Ruidoso area. He has performed at several Lincoln County Cowboy Symposiums and travels and performs throughout the state on a regular basis.

"I love New Mexico," he said.

Edwards made his first record in 1964, and since that time he has released seven solo efforts and nine collaborations with other artists.

"Guitars and Saddle Songs" and "Songs of the Cowboy," both by Edwards, are included in the Folklore Archives of the Library of Congress. He has received the National Cowboy Hall of Fame's "Wrangler Award" for Outstanding Traditional Western Music for his recording, "Chant of the Wanderer." Edward's recent book, "Classic Cowboy Tales," is available in bookstores. "Goin' Back to Texas" and "Songs of the Trail" are Edwards' most recent solo releases on the Warner Brothers-Western label.

Carne Asada

Preparation time: 20 minutes, Cooking time: 7 to 9 minutes

Marinating time: Approximately 30 minutes

- 4 beef rib eye steaks, cut 3/4 inch thick
- Fresh Tomato Salsa*
- 2 Tablespoon fresh lime juice
- 6 flour tortillas (6-inch diameter)
- 1/4 cup (1 ounce) each shredded Colby cheese and Monterey Jack cheese

Prepare Fresh Salsa: Place beef rib eye steaks in utility dish; sprinkle both sides of steaks with lime juice, rubbing into surface. Cover and refrigerate while preparing salsa. Wrap tortillas securely in heavy-duty aluminum foil. Place steaks on grill over medium coals. Grill steaks 7 to 9 minutes for rare to medium, turning once. Place tortilla packet on outer edge of grill five minutes before end of cooking time. Heat tortillas 5 minutes, turning once. Top each steak with equal amounts of each cheese 1 minute before end of cooking time. Trim excess fat from steaks; serve steaks into slices. Serve with salsa and warm tortillas.

** To check temperature, cautiously hold hand about 4 inches above coals. Medium coals will force removal of hand in 4 seconds.
Note: Beef rib eye steaks will yield three 3-ounce cooked, trimmed servings per pound.



Beef Steaks Provencale For Two

Preparation time: 10 minutes, Cooking time: 8 to 9 minutes

- 2 lean beef cubed steaks (approx. 4 ounces each)
- 1 slice garlic, crushed
- 1/2 teaspoon dried basil leaves, crushed
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 2 small zucchini, thinly sliced
- 6 cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1 teaspoon grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Combine garlic, basil and pepper in small bowl. Press half of paste evenly into both sides of beef cubed steaks; reserve. Combine oil and remaining paste in large non-stick skillet over medium heat. Heat 2 to 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add tomatoes; continue cooking 1 minute. Remove vegetables to warm serving platter. Sprinkle with cheese. Cook steaks in same skillet over medium heat 4 to 5 minutes. Turn once. Reserve steaks 2 to 4 minutes, remove sauce. Season with salt. Serve steaks with vegetables. 2 servings.

- 1 pound boneless beef top loin or tenderloin steaks, cut 1/2 inch thick

- 1 tablespoon balsamic vinegar
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 3/4 teaspoon dried rosemary leaves, crushed
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
