**Fire restrictions temporarily lifted**

Fire restrictions put into place April 5 on the Lincoln National Forest have been temporarily lifted as snow and rainfall have eased the high fire danger.

However, the restrictions will be reinstated on Friday, April 12.

Banned are fires, charcoal broilers, grills, candles, and coal or woodstoves, except in a developed campground or picnic area. Smoking outside of buildings, vehicles or cleared areas is also banned.

Forest fire personnel said up to a foot of snow fell on the highest peaks of the Guadalupe Mountains Friday, and two to five inches in fell the Sacramento Mountain Range.

**Equipment stolen from high school**

Burglars stole approximately \$7,000 in high-tech audio visual equipment from the Ruidoso High School on April 6 or 7, police report.

Stolen were a \$2,000 studio TV camera, a \$3,000 professional VHS recorder, and a \$2,000 big screen TV, police said.

The thieves snatched the camera and recorder from the coaches office. The TV was taken from inside the boys locker room, police said.

Initial entry into the building may have been gained through an unlocked door because there was no sign of force, police said.

Mrs. Huffmon was diagnosed with cancer one year ago, has undergone two surgeries to remove the malignancy and has been subjected to chemotherapy. She needs special cancer treatment at the University Hospital in Tucson, Ariz.

## Ruidoso officials seek meeting with Mescalero Tribal Council about land annexation issues

□ Tribe finishes paperwork on application to make Mescalero Inn part of tribal trust lands

Ruidoso officials will be requesting a meeting with the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council to discuss its federal application to annex the Carrizo Lodge land tract, the village manager said Tuesday.

The land, close to two miles from downtown Ruidoso, is within village limits.

"We'd like to offer the opportunity to sit down and see if some of the questions (about the property) can be resolved," Jackson told village councilors.

The village would be "remiss" if it didn't try to do this, Jackson said.

Topics for the meeting would include the status of village utilities serving the property and an incomplete replat of one of the Carrizo land parcels, among other issues.

Village officials were notified by the U.S. Department of Interior late last month of the tribe's application to add the approximately 7.5 acres of land to its trust. In its notice, the Department of Interior gave officials 30 days, or until April 25, to respond with any concerns about the potential impact of the loss of land.

The notice also requests information about the annual amount of property taxes currently levied on the property; any special assessments against the property; governmental services currently provided to the property by Ruidoso; how the property is zoned, and any other comments the village government would want to make.

Lincoln County officials received

the same letter, which is now in the hands of county attorney Alan Morel, county manager Frank Potter said. It will be discussed by the county commission at its April 22 special meeting or at its regular May 4 meeting, he said.

Jackson said all village department heads are being asked for their input regarding the potential acquisition, and village attorneys are researching relevant case law. A drafted response to the Interior Department should be ready by the latter part of next week, he said.

### Topics for the meeting would include the status of village utilities serving the property and an incomplete replat of one of the Carrizo land parcels, among other issues.

Village councilors first became aware of the tribe's interest in the land last August. At that time the tribal council sent a resolution to the Bureau of Indian Affairs saying it wants to acquire the land, and the BIA instructed the tribe on what it needed to file the application.

The Carrizo tract was annexed by the village three years ago, making the property liable for local sales and property taxes. Upon annexation, it was linked to Ruidoso water and sewer systems.

The property was purchased by

Raymond Gallegos' slot machine-supplying company, Gaim-ko, Inc., in August. Soon after, he gave part of it to the tribe. The tribe has revamped the restaurant and bar in the historic lodge, and opened a nightclub nearby.

Property taxes paid on the land last year totaled \$11,198, the county assessor said.

Although village officials are given the opportunity to respond to the application, they won't necessarily receive a response to any of their questions.

The Interior Department's letter states a copy of the village's response will be given to the tribe, which will be given a reasonable time to reply and/or request that the BIA area director issue a decision.

From a legal standpoint, the entire annexation situation is both "fascinating" and a "quagmire," said Village Attorney John Underwood.

The Department of Interior has a fiduciary type of relationship with Indian Nations and protects their interests, Underwood said. So whenever a village is on the other side of a tribe in a legal argument, it's also on "the other side of the government," Underwood said.

Because of a common area underneath 12 Carrizo condominiums Gallegos purchased, and questions about projected water use at the new businesses, subdivision of the land still awaits village Planning and Zoning Commission approval, P&Z Director Cleatus Richards said.

Richards requested information about whether Carrizo Lodge Condominium Association mortgage holders approved a requested replat of the property. Their ownership and free access to the common area would be lost with the replat. Richards still hasn't received the information, Richards said.

## Subdivisions face water shortages

The lack of snow and rain in Lincoln County has hit subdivisions around Alto hard, according to state water officials.

They've been impacted more than most of the county's towns or even its ranchers, because they sit on top of a formation of shale that is poorly suited to holding water, said Craig Hipple of the State Engineer's Office in Roswell.

"The problems we've seen have been more in the Alto area and surrounding subdivisions," he said. "A few had to drill new wells. There's a problem in Tall Pines Subdivision (along Alpine Village Road off Mechem Drive) right now.

"The (underground) formations are real tight and not conducive to holding a lot of water, compared to the more porous limestone formations like the San Andreas that runs under Capitan, Hondo and into Roswell.

"When there is a lack of precipitation for three to four years, it finally starts to show up in wells.

"Wells just aren't producing as much water as they used to because of the lack of precipitation.

Alto Lakes Water Corp., which serves Alto Village and related subdivisions, hedged its bets by developing 18 wells, he said. The water company currently only uses six to eight of those wells.

Although Alto Lakes Water Corp. should have enough water to take care of growth for the next three or four years and cover dry spells, it drilled a new well earlier this year and has a couple wells in the Eagle Creek area, said corporation president Dalton Haines.

"We've not had to move to any new wells, but with our rapid growth, we drilled a new well this year and negotiated for some properties for drilling sites and rights that have given us a good water supply," he said. "We have plenty now underground and we're working on above-ground storage."

During dry summers in the past three to four years, residents have been asked to water lawns only two days a week until the rains start, he said.

"But we think we will get by this year without that," Haines said. The water corporation serves between 700-750 connections, he said.

### Ranch land dry, but wells working

Ranchers haven't been affected significantly, because they don't use much water, officials said.

"I've talked to several ranchers who think their well water levels are dropping," said county extension agent Barry Herd. "I started hearing about it last summer. A few have gone dry. Not everyone is affected, because some are on top of a different underground system.

"With ranchers, the main concern is that between the ground being dry and the need for supplemental feeding, it's just another thing ranchers have to live with."

Billy Weddige said he drilled a new well last year when he started to have problems with one of his four.

"I thought it was pumping from the same vein, but this one is doing fine," said Weddige, who cares for a 15-section ranch about 10 miles north of Capitan.

County Commissioner Stirling Spencer lost one well this year on his Bar W Ranch west and north of Carrizozo.

"It will come back if it rains, but it will have to be a constant rain like in 1986-87," he said. "I lost it once before in the 1950s. It's about 60-70 feet deep, but it just must not be in the right holding capacity, because my other (five) wells range from 12 feet to 400 feet deep."

Five springs also continue to flow on his ranch despite the lack of precipitation, he said.

### Villages' restrictions

Water use restrictions have been enacted in the village of Ruidoso because its sources are drying up, Hipple said.

Eagle Creek is not running, the upper Rio Ruidoso is barely flowing and Alto Lake is dry. Although Grindstone Lake has water, the village can only treat about a million gallons a day, Hipple said.

Some residents of Ruidoso have called his office to find out about drilling private domestic wells, Hipple said.

The village has banned watering of gardens and other outside uses, and residents have been asked to conserve on their indoor water uses.

"We have no restrictions on domestic wells right now," Hipple said.

Capitan residents have been asked to conserve water, although no official restrictions have been

## Lava slows widening of Highway 380 by Carrizozo

Blasting through the 10,000-year-old lava field west of Carrizozo probably will turn out to be the toughest part of the reconstruction and widening of U.S. 380, says the project manager.

But that work has been accomplished and from now on, the job of building the base and then surfacing the road should be routine, Corky McEuen said Thursday.

"We had to blast our way through," said McEuen, a state Highway and Transportation Department official. "The lava is estimated to be from 20 to 40 feet deep and we didn't go all the way through anywhere."

"It tore up tires and equipment." Started in December by Mountain States Construction Co. of Albuquerque, the 4.2-mile job should be finished by the end of the year, McEuen said. Since it was originally designed, the cost has risen from \$4.4 million to nearly \$5

million, he said.

It's not the only road in the area receiving a facelift.

Shoulders also are being built along a four-mile section of U.S. 54 south of Carrizozo, starting at the edge of town, McEuen said.

The \$2 million job is being handled by J.W. Jones Construction from Albuquerque and is expected to be completed by the end of the year.

But it's the twisting, up-and-down section of U.S. 380 winding its way toward San Antonio that was the most pressing project. When finished, it will be flatter and straighter, McEuen said.

"What we're doing is building a brand new road to the north of the existing road," he said. "It will have two, 12-foot wide driving lanes and 8-foot shoulders on each side. There are no shoulders now."

Starting about 3 miles west of Carrizozo, cement dividers have been put up where the ground has been cut away. The solid cement "railing" should keep drivers from miscalculating and ending up 40 feet below, off the side of the road in the new construction area.

While working on this job, the state also is creating trails with handrails for the handicapped at the nearby Valley of Fire Recreation Area, McEuen said.

Another section of U.S. 380 near Bingham is scheduled to be improved later in the year, he added.

"We definitely will have a shortage this summer," Muniz said. "El Paso Natural Gas gave us two wells, but we need the money to connect them to our existing water lines. We applied for a Community Development Block Grant (for money to hook up the wells), but didn't get it."

Customers have been asked to moderate their lawn watering, she said. The school football field is watered once a week instead of three times.

The situation is more severe in Corona, said village clerk Cathy Muniz.

"It's been a very dry year and we had no winter whatsoever," Muniz said. "It could be especially tough this summer. There's been no moisture for about three years in Corona."

The village serves about 200 customers off one old well, but the water quality is poor and many people haul in their drinking water, she said.

## County commission delays action on White Oaks alleys

Action was delayed by the Lincoln County Commission on two requests to abolish county-designated alleys in the historic community of White Oaks.

Following the recommendation of the new county road review committee, commissioners agreed last week to refer the requests to County Attorney Alan Morel for advice.

Paul Wetzel, a resident of the small settlement northeast of Carrizozo, said he opposes the requests, but not because he's against growth.

"I don't want to lose the historic values of the community," he told commissioners. "The alleys were laid out when the town was formed."

E.J. Fouratt, who serves on the road review committee, said several structures intrude into the designated alley ways.

Just because a porch juts out into an alley is no reason to close it, Wetzel said.

"If this happened in other areas, the structure would be moved," he said.

Wetzel asked commissioners to deny the requests submitted by Milton Huffmyer of Las Cruces and A.J. Marks of Carrizozo.

Huffmyer wants the county to vacate (abolish) a 16-foot wide alley in Block 19 that includes the west 10 feet of Carizo Street and the east 10 feet of Chloride Street.

Marks is asking the commission to vacate a 16-foot wide alley on Block 35.

If the county decides to vacate the alleys, commissioners might

want to consider closing all the town's alleys at once, instead of piece-mealing the closures, Fouratt said. He also asked whether the commission should develop a formula for the county to be compensated when it vacates roads.

"In some cases, the person is gaining quite a bit of land," he said.

But Morel said that although some municipalities do charge, he disagrees with selling property back to the people who gave it.

"Then we're not deciding who's entitled to it," he added.

In other business, the commission awarded a contract to Lincoln Mechanical of Ruidoso to replace the chiller (air conditioning) in the main courthouse, for a bid of \$49,775. The only other bid was from Carrier in Albuquerque for \$87,498.

awarded an electrical maintenance contract for county facilities to Central New Mexico Electric for a price of \$45 per hour and a 24% markup on material.

awarded a plumbing, heating and air conditioning maintenance contract to Lincoln Mechanical of Ruidoso for \$45 per hour (\$30 for an apprentice), and a markup on material ranging from 50-105% depending on the wholesale price.

appointed Frank Sawyer of Ruidoso to the new county management relations board, in compliance with the collective bargaining ordinance. The other members are Ray Vowell from Ruidoso and Clifford Macias, representing labor.

rejected the only bid for two road surfacing projects being done in cooperation with the state highway and transportation department. The budget was based on costs two years ago and fell more than \$10,000 short on each project. Commissioners said they will ask the state for more money.

Commissioner Bill Schweitmann said if the state won't allocate more money, the amount budgeted should be used to do one of the roads, DDO2 and DPO3, run along the edge of Alto and link up to Sierra Blanca Airport Road.

### RUIDOSO VILLAGE COUNCIL ACTIONS

The following actions were taken at the April 9 regular Ruidoso Village Council meeting.

**PUBLIC HEARING:**

Approved a zone map amendment on lot 6, and tract P, Palmer Gateway Subdivision. Property was rezoned from C-4 (heavy commercial) to C-2 (community commercial).

**REGULAR MEETING ITEMS**

Vacated 1,808 square feet of public right-of-way on lot 2, block F, Ruidoso Springs Subdivision, for 3904. Vacation will cure encroachment into right-of-way.

Scheduled a May 14 public hearing for a zone map amendment on lots 2-6, block 3, Hamilton Terrace Subdivision. Proposed zoning would change property from R-1 (single family residential) to R-4 (high density residential). Proposed zoning complies with the village comprehensive plan.

Adopted mission statement and goals. The mission and goals were discussed at the council retreat March 30-31.

Adopted council agenda format amendments discussed at the council retreat March 30-31. The amendment deletes the "comments from audience" category.

**CONSENT REGULAR ITEMS**

Approved governing body minutes.

Extended professional agreement with Management Associates, Inc. for consultation services in connection with collective bargaining. Extension is for a year from April 25, 1996 to April 24, 1997. During the first year of its agreement with the firm, the village has paid out \$2,413.

Approved bid award for water pipe and accessories to Waterworks Sales for \$16,717 and Rio Grande Pump & Supply for \$1,888. The bids were the lowest out of the three received.

Rejected bids for a trench compactor and approved a rebid. Two bids were received, but neither met village specifications. Staff will make changes in the bid before advertising the rebid.

Approved a bid award for fuel dispensing service to Bell Gas-AWC Propane with a .0976 per gallon offer for unleaded and .0999 per gallon for diesel. This will be a contract valid through June 30, 1997 for all village departments using fuel.

Approved rate increase from \$70 to \$75 per month on all shades rentals at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Scheduled workshop to discuss street priorities for 10 a.m. April 16.

Approved out-of-state travel for Ruidoso Police Chief Larry Maddox, who was selected by the Federal Bureau of Invest-

igation to attend the advanced Leads Program at Southwest Command College in Irvine, Calif. Travel will be June 9 to June 14; all expenses are being paid by the New Mexico Police Chief's association.

# Teen pot charges filed

A post-midnight game of Hackey Sack behind some downtown Ruidoso stores led to the arrest Tuesday of three area teenagers for marijuana possession, police said.

Two of the 18-year-olds, Steve Stambaugh of Alto and Mark Owen Russell of Ruidoso, were arrested on petty misdemeanor charges of possession of less than an ounce of marijuana.

Stambaugh and Russell pleaded guilty at their Tuesday Ruidoso Magistrate Court arraignment, and received suspended sentences of 15 days in jail and the maximum \$100 fine. Each was ordered to pay court costs of \$106, Judge William Butts said.

Mark Prewitt, 18, of Ruidoso, the third youth found kicking the sac behind Pine Tree Square, was arrested on a fourth-degree felony charge of possession of marijuana with intent to sell. He was also charged with misdemeanor possession of drug paraphernalia, police said.

Prewitt was on probation at the time of his arrest, so he is being held at the Lincoln County Jail without bond, Butts said.

The one-year probation was set after Prewitt's April 1 arrest on petty misdemeanor charges of drinking alcohol, possession of less than an ounce of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia, Butts said. Prewitt pleaded no contest to those charges.

The Tuesday morning bust occurred after officers Bobby Madrid and Mike Lovelace were dispatched to the shopping area around 12:30 a.m. An Allstate employee had complained to police of suspicious-looking youths hanging around the store's exterior.

Lovelace shined a flashlight through the window of the only car parked behind the stores and allegedly saw the two baggies of marijuana and rolling papers laying on the back seat.

One of the bags was a regular sandwich plastic baggie allegedly containing more than an ounce of marijuana, and partially-smoked marijuana cigarettes. The other baggie allegedly contained six sandwich baggies of marijuana, one of which was weighed at eight grams, police said.

# Church plans expansion

The Community United Methodist Church of Ruidoso is running out of room. Church officials are now raising money for a new education building, and eventually hope to build a new sanctuary as well.

The first phase of the building program is replacement of the nearly 50-year-old outmoded and much-too-small education building, said Pat Newell, director of the current six-week fundraising campaign. The goal is to raise \$176,000 to \$236,000 to construct a new 6,542 square-foot facility.

Highlights of the campaign included prayer visits to church members' homes before any solicitation. Louise Wilkinson is spiritual emphasis director. An eight-page brochure explaining the need and listing campaign details has been developed, and weekly newsletters will keep church members informed of campaign news and progress, said Don Reynolds, promotion director.

An inspirational prime rib banquet and associated children's party is set for May 12 at Bonito Park at the Nazarene Camp north of Ruidoso. Victory Sunday is planned for May 25.

The current educational building, which will be demolished, started out as a lumberyard storage area. It has been revamped a number of times but the Sunday school has completely outgrown the old facility, pastor Craig Cockrell said. There is hardly room for potluck dinners, he added.

Other division directors are Jim Miller, advance commitment director; Jim Wood, commitment visitation director; Jane Parks, report snack director; Paula Davis, banquet director; Arla Reynolds, campaign secretary, and Linda Newell, follow-up director (organization).

Expanded parking and a much larger sanctuary are planned for coming years, the Rev. Cockerell said.

### Small communities take care of their people


One thing that's great about living in a small community such as those in Lincoln County is, your neighbors care about what happens to you.

## School board approves plan for success

The Ruidoso School Board approved an Educational Plan for Student Success and "Reporting Child Abuse and Neglect" policy Tuesday night.

The Educational Plan for Student Success (EPSS) was developed by a steering committee formed to help the district meet North Central Association accrediting standards. The committee is headed in part by Dr. Paul Wirth and Ellie Keeton. In summary, the plan identifies four broad goals for the schools in Ruidoso:

1. Students will recognize and apply positive options to solve peer/adult relationship issues and conflicts.
2. Students will demonstrate respect and responsibility for each other.
3. Students will promote appropriate behavior and be

responsible for their own actions.

4. Students will show improvement in written communications skills across the curriculum.

The steering committee has developed specific strategies for meeting these goals. Wirth expressed his hope that parents, teachers, and staff will work together to implement the plan successfully. The EPSS is necessary for accreditation from the North Central Association.

The policy on reporting child abuse and neglect was expanded to include specific regulations and procedures. The policy was developed through the joint efforts of the administration, the Ruidoso Education Association, and the state Children, Youth and Families Department.

Both the EPSS and the "reporting child abuse" policy are available for public view through the administration office.

In other business, four Ruidoso

recipients of the Dream Team Grant Awards spoke at the meeting. These Ruidoso teachers were awarded grants to fulfill their professional dreams.

English teacher Pixie Arthur will use her \$400 grant to attend an Advance Placement Program conference in El Paso. Special education and journalism teacher Jackie Tobias will use her \$1,000 grant to take HyperCard and HyperTalk computer programming classes at the University of Oregon. Lisa Vasquez, who teaches gifted students, will use her \$1,000 award to attend the Autonomous Learners Conference in Colorado. Terri Hardeman, speech and language pathologist at Nob Hill, will use her \$1,000 grant to study how children learn through movement.

The board approved three budget adjustments. The board found out it received an extra \$6,335 for Title I programs. The athletics department brought in

\$6,922 more in gate receipts than anticipated. Board president James Paxton suggested again that student ticket prices for athletic events be reduced; Gladden said that idea will be studied. Also, the driver's education course earned \$12,406 in fees. This money will be used to pay instructors, buy books, and rent three cars for the summer driving portion of the course.

Board member Susan Luterman reported on her trip to the "Celebrating Opportunities" conference in San Diego. The conference focused on involving parents in their children's education, she said, and it stressed the importance of starting bilingual education at an early age. Luterman recommended sending Ruidoso teachers to next year's conference in Dallas.

"One of the quotes I heard there was that 'Education is not filling a bucket. Education is lighting fires,'" she related.





For cat lovers, an endearing story was reported in the March 18 edition of "People" magazine.

The article focused on the relationship between a grizzly who had been injured by a train as a cub and a hungry tabby kitten at an animal rehabilitation center in Grants Pass, Ore.

The grizzly, dubbed Griz by the people at Wildlife Images, came to the center as a cub in 1990 after being by a train while foraging on the tracks in Montana.

Suffering from severe head injuries, experts said he was unfit to survive in the wilderness.

Enter Cat, the only one of four abandoned at the center who volunteers had been unable to trap. Last July, when Cat was about six weeks old, it showed up in Griz' pen while the 650-pound grizzly was snacking on his mid-day meal of kibble, meat, fruit, vegetables and road-kill venison.

Knowing the kitten could be crushed with one swipe of the grizzly's paw, center owner Dave Sidon watched apprehensively, but Griz turned into the consummate host.

"The bear very gently picked up a chicken wing and dropped it by his own forepaw for the cat," Sidon said.

The twosome have become great pals, playing ambush games. Griz

even accepts Cat's occasional swats to his nose. Sometimes, he carries Cat around in his mouth like a mother cat carrying a kitten. Other times, Cat rides on Griz' back. During quiet moments, they may groom each other.

Not surprisingly, the two have become a major attraction at the rescue center and donations have soared.

The story brought to mind a sheet of basic rules for cats who have a house to run.

They are:

— if you have to throw up, get into a chair quickly. If you can't, find an Oriental rug, or shag will do in a pinch.

— don't allow closed doors in any room. Finding one, stand on hind legs and hammer with forepaws. Once humans have opened the door, it's not necessary to use it. Stand halfway in and out and think about several things. This is particularly important during very cold weather, rain, snow and mosquito season.

— If one of your humans is sewing or writing and another is idle, stay with the busy one. This is called "helping." When supervising cooking, sit just behind the left heel of the cook where you can't be seen and may be stepped on, picked up and consoled. Get in close under the chin of a book reader, between her eyes and the book, unless you can lie on the book itself.





# Village officials struggle to keep water supplies flowing

Fifty years after Ruidoso incorporated, water system supplies remain a dominant community issue.

## Village measures to provide, save water

To counter the drought-and-demand variables, officials and village councilors have taken several steps during the past year to further provide the basic municipal need of water:

— Imposed the strictest water conservation measures on village books, prohibiting outdoor watering;

— Increased water rights capacity by 64% by leasing 160 acre-feet of water rights. The lease can be renewed for up to 25 years;

— Equipped an Eagle Creek Innercommunity Water Supply Association well, which is deeper than other wells, with pumps and motors. Electricity is being added early this month.

— Received approval from the state engineer's office to drill exploratory wells for new and deeper sources of water in the Eagle Creek area; meetings have begun with a geohydrologist to determine locations of the exploratory wells;

— Passed a \$2 million bond issue to double capacity at the Grindstone Lake Water Treatment Plant to two million gallons a day, and to replace inadequate water lines serving village customers;

— Put a moratorium on additional water connections to homes or businesses outside the village limits.

That focus isn't unique; most communities in the arid southwest regularly struggle with maintaining adequate water supplies.

But for this tourism-dependent village, keeping heads above water when it comes to supplying it is a daily challenge. Although drought-like conditions are preventing area wells from recharging, village government officials must attempt to meet increased demands in water volume during tourist-saturated holiday weekends.

The influx of visitors can easily hike consumption demands by one million gallons a day.

Water supplies and an aging infrastructure have been the focus of the village government for the past two years, says Village Manager Gary Jackson.

"It's the number one priority I've had and the council," Jackson says. "This council has not only tried to play catch up (on infrastructure issues), but also plan for the next 20 years."

The current governing body has been concentrating on these neglected needs since most councilors came into office in 1994.

"We've accelerated our capital expenditures tremendously and have put a lot of attention toward water," Jackson says.

Last year and this, the council's top legislative requests for capital outlay involved water and sewer improvements. All were denied, except for the 1995 appropriation of \$180,000 out of a \$1.5 million request for sewer system improvements. The money was just appropriated from the state budget after it was frozen for a lack of state funds last year.

Meanwhile, nature hasn't been cooperating.

"We are in a literal drought — period," Jackson says. "We're tied into surface water to a great extent; with no snowpack, no spring melt, reservoirs aren't replenishing."

Eagle Creek, which feeds the Alto Lake reservoir, is bone dry. Wells along that same Eagle Creek drainage system are producing 50% less than normal because they can't recharge, Assistant Village Man-

ager Alan Briley adds.

If the drought continues and water consumption demands increase, it is possible the wells feeding the northern parts of Ruidoso could run dry, officials say.

"It is possible parts of town could be without water or water pressure," Briley says. "That's why we're doing exploratory wells to see if we can find more water in that (Eagle Creek) area."

Alternative piping is also being added to the Grindstone Lake Treatment Plant, to help get water up to supply tanks to serve the northern areas.

Water consumption by residents and visitors adds up to 1.5 million gallons per day. That's much less than the nearly 3.3 million gallons the village is presently capable of producing each day. But tourism will increase heavily this summer. If demand increases by 1 million gallons per day and wells produce 50% less, even tank supplies could

be grossly depleted.

These are the reasons behind the strict conservation measures.

"We're more reliant on surface water than most other communities in New Mexico," Jackson says. On the good side, surface water has better quality than the groundwater many other communities rely on.

If regular summertime monsoons do return and snow starts falling again next winter, Ruidoso water supplies will flow more freely.

### Grindstone helps

Although Eagle Creek runoff is non-existent this spring and cannot recharge the village's wells at Eagle Creek, the Rio Ruidoso — the other major tributary for village water supplies — is still flowing.

The nine-month-old Grindstone Lake Water Treatment Plant is treating one million gallons of

water a day, and the reservoir itself, relocated for greater efficiency holds about 325 days worth (1,000 acre feet or 330 million gallons) of water for treatment.

Getting the treatment plant online June 1 was a proud moment for than Alto Lake water, officials say. Thanks to voters, the treatment staff, who highly recommended plant's capacity will be doubling by summer.

Last August, voters approved a \$2 million bond issue for water projects, and about \$800,000 will be used to expand Grindstone.

John Carollo Engineers — the same firm that designed the plant — has just drafted expansion plans. They've been reviewed by village staff and forwarded to the state Environmental Department for approval. Once approved, the piping additions will get underway.

Treated water will be stored in the village's 17 million gallon supply tanks — one of which was just relocated and put into the system for the first time last June.

That one million gallon tank was

The deteriorating 30-year-old lines are just two inches in diameter, and sometimes only let a dribble pour through faucets in

## Did you ever wonder why no one smiled in all those old photos?

The first meeting of the nine member Board of Directors was held October 18, 1939, in the old Texas Hotel located on Burro Avenue.

Otero County Electric, under the auspices of the newly created REA, was incorporated in 1939 to serve approximately 50 people in the Cloudfcroft area. Over the past 57 years the cooperative has grown to approximately 12,000 consumers and 42 full-time employees. The service area encompasses portions of Otero, Lincoln, Chaves and Socorro counties with over 10,000 square miles of territory and 2,200 miles of power lines.

## New E911, street signs cut emergency response times

When a 50-year-old village finally gets identifiable street signs planted, it's definitely making progress.

The 1,924 new reflective street signs were put in place to make it easier for emergency personnel to find people who call Enhanced 911 (E911) for help, Village Manager Gary Jackson says.

"It was a significant undertaking," Jackson says.

Until late last year, streets in Ruidoso were marked with wooden posts that couldn't be read from a distance or at night. Some streets didn't even have names.

Others had duplicate names like the seven Pine streets, three Wingfields, and three Ridges, says Ruidoso Police Department 911 dispatch coordinator Johnnie Romero. "It was very confusing for everyone," Romero says.

Emergency personnel were having problems getting to residences because of the address confusion.

"911 is liable for getting to a destination within a reasonable amount of time," Romero says. "E911 has higher expectations...With it, we have the responsibility of making sure we can get to everyone."

Without it, "there were some close calls," Romero relates.

The enhanced system, which came on line in Ruidoso on Jan. 17, uses computer technology to immediately signal the address of a caller, even if the caller is incapacitated and cannot speak or is disconnected.

"Before, (with just 911), we only got the caller's number and had to send a trace on that number," Romero says. "That took time."

Beginning in 1994, Romero took on the daunting task of identifying the problem streets and addresses.

"I drove every street in this town and a lot of streets I had to drive over and over and over," she recalls.

Then, with former Planning Department secretary Roseanne Painter and department director

Cleatus Richards, she set about renaming the duplicate streets.

Several Planning and Zoning Commission hearings were held on the street name changes, and most of the changes were approved in the winter and spring of 1995.

With about \$80,000 in new signs, village street department workers began the installation process. They're 99% through with the job — the 1% incomplete factor being due to newly-identified problem addresses, says street department manager Charlie Armstrong.

"I'm glad we did this and I think it's an asset to everyone," Armstrong says. "We may have lost some of the charm of the old wooden posts, but we really needed to change them to help people get to where they needed to go."

Residents still need to put up their house numbers, even if there wasn't a change, says Romero. So far, many haven't.

"This will all be for naught if we can't find these people" once they're on the right street, Romero says.

some Ruidoso homes.

The new six-inch diameter lines allow for a greater flow — and therefore greater fire protection during the drought.

"We're taking care of the worst ones first," Briley says of the 25 miles worth of bad lines. "The ones with high maintenance with a lot of leakage."

### Water rights swell

Acquiring water rights in Ruidoso is about as complicated and convoluted as anywhere in the Southwest.

The village has the distinction — because of its location and topography — of having one of the most complicated water systems in the state, Briley says.

"All the water rights in the Rio Ruidoso have been adjudicated," says Jackson. "Only if someone wanted to sell a right could we acquire more."

They've done just that. In 1995,



village officials scored 160 acre feet more basic water rights per year by leasing water rights.

"This has increased our (Rio Ruidoso) water rights capacity by 64% — it's significant," Jackson says.

In addition to these new rights, the village shares rights to Eagle Creek wells with Capitan. The Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Supply Association, with Ruidoso and Capitan as members, shares Eagle Creek water rights, wells and the Alto Lake reservoir.

"We have the capability to produce more than what the demand is," says Briley. "But you've got to have the water (rainfall) to make use of the rights."

### Further conservation

A normal weather cycle is bound to return, Jackson says.

"This situation will pass, but it may not be the only time we're in this cycle," he says.

If drought conditions do continue, additional water rationing steps could be imposed by the village's governing body.


Jackson says the options, which councilors have yet to discuss, could include:

- turning off water during the "wee hours" of the morning in different portions of the village so tanks can be refilled;

- implementing a water rate structure that encourages water conservation;

- and possible water system impact fees for new construction.

In the meantime, Jackson says, "We'll accept all prayers for moisture — in any form."

# Many new village projects in works, thanks to voter approval

Bond issues passed by voters last summer will have a lasting impact on the progress of Ruidoso.

The fruits of the \$6.65 million worth of bond issues for several infrastructure projects will affect everyone in the village, from children to seniors.

Besides the \$2 million planned for the expansion of the Grindstone Lake Water Treatment Plant and the replacement of water transmission lines (detailed in related story), projects include:

— \$1.5 million for the rehabilitation of wastewater lines. About 30 miles of lines are cracked, allowing rain and groundwater to flow into the wastewater system.

This "inflow and infiltration" severely reduces the capacity of the system and increases treatment expenses. Additionally, each time there's an overflow of the wastewater system due to the infiltration of rainwater, the Environmental Protection Agency can issue fines of \$10,000 per day.

— \$1.6 million for construction of a new public library.

The current 6,000 square-foot Sudderth Drive building is too small and only offers about 23 seats for patrons.

Officials are considering village-

owned land next to Village Hall on Kansas City Drive as the site for the new 15,000 square-foot library.

— \$100,000 for renovation of the library for use as a Senior Citizens Center.

Seniors and library patrons currently share different parts of the

present library building. And like the library, the center has experienced increases in usage in recent years.

The renovated facility will be further enhanced by three state grants totalling \$139,000 for a handicapped-accessible restroom, kitchen remodeling and kitchen equipment.

— \$1 million for new athletic fields.

Plans call for seven multi-purpose fields and two regulation-sized fields for baseball and softball. The fields will be built on a 17-acre tract near the White Mountain School complex at the corner of White Mountain and Hull drives. Once constructed, they can be used to serve youth soccer, little league baseball, T-ball, little league football, slo-pitch softball, pony and senior league baseball, high school baseball and adult soccer leagues.

The fields are part of a master plan for an eventual recreational complex and aquatic center.

— \$350,000 for expansion of

the Ruidoso Village Hall.

The addition of approximately 1,800 square feet will allow staff and elected officials to arrange offices in a centralized fashion to more efficiently serve the public. Within the addition, restrooms that comply with the federal Americans with Disabilities Act will be constructed.

— \$100,000 for storage space additions at the Ruidoso Con-

vention Center.

The room will be used to store chairs and tables. Currently, during large exhibits or events, furniture is stored in offices.




The Ruidoso Public Library looks cluttered now, but it will look much different when the newer, larger one is built.

# Ruidoso School District has many recent accomplishments

Some exciting program changes have evolved during the past year at Ruidoso schools. Innovative principals and faculty combined with a committed administration have been instrumental in the changes. Superintendent Mike Gladden is so confident in the progress this school system has made, he and the school board are applying for district-wide accreditation from the North Central Association of Schools. Standards for this certification include good facilities, cleanliness, safety, and the student-to-staff ratio.

Gladden cited several accomplishments at the Ruidoso schools this year: a 20% increase in the number of high school students with grade point averages of 3.5 or above; positive results from the Gavilan Canyon alternative school; the addition of auxiliary staff, including a speech therapist, psychologist, and occupational therapist; plus the renewal of a 2-mill levy, which will generate \$1 million throughout three years.

A new principal was hired at the Ruidoso Middle School this year, former Ruidoso High School teacher Sergio Castanon.

"Our school had a whole new attitude this year," Castanon said. "We've had fewer discipline problems, and morale has improved with both students and teachers. I believe the reason we've had such a good year is because of a very good, motivated staff."

The school added a 24-terminal computer lab to its facilities this year. Students learn keyboarding and word processing. Eventually there will be separate labs for seventh and eighth graders.

This year students at Gavilan Canyon, who had trouble achieving in a traditional school setting, are learning to give back to the community. One afternoon a week,

Education director Karen Taylor said the mentor program at Gavilan is invaluable to her students. Through this program, Gavilan students spend Friday afternoons working with an adult in the community.

"They get some real-world experience this way," Taylor said, "and they start developing good work habits early."

Gavilan students benefit from art therapy, held at Stetson Art Center, and from the addition of another counselor. Thanks to what Taylor calls a "generous and creative school system," her students receive drug and alcohol counseling when needed.

Perhaps the most altruistic project the Gavilan School has undertaken this past year is the work project. Through Lone Tree Bible Camp and the Rotary Club, students work at odd jobs in the community to raise \$1,900. The money will be used to build a house for a family in Juarez, Mexico.

At White Mountain Elementary, principal Frank Cannella emphasizes team dynamics in the classroom and on the playground.

"I'm really pleased with our conflict resolution program," he said. "It allows the kids to interact more positively on the playground, and it results in fewer referrals to the principal's office."

The program is a mini-curriculum of 30 conflict-resolution lessons given by the teachers. After the lessons, 30 students in the 4th grade are chosen as mediators.

During recess, two mediators, wearing orange jackets, help students resolve their own problems.

Another kids-helping-kids project is the after-school tutoring program. The school already offered tutoring in reading, which was provided by teachers funded by Title I. The demand for tutoring was so great, however, that Cannella added a team of nine high school students who help other students with math after school.

Getting the entire student body in on a project is even better. The White Mountain Elementary Literary Magazine was begun this school year. Teachers selected three written works from each of the 17 classes, then the art teacher had students submit illustrations for each selected work. The entire magazine, writing and illustrations, was the work of students.

At Ruidoso High School, two new programs are preparing students for a lifetime of success. The freshmen program called "Success Skills" teaches them good study skills, work habits, responsibility, health maintenance, and other life-management skills. All freshmen are required to take this course.

A second program, called "Life Skills," is physical education aimed at giving students a range of activities they can enjoy their whole lives.

"It shows them a good alternative to drugs," Principal Ron Hodges said.

Students learn sports such as golf, swimming, canoeing, skiing, biking and hiking.

In addition to these programs, the high school has expanded its enrichment courses, challenging good students to excel further. The school also added a graphics art department, where students do all the school printing on their own press.

Overall the Ruidoso schools have seen a year of challenges and triumphs.

## ENMU-Ruidoso leads community into computer age

Eastern New Mexico University is launching Ruidoso into the Information Age. Now in its new location about four months, the Ruidoso branch has expanded its educational offerings through Internet access, satellite systems, and interactive television.

The school offered 22 classes this spring through ITV (interactive television). Ruidoso students view classes taking place in Portales via a one-way video. The Portales professor controls three cameras and their angles, so Ruidoso viewers can see the professor, their classmates, and the top of the teacher's desk (handy for getting a shot of visual aids). Students can also view visual aids through a computer screen link-up. With a press of the button, the computer screen appears on the Ruidoso television.

When a Ruidoso student has a question, she picks up a phone at her desk. This signals the teacher, who can then call on her invisible student. The question from Ruidoso is broadcast in the Portales classroom, as well as at any other sites

tuned in to the class. ENMU-Portales broadcasts to sites in Clovis, Artesia, Roswell, and Hobbs.

Lou Ann and Jim Hodson supervise the Ruidoso room during class. They also handle correspondence between professors and students, such as mailing out homework assignments. When a student is sick and misses class, Hodson simply pops a tape into the VCR and records the session. If a Ruidoso student needs a one-on-one consultation with his Portales teacher, he uses an e-mail terminal with a two-way video.

The tuition for an ITV class is a little higher than regular tuition, but it saves students the cost of traveling to a distant university, or of relocating altogether. Through ITV classes, ENMU-Ruidoso now offers a B.A. in Nursing, a B.A. in Business Administration, an M.B.A. in Business, and an M.A. in Communication Disorders. In August, 44 ITV classes will be available at ENMU-Ruidoso.

The new library space at ENMU-Ruidoso has a limited print collection, but through the Inter-

Net, students can access any library in the world.

"We're basically an electronic library," said Mary Weaver, ENMU-Ruidoso librarian. Weaver's position was increased from part-time to full-time when the school relocated, and the library is now open 40 hours a week.

Non-students who want to use the library computers may purchase a guest card, which allows them limited access to materials. Through inter-library loans, books reach ENMU in three to five days.

The school's third high-tech avenue is satellite access. This means students and faculty can "attend" teleconferences being held anywhere on the globe.

The university's new donated, larger building is a vast improvement of facilities, with private offices for administration and counseling, comfortable classroom space, and an extra 33,000 square feet to grow into.

It looks like the extra room will be needed. Enrollment is up 31% this spring, with 593 credit students, 27 ITV students, and 166 community education students.





# Advice on making it work in the Ruidoso business climate

Consistent hours, catering to customers, and setting aside enough capital to survive start-up pains and seasonal fluctuations seem to be essential ingredients for survival in the Ruidoso business world.

It's not an easy task; hundreds of businesses come and go each year in this community, despite its steady progress of growth. This is a story about a couple survivors — and how they do it.

One of the longest survivors is Herb Brunell, who started out helping his father run Brunell's clothing store in downtown Ruidoso, later took it over and has now passed it down to his son Bert.

His father opened the store in 1945 because he believed in the future progress of Ruidoso, Brunell said. He owned a similar store in Alamogordo from 1935 until his death in 1968.

His father also was a believer in paying off business real estate. That philosophy has allowed the family to better control costs and to remodel and upgrade without requiring someone else's approval.

## Undercapitalized

"This town has a history of business owners starting without enough money," Brunell said. "They come up on vacation and see a steady flow of customers in season. They think, 'What a great place to make a living.'"

"But then two things happen. They find they can't do all the fun things they did when vacationing, because they should work. And they come in undercapitalized."

LaVeda Peitersen, owner of Misty Mountain Gourmet Shop just down the road from Brunell's, said she plans for up to two years without significant profit when opening a new business.

"And you should start without any bills," she added.

Her stand-out pink and gray store is in its third year of offering gourmet coffee and tea, specialty sweet treats, condiments and decorative items.

Peitersen and her husband Jim also have developed a private label, featuring a sketch of the building as it appeared when it was used as the village ice house.

"I think many people mislead themselves about what kind of money they can make here," Brunell said. "We went into it for the long term and we stayed."

Some business owners aren't willing to sacrifice the time or keep a staff on hand if they decide to take a long weekend or vacation, he said. They close their stores while they're away, or change their hours of operation during the slow tourism season.

"This town is getting a bad reputation for shops being closed on Tuesday and Wednesday," Peitersen said. "We stay open seven days a week. Some days it doesn't seem like it pays off, but I consider it a customer service."

Brunell doesn't alter his hours, either, whether it's busy or slow.

"You watch a customer drive up to a store that's closed, for whatever reason," he said. "The third time they drive up, they won't ever come back. They might be driving in from Corona to see a doctor, and they want to shop and have lunch."

"We also keep a steady year-round staff. We might have a heck of a busy day during a slow month

and if you make one customer mad, you may lose three."

Brunell tracks the store's sales curve by computer. With the exception of a few anomalies, the curve has stayed about the same for five decades. The only change is that, because of growth and inflation, gross receipts now total in one month what the store used to earn in a full year, he said.

Brunell's sales curve resembles those of most of the stores in

Ruidoso, even those more tourist-oriented, with the exception of ski shops and motels when they have snow and a big influx in winter, he said.

"We do 55% of our gross annual business in four and a half months: July, August, September and December. June has been a pretty quiet month in the last several years," Brunell said.

"Our curve has looked the same ever since we opened the store. January and February are the lowest months, then the line goes straight up through August. It starts dropping in September and continues down until it jumps up in December and then the cycle starts over again."

The month of October has improved with the promotion of several special events such as Aspen Fest and the county Cowboy Symposium, he said.

"If the weather is bad during those special events, customers come inside the store," Brunell said. "But if it's sunny, they stay outside and watch the parade. However, those events and others benefit the county, and in the long run that benefits us."

## Customer categories

"The market in Ruidoso is strange," Brunell said, a statement echoed over the years by many other business owners.

"It's cyclical and the cycles are not predictable," he said. "We are subject to weather; our local weather and Texas weather."

"If it's dry in Texas, they have to stay and tend their products, their farms. If it's overly wet, they have to stay. If it's really hot, they like to come to the mountains where it's cool. If it's really hot in the mountains, they might as well stay home under the air conditioner."

"We are, have been and always will be a tourist area."

Brunell classifies people in Ruidoso into four categories:

- permanent residents;
- out-of-town residents with seasonal or weekend homes;
- first-time visitors;
- and the day tripper.

The last category consists of people who have traded with stores in Ruidoso for years and are a day trip away in places like Roswell,

Alamogordo, El Paso and Albuquerque.

"They come for various reasons," Brunell said. "They may come for lunch at their favorite restaurant, or to shop in their favorite store."

Because 40% of his customers are day trippers or drop-ins, his front window display must be a grabber, Brunell said.

"I told the staff if customers walk by without going in, the window needs to be changed," he related.

Petersen said she leaves her store gaily lighted after closing hours in the evening, to catch the eyes of people who may have been unable to stop before.

"Those who were busy their first day in town see us and say they have to go there the next day," she said. "I think with several other

shops leaving their Christmas lights up and looking festive at night, it creates more of an air of fantasy and romance.

"We get lots of comment about our appearance. People don't know what to expect when they get inside."

Besides her attractively displayed products, they find friendly staffers who make them feel comfortable and welcome, she said.

"That helps a lot with getting repeat business," she said. Along that same line, she plans to create more seating areas for visitors to take a breather and sample the specialty drinks.

About 60% of Brunell's customers are local or long-term seasonal residents, people who know the type and quality of clothing, footwear and accessories the store carries, he said.

While supermarkets and discount stores in Ruidoso have changed the shopping habits of local customers, they also have brought new customers to town, customers who otherwise would have driven into Alamogordo or Roswell to shop, Brunell said.

"And while they're here getting groceries, they may shop with us," he said. "We have to be aware of what they are willing to buy from us that they can't get from some other stores."

Tracking by computer allows Brunell, who also has a degree in engineering, to keep a close watch on expenses and to analyze whether a department is profitable.

"Over the years, we have eliminated product sections of the store such as children's clothing, notions, piece goods and men's work clothes," he said. "It took

several years of tracking. I began to analyze floor space percentage, gross and net income percentage and cost of operating each department."

For three years, he held onto children's clothing despite the negative figures, because of the lack of sources in the town. But when Wal-Mart and some other stores filled the void, he closed it out.

### Service essential

"Our secret weapon is service and an awareness of what customers want," Brunell said.

"We have a good local customer base and get a lot of day trippers and weekenders," he said. "We have a broad customer base that spans at least three generations."

"Being locally owned and managed is a real benefit. We're still a little town. Customers like

being called by their first name. That's one of the things out-of-towners really like about our store. They can stand there and visit without being bothered."

Survival also requires an awareness of the local, regional and national markets, he said. Even events such as tax season or a big forest fire nearby can affect sales on a short-term basis, Brunell said. Competitors should be monitored, as should the changing requirements of customers, he said.

"Even things you do to your store can affect sales," Brunell said. "When we carpeted, a number of customers thought we'd gone too

high class and stopped trading with us, but we got most of them back.

"You don't do this kind of thing alone. We've had dedicated staff. One person I think of in particular worked for us for 40 years, Marge Garner. They develop the customer base for you," Brunell said.

He also requires the staff to stay informed about other stores in the area and special events.

"That way if we don't have the product, we can help them find it somewhere else and keep the money in town," Brunell said. "It also makes the customer happy. Many of them even call us long distance to ask about things."

## Major recent events in business world

Here's some major business events that occurred in Lincoln County over the past year:

— Fort Stanton, the second-largest employer in the county while operating, is closed as a state hospital in March 1995 with the loss of 200 jobs locally. Two attempts by the state to find a new tenant fail.

— The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce in June 1995 is awarded the contract to operate a convention and visitors bureau.

— Lone Star Airline on Sept. 5, 1995 offers scheduled service from Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, after the community goes years without commercial service.

— a 52-room Day's Inn Motel opens for business in October in Ruidoso Downs.

— the Mescalero Apache Tribe in November 1995 opens The Mescalero Inn as a proposed part of reservation expansion.

— the state Legislature in its January regular session and March special session fails to pass a gambling bill extending video gambling to racetracks.

— the state Department of Corrections confirms in January that Camp Sierra Blanca minimum security adult prison will be closed.

— earth begins to move in January on the \$16 million Spencer Per-

forming Arts Theater on Sierra Blanca Airport Road.

— the Legislature in February approves the transformation of the prison camp into an environmental work camp for juveniles. Enough money to accomplish that is appropriated in March.

— about 100 new businesses are issued Ruidoso village licenses in 1995-96, while the well-known Texas Club restaurant and The Book Store shut their doors.

— Ruidoso Downs Racetrack stays open, but 1996 race days are cut back.

— after opening three weeks later than usual, Ski Apache also closes two weeks earlier than last year due to warm temperatures and lack of snow.

— Sierra Bank opens March 1 in Ruidoso.

— the Holiday Inn Express, a 104-room, three-story motel on U.S. 70, nears completion in March and is Ruidoso's first major motel in decades.

— the final phase of Ranches of Sonterra subdivision, the largest subdivision in Lincoln County since Alto Village, is to open in late spring 1996. More than 200 homesites already have been sold at the site off Sierra Blanca Airport Road.





# New events paint bright past, future for local arts scene

The arts are blossoming in Lincoln County these days, in all their forms.

Artists naturally tend to love their work more than promoting it, but lately they have been banding together to let people know they are a major force in this community.

Nowhere was their talent more evident than at the Night for the Arts at the Museum of the Horse on Nov. 16, 1995, and at a more recent performance at Marie LeVeaux's when every local band played the same night at the same place. Music lovers showed their appreciation by packing the nightclub to capacity.

Dave McGary, Susan Rush and Ann Bolton were honored at the Night for the Arts with the first mayor's awards.

Another highlight of the musical world was the first TNT concert series sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. Bands performing a variety of popular sounds filled the civic center with music during a slow time of year for tourism, to help fill in the gaps.

The Ruidoso Arts and Film Board completed a survey last year to find out what forms and styles of art and music people want more of. The board is urging artists to let it know about special events so calendars of local happenings can be complete.

On Thursday, April 11, the board will be meeting with the New Mexico Arts & Film Board to talk about promoting this area for films, and other issues.

The board is also planning an arts celebration week in late October or early November, said Chairman Jay Wright, who is also the director of the Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs.

Wright and the museum have been major forces in promoting the arts this past year. The museum has expanded to a full-fledged education program, highlighted by a Czech chamber orchestra Sept. 11, 1995.

Another museum highlight included its Russian art show on display from April to September last year. This year's big show will be "The West in American Art," from the Bill and Dorothy Harmsen collection of western Americana. It will run April 28 through Sept. 22. This wide variety of western works was organized by the Colorado Historical Society.

The opening party for the Russian art show was certainly a gala event; perhaps the only single-night museum event that was even bigger was the unveiling of the Free Spirits at Noisy Water monument on July 15. The Free Spirits creator, Dave McGary, is continuing his monumental works with the 30-foot-tall "Touch the Clouds" bronze monument of a Miniconjou Indian leader, scheduled to be installed at the Houston Astrodome in February 1997.

An event that will long promote tourism by highlighting the history of this area was the recent naming

of the Billy the Kid Scenic Byway. The lead agency, the village of Ruidoso, is now considering a site for an interpretive center after receiving nearly a half-million dollars to build it. The Museum of the Horse and Glencoe Rural Events Center have offered a site for the center.

The rural events center is the only tourist-oriented project of the Lincoln County government. It has been expanding its venue from the popular Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium, adding auctions, dances, meetings and private parties. This year's cowboy symposium will feature new events like a farriers' contest, gospel music and a Sunday chicken dinner.

The center is seeking a grant to build an indoor arena so it can host larger livestock-related events, especially equine.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe's main tourist-related activity, Casino Apache, expanded to include card games of blackjack,

craps and poker last year. Located at the scenic Inn of the Mountain Gods, the casino draws hundreds of visitors each day, even during traditionally-slow tourism seasons.

The theater arena has seen well-rounded growth in this community during the past year, too. As the Ruidoso Little Theater settled into its permanent home, Ballet of New Mexico came on line to offer a different kind of stage performance. Its production of The Nutcracker at the Castle Mountain music theater was a marvel for a community of this size, and it came together under the experienced direction of maestro Victor Moreno. It also showcased the music theater as a great place to host a variety of events.

The coming year promises to be a watershed for the theater world, as the magnificent Spencer performing arts theater just outside of town is scheduled to be completed in mid-1997. Ground was broken this year in January.

# Sports attract residents, visitors to Playground of Southwest

During the past year, Ruidoso has enhanced its claim as the "Playground of the Southwest."

Record-number softball teams flocked to play in village-sponsored tournaments.

Despite an uncooperative Mother Nature, Ski Apache proved it can draw skiers from across the Southwest. More than 224,870 skied the slopes in 1994-95. Little precipitation and warm temperatures shortened this year's season dramatically. Still, the ski area will upgrade one of its lifts for the 1996-97 season.

The village pool welcomed capacity crowds during the summer, with more than 200 swimmers each day.

Hikers and campers continued to enjoy Ruidoso's backyard, the Lincoln National Forest, while mountain bikers clamored for more trails.

And the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Department, in cooperation with a number of local groups, launched the village's first serious

attempt at getting a community recreation center.

But the past year hasn't been good for everyone. Ruidoso Downs Race Track suffered its sixth straight year of declining attendance and handle. Ruidoso Downs will have a shorter race meet in 1996, the fifth consecutive year the number of race dates has been scaled back.

Racetrack owner R.D. Hubbard says Ruidoso Downs can't survive without video gambling to supplement horseman's purses. For the second straight year, the Legislature failed to produce legislation giving racetracks expanded gambling. The future of horse racing seems dicey at best.

Despite that prospect, the community has turned to the development of other recreational attractions.

Taxpayers approved a bond issue to construct new athletic fields for youth and adult soccer, and high school baseball and softball — perhaps recognizing the importance of the continued development of recreational opportunities.

The county's high schools saw the birth of two baseball teams; one at Hondo Valley in 1995 and the other at Ruidoso in 1996.

Capitan athletics survived the closing of Fort Stanton, with the influx of new families from within the state as well as California and Arizona.

Carrizozo lost its 11-man football team, but fielded a six-man team instead. Coach Kim Gremillion has single-handedly rejuvenated the 'Zozo girls athletic program, taking the volleyball and basketball teams to both state tournaments.

At Ruidoso High, first-year volleyball coach Jauna Sanchez tapped the Warriors' potential and directed them to a third-place finish at the Class AAA State Volleyball Tournament in November. The Warriors, under the athletic direction of Les Carter and his coaching staff, find themselves competing for district titles in most sports every season.

The recreational and athletic activities abound in Lincoln County, and 1995-96 was evidence of that.

# Village, racetrack and newspaper all celebrate 50 years

Three notable institutions in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs are celebrating their 50th anniversaries this year: the village of Ruidoso government, the Ruidoso Downs Race Track and The Ruidoso News.

The fact that all these entities formed about the same time is obviously no coincidence; growth spurs more growth, and when the outlook is good, people come in to provide basic services and expand existing ones.

A celebration by The News is in the works, including a special edition about the village's history. Old-timers who recall events from a half-century ago will be interviewed for the special section, and many historical photos will be included.

The village officially incorporated on Nov. 15, 1945 after general support was found in a public hearing. One of the major

reasons for the incorporation was the need for a community-wide water system. Septic tanks often overflowed, and businesses needed assurances that their investments could be protected from fire.

**If you have memories of 50 years ago in Ruidoso, or if you know of a business or other entity celebrating its 50th this year, please give us a call.**

It wasn't long before a village-wide water system was installed. Ruidoso Downs Race Track was officially sanctioned by the state in

1947, making 1996 the 50th official season of parimutuel wagering (technically, the 50th anniversary of the track comes next year).

Of course, racing at that site had been going on for decades before. More than any other single entity besides Mother Nature, Ruidoso Downs Race Track was the first to be responsible for this region's resort status.

A crude racing oval was constructed around a rodeo arena early in this century, and the horses ridden in the rodeos often raced against each other while competitors and onlookers bet substantial sums.

Cowboys, ranchers, Native Americans, and visitors from Texas and Mexico were among the early racing fans.

The Ruidoso News became Ruidoso's first and only newspaper on May 17, 1946. It was founded by Lloyd Bloodworth, owner and publisher. His family still has a sum-


mer home in the cool pines and visits here often.

In his first edition, Bloodworth said he had been in the public relations business for 25 years but had always wanted to own a good country newspaper.

He thus surrounded himself with good capable men and hoped they'd stop him from making too many mistakes.

"We'll pursue an independent policy and we'll report the news just as it happens," Bloodworth wrote in his column.

A story about the Old Mill and Ike Wingfield dominated the cover of that first issue.






