Ski Apache delays opening day again

Ski Apache has again delayed its opening, this time until Friday, Dec. 15.

The ski area 15 miles northwest of Ruidoso was originally scheduled to open Thanksgiving Day, but delayed its opening until Dec. 8 because of unseasonably warm temperatures and little snowfall. That weather pattern was the cause again this time.

Ski Apache general manager Roy Parker made the decision this morning after touring the ski area.

This week is traditionally slow for skiers anyway, so officials decided to build up the snow base an extra week.

The ski area has no natural snow. Snowmaking efforts have continued around the clock at the ski area.

"We've been able to make some almost every night. The problem is, if it's not really cold, we can't make as much as we'd like," Parker said. "Of what we're making, we're not losing any."

Mother Nature hasn't cooperated at other New Mexico ski resorts, either. Red River was the only ski area to open Thanksgiving weekend with 30% of its skiable terrain ready. Ski Rio opened a small part of its terrain Nov. 30. Taos is scheduled to open Dec. 14.

Fire department torches house

An abandoned 5th Street house will be torched by the Ruidoso Fire Department Wednesday, Dec. 6.

The controlled burn is planned to start at 8 a.m. It's being sparked to help firefighters practice dousing flames.

Attorney general calls for grand jury to investigate deputy

□ Sheriff not named in letter, but outside investigation continues

A grand jury will be convened Jan. 19 to consider allegations against a Lincoln County sheriff's deputy, at the request of New Mexico Attorney General Tom Udall.

County Attorney Alan Morel and Sheriff James McSwane each received a letter Friday from Udall's office signed by assistant attorney general Richard J. Klein.

The message was short, but to the point.

"It was about two sentences and basically said they were going to convene a grand jury (in Lincoln County District Court) in front of Judge Robert M. Doughty," Morel said. The letter didn't say which deputy is being targeted. Udall's public information officer Kay Roybal said his office cannot comment on the investigation or details surrounding the grand jury.

"We're ready to present what we learned to a grand jury and let it make a decision as to whether a crime has been committed. We're asking them to look at one deputy right now, but the investigation is still active."

The action is the result of a month-long investigation of allegations against McSwane and deputies, after two women said the men tried to coerce them into acting as confidential informants in drug cases, by keeping them in jail after a judge dropped charges against them. They also allege the officers asked them to set up commissioners on drug charges.

In statements given to their at-

torney and sent to the County Commission, the women named deputy Angelo Vega as the person who headed the recruiting effort.

McSwane said he cannot disclose which deputy has been targeted.

"No charges have been filed," he said. "It is an allegation."

The deputy still is on the job.

"I don't believe the officer has committed any illegal acts, but if the grand jury comes back with an indictment, the deputy will be put on administrative leave," McSwane added.

The letter did not refer to any allegations against the sheriff.

"From what I understand, they have looked into (allegations against him)," McSwane said. "I don't know what they found, but I believe if they had found something, they would have included me in the grand jury."

However, Wesley Waller, a New Mexico State Police agent based in Clovis, said Monday the investigation is not closed.

Military won't force local airport closure

Air flight service won't be interrupted at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport during proposed new high altitude missile tests next year.

However, Carrizozo's airport will be closed during 11 four-hour periods (5 a.m. to 9 a.m.) over the next 18 months when high-altitude missile tests take place. Only private planes fly into Carrizozo.

Officials with the U.S. Army Space and Strategic Defense Command and White Sands Missile Range have carved out take-off and landing air space for the Ruidoso airport, said Larry Furrow, chief of public affairs for the missile range.

Both of Lincoln County's airports, in Carrizozo and Ruidoso, fall within the expanded airspace.

Flights using instruments to land or takeoff at the Sierra Blanca airport will not be affected, Furrow said.

However, planes using visual landings and takeoffs can only arrive and depart from the east if one of the four-hour missile tests is underway, Furrow said.

"Tim Morris (manager of Ruidoso's Sierra Blanca Regional Airport) asked for that, because that's the preponderance of his traffic anyway," Furrow said. "We carved out an area for Ruidoso so its air traffic would not be disrupted."

Meetings to brief residents on the new tests and the eastward expansion of WSMR restricted airspace will be at 1-3 p.m. and 6-8 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 5, in the Ruidoso Civic Events Center.

During previous meetings with the public in Tularosa and Carrizozo, it was apparent the main concern about the new tests centered around air traffic restrictions, Furrow said.

Only 11 high altitude missile interception tests are planned over the next 18 months, he said.

"The times will be from 5 a.m. to 9 a.m., so most of the time, we wouldn't be bothering anybody anyway," Furrow said.

The airport at Carrizozo will be shut down completely during the four-hour period.

"It's right in the middle of the area, so we couldn't make an exception for them," Furrow said.

Because the test explosions will take place at higher altitudes than before, debris could be carried by the wind outside of the existing boundaries of the missile range. To compensate, the range is requesting an additional 30 miles of restricted air space east of its border.

At the meeting in Ruidoso Dec. 5, missile range officials also will explain the chances of debris falling outside the range and hitting people or structures, characterized by one missile range official as "one in a million, but not impossible."

Commissioner seeks tax cut

The time has come for Lincoln County tax rates to drop, says County Commissioner Wilton Howell.

Since the county's cash reserve is about double the amount required by the state and the commission has enough money to help counties in other states fight their legal battles, he wants a break for

the taxpayers, Howell said during an interview last week. Howell's district covers the Ruidoso area.

He urged property owners to express what they think about the county's surplus, during a 9 a.m. commission meeting Tuesday in the Ruidoso Civic Events Center.

To achieve the tax cut, Howell proposes eliminating a 1.75 mill special projects levy that produces about \$576,000 a year. (One mill

equals \$1 for each \$1,000 of taxable property value.)

If the financial picture changes, the commission always could reinstate the levy, Howell said.

"It's hard to decipher, because everything is so segmented, but the best I can tell we have a \$3 million surplus," Howell said. "By law, we must hold back three-twelfths of

Soil conservation office moves

The soil conservation office in Lincoln County will pay about double its current monthly rent as a result of a reorganization under the Department of Agriculture.

The reorganization was aimed at cutting the expenses of the U.S.D.A.'s divisions and consolidating offices.

Now called the office of Natural Resources Conservation Services (NRCS), the soil conservation operation has been situated in the county courthouse annex in Carrizozo for more than 30 years.

But starting Dec. 5, it will relocate to the Ruidoso State Bank building across U.S. Highway 54 in Carrizozo.

The U.S.D.A. had been paying \$250 a month for the annex office, plus another \$400 a month for a suboffice in Capitan. The rent at the bank building will be about \$1,200 a month, but it's bigger.

Another reason for the move is

tied to requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), said Hollis Fuchs, range conservationist with the NRCS.

"One of the primary issues was handicapped accessibility, and the new space fully complies with the requirement of the ADA," he said. "Federal regulations say if handicapped-accessible space is available, you must go to it. That probably was one of the biggest factors in the move."

The office in the courthouse annex is located on the second floor and accessible only by two staircases.

"It's all part of the reorganization and we're just following directions," said Howard Shanks, project coordinator with the South Central Mountain Recreation, Conservation and Development Council (RC&D).

The new office has about 1,500 square feet compared to 800 square feet in the courthouse. The additional space will allow the new office to become a U.S.D.A. Service

Center, large enough to accommodate local staff and representatives from U.S.D.A. offices in other parts of the region when they're working in Lincoln County.

"It will be set up so that all the employees (of the department) in the county can work from there," Fuchs said. "Representatives from Farm Services in Alamogordo will use it, as will officials from the Farmers Home Administration in Roswell when they're in town."

The local staff consists of Shanks, Fuchs, District Conservationist Greg Haussler, soil technician Tom Royal, and Sue Stearns with the Upper Hondo and Carrizozo Soil Conservation districts and the RC&D.

One other office will remain in this county in Capitan, because it's being funded by the Upper Hondo Soil & Water Conservation District.

The telephone number of the Carrizozo office will remain the same, 648-2941, as will the address, P.O. Box 457 in Carrizozo.

crime has been committed," Waller said. "We're asking them to look at one deputy right now, but the investigation is still active."

Once convened, the grand jury can expand its scope with the judge's concurrence and if its members find probable cause to believe wrongdoing has been committed by someone else, he said.

Waller said he and another agent questioned more than a dozen people during his five trips to this area.

"A lot of people expressed their concerns to us," he said.

District Attorney Bart Atkins requested the investigation be conducted by an agent outside of his jurisdiction. He also asked the attorney general to review the case for prosecution.

Atkins cited possible conflicts in his office, because he is involved in prosecuting cases filed by McSwane. The sheriff's wife also is a secretary in Atkins' office in Lincoln County.

Calling a grand jury is an

alternative to referring a case to a district attorney for possible charges. In sessions behind closed doors that can last months, the jury is guided through evidence collected by a prosecutor, who can call persons to testify without cross-examination.

Participants often are admonished by the judge not to discuss their testimony, until the grand jury reaches a decision whether to issue indictments based on evidence showing probable cause that a crime has been committed.

the money in the general fund and one-twelfth of the road fund to ensure at least three months operating expense in case of an emergency. But that only equals about \$1,058,000."

Another \$900,000 has accumulated in the facilities fund for improving and repairing county buildings, and \$45,000 is marked for improvements to the health clinic building in Carrizozo, he said.

"We seem to have money scattered everywhere," Howell said. "We have 13 different mill levy accounts started for specific things."

But once the money is deposited in those accounts, it seems to be handled more like a stash for whatever strikes the fancy of the commission, he said.

"For instance, we shouldn't be taking \$5,000 to send to Nye County, Nevada, out of the facilities fund. It should come out of the budget for the public lands," he said.

In a 3-2 vote last month, commissioners approved sending \$5,000 to the Nye County Commission to help cover legal fees in that county's fight against the federal government over ownership of public lands. On the agenda Tuesday is a contract for services with Nye. The county would be violating the state's anti-donation clause if it gives Nye the money without receiving some service in exchange,

County Attorney Alan Morel said.

"I propose a tax cut plan for Lincoln County taxpayers and I'll be asking for consensus from the other commissioners to redefine county government to provide basic and generic services only," Howell said.

"It should cost us less to operate the next three years, because in the last three years, we've replaced 12 patrol cars, remodeled the jail, replaced old road department equipment, bought new voting machines and set aside money to spend on county buildings," Howell added.

Although he supported a request a few months ago from Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso for money to purchase more computers, he now thinks he should have rejected the proposal.

"We've got so much money gathered up that it's caused a run on the county," Howell said. "Different entities like the school system are asking us for money when they have bigger budgets than our own."

A discussion of a tax break is particularly timely now because county employees are looking for raises, he said.

Howell said he is distressed by what he sees as high salaries and steep increases received by some employees in the last few years, although he emphasized he is not criticizing the quality of work produced by the county's 84 full-time and eight part-time employees.

He cited a deputy earning

\$37,600, a secretary paid \$39,969 and one employee whose salary jumped from \$27,810 in 1992-93 to \$35,505 this year.

"The average county employee earned \$28,100 a year in 1994, while countywide, the average figure was \$18,000 and statewide, it was \$22,000," Howell said.

Howell also wants the commission to convene as the county Board of Finance in early January to review the county's approach to investing its surplus.

Commissioners need to be more aware of state requirements and of procedures used by County Treasurer Joan Park, since the ultimate responsibility for the money lies with the board, he said.

Other items on the agenda Tuesday include:

— a request to help pay for an "Arts in Education" program to bring the fine arts to students in the county;

— a public hearing to consider proposed amendments to the county subdivision regulations;

— a request for the county to work with the village of Ruidoso to establish a new public cemetery;

— appointments to the Lincoln Historical Preservation Board, the Agriculture and Rural Affairs Advisory Committee and the Lincoln County Senior Citizens Olympic Committee;

— and a discussion about a building permit procedure by planning technician Patsy Sanchez.

Ruidoso earned a split in weekend boys cage action and improved to 2-1 overall.

The Warriors picked up their second win of the season Friday in Belen where they defeated the Eagles, 56-53. Despite the close score, Ruidoso coach Ben Sanchez said his team controlled the game from opening tip to final buzzer.

"We really played a good defensive ballgame," he said.

Ruidoso pressed the Eagles all night. Sanchez was hesitant to use the pressure this early in the season, but the scouting report on Belen indicated the Eagles were a team that could be pressed.

"We became that pressing ballclub that I'd like to see us become eventually," Sanchez said.

Ryan Trout paced the Warriors in Belen with 14 points.

Ruidoso completed its back-to-back road trip in Tularosa Saturday. The Wildcats prevailed, 51-38, thanks to cold shooting by the Warriors.

The Warriors made just 17 of 55 shots from the field for 31%, and were a meager 17% (four of 24) from beyond the 3-point arc. Ruidoso even had trouble from the foul line, where it was just four of eight.

"I wasn't upset with the way we played. We played hard. We took good shots. We just couldn't get anything to go in," Sanchez said.

The Ruidoso coach also complimented the efforts of the Wildcats. Tullie coach Johnny May has four starters back from last year's Class AA runnerup.

"They are a very good basketball team. They would be a very good triple A basketball team," Sanchez said.

Senior Rex Comanche led Ruidoso with 12 points. Jackie Roe added eight for the Warriors. The Tullie defense held Cory Hood, Joshua Hodges and Trout to five points each.

"They really shut those guys (Hood, Hodges and Trout) down, and we didn't pick up the pace anywhere else," Sanchez said.

The Warriors were tired from the back-to-back road games, Sanchez added. "Anytime you do that,

the first thing that suffers is shooting and sure enough, it did," he said.

Ruidoso, however, will learn from the experience, Sanchez promised. It was good preparation for district play, when teams often have to play two nights in a row.

Sanchez's team is a bit further along than he thought it would be after three games.

"Our depth is developing faster than I thought. We will need that if we're going to press," Sanchez said. He noted the quality of play the Warriors got off the bench from Eric Padilla, Arthur Rojas and Byron Soales.

The Warriors are back in action at the Bruce King Invitational hosted by Moriarty. Ruidoso plays Las Vegas Robertson at 3 p.m. Thursday.

Other teams at the tournament include Zuni, Belen, Fort Wingate, St. Pius and Bloomfield.

Zozo girls down Mesilla

A 71-32 win over Mesilla Valley improved the Carrizozo girls basketball record to 3-2 overall.

"We played really well against them. They couldn't break our press," Grizzly coach Kim Gremillion said.

Junior forward Naomi Vallejos led Carrizozo with 23 points. Mandy Baca added 11 points in the winning effort.

Earlier in the week, Carrizozo lost a heartbreaker to Tularosa Wednesday and then pounded Hondo Friday.

Against the Wildcats, the Grizzlies rallied from a seven-point deficit in the final minute of play. Zozo cut the lead to one point, but the Wildcats broke the Grizzly press and scored for a 47-44 lead and the eventual winning margin.

Carrizozo had one final chance for a tie, but the Grizzlies forgot to call a timeout with seven seconds left and the clock ran out.

"They played their hearts out," Gremillion said.

Grizzlies beat Eagles

In a battle between Lincoln County schools, Carrizozo downed the visiting Hondo Eagles, 70-61. The Grizzlies led by as many as

18 points before Hondo rallied. Carrizozo outscored the Eagles, 18-12, in the fourth quarter and held on for the win.

December is great for hunting game birds


December is a month known for cold temperatures and warm holiday greetings, but it has special significance for a bird hunter. December offers a real smorgasbord for shot-gunners, with seasons open on almost all game bird species.

The early dove season was fair in the southeastern part of the state and hopefully the late dove season will provide some more fast action. Dove season reopened Dec. 1 and ends Dec. 30 with a daily bag limit of 15 and possession limit of 30.

The season for scaled, Gambel's and bobwhite quail began in November and continues through Feb. 15, with a daily bag limit of five per day. Montezuma quail season started Dec. 1 and ends Jan. 31 with a bag limit of five per day. Reports from the field show some areas have good numbers of quail this year.

Several years ago, there were tremendous numbers of lesser prairie chicken in the southeastern part of the state, but their numbers dropped off drastically. Prairie chicken hunters then were limited to a four-day season.

Pheasant numbers are down this year in

the lower Pecos Valley, but good numbers of birds are being reported in the Clovis and Portales areas. The season on pheasant starts later this month, Dec. 14, and runs through Dec. 17. The bag limit is three per day and six in possession.

Sandhill crane numbers used to approach 80,000 in the Roswell area in the late 1960s and early 1970s, but that is no longer the case. There are still about 10,000 that winter in southeastern New Mexico. Sandhill crane season started in October and runs until Jan. 31. The daily bag limit is three per day and six in possession. In addition to a small game license, crane hunters need to pick up a special

free permit from any game department office.

Waterfowl hunters are definitely not left out in December. In southeastern New Mexico, season on duck, coot, moorhen, rail and snipe began in November and will continue through Jan. 21. The bag limit is five ducks per day, but may not include more than one female mallard, one redhead, one northern pintail, one hooded merganser or two wood duck.

Seasons are also open on both light (snow, Ross' and blue) geese and dark (Canadian and white-fronted) geese. Dark geese season ends Jan. 31 and light geese season ends Feb. 25. The bag limit for light geese is five per day. The possession limit on geese is twice the daily bag limit.

All waterfowl hunters will need a federal duck stamp; the state duck stamp has been eliminated. Federal stamps may be purchased at post offices for \$15 or at game department offices for the same price plus a 76-cent vendor fee.

Waterfowl may be hunted only with non-toxic (steel or bismuth) shot.

With so much opportunity, December should be a great month for hunters, so get out the warm clothes and load up the bird dog.

"The winning attitude (from volleyball) rolls over and they actually know how to win now," Gremillion said.

"Our strength is our quickness," Gremillion added.

When boys basketball coach Ron Becker left Capitan for some Alaskan northern exposure in August, he left behind a fundamentally sound team with lots of experience.

Gerald Montes inherited the Tigers, who have seven seniors on the roster. Not a bad situation for the first-year coach at Capitan.

Montes is no stranger to coaching in general. This is his 21st year of coaching, a career that includes 10 years at Hondo Valley and a year at Carrizozo.

Capitan's seven seniors who will try to keep pace with the district heavies are: Neil Montes, Ernie Trujillo, Keith Cox, Josh Peralta, Jeremy McGarvey, Jonathon Ugalano, and Nathan Longbotham. Junior guard Cody Turnbow finishes out the core of varsity players for Montes.

Neil will direct the Tiger offense at point guard. The 5-foot, 8-inch speedster handles the ball well and can score for Capitan. He's been on varsity for four years.

Returning letterwinner Ugalano is Capitan's main threat from 3-point land. Ugalano, a 5-10 off guard, is a "tremendous shooter but must work on his mental game," coach Montes said.

Also on perimeter is Trujillo, a 5-9 guard. Trujillo returns to hoops after a two-year absence. Montes described Trujillo as a good shooter. He's also demonstrated he can drive to the basket.

The 6-foot, 2-inch Peralta enters his second season on varsity. Peralta is a versatile player who will see a lot playing time on the perimeter.

"He's got to play where we need him," Montes said.

Helping out Cox in the post is 6-3 McGarvey. Guard Longbotham will be Montes' main player off the bench at either the point guard or off guard.

Turnbow will also see significant playing time for Montes.

"He's so intelligent and he played a lot this summer," Montes said of Turnbow.

Montes' Tigers will run the fast-break more than Becker's team did last season. Montes likes an up-tempo game.

Capitan will stick to what it knows offensively and run the same offenses in the halfcourt game, Montes said.

"The kids have to enjoy playing the game. They have to have fun going out there," Montes added.

Defensively, the Tigers will play some man-to-man, zone and press.

His team's lack of depth concerns the first-year coach, who said the Tigers need at least two more players to contribute to varsity. Capitan also needs to learn to put together back-to-back performances when the district season heats up.

"The seven seniors and Cody need to step up and play another notch. We shouldn't be wide-eyed," Montes said. "We've got to play together as a team. I want us to be competitive in the district."

Chavez was a native New Mexican, born in 1870 at Manzano, Valencia County. He and his wife, Beatrice had six children, three sons and three daughters.

He was a member of Alianza Hispano-Americana, a Spanish-American society at Lincoln.





The flavor of Old Mexico with a flair is Cafe Mescalero's speciality

The new Cafe Mescalero offers diners a variety of selections, all prepared with the taste of Old Mexico.

Chef de Cuisine Anthony Carpenter has assembled an exotic yet reasonably priced menu. The most expensive dish is the Camarones Ala Talla, or grilled shrimp with chipotle garlic cream, for \$10.95.

From Colima, try the Bolsa Del Pabre, coastal seafood and fragrant vegetables steamed in parchment paper is \$7.95; the Pescado En Hojas De Planto, succulent fresh fish wrapped in banana leaves, originated in Jalisco and also costs \$7.95.

Should your taste run towards steak, try the Bisteces Encabollados, Chiles De Queso or New York steak strips with onion, garlic, white cheese and green chili for \$9.95.

Cafe Mescalero, previously Cafe Carrizo, has been completely remodeled and transformed, but it retains the historic adobe and brick look that earned the structure a

spot on the National Register of Historic Places.

The decor and place settings are decidedly southwestern, with hand-blown glass goblets. The kitchen is filled with new stainless steel equipment.

Chef Carpenter practiced his art in various fine dining establishments in Santa Fe for 10 years before relocating to Ruidoso.

"When I lived in Santa Fe, I cooked for Rancho Cañado, Evergreen Restaurant and Old Mexico Grill," he said. "At Cafe Mescalero, we are doing a lot with exotic chiles with fruity flavors, a little bit away from the fire and spice."

Cafe Mescalero also features the Muestra Dor or sampler, a trio of daily entree selections for those who want to taste several of the menu items.

Appetizers include Ceviche, marinated seafoods in tomato, lime and spices; Queso Blanco Con Pina, white cheese and pineapple with tortilla chips; and Taquitos De Pollo Con Guacamole, individually-rolled small chicken tacos with avocado dip.

Fresh fish is flown in daily for use in Chef Carpenter's special creations.

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Mescalero Apache crews help out Mother Nature with controlled burning

Smoke floating down the valley along Highway 70 from the Mescalero Apache Reservation will stop now that controlled burns are completed.

"As of today (Friday) there will be no more burning on this side," Mescalero Tribal Burn Crew ignition specialist Roy Martinez said. "We are pretty much done with this area." Crews will now concentrate on areas about 15 miles away.

This latest series of controlled burns on Mescalero Apache lands began about a month ago.

"We usually do two, three, maybe four burns a year," Mescalero timber operations supervisory forester John Andrews said. "But some of those are fairly large."

The crews target 5,000-10,000 acres most years.

"We've burned as much as 30,000 acres, but that's primarily rangeland, and in the forest areas it goes slower," Andrews said.

The crews sometimes work through January, depending on weather conditions.

"We will burn as long as we can, usually until the snow prevents us from continuing," Martinez said.

The major reasons for the burns are to reduce the accumulation of hazardous fuels that can lead to large wildfires, enhance appearance, improve wildlife habitat and improve forage and grazing.

Federal agencies such as the Bureau of Land Management also use Mother Nature's old tricks, lighting fires to improve the environment. The BLM sets an average of 700 fires nationally each year that burn about 70,000 acres of land.

Like federal agencies, tribal burn crews are comprised of highly-trained professionals, Martinez said.

All 22 people on the burn crews are trained to set and monitor the fires, Martinez said. Training includes techniques in monitoring burn sectors, water sources, contingency plans to suppress fires burning out of prescribed areas, and the locations of firebreaks and roads.

Each burn has about 10 members of the crew on hand to monitor the fires.

"We've been trying to get the smoke carried out by the wind, but instead it just kind of settled in and that's why we've been burning at night."

Tribal burn crews use extra precautions when a controlled burn is close to the road, Martinez said.

"We try to control the smoke at all times," he said. "We don't want to have too much smoke because it could affect visibility, so we have to work with ways to control it."

Burning slow is necessary to keep the smoke dispersed.

"You must burn slow because if you get too much smoke it can cause accidents," Martinez said.

Weather conditions are carefully monitored by the burn crews, he said. When weather changes and creates a situation where smoke lingers over an area, burning is discontinued until conditions become suitable.

Humidity also is monitored closely.

"We want to keep the flame length down so we monitor the relative humidity (RH)," Martinez explained. "We have to work with the

RH, for example we try not to burn near houses during the day because the heat intensity will be too high."

When the RH factor is higher, usually at night, the fire creeps at a slow, controllable rate and flame height remains low, he said. With low flame height, the threat of scorched trees is lessened.

Relative humidity strongly influences the moisture content of the vegetation at the burn and determines how the fire will burn, New Mexico State Forestry guidelines indicate. The RH recommendations vary depending on the type of vegetation at each burn site.

Wind is another big weather factor, especially in New Mexico.

"Sometimes the wind is hard to predict and you really have to watch it," Martinez said.

Burn crews have been working at night because the winds haven't been cooperating lately, he said.

"We've been trying to get the smoke carried out by the wind," he said. "But instead, it's just kind of settled in and that's why we've been burning at night."

Prior to each burn, a spot weather forecast is performed. If high winds appear in the forecast, the burn is postponed.

"We did have some trouble last year when the winds changed unexpectedly, even though we had done our weather forecast," Andrews said. "We haven't had any problems with the wind recently."

New Mexico State Forestry guidelines recommend that burns not be conducted if the wind rises above 12 miles per hour, depending on the vegetation involved at the site.

Controlled burning is something that requires skill and monitoring, Martinez said.

"You've got to know what you're doing because if you don't, you'll run into a lot of problems."

Field trip to fire site Wednesday

Lincoln National Forest and Alamogordo Public Safety will host an educational field trip for the public on the topic of "Fire in the Ecosystem" at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, Dec. 6.

Participants will gather at Fire Station #4 at 3310 E. 10th Street in Alamogordo for a briefing and safety instructions before going to the field.

"We will explore the historic and future role of fire in the ecosystem," said the forest's fire management officer Dan Krutina. He will introduce the topic with a slide program, then lead a vehicle caravan and a hike into Marble Canyon east of Alamogordo.

"The group will be able to study a fire-affected ecosystem in Marble Canyon where a blaze started by fireworks burned over 80 acres July 25, 1995. The fire was very visible from Alamogordo so people may recall seeing the smoke, and a helicopter dumping water on the fire in Marble Canyon," Krutina said. "Now they can see what has happened to the canyon since the fire."

Other aspects of fire will also be discussed, such as: wildland/urban interface, prevention and protection (stewardship over fire), fire and forest health, and how wildlife and grazing benefit from prescribed natural fire and prescribed burning.

"We can help people develop an understanding of managed fire as a beneficial resource in comparison to unwanted, carelessly caused or arson fires that can take lives and destroy property. Bring your questions. You may be surprised to learn the history and science of fire," said Krutina.

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

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

Fort's use needs to be resolved immediately

Something's fishy at the fort. How could 374 companies express initial interest in leasing Fort Stanton, and only one ends up submitting a bid?

At least one bidder, from Youth Services International, said state officials seemed negative and scared him off. He had the feeling the state was discouraging companies so the state could use the fort for a prison.

General Services Department Secretary Steven Belfort said last week the state can't show any preference to any company, so maybe that's what Youth Services International was talking about. We understand state officials can't show preference — but they can surely encourage all the applicants instead of discouraging them all by giving off negative vibes.

Belfort speculated that YSI's attitude that it was the front-runner for the lease may have turned off other bidders. That seems to be a somewhat ludicrous scenario. How would these other bidders even know YSI officials felt that way (if in fact they did)?


A county commissioner said other bidders were turned off because the state included a provision allowing it to cancel the lease without cause.

State officials knew this clause was causing concern amongst potential bidders. When the fort is just sitting there empty, why didn't they go ahead and try to get rid of this clause? It seems inherently unfair to ask a company to invest millions in the fort when it has no guarantee it won't be suddenly kicked out (for a prison?) and lose its investment.

But instead of being proactive and working to take out the clause, Belfort said companies should have submitted bids saying they wanted the lease without that clause, and then the GSD would have asked the Legislature to waive the clause.

State officials need to stop pointing fingers and work this problem out — fast. Belfort said the GSD will survey the potential bidders to find out what went wrong. This survey should be completed by the time the only bidder's appeal period runs out in 15 days, on Dec. 5, with analysis of the results completed as well. Then the state should be ready to mail revised specifications to all 374 companies that expressed initial interest. And whoever talks to these companies in the future should have a positive attitude about the process. Any delay should be avoided; if the GSD thinks it's busy now, just wait until the Legislature convenes in January.

Meanwhile, we hope our county commissioners who say they have a good idea for a regional juvenile detention treatment center can get other southeastern New Mexico county commissioners behind them quickly and present their plan to the state.

Survey tells where residents stand on issues

Earlier this year, a questionnaire generated from my office was mailed to every household in the 2nd Congressional District that contained questions about important issues facing New Mexico. Residents were given an opportunity to respond to this questionnaire because, as congressman, it is important for me to know what residents of my district think about these or any other issues.

Based on a representative sample, I am pleased to report the results of how people of the 2nd congressional district responded and, in turn, how Congress is responding to the people.

The major areas where residents of the 2nd Congressional District agree with legislative proposals moving through Congress include welfare reform, tax cuts, rangeland reform and reducing or freezing government spending for several programs.

First, an overwhelming amount of respondents believe that the current welfare system must be reformed. Specifically, 92% support limiting benefits to welfare parents who have additional children. And 94% support a reasonable limit on how long an individual may receive welfare benefits; 99% believe that able-bodied welfare recipients should be required to work for benefits, and 80% are against granting welfare benefits to legal immigrants who are not yet citizens.

Under the House-passed version of the welfare reform bill, the House supported the views of the 2nd Congressional District. Our reform bill ends welfare as we know it by rewarding the dignity of work and self-respect

over illegitimacy, family disintegration, and non-contribution to society. The measure denies benefits to non-citizens, denies cash payments to kids having kids and welfare recipients who have more children while on welfare. It also requires single welfare recipients to work in order to collect benefits.

In the area of rangeland reform, 81% agree that states should have the opportunity to manage non-environmentally sensitive Bureau of Land Management land within their own borders. Also, 87% believe that states should have the opportunity to collect the revenues generated off these lands and 65% believe that the state of New Mexico can manage these lands in a responsible way.

As you may know, I am co-sponsoring legislation that would give states the option to manage BLM lands. It is a common sense approach to bringing public management closer to the people who live and use these lands. I believe recreationists, hunters, fishermen, ranchers, farmers and other public land users would have greater access to these lands and a louder voice in shaping public land-use policy if this bill becomes law.

A majority of those responding to the questionnaire support tax cuts. A total of 64% believe Congress should pursue tax cuts as a way to promote economic growth. Already, the House has passed a tax relief bill that calls for a number of tax cuts including cutting the capital gains tax, giving working families a \$500 per child tax credit, and repealing the alternative minimum tax.

In the area of government spending, more people favored funding increases. I am pleased to report to you that the views of this Congress

are consistent with the 2nd District. The Congress is providing only a slight increase in park operations so that the parks are maintained without jeopardizing operations. This Congress has taken the approach that we must take better care of those parks that are in the national park system before acquiring new parks.

A majority of respondents favored reducing spending in general government operations and Congress. The focus of many of our legislative initiatives is to cut back the federal bureaucracy and allow states to have more control in determining how best to spend federal dollars. Also, the Congress has already made major cutbacks on congressional operations. I'll dedicate another column to outline what those cutbacks mean for constituent services in the 2nd District.

In the areas of National Endowment for the Arts, more people favored elimination of these programs. A total of 31% support a freeze in spending while 49% agree that this program should be eliminated. For fiscal year 1996, the Congress proposes to cut NEH by about 40% from current levels. For NEA, 55% support elimination of this program while 24% support a freeze in spending. The Congress also recommended about a 40% reduction in spending for NEA.

I want to thank everyone for taking time to respond to the questionnaire. In the weeks ahead, we will continue to focus on reforming the welfare system, bringing tax relief to working families, providing rangeland reform that allows states more control over their own lands, and reducing the cost of government operations.

Support funding for Parkinson's disease research

TO THE EDITOR:
To the many thousands of New Mexicans who have Parkinson's disease, their spouses or children, or friends of afflicted persons: please, please send letters to Congress asking for passage of the Morris K. Udall Parkinson's Research and Education Act!

You already know how terrible this disorder is. I know, too; my wife is a victim of Parkinson's disease. But did you know that the government spends only about \$25 per patient for research on it? That is far less than is spent for Alzheimer's disease, heart disease, Multiple Sclerosis, or cancer. About 1/25-1/10 of Americans are afflicted, and more people under the age of 50 are being diagnosed. The direct financial impact of the disease is

estimated to be over \$6 billion per year, and the indirect cost to society may greatly exceed \$25 billion per year.

To improve prospects for a cure, the Morris K. Udall bill has been introduced in the Senate (Senate Bill S 684) and in the House (House Bill HR 1462). If passed, the bills would increase the National Institutes of Health research spending to \$100 million per year (about \$100 per patient) for five years, provide for 10 Parkinson's disease research centers, and establish a means for sharing the research results with those working on other neurological disorders. The medical community is quite optimistic that increased research funding would lead to very significant advances in understanding and treatment within five years.

Your letters are needed to get Congress to act favorably on these bills. At a time when federal spending is decreasing and competition for remaining funds is very great,

you who are affected can help make every relevant member of Congress aware of the inequity of the present research support and encourage them to co-sponsor the legislation. As the New Mexico representative of the Parkinson's Action Network, I ask that you write to the New Mexico congressional delegation (visit them if you can), with copies to the chairs of the committees that have jurisdiction over the bills. Your letter should explain why you are supporting the Udall bill, and how the disease affects you. Ask them to co-sponsor the Udall bill. A handwritten letter is very effective. But if you prefer, write me and I will send you a typical letter that you can use or modify to suit your needs.

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ASTIGMATISM???

Astigmatism has been likened to a problem in physics: when the cornea is not perfectly round, i.e., elliptical or oval, light rays passing through it are not able to meet in a single focal point. The result is a blurred image, often followed by headaches, squinting and eye fatigue.

Nobody's perfect. That's why most people have at least a small degree of astigmatism, though it is probably not noticeable to them. The more elliptical the cornea, the more the image is blurred. Fortunately, this widespread problem is not difficult to correct.

Astigmatism may exist alone as an eye defect, but more often it coexists with nearsightedness or farsightedness. Drs. Gutowski and Sonnenmoser can incorporate the proper prescription to correct the astigmatism with a prescription for other eye conditions, thus the patient is able to see clearly. In recent years, most patients with astigmatism can even wear contact lenses successfully. Occasionally, there may be a short adjustment period for the wearer to become accustomed to glasses with astigmatism correction.

POOP SCOOP

Sometimes kindness can accentuate suffering and lead to more grief.

Well-meaning people who feed stray and semi-feral cats without taking full responsibility by neutering and vaccinating them are one example.

"Many very kind, humane and good hearted people from the most congested city streets to far removed farms perpetuate some of the most wide spread suffering known to companion animals," said Jim Riggins, director of the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter. "The feeding and sustaining of large number of homeless cats is something that appeals to our humanity, but I would like people who are doing it to consider that cats breed at least three times a year."

Many people feeding homeless cats see the kittens arrive and sometimes grow older, yet the size of the group does not increase proportionately, Riggins said.

"Most people I discuss this with believe that the young cats simply move away," he said. "The truth is that domesticated cats born homeless are extremely susceptible to disease, predation by other animals and they often die

from exposure."

Adult cats also are susceptible, but they have some degree of feral survivability, he said.

"This doesn't mean they have comfortable or pleasant lives, Riggins said. "The opposite usually is true. They survive, they breed and they die."

"Every national humane association or society agree that the feeding and sustaining of homeless cat populations is cruelty."

In October, the shelter saw a high percentage of cat impounds as owner releases, but most were feral or semi-tame cats being fed by the residents.

"Some shelters make the mistake of resenting, chastising or even charging owners who make this wise decision," Riggins said. "I'm proud (county humane society members) see the big picture in population control."

"We urge anyone in this situation to either bring the homeless cats to the shelter or have them picked up or humanely trapped by animal control."

"Although not every cat will find a new home through adoption, the breeding cycle will be broken," Riggins said. "Quantity of life is cruel without quality of life."


