

Governor plans Fort Stanton visit

Gov. Gary Johnson plans to be in Lincoln County Thursday, Aug. 24, at the second session with potential bidders for the use of Fort Stanton.

"Depending on scheduling, the visit could be canceled, but that's the plan at this time," said Johnson's spokesperson Diane Kinderwaker Tuesday.

Johnson initiated the closure of the fort as a state hospital when he did not include operating money in his 1995-96 proposed budget. He said the fort was too expensive to run and he would prefer the private sector lease it from the state.

About 200 persons who had worked at the hospital either lost their jobs or transferred out of the area to stay within the state's employment system.

Requests for proposals have been advertised in national publications. State officials met with three bidders at the fort July 26.

Lightning strikes twice at golf course

A Ruidoso man remains in critical condition after being struck by lightning Monday on a putting green at Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club.

It was the second strike at the course in a month. A bolt hit a tree in late July, jolting three or four players who were standing about 10 feet away. And in mid-July, three people in Capital were struck and were hospitalized with burns.

In the latest incident, Harold Collins and at least five other golfers were knocked to the ground by lightning about noon Monday. All are members at the course who were playing in a tournament.

Collins, the only person who suffered a direct hit from the lightning, was airlifted to the Regional Burn Center of New Mexico University Hospital in Albuquerque. He suffered burns on his chest and arms.

said. "I heard someone yelling that a man was down. My husband was on the course and my first thought was for him."

As she approached the clubhouse, May saw one man sitting alone on the green and a group of people surrounding Collins.

Her 24 years as a flight attendant with Eastern Airlines kicked in, and May started CPR. She was helped by several others, including Southwest Airlines pilot Jerry Kennedy, club member Gene Wilson and several club employees.

The sky gave no warning of lightning, said Walt Singletary, one of the men knocked to the ground.

"There was no indication, no thunder or lightning nearby," Singletary said. "Everything was a long way away. There was no apparent danger."

Other witnesses reported seeing a web-like pattern of grass burns that seemed to emanate from the spikes of Collins' golf shoes.

Collins' family, with him in Albuquerque, declined to comment about his injuries or prognosis.

His golfing partner Russell Henry, 55, went to Albuquerque to stay with his friend, said his wife, Jorise Henry.

"Russell's left arm looks like it was unburned," she said. "He was hit by the bounce of the lightning, kind of a glancing blow. He only remembers waking up and not being able to catch his breath. He saw Harold down and kept telling him to hold on."

The two men met two years ago while golfing at The Links course in Ruidoso.

"They've been inseparable ever since, like two kids," Mrs. Henry said. Although her husband was taken to the Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso by ambulance, he was released after being examined, she said.

"I want everyone to know he's fine," Mrs. Henry said. "Before I could get to my daughter, some (boy) told her that Harold and her father had been killed by lightning. I've even heard that three were killed, but the only one seriously injured was Harold."

Golfer Danny Wimberly suffered burns on his eyes, Garber said. Four others, including Garber, came to the Ruidoso hospital in private cars to be checked, but were released.

"As I was getting up, I looked around and everybody was on the ground. Then I saw a man with his clothes on fire."

Those knocked to the ground included Tom Garber, Walt Singletary, Russell Henry, Danny Wimberly and Joe Bowden. All are members of the country club and have homes in Alto and Ruidoso.

Garber was leaving the putting area to start a round of golf with several other players when the lightning hit.

"I didn't see or hear anything," Garber said. "One minute I was standing there with my putter in my hand. The next, I was lying on the ground."

"As I was getting up, I looked around and everybody was on the ground. Then I saw a man with his clothes on fire. I went over and tried to tear his shirt off and yelled to find someone who knew CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation)."

Sandra May was teeing off on a nearby hole when she heard a loud bang and thought the lightning had cracked just above her head.

"I dropped my club and started running to the clubhouse," May

Family has enough love left for new puppy after bear kills dog

When their 7-year-old pet dog was killed by a bear on the back deck of their home in Alto Village, Richard and Eva Cantu thought they would never own another dog.

Their pet's July 27 death was too brutal, unusual and unexpected to get over quickly. Shar-pei breeder David Hall and his wife Cindy read in the newspaper about the tragic attack by the bear. They decided to offer one of their registered pups to the Cantus as a gift.

At first, Richard Cantu was reluctant. In the weeks after the death of Duchess the cocker spaniel, the couple and their daughter, Dinah, discussed adopting a cat and other pet

alternatives. But Cantu wasn't sure how his wife and daughter would react to the offer of a new dog.

His family's reaction when he told them about the offer was, "Yes! When can we pick it up?"

The two families met last week, the same day Hall offered the pup.

It was love at first sight as the pup stared at her new owners through folds of skins masking her eyes.

The Shar-pei may be descended from the chow chow, because both breeds have purple tongues.

Simon & Schuster's "Guide to Dogs" describes the Shar-pei breed as tranquil, loyal and friendly, especially with children, despite its history as a

ferocious fighting dog in China. Later, it was bred to be a companion dog and brought to the United States.

The breed is distinguished by soft skin that falls in large folds in coat colors of fawn, cream, red and black.

The Cantu pup will be small, Hall said. She probably won't exceed 25 pounds as an adult, about 10 pounds lighter than most females. Her coat is fawn.

The Cantus still are researching possible names, looking toward something in Chinese that is connected to their new family addition.

They'd like to find out what the phrase is for the full moon that was shining her first night in her new home.

Capitan police chief charged with felony, suspended at job

Capitan's police chief is on administrative leave with pay after being charged with forging a vehicle registration title.

Tony Cano, 52, who was hired by the village in September 1993, was arraigned last week in district

court on charges of false evidence of title and registry, a fourth-degree felony.

Charged with conspiracy in the same case was Romero Mendoza, 33, of Capitan.

Sharon Mendoza, who lives in Capitan and is estranged from her husband, Romero Mendoza, alleged

Track will be open next year, owner says

The horses will run at Ruidoso Downs Race Track next year, whether or not the New Mexico Legislature approves video gambling at racetracks, said track owner R. D. Hubbard.

"The reason we announced it now is to let the horsemen know and the people of Ruidoso know that there is going to be racing next year," Hubbard said yesterday from his Ruidoso home.

Earlier this year, Hubbard had threatened to close the track if the state legislature didn't approve

video gambling at the track. Hubbard said during the legislative session the track couldn't open without video gaming revenues to subsidize horsemen's purses.

But on Friday, Hubbard issued a press release saying the track will apply for a 41-day 1996 race meet. This year's meet has 68 racing days.

The 41-day race meet would start June 7 and conclude Labor Day with the 38th running of the All American Futurity, the world's richest quarter horse race. Racing

Prison guard arrested in gun charge

A Camp Sierra Blanca prison guard was charged Monday with negligent use of a firearm after he allegedly fired some shots in a pasture north of Capitan.

Shelby Martin, 35, of Capitan, was arrested after officers found him lying in the field wearing camouflage with several weapons at his side, said Sheriff's Deputy Angelo Vega.

(U.S. 246) called," said Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane. "When we arrived, he was lying motionless in a pasture about one mile from the road."

"We didn't know what the situation might be, whether he might have shot himself. When you're dealing with weapons, it's potentially dangerous."

McSwane and his deputies, backed by state and Capitan police

Teachers want hiring freeze to leave room for salary increases

Ruidoso teachers are calling for a hiring freeze and a delay in budgeted raises for athletic coaches, so enough money is available for teacher pay raises this year.

The proposals were among several suggestions given to the school district in April, prior to formulation of the 1995-96 district budget, by Ruidoso Education Association (REA) collective bargaining negotiators. The list of suggestions was released to the public last week.

"While the district appeared willing to listen, the proposed budget does not reflect consideration of the suggestions," an Aug. 8 REA memo states.

Collective bargaining between the REA and the school district has

resulted in some progress, but employee raises have not been resolved, REA negotiator Cathy Jones told 40 people at the REA meeting on Aug. 8.

District officials said 260 people are employed by Ruidoso schools. The REA has 84 members.

Negotiations have resulted in tentative agreements on hours and workload, transfers and reassignments, personal leave, class size and professional development, Jones said.

The largest stumbling block in negotiating teacher raises seems to be uncertainty about Mescalero students, she said.

Mescalero president Wendell C. Lino has given verbal notice to Ruidoso Superintendent of Schools Mike Gaden that the reservation would open its own schools this

year. Last year the reservation only had an elementary school. Several portable buildings have been brought to a site by the elementary school, but no official written confirmation from the tribe has been received by the school district.

Because of the uncertainty of the situation, the district budgeted for zero growth in student population and related funds.

"Mr. Gladden's primary concern is the unknown situation with the Mescalero students," Jones said. "Not knowing what enrollment will be is a major concern."

If all Mescalero students leave the Ruidoso schools, the district could lose up to 450 students and a corresponding \$1.3 million in state funds, district business manager Caron Snow said.

Another topic of conversation at the REA meeting was Gladden's 9% raise, given by the school board in May. The raise, given before the Mescalero situation developed, increased Gladden's salary from \$59,585 to \$65,000 and has added controversy to teacher salary negotiations.

"One of the most difficult things I face is when members ask if they are going to get a raise and I tell them that I don't know," Jones said. "It's hard for Gladden to get

that much of a raise and the rest of us to bite the bullet."

Jones said low attendance by REA members at the board meetings may be hurting the credibility of the REA negotiating team.

"The more people we have at meetings saying 'This is what we need,' the more powerful (collective bargaining) will be," Jones told the gathering.

On the average, only five REA members have been attending school board meetings, Jones said. Without the members' input and commitment, it makes the negotiation team's job difficult, she said.

"It is not very convincing when they (the administration) only see a few of us at the board meetings,"

Jones said.

A confidential ballot with options for employee pay was handed out at the meeting, and Jones asked members for input.

"We've got to know what you want," she said. "You've got to make calm, reasonable, rational decisions because it's easy to be swept away with emotion."

"The district claims that the state education letter directs them to increase the emergency fund, but we don't see it that way," Jones said.

The letter was sent to the school district on Feb. 10, and suggests that, "The district may also consider an increase to the emergency reserve fund."

Teachers' suggestions for budget

Suggestions given to school administrators by the REA team during collective bargaining sessions were outlined in an REA memo at the Aug. 8 meeting.

Budgeted items that the REA feels could be dropped in favor of teacher raises were listed in the memo.

The memo suggested that a budget with more accurate numbers could be created if the district develops a survey of projected student population for the 95-96 school year.

Instead of hiring new personnel to replace employees who are leaving, institute a hiring freeze, with vacancies to be filled by em-

ployee transfers and current staff, the memo says.

The memo also suggests postponement of new non-required programs for the upcoming school year and postponement of raises for athletic coaches. The new budget has an additional \$30,000 set aside for athletic salary increases.

More efficiency in conserving energy at school sites, rather than increasing utility line items by \$117,000, was another REA suggestion.

A letter from State Department of Education budget analyst Martin Ortega prompted the district to increase the emergency fund by \$107,524, Jones said.

The district claims that the state education letter directs them to increase the emergency fund, but we don't see it that way," Jones said.

this department. Councilors have budgeted funds for a new plans examiner.

"There's no place for the person to go," Jackson said. "The only option is upstairs in the attic, and that's not possible for people who are physically challenged."

Because of the lack of village hall space, the office of one new P&Z employee is located across town.

In the one-room modular shed behind the police and water departments you'll find Bob Bell, Ruidoso's new geographic information system (GIS) technician, and \$50,000 worth of sophisticated computer equipment.

The equipment was purchased last year, and it's the future focus of planning and zoning in Ruidoso so it should be housed at village hall, officials said.

"Basically, for any type of interaction with the planning department, I have to go over to city hall," Bell said.

Bell will digitize aerial maps of Ruidoso, depicting topographical and physical characteristics of the entire village and individual

properties. Computer overlays will also mark lot lines and grades, lines for sewer and water, and roads and planning zones.

"It will handle a thousand different layers of information," Briley said. It can be used by every type of government department.

on Thursdays would be eliminated, and the first jewel of the Quarter Horse Triple Crown, the Ruidoso Quarter Horse Futurity, would be run in June instead of Memorial Day weekend.

The New Mexico Racing Commission must first give its approval. It will consider the request in October or November, said commission Chairman Eddie Fowler.

Hubbard said Wednesday he expects the commission will approve the shorter racing season request.

"I can't see why there would be any problems," he said.

The shorter race season would save the track money, Hubbard said. A June starting date would

better serve the majority of the track's fans who come from Texas, Hubbard said, because their children will be out of school.

The track's betting handle is down 31% from last year, Hubbard said, and he projects a \$2 million loss this year. In 1994, the track lost \$1.6 million when its handle dropped almost 26%, he said.

Running three days a week instead of four will build the purses which should be better for the horsemen," Hubbard said. He said he's received a positive response from the horsemen he's talked to.

Horsemen didn't have a problem with the proposed move of the Ruidoso Quarter Horse from Memorial Day to late June, Hub-

bard said. With the shorter race meet, there would be 16 days between a futurity's time trials and the finals, and then 19 days until the next futurity's time trials.

"When I ran that by all the horsemen they thought that was very good," Hubbard said of the proposed futurity schedule.

If the cost-cutting measures are successful and the tracks get casino gaming, Hubbard said he then can expand the season because the video gaming revenue will generate purse money.

If the Legislature approves video gaming for the racetracks, more than likely the machines wouldn't be in place until late next year or even 1997, Hubbard said.

Track GM to return

Hubbard confirmed Wednesday that Ruidoso Downs Race Track general manager Scott Wells will return to the track before Labor Day weekend. Wells is expected to re-assume his general managing duties before Labor Day, Hubbard said.

Wells has been on a personal leave of absence from the track since July 22.


In Wells' absence, Dick Cummings was named acting general manager. Cummings manages another Hubbard-owned operation, Multnomah Kennel Club, a greyhound racetrack in Oregon.

Community Concert Association offers something for us locals

Community Concert Associations number about 600 across the nation, and they have been a verified success since they began approximately 65 years ago.

The Ruidoso Community Concert Association has been a valuable source of quality music since it was organized nearly seven years ago. As testimony to its success, approximately 400 people attend each show. Four shows are offered each year from May through October.

This is a concert series for local residents, since it's set up in such a way that attendees must pay for all four concerts or none (although some might easily consider the \$30 adult price a great deal for just one or two performances). In a tourist community, it's often easy to forget about catering to the needs of residents.

As founder Bob Rowe puts it, the local concert series "adds to the quality of life for our little mountain town."


Rowe said he was a supporter of the Community Concert Association in El Paso when he moved to Ruidoso, and he missed his music, so he organized the association here.

Such associations bring musicians to small communities who otherwise couldn't be attracted. Nationwide, all the associations contract with Columbia Artists and guarantee to host at least three concerts annually. The artists, in return, are guaranteed a certain number of concerts per year, so they can afford to seek lower fees. As for the audience, they get lower ticket prices because of nationwide volume discounts.

The association also allows for variety. The Ruidoso association purposely avoids music that's already accessible in this area, focusing on classical, jazz, ethnic, folk and popular music and dance.

The local association is having a membership campaign all next week. The group relies on two sources of income: season tickets/memberships (\$30 adults, \$70 families, \$15 students through high school) and patron support (individual or business patrons offer a minimum of a \$50 tax-deductible donation and are listed in concert programs). The patron support allows the association to offer lower ticket prices.

So call Rowe at 336-4015 and tell him thanks — and tell him you want a ticket to community culture.

Help stop horseplay

TO THE EDITOR:

During the last legislative session, I wrote this newspaper bringing attention to Senate Bill 610. This bill would have permitted "any person, association or corporation" to apply for license to offer wagering on simulcast horse races at bet-

ting parlors throughout the state. The bill died when legislation time ran out.

Well, compadres, proponents are back and determined to reintroduce it at the next session, or at a "special session" should one be called.

What would this mean to our village? It would mean that folks would not need to come to Ruidoso to bet on the ponies! They could bet in their hometowns should an entrepreneur provide the opportunity.

Horsemen say if they do not get more money flowing into their purse structure, they will fold. It is unfortunate this situation exists, but it is no surprise. The writing has been on the wall for some time. It seems the "sport(?)" has simply lost popularity.

This is not just a New Mexico problem. Tracks in Texas, including new ones at Houston and San Antonio, are extremely shaky. Even stolid Remington in Oklahoma is showing cracks in the seams. In 1994, only one track in America, according to *Thoroughbred Times*, showed a profit.

Regardless of the causes and conditions, I do not feel it incumbent on the State of New Mexico to either partially or wholly subsidize this industry. In my opinion, off-track betting would be a form of subsidy.

As for racing in general, I am weary of the Hubbard-induced verbiage that "other" gambling endeavors (particularly Indian gaming) are responsible for racing's problems. He cited the track lost \$1.2 million in 1993 because of Mescalero gambling activities. Hey, in 1993 about all they had was BINGO!

If "other" forms of gambling are causing racing's problems, allow me to pose two questions. Why did LaMesa Park fold? It closed shop long before any gambling hit the state. Why did San Juan Downs at Farmington go belly up? There were no casinos anywhere near that area.

Ever since gambling questions arose, Ruidoso Downs Race Track owner R.D. Hubbard has said, "we need a level playing field." Let me set this scenario. The bill he backed last year would have authorized gambling at two places in Ruidoso...HIS racetrack and HIS "almost fictional" hotel...so, where was the "level playing field" when it came to the rest of Ruidoso?

Capitan trustees reject zoning ordinance for second time

In a replay of objections voiced three years ago, Capitan residents loudly rejected the idea Monday that their village needs a zoning ordinance.

The Capitan Board of Trustees responded to their opinions by rejecting the proposed ordinance in a 3-2 vote. It was the second defeat for a zoning ordinance since 1992.

Mayor Norm Ranfor broke a tie by voting against the ordinance with trustees Byron Carpenter and Connie Hopper. Voting to keep the ordinance alive and to try to work on points of controversy were trustees Gordon Ross and L. C. Cozzens.

Although disappointed with the outcome, zoning board member Bobbi Shearer said after the meeting she understood the trustees' decision to vote in line with the majority of the 250 attending the meeting.

About a dozen people spoke, and only two people spoke in favor of the ordinance, saying the village is on the verge of a growth spurt and needs the protection of law to ensure orderly growth.

At the point, approximately 90% of the audience raised their hands in a show of opposition.

Zoning board chairman Van

Shamblin, who with other members put together the proposed ordinance, said much of the criticism was inaccurate. It sounded like many people had not actually read the ordinance, but were speaking on hearsay and rumors they heard from neighbors about the terms of

the ordinance, she said. Although the ordinance does not mention any restrictions on keeping livestock, some opponents inaccurately contended they would no longer be able to keep horses, Shearer noted.

The creation of a commercial

zone also worried several speakers.

"I've lived in Capitan 49 years," said Angeline Provine, a retired teacher. She and her husband, Ray, bought their house on U.S. 380 in 1957. "Now it's to be designated as a non-conforming use (within a commercial zone)," she told the

crowd and trustees.

"Designating 10 miles of commercial (zone) doesn't consider the history of the village's growth. Because we've had slow growth, areas have mixed usage. This would change the nature of Capitan. The community can not support that

much commercial, while denying use as residential."

Along Smokey Bear Boulevard, the main road through town, 30% of the buildings are used as residences, she calculated. Sixty percent are businesses and five lots are empty, she said. The area is proposed as a commercial zone.

"You say the ordinance is supposed to protect property rights, but if you own in a commercial area, you can't build a new home, you can't rebuild if your home burns down and you can't make changes," Provine said. "That will make existing homes in that zone hard to sell."

As written, the ordinance says if a non-conforming use is interrupted for more than three months, the land use must then conform to the zoning designation.

Shearer later said the board should have anticipated the problems that could be created for long-time residents whose homes would be swept into the proposed commercial zone. Instead of calling them non-conforming uses, another approach giving them more latitude might have been possible, she said.

Although the village adopted a master plan years ago, it never approved a zoning ordinance or zoning maps. Those two items are needed to enforce zoning regulations and to follow the master plan.

Other objections to the proposed Capitan zoning ordinance were voiced Monday by:

— Lamoyne Carpenter, a real estate agent who blamed news of a possible zoning ordinance for the loss of two sales.

"If this is passed, it will infringe on people's right to use the land they paid for," he said. "They'll be able to walk all over you."

— Walter Jones, who said he is living in a recreational vehicle on his children's property. He would be forced to move, if the ordinance passed, because a 45-day cap would be imposed.

— Dave Strickland, who said he lives in an older mobile home that would be classified in the proposed ordinance as non-conforming because of its age.

"I just got through paying for it," he said.

The proposed ordinance said any mobile home more than 10 years of age would be considered nonconforming and would require a special or conditional use permit.

— Robert Runnels, who said, "This is Capitan, not L.A. We like it the way it is. For you new folks that don't, leave. Move back to Napa Valley. Don't tell us what to do with our property."

— Tom Sidwell, who questioned why trustees thought zoning is needed.

"How many businesses or homes turn away because there's no zoning?" he asked. "I submit more turn away because there is zoning."

Zoning may protect some land

owners, but it hurts others," he said. He contended the proposed ordinance would discriminate against mobile home owners. He asked who would decide whether a unit was "unsightly and inappropriate."

— Lynna Story, who said the shortage of water in the area will limit the town's growth anyway.

Her husband Jerry Story said his property isn't large enough for any commercial use, although it would fall within the commercial zone.

"If I moved our mobile home off, it wouldn't be worth a dime," he said.

— Pat Huey, a local contractor who said although his mother "lives in a dump, she calls it home."

He asked for a show of hands

against the ordinance. About 90% of the audience responded.

— Phyllis Macaw, the owner of four shops in town, who said she lost money and was chased out of Las Cruces by zoning regulations.

Once zoning was introduced, "We couldn't give our kids a piece of ground," her husband Harold Macaw added.

"We're tired of the battle. If this passes, we'll sell out and leave," she said.

— Curtis Payne, who said once an ordinance is passed, someone will have to be hired to enforce it.

Revised Capitan schools cheating policy emphasizes learning and supervision

After months of wrestling with what to do when students cheat, Capitan School Board members unanimously approved a tentative policy last week.

It went into effect the first day of school yesterday, but parents will still be given a chance to look over the policy and comment.

Even if some object, the board may stay with the current version. Within the last two years, they imposed stricter penalties in response to complaints from parents, then considered lighter penalties when parents did an about face and said the punishment was too harsh. Last month, they moved toward a middle ground, but a week ago, members Freda McSwane and Tim

Worrell proposed a different approach.

They said punishment, not an academic death sentence, should be the goal of a discipline policy on cheating.

Under the approved policy, a first offense will bring five days of in-school suspension. Although the student will be required to do assignments for those days, the student will receive only 80% credit. No interaction with other students or participation in extracurricular activities will be allowed.

The student will receive no credit for the assignment or test on which he/she cheated.

A second offense will result in a five-day, out-of-school suspension and no credit for work missed during that period.

The student will be expelled on a third offense.

"We didn't want the first punishment to be such an academic devastation for the student that they might give up," McSwane explained. "We kept the 'third time you're out' punishment. I had no problem with that."

"You give the child a chance. Anyone can make a mistake."

McSwane didn't like a previous policy for a five-day, out-of-school suspension on a first offense and expulsion for a second, adopted for the 1994-95 school year.

"It's our responsibility to educate," McSwane said. "If they're cheating, we need to look at why."

Without a parent at home to supervise, an out-of-school suspension is not a punishment, McSwane said.

"It would be better for the student to stay in school so they don't fall behind and feel the need to

cheat," she said. Five days of zeros on the first offense might be too damaging academically to the student, she said.

Worrell presented the alternative of the in-school suspension: Spectator David Cummins suggested adding the 80% credit instead of no credit.

"That way they have to work harder and can't get by with what would normally be 'C' work," McSwane agreed.

"We didn't want to take away the opportunity for an education, but we also needed to ensure they paid a penalty," said board President Beverly Payne. "We need to be consistent with policies. We can't go back and forth."

Members of the Capitan Association of Classroom Teachers are working on a separate policy to cover cheating on final examinations, a situation that occurred last May.

Open communications

In an effort to avoid some of the confrontations with teachers they see in school districts surrounding them, Capitan board members will meet with teacher association members in September to discuss policies and concerns, said Superintendent Diana Sonnemaker Billingsley.

In personnel action at the meeting last Thursday:

— Jean Cunningham resigned as custodian at the high school to become a sheriff's dispatcher in Carrizozo;

— Wayne Ellison temporarily will serve as band and vocal instructor;

— teacher Karen Earwood

resigned to take a position with the Carrizozo school district;

— and English teacher Linda Marr resigned to teach and attend at New Mexico State University.

After three hours in a closed session on personnel, the board will meet in a closed session on that subject again at 11 a.m. today at the county courthouse.



A glimpse into Lincoln County's past, compiled by Polly E. Chavez with excerpts from "A History of Lincoln County Post Offices."

Rabenton and Raventon

Six miles east of White Oaks in a ranching and farming area, the Rabenton post office was established in 1896 with David H. Lueras as its first postmaster.

The office closed March 15, 1900, but was re-activated in June 1910. When it re-opened, the spelling of the name of the

office was changed to Raventon, an Americanization of the earlier Spanish spelling.

Closed again in 1914, it was reopened that same year. Final abolishment was Sept. 29, 1928.

Eight postmasters served the area, which was populated with many Hispanic residents: David H. Lueras, 1896; Ramon Ulibarri, 1898; Augustine Chavez, 1910; Bonnie Richardson, 1914; Sarah L. Corn, 1916; Adelina DeMartinez, 1921; Augustine Chavez, 1922; and Eluticia Chavez, 1928.

This is also why Saturn appears a little dimmer than usual - its rings are contributing no light.



Local retail sales show decrease

May through July Lincoln County retail sales dropped compared to the same quarter last year, Ruidoso chamber director Joan Bailey told Ruidoso Downs trustees Monday.

Her statement is based on surveys of county merchants, she said later. In the most recent state sales tax report, May figures dropped 18% from May 1994, going from approximately \$493,000 to \$405,500.

"This whole part of the country is down, partially because of the devaluation of the (Mexican) peso and partially because people are

holding on to their money," she said.

Chamber inquiries this May through July increased from last year, Bailey said. From May to July of 1994, 19,736 people contacted the chamber while 23,544 people made chamber inquiries during the same time period this year, a 16% increase, she said.

White Oaks home will house museum

It's been a five-year dream. The empty, dilapidated, sad old house sat 2.5 miles south of White Oaks. It was moved from the townsite back in the early 1950s.

In 1994 a group of citizens organized to help preserve the history of Lincoln County. They called themselves HOME (House of Memories Echoes).

The HOME group took on the project of making a dream come true: buy the old house, move it back home to White Oaks, restore it and end up with a public museum.

Proceeds from calendar sales went toward the purchase of the house from Fred English. A loan was made to cover the balance of the moving cost. More donations, bake sales and an auction will help pay off the loan.

On July 19, the house came home and a dream was coming true. The house was moved by the Bookout family from Tularosa. There have been four generations of Bookouts involved in moving the old house out of and back into town. What a joy it was for the folks of

White Oaks to see it return home.

More than 65 volunteer hours from people in the community helped in the endeavor. One example was Bobby Dan Crenshaw, who with his equipment and crew bladed the homesite. They also did extensive work at the old homesite so the house could be moved out onto the road.

Now the restoration can begin. A house full of items has already been collected, but some things are still needed, such as quilts, rugs, linens, curtains, clothing, dishes, glassware, mining paraphernalia and artifacts from the late 1800s and early 1900s.

A target date of April 28, 1996 is tentatively scheduled for the dedication of A Miners Home Museum, with a Miners Day Celebration in White Oaks.

HOME includes Ruth Birdsong as president, Clarence Leslie as vice president, and Dorothy Forsythe as secretary/treasurer. The Board of Advisers includes Johnson Stearns, Walt Birdsong, Bob Reynieron and Larue Griswold.

Village attorney's contract renewed Chief

John Underwood's contract to serve as Ruidoso's village attorney was unanimously extended for another year by the Ruidoso Village Council last week.

Underwood has served in the part-time position for one year.

Underwood will be paid a set fee of \$48,000 for providing approximately 720 hours of legal service to

the village, the same as the previous year. His time will amount to slightly less than a third of a working year.

Underwood served two terms as a state legislator between 1991-94.

During the 90-day state legislative session this year, he also served as a lobbyist for the village.

P&Z board resignation
Attorney Chay Rennick filled in

for Underwood while the Legislature was in session, and Rennick is still retained by Underwood as an assistant in council matters.

Last week Rennick stepped down from the Planning and Zoning Commission to more fully assist Underwood on P&Z issues, Rennick said. Rennick has served on P&Z since March 1994.

Rennick said there would have been a potential conflict of interest if he continued to serve on P&Z. The conflict would arise if he were to vote on an application and later have to give legal advice about an appeal of that decision.

Underwood said Rennick will also fill in for him if a special legislative session is called for gambling or budget issues.

District Court Judge Richard A. Parsons conducted Cano's arraignment Aug. 7, because Carrizozo Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean was unavailable. Parsons released Cano on his own recognizance, pending Dean's return from vacation.

Dean said Tuesday he will require Cano to sign a \$5,000 appearance bond, but does not consider the chief a flight risk.

A date has not been set for Cano's preliminary hearing, where he will enter a plea, Dean said.



Applications for absentee ballots may be obtained from the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, 300 Central Avenue, in Carrizozo, New Mexico; however, in

accordance with §1-6-10(C) NMSA 1978, at 5:00 p.m. on September 25, 1995 (the day before the election), the County Clerk is required by statute to destroy unused absentee ballots so completed applications must be returned to the County Clerk prior to that time. In accordance with §1-22-19(B) NMSA 1978, absentee ballots of Program district voters may be marked in person at the Office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, 300 Central Avenue, Carrizozo, New Mexico, and delivered to the County Clerk until Friday, September 22, 1995 at 5:00 p.m.

In accordance with §1-6-16B NMSA 1978, at any time prior to 5:00 p.m. on Monday, September 25, 1995 (the Monday before the election, any person whose absentee ballot application has been accepted and who was mailed an absentee ballot but who has not received the absentee ballot may execute, in the Office of the Lincoln County Clerk, a sworn affidavit stating that he did not receive or vote his absentee ballot. Upon receipt of the sworn affidavit, the County Clerk shall issue the voter a replacement absentee ballot. In accordance with §1-6-10B, sealed envelopes containing marked absentee ballots of Program district voters will be received by the County Clerk of Lincoln County until 7:00 p.m., September 26, 1995.

Section 5. In accordance with §1-12-1 NMSA 1978, each polling place will be open between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on election day.
