### Violations found at authority's landfill

The State Environment Department (ED) cited the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority Monday for violations at the landfill near Capitan.

Paper was found blowing around the landfill. Mattresses, furniture, lawn cuttings and household garbage was found in the burial trench.

The landfill's current classification allows it to only receive construction and demolition debris for burial.

Other violations included no plan for detection of unauthorized waste, water runoff into the trench, waste oil not properly stored and methane concentrations not routinely monitored.

The landfill will be allowed to store more than construction and demolition debris at the site, but the items must eventually be hauled off to other destinations, ED chief compliance officer Charles Hules said.

Authority manager Joe Lewandowski said he sent a letter to the state Tuesday asking for a change of classification to a municipal solid waste landfill receiving less than 25 tons a day. That change will allow the authority the option of burying more types of goods. However, no household garbage can be accepted.

Lewandowski said the landfill has passed twice-a-year inspections without problems in the past. A need for a change in classification never was mentioned, he said.

Hules said the authority will not be fined for the violations. The inspection was scheduled after the department received a complaint from a Capitan resident and an anonymous call, Lewandowski said.

### County considers zoning changes today in Ruidoso

Proposed changes to Lincoln County's planning and zoning ordinance will be reviewed by county commissioners at 6:30 p.m. today at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center.

Several more hearings are anticipated by County Manager Carolin Cooney. Commissioners are seeking public input.

## Mescalero Apache tribe opens middle, high schools

Students at the new Mescalero middle/high school complex didn't seem to be bothered this week as construction continued at full throttle.

The new school on the Mescalero Indian Reservation officially opened Monday, with 164 new students enrolled and attending classes, officials said.

"We're enrolling more students every day," middle/high school Principal Manuel Jimenez said. "It seems that they were ready for their own school."

Including the pre-existing kindergarten, the Mescalero schools had 525 students enrolled as of yesterday.

"We are even seeing requests from some kids who dropped out of high school and want to resume their education," Jimenez said.

Located approximately 300 yards from the Mescalero Elementary School in Mescalero, the new middle/high school campus is composed of 15 double-wide portable buildings with 30 fully functional classrooms currently in session.

A day care center will soon be added for those students who have small children, officials said, and paved parking areas and basketball courts are under construction.

"Everyone has pitched in," seventh grade teacher and project coordinator George Cronin said. "The staff even did the digging for the sewer lines."

Mescalero school officials are already looking to the future and are planning to eventually add a two-year junior college to the campus, said Mescalero Superintendent of Schools William Butler.

"With a junior college, students could make better decisions about their area of study," Butler said.

"We have to be ready and we are going after the heavy science and math areas because of the nuclear storage project.

"Our kids that are sixth and seventh graders — by the time they graduate, that facility is going to be open and the jobs are there and

they need to be Mescaleros and they need to be training now."

Mescalero Middle School has six teachers on the payroll. The high school has 11 teachers and the elementary school has 17. The entire school system, including administration, teaching assistants, cafeteria workers and custodians, currently employs 80 people.

"We will possibly still need to hire three teachers for math, science and social studies," Jimenez said.

The complex could, even in its current state of construction, accommodate 250 middle and high school students, he said.

While construction work isn't complete, the business of learning is in full swing.

In addition to the standard curriculum, students attend Apache language and culture classes, plus an art class that emphasizes southwest art.

The school's technology is designed to allow students to face the future with confidence, Butler said.

"We are tied in with Sandia National Labs for our Supercomputing Program," Butler said. "The whole idea behind this class is not only to teach kids how to be proficient with computers, but also how to actually write programs."

The school is also connected with the Los Alamos Laboratory computer network, and offers Internet access to the students.

The Mescalero school system will have a lab with 20 computers, plus every classroom will have a minimum of five computers, he said.

Another unique program at the school is the computer connection with the Consortium of American Manufacturing Inc. (CAMI).

"Our CAMI connection gives us a tool to teach students about manufacturing techniques and management principles," curriculum director Linda Cardoza-Kon said. "Teachers are trained to adapt the curriculum to manufacturing and to help the children obtain school-to-work skills."

Some students at the new school will also have the opportunity to observe first-hand the workings of a metropolitan hospital, Butler said.

"Through our connection with the Consortium of Martin Luther Schools, we have discovered many different facets of education," Butler explained. "We share experiences, and this year we will be taking some of our high school students to Los Angeles to one of the hospital magnet schools."

Like the Ruidoso school system, Mescalero schools have applied for accreditation for kindergarten through 12th grades via the North Central Association, Butler said.

"That accreditation is assured to us, and all that remains is the formality of a letter," he said. "Each school has to meet their standards, and that helps higher level institutions accept kids from accredited schools."

The school administration has instituted a 'triad' system. The triad breaks grade levels into three areas: kindergarten to fourth grade (elementary school), middle school (fifth to eighth grades) and high school (ninth to 12th grades). Last year, Mescalero Elementary served students in kindergarten to sixth grade.

The new student council will be meeting soon to select school colors and a mascot, officials said.

"We are all very excited," Jimenez said. "If we can help the students get a good education, we've done our job."

## Ruidoso voters OK bond issues

Voter turnout was low for Ruidoso's \$6.65 million bond issue election, but those who cast ballots yesterday passed all seven projects.

"I'm relieved people realize these are all worthwhile projects and important to the growth of the community," Mayor Jerry Shaw said Wednesday morning.

Shaw said she hoped for a better turnout, but she expected it to be low. Still, she was confident all the bond issues would pass.

"Ruidoso has never turned down a bond issue," she said.

Only 17% of the registered 3,743 voters cast ballots Tuesday, significantly less than the 48% of the 2,896 registered voters who cast their opinions at the last council election in March 1994.

Village Manager Gary Jackson suggested the reason for the low turnout could be the election's subject matter.

Bond issues tend to reap the fewest votes of any type of election, Jackson observed. The biggest voter turnout comes with national elections, and state elections historically have the second largest showing, he said.

"Some may think the issues are mundane, that they don't carry a great deal of excitement or electricity as a people vote," Jackson surmised.

"It is a democracy," Jackson concluded. "The community has determined which needs to be prioritized."

Now that the bond issues have been authorized, village councilors will determine at their Sept. 12 meeting when to put the bonds out to market.

Jackson said the council will use the advice of the village's financial adviser, Kevin Powers. Some or all of the bonds could be sold as early as November, and the village could "take delivery" of the money as early as December.

### Important issues on top

Each bond issue was voted on separately, and the two bond issues officials have described as "extremely important" gained the most votes.

Approximately 88% of the voters approved the \$2 million bond issue to improve water volume with larger water lines, and to improve water pressure by doubling the capacity of the Grindstone Treatment Plant.

Likewise, about 86% approved the \$1.5 sewer bond issue to replace

decaying wastewater lines. The old sewer lines allow already fresh groundwater to seep into the lines, costing the village nearly \$200,000 in unnecessary treatment per year.

With the sewer bond issue approval, the village will use the \$160,000 it received from the state Legislature for line improvements for engineering costs instead.

"We'll get an engineer on board," he said. "We need a lot of survey work up front."

Building a new library with a \$1.6 million bond issue proved the third most popular ballot question, as 67% of the voters said they wanted it.

Officials are leaning toward constructing the new building on city-owned land next to the village hall on Kansas City Street. Jackson said he will recommend the council create a subcommittee to study and determine the most suitable site for the new complex.

Construction of seven new athletic fields, a baseball field and a softball field with a \$1 million bond issue was the fourth most popular project. About 65% of the voters wanted it.

The fields, which will also include bleachers, goals, a scoreboard and dugouts, will be built on school-owned land next to the White Mountain Elementary School. The village will lease the land from the

school district for \$1 a year, and will also maintain the playing grounds.

Renovating the existing Sudderth Drive library into a senior citizen center with a \$100,000 bond issue gained the fifth most votes, with 62% approval.

The senior center's expansion

was dependent upon the passage of the library bond issue, officials explained. The new library was approved by 67% of the voters.

Expansion of village hall with a \$350,000 bond issue came sixth on the popularity list, with only 54% saying yes. With the funds, about five new offices and a foyer area will be added.

The least favored bond issue, gaining only 52% of the vote, was the \$100,000 storage space addition at the Ruidoso Convention and Civic Events Center.

The tally of votes was verified after the election by Ruidoso Magistrate Court Judge William Butts and Village Clerk Tammie Maddox.

## Apaches keep gambling take

The Mescalero Apache Tribe planned to send its share of casino revenue wins to the state, the general manager of the Inn of the Mountain Gods said Tuesday.

But the July 13 ruling of the state Supreme Court put that financial transfer on hold, said John McCulla.

The tribe, one of eight state Indian groups with casino gambling, was the only one not to send its revenue share.

"We thought we had the compact in place," he said. "It certainly got muddled."

Just as a "final determination" of the revenue share was being calculated, the court made its decision, McCulla said.

"We do have the figures accumulated if things get settled," he said. The tribe still considers the gambling compact, signed by Governor Gary Johnson in February, to be valid, McCulla said.

Even after the state's Supreme Court ruled Governor Johnson didn't have the authority to bind the state to the compacts without legislative approval, the tribe considered fulfilling the revenue agreement and sending the money to the state, McCulla said.

"We certainly were willing to do everything under the compact until

the Supreme Court made its decision," he said. "In view of their position and the refunds, we felt we took the right decision — to let everything settle down and fall into place."

He said he did not have "on hand" the amount the tribe would have sent to the state, nor would he release how much money the tribe has gained in winnings from its casino.

"The casino is doing a good business," McCulla offered.

Six of eight Indian groups had sent a total of \$919,906 in revenues to the state Treasurer's Office, but the treasurer decided last week to return the money.

"Upon advice of legal counsel following a thorough analysis of the opinion and order of the New Mexico Supreme Court and of applicable federal and state statutes, we've determined the funds and accrued interest may not be claimed as property of the state and must be remitted to the respective pueblos," state Treasurer Michael A. Montoya said in a statement this week.

The first payment was due July 25. The next payment would have been due Jan. 25.

The tribal/state revenue sharing agreements stipulated each Indian group share 3% of its first \$4 mil-

lion in gambling revenues with the state, and 5% after the \$4 million mark.

"This is not an enforcement agency," H.L. Lovato, a spokesman for the Treasurer's Office said Aug. 8. "We're certainly not going to go out and enforce payment because we're not authorized to."

Payments were sent from all the Indian groups except the San Juan Pueblo and the Mescalero Apache Tribe to the Treasurer's Office by the July 25 deadline. They include:

- \$87,841 from the Tesuque Pueblo;
- \$304,992 from the Pueblo of Isleta;
- \$82,690 from the Pueblo of Pojoaque;
- \$11,170 from the Pueblo of Acama;
- \$142,374 from the Pueblo of Santa Ana;
- \$290,839 from the Pueblo of Sandia.

The San Juan Pueblo had sent its \$51,730 revenue share to the governor's office July 27 rather than the Treasurer's Office, but the check was returned by mail the next day.

Diane Kinderwater, the governor's spokeswoman, explained the office was advised not to "enable" the compacts in view of the court's decision.

## Ruidoso attorney hired by group to seek county raises

A Ruidoso attorney has been hired to challenge a constitutional prohibition against mid-term raises for elected county officials in New Mexico.

When they first heard Dan Bryant was hired by the Association of Counties to file a lawsuit, Lincoln County commissioners were a little confused.

Last year, Bryant's partner Alan Morel advised commissioners mid-term raises would be illegal under the state constitution and subsequent attorney general opinions.

"Dan worked with me on my opinion and, at least, we raised the question whether it was legal," Morel said from his office Tuesday. "We asked for an attorney general's opinion and he said it was illegal, unconstitutional."

On the one hand, the state constitution won't allow elected county officials to get raises while they're in office. But, on the other hand, a state statute says all elected officials in a specific county have to receive raises at the same time. Since they now are elected in staggered terms, there's no way to comply with both these rules.

Morel's opinion to the Lincoln County commissioners was that the constitution takes precedence.

The state constitution aims to ensure commissioners don't vote increases for themselves. The state statute is aimed at preventing commissioners from punishing any one official.

To complicate matters, the constitution includes several exceptions to its rule.

"When we looked further (in research financed by the association), the attorney general had rendered a great number of opinions that basically state it's okay for everybody except county elected officials to get mid-term salary increases," Morel said. "The supreme court,

court of appeals, State Corporation Commission, all district judges, everybody is entitled to get mid-term salary increases except for county elected officials, and that doesn't make any sense. If the exception has been good for everyone else to receive those raises, it should be OK for county officials to receive them as well. We believe that's the way it's going to come out."

Mired in confusion, Lincoln County commissioners decided in January to rescind 7% raises they had given themselves in April 1994.

This allowed them to avoid having their budget thrown out by the Department of Finance and Administration, Morel said.

"The AG (attorney general) kicked out about seven county budgets that provided for mid-term salary increases, saying they were unconstitutional," Morel said.

Lincoln commissioners lost a \$735 annual salary increase. Other county officials had more at stake. With salaries in the \$30,000 range, they would have received increases of more than \$2,000.

### A decision is needed

"Somebody's got to have the question answered and I guess we're going to do it," Morel said.

Although the case probably will be filed in district court, the attorneys expect to see it kicked up into the New Mexico Supreme Court. Plaintiffs have signed on from all over the state, they said.

"What we've created with staggered terms is that a brand new elected official right off the street with no experience can come into county government and be making more money than the county clerk or county commissioner who's been there four or six years," Bryant said. "Nobody would run an organization this way. You don't give the new guy more money, you make him earn it."

## Pampered Pets faces dogfight over residential boarding kennels

Pampered Pets, a Mechem Drive dog kennel and grooming operation, may be cited later this week for violating Ruidoso village ordinances.

The notice summoning the business owners to municipal court would not be for the complaint of barking dogs, but because dogs are allowed in an open, fenced area, village planning director Cleatus Richards said.

The lack of a roof and siding violates zoning ordinances and the P&Z's 1994 approval of the kennels' construction, Richards said. The business is owned by Kimberly and Dan Mills.

"We will have to serve a citation because they're in violation of the ordinance," Richards said after visiting the 512 Mechem Drive business. The kennel also has frontage on Upper Terrace Drive. "They can have their operation as long as it's fully contained in buildings."

But he also said he will try to sit down with the Mills to seek compliance before issuing a citation.

The complaint of neighboring property owner Patricia Benton to the Planning and Zoning Commission brought issue to the alleged violation during a Monday public hearing.

Benton contended the loud barks

emanating from the business and its open dog runs prompted a potential buyer of her Course View property to back out of their deal.

Benton also charged that the operation is not suitable for the residential area, and that neighbors never had the opportunity to oppose the kennel because the business license was issued to a Sudderth Drive address.

"I don't feel it's a valid license at all," Benton charged. "We'd just like to get it out of there."

But the site is completely legal for the business, Richards said. Despite the residential setting of streets east of Mechem, the area has been zoned commercial for decades.

Commissioners just approved establishment of another business in the area at their last meeting. Pappy Bell, owner of Pappy's Diner in Ruidoso Downs, was given the go-ahead to convert an old house into a restaurant at the corner of Rainbow and Mechem drives. Because of neighbors' complaints, commissioners stipulated Bell must erect a wooden fence and vegetative screening around the old house.

The two-year-old Pampered Pets began as a grooming operation, and branched into boarding last summer after the P&Z approved construction of a 21x21 foot enclosed kennel. With the kennel, the Mills

installed the chain link fence.

Kimberly Mills and her attorney Bob Beauvais explained to the commission the fenced-in area is not an outdoor run, but "where we let the dogs go to relieve themselves."

"My only intention is to make a living," she said.

About four other neighbors were also at the hearing.

Don Weiner, owner of the Aspen Lodge, said the dogs' continual "racket" negatively impacts his business. Anytime a person walks by the Mills' fenced yard, the dogs jump up and bark ferociously, he said.

"It scares the hell out of me," Weiner said.

Citing the operation will not shut down business, but will force the Mills to appear in municipal court, Richards said.

If the citation is issued, it will be the second time this month the business owners will be summoned to court. The first time regarded a nuisance charge about barking dogs.

Judge Mike Line dismissed that case, saying there was no proof the noise came from the kennel. He dismissed a similar case against the Mills filed by the same people late last year, Mills said.

There's about eight other dogs in the immediate neighborhood, many which like to bark, Mills said.

# Lincoln County attorney seeks fee increase

A request to increase the \$60 per hour fee of Lincoln County's contract attorney may spark another look at hiring an in-house lawyer.

County Attorney Alan Morel collected \$73,346 in legal fees for fiscal 1994-95. In addition to the regular 850 hours covered by his \$51,000 contract, he billed 373 hours for work on 15 pending or threatened lawsuits.

"I haven't decided yet whether I will submit an exact figure or just leave it up to the commission's discretion," Morel said from his Ruidoso office Tuesday.

The county commission will consider his request at its regular meeting Sept. 5. Morel, as a partner in the firm of Parsons, Bryant and Morel, was hired in February 1993.

Surrounding counties use a variety of methods to satisfy their legal needs. They include hiring a staff attorney, contracting with a local office of the district attorney, joining a risk pool through the New Mexico Association of Counties and hiring on contract.

"Before we made the contract last time, we considered an in-house attorney," said Commissioner Sterling Spencer. "The idea probably will come up again."

"We try to look at the overall legal costs. When an attorney is on staff, many other expenses are involved such as secretarial help, office expenses and travel expenses. You have to look at the total budget over and above the cost of an attorney."

Commissioner Bill Schwettmann said he doesn't see any advantage for the county by hiring a staff at-

torney. The county could save money if the commission starts drafting its own resolutions and stops using Morel's time unnecessarily, he said.

"I couldn't see where it (an in-house attorney) would benefit us one iota," Schwettmann said Wednesday. "He'll have to have a secretary, an office. I think Morel has treated us very favorably. I think a cost of living increase is justified. I don't know how the other commissioners feel, but I think I will go along with" an increase in hourly charge.

With a contract attorney such as Morel, additional expense also may be involved. For instance, in a summary of his charges for the 1994-95 fiscal year, Morel listed his basic miscellaneous work for the commission at \$51,321, plus \$4,317 in expenses for a total of \$55,638.

He then itemized work on 15 actual or potential lawsuits for another \$22,025 in legal fees and taxes, plus \$4,053 in expenses. The grand total for all of the work and expenses was \$81,716. Morel pointed out in his summary that one of the suits resulted in recovery of \$9,025 for the county.

According to his figures, he averaged 102 hours a month on county business.

In neighboring Otero County, with a population of about 55,000 compared to Lincoln's 13,000, in-house attorney Al Quintana handles the miscellaneous work and lawsuits for an annual salary of \$51,000. However, when travel, secretarial help and office supplies were added, his budget was \$86,000 last year.

Otero County Commissioner Ronny Rardin said hiring an in-

house attorney "was the best thing we ever did."

"I was totally against it when it was suggested, although I voted for it with reservations," he said Tuesday. (Dan) Bryant (one of Morel's partners) was a great attorney for the county. We still have him on call at \$90 an hour for any really tough issues, but we just can't afford him full time. He's well known around the state.

"But Al is a good lawyer and for the day-to-day work, we save a lot of money. We keep him running. He's there many Saturdays and Sundays."

Availability is one of the biggest pluses, Rardin said.

"It's better to have a lawyer sitting in the office, responsive to your calls," he said. Contract attorneys "represent other clients. They get back to you, just not as fast."

The Otero attorney also attends the meetings of other county boards, often preventing them from getting into trouble, instead of spending time getting them out of trouble, Rardin said.

Lincoln Commissioner Wilton Howell said what works for Otero may not work for Lincoln County.

"We inherited a lot of (lawsuits)," he said. "I think (Morel) has done a good job keeping out of lawsuits."

"We really don't have a place to put an attorney and I'm dead set against expanding the courthouse to accommodate a lawyer," he said. "I'm for paying a person what they're worth. If it can be justified, I will go for it. If not, I will be the first to vote against it."

Donna Smith, executive director of the Association of Counties, said her agency urges counties to use contract attorneys.

"Many used to use assistant district attorneys and that was adequate," she said. "Now with the human resource issues and the complexity of county government, in my opinion, that is inappropriate since their background is in the criminal field."

The problem with a full-time county attorney may be lack of diversity, she said.

"If they have that diverse background, a county usually can't afford them," Smith explained.

Contracting with a firm allows access to the different expertise of the partners, Smith said.

"Speaking as an insurer, we want them to get as good advice as they can, because even if they're right, it costs a lot to defend," Smith said. "A good attorney can save you thousands and thousands of dollars by preventing lawsuits."

# Planning officials seek parking for tea

If Ann Bolton wants to serve iced tea on her clothing store's patio, she'll also have to provide customer parking, planning and zoning officials said.

Bolton, who owns J. Roberts at 2608 Sudderth Drive, requested a commercial site development approval from the Planning and Zoning Commission that would allow her to serve iced drinks.

But commissioners tabled her request, suggesting that Planning Director Cleatus Richards meet with Bolton and see if she'll agree to supply parking at the site.

The patio, which already is decorated with patio furniture and 10 chairs, is owned by Bolton.

"We have the tables. All we're asking is to serve cool drinks to keep people in town longer to shop," Bolton's friend Wanda Millar pitched to the commission.

But P&Z Chairman Mike Radziewicz complained that Bolton had made past promises to construct parking on a back lot she also owns, but never has. Her parking promises had come

when the commission granted the addition of storage to her building in 1993.

At that time, P&Z staff recommended the approval be withheld unless parking was provided. The commission went ahead and approved Bolton's request after being told she planned to turn the lot into parking spaces.

The entire business site provides no parking, having predated the zoning ordinance that would have required 20 spaces for the building's square footage. The change of some space into storage eliminated some of that parking need, but beverage service would require one parking space for every three patrons, P&Z staff members said.

Commissioner Van Patton said "not many people are going to drive to town just for an iced tea — and there's not enough places to get a cool drink."

Commissioner Bob Sterchi agreed, saying that since the business site was once a restaurant, parking can be a much of an issue for tea service.

The request will be reviewed again by the commission in early September.

## Sample costs of county attorneys in N. Mexico

A check of the legal system used by several of New Mexico counties showed that:

— Torrance County (10,000 residents) uses the district attorney's staff for most work. The county is insured through the Association of Counties for law enforcement liability and property damage, said assistant county administrator Babetts Berkshire. Previously, the county paid about \$15,000 a year for legal work, she said.

— Socorro County (15,000 residents) contracts with an attorney at \$50 per hour and has kept its expenses under \$20,000, according to County Manager Jake Sedillo. The same attorney represents three other counties. "That's his specialty," Sedillo said. "And he's not real fancy."

— Chavez County (80,000 population) pays a staff attorney \$51,000 and uses the association of counties for contract labor issues.

— Cibola County (25,000 population) contracts with the district attorney's office, but pays \$40,000 for use of the staff. The county jail pays another \$20,000. "We have use of four attorneys including the DA (district attorney), and they're right across the hall," said County Manager Joe Murrietta.

— Bernillo County (nearly half a million population) has one in-house attorney, Tito Chavez, at about \$75,000 a year. The legal department also has one full-time and seven part-time assistant attorneys and other support staff and expenses, for an annual budget of \$550,000.

### Changes in the air as school year begins

Ruidoso students will face many changes this year — and so will Mescalero Apache students.

As detailed in a story in this issue of The News, a middle school and high school have now opened in the Mescalero. Approximately 164 students have left the Ruidoso and Tularosa school systems to attend the Mescalero schools, and more are expected. We hope this facility provides a needed option for Mescalero students.

There are two ways to look at the loss of these students at Ruidoso: it may result in less integration between races in this area, and that's not good. But the good may prove to outweigh the bad. The reservation deserves to have its own schools, and the tribe plans to offer more classes about the Mescalero culture than the Ruidoso schools. One big reason the tribe has opened these schools is to give Mescalero students pride in having their own school system. So far, the effort to open the school so quickly has created an air of cooperation, with teachers even helping with construction.

Ruidoso students will face other changes. High school freshmen will not be able to leave school for lunch, reportedly because of the failure of their predecessors. At least they're supposed to get improved lunches (one wonders if these changes are unrelated, or if they're both aimed toward increasing the number of students eating school lunches, thus reducing costs).

A new face is in the Ruidoso Middle School principal's office. Sergio Castañon should be a good addition to this school system, with previous experience here making his transition smooth. More Hispanic leaders will enrich the school system.

In the curriculum arena, the new mandatory freshman Life Skills class will teach practical information, such as study skills and offer information to help students make the proper life decisions.

Eastern New Mexico University in Ruidoso has some changes, too. Via interactive instructional TV, students can earn master's degrees as well as more bachelor's degrees.

A final note: as we've stated before in this column, some drivers in this area (local and visitors) have a need to improve their habits behind the wheel. It's never more important to heed this warning than now, as school comes back into session. We especially need to watch out for children and school buses directly before and after school!

### Money is there for teacher pay raises

TO THE EDITOR:

As of April 1, 1993, the State of New Mexico legislated for the right to collective bargaining for all public employees. The law is "Open Shop," which does not require employees to belong to the association in order to receive representation. The employees of the Ruidoso School District elected Ruidoso Education Association/National Education Association to represent them in this process.

Issues brought to the bargaining table are derived from employee concerns. Input from represented employees is gathered through formal surveys. From the survey results, proposals are developed for negotiations.

Specific working conditions, as well as salary compensation, were primary concerns this year. A majority of survey respondents were concerned about a potential decrease in take-home pay should salary not be addressed. Salary discussions between REA and management focused on potential areas of revenue that could be used in a salary increase, while still allowing a prudent and cautious budget.

Primary focus of discussion centered on the following:

— Additional increase to operational budget as allocated by the

Legislature: approximately \$200,000

— Increased revenues to cash balance: approximately \$200,000

— Increased emergency fund: approximately \$145,000

— Reassessment of utility line item increase: \$117,000

Discussion centered around a potential crisis year due to a possible drop in enrollment. Therefore, REA suggested a hiring freeze beginning in early April, as employees were concerned about a potential reduction-in-force situation. REA also emphasized maximum efficiency in use of existing personnel until an accurate enrollment was determined. REA DOES NOT oppose the athletic increment increases, but questions the timing, given management's concern about a crisis year.

Based on current budget figures provided to REA, monies are available to address employee compensation and still provide a cautious budget.

## Ruidoso opens grid season on defending state champ's turf

Ruidoso football coach Les Carter doesn't believe in playing "cupcakes," even as a season opener.

The Warriors opponent Friday night, however, is more like an overdone steak — tough, real tough.

Ruidoso opens the 1995 season against defending state champion Artesia at 7:30 p.m. in the Bulldog Bowl.

Artesia, winner of three straight state titles, ended the Warriors' "Cinderella" season last year in the quarterfinals of the state football playoffs. The Bulldogs blanked the Warriors, 38-0.

RHS finished the season with a 7-6 overall record, after making the playoffs for the first time in five years.

Is there an advantage to playing Artesia early?

"Yes. They are the returning state champs and we get to play them before anybody else does," Carter said.

A team rarely reaches its peak early in the season, even the three-time defending state champs. Artesia runs a complicated offense similar to the pros run-and-shoot. The time to bump off the pre-season No. 1-ranked Bulldogs is when they haven't achieved mid-season form.

Carter and his coaching staff scouted the Bulldogs in a scrimmage last week. Artesia will be strong again, Carter said, but it may not have the potent offense it had last year.

Gone from the 1994 team are quarterback Ty Houghtaling and split end Denny Giles. Houghtaling

was a one-man wrecking crew for the Bulldogs in last year's playoff win over the Warriors. He threw 275 yards on 14-of-24 attempts, while the Bulldog running backs rushed for 218 yards. It was quite an offensive display.

"Offensively, I don't feel like they are the powerhouse that they were," Carter said.

Artesia coach Cooper Henderson has lost all his skilled position players from last year's offensive unit. Stepping in for Artesia will be wide receiver Scotty DeHoyos, a 5-8, 140-pound senior, and slot back Chad Letcher, a 5-9, 140-pound senior.

Josh Whitmire (5-11, 175) will get the start as quarterback Friday night against the Warriors.

"The key to any early season game is just coming out and playing sound football," Henderson said.

The seventh-year coach expects the Warriors to have more confidence than they have had in awhile.

"They're an experienced ball club that's been there," Henderson said. "They'll be more physical than last year."

Henderson, who coached at Ruidoso from 1984 to 1988, also is concerned about the Warriors' speed, particularly that of Kyle Humphreys and Rex Comanche.

"Coach Carter has brought them so far in such a short time," Henderson said.

The Warriors will counter with an experienced group of returning players. Carter said this year's personnel matches up better than last year's did.

Carter had penciled in senior Billy Rogge as the Warriors' starting quarterback, but that changed when Rogge broke his leg in Friday's scrimmage with Las Cruces Oñate High School.

Vying for the QB position are senior Jackie Roe and junior Pascal Enjady. Carter said both players are getting repetitions in practice. He probably won't name a starter until today or tomorrow.

"The team is behind both of them," Carter said. "We're going to expect a lot out of both them no matter where they play."

Last year's leading rusher Humphreys and fullback Comanche give Ruidoso an experienced backfield.

Offensive linemen Jesse Fromknecht, Robert Guadiola, Erik Kakuska, and Kevin Pellman anchor the Warriors' offensive line. Shane Reidhead, a transfer from Capitan, will see playing time also.

Ruidoso also returns a pair of solid receivers in tight end Byron Soules and wide receiver Brandon Emello.

Expect the Warriors to run Carter's run-oriented offense, with hopes of keeping the ball out of the Bulldogs' hands. When Ruidoso does pass, it will be mostly high-percentage, play-action passes.

"To be good, you've got to play the best," Carter concluded.

The Warriors will be doing just that Friday night.

## RHS volleyball coach aims to stabilize team

Jauna Sanchez's newest volleyball coach Jauna Sanchez has a simple but direct philosophy when it comes to the game she loves: don't let the ball hit the floor.

The Florida native came to Ruidoso with hopes of providing some stability to a program that has had four coaches in three years. She said the team has sensed her hopes, and as a result, has an excellent attitude heading into the 1995 season.

Sanchez graduated from Eastern New Mexico University in Portales in 1993, majoring in education. She taught at Mansaul in Albuquerque the past two years, and coached the junior varsity volleyball team to a 23-7 overall record.

She played volleyball for the Zias, earning first-team all-conference honors her senior year. Prior to her career at ENMU, Sanchez played volleyball at a California junior college. It was there that Sanchez played for Albert Gasparian — her most influential mentor. Gasparian will be an assistant coach for the United States

women's Olympic volleyball team in 1996.

"He made you realize you could do it, even if you're dying at the end of practice," Sanchez recalled.

Sanchez wants to get that same type of effort from the Warriors.

Ruidoso will focus on mastering the fundamentals, teamwork, and "not letting the ball hit the floor" this season, Sanchez said.

Sanchez took over the program from Janie Roland. Roland coached last year's team to an 8-10 record. She is now teaching in Dallas and retired from coaching.

After the 1993-94 school year, Superintendent Mike Gladden, backed by the school board, removed long-time volleyball coach Jody Blanton, despite strong opposition from some parents and students.

The district had trouble filling the coaching position prior to the start of the season last year. Former Ruidoso boys basketball coach Sid Wright coached the volleyball team for a week before resigning. Roland then took over for the remainder of the season.

## Tigers and Bears tangle in opener

Capitan will take on a much-improved Hatch Valley football team in the season opener for both teams. Kickoff is set for 7:30 p.m. at Tiger Stadium.

The Tigers return 12 seniors from last year's state runner-up squad. LHS was 11-2 in 1994.

Hatch finished 3-7 last year. Coach Michael Booty said his Bears are young and eager. "But enthusiasm takes you only so far," Booty said.

## Stablemates vie for top thoroughbred honors

The \$25,000-added Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity will spotlight a group of talented juveniles in the main stakes action of the week at Ruidoso Downs.

The 40th running of the Futurity will be contested Saturday as the highlight of the weekend, which also includes simulcast wagering on the International Festival of Racing from Arlington International in Chicago.

Solid stakes performers Id's Fizz and Winnerslaughjoke get top billing among an evenly matched group of 2-year-olds entered in the six-furlong Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity. The race attracted a field of nine 2-year-olds.

Id's Fizz comes into Saturday's marquee event off a solid third-place finish behind two-time stakes winner Full Connection in the \$58,000 Rio Grande Futurity on July 15.

The Tim Cross-trained filly by Sparkling Blade has two wins in five career starts for owner Robert Canning of Ruidoso. Id's Fizz will break from the five post under jockey David Mitchell, who also rode her in the Rio Grande Futurity.

In order for Winnerslaughjoke to win the rich futurity, he will have to beat stablemate Id's Fizz — both are trained by Cross.

Winnerslaughjoke also started in the Rio Grande Futurity, but finished eighth in the 11-horse field. The New Mexico-bred gelding by Dawn of Creation finished fourth in the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity in May and fifth in the Norgor Futurity in mid-June.

Winnerslaughjoke is owned by James Lewter of Clovis, and veteran jockey Darrell Blevins will handle the riding duties.

Impressive maiden winners Sunset Boulevard, Doc Davis and Love Is Blind also deserve a look in Saturday's feature, as each of them notched their first career victories here this summer.

Headlined by Sunday's Arlington Million, which will be simulcast at 2:45 p.m. local time, the International Festival of Racing has attracted some of the world's best Turf specialists including Sand Pit

and Timmers Way, who are pre-entertained to run in the Million.

The \$400,000-added Secretariat Stakes for 3-year-olds is also part of Sunday's card. Saturday's \$500,000-added Beverly D Handicap will feature the powerful mare Possibly Perfect.

Popular Last Don B. will get the week started when he heads the field for Thursday's featured event, a one-mile allowance test for older thoroughbreds.

A multiple champion with earnings of more than \$345,462, Last Don B. is returning to Ruidoso Downs following his victory in the Sangre De Cristo handicap at Santa Fe July 3.

Prior to that the Lynda Tanner-trained won the Mescalero Apache Handicap at Ruidoso June 10, and was second by a head to Acrylic in the Governor's Handicap.

Regular rider Manny Ortiz Jr. will be aboard when Last Don B. breaks from the outside post position for the route test.

Returning by popular request Sunday is a rematch of the Pony Express Relay race featuring three teams of jockeys, trainers and assistant trainers, who will race around the Ruidoso Downs main track in an old-fashioned Pony Express relay.

Racing fans are also reminded that tickets for two of the most popular events surrounding the All American Futurity are on sale in the general offices at Ruidoso Downs.

Fans can see the post position draw for the All American on Friday, Sept. 1, at the All American Call To The Post Brunch, beginning at 10:45 in the Post Club. Tickets are \$12.50 per person.

The night before the All American, fans are also invited to celebrate at the All American Ball in the Museum of the Horse.

Selected as one of 53 James Madison Fellows out of 416 applicants nationally, Whitaker shook the president's hand while attending a summer seminar on the U.S. Constitution and the Bill of Rights in Washington, D.C.

"He was speaking at James Madison High School in Virginia," said Whitaker, a 22-year-old graduate student. "I thought we'd just meet to him and that would be exciting enough. But he acknowledged us and arranged for us to go to a reception. We shook hands and I told him about my plans."

"He asked where I was from and said he loved New Mexico and couldn't wait to go back. The experience sparked my interest in politics again."

Besides giving her the opportunity to meet the president and other important national figures, plus a chance to tour the nation's capital and learn about the constitution, the fellowship also will help Whitaker financially.

Funded by an act of Congress in 1986, each fellowship will pay up to \$24,000 toward the recipient's master's degree.

"Without the fellowship, I would have to work full time to complete my master's," Whitaker said. She already completed one year toward a master's of science in history at New Mexico State, and hopes to finish her thesis this year.

"I'm really looking forward to getting a job," she said. "I've been in school 19 years straight."

Fellowship recipients are required to teach American history or social studies in a secondary school for at least one year for each year

they receive fellowship support. The aim is to recruit into teaching people knowledgeable about the origins and development of the nation's government.

The foundation was named in honor of the fourth president of the United States, generally acknowledged as the "Father of the Constitution." Based in Washington, D.C., the fellowship stages intensive summer seminars for study of the U.S. Constitution and the Bill of Rights.

Whitaker attended the session at the history department of the University of Washington, D.C.

While she learned about the principles, framing, ratification and implementation of the two documents, she also earned six graduate credits toward her master's degree.

She also took the opportunity to visit New Mexico senators Pete Domenici and Jeff Bingaman; rode in the senate elevator; and watched Sen. Ted Kennedy, Sen. Jessie

Helms and Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas.

And to think she applied on a whim.

"My senior year, I looked at the bulletin board and saw the notice," Whitaker said. "I decided to apply and then forgot about it. I was gearing up for my teaching job interviews."

The award letter arrived in April. The month-long constitutional boot camp ending July 28 was intensive, she said. Classes ran three to four hours every day and a research paper was required.

"It gave me a whole new appreciation for the constitution," said Whitaker, the daughter of John and Myrum Whitaker. Myrum Whitaker is a teacher at Capitan High School.

She previously earned a bachelor's in social studies and education from Adams State in Alamosa, Colo.







# All American Futurity is climax of season

The speculation and anticipation surrounding this year's All American Futurity is now centered on the 10 talented runners who will contest the finals of the world's richest quarter horse race on Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 4.

Winalota Cash and Shake The Bank, two of the three supplemental entries to qualify, tied for the top time when they both covered the 440-yard distance in

:21.47 seconds while competing in separate divisions of the Aug. 18 trials.

A total of 173 hopefuls contested the trials on an afternoon of varied weather and track conditions which produced qualifiers from nine separate races. This year's total purse is worth more than \$1,653,644, with \$904,135 earmarked for the winner of the 37th running of the race. Yard for yard, it is the richest event in racing.

As it has been for the past 36 years, All American day promises to be the biggest of the season.


Ruidoso Downs will start its first race at noon (instead of 1:15 p.m.) on the All American program. Gates will open at 10:30 a.m. and the parking lot will open at 9 a.m.

Shake The Bank, an undefeated filly who arrived at Ruidoso Downs in late July from Mexico City, set the standard for this year's trials when she zipped out to win the first division under jockey Henry Garcia.

Owned by Mexico City businessmen Hector Roldan and Ramiro Alpizar, Shake The Bank won two futurities at

the Hipodromo de las Americas in Mexico City before her owners decided to put up the \$50,000 supplemental eligibility payment. Juan Gonzalez trains her at Ruidoso Downs.

Winalota Cash, who shared the fastest qualifying time with Shake The Bank, was also a supplemental nominee for her owner Andra Meridith of Odessa, Texas. The Gregg Sanders-trainee had previously finished second in two Grade I futurities, including the Ruidoso Futurity on Memorial Day weekend.

With jockey Billy Peterson aboard, Winalota Cash tallied the longest margin of victory of all 10 finalists, winning the fifth division by a dominant 2 3/4 lengths.

Naturally A Winner, the third supplemental nominee, won the 11th trial by two lengths in :21.69. Johnnie Goodman, winner of back-to-back All Americans in 1980 and 1981, trains the Texas-bred son of Runaway Winner for Texas owners Jim Johnson and Don Bess.

Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath, also a two-time All American winning trainer, qualified his charges Cash on Deposit for Linda Mathews of Dallas and Six Delights for Jack Evans of Allen, Texas.

John Basset was the other trainer to qualify two horses. Basset's duo included Evening Snow, owned by Abigail Kawanakoa and winner of the 1993 All American, and Western Heart, owned by Ruidoso Downs President R.D. Hubbard and Ed Allred, owner of Los Alamos Race Course.

Completing the list of All American finalists are Jerry Windham's Winners Dash, trained by two-time All American winner James McArthur; Fishers Dash, an invader from California owned by Vessels Stallion Farm and trained by Danny Cardoza; and Some Swinger, who races for G.C. Broughton and is conditioned by Richard Fry, winner of last year's renewal with Noblesse Six.

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
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# Derby is top 3-year-old quarter horse event

Mildly Sinful was the fastest qualifier among the 10 three-year-olds who made the finals for the Grade I All American Derby.

An Oklahoma-bred filly, Mildly Sinful won the first division of the All American Derby Trials in :21.405 for the 440 yards.

The premier three-year-old event of

the season, the Grade I All American Derby will be worth \$200,401 for its 22nd running on Sunday, Sept. 3.

Sixty sophomore hopefuls were entered in the six Derby Trials, and Mildly Sinful set the standard for the afternoon with her half-length victory in the first division.

The first division also produced three other qualifiers, including Six Cantu, Imajewel Dash, and Ms. Achy Breaky Heart.

Mildly Sinful is owned by the Six G's Stable and is trained by Fred Danley, who is seeking his first All American Derby trophy.

Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath, winner of the 1986 edition with Six Popper, qualified the trio of Six Cantu (runnerup to Mildly Sinful), Imajewel Dash (third in that same race), and Kuhi, Kuhi (who won a shake for the 10th position after tying for the 10th fastest qualifying time).

Vessel Stallion Farm's Meter Me Gone will represent California in the Derby. He was the fourth fastest qualifier with his 6th division win in :21.580.

First Down Laveaux tallied the fifth best clocking for owner Jerry Windham and trainer James McArthur, who won the 1979 All American Derby with Dick-eys Fireman.

Other qualifiers included Gotum Lookin, winner of the second division which also produced finalists Clicken On and Hot Diggity Dash.

Gates will open at 11 a.m. for the All American Derby Day program, with the first race of the day scheduled for 1:15 p.m.

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# Sales may offer next All American winner

Horse racing fans from across the country will be in town Labor Day weekend to see who wins the richest quarter horse race — and many also come to catch a glimpse of future winners.

Past years indicate the chances are good that the 1996 All American Futurity winner could be one of the yearlings up for bid at this year's Ruidoso Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sales.

Last year's All American Futurity champion, Noblesse Six, was one of the yearlings purchased at the 1993 show. Five other 1994 world champions were purchased at the 1992 and 1993 sales.

Of the \$21 million in 1994 quarter horse purse money, \$7 million was won by racehorses bought at Ruidoso's select quarter horse yearling sales.

With the highest average sale price of any quarter horse sale in the nation, the Ruidoso Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sales rates as the top place to buy a racehorse.

"Everybody that buys a quarter horse in the United States comes to Ruidoso," said Lowell Neumayer, general manager of Ruidoso Horse Sales Co.

At the Super Select Sale last year, 122 yearlings sold at an average price of \$28,000. The All American Yearling Sale sold 210 horses at an average price of \$10,300.

Three yearling sales will take place Friday, Saturday and Sunday, all part of the Ruidoso Select Quarter Horse Sales.

The Super Select kicks off the three-day sales event at 5 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 31. Session one of the All American Yearling Sale starts at 5 p.m. Friday, Sept. 1, with the second session at 5 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 2. The New Mexico Bred Select Sale immediately follows the second session of the All American Sale.

Bob Tackett of Collinsville, Okla. and Keith Babb of Monroe, La. will handle the auctioneering duties.

## Months of preparation

Before any yearling is paraded around the pen, Ruidoso Horse Sales office manager Jackie Riddle must complete piles of paperwork for all three sales, and Neumayer must inspect more than 200 yearlings in the months leading up to the sales.

It all starts in January, when the first entry forms start arriving at the Ruidoso Horse Sales office, located in the Ruidoso Downs Race Track Sports Theater.

"I have to get four pieces of paper from every owner, and sometimes that's like pulling teeth," Riddle said.

An owner must submit a horse's registration paper, owner transfer paper, Coggin's test result (for infectious equine anemia) and health certificate to Riddle. In addition, she receives parentage verification from the American Quarter Horse Association on each yearling. The horse's pedigree also goes into the file.

With this summer's outbreak of vesicular stomatitis (VS), Riddle must

also get a VS check on file for each yearling. Usually that is not necessary.

Everything a buyer would want to know about a prospective yearling can be found in Riddle's files. She keeps meticulous notes, copies every letter sent and received, and writes down every phone call made to and from the office.

Prospective buyers are picky, Riddle admitted. And for good reason. Last

program are announced during the sales, so Ruidoso Horse Sales videotapes and records the sales for protection.

## Checking confirmation

Neumayer, Ruidoso Downs Race Track owner R. D. Hubbard and seven other men founded the Super Select Sale 15 years ago with the hope of attracting the top quarter horse yearlings.

"There had never been a select sale for quarter horses before. This is the Keeneland (Ky.) of the quarter horse industry," Neumayer said, referring to the top yearling sale in the thoroughbred industry.

After paperwork starts to come in, Neumayer judges prospective yearlings by pedigree. He chooses more than 200 yearlings for a visual inspection and to check their "confirmation." When inspecting a yearling, Neumayer looks for good balance and straight legs. He will take the best 120 for this year's Super Select Sales.

Yearlings for the All American Sale are not visually inspected, but must have all the proper paperwork on file and must start the nomination process for the All American Futurity. The yearlings in the 1995 sale will make up the majority of the field for the 1996 All American Futurity Trials.

For the New Mexico Bred Select Sale held after the All American Sale, Neumayer also visually inspected the yearlings.

"It's just a special selection for New Mexico breeds," Neumayer said of the sale.

The Super Select Sale and the All American Sale are the premier sales of the weekend. It costs an owner \$800 to enter a yearling in the Super Select Sale and \$450 for the All American Sale. Owners must pay Ruidoso Horse Sales a 5% commission as well.

As the three sales approach, the 400 yearlings are housed in boxed stalls under two, 100x360-foot tents behind the Sports Theater. They start arriving usually three or four days before the sale, but some don't get there until the night before the sale. Prospective buyers can look at the yearlings as soon as the horses arrive on the Ruidoso Horse Sales grounds.

"It's a challenge to get everything done before the sale," Riddle said.

These horse sales contribute to the hype and hoopla of the All American Futurity race. Admission is free and the event is open to the public.

The crescendo begins to rise at 5 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 31, when the first Super Select yearling is led into the sales ring. Prospective buyers, who must pre-register, will peruse the program, look carefully at each horse and make their bids, wondering and hoping their choice will be the next All American Futurity winner.





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
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## Meet owners, trainers, jockeys at brunch



Tickets are available for \$50 a person at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

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



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# Finest fiddlers seek championship

Some of this country's finest fiddle players will pluck complex tunes during this year's All American Fiddler's Championship.

"The ones this contest usually draws are really good," said Bart Trotter, the championship's master of ceremonies. "They're not just the ones who just enter for a good experience."

The sixth annual All American Fiddler's Championship takes the stage Saturday, Aug. 26 at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center. Fiddling contests begin at 9 a.m. with fiddlers of all ages. Contest winners and the champion fiddler will be awarded cash prizes from a pot of more than \$4,200.

Spectators are welcome. Adult ticket prices are \$4 and children under age 15 can enter for free.

The fiddlers don't have to reserve a contest spot, but Trotter estimates between 30 to 40 of the musicians will show up.

The champion's name will be engraved on a bronze statue of Benny Thomasson. The Benny Thomasson Memorial Award is kept on display at the Museum of the Horse.

Last year's winner was Randy Elmore of Joshua, Texas, who is also a past world champion. The previous year's winner, Danita Hartz of Pocatello, Idaho, is a former Nashville, Tenn. Grand Masters Contest winner.

A champion fiddler player himself, Trotter said Thomasson developed the "Texas style" for fiddling, a technique that now prevails in the national contest scene.

The style combines intricate note playing and the stretching of tunes into five or more parts.

"The bowing is also different," added Trotter's wife Marilyn, a 1992 winner of the All American Fiddler's Contest and a past New Mexico state champion.

"You slur the different notes together," she said of the Texas style. "It's not in how much bow you use, but in how you do it."

Contest judges listen for the more intricate notes, Trotter explained.

"Benny used to say, 'There's not a bad contest song, just a bad fiddle player playing it,'" Trotter related.

Fiddle playing used to focus on the Irish jig type of sound, then evolved into the Kentucky bluegrass mixes.

"Then Benny developed the Texas style, which really is dominant — it's what everyone is playing all over the country," Trotter said. "It's better versions of all the songs."

Thomasson suffered a fatal heart attack in the 1980s while on an El Paso stage playing his signature tune, "Sally Goodin."

Trotter, who had the privilege of playing with Thomasson while on the contest circuit, said the famous fiddler was a natural teacher.

"Benny's big accomplishment was to show kids how to play like him — he was always really good to the younger fiddle players," Trotter recalled.

For the past seven years, Trotter has been playing his 31-year-old fiddle with the Flying J Wranglers six nights a week. He won the first two All American Fiddler's Championships when the event began six years ago, and has served as its emcee each year since.

He also has a world championship and five national titles under his belt.

"For about 10 years I traveled the country for national competitions. I put myself through school that way, and when I got married, I put my wife through school that way," Trotter said. He's off the contest circuit now, but he still plays every day.

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
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## Bridge enthusiasts face intense competition

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

## Guns engraved


Leo Ferguson started engraving 10 years ago as a hobby, but he liked it so well, the avocation is now a full-time vocation.

"If you're decorating a house, stop by," Powell said. "We'll have lots of unusual items."

Children also should be fascinated

# Antique heirlooms for all kinds of collectors

Antique dealers from five states will sell heirlooms at the fourth annual All American Antique Show and Sale Friday through Sunday, Aug. 25-27, at the Civic Center.

Lee Kirkendall, co-owner of AmeriWest Shows, said 44 dealers will sell a variety of antiques for both casual and serious collectors. AmeriWest, based in Amarillo, coordinates antique shows throughout the country.

"There will be lots of primitive pieces, furniture and small things," he said, making it one of the premiere antique shows of the year for this region.

Primitive antiques include furniture, kitchen pieces and tools often crafted by hand and used by early American settlers.

Local pottery collector Brad Bennett said at least one dealer will be selling Roseville and Weller pottery, referred to by collectors as "art" pottery.

The Roseville and Weller companies were both established in the late 1800s in Ohio. These pieces are among the most collectible pieces in the country today, and their popularity increases every year. Designs on the pottery include nature studies, portraits, birds, animals and flowers.

Another dealer will sell American brilliant cut glass, made between 1880 and 1915, Bennett said. Glass cut during what people in the antique industry refer to as The Brilliant Period has elaborate patterns that often cover the entire surface of the glass.

Bennett, who stays in touch with dealers who do shows with AmeriWest, said he expects this show to have a variety of "good, authentic antiques; something for everybody's taste."

by Jesse Locke, a local lady who sews 10 stitches to the inch," said Allen, who chose Locke's quilt because she "has a reputation for quality work."

At age 85, Locke still makes approximately three quilts a year.

"I'm either piecing or quilting. There are some days that I do other things," she said.

Asked the about number of stitches per inch, a gauge quilters use to measure quality, Locke replied, "I have never counted number of stitches to the inch, but I do take a real interest in my quilts. I am very particular."

"My daughter-in-law sent me pre-cut squares, and I put the quilt together with matching solids," Locke said.

Quilts are made in stages. First the fabric is cut, then pieced together. Once the pieces form the desired size, a back is attached to the piecwork, with filler material in the center.

Then the real work begins. The layers are melded together with quilting stitches that go through all of the layers.

"I have a quilting frame that's like a carpenter's saw horse. I start my quilts in the middle, and work toward the edge. I let the frame out to any size I need it to be as I work," Locke said.

Raffle tickets for the quilt will be available at the door. They cost \$5 for six or \$1 each.

The antique show will be open 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. Friday, 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday and noon to 5 p.m. Sunday.



Sept. 4. Stitch 'N' Stuff and *The Ruidoso News* will announce the winners.


Nearly everyone who participates enjoys the opportunity to show off at the fair, Dvorak observed.
