## Unemployment rate high locally since fort closed

The closing of Fort Stanton last March boosted Lincoln County's unemployment rate by nearly 3%, according to unemployment statistics from the state Labor Department.

Lincoln County's unemployment rate in November 1995, the latest figure available, was exactly 2% higher than the statewide rate of 6.2%. Out of a county labor force of 6,806 people, 556 were unemployed.

A year earlier in November 1994, 5.9% of the county's labor force of 6,802 was unemployed, equaling 403 people. That compared favorably to the statewide rate of 5.3%.

Before Gov. Gary Johnson closed the fort, which was being used as a state hospital, the county's unemployment numbers placed steadily under 6%.

In March, the rate was 5.8%. By April, after 200 jobs at the fort 20 miles northeast of Ruidoso had been transferred or terminated, the rate jumped to 8.6%, said statistics specialist Jerry Bradley.

"Other than the summer months when the rate traditionally dips, it has been riding at more than 8%," since April 1995, Bradley said. In July, 1995, it went down to 7.1%.

Bradley said he's unsure how many new jobs have been provided for Lincoln County residents at Casino Apache on the Mescalero Apache reservation that abuts Ruidoso.

"We don't get reports very often and it's difficult for us to track," he said. "They also contend they are not bound by the New Mexico unemployment insurance law."

## Heifer cow shot, butchered on Cooper ranch

Tom Cooper found a bred heifer's cut-off head Jan. 9 on his Hondo Valley ranch, and now he's worried foul play may be involved in the disappearance of up to five cows during the past 18 months.

"The heifer's head had been shot. People tend to think cattle thieves are from the old days, but they're still around," Cooper said. "In the old days, they used to hang 'em high, and that's what I think they ought to do now."

Cooper is offering a \$250 reward for the conviction of those responsible for the killing. The sheriff's office knows of no other similar incidents.

## Ruidoso is not totally immune to woes of gambling

Despite its relative isolation and small-town atmosphere, Ruidoso has gambling problems.

Police chief Lanny Maddox estimates gambling-related crimes have increased 15% in the past two years.

Just last month, a Ruidoso man was arrested for embezzling about \$3,000 in two months time from the store where he worked. The long-time employee allegedly wrote in a confessional statement to store managers that he needed the money because "I play horse. I play casino, I play golf for money. But like I say, I will pay back the money."

Like most villages in New Mexico, Ruidoso and Mescalero lack Gamblers Anonymous groups.

Thus far, no one's been admitted to Indian Health Services in Mescalero for treatment of a gambling problem, said employee Gayle McWilliams.

The Counseling Center in

Ruidoso plans to establish a therapeutic support group later this season, said Dr. Laren Winter.

"Gambling is a definite health problem in Lincoln County," Winter said. "In Ruidoso, with all its (gambling) opportunities, people aren't talking about it because of its economic aspect."

For reasons of confidentiality, the licensed family therapist wouldn't disclose the number of clients he treats for gambling addictions. But he said there were several, with the male-female ratio being 50-50.

"We're going to see more and more," Winter said. "I'm confident of that, unfortunately."

None of his clients have lost all their holdings, nor have any threatened suicide — something an estimated 20% of addicted gamblers have attempted, he said.

That estimate comes from surveys of gamblers entering treatment programs, he said.

## Theatre construction begins

The long-awaited construction of the Spencer performing arts theatre has begun.

The first dirt on the \$16-17 million theatre was overturned last weekend. PCL Construction Services, Inc., headquartered in Denver, is overseeing the work.

The theatre is tentatively scheduled to be completed in mid-1997. Local resident Jackie Spencer and her husband are totally funding the project.

"It's more than just a building — it's an art project in itself," PCL project supervisor Gene Brown said Thursday. "It's a very unique design, a world-class theatre."

Glass and white stone will

dominate the 500-600-seat theatre, located north of Ruidoso off the airport road. Well-known architect Antoine Predock visited the site recently, looking out at the view of Sierra Blanca

from the same place theatre goers will eventually stand in the crystal-shaped glass lobby.

PCL has worked with Predock before, on the University of Arizona fine arts center, said Jim McGibney, PCL director of business development. PCL annually constructs \$1.4 billion worth of projects throughout North America, employing about 1,100 salaried and 3,000 hourly employees.

Approximately 20 subcontractors will work on this project, Brown said. He and 15-20 other PCL employees will live here during construction.

"It's really a joy to be here — people are really friendly," Brown said, adding, "There's a lot of anticipation."

## Legislative bill would allow wide-open gambling

A broad bipartisan bill that would legalize video gambling at racetracks, licensed resorts, bars and clubs is expected to be introduced today in the state Senate.

The bill is co-sponsored by Democratic Senator Don Kidd (Eddy, Lea and Otero counties) and Republican John Arthur Smith (Dona Ana, Hidalgo, Luna and Sierra counties). It is 78 pages long. Smith is chairman of the Senate Select Gaming Committee, while Kidd is vice chairman of the committee.

The bill contains a provision to allow counties and municipalities to call for a referendum on whether to allow video gambling in their jurisdiction.

The bill makes special provisions for racetracks and resort areas, allowing them to award unlimited prizes while liquor establishments and licensed clubs would be limited to \$1,000 payoffs.

All tracks licensed by the state Horse Racing Act would be allowed the video machines, except the Albuquerque Downs. The proposed bill states "no racetrack located on property owned by the state may apply for or be issued a license as a video gambling place."

The bill will not take effect, the final section states, until tribal-

state gaming compacts are approved by the Legislature and the governors of 17 Indian tribes.

The bill lays out how money will be distributed and includes stiff regulations geared to accountability. All machines would have electronic hook-ups to monitor how much was put in and taken out in prizes.

"Every machine in New Mexico will be connected to the main frame," Kidd said; all money going in and coming out would be monitored.

The proposed law also requires at least 87% of all money going into a machine to be paid out in cash or credits.

The bill sets up a special state gaming fund, establishes how many machines may be placed in each establishment, establishes laws that range from misdemeanors to felonies for violation of the laws and tampering with machines, and establishes the legal age to play machines at 21 years old.

If passed by both houses and signed by the governor, video gaming machines could be in operation as early as February of 1997 — if 17 Indian tribes, including the Mescalero Apache, and the Legislature sign gaming compacts.

The proposed law sets up a chain of command to oversee video

gambling, starting with a director and a security division chief.

The proposed bill defines "resort" as a "house or complex of buildings that has available for public lodging at least 150 guest rooms and that has, on the same premises, an affiliated restaurant that has seating for and can serve meals to at least 200 patrons at a time."

Both resorts and racetracks could have an "unlimited number of machines" and would "not be subject to limitations regarding maximum prize amounts."

On the other hand, liquor establishments would be allowed no more than five machines and clubs would be limited to 25 machines with payoff limited to \$1,000.

But the ability to have those machines may be limited by the money establishments have to invest in licenses. It will cost \$500 to license one machine and \$7,500 to license the club owner or operator. That fee is good for one year and they must be renewed.

All revenues received from video gaming would go to the state gaming fund and be distributed in just three ways. The first distribution would be to pay the costs incurred in the operation and administration of the video gaming act.

The second would be to a reserve account established within the state gaming fund. And third, 5% of the balance, after creation of the reserve account, would go to municipalities and counties in the same proportion as the state's

share of revenue raised throughout the state from all gambling operations.

The balance (after distribution to municipalities, counties and reserve account) would go into the public school capital outlay fund.

## Spokesman for horsemen testifies to state Legislature

Mike Weatherly, spokesman for the New Mexico Horseman's Association, told the state Senate Select Gaming Commission Thursday that racetracks provide thousands of jobs and put millions of dollars into the economy.

Weatherly, in a relatively short presentation, also showed a video of what video gaming machines have done for one lowa racetrack. The video said that the track experienced increased attendance when video gaming was installed, and that many new racing fans were first brought into the track because of the availability of video gaming.

New Mexico racetracks bring in \$138 million in tourist dollars and

jobs provided by the tracks outstrip employment at such organizations as New Mexico State University and White Sands, Weatherly said.

"There are 10,000 jobs in the industry," he said.

Weatherly admitted that since the advent of video gaming and Indian casino gambling, "the quality of racing, the horses and the purses have declined."

"Our people may have to move to California or Oklahoma if they want to stay in the business," he said.

"We appreciate anything you guys can do to help us," Weatherly concluded.

"I see a need for Gamblers Anonymous here. With a support group they (gamblers) actually tell people, 'Watch out for me and help me,'" Winter said. "It's a safety net. Part of recovery is talking about it, getting it out of the closet."

The 12-step GA programs, modeled after Alcoholics Anonymous, have doubled nationally in the last six years. About 1,358 groups now exist.

Meetings in Albuquerque, Santa Fe and Espanola have been established with the help of GA hotline personnel. The state Department of Health, which just conducted a telephone survey on the health impact of gambling (expected to be released later this month), will also help set up GA programs.

Those far from GA programs can call the state's gamblers hotline (1-800-407-7272) or the National Council on Problem Gambling (1-800-522-4700) for help. "Carol," reached at the Albuquerque hotline, said just last week a Capitan resident requested information on

how to set up a GA program in the Lincoln County area.

A problem gambler herself, Carol said she first admitted her addiction in 1994, after being confronted by her children.

Apparently, they took note of the deep depressions she'd enter after gambling all night, and they feared she might kill herself.

Her problem began about four years earlier when casinos and bingo halls became increasingly available, she said.

"What really hooked me was I had two or three big wins. I'm talking \$5,000, then \$3,000 and several \$1,000 wins," she said. "Of course, I gave it all back and much, much more — we get greedy."

Carol usually left the casinos "with the most awful feeling," fearful of how she'd pay her bills. But she'd go back, chasing her losses and devouring her savings with bank debit cards.

Winter, who has treated people with problem behaviors for 14 years, said addicts often have dysfunctional family histories and

gamble as a substitute behavior "to cover up other emotional pains."


Some of his Ruidoso clients have described a mood-altering, trance-like state when gambling, and they thrive on the "amusement park" atmosphere of the casinos. They've also reported a feeling of connectedness — not with other people, but with cards, machines, or chips. The connection frequently involves a ritualistic pull of the handle or throw of the dice, and the ritual can leave a person anxious and depressed when it doesn't work.

Often a euphoric high is produced, especially if there's a win.

"It's a great rush — pumping adrenaline. They're on top of it all, like skiing down a black diamond, he said. "Except the rush doesn't stay."

Losses can plummet a player into serious emotional and financial debt, and after awhile an addicted gambler will, holistically, suffer in a biological manner, Winter said.

"It's the insidious nature of the gambling addiction," Winter said. "It gets you by the throat and will not let you go."



Many lured to gamble fantasize about big wins like the \$250,000 Las Cruces resident Barbara Gomez won at Casino Apache last year. But Gomez, unlike many players, said she goes to the casino planning to lose and only spends the money she's set on blowing.

## Gambling fever a problem, though it's less of problem locally

Gambling may seem a painless way to generate government revenues, but it's loaded with pain for those who become addicted.

Luckily, the problems associated with gambling appear less frequently in isolated tourist communities like Ruidoso.

About 80% of Americans think gambling is an acceptable recreation, various studies have concluded. Its popularity has overtaken baseball as the country's favorite pastime, attracting an estimated 100 million players last year — more than the 70 million who went to major league ballparks.

It's a moneymaker, one that state governments and Indian nations are increasingly using to spark local economic growth and bolster financially-strapped social programs.

Social and economic problems associated with gambling are less noticeable in rural tourist communities, said gambling industry expert Bill Thompson.

"It's a much better situation when gamblers fly in, spend their

money and leave," the professor said from his University of Nevada at Las Vegas office.

The Mesalero Apache Tribe's "Casino Apache" fits that bill, Thompson said, because its Inn of the Mountain Gods gaming resort is removed from large population centers. Money spent there mostly comes from El Paso, he said.

"Wendell Chino told me when he sees his own people in the casino he says, 'Visit, but this is not for you to hang out in.' He feels they should come, but he doesn't want to see them spending their money in the casino," Thompson said.

Thompson and Whittier Law School Professor I. Nelson Rose reversed the New Mexico Legislature last year about possible social effects of widespread gambling. Rose thinks the current gambling craze will drop, but not for years. Gambling fever comes in waves about every 70 years, he said.

When casinos draw players from the local community, problems emerge, Thompson said.

"It becomes a regressive tax, just recycling money and taking it away from local businesses," Thompson said. "That tends to be a bad situa-

tion." Particularly among the poor, games like lotteries have that backsliding tax effect. Thompson said people lacking stable incomes have a tendency to gamble more when it's available — especially on lotteries.

New Mexico plans to start a state lottery this summer after regulations are established.

Readily-accessible games of chance have been shown to breed compulsive gambling and the correlative crimes of embezzlement, fraud and forgery, Thompson said.

"Accessibility equals problems," he concluded.

And accessibility is ever-increasing. Americans spent an estimated \$482 billion on legal games of chance last year, Thompson said. About 85% of that money came back to players, but about \$40 billion was lost.

"Gambling is excessive, and most of it is fun," Thompson said. "But the people losing big money definitely are not having fun."

When members of Gamblers Anonymous in Illinois were surveyed by Professor Henry Lesieur of Illinois State University at

Normal, results showed: 44% had stolen from work to pay their gambling debts; 18% had gambling-related arrests; 34% had lost or quit a job; 26% had divorced or separated because of gambling; 21% had filed for bankruptcy; 66% had contemplated suicide and 16% had attempted suicide.

Places like Las Vegas, Nev., with 1 million residents all within a mile of a slot machine, have excessive compulsive gambling rates. About 8% of its population is thought to have a serious gambling problem, Thompson said. Nationally, an average 1%-2% are addicted to gambling, Thompson said.

The American Gaming Association reports a 5% rate.

Rachel Volberg, a Maryland sociologist who has conducted much of the research on pathological gambling rates, suggests 2%-6% of the populations in various surveyed states are problem gamblers.

No national surveys have been gauged the number of problem gamblers, Volberg said. The data she's collected is based on people entering treatment programs for the addiction.

Of those surveyed, she said

about 15% considered committing a crime to pay for their gambling habit. Those crimes are usually "white collar," like embezzlement or tax fraud, and not violent.

"Anywhere there's loose money, there's going to be people with bad motives attracted to getting it, or good people who start to have bad thoughts," Thompson said.

Volberg's data also concludes about 45% of problem gamblers are women, especially where video slot machines are available.

The slots — often called the "crack cocaine of gambling" — appeal strongly to women, Volberg said.

"The theory is that women are less intimidated by the video poker," she said. "They're easy to learn — do it at your own pace."

Unlike horse racing, players don't have to be initiated to gambling machines, Volberg said. All that's necessary is a coin and pull of a handle. In several gambling cities, they're set up at restaurants, bars, even grocery stores.

Psychologists generally divide gamblers into two main categories: the "action seekers," who chase fantasies of big wins and power, and

"escape seekers" who run away from personal problems.

Studies show female compulsive gamblers usually go for the escape, where the men go for the action.

The psychological high produced from the chancy plays can be just as addictive as that produced by drugs, experts say.

Teenagers and senior citizens also appear particularly vulnerable to the lure of gambling, other studies show. (Volberg said there's "lots of claims out there" about seniors, but she hasn't seen any data yet to confirm them.)

Some reports indicate those who are alone, especially the elderly, are susceptible to the lure of luxurious casinos with their special dining and transportation arrangements.

Problem gambling among juveniles is estimated to be three times the rate of adults, other experts have reported. At least half of all teenagers placed wagers of some type during the past year.

"As soon as you bring gambling into an area, the rate of compulsive gambling will go up," Thompson said. "People who otherwise wouldn't gamble are getting hooked."

# Woman tells of husband's track gambling addiction

Key and her husband used to enjoy their visits to Ruidoso. But after they moved here, her husband's addictive behavior had a place to grow.

"He came home one day after being at the track — throw \$100 on top of the TV and said, 'That's all I have for rent.'"

A few minutes later he admitted he'd blown the rest at the racetrack, she said.

"I knew then he was admitting he had a problem," Kay said of the 1994 confrontation, "but it's not like he did anything about it."

When telling her story, Kay asked that her real name be kept confidential.

The gambling had been going on for some time, and his mysterious shortages of cash on payday — especially when rent was due — were rather pathetically played out, she recalled.

"He always came up with a reason for why he didn't have it — or would lie," she said. "But I always knew he was at the track."

The gambling started as soon as the couple moved to Ruidoso in 1987.

"Prior to then, there wasn't the opportunity. We lived in a different state," Kay explained. "But we used to come up here to visit and it would be fun for a couple of days just to go to the track. We never bet

much." Once they were Ruidoso residents, however, "the accessibility made it easy to keep going and going."

He had an addictive personality to begin with, she said, and was one of those who would "pile one addiction on top of another."

The gambling addiction solidified walls in their personal communications, she said, and made her feel she was the only responsible adult in the relationship.

"At first, the gambling was on and off," Kay said. However, "His pitfall was right there — he'd go to the track and the 'regulars,' the cronies, would get their own little group and start borrowing. And if they were losing, they'd borrow

more." Her husband also frequented the casino at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, she was told.

"I never asked — it was a touchy subject," she said. "I didn't really want to hear about it, guess I was trying to ignore it," she said.

Still, it was the horses she knew he favored.

For about two years, the losses took huge bites out of the couple's living expenses, and finally hit a low — for her — when she had to lie for a loan from family members.

After one son and 19 years of marriage, they divorced in 1994.

"The gambling made me bitter," she said. "For me, that should be a luxury. When all is paid, then use your mad money. But not your living money on a horse!"

## Signs of gambling addiction

According to the New Mexico Department of Health, the following are signs of a gambling problem:

- increasing the frequency and amount of money gambled;
- spending an excessive amount of time gambling at the expense of job or family time;
- being pre-occupied with gambling or with obtaining money with which to gamble;
- gambling creates a special and intense pleasure, an aroused sense of being in "action";
- continuing to gamble despite negative consequences such as large losses, or work or family problems caused by gambling;
- gambling as a means to cope, with loneliness, anger, stress, depression, etc;
- "chasing" losses, or the urgent need to keep gambling — often with larger bets. Or, the taking of greater risks in order to make up for losses;
- borrowing money to gamble, taking out secret loans, or maximizing credit cards;
- bragging about wins, but not talking about losses;
- frequent mood swings — higher when winning, lower when losing;
- gambling for longer periods of time, or spending more money than originally planned;
- and secretive behavior.

# Anti-gambling crusader fights gambling in legislatures, courts

In his fight for "social morality," the Rev. Tom Grey, a Methodist minister from Galena, Ill., is battling the nation's proliferation of gambling.

"Gambling is not inevitable — hell, it's not even desirable," he said from a Biloxi, Miss., airport telephone.

The games "sacrifice" people — five of every 100, if the American Gaming Association's estimated compulsive gambling rate is correct, he said.

"I'm supposed to sacrifice five people in my church for them? And I have to take care of them and feed and clothe them when their families leave and they've lost all their money?" Grey asked. "These people (gambling industry) are in the business of separating people from their money."

The founder of the National Coalition Against Gambling has been involved in several legislative and political battles this year, winning "shut-outs" of recent expansion efforts in Virginia, Pennsylvania and Connecticut.

Grey said he's especially proud of New Mexico dentist Guy Clark, who last summer won a state Supreme Court ruling against against Gov. Gary Johnson for signing gambling compacts with 14 Indian tribes without legislative authority.

"He and the people power of New Mexico took on the governor," Grey said. "They very easily could have said, 'We can't beat the statehouse.' Come on! This is America and you can stop something if you have the power on your side."


Clark is presently trying to intervene in a lawsuit filed by nine New Mexico pueblos against U.S. Attorney Tom Kelly. The suit is still pending.

Clark is "dismayed" by the two parties' latest agreement, allowing the pueblos' casinos to continue operating as long as they don't expand.

Before the agreement, Kelly announced the state's Indian-run casinos would be forcibly closed this month if not done so voluntarily. His threat followed a state Supreme Court ruling that outlawed most forms of gambling. The ruling immediately shut down gambling at social, fraternal and charity clubs.

"I'd just like the law to be enforced," Clark said. "It can be done without rifle waving or bloodshed."

Another plan, for a large hotel at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center, has fallen by the wayside. 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

### Birthday of Robert Burns, Beloved Poet of Scotland

This is being sent to you a little before high noon on Jan. 23, a bright and sunny mid-winter day under a pure blue sky that brings lightness to your heart and your step.

This is the eve of the birthday of Robert Burns. He was born Jan. 25, 1759 on a farm near Alloway, Scotland.

To his neighbors, he became known as "The Singing Ploughboy" because across the fields he could be heard singing at the plough—sometimes reading from a book of old Scottish ballads, or singing the words of songs and poems of his own as they came to mind. Some of his songs and verses were even composed while ploughing in the field.

Like Abraham Lincoln, who was inspired by his works, Burns had very little schooling; yet through a great love of reading, he developed a mastery of words which, together with his God-given insight into the human heart, enabled him to write poems and songs which are more beloved as the years go by.

One of his most famous poems is "To a Field Mouse," in which he apologizes to a field mouse for turning it out of its winter home with his plough.

"The truly sorry man's dominion has broken nature's social union and justifies that ill

opinion that makes thee startle at me, thy poor earth-bound companion and fellow mortal."

Much of his philosophy is brought out in his poem "A Cotter's Saturday Night." The last verse is in the form of a prayer to his native Scotland.

"O Scotia, my dear, my native soul For whom my warmest wish to Heaven is sent, Long may thy hardy sons of rustic toil be blest with health and peace and sweet content.

Then however crowns and coronet be rent A virtuous populace may rise the while and stand, a wall of fire around their much-loved isle.

Let us send up a prayer of thanks to God for Robert Burns.

Jan. 25 is also the birthday of Miss Tommie Sue Dummahoe of Roswell, a poet and singer—a true birthday mate to Robert Burns.

# Opinions on county health needs sought at February meetings

Just like the diversity of Lincoln County's landscape, the communities within its boundaries need diverse medical services.

Members of the county Maternal Child Health Council were asked by the county commission last March to discover those needs and create a strategic health plan to meet them.

To fulfill that assignment, eight community meetings are scheduled around Lincoln County through Feb. 15. The first was held Thursday at White Oaks. The next session will be at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 1 at the Corona Senior Citizens Center.

To ensure meetings are well attended, one Altrusa or council person has been assigned to try to generate interest in each of the eight locations.

Separate meetings will be held in several non-incorporated communities, because needs there may differ significantly even from a town just 10 miles away.

Other health plan meetings are set for 6:30 p.m. throughout the first two weeks of February: Mon-

day, Feb. 5, at the San Patricio senior center; Tuesday, Feb. 6, at the Capitan Catholic Church; Thursday, Feb. 8, at Dr. Wood's House in Lincoln; Monday, Feb. 12, at the Carrizozo Senior Center; Tuesday, Feb. 13, at the Ruidoso Downs Senior Center; and Thursday, Feb. 15, at the Ruidoso Care Center.

To help collect and compile the information, the council turned to the local Altrusa group for help, said Wanda Gielow de Figueroa, a clinical nurse specialist with the council.

"More and more of the health care decisions are being made at the grassroots level, using block grants to the state from the federal government," de Figueroa said Thursday. "The authorities have grasped that what's good for the Santa Fe area may not work in Lincoln County. That's the trend for the future, and the commissioners realized they needed current information to be proactive in going after the money available. They wanted to gather data and get a baseline that could be updated as the county progressed."

Although the Lincoln County Medical Center has distributed a limited, random questionnaire about medical needs, it was more of a marketing tool aimed at starting a mobile health clinic, de Figueroa said.

Commissioners wanted a study with no preconceived ideas or special agendas.

"We still may look at what they (LCMC) came up with, as well as data from other sources, and at plans already put together by other counties," she said.

The council and Altrusa also will consider input from "key informants," usually employees of home health care organizations or government divisions who are routinely interacting with residents across the county.

But most important, the group will seek opinions from county residents themselves.

"We want to hear about what's good and what's bad," de Figueroa said. "Otherwise, if we don't hear, we may assume it's broken and needs to be fixed."

Six volunteers will go to each of the community sessions to maintain consistency and ensure

the data is not skewed, she said.

"That's why the meeting in Ruidoso is last," she said. "We didn't want Ruidoso influencing the smaller communities. We want them to be selfish and think of their needs first."

In just six months as a parent/child case manager and coordinator here, de Figueroa has seen "a blatant gap in health care" in the county, with most of the care concentrated in the Ruidoso area, she observed.

"Generally speaking, there are pockets of the population that are financially needy, and it is difficult to find Medicare and Medicaid providers," de Figueroa said. "Physicians have to put a cap on that type of patient, because they need insurance money to survive."

"Other people don't even qualify and are under-insured, or have such a high deductible they never meet it. Then there are the mom-and-pop organizations that are not

insured at all."

It's difficult to keep a pharmacy in a community with those problems, she said. That means residents must travel to pick up prescriptions, and some don't own cars.

Cap all those problems with a lack of knowledge about general health care and a reluctance to acknowledge health problems, and a picture emerges of the situation in some Lincoln County settlements, she said.

## Assault nets 30-month jail sentence

Nathaniel Chee, Jr., 34, of Mescalero, was sentenced to 30 months imprisonment and three years supervised release by Senior U.S. District Court Judge Santiago E. Campos in Santa Fe Wednesday.

Chee pleaded guilty in October 1995 to assault causing serious bodily injury, a press release from U.S. Attorney John Kelly's office stated.

Chee admitted he assaulted and seriously injured Jennifer Ann Lester on May 14, 1995, on the Mescalero Indian Reservation, the

press release stated. Chee, apparently upset over a complaint Lester filed against him, arrived at Lester's home on the evening of May 14 and attacked her with an eight-inch-long knife, cutting her hand as she protected her face from the assault.

Lester's children witnessed the assault and yelled at Chee to leave their mother alone, officials said. Chee then pulled Lester outside by the hair to a nearby ravine.

As Lester screamed, Chee ripped

off her shirt and stuffed it in her mouth, officials said. He then hit her on the neck and head with the knife handle. Lester fell and Chee then kicked and stabbed her, cutting her hand and slashing her abdomen. The knife broke and Chee ran away. He was later arrested after Lester's children notified the police.

The case was investigated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and was prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney Norman C. Bay.

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**NOTICE OF PROPERTY TAX REPORTING REQUIREMENTS**

Property which was valued in 1995 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1996 or subsequent years, EXCEPT FOR:

1. mobile homes
2. livestock, and
3. land used for agricultural purposes

If, for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's office.

**All nongovernmental entities (property owners) which claim to be exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1996 if the exemption was not claimed in 1995.**

Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land use for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by nongovernmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February.

If you made improvements to your real property and:

1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and
2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued;

you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by that assessor.

If you believe your property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report, on forms provided by the assessor, a signed statement which:

1. describes the property affected,
2. state the cause of decrease in value, and
3. states the amount you contend the value has decreased.

This statement must be filed with the county assessor no later than the last day of February.

If the veterans exemption was claimed and allowed in 1995 no new claim for the exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1995 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

If the head-of-family exemption was claimed and allowed in 1995 no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. Beginning in the 1982 tax year, taxpayers are responsible for declaring their property classification to the assessor, as residential or nonresidential. When the declaration is accepted by the assessor, it shall remain as such and need not be made in subsequent years unless the classification changes. If a taxpayer has not declared their property to be residential in 1995 and desires that classification for 1996 they must complete a declaration of residential classification and return the signed declaration to the county assessor's office by the last day of February, 1996.

Certain mineral property and personal property of contractors operating in more than one county are required to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division of the State of New Mexico in Santa Fe. Information about property to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division can be obtained from the county assessor or the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division, Central Assessment Bureau, P.O. Box 630, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87509, Phone: (505) 827-0893.

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

When a woman ordered a new kitchen table from a mail-order catalog, she didn't realize she'd have to assemble it, so she sent it back.

A young couple ordered a set of rugs, but when the rugs arrived, they weren't quite the right color, so back they went.

DeLane and Justin Black have decided to take advantage of the fact that people return mail-order products every day. They recently opened DeLane's Wholesale Outlet at 427 Sudderth Drive in Ruidoso's Gateway Shopping Center.

If you go there, don't be surprised to see workers busy unloading and assembling everything from furniture to toys.

"We get catalog returns from companies like Macy's, Fingerhut and Aames," DeLane said.

Government regulations require companies to inspect and repackage product returns if they want to sell them as new again, DeLane explained.

"That's simply not cost efficient, so instead the companies put the returns aside for liquidators, which is what we are," she explained. "Because we are really trying to bring savings to the community, we assemble the products and mark down the normal price 50-70%."

DeLane's Wholesale Outlet has furniture, dishes, linens, rugs, toys, exercise machines, desks, pictures, lamps, luggage, VCR and microwave stands, bean bags — just about anything you'd expect to find in a mail-order catalog.

"Right now we have product shipments coming in weekly, sometimes daily," DeLane said.

Justin and DeLane are no strangers to the business world, al-

though this is their first wholesale outlet venture.

"My husband still works as a consultant for General Motors, she said. "And we owned a restaurant in Colorado."

Justin was raised in Roswell and DeLane visited Ruidoso 20 years ago.

"For Justin, it's like coming home, and as for me, I like it here far better than Colorado," DeLane said.

Most of the time, the contents of the shipments are a surprise, DeLane said.

## Billy the Kid bottled water has spirit of the Old West

David Stevens was sitting on the front porch of his Spring Ranch house, sipping bottled water, when a light bulb went off in his head.

"I was sitting there looking at the spring and it hit me that I should bottle the water," Stevens said. "We knew it was good because even oldtimers had told me that to cook a decent pot of beans, the water had to come from the spring."

Four years later, Billy The Kid Pure & Natural Mountain Spring Water made its debut at the 1995 Old Lincoln Days Celebration in Lincoln.

"We sold 500 bottles during Old Lincoln Days," Stevens said.

Stevens and his wife Vonna purchased the Spring Ranch property, located between Honda and Lincoln, about six years ago.

Nobody knows where the ranch's spring originates, but according to tests Stevens had performed in Albuquerque, the water is very pure.

"I had the chemical composition tested and the test turned out exceptionally well," he said. "One lab technician told me it was some of the best water he'd seen come through his lab."

Billy the Kid water is taken from the spring and shipped to a Las Cruces bottling company in stainless steel containers. It is then distributed primarily throughout New Mexico and Texas, with limited distribution in Arizona and Colorado.

Water at various locations in Ruidoso, Capitan and Alto.


The Billy the Kid legend seemed a natural marketing tool, Stevens said.

"They had stopped at the ranch to get a drink from the spring,"

"Billy was concerned about being ambushed upon return to Lincoln, and suggested to the governor that a lookout be posted at the Fritz Ranch, which is what Spring Ranch was called at the time," he said.

The letters are on display at the Lincoln County Heritage Trust.

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

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

## County teams face crucial district tilts

Prep hoopla shifts into high gear Saturday when Ruidoso's Warriors, Capitan's Tigers and Carrizozo's Grizzlies all play crucial district contests. The Ruidoso boys face a must-win on the road in Truth or Consequences, while Capitan's boys and girls host rival Cloudcroft in 6AA action. Carrizozo's girls will try a unique strategy when they face powerhouse Fort Sumner on the road.

The last two weeks haven't been kind to the Ruidoso Warrior boys basketball team.

The Warriors, once 7-3 and earning points in the Class AAA Top 10 poll, have lost five in a row. Two of five setbacks were District 3AAA contests. It can be argued that Ruidoso isn't out of contention for second place in the district, but the Warriors have their backs against the wall.

Coach Ben Sanchez's team is 7-8 and 0-2. The Warriors are led by senior point guard Cory Hood, who paces the team in scoring and is one of the top assist leaders in Class AAA.

Ruidoso's latest outing was a 69-53 setback Monday in Roswell at New Mexico Military Institute. It was the Warriors' third game in four days.

The Hot Springs Tigers come into Saturday's game with a 9-4 overall mark and 2-0 district record. The Tigers beat both Santa Teresa and Socorro — two teams responsible for hanging district losses on Ruidoso.

The adversity of some early-season nagging injuries and illnesses have toughened the Tigers, coach Tommy Morrow said. Hot Springs has become a balanced team with four starters in double figures.

Leading the Tigers in scoring is 6-foot, 2-inch guard-forward David Carlile. The senior averages 14.7 points per game (ppg). Junior guard Justin Ruiz (6-0) puts in 13.9 points per contest. Also scoring in double figures are Randy Walker (6-5 center) at 12.3 ppg and O.J. Hochler (5-11 guard) at 11.5 ppg.

Hot Springs has a solid in-

side/outside scoring punch with Walker in the post and Carlile, Hochler and Ruiz on the perimeter.

The Tigers take what the defense gives them Morrow said.

Hot Springs is a versatile bunch, much like Ruidoso. It can play an up-tempo game when it suits them, or slow it down. Hot Springs utilizes several defensive schemes as well.

"We don't feel like we're ever out of a game," Morrow added.

But he admits, the Tigers have had trouble stopping opponents at times.

"We have to really concentrate on taking care of the ball, too," Morrow said.

Morrow has plenty of respect for the Warriors even though they are in the midst of a five-game slide.

"All they would need is a win over us and they would be cured pretty quickly," Morrow said, adding, "it would silly for anybody to take anyone in this district lightly."

Morrow is most concerned with Ruidoso seniors Hood and Joshua Hodges.

"Hood basically creates everything for Ruidoso," Morrow said.

The RHS senior guard has excellent court vision and gets the ball to the open man, the Hot Springs coach noted. Hodges is one of the best rebounders in the district and can dominate play in the paint offensively and defensively, Morrow added.

The Tigers should have plenty of motivation Saturday.

"Ruidoso has a lot talent. They knocked us out of the district tournament last year," Morrow said, perhaps tipping off the focus of his pregame pep talk.



*A cagey adage: Old basketball players never die; they just lose their step.*

A pair of legs still fresh with youthful spring — or "hops" as they call it — lifted the Cobras basketball team to the Ruidoso men's recreation league title Wednesday.

Former Ruidoso Warrior Daniel Espinosa scored 12 points and led his teammates to a 49-46 over Alamo Pipe & Supply in the "if game" championship of the double elimination tourney. Espinosa (RHS Class of '95) scored five of the Cobras' last six points to fend off a spirited effort by Alamo Pipe.

Alamo Pipe had a chance to tie the game in the final seconds, but Kenneth Crenshaw's 3-pointer as time expired bounced off the front of the rim.

Crenshaw, a former Carrizozo cager, had one good reason for coming up just short. It was his third game in a row that night. He and his Alamo teammates had to battle through the loser's bracket to earn the right to play the Cobras. They forced a second championship game when they downed the Cobras in the first title tilt.

Alamo Pipe had to be tired physically, although you couldn't tell it by their effort. They pestered the Cobras until the final seconds of the game.

Both teams featured a number of familiar faces to Lincoln County sports history buffs. The Cobras' roster has two former Ruidoso players, brothers Daniel and Kenny

Espinosa, three former or current Ruidoso basketball coaches (Dwayne Rogers, Sergio Castanon and Dennis Davis), and former Lake Arthur star Armean Grado. Lynn Willard is no stranger to Warrior athletics, either. His son, Cody, starred for Ruidoso in the early 90s.

Alamo Pipe boasts a group of former Capitan and Carrizozo headliners. Deke LaMay leads the Capitan contingent of former Tigers, which includes Tory Padilla, Anthony Sanchez, Billy Page and former coach Terry Cox. Crenshaw was a Grizzly, as was George Vega. Norman Jojala went to Ruidoso, and Bobby Snowden tore up the

court at Artesia.

In the semifinals of the double elimination tournament, the Cobras sent Alamo Pipe to the loser's bracket with a 59-46 victory Tuesday. Kenny Espinosa led the Cobras with 22 points. LaMay scored 17 for Alamo.

Alamo then beat Ruidoso Taxi, 61-60 winners over Thriftway in the loser's bracket, for another shot at the Cobras.

In the first championship game, Alamo Pipe jumped out to a 9-0 lead and never trailed, posting a 62-57 victory. Daniel Espinosa cut the Alamo lead to 55-53 with three minutes left, but the Cobras could

get no closer. Padilla's two free throws with 29 seconds left sealed the win for Alamo Pipe.

Snowden paced Alamo Pipe with 18 points. LaMay added 10. Kenny Espinosa led the Cobras with 16, while Davis pitched in 11.

The Cobras came out the hotter team in the second championship game. They took a 27-17 halftime lead, but Alamo Pipe got right back in the game when it outscored the Cobras 9-2 in the first five minutes of the second half.

Jojala's old-fashioned 3-point play knotted the game with 14:23 left. The teams battled back and forth until Daniel Espinosa's heroics prevailed and Alamo Pipe's legs gave out.

Daniel Espinosa induced LaMay to foul out with 1:38 left. He hit a dippy-do runner in the lane and made the free throw for a 46-41 Cobra lead. After an Alamo Pipe free throw, Espinosa scored again.

Alamo Pipe made four of five free throws in the final minute to pull with two, 48-46. It even had three shots to tie the game, but the rim wouldn't give. Davis sank one of two charity shots with five seconds left. Crenshaw dribbled the length of the floor and got a good look at the basket, but his shot banged off the rim.



## Big game proclamations now available

They're here. The new 1996-97 New Mexico Big Game Proclamations are already available from those places selling hunting and fishing licenses in the state. Application forms (Form 96) for special hunts like elk and antelope are also at license vendors. This will help with those folks that need to plan their vacation time early.

The biggest changes for 1996-97 are the increase in resident hunting and fishing license fees, the creation of junior hunting and fishing licenses and the addition of "quality hunts" for non-residents. The new license year begins on April 1, 1996 and it will mark the first time since 1983 that resident license fees have been increased. There are very few products or services that can claim that they have not raised their costs in 13 years.

The license fee increase was necessary to help catch up with basic needs. Lots of folks believe that the Department of Game and Fish is supported by mummies from the state's general tax fund, but that isn't the case. The De-

partment of Game and Fish is an "enterprise agency." It generates most of its own revenue and operates within that income. About 95% of the state revenue received by the department comes from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses. Therefore, to keep up with the times, the department needed to raise license fees. The new fees are comparable to other western states and within easy reach of the residents.

The Department of Game and Fish wants to encourage youngsters to participate in the sports of hunting and fishing, so new "junior licenses" were added to the license structure. Those hunters and anglers ages 12 through 14

will get a break on the cost of hunting and fishing licenses. They may purchase a general hunting license (deer and small game) for \$15 and add fishing (including trout) for \$23. In addition to junior licenses, there are youth-only hunts for deer, elk and antelope. These are special hunts and only those 17 years of age or younger may apply.

The state Legislature also approved a new category called "quality hunts" for deer and elk. These are areas that are very popular and where hunters have a good chance of success. Residents of the state will pay the regular cost for a quality hunt area, while non-residents would pay a premium price. A normal nonresident elk license is \$465 for non-residents, but for a quality hunt the fee would be \$750. A normal non-resident deer license is \$199, with a quality deer hunt going for \$300.

All this information is contained in the new 1996-97 Big Game Proclamation. Pick one up soon from any license vendor and don't forget application forms for special hunts.

# PERSONALITIES

## Bennett brings personality to myriad occupations

She was always headstrong, determined not to be defined by artificial societal standards.

Fortunately, Betty Bennett was the only child of doting parents who encouraged and appreciated her independence. She spent the morning cooking and doing house chores with her mother. In the afternoon, she changed oil and repaired cars with her father.

Her throaty vocal cords propelled her into the world of small jazz bands and has become one of the most recognized voices in Lincoln County. Bennett has manned police dispatch consoles at the Ruidoso Downs and Ruidoso Police departments, the county sheriff's office and the Alamogordo Police Department.

Her baptism at the dispatch microphone was quick and fiery when she arrived at her first post with the Alamogordo department.

"My training was fun," Bennett said. "I came in that night and a man said, 'This is the telephone, this is the mike. Push your finger down to speak and let it up to hear.' And then he left."

In the 1960s, local police had radios in the police cars, but no mobile hand-held radios. That turned out to be a dangerous situation for Bennett while she was directing a search for a mass killer early in her dispatching career.

After learning he was terminally ill, a civilian employee at Holloman Air Force Base bought several weapons and lots of ammunition, Bennett said.

"He decided he was going to eliminate some problems. He killed his wife and mother-in-law and then went out on the street and shot a well-known drug dealer and a couple of other people who had gotten off because they had good attorneys," Bennett said. "I got a call that there was a man killing everybody in south Alamogordo."

She dispatched all available units, including the Border Patrol, city and county officers and the state police.

While she focused on the radio and the officers left their vehicles to comb a field where the shooter had been spotted, a man carrying a shotgun walked through the door behind Bennett. As she turned around to talk to him, she slipped a typewriter on top of the microphone key to broadcast her predicament to the officers.

"I keyed up the radio, but no one could hear me, because they all were out in the field," Bennett said.

Luckily for Bennett, the man was polite. He explained what happened, said he didn't want to scare her and wanted to give himself up. Bennett told him to put down the guns.

"I grabbed a booking sheet and as we talked, a dispatcher with the state police who was listening to all of this tried to raise some of the officers," she said. About the time she finished booking the man, state police officers burst through the door.

She stayed strong during the whole ordeal. It wasn't until later, when another officer came to console her, that she shed tears of relief.

Some dispatch experiences were more humorous, like the time she was working an evening shift and received a call from a teary-voiced child, who said "Help me, help me."

Bennett traced the call to a house on Spring Road and dispatched a sergeant.

"What he found when he arrived was a distressed four-year-old being forced by his nine-year-old sister to eat his peas before he could leave the table," she said. "The sergeant explained to the boy that what might seem like an emergency to him may not be to the dispatcher on duty."

A good dispatcher must be slightly schizophrenic, Bennett said.

"You have to write type, talk, listen to the radio and the people around you all at the same time," she said.

Bennett has tried other pursuits and "retired" in 1993 after 11 years of dispatching for the Ruidoso Police Department, but she keeps coming back.

"Once you become a dispatcher and you're good at it, no other job will do," she said. "There's an adrenaline high. You must function and get people help in as short a time as possible."

### Youthful pursuits

Clayton and Helen Bennett already operated a store and tourist cabins near Ruidoso when they adopted Betty as a three-day-old child in El Paso in the 1930s.

"They had the only gas pump between Roswell and Alamogordo, so the business grew," she said. "As a small girl I can remember the strong relationship between my parents and the Indians who would bring their goods to trade for a sack of flour. My parents were proud to be known as Indian traders."

Their location on U.S. Highway 70 in the Hollywood area was considered country living.

"I went to Stetson School (now Stetson Art Center) through sixth grade and we were proud that we weren't city kids," Bennett said. A new school, now called Ruidoso Middle School, was built in Ruidoso by the time she reached seventh grade.

Bennett remembers her first grade teacher, Miss Young, saying she was going to teach the class to read.

"I said I can already read, and she handed me a book and I read it. I told my folks I didn't have to go to school, because I knew everything," Bennett said.

To keep their precocious child mentally occupied, the Bennetts drove to Roswell once a week for her piano and voice lessons, followed by a visit to the bookstore.

During Ruidoso's World War II years, parents filled in as teachers, everyone picked up bits and pieces of scrap metal and Victory Gardens grew in most backyards.

The favorite pastime was going to the movies at the Pueblo or the Apache Theater, where Bennett saw her first movie, "Sleeping Beauty."

Her family's log cabin rentals

burned in March 1941.

"I remember the volunteer firefighters trying to fight this huge blaze from three pickups with 55-gallon drums of water in back," Bennett said.

Her parents rebuilt the business and stayed until 1959, when they retired and moved to Alamogordo. The retirement lasted one year before they moved back to the mountains and built what became the landmark Bennett's Indian Shop on U.S. 70 at the western entrance to Ruidoso. Clayton Bennett died Aug. 11, 1995 and Helen Bennett now lives in Alamogordo.

During her teen years, her father sold cars and Bennett had the best of two worlds — a horse to ride and her pick of cars to drive.

"I was involved in nearly everything in high school," she said. It's where she first tasted the excitement of performing in a play.

## Little theater dream

Her best friend in high school, Joan Marie Poteet Griffith, shared Bennett's dream of starting a local theater.

But Bennett's course in life involved a few more bends before she

returned to Ruidoso and the women realized their ambition.

"In those days, a woman had three choices," Bennett said. "She could become a teacher, a nurse or a secretary, but the ultimate goal was to marry and have children."

Bennett left for Texas Tech's nursing program, but it didn't take long for the crush of students on the campus to drive her back to the uncluttered air of Ruidoso. After staying out a semester and working at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital (now the Lincoln County Medical Center), she tried college again, this time at the smaller Portales campus of Eastern New Mexico University.

"That's where I really found drama, but I always was in trouble," she said. "I spent more time in the academic dean's office trying to convince him to let me take the courses I wanted to take. Sometimes I would be told I couldn't take a class, because it's a male course."

"I told him I thought learning had to do with the brain and not other parts of the anatomy."

On the other hand, she was

never involved with the women's liberation movement.

"I never wanted to come down to being equal," she said.

Instead of completing college, on a whim Bennett spent a year in Milwaukee where she sang in a strip club and acted as master of ceremonies.

"It never occurred to me at the time that the girls had another sideline," she said.

Eventually, she became pals with the black drummer and saxophone player, and during an era when Milwaukee still operated on a philosophy of segregation, she ended up singing with a black nightclub.

When she came back to New Mexico, she was hired as a dispatcher for the Alamogordo department and worked there four years. She was married three years to a police officer.

Over the decade of the 1960s, she moved back and forth from El Paso, worked at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track, at the elegant Juarez Race Track and spent time in Florida with her second husband.

A hurricane chased her out of that state and she settled in Arizona, where she became an Indian trader, working for a jewelry dealer until 1974.

"On my 40th birthday, I gave myself a divorce and started life over," Bennett said.

She worked at K-Bobs Restaurant and as a dispatcher in Ruidoso Downs. One day at the restaurant, her boss was complaining about the lack of customers on Monday night. Bennett suggested a dinner theater and he agreed.

"I put an ad in the paper for anyone interested in starting a theater and much to my surprise, a lot of people showed up," Bennett said.

She quickly slid into the slot of director for a melodrama and Joan Marie Potest Griffith took on a one-act play.

The group has been together ever since, moving from one location to another throughout the years until it found a home in 1993 near the Ruidoso Post Office.

Even bigger ambitions are brewing. The Ruidoso Little Theater members hope to find backing to

move into the Camelot Castle, where they could perform and bring in other small groups.

"We do four shows a year, each running about three nights," Bennett said. "This year, we'll also have a children's show. We need to get young people involved."

And, of course, Bennett still works as a dispatcher, this time for the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.



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# Capitan girls sluggish in loss to Blue Demons Basketball

Dexter took advantage of an uninspired Capitan team to post a 41-31 District 6AA girls basketball win Tuesday in Dexter.

The Blue Demons move to 3-0 in district play, while the Tigers slip to 1-2. Capitan has a 7-12 overall slate.

Capitan coach Norman Cline said his team wasn't mentally ready to play. The Tigers had trouble executing their offense and playing with emotion.

"Missed shots, missed free throws, not diving for loose balls all point to not being mentally ready," Cline said.

The Tigers were coming off a hard-fought 40-39 win at Tularosa Saturday. Against the Wildcats, Capitan got some late-game heroics from several players.

Casey Cunningham played the nets for four free throws in the last three minutes of the game to keep Capitan close. Mandi Aldaz's bucket put the Tigers ahead 38-37 with less than a minute remaining.

Then, Tulio had the ball and a chance to go ahead, but Chris Worroll and Michelle Wilson teamed to steal the ball. The Wildcats were forced to foul and they sent Cris Gonzales to the line. Gonzales nailed both free throws for a 40-37 lead and 10 seconds to go in the game. Tularosa scored a layup but the Wildcats eventually ran out of time.

Gonzales finished with nine points and Aldaz added eight in the winning cause.

In Capitan's Jan. 19 non-district loss to Loving, Joni Autrey paced Capitan with 15 points. Loving prevailed 49-46.

Capitan still can win the No. 1 seed in the district — with a little help from either Tularosa or Cloudercroft.

"We still have an outside chance of being seeded first. But, we have to rely on somebody else. For being No. 2, we can take care of that," Capitan coach Norman Cline said.

The Tigers are 1-2 in the 6AA and 7-12 overall. They play the Cloudercroft Bears, who are 2-1 in district action.

Cloudercroft beat the Tigers just a week-and-a-half ago, 42-40. Junior post player Rustie Waldon destroyed Capitan inside, scoring 27 points. The Cloudercroft player was a perfect 10-for-10 from the free-throw line.

"Their goal on offense was simply get the ball to her," Cline said. "We're going to have to stop Rustie. We need to hold her under 15 points."

Capitan is led in scoring by senior Cris Gonzales and junior post player Mandi Aldaz. Aldaz and sophomore Coye Robbins pace the Tigers in rebounding.

But Cline's team doesn't rely on any player to score 20 points a game for them. It's scoring by committee for the Tigers, with no one averaging in double figures.

"We have somebody different leading us in scoring every night," Cline noted.

Perhaps Cline's biggest concern is 'which' Capitan team will show up Saturday to play: the one that

has the notorious Tiger hustle and tenacity, or the one that plays without emotion.

Capitan must beat Cloudercroft by more than two points if it's to regain the edge in the district race. The second seed is assured of home-court advantage in the district playoffs until the championship game.

"If you're not second, you've got to play everything on the road," Cline said. "Now, we have to go about it the hard way."

Maybe that will be enough to get the Tigers hissing and spitting Saturday when the Bears pay a visit.

## Susan McSween stood strong in face of controversy

Susan McSween's husband Alexander was gunned down in the climactic gun battle of the Lincoln County War on the night of July 19, 1878. But she was not the kind of woman to just give up and leave simply because her husband had been murdered.

Born Susan Hummer, she had married "Alex" on the 28th of August, 1873. Both she and her husband exist in the shadowlands of history, because the little that is known of their lives prior to their arrival in Lincoln County is contradictory at best.

The movies invariably paint Alexander McSween as a God-fearing man devoted to justice, a man who made right the wrong that was perpetrated when his partner John Tunstall was murdered on the 18th of February, 1878. Susan is pictured as his loyal, matronly wife. Brave and true.

As is always the case in real life, it's not that simple.

Alexander McSween was most certainly a God-fearing man, never far from his Bible. As to being devoted to justice, that may well be another story.

It was McSween who, after the death of Tunstall, organized Tunstall's friends and employees into what would become the Regulators. The question is whether he was seeking justice or revenge.

Dick Brewer, Tunstall's friend, neighbor and employee, felt guilty for leaving Tunstall to his fate that February evening near modern-day Glencoe. He shouldn't have — he and Tunstall's other men were far too outnumbered to have made a difference.

But Dick Brewer was a decent young man — honest, brave, and very highly thought of in Lincoln County. His courage and character were never questioned.

Nevertheless, guilt was what Dick felt, and McSween played upon that guilt to persuade Dick to be the first leader of the Regulators. It was a mistake for Brewer to allow himself to be manipulated like this, and he paid for it with his life on the 5th of April, 1878 at Blazer's Mill, just outside what is now downtown Mesalero.

At the time, no one held Alexander McSween in any way responsible for Brewer's death. Perhaps they should have.

Susan Hummer McSween was a controversial citizen of Lincoln County in her own right, and remains so to this day. At the time, many citizens felt that she "put on airs" — especially after she and her husband built an extremely large and opulent (by the standards of the time and place) house in Lincoln near the Tunstall Store.

Even more damaging, at least in the eyes of the local populace, was Susan's alleged promiscuity. Rumors abounded concerning her trysts with various young men in the Lincoln area.

Susan, however, contended to her dying day that these stories were nothing more than malicious lies, spread by the enemies of her husband. And perhaps that is exactly what they were.

Despite the fact that her husband was dead and her home in ashes, she chose to remain in Lincoln. Some of the surviving Regulators, Billy the Kid among them, acted as unofficial guardians for her in the aftermath of the Five Day Battle that resulted in the deaths of her husband and five others.

The Regulators slept on the ground outside of her door, and while she would later refer to them as "foolhardy boys," she owed them a debt of gratitude for this action. Ruthless outlaws such as Jesse Evans and John Kinney held sway in the town during that period, and she doubtless would have been subjected to insults and perhaps worse at their hands if not for the presence of those "foolhardy boys."

Huston Chapman was a one-armed firebrand lawyer who, if he felt he was in the right, was prepared to battle his way through every court in the land in the pursuit of justice.

However, as Chapman was destined to discover, the

battles in Lincoln County did not take place in courtrooms.

Immediately after his arrival in Lincoln, he made himself a thorn in the sides of Jimmy Dolan, Nathan Dudley (the commander of Ft. Stanton), and virtually anyone else that he could connect with the deaths of Tunstall and (especially) McSween.

Chapman and Susan McSween felt that the lack of decisive action by the U.S. Army during the Five Day Battle was directly related to the death of her husband.

It all came to a head on the night of Feb. 18, 1879, one year to the day since the death of John Tunstall.

Huston Chapman was afflicted with neuralgia, and with his head swathed in bandages, he was walking down Lincoln's only street to get some bread to make a poultice when he came face to face with some of the most visible participants of both the Tunstall/McSween and Murphy/Dolan factions. Many of these men were dangerous gunmen even when sober, which unfortunately for Chapman, they were not.

Unbeknownst to Chapman, the two factions had met a short time earlier in the middle of the street for peace talks. After reaching a mutual agreement concerning the keeping of the peace and ending of the war, they decided to celebrate their new friendship with all of the liquor they could get their hands on.

Among this group were some of the leading lights of both sides in the Lincoln County War. From the Murphy/Dolan faction there were Jesse Evans, Billy Campbell and several other men loyal to the "House of Murphy," including Jimmy Dolan himself. From the Tunstall/McSween faction there were Billy the Kid, Yginio Salazar and Tom O'Fallard.

Spying this drunken group waving down the street towards him, Chapman chose to confront them instead of walking on the other side of the street. It was a brave move, and a fatal error.

Billy Campbell, one of the more dangerous men in a group of dangerous men (he had once killed a man for "goosing" his girl at a dance), stepped directly in front of Chapman and refused to let him pass.

"Who are you and where are you going?" he slurred.

Chapman remained unfazed. "My name is Chapman and I am attending to my business," he replied. With that, Campbell drew his revolver and jammed it into

Chapman's chest. "Then you dance," he snarled.

Chapman peered intently into Campbell's face. "You can't scare me, boy. I know it's you and it's no one. You've tried that before. Am I talking to Mr. Dolan?"

Jesse Evans spoke up: "No, but you're talking to a damned good friend of his." At that moment, Jimmy Dolan, further back in the crowd, fired his pistol into the ground, presumably to frighten Chapman, who was obviously a man who didn't frighten easily.

The sound of the shot had an unexpected effect. Billy Campbell's trigger finger tightened reflexively and his pistol discharged into Chapman's chest. "My God!" exclaimed Chapman. "I am killed."

He was right. Campbell and Chapman had been standing so close to one another that the muzzle flash from Campbell's gun had set Chapman's clothes on fire. The lawyer, however, was past pain by the time he hit the ground.

The crowd stepped over and around his burning body and continued on their drunken way to the next saloon.

Once they were in the saloon, Campbell began to worry about legalities. Suggesting that someone go out and put a gun on the corpse for the sake of the authorities, he looked around for a volunteer.

After a brief, uncomfortable silence, Billy the Kid offered to do it. Taking a gun from Jimmy Dolan, he left the saloon to go and place the weapon on the dead man.

Billy, however, was nobody's fool. Once outside the saloon, he went directly to his horse and left town, no doubt relieved that Campbell had offered him such a golden opportunity to get away from this volatile and obviously dangerous group.

Even with the additional weight of these new catastrophic events, Susan McSween refused to give up. Despite the fact that just about everyone in Lincoln County was in financial arrears thanks to the war, she attempted, mostly unsuccessfully, to collect her husband's and Tunstall's debts.

A little less than two years after the death of Alexander McSween, Susan McSween remarried on June 20, 1880. Her new husband was a man named George Barber, who had played no role in the Lincoln County War.

Three years later, in 1883, the Barbers bought a ranch near Tularosa and, thanks to a gift of cattle from John Chisum, she ultimately gained the money and respect that she had coveted for so long. She became known as the "cattle queen of New Mexico."

The Barbers were divorced in 1891, and Susan eventually purchased a home in White Oaks, but there was still some excitement in store for her, whether she wanted it or not.

At the age of 78, she was forced to jump 14 feet from her burning home to save her life. This time, however, her home had caught fire by accident.

She moved to a shack on Lincoln Avenue in White Oaks. It was there that historian after historian would come to interview her. It was there that she had a bad fall in 1929, from which her aged body never recovered. And it was there that, as she lay dying, she complained that she was portrayed as a middle-aged woman in the Johnny Mack Brown film, "Billy the Kid," when in fact, "I was much younger." And it was there, on the third of January, 1931, that her long life finally ended.

Susan McSween could have enlightened us greatly about the character and motives of the other major participants in the Lincoln County War, but because her own motives were so often suspect, many of her statements are greatly in need of corroboration.

Susan Hummer McSween Barber was buried, along with all of her secrets, in the cemetery at White Oaks. There is a simple headstone on the grave, and it gives no clue as to the character of the pioneer woman who lays beneath it.

# The new world is flat:

## A look at the flat tax proposed by some in Congress

(The following information was provided by Deason, Peters, Stockton & Co., certified public accountants in Ruidoso.)

Congress has heard your cries for a less complex tax code and has responded with several proposals on how individuals and businesses are taxed. The most radical and most popular of these proposals is the flat tax.

### What is it?

The flat tax is an attempt to create a system that treats all individuals and businesses fairly, while eliminating the majority of the Internal Revenue Code and the 400-plus tax forms currently in use. Instead we'd have two postcard-sized tax forms: one for individuals and one for businesses.

### How Does it Work?

As opposed to the progressive rates of the current tax system, all individuals and businesses would be taxed at the same rate. Under the current reform plan proposed by House Majority Leader Dick Armey, this rate would be 20%, falling to 17% after two years.

For individuals, taxable income would only include wages (expanded to include employer-provided health coverage), retire-

ment distributions, and unemployment compensation. All interest, dividends, and capital gains would be excluded. Also, there would no longer be any itemized deductions. Instead, taxpayers would receive a standard deduction of \$21,400 for married taxpayers filing jointly (\$10,700 for single filers), and a standard deduction of \$5,000 for each dependent.

Under the flat tax, all businesses would be taxed the same way. Taxable income would be determined by reducing gross domestic and foreign receipts by wages, retirement contributions, some taxes, and any property or services used in connection with the business activity. This would include all fixed assets; there would be no more depreciation. However, some expenses (such as fringe benefits and interest expense) would no longer be deductible. Businesses would also be allowed to carry over excess deductions to the next year, with interest.

### Who Wins?

Many stand to win with the flat tax. Because of the large standard deduction, many lower-income families would not have to pay any income tax at all. Meanwhile,

higher-income taxpayers would receive a large tax cut from the reduction in the tax rates. Businesses that rely on capital investment and equity financing would see big gains as well. Finally, the flat tax would greatly simplify the current tax system, saving potentially billions of dollars in administration. If it sounds too good to be true, you're right. Not everyone stands to benefit.

### Who Loses?

While the flat tax has many advantages, there are some drawbacks. First of all, tax revenues would fall far below their current level. Unprecedented spending cuts would be required to make the system deficit-neutral.

Secondly, eliminating itemized deductions could have harmful effects on the housing industry and on charitable organizations.

Without the mortgage interest and property tax deductions, some have predicted that the market values of homes could drop as much as 15%.

Also, more than half of all charitable contributions made in 1992 were claimed as deductions on tax returns. The inability to deduct

contributions could adversely affect people's willingness to give.

Supporters of the flat tax claim that these are only short-term problems. They believe that the long-term benefit in the economy from such a system would eventually outweigh its shortcomings. Others, such as Republican presidential candidate Arlen Specter, have proposed a modified flat tax, allowing limited mortgage interest and charitable contribution deductions.

Another obstacle facing the flat tax is how such a system would be

phased in. What would happen to all of the unused depreciation deductions currently sitting on corporations' books? What would such an abrupt change in taxation do to the housing industry and the securities markets?

### When Would it Happen?

These and many other important questions have yet to be answered, so you won't see a flat tax soon. But as the debate rolls on, our tax

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# TAX TIPS BY H & R BLOCK

## TAX BREAKS FOR BABY

**Q** My wife and I are expecting our first baby soon. Will I receive the full exemption amount for the child or will I need to prorate the amount for the number of days in the year after the child is born?

**A** The baby will count as a full exemption even if he or she is born on December 31. As for other tax consequences, you may want to adjust your Form W-4 to reflect the extra exemption. Assuming you're in the 28 percent tax bracket, that will result in about \$58 more per month in take-home pay. Next, keep track of your medical expenses for the prenatal care, delivery, and post-delivery care for your wife and child. Medical expenses are deductible to the extent the unreimbursed amount exceeds 7.5 percent of your adjusted gross income. Finally, obtain a social security number for the child. New IRS rules require a social security number for any individual born before November 1, 1995, who is claimed as a dependent. In fact, you'll need the number right away if you want to file your 1995 tax return electronically.

## HOME IMPROVEMENTS

**Q** I recently added a deck to my home at a cost of about \$4,000. Can I deduct any portion of my expense?

**A** You can't deduct your expense, but that doesn't mean you have

no tax benefit. The full amount you spent for your deck is added to the tax basis of your home. When you sell your home, the cost of the deck will reduce any gain that may otherwise be subject to income tax. Be sure to keep all records and receipts related to the cost of the deck and other home improvements.

## PRINCIPAL RESIDENCE EXCLUSION

**Q** My mother purchased a home and lived in it for two years. She then suffered a stroke and can no longer care for herself. She has lived in a nursing home for the past year. Can she, like others age 55 or older, exclude the gain from the sale of her home?

**A** A taxpayer who is age 55 or older may qualify to exclude from income tax the first \$125,000 (\$62,500 if married and filing separately) of gain realized on the sale of his or her principal residence.

Generally, a taxpayer must use the residence as his or her principal residence for three of the five years prior to the sale to qualify for the exclusion.

There is, however, an exception for incapacitated individuals. If the property was used as the principal residence for at least one year within the five-year period, the time of residence in a licensed facility such as a nursing home is treated as use of the

home as the principal residence.

## IRA CONTRIBUTIONS

**Q** My husband is 72 and still holds a job. We would like to put some money in an IRA, but are told he can't because he's over 70 1/2. I'm only 65, but I don't work. Is there any way around these rules?

**A** You haven't reached age 70 1/2 and your spouse is eligible to make a contribution to a spousal IRA. He can contribute up to \$2,000 per year, assuming he earns at least that much during the year. Even though you can contribute to an IRA, whether or not you can deduct any part of your contribution will depend on your total income and whether your husband is covered by a retirement plan where he works.

## REFINANCING YOUR HOME MORTGAGE

**Q** We recently refinanced our home mortgage. We paid "points" as well as closing costs. Can we deduct what we paid to refinance?

**A** Loan fees such as points are normally deductible in full, in the year paid, only if the loan was incurred to purchase or improve your principal residence. Points paid to refinance a home mortgage — for example, where a new lower rate loan replaces an old loan — are not currently deductible in full. Instead, refi-

naning points may be deducted over the term of the loan. For example, if the new mortgage has a 15-year term, the points paid may be deducted evenly over the 15 years. Unfortunately, the other closing costs you paid in conjunction with your refinancing — appraisal fee, title insurance, recordings, etc. — are not deductible.

## DONATING PROPERTY

**Q** Each year I donate items of property other than cash to charity. What must I do to document my contributions?

**A** When you make contributions of property such as household items, you may deduct the property's fair market value on your tax return. The fair market value of most household property is the price the item would sell for at a thrift shop or yard sale. Special rules may apply, however, for property that has increased in value.

For your records, you should keep an itemized list of all items you donate along with their estimated fair market value. You should also have a receipt from the charitable organization indicating the date that property was, in fact, received from you.

If you contribute property valued at over \$500, you are required to attach Form 8283 to your tax return providing detailed information about your contribution.

## CASUALTY LOSSES

**Q** My home was recently destroyed by a flood. How will this affect my income tax return?

**A** When property is damaged or destroyed due to a flood, the loss is called a casualty. Damage caused by other events such as earthquakes, tornadoes, storms, fires, vandalism, and automobile accidents may also qualify as casualties.

The amount of your casualty loss is either your adjusted basis in the property (generally measured by your cost or investment in the property) immediately before the casualty or its decline in fair market value (generally measured by the cost of repairs) as a result of the casualty, whichever is smaller. The loss is reduced by any insurance or other reimbursements you receive. In the case of personal-use property, such as your home, the amount of the loss you can deduct on your tax return is further reduced by \$100 per casualty and by 10 percent of your adjusted gross income.

How much of a loss will be deductible in your particular case will depend on the size of your loss relative to your income. For example, a loss of \$8,000 (after insurance reimbursement) will be partially deductible for a taxpayer with adjusted gross income of \$40,000. The same loss, however, will not be deductible for a taxpayer with adjusted gross income of \$80,000.

## TAXES AND YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS

**Q** Will I have to pay more income tax on my social security benefits this year?

**A** Whether any of your social security benefits will be taxed depends on the amount of your income. If your modified adjusted gross income, plus one-half of your social security benefits, is more than \$34,000 (and you're single) or \$44,000 (and you're married and filing a joint return), up to 85 percent of your social security benefits will be included in taxable income. If your modified adjusted gross income is less than these amounts but more than \$25,000 (single) or \$32,000 (married filing jointly), you'll pay tax on a maximum of 50 percent of your benefits. Finally, if your income is below the levels just listed, your social security benefits will be tax free. Special rules may apply if you are married and filing a separate tax return.

## EARLY IRA WITHDRAWALS

**Q** I wanted to start withdrawing money from my IRA, even though I am just 55 years old. Is there any way around the 10 percent penalty?

**A** Generally, unless you are disabled, you must pay the penalty if you withdraw money from your IRA before reaching age 59 1/2.

There is, however, one further exception to the penalty. You can escape the penalty if your withdrawals take the form of a lifetime annuity. Payment must be based on your life expectancy, or the life expectancies of you and your IRA beneficiary, made in substantially equal amounts, and distributed at least annually. If you later change the method of payment, the penalty may be imposed retroactively.

## CHILD CARE EXPENSES

**Q** May I claim a credit for child care expenses I pay while I'm looking for work?

**A** You may claim a child care credit for expenses that are work-related — those that allow you (and your spouse, if you are married) to work or to actively look for work. To claim a credit for child care expenses incurred during your job search, however, you must have some earned income during the year.

## JURY DUTY PAY

**Q** I was recently called for jury duty. I continued to receive my pay from my employer while I served, but my company required me to turn over to them the jury duty fee I earned. What are the tax consequences of all of this?

**A** You must include in income both your wages and the jury

duty pay. You may deduct the amount you turned over to your employer, however. What's more, you can deduct this amount even if you do not itemize deductions.

## AMENDED RETURNS

**Q** I filed my 1994 tax return on time. I forgot, however, to include income from a part-time job. What do I do now?

**A** You will need to amend your 1994 return. You may owe a little more tax, or you may get a small refund, depending on how much you earned and how much tax was withheld. You amend a return by filing Form 1040X.

You may file an amended return for a variety of reasons. For example, if you remember a deductible expense after your return has been filed, an amended return will correct the error and net you a refund. Generally, you have three years from the due date of your return to file an amendment. If you filed a state return, you may also have to amend that return.

## DEPENDENTS NEED SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS

**Q** My first child was born a few months ago. Should I obtain a social security number for him now?

**A** Since you must include the social security number of each individual born before November 1,

1995, whom you claim as a dependent on your return, it would be a good idea to apply for a social security number right away. In fact, because of IRS rules, if you want to file your return electronically, all persons listed on your return will need a valid social security number regardless of their age.

Call your Social Security office and request a copy of Form SS-5 for any child who needs a social security number. The completed application should be filed as soon as possible to avoid the expected last minute rush.

## CHANGE IN MARITAL STATUS

**Q** I got married in November. What will my filing status be on my 1995 tax return? Will I be considered married because I was married at the end of the year or will I be considered single because I was single for the majority of the year?

**A** You'll be considered a married taxpayer for 1995. Your marital status for tax purposes is determined as of the final day of the tax year, meaning you'll need to choose between filing a joint return or filing separate returns.

It will be best to compute your tax both ways for comparison, and then select the filing status that results in the lower combined tax liability. You and your spouse should each review your Forms W-4 filed

with your employers to adjust your tax withholding to reflect your new situation.

## CONSIDER ALL OPTIONS BEFORE FILING LATE

Sometimes it's just not possible to file your tax return by the April deadline. Events such as fire, hurricane, earthquake, or personal illness may make it impossible. If you find yourself in this situation, your H&R Block tax preparer can prepare a Form 4868 for you, which will result in a four-month extension of the deadline.

Even with an extension, you won't get a break on late payment penalties unless you pay at least 90 percent of your tax by April 15. In addition, interest will continue to accrue on the full amount you owe.

If you are tempted to apply for an extension because you owe taxes and can't afford to pay the full amount all at once, there is an alternative to filing late. You can file your tax return on time and request an installment payment plan from the IRS. If you need assistance requesting an installment payment plan, H&R Block can prepare Form 9465 for you.

Although the IRS will assess interest and a late payment penalty on the remaining balance, by making installment payments you'll keep these charges to a minimum.

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# TAX TIPS BY H & R BLOCK

## GOOD NEWS FOR JOB HUNTERS

Many expenses you have looking for a new job in your present occupation may be deductible. These expenses include resume preparation, employment agency fees, and transportation expenses to interview for a position or look for work. If you are job-hunting in a different part of the country, your qualified travel expenses include transportation costs to get to and from the job-search area, and food (subject to the 50-percent limit), lodging, and local transportation costs while there.

Job-hunting expenses are deductible whether or not you actually obtain a new job. If you are currently unemployed, you may deduct expenses related to looking for a new job in your most recent occupation, unless you have been unemployed for a long time.

You may include your deductible job-hunting expenses with other unreimbursed employee business expenses as miscellaneous itemized deductions, subject to the two percent of adjusted gross income limitation.

## LEARN WHILE YOU EARN

Your job-related educational expenses may provide you with a valuable tax deduction. Your costs are deductible if the education maintains or improves your skills in your present occupation and doesn't at the

same time qualify you for a new trade or business.

If you have already met the minimum education or training requirements for your job, the expenses you incur to upgrade your skills or obtain advanced training are deductible. It doesn't matter if the additional training is required by your employer for you to keep your job or you take the courses on your own initiative.

Deductible expenses include tuition, books, supplies, lab fees, and correspondence course fees. Also deductible are your travel and transportation costs going from work to school. You may even deduct your qualified expenses for job-related courses taken during vacations or temporary leaves of absence from work.

You may include your deductible educational expenses with other unreimbursed employee business expenses as miscellaneous itemized deductions, subject to the two percent of adjusted gross income limitation.

## EARNED INCOME CREDIT RULES

The earned income credit is designed to help lower-income working Americans. For 1995 the credit has been increased and the requirements for claiming it have changed too.

You may be eligible for an earned income credit (EIC) if your earned income and adjusted gross income are

less than:

- \$24,396 and you have one qualifying child, or
- \$26,673 and you have two or more qualifying children.

A qualifying child is one who meets three tests relating to relationship, residence, and age. Qualifying relationships include your son or daughter or descendant of either, stepson or stepdaughter, foster child, or adopted child. The qualifying child must have lived with you for more than half the year (the entire year in the case of a foster child).

Finally, the qualifying child must be under age 19 (or a full-time student under age 24) or be permanently and totally disabled.

If you have no qualifying children, you may be eligible for the credit if you have earned income and adjusted gross income of less than \$9,230 and meet these criteria:

1. You reside in the United States for over half the year;
2. You (or if married, either you or your spouse) are at least 25 but not yet 65 at the end of the tax year; and
3. You are not eligible to be claimed as a dependent of someone else.

While the earned income credit may be calculated on a worksheet, Schedule EIC requires you to provide certain identifying information about your qualifying child or children.

The credit is treated as a payment of tax that will result in a larger refund or reduce the amount of tax you owe.

## SOCIAL SECURITY AND MEDICARE TAXES

For 1995, employees are subject to social security tax withholding at a rate of 6.2 percent of the first \$61,200 of wages and medicare tax withholding at a rate of 1.45 percent of all wages. These amounts are reported separately on each employee's W-2 form. Employers pay an equal amount for each worker.

Self-employed individuals pay social security tax at a rate of 12.4 percent of the first \$61,200 of net self-employment income and medicare tax at a rate of 2.9 percent of all net self-employment income. Self-employed taxpayers are entitled to a deduction of half the self-employment tax paid.

## DEDUCTIBLE INTEREST

Taxpayers pay interest on a variety of different types of loans. These include business, investment, personal, and home mortgage loans. Only certain kinds of interest expenses are deductible, however. According to H&R Block, the income tax preparation service, taxpayers may deduct business, investment, and home mortgage interest. However, personal interest is not deductible.

In general, taxpayers may deduct all interest expenses incurred in connection with their trade or business. Taxpayers may also deduct interest associated with their investments up to the amount of their taxable net investment income (that is, investment income less investment expenses). In the area of home mortgage interest, certain special rules may apply.

Interest on loans used to purchase, construct, or improve a principal or second residence is fully deductible under most circumstances. "Points" or loan fees paid to obtain a home mortgage are also deductible in full the year paid if they are incurred in conjunction with the purchase or improvement of the home. Interest on home equity loans or lines of credit is also deductible under most circumstances.

Interest on a home equity loan (up to the lesser of \$100,000 or the difference between the fair market value of the home and total existing debt) is deductible regardless of how the proceeds of the loan are spent. However, H&R Block advises taxpayers to use caution with these types of loans or lines of credit. Because most qualified home equity loans are secured by the taxpayer's residence, there is an increased danger of losing the home if the taxpayer runs into financial difficulty and finds himself or herself overextended.

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

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### MACULAR DEGENERATION

Think of your eye as a camera, the retina at the back part acts like the picture. Right in the center of the retina, its most sensitive part is the macula. # POOP SCOOP

A year-end review of the number of animals impounded at the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter shows that 62% of the dogs were either adopted or reunited with their owners.

Cats were less fortunate, but still better than many shelters across the country, with a 32% placement rate.

"Our shelter is very fortunate that we have to euthanize, that is humanely kill, very few animals by state and national standards," said shelter director Jim Riggins. "On average, animal shelters having animal control contracts must kill upwards from 80%.

"Adoption is not the answer, because not enough homes exist for all the surplus animals. Besides, most of the animals euthanized at our shelter are wild (feral) cats or sick animals that are not adoptable."

Riggins said "no kill" shelters or 100% adoption facilities are popular and receive a great deal of publicity. On the plus side, they are injecting neutered animals into the cycle, he said.

"But on the negative side, without exception, there is a city 'pound' nearby that treats the real symptoms of overpopulation" by killing most of the animals it receives, Riggins said.

In Lincoln County last year,

1,049 animals were impounded. Of the 830 dogs impounded, representing 59% of the shelter's population, 578 were strays or running at large with unknown owners, 241 were brought in by their owners and 11 were quarantined for possible rabies.

Of the 575 cats impounded, 335 were stray, 242 were brought in by their owners and two were quarantined.

The shelter adopted out 205 dogs and 95 cats.

"This is our strongest weapon against pet overpopulation, because all of these animals were spayed or neutered and will not reproduce," Riggins said.

"If these roughly 300 slots in homes had been filled with breeding or 'free to good home' animals they could have produced a staggering 3,500 surplus animals in one year."

During 1995, 209 dogs and 13 cats were reunited with their owners.

"Although this is a high rate, we would like to see this number rise through simple measures by owners like tagging animals and taking precautions with a reliable animal care-giver while away on vacation."

About 59% of the animals came from Ruidoso, 27% from the county, 7% from Ruidoso Downs and 7% from Capitan.


