**Commission meets at 9 a.m. Tuesday**

Criteria for leasing the Lincoln County Rural Events Center will be discussed by county commissioners Tuesday during their monthly meeting.

The session begins at 9 a.m. in the County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

A third public hearing is scheduled to clear up language in the county's subdivision regulations. Changes may include a designation for "gated communities," private developments with homeowners associations taking responsibility for maintenance and repair of their own roads.

**Driver pinned in Saturday accident**

A Glencoe man was trapped Saturday when the roof of his 1991 Chevrolet pickup was crushed on impact with a semi-truck at the intersection of U.S. 54 and 380 in Carrizozo.

Gerald Tully, Jr., 53, was pinned for about an hour while rescue workers from the Carrizozo Fire Department cut off a hole through the roof of his truck to free him.

Tully was headed west on U.S. 380 about 1:55 p.m. when he collided with the center of the tractor trailer, moving north on U.S. 54.

Larry Bannon, 55, the driver of the 1995 GMC, was charged by State Police Officer Steve Standridge with failure to yield the right-of-way. The intersection light flashes red for drivers on U.S. 54 and yellow for drivers on U.S. 380.

Mayor Cecilia Kulnel said she has requested improvements at the intersection from the State Department of Highway and Transportation, but has been told that it does not meet the necessary criteria for a regular traffic light or a four-way stop.

Tully was treated for minor injuries at the Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso and released.

**Fish policy calls for Mescalero help**

A new joint wildlife management policy designed to enhance the role of Native American tribal governments in the endangered species program was announced this month by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the National Marine Fisheries Service.

In the southern Rocky Mountain area, 12 tribes, including the Mescalero Apaches next to Ruidoso, are developing fishery management plans for non-native fish on their reservations.

## Geronimo pledges better access to tribal business

If Joseph Geronimo wins the vice president's seat on the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council Tuesday, he wants to ensure that tribal members have better access to information about the tribe's business operations.

Geronimo will face Keith Miller in the general election Tuesday. An estimated 1,300 Mescalero voters are eligible to elect a president, vice president and four council members.

Incumbent President Wendell Chino, who has served in that capacity for more than 30 years, has been challenged by Fred Peso, current vice president. Neither man granted interviews.

Miller, who is retired and has no home phone, could not be reached for an interview.


Eight tribal members are vying for four council seats. The four with the highest vote counts will win.

The eight are incumbents Fred Chino Sr., Raymond Kirgan, Berle Kanseah and Raphael Mendez; and challengers Oliver Ray Enjady, Virgil Comanche, Evelyn Breuninger and Teddy Rodriguez.

## Vice President Peso questions President Chino's tribal management

Mescalero Apache Tribal Council Vice President Frederick Peso has sent letters to tribal members detailing problems with the tribal governing system and asking damning questions of President Wendell Chino.

Peso is running against his long-time ally for the position of president. The election is Tuesday.

Once thought to be Chino's hand-picked replacement if he retires, Peso is now at odds with Chino, especially since they disagreed about rejecting the local U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs chief, who is Peso's relative.

Peso was first elected to the tribal council in the 1980s, and has been vice president for two years. Chino has been president for more than 30 years.

Peso's poster says he is "seeking

## Insurance coverage threatened by wildfire danger, agent says

Insurance availability should be a major local concern because companies are becoming increasingly jumpy about insuring homes here, local insurance agent Dave Parks said Saturday.

Wildfire hazard is scaring the companies, Parks said at a Ruidoso Civic Center seminar on forest health and wildfire danger.

"Making it less likely that we will have a wildfire in Ruidoso probably won't affect rates," he said. "But it will make a big difference on whether or not you can buy insurance in a competitive market."

Losing a subdivision to fire would most likely cause some in-

urance companies to pull out of the area, Parks said.

"It would cause a very serious problem for availability of insurance in Ruidoso," he said.

Because New Mexico counts for less than one-half of 1% of the insurance premiums generated in the country, some companies feel safer simply withdrawing from the state, he said.

"It is important that we prevent that, not only because we want to save our homes and our beautiful scenery, but because we want to be sure that we have insurance available when we want to buy it," Parks said.

**Fire department advice**

Local residents who have fire

hazard concerns are encouraged to contact the fire department for help, Ruidoso Assistant Fire Chief Robby Hall said.

"We'll send someone out to look in your home and make recommendations about placement of fire detectors and fire extinguishers," Hall said. "We'll also make recommendations about how to clean up around your land and do whatever it takes to protect your property."

Homeowners can help the local fire departments by thinning trees, Brad Thorne of the Bonito Fire Department said.

"Trees are just like people," Thorne said. "They need room, and like to breathe."

## Bus shot at from passing car

A pellet or BB gun shot from a passing vehicle at a Ruidoso school bus Friday left a child slightly injured and her fellow passengers shaken.

The bus was carrying 8-10 Nob Hill elementary students, Superintendent Mike Gladden said. The bus had just turned north on Hull Road from Warrior Drive about 3 p.m. when one of its windows was struck by a projectile, police said.

Some of the children on the bus, who were all five and six years old, told police they saw two or three adult white males inside a "large, loud white car" traveling south on Hull Road.

Detective Jim Biggs said the kids pointed to his .9mm gun as the

type of weapon they saw. Some air guns look like a .9mm or .45 caliber gun, police said.

The bus driver, who was very shaken by the incident, heard a loud pop before pulling over for help at Sierra Vista Primary on White Mountain Drive, police said.

The projectile was likely a pellet, but could have been a BB or even a rock, police said. It didn't break the window, but left a circular indentation in the glass.

Glass flew across the bus aisle and struck six-year-old Andrea Montes near the left eye.

"It had to have been a high-powered air gun," said her father Ray Montes, a Ruidoso Downs police officer. "If hit just right, a pellet

could put anyone's eye out in a heartbeat. I think we were lucky because of the angle it was shot — the bus being so high, and the car lower to the ground."

Andrea was treated at the hospital for a scratch on the sclera or white part of her eye.

"We have to make a lot of noise about this," said Montes' grandfather, Barney Rue. "We don't want this to happen to anyone else's child."

Police searched for the white vehicle, but were unable to locate it. They said because the suspected weapon was not a high-caliber pistol, the incident can't be classified as a drive-by shooting.

## Indian leaders urge Legislature to sign compacts

Indian leaders urged the state Legislature last week to ratify gambling compacts, saying casino gambling is an important start toward Indian self-sufficiency.

The leaders were speaking before the Legislature's Indian Affairs Committee at the Inn of the Mountain Gods on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

Some committee members agreed with the speakers that heavy publicity concerning Indian casinos indicates bias against Indians.

"When it comes to Indian gaming, everybody makes it a story," said Sen. Leonard Tsosie (D-Crownpoint). "Our media continue to have a cowboys and Indians mentality."

More than 2,000 illegal gambling machines are being operated in Albuquerque, Tsosie said, yet there is no publicity about the social ills and lost taxes associated with those machines. He also pointed to the Intel corporation in Albuquerque, which gets huge tax breaks but no complaints about the lack of taxes it pays.

"In the past few months, there has been an uproar over Indian gaming in New Mexico

and the moral issues it involves. My question is, where was the uproar when Indians were trapped in poverty?" asked James Rivera, a Pojoaque Indian who works for a public relations firm that has been hired by the New Mexico Indian Gaming Association.

"Indian gaming is the key step in self-sufficiency, self-determination," James said, adding 46% of Indians in New Mexico live in poverty.

He noted several statistics associated with Indian gaming:

- unemployment in some Indian communities has dropped from 60% to nearly zero;
- Indian gaming provides jobs for 2,650 New Mexicans;
- it generates a payroll of \$46 million;
- the gambling operations purchase more than \$69 million worth of goods and services in New Mexico;
- and they create \$4.6 million in direct state tax revenues.

The tribes have followed all the rules and negotiated in good faith with the governor, James said. Of the 23 states that have Indian gaming compacts, 21 were signed by the governor, so it was reasonable for Indians to assume New Mexico's governor

# Health department starts survey of gambling effects

The New Mexico Health Department is conducting a statewide scientific survey on the health effects of gambling.

Secretary of Health Alex Valdez told the Legislature's Indian Affairs Committee about the survey while it was meeting last week at the Inn of the Mountain Gods on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

The random phone survey started last week. It will give the health department baseline data which it will compare to future health effects in a later survey, Valdez said.

Residents will be asked about their gambling behavior, said Lynn Brady, division director for substance abuse in the health department.

Survey callers will ask how often respondents have gambled in the past few years, Brady said. With a representative sample of each county, the survey will help the state learn where stronger pockets of gambling problems exist, she said.

Gambling is a personal choice and the health department is staying away from the morality debate, Valdez said.

A compulsive gambler is a chronic gambler who has a progressively larger failure to resist. The problem ends up damaging the gambler's family and job life, Valdez said.

High risk gamblers are preoccupied with gambling and continue to gamble after big losses, Valdez said.

The department will also train staff to help people with gambling problems, Valdez said, and contact various Indian tribes, pueblos and racetrack owners.

Hopefully, this state will avoid the need for an in-patient treatment facility for compulsive gamblers, like the one found in Minnesota, Valdez said.

He opened his talk with a humorous story about going to the first Gambler's Anonymous meeting at a church in his hometown of Espanola. He was

surprised to find the church packed when he arrived, but walked in to find most of the people were there to play bingo.

Rep. Shirley Baca (D-Las Cruces), who is running for U.S. representative in this district, said she recalls how her grandmother and friends set aside a specific amount of money each week for bingo. Growing up in Las Cruces, she also remembers hearing about compulsive gamblers who got into trouble at nearby Sunland Park.

Despite this state's long history of gambling, "Once Native Americans started making money, the whole issue seemed to have surfaced," about problem gamblers, Baca observed.

"I share your same view of what has happened," Valdez said.

But Valdez himself was accused of bias by Sen. Leonard Tsosie (D-Crownpoint). Tsosie said Valdez's choice of timing for this survey indicates a bias against Indians.

Valdez strongly objected to Tsosie's opinion.

"This is an issue which is ripe today for discussion," Valdez said, and he believes it's his responsibility to talk about it.

State University, graduating with a degree in history and pre-law. He also attended the University of Puget Sound in Tacoma, Wash.

He is the father of two children, who attend school in Tularosa.

A longtime political opponent of Chino and an activist against the proposal to store radioactive nuclear waste on the reservation, Geronimo said he decided to run for vice president because it's a position where he can devote time to goals he wants to pursue.

He previously ran unsuccessfully for the presidency.

Geronimo is employed as the only adolescent services counselor for juveniles under the tribe's Human Services Department.

"I work drug and alcohol cases and do the follow up," he said during an interview a few weeks before the election. "I help students go after advance education whether it's college, vocational training or the job corps. I stay in touch with them until they're in their 20s."

"My biggest dream is to set up a first class library for the community. I want a complete set of law books, computers, the whole works."

If elected, another of his efforts will be to find out the financial holdings of the tribe and share that information with other tribal members, he said.

He also would direct his time toward activities that could cut down the high crime rate on the reservation, Geronimo said.

"There's heavy drug and alcohol abuse," he said, adding that he sees the destructive influences in his job working with juveniles.

Other goals Geronimo would like to pursue include:

- establishing a boys and girls ranch on the reservation to handle rehabilitation and treatment of troubled children, instead of sending them off the reservation to other facilities.

- using an aging post office on U.S. 70 as an art gallery, performing arts center and display area for Mescalero artists and artisans.

- "It would allow the public to share the Mescalero cultural experience and to develop a better understanding," Geronimo said. "It also would give our artists a better return on their creative work."

- opening a country store in the Upper Canyon area of Ruidoso near the Mescalero Apache Reservation entrance.

- Goods for fishermen and

campers would be sold. Mescalero arts and crafts would also be sold. The store would stay open through hunting season.

— establishing a factory to build furniture with lumber from the reservation sawmill.

"We have kids with enough talent and training," Geronimo said. "And this is a resource we already have, not just something we're wishing for."

Geronimo has been an outspoken opponent of the tribal council's plan to store radioactive nuclear waste on the reservation. If the plans go through, the 40-year site would be the largest commercial waste site in the nation.

A disturbing the peace charge was dismissed Oct. 27 against Geronimo. He was accused of disrupting a tribal council meeting when he objected to the council asking a reporter from *The Ruidoso News* to leave a session last June.

His trial was postponed three times before it was dismissed. The judge's decision did not say why the case was dismissed, but the decision came after Geronimo filed a motion for dismissal.

The motion stated his right to a speedy trial was not met, and freedom of speech and the press are protected under the Indian Civil Rights Act of 1968.

An Alamogordo reporter who tried to get into the court hearing was not allowed to enter.

had the authority to do the same.

While the Indians believe the compacts are valid with only the governor's signature, they are asking the Legislature to ratify the compacts to quiet the complaints of anti-gambling crusaders, James said.

The committee passed a motion to ask the Legislature to ratify the compacts, and also asked the governor to sign compacts with the pueblos of Laguna and Santo Domingo in the future. The committee is made up of Democratic senators and representatives, some of whom are Indians.

Other Indian representatives said rumors about the lack of regulations with Indian gambling are unfair.

Ray Gallegos, who sells machines to the local Mescalero Apache Tribe for the Inn of the Mountain Gods, said the Mescalero and San Juan Pueblo have high-tech accounting systems that cost up to \$1 million. They can produce print-outs showing every payout from the machines, he noted.

The law allows Indian gam-

bling revenues to go to specific uses, said Bruce Sanchez of the Pueblo of Santa Ana Gaming Commission. Those uses include donations, local government operations, economic development, and for the welfare of the tribe.

The Santa Ana Gaming Commission has several police powers, such as the ability to conduct audits and issue subpoenas for investigations. The commission does licensing and background checks on every casino employee and vendor, more than is required by the U.S. Indian Gaming Regulation Act. Employees cannot get into machines without the commission's approval, Sanchez said.

Other governments help Santa Ana meet other regulations, such as food inspections (the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs) and fire codes (Sandoval County), said Walter Cristobal, who is also on the Santa Ana Gaming Commission.

The pueblo meets all state and federal standards, and sometimes exceeds them, Cristobal said.

A gambling machine's E-prompt must be removed in order to change the percentage of wins on a board, Sanchez added.

One machine needs a minimum of 37,000 revolutions before a hit, he said.

Sanchez noted he can't even play at the Santa Ana casino because he's on the gaming commission, so he stopped by Casino Apache while he was here.

Someone beat him by a half-step to one machine, then proceeded to win about \$1,200.

"I'm pretty assured and comforted there are regulations," said Rep. James Roger Madalena (D-Jemez Pueblo) after hearing the Santa Ana comments.

In urging the legislative committee to support the compacts, Sanchez said, "We all live in this state. Let's get along...I think we haven't done that for a long time."

Rep. Tsosie noted how well Indians in Minnesota get along with Duluth residents, where they operate a casino.

"Are we truly a Native American state?" Tsosie asked of New Mexico. He noted that he was late getting to Tuesday's meeting because he didn't see any state highway signs directing him to the Mescalero Reservation.

to lead our people...not control them." Tribal members said Chino's poster reads, "vote for someone you can trust," and includes the names of other candidates he supports, including Keith Miller for vice president.

The top two votegetters for president in the Oct. 3 primary are facing off Tuesday. Chino handily beat Peso in the primary numbers, with 472 votes to Peso's 178.

Keith Miller also received overwhelming favor for vice president in the primary, with 471 votes versus Joseph Geronimo's 142 (please see related story on Geronimo and his letter to the editor).

The top eight council candidates are vying for four seats tomorrow. Chino, Kirgan, Berje Kanseah and Raphael Mendez were top primary votegetters.

Peso asked several strong questions in the information he sent to tribal members, prefacing the questions with, "Before you vote, you need some answers."

The questions asked "Is it true" that:

- the president in a general

meeting in 1994 promised he would not run for office again?

- the president has for many years, lost interest and has ignored the real problems of the tribe? Could it be that he may be too busy with other interests?

- that the president will not disclose the income of the Inn (of the Mountain Gods) and especially Casino Apache to the tribal council much less the tribal members?

- that the tribal employees fear for their jobs if they oppose the president?


- if tribal members disagree with the president he/she is considered an enemy of the administration?

- that a tribal member was removed as BIA superintendent by the tribal council acting under duress by threats of resignation and intimidation, and to date has not been replaced?

- the inn was sued because of the misconduct of the president's wife?

- the president is promising a dividend payment for votes, and in actuality only the tribal council can approve dividend payments?

- that the president's wife is in-

involved in the private corporation that leases and sells gambling products to Casino Apache?

- that the president's wife controls the inn, instead of the board of directors appointed by the tribal council?

- that the president and his wife use the tribal plane (Lear jet) like it is their private airplane?

Chino did not return phone calls to ask for responses to these allegations.

# Forest experts seek more tree cutting in Ruidoso area

Proposed changes in Ruidoso's development controls would loosen the reins on tree cutting restrictions.

The current planning code considers trees to be mature when as small as five inches in diameter or when five feet high, and cutting them requires a permit.

State forest experts say a permit shouldn't be required unless a tree has at least a 19.1-inch diameter where it is 4.5 feet off the ground.

Cutting trees this size or larger wouldn't require a \$5 fee, either, under a forest protection code proposed by state officials. It was written by state forester Bill Duemling and the New Mexico Forestry & Resource Conservation Division.

The proposal aims to reduce the danger of a catastrophic fire in Ruidoso and increase forest health.

Some form of forest protection code may be adopted by Ruidoso early next year, Village Manager Gary Jackson said Saturday at a day-long seminar held in Ruidoso to increase public awareness of Lin-

coln County's forest health conditions and wildlife hazards.

The present code, adopted in the 1980s, focuses on preserving the natural environment of Ruidoso because the village's economic viability depends upon it.

The proposed new ordinance takes note of Ruidoso's forest preservation concerns, but stresses sound forest management as the key to economic viability, officials said.

Rather than let everything grow in a wild state to keep the area's character, the code proposes to thin out diseased and hazardous trees on overcrowded lots, Duemling said.

Currently, cutting a tree with a diameter of at least 19.1 inches is considered "development." Along with a permit a site development plan is required by the village.

In the state proposal, site development plans would require the submission of topographical maps, but trees would be marked with a flag or paint for village inspection. A short description of the condition of the trees on a lot would be required.

In the existing code, replacement of trees is required if more than 20% on a lot will be cut.

In the state proposal, tree replacements wouldn't be determined on the number of trees cut, but on the stocking conditions and health of trees on a lot, the foresters propose.

Other code items considered for significant change address Ruidoso's need for fire hazard reduction and hazardous tree removal, and the area's proper description as a wildland/urban interface area, not a wilderness area.

"We strongly recommend everyone get a copy of the proposal, read the revised ordinance and let us (at village hall) know your thoughts about it," Jackson told the crowd.

Comments on the proposed ordinance, which can be found at village hall, will be accepted until Dec. 31. Thereafter, the code amendments will be sent to the Planning and Zoning Commission for review and then forwarded to the village council for adoption.

With this schedule, a workable code could be in place by the next fire season, Jackson said.

# Controlled burns necessary these days, forester explains

The Village of Ruidoso is built right into an overcrowded, aging forest, making it a prime staging ground for a catastrophic fire unless some management practices are changed, foresters said Saturday.

"Some call it a 'wildland/urban interface,'" said state forester Bill Duemling during a forest health and fire hazard seminar at the Ruidoso Civic Event Center. "I like to call it 'wildland/urban in-your-face,' because that's what it is," he said.

Homes are built into the forest stands as if they were part of the forest. But they really have become a part of the fuel, because there's no clearly defined boundary between the woods and the wooden houses, Duemling said.

Few homes have defensible space if a fire were to rage, and many are overshadowed with huge canopies of trees.

"The people have built right into the fuels," he said. "The question now is not 'will it burn,' but 'when.'"

When the house doesn't have at least a 30-foot clearance away from the

forest, many fire departments will not consider saving it during a fire, Duemling said.

"No house is worth a life," he said.

Homeowners must clear away ground brush, prune tree undergrowth, and thin out crowded, unhealthy trees to better protect themselves from a devastating fire, he said.

Duemling also said residents should:

- build homes with metal or clay roofs;
- spray trees with a super phosphate fertilizer which is fire retarding;
- stain or treat the wood on decks or porches;
- clear dead pine needles off the ground and the house's rooftop;
- stack fireproof wood away from the house;
- keep a hose or some other water source hooked up to the outside of the house;
- and keep brush cleared away from propane tanks

### Fire management

Ron Moody of the U.S. Forest

Service told the small crowd about the benefits of controlled burns, forest thinning and the need for fire management.

"Earth has always been a fire planet," said Moody. "But since the 1900s (in the U.S.), the fires were stopped."

Suppression became the practice as a lot of settlers moved further out west into wildland settings and visualized fire as a bad thing.

Previously, Native Americans practiced seasonal land clearing with fire. This would regenerate ground nutrients while only scarring the base of adaptable mature trees, and would leave the forest with meadows to attract game animals.

Without the fires to "sweep the carpet," new tree saplings take root with ease. Their growth creates a tangled ground cover that is more like a stepladder for fires, allowing flames to jump into the crowns of larger trees for vast destruction, Moody said.

The overcrowded, stressed conditions of trees in this area's forest has made it more vulnerable to bark beetle dwarf mistletoe infestation, and severe firestorms, he said.

Unthinned scrub brush also causes problems because it helps fire spread faster and consumes groundwater, he said.

"Clear some of those trees and the brush out," Thorne said. "You don't need oakbrush coming all the way up to your house."

Stacking firewood next to a house is dangerous because if there

ever is a fire, it will only make matters worse, Thorne said.

"Stack your wood and construction materials away from the house and never store them under a deck," he advised. "Because otherwise, it is a fire danger."

Trimming overhanging branches and cleaning chimneys and rain gutters are other ways to help lessen a fire danger, he said.

Thorne also suggested that homeowners know where the nearest fire hydrant is located, make sure their property is accessible to fire trucks and know how to give directions to their homes by using landmarks.

# Homeowners offered advice on protecting houses from wildfire

Wildfires have raged through rangelands and forests since the beginning of time.

But new growth then rises through the ashes. Today, controlled fires are a critical part of helping the ecosystem, said Dave Koch. He works for the Bureau of Indian Affairs Branch of Forestry on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

Koch spoke Saturday afternoon at Public Awareness Day: Forest Health Conditions and Wildfire Hazard in Lincoln County.

Public turnout was sparse for the event at the Ruidoso Civic and Convention Center. It featured speakers, demonstrations, and information about wildfires, forest pests, fire hazards, forest management, fire insurance industry perspectives, firefighting tactics and other forest and fire topics.

Fireproofing a community

should be a joint responsibility, including cooperation from federal, state, city agencies and homeowners, Koch said.

"It's not just a matter of getting your own backyard in shape," he said. "It's a matter of getting the entire Sacramento Mountains back to a healthy forest condition."

Achieving that goal meets with resistance from a small vocal minority, Koch said.

"Even though 95% of the population may agree that some form of management is necessary, environmental radicals are advocating that we don't cut anything," he said. "But we can't let these radicals dictate policy."

Accusing the media of brainwashing the public and increasing resistance to forest management, Koch said that public education is needed to combat misinformation.

"Starting in the '80s, the media forced a lot of hogwash down the public's throats regarding the evils of forest management," he said. "All of it is untrue and unfounded scientifically but nonetheless, we have these powers at work to undermine sound forest management."

Koch urged people to write government leaders and let them know that they support prudent forest management, including controlled burns and thinning.

# Making friends with winter

For most healthy people, winter is no excuse to get cold feet about outdoor exercise. Staying indoors, and not getting enough fresh air, exercise and exposure to natural light, can lead to seasonal depression, as well as general grumpiness. Our animal instincts say "hibernate." We tend to eat more and gain a few pounds. Regular exercise can help hoist us out of the winter blues, and make friends with winter.

**Embrace the change**  
Instead of regarding winter as an unfortunate barrier, find something about it to like. If we regard winter weather as a curse to be endured, we make ourselves winter's hostage, resentful of its icy grasp. A positive attitude helps us cope with the challenges of winter conditions.

Need motivation? Consider the results of one study that compared exercise energy expenditures for room temperature and cold environments. A given amount of exercise in the cold burned about 13 percent more calories, and fat utilization was 35 percent greater in the cold.

**Exercise caution**  
Some health conditions are not compatible with cold, dry air. People with asthma may be better off enjoying winter through the windows as they swim indoors, or work out on indoor exercise equipment. People with high blood pressure and heart disease should check with their doctors about exercising in the cold. While exercise may provide a healthy stress, the additional stress of a cold environment may produce system overload.

Early darkness and dangerous surfaces make some activities not worth the risk. Cycling after dark is 15 to 20 times more dangerous than daylight riding. Pedestrian injuries are also much more common at night. The best winter exercise is performed during daylight hours and away from traffic.

**Dress for success**  
Appropriate attire can help you exercise comfortably and safely. When dressing to go outdoors, consider the intensity of the upcoming activity. People new to cold weather exercise often overdress, get hot and sweaty, remove layers too late, and then get chilled. When you first go outside to exercise, you should feel slightly cool. You'll warm up after a few minutes. Open a zipper or take off a layer the minute you start to sweat.

Layers help you adapt your clothing to your needs. If

you have one heavy coat over a T-shirt, modifications are limited. If, instead, you have turtleneck, light sweat-shirt, vest, or jacket and a windbreaker, you can fine-tune your attire for comfort.

If you are in the market for some new exercise clothes, consider thermal underwear made of polyester fabrics that wick away perspiration from the skin. Perspiration is designed to cool you; wet clothes transfer heat from your body to the air. Your winter dressing goal is to stay dry and warm, but not hot. Another handy wardrobe addition is a jacket made of breathable material, such as Gore-Tex, that keeps the wind and rain out, but allows perspiration to evaporate. Don't let a lack of high-tech clothing keep you indoors, however. People have been enjoying winter sports for years, long before these fabrics came along. Use whatever you have and over time you can gradually modify your exercise wardrobe so that it works for you.

**Prevent cold injury**  
Hands, toes, ears and nose are most vulnerable to frostbite. In the cold, your body shuts down blood flow to the skin, where valuable heat is lost. Even though most of you feels warm, extremities can still suffer frostbite. Warning signs are numbness and a white appearance. Wear gloves or mittens, warm shoes and socks, and something over your ears to prevent frostbite in these areas. Your nose may need covering, as well, on very cold or windy days. Circulation to the head does not slow down in the cold; your brain must continue to function. Wear a hat to prevent heat loss from the head.

**Warm up for the cold**  
Warm up indoors by jogging in place, then do some stretching. Now you're ready to cool moving once you're outdoors. After your workout, cool down as you near the indoors and stretch inside. Beware of sun damage, especially if it is snowy, and still need sunglasses and sunscreen. And don't forget that you will need extra fluids in the cold. Water is lost through perspiration and respiration as your lungs humidify the cold, dry air.

# Health department starts survey of gambling effects

The New Mexico Health Department is conducting a statewide scientific survey on the health effects of gambling.

Secretary of Health Alex Valdez told the Legislature's Indian Affairs Committee about the survey while it was meeting last week at the Inn of the Mountain Gods on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

The random phone survey started last week. It will give the health department baseline data which it will compare to future health effects in a later survey, Valdez said.

Residents will be asked about their gambling behavior, said Lynn Brady, division director for substance abuse in the health department.

Survey callers will ask how often respondents have gambled in the past few years, Brady said. With a representative sample of each county, the survey will help the state learn where stronger pockets of gambling problems exist, she said.

Gambling is a personal choice and the health department is staying away from the morality debate, Valdez said.

A compulsive gambler is a chronic gambler who has a progressively larger failure to resist. The problem ends up damaging the gambler's family and job life, Valdez said.

High risk gamblers are preoccupied with gambling and continue to gamble after big losses, Valdez said.

The department will also train staff to help people with gambling problems, Valdez said, and contact various Indian tribes, pueblos and racetrack owners.

Hopefully, this state will avoid the need for an in-patient treatment facility for compulsive gamblers, like the one found in Minnesota, Valdez said.

He opened his talk with a humorous story about going to the first Gambler's Anonymous meeting at a church in his hometown of Espanola. He was

surprised to find the church packed when he arrived, but walked in to find most of the people were there to play bingo.

Rep. Shirley Baca (D-Las Cruces), who is running for U.S. representative in this district, said she recalls how her grandmother and friends set aside a specific amount of money each week for bingo. Growing up in Las Cruces, she also remembers hearing about compulsive gamblers who got into trouble at nearby Sunland Park.

Despite this state's long history of gambling, "Once Native Americans started making money, the whole issue seemed to have surfaced," about problem gamblers, Baca observed.

"I share your same view of what has happened," Valdez said.

But Valdez himself was accused of bias by Sen. Leonard Teosie (D-Crownpoint). Teosie said Valdez's choice of timing for this survey indicates a bias against Indians.

Valdez strongly objected to Teosie's opinion.

"This is an issue which is ripe today for discussion," Valdez said, and he believes it's his responsibility to talk about it.

State University, graduating with a degree in history and pre-law. He also attended the University of Puget Sound in Tacoma, Wash.

He is the father of two children, who attend school in Tularosa.

A longtime political opponent of Chino and an activist against the proposal to store radioactive nuclear waste on the reservation, Geronimo said he decided to run for vice president because it's a position where he can devote time to goals he wants to pursue.

He previously ran unsuccessfully for the presidency.

Geronimo is employed as the only adolescent services counselor for juveniles under the tribe's Human Services Department.

"I work drug and alcohol cases and do the follow up," he said during an interview a few weeks before the election. "I help students go after advance education whether it's college, vocational training or the job corps. I stay in touch with them until they're in their 20s."

"My biggest dream is to set up a first class library for the community. I want a complete set of law books, computers, the whole works."

If elected, another of his efforts will be to find out the financial holdings of the tribe and share that information with other tribal members, he said.

He also would direct his time toward activities that could cut down the high crime rate on the reservation, Geronimo said.

"There's heavy drug and alcohol abuse," he said, adding that he sees the destructive influences in his job working with juveniles.

Other goals Geronimo would like to pursue include:

— establishing a boys and girls ranch on the reservation to handle rehabilitation and treatment of troubled children, instead of sending them off the reservation to other facilities.

— using an aging post office on U.S. 70 as an art gallery, performing arts center and display area for Mescalero artists and artisans.

"It would allow the public to share the Mescalero cultural experience and to develop a better understanding," Geronimo said. "It also would give our artists a better return on their creative work."

— opening a country store in the Upper Canyon area of Ruidoso near the Mescalero Apache Reservation entrance.

Goods for fishermen and

campers would be sold. Mescalero arts and crafts would also be sold. The store would stay open through hunting season.

— establishing a factory to build furniture with lumber from the reservation sawmill.

"We have kids with enough talent and training," Geronimo said. "And this is a resource we already have, not just something we're wishing for."

Geronimo has been an outspoken opponent of the tribal council's plan to store radioactive nuclear waste on the reservation. If the plan goes through, the 40-year site would be the largest commercial waste site in the nation.

A disturbing the peace charge was dismissed Oct. 27 against Geronimo. He was accused of disrupting a tribal council meeting when he objected to the council asking a reporter from The Ruidoso News to leave a session last June.

His trial was postponed three times before it was dismissed. The judge's decision did not say why the case was dismissed, but the decision came after Geronimo filed a motion for dismissal.

The motion stated his right to a speedy trial was not met, and freedom of speech and the press are protected under the Indian Civil Rights Act of 1968.

An Alamogordo reporter who tried to get into the court hearing was not allowed to enter.

had the authority to do the same.

While the Indians believe the compacts are valid with only the governor's signature, they are asking the Legislature to ratify the compacts to quiet the complaints of anti-gambling crusaders, James said.

The committee passed a motion to ask the Legislature to ratify the compacts, and also asked the governor to sign compacts with the pueblos of Laguna and Santo Domingo in the future. The committee is made up of Democratic senators and representatives, some of whom are Indians.

Other Indian representatives said rumors about the lack of regulations with Indian gambling are unfair.

Ray Gallegos, who sells machines to the local Mescalero Apache Tribe for the Inn of the Mountain Gods, said the Mescalero and San Juan Pueblo have high-tech accounting systems that cost up to \$1 million. They can produce print-outs showing every payout from the machines, he noted.

The law allows Indian gam-

bling revenues to go to specific uses, said Bruce Sanchez of the Pueblo of Santa Ana Gaming Commission. Those uses include donations, local government operations, economic development, and for the welfare of the tribe.

The Santa Ana Gaming Commission has several police powers, such as the ability to conduct audits and issue subpoenas for investigations. The commission does licensing and background checks on every casino employee and vendor, more than is required by the U.S. Indian Gaming Regulation Act. Employees cannot get into machines without the commission's approval, Sanchez said.

Other governments help Santa Ana meet other regulations, such as food inspections (the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs) and fire codes (Sandoval County), said Walter Cristobal, who is also on the Santa Ana Gaming Commission.

The pueblo meets all state and federal standards, and sometimes exceeds them, Cristobal said.

A gambling machine's E-prompt must be removed in order to change the percentage of wins on a board, Sanchez added.

One machine needs a minimum of 37,000 revolutions before a hit, he said.

Sanchez noted he can't even play at the Santa Ana casino because he's on the gaming commission, so he stopped by Casino Apache while he was here.

Someone beat him by a half-step to one machine, then proceeded to win about \$1,200.

"I'm pretty assured and comforted there are regulations," said Rep. James Roger Madalena (D-Jemez Pueblo) after hearing the Santa Ana comments.

In urging the legislative committee to support the compacts, Sanchez said, "We all live in this state. Let's get along...I think we haven't done that for a long time."

Rep. Teosie noted how well Indians in Minnesota get along with Duluth residents, where they operate a casino.

"Are we truly a Native American state?" Teosie asked of New Mexico. He noted that he was late getting to Tuesday's meeting because he didn't see any state highway signs directing him to the Mescalero Reservation.

to lead our people...not control them." Tribal members said Chino's poster reads, "vote for someone you can trust," and includes the names of other candidates he supports, including Keith Miller for vice president.

The top two votegetters for president in the Oct. 3 primary are facing off Tuesday. Chino handily beat Peso in the primary numbers, with 472 votes to Peso's 178.

Keith Miller also received overwhelming favor for vice president in the primary, with 471 votes versus Joseph Geronimo's 142 (please see related story on Geronimo and his letter to the editor).

The top eight council candidates are vying for four seats tomorrow. Chino, Kirgan, Berje Kanesh and Raphael Mendez were top primary votegetters.

Peso asked several strong questions in the information he sent to tribal members, prefacing the questions with, "Before you vote, you need some answers."

The questions asked "Is it true" that:

— the president in a general

meeting in 1994 promised he would not run for office again?

— the president has for many years, lost interest and has ignored the real problems of the tribe? Could it be that he may be too busy with other interests?

— that the president will not disclose the income of the Inn (of the Mountain Gods) and especially Casino Apache to the tribal council much less the tribal members?

— that the tribal employees fear for their jobs if they oppose the president?

— if tribal members disagree with the president he/she is considered an enemy of the administration?

— that a tribal member was removed as BIA superintendent by the tribal council acting under duress by threats of resignation and intimidation, and to date has not been replaced?

— the inn was sued because of the misconduct of the president's wife?

— the president is promising a dividend payment for votes, and in actuality only the tribal council can approve dividend payments?

— that the president's wife is in-

involved in the private corporation that leases and sells gambling products to Casino Apache?

— that the president's wife controls the inn, instead of the board of directors appointed by the tribal council?

— that the president and his wife use the tribal plane (Lear jet) like it is their private airplane?

Chino did not return phone calls to ask for responses to these allegations.

# Forest experts seek more tree cutting in Ruidoso area

Proposed changes in Ruidoso's development controls would loosen the reins on tree cutting restrictions.

The current planning code considers trees to be mature when as small as five inches in diameter or when five feet high, and cutting them requires a permit.

State forest experts say a permit shouldn't be required unless a tree has at least a 19.1-inch diameter where it is 4.5 feet off the ground.

Cutting trees this size or larger wouldn't require a \$5 fee, either, under a forest protection code proposed by state officials. It was written by state forester Bill Duemling and the New Mexico Forestry & Resource Conservation Division.

The proposal aims to reduce the danger of a catastrophic fire in Ruidoso and increase forest health.

Some form of forest protection code may be adopted by Ruidoso early next year, Village Manager Gary Jackson said Saturday at a day-long seminar held in Ruidoso to increase public awareness of Lin-

coln County's forest health conditions and wildlife hazards.

The present code, adopted in the 1980s, focuses on preserving the natural environment of Ruidoso because the village's economic viability depends upon it.

The proposed new ordinance takes note of Ruidoso's forest preservation concerns, but stresses sound forest management as the key to economic viability, officials said.

Rather than let everything grow in a wild state to keep the area's woody character, the code proposes to thin out diseased and hazardous trees on overcrowded lots, Duemling said.

Currently, cutting a tree with a diameter of at least 19.1 inches is considered 'development.' Along with a permit a site development plan is required by the village.

In the state proposal, site development plans wouldn't require the submission of topographical maps, but trees would be marked with a flag or paint for village inspection. A short description of the condition of the trees on a lot would be required.

In the existing code, replacement of trees is required if more than 20% on a lot will be cut.

In the state proposal, tree replacements wouldn't be determined on the number of trees cut, but on the stocking conditions and health of trees on a lot, the foresters propose.

Other code items considered for significant change address Ruidoso's need for fire hazard reduction and hazardous tree removal, and the area's proper description as a wildland/urban interface area, not a wilderness area.

"We strongly recommend everyone get a copy of the proposal, read the revised ordinance and let us (at village hall) know your thoughts about it," Jackson told the crowd.

Comments on the proposed ordinance, which can be found at village hall, will be accepted until Dec. 31. Thereafter, the code amendments will be sent to the Planning and Zoning Commission for review and then forwarded to the village council for adoption.

With this schedule, a workable code could be in place by the next fire season, Jackson said.

# Controlled burns necessary these days, forester explains

The Village of Ruidoso is built right into an overcrowded, ailing forest, making it a prime staging ground for a catastrophic fire unless some management practices are changed, foresters said Saturday.

"Some call it a 'wildland/urban interface,'" said state forester Bill Duemling during a forest health and fire hazard seminar at the Ruidoso Civic Event Center. "I like to call it 'wildland/urban in-your-face,' because that's what it is," he said.

Homes are built into the forest stands as if they were part of the forest. But they really have become a part of the fuel, because there's no clearly defined boundary between the woods and the wooden houses, Duemling said.

Few homes have defensible space if a fire were to rage, and many are overshadowed with huge canopies of trees.

"The people have built right into the fuels," he said. "The question now is not 'will it burn,' but 'when.'"

When a house doesn't have at least a 30-foot clearance away from the

forest, many fire departments will not consider saving it during a fire, Duemling said.

"No house is worth a life," he said.

Homeowners must clear away ground brush, prune tree undergrowth, and thin out crowded, unhealthy tree lots to better protect themselves from a devastating fire, he said.

Duemling also said residents should:

- build homes with metal or clay roofs;
- spray trees with a super phosphate fertilizer which is fire retarding;
- stain or treat the wood on decks or porches;
- clear dead pine needles off the ground and the house's rooftop;
- stack fireplace wood away from the house;
- keep a hose or some other water source hooked up to the outside of the house;
- and keep brush cleared away from propane tanks

**Fire management**  
Ron Moody of the U.S. Forest

Service told the small crowd about the benefit of controlled burns, forest thinning and the need for fire management.

"Earth has always been a fire planet," said Moody. "But since the 1900s (in the U.S.), the fires were stopped."

Suppression became the practice as a lot of settlers moved further out west into wildland settings and visualized fire as a bad thing.

Previously, Native Americans practiced seasonal land clearing with fire. This would regenerate ground nutrients while only scarring the base of adaptable mature trees, and would leave the forest with meadowlands to attract game animals.

Without the fires to "sweep the carpet," new tree saplings take root with ease. Their growth creates a tangled ground cover that is more like a stepladder for fires, allowing flames to jump into the crowns of larger trees for vast destruction, Moody said.

The overcrowded, stressed conditions of trees in this area's forest has made it more vulnerable to bark beetle dwarf mistletoe infestation, and severe firestorms, he said.

# Homeowners offered advice on protecting houses from wildfire

Wildfires have raged through rangelands and forests since the beginning of time.

But new growth then rises through the ashes. Today, controlled fires are a critical part of helping the ecosystem, said Dave Koch. He works for the Bureau of Indian Affairs Branch of Forestry on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

Koch spoke Saturday afternoon at Public Awareness Day: Forest Health Conditions and Wildfire Hazard in Lincoln County.

Public turnout was sparse for the event at the Ruidoso Civic and Convention Center. It featured speakers, demonstrations, and information about wildfires, forest pests, fire hazards, forest management, insurance industry perspectives, firefighting tactics and other forest and fire topics.

Fireproofing a community

should be a joint responsibility, including cooperation from federal, state, city agencies and homeowners, Koch said.

"It's not just a matter of getting your own backyard in shape," he said. "It's a matter of getting the entire Sacramento Mountains back to a healthy forest condition."

Achieving that goal meets with resistance from a small vocal minority, Koch said.

"Even though 95% of the population may agree that some form of management is necessary, environmental radicals are advocating that we don't cut anything," he said. "But we can't let these radicals dictate policy."

Accusing the media of brainwashing the public and increasing resistance to forest management, Koch said that public education is needed to combat misinformation.

"Starting in the '60s, the media forced a lot of hogwash down the public's throats regarding the evils of forest management," he said. "All of it is untrue and unfounded scientifically but nonetheless, we have these powers at work to undermine sound forest management."

Koch urged people to write government leaders and let them know that they support prudent forest management, including controlled burns and cutting.

Unthinned scrub brush also causes problems because it helps fire spread faster and consumes groundwater, he said.

"Clear some of those trees and the brush out," Thorne said. "You don't need oakbrush coming all the way up to your house."

Stacking firewood next to a house is dangerous because if there

ever is a fire, it will only make matters worse, Thorne said.

"Stack your wood and construction materials away from the house and never store them under a deck," he advised. "Because otherwise, it is a fire danger."

Trimming overhanging branches and cleaning chimneys and rain gutters are other ways to help lessen fire danger, he said.

Thorne also suggested that homeowners know where the nearest fire hydrant is located, make sure their property is accessible to fire trucks and know how to give directions to their homes by using landmarks.

## Making friends with winter

For most healthy people, winter is no excuse to get cold feet about outdoor exercise. Staying indoors, and not getting enough fresh air, exercise and exposure to natural light, can lead to seasonal depression, as well as general grumpiness. Our animal instincts say "hibernate." We tend to eat more and gain a few pounds. Regular exercise can help hoist us out of the winter blues, and make friends with winter.

**Embrace the change**

Instead of regarding winter as an unfortunate barrier, find something about it to like. If we regard winter weather as a curse to be endured, we make ourselves winter's hostage, resentful of its icy grasp. A positive attitude helps us cope with the challenges of winter conditions.

**Need motivation? Consider the results of one study** that compared exercise energy expenditure for room temperature and cold environments. A given amount of exercise in the cold burned about 13 percent more calories, and fat utilization was 35 percent greater in the cold.

**Exercise caution**

Some health conditions are not compatible with cold, dry air. People with asthma may be better off enjoying winter through the windows as they swim indoors, or work out on indoor exercise equipment. People with high blood pressure and heart disease should check with their doctors about exercising in the cold. While exercise may provide a healthy stress, the additional stress of a cold environment may produce system overload.

**Early darkness and dangerous surfaces make some activities not worth the risk.** Cycling after dark is 15 to 20 times more dangerous than daylight riding. Pedestrian injuries are also much more common at night. The best winter exercise is performed during daylight hours and away from traffic.

**Dress for success**

Appropriate attire can help you exercise comfortably and safely. When dressing to go outdoors, consider the intensity of the upcoming activity. People new to cold weather exercise often overdress, get hot and sweaty, remove layers too late, and then get chilled. When you first go outside to exercise, you should feel slightly cool. You'll warm up after a few minutes. Open a zipper or take off a layer the minute you start to sweat.

Layers help you adapt your clothing to your needs. If you have one heavy coat over a T-shirt, modifications are limited. If, instead, you have turtleneck, light sweatshirt, vest, or jacket and a windbreaker, you can fine-tune your attire for comfort.

If you are in the market for some new exercise clothes, consider thermal underwear made of polyester fabrics that wick away perspiration from the skin. Perspiration is designed to cool you; wet clothes transfer heat from your body to the air. You winter dressing goal is to stay dry and warm, but not hot. Another handy wardrobe addition is a jacket made of breathable material, such as Gore-Tex, that keeps the wind and rain out, but allows perspiration to evaporate. Don't let a lack of high-tech clothing keep you indoors, however. People have been enjoying winter sports for years, long before these fabrics came along. Use whatever you have and over time you can gradually modify your exercise wardrobe so that it works for you.

**Prevent cold injury**

Hands, toes, ears and nose are most vulnerable to frostbite. In the cold, your body shuts down blood flow to the skin, where valuable heat is lost. Even though most of you feels warm, extremities can still suffer frostbite. Warning signs are numbness and a white appearance. Wear gloves or mittens, warm shoes and socks, and something over your ears to prevent frostbite in these areas. Your nose may need covering, as well, on very cold or windy days. Circulation to the head does not slow down in the cold; your brain must continue to function. Wear a hat to prevent heat loss from the head.

**Warm up for the cold**

Warm up indoors by jogging in place, then do some stretching. Now you're ready to keep moving once you're outdoors. After your workout, cool down as you near the indoors and stretch inside. Beware of sun damage, especially if it is snowy, and wear sunglasses and sunscreen. And don't forget that you still need extra fluids in the cold. Wear is lost through perspiration and respiration as your lungs humidify the cold, dry air.

## District 3AAA title belongs to RHS boys

The Ruidoso boys cross country team learned a painful lesson at the 1994 District 3-AAA meet. The Warriors lost the district title by one point to Cobre.

It was a lesson they vowed not to repeat this year. Lo and behold, they didn't make the same mistake, and the result is something they'll treasure for a long time.

"They realized what they had to do and they let the other guys know it," Maskew said.

The Warriors saved some of their best running for the district meet. Almost everyone had their best times on the difficult, rocky Fort Bayard course.

### Romero top girl

Freshman Erica Romero captured the individual girls title with a 20:30 time. She led the Ruidoso girls team. The Warrior girls also posted solid times, but ran third as a team.

"They had their best times by far, but we just ran into a bit more competition than we thought," Maskew said. "All the girls improved their times."

Freshman Erica Oxford shaved four minutes off her previous best for the three miles, and sophomore Christy Smith ran a 22:50 after posting times in the 24-minute range earlier in the season.

### Off to state

Both the boys and girls teams advance to the Class AAA state meet in Gallup Saturday.

The Warriors will practice hard Monday and Tuesday before tapering down their workouts by Wednesday and Friday.

"At this time of the year being rested (with lighter workouts) may be more beneficial," Maskew said.

### Tax revenues up for year

Gross receipts tax revenues for Ruidoso rose 5% for the first eight months of 1995 compared with the same time period last year.

The latest village gross receipts report also shows the village gross receipts tax revenues were 9% higher in August compared with the same month last year.

Finding affordable business health insurance may become easier because of a decision by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

The chamber board of directors, in a unanimous decision, decided last week to approve a proposal by Presbyterian Health Plan which will make a health management organization (HMO) plan available to chamber members.

The chamber's decision was made after hearing a presentation from Presbyterian Health Plan marketing representative Bob Sterchi.

The plan offers affordable health care insurance for small employers and allows the chamber to group together larger numbers of people, generally at a lower cost than what they would normally be paying, Sterchi said.

"We feel that this would give small businesses, even mom and pop operations and those with few employees, an affordable option," chamber president Danny Sisson said. "It allows chamber members to act as a large group, making health care more available."

The parent company of the

health plan is Presbyterian Healthcare Services (PHS), which also holds the county contract to manage Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) and Carisozo Health Center.

Presbyterian Health Plan, formerly Health Plus, was contracted by the new Lincoln County Medical Alliance (The Alliance) to offer local businesses the HMO plan. The Alliance was formed after LCMC officials began to realize the need to reduce insurance costs and provide a managed care plan to employers in Lincoln County, hospital administrator Valerie Miller said.

"We are attempting to bring companies a competitive rate when compared with managed care in larger communities," she said. "Many businesses have been experiencing up to a 20% premium increase per year and they can't afford that."

Health care service providers like physicians, pharmacies and other suppliers who join The Alliance, agree to accept certain discounts in return for a larger amount of people. They are not limited to providing exclusive services through the Presbyterian Health Plan, Miller said.

"Should a health insurance company such as Blue Cross or Prudential wish to access Alliance resources, they will find the system already in place," she said.

Plan members pay a co-pay fee for visits to Alliance physicians and other providers. The fee varies depending which plan a member chooses, but the average cost for a doctor's visit is \$10 to \$15 with prescription drugs costing from \$5 to \$17.

"The beauty of the system is that you don't have deductibles or claim forms," Sterchi said. "You just show your card, pay your co-pay and you're through."

Plan members will also have access to non-local physicians and service providers who are affiliated with the HMO, Sterchi said.

Premiums for the chamber's Presbyterian Health Plan will depend on how many people sign up, but any business, even if it only has one employee, is eligible to apply, he said.

Currently, the health plan does not offer dental and eye services, but that could change in the future, he said.

The health care program for chamber members will become effective on Feb. 1, 1996.

## State business organization wants level playing field

The New Mexico Association of Commerce & Industry's board of directors has adopted a position of "leveling the playing field" regarding gaming in New Mexico.

"The Association of Commerce & Industry supports legislation which will allow any off-reservation, licensed gaming operation in New Mexico to have the same forms of gambling allowed under compacts that are entered with Indian Tribes and Pueblos," the ACI position

states.

"Dealing with such a complex issue as gaming has not been an easy task," said Jerry C. Walker, ACI president. "After lengthy discussion, the directors felt that as a statewide business organization, it was impossible for us to adopt any position that did not support a legitimate, free enterprise industry whose very existence is threatened."

"While some people view gaming as a social issue, and others as a

moral issue, it is also a serious business issue.

"Regardless of one's personal views, any action that could conceivably lead to the downfall of an industry that employs several thousand New Mexicans and pays a significant sum in local and state taxes would be against the mission statement of ACI."

"Recognizing the economic threat faced by the horsing racing in-

dustry and by fraternal and non-profit organizations, support of legislation that would provide for a 'level playing field' was the right position to adopt."

The Association of Commerce & Industry is a statewide business advocacy organization founded in 1959. ACI serves as the state chamber and the state manufacturers association and has members in most New Mexico cities.





Since 1876, Indian Agent Frederick Godfrey and his wife had been living at the Blazer residence in what is now Mescalero. This was accomplished through the courtesy of a rental agreement between the U.S. government and the Blazars.

The Godfreys had been renting rooms and serving meals to travelers in order to supplement their income. Consequently, when the Regulators arrived about noon on April 5, 1876, they were looking for a hot meal, not a gunfight. They got both.

After the assassination of Sheriff Brady on April 1, the "hothead element" of the Regulators, joined by some cooler heads (most notably Dick Brewer, who was also the acknowledged leader or "captain"), rode up the Ruidoso in the direction of the Indian Agency in Mescalero — Blazer's Mill.

It is surprising that Brewer accepted the position of captain — he had quit to do some long-neglected work on his farm — because by taking the position, he was giving at least his tacit approval to the murder of Brady several days before.

Also, it has never been clear exactly why the Regulators went to Blazer's Mill. Several reasons have been advanced to account for the Regulators' ride to the Agency. The most believable seems to be that they heard some of the late John Tunstall's cattle had been driven off in the direction of that notorious clearinghouse for stolen livestock, Shedd's ranch near the San Agustin Pass. This would have made the Indian Agency a logical place to stop and eat on the way.

At any rate, when they approached the Blazer residence, their number included Brewer, Frank MacNab, Charlie Bowdre,

John Middleton, Harry Brown, Fred Waite, Doc Scarlock, Jim French, George and Frank Coe, "Dirty Steve" Stephens, John Scroggins, Ignacio Gonzalez, and last but certainly not least, Billy Bonney, aka The Kid.

Meanwhile, seeing the county was hopelessly immersed in the war, Andrew L. "Buckshot" Roberts had sold his place on the Ruidoso, and he was waiting for a check to be delivered to him at Blazer's Mill, which also served as a post office.

Roberts had good reason to want to quit the county: he had been a member of the posse that killed John Tunstall in February, and he was acutely aware his name was included on the "dead list" the Regulators called "warrants."

On this particular day, it would have been better all around if Roberts had not bothered to check his mail.

When he arrived, he was unaware of the presence of the Regulators. Their horses were corralled out of his sight, and the 14 gunmen — still seeking vengeance for the death of John Tunstall — were inside eating.

There are few surviving accounts of exactly what happened at Blazer's Mill that day. One of them was Frank Coe's, which seems to be the fullest.

According to Coe, Roberts dismounted, still unaware of the Regulators' presence inside. Leaving his gumbel slung over the saddle of his mule, he began walking toward the house, carrying his Winchester. It was at this juncture that Frank Coe, the first to finish his meal, stepped outside and saw Roberts approaching.

Roberts and Coe had been friendly in the past, and despite the fact that Roberts

had been in the posse that killed Tunstall, they had apparently remained so.

Hailing Roberts from the porch, Coe took his arm and led the diminutive "Buckshot" around the side of one of the buildings to inform him the Regulators held a warrant for his arrest.

"The hell you have," Roberts replied. Coe re-asserted this fact repeatedly, but Roberts would have none of it. When Coe told him "You surrender and nobody will hurt you," Roberts replied sardonically, "Yes, that's what they told Marton and Baker."

Morton and Baker had surrendered to the Regulators the previous month and had been left riddled and dead near what is now Arabella.

For nearly half an hour, Frank Coe tried to induce Roberts to surrender, but Roberts was convinced his life would be rendered worthless the second he did so. He was probably correct.

Suddenly, George Coe, Charlie Bowdre and Billy the Kid rounded the corner, weapons at the ready. Frank Coe, seeing the time for reasonable discussion was about to end dramatically, beat a hasty retreat.

Bowdre commanded Roberts to throw up his hands, to which the plucky Roberts replied, "Not much, Maryann." With that, both Bowdre and Roberts brought up their rifles simultaneously and fired, the two shots being so close together they sounded almost as one.

Roberts' bullet glanced off Bowdre's belt buckle, undoubtedly giving him a whale of a bellyache, and ricocheted into George Coe's hand. It took off George's trigger finger and shattered his hand, which Coe later described as "my usual luck."

Bowdre's bullet passed through Roberts' groin, mortally wounding him. The fight had now become general, with Roberts taking a deadly toll among the Regulators: Bowdre was down with the wind knocked out of him, George Coe had a mangled hand, and John Middleton had taken another of Roberts' bullets in the chest, although not fatally.

Seeking cover, Roberts darted into one of Blazer's outbuildings as the Regulators began to pepper it with bullets.

Inside the building, unbeknownst to the Regulators, a buffalo gun belonging to Dr. Blazer grazed the wall over the door. After piling some mattresses against the door and walls, Roberts pulled the big gun down, and prepared to defend himself.

Peering out one of the windows, he spied a puff of smoke rising lazily from over a woodpile where one of the Regulators had taken cover and fired at him.

Taking careful aim at the spot, Roberts waited for the man to reappear. After a few moments, he saw a man's head clear the top of the woodpile. Roberts squeezed off a

round and the man disappeared from view. It was Dick Brewer, leader of the Regulators, who had taken cover behind the woodpile. Roberts' bullet hit him in the left eye and took off the back of his head.

Seeing their friend and leader stretched out dead in the dirt, the Regulators, completely demoralized, decided to call it a day. Leaving Brewer where he had fallen, they hastily remounted and left the scene.

A short time after this, one of the non-combatants warily approached Roberts, waving a white flag. Roberts allowed him to enter his little impromptu fortress.

It had been an unseasonably hot day in Lincoln County, and while the Blazars tried to make Roberts as comfortable as they could, plans were made to bury Dick Brewer immediately.

Because there was no minister within miles, Dr. Blazer's married daughter, Ellie Hedges, read from the Bible at the hastily-organized service for Brewer.

Roberts, in great pain, remained conscious and coherent for most of the day. During the night, he lapsed into a coma, and he died around noon the following day.

A service identical to the one held for Brewer the day before was conducted, and Roberts was laid to rest near Brewer in the Blazer family cemetery at the top of a hill.

Frederick Nolan, in his masterwork "The Lincoln County War: A Documentary History," points out that "it is one of history's little ironies that no one any longer knows which grave is which."

## Blood drive Thursday at hospital

The Lincoln Medical Center hospital auxiliary will conduct a blood drive in the education annex just west of the hospital from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 9.

There is an urgent need for blood donors, hospital officials said.

Donors should eat a low-fat meal before donating blood. The procedure takes about 30 minutes, while the donors relax in comfortable chairs.

Donating blood is safe, all

materials are sterile, and are used only once and discarded.

Blood donors must weigh at least 110 pounds and be at least 17 years old; permit cards are available to be signed by a parent or guardian of 17-year-olds. Donors 18 and older do not need permits.

Blood is separated to serve patients with varying needs: red blood cells are used by surgery patients; plasma is used for patients suffering from burns and

other traumas; platelets are often needed by patients with leukemia; and anti-hemophilic factor is used to stabilize hemophiliacs.

Medical scientists have not learned to manufacture blood, there is no substitute. The only source is from people.

The hospital auxiliary asks people to give the "Gift of Life" and stop by the annex Thursday to donate.

## Ruidoso councilors table road vacation decision for 2nd time

An appeal of a recommendation to vacate a portion of Slay Road was tabled by village councilors Tuesday.

Councilors said the issue would remain tabled until a court determines that another road — Bloodworth Drive — is a legal village right of way.

P&Z commissioners recommended the vacation to J.F. and Betty Hood in August, although their neighbors, R.F. and Hazel Haynsworth, protested the request.

Hazel Haynsworth argued Bloodworth Drive, which serves her property as well as Slay Road, passes through private land and is not a village right of way.

If Slay Road were vacated, she and her husband would be

left without a legal access to their property, Haynsworth said.

But Bloodworth Drive is a village platted road, said Planning Director Cleatus Richards. It may not be in the exact spot platted on maps, but few roads in the Upper Canyon are, he said.

Tuesday was the second time the prickly issue about vacating Slay Road and the status of Bloodworth Drive came before councilors after the P&Z sent it back to them for action.

Councilors first heard the appeal in September, put a stay on it and sent it back to the P&Z for more legal information about Bloodworth Drive.

At Tuesday's meeting, councilors said it will be up to one of the two contending parties to bring the issue to court for a legal determination.

Village Attorney John Underwood told the councilors until there's legal proof Bloodworth Drive is a public street, the village would be irresponsible to vacate an existing legal access. The easiest way to obtain proof is with a court's declaratory judgment, he said.

The village is required to provide at least one public access to a property, said the village attorney.

Hazel Haynsworth argued Bloodworth Drive is not the platted road P&Z thinks it is, and she only has a verbal approval from the property owners to use it. If the owners were to sell the property, she'd be left without a legal access to her home, she said.

Haynsworth added she prefers to use Slay Road in the winter because Bloodworth Drive is steep and becomes icy.


tion of a deputy chief's review of Region 3.

## Freedom of press, speech are protected, even on tribal lands

Mescalero Tribal Court Judge Harrison Toclanny did the right thing — the only thing possible — by dismissing a disturbing the peace charge against tribal member Joseph Geronimo Oct. 27.

The charge stemmed from Geronimo's loud objection when the tribal council voted to kick a Ruidoso News reporter out of a meeting while others were allowed to remain in the audience.

The judge offered no comment about his reasons for the dismissal. Geronimo had filed a motion for dismissal, saying he was denied his right under Mescalero law for a speedy trial, he was denied the ability to subpoena witnesses as allowed under the Indian Civil Rights Act of 1968, and the same act prohibits any Indian tribe from abridging the freedom of speech or the press. We would have liked the judge to address the components of this motion in writing.

Based on this information, the case should have been thrown out immediately when it was filed July 17.

A sidebar to this issue is the council's decision to throw out our reporter. According to the Indian Civil Rights Act, the press has the same rights on reservation land as on other U.S. soil. An Alamogordo reporter tried to go to the court hearing Oct. 27, and was denied access by the judge. Again, this violates the Indian Civil Rights Act.

The Alamogordo reporter says U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs officers helped enforce the judge's decision to keep her out of the courtroom. We hope the judge, the tribal council, and the tribal and BIA officers follow the Indian Civil Rights Act and avoid these illegalities in the future.

## Mescalero Apache Tribe needs change

(Editor's note: This letter was sent to tribal members.)

It is time I write to explain my reasons and ideas why I am running for president.

I worked very closely for many years with the president as an ally and friend. I was happy and proud to serve with him. I also was very fortunate to serve on the tribal council with several elder councilmen of the 1960s and 1970s. Over the years I have gained valuable knowledge and tremendous experience and insight into tribal matters, other tribal governments, the private sector and businesses, local, state and federal governments.

Many developments, advancements and changes have occurred and must continue. We must keep ourselves up to date with the times for the protection of our resources and the advancement of our people. The tribe's well-being must come first. Despite change, we must maintain and protect our heritage, culture and tribalism.

In order to reach these goals, the tribe must continue to invest in the future of our people, to wisely use our natural and financial resources and to insure that everyone receives equal treatment and their fair share.

How can these goals be accomplished and what are the problems and obstacles that exist today? If we work together, we can correct many problems and make many important improvements. First we must change some of the practices and policies of the present administration. These are some of them:

- Non-disclosure of income made at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, and related enterprises, and the casino.
- No accountability of operations at the Inn.

— No information is given to tribal members on actions taken by the tribal council.

— No tribal members in management or administrative positions in tribal enterprises (Ski Apache - 33 years, the Inn - 22 years, others - 7).

— Lack of fairness in hiring and promotions.

— Fear of open expression of opposing opinions.

— No regular quarterly or annual general meetings.

— No structured formal system in the administration that would allow the tribal operations to function independently without direct, micro-management from the president's office.

Despite the existing problems, many good things have happened. An elementary school was started, which has grown to be more advanced than many other government or state-operated schools. It is second to none. A new junior and high school were started this year, which is quickly advancing into the high-tech systems. Our schools are based on a local educational concept as a working plan with tribal culture a priority. The delinquency rate among our youth has declined because of the development of an extensive recreational program. Also, over the past two years as vice president, I was instrumental in setting up a new fiscal management system of accountability and good management. Because of this, the Tribe experienced a cutback of expenditures of nearly \$800,000 this fiscal year. The tribe's resources should not be wasted.

Although much progress has been made over the years, much more needs to be done. Together, with your help, and responsible, creative, fair and open-minded leadership, these and many more programs in time could

be put in place. Tribal gaming funds, that are available, could be used if necessary to develop programs as other tribes have done.

— A new personnel system responsible for all tribal employment, completely independent and free from any political influence.

— An improved tribal justice system that operates fairly, impartial and independently as intended by the tribal constitution.

— A transportation system that could serve all the communities.

— Businesses that will supply needed services to our communities, such as bank services, laundromats, convenience or satellite stores, etc.

— A more effective long-term treatment center for substance abusers.

— Local nursing home for our elderly that need such a facility, and other home care systems.

— Expand other needed services in the communities, such as fire protection, police services, lighting, etc.

— Improved water systems in the communities.

We must seriously think of the tribe's future and what direction we are going to take.

Change can be frightening, but if we do not take destiny into our own hands, think of the consequences.

No one should be discouraged from voting and letting their voice be heard because of the false belief expressed by some members that the tribal elections are not fair. This is not true. The tribal election committee members are fair, honest and decent. They have always insured fair and honest elections.

Let your vote be counted and your voice be heard to make a better future for ourselves. Vote on November 7, 1995.





With cold weather creeping into town, residents are buying and changing antifreeze in their vehicles to prepare for winter driving.

Antifreeze poses a deadly threat to pets. It's sweet odor and taste lures cats, dogs and wildlife into licking up any puddles of the material. Once in their systems, it forms crystals in their kidneys and bladder, causing a painful death.

"Poorly discarded antifreeze poses a danger to wild and companion animals," said Jim Riggins, director of the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter.

"When considering winterizing your vehicle, be sure the procedure is needed," he said. Antifreeze does not have to be changed every year. Home test kits are available and a local mechanic also can tell you whether a change is necessary.

"Many newer model cars use coolants that are 100% antifreeze and need changing even less frequently," Riggins pointed out.

An environmentally friendly antifreeze called Sierra now is on the market and available at Wal-Mart and Western Auto as well as other places in town. It may cost a bit more than the

least expensive antifreeze, but you don't have to worry about pets or disposal.

However, for those who don't want to change or who already have the poisonous type in their radiators, some cautions should be observed, Riggins said.

"Drain all the old antifreeze into a container that can be tightly sealed," he said. "If flushing is necessary, all run off from the process should also be caught. Dispose of the materials responsibly."

One suggestion is to absorb the antifreeze or runoff with kitty litter, then bag the litter and drop it into a dumpster.

"Irreversible poisoning can occur with as little as one lick of antifreeze," Riggins said. "Wild animals are just as attracted to the taste and are even more susceptible. Antifreeze-soaked soil also is a risk."

Another unique risk in mountainous areas is that seasonal residents use antifreeze in toilet bowls and tanks when they are gone, he said.

"I discourage this practice and advise instead to turn off the water main," Riggins said. "Drain the lines and then flush the toilet, removing any freezing risk."
