### Guv says state may help make fort into resort

The state and Lincoln County might be able to form a partnership to develop Fort Stanton into a resort park, Gov. Gary Johnson said Tuesday.

During an interview from his office in Santa Fe, Johnson said if state officials could see some hard facts about the possibility of such an operation breaking even or earning money for the state, he would be willing to listen.

"I could see a shared risk on making something like that happen," he said.

However, he doesn't see any logic in handing over the fort to the Lincoln County Commission if the county expects the state to continue paying \$500,000 a year for its basic maintenance, Johnson said.

The state and county has been looking for a new tenant at Fort Stanton since Johnson closed it as a state hospital in March 1995.

A citizens' drive started two months ago to convert the fort into a resort/history complex fashioned after the successful Fort Robinson in northwest Nebraska.

### Johnson previews Thursday speech to municipal league

Gov. Gary Johnson said Tuesday he won't advocate state tax cuts this year that will throw a financial burden on municipalities.

Johnson gave *The Ruidoso News* a preview of topics he will cover in his speech to the New Mexico Municipal League during a luncheon Thursday at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center.

"The league is always interested in how state actions will impact them fiscally," he said. "I would continue my pledge of not affecting municipalities fiscally. I do not intend to cut taxes at the expense of municipalities having to raise theirs."

He'll discuss how a tax cut will affect the state's economic development, Johnson said.

"New Mexico really has room to cut its taxes since it arguably is the highest tax state in the United States based on percentage of income," he said.

## Capitan sues Ruidoso over water rights

Capitan village trustees filed suit against the village of Ruidoso Tuesday to stop Ruidoso from pumping water from wells and force the liquidation of a mutually-owned water association.

If the court shuts down the wells, it would have no immediate impact on Ruidoso's water supply, said Village Attorney H. John Underwood. Heavy and consistent rain has allowed the village to fill its storage tanks.

A hearing on Capitan's request for an injunction to shut down the exploratory wells is scheduled for today (Wednesday) in District Court in Alamogordo, Capitan officials said.

Ruidoso officials planned to pump Eagle Creek water to their regular domestic supply, although Capitan representatives on Eagle Creek only authorized Ruidoso to drill test wells, he said.

Capitan Mayor Norm Renfro said the three Capitan representatives and three Ruidoso members on the Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Supply Association Inc. are deadlocked on major issues facing the association.

But Underwood said, "As far as we are concerned, the Eagle Creek Association is an on-going association and a viable association."

"We realize they've got water problems and we have too," Renfro said. "Capitan hasn't had any benefit out of Eagle Creek for eight or nine years."

"The trustees decided if we couldn't get any benefit out of Eagle Creek there is no use owning it."

When Capitan officials first announced their interest in selling the village's 50% interest earlier this summer, a series of offers and

counter offers were issued, but no agreement was reached, Renfro said.

"The board members just can't seem to get anything done so there really is no reason to have Eagle Creek going any more," he said. "I'm sure they probably feel their offer is justified, but we just don't feel it is. Since they are not going to furnish Capitan water, this is our last resort."

He would not disclose the amount of money offered by either side.

Ruidoso has contended it wouldn't be cost effective to build the water line to Capitan, because Eagle Creek doesn't flow consistently. But with the State Engineer's approval to now pump 1,600 acre-feet of underground water, a constant source of water is available so Ruidoso's argument is invalid, Beauvais said.

"We asked them to withdraw their permits from pumping these wells until we could come to some kind of settlement, and they refused," Renfro said.

Ruidoso Village Manager Gary Jackson said Ruidoso received notice of the suit about 10:45 a.m. Tuesday and called a closed session to discuss the issue. The outcome was to authorize Underwood to represent the village at the injunction hearing.

"Certainly, the court is the proper venue for the issues to be addressed," Jackson said.

Although one of the exploratory wells was pumped last week, none of three producing wells were being pumped Tuesday, he said.

"The water table has come up a bit, which has allowed the North Fork wells the village owns to be doing a little better," he said. "The

## Ruidoso police tired of answering multiple false alarms

The Ruidoso Police Department is sick and tired of turning off blaring late night alarms.

Alarm systems in the village should be licensed and people should hire keyholders to silence alarms, police chief Lanny Maddox said.

Changes to the village alarm ordinance, drafted during the past two months, were proposed to village councilors at a special meeting Monday. Councilors scheduled a Sept. 23 public hearing to consider amending the code.

The new rules are necessary because police spend an inordinate amount of time responding to alarms, Village Manager Gary Jackson said. Maddox later said his officers

respond to more than 100 false alarms annually.

The four-year-old alarm ordinance required police to list alarm owners and keyholders, he said.

"There's nothing worse than having a residential or business alarm going off at 2 a.m. and not knowing how to turn it off or who is the keyholder," Maddox said. "We'd get these calls from alarm companies in Texas saying 'There's an alarm going off at so and so' and there's no keyholder."

When keyholders don't show up and police can't find the alarm, it rings for hours, he said. Officers don't want to damage property by breaking in, Maddox added.

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## Hondo School District can't find bond issue information

Records concerning a Hondo School District bond issue have been lost, and school officials aren't sure what to do about it.

The district has \$300,000 left from a bond issue, but officials don't know what the bond issue was for, they aren't sure how much was spent on what, and they aren't sure what to do with the remaining \$300,000.

The school board has asked Casey to mail surveys to parents this week, asking how they want the remaining \$300,000 to be used.

There is not enough money left to follow through on the original expansion plans, officials said.

The district has been in trouble with state officials for poor administration and management.

Supt. Barbara Casey, who just started her job this summer, thinks the bond was originally intended for expansion of the library, restrooms and administrative offices, plus repair to the vo-ag building.

Casey said the vo-ag building has been repaired, but the expansion

has not been made. She cannot locate records showing the original amount of the bond or how much has already been spent.

She has not yet checked with the county clerk, and she said she will look through old board meeting minutes, too.

Hondo administrative records apparently have no account of how the bond election was originally put to the public, Casey said. No one seems to know exactly how the bond issue was worded.

# Experts offer ways to save Ruidoso from forest fire

Ruidoso residents can reverse unhealthy forest conditions with the help of the village's revised tree protection ordinance, foresters said Saturday.

"It's pretty stunning to me what we've gotten ourselves into in Ruidoso," said forest management expert George Duda. "I'm told that there's a window of opportunity of about 15 years to solve this problem."

If it's not solved, the result could be catastrophic fire, Duda said.

"Let's get our butts in gear and clean this up," he said.

Duda was one of eight forest health experts talking about ecosystems and wildfire prevention at a workshop Saturday in Ruidoso's Upper Canyon. The day-long event was sponsored by the village government and the citizens' Forest Health Coalition of Lincoln County.

Neither the mayor nor village councilors came to the workshop, coalition members noted, but Village Manager Gary Jackson attended part of the morning session. Also in attendance were State Rep. Dub Williams and his challenger, Lincoln County Commissioner L. Ray Nunley.

Workshop demonstrations, held at Ernest and Anita Powell's thickly treed property, helped about 80 people see how elements of the code work.

The Powells have put the code to use on their land, removing dozens of trees with diameters of 10 inches or less. Using the code's tree spacing guidelines, several trees with touching crowns have also been removed. They've also raked pine needles and cleared trees within 10 feet of their home to defend it from wildfire.

State forester Bill Duemling, who first proposed changes to Ruidoso's code, pointed out some of

the changes the Powells made.

"What's been done here replicates what a fire would normally do," Powell said later. "Our property will survive, but areas around us would end up as moonscape."

Ruidoso's mountainous terrain combined with its tight urban/wildland interface makes the potential for a catastrophic fire severe, foresters said.

Just this past weekend, a wild-fire swept into an inland Oregon community with the same mountain atmosphere as Ruidoso, and 19 homes were destroyed.

Dense pine cover is "the basis of wealth and well-being in Ruidoso," Duda said — but if the forest isn't thinned out soon, whole canyons could be reduced to "black sticks."

Hundreds of Ruidoso ponderosa pines, stressed by drought and dwarf mistletoe, are also dying from bark beetle infestation, said state forestry entomologist Bob Cain.

Large stands of the pines in Ruidoso and the surrounding forest will be eliminated by the beetles before the current epidemic passes, he said. But he assured people "the nature of Ruidoso's forest will not be changed drastically."

Smokey Bear Ranger District foresters Dave Cummings, Dick Edwards and Larry Cordova explained how the U.S. Forest Service fire prevention practices of the past century also hurt ecosystem diversity. The practices enabled tree stands to replace grassy, open areas where wildlife graze.

Today, fires in overpopulated forests burn as hot as 2,000 degrees

and can jump a half-mile from one crown of a ponderosa pine to another, Cummings said.

"Ruidoso is only five or six miles across, boundary to boundary," he added.

### Cuts prevent erosion

Fires release plant nutrients into the soil, said Hollis Fuchs of the Natural Resources Conservation Service. The nutrient-rich soil then produces more fibrous root grasses, binding soil together so it holds in water during droughts and reduces runoff during monsoons, Fuchs said.

Downed trees release nutrients much slower than fire, and when left to rot the dead trees compound

the present fire danger, he said.

But, "fire is not an option at this point — we can't turn Ruidoso loose with matches," Fuchs said. "Our best option now is to chip and compost."

Ideally, felled trees should be reduced to tiny pieces with a wood-chipper, then spread on the ground to limit erosion. Fertilizer should also be scattered with the chips because the wood can tie up the soil microbes, Fuchs said.

"Our watershed acts as a buffer against drought, so we have to take pretty good care of it," Fuchs said later.

The lack of snow the past three winters "more than anything else is what has gotten us in water trouble in Ruidoso," Fuchs said.

water table hasn't completely recovered, but is doing better with the recent rain. Right now, we have full water tanks. This is the type of summer monsoon season we are supposed to have.

"We are not the situation we were facing at the first of June."

None of the exploratory wells are equipped to be used on a regular

basis, he said.

The pipeline construction and permission to use the exploratory wells were on the agenda for an Eagle Creek meeting Tuesday evening, Jackson said.

Although Hendro has ordered Capitan representatives not to attend the meeting, because of the litigation, Ruidoso's members will be there, Jackson said.

# Basis of Capitan suit detailed in court file

The Eagle Creek Inter-community Water Supply Association Inc. was formed in 1964 to develop a domestic water supply for Capitan and Ruidoso.

The ownership was split 50/50 between the two villages.

The supply of water to Capitan was curtailed in 1987, because of the deterioration of a water transmission line, according to the suit filed Tuesday by Capitan against Ruidoso in District Court.

Capitan, the association and the city of Alamogordo agreed in 1980 that Eagle Creek would be financially responsible for the cost to reconstruct the water transmission line to Capitan, the suit states.

"Thereafter, Eagle Creek either refused or failed to acquire sufficient funds to construct the water transmission line to Capitan, although funds were available through state and federal financial assistance programs," the suit states.

In July of this year, Capitan members asked for Eagle Creek authorization to apply for money to finance the water transmission line to their village. Then using a point of parliamentary procedure, the Ruidoso representatives on the board refused to authorize the steps necessary to complete the water transmission line or put the issue back on the agenda, the suit states.

Earlier this month, Capitan Mayor Norm Hendro asked Ruidoso Mayor Jerry Shaw, Councilor Leon

Eggleston (an Eagle Creek board member) and Village Manager Gary Jackson to stop Ruidoso's plan to transfer Ruidoso's water rights to wells owned by Eagle Creek on Eagle Creek property, until the dispute over provision of water to Capitan is resolved.

Such a transfer of rights would allow Ruidoso to pump water from the wells.

"Rather than acquiesce to Capitan's request, representatives of Ruidoso advised they would not assist and have actively pressed their efforts to transfer water rights to wells owned by Eagle Creek located on Eagle Creek property against the express objection of Capitan," the suit states. "Capitan has been forced to file protests of the proposed transfers of water rights to prevent irreparable harm to the aquifer underlying the Eagle Creek property to which Capitan has a legal right and ownership interest."

The suit accuses Ruidoso representatives of Eagle Creek of trying to conduct an illegal meeting to authorize actions by Eagle Creek despite protests by the Capitan representatives to the board.

The suit asks for the court to appoint a liquidating receiver to preserve the corporate assets and for an injunction to prevent irreparable injury to association assets.

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# Municipal League proposes more money for small towns

Some small towns in Lincoln County would get more state funding through a bill proposed by the New Mexico Municipal League.

League Executive Director William F. Fulginiti presented the idea to the legislative Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Committee Aug. 21 at the Ruidoso Convention Center.

The proposal will be discussed further by league members at the convention center during their annual conference today and Thursday.

Fulginiti proposes a nearly 50% increase for the state's small cities assistance program. The increased funding would come from state compensation tax revenues.

The 5% comp tax is charged on items purchased from out-of-state businesses.

Funding for the small cities assistance program would be increased from \$2.1 million to \$3.4 million by using more of the comp tax collections, under the league's proposal.

If approved by the Legislature next year, the distribution received by Ruidoso, Corona and Ruidoso Downs would double from \$15,000 annually to \$30,000. Carrizozo and Capitan would see a \$20,000 increase, from \$30,000 annually to \$50,000, Fulginiti said.

The bill, sponsored by Rep. Donald Whitaker of Eunice, also moves the minimum cap on distribution from \$15,000 annually to \$30,000, and the maximum from

\$30,000 to \$50,000.

Similar legislation passed through the House last session, but was tabled in the Senate, Whitaker said.

Many small communities don't receive enough from gross receipts taxes and can't even afford a police officer or village clerk, Fulginiti said. Eligible towns must have populations of 10,000 or less and gross receipts taxes revenues lower than the state's average.

The new package received a lukewarm response from legislative committee members, ranging from Hobbs Rep. Robert Wallach's feeling that "we ought to do away with the comp tax when you get down to it," to Las Cruces Sen. Leonard Rawson's comment, "The only thing that concerns me is, if they want help, are they willing to help themselves?"

To receive the added income, communities would have to impose at least 1/4 of the allowable 1.75% gross receipt tax, Fulginiti said. Ruidoso's current rate is 2.3125%, which includes a 1% supplemental gross receipts tax for municipal waterworks, said Manuel Gallegos, the state taxation and revenue department's chief for tax information and policy, from his office in Santa Fe.

Before discussion closed Aug. 21, Fulginiti was asked by Farmington Rep. Jerry Sandel to prepare a spread sheet juxtaposing the benefit of the added comp distribution against the impact of Gov. Gary Johnson's recent proposal to eliminate gross receipts taxes paid

on food, prescription medicine, and services like legal assistance.

"I support this 100%, but I have trouble giving to communities this way and taking it right back another way," Sandel said.

"We need to look at the overall picture," Wallach agreed.

The governor's proposal, which mirrors one he made during his 1992 campaign, would reduce state income by at least \$800 million annually, Fulginiti said.

Fulginiti's estimate is based on 1992 sales. Municipalities would lose about \$42 million a year from repealing the tax on food sales alone, he said.


## Collection woss

Regulations for enforcing the tax need to be strengthened because the state is losing about \$250 million a year in gross receipts tax revenues through catalog sales, state taxation and revenue department secretary John Chavez said.

Only about 10% of all the comp taxes are collected annually, Gallegos estimated, or about \$37 million.

"If the company is not registered as a gross receipts (taxing business in New Mexico), or the marketer doesn't voluntarily notify us about sales, we don't know about it unless we do an audit," he said.

The comp tax should be parallel to the gross receipts tax, Fulginiti said; if a community has a 6% gross receipts tax, the comp tax should also be 6%.

# Contracts for bond projects awarded by Ruidoso councilors

A Ruidoso company was awarded three bond issue construction projects by village councilors Monday.

Two of the projects awarded Carl Kelley Construction, Inc. are for the Grindstone Water Treatment Plant — a decant basin and a storage tank water line. The third project will replace underground wastewater lines along Sudderth Drive.

Councilors awarded another project, for renovations at the Ruidoso Senior Center and expansion of the convention center, to American Construction & Concrete of Alamogordo.

Architectural plans for three other bond issue projects — new ball fields, new water distribution lines and a new library — are still being completed. These projects will be put to bid soon, Jackson said.

Voters approved funding the projects at an election.

Kelley's company has the bonding capacity and crews to handle three jobs simultaneously, project coordinator Dennis Brand assured councilors.

Kelley's company bid \$125,464 to construct the water line to link storage tanks to the Grindstone Water Treatment Plant. His was the only bid, Assistant Village Manager Alan Briley said. With addition of gross receipts taxes on

purchased materials, Kelley's line extension work will cost the village \$134,012.

Kelley Construction will install the water basin at the plant for \$276,721. The basin will catch the 30,000 gallons used daily to backwash system filters and recycle water.

Kelley's crew will start replacing wastewater lines along Sudderth Drive next week, Brand said.

Kelley Construction was awarded the first phase of the water line replacement contract with a bid of \$558,545, the lowest of the three bids received by the village, Briley said.

The \$1.6 million water line project will prevent rainwater from infiltrating some lines. Lines will be installed along Sudderth Drive, from Meander Drive to Carrizo Canyon Road, then move up Carrizozo just past its intersection with Evergreen Road, Brand said.

The request for proposals for the senior center and convention center were combined by the village, Briley said.

Councilors awarded a contract for \$211,855 for both projects to American Construction & Concrete of Alamogordo. The company's bid was one of seven received.

# Downs drops Ruidoso police drug agent deal

Fearful of more lawsuits, Ruidoso Downs won't renew a contract to allow Ruidoso narcotics officers to work in the Downs. A Downs officer will do the work instead.

Ruidoso Downs may already be held "liable" for the actions of a Ruidoso narcotics agent, who is being sued for alleged civil rights violations in the arrest of two men for alleged drug trafficking.

Officer Pete Esquibel, a Ruidoso narcotics agent working as a commissioned Ruidoso Downs police officer, arrested Leonard Padilla and Zeke Duran in August 1996 for possession of heroine with the intent to sell. Resolution of the criminal case is still pending.

Now Duran and Padilla are suing Esquibel for allegedly violating their civil rights during the ar-

rest because he didn't have a search or arrest warrant. The lawsuit could eventually affect Ruidoso Downs, if Ruidoso shifts responsibility for Esquibel over to that municipality.

To protect itself from future liability for the actions of an officer not under their supervision, the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees voted Monday not to renew a Joint Powers Agreement for Narcotic Interdiction between the Downs and Ruidoso.

Instead, the Downs is signing a similar agreement with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office. In this agreement, one Ruidoso Downs officer will act as a commissioned sheriff's deputy and handle all narcotics cases within Ruidoso Downs. The sheriff's office may also call this officer to duties outside the vil-

lage.

"He'll be primarily on highway drug interdiction," Ruidoso Downs Police Chief David Hightower said. "He'll still be writing speeding tickets, stopping cars, and looking for a load of dope coming through."

Mayor Joe Hayhurst said the board also liked the sheriff's agreement because the Lincoln County Narcotics Enforcement Unit will pay 50% of the Downs officer's salary, and it will split 50-50 confiscated vehicles and other items.

The sheriff's department has a similar agreement with Ruidoso. Ruidoso drug agent Pete Esquibel said confiscated items weren't always reimbursed to Ruidoso from the sheriff's office, Hightower related.

The previous agreement with Ruidoso allowed a Ruidoso nar-

cotics agent to operate as a fully commissioned Downs police officer, but he was not required to report to the Downs chief of police. Though the Downs was not supervising the Ruidoso narcotics agent, Downs village attorney Robert Beauvais said the village of Ruidoso will probably expect the Downs to pay any liability or damages resulting from the lawsuit against the officer.

"The likelihood of getting sued in narcotics is high," Beauvais said.

Beauvais will review the Downs agreement with the sheriff's office before it is officially adopted.

This is the first time a Downs police officer will work as a full-time narcotics agent. Chief Hightower is in the process of choosing between two officers under his command.

### A piece of the pie would leave legislators hungry at this point in game

It was a good idea for New Mexico racetrack officials to talk to the legislative Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Committee when it met Friday in Ruidoso. Talking one-on-one is always better than not talking at all, and the more the tracks can get the word out about their side of the gambling issue, the better.

Unfortunately, the discussion probably didn't do much to boost track officials' mood.

Some legislators told track officials they want a good-sized piece of the pie if tracks get video gambling machines. Right now, their piece of the pie would be millions of dollars in the red. Wonder if they want a piece of that?

No, but they don't. Instead, they heavily regulate the tracks, creating extra expenses for the track owners, while avoiding gambling issues that they should be facing head-on.

While such a committee would understandably focus on fiscal issues, the committee should also understand the tracks' fiscal problems better than most. Judging from the meeting, they're more concerned about getting a piece of something that doesn't exist.

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### River has always been focal point of family visits

(This letter was sent to the Ruidoso mayor and council members, and the writer asked it to be printed in this paper.)

Recently I was asked what comes to mind when I am asked about Ruidoso, and my immediate answer was the river.

## Hondo holds onto good standing with state

Hondo Superintendent Barbara Casey has salvaged the Hondo School District's accreditation. She reported at the school board meeting Monday that the State Board of Education (SBE) has restored the Hondo School District to full accreditation, though state officials expressed some reservation.

A letter from State Superintendent of Public Instruction Alan Morgan said the SBE "remained concerned with the district's ability to accomplish all accreditation and financial corrective action plans." Department of Education staff continues to monitor Hondo's progress.

Hondo was in danger of losing its accreditation at the beginning of this year for failing to live up to state education and management standards. Without accreditation, a school is not authorized by the state to operate as a public school and it does not receive state funding.

State Director of Accreditation Toni Trujillo said earlier if Hondo's accreditation was revoked, the state would step in and take over the powers of the school board, and the school would not necessarily close.

Trujillo and Accreditation Team Leader Catherine Hill will visit Hondo Sept. 11 and 12 to review

what's been done to address last year's citations.

"We'll be making sure they are implementing the corrective action plans they turned in," Trujillo said.

The Hondo district is expected to have handbooks for students and personnel, a revised curriculum, a plan for updating technology, a way to keep accurate students records, and four-year plans for all high school students, according to Casey.

"As far as I know, that's all been done," Casey said.

Curriculum revisions are being written by teachers this week and must be turned in by Aug. 29. The revisions will update old-fashioned techniques and methodologies. For example, the outdated philosophy behind home economics was to make girls into homemakers, Casey said. The modern philosophy is that home economics helps students enter the workforce, make career choices, and become responsible citizens.

The curriculum revisions will emphasize incorporating computers into studies, Casey said.

### Upgrades Needed

Meanwhile, Casey is dealing with an ultra-tight budget and serious plant upgrade needs. Fortunately, Hondo qualifies for assistance under the Public School Capital Outlay Act (PSCOA). Par-

tially funded by the New Mexico Lottery, this act helps financially exhausted school districts with critical capital outlay needs.

If Hondo applies for critical capital outlay funds, Casey's priority would be to make the schools accessible to people with disabilities.

Hondo schools fall short of ADA standards such as wheelchair-accessible restrooms and braille signs at doorways. Hondo has no disabled children enrolled, but officials must plan for the future, Casey said.

In addition to complying with ADA, Casey would like to find money to buy property and build housing. Money from the PSCOA can be used for that. Teachers are concerned about the lack of housing in Hondo, Casey said.

"We have people looking for places to live and they can't find any place," she said.

Many teachers commute from Roswell or Ruidoso, Casey said.

The school board has considered building employee housing that teachers could rent from the district at a reduced rate.

Finally, Casey would like to convert the upper playground area into a parking lot for visitors. This would especially help during Fiesta Hondo, and it would make the parking lot safer for buses, she said.

## EDUCATION BRIEFS

### Extended Learning expands at Eastern

Information hounds and people seeking degrees can now choose from 60 courses, three bachelor degrees, and two master degrees through the Extended Learning program at Eastern New Mexico University. Broadcasting mainly from Portales, 17 departments will deliver classes to six sites this year, including ENMU-Ruidoso.

Correspondence courses aren't what they used to be. New colleges are using "distance learning," which combines all the communication systems of the modern age — interactive television (ITV), e-mail, Internet, fax, and phone. This technology brings greater educational opportunities to communities like Ruidoso.

This expands Eastern's extended learning campus to cover 22,000 square miles. The FCC recently licensed ENMU to broadcast on four Instructional Television Fixed Service channels simultaneously.

Ruidoso tuned in to ITV last semester with 27 students enrolled in Extended Learning classes, ENMU-Ruidoso Director Jim Miller said. Registration for this semester's ITV courses continues until Sept. 6.

Each of Eastern's ITV classrooms is equipped with the latest in educational technology. Projection systems have taken the place of overhead projectors. Interactive talkback lets students at remote sites talk with the instructor and

fellow students in the ITV classroom.

Computer images are broadcast to students seconds after touching computer keypads. The instructors use special cameras which follow them in the classroom. Class sessions may be videotaped, so students can watch it later if they are unable to attend class.

ENMU-Portales is the leader in Interactive Instructional Television in the state of New Mexico, according to coordinator Cynthia Hayes. Not only has ENMU increased its number of broadcasted classes, but it also is now offering distance education bachelor's degrees in Business Administration, Nursing and University Studies; and master's degrees in Business Administration and Communicative Disorders.

In addition, a Master of Education in Elementary Education, Master of Education in Special Education and Bilingual certification/licensure can be earned through a combination of ITV and on-site classes.

Anyone interested in participating in ENMU's ITV Program may register now. Students may apply for various scholarships at Eastern. Recently, two \$400 Extended Learning Endowed Scholarships were made available specifically for extended learning students who meet the eligibility requirements. More information is available at Accounts Receivable/Scholarship Office in Portales at 562-2615.

After a day at the races at Ruidoso Downs, this novice racing fan decided to learn a bit about the Sport of Kings. What makes better horse sense than to get the low-down directly from the horse's mouth — figuratively speaking of course. Mr. Ed was not available.

Carrizozo claims Kelly Gregory Lovelace, daughter Crystal, and husband Gary Joe as a resident horseracing family. Owner Kelly has three racers in her name. They include thoroughbreds Secret Keeper and Western Country, along with a quarter horse, Sign of Royalty. I wonder what the other three-quarters are? Horse also, I hope (I told you I am a novice).

Gary Joe does the training. He has been a licensed trainer for a number of years, beginning his career in Arizona. He is now a New Mexico licensed trainer. Gary Joe has also done a stint as a jockey. Sporting a five-foot, 11-inch, 115-pound frame, he was affectionately known as the "Ethiopian Poster Child." During the off season, Gary

Joe can be found busy at work breaking colts.

The Lovelace full service basic horse training facility is complete with training track and starting gate.

The third member of this family team is Kelly's daughter Crystal. She is the official groom, keeping the horses looking sleek and abiding for races at Ruidoso Downs, Sunland, and Albuquerque.

These proud horses are usually in the capable hands of Harla Webb, a well-known jockey. Asked if Kelly ever considered this profession, she replied with an emphatic "NO!" A little galloping in the extent of Kelly's fast riding, a smiling Gary Joe reluctantly reported.

Kelly responded "seldom" when asked if she bets on her horses. I was fishing for a hot tip but Kelly would rather have a soda instead of the anxiety of betting on her own entry in a race. I saw Secret Keeper run and, loyal to the local entry, I bet on the horse. I should have bought a soda!

According to Lovelaces, the horse to watch is Western Country.

I could hear the pride in their voices as they recited the impressive stats; of 11 starts, the three-year-old has claimed three firsts, four seconds, and a third. That's win, place, and show in racing parlance. See, I'm learning!

It would cap a great season for the Lovelaces to be in the winner's circle with Western Country for the prestigious New Mexico Breeder's Thoroughbred Derby. The horse is also in the running for the Three-Year-Old Thoroughbred of the Year for New Mexico.

With all the time and effort needed to maintain a racing stable, Gary Joe and Kelly still squeeze in a bit of recreation on the golf course and bowl on the local mixed league. Add all that to Kelly's position as records coordinator with the sheriff's office and night shift as an EMT, and they are left with precious little time to catch a breath.

So, I won't be quite so unschooled about horse races next time I have a day at the track. Gary Joe patiently explained the flipping halter worn by some race horses. It is a ring attached to the

halter, under the horse's chin. A short rope is passed through the ring and the starting gate to prevent the horse from backing off and flipping over onto its rider. Ouch! The rope easily pulls loose when the gate opens.

Also tweaking my curiosity was the notation on the racing program regarding the use of a well-known diuretic, Lasix. Kelly explained in layman's terms that under strict medical supervision, the medication is sometimes indicated to prevent fluid retention which can cause stress and, in turn, result in the rupture of tiny blood vessels which can bleed into the horse's lungs. High altitude is a definite factor. Ah ha! That's where the old saying about having to p— like a racehorse must originate!

It's a thrill to watch those magnificent horses thunder around the track in a headlong race to the finish line. I'm sure it is a special feeling to our local horse racing family to hear that "call...AND THEY'RE OFF!"

# Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees deals with Wal-Mart issues

The Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees Monday denied a request for a special burn permit to clear a residential property on Wood Lane. Ron and Tina Bitter asked the board for a special burn permit in a one-acre field by their house, about

a half-mile from the site where Wal-Mart will conduct a burn to clear property. The board approved Wal-Mart's permit two weeks ago. "Our burn would be smaller and easier to control," Ron Bitter said. "We figured since Wal-Mart got a

permit, we might get one." Downs Fire Chief Nick Herrera told the board he had checked out the Bitters' property and believed it was too dangerous to burn wood scraps, brush or trash there. "There's a lot of livestock around there, and that smoke could kill them," Herrera said.

The fire chief also noted that the Bitters are storing hay on their property, and that could create a hazard. Mayor Joe Hayhurst told the

Bitters that special burn permits are not meant for clearing yards. "I considered Wal-Mart's permit economic development," Hayhurst said. "I don't consider it in the same frame as burning trash in your yard."

Wal-Mart is clearing away an old dump site behind Cowboy Stables, where it plans to build a new store. The burn will be supervised by the Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department. In the interest of economic devel-

opment, the board also approved on Monday a request for Mayor Joe Hayhurst to work with Wal-Mart when needed.

Wal-Mart executives asked to work directly with just one person in Ruidoso Downs, so the board empowered the mayor to respond to any requests from Wal-Mart pending council votes.

Trustee Jackie Branum explained the mayor will consult with trustees between monthly council

meetings if necessary, so the village can respond to Wal-Mart quickly. The council will then vote on issues at regular board meetings. If the public objects to any plans the mayor tentatively approves, Branum said the decision could be changed at a board meeting in response to public comment.

"They can't do anything until we actually vote," Branum said.

Branum said the mayor's work will help "speed things up and get Wal-Mart down here."

# Three people arrested in Downs on drug charges

Three Ruidoso Downs people were arrested on drug-related charges Sunday when marijuana and methamphetamine powder were found in their vehicles.

Smith was arrested as an alleged party to a crime. She was released on a \$1,000 bond. Gray and Pack are being sent to county jail pending a preliminary hearing in magistrate court. Gray is being held on a \$16,000 bond.

Pack is being held without possibility of bond because he was on probation for aggravated assault.



# State wants its share of the gambling pie

Legislators may want a bigger slice of the action, if the state is going to allow video gaming machines at New Mexico's four active racetracks.

Two members of the legislative Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Committee meeting in Ruidoso Friday said the state's tax revenues should be large enough to cover regulatory expenses and end all subsidies to the tracks.

The state would get up to \$21.6 million annually from 2,000 video gaming machines at racetracks, said Marc Wilson, president of Hubbard Enterprises, which owns Ruidoso Downs Race Track. The estimate was based on a 10-15% state tax on net revenue from the machines.

Racetrack officials, including those at Ruidoso Downs, tried unsuccessfully last year to push a bill through the Legislature allowing video and table gaming at tracks. When that failed, they lowered their sights to just video gaming, but again, no legislation was passed.

They contended the games are essential to allow racetracks to compete with Indian casinos such as the Inn of the Mountain Gods, just a five-minute drive from the Ruidoso Downs Race Track. Next year, racing officials again will ask the legislature for video gaming, Wilson said.

Sen. Timothy Z. Jennings (D-Roswell) said the state needs enough tax return from such gaming to cover regulation, other industry-related costs and generate some discretionary money for the state general fund.

"This industry brings a lot to the state, but it also is subsidized by the state," Jennings said at the session in Ruidoso. "New Mexicans have paid for a lot of (racetrack) construction over the years."

The state doesn't intend to subsidize racetracks in any way if the video machines are approved, Jennings said.

"If we go to slot machines, we're going to be looking to make it pay, to generate more

taxes for other things we subsidize," he said.

The state Racing Commission already is subsidized to oversee the racing industry, Rep. Jerry W. Sandel (D-Farmington) said, and the slot machines would require additional oversight.

Without the machines, the state will continue to lose revenue, Wilson said.

The track will lose more than \$1 million this year, he said. In 1994, it lost \$1.2 million, but the biggest hit occurred in 1995 at \$2.3 million.

Statewide purses this year have dropped 15.3% from 1995, more than \$2.6 million, said Eddie Fowler, state racing commission chairman.

"As you can see, our industry is in dire straits," Fowler said. "It's going to get worse if we don't do something about it."

From 1991 to 1995, state tax revenues from the five racetracks declined 18.8% from \$149 million to \$115 million, Fowler said.

State Rep. Henry Kiki Saavedra (D-

Albuquerque) said he favors the machines at tracks and would be willing to introduce a bill when the Legislature convenes in January.

"The figures are terrible," he said. "The Indians make this in one night. But what's the governor's position on this?"

"His position was, he would support machines at the racetracks," Fowler responded.

Wilson, Michael Weatherly, president of the New Mexico Horsemen's Association, and Woody C. Schick of The Downs of Albuquerque pitched their case for approval of gaming machines at racetracks.

Industry experts expect track purses to hit more than \$100,000 a day, putting New Mexico only behind California, Kentucky, New York and Florida in purse size, Wilson said.

"Then you're looking at \$200 million in total revenue," said Luciano "Lucky" Varela (D-Santa Fe).

"A lot of improvements are needed at the tracks - air conditioning and heating at

Ruidoso," Wilson said. "We figured a capital investment at each (track for machines) of \$18 million to \$23 million. There has to be a sufficient amount of return after you pay taxes, purses, and other expenses to repay the debt and make a profit."

The tourist dollar impact of the racing industry, estimated at \$198 million in a racing commission study three years ago, is expected to triple, he said.

The figures are based on machine operating year-around, not just race days, Wilson said.

State Rep. Joe Stall (D-Carlsbad) questioned whether people will begin coming to the tracks just for the machines, and racing eventually will be phased out.

"We have to remain a racetrack and run a set number of days to retain our licenses," Wilson said. "We think protection can be built into the law for owners and breeders to avoid that threat. If we stop racing, machines won't be allowed."

State Sen. Michael C. Wiener (R-Bernalillo) speculated that gaming machines will increase the value of the tracks and owners will sell them.

"Mr. Hubbard has \$30 million invested in the area including the racetrack, the Museum of the Horse, radio stations, horse farms and a summer home," Wilson said.

"So this would be a financial windfall?" Wiener said.

"It would be a profit for those who took risk to invest," Wilson said, adding that the rest of the state also would benefit.

"We're losing (horse) owners in droves in New Mexico, because it costs them \$4 to earn \$1, because the purses are too low," Wilson said. "Purses are the backbone of the industry. Without healthy purses, you don't have owners willing to invest in racetracks, you don't have breeders or trainers."

"Critics say racetracks will just turn into casinos," Wilson said. "That's not true. Live racing increases, because more people are at the track. But racetracks recharacterize themselves to become entertainment destinations."

## Committee presents track impact data

Economic data presented during the New Mexico legislative Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Committee meeting Friday included:

- three years ago, a study by the state Racing Commission showed racing has a \$370 million positive impact on the state, including tax revenues, associated jobs and income;
- the number of jobs associated

with racing dropped to 9,300 this year compared to 10,000 jobs three years ago;

- 75% of Ruidoso Downs business is dependent on out-of-state patrons;

- since 1991, there was an 18.8% decline in state tax revenues from tracks (from \$149 million to \$115 million in 1995);

- during that same period, purses dropped 15.3%, a \$2.6

million decline;

- if each of the four active racetracks in the state installed 500 machines and each machine earned \$200 a day, the state would collect \$14.4 million at a 10% levy;

- and if the tax rate was increased to 15% with 2,000 machines earning \$200 each per day, the state would get \$21.6 million.

## Video machines boosted track's purses

The addition of video gaming machines helped an Iowa horse racetrack immensely, the Ruidoso Downs Race Track president told a state legislative committee meeting in Ruidoso Friday.

During the legislative Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Committee meeting, Marc Wilson, president of Hubbard Enterprises Inc., reviewed data

from Prairie Meadows Race Track near Des Moines, Iowa.

In April of 1995, 1,100 video gaming machines were installed. Last year, each machine netted \$273 per day.

Fed by some of those revenues and higher attendance, Prairie Meadows racing purses more than doubled from \$20,000 in 1994 to \$56,000 in 1996, Wilson said. By next year, the

purses are projected to reach \$97,000.

"Here purses are \$25,000 to \$35,000 statewide," he said.

Race days also increased from 62 in 1995 to an expected 115 in 1997. Along with that good news, racing-related employment connected to Prairie Meadows climbed 250% from 400 jobs in 1994 to 1,400 in 1996, Wilson said.
