State seeks input on long-term care

The state government is seeking comments about the adequacy of long-term medical care in New Mexico, at a meeting Saturday in Roswell.

The state Agency on Aging is hosting meetings around the state.

The state closed a long-term care facility at Fort Stanton in Lincoln County in March, citing the expense. The state is now seeking a new use for the historic fort.

After the meetings, a report will be made to the interim health and human services committee by Oct. 1, followed by a report to the Legislature and governor before 1996.

Clinton wants to close fish hatchery

A proposal to close the Mescalero Fish Hatchery on the Mescalero Apache Reservation has been included in President Bill Clinton's proposed budget for the coming fiscal year.

Sen. Pete Domenici (R-NM), a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, has asked the Senate Interior Appropriations Subcommittee to reject the Clinton Administration's proposal to close the Mescalero hatchery.

The senator also requested \$253,000 and adequate staffing (the equivalent of four full-time employees) to continue operation of the facility through 1996.

Interior Appropriations Subcommittee work is expected to begin on this funding bill in July.

Skateboarder hits car on Sudderth

A skateboarder ran into a 1993 Ford at the corner of Eagle Drive and Sudderth Drive Monday evening, causing an estimated \$500 to the car.

The skateboarder, who left the scene after retrieving his skateboard, escaped uninjured, police said.

The driver of the Ford, Jeffery Chapman of Ruidoso, told police he had stopped at a red light when the skateboarder slammed into his right front fender.

Chapman exited his car to see if the male skateboarder was okay. The youth got up, said he was fine, and went out to the middle of Sudderth to collect his board, police were told.

Bomb's 50th anniversary Sunday

Night turned into day for the Gallacher family at 5:29 a.m. July 16, 1945, as an artificial sun rose 30 miles away in the Jornada del Muerto (the Journey of Death).

When the world's first atomic bomb exploded off a 100-foot tower on an isolated bombing range, Bill Gallacher was 15 and just climbing out of bed.

"No one knew what it was," Gallacher said. "It just kind of turned daylight. The whole sky lit up."

Ironically, as the countdown for the explosion began, a local radio station began broadcasting "Nutcracker Suite" on the same wavelength.

The government had laid out detailed plans for evacuating southeastern New Mexico, but never followed through. No one can say what it would have taken to initiate the evacuation, since government officials wanted to stay low-key and keep the reality of the blast a secret for as long as possible.

The White Sands Missile Range will commemorate the 50th anniversary of the history-shaping event with special visitation hours, but no ceremony, this Sunday.

The road to Ground Zero south of U.S. 380 will be open from 5 a.m. to 11 a.m.

What bomb?

At first, the official line pinned the event to the explosion of an ammunition dump. It wasn't until a few weeks later, when the U.S. dropped atomic bombs on Japan, that people connected the Trinity Site event to the new world order.

Don C. Wright, then editor of the Roswell Daily Record, played the Trinity Site explosion on page two of the paper.

And Bill Gallacher and his family went about their business that day, tending 500 cattle on their 70-section ranch on the Chupadera Mesa north of the explosion site.

Government officials drove out to ask some questions, but they would never explain why, he said.

Radioactive fallout was a new experience for everyone, including the military.

A few months later, Gallacher and his father noticed that some of

their cattle developed streaks of white hair. When they went hunting that fall, they noticed the streaks on deer.

"I remember it vividly," Gallacher said. "We saw the same thing for two years."

But he doesn't recall any unusual illnesses among the cattle, or any deformed calves being born the next spring.



"Of course, if there were some, we would have blamed it on something else," Gallacher said. "We wouldn't have known (there might have been a connection to the radioactivity from the bomb)."

Scientists had picked what became known as the Stallion range of the White Sands Missile Range, because of its remoteness. The nearest communities were shielded on both sides by mountains. The Oscura or Dark Mountains rose to the east as a barrier against possible drifting clouds of radioactive particles. The site was also relatively close to Los Alamos, where a group of renowned scientists created the bomb.

When the bomb went off, its creators, who had reassembled it a few miles away at the former George McDonald ranch house, watched from shelters 10,000 meters away.

Just before the blast, one scientist, Enrico Fermi, began taking wagers on whether the bomb would ignite the atmosphere, and if so, whether it would destroy just New Mexico or the entire world.

Ranchers still fighting for compensation for loss of land

Dolly Helms Onsrud still remembers the curl of dust as the government car crossed the lava beds and bumped down the rutted road to the family homestead 40 miles west of Oscura.

It was February of 1942. From inside her two-room wood house, she saw a U.S. marshal hand her husband, the late Art Helms, a sheet of paper.

She didn't know until later that he was telling her husband the family had two weeks to pack up their belongings, round up their livestock and get off the land that Helms had homesteaded 10 years earlier.

If they didn't leave, they would be considered trespassers.

The country was at war and needed the land of about 110 ranchers for the new Alamogordo Bombing and Gunnery Range, expanded later into the White Sands Missile Range.

The demand for them to move came as a surprise, Dolly said.

"We had heard rumors, but nothing concrete," she said during an interview at the home she shares in Oscura with her second husband, Lee Onsrud. "People would say, 'Do you know what's going to happen to us?' You really can't believe anything like that would happen to you."

The Helms packed up their belongings, rounded up their cattle and camped out in a one-room range house of a neighbor. But the harsher environment, with sparse grass and alkaline water, caused their cattle to lose weight and become ill. Three months later, they were forced to sell them at a greatly reduced price, less than \$50 a head.

The ranchers didn't know until years later that the government also would use the land to detonate the world's first atomic bomb.

As the 50th anniversary of the bomb approaches Sunday, July 16, the dozen ranchers still alive and

the offspring of others are fighting for what they contend is equitable repayment for their sacrifice.

Stripped of their land

The government, speaking through the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, offered no money to help the affected ranchers relocate.

In addition to the loss of the one-section (640 acres) original homestead and 480 acres more from his father, Helms lost 11 sections he leased for grazing from the Bureau of Land Management. A few years later, when the missile range was expanded, the government also took a second ranch with a larger house the couple had purchased.

For three decades, the ranchers received rent for use of the land and the assurance that someday they could return to their private property and their leased federal land. But the payments were small,

Landscapers turn site into mountain

Bud Hettinga's mission was to create a mountain from a molehill.

Hettinga is the president of Highland Enterprises, Inc. of Las Cruces. His company was hired to landscape the site where Free Spirits at Noisy Water, artist Dave McGary's eight-horse monument, will stand.

"The job is landscaping on a grand scale," Hettinga said. "We've built a small mountain and surrounding hills, literally bucket by bucket."

The 255-foot long monument required 94,500 cubic feet of dirt. Almost 1,500 cubic feet of cement is required to anchor the horses.

about \$1,600 a year for 20 years under the second lease agreement signed in 1945, according to Dolly. Until 1982 when the leases were revoked, the government also paid \$535 to \$800 per year to use their state leased grazing land, she said.

Instead of returning the land to the ranchers, the missile range was expanded in the 1950s and again in the 1970s, gobbling up even more ranches and property. In the mid-1970s, the ranchers were told they would never be able to set foot on the property again, that the government had paid about \$20 million over the 30 years and it now owned the land. The government bought the private land and improvements at a fraction of their worth at that time, as low as \$37 an acre, Dolly said.

By then, it was too late for many of the families, whose lives had been put on hold waiting for the return of their ranches or enough money to buy new places, Onsrud said.

The Helms tried working for the government and then farming, but were drawn back to the peaceful quiet of Lincoln County. They found a smaller place near the tiny settlement of Oscura south of the county seat of Carrizozo, and stayed there even after losing a second ranch to the missile range.

For 10 years, New Mexico's congressional delegation has been unsuccessful in convincing their colleagues to approve compensation for the ranchers. A bill is pending in front of Congress again this year.

White Sands Missile Range officials want the ranchers to be compensated, said public affairs specialist Jim Eckles.

Although the ranchers were paid

hundreds of thousands of dollars in some cases, "it was dribbled out over several decades and it wasn't enough at any one time to go out and buy a new place," Eckles said. "If they had been compensated like (ranchers at) McGregor from the very beginning, we probably wouldn't have this problem."

The Onsruds compared the situation to others, too.

"We reimbursed the American Japanese when they were relocated in 1942," Lee said. "We reimbursed the Aleutians when we relocated them from the Aleutian Islands. The ranchers on the McGregor southern missile range near El Paso were paid off to the tune of \$2,000 an animal unit (the number of animals allowed to graze on the leased federal land), which was a very fair thing, and then they gave them back full use of the land again for grazing, if they bid on it."

Out of the original estimated 110 White Sands ranchers, only 13 are left.

"I think they're just waiting for the rest to die off, thinking the problem will go away," Onsrud said.

A 40-year fight

The White Sands ranchers formed a committee in 1949 to fight for a better price, but there was dissension among the members. Some were willing to take whatever they were offered as being better than nothing, Dolly said.

Much of the money paid over the years ended up paying for attorney's fees, she said.

A group of 29 ranchers went to Washington D.C. in November 1983 to appeal to Congress for help. They were unsuccessful.

Art Helms died in October 1985

after an accident on the ranch. Dolly met Lee Onsrud a year later. They were married in 1989, and Lee has devoted many hours to help his wife find justice.

"It took a constant stirring at the top to keep things going all the time," Lee said. "I thought at first when Clinton got in, we might have a chance."

But two letters to President Clinton and one to the Department of Defense have gone unanswered.

The Onsruds think the White Sands ranchers should be compensated at a rate similar to the McGregor Range ranchers. For Dolly, that would translate to about \$460,000.

The original Helms homestead still stands on the confiscated land. Another house on their former property has been destroyed along with other improvements.

"Everybody back East is afraid of this story," Dolly said. "They don't want to think it could happen to them."

Trinity Site radiation lower than exposure on plane ride

Fifty years after the first nuclear bomb was exploded about 80 miles northwest of Ruidoso, radiation at ground zero is still 10 times greater than the general background radiation for this region, according to information from White Sands Missile Range.

But don't let that scare you away.

"There's a lot of myths," said range public information officer Don Montoya. "Remember that although the radiation is higher than the normal background radiation, you're not going to get zapped just for coming."

"A one-hour visit results in a whole body exposure of one-half to one millirem (unit of radioactivity)," he said. "A U.S. adult receives an average of 90 of these a year from natural and medical sources."

The Department of Energy (DOE) estimates that humans receive between 35-50 millirem each year from the sun, and another 28 to 35 from eating food, Montoya said. Radioactive minerals naturally occurring in rocks and soil account for 55 per year, and a chest X-ray yields about 22. A whole mouth of dental X-rays delivers a whopping 900, and smoking a pack of cigarettes a day for one year would yield an average of 40, Montoya said.

"If you are flying coast to coast in a jetliner, that gives you an exposure of about three to five on each trip," Montoya said. "Although you can see everything at ground zero in about 30 minutes, if you just sat there in one place for one hour, you'd get less radiation than you would flying a jetliner to New York."

Visitors to the Trinity Site are admonished not to pick up the trinitite, a green glassy material lying in the soil. The green trinitite, formed in vast sheets from the heat of the implosion, was highly radioactive at one time, he said.

"They used lead-lined tanks to go to the site after the explosion," Montoya said. "They broke it (the trinitite) up with special equipment, put it in regular garbage cans and buried it a short distance from the site. When the area was taken over by the National Parks Service, the people from Los Alamos (National Laboratory) remembered where they buried it. It was still highly radioactive. They put the old garbage cans in specially treated lead-lined containers and shipped them off to a waste disposal site."

"The rest of stuff at ground zero was bulldozed over and over and over and over, much like a salad. They kept on tossing until the chunks were small and mixed in with the dirt. A fence was placed around it. When the Park Service decided to open it up, they came in and leveled it again."

All that remains are small pieces of the material that have been exposed to the elements over the past 50 years.

"That degenerates the radioactivity that much faster," Montoya said. "We have to announce that it is radioactive and not to pick it up, but we also consider it part of the national monument itself and you're not supposed to take any."

Unfriendly cloud

Radioactive particles floated northeast from Ground Zero after the first atomic bomb exploded at 5:29 a.m. July 16, 1945 on what is

now the Stallion Range of White Sands Missile Range.

The cloud passed over Chupadera Mesa in Lincoln County, where the Gallacher family ranches. Localized areas of higher radiation levels were observed there, according to a report issued by the Los Alamos National Laboratory.

The measurements were based on a soil survey after the bomb test.

"The maximum concentrations in soil outside the fenced area of Ground Zero (GZ) were detected on Chupadera Mesa about 28 miles from GZ," the report stated. The authors of the report suggested that a localized rain shower may have scrubbed a portion of the fall-out cloud.


Measurements began the same day as the test.

Additional surveys of the Trinity Site were carried out in 1977 and 1983 by DOE. Previous studies were completed in 1948, 1950, 1951, 1973 and 1974 by various groups including the Environmental Protection Agency.

The radiation did not reach east beyond the nearby Oscura Mountains, Montoya said.

However, in his critically-acclaimed book "The Day the Sun Rose Twice," author Ferenc Morton Szasz concluded that a swath of fairly high radioactivity covered an area roughly 100 miles long by 30 miles long. Radiation was traced from the blast to as far away as New York, where highly sensitive film was affected.

While no proof exists that humans or animal populations were permanently damaged, some did end up with strange growths of white hair.

Government took new ranch, spurring break-up of family

Patti Brady's mother died still hoping that someday her family would regain the ranch land taken by the government in 1941.

Her mother and dad bought the spacious Jim Gilliland Ranch, a 67,840 acre block, and set out to fix it up. They built a new adobe home, drilled wells, put in water tanks and windmills. They ran 450 head of cattle, worked four active mines and ran ore trucks daily.

But two months after moving onto their new ranch, government officials came to Laura and Snook Burris' house to say they were taking it away.

They were ordered to leave in December 1941. They were given until February 1942.

"I was a little child, but I do remember the bad feelings and the hurt," Brady said. "Mother said they had no sympathy for the pain they were causing."

Her parents divorced after they were forced off the land and her father left, Brady said. "He couldn't handle it," she said.

Her mother later remarried and became Laura McKinley.

She had to pay off the mortgage on the confiscated ranch and lease another place, Brady said.

"She had two children and (the government) kept giving her promises of all kinds. She wrote a book. It's a sad situation when armed people come to your home, tell you you're leaving and you have no choice."

"The sad part is that they left thinking that their own government would let them come home, which they never were able to do again."

Putting the example in terms urban residents may understand, Brady said it's like being forced to rent your home to the government at the annual rent the government wants to pay. Ten years go by and although property values go up significantly, the government only increases the rent it pays by a small amount. Then after another 20 years, the government says it's paid enough and it owns the house.

"How would you feel when you still have the mortgage on it, you still have the deeds and you're still paying taxes?" Brady asked. "The government can do that to you, and don't think they

can't."

In total, Patti's mother received \$322,000 for her ranch, which was valued at \$747,000 by experts at New Mexico State University, Brady said.

"Those ranchers had to go through this horrible nightmare. I kept hearing my mother comment all through the years, 'Don't trust the government because they'll take what you've got and they'll give you false promises.'"

Brady doesn't hold out much hope for a Congressional solution. Congress doesn't understand the situation, she said.

"(The government) sent people from Washington (about six years ago) to fire all these cattle guards we've got here," Brady said, referring to the spaced metal rods used on roads to keep cattle from leaving their grazing land. "They don't know anything about life here when they think steel bars across the road are guards with guns."

Hoping to promote support for what she considers just compensation, Brady presents programs on the White Sands ranchers' situation to clubs, retirement groups and government agencies.

Ferenc Morton Szasz, which received accolades from the New York and L.A. times newspapers.

Cloudy and windy weather caused the test to be rescheduled from 4 a.m. to 5:30 a.m. But top military officials refused to wait until a clearer day, as President Harry Truman needed the ammunition of this powerful card at his war negotiations in Potsdam.

The bomb's fury vaporized the tower, leaving behind a crater of melted sand. Luckily, the weather cooperated and disseminated the radioactivity.

A site to see

The entrance to the Trinity Site, the name given to Ground Zero for reasons still uncertain, is accessed through the Stallion Range gate, about 12 miles east of San Antonio

and about 65 miles west of Ruidoso.

Seventeen miles south, a solitary bunker covered with earth and capped with a thick slab of concrete remains as a reminder of the humans who witnessed through dark glasses the culmination of the three-year race to create the atomic bomb and end World War II.

Visitors leave their cars in a large parking lot outside the fenced area around ground zero (GZ).

The only evidence of the tower inside is a cement footing that secured one corner.

A model similar to Fat Boy, the bomb dropped on Nagasaki, Japan on Aug. 9, 1945, rests on a flatbed. It was the third atomic bomb exploded. The second devastated Hiroshima three days earlier. The Japanese surrendered on Aug. 14.

Photographs inside the fence show the second-by-second development of the mushroom cloud after detonation.

According to information handed out at the gate, the shock from the bomb broke windows 120 miles away.

To allay fears of radioactivity at the site, soldiers demonstrate that brightly colored Fiesta ware sets a higher pace on a Geiger counter than the trinitite created by the blast.

The tour area encompasses the McDonald ranch house, where the plutonium core of the bomb was assembled. Visitors also can walk through the tubular shell of Jumbo, a 25-foot long, 10-foot high, 214-ton casing originally constructed, but never used, to contain the rare plutonium in case the bomb didn't work.

After three decades of urging by the National Park Service, the 51,500-acre Trinity area was named a national historic landmark in 1975.

Skateboards, even joggers, are banned

Skateboards, in-line skates, bicycles and even jogging were outlawed on Main Street sidewalks by Ruidoso Village Councilors Tuesday night.

Hackey Sack and other sports were narrowly spared from the ban. The law covers Sudderth Drive sidewalks from Grindstone Canyon Road to Country Club Drive. It becomes effective Tuesday, July 18.

Those caught violating the ban will be issued a warning by police for the first offense, \$50 for the second, and \$100 for each subsequent violation, councilors decided.

"I know there is a problem (downtown), but this is not the solution," said Councilor Leon Eggleston at the public hearing. Eggleston cast the sole dissenting vote against the ordinance.

The ban came in response to downtown merchants' complaints that skateboarders are a safety hazard to themselves and pedestrians, unruly and rude, loitering in front of stores, and driving away potential customers.

Business owner Terri Sodd, who first proposed skateboarding be banned back in April, complained at Tuesday's hearing that something has to be done before more of her customers are turned off and go away.

"I've spent my entire life building up my business, not to give it up by what's going on out front," Sodd said.

About 10 youths, overshadowed by about 20 merchants, sat in attendance at the hour-long hearing. One youth, Austin Koontz, spoke in opposition of the ban, suggesting it left the kids with nowhere to skate until the new skateboard park behind Fire Station #2 is built.

He complained that the owners of the Jack Little Drive property where kids have made their own little park have also forbidden skateboarding there.

"If we're going to get kicked out of Midtown, where are we supposed to go?" Koontz said.

Last month, councilors approved construction of a skateboard park along White Mountain Drive. The park, which will be mostly asphalt, should be ready by the end of the month, village officials said.

Since the last council meeting, the police "have beefed up patrols somewhat," said police Detective Wolfgang Born.

Police have responded to com-

plaints about skateboarders 14 times, one which involved an accident with no injuries after a skateboarder ran a traffic light at the corner of Eagle Drive and ran into a vehicle, he said.

Officers have also issued three violations for skateboarding in the roadway, and have made one arrest for possession of marijuana.

Although there is no law against loitering, ordinances are already on the books that prohibit obstruction of movement, vandalism and littering.

Eggleston said merchants should support enforcement of these laws, rather than penalize everyone in town with a new law.

"The solution is filing (police complaints) on those causing problems," Eggleston argued. "Are we going to affect all kids down there because of a certain group no one will file on?"

It was Eggleston who proposed adding joggers to the ordinance.

"If they're set on walking traffic, then there will only be walking traffic," Eggleston concluded.

His motion was seconded by Councilor Robert Donaldson, who said sarcastically, "The speed of joggers running through the town is dangerous — they might knock over people."

Councilor Frank Cummins and Mayor Jerry Shaw also agreed to the jogger ban.

"I decided that if we were going to just keep kids from using the sidewalks (for sport), then some adults were going to have to suffer too," Mayor Shaw said later.

Yet another attempt to ban more sporting activities failed.

"In my opinion, Hackey Sack should be included," Councilor J.D. James offered. "I've noticed they've started doing this (downtown) too."

The group foot bag game hinders sidewalk traffic, James said.

"Well, why don't you just delete Hackey Sack and put in all sporting activities?" Shaw responded. "How long is (the list) going to be?"

With that suggestion, James made a motion for the ordinance to include a ban on all thrown or kicked recreational objects, mirroring a ban for the plaza area in Santa Fe.

That motion failed, however, as another split vote along the same lines was made, and Mayor Shaw voted against it to break the tie.

"There's nothing I've seen that suggests Hackey Sack interferes with public safety," Mayor Shaw said.

Tribe submits nuke quality program

The Mescalero Apache tribe has submitted a proposed quality assurance program to the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC).

It's one of the first official steps in the tribe's agreement with a group of nuclear power companies to build what could become the nation's largest private, centralized storage facility for spent nuclear fuel rods. But a NRC official said Wednesday the application is routine and the document speaks in generalities.

"They have submitted an application for approval of a quality assurance program. That's a very general (document)," said Robert Baer, chief of the source containment and devices branch of the NRC. "It doesn't specify in any detail how it would be used."

"It does not have an application

for a specific device or storage system. Our regulations say in order to use, design, fabricate anything associated with the transportation of nuclear waste material, you have to have a quality assurance program."

The program must cover 18 criteria, he said.

"What they've submitted is how they would meet these criteria, but that's separate from any specific application," Baer said. "I wouldn't make too much out of it. The fee is only \$370, so nobody is making a huge commitment. We're in the process of reviewing it."

The site most often mentioned for the storage project is at the northwest corner of the reservation that stretches from Cloudfcroft north to Alto. Tribal members first rejected the proposal in a January election and then approved it in a second vote in March.

County Briefs

Lincoln County will maintain part of Country Club Road

Uncertainty over the ownership of Country Club Road in Carrizo led to lack of maintenance and the street's deterioration, Lincoln County officials said Tuesday.

Carrizo Mayor Cecilia Kuhnle supplied documentation proving county ownership. Since she moved to the area in 1983, she hasn't seen "one ounce of work" on the road and has received many complaints, she said.

"Put two more potholes out there and the road would be smooth," cracked County Commissioner L. Ray Nunley.

"It's used by a lot of county and city residents, and school buses," said Commissioner Stirling Spencer. "It's highly traveled."

Nunley emphasized that only the portion of the road that skirts the town and gives access to recreational areas will be maintained by the county. At one point, it enters private land and that won't be touched, he said.

Acting road manager Albert Hernandez said he will rip up the existing base, apply a base course, then roll to compact the surface. He estimated the cost at \$5,700. That amount also would include a culvert, if needed. He said there's enough money in the 1995-96 budget to do the work.

County won't join spotted owl lawsuit on its own

Lincoln County Commissioners said Tuesday the county won't join a lawsuit fighting restrictions on the use of spotted owl habitat enforced through the Endangered Species Act (ESA). The county is already a member of an organization that joined the Arizona attorney general in filing the suit.

On behalf of the county's Public Land Use Advisory Council, Commissioner Stirling Spencer said the Coalition of Arizona and New Mexico Counties is a party to the attorney general's suit against the U.S. government for allegedly exceeding its power in the application of the ESA and for failing to comply with some aspects. But the coalition also would like each county individually to be a party to the suit.

"To bolster their case and add more credibility, the more plaintiffs the better," explained County Attorney Alan Morel. He warned that the county could then expect to pay a larger share of any economic impact statement charge and the expenses associated with giving depositions in Arizona.

Commissioners agreed that the county's participation should be limited to its membership in the coalition.

Attorney's fee on hold until commission approves policy

Payment of an attorney's fee for Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane was put on hold Tuesday by the County Commission.

McSwane wants to pay the fees from his county budget. The fees were incurred when he was fighting the commissioners to keep his narcotics investigation unit.

Commissioners are split on whether McSwane should pay the fee personally, since he could have consulted the county attorney who already is on the public payroll; or if he can take the \$900 out of his office's budget for professional services.

They decided to withhold payment until they consider a policy to govern legal fees acquired by elected officials. Most budget line items for professional service spell out a specific use, such as microfilming in the county clerk's office. But McSwane's line item wasn't specific, County Manager Carolin Cooney said.

She has asked for a written opinion from the Department of Finance and Administration on whether it was proper for the sheriff to hire a private attorney, and if the fee can be charged to his budget.

Commissioners contend that legal costs could soar if all elected officials decide to seek advice from private attorneys and then bill the county.

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September election for ENMU-Ruidoso

Ruidoso School District residents will be asked to vote Tuesday, Sept. 26 on a one-mill tax increase for Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso.

Because of a new state law, property owners in the school district are being asked to double their tax commitment from the current one mill.

If voters reject the increase, officials say state money for ENMU-Ruidoso's general fund could drop by one-sixth, from the current \$308,000 down to \$50,000.

The election was approved by the Ruidoso School Board Tuesday. The board was acting in its capacity as the Ruidoso Off-Campus Instructional Program District Board.

Registered voters who are residents of the Ruidoso School District are the only people eligible to vote in the election.

Voters had first approved a one mill levy tax to start up the off-campus university on Feb. 5, 1991.

The tax increase would amount to \$1.00 per \$1,000 of net taxable value of property.

In New Mexico, property is taxed on one-third of the market value. For example, a person with a \$60,000 home, which has a tax

valuation of \$20,000, now pays \$20 a year toward the campus operation. Should voters approve the additional mill levy, that same property owner would pay \$40 a year for ENMU-Ruidoso operations.

House Bill 608 includes a new concept called the College District Tax Act. All property taxpayers in various two-year college taxing districts must now pay two mills of property tax or higher.

If voters reject the tax increase, the Commission on Higher Education could only recommend state funding of \$325 per full-time equivalent student, said EMNU President Everett Frost.

"Using this spring's enrollment figures as an example of the formula; 460 students divided by 15 hours, times \$325, would reduce the current appropriation by about \$250,000 or 1/6th of the current funding," ENMU-Ruidoso director Jim Miller explained.

Costs of the election will be paid by ENMU, officials said.

The only voting station available for the mill levy election will be at the Ruidoso School District Administration Office at 200 Horton Circle. The Election Proclamation will be published in *The Ruidoso News* prior to the election.

Ruidoso 1995-96 budget finalized

The Village of Ruidoso's \$19.5 million budget for 1995-96 gained final approval from councilors Tuesday night.

The final budget, also approved by the state Department of Finance, increased approximately \$2 million over the \$17.5 million preliminary budget councilors approved in June.

Village Finance Officer Lee Ann Nichols explained the increase is primarily due to about \$1 million in holdover capital improvement project funds that was budgeted but not spent last year. The funds,

pegged mostly for MainStreet and airport improvements, are designated for the same uses this year.

Additional increases are due to roughly \$370,000 in outstanding purchase orders, and \$504,278 for projects not completed by the close of the fiscal year.

Councilors also approved: about \$4,000 for contracted services with the Lincoln County Humane Society Animal Shelter; \$4,000 for legislative election expense fund; and \$17,960 in 1/2% gross receipt tax funds transferred to the airport fund.

The mountain is constructed at the entrance to the Museum of the Horse. It was a tall order, but one Hettinga readily filled.

"It's been a real challenge," he said. "Each rock and tree was placed by our foreman, Darryl Staily."

Hettinga hit it off well with artist Dave McGary from the start.

"I liked Dave McGary from the moment we met," he said. "He is a genuinely swell guy with a lot of talent."

McGary's vision of the landscaping was critical and required a no-

limits attitude, Hettinga said.

"We pushed dirt and looked, placed rocks and looked some more, moved things around some and then things began coming together," he said. "We painted X's on the ground to represent where the horses would go and it began to take shape."

From the original conceiver of the piece to all the workers who helped with the realization of the dream, the construction of the Free Spirits at Noisy Water mountain has been a labor of love, Hettinga said.

"I know those who come and see

Free Spirits will love it and hold it in their minds for a long time."

Hettinga has been a part of the Ruidoso area since 1949, when his family built on property at Cedar Creek.

Volunteers to work on wilderness trails

 This weekend, 20 to 25 members of the New Mexico Volunteers for the Outdoors (NMVFO) organization will pack up cross-cut saws and shovels and head to the backcountry of the White Mountain Wilderness for two days of trail maintenance.

The volunteers, who come from towns and cities across the state, will help clear and stabilize five to seven trails in the wilderness area.

Lincoln National Forest Recreation Officer Sam Tobias said trail managers Nick Kuhn, Jim Rogge and Bob Falke have scouted out several projects for the group.

Volunteers will spend most of their time clearing deadfall, pruning and stabilizing portions of the Crest, Southfork, Rodemaker Canyon, Mills Canyon and Peacock trails. They might also construct water bars to slow or prevent erosion.

Tobias said NMVFO has volunteered for projects in the Lincoln Forest's White Mountain and Capitan wilderness areas since 1989.

They usually work intensively on short segments of a trail, Tobias said, but high winds this winter and spring downed a number of trees. Many hikers have blazed their own awkward trails around the deadfall, which is one reason the trails need to be cleared. As a result, NMVFO group efforts will focus on clearing several trails, rather than just one or two.

"They really are a good group, especially if you look at their overall program," Tobias said. "They're really aggressive and well-organized."

Several of the Smokey Bear Ranger Station officers will supervise the volunteers, but with this group, supervision really isn't necessary, Tobias said.

"You can just tell them what to do, and they'll do it," Tobias said. "They've actually conducted their own training in trail maintenance."

A learning experience

For Rickie Richardson, becoming a NMVFO member five years ago gave her the perfect opportunity to learn more about the state. The Albuquerque mental health worker is the coordinator for this weekend's project.

"This helped me explore different areas of the state that I hadn't been to," Richardson said, noting that the group is especially good for those new to the state.

NMVFO president Jim Orr of Albuquerque agreed. Orr and his wife, Vicki, have gone to places they didn't even know existed.

"I think that's why people get

involved. A lot don't know what's in their backyard," said Orr, a program analyst for the U.S. Department of Energy.

The group's largest base of volunteers is from Albuquerque, with contact groups in Las Cruces and Santa Fe. But Orr and Richardson said NMVFO would like to increase membership in the smaller towns like Ruidoso.

"We're trying to build up that area membership-wise," Orr said, referring to Lincoln County.

The group does more than just trail maintenance, although that makes up the majority of projects. Other projects include fence construction and erosion prevention at Indian ruins sites. The group works with the official stewards of the lands - U.S. Forest Service, U.S. Bureau of Land Management, and state forest personnel.

This weekend's project begins at 8:30 a.m. Saturday. Project volunteers will work until 4:30 p.m. Saturday, and resume efforts again at 8:30 a.m. Sunday. USFS officers and NMVFO members will meet at Skyline Campground, located on Forest Road 117 off State Highway 532 (Ski Run Road).

Tobias, Richardson and Orr encourage those interested in volunteering to meet with the group.

"You don't need to be a member to be on the project," Richardson said.

Those interested in working one or both days should dress appropriately. Tobias suggested hiking boots, gloves, long-sleeved shirts and pants. Wear a hat and sunscreen and prepare for rain, Tobias suggested. Volunteers should also bring plenty of water and energy snacks.

Because all the work will take place in a designated wilderness area, Forest Service rangers and volunteers are restricted to primitive access (walk in or horseback ride in) and primitive tools. For example, they can't use chainsaws to clear the deadfall, Tobias said. The group will use two-person handsaws instead.

Tobias and trail managers have set up a variety of projects for the group to accommodate those who have less or more time. Some projects will require lots of hiking - up to 12 miles - in the wilderness. Others will be based closer to Skyline Campground, or will be shorter in length.

"We'll have some folks that will put in a good day of hiking to the remote areas," Tobias said.

Retired thoroughbred finds a home

Fog Fighter was claimed by Jim and Carla Claridge about four years ago, and during that time, he won 11 races. Fog Fighter has been a special horse for the Claridges.

"He just tried hard every time he ran. He was right there every time. He's got a lot of heart," Jim Claridge said.

In his lifetime, Fog Fighter has been in 140 races and has won \$88,775.

"That's a lot for a horse to run and he just didn't need any more running," Claridge said.

So the Claridges decided to retire Fog Fighter "like an old soldier" to the Coe Ranch, which is owned by Skip and Mary Trimble.

The Trimbles have put aside a pasture on their ranch for their retired racehorses.

"We just never could bring ourselves to sell our horses. We let them eat grass and have a good time," Skip Trimble said.

The Trimbles accepted Fog Fighter as a special favor to Jim Claridge, who trains their horses.

"Fog Fighter is just one of the lucky few that gets to go to a nice retirement home instead of having to go to a sale barn or somewhere else. This is much better," Jim said.

The Trimbles have five racehorses and a 30-year-old roping horse on their "retired horse field."

What have the Claridges and Trimbles saved Fog Fighter from?

"Most racehorses go to the slaughterhouse. A very good female or male racehorse becomes a broodmare or stud, but those are very few," Skip Trimble said.

Not everyone agrees with that estimate. Scott Wells, general man-

ager at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, differs somewhat.

In any case, as Jim puts it, Fog Fighter is one of the "lucky few."

"I think it would be good if other people would try to retire horses, too. My horses brought me a lot of pleasure when they were racing. They worked hard."

"I'd say probably 80-89% of racehorses find second careers either as breeding stock or as recreational horses, because racehorses tend to be very high-quality horses. Of course, some horses are slaughtered for dog food and for meat in Europe," Wells said.

"I felt like it was the least I could do for them after the pleasure they had brought us," Skip said.

Rita Danley's Proud and Jivey should pose the top threat to Full Connection, as the lightly raced juvenile outran Full Connection by a head to win the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity in his second lifetime start here on May 28.

The winner of Sunday's race at Ruidoso Downs automatically qualifies for the \$50,000 championship event which will be run at Retama Park in November.

Nine older thoroughbreds are eligible for the six-furlong Land of Enchantment Speed Handicap. Joe Torres' Power Stretch, a winner of five of his last six starts, including the Viva El Paso Handicap at Sunland Park, was assigned high-weight among the nominees.

Emergency planner urges Capitan to join FEMA program

With high summer temperatures and sparse rain, the idea that portions of Capitan are in a floodplain may be hard to swallow.

But Village Trustee Gordon Ross said Monday that's one piece of information he learned during a recent two-day session in Albuquerque with officials from the Federal Emergency Management Administration (FEMA).

Two areas of the village show up on a 1976 floodplain map, Ross told other trustees during their monthly meeting Monday. The map does not include recent annexations. The spots identified are North Smokey Bear Boulevard and East Forest Street down to the creek crossing on U.S. 380, and the intersection of Long Avenue and North View to State Highway 48.

"We're not in that program, so we are not eligible for FEMA flood insurance or disaster relief," Ross said.

Trustee Connie Hopper, who also heads Lincoln County's emergency services and disaster response planning, urged the board to motion joining the program. A motion by Ross to find out what needs to be done was approved unanimously by the board.

If the village joined the program, certain restrictions would have to be specified in a zoning ordinance on building elevations and construction techniques.

Updated maps showing annexed areas could be sent to the head of FEMA's regional office in Denton, Texas, to be sure all flood-prone sections are identified, said Village Clerk Deborah Cummins.

Hopper said she's starting a local emergency planning committee and has money available

to send people to training sessions. If interested, contact her at her office by calling (505) 648-2385.

In other business, the trustees:

— decided to concentrate on village water demands for the next five years, instead of asking for proposals for a 40-year water needs study. A longer-range study would be performed later. Breaking the study into two parts must first be approved by the State Engineer, who has control over the purchase of water rights in the state.

— heard assurances from Dr. Bernie Reimann, village representative on the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, that the possible closing of the construction and yard debris landfill near Capitan next year would not negatively impact the village. Alternative disposal methods would be provided.

Designer warns against using Capitan canal water elsewhere

The designer of Capitan's wetlands sewage treatment canals says pumping water off the property could seriously damage the natural filtration system.

At the Capitan Board of Trustees meeting Monday, Dr. Bernie Reimann strongly objected to a proposal by local business owner Don Brewer to pump some of the effluent to his neighboring ranch and the nearby Lincoln County fairground. The filtered sewage effluent would be used to water his cattle and to water down the fairground arena.

It took several years to complete studies, secure the money and build the efficient system, Reimann said.

"Now (water foreman Terry Cox) and I are battered by some who want to exploit and destroy it," Reimann said. "Extensive modification would have to be made for the very person who denied us the most suitable site."

Reimann explained that the village had to buy a less desirable piece of land for \$50,000 and scale down the project when Brewer declined to sell some property.

Pumping out water from the

wetlands could lower levels in the canals and kill some of the vegetation, Reimann said.

Mayor Norm Renfro told Reimann he was over-reacting.

"I believe everybody in Capitan knows that (Brewer) wouldn't do anything to hurt this village," Renfro said. "He has a million dollar business (a ranch and a Shell gas station and convenience store). He owns land on three sides (of the wetlands) and asked me if it could be done, if extra effluent was available. He would have put in all the pipes. It wasn't going to cost the village anything."

Renfro took Brewer's question to Reimann.

"All I asked (Reimann) was 'can it be done,'" Renfro said. "I didn't know. The man (Brewer) asked me a question and I got him an answer and that's the end of it."

Cox said a member of the village water advisory board told him that group also was interested in using the effluent for the arena. Then he heard Brewer was bringing up a 20,000 gallon water tank for storage, Cox said.

Trustee Connie Hopper asked whether the system had water to spare.

That depends on existing conditions at the moment the water is requested, Reimann said. If the water dips too low, the filtering plants could die.

With little rain and intense heat, the evaporation rate in the system of canals is high, Cox said.

The state already has approved a 250,000 gallon discharge for use in watering down streets during a construction project in the village. But when the water is needed, the level may be too low to pump, Cox said.

Some additional treatment of the water also might be necessary, depending on the proposed use for the water, Reimann said.

The trustees should go on record against private uses of the sewage effluent, resident Molly Mason said.

"The four people here make the decisions," Renfro said, pointing to the four trustees. "And I'm sure they are not going to jeopardize the wetlands."

"I think the issue is dead," said Bernie Coker of the water advisory board.

Scenic byway planning begins

Planning is underway for promotion of the new Billy the Kid Loop scenic byway.

Representatives from Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Carrizozo, Capitan, Cloudcroft, Alamogordo and the Lincoln National Forest met yesterday to discuss the new Billy the Kid Loop official state scenic byway.

Twenty people attended the Scenic Byways Ad Hoc Committee meeting at the Ruidoso Civic and Convention Center to talk about possible sites for a regional interpretive center and local matching funds.

The Billy the Kid Loop was approved by the state June 6. It runs through Ruidoso on Highway 70, into Capitan via Highway 48, through Lincoln on Highway 380 and back onto Highway 70 through the Hondo Valley.

After the state approval of the designation, the village applied for federal tourism grant funds. The grant request asks for \$528,000 to the Village of Ruidoso to develop a comprehensive corridor management plan, produce a regional brochure and construct a regional interpretive center which preserves and promotes the history, culture, etc. found along the Billy the Kid

route.

The application foresees a 20% local match (\$132,000) for a total \$660,000 budget.

Most of the federal money would be used to construct a 3,500 square-foot regional interpretive center along the route. The center would have a display area, restrooms, exhibits and, computer-generated information.

Other discussion at the meeting included:

- development of a non-profit Billy the Kid Historical Foundation;
- how to assure outlying areas receive benefit from the byway.

A glimpse into Lincoln County's past, compiled by Polly E. Chavez with excerpts from "A History of Lincoln County Post Offices."

Carrizozo
Carrizozo probably would have been no more than a siding and junction with the old Capitan branch of the El Paso and Northeastern Railroad, if the people of White Oaks had cooperated with Mr. Eddy. His plans were to build his railroad north to tie in with the Rock Island Railroad. Because of the high cost of securing a right-of-way through White Oaks, Eddy by-passed it. The Carrizozo Post

Office was named for the Spanish word "Carrizo" meaning tall dry grass, which once grew in the area. Frederick M.P. Hunt became the first postmaster in 1902. In 1914, newspaperman John A. Haley was appointed postmaster. Haley's daughter, Aileen Lindamood of Carrizozo, granted permission for use of a portion of his 1913 yearbook in "A History of Lincoln County Post Offices." Other history for the booklet was obtained from various sources. (Correction: The Tinnie Office, once known as Analla, was established in 1903, not 1990 as inadvertently stated in the July 10, 1995 column.)



Local tourism grants awarded

The New Mexico Department of Tourism (DOT) recently awarded 86 tourism organizations \$499,950 in cooperative advertising funds for the 1995-1996 fiscal year, according to DOT Secretary John A. Garcia.

Among the 86 are seven local organizations: Apache Trails Promotion Council, \$7,000; Capitan Chamber of Commerce, \$20,000; Cloudcroft Chamber of Commerce,

\$8,000; County of Lincoln, \$500; Lincoln County Heritage Trust, \$250; Ruidoso Civic Events Center, \$10,000; and Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, \$20,000.

"Many of the applications this year were excellent," Garcia said, citing the Ruidoso Chamber and Ruidoso Civic Events Center as outstanding.

The applicants had been seeking a total of more than \$1.9 million.

Cooperative advertising funds, appropriated by the state legislature and administered by DOT each year since 1976, is actually a reimbursement fund. It can recover the net costs of advertising, printing, billboard rental, and trade show registration fees.

Judge William Butts released them from custody Tuesday afternoon on \$10,000 unsecured bonds. He added a condition that they go nowhere other than work or home until a preliminary court hearing is held in August.

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

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

Anniversary would be perfect time to stop nuclear bomb testing

As the 50th anniversary of the first atomic bomb blast approaches, it's ironic that a Greenpeace ship on its way to protest new above-ground explosions has just been taken over by the French government.

The legacy of that first blast is immense, comparable to any other major event in this planet's history. The bomb put a quick end to World War II, but for the first time, it gave man the ability to destroy his world.

Some Lincoln County residents who witnessed that first blast are still alive. It's hard to imagine the shock they must have felt when the sky lit up; some thought it was the end of the world. The explosion was one of the best-kept secrets in history; no one outside the U.S. government and its scientists was told it was coming, despite some scientists' worry that it could create a chain reaction and destroy the world. The government issued a press release afterwards that said it was an ammo dump explosion.

A few weeks later when nuclear bombs exploded over Hiroshima and Nagasaki, everyone realized what had happened on the White Sands Missile Range — on the Jornada del Muerto (Journey of Death).

On Sunday's 50th anniversary of the Trinity Site explosion, it would be an appropriate time for all governments in the world to cease nuclear bomb testing, above or below ground. After 50 years, surely we know enough about the effects of the explosions to avoid setting any more off and risking more damage to our battered Mother Earth.
