## Winter 'official' this Saturday

Saturday will be the shortest day of the year, as winter officially begins at 7:06 a.m. MST Dec. 21 (and you thought it already started earlier this week with below-zero temperatures). It will be the earliest winter solstice in 99 years.

Another noteworthy astronomical event coming soon is the Christmas Eve full moon. It will be the first time it has fallen on this holiday since 1950.

## Cold weather makes pipes burst

Below-zero temperatures are being blamed for about 20 water pipes bursting inside and underneath homes all over Ruidoso Thursday.

"When it gets a little warmer in the day, after a freeze like this, they thaw out and break," said Ken Perryman, a village water department technician. Wednesday's low hit -5 degrees, followed by -4 on Thursday and a "warming" trend today.

A good half of the broken pipes are spewing water at empty vacation homes, Perryman said. He advised people to shut their water off when they're leaving for an extended period of time.

## Boy with gun kicked out of public schools

A Ruidoso fifth-grader has been expelled from all public schools in the United States, for bringing a loaded Colt .380 to White Mountain Intermediate on Nov. 27.

The federal Gun-Free Schools Act requires that the student be expelled for one year, until January 1998, Superintendent Mike Gladden said.

Whether or not he repeats the fifth grade at that time depends on what arrangements his family makes, Gladden said. The family could home school him or perhaps find a private school for him.

School officials are not planning any new safety measures, Gladden said.

The boy has not yet appeared in court on the federal criminal violation of bringing a gun to school.

## Feds seek wolves' return to New Mexico and Arizona

Mexican gray wolves could be roaming the Gila National Forest of New Mexico in about a year.

Officials with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced Thursday they are recommending the reintroduction of wolves into their historic range on public lands in Arizona and New Mexico. However, they may not be released in the White Sands Missile Range near Ruidoso.

However, in the Fish & Wildlife plan, the wolves would be classified as a "nonessential experiment" population under the federal Endangered Species Act. That designation would allow ranchers to kill wolves that attack their livestock on private or tribal lands.

Temporary permission might be granted to terminate a wolf killing livestock on public lands after the wolf population has grown to a specified level and if efforts by the agency to control the wolf have failed.

The recommendation to reintroduce the wolves is the

"preferred alternative" in a final environmental impact statement (EIS) issued by Fish & Wildlife Thursday. Secretary of the Interior Bruce Babbitt will decide whether to proceed with the reintroduction after a required 30-day public review of the EIS.

If approved, Mexican wolves would be released first in eastern Arizona on the Apache National Forest and would be allowed to disperse into the Gila, according to a press release prepared by Tom Bauer and Megan Durham with the New Mexico office of Fish & Wildlife in Albuquerque.

The two forests comprise the Blue Range Wolf Recovery Area that includes portions of Apache and Greenlee counties in Arizona and portions of Catron, Grant and Sierra counties in New Mexico.

If needed to reach the target of 100 wolves in the wild by 2005 in a 5,000 square mile range, wolves might later be released into the White Sands Wolf Recovery Area on White Sands Missile Range that includes portions of Lincoln, Dona

Ana, Otero and Socorro counties.

The last sighting of a Mexican gray wolf in the Southwest was in 1970.

The Mexican wolf is one of five subspecies of gray wolf in North America and one of the rarest subspecies of gray wolf in the world, Bauer said. It was listed as endangered on the Federal List of Threatened and Endangered Species in 1976 as a result of intensive predator removal efforts from the late 1800s to the mid 1900s.

### Captive wolves

The wolves for this experiment will come from the Sevilleta National Wildlife Refuge, an ecological research area near Socorro that is closed to the public except for limited seasonal duck hunting.

The release animals would be captive-reared wolves that are "genetically surplus" to the captive population, which means their genes already are well represented among the 148 wolves in zoos and

## Council draws up bigger wish list for Legislature

Ruidoso's Upper Canyon might score a fire station of its own if village councilors can get some help from the state Legislature next year.

Councilors placed construction of a new fire station on a list of \$1.5 million in capital project requests Wednesday that will be delivered to the state Legislature by Sen. Pete Campos (D-Santa Rosa).

Money for water system improvements still top the village's list of priorities. The fire station is second, followed by money for the second section of MainStreet improvements (Sudderth Drive facelift).

The requests are basically in line with the village's previously submitted five-year capital improvement plan (CIP). However, the funding requests for water system improvements is \$100,000 higher than the CIP, so it will be amended, Assistant Village Manager Alan Briley said.

The CIP lists the fire station as a sixth priority and MainStreet work as the last priority out of 17 items. But councilors moved the items up for their legislative re-

quests after deciding they'd have better luck presenting varied projects.

Councilor Joe Gomez suggested adding the fire station to the list of legislative requests.

"I think that's critical because of the fire situation there," Gomez said, referring to the wildfire danger in Upper Canyon.

Campos and village councilors will make their pitch to the Legislature sometime during its 60-day session Jan. 21-March 22, 1997.

The council will also be making pitches for \$1 million to help with village water system improvements and \$250,000 for the second phase of the MainStreet rehabilitation project.

The village is required to pay for 25% (\$250,000) of the MainStreet work in order for the federal government to give its 50% match. The state would already have to kick in 25% to get the federal match, so if the village's request is granted, the state would pitch in \$500,000.

The second phase of the MainStreet work extend the Sudderth Drive rehabilitation east

## Fire burns up two local condominiums

A Sunday fire caused substantial damage to two furnished Ruidoso condominiums on Lookout Drive.

The 12:47 p.m. blaze at the neighboring 220 Lookout Drive condos was sparked through old, faulty cement in the fireplace at condo H1, said Ruidoso fire prevention officer Loretta Kirk.

"It let fire catch on the inside of the fireplace wall and then outside the wall," Kirk said.

Neither condo owner was at home during the blaze, and no one was injured.

Condo owner Page Dobson of Oklaholma City, Okla., had been staying at her H1 condo and used

the fireplace, but left to return home Saturday, Kirk said. The other resident, Irene Fremden who owns H2, was not at home because she is in the hospital, Kirk said.

Once the fire caught at Dobson's residence, it reached over to the adjacent H2 condo, she said.

Nineteen firefighters doused the blaze in about 20 minutes, Kirk said, and spent hours afterwards removing sheet rock and parts of damaged decks.

"There was a lot of smoke and water damage," Kirk said of both condos. "Both are unlivable. They need to be gutted and totally redone."



to Country Club Road and west to Grindstone Drive.

If the state doesn't pay Ruidoso's share, officials will try to figure out if the village can afford to have the work begin in 1997, said Village Manager Gary Jackson.

The \$1 million request for water system improvements would fund a water system improvement master plan; completion of a remote monitoring system allowing the various water systems to "communicate;" a decant basin; replacement of two-inch water transmission lines; drying beds; rehabilitation of a steel reservoir; and North Fork Well Field development.

"Water has been our priority for a number of years, when you consider the drought and trials and tribulations we've encountered over recent times," said Jackson. "Whether we get a dime (from the state) is certainly conjecture, but it's something we can ask for."

Last year the village requested \$1.25 million from the Legislature for various projects, and only came home with \$150,000 for the architectural design for a youth center, after Campos pushed for the funding. That item was toward the bottom of the village's priority list, below water issues.

The \$150,000 is still in the state's coffers, but the village has a contract for it.

Ruidoso councilors kept their legislative funding requests relatively light last year compared to other communities. The three-item list — money for water, sewer improvements and a rec center — was

kept small because Rep. Dub Williams recommended "asking for as little as possible," Councilor Robert Donaldson recalled at the start of this week's meeting.

"And Tularosa got like \$2 million," he said.

Legislators might be feeling a bit more generous this year, suggested Village Attorney John Underwood, because the state has found additional revenue of about \$30 million.

"It's the brightest forecast I've seen in some time," Underwood said.

Strategizing for the councilors, Underwood, the village's former representative known in Santa Fe as "Smokey the Pig," said the Legislature looks more kindly at money requests for water projects, tourism and development, and youth-oriented projects. Juvenile crime is a big issue in Santa Fe, he added.

"I know we need to go for water," Mayor Jerry Shaw said.

The village has a good chance of receiving funding for its water projects because a lot of them are being addressed in phases, officials said. Legislators like to see planning and phasing, and a willingness by village residents to fund their community's growth, Jackson said.

Also at Wednesday's meeting, councilors awarded a contract to design and produce a Billy the Kid Scenic Byways Trail brochure to Ruidoso Printing, which was rated the highest of four proposals by a selection committee.

awarded de la Torre Architects of Albuquerque the contract to design the Billy the Kid Scenic Byways Trail Visitors Interpretive Center. The firm was ranked highest of three bids based on its presentation. It ranked second in terms of qualifications.

Councilors will negotiate fees, terms and agreements with de la Torre Architects.

announced nationally.

Before release, the wolves will be evaluated for their suitability, paired with a mate and moved to temporary pens at the release site in the Blue Range Area for a lengthy acclimation period.

Precedence for the reintroduction can be found in the Yellowstone National Park area, as well as in the southeast, where captive-reared red wolves have been reintroduced since 1987. Now in their second and third generations, the wolves are living successfully in the wild and reproducing, Bauer said.

Two or three family groups of one pair of adults and their offspring would be chosen for the Blue Range release. A similar number would be released each year for three to five years until experts decide the recovery goal of 100 wolves can be reached by reproduction in the wild population.

The program would be evaluated every three to five years for continuation or termination.

The wolf release area will include only public lands. Wolves that move beyond those boundaries would be removed, unless the land managers wanted them to remain. The wolves would be monitored with radio transmitter collars.

## Livestock loss

If 100 wolves are established in the Blue Range area, one to 34 head of livestock are predicted to be killed annually by the wolves, which are natural predators of hoofed mammals. That number

represents less than one-tenth of one percent of the livestock that would be available to wolves there, Bauer said.

A private non-profit group called Defenders of Wildlife has set up a fund to pay ranchers for the loss of livestock to wolves.

Although fewer restrictions apply to a nonessential experimental population, the wolves still would be protected under the Endangered Species Act, Bauer said.


"Selective control of individual wolves that (kill) livestock encourages wolf population that focus on wild prey and fosters tolerance of wolves by livestock producers," Bauer said. "This increases public support for wolves and enhances the success of recovery efforts."

Releasing wolves also should benefit prey populations by reducing nutritional stress through the elimination of the weaker members of the herd, officials said.

Although any cornered, injured or sick wild animal could be dangerous, no human death or serious injury by a healthy wild wolf has been documented in North America, Bauer said.

Wolves tend to be shy of humans and avoid contact.


The recommendation to reintroduce the Mexican wolves came after a lengthy period of review and public comment officially started in 1991. Seventeen public meetings were conducted and more than 18,000 comments were received on a draft environmental impact statement released in June 1996.



## Other Solid Waste Authority recommendations

Other recommendations in the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority report include:

- set up an accounting system that would show income and expenses for each of the six-member entities. That would allow the authority to offer customers for-fee special services charged to the specific entity only.
- road expenses for vehicles could be tracked more accurately,

allowing compensation to more heavily populated areas;

- sponsor public information presentations and handouts;
- identify and train neighborhood volunteers for care around individual dumpster sites;
- pilot the use of polycarts through test areas in Ruidoso;
- provide bear-proof locking containers in needed areas, an action urged by residents and the

state Game and Fish Department;

- adjust the fees of each member entity based on its level of service and separate accounting;

- set aside 10% of the annual budget in a capital equipment fund for future repair and replacement;

- and set up fees and service for the disposal of pine needles, slash and branches.

## Garbage collection needs cleanup

The county garbage collection board needs more power, more money and more equipment to operate more effectively, consultants say.

The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority board should have the power to set rates, collect bills and file liens, consultants concluded in three pages of recommendations.

Currently, each of the six members of the authority set their own rates and most handle their own billing and liens.

The recommendations were part of a study of the coalition's operation prepared by Jim Miller, head of Eastern New Mexico university's Ruidoso campus, and Gene Simmons of Eastern's Small Business Development Center in Roswell.

Following their lead, the authority board Tuesday agreed to apply for a low-interest equipment loan of \$840,000 from the state to be repaid over the next 15 years. If the application is successful, the board will try for additional loans from the New Mexico Finance Authority to cover the remaining \$1,160,905 owed on equipment.

Representatives of the county and its five municipalities on the board hope the financial squeeze on the authority may be eased by interest rates that could be as low as 4.5%. The authority is paying as high as 9.25% now, Miller said.

"We've been underfunded for five years and this should get us some

equipment to get this thing moving," said Authority Chairman Frank Cummins.

The deadline to apply for the loan is Friday.

Besides six members of the 11-member authority board, only three people attended the coalition's special meeting at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center Tuesday. The meeting was called to brief authority members about the first phase of a three-phase study of the authority by Miller and Simmons.

"I think most people understood that we weren't going to be changing any rates or service at this meeting," said Cummins, one of Ruidoso's representatives on the board. "That decision will come after two more stages of the study are completed."

Before Miller and Simmons start the second phase covering the day-to-day operations, authority members want to review the accuracy of some of the figures and assumptions they used in the first phase.

"We'll set up a workshop after the first of the year for members and the public to submit questions," Cummins said.

Simmons and Miller said they welcomed corrections or additional information to improve the accuracy of the report.

The third phase of the study will deal with a long-term business plan and more equipment purchases.

Although the overview of the authority showed the village of Ruidoso using more than 70% of

the services while bringing in slightly more than 60% of the revenues, Simmons said the operations is well balanced.

The lagging Ruidoso revenues are due primarily to low commercial collection rates, Simmons said.

"There's no one entity that doesn't carry its share," he said. "It's just that the authority is 10% short in revenue for capital investment. Had that money been in here, the equipment would be in better shape."

An efficiently operated garbage collection and disposal operation is vital to the economic development of an area, Simmons said.

The two consultants, who prepared the report without charge for their time, also urged the board to revitalize recycling into an aggressive program that may include composting.

Toward that goal, the board voted to apply for a \$183,000 grant from the state Environment Department to set up an alternative recycling system.

The grant application, prepared by Miller and Simmons, notes that while Lincoln County is experiencing growth exceeding 16% and was a leader in its early recycling efforts, the current recycling rate has dropped to only 3% of all waste picked up in the county. That compares unfavorably with the national rate of 10% and the state rate of 9%.





## EDITORIAL

### Now we're going to put all our begs in one ask-it

With the coming of the holiday season in earnest, people in local governments everywhere have visions of capital appropriations dancing in their heads.

Such clearly is the case in Ruidoso, where the village's elected councilors have packaged a tidy wish-list to be presented when the 1997 state legislative session convenes on Jan. 21. Totalling some \$1.5 million, two-thirds of the money would go for continued water system improvements.

Notable in the No. 2 spot (a higher priority than in the capital master plan driving the funding) is proposed construction of a new Upper Canyon fire station. With fire danger signs these days in the "low" and "moderate" range, the fright hanging over the village throughout much of 1996 has all but disappeared, but anyone driving through the tree-and-house-clogged area will recognize the potential for havoc it represents.

More MainStreet improvement money also is on the list, along with a proposal to switch some already approved planning money to complete the athletic fields near the schools complex at Hull Road and Warrior Drive.

What are the odds of getting all, or most, of that state money? Better than last year, because a state revenue shortfall nailed the door shut on almost everything. But Rep. Dub Williams, going along with the Johnson Administration's austerity program, had advised the village to hold off on its requests with the result that the village asked for only \$100,000. Meanwhile, near-neighbor Tularosa collected \$2 million.

So...politics being politics (and every successful politician in Santa Fe knows that you always ask for at least twice the money you expect to get), this year the village has turned to our state senator, Democrat Pete Campos of Santa Rosa, to carry its wish-list through the process.

The fact that more money seems to have been uncovered also improves prospects for the '97 session.

Without exploring the political implications in the village's move from the GOP's Dub to the Demos' Pete, we have to say it just makes good sense to load up what the village really needs for capital spending.

And then, while they're at it, doubling it.







# Council seeks to keep tax for water dept. improvements

Ruidoso councilors want the state Legislature to let them keep a tax that funds water projects, and use money set aside for a rec center for ballfields instead.

Councilors want Sen. Pete Campos to make the pitches because Rep. Dub Williams hasn't contacted village officials about the upcoming session, and Campos has, they said.

"He's the only thing we've got up there now," said Mayor Jerry Shaw at Tuesday's meeting, when the council decided to ask for the changes.

The Legislature approved a 1% supplemental gross receipts tax for Raton and Ruidoso in 1984 for water-related projects. Ruidoso's tax expires around 2003, when the bonds for the construction of Grindstone Lake Dam expire, said Village Manager Gary Jackson.

But Jackson suggested asking legislators to either remove or extend the sunset provision of the tax, which collects about \$500,000 a year for the village.

on water," Jackson said. "I could feel better if they don't give us any money (for all our 1997 requests) if they let us provide for ourselves."

"We have to somehow be given the authority to provide for ourselves," Councilor Donaldson added.

But with costly state issues like prisons, welfare, rider insurance and gaming, some legislators are likely to want back taxes communities have a right to impose, some officials said.

The Legislature gave the village \$150,000 last year to design a rec center, but now the village has concluded it doesn't have enough money to finish a project it's already started.

Councilors want to use \$100,000 of the money instead for additional items like a concessions stand and restrooms at the White Mountain ballfields complex now under con-


struction. But the change in use will require legislative approval.

The remaining \$50,000 would be used to downsize and redesign the elaborate 1994 plans for a \$12 million aquatic recreation center.

The rec center "was not our top priority last year, and we're getting ready to lose Wal-Mart" sales tax revenues when it moves to Ruidoso Downs, Councilor Robert Donaldson said. "We're going to be strapped for funds. Why spend \$150,000 to design something we're not going to build anytime soon? It's a waste of money for something that's going to sit on a shelf."

Major Jerry Shaw resisted, but resolved, "I don't care, as long as we don't lose the money. I'll take the money no matter what."

Officials originally thought a \$1 million bond issue would cover everything at the field site, but have now concluded it won't.



# Bulldogs and Warriors clash again

## This time Artesia and Ruidoso meet on the basketball court

The Warrior boys basketball team will try to continue its trek on the highway of improvement when it hosts Artesia tonight (Friday) for a non-district cage clash.

Ruidoso enters tonight's game with a 4-3 overall mark. The Warriors finished fourth last weekend at Moriarty's Bruce King Tournament.

The Bulldogs' objective is to divert the Warriors to an off ramp. Artesia presents a challenge to the Warriors, Ruidoso coach Ben Sanchez said.

Getting better will be the primary objective tonight and tomorrow, when the Warriors travel to Portales for their last game before the holiday break.

Artesia's style of play and athleticism reminds Sanchez of District 3AAA foes Silver and Hot Springs.

"We just want to play well," Sanchez said. "Win or lose, as long as we can learn from either situation, it will help us prepare for the district."

The Warriors won't be at full strength,

however, for the Bulldogs. Leading scorer and rebounder, senior Erik Padilla has missed three days of practice because of a nasty flu bug.

Padilla was back in school Thursday and feeling better, but he is bound to be weakened by the illness. The Ruidoso post player averages 16 points and 12.5 rebounds a game for the Warriors.

Ruidoso's other starting post player Adam Windham isn't feeling well, either. That means junior Tyler Cluff and sophomore Garvin Grant will have to step in for Sanchez and the Warriors.

Padilla is questionable for tonight's game.

"I know if Erik can go, then he's certainly going to give it all that he's got," Sanchez said.

If Padilla can't play, his defensive presence will be missed against the athletic Bulldogs.

Sanchez, a believer in man-to-man defense, said the Warriors will try a 1-1-3 matchup zone versus Artesia because the Bulldogs have a height advantage.

Artesia's "go-to" guy is 6-foot, 2-inch Michael Rogers. Rogers played point guard and off guard last year for Artesia. His 16 points led the 'Dogs to a 69-62 win over Ruidoso last year.

If Ruidoso plays man-to-man defense,

then sophomore Corey Saenz would draw the Rogers defensive assignment. Saenz stands 5-8 "with toilet paper stuffed" in his high tops, Sanchez said.

Artesia will have Rogers post up Saenz if the Warriors play a man defense.

Sanchez thinks the matchup zone will help the Warriors rebound and run their fastbreak better.


Plus, the Warriors could fall back into the zone after pressing the Bulldogs.

Ross Hampton paces the Rams. Hampton can play inside or outside. He scored 11 points against Ruidoso last year.

The Warriors will take five days off for Christmas, then return to the gym Saturday, Dec. 28.





## Mescalero principal stresses persistence

As far back as Lynette Kanseah can remember, she's loved being in school with Mescalero Apache children.

That passion was fostered long before she left the Mescalero Apache Reservation for her high school, college and master's degrees - even before the little long-haired girl entered the White Tail Day School.

"I was so excited the day I found out I was going to be enrolled at school," recalls Kanseah, the acting principal of Mescalero Middle and High School. "I won't say all that happened (when I found out), but part of it is, I fell down the stairs!"

Today, when speaking of her life's education and her newest opportunity, her excitement is more safely displayed with stern looks and breezy laughter.

"Now, I came back in administration to be one of the big, bossy people," she concedes.

For the past four months she's been in the 1.5-year-old school's top administrative position - a challenge involving 230 students in grades five through 12.

It's a daunting job, she says, but one she knew she had to take. "I was perfectly happy staying

at the kindergarten," says Kanseah, who taught Headstart, first and second grade Mescalero students for the past 20 years. "But, the opportunity was offered and if I didn't try it, it would have always been in the back of my mind. How would it have been?"

Her husband, Berle Kanseah, a tribal councilor for 22 years, agreed.

"He told me I'd never be happy with myself if I didn't try," she laughs. "He knows."

After all, she's had a master's degree in education administration for the past 20 years, and although she never had a strong desire to put it to work, she did renew her certification "just in case."

Her uncle Oliver Enjady's saying, "There's always an opportunity at your door - you can do it, you can do it," has become Kanseah's own credo. And she hopes she, in turn, has inspired schoolchildren with that message.

"If I can make an impact by setting an example and encourage students in any way - I hope I do," relates Kanseah. "I'm proud of when I hear my students have achieved - whether it's with a diploma, whether they're taking care of their families, or whether they're certified in some type of training, because it goes back to that being a productive and caring person."

There's work to be done, with these mostly teenage students in the realm of self esteem and cultural knowledge, she says, but now having a Mescalero school with the study of Mescalero Apache culture in the curriculum is a sure start.

"We've always wanted our own tribally run school," she relates, "because we are a unique people. And this gives us a chance to set-up our own educational system to study our own language and culture."

There's two Mescalero Apache language teachers at the high school, which helps keep the continuity of language education coming from the Mescalero elementary school, which has been around for nearly two decades.

"I think those of us here at the school that are looking for improvements are looking at the

school as a vehicle to bring knowledge of the language and culture back, and some of the practices," she says.

That cultural knowledge helps children grow into productive adults, she explains.

"(Today's youths) have less knowledge of our background, which all plays into the issue of respect. Of course, people in authority have not always given reason to have respect," she adds. "But these kids have so much to deal with that's not traditionally and culturally ours, like gangs and things that come through the media."

Kanseah, a Native American of Chiricahua Apache and Tohono O'odham stock, left the reservation a number of times for her education, but like other Mescalero, she always came back to share with her community.

"I've never wanted to do anything else in my life than work with Mescalero students," she says. "This is what I do, this is my life."

## Cultural awareness

Kanseah was born in 1945 in the Chiricahua district of White Tail, to Isaac and Dorcie Kazhe.

Her father, a Chiricahua Apache, met her Tohono O'odham (previously known as the Pima) mother at the Phoenix Indian School where they were both sent to be educated, and Isaac brought Dorcie back to stay.

He worked as a cowboy at the Mescalero Cow Camp while Dorcie cooked at the day school. They raised four children, Karl, Peter, Lynette, and the late Carla. Kanseah remembers spending hours and hours of her early childhood at the day school.

"So, I guess I've always been in school," Kanseah laughs.

Her parents worked hard, and taught their children to do their best.

"My brothers and I were never told to go further than high school, but somehow my parents stressed to us to be productive citizens in the community, and not to depend on someone else to support," she says. "They expected us to do something with our lives."

She also recalls a nice simple life, with lots of good memories.

"We were not in town every day like now," Kanseah says. "We played with whatever was there — the rocks, the trees, logs — anything we could find. It was a simple life."

Some of the surviving Chiricahua Apache settled in

White Tail in 1913 after being invited there by the Mescalero Apache.

They were returning from Oklahoma, where they were imprisoned by the U.S. government for 26 years, she relates.

"They were allowed to leave because I guess they thought we weren't a threat to the U.S. government anymore," she says. "They thought so, but we sure didn't die off!"

They were free, but the Chiricahua had nowhere to go in 1913 because the government had taken their land in western New Mexico, Arizona and Mexico. But they found a new home in White Tail.

"Most Chiricahua hold (their history) with great pride, because what was passed on to us was ingrained in our minds and heart because there was no longer a place to say, 'This land is ours.'"

The Mescalero also invited the Lipan Apache of Texas to live with them on their homelands, and the three subgroups have coexisted and inter-married now for three generations.

"It's with my generation and on that we really started accepting ourselves as Mescalero, by blood, and take the Mescalero tribal identity," Kanseah says.

But when Kanseah was in the third grade, the farming tradition of the community started to change, and many of the 25 or so families in White Tail chose to move to Mescalero, she says.

Her family was one that moved, but Kanseah says she still

considers White Tail to be a strong part of her roots, and she and Berle, who is also from White Tail, plan to move back there someday.

## Leaving the nest

Kanseah was educated in Mescalero until the eighth grade, then entered a private Indian school in Tucson, Ariz.

"We had to pay our tuition and had to work as part of our being there," she recalls of the Granada Mission High School which was run by the Presbyterian Church.

Students came from a multitude of tribes, including the Navajo, Hopi and Apache. The only white students were children of the faculty.

"I still have a lot of friendships from those days. It's very rewarding when I think of the high standards and having that as part of my background," Kanseah says. "A few years ago we had a total school reunion, and in my particular class, we all had gone into something professional — education, business — we all did something, and we all agreed it was because of Granada."

But it was not easy for Kanseah to be that far away from home, and sometimes she ran into obstacles trying to understand who she was.

"I had a strong knowledge. When I left, I found obstacles that I didn't understand, but I wanted to come back. But what those obstacles came down to are, who

are you?" she relates. "Coming back certainly helped me get (further) educated in that — it was a complete circle. I was told who I was, but had to come back and be comfortable with that. It feels good."

Not long after she graduated, she and Berle, who works with the tribal housing authority, decided to marry.

"He and I were never good friends, but I guess after a number of years, it was natural (to marry)," she laughs. "We have a lot in common, but that's not to say we're alike, because we're not!"

The two grew up as neighbors and played with each other's siblings. They share the same Mescalero Reformed Church religious beliefs, and the values and background of White Tail.

They had three children, Wadell, James and Anissa. The Kanseahs took in a nephew, Gerald Rice, Jr., at the age of 4 when Kanseah's sister Carla died in a U.S. 70 car wreck.

When the children were still young, Kanseah fulfilled a promise and went back to New Mexico State University to acquire her bachelor's degree in education.

"Back in the days when galantry still held, my husband asked my mother if he could marry me. She said, 'What are you going to do about your education?' I said I'll finish it some day, and I did."

It was a hard and sometimes

lonely mission, she says. It took her 10 years because sometimes she'd just quit.

"One time I had to leave to have surgery, and another time I just called up my husband and said, 'Come and get me!'" she recalls. "But I could never live with myself if I didn't finish it. It was like giving up and I was taught not to give up, and I think it was a promise to my mother."

Upon graduation from college, she was told of a master's program funded through the Rockefeller Foundation that was specifically for Native Americans, and Kanseah seized the opportunity to apply. She was one of only six to be accepted into the new program, and two years later she walked away with a master's degree.

"At the time, I wanted to get it mainly to move up job wise and pay wise," she says. "But it certainly has come in handy now, because I'm licensed and wouldn't be here otherwise."

Kanseah strongly believes youths should travel to find out more about what they're capable of, and how people of different races can sometimes not be so different.

"I think you need to know who you are first — how you know where you're going, which in one word is identity," she says. "All your life you're searching for who you are, but if you have a basis of that identity, you have a head start. That can make or break you."

**Judge postpones case in Zia gas dispute against Capitan, 'Zozo**

A federal judge has decided not to hear a lawsuit filed by Zia Natural Gas against two local villages until other related cases are resolved.

U.S. Magistrate Judge Don J. Svet granted a postponement Nov. 27 to the villages of Carrizozo and Capitan and to the Capitan Carrizozo Natural Gas Association they operated.

The three were sued by Zia, a division of Natural Gas Processing Inc., for breach of contract in connection with the purchase of a transmission line from the association in 1992.

But the judge agreed with the villages that its lawsuit in district court and a case before the New Mexico Public Utility Commission (PUC) both were initiated before the Zia lawsuit. All the cases allege that the other side has breached their contract.

The villages and association, which has now been converted into a municipal utility, also have filed a counterclaim against Zia in federal court for breach of contract and breach of fair dealing.

The two villages serve about 700 customers. Zia, which serves about 6,000 customers in a district that includes Lincoln County, also has asked the PUC for a 7% rate increase.

# Skate ban sought on Forest St.

Capitan trustees will consider banning skating, bike riding and skateboarding from the street in front of the elementary school next month.

The request to ban the activities came from the Capitan School District administration office, said Village Clerk Deborah Cummins.

The road recently was repaved and a sidewalk was added. Children are using the sidewalks and are placing skateboard ramps on an adjoining street, she said.

"Since it all is village property, they asked us to declare a no biking, skating or skateboarding zone," Cummins said.

The board of trustees Monday agreed to conduct a hearing on the issue at 6:30 p.m., before the regular meeting at 7 p.m., on Monday, Jan. 13.

The board also will conduct a hearing on a proposal to ban semi truck traffic from the road. The route is a popular cut from U.S. 380 to State Road 48 and passes in front of the school.

## Eagle Creek response

Also at Monday's special meeting, the board will consider a response to Ruidoso's counterproposal on a long-standing dispute over the Eagle Creek Water Supply Association.

Capitan trustees sent a letter last week proposing to move straight to binding arbitration in a lawsuit they filed against the Eagle Creek board and the village of Ruidoso.

The two villages are partners in the association, but Capitan has called for its dissolution, contending it cannot function because of tied votes on the six-member

board. Capitan receives no water from the association.

After a closed executive session, the trustees voted to turn down Ruidoso's undisclosed offer and continue to insist on arbitration.

## More notice on water bills

The board also agreed to consider next month a change in the village's 1987 water ordinance.

"One section in there that states you have to give 15 days notice (before shutting off water service because of unpaid bills) and we're updating that...to agree with state statutes that require 30 days notice," Cummins said.

Fourteen accounts were turned off Wednesday, she said, adding that all of the customers were more than two months in arrears.

# Home-schooled students must prove mastery of subjects for Capitan return

Home-schooled students will soon have to document their curriculum or pass tests to prove they mastered skills taught in Capitan schools, if they ever want to return to the Capitan School District.

The Capitan School Board Thursday approved a revised policy on home schooling.

Roberts, a rancher, ran un-

King, a planner with the state Department of Health's Developmental Disabilities Southeast Regional Office in Roswell, previously served four years on the board. He signed up to run for a second term in 1995 but then withdrew.

Trost, who worked for Fort Stanton State Hospital until it closed in March 1995, also works at the health office in Roswell as health program office manager.

He didn't run in 1995 because he needed a break, Trost said.

"And I felt some others needed to be in," he said. "But I kind of missed it. I really enjoyed being on the board. It was very rewarding."

"I got off when the fort was closing and I didn't know where I might end up."

...Thus, it follows that our best New Year's resolution is that we work together in 1947 for the good of the whole community.



## Museum's firearms exhibit continues

"200 Years of Firearms: Rifles, Pistols and Commemoratives from the C.L. 'Bones' Wright Collection" is the featured exhibit at the Museum of the Horse through March 31.

The event marks the first time the Wright collection has been shown to the public, and firearms aficionados and history buffs alike say they are eager to see it.

"Just come prepared to stay awhile," cautions Museum of the Horse publicity director Scott Wells. "You'll definitely want to take your time going through this exhibit. The woodcarving, the engraving and the inlays on some of these pieces make this comparable to an art exhibit. And the feel-

ing of history is inescapable when you see these items and learn of their importance at a given point in time."

Included among the nearly 200 firearms are a Charleville flintlock rifle from the time of the French Revolution; a pair of exquisitely-carved German dueling pistols; a four-barrel pepperbox pistol; and a rare flintlock elephant gun. The collection of Colt revolvers is an attraction in itself. The same can be said for the unusual "trap" guns which were rigged with trip wires to serve as lethal home security devices.

"We're scheduling special educational programs to tie in with the firearms exhibit," noted museum

education curator Jim Dickinson. "There's such a wealth of history represented by these pieces that to see them and listen to someone explain their significance will be an unforgettable experience."

The Museum of the Horse, a nonprofit institution, also features some 10,000 horse-related items and is home to Free Spirits at Noisy Water, one of the world's largest equine monuments. It is open year 'round and is located on Highway 70 East, next to the famous Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

# Aftermath at the OK Corral

(This is the fourth of a five-part series about the Earp brothers in Tombstone, Arizona Territory.)

Almost as soon as the gunsmoke cleared, people began arguing over the street fight that would become known as "The Gunfight at the O.K. Corral." And they are still arguing to this day.

The people who sided with the Earps claimed that Wyatt, Morgan and Virgil Earp, in the company of Doc Holliday, were legally appointed officials executing their sworn duty by disarming dangerous outlaws. There was some truth to this, but there was more left unsaid.

Those who supported the "cowboy faction" felt that Doc and the Earps had gunned down innocent cowboys whose only crime was to gain the enmity of the marshal and his brothers. There was some truth to this, too.

Everyone in Tombstone knew about the feud between the two groups — and absolutely no one was surprised when the result was a spasm of violence that left three dead.

The O.K. Corral Inquest, as it came to be known, began on Oct. 31, 1881, and ended Nov. 29, 1881 with the complete exoneration of the Earps and Holliday. When the court of inquiry announced that the two McLaurys and Billy Clanton came to their deaths as a result of being shot by firearms in the hands of the Earps and Doc Holliday, a reporter for the Tombstone Nugget commented, "Oh. We thought it was wasps."

The conclusion of the inquest was simple: A group of men who had been threatening the lives of the duly appointed lawmen had resisted arrest in a vacant lot near the O.K. Corral. The marshal (Virgil Earp) and his deputies (Wyatt, Morgan, and Doc) had defended themselves in a deadly situation.

**Ike Clanton: the man who wouldn't shut up**

After this, Ike Clanton, whose big mouth had started the whole thing, never tired of filing and re-filing petitions with the courts to have the case retried. It never was.

There were, however, some unanswered questions even in the minds of the participants about the circumstances surrounding the battle. One of the biggest questions was where were the cowboys' "big guns"? Namely, Pony Diehl, Johnny Barnes, and most particularly Johnny Ringo and Curly Bill Brocius. If even one of these men had been present at the shootout, the end result could have been very different.

The answer may lie in some intrigue that went on between Wyatt Earp and Ike Clanton. Wyatt had wanted to run for sheriff in the next election, and he needed some sort of feather in his cap to get the public's attention. When the stagecoach was robbed in early summer of 1881, he saw his chance. Searching about for an informant, someone with a complete lack of scruples, Wyatt quite naturally came across Ike Clanton.

Wyatt's plan was simple. If Ike would turn over the bandits to Wyatt, Ike could have the reward and Wyatt would take the glory.

**Indictment records**

The records for the Tucson District Court that indicted the Earps and Holliday for the death of Stilwell contained some of the most confusing legalese ever written:

*"Doc Holliday, Wyatt Earp, Warren Earp, Sherman McMasters and John Johnston are accused by the Grand Jury of the county of Pima and territory of Arizona on this oath by the indictments of the crime of murder committed as follows: that the said Doc Holliday at the city of Tucson in the said county of Pima, on or about the 20th day of March, A.D. 1882 with force and arms in and upon the body of one Frank Stilwell then and there being then and there feloniously, willfully and of his malice aforethought did make an assault and the said Doc Holliday a certain gun charged with gunpowder and leaden bullets, which he, the said Doc Holliday, in the hands then and there, had and held, then and there feloniously, willfully and of his malice aforethought in and upon the body of him, the said Frank Stilwell did discharge and shoot off giving to him the said Frank Stilwell then and there with the said gun so discharged and shot off as aforesaid in and upon the body of him the said Frank Stilwell a mortal wound of which said mortal wound he the said Frank Stilwell died instantly."*

It's no wonder the citizens tended to take the law into their own hands in those days.

Unfortunately, Marsh Williams, the Wells Fargo agent, deduced that something was up between Wyatt and Ike. Marsh told Ike that any plan Ike had cooked up with Wyatt was fine with Marsh, too.

Ike came unglued. He knew exactly what would happen to him if his outlaw buddies found out what he had been up to. And, as was his custom, Ike did exactly the wrong thing: he rambled drunkenly around Tombstone telling anyone who would listen that anything Wyatt Earp said about him was a lie. This, of course, made everyone wonder exactly what Ike was talking about. As usual, Ike was going around with his foot firmly planted in his mouth.

But what if Ike's cronies did find out about it? Perhaps they felt it would be easier if the Earps got rid of Ike for them. After all, on the day of the gunfight, Ike had sent a telegram asking for reinforcements, and under normal circumstances, Ringo and the others would have rushed to his aid. But they never showed.

This is, of course, strictly conjecture. It is doubtful, at this point in time, that we will ever really know what went on. But it does make one wonder ...

At any rate, the exoneration of the Earps and Holliday did not sit well with the "cowboy crowd." And if they couldn't get their revenge legally, they would resort to other measures.

**Virgil Earp shot**

On Wednesday night, the 28th of December, 1881, exactly eight weeks after the gunfight to the day, Virgil Earp, almost completely recovered from the leg wound he had received that day near the O.K. Corral, was crossing Fifth Street. He was going from the Oriental Saloon to the Crystal Palace across the street.

**Morgan Earp killed**

Finally, on the night of March 18, 1882, the cowboys struck again. But, it was a move that would have fatal repercussions for many of them.

Morgan and Wyatt Earp were in Campbell and Hatch's Saloon that night, shooting a game of pool. As Morgan leaned across the table for a better shot, a bullet crashed through the rear door's window. It struck Morgan in the back, shattering his spine and passing all the way through his body. Another bullet, fired immediately after the one that got Morgan, splintered the woodwork inches above Wyatt's head.

It took Morgan about a half hour to die. Before he did, the Earp women, all of whom were fond of him — they remembered him as being "good-hearted" — were summoned. By the time he breathed his last, Morgan's entire family in Tombstone, including his little dog, was gathered about him.

And as Wyatt Earp looked down at his younger brother, the one whom intimates said was his favorite, something hardened in him. While he continued to wear a badge, he never again was a real lawman. From that point on, the only law he obeyed was his own.

Among the suspects in Morgan's death was Johnny Ringo, Frank Stilwell, who was also one of John Behan's deputies, and a man named Florentino Cruz, also known as "Indian Charlie."

**The revenge of Wyatt Earp**

Wyatt's vengeance was not long in coming. Two days after Morgan's death, on the 20th of March, Wyatt and a special "posse" of Earp friends and supporters escorted the crippled Virgil and all of the Earp women to Tucson. Their intent was to catch a train to California — the family was taking Morgan's body home to his parents.

However, when Wyatt peered out of the window on the train, he saw Frank Stilwell. Surmising, probably correctly, that the cowboys had sent Stilwell and others (Ike Clanton was also spotted in Tucson that night) to make a clean sweep of the Earps, Wyatt and his men rushed out into the railroad yard.

No one will ever know for sure what happened in the Tucson railroad yard that night, but in the morning, Frank Stilwell was found extremely dead alongside the tracks.

Stilwell had been shot so many times that there was a running joke in Tucson for the next week or so: residents said that they didn't know if they should bury Stilwell, or "sell him for scrap metal."

Virgil had just stepped up onto the wooden sidewalk in front of the Crystal Palace when the relative silence of the evening was shattered by the sound of five shotgun blasts. Luckily for Virgil, the shooters were firing from across a wide street, and the distance saved his life.

However, his left arm was badly mangled by pellets from the attack. Virgil turned and walked back to the Oriental, where he calmly told brother Wyatt what had happened. Then he collapsed.

When Virgil's wife Allie reached his bedside, she cried out at the sight of her husband lying in a pool of blood with the doctors working feverishly to save him. "Never mind," he told her, "I've still got one arm left to hug you with." The doctors saved both his life and his arm, but he never regained the use of it — he was crippled for life.

The next day, Wyatt was appointed U.S. Deputy Marshal and authorized to organize a posse to go in pursuit of the would-be assassins.

The shooters were never apprehended, but the violence was far from over.

On the afternoon of Jan. 17, 1882, a probably drunk Johnny Ringo attempted to single-handedly have it out with the Earps and Holliday. While Wyatt was probably Ringo's prime target, Doc Holliday inserted himself into the situation, telling Ringo that "I'll be your huckleberry. That's just my game."

Tombstone diarist George Parsons, who stumbled onto the scene, wrote "Much blood in the air this afternoon. Ringo and Doc Holliday came nearly having it with pistols... bad time expected with the cowboy leader and D.H. (Doc Holliday). I passed them both not knowing blood was up. One with hand in breast pocket and the other probably ready. Earps just beyond. Crowded street and looked like another battle. Police vigilant for once, and both disarmed."

## Cafe Mescalero historic setting for fine dining

Cafe Mescalero, all decked out in holiday wreaths, boughs and berries, will offer guests a menu full of cheer on Christmas Day.

It's a great place to celebrate, immersed in the memories stored from 70 years of holidays, when the cafe was known only as Carrizo Lodge.

The historic lodge with its large stone fireplace and spacious rooms served as a summer camp for the New Mexico Military Institute, which bought the property in 1925. It then was used as camps for organizations of both boys and girls and as a meeting center.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe acquired the property on Carrizo Road about a year ago, quickly creating a cafe with charm and a reputation for spectacular food and presentation.

Chef Tony Carpenter, who came to Ruidoso three years ago from Santa Fe, describes the daily menu

of the restaurant as traditional Mexican with a Southwestern flair. His Christmas menu will follow that lead, with some special touches.

The choices are dazzling, from baked brie to smoked ham with cactus glaze.

Guests may select from among four different appetizers, eight different entrees, and desserts from pastry chef Del Salai of the tribe's nearby Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Start with the choice of appetizers: baked brie in puff pastry, spinach salad, basil quesadilla or sopos con tinga poblana, which is a fresh homemade tortilla with beef and chili, avocado, lettuce and tomato.

The list of entrees will be traditional red chile tamales, red snapper baked on banana leaf with cilantro lime butter, smoked ham with cactus glaze, smoked turkey breast with guajillo chili and maple glaze, beef tenderloin in puffed

pastry, a 10-ounce prime rib grilled on top of green chili and tomatoes, braised chicken with summer mushrooms and smoked jalapeno, and Paella Mexicana, an assortment of seafood and shellfish with Spanish rice.

Desserts include spicy poached peaches baked in filo dough, fresh berry taco in praline shells, lbera chocolate fudge cake and more.

Prices range from \$4.95 to \$6.50 for appetizers. Entrees go from \$10.95 to \$12.95, and desserts are \$3.50.

Dinner at the cafe is fine dining, but attire can be casual, Carpenter said. The chef and his 12-member kitchen staff will serve the special menu from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Christmas Day only.

The cafe's regular hours are 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. for lunch and 5 p.m. to 10 p.m. for dinner, except on Sunday when dinner is served from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m.
