Tribes sue U.S. attorney over casino closure

Nine New Mexico Indian nations with casinos united Wednesday to sue U.S. Attorney John Kelly in U.S. District Court. They hope to stop Kelly from shutting down their gambling operations.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe was the only New Mexico tribe with a casino that did not join the suit. Mescalero President Wendell Chino said Dec. 20 he would file suit against Kelly if Kelly insists on closing the casinos.

Kelly told the tribes they must close their casinos by Jan. 15, or face forfeiture of their slot machines and other gambling devices.

Kelly's comments came after the state Supreme Court ruled the casinos are illegal.

Capitan trustees to review water study

A water feasibility study will be reviewed by the Capitan Board of Trustees during a hearing at 6:30 p.m. Monday.

The regular meeting will begin at 7 p.m. The board will consider resolutions authorizing financing for the purchase of water rights and the third phase of a road improvement program. The program is the village's 1996 Community Development Block Grant project.

BLM oil and gas leasing resumes

The Bureau of Land Management's Roswell District has issued two decision records that allow oil and gas lease sales to resume.

Lease sales in this district were halted until BLM could analyze the cumulative impacts of development.

The BLM concluded the development would have no significant impact. Lease sales can resume Jan. 14, 1996. One "environmental assessment" analyzes the cumulative impacts of oil and gas development in the Roswell Resource Area, while the other analyzes the cumulative impacts in the Carlsbad Resource Area.

The EAs are only "interim" EAs because they allow lease sales until the Roswell Resource Management Plan (RMP) and the Carlsbad RMP Amendment are completed.

Lease sales of federal split estate minerals have not been interrupted and will continue as before.

Three Ruidoso councilors seek another term in March

Planning commissioner also decides to enter race for 3 council seats

All three Ruidoso Village Councilors whose terms are coming to a close say they plan to run again.

At least one other person, Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commissioner Bob Sterchi, said he'll be throwing his hat in the political ring, too.

Candidates for village council in communities throughout Lincoln County must sign up Tuesday at their respective village halls.

Ruidoso incumbents running again are Robert Donaldson, J.D. James, and Frank Cummins.

The municipal election will be held March 5. Since the three available seats are at-large, the top three vote getters win.

Those signing up to run Tuesday must bring a certified copy of their voter registration from the county clerk's office, signed and dated after Nov. 28, 1995.

Thus far, only four or five Ruidoso residents have requested the certified voter registrations,

County Clerk Martha Proctor said yesterday. Although this flow of potential candidates may seem "light," most people end up asking for the paperwork on deadline day, she said.

Robert Donaldson

Donaldson, who filled a council vacancy seat two years ago, said he "absolutely" plans a second run.

"I feel we've made a lot of accomplishments during the past two years — I feel we have a way to go where the village needs to be, and I have a lot of ideas for getting us there," Donaldson said.

He described his governing style as "proactive, not reactive," and said he believes he is one of the "more forceful councilors" currently serving the village.

Donaldson is also the chairman of the council's annexation committee, and a former P&Z chairman.

As a councilor, Donaldson said he's proud of: completion of MainStreet rehabilitation work and the Grindstone Water Treatment Plant; passage of the seven bond issues for infrastructure projects; prioritization of village road reconstruction; establishment of the Convention and Visitors Bureau; and current efforts to change Civic Events Center rules and to make the Planning Depart-

ment more user friendly.

The Pro Ski Sports shop owner and independent mortgage loan contractor added that during the next term, he'd like joint power agreements with Ruidoso's neighbors to be strengthened, and water rights work to continue.

"Over the last two years we've caught up with 10 years of disrepair in infrastructure," Donaldson said. "We need to start looking at future needs and determine what is the direction for Ruidoso."

J.D. James

J.D. James, who's served on the council since 1987, has also served as the council's mayor pro tem for the last two years.

"There's things that we've started that I'd like to see finished," James said. "I think I've done a good job for the village, and people always ask me to run."

James, a former administration manager for Sun Oil Co., said he's quite pleased with the council's work during the past few years.

"I'm proud of the new water plant and the completion of the first phase of MainStreet," he said. "To me, one of the most outstanding things that has happened is the revitalization of downtown."

His governing style involves

State legislator wants local input on highway speed limits

Speed limits on Lincoln County roads will be discussed during the second of two county commission meetings early next week.

Commissioners will be doing double duty the second week of the new year, holding a special meeting Monday, Jan. 8 followed by a regular meeting Tuesday, Jan. 9.

At 9 a.m. Tuesday, State Rep. Dub Williams (R-Ruidoso Downs) will brief the board on the state Legislature's one-month session that begins Jan. 16.

Williams said Wednesday he

wants input from commissioners and other local citizens about future speed limits for roads in the county and throughout New Mexi-

co. The U.S. Congress in December approved a bill allowing states to set their own speed limits. Montana legislators have totally abolished speed limits during daytime hours.

"I probably should have done this differently by running a survey in the newspaper, but time is running out before the session," Williams said. "When I saw Monroy at a meeting in Roswell, I asked to be put on the agenda to discuss it with the commissioners and anyone else who wants to offer their opinion."

He has heard some support for

Fort bidder circulates petitions

With only a few weeks left before the deadline to submit lease proposals for Fort Stanton, Tracy Brannan is trying to drum up grassroots support for his dream.

He is leaving petitions at sites around Ruidoso and at Fort Stanton. He wants people to sign the petition to show their support for his juvenile rehabilitation proposal.

Brannan, executive director of New Mexico Outreach Inc., was the only person to submit a lease proposal for the fort after a national advertising campaign.

But a seven-member selection committee rejected his proposal and

decided to set a deadline of Jan. 22 for another round of proposals. The rejection was based in part on lack of financial resources.

The state is asking for a minimum of \$1 million, although the lessee could receive credit for restoration and renovation work on the fort's 80 buildings.

Since the fort was closed as a state hospital last March, Lincoln County commissioners have been working with the state General Services Department to find a new tenant and replace some of the 200 jobs lost.

Brannan proposes a juvenile rehabilitation center at the fort, to provide therapy through experiences. One of the approaches would

be a wagon train wilderness trip. Brannan is a wagon builder and currently has a wagon displayed for sale outside the Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs.

He intends to submit another proposal based on the same premise by the Jan. 22 deadline, Brannan said.

The petition says the signers want to see an activity at the fort that recognizes its history and attracts tourist dollars. The fort is large enough to accommodate multiple activities, and the juvenile rehab project would work best in an isolated environment available there, the petition states.

Teens shoot BB gun at Texas visitors

When Greg Meyer saw a rifle pointed at him Christmas night, he thought he might become a dead man in Ruidoso.

Meyer was visiting Ruidoso from Corpus Christi, Texas. He told police he was standing next to his rental van on Rio Street when he saw a weapon poking out from a car passenger window. The car was

speeding down the street toward Grindstone Canyon Road.

Meyer didn't know it was a sawed-off BB gun. The BBs missed him but shattered the rear window of the van, police said.

Minutes later, after Meyer chased the suspect's car down and witnessed two of the four boys in

the car enter a Santa Maria Drive home with a rifle, he called police.

Officers escorted the four juveniles to the police station and contacted their parents. Two were brothers from Ruidoso Downs, 14 and 17 years old, and two were boys from Ruidoso, ages 14 and 15.

While at the station, each of the boys allegedly admitted to shooting

the estimated \$400 window out as well as damaging other windows, police said.

All four were charged with criminal damage to property, a misdemeanor.

They were referred to juvenile probation authorities and will appear in juvenile court, police said.

"common sense," James said. It also concentrates on listening to the concerns of others.

"I learn by listening — it's the reason God gave us two ears and only one mouth."

Frank Cummins

Cummins, who's completing his first term of any elective office, said he'd like to give council service "another shot."

The retired school principal and educator said his primary second-term goal is to see some things get completed, especially construction of items passed in last year's bond issue election.

He's most proud of the passage of the bond issues, which he considers a "reflection of the council."

Cummins also applauds council efforts at bolstering village water supplies — something he'd like to make sure Ruidoso has an adequate supply of in future years.

"I'd like to make sure we continue providing services at a high level, and we provide services for the growth anticipated," Cummins said. "I feel good about the village, feel it's progressing in the right direction."

He described his governing technique as analytical, and characterized himself as "a quiet person — I don't look for controversy."

"While I like to see everything

get done, I'm not outspoken. I more or less go along in a quiet way, though I do have my opinions," he said.

Bob Sterchi

Sterchi, a P&Z commissioner for the past two years, said he would like to "lend a new voice, a new outlook on things," to the village council.

"I'm not being critical — I think this current council has run smoothly — but there are things I'd like to see get done," Sterchi said.

First and foremost, the retired senior vice president of Sun West Bank said he'd like "to see a more conciliatory attitude rather than

combative with our neighbors, the Mescalero."

Additionally, Sterchi said the Planning and Zoning department should be reorganized to make it more "user-friendly."

Sterchi, who described his governing style as "conservative, while believing in moderate growth control," said he believes voters should be given a choice, an alternative. Hence, his candidacy.

"I believe in term limits, so to speak. I don't think anyone should serve more than two terms — all a (representative) wants to accomplish should be done in that time," he said.

increasing the speed limit to 70 or 75 mph on U.S. 54, which runs through El Paso to Carrizozo to Vaughn and Santa Fe.

Another highway mentioned for a speed limit higher than 55 mph is U.S. 70 from Alamogordo to Roswell, he said.

"But in my view, before we take any action on the primarily two-lane section from Ruidoso Downs to Hondo, we need to look at how many people already have been

killed on that stretch," Williams said. "I think it may be the most dangerous section of highway in the state."

At this point, he is considering recommending that any speed limit increases be confined to four-lane roads and interstate highways. But he said he is open to other suggestions and has found officials in the state Highway and Transportation Department receptive to suggestions.

During the special meeting at 9 a.m. Monday in the county courthouse in Carrizozo,

commissioners will:

— elect a chairman and vice chairman for 1996. Mosaroy Montes has served as chairman for three years. Bill Schwetzmanna is the current vice chairman.

— convene as the county Board of Finance to review with County Treasurer Joan Park how and where county cash reserves are invested.

— hear Commissioner Wilton Howell present a specific plan for a property tax cut.

— possibly take action on a raise for employees and revamping of the pay matrix.

Other items on the Tuesday agenda at the courthouse include:

— recommendations from Don Scott of Radio Communications in Alamogordo on changes needed in the county's radio equipment and systems;

— a quarterly report from Rex Wilson,

chairman of the Lincoln County Public Land Use Advisory Committee;

— a 10 a.m. hearing on amendments to the county's collective bargaining ordinance;

— awarding a contract for an emergency services medical director;

— a report on proposed improvements and renovations at the county courthouse and at the suboffice in Ruidoso;

— appointment of a five-member road review committee;

— a status report on Fort Stanton by Howell;

— and a request for stricter enforcement of the Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance by two members of the preservation board.

The agendas for the two meetings were incomplete at press time. Additional items may be added or subjects may be removed before the meetings. Call 648-2385 for times.

IN REVIEW

Jan. 3 — Howard Dale Walthall, a businessman who recently donated a 40,000 square-foot Ruidoso commercial building to Eastern New Mexico University, dies following a sudden illness.

Jan. 5 — Former L.A. Rams football player Preston Denard visits Hondo Valley School. Denard talks to students about making correct lifetime decisions.

Jan. 9 — A new on-campus day care facility at Ruidoso High School opens in an attempt to help students with children stay in school.

Jan. 12 — The Ruidoso School District Mediation in the Schools program begins. The program trains children to deal with conflicts in a non-violent way.

Jan. 12 — The Ruidoso Municipal School District and The Ruidoso Village Council sign a cooperative agreement to construct a community recreation center on school property.

Jan. 16 — School board candidate Susan Randle files a complaint with the superintendent of schools after being told she could not campaign on school campuses. The superintendent calls the incident a misunderstanding.

Feb. 2 — More than 200 students, parents and onlookers gather at Ruidoso Middle School for the Third Annual Balloon Festival. Students launch more than 100 balloons constructed from heavy gauge tissue paper as they learn about flight patterns, temperature highs and lows, and balloon design.

Feb. 7 — Ruidoso School Board incumbents Susan Lutterman and Ronnie Hemphill are re-elected by a wide margin. Karen Anderson is also elected to the board to replace Mike Morris, who did not run.

Feb. 28 — More than 1,000 people attend the funeral of popular Ruidoso High School senior David Brian LaMay, who died in an automobile accident. LaMay was also an all-district linebacker on the Warrior football team. The funeral is held at the high school gym.

March 14 — Ruidoso Schools Superintendent Mike Gladden's pay is raised from \$59,585 to \$65,000 per year by the school board.

April 17 — The Ruidoso High School FFA Forestry Team wins first place at state competition hosted by the New Mexico State University College of Agriculture and Home Economics in Las Cruces.

April 11 — The Ruidoso School Board accepts district food service director Marcia Merrell's resignation. Merrell cites differences in philosophy concerning how the program should be operated, as the reason for her resignation.

April 18 — The 13th Annual Academic Awards Banquet honors 82 Ruidoso High School students with a grade point average of 3.5 or better. More than 650 people attend the event.

April 26 — Ruidoso Schools Superintendent Mike Gladden announces the district is planning for a no-growth 1995-96 school year because of a new middle and high school on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

May 2 — At a special Youth Empowered for Success/Drug Free Schools meeting, Ruidoso Police Detective Wolfgang Born recommends a closed campus at Ruidoso High School. Born says a closed campus policy would help reduce juvenile crime.

May 5 — White Mountain Elementary School students blast off in the Starship Enchantment Shuttle (a converted school bus). The shuttle program teaches children about science and space.

May 9 — Cafeteria workers express concerns during the Ruidoso School Board meeting. Board members call for proposals to contract food services for the 1995-96 school year.

May 9 — Eastern New Mexico University President Everett Frost says the university must ask for an additional one mill of taxes from Ruidoso property owners, because of changes in state funding regulations.

May 19 — The Ruidoso High School Supercomputer class is awarded the "Search and Browse Award" as part of the state-wide Supercomputer Challenge.

May 21 — Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso holds a reception for seven graduates at the Enchantment Inn, the largest number since the school opened in 1991.

May 25 — The Ruidoso High School Warrior Chorale wins first place at the Western New Mexico University Chorale Competition in Silver City. It's the first time in 10 years that the chorale has participated in competition.

May 25 — Diplomas are received by 98 Ruidoso High School seniors during graduation ceremonies.

June 5 — Operators of Starlite Montessori Schooling fear state regulations classifying the facility

as a day care center may force it to close.

June 10 — All five members of the Ruidoso School Board attend a law conference and retreat in Albuquerque.

June 21 — The Ruidoso School Board accepts a proposal from Aramark School Nutrition Services to provide district-wide food service.

June 29 — Ruidoso Middle School Principal Paula Papponi is chosen as the 1995 National Distinguished Principal for New Mexico.

July 11 — The Ruidoso School Board decides to hold an election asking for a one mill property tax increase for Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso.

Aug. 2 — Paula Papponi, Ruidoso Middle School principal for the past five years, accepts the position of superintendent for the Carrizozo School District.

Aug. 8 — National Education Association representative Henry Gonzales calls the decision by the Ruidoso School Board to deny three grievances "prejudiced."

Aug. 8 — Ruidoso High School Principal Ron Hodges announces a new closed campus policy for freshmen.

Aug. 8 — Former Hondo Schools Superintendent Sergio Castanon is selected by the Ruidoso School Board as the new principal of Ruidoso Middle School.

Aug. 21 — The Mescalero Apache Tribe opens a new middle and high school on the reservation.

Aug. 28 — Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso begins interactive instructional television classes.

Aug. 30 — Starlite Montessori school is granted a license to operate as a preschool and not a day care center by the New Mexico Department of Children, Youth and Families.

Sept. 8 — Erik Kakuska and Kara Castanon are named Ruidoso High School Warriors homecoming king and queen.

Sept. 9 — Ruidoso High School dedicates a memorial park. The park was constructed in remembrance of students who have died.

Sept. 12 — Subcommittees of the Ruidoso School District and the Ruidoso Education Association are formed to try to hash out collective bargaining differences.

Sept. 12 — Because of a fight during the Ruidoso High School Homecoming Dance, school dance policy is changed.

Sept. 15 — The Ruidoso School Board votes to enroll all levels, kindergarten through grade 12, in the North Central Association.

Sept. 26 — Voters support the proposed Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso tax hike by a landslide margin.

Oct. 2 — The Mescalero school system reports that 579 students have enrolled, with 186 in the new seventh through 12th grades.

Oct. 28 — Hundreds of costumed children attend the Fall Fest Carnival at Nob Hill Early Childhood Center.

Oct. 30 — The Ruidoso High School drama department presents the play "A Fatal Combination."

Nov. 3 — The window of a bus carrying students from Nob Hill Early Childhood Center is shot with a pellet or BB gun, causing

slight injury to a six-year-old. The perpetrators are not captured.

Nov. 14 — After long negotiations, the Ruidoso School Board and teachers ratify a new collective bargaining agreement. The new agreement gives district employees a 2% pay raise.

Nov. 30 — The new Mescalero Vocational Center graduates 11

first-phase students.

Dec. 14 — The Ruidoso School Board is named the 1995 New Mexico School Board of the Year.

Dec. 14 — The Ruidoso School District receives a \$19,000 grant from the New Mexico Department of Education Transportation Division. The grant will be used to implement a new computerized bus

system.

Dec. 14 — Ruidoso High School, middle school and intermediate school chorale groups join with the RHS 24 Karat Band for the Annual Combined Christmas Concert at the high school gym.

Dec. 18 — Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso moves into its new larger location at Sierra Vista Mall.

Minnesota senator's words seem callous

Many Southeast New Mexico residents would be shocked to see a press release Sen. Rod Grams of Minnesota sent to this newspaper.

We had asked Grams' office for information about his Congressional bill that seeks to allow private storage of commercial spent nuclear fuel, and his people sent us this press release. It was obviously written to please Minnesota residents. But here in New Mexico, it has the opposite effect on those who oppose the Mescalero Apache Tribe's plans to store Minnesota's waste.

"It's time to speed up the process of moving nuclear waste out of Minnesota," the press release quotes Grams as saying. "Further inaction by the federal government would only serve to threaten our environment." Grams went on to say.

"Increasing competition will always reduce costs and that's what my bill will encourage," Grams concluded. "More importantly, it will ensure the speedy removal of spent nuclear fuel from Minnesota and a cleaner, safer environment for our children and grandchildren."

Even if you don't oppose the Mescalero storage site, Grams' words seem callous. Isn't he supposed to represent the United States, not just Minnesota? Doesn't he care about our children and grandchildren, too?

The end result of his words is to spread fear amongst those in Southeast New Mexico — fear that, if Minnesota's senator thinks the waste is dangerous for his state, then maybe it's dangerous for ours, too.

Ski Apache needs to offer break on lift tickets

TO THE EDITOR:

Like so many Texas families, we enjoy coming to Ruidoso in the winter to ski and in the summer to escape the heat. I am writing to comment on the lift ticket rates at Ski Apache.

I learned to ski at Sierra Blanca. I taught my wife and my two young kids to ski there. We have skied at every ski area in New Mexico and we always enjoy coming back to Ruidoso. The ski area offers a good variety of runs but even more so, the village of Ruidoso offers incomparable accommodations, good restaurants and an ambience that cannot be found elsewhere in the state.

This year we went to Sunrise Park Resort in eastern Arizona, a ski area owned and operated by the White Mountain Apache Tribe. It is only about a 4.5-hour drive from Ruidoso.

Like Ski Apache, Sunrise is off to a late start due to lack of snow. Consequently, we skied one day for \$8 per person. When more of the mountain opened up, we skied for \$12 per adult and \$8 for the kids. The conditions were good on the slopes that were open, and it was certainly comparable to the Ski Apache slopes we experienced on our way back to Texas (Capitan chair and the Lincoln chair to Midway).

However, Ski Apache started with a "reduced" ticket price of \$29 for adults and \$18 for the kids (regularly \$36/\$23). Without providing any substantial additional skiing, the tickets shot up to the even higher holiday rates of \$39/\$25. I checked back with Sunrise and reduced prices of \$15/\$10 were in effect throughout the holiday period.

Sunrise offers three mountains of skiing, beautiful facilities, and \$29/\$16 lift tickets throughout the season. I have talked to Ruidosians who are involved in the ski business, and they always tell me that it costs a lot to make snow, which

I'm sure is true.

However, there are two principles that are being missed here by Ski Apache. First, people still want something for their money. Second, Ski Apache has never offered families any monetary break, which is shortsighted when considering that young skiers of today will be adult skiers of tomorrow with kids of their own, if they are not priced out of recreational skiing. And that is why we will probably continue to visit Ruidoso in the summer but take our ski trips elsewhere.

Store employee allegedly caught stealing thousands

Allegedly caught on video taking large bills from cash drawers, Ruidoso Wal-Mart employee Bennie Brazell, Jr. was arrested Wednesday on embezzlement charges.

Brazell, 56, of Ruidoso, was charged with the third-degree felony after Wal-Mart managers presented evidence to police that he'd taken \$3,030 from store registers between Oct. 31 and Jan. 2.

Despite a signed confession obtained by Wal-Mart, Brazell told Ruidoso Police Detective Jim Biggs he didn't take all the missing money, Biggs said. Brazell only admitted to stealing \$300 from a cash register Tuesday — cash he returned after being confronted by store manager Mike Daulton, Biggs said.

After his arrest, Brazell pleaded innocent at his Ruidoso Magistrate

Court arraignment. He was later released on an unsecured \$10,000 bond.

Daulton told police he learned of Tuesday's \$300 theft when a store employee was cashing out Brazell's drawer. Brazell had just been fired from his job in the electronics department, and was collecting his things when the missing \$300 was noticed.

Brazell was being fired for allegedly stealing \$2,730. Daulton told police Brazell admitted he took the money from various cash registers beginning Oct. 31.

The store manager specified to police the amounts taken and the dates of the thefts:

Oct. 31 — \$250; Nov. 2 — \$160; Nov. 22 — \$550; Nov. 28 — \$400; Nov. 29 — \$200; Dec. 12 — \$400; Dec. 20 — \$350; Dec. 23 — \$60; Dec. 28 — \$50; Jan. 1 — \$310.

NMSU professor polls county jails

A New Mexico State University professor is surveying county jails throughout the state, including Lincoln County's, to see if they properly handle inmates with communicable disease, drug problems or mental illness.

The survey is titled "Special Needs Inmates in New Mexico Jails" and is coordinated by NMSU Criminal Justice Professor Larry Mays with Dan Judiscak, a graduate student in the department.

A 10-page questionnaire is being mailed to all the jails.

One of the survey's benefits will be to assess each jail's potential for being sued.

"If there is any truth to the old cliché that 'to be forewarned is to be forearmed,' then this project should provide a sufficient amount of feedback to the individual jails," Mays said. The New Mexico County Insurance Authority, responsible for providing indemnity for county governments, has reviewed the survey.

The survey will ask about the

number of mentally ill, chemically dependent or infectious disease-carrying inmates housed in New Mexico jails during the past year. It also will ask what treatment programs exist for dealing with these inmates.

The results of the survey, the first of its kind in New Mexico, could help set standards for the state's jails. New Mexico currently has no standards for the operation of county or city jails. Mays attributes this void to the public's perception of criminal justice.

"The politically-conservative viewpoint says these people are criminals and they deserve to be in jail, so lock them up and throw away the key," Mays said. "Side by side with that, we have fiscal conservatism that says we shouldn't spend a lot of money on jails."

Results of the survey will be sent to jail administrators and the New Mexico County Insurance Authority. Final results of the survey are expected in May 1996.

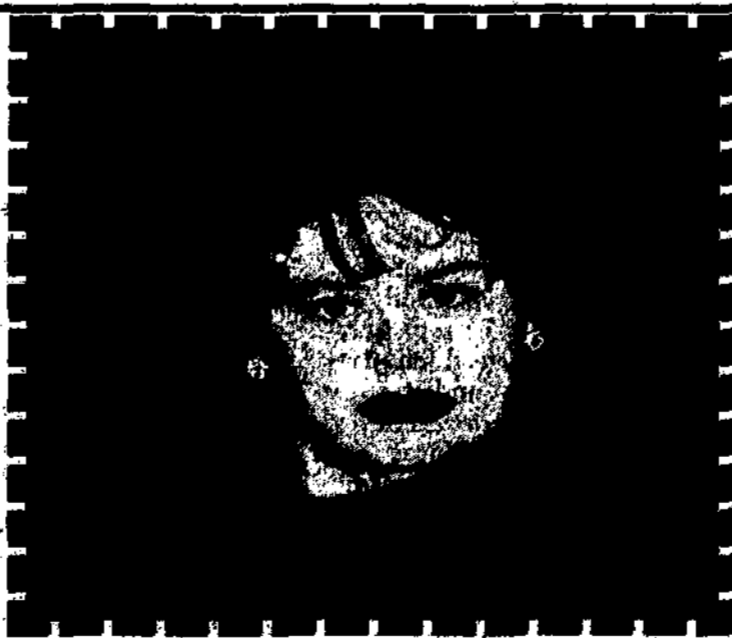

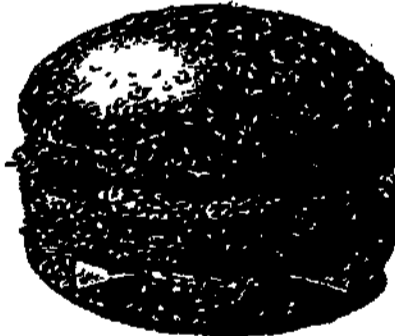

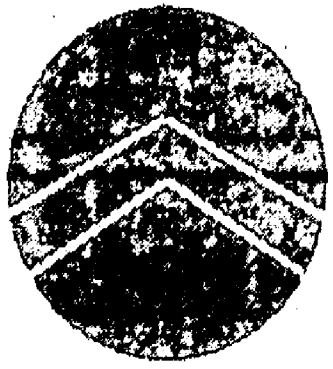

Instructors needed for SAHSA students

Increased demand for Ski Apache Handicapped Skiers' Association services has SAHSA director Lisa Mauve scrambling for more volunteers.

Volunteer instructor training takes place this weekend, and Mauve is accepting applicants up to the last minute.

"We're getting a lot more kids who are multi-disabled from the School for the Visually Handicapped (SVH, in Alamogordo), and they require more than one instructor," Mauve explained. "Also there are more of them. So right now, the number of kids we can take is entirely dependant on the number of volunteers we have. We'll probably have to turn away some kids (from SVH)."

Last year SAHSA had more than 200 participants. Of those, 17 were partially or totally blind students and five were multi-disabled from SVH. Linda Zimmerly, recreation coordinator at SVH, said that number will increase because her school's elementary and secondary populations have increased.

"This is probably one of their only opportunities to be involved in a program like this," Zimmerly

said. "For many of our students, it fits in with their IEP (individual educational plan)."

The children ski one day a week for six consecutive weeks beginning the week of Jan. 22. Volunteers are needed on Monday and/or Wednesday during that period.

A training clinic is scheduled for this Saturday and Sunday. It will cover what to expect, how to teach and pointers on personal skiing. The clinic will be held from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. both days at Ski Apache.

Volunteers should be strong intermediate skiers, more than 18 years old, and have access to ski equipment. Lift tickets will be provided for the training clinic, plus on the days volunteers work.

Mauve said she'll also schedule an additional clinic for volunteers who will teach visually-impaired skiers. That clinic will be held from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 13.

Completion of the clinic will also certify volunteers as Special Olympic coaches in alpine skiing. Additional training clinics will be held as time permits throughout January.

New owners give Ruidoso Athletic Club a facelift

The place where Ruidosoans raise their heart rates, build their biceps and sculpt their bodies has been getting a workout itself lately.

After a month of renovations, the Ruidoso Athletic Club reopens for business Monday, Jan. 8. The new operators will show off the RAC's facelift Saturday in a grand opening.

Jerry Bourassa and Edmund Chantler, business partners in the venture, have worked nearly every day for the past month getting the health club in shape for its reopening.

Chantler promises a better product that meets the needs of club members.

"We want the name to be the same, but the facility and the whole attitude to be different," says Chantler, who was a top administrator for Bourassa's physical therapy practice in Prescott, Ariz.

Surrounded by dismantled Nautilus machines in the upper balcony, Chantler rattles off a list of some of the major renovations — new ceiling, new paint, new carpet, and new tile. The list goes on. The wood floors in the two racquetball courts and in the aerobics room have been refinished, as well as the sauna and the wood ceiling in the jacuzzi room. Even the lockerroom bathrooms were gutted and redone.

Chantler estimates he and Bourassa will spend at least \$40,000 in remodeling alone — that's not including the cost of new exercise equipment or the computer management system.

The basic layout of the club remains the same with one excep-

tion. The free weights and Nautilus equipment have swapped locations. Chantler hopes to reduce the noise level in the club with the quieter Nautilus and cardiovascular machines on the upper balcony.

In addition to five new cardiovascular machines by StairMaster, the RAC will have a computer management system that Chantler says is more consumer-oriented.

The computer system features a bar code reader and video imager to monitor memberships. RAC workers will be able to pull up a picture of a club member on the computer screen. The system, which ranges in price from \$8,000-15,000, keeps track of court reservations and aerobics scheduling as well.

"We can tell when to staff people, and it tells us what equipment people are using," the 25-year-old Chantler says. That information will help the RAC owners determine business hours and what new equipment to purchase based on members' usage.

The computer system also has a body composition analysis program which will provide nutritional, exercise and cardiovascular level readouts for members. With this complete baseline information, members can chart their progress and improvement.

Club members will have to pay more for a membership (a yearly membership costs \$36 more, at \$360), but Chantler says it's worth it. The cost for a one-time visit will increase from a flat \$5 rate to \$6 for residents and \$8 for non-residents.

"You get a lot more club for a little more money," he says.

In addition to the new equipment, club users will have access to free training supervisors who can show them which equipment to use and how to get the best results.

"We'd rather make exercising a positive experience, rather than something they dread," Chantler says.

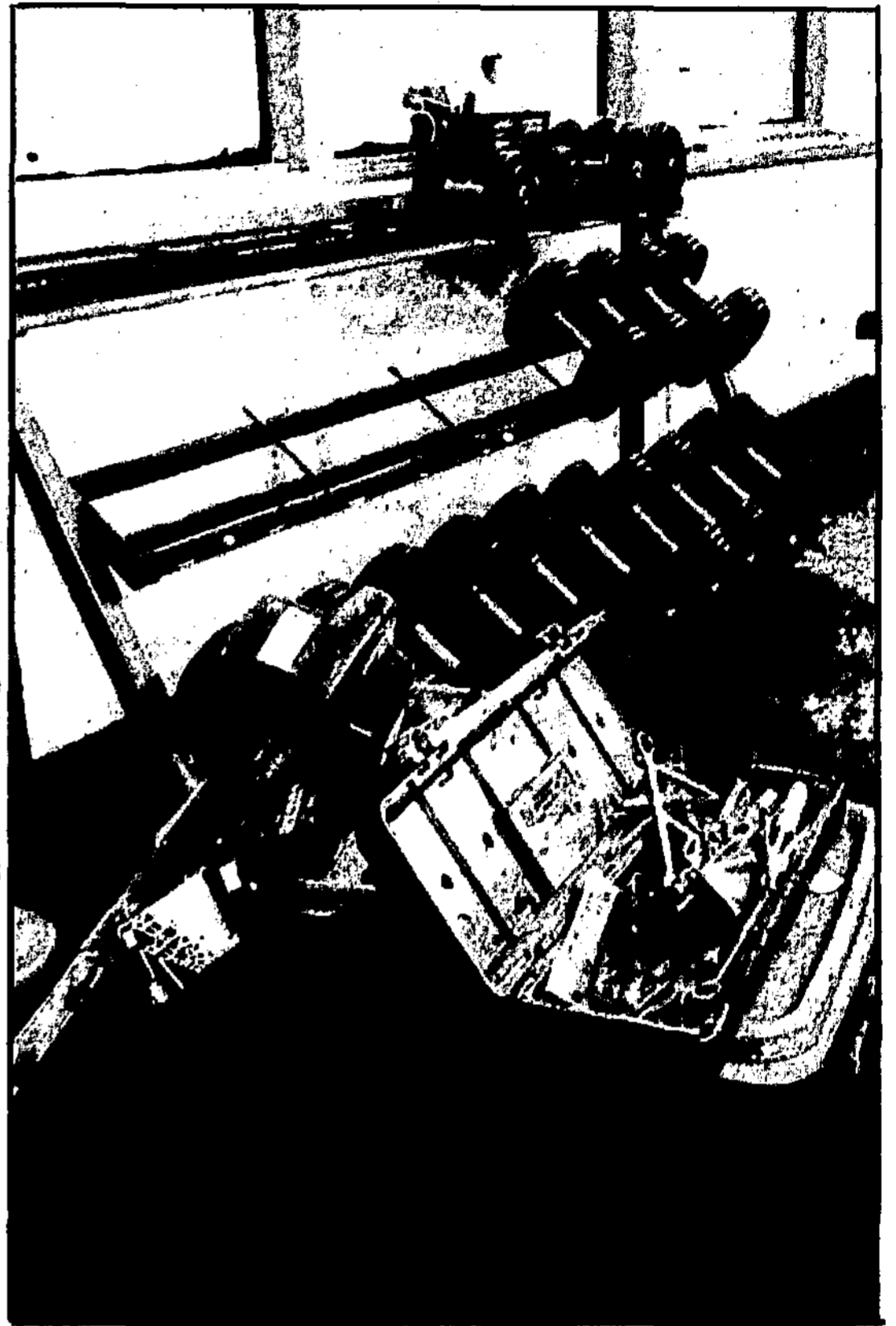
Supervising and taking part in the remodeling of the health club has kept Chantler and Bourassa busy. It's been a month of long workdays at the RAC building that, in the past, has been used as a night club, a gym and a school.

The health club business can be somewhat tenuous, but Chantler says his and Bourassa's business experience and expertise in the exercise field are pluses. Bourassa is a licensed physical therapist, and Chantler majored in exercise physiology at the University of Arizona.

"We're not tourist-oriented. Our lifeblood is the locals — that's who we want to cater to. We are going to meet the needs of the community. As long as the community gives us a chance, we're in for the long haul," Chantler explains.

Bourassa has eyed Ruidoso for several years, and the pair were interested in the RAC for the last 18 months, Chantler says. Jeanie and Paul Witwam sold the RAC to Bourassa in December.

The 35-year-old Bourassa and his wife, Nancy (also a physical therapist), have bought a home in the area. Chantler's wife, Janel, will relocate as soon she finds a nursing job.

New Mexico officials offer free child car seats to AFDC clients

More New Mexico children will now ride safely in vehicles, thanks to a new program.

The only program of its kind in the nation provides free car seats to Aid for Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) recipients.

New Mexico has approximately 4,000 AFDC births annually. The goal of this program is to provide quality car seats to all AFDC recipients. In collaboration with 13 hospitals across the state, approximately 1,700 AFDC recipients will receive car seats and training by

June 30, 1996.

In 1994, 19 children were killed in New Mexico motor vehicle crashes and 3,009 were injured; and 510 were incapacitated or disabled; 79% of the children were not wearing seat belts or riding in child safety seats. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, correct use of car seats is 71% effective in reducing death and injury to infants and children in motor vehicle crashes.

The AFDC car seats are the result of a collaborative effort be-

tween the New Mexico Department of Health (DOH), New Mexico Human Services Department (HSD), New Mexico Hospitals & Health Systems Association (NMHSA), New Mexico Traffic Safety Bureau (TSB) and Safer New Mexico Now (SNMN). A joint powers agreement between the DOH and HSD will make \$80,500 available to purchase the car seats.

The AFDC car seat program's goal is to help increase child restraint use, thereby protecting more of New Mexico's children.

Ruidoso volunteer tax counselor receives training

The Internal Revenue Service estimates that volunteer tax counselors saved the government \$50 million during this year's tax season.

To get ready for the next tax season, AARP Tax-Aide leadership from around New Mexico met Dec. 11 and 12 in Albuquerque. Dale E. Miller attended from Ruidoso.

Attendees will be returning to their home communities armed with IRS training, exams, and

manuals. Classes are scheduled for early January around the state and, after passing IRS exams, volunteers will be certified to provide free help to older low and moderate-income taxpayers.

This year's trainers will include Josie Uber from the Internal Revenue Service, Pola Richardson from New Mexico's Taxation and Revenue Department, and Patricia Tucker from UNM's Anderson School of Business.

Dan Storm sees silver lining throughout his life

During a long Alaska winter in the early 1900s, young Dan Storm asked his mother if the sun was ever going to shine.

Bertha Storm led him to a window and pointed to the horizon.

"If you look closely you can see the silver lining in the sky," Bertha Storm said. "And just beyond that silver lining is the sunshine."

Bertha Storm's lesson remained with Dan throughout the years, eventually resurfacing as a weekly column in *The Ruidoso News* called "The Silver Lining" in 1962.

"I've always been kind of a happy, upbeat guy," Dan related. "There was so much bad news in the world that I want people to see that silver lining."

Born in Valdez, Alaska on Oct. 27, 1909, Daniel Agnew Storm was the second of five Storm boys.

"John was the oldest, then myself, then Mark, Joseph, and Lynn," he said. "Joseph was killed in World War II and John has died."

The youngest brother in the Storm clan is Lynn, 81, a rancher who lives in Dripping Springs, Texas.

Mark Storm, 84, is a painter of western scenes living in Houston. He recently finished construction of a house at Dan's Storm Ranch, just east of Ruidoso Downs.

"Mark is going to be spending as much time here as he can," Dan said. "In his early days here, he was a cowboy, and a lot of the inspiration for his pictures comes from that experience and the beauty of this area."

It's easy to see how Storm Ranch could inspire art. Nestled between mountains, the ranch is an idyllic picture of tranquility.

The patriarch of the Storm family was Lynn Whippo Storm, a mining engineer and government surveyor. After working in Alaska, father Storm's job took the family to El Paso, Texas. It was while living in El Paso that Dan's mother Bertha first heard about Ruidoso.

"Since we were used to the cool weather in Alaska, when my mother heard about Ruidoso, we had to come see," Dan said. "We first started buying what became Storm Ranch in 1925."

When Dan's father became a geologist based in Houston, the family spent the winters in Austin and the summers in Ruidoso, he said.

After graduating from Austin High School, the Storm brothers attended the University of Texas at

Austin. Dan graduated in 1932 with a journalism degree, Mark graduated with a degree in architecture, Lynn received his degree in petroleum engineering and Joe Storm graduated with a degree in economics.

"After graduation, I did some freelance writing for the Dallas News and wrote for publications produced by the Texas Folklore Society," Dan said.

Attending a university class in southwestern literature kindled a passion for folklore which would eventually lead Dan to publish a book of Mexican folk stories.

"When I was a boy in Alaska, my grandparents sent me some children's books about animals," Dan said. "Years later, when I began collecting folklore, I decided to send one of the folk tales to the publisher of one of those children's books."

The publisher, Fredrick Stokes, first published "Picture Tales From Mexico" in 1941, but that version has been out of print for many years.

Dan's book has recently been revived and is being published and distributed nationally by the Grothe Publishing Company from

Houston.

"The pictures in the book are all by my brother Mark," he said. "And I still hope to write a little more about folklore."

Writing isn't the only form of entertainment Dan's been involved in.

"If you look closely you can see the silver lining in the sky. And just beyond that silver lining is the sunshine."

silent moviemaker," Dan said. "I played as an extra in a few movies while I was there."

Dan's most memorable movie experience was as an extra in "The Bowery," starring Fay Wray and Wallace Berry.

"I met movie producer Daryl Zanuck and he said that he would let me know as soon as he could find me a speaking part that would get my name on screen," Dan said. "But time lapsed and I didn't like it out there, so I came home."

Dan joined the Army in 1943 to fight in World War II. As a member of the 32nd Infantry Division, he saw action in the Philippines.

"Fortunately, by then the Japanese were on the retreat," he said. "I was married briefly before World War II but it didn't work out after I got back."

Returning to Storm Ranch in 1946, Dan worked briefly as a reporter at The Roswell Daily Dispatch.

"When *The Ruidoso News* started in 1946, I started writing news stories and features for them," he said.

Dan continued writing and living at Storm Ranch with his parents. His mother died in 1954 and his father died in 1962.

Besides his folklore research and column writing, Dan keeps busy caring for his 28 head of cattle and his cat Corina, who yesterday was still at the vet's office fighting a kidney infection.

"She just showed up 13 years ago, and ever since, she's been the Storm Ranch Cat," he said.

Dan is also active in civic and church events, and is a member of the local chapters of the Veteran's of Foreign Wars and the American Legion.

He still gets in a little acting every year.

"Except for two years, I've been involved in the Lincoln Pageant every year since 1939," he said. "Since 1946 I've been a lay reader with the Episcopal Church and now I'm the oldest lay reader in the Episcopal Diocese of the Rio Grande, which takes in all of New Mexico and parts of Texas."

After writing "The Silver Lining" for two decades since 1962, Dan added "The Dreamer" in the early 80's for the other News issue of the week.

"The editor of *The Ruidoso News* at that time was Al Lane," he said. "One day he asked me if I would dream up another column, so I came up with "The Dreamer" and I've been writing both columns ever since."

By now, Dan Storm is a Lincoln County treasure to readers who faithfully read each of his upbeat columns. Those who meet him in person instinctively know that he is what he writes; he could never say a bad word about anyone or anything.

After more than three decades, Dan continues to give readers a glimpse into a world filled with songbirds and flowers, sunshine and little calves.

Here are a few "Dan Stormisms:"

— "I want to emphasize the happy side of life and make people grateful for what we have, especially nature and the outdoors."

— "I've always loved songbirds because to me they are my little link between heaven and earth, little messengers of happiness."

— "I've always been interested in wildflowers, and we used to go gather violets and bluebells and other wildflowers at the edge of the snow."

— "I enjoy seeing the little calves come in the spring... that's a great inspiration."

— "My whole life is based on my faith in the good Lord and my Christian outlook."

— "I see the Lord's work in the little calves that come every spring and the birds that come and sing, and I'm grateful for such a wonderful family, brothers and my parents."

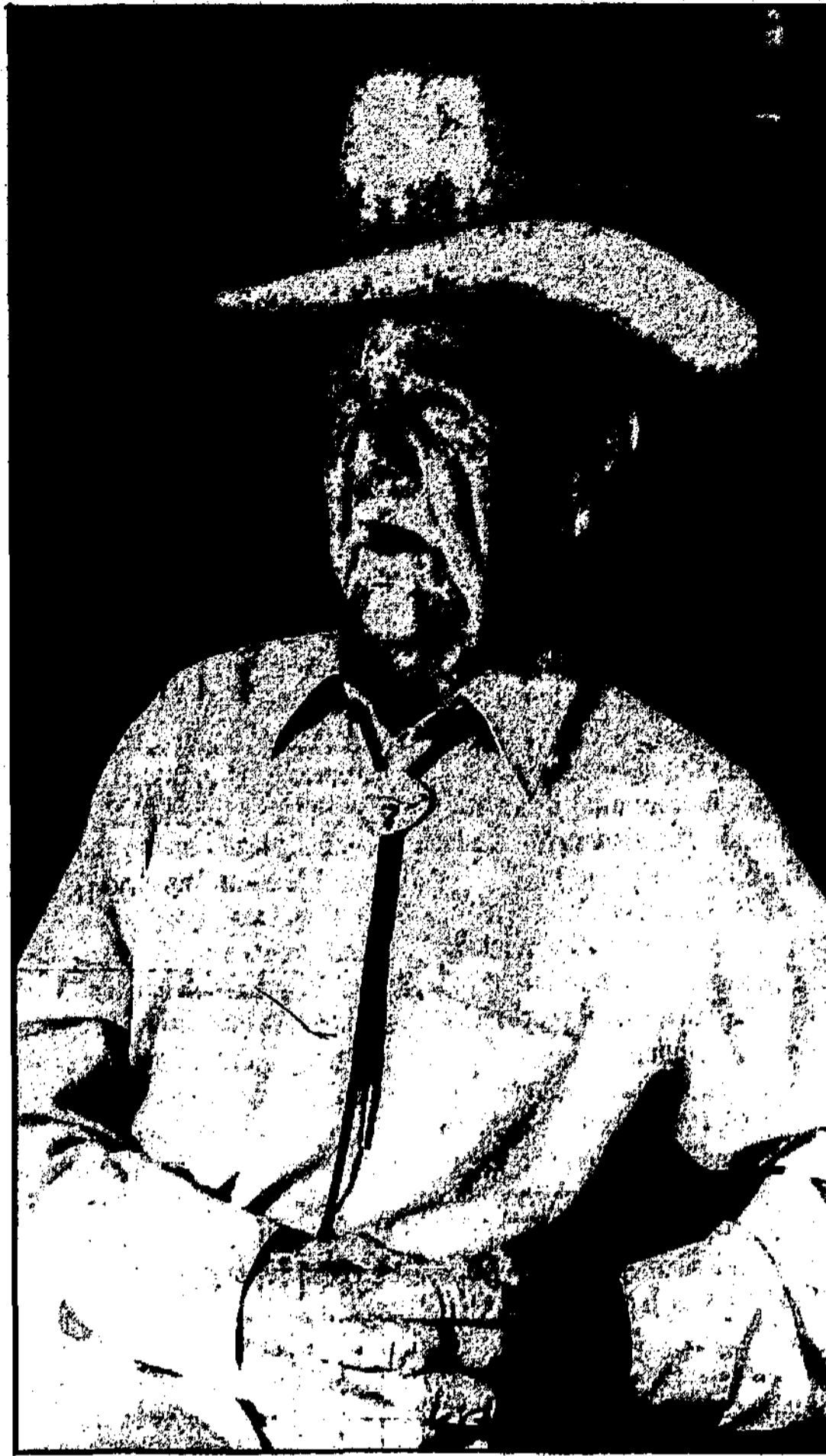
— "I love children. I never had children, but I think they are the little angels of this world, and maybe in heaven I'll get to have some."

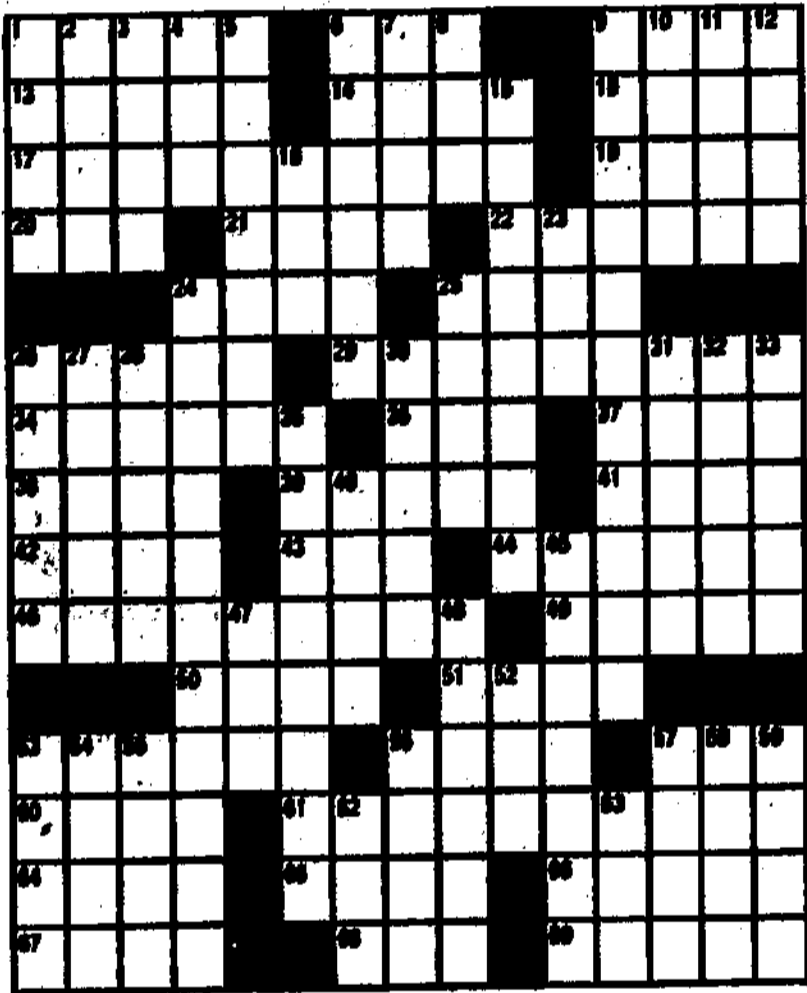

illness in his family, Chair Cece Griffin announced. She appointed Cathy Garrison of Ruidoso for a holiday festivity and to conduct some business.

State senator Pete Campos sent word that he had planned to attend the holiday meeting, but he was called away to a Democrat caucus in Santa Fe. Campos is the caucus chairman.

Ketchum's bad luck catches up with him on scaffold

What's in a name? Plenty, if you were to ask a fellow named Tom Ketchum, an outlaw in New Mexico around the turn of the century.

Tom and his brother Sam hailed from Texas, where Tom first got into trouble in December of 1895. As might be expected, the trouble was serious. Murder, to be exact. It seems Tom was hired as a paid assassin along with two other "enterprising" young men.

Their target was a man named Jap Powers, a neighbor of the Ketchums in Green County, Texas. So there may have been more to the killing than just pay, at least for Tom.

When he fled the state, his brother Sam went with him, presumably for no other reason than family loyalty since Sam had done nothing wrong — yet.

Curiously, Sam was 41 years old, a bit long in the tooth to start on a career of crime. But start he did, with a vengeance.

One night in June of 1896, the two brothers looted a store near present-day Tucumcari, belonging to a man named Levi Herstein. The following morning, Herstein and a posse of three friends went in pursuit. This turned out to be a serious error in judgment on the part of the storekeeper.

When the posse caught up with the miscreants, some 25 miles from the scene of the crime, a gun battle erupted. When it was over, one of the possemen had fled, two others lay dead (including Herstein), and the last only survived by playing dead.

The Ketchums continued to keep busy. In the summer of 1896, they stopped the Texas Flyer and made a sizable withdrawal.

They seemed to be everywhere. Apparently they felt that practice really does make perfect when they waylaid and robbed the White Oaks-San Antonio stage not once, but twice.

However, when they went to rob another train near Stein's Pass on the New Mexico/Arizona line, things got a little dicey.

Wells Fargo, never happy being victimized, had anticipated the raid. When the train stopped for the bandits and the express car doors slid open, it was full of Wells Fargo agents bearing not gifts, but shotguns.

For a half an hour, the outlaws and the lawmen blazed away at each other with no real damage to either side. Then one of the outlaws, Tom Cullen, peeked around the rock he was hiding behind to get a better look at the action and caught a shotgun blast in the face. The other outlaws fled in disarray.

This was the end for the Ketchums as a gang. The other outlaws, tired of what they considered to be Tom's inept leadership and surly personality, decided to split up the gang. In the end, Tom simply went off by himself. Even his brother had abandoned him.

Sam Ketchum was keeping busy without Tom. He and his gang robbed the Colorado and Southern Flyer on July 11, 1899. A special posse, consisting mostly of Colorado lawmen, took off in hot pursuit.

They caught up with the bandits in a place called Turkey Creek Canyon. When the gun-smoke cleared, one lawman was dead, and two of the bandits, including Sam Ketchum, were wounded.

The outlaws escaped from the canyon, but Sam was captured a day or two later. Blood poisoning had set in, and he died of his shoulder wound on July 24, 1899.

One of the most famous outlaw gangs of that era was known as "The Black Jack Gang" led by Black Jack Christian. Because they looked somewhat alike, Tom Ketchum became confused with Black Jack Christian by both law officers and the citizenry.

Both men were tall, dark, and powerfully built. Both were bandits. And while it had nothing to do with the con-

fusion surrounding their identities, both were destined to die young like Sam already had.

In 1897, Black Jack Christian was killed. But in the public mind, Black Jack was still alive. His name was Tom Ketchum.

Law enforcement officers stepped up their attempts to track him down. As far as they were concerned, Tom Ketchum had actually inherited another man's crimes.

Not that Tom didn't commit enough crimes of his own. For example, on July 2, 1899, he was fingered as the lone gunman who rode into Camp Verde, Ariz. and gunned down two men for no apparent reason.

Just a few weeks after his brother died (unbeknownst to him), Tom made a bold attempt to rob a train alone on

the night of Aug. 16, 1899.

At gunpoint, Tom forced the train crew back towards the baggage car and demanded they open the doors. A mail clerk in the next coach poked his head out to see what was happening and took a bullet in the jaw.

At the same time, a conductor by the name of Frank Harrington was creeping cautiously toward the lone outlaw. When he got as close as he dared, he stepped into the open. Ketchum, catching the movement out of the corner of his eye, whirled and fired.

His bullet grazed Harrington, who let loose with his shotgun at the same time. Tom took most of the blast in his right arm. The outlaw staggered off into the dark, and the train continued on into the night.

Tom Ketchum, alone and badly wounded, decided to surrender to the next train that came along. At seven the next morning, he did precisely that, and was taken into custody.

At the prison where he was awaiting trial, surgeons amputated his shattered right arm.

The authorities were delighted. Black Jack had been captured! No matter that it wasn't the real Black Jack. As far as everyone but Tom Ketchum was concerned, he was Black Jack.

Things hadn't gone well. Sam was dead, Tom had lost his arm and was in custody, and to make matters really bad, the penalty for train robbing in those days was death. New Mexico had so many train robberies that it had been made a capital offense.

While awaiting execution, Tom had become somewhat embittered. He claimed that he had never killed anyone, and that the people he had spared from death testified against him without a touch of sympathy and had thereby encouraged the sentence of death.

He particularly blamed his troubles on Frank Harrington, the railroad conductor who had shot him. As time passed, Tom began to blame Harrington for everything short of the eruption of Mt. Vesuvius. One of his last requests was to be buried face down so that "Harrington can kiss my ass."

He also had some words of wisdom for the youth of America: "My advice to the boys of the country is not to steal horses or sheep, but either to rob a train or a bank when you have got to be an outlaw, and every man who comes in your way, kill him; spare him no mercy, for he will show you none. This is the way I feel, and I think I feel right about it."

The mothers of the boys he was addressing would undoubtedly disagree.

On April 26, 1901, Tom "Black Jack" Ketchum mounted the 13 steps of the gallows in Clayton, N.M.

The people of Clayton had never had their own outlaw to hang before, and they were pretty excited about it. However, their inexperience in these matters was about to have a horrific side effect.

After the sheriff had placed the noose and the black hood over Ketchum's head, he asked "Are you ready?" Ketchum's muffled voice replied "Ready. Let 'er go!" Whatever else he was, Tom Ketchum was no coward.

His body plunged through the trap, but the authorities had botched the job. Whether his body was overweighted, or the missing right arm threw the balance off, no one really knew. But the force of the drop was so powerful that it separated Ketchum's head from his body.

People were thoughtful in those days. They sewed his head back on before they buried him.

In 1933 Ketchum was disinterred and moved to the new Clayton cemetery. One of the cowboys he had known in his trail-driving days, a man named Jack Potter, had the coffin opened and he placed a note on the amazingly well-preserved body.

The note had only six words: "To a cowboy who went wrong."

POOP SCOOP

Despite access to overnight drop cages at the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter, people continue to dispose of their pets in cruel and inhumane ways.

Shelter administrator Jim Riggins related a recent incident:

"When we arrived to clean the shelter (on Gavilan Canyon Road) one icy and frigid morning, the employees of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Transfer Station next to the shelter came over and told us someone had abandoned some animals.

"We found five, eight-week-old puppies and an injured female we assumed to be 'Mom' had been tossed into one of the large transfer dumpsters. They were extremely hungry, dehydrated and suffering from hypothermia.

"The mother recently had one eye poked out and had a sprained or broken leg, possibly from jumping from the dumpster.

"Less than 100 feet from this sad scene were our drop off cages complete with blankets, a dog house and a gate to prevent escape. In fact, anyone approaching the dumpster must pass the cages."

Some people appear to be afraid to do the right thing by calling animal control or bringing animals to the shelter.

Giving people the benefit of the doubt, Riggins said the following

misconceptions may be the cause:

— they believe they will be charged for dropping the animals at the shelter, but there is no charge for animals left there or picked up by animal control.

— they think shelter employees will lecture them or try to make them feel guilty.

"The truth is we encourage and appreciate people doing the responsible thing and we provide the drop-off cages for people who are shy or who work odd hours," Riggins said.

— they think the animals will be killed if left at the shelter.

"Ruidoso has the rare opportunity of adopting out literally every healthy animal it received because there are no mandatory time limits on how long they may be held," Riggins said.

— they believe if they dump the animals, someone else will give them a home.

"Stray dogs are almost never a welcome part of a neighborhood," Riggins said. "Abandonment is more often than not a grizzly death sentence from cars, the cold, diseases and cruelty.

"On a happy note, we were able to save these five pups and nurse them to adoptable health. We hope that people seeing this story will save their animals the miserable and dangerous night these babies suffered through."

WHAT DOES MEDICARE COVER?

Medicare is designed to cover the cost of health care for senior citizens and the permanently disabled. That includes eye health care, too.

As long as the care of a licensed optometrist is necessary for a health-related condition, symptom or complaint, Medicare will pay for up to 80% of the visit. Anyone with a history of diabetes or headaches, for example, would be covered for the cost of an office visit. Blurred side vision, which might indicate glaucoma, should signal a visit to the optometrist. The visit, including a field test for glaucoma, would be covered up to the allowable amount. Likewise, testing for cataracts is a Medicare approved expense. Frames and lenses needed after cataract surgery are also covered.

Dr.s Gutowski and Sonnenmoser treat eye conditions as well as diagnose them. Medicare also approves these expenses. If you have any questions about what eye health expenses Medicare will cover, Dr.s Gutowski and Sonnenmoser will be happy to discuss them.

"THE GULF WAR"

For seven months between 1990 and 1991, the standoff in the Persian Gulf dominated the world stage as more than one million troops faced each other in the desert.

Marking the fifth anniversary of the war with Iraq, Frontline presents "The Gulf War," an authoritative four-hour history that documents what really happened during the invasion of Kuwait, the months of diplomatic maneuvering, the air war and ground assault, and the post-war rebellion inside Iraq.

The first two hours of "The Gulf War" examine the misunderstandings that blinded the U.S. to Saddam Hussein's intentions to invade Kuwait — the struggles inside the U.S. government about how to respond to the invasion, the diplomatic and domestic political maneuvering that formed an international coalition and American political support for war, and the conflict's first act — the devastating air campaign against Baghdad.

"The first twenty-four hours consisted of more attacks in the master attack plan than the entire number of targets that were targeted in the years 1942 and 1943 during the combined bomber offensive in Europe," says air planner Lieutenant Colonel David Deptula.

The second half of "The Gulf War" focuses on the tensions inside the U.S. military command during the one-hundred-hour ground war and how the stunning U.S. military victory was tainted by the war's ragged end.

To everyone's surprise, the initial Allied ground assault met little resistance. Eight thousand Iraqis were captured in the first hours of the war. After six weeks of bombing, half of the front line army had already deserted.

On the third day of the ground war, Frank's VII Corps finally encountered the Republican Guard and destroyed many Soviet built tanks in a short, bloody, one-sided battle.

But the assault on the Republican Guard was racing against the clock. Already in Washington, there was talk of ending the war soon. General Powell, in particular, was concerned that television pictures of the "Highway of Death," the massive destruction of Iraqi convoys escaping north out of Kuwait City, would soon be broadcast and turn the public against the war.

The talks between Powell, Cheney, Schwarzkopf, and President Bush had reached agreement — the slaughter had gone on long enough. President Bush announced the end of the war. Hussein was elated.


Final observations include those of Bernard Trainor who, five years later, says, "We are still tied up there. We've got thousands of troops down there, trying to protect the Shiites and the Kurds. We send forces down into Kuwait for exercises every time Saddam Hussein makes a move towards the Kuwait border. So, it was an inconclusive war... a modest victory that was snatched from the jaws of triumph."

"We can grind our teeth forever as to whether we should have fought a day or two longer," says General Powell. "But we ought to recognize the significant achievement that Desert Storm was. President Bush said, 'This will not stand.' That did not stand."

AUDITS (NONCREDIT)

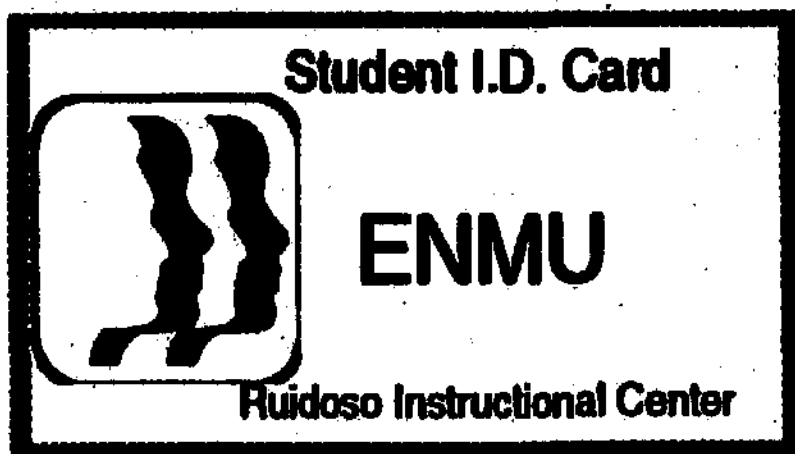

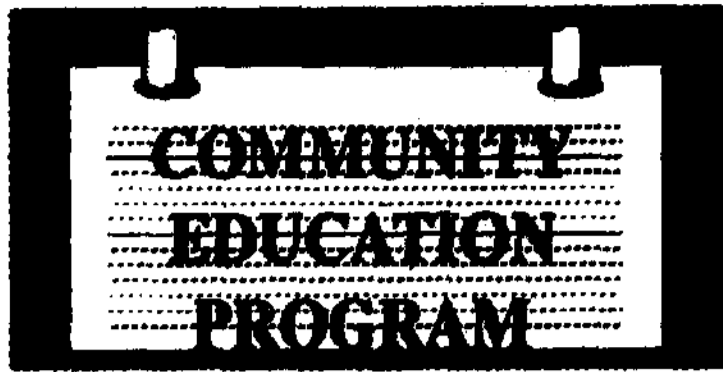
HOUSING REFERRAL SERVICE
