Corona Summer Festival set for Saturday, Sunday

Residents of Corona will celebrate the opening of their new senior citizens center Saturday as part of the community's annual Summer Festival.

Lincoln County Commissioner L. Ray Nunley, who has championed the project with help from Corona Mayor Ernest Lueros and former state representative H. John Underwood, will be on hand with other commissioners for the dedication at 10 a.m.

Lueros said a parade will follow the ceremony. Visitors can browse through arts and crafts booths and sample Corona cooking Saturday and Sunday. Dance reunions are scheduled the same weekend.

Children will participate in a 4-H rodeo Saturday and a dance will wind down the day. Team roping competition is set for Sunday.

The county kicked in \$10,000 to move a donated senior citizens building to the community. The state Legislature gave \$90,000 for renovations and another \$65,000 this year to complete the kitchen. The South Central Mountain Recreation, Conservation and Development Council also chipped in \$9,000.

Commission calls special session

The Lincoln County Commission will meet in emergency session at 8 a.m. Friday to sign a resolution for the financing of a new fire truck at Fort Stanton.

The money will come from the New Mexico Finance Authority, an account created to allow government entities to borrow for capital outlay at a low rate of interest.

Art festival offers free shuttle service

The Ruidoso Art Festival is providing a shuttle bus service this weekend for visitors. The shuttle will make stops in downtown Ruidoso, at the Museum of the Horse and at Ruidoso Downs Racetrack, in addition to a stop at the Civic Convention Center, location of the art festival.

The shuttle will run continuously, picking up and dropping off passengers, after departing from the Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs at 10:25 a.m. Saturday and 11:25 a.m. Sunday.

State's first tour draws three bidders to fort

Dan Lopez of Desert Hills Center sees Fort Stanton as a chance to provide training and rehabilitation for young people.

Stan Monks thinks the former state hospital could be converted into a film production operation.

And Veronica Luna of Rivers Bend in Las Cruces envisions a residential treatment center for those with severe emotional problems.

The three were representatives of companies interested in leasing the fort, a former state hospital. They attended the state's first briefing tour since a request for leasing proposals (RFP) was issued July 14.

"We have other companies interested in using it as a corporate retreat or rehab center, the whole gamut of uses," Carol Fittipaldi of the New Mexico General Services Department (GSD) said Wednesday.

"But the national advertising hasn't even begun yet. We hope by the next briefing, Aug. 24, the room will be filled with prospects from across the country," she said.

Already, the tale of the 1855 military fort up for lease has been reported by the Cable News Network (CNN). Fittipaldi expects other news organization to find the story intriguing.

But the GSD isn't taking any chances. The state has hired the Albuquerque marketing firm of Strascina and Partners, which subcontracted with Edelman Business Marketing of Chicago, to handle the

national media campaign.

The department has been criticized for possibly wasting money. But Wednesday, Fittipaldi defended the move.

"Fort Stanton accounts for one-tenth of all the state-owned buildings in New Mexico," she said. "We have a substantial investment here. I was surprised about the reaction."

The entire advertising, marketing and public relations budget for the project equals about 10% of a one year lease, she said. The state already has indicated the fort's 317,514 square feet and 76 buildings are worth \$1.35 million a year, plus another million in maintenance and operation.

"If we hadn't reached for this national market, they would have criticized us for that too," Fittipaldi said.

In addition to other target markets, an advertisement is set to appear in Forbes magazine Aug. 14 and again at the end of that month, Fittipaldi said.

That gives prospective occupants all of September, October and half of November to submit proposals, said Rex Robberson, director of the property control division.

Speaking Wednesday to the three potential bidders, to Lincoln County Commissioners and to assorted state and local staff, GSD Secretary Steven Beffort said the state is approaching the lease carefully. He wants a long-term solution and protection of the historic integrity of the fort, Beffort said.

Fort Stanton is listed on the state registry of cultural properties and the national register of historic

landmarks. The grounds contain 48 archaeological sites.

Proposals varied

Lincoln County Commissioner Wilton Howell expressed his hope that the fort's future use does not stop public access to the historic site.

Lopez of Desert Hills said under his proposal, the fort would become a training center in construction-related skills, food service and

other fields. The complex could become an academy aimed at meeting the needs of those who have dropped out of school or encountered trouble in their lives, he said.

The participants also could be trained to lead tours of the fort, he said. The operation would be labor intensive, with about two employees to every client.

Monks, speaking for Brentwood Entertainment in California,

received assurances that the state wouldn't have a problem if the gymnasium is renovated into a sound stage, because it is not a historic building. Monks said Brentwood would not want to spend time and money on a proposal if the state would reject part of the plan outright.

The state can kick out a lessee with one-year notice if it is not a government department, but the

New NMSU president speaks about future role of agriculture

New state university president Michael Orenduff told a gathering of ranchers Wednesday he does not like the federal Endangered Species Act, even though he considers himself an environmentalist.

Orenduff addressed members of the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau at their Summer Leadership Conference Wednesday at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center. Orenduff took the helm at New Mexico State University July 1.

Orenduff predicted some hot topics for coming years: environmental laws, expansion of niche markets, and localized processing of food.

The Endangered Species Act should be rewritten, Orenduff said, because it isn't balanced.

"Farmers and ranchers have always been the leading environmentalists in this country. They live with the land and must take care of the land.

"But they're also realists. They know the land has to be productive if we are going to benefit from it. All of society depends on that," Orenduff said.

There are people who use environmentalism as a way of stopping progress and making use of the land impossible, Orenduff observed.

"I think that we at NMSU, as we look at all the issues involved, will take the middle approach," Orenduff said.

More and more niche markets will develop in the future, Orenduff predicted, to meet the needs of increasingly diverse consumers. Even lettuce producers are aware of this trend, producing greens like red curly leaf lettuce, green curly leaf lettuce, endive, chicory lettuce as well as iceberg lettuce.

There is also a growing ethnic component to foods, Orenduff said.

At a land grant institution in Maine, the sea urchin egg, a delicacy in Japan, is being harvested.

"I hope New Mexico will be able to take advantage of the growing niche markets," Orenduff said.

State farm revenues for 1993 totaled \$1.6 billion, but New Mexicans' consumption of processed

Stranded climber rescued from ledge

In a replay of a similar rescue in early June, an emergency team plucked a stranded man from a ledge beneath the Bonito Lake Dam Saturday.

Volunteers with the Bonito Fire Department rescue unit received a call about 6:30 p.m. that a man was yelling for help.

Scott Yates, 32, of Artesia and Alto Village had climbed about 250 feet from the bottom of the dam to within 15 feet from the top of a cliff, according to Assistant Chief Jack Orio and Deputy Chief Mark Stambaugh.

"He had been climbing on solid ledges, but from there above, it was marly stuff (that broke off when touched) and he couldn't get a firm grip," Orio said.

Stambaugh added, "He was pretty much stranded. He couldn't come down. The ledges he had ascended were very treacherous."

Yates wasn't aware of how close he was to the top, because a rock outcropping blocked his view, said Bob Palko, operations captain.

Orio said Yates clung to a small tree for added security while he waited for the rescue unit personnel to reach a point above him.

"It was a matter of getting

above him and securing three sets of ropes," Stambaugh said. "Then (Palko) rappelled down from the top to where the climber was stranded."

Palko, who said he has been climbing since his college years, tied safety ropes to Yates.

"I gave him a short course on climbing and with the safety ropes attached, he went up on his own power," Palko said.

The entire operation took about 45 minutes, Orio said.

"This is how I got into the fire department about five years ago," Stambaugh said. "(Fire Chief) Howard Puckett rescued my yellow lab the same way on Angus Hill. (The dog) came down on a ledge and couldn't go up or down and the department rescued him."

Stambaugh gave credit for Yates' smooth rescue to Palko.

"He's well-trained and has quite a bit of experience in climbing," Stambaugh said. "That was obvious Saturday, because he really knows how to pull this off."

Yates, who couldn't be reached for comment Tuesday, was "just out having an adventure and ended up in a real tight spot," Stambaugh said. "He did the right thing by calling for help, instead of trying to pull himself out of it like a lot of people might have attempted and ended up dead."

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Geronimo pleads not guilty

Sitting in a chair instead of standing in front of the judge like other defendants, Joseph Geronimo pleaded not guilty Monday to a charge of disturbing the peace.

He said the charge, which carries a maximum sentence of one year in jail and a \$5,000 fine, is motivated by politics.

Geronimo is accused of disrupting a tribal council meeting June 22 after a reporter was asked to leave by council members in response to a request from Fred Kaydahzinne, tribal director of housing.

"Wendell is afraid he will be kicked out of office this fall," Geronimo said of Mescalero President Wendell Chino and the tribal election in November. "He's trying to eliminate opponents. If I am found guilty, I will not be eligible as a candidate."

Chino could not be reached for comment.

By pleading innocent to the charge, Geronimo ensured that his case will be set for trial. He will defend himself, because he can't afford an attorney, he said.

Geronimo ran unsuccessfully against Chino for president in several elections, and has opposed the tribal council's plan to store nuclear waste on the reservation.

"The only crime I committed is that I don't worship Wendell Chino like (some tribal officials)," Geronimo said.

By asking a reporter from *The Ruidoso News* to leave the tribal council meeting and no one else, the council "made a joke out of our civil rights," Geronimo said. "Too much is done in secrecy and the press is one way for us to hear what happens in the meetings."

Referring to verbal attacks on the council members, Geronimo said "My speech is protected by law in addressing the council," he said. "If the kitchen is too hot, get out."

In a sworn affidavit, Chino stated that Geronimo went up to him after the reporter left, pointed a finger and called him "a crazy old man." Chino also swore that Geronimo referred to council members as "thieves, liars and crooks."

The special tribal meeting was called June 22 to dispel rumors that Chino had resigned as president, and to reconsider a resolution calling for the appointment of a new supervisor of the local Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Geronimo said he did not stand before the judge like other defendants in the tribal court Monday because "it is Wendell's court and his puppets."

Judge Gregg Klinekole released Geronimo without bond.

"You know where I work and where I live," Geronimo told Klinekole in requesting no bond. "This is my home. I'm not going anywhere."

Villages to share police narcotics unit

Neighboring police forces have combined to form a narcotics enforcement unit to address drug trafficking between Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

The unit will function under a joint powers agreement, approved by Ruidoso village councilors Tuesday night.

The council's approval followed that of Ruidoso Downs village councilors the night before.

At the Ruidoso meeting, Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox said "the trafficking of drugs is not something that is going to go away," and that creation of the unit may help to "cure some cases" existing between the towns.

He said that although his department has a narcotics officer, it has been without a task force unit since cooperation with the Lincoln County Narcotics Unit no longer exists.

"With this cooperative agreement, any investigation in Ruidoso Downs, or one that goes over boundaries to here, gives us the authority to make an arrest," Maddox said.

The cooperative agreement dif-

fers from the one with Lincoln County because Ruidoso agents "will have full commission" when acting in Ruidoso Downs, Maddox added.

Assets derived from investigations will be split 60-40, with the Ruidoso department receiving the larger portion. The assets will revert to the program, which Maddox said he hopes will be self-sufficient in the near future.

Ruidoso councilors also approved the establishment of a police department reserve program.

The program will allow for any Lincoln County resident 18 years or older to see if "they have some sort of law enforcement blood in them," Maddox said.

Back in 1972, Maddox served as a reserve officer, and he said it was the "cheapest education I've ever had."

The police department has been wanting to initiate the program for several years, the chief said, but couldn't because of the liability concern with its former insurance carrier. A change in carriers has cured that problem.

The reserve officers must be with a commissioned law enforcement officer at all times, Maddox

said, and will be volunteering their time. Additionally, they must serve a minimum of eight hours a month.

Potential reserve officers must have a high school or GED to qualify, and must pass physical agility, written and oral exams at the department. They also will undergo stringent firearm training, and will come into the program owning their own gun.

Reserve officers will have different uniforms than regular officers, Maddox said, adding that there might be a nominal clothing cost to the village. He was unsure what the cost might be until the program gets underway, and said he is looking into other resources to fund the expense.

Maddox said about 10 people have already expressed interest in the program. They may be tested as early as next week.

Also at the meeting, councilors authorized a \$283,496 federal grant agreement for improvements to the instrument landing system at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

The grant requires a 5% funding match from both the village and the state. Each entity has approved the funding, and village officials have budgeted the necessary \$14,175 in funds.

lessee doesn't have that right, Robberson said. Monks said that appears discriminatory and that it would be difficult for a company to sink a great deal of money into the site, knowing it could be told to leave in one year.

Robberson said he "will work on it" and also try to convince the state Legislature to abolish or extend the 25-year time limit that now exists on leases of state property.

Commissioners asked Beffort to be sure staff is available to conduct tours for company officials before the next briefing session. Some may not be able to coordinate with that schedule, they said.

Dates changed

Several dates have been changed since the RFP was issued, said Liz Roybal, leasing and property management bureau chief.

She listed the changes as:

— the second pre-proposal conference set for Aug. 10 changed to 10 a.m. Thursday, Aug. 24, in the dietary building.

— the submission deadline moved from Oct. 30 to 4:30 p.m. Nov. 13.

— the opening of proposals changed from Oct. 31 to 8 a.m. Nov. 14.

— the evaluation of proposals moved from Nov. 6 to Nov. 10.

— the final selection and notice of award changed from Dec. 15 to Friday, Dec. 29.

— lease negotiations shifted from Jan. 8 to Monday, Jan. 22.

The fort was shut down in late March when all employees, except a small maintenance and office crew, were laid off. The governor decided the fort was too expensive to continue conversion from a facility for the developmentally disabled (DD) to a long-term care hospital.

Before it was closed, the hospital employed about 200 people. The conversion to long-term care was initiated after a court ruling that directed Fort Stanton to relocate DD clients into community-based settings.

foods added up to more than \$2 billion, Orenduff said.

"Very little of that (processing) was done in New Mexico. I think this is an area that promises great growth in the economy of New Mexico," Orenduff said.

Orenduff asked for support in asking the Legislature for another agriculture building so NMSU can continue to be a leading agricultural school in the country.

Land grant institutions like NMSU emerged when the U.S. government decided to promote advances in the agricultural and me-

chanical arts, Orenduff said.

"That experiment has worked so successfully, it's really one of the great success stories of our nation. If you look at what U.S. agriculture has done, in comparison to anywhere else in the world, you can see it has been a tremendous success," Orenduff said.

After the land grant institution program began, the cooperative extension service was added.

Orenduff noted the New Mexico Livestock and Farm Bureau was the first sponsor of the cooperative extension service in New Mexico.

Every New Mexico county has a

cooperative extension office, and those offices often tailor their programs to the needs of the area.

Areas like Ruidoso can benefit from the recent creation of the hospitality and tourism major at NMSU.

"We are getting more and more people in the state in areas like this asking for assistance in developing the tourism business," Orenduff said.

"Our outreach is not just agriculture, it's also tourism and economic development," Orenduff added.

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P&Z chairman lambastes village planner

Faster action is needed on the revamping of Ruidoso's forest protection ordinance, the chairman of the planning commission said Monday.

Mike Radziewicz, chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission, also complained the village's planning department staff was "dragging its feet" in addressing certain ordinances that the commission has asked it to review.

He referred to the village tree cutting ordinance and one that says people can "allege" the P&Z made an error when appealing their request before the village council.

"The tree thing has been going on for I don't know how long," Radziewicz said. "I'm really getting fed up."

The code is inadequate and cumbersome, commissioners have said. They have asked village planner Cleatus Richards twice to follow up on a state forestry division request to help with the rewrite.

The intent of the existing ordinance is to preserve the area's forests, and reserves property owners to:

- gain staff permission when cutting any living tree with a five-inch diameter up to a 19.9-inch diameter;
- acquire commission approval for a tree 20 inches in diameter or greater;
- acquire a tree cutting permit, upon staff or commission approval,

at a cost of \$5 per tree; - submit to the P&Z a tree replacement plan if more than 20% of a lot's trees are to be cut; and - trees cut dead or diseased, obtain site inspections and remove slash (cut tree parts) promptly.

"People get real unhappy when they have to get a site approval for one tree," Radziewicz charged, adding he gets "blistering phone calls from people that don't make my day."

Richards said he did contact the forest division, and is still waiting for it to present its recommendations. Forest division officials told him they would issue their comments to him last week, Richards added.

Richards said his department needs more help in handling a hefty workload, but Radziewicz charged it is creating a "petty bureaucracy."

State foresters first approached the P&Z back in December, asking the commission to revamp the ordinance and make it more applicable to the area's forest health and high fire risk. Commissioners told state foresters to draft some recommendations for the commissioners to follow.

The two parties failed to communicate about the code until Richards was asked by the commission this spring to contact the division, said state forester Bill Duemling.

The recommendations still are not ready, but Duemling said Tuesday he hopes to have them com-

pleted within the next two weeks.

He said he was asked by Richards about three weeks ago to draft them.

"We held off on it until we heard from Cleatus," he said, adding that when foresters approached the commission in December, "We weren't sure they were all that interested."

Duemling said he is in the middle of writing suggestions and going through the existing code line by line.

Ordinance challenged

Richards said because the constitutionality of the forest protection ordinance is currently being challenged, reworking the old ordinance may be a "moot point."

He was referring to a Ruidoso Municipal Court case argued Thursday that may invalidate its existing ordinance.

The legal challenge involves a Ruidoso homeowner, Tom Walsh of Lubbock, Texas, who had clear cut 120 trees this winter without P&Z approval. He had been cited by code enforcement officers and fined \$600 by Judge Mike Lins, with \$4,400 suspended under the condition he submit a tree replacement plan to P&Z and appear before the commission.

Richards said Walsh "apparently didn't like pine needles."

Walsh hired attorney Gary Mitchell, who filed a motion to set aside judgment. During the hear-

ing, Mitchell and his assistant, Adam Rafkin, cited a 1982 U.S. Supreme Court case, Lucas vs. State of South Carolina. The case involved a shoreline area with undeveloped private property that had an environmental protection easement imposed on it to prevent further erosion. The state's action was in the aftermath of a destructive hurricane. Lucas was prohibited from developing the property and argued it was a taking or inverse condemnation of his land without compensation.

Mitchell said the village was infringing on Walsh's constitutional rights and taking his property by denying him the freedom to cut his trees.

Village Attorney John Underwood argued Walsh violated a village ordinance that controls cutting, and that Walsh and Mitchell both admitted he had violated the ordinance.

Line asked Underwood and Mitchell to file constitutional arguments about the ordinance by next week. He will make a decision soon after reviewing the briefs.

Other action

In other action, P&Z approved: - a site development plan for the Calvary Chapel at 2900 Sudderth for a church and parking; and,

- a variance to allow the extension of an existing carport at Mes-calero Trail.

Foresters reviewing tree cutting code

The state forestry division is in the process of reviewing Ruidoso's tree cutting ordinance, and plans to have recommendations for the Planning and Zoning Commission by early August.

"There's so much information and I'm trying to condense it," state forester Bill Duemling, who has been closely reviewing the ordinance, said Tuesday.

Foresters requested in December the commission rewrite its existing ordinance after explaining the area's forest health problems and severe fire threat.

In response, commissioners requested the division's professional recommendations prior to revamping the ordinance.

Duemling said much of the forest in the Ruidoso area is infected with dwarf mistletoe, an orange, spongy parasite that spreads easily, slowly kills the tree and makes it vulnerable to disease. Many trees also suffer from bark beetle infestation which also deprives the tree of nutrients, starving it and welcoming disease.

"We're seeing clumps of mortality in Ruidoso that probably weren't part of the vision the planners had in writing the (forest protection) code," Duemling said. "Nature is taking care of it now with disease and insects."

Duemling said the foresters plan to suggest the following changes: 1) the objective of the old ordinance; 2) the cost of tree cutting permits; 3) the size of tree considered mature and; 4) the cutting of dead and diseased trees.

Duemling said the old objec-

tion in the village code refers to the preservation of the woodlands for the economic viability of Ruidoso, but the word preservation should be changed to management. He said the code's reference to the village's wilderness state is incorrect because if it were truly a wilderness, fires would not be suppressed. Duemling also added the code's reference to the health, safety and welfare of the community should include the need for defensible space, a definition of hazardous areas and the responsibility for their removal.

He said the P&Z should either set up a flat fee for a cutting permit or to do away with the cost entirely.

"It's a little excessive, at \$5 a tree," he said, especially since some areas have 100 to 200 trees in an acre and desperately need some thinning.

The old ordinance requires approval to cut a five-inch diameter tree, but Duemling said that size isn't really a mature tree.

"It should not be based on size, but on age and condition of the stock per acre," he said.

The removal of dead or diseased trees is allowed without P&Z approval in the old ordinance, but Duemling says the code's definition of diseased trees is too vague and subject to broad interpretation.

Additionally, Duemling said the division plans to suggest the county hire an urban forester to help make daily determinations about the health of area trees and to work with individual residents assessing the condition of trees on their property.

Downs council makes fire chief job paid position

The Ruidoso Downs Village Council decided Monday the job of Ruidoso Downs fire chief should go through the normal village application and hiring process rather than be appointed by the mayor.

The council decided at a recent budget workshop that the fire chief

should be paid. The decision came after current volunteer Fire Chief Nick Herrera explained the amount of work involved in the job.

The fire chief's job will pay \$1,341 per month, village Clerk Leann Weibrecht said.

The Ruidoso Downs Fire Department operates with 15 volunteers.

The chief's job will be the only paid position in the department.

Herrera will be required to go through the hiring process if he wishes to continue as fire chief.

At Monday's meeting, trustees also approved a request by the fire department to seek bids for two fire trucks.

Trustees also approved a joint powers agreement with the Village of Ruidoso to share a narcotics enforcement unit.

Under the agreement, the Ruidoso Police Department Narcotics Unit will investigate narcotics violations as requested by the Ruidoso Downs Police Department.

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

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Commissioners seek ways to cover road costs

Lincoln commissioners agree the county needs a way to cover maintenance, repair and reconstruction expense on paved and chip-seal surface roads.

At their Aug. 8th meeting, they are expected to set a date for a hearing on the issue.

During a special commission meeting last week, County Manager Carolin Cooney requested permission to schedule the hearing.

"We have no mechanism to finance maintenance of paved roads we accept," she told commissioners. "We need to look at methods at the hearing to finance that as new roads come on for the two-year test period. During that period, we could determine what each road will need (for maintenance)."

Whatever the commission decides, the provision should be included in the county's subdivision regulations, she said. Developers and prospective residents need to know up front about costs.

The commission previously increased and then abolished a per front-foot road assessment against all subdivision roads, after residents in rural settlements loudly protested.

Residents pointed out that their dirt and gravel roads were being

assessed at the same rate as asphalt and chip-seal surface roads in more urban developments. While their streets might be bladed several times a year to remain useful, the surfaced roads eventually require more costly repairs, they contended.

Some roads had received no attention at all, but adjoining property owners still were paying the assessment.

"Maybe we should include a requirement that in a subdivision's disclosure statement, buyers be notified that an assessment will be levied," said commissioner Wilton Howell. "That way, they'll know up front what it will cost to maintain the roads."

He enthusiastically endorsed setting a hearing, and said, "We need to give people a chance to come out and express their opinions."

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said, "It seems that (approach) would prevent county residents in general from paying for the upkeep on roads in a new subdivision."

Other changes needed in the subdivision regulations also could be reviewed at the hearing, Chairman Monroy Montes said. He asked Ralph Romero, chairman of the county planning and zoning board, to submit recommendations

in time to be included in the hearing.

Commissioners rethink sale of equipment

Commissioners decided to think again about selling the chip-seal equipment purchased earlier in the year. A chip-seal treatment consists of laying chips of rock and thick oil on a road and is less expensive than hot asphalt.

When subdivision residents objected to the road assessments, the majority of commissioners decided not to move ahead with a plan to handle repairs and resurfacing of chip-seal roads in-house.

Commissioner Bill Schwettmann had pushed for the service, pointing out that, in addition to some subdivisions that already have surfaced roads, the county requires new subdivisions to provide surfaced streets. He questioned how the county can require such roads if it is not equipped to care for them later.

The other commissioners said lot owners in those subdivisions could band together and hire a private contractor to handle the work, or the county could hire the company and then bill the lot owners.

But Cooney said the county is looking at two highway projects where the equipment could be used

and most of the expense would be borne by the state. They also would train the men on the equipment with help from the equipment suppliers and consultants.

"There's a lot of technical support out there," she said.

"We're the only county except DeBaca without a chip-seal program," Cooney said. "I don't mean to go out and pave the county, just to maintain the roads we have."

She asked commissioners to consider keeping the equipment.

"My hopes of selling the equipment for what we paid for it or more are less sure than before," she said. "There's interest, but I think full price is a bit of a pipe dream."

Using the equipment would not increase the road department budget, she said.

Howell said if the equipment is to be kept, he'd like to see paving districts established where assessments could be charged for specific projects.

Nunley said the only way he would consider such assessments or projects would be if the lot owners came to the commission and asked.

"Yes. They told us they didn't want to pay and I don't see rewarding them with the service, but without the assessment," Howell agreed.

"I believe we can do it for less and that we can do the job," acting Road Manager Albert Hernandez said of the chip seal. "That includes the men's time and the value of the equipment."

"It's taken a year for us to get to this point and again we are undecided," chairman Montes said. "There's no rush. I favor going to the subdivisions and explaining the equipment is available and if they are willing to pay, this could be done."

Commissioner Stirling Spencer indicated his agreement, adding that even though he was against it before he wouldn't oppose projects where they can parlay with state money.

Schwettmann noted that he had voted against the sale of the equipment.

"It would be foolish to sell it," he said. "Asphalt roads have to be maintained. The people I know living on asphalt roads had no objection to the increased assessment, it was those on gravel roads. We accepted (the roads) and we've got to do something. Chip seal will last 15-20 years."

Commissioners then asked Hernandez to lay out a plan for the use of the equipment for them to review in August.

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

Land swap between developer, country club falls through

A proposed 62-acre land swap between a developer and the Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club has been withdrawn, reopening questions of what will be done with the open space.

Ronnie Paulger, president of Ruidoso Inc., said last week that his development company had proposed that the club develop and maintain approximately 62 acres of Ruidoso Inc. land, as a nine-hole extension of the Alto Lakes golf course.

In exchange, the buyers of homes Ruidoso Inc. plans to develop in Alto would receive full golf course membership.

But Ruidoso Inc. withdrew the offer earlier this week, after company officials could not agree with the club on the value of the land exchange, Paulger said.

"We were going to give them the land and some cash, and other considerations," Paulger said. "But we couldn't come to terms on a satisfactory value exchange for our land for social and full memberships" at the club.

He said the club wanted more money in addition to the land.

"I have no problem with their decision - they have their number crunching to do. Everyone has to seek their own confidence level in a project of this nature," Paulger said. "We just want to be good neighbors."

John Barnes, the club's president for the past six months, said a six-member committee was formed about two months ago to explore how the proposed nine holes "would

integrate with what we have.

"We were not finished with the study when the offer was withdrawn," Barnes said.

Despite the failed initiative, Paulger said Ruidoso Inc. plans to go forward with its home development plans.

"We're back to square one to identify (development) options for the 62 acres," he said.

The options include an executive 18-hole golf course, a separate club or more housing.

"We hope to have the options narrowed down within the next 60 days or so," Paulger said.

Ruidoso Inc.'s sketch plans for a housing development on approximately 49 acres of Alto land has received preliminary approvals from the county planning commission, the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission, and the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission, Paulger said.

At one planning hearing July 10, Ruidoso Inc. officials said they were negotiating on the golf course swap.

Paulger said plans for "Kokopelli Mesa" include 76 garden homes in a gated community alongside 31 houses on 3/4-acre to two-acre parcels.

The garden homes are listed with the planning departments as multi-family housing, but will actually be separate houses in a secure, maintained community, Paulger said.

Development of an acre of land for commercial use is also planned, as is a sewage treatment plant for the new homes.

"We hope to start moving dirt this fall," he said.

LCMC healthy despite drop in net revenue

Lincoln County Medical Center is healthy even though its net revenue is dropping, administrator Valerie Miller told the board of trustees at its monthly meeting on Thursday, July 20.

Attending the meeting were chairman Dub Williams and board members Valerie Miller, Nellie Ruth Jones, Gary Mitchell, Sonny Sanchez, Tom Battin and Donald Simms.

"The net revenue is going down even while the gross revenue is going up, because we are busier," Miller said. "The amount we are getting paid changes all the time because of the changes in the types of insurance plans."

"Some plans are tying us into a fixed amount or they want five or 10% off charges."

Because of the changes, the hos-

pital has experienced a loss of \$531,204, or 47.84% in insurance allowances, since last year, Miller said.

Gross patient revenue for LCMC was \$5,482,795 from January to July of last year. This year, gross patient revenue from January to July was \$6,990,596.

After insurance allowances and charity care, the hospital's net patient revenue was \$4,372,486 from January to June of 1994. Net patient revenue was \$5,349,083, from January to June of this year, a 22.34% increase.

"We are always changing the way we work," Miller said. "We have to."

The hospital has not raised its rates since 1990 and has absorbed inflation by increasing efficiency, Miller said.

"That's the proof in the pudding," she said. "We are always

looking for ways to increase efficiency without comprising care."

The ultimate goal of the hospital is to stop people from needing the facility at all, Miller said.

"We need to look at what we need to do to facilitate people going home," she said. "But we can't and don't want to deny anyone care."

People needing medical care frequently find the home environment, rather than hospitalization, the best solution, Miller said.

"When we're getting paid a certain number of dollars per person per month, do we want to stop them coming?" she said. "Absolutely, because our motivation is not to fill beds but is rather to put people in the most cost effective environment for their health care needs."

For more than 30 years, the LCMC Hospital Auxiliary has helped the facility with equipment costs.

Auxiliary president Dorothy King said her organization recently purchased \$110,406 worth of equipment for the hospital.

"We purchased copy machines, computer software and equipment for surgery, physical therapy, and emergency medical services," King said.

Most of the money is raised by the auxiliary through its thrift store and Pink Shop operations.

The Hospital Auxiliary Thrift Shop is located at 140 Nob Hill Drive and accepts donations of clothing and other usable items for resale. The Pink Shop is located inside the front lobby of LCMC and has a snack bar and gift shop.

Green Tree

In the summer of 1883, H.V. "Hack" Johnson viewed his inheritance and recognized it as an exceptionally desirable location for a town site. The 80-acre tract of grassland is bounded on the north by the Ruidoso River and stretches across Highway 70 southward to the base of the mountain where Hale Spring is located.

Johnson had the town site of Palo Verde surveyed and sold lots. As the building boom grew and the sawmills thrived, the population increased to about 500.

Dorothy R. Parnell was appointed acting postmaster at the newly-established office at Palo Verde, N.M. The department in Washington, D.C. stipulated that the name must be changed to the English translation "Green Tree," because there were several offices bearing the name Palo Verde in the country.

In 1958, the post office of Green Tree officially became Ruidoso Downs.

Ruidosoan placed on probation

After spending three months in custody, John Blackmon, 21, appeared in Ruidoso's Magistrate Court Wednesday, quiet and contrite.

Blackmon had been charged with aggravated battery with a deadly weapon for allegedly waving a gun at a Ruidoso homeowner April 25 and threatening him.

While in court Wednesday, attorneys reached a plea agreement and Blackmon pleaded no contest to the lesser charge of negligent use of a firearm, a petty misdemeanor.

Judge William Butts placed him on a year of unsupervised probation

with 180 days of suspended jail time.

During his recent Lincoln County jail stay Blackmon had attempted to harm himself several times, and was eventually placed at the Las Vegas Medical Center for a stay, court personnel said.

Butts told Blackmon he cannot contact his victim or possess a firearm. He must also have a job by Aug. 26 and begin counseling sessions this week for at least a year.

The young man's April arrest came just two weeks after he was acquitted of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon in connection with the shooting of 22-year-old Alan Ryan.

In that case, Butts had found that Blackmon had shot in self-defense.

Blackmon had been held at the jail on a \$100,000 bond.

During his second week of county jail custody, Blackmon claimed he swallowed a razor blade, and was found the next day to be bleeding from the mouth. He was taken to the county hospital that night. The next night, back in his cell, he pulled a bunk bed down on top of himself, detention administrators said.

Three weeks ago he was allowed to leave the holding facility under house arrest while awaiting his hearing.

Adults take advantage of GED testing program

Since testing began in November of 1994, 33 adults have taken the general education development (GED) test at the Ruidoso Center of Eastern New Mexico University.

The November testing date represented the first time the test has been regularly scheduled for administration in Lincoln County. The test is a cooperative service

provided by Eastern New Mexico University's Roswell campus and the Ruidoso Center.

Since that time, 20 adults from Lincoln County including Ruidoso have passed the test, and six are awaiting results from the most recent testing date in July.

The Ruidoso Center offers the test regularly on the second Friday

of each month for Ruidoso and Lincoln County residents.

The GED test consists of five parts which include writing skills, social studies, science, literature and the arts and mathematics.

The test costs \$20 and is available for people 17 or older. For information call 257-2120.



Formed by Mayor Jerry Shaw in August, the board is seeking ways to promote, sustain and expand cultural life in the area.

The questionnaire, designed to determine strengths and weaknesses of area arts, asks for input about community art events and the economic impact of the arts.

Another item discussed at the meeting was how to put together a community arts calendar.

The community arts calendar requires considerable planning because it needs to reflect events far enough in advance to avoid scheduling conflicts, Wright said.

Because of the variety of formats for a community arts calendar, board members decided to wait un-

til they finish compiling the needs assessment questionnaire before continuing discussion about the calendar.

Board members are requesting public input about the calendar at their next meeting, at 4:30 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 17 at the Ruidoso Village Hall.

Hansen suggested members carry voter registration forms to give to people. The forms are available from the county clerk. Candidates and office holders can also distribute voter registration forms. Hansen said the new voting law for absentee voting requires no excuse to receive absentee ballots.

The state Democratic party leadership has defined the goals of the party: provide people with tools for economic and educational opportunities, provide human rights

legislation and maintain cultural diversity.

Hansen said the legislature can consider the vetoes made by Gov. Gary Johnson during the first five days of the next legislative session, special or regular.

On the federal level, Hansen said the Democrats have taken steps to reduce government with its "Re-invent Government" program, which seeks to cut government red tape, put the citizen first and decentralize authority. The program's intent is to cut costs and re-establish the citizens' confidence in the government. He said the proposed federal "block grants" to states need to be regulated by the

state legislature to assure the money goes to the proper programs.

Lincoln County chairperson Cece Griffin reported former Texas Democratic governor Ann Richardson was her guest during the July 4 holiday. Richardson commended the county Democrats for responding to recent negative publicity. She told Griffin that such response should be done on the state level all the time.

"Ann Richardson is a real Democrat," Griffin said.

The August meeting of the Lincoln County Democratic Party will be at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 17, at the home of Lynda and James Sanchez in Lincoln.

Ag department reorganization nearly done

The reorganization of the United States Department of Agriculture in Lincoln and Otero counties will be completed by approximately Aug. 1, said Dale Woods, Rural Economic and Community Development County Supervisor.

The USDA is reorganizing its

programs and consolidating offices in an effort to better serve the people who deal with the programs and to save operating costs, Woods said.

Farm and housing loan borrowers of Lincoln and Otero counties will be serviced by a regional office.

The regional office for Lincoln and Otero counties for farm loan borrowers will be headquartered in Roswell. Once the reorganization of the Lincoln and Otero counties office is completed, a regularly-scheduled office day will be held in Roswell at the CFSA (formerly ASCS). Twenty employees

statewide in New Mexico will be moved to the CFSA, Woods stated.

Reorganization of the Department of Agriculture was authorized by legislation signed by President Clinton in November, 1994. The reorganization should be complete by Oct. 1, 1995.



Prison officials should reconsider decision about the Outlaws team

State prison officials recently booted an opportunity to show something positive can emerge from the correctional system, when they told the Camp Sierra Blanca Outlaws softball team they can't travel to Clovis to participate in the state tournament.

They cited "logistics" as the prohibitive factor — Clovis is simply too far.

First, there was no place to house the inmates between Camp Sierra Blanca and Clovis. Roswell might have been a likely choice. It has a minimum security facility which houses 250 inmates. But for some reason, an arrangement couldn't be worked out between the two institutions.

Second, Camp Sierra Blanca Warden Sandra McFadin said she didn't have the staff to supervise the Outlaws for the whole weekend, even though three Camp Sierra Blanca security officers volunteered to escort the team for the weekend.

And third, prison officials weren't willing to take a chance that something might happen. They've been especially cautious since an inmate walked away from the Camp Sierra Blanca grounds and eventually murdered an elderly man from Lincoln last year.

We understand those concerns. But these aren't the people who committed that crime, and they shouldn't be punished for it. These are inmates who have proven they can handle responsibility.


The softball team members have raised all the necessary money to pay for their uniforms, tournament entry fees and league entry fees. They already had raised the money for the state tournament. They have maintained clean conduct records in order to play on the team.

In addition, they've enjoyed success on the field. The Outlaws are one of the better teams in the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation men's league. They've been a top three finisher at two of the three local tournaments hosted by the Village of Ruidoso and won the sportsmanship award at the Sierra Blanca Opener softball tournament in May.

Camp Sierra Blanca officials say the state prison officials in Santa Fe nixed the Outlaws' request. The state tournament is Aug. 11-13. Perhaps it's not too late for the officials in Santa Fe to reconsider their decision. If you have an opinion as to whether or not the Outlaws should go to state, share it with Corrections Department Secretary Karl L. Sannicks in Santa Fe at 505-827-8709, or write to him at P.O. Should the original decision stand, we'll mark it an error in our scorebook.

Did CYFLB ever consider what it was doing?

TO THE EDITOR:

(The following letter was sent to Heather Wilson, Secretary of Children, Youth and Families.)

Dear Madam:

The Ruidoso News carried an article headed: "State Regulations Could Force Local Preschool Out of Business."

This school is known as the Starlite Montessori School, and has been run by Dick Cull and his wife, Shaula, and has been operated by them since 1983. From an educational standpoint, the school as operated has been a wonderful success. Just ask anyone who has been fortunate enough to send their youngster there.

The operation is for children from three to five years of age. They opened this school before kindergarten became mandatory in our school systems.

Comes now the CYFLB, formed in 1987, whose regulations state: "These regulations do not apply to private schools accredited or recognized by the New Mexico Department of Education, operated for educational purposes only for children age five years or older."

Changes are the CYFLB never considered what they were doing to our wonderful Starlite Montessori School here or elsewhere, when they omitted the three-year-old children.

I am deeply concerned, Madam Wilson, about this matter because of what has happened to me during my 58 years as chairman of the Ruidoso Water Users Association. I am a civil engineer, having attended UNM. I practiced 10 years and when my father passed away in 1937 I came back to the ranch and farm and inherited his job as

chairman of the Ruidoso Water Users Association. Ms. Wilson, I was carrying 146 hours of college credits and it took me 10 years to fully understand all the fundamentals of a little mountain stream here in the arid southwest. We have fully protected our waters in the Rio Ruidoso, and have won every lawsuit in connection therewith, and there were plenty, and we still have one going on. These fundamentals that we laid before the courts was the difference in each case.

What has amazed me Ms. Wilson is that very, very few of our officials in high authority connected with the legal profession can readily absorb these fundamentals of our streams that make the difference.

On one occasion I stated to our attorney that any 7th grader, once briefed, should easily grasp these fundamentals with ease. He stated in short that I was totally wrong! That only a handful of people mixed up in our litigation understood these fundamentals. Our attorney easily grasped these facts once laid before him, but those that did were scarce as hen's teeth.

I am of the opinion that our Starlite Montessori School could well mean the difference in the future of our great nation. They would necessarily ignite the spark of intelligence in our youngsters from the age of three to five, that has been absent all these years in our educational system.

Our wonderful recreational area is not a success by accident. Both my father and myself have put in 81 years protecting these waters, and successfully against all comers. By that I mean we provided the leadership. This is a matter of record.

Were I 10 years younger I would drive up and contact you personally, but I am physically unable to do so at 88-plus years of age. So bear with me on my terrible typing and I pray you will keep our wonderful little school in operation.

A Great Place To Live

Clean water, fresh air, a strong sense of community spirit and a friendly population make the Village of Ruidoso Downs a special place to visit and live.

Neighbors aren't just the people that live on your block in this small town of 923 residents. People visiting or relocating to Ruidoso Downs soon find the community friendly and neighborly. Folks at the police department or village hall, and the town's many business people, always have a minute to spare to talk about the weather or simply shoot the breeze.

Ruidoso Downs was first laid out as a town in 1933. Originally the village was called Palo Verde but in 1947, the federal government opened a post office and required a name change because there was already a town named Palo Verde in Arizona. The town was renamed Green Tree.

Residents voted to change the village's name to Ruidoso Downs in a special election in 1958, partly to identify it with Ruidoso Downs Racetrack and partly so that it would show up on highway maps. The name became official in 1961 when a new village post office opened.

Village services

With its own village council, police and fire departments, senior citizen's center, post office, churches and 80 businesses, Ruidoso Downs offers residents and visitors all of the services necessary for a comfortable and fun lifestyle.

The Ruidoso Police Department employs six full time officers and is located in the new Village Hall at 122 Downs Drive. The Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department has 15 trained fire fighters. Ambulance and

medical services are provided by Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso.

Village council consists of four trustees, the mayor, the village clerk and village attorney. The council meetings, open to the public, are at 7 p.m. the second and fourth Monday of each month. Trustees, who invite and encourage residents and visitors to attend those meetings, are always willing to hear comments from community members about how projects or procedures can be improved to benefit Ruidoso Downs.

"Mostly everyone knows everyone else and we work together to get our community to grow," Joe Hayhurst, Ruidoso Downs mayor said.

Ladies Auxiliary

One of the most active organizations in the village is the Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary. With about 20 members, the auxiliary promotes many different activities and events, one of the most successful being the annual All-American Arts and Crafts Fair on Labor Day weekend.

Artists and craftspeople from throughout the southwest and beyond gather under a giant circus tent next to the senior citizen's center to show off and sell their creations in a festive atmosphere that's fun for the entire family. The auxiliary is a strong organization in the community that participates in many activities, including area clean-up campaigns, to improve Ruidoso Downs.

Current auxiliary president Shirlene Roberts believes that when you live in a small community, you try to make it the best it can be.

"We are working next to try to get a beautification program in place for the village," Roberts said.

Recently the auxiliary leased a trailer across from village hall where they will have a permanent meeting place and office.

Some of the other activities the auxiliary is involved in include an Easter egg hunt, and donating money to various organizations such as the senior citizens center and the fire department.

Senior Citizens Center

Another project the Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary assisted the village with was the building and opening of the Ruidoso Downs Senior Citizens Center in 1991.

The bright, modern, new building, located off of Highway 70, is a testament to the auxiliary members' dedication to the community. They joined village leaders in getting the money to build the facility, and they continued to contribute by furnishing the center.

Auxiliary members and village residents also helped furnish the kitchen with utensils and supplies by sponsoring a pot-luck party. Downs residents brought food and kitchen items to help stock the center's kitchen.

The Senior Citizens Center serves many purposes throughout the year in-

cluding use as a polling place for Precinct 10, which includes Ruidoso Downs residents. Seniors gather throughout the year to play cards and dominos, socialize and plan community events.

Cool, clear water

Water for the village has the reputation of being extremely pure, pouring from Hull Spring, located in a mountain in Ruidoso Downs.

Hull Spring has been flowing at a constant 350 gallons per minute, day in and day out for as long as anyone can remember.

Nobody is sure where the spring originates. It is thought that it comes from the Guadalupe Mountains.

Because of the constant flow, the purity of the water, and the fact that it is so large, state engineers still occasionally ask to see the spring.

Water quality from the spring is exceptionally pure.

Over the years, many people have found the Village of Ruidoso Downs to be the kind of place residents are proud to call home and visitors are invited to see what makes the community one of the best small towns in the Southwest.

On July 15, 1995, the Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs, New Mexico will unveil "Free Spirits at Noisy Water". This incredible landscaped monument is the inspiration of noted American sculptor, Dave McGary, and features the figures of eight one-and-one-half-times-life-size sculptured horses. The seven classic breeds represented in this exceptional piece are the Thoroughbred, the quarter horse, the appaloosa, the Paint Horse, the Arabian, the Morgan and the Standardbred. The Paint mare is joined by a foal running by her side - making the eighth horse.

The eight figures will be galloping through a fully landscaped area that is 225 feet long. The finished sculpture will rise to a height of almost 36 feet. As the world's largest equine monument, it will grace the entrance of the Museum of the Horse.

The dedication weekend of July 14-16, 1995 is filled with many fun activities. There will be a formal evening on Saturday, July 15. Master of Ceremonies Sam Donaldson will preside over the festivities, along with nationally acclaimed entertainers Michael Martin Murphey, Don Edwards and Waddie Mitchell. Optional events include a VIP dinner party on Friday, lunch and a day at the races in the Ruidoso Downs Turf club on Saturday afternoon, and a tour of McGary Studios followed by a sumptuous brunch.

In order to support the creation of this beautiful sculpture, the Museum of the Horse, exclusively, is selling limited edition bronzes of each of the breeds in the maquette state (24" long and 17" high). A bust of the Quarter Horse and a masterwork which includes all eight horses is also available.

Ruidoso Downs Yesterday

New visitors to Lincoln County may think of Ruidoso Downs as an adjunct to the Village of Ruidoso, but the town boasts a rich history all its own.

When Ruidoso was only a dirt road turnoff, the area that was to become Ruidoso Downs was a major stop from Roswell to Tularosa, first on a stage line and later by bus and car.

Bernice Jones said her grandfather, Lowrey Hale, owned most of the land in the area in the 1880s and built the first house.

Parcel by parcel, he acquired about 800 acres, 100 of which cost \$400 in a purchase from Indrice Herrah, and later was called Hale Springs.

Hale also bought a tract from "Doc" Scurlock for \$400 that became the site of the White Mountain Inn on the banks of the Rio Ruidoso.

The inn, which still stands, was first used as an overnight stop for stagecoaches and later for buses.

The two-story structure was built by a man named Johnson in the early 1900s.

Long-time area resident Dan Storm said the inn was quite a landmark in the 1920s.

"Roderick and Heck Johnson owned it then," Storm said. "It was the only thing in what was to be Ruidoso Downs.

"The Johnsons sponsored a big Fourth of July celebration with big rodeos around the inn on a flat piece of land.

"They had a swimming pool nearby, but nobody used it much."

Former Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris said the highway from the east turned north across the front of the inn, then veered west.

"They had rooms for overnight," Harris said. "They served meals and the bus stopped there. Originally it was the only business in this area. Before the buses, the old stagecoach stopped.

There were barns there for the driver to change horses or stay overnight."

At one time the Johnsons operated a general store, a post office and a dance hall. In 1935, a saloon and filling station called Turner's Tavern opened. Jim Mauldin started a garage and in 1936, Ewing Carter opened a general merchandise store that later became Fox Merchandise. That same year, the community's first sawmill was started by Ed Hoagland. Ruidoso Downs was taking shape.

Timber cutting and lumber mills played a significant role in the economic health of the community, but eventually the heavy cutting activity played out the good timber areas.


The property owned by Johnson contained the right to the spring that still is the source of water for the community. The spring's lifeline in this arid area was one of the main reasons the community was incorporated.

The community's current identity is deeply entrenched with the Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

When the governor shut down slot machine and table gambling in Ruidoso, promoters decided to try horse racing in earnest. Drawing a circle in a pasture that was visible from the highway, they started running the horses.

With little business knowledge, the promoters soon went broke, but a man named Gene Hensley bought the track for \$60,000. With Walt Wiggins as promoter, they introduced the All American Futurity, the race that established the track's reputation and now is the richest quarter horse purse in the world.

Today, in addition to the race track and the Museum of the Horse, The Village of Ruidoso Downs sports more than 80 businesses, six lodging establishments, a new senior citizens center with pool tables and shuffleboard, a police

force and a volunteer fire department. A new 50-unit Day's Inn motel is scheduled to be fully operational by late July.

The village offers several recreational vehicle parks. G & D RV has 20 spaces (378-4594), Downs Motel has 10 RV spaces (378-4134), and Cowboy's Trailer Park has 28 RV sites (378-8217).

The brand new Ruidoso Downs Village Hall houses the police department, municipal court, juvenile probation department and animal control department. Also at Village Hall is the village clerk, water and sewer and planning and zoning department.

Two churches serve the community,

Ruidoso Word Ministries Church and First Baptist Church of Ruidoso Downs. The Baptist church also operates Ruidoso Christian School, a preschool to fourth grade private school.



The population of Ruidoso Downs is currently 923. The village has changed over the years, but it remains a tribute to the spirit of small town America.



Old Lincoln Days

Although many people go to the Village of Ruidoso Downs because of the racetrack, there are many other attractions for visitors to enjoy.

Racetrack fun

Ruidoso Downs Racetrack began in the mid-1940s with high stakes quarter horse match races for wealthy ranchers and oilmen, who displayed the talents of their top sprinters before the advent of pari-mutuel wagering. The races were usually held on weekend afternoons in roughly the same area as the current track's location, with purses sometimes reaching \$50,000.

The track was originally named Hollywood Park because of the close proximity of an area called Hollywood.

Tommy Hicks and Ted Johnson, owners of the Central Bar and Grill in Ruidoso, set up the inaugural race meet in 1947, consisting of 10 race days and running primarily quarter horses. The average handle was \$33,261. It wasn't quite enough to break even, but enough for track owners to continue the venture.

Gene Hensley purchased the track in 1953 for \$60,000, changed the name to Ruidoso Downs and in 1959 introduced the All American Futurity, now the richest quarter horse purse in the world.

Current owner R.D. Hubbard took over the track in 1988, initiated more than \$3 million in renovations and started the All American Festival, a week-long celebration of community events and world class horse racing, culminating each year on Labor Day with the All American Futurity.

Museum of the Horse

Another Hubbard venture is the 46,000 square-foot Anne C. Stradling Museum of the Horse, a one-of-a-kind exhibition which opened in 1992. It's located one mile east of the racetrack off Highway 70 East.

First established in Patagonia, Ariz., the museum was the brainchild of Stradling, who spent her life gathering a collection of equine related materials, including many one-of-a-kind items.

Stradling grew up in New Jersey, where she participated in fox hunting and polo playing. She later became involved in rodeos and practiced trick and calf roping. After she married, Stradling and her husband moved to Oklahoma, where they operated a ranch for 12 years before moving to Arizona.

Stradling died in 1992, but in keeping with her vision, the Museum of Horse continues to expand and grow.

Currently on display at the museum, in addition to the many permanent exhibits, is "The Imperial Russian Horse: Equine Art from the Reign of the Czars."

This exhibition of Russian art from the Museum of Horsebreeding in Moscow features a collection of paintings and bronzes created by renowned 19th and early 20th century Russian equine artists. The exhibit will be at the museum until Sept. 10.

The Museum of the Horse is open every day except Thanksgiving and Christmas. Hours are 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. May through Labor Day; and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. from Labor Day through October; and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. November through April (and closed Mondays).
