Property tax bills arriving next week

Property tax bills will be mailed Monday by Lincoln County Treasurer Joan Park and her staff. The bills represent \$10,130,687 in taxes for the county, municipalities and special districts. They will be sent to 26,486 property owners, a 2% increase compared to the number mailed last year, primarily reflecting the creation of more home lots.

Morton resigns from state office

Gary Morton, well-known cowboy artist and Lincoln County resident, resigned this month as director of the state Office of Cultural Affairs. A spokesman for the department said Morton cited a need for more time to paint. He had served as director for about three years. John A. Garcia, Secretary of Tourism, has been appointed acting director of the office until Gov. Gary Johnson names a permanent replacement. The state is accepting applications for the position.

Baca attends Indian Affairs meeting this week

State Representative E. Shirley Baca, Democratic candidate for the 2nd U.S. Congressional District, will be in the Ruidoso area to attend the state Legislature's Indian Affairs Committee meetings that begin at 10 a.m. Thursday, Oct. 24 and 9 a.m. Friday, Oct. 25, at the Mescalero Inn on Carrizo Canyon Road, Mescalero Apache Reservation. Items on the agenda include Commission on Indian Affairs issues, Mescalero Apache issues, welfare reform, charter schools, Dept. of Health block grants and other business.

Missile travels 180 miles to White Sands range

An Army Tactical Missile System missile was successfully launched from Fort Wingate Wednesday, Oct. 16 and impacted at its intended location at White Sands Missile Range, some 180 miles away. Area residents were invited to view the launch from adjacent Red Rock State Park. About 50 people observed an exhaust contrail, similar to that of the space shuttle, as the missile propellant burned for 26 seconds.

Early snowstorm blasts Ruidoso

Motorists caught off guard

An arctic blast from Canada took Ruidoso by surprise Monday and dumped about six inches of wet snow, sending motorists into ditches and children into yards to play.

Ski Apache received 11 inches in its first snow. It came much earlier than last year's first flakes on Nov. 5. The village didn't accumulate any snow last year until Dec. 16.

After a low of seven degrees in Ruidoso overnight, much of the white stuff had melted down by midday Tuesday. But more is possible this weekend, KBIM-TV Roswell weatherman Cam Moore said.

"It looks like we're in a pretty cool pattern, and a wet pattern too," Moore said Tuesday. "Another storm is moving in from the northwest. It looks like on Saturday and Sunday, in the mountains of New Mexico, we'll be getting more snowfall."

This coming front, however, shouldn't be as cold as Monday's, he said.

The wet snow caused problems for trees still holding leaves, causing them to droop and hit power lines around Ruidoso. This caused a 1.5-hour power outage in the Ruidoso Downs River Park area, police Chief David Hightower said.

Some other lines sparked, but none resulted in fire. Texas-New Mexico Power Company received six calls associated with the sparking lines, which were cleared of snow by a service man, said company clerk Lesley Schaffer.

Ruidoso police reported seven accidents after the snow started accumulating around 4:30 p.m. Only


one of the accidents, at 6:47 p.m. on Wingfield Street, resulted in injuries, and they were minor, police said. Three other motorists had to be pulled from ditches or pushed out of the road.

In Ruidoso Downs, five cars lost control, mainly near the racetrack and Champions Run area on U.S. Highway 70. No injuries were reported.

Monday's winter blast was caused by an unseasonably cold arctic high pressure system that moved down Sunday from Canada. It was then met by a strong upper-level low disturbance moving in from the Northwest, Moore said.

Although uncommon, October snowfall is not unknown to the south central mountains and high plains, Moore noted.

Ski Apache gets nearly a foot

Ski Apache got a jump on its snowmaking for the 1996-97 season when a storm blew in cold temperatures and dropped 11 inches of natural snow Monday.

The ski area fired up its 46 snow guns at 9 a.m. Tuesday and sprayed manmade snow on the slopes throughout the day, said Riker Davis of Ski Apache.

Eager to take advantage of the favorable weather conditions, snowmaking crew chief Denny Grover cut short his vacation to return to the mountain and direct the snowmaking efforts.

In a matter of hours, the short-clad Grover went from putting up a sailboat in San Carlos, Mexico to donning a parka, gloves and ski caps and making snow at Ski Apache.

The area has 46 snowmaking guns, and the capability of making snow on 19 of its 55 trails. Ski Apache will resume full-time snowmaking Nov. 1, Davis said.

At other ski areas in the state, Santa Fe received the most, 16 inches. Taos and Angel Fire both got a foot of snow, while Sandia Peak received 10 inches and Sipapu had eight. In Colorado, Keystone ski resort opened one trail Monday.

Snow contest winners

The Monday storm also determined the winner of the First Snow Contest sponsored by Ski Apache, the Inn of the Mountain Gods and The Ruidoso News.

Bill and Cindy Pratt of McKinney, Texas guessed six inches of snow would accumulate in the Ski

Chino breaks Democrat tradition

Mescalero Apache Tribe President Wendell Chino changed coats Friday when he endorsed Republican Senator Bob Dole for U.S. president.

Chino has traditionally been a Democrat supporter, a spokesperson said.

But as Chino told Dole, U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici, Gov. Gary Johnson and a crowd of about 7,000 gathered for a Dole rally in Albuquerque Oct. 18, he switched his support and recommended tribal members join him in endorsing Dole for president.

Chino is the only state Indian leader to support Dole for president. All 21 other tribal leaders endorsed Clinton at a meeting with the president Oct. 15.

Fire destroys home

Final touches to a new, three-story Ruidoso house may have started a fire Tuesday that destroyed the structure, fire officials said.

A painter was inside the 405 Flume Canyon house when the blaze started. The painter, Jazz Hallmark, suffered no injuries, although all his facial hair, including his eyelashes, was singed.

The fast-burning fire started around 11:30 a.m. in the house's living room. After spreading and burning most of the walls, it was contained within a half hour by 22 Ruidoso firefighters. No household items or furniture were in the house.

The house was pronounced "a total loss" by Assistant Fire Chief Robbie Hall.

The new home was being built by Realtor Barbara Willard, who said she planned to lease it to Bruce Eldredge, the new director of the Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs.

Willard appeared at the Flume Canyon fire scene, gasping when seeing the charred 10-room house and looking visibly shaken.

Eldredge had hoped to move his wife and two daughters, who are still in Orange, Texas, into the 3,000 square-foot home in two weeks, he said.

The fire could have been caused by an electrical spark, fire officials said. A paint gun was plugged into an outlet at the time of the fire. Fire officials are investigating the cause.

Flammable paint and cleaning liquids were in the living room at the time of the fire, and Hallmark had just coated the walls with dry seal. He was not smoking a cigarette, nor were there any open flames inside or around the house when the fire started, he said.

An independent painting subcontractor for 22 years, Hallmark said he had just finished with the dry seal and was about to go outside to clean the paint gun rig with chemicals. He turned around to get the paint gun pointer, which also needed cleaning, and the fire "flashed" up before him.

Hallmark lost \$3,000-\$4,000 worth of his own equipment and supplies in the fire, he said.

"If it wasn't for my bad luck, I wouldn't have any luck at all," Hallmark said.

"The Indian tribes of New Mexico are sovereign nations, and Mr. Chino has the prerogative to choose who he wishes to support," said Pueblo of Acoma Gov. Ron D. Shutiva on Tuesday.

An attempt to reach other tribal leaders for comment was unsuccessful.

"It was a surprise for Wendell Chino to endorse Bob Dole, but I also think it wasn't a surprise that 21 other Indian tribes endorsed Clinton," said Clinton's statewide campaign office manager Anne Uhring.

Chino said he asked Clinton for a meeting while he was in New Mexico, but Clinton never responded.

Chino has requested that U.S. Attorney John Kelly be removed from office, following Kelly's forced shutdown of Casino Apache Sept. 24. All 10 of the other Indian casinos in New Mexico have been allowed to stay open pending appeals of court rulings saying they are illegal. Chino complained earlier this month that Kelly and the court's treatment of the tribe has been unfair.

"President Clinton personally

knows John Kelly, and I think he respects what Mr. Kelly is trying to do and respects the power of the court system," Uhring said. "The president very specifically said it's in the courts now, and it's for the courts to decide."

"Just two weeks ago, Chino was ready to endorse President Bill Clinton for re-election, he said. But after looking into records, Chino, a former co-chairman of the Bureau of Indian Affairs Reorganization Task Force, concluded Clinton has failed to implement the task force's 4-year-old recommendations.

"I believe that Indians and not Washington bureaucrats should lead the reformation of the BIA and the Indian Health Service. If you have never lived on a reservation, then you cannot understand the issues we must live with every day. And you will not know how to fix the problems," Chino said at the Dole rally. "Bob Dole shares that belief. To date, four years after the forming of the BIA Reorganization Task Force, our recommendations for such reforms have had virtually no action by the current administration."

Dole and Domenici, on the other hand, have shown their support of

Lost hunter found

A hunter caught in a snowstorm that blanketed the Sacramento Mountains Monday was found about 11:25 a.m. Tuesday.

"The other guys in his hunting party didn't see him after 1 p.m. (Monday)," said Jim Edwards, field commander for the search initiated by the New Mexico State Police at 9 a.m. Tuesday. "They were on horseback and on foot all night searching, and when they couldn't find him they called the state police."

The hunter was identified as Michael Foster, about 35 years old. He is not from Lincoln County, but his hometown was unknown, Edwards said.

About 11 volunteers from White Mountain Search and Rescue based

in Lincoln County joined the other hunters and Foster's father in the search for the lost man. He was found in good condition in the Aspen Canyon area of the White Mountain Wilderness.

Neither Foster nor his hunting buddies wanted to come down Tuesday from their base camp, a U.S. Forest Service cabin off Crest Trail, Edwards said. Because he hasn't been able to talk to the rescuers or Foster, Edwards had no details of how the lost hunter protected himself overnight in heavy snow and single-digit temperatures, or who found him.

"Apparently, he fared all right and was dressed OK," Edwards said.

funding of educational programs on the reservation, Chino said.

Chino said that Dole's voting record shows:

— he voted for increases in the BIA Loan Guaranty Program during the Reagan and Bush administrations;

— and, without those increases Dole supported, more than \$250 million in economic development programs for Indians wouldn't have happened in the past 12 years. Economic development on the Mes-calero Apache Reservation has included the Inn of the Mountain Gods, a timber mill and convention center.

"Rhetoric, political posturing and bureaucratic hand-aid programs from Washington are not going to allow the American Indian people to enjoy the equality our fellow citizens enjoy," Chino said in closing. "Sovereignty, self-determination, personal responsibility, equality, character and the freedoms Bob Dole and American Indians fought for side-by-side in world wars are what make America great."

"The Mescalero Apache Tribe is proud to endorse Bob Dole as our next president of the United States."

"We've known of snows in late September," Moore said Tuesday. "This is something that happens occasionally. It's not too early for us to have snow, especially for you guys in the mountains."

Stores get busy

"This ought to get everyone ready who wasn't ready for winter," police detective Wolf Born said of the wood, fuel and car maintenance needs for mountain residents.

Area businesses reported brisk sales of winter related items Tuesday.

"From the time we opened, people have been coming in to buy shovels, scrapers, ice melt and anything else they can get hold of," Village Hardware Store secretary Ilo Boren said.

Wilton Howell, owner of One Stop Auto, said he received a couple

of dozen calls about snow tires and put studded snow tires on about six cars.

Over at Western Auto Associates, about 30 or 40 requests for fire chains or snow-related items poured in Monday and Tuesday, said manager Jim McCarvey.

"But the requests are pretty normal for this time of year," he added. "It's just moved up a couple of weeks with this little scare we had here," he said.

People were running into Wal-Mart when the snow started gathering, buying everything from anti-freeze to long underwear, said store manager Mike Daulton.

"I don't think anyone expected this storm to be as good as it was," Daulton said Tuesday. "Since it thawed out in the morning, we've really been busy. You could tell everyone was surprised by it — overreacting to it, and it's a good thing they did!"

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Domenici stumps Ruidoso over coffee

On his reelection campaign swing through Lincoln County, U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici warned ranchers they may see federal grazing fees rise, but he is optimistic overall about the future of rural communities.

And he said the Mesquero Apache have been unfairly treated by the courts in being forced to close their casino while those of other tribes remain open during deliberations over the legality of gambling.

Traveling with his wife Nancy, a caravan of family members and a cover of rain clouds, Domenici drove into Ruidoso Saturday morning from a pancake breakfast in Alamogordo.

The temperature outside was chilly, but inside K-Bob's at a coffee in his honor, the mood was warm as supporters crowded around Domenici, shook his hand and posed for photographs.

The Republican senator from New Mexico was introduced by Lincoln County Commissioner Monroy Montes, as a legend in politics.

"He's given politics a good name and has given New Mexico a lot of publicity throughout the country," Montes said.

Facing opponents from the Democratic, Green and Libertarian parties, Domenici said his chances for re-election look good, "but you never know until election day."

He recalled that his career in politics started when six of his good friends were sitting around talking 34 years ago and told him he should run for public office.

At that point, Domenici had been in a successful private law practice for eight years.

When he told his friends a few days later he was ready to run, they blanched and changed their tune, he said. "I tried to convince him he shouldn't run, because

he had a wonderful family, a good practice and would be corrupted by politics.

But Domenici told his friends it was their idea and now they better work for his election. They did, and four months later he was elected to the Albuquerque City Council, a path that led to the U.S. Senate.

Turning to local issues, Domenici said, "I don't think it's fair and even-handed to have just one casino closed."

The issue will have to work its way through the courts and the state Legislature, but "sooner or later they all will be treated the same," he said. "Whatever the circuit court had in mind, I don't think it was right" to order Casino Apache to close when casinos in nine pueblos and at the Jicarilla Apache Reservation remain open.

More money is available to continue development at the county rural events center in Glencoe and he will support the project, he said.

The county earlier this month received \$130,000 in federal money from a Rural Economic Development grant to build an outdoor roping arena there.

On the future of Fort Stanton, closed in March 1995 as a state hospital, Domenici said he doesn't know what he can do to help in the push to turn it into a state or federal park or monument. But he sees combined county, state and federal involvement in any long-term solution, he said.

Ranchers will be vulnerable if

President Bill Clinton wins re-election, because grazing fees now can be changed by executive order, Domenici said.

"And (Clinton) has never been on the side of the rancher. They should vote for Dole, is what they ought to do," he said.

But generally, the future looks good for rural communities, the senator said.

"I think Ruidoso residents have the right kind of community spirit to be part of our vision for the next decade," Domenici said.

Albuquerque's unemployment percentage this year has been in the 4% to 5.2% range and businesses are finding no work force available, he said.

"I believe with the growth of telecommunications, there will be a large segment of the nation's population that still will want to live in small communities," Domenici said. "I believe in community spirit, and I'm going to be part of it."

Two Fort Stanton support groups talk about combining

Leaders of two citizen support groups for Fort Stanton say they must work together if the effort to create a museum and history center at the fort is to succeed.

But during the third meeting of Operation Fort Stanton, members of the two groups seemed to have trouble figuring out how that can be accomplished.

At a previous Operation meeting, Virginia Jones, who heads Friends of Fort Stanton and the associated Fort Stanton Historic Foundation Inc., invited the Operations group to join her organization.

Operations president Sally Burkstaller turned the invitation around Thursday, inviting Jones' group to join her. The fort is located 12 miles northeast of Ruidoso.

Burkstaller said Operation Fort Stanton has more than 400 members. About 50 people attended the Thursday meeting, showing that volunteers are willing to contribute their time, she said.

But after listening to some of the proposals to use the fort as a resort and living history center with enactments and trail rides, Jones' husband, Lonnie Lippmann, questioned if the historical integrity of the fort could be maintained with all of the activities being proposed.

Burkstaller assured him preservation of the historic aspects of the fort is the first emphasis. Lynda Sanchez, writer, teacher and anthropologist, told Lippmann she wouldn't remain associated with the Operation group if "heritage" tourism isn't the primary focus.

Real estate agent Cindy Lynch, who handles legislative issues for the local Realtors association, threw her support with Burkstaller.

"It's a vision I see happening for Lincoln County," she said of the proposal. But she added that like many other people, she had been confused by the existence of two groups.

Burkstaller invited Jones and one of her associates to join the Op-

eration steering committee, or at least sit down with committee to see if some type of merger can be arranged, and to learn more about each other.

"There's nothing I want more," Burkstaller said. "I implore you to join us. When we have another workshop, let's have it together. We both want the fort preserved."

Jones agreed it's necessary to appoint someone to be liaison between the two groups and it would be beneficial to have some mutual meetings of key committees from each group.

Jones' group recently met with representatives from a half dozen state departments and several federal agencies to review possible funding avenues. They also are incorporating the foundation as a non-profit entity, she said.

Burkstaller said she's also been busy. She and several friends handed out fliers on Fort Stanton, which was closed as a state hospital in March 1995.

And she went to Santa Fe to corner state officials and legislators. Public Lands Commissioner Ray Powell seemed especially interested, Burkstaller said.

This is the type of build-up necessary before going to the state Legislature to ask for help, she said.

"It's incredible," Burkstaller said. "Every day I go to the mailbox and find letters of support and I receive phone calls. It's so encouraging."

Burkstaller appointed members to several different committees, including a speaker's bureau to talk to clubs and other groups about plans for the fort.

Lincoln County Commissioner Bill Schwetmann said the county can help with grant writing when the time comes, but first the state

must release the fort to the county government to eliminate some of the requirements that are too steep for most groups. The county has no intention of accepting responsibility for closing a landfill operated for decades by the state at the fort, he added.

Several people asked Commissioner L. Ray Nunley why a recent \$130,000 federal grant is being used to build an outdoor arena at the county's rural events center in Glencoe instead of directing commission efforts toward the fort. Nunley said the type of activities at the center will be on a much smaller scale than the fort and won't involve an emphasis on history.

"The first thing we need to do is reopen the museum at the fort to have it ready for this summer," Nunley said. Artifacts stored in Santa Fe and Lincoln must be brought back to the fort, he said. And he urged the two groups to work in unison.

"We need to pull together," Nunley said.

Burkstaller appointed a steering committee to define the scope, limits, direction and policy for the group. Committee members include Sid Goodloe, Dick Weber, Trink Edmunds and Roland Caster.

Operation Fort Stanton Secretary Cheryl Wozny praised a study performed about 10 years ago on creating a National Center for the Western Horse at the fort, saying the goals would apply as much today as when it was assembled.

Historical preservation officials in Texas suggested asking corporations to adopt one or more of the buildings for upkeep and restoration. Cille Dickinson from Lincoln said groups such as the American Quarter Horse Association also maybe interested.

Signal epidemic infects Ruidoso

TO THE EDITOR:

This is a warning to the citizens of Ruidoso! There is an epidemic here in Ruidoso that seems to be spreading. At first I wasn't too worried as it seemed to be affecting vehicles with black and white license plates only. But it has now infected vehicles with yellow and red licenses as well.

Increasing populations in many of our small counties has put an incredible burden on county services like road repair. Unfortunately, county budgets are stretched to their limits. This amendment would give counties the ability to plan ahead and purchase equipment vitally necessary for road and bridge repair, helping to protect the lives of our families.

We encourage all citizens to vote FOR amendment #7 on Nov. 5.

Help make school bus rides safe

TO THE EDITOR:

Fortunately, the bus ride to and from school poses few dangers. It is not, however, risk-free! Many thousands of children are injured each year, some fatally. If children are taught common safety practices at home as well as at school, many, if not all, of these injuries can be prevented. As parents, we, too, can help by keeping safety ever-present in our daily routine.

Oct. 20-26 is National School Bus Safety Week, sponsored by the National Safety Council and the National Highway Transportation and Safety Administration — a time when we can begin to focus our attention to our safety practices relative to School Bus and Pedestrian Safety.

As a parent, first of all, ensure your child gets out the door in time to catch the bus without rushing, and remind them to always stop at curbs or edges of parked cars and

look left-right-left before proceeding across a street or intersection (even if there is a crosswalk, light or crossing guard). Also, instruct your children to never walk behind a school bus and to keep a distance of 10 feet in front or 6 feet to the sides of the bus when entering the bus or exiting from it.

As drivers, we should watch for children and youth walking to school and on bicycles, especially at intersections and driveways. Young bicyclists have a tendency to dart out of driveways without looking for traffic. We should slow down and watch for children and youth playing and gathering near bus stops and be aware that children and youth are often running late and only have one thing in mind — getting to the stop. Therefore, safety is, unfortunately, not commonly a forethought. When you see red lights or yellow lights flashing on a school bus, stop your car for loading and unloading, and do not begin to drive until the lights stop flashing.

Our children are our most precious resource for the future. Let's work together to prevent these types of injuries. Remember, together, we CAN make a difference!

Firing sparks Hondo assault charges

The firing of Hondo Valley Schools business manager Abdul Ibrahim on Sept. 26 has led to violence and the exchange of accusations between Ibrahim and Superintendent Barbara Casey, and her husband Frank Casey.

At a special meeting on Sept. 26, the Hondo School Board voted unanimously to fire Ibrahim. He had been the business manager for one year.

Casey put Ibrahim on a leave of absence Sept. 20, and she banned him from school premises to block his access to the computer and paperwork, she said. Ibrahim claims he was banned to prevent him from protecting his records from Casey's tampering.

Ibrahim defied the ban twice, once to hand-deliver a request for due process to Casey, and again in the company of former superintendent Margarito Uranga because Uranaga wanted to visit with employees.

Casey went to the police after Ibrahim's second visit to the Hondo campus on Oct. 14, alleging that Ibrahim made "contemptible comments" to another employee about Casey's marital status.

"He asked if I still loved him (Ibrahim) and said he would marry me after Frank was dead," Casey said.

Taking the comment as a veiled threat, Casey and her husband reported the incident to state police.

Frank Casey went to Ibrahim's house that evening, Oct. 14, and a violent confrontation ensued.

Two days later Ibrahim filed battery and criminal trespass charges against Frank Casey, and Frank Casey filed assault and battery charges against Ibrahim in Roswell Municipal Court. According to court records, both men pleaded innocent and both cases will go to court.

Casey claims Ibrahim invited him into his house, then grabbed

Casey by a jeweled crucifix around his neck.

Then Ibrahim hit him with a broom and threatened to shoot him, Casey said.

Ibrahim claims that when he answered Casey's banging on the door, Casey looked violent so Ibrahim tried to shut the door. Ibrahim claims Casey forced his way into the house and proceeded to beat Ibrahim up in front of his 7-year-old son.

School allegations

Barbara Casey said Ibrahim was terminated for causes related to "discrepancies in the district's financial transactions." She could not say if any money was missing from school accounts.

Casey has turned information on Ibrahim over to the state auditor and District Attorney Viola Rhodes for investigation, she said. Rhodes said the investigation is still in the

early stages and she has not come to any conclusions yet.

"Our office is looking into it," she said.

Ibrahim's attorney Richard Hawthorne said the school board's hasty action may have violated Ibrahim's right to due process.

"We feel he's been wrongly terminated," Hawthorne added. "They didn't have just cause."

If the outcome of a termination hearing does not satisfy Ibrahim, he is prepared to file a wrongful termination suit against the Hondo School District, Hawthorne said. Casey and the school board have failed to follow correct termination procedures, Hawthorne said.

"There's an issue as to what they've done and why they've done it," he said. "We'll get a better understanding at the hearing."

No date has been set for Ibrahim's termination hearing, Casey said.

Ibrahim charges that Casey's in-

experience as a school administrator and finances has led her to make several mistakes not only in his termination, but also in her administration of the Hondo Valley School. Casey is a state legislator and former teacher, and this is his first year as a superintendent.

Ibrahim has his own concerns about the district's finances under Casey's administration, he said.

Ibrahim has accused Casey of using school time and resources to manage her legislative and campaign work as House Representative of District 58 in Roswell.

"That's the most ridiculous thing I've heard in my whole life," Casey responded.

Casey has served six terms as Dist. 58 state representative and is competing against Dara Dana to keep her seat in the coming election.

Casey said she had suspicions about the handling of Hondo's school money since she took the job of superintendent in July.

"It came to a head when the school's external auditor was here Sept. 17 and 18," Casey said. "We (Casey and Ibrahim) had a confrontation over something he (Ibrahim) wanted me to say was general practice that was not true."

Ibrahim said the confrontation was over an internal control procedure the auditor recommended for the 95-96 school year. Casey believes Ibrahim wanted her to tell the auditor that these procedures are in place for the current school year, though they are not, she said.

Ibrahim believes that confrontation was just a matter of miscommunication or misunderstanding.

"If there was any other problem or build-up, I don't know about it," Ibrahim said.

"A lot of things were done that shouldn't have been, and things should have been done that weren't," Casey said. "I felt like he wasn't cooperating. He had a problem dealing with the fact that I was the boss and he wasn't."

Capitan schools host open house for new library stuff

It's a chance for parents to see the new electronic capabilities of the library and the equipment available to students.

Students can get lottery money for scholarships

The New Mexico Lottery handed over \$836,270 in September 1996 lottery ticket sales to the State Treasurer on Oct. 10 for use in funding education in New Mexico.

Of this total, \$501,762 or 60% goes to the Public School Capital Outlay Fund. This fund does not benefit every school in New Mexico. It is money set aside strictly for school districts in dire need of improved or enlarged facilities which cannot fund construction themselves.

Schools must apply for these capital outlay funds after meeting seven eligibility requirements.

The remaining 40% of lottery proceeds, or \$334,508 for September, go to the Lottery Tuition Fund. This fund provides tuition assistance for New Mexico residents attending New Mexico colleges and universities.

Students who graduated from high school in May 1996 are the first class of students eligible for the scholarships. Disbursement of funds to eligible students will begin in fall 1997.

Enrollment increases at university this fall

Ruidoso's Eastern New Mexico University added 16 students to the roster this fall, raising enrollment 3% from 616 to 632.

The average student is taking a few more credit hours this year, but the six average credit hours show most of the students are still part-time. Students are taking a total of 3,030 credit hours, up 10% from last fall's 2,759 hours, ENMU director Jim Miller said.

"We've seen a steady increase in enrollment since 1991," Miller said. "I'm glad we're continuing to grow at a time when not all colleges around the country are growing."

While Eastern has primarily attracted adult learners in Ruidoso, the college is seeing a few more recent high school graduates signing up for college here, Miller said.

"Most of our students are working adults going back to college for a degree," he said.

General liberal arts is the major of choice at ENMU-Ruidoso. Also, many students are receiving their child development certificates this fall. Offered for the first time last year, the child development program calls for 30 credit hours.

"People at Head Start, public schools and day care centers are taking this course," Miller said.

ENMU is broadening its curriculum with new classes, and Miller said new classes are what have attracted new students. One popular course is a 30-credit-hour banking certification to train bank employees.

Political science is another popular class, Miller said, along with anatomy and geology.

"We've been into the ecology business this summer and this fall, and that's been extremely popular,"

Miller said.

Another factor that may be drawing in new students is the availability of more scholarships. Eastern gave out more scholarships to more applicants this year than ever before, Miller said.

The biggest obstacle to enrolling new students in Ruidoso is the lack of child care, Miller said. Many adults going back to college need someone to look after the children while they're in class.

"We probably could have grown more if we were able to identify quality late afternoon and evening childcare," Miller said.

ENMU's facility is also about to increase in size. Within the next month, construction will begin on three new high technology television classrooms, Miller said. These classrooms will be added into the remaining space at the back of ENMU's one-year-old location in Sierra Mall.

ENMU's interactive television courses have proven popular in Ruidoso. This fall 31 students will participate in classes taking place in Portales and at other sites without having to leave Ruidoso. Last spring, 27 students enrolled in TV classes.

Eastern uses TV mainly to provide upper division and graduate courses in business, special education, computer science, mathematics, psychology, speech pathology, and nursing.

Registration for the spring semester takes place in mid-November. Miller is currently accepting class suggestions from students and the general public. If you want to see a particular course offered at ENMU, whether for credit or through the community education program, call Jim Miller at 287-2120.



Big plays boost Colts past Warriors, 26-6

Silver backed up the Ruidoso Warriors against the wall with a 26-6 District 3AAA victory Friday in Silver City.

The loss means the Warriors have to win their next two games to make the Class AAA state football playoffs. Ruidoso is 3-5 overall and 1-1 in district play.

The Colts scored on two long pass plays that went for touchdowns and a 95-yard fumble recovery for a TD.

"They had three big plays that really hurt us," Ruidoso coach Les Carter said. "They never put together a drive. The kids played well. We had an opportunity to win the game and didn't do it."

Silver took a 6-0 lead late in the first half on the first of two bombs for scores.

The Warriors have a week to heal from the Silver game.

"We've got a lot of kids that are beat up and sore and tired. We're going to take care of that this week," Carter added.

Ruidoso's next game is at Cobre Nov. 1. In order to make the state playoffs, the Warriors must win their two remaining games.

Welcome to 'The Hill'

Is there any truth to the notion of a "home court" advantage? How about a "home course" advantage?

In a collective voice, the Ruidoso cross country team answers with, "The Hill."

The Hill will come into play Thursday when the Warriors host 10 other cross country teams for their annual Ruidoso Invitational, and the Warriors are convinced that the 175-meter-long hill nestled in the 3-mile-long course will separate them from the rest.

"Psychologically, the girls think they can pass a lot of other runners on The Hill," explained Ruidoso cross country coach Ronny Maskew as his runners tackled The Hill during practice Monday.

"When you get used to doing something tough, it's not so bad....Not many teams practice on a hill like this," he said.

The Warriors run The Hill every week. In preparation for Thursday's meet, the Ruidoso runners made four trips up and down the one-tenth of a mile incline Monday with the temperatures in the 30s and snow spitting. Sometimes they run it as many as eight times in one practice.

"Just the fact that this is our turf helps us a lot," Ruidoso sophomore Erica Romero said. "We know we can run The Hill because we practice on it."

The Warriors say they have another advantage: Cisco Bob. The former Ruidoso running standout and Olympic hopeful is literally

in step with the Warriors during practice.

Seniors Becenti Platero and America Sandoval both say it helps to have Bob running along with the team. His encouragement rubs off on the Warriors.

"He'll look at us while we're running and tell us whether we need to pump our arms more, or whatever," Romero added.

The Warriors can learn from observing Bob's work ethic, too, Maskew said.

Ruidoso is taking full advantage of Maskew's expertise, Bob's pacesetter and workouts that include The Hill.

The boys team has run well together all season. Cross country aficionados know the importance of "rummy with the pack" for scoring purposes. As a result, the Warriors have become a formidable team, posting their best finish in years at the Lubbock Invitational. There, Ruidoso took fifth place of 67 teams.

Romero has led the girls team, finishing in the top five in five of six meets.

The girls and boys have set their sights on winning the district 3AAA title. Ruidoso hosts this fall's district meet Nov. 8, and that's why district foes Silver and Cobre won't be invited to Thursday's meet.

"I really don't want them to run the course," said Maskew, reasoning The Hill will be an advantage for the Warriors.

Ruidoso enters its meet with fresh legs. The Warriors are coming off an open weekend. The last time Ruidoso ran was Oct. 12 at the New

Warriors win share of district crown

Soccer team earns trip to playoffs

A pair of victories last week guaranteed the Warrior soccer team at least a tie for the district championship and a trip to the state soccer tourney.

At the start of the season, not many predicted the youthful Warriors would make this trip. But Sigurd Schmitz's Warriors are rising up fast.

The Ruidoso Warrior soccer team proved it learns from its mistakes with wins last Thursday and Saturday. The Warriors blanketed Hatch, 7-0 Thursday, and then followed that up with another district win, a 5-1 decision over Silver Saturday.

"I only said one thing to them at practice, 'You can't let anyone get in the way of your mental game,' and they took it to heart," Ruidoso coach Sigurd Schmitz said.

The Warriors, now 10-4 overall and 4-1 in districts, found themselves reeling with frustration after a 4-0 loss to Santa Teresa Oct. 12. In that game, the normal jockeying for position turned downright nasty and dirty. The Desert Warriors' physical play provoked Ruidoso into retaliating instead of playing soccer, Schmitz said.

The objective heading into last week's games was to stay mentally in the matches, Ruidoso team co-captain Piper Adamian said last week.

The Warriors did exactly that. Ruidoso put the clamps on Hatch's solid passing ability Thursday from the opening kickoff.

Schmitz had a good idea his Warriors had come focused and ready to play. All the way from St. Augustine Pass outside of Las Cruces to Hatch High School, the Warriors didn't utter a word to each other on the bus.

Senior co-captain Jimmy Stover scored three times against the Bears. Adamian added a pair of goals. Gerald Gomez and eighth-grader Ryan Blackmon each scored a goal.

Four Warriors hit the net in Saturday's 5-1 victory over Silver. Stover had two, while Gomez, Adamian and eighth-grader Sean Sebastian each tallied a score.

Ruidoso took a 3-0 halftime lead, then put it away in the second half with two goals in the last 15 minutes. The Warriors and Colts tangled in rain, sleet and hail throughout most of the game.

As the team heads toward the postseason, leading scorers Stover and Adamian are getting the support the Warriors will need from their teammates.

"Like it because our distribution of scoring is evening out," Schmitz said.

Ruidoso has two more matches in the regular season, a non-district game against New Mexico Military Institute at 4 p.m. Thursday at Horton Stadium, and a district match versus Silver Oct. 29.

"We're already in the state tourney and we're going to get ready for that," Schmitz said.

The Warriors will watch game films of their matches with Hobbs and Hatch because both of those teams pass the ball well, and Schmitz expects the teams at the state tourney to display deft passing skills.

Ruidoso will also work on defending the first and second passes. It's conditioning and it's own passing, Schmitz said.

"We're not playing to the level of the competition anymore, which is a sign of maturity," Schmitz said. "We've matured a lot, but we still have a lot to work on."

No gold rush for Ruidoso spikers in Silver

If the Ruidoso volleyball team is to return to the Class AAA State Volleyball Tournament, the Warriors must come up with an answer to Silver High School's middle hitter, Katherine Callahan.

The 6-foot Fighting Colt dominated the net Friday, leading her team to a 15-11, 17-15, 15-5 District 3AAA win over Ruidoso.

"We played better. I just don't know how to get my team past being intimidated by their top hitter," Ruidoso coach Jaana Sanchez said.

Callahan kept pounding away at the Ruidoso net defense in Friday's match. Her persistence paid off, even though Ruidoso's Kelle Lutterman successfully blocked her several times, Sanchez said.

Opponents must totally shut down Callahan because the Colts have no other real threat, Sanchez said.

Ruidoso has two weeks to get over its fear of Callahan.

If Ruidoso beat Santa Teresa Tuesday (results came in after press time), Ruidoso secured third place in the district. That means the Warriors would host a second-round match in the District 3AAA volleyball tournament in two weeks. Amanda Kakutaka paced the Warriors with eight kills against the Colts. Mariah Lewallen added seven.

Ruidoso salvaged the weekend with a 15-11, 15-11, 17-15 sweep of Cobre on Saturday. The Warriors improved to 8-9 overall and 3-3 in 3AAA play with the win.

Kakutaka's eight kills in the first game against the Indians and her

14 total for the match led Ruidoso.

Sanchez also received solid all-around play from setter/hitter April Figueroa, who has been a pleasant surprise to Sanchez.

"April Figueroa has really come through for us. She's one of my go-to hitters. She's been doing a good job serving and setting," Sanchez said. "Really, she's my best all-around player right now."

Ruidoso wraps up the regular season Saturday, hosting Hot Springs. The Warriors can gain confidence with a victory over the district-leading Tigers in a preview of Hot Springs' Saturday match with junior varsity and varsity matches to follow.

Ruidoso has a week to prepare for the district tournament, which gets underway Monday, Nov. 7.





Albuquerque (Special) October 17 — The man who rode in a buggy from downtown Albuquerque in 1895 to make one of the first state inspections of the University of New Mexico, and who later served as governor of the Territory, returned to the campus the other day to visit his grandson, now a university freshman and to talk to officials about some of the early history of the institution.

He was George Curry, now 85, of Kingston. He disclosed that he has about completed the memoirs of his life as a politician.

Looking back over his life in New Mexico since 1878, Mr. Curry recalled the time when he drove from his home at Lincoln in a buckboard to Santa Fe in four days to serve as governor upon appointment by President Theodore Roosevelt. His two sons were born in the famous Lincoln County courthouse, now a New Mexico museum, and he was one of the posse which originally captured Billy the Kid at Stinking Spring, before Billy escaped from the Lincoln County jail.

VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO CAPITAL PROJECTS UPDATE - OCTOBER 1996

Listed below are the capital improvement projects that the village has budgeted for the current fiscal year 1996-97 budget. Projected construction times and approximate completion dates are identified. Additionally, sources of funding for each project are specified (i.e., General Obligation Bonds, Utility Fund Budget, etc.)

WATER SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS

- **GRINDSTONE WATER TREATMENT PLANT-PHASE II** — Addition of treatment facilities which will upgrade the treated water capacity of the plant from 1,000,000 gallons per day to 2,000,000 gallons per day. Contractor is Drew Engineering. Contract amount is \$528,700. Bid awarded June, 1996. Projected completion date is Oct. 31, 1996. (Funding: Aug. 1995 G.O. Bond Project.)
- **GRINDSTONE WATER TREATMENT PLANT-DECANT BASINS** — Large concrete basins in which backwash water is stored, solid particles settle and decanted, with clear water being recycled back into the treatment plant. Contractor is Carl Kelly Construction. Contract amount is \$276,720.50. Bid awarded Aug. 1996. Projected completion date is Oct. 21, 1996. (Funding: Aug. 1995 G.O. Bond Project.)
- **GRINDSTONE/CHELSEA WATER MAIN** — Large diameter water main constructed to tie in the Grindstone water tanks into the existing water system in the Kingswood/Flume Canyon area, to better distribute the volume of water, and to better regulate pressures coming from Grindstone Treatment Plant. Contractor is Carl Kelly Construction. Contract amount is \$125,464.57. Bid awarded Aug. 1996. Project completed. (Funding: Aug. 1995 G.O. Bond Project.)
- **TWO-INCH WATER LINE REPLACEMENT-COUNTRY CLUB SUBDIVISION** — Replace approx. 2.5 miles of old and deteriorated 2" galvanized lines in the Country Club Subdivision, with new 6" PVC lines, to increase capacity, volume and fire flow volumes of water. Design completed by end of Sept. by Wilson and Company Engineers. Estimated cost is \$300,000. Bid date is Nov. 1996. Projected completion date of Mar. 1997. (Funding: Aug. 1995 G.O. Bond Project.)
- **TWO-INCH WATER LINE REPLACEMENT-PHASE II** — Replace approx. 4-miles of old and deteriorated 2" galvanized lines, with new 6" PVC lines, throughout town, to increase capacity, volume and fire flow volumes of water. Feasibility study and needs assessment to identify areas needing repair, have been done by Wilson and Company Engineers. Estimated cost is \$450,000. Bid date is Dec. 1996. Projected completion date will be about Apr. 1997. (Funding: Aug. 1995 G.O. Bond Project.)
- **TWO-INCH WATER LINE REPLACEMENT-PHASE III** — Replace old and deteriorated 2" galvanized lines, with new 6" PVC lines, to increase capacity, volume and fire flow volumes of water. Feasibility study and needs assessment to identify areas needing repair, currently being done by Wilson and Company Engineers. Estimated cost is \$300,000. Bid date is Apr. 1997. Projected completion date will be about Jul. 1997. (Funding: Aug. 1995 G.O. Bond Project.)
- **GRINDSTONE 3.5 MILLION GALLON STORAGE TANK** — Large steel tank to supplement the existing 1 million gallon tank at Grindstone, to provide adequate storage and pressures for the water system. Design completed by mid-September by Wilson and Company Engineers. Estimated cost is \$450,000. Bid date is Oct. 1996. Projected completion date will be about Jan. 1997. (Funding: Utility Fund Capital Improvement Budget.)
- **WATER SYSTEM TELEMETRY** — To automate by radio relay and computer, a method to monitor, evaluate and control mechanical equipment within the water system. It would be able to monitor tank levels, well production, water quality, emergency situations, without actual hands-on evaluation. Design to be completed by end of Sept. 1996 by Molzen-Corbin and Associates, Engineers. Estimated cost is \$100,000. Bid date is Jan. 1997. Projected completion date will be about May. 1997. (Funding: Utility Fund capital improvement budget.)
- **HULL/GAVILAN WATER TANK REHAB** — Project consists of cleaning out the tank, sandblast and re-paint the inside of the tank, fix the structural parts required and install isolation valves. Estimated cost is \$156,000. Projected completion date Apr. 1997. (Funding: Utility Fund Capital Improvement Budget.)
- **GRINDSTONE DAM CONSTRUCTION JOINT REHAB** — To repair and replace the existing deteriorated rubber sealant located on the upstream portion of the dam. Estimated cost is \$50,000. Projected completion date Feb. 1997. (Funding: Utility Fund Capital Improvement Budget.)

WASTEWATER SYSTEM PROJECTS

- **RIO RUIDOSO/SUDDERTH/CARRIZO ROAD SEWER REHABILITATION** — Involves replacement of sewer line which is undersized and has a great deal of infiltration. Project is from the intersection of Evergreen and Carrizo Rd., continuing east or downstream to the intersection of the Rio Ruidoso and Paradise Canyon Rd. The construction will have a portion of Sudderth restricted down to one lane of traffic westbound for approximately 60 to 90 days. Contractor is Carl Kelly Construction. Contract amount is \$522,921.34. Bid award was in Aug. 1996. Projected completion date is Feb. 1997. (Funding: August 1995 G.O. Bond Project in the amount of \$107,633.80 and \$415,287.54 out of Utility Fund Budget for Wastewater.)
- **WASTEWATER INFLOW AND INFILTRATION REPAIRS-PHASE II** — Involves the repair of existing sewer lines which have a great deal of inflow and infiltration. Construction methods will be primarily non-destructive with trenchless technologies such as inversion lining, new liner, and pipe bursting. Feasibility study and needs assessment to identify areas needing repair are currently being done by Wilson and Company Engineers. Estimated cost is \$600,000. Beginning date is estimated at the beginning of Nov. Completion date is estimated as Mar. 1997. (Funding: Aug. 1995 G.O. Bond Project.)
- **WASTEWATER INFLOW AND INFILTRATION REPAIRS-PHASE III** — Involves the repair of existing sewer lines which have a great deal of inflow and infiltration. Construction methods will be primarily non-destructive with trenchless technologies such as inversion lining, new liner, and pipe bursting. Feasibility study, needs assessment to identify areas needing repair, and design will be done by Wilson and Company. Estimated cost is \$600,000. Beginning construction date is estimated at May 1997. Completion date is estimated at Sept. 1997. (Funding: August 1995 G.O. Bond Project.)



REGIONAL WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT

- **PLANT MODIFICATIONS** — Project consists of automation of the influent equalization basin, effluent flow measurement, and sludge handling modifications. Work is being done to keep up with EPA and Environment Department regulations, and to increase efficiency during high flows. Estimated cost is \$700,000. Design is suspended, waiting on Environmental Department approval. Project is anticipated to begin in summer of 1997. Completion will be end of 1997. This facility is jointly owned by the Villages of Ruidoso (85%) and Ruidoso Downs (15%) and, thus, this is a joint project of the two communities through the Joint Use Board. (Funding: New Mexico Environmental Department Loan Program, with repayment of the loan being by user fees.)
- **DRYING BED ROOFING** — This project consists of covering the existing sludge drying beds with a transparent roofing material. This will promote efficient drying by prevention of moisture, with allowing sunlight to go through. Construction cost is \$50,000. Project estimated to begin winter of 1996. Completion by early 1997. As stated above, this is a Joint Use Board project of the Villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs. (Funding: Regional Wastewater Capital Improvement Budget.)
- **SLUDGE PRESS** — This project includes leasing a press to dewater the sludge in order to make more efficient use of drying beds and land application sites. Project cost is \$40,000. This project will be done during the spring of 1997. This is also a Joint Use Board facility project. (Funding: Regional Wastewater Fund Capital Budget.)

ATHLETIC FIELD PROJECT

- **WHITE MOUNTAIN ATHLETIC FIELDS** — Involves the construction of a high school varsity baseball field, the construction of soccer/multi-purpose fields for recreational play. Construction includes appurtenances required such as access roads, parking, drainage, irrigation, restrooms, etc. Design completed the week of Sept. 23, 1996, by Design Workshops. Estimated cost is \$1,000,000. Construction to begin Oct. 1996. Completion date is beginning of Feb. 1997 for baseball field; Mar. 1997 for the soccer fields. (Funding: Aug. 1995 G.O. Bond Project; additionally, this is a cooperative project with property owned by Ruidoso Municipal Schools and roads and parking to be done through agreement with Lincoln County.)

SENIOR CITIZENS CENTER MODIFICATIONS

- **BATHROOM AND KITCHEN MODIFICATIONS** — This project is to renovate the existing bathrooms to conform with Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). In addition, the project will be for renovation to the kitchen inside the senior's building. The contractor is American Construction and Concrete, Inc. Project cost is \$111,051. Construction begins Sept. 1996. Project will be completed by Dec. 1996. (Funding: grant funded through State Agency on Aging (Legislative) Grants.)
- **EXISTING LIBRARY CONVERSION TO SENIOR CENTER** — Once the new library is completed and has moved out of their existing location, this renovation will be to convert the existing facilities into a usable Senior Citizen Center. Renovations may include recreational areas, meeting rooms, new accesses from the outside, and ADA modifications. Coordination and Design is currently being done by ASA Architects. Estimated costs are \$100,000. Project will start in late 1997 (dependent on new library construction). Project completion is estimated at Dec. 1997. (Funding: Aug. 1995 G.O. Bond Election Proceeds.)

PUBLIC LIBRARY PROJECT

- **NEW LIBRARY CONSTRUCTION** — The project is for the construction of a new library. The location is on the village-owned parcel just north of the current Village Hall. The approx. 14,000 sq. ft. library will be complete with all hookups for computers, Internet, etc., reading areas, children areas and meeting rooms. Design is currently being done by ASA Architects. Estimated cost is \$1,600,000. Bidding will begin in Nov. 1996. Completion date will be by fall 1997. (Funding: Aug. 1995 G.O. Bond Project.)

VILLAGE HALL ADDITION

- **ADDITION AND MODIFICATION TO VILLAGE HALL** — This project consists of a 2,400 square foot addition to accommodate existing crowded and satellite offices. To make Village Hall more accessible, new restrooms, and enlarged lobby area. The modifications also include interior remodeling to existing offices. Design is currently being done by ASA Architects. Estimated cost is \$350,000. Project will begin in early 1997. Completion date by mid 1997. (Funding: Aug. 1995 G.O. Bond Project.)

CONVENTION CENTER STORAGE ADDITION

- **STORAGE ADDITION** — This project consists of a 1470 square foot addition to store tables, chairs and other items used at the convention center. The contractor is American Construction and Concrete, Inc. Project cost is \$100,804. Construction began Sept. 1996. Project will be completed by Dec. 1996. (Funding: Aug. 1995 G.O. Bond Project.)

OTHER CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

PARK IMPROVEMENTS

- **MISCELLANEOUS PARK AND POOL IMPROVEMENTS** — Projects to include ADA requirements, fencing, locker room flooring and concession stand improvements at the pool. Cost about \$22,000. Projects in the parks include paving, sidewalks, jogging, path improvements, fencing, ADA improvements, etc.

Estimated costs are \$105,000. These projects will be completed in the fiscal year 1996 - 1997. (Funding: Parks & Recreation Department Capital Improvement Budget.)

- **LAND AND WATER CONSERVATION GRANT** — Completion of the construction of a new playground area, complete with restrooms and retaining walls at the School House Park area. Construction costs were about \$84,000. Completion of the project was Sept. 1996. Playground dedicated as Charlie Griffin Playground on Oct. 9, 1996. (Funding: State Grant from the Land and Water Conservation Fund.)

STREET IMPROVEMENTS

- **STREET UPKEEP AND MAINTENANCE** — Includes regular maintenance of existing roadways. Includes pothole patching, striping, chip seal, street signing, base course material, etc. Approximately \$241,000 will be for these maintenance items. Project is currently underway. Project is anticipated to continue through the Fiscal year 1996 - 1997. (Funding: Street Department Operations Budget.)
- **NEW STREET PAVEMENT** — Includes the pavement on existing dirt roads, in accordance with the street rating and priority system as approved by the Council. Cost is \$180,000. Project is currently under way. Project is anticipated to continue through the Fiscal year 1996 - 1997. (Funding: Street Department Operations Budget.)
- **HULL AND PARADISE ROAD DRAINAGE PROJECT** — This project involves the improvement to the low water crossing on Hull Rd. near Paradise Canyon, along with other downstream improvements. Estimated cost is \$65,000. Project is anticipated to start Jan. 1997. Completion in Apr. 1997. (Funding: Street Department Capital Improvement Budget.)
- **BRIDGE AND GUARDRAIL EVALUATION AND UPGRADE** — The purpose of this project is to evaluate, make recommendations and make alterations or repairs to the 14 bridges over the Rio Ruidoso in which the Village has maintenance responsibilities. This project is currently being done. Estimated costs are \$20,000. Evaluation completed in Sept. 1996. Construction and repair completion Mar. 1997. (Funding: Street Department Capital Improvement Budget.)

CONVENTION CENTER

- **ENTRANCE SIGN AND MESSAGE CENTER** — Construction of an entrance sign to the Ruidoso Convention Center complete with electronic message sign. Costs were \$59,147. Project completed Sept. 1996. (Funding: Convention Center Common Area Improvements Account.)

AIRPORT PROJECTS

- **CROSSWIND RUNWAY PRELIMINARY** — The crosswind runway construction in the FAA plan for 1997 through 1999 is estimated to cost about \$8 million. This current project and initial phases are to provide the preliminary studies and design necessary to eventually construct the runway. The environmental study has been awarded to Molzen-Corbin and Assoc. for approximately \$60,000. The preliminary runway design consultant was been selected and the contract is awaiting approval from the FAA. Estimated cost for preliminary design is \$180,000. The environmental study should be completed by Dec. 1996. The preliminary design should be completed by June, 1997. (Funding: 90% by the FAA, 5% by the State Aviation Division, and 5% from the Village of Ruidoso.)
- **AIRPORT STRUCTURES** — There are three projects planned for this fiscal year, 1996 - 1997. One project included is the construction of sun shades. Cost is \$130,089. Contractor is Diamond Y Construction Company. Project should be completed by Dec. 1996. Another project is an equipment storage shed. Cost is \$49,966. Contractor is Diamond Y Construction Company. Project should be completed by Dec. 1996. The final project is the construction of T-hangers. Estimated cost is \$202,178. This project will be constructed in the spring of 1997. (Funding: Airport Department Improvement Budget.)
- **TAXI-WAY SEALANT AND RESTRIPIPING** — This project is for the sealant of the existing taxi-ways and aprons with a special treatment process, then restriping them. This will add life and durability to those taxi-ways and aprons. Cost is approximately \$339,000. Project should be completed by summer of 1997. (Funding: 90% FAA, 5% State Aviation Division and 5% Village of Ruidoso.)

VEHICLE MAINTENANCE

- **RECONSTRUCTION OF VEHICLE MAINTENANCE BUILDING** — This project consists of the reconstruction of the existing vehicle maintenance building which burned last year. Design is being done by Molzen-Corbin and Associates. Estimated cost is \$118,000. Project beginning date is Jan. 1997. Completion date is June, 1997. (Funding: insurance proceeds.)

MAIN STREET

- **PUBLIC RESTROOMS** — This is for the construction of a public restroom facility in the Mid-town (Main Street) area. Project has been designed and bid once with bids exceeding the budget amount. Estimated cost is \$54,000. Bidding in fall of 1996. Completion should be by winter of 1996/1997. (Funding: Village of Ruidoso Capital Improvement Fund.)

BILLY THE KID SCENIC BYWAYS LOOP

- **INTERPRETIVE CENTER** — Project includes the construction of a "Billy the Kid Scenic Byways Loop" interpretive center. A site has been selected and is currently undergoing an environmental study. A joint powers agreement with the State Highway Department is currently being drawn up. The environmental study is being done by Molzen-Corbin and Assoc. Project also includes a corridor management study. Contract for this work has been awarded to Dick Seely and Associates. Design architect for the center itself has not been determined yet. Estimated cost of total grant is \$660,000, with Visitors' Interpretive Center being \$545,000. Project is currently underway with environmental and corridor studies. Interpretive Center construction should begin in early 1997. Completion of the center should be mid-1997. (Funding: Federal Highway Administration Grant, administered by the State Highway Department 80%; local match of 20% from the appraised value of the donated land, and other in-kind service.)

Not So Pretty In Pink

Conjunctivitis — sometimes known as pink eye — is an inflammation of the membrane that covers the white of the eye and lines the underside of the eyelid. This membrane contains tiny blood vessels. When it is irritated, these blood vessels enlarge and become more prominent. This is what makes the eyes appear pink.

Many kinds of irritation can cause this condition, including infection, allergies and environmental irritants. Infectious conjunctivitis — whether caused by viruses or bacteria — can be very contagious.

Giant papillary conjunctivitis is one form of the disease that can affect contact lens wearers. It can be caused by the lens itself, deposits on the lenses, or a problem with the contact lens solution. Replacement of the lenses or changes in the lens care routine may be needed to combat this condition.

There are other diseases that can lead to pink looking eyes. Some of these can result in more serious problems, unless detected and treated. It is always wise to seek a professional evaluation for pink or red eyes.
