Hondo School Board appoints teacher to board

The Hondo School Board appointed Thurman Sanchez of San Patricio Thursday to a four-year school board term.

He is a Mescalero physical education and pre-algebra teacher after retiring from the Roswell Schools as a wood-working teacher in November.

He was the only applicant to fill a vacancy left by the resignation of Jimmy Montoya. He left after people continued to question whether he lives in the Hondo School District, although he said he does live there, Superintendent Barbara Casey related.

The board had 45 days after the resignation to fill the position, and the 45 days are up today (Friday), Casey said.

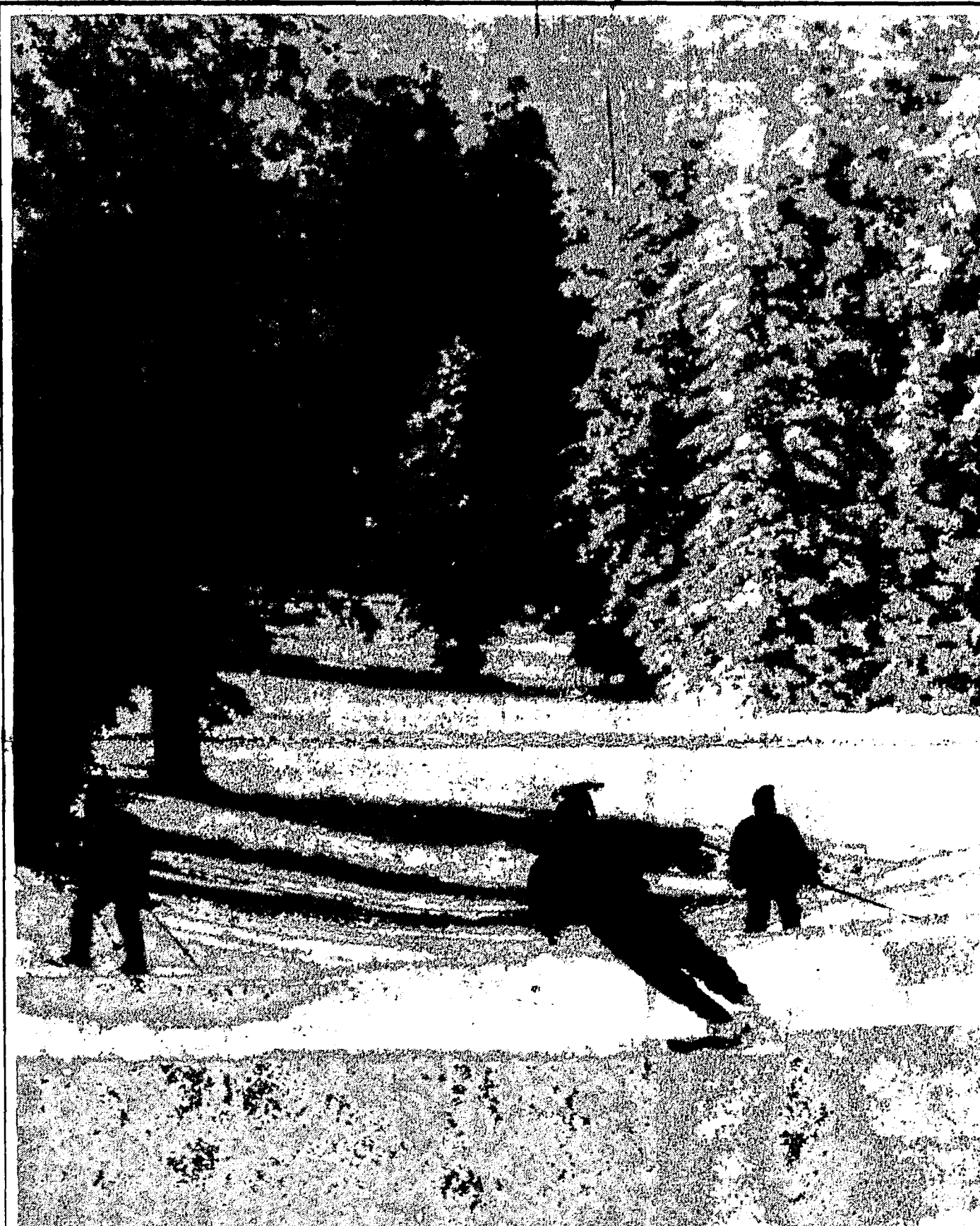
The board still has one more four-year position to fill in February by appointment. No one signed up to run for the Feb. 4 election, and the write-in candidate deadline also has passed, Casey said.

Ruidoso police form gang fighting unit

Ruidoso police are looking to halt rising criminal gang activity by forming a gang intervention unit.

The unit will share information with Ruidoso Downs police and other local law enforcement officers.

"We have a certain threat of problems developing we need to be prepared for, and we're dealing with gang-related problems right now," Chief Lanny Maddox said Wednesday. "Between Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs in the last three months, there's been three shooting incidents. There's a problem, and we're not going to turn away from it but face it straight on."

Following the Oct. 30 shooting in downtown Ruidoso, which involved one of two brothers firing a gun at a group of six male juveniles, police said the incident was not gang related. There was no hard evidence that the boys belonged to any gangs, and none of the boys claimed any current gang affiliation when asked by police, said detective Wolfgang Born.

Yet, Born conceded, "They (gangs) are going to be here sooner or later."

Just because those involved in criminal activities aren't claiming gang affiliation doesn't mean it should be ruled out, Maddox said.

"With three shooting situations involving young people ... whether or not it's gang related, a shooting is not normal criminal activity in this community," Maddox added.

With the department's gang unit, officers will have "an extra tool" to find out what some juveniles are doing or planning on doing, and "why the parents of these kids are allowing them to do it," Maddox said.

Department officers interested

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in taking on the extra, special duty of gang intelligence and intervention were asked this week by Maddox to submit a written request.

Already, five officers have volunteered. Maddox said he hopes to make appointments and have the unit ready for action by Feb. 1.

"There will be a lot of work in setting it up," he said. "We're not going to go out and be unorthodox. We're going to have certain protocols in place."

The officers assigned to the unit will have the opportunity to develop an expertise in gang intervention.

And it will be gang intervention as opposed to just gathering gang intelligence, Maddox said.

"We're going to get directly involved with them one on one, so we know who they are and they know who they're dealing with," he said.

Officers will receive training, part of which might be with the Albuquerque Police Department's gang unit. The two departments have a reciprocal agreement letting RPD officers ride with the unit, Maddox said.

Councilors may hire own lobbyist for state Legislature

Ruidoso might have an extra voice on its side in Santa Fe when the 60-day 1997 legislative session begins Jan. 21.

But that all depends on whether village councilors approve a \$5,341 contract with lobbyist John Underwood during the 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 14 council meeting.

"It certainly can't hurt anything," Mayor Jerry Shaw said. "Who knows what the situation up there will be this year? We've got to be trying to get ourselves in (the budget) pie."

Underwood has the added appeal of being a former state legislator. If he is hired he will lobby for the village's capital improvement funding requests. State Sen. Pete Campos and Rep. Dub Williams will likely push the

same issues.

Councilors wrote up the \$1.5 million wish list during their last meeting of 1996.

The list includes:

- \$1 million for water system improvements;
- \$250,000 for a fire station in the Upper Canyon;
- and \$250,000 for the MainStreet improvement program.

Underwood would also be lobbying to keep a 1% supplemental gross receipts tax, which only Ruidoso and Raton implement for water-related projects.

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Gangs are here and they're dangerous, local expert says

Criminal gang activity has changed from rival intimidation to violent shootings in the Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs area in recent months, at least one expert says.

However, that gang activity is still denied by some in the community, adds Chris Condon, the gang specialist for the Ruidoso Downs Police Department.

"No one wants to face up," said Ruidoso Downs detective Chris Condon, talking about gang members as well as adults aware of them. "But by denying there's a gang problem, we'll be setting ourselves up for the same situation Albuquerque is in."

"Sorry, but that wannabe (status) has changed."

Denying the existence of gangs just hampers tackling the problem, Condon said.

"A gang is a group that gets together to do something bad. They are not the boy scouts — they are not getting together to clean up the river or pick up trash," he said. "The public needs to know. Real estate values will go down if there is a gang problem, and there is."

Those in the gangs might also think their activities are chummy and cool, but they aren't, he said.

"Kids might be playing around like it's a game, but it isn't. It's life threatening."

Condon referred to a Dec. 31 shooting at the Circle K Store in which 20-year-old Ruidoso Downs resident Jacob Scott was shot point blank in the head. He was lucky to be grazed by the bullet, and was treated and released for his injuries Jan. 1.

Police say Ruidosoan Marcello Silva, 16, later confessed. Silva, who once was friends with Scott and lived with him, said he did it because of "personal problems," Condon related. Both are known

gang members, he added.

A detention hearing is being held for Silva today at the district court.

Silva told Condon he threw the .22 caliber gun away in the midtown Ruidoso area. Police don't know how Silva obtained the weapon, which they have yet to find.

Silva was witness to another shooting Oct. 30 in downtown Ruidoso when he was with a group of juvenile males, Condon added.

One of the reasons the denial of gangs lingers in the community is because suspected gang members here refuse to publicly claim an affiliation, Condon said.

This is unusual, Condon said, because in most cities the members proudly claim their affiliation — and not by graffiti tagging of buildings, which is a different activity done by taggers. In big cities, taggers are rarely gang members, he said.

But in Ruidoso, gang members also seem to be tagging their insignia on buildings and walls. Every few weeks there are new tags with different symbols, leading police to believe the groups are changing their names to keep law officers guessing.

A good place to see some of the ever-changing tags is behind McDonald's restaurant at 144 Sudderth Drive, Condon said.

"Their names change on a weekly basis," he said. "No one says they're running with a gang, but we know they're running with a group of people dealing with narcotics and its all intertwined with tagging and criminal activities."

Police don't know the leaders, but they believe gangsters from California and other states are coming to the area and organizing youths.

The local gangs' main activity is not to traffic drugs, Condon said. And a lot of people outside of local gangs here also distribute drugs.

The gang affiliation is just something for allegedly bored youths to identify with, he said.

"It's a lack of imagination, that's all," he said. "There's no excuse to have trouble finding something to do around here."

Signs of gang membership

Signs of gang affiliation include:

- being friends with gang members;
- arrest records;
- nicknames;
- family problems;
- demeanor;
- victimization from gang violence;
- tattoos;
- hangouts;
- clothing;
- graffiti activities;
- and signs or symbols they use which are associated with gangs.

Teens who meet one or two of the above criteria are not necessarily gang members, but if they fit the majority of items on the list, they are likely in a gang.

Graffiti was a banner in a Ruidoso Downs teenager's bedroom. The boy says he's not a member of a gang, but a lot of his friends are.

Some ways to fight off local gangs

There are various ways to defeat local gangs, says Ruidoso Downs police detective Chris Condon, and the starting point is admitting they exist. Then gang members can be identified.

Condon gathers information about gang activity for his department and shares it with neighboring law enforcement officers.

The free flow of information about gang-related criminal activities is a key way to combat the problem, he said.

"Gangs and juvenile crimes go hand-in-hand," Condon said. Looking at arrests and suspects in violent crimes during the past year

is a way to start identifying gang members.

"In this last year, serious crimes involving juveniles have increased," Condon said. "The crimes include aggravated battery with deadly weapons, assaults, drug-related incidents and a recent bank robbery. Simply put, violence is associated with gangs, so most of their crimes are violent."

Street gangs are defined as ongoing formal or informal organizations or associations of three or more persons, Condon says. Members share a common group name, identifying sign or symbol. And their members collectively engage in any pattern of criminal behavior.

Youths join gangs simply to belong, Condon said. They might need security from other gangs or a sense of identity.

Many potential gang members are from broken or troubled families with drug and criminal behavior, and may have family conflicts. They also tend to have minimal adult supervision, inconsistent discipline at home, negative role models, lack of interest in school and low self-esteem.

"More and more kids are being drawn into gangs by the lure of money and glamour," Condon said. "Some of them are even intimidated to join."

Annexation committee meets for first time since October

When Ruidoso's ad hoc annexation committee meets at 9 a.m. Tuesday, Jan. 14 at village hall, committee members will discuss the pending annexation of two pockets along Gavilan Canyon Road.

The committee will be meeting for the first time since October, after it decided to send out notices to the canyon property owners as-

king them to petition for annexation.

Village Planning Director Cleatus Richards sent out 57 letters to residents in Valley East Estates and the Pines of Gavilan Canyon notifying them of the village's intent, he said.

So far Richards has received 22 letters back, with 10 indicating support for annexation. Letters are

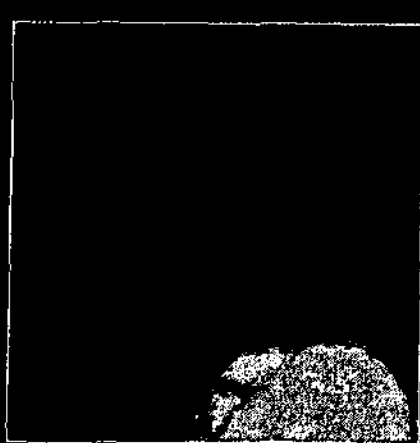
still being received.

Both parcels, which Richards hasn't yet tallied the acreage of, are north of Warrior Drive. If annexed, the property owners will be subject to village property taxes. A few of the residences are hooked to village sewer lines, but none of them have access to village water.

A cost-benefit analysis of extending services to the residences is being compiled, Richards said.

County commission picks new chairman in first 1997 meeting

The Lincoln County Commission has a long schedule of agenda for its first 1997 meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 14.

General business items on the agenda, including appointment of the commission chairman and vice chairman, and appointments to seven boards.

The meeting starts at 9 a.m. at the county courthouse in Granger. Other agenda items (in order of appearance) include:

— schedule public hearing to consider a property tax rebate for low-income taxpayers;

— Glendale Rural Events Center policies and rates;

— public hearing to consider amending the county lodger's tax;

— presentation on the county's customs and culture as influenced by livestock grazing on public lands, by new county Commissioner Rex Wilson;

— presentation on the status of the county's comprehensive land use plan, also by Commissioner Wilson;

— adopt public records policy

and rates;

— presentation on the county's annual commission inspection of Lincoln County Jail;

— presentation about economic development by Robert Rios;

— capital equipment reimbursement request from Lincoln County Medical Center;

— update on Lincoln County Health and Welfare Board by Ann Bauman;

— discussion of emergency medical services;

— authorization for county manager to plan, budget and apply for a litter control and beautification grant;

— authorization to apply for participation in Local Driving While Intoxicated/Impaired state grant program;

— adoption of mid-year budget changes;

— and discussion about the Association of Counties and state Highway Commission.

The meeting is open to the public, and people can bring up items outside the agenda at the end of the meeting.

The tax, which brings in about \$500,000 a year for Ruidoso, expires around 2003 when the bonds for construction of Grindstone Lake Dam expire. Village officials would like to remove or extend the sunset provision of the tax so more water projects can be funded with it.

"Considering we have to start long-range planning to keep that tax in effect, John might be helpful with an issue like that," Shaw said. "John is effective up there, there's no doubt about that. He was an effective legislator and knows the people up there and who to talk to."

Shaw said this is an important year to have an extra voice supporting Ruidoso needs, especially since Wal-Mart will be moving its operations to a new, bigger store in neighboring Ruidoso Downs. This will cut a huge chunk out of Ruidoso's gross receipts tax revenues, which fund about 60% of the village budget.

While he's in Santa Fe, Underwood will also continue his lobbying efforts for Ruidoso Downs

Racing and Albuquerque Downs Racing, which want video gambling at their horse racetracks. He pushed the same issues for the racetracks during the 1995 and 1996 sessions.

Underwood last lobbied for the village during the Legislature's 1995 session. He was paid \$5,000 per month then, at a listed 50% discount on his average fees. Before that, Underwood lobbied for Ruidoso "for free" as its state representative from 1990 to 1994.

Having a lobbyist represent important issues is "fairly common" for most communities in New Mexico, Underwood said, especially during a 60-day session when "everything is put on the table."

During the 30-day legislative sessions in alternating years, only budgetary issues can be raised.

Underwood said there will probably be 2,000 bills considered during this session.

He anticipates myriad heavy issues, including prison funding, labor issues, welfare and Medicare reform, and gambling expansion, he said.

Other council agenda items

Also at the meeting, councilors will consider:

— awarding a contract for construction of MainStreet public restrooms;

— a resolution to approve an annual \$3,500 grant application to the New Mexico Clean and Beautiful program. The money would be used by the Parks and Recreation Department;

— a joint powers agreement with the county for the housing and transportation of Ruidoso prisoners at the county jail;

— an annual resolution declaring reasonable notice of regular village council meetings;

— awarding a contract for a three-million-gallon water-storage tank.

— and transferring a liquor license owned by Texas B-G, Inc., to Delights, Inc. which would use it to revive the Texas Club Grill and Bar name at 212 Metz Drive. The state will have to give final approval to the license.

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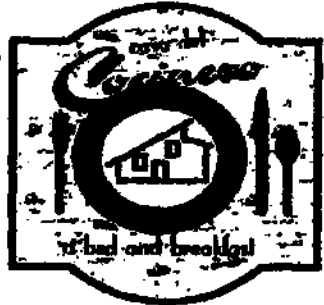


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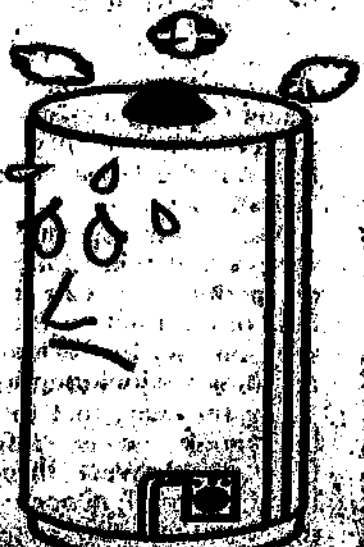

Directions aren't necessary when you know where it's at

It was one of those incidents right out of a novel by John Grisham, or maybe Tony Hillerman. A few days after Christmas, tips from an out-of-state law enforcement agency lead to the discovery of a body on Boy Scout Mountain northwest of Arabela.

Following up on the tip, State Police Sgt. Curtis Harding went to the area and found the body within an hour. Whoever killed the man may be known by the State Police, but they're not talking. The word was that Daniel VanDeman of Atlanta, Ga. may have been murdered in November and his body dumped on the mountain.

Whatever the outcome of this long-range murder mystery, people familiar with that corner of Lincoln County recall that it's not the first time lives have ended there. It's recalled that this is the fifth body found in the area.

Some chose to take their own lives; some were murdered.

One suggestion is that, if you were heading west from Roswell, or West Texas, or wherever, on the back roads, Boy Scout Mountain is about the first decent hiding place you'd come to...whether to dispose of a body or take your own life in seclusion.

With apologies to people who live and work in that remote mountain area, we do have to raise just one question that perhaps one of our readers can answer:

Why the devil is it called Boy Scout Mountain?

Remember those science-fiction tales of your youth about an infinite number of alternate universes? Turn around twice these days, and suddenly you realize there's a whole hidden world out there.

Clues are spread all over your TV screen. Nearly every channel for the past year or so has put forth some confusing messages. For more information, check our web site at gobbledygook.edu.

Well, right here by the noisy water in the shadow of Sierra Blanca one of those alternate universes lurks just behind your computer screen.

You can see it, like Alice in Wonderland, by stepping through the lookingglass. Make that "lookingglass.net" and for about 65 cents a day you can travel the world, chat with people in New Zealand or Singapore, get details on country inns in England, follow the stock market and explore esoterica you wouldn't believe.

First encounters

We found the lookingglass at Ruidoso Computer Systems, a bit east of the Post Office. Others out there are finding many ways to use the Internet. Realtor Bill Hirschfeld has sold Ruidoso property with his own web page. That way he can tap a national market without leaving town, and compete with the biggest brokers.

Larry Corbin runs the Merrill Lynch office in Ruidoso. He uses his computer to read the Dallas Morning News most days, while tracking Wall Street doings constantly.

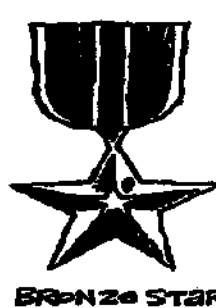
More to come

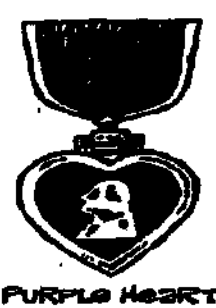

Pecos Valley management areas benefit sportsmen

Two years ago, the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish opened up two new wildlife management areas in the lower Pecos Valley. The Brantley and Seven Rivers management areas comprise almost 36,000 acres for the management of all types of wildlife.

The two areas surround Brantley Lake between Artesia and Carlsbad. The Department of Game and Fish signed a 25-year lease with the Bureau of Reclamation to administer the areas.

About 2,200 acres are contained within the Seven Rivers Waterfowl Area. This area has been set aside to raise feed for wintering waterfowl. Right now the area is being utilized by an estimated 2,000 ducks, 100 Canada geese and 25 snow geese.

The waterfowl area also contains the Seven Rivers arm of Brantley Lake as a resting area. This means that during the prime waterfowl wintering time, from Jan. 1 through Feb. 28, this portion of the lake will be closed to boating and hunting. The remainder of Seven Rivers Waterfowl Area will be open for wildlife viewing and hunting from a half hour before sunrise until 1 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Saturdays during established bird seasons.

There are almost 34,000 acres within the Brantley Wildlife Management Area. This wildlife area is open seven days a week to wildlife viewing and hunting.

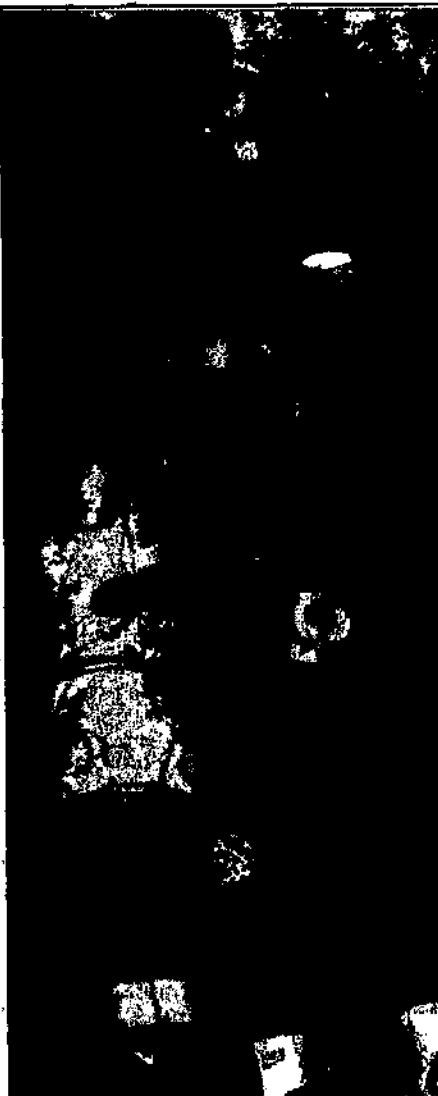

to 5:30 p.m. seven days a week to help customers.

The high-power automatic car wash run by the attendant operates without brushes so nothing can be scratched. It even washes the undercarriage, an often-neglected area. Its spot-free rinse uses reverse osmosis, making the water as soft as it can be (the self-service bays have RO, too). Cost for the automatic wash starts at \$3.

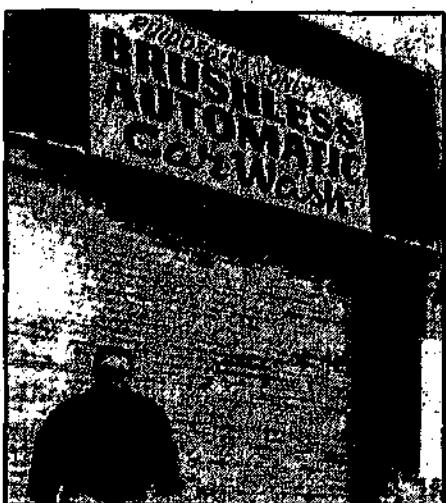
If you want to wash off your car at any hour of the day, the three covered and one open automatic car wash bays are open 24 hours a day. So are the three covered vacuums.

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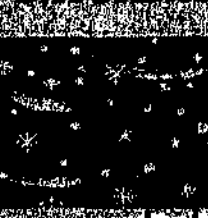

In the night sky, Orion's belt points down to Sirius, the brilliant Dog Star in the constellation Canis Major, about one-hand span away. In early January, Sirius rises a bit before 7 p.m., and by an hour or two later it's in good view low in the south-east, twinkling vigorously. Sirius is not only the brightest star in the night sky, it is one of the closest, only 8.6 light-years away.

Carter strives for excellence on and off the football field

Quoth a T-shirt: "Football is life. The rest is just details."

True for some coaches, but not for Ruidoso football coach Les Carter.

When it comes to life, Carter has the balance of running back Barry Sanders and the faith of Job.

Teaching his football players how to tackle, pass and block is just as important as teaching them how to be good people and good citizens. That's more important than winning football games, says Carter, who was born in Carlsbad and raised on a cattle ranch near Silver City.

Carter credits his parents, Jack and Mary, and his high school football coach for instilling in him the importance of commitment and dedication.

"I was always taught by my dad that if I was going to do anything, to do it the best I could," Carter says.

He expects no less from his players. But as intense as Carter is on the gridiron, he is as equally laid back off the field.

"There's a time when we're very serious on the field, but when we walk off the field, we're off the field," says Carter, who directed the Warriors to two playoff appearances in three seasons.

Rodney Webb, one of Carter's football assistants, hears that message.

"He (Carter) does have everything in

perspective. He understands that we have other things in life," Webb says.

An intense Indian

Carter attended Cobre High School, where he played football for the Indians. He was linebacker on defense and offensive center when Cobre had the ball.

As a prepster Carter idolized professional football's linebackers like the Packers' Ray Nitschke, Jerry Tubbs of the Cowboys and Dick Butkus of the Bears.

He was Cobre's own green-eyed monster on defense, used mostly to defend the run.

Cobre enjoyed plenty of success during Carter's years. His sophomore year, the Indians lost in the state championship game to Roswell Goddard High School. They were undefeated entering the title game.

The Indians were a permanent fixture in the playoffs while Carter was in high school, but they never duplicated the success of 1967. His junior year Cobre lost to Portales. The Indians fell to Lovington in the semifinals of the playoffs Carter's senior year.

A bad knee prevented Carter from extending his grid career. After graduating in 1970, he went on to study education at New Mexico State University.

He played a little intramural ball, but for the most part Carter stayed away from the field in college.

"If I couldn't be involved, I didn't want to be around it," he recalls.

Carter spent his college days studying and, by the end of his sophomore year, he was living the life of a married man. He and his first wife had two children: Troy, now 24 and a junior at Austin Community College, and Kelley, 20 and a junior at Texas Tech.

A call from within

The Carters moved to Roswell after Les' graduation in 1975, where he taught vocational agriculture and coached football and wrestling.

He worked in education for three years before leaving the profession to pursue a sales career. Carter ended up in the ministry as well, where he became involved in a Christian school and became an associate pastor.

A calling from within led Carter to the ministry.

"It was just the desire I had to serve God," he explains.

But after three years and a move to Albuquerque, Carter decided he needed to return to teaching - for himself and for his children.

"It was a matter of taking care of family needs - having the regular hours - and realizing that (teaching) was what I was supposed to do," Carter says.

He enjoys the role of educator and lis-

tener - a skill the ministry taught him.

"There's more than just the need of being a teacher. It's being someone they (the students) can talk to," he says. "I believe kids need someone who can love

them, but also discipline them."

In Albuquerque he rediscovered his love for teaching and discovered his love for his second wife, Susan. Susan and Les were teaching at the same school when they met. They were married Nov. 23, 1984.

By the fall of 1985, Les and Susan moved to Los Lunas where he would start a nine-year teaching and coaching stint with the community located south of Albuquerque.

In his tenure at Los Lunas, Carter turned around the Tiger football program. But Albuquerque's big-city problems filtered south to its bedroom community, and Carter found himself frustrated by the outside distractions that affected his work inside the schoolyard gates.

Carter was thrilled with the opportunity to teach and coach in Ruidoso, and in 1994, Carter inherited a woeful Warrior football program.

Changing times

As he did in Los Lunas, Carter guided Ruidoso to its first football playoff appearance in years - five, to be exact. The Warriors missed last year's post-season party, but returned this year. Eventual state champion Artesia eliminated Ruidoso in the quarterfinals of the Class AAA playoffs this time around.

Still, the 1996 Warrior team exceeded just about everyone's expectations. The Warriors had young talent and an over-achieving senior class. It was Carter's motivational touch that molded the Warriors into winners.

Carter can put the fear of God in his players, if necessary. Anyone who has seen him stalking the sidelines can imagine that.

But Carter's secret is his varied motivational approaches, says assistant coach Webb. He'll go nose-to-nose with those players who respond to that.

For others, he'll try a different technique.

"He's a very good motivator for the kids. He gets the most out of them," Webb adds.

Carter's efforts earned him District 3AAA Coach of the Year honors and the opportunity to coach the South All-Star football team this summer.

With his new duties for the 1996-97 school year, Carter has the opportunity to distribute some "tough love." He's out of the classroom - he does miss day-to-day contact with students - but keeps in close contact with students as the Warriors' football coach and girls golf coach, athletic director and student adviser. The student adviser handles freshmen discipline and supervises the Ruidoso High buildings.

It gives him the chance to see how teaching and coaching has changed.

"We see our kids a lot more mature and grown-up than when I first started. But I think that's a sign of the times," Carter notes.

"We've got to a point where - because of the change in education - we've had a lot of good teachers and coaches who have decided to do other things. I'm concerned that we've become more disciplinarians than educators," he adds.

The solution, Carter suggests, is a cooperative effort among educators, school administrators, parents and the community.

"We've got to work together and let the kids know we care about them," he says.

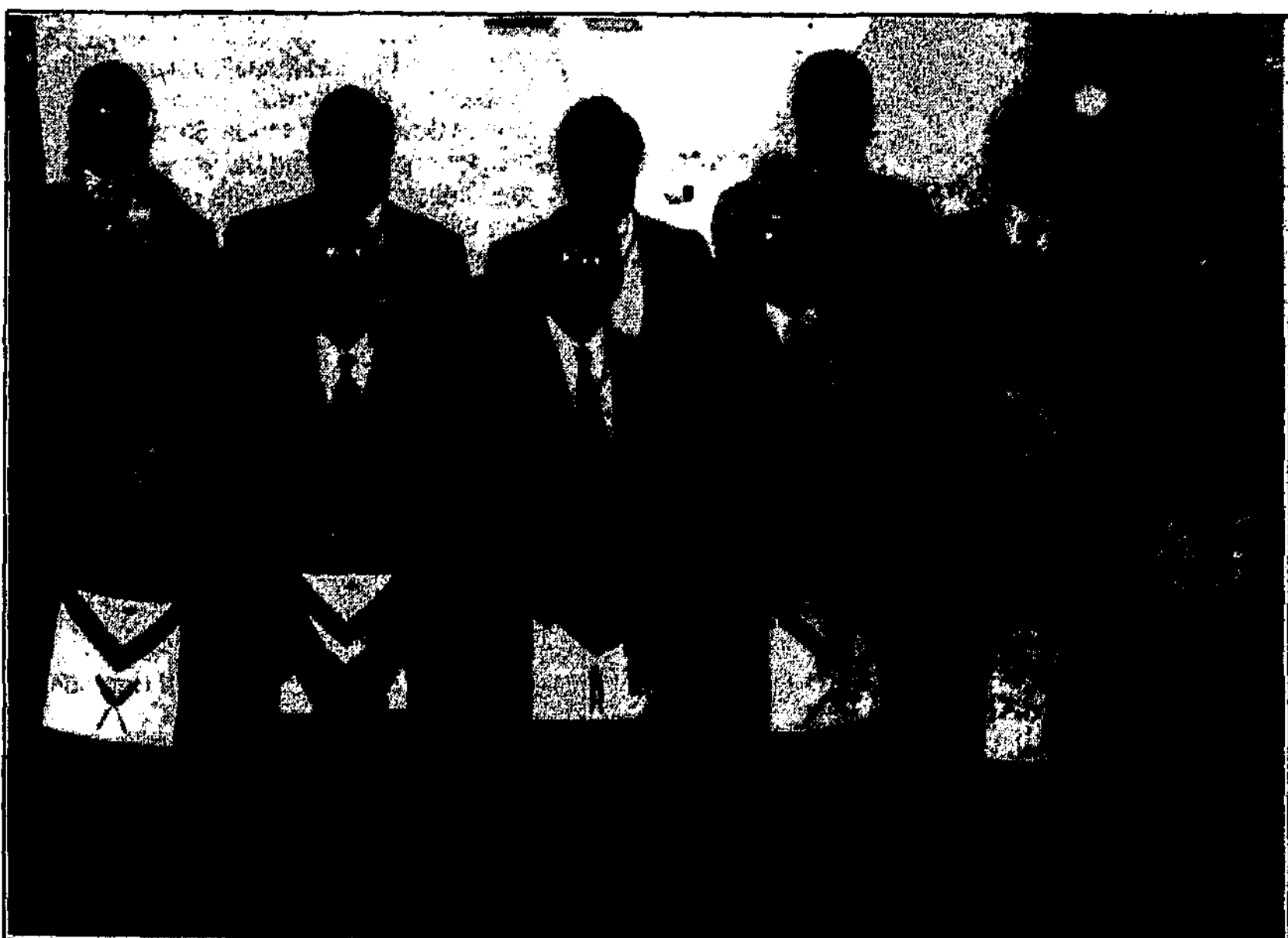
Outside his office and off the football field, Carter shows his interest in students as adviser to Ruidoso's Fellowship of Christian Athletes chapter. Les and Susan restarted the inactive chapter last year, and now the Ruidoso group boasts a membership of more than 40 active students.

He and Susan want to continue their educational efforts in Ruidoso.

"We love Ruidoso. We would love to retire right here, as long as the community is happy with us," Carter says.

Football is life for Carter - and the rest is just as important.

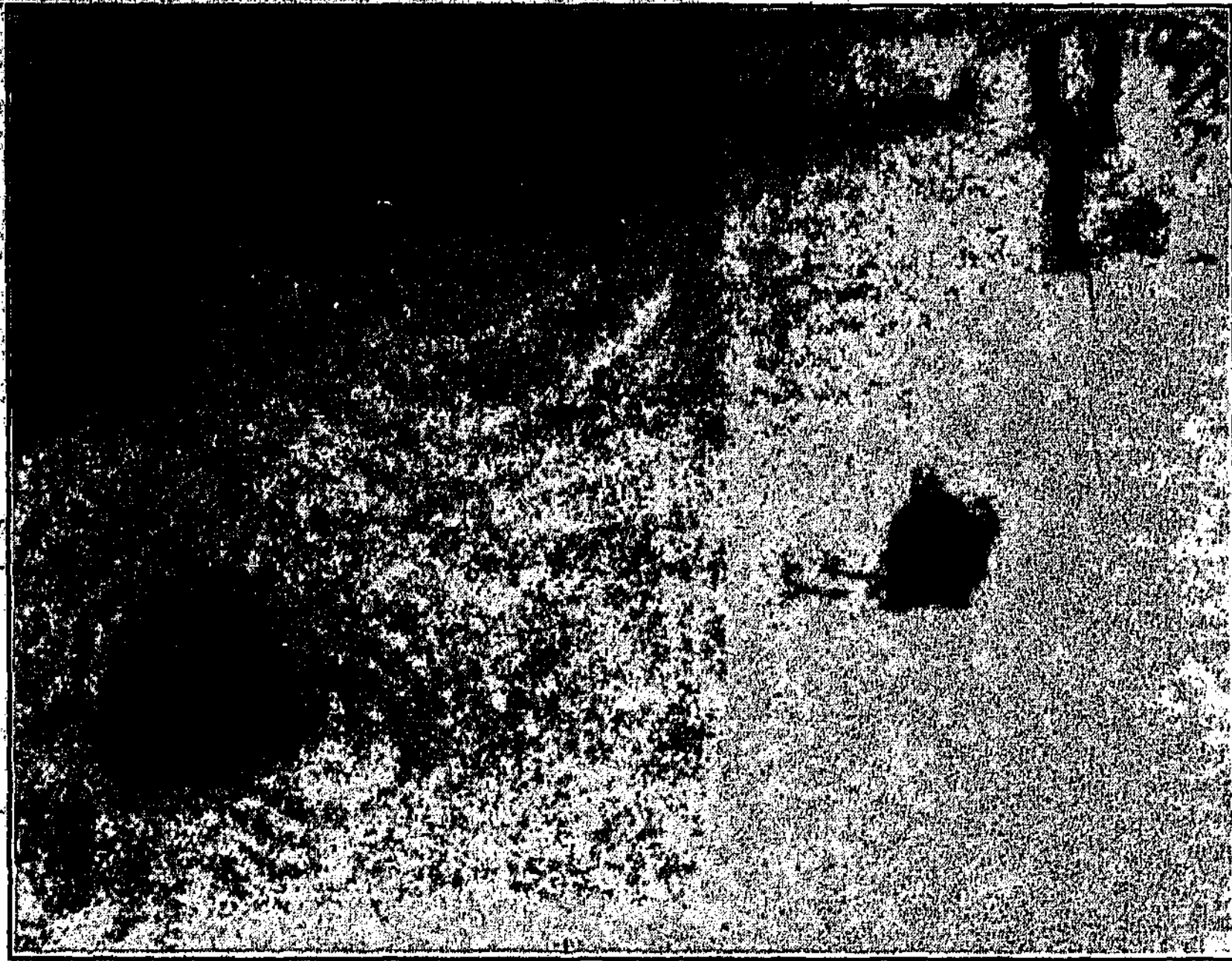

Slip sliding away

Where to sled in Ruidoso

When the snow flies, it's that time of year to bundle up and head to the Ruidoso public library, where a steep incline creates a thrilling decline for sledders.

The hill behind the Ruidoso Library is a favorite spot for those on toboggans, inner tubes and sleds. The end of the slick slide is buffeted by some small trees and a parking lane, ensuring no one will sail into the street.

It's always a good idea to bring some hot chocolate and a sandwich for energy, and to help keep your hands warm.

If you drive a few miles north, a longer run can be found at the end of Cedar Creek Road. The turnoff from Mechem Drive is next to the Smokey Bear Ranger District Office of the U.S. Forest Service.

Four decades earlier, the Cedar Creek run doubled as Ruidoso's ski area and had tow ropes. Sledders can still go for the gusto by climbing to the tree line, or pick a famer route.

If both places are too crowded, ask a young resident of Ruidoso to suggest some out-of-the-way hills or backroads that remain impassable during the winter, but offer some scary snow skirmishes.

Sledding at Cloudcroft

For more tubing opportunities, drive another 40 miles into the Lincoln National Forest around Cloudcroft. Besides many impromptu spots along the road, tubers can whip down the slopes at the privately-owned Triple M Snow Play Area.

"We have three slopes and one is the steepest in New Mexico," said owner Craig Sparling. "We also have an intermediate and beginners hill. All are supervised."

At Triple M, you don't even have to walk back up the slope after flying over packed flakes to the bottom. A lift will gently move you to the top again for another trip down.

The lift is open on the weekend.

Tubing hours are 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Lift tickets are \$12 for all day and \$8 for a half-day. Lift tickets with a tube rental are \$16 for all day and \$11 for a half day.

Tube and slope rate without the lift is \$8 for the day. If you bring your own tube, it drops to \$6.

To find Triple M, leave Ruidoso on U.S. 70 West, then turn left (southeast) on State Highway 244 to Cloudcroft. Head left on State Highway 130 out of Cloudcroft for two miles, then turn onto the Sunspot Highway (6563) for another 2.6 miles.

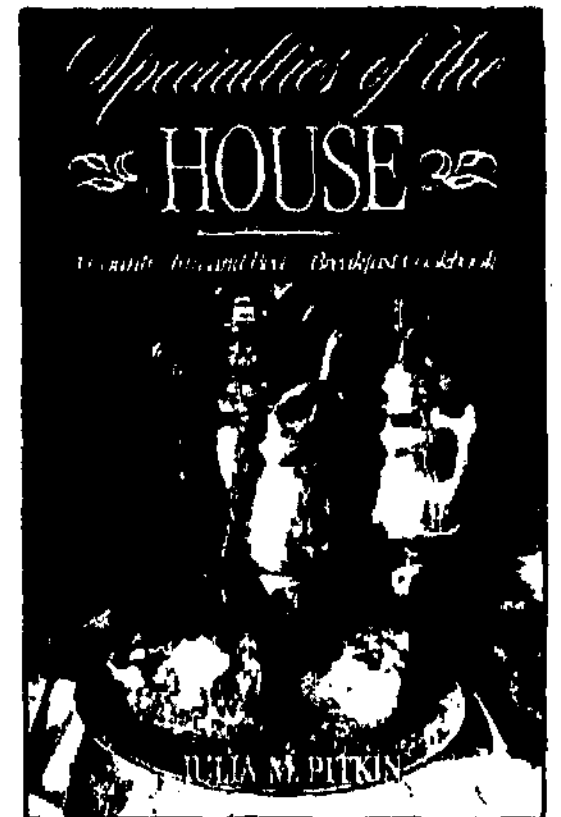

Get rich quick scheme gone wrong

In the Old West, just as today, criminals had to be devious and secretive. The miscreants who weren't took the risk of winding up at the end of a rope, which was very unlike today.

Ed Goss, an unemployed saloon denizen of San Luis Obispo, Calif., decided to plan for an extremely early retirement about May of 1892, and went about trying to recruit men of a like mind. One of the men he approached was Charles Dunn. Goss was not overly specific about the method that he planned on using to get rich quick, but he said enough to make Dunn, an honest man and one that Goss had clearly misjudged, go and confide in The Law.

Dunn was instructed to go along with any plan that Goss might present to him.

For some time Dunn heard nothing from Goss. And then on Aug. 25, 1892, Goss approached him again. This time, Goss had other recruits with him: Bill Brown, John Isom, aged 20, and Jasper "Jap" Brown, brother of Bill and also known locally as "The Fat Boy of San Luis." Anorexia, it seems, was not a problem for Jap, who as it turned out, was also informing to the police, brother or no brother.

Goss' plan was to rob the bank at Cayucos, Calif., a little town about 18 miles from San Luis Obispo.

The plan

The idea was to take the president of the Cayucos bank hostage at his home in the dead of night and force him to open the bank doors and, more importantly, the bank safe. After the robbery, the outlaws intended to ride back to San Luis Obispo in the carriage that they had rented there specifically to perform the robbery. This would be about the same as renting an automobile in your home town, robbing a bank in a neighboring town, returning the vehicle and actually expecting not to get caught.

Jesse James, the most famous bank and train robber in the Old West, managed to stay at large for 15 years by avoiding such hare-brained schemes as this one.

After being thoroughly briefed on the details of the robbery, Dunn hot-footed it to San Luis Obispo County Sheriff E. F. O'Neal, and thoroughly briefed him on the details.

O'Neal told Dunn to go along with everything. In the meantime, he assigned a man to watch the San Luis Obispo livery stable.

On the evening of Aug. 30, O'Neal's man reported to him that Charles Dunn had just rented a two-seated wagon and a team of horses. The festivities were about to begin.

O'Neal, in the company of his deputies, McLeod, Kues and Banks, arrived in Cayucos about 10 p.m. that night. There,

they found that news of the robbery had leaked and that every able-bodied man in Cayucos was wandering about armed to the teeth. And they were in no mood to have some out-of-town lawmen ruin their plan to deal with the robbers themselves. Laws and courts were not part of the citizens' plan — just bullets and ropes.

After an hour of reasoning and cajoling, O'Neal finally convinced the citizens to return to their homes. Then he and his deputies went to the home of John Simmler, the bank president. Simmler, like everyone else in town, was aware of the impending robbery and had taken the precaution of removing the contents of the bank to a safe place.

When Sheriff O'Neal asked Simmler to remain in his house and cooperate with the bandits upon their arrival, Simmler refused. Simmler told O'Neal that he did not wish to endanger his family. It was an argument with which the sheriff could not take issue. As an alternative, O'Neal enlisted a young neighbor of Simmler's, William Waterman, to play the role of bank president and act as a decoy.

It was almost midnight when the Simmler family moved out of their home and young Waterman entered, undressed and went to bed.

Then O'Neal placed two of his deputies in the room next to the bank office, where Simmler decided to wait with them. Simmler was unarmed. McLeod and Kues were toting shotguns. O'Neal posted himself and the other lawmen on the street.

The bandits arrive

It was just after midnight when the bandits rode into town and parked their carriage about two hundred yards from the bank. To them, the town appeared to be asleep. In fact nearly every man, woman and child in Cayucos were surreptitiously peering from their windows hoping to catch a glimpse of the impending fireworks.

When he heard the knock at the door of the Simmler home, William Waterman was ready. "Who is it?" he called out from inside the house. When a voice from the other side of the door asked Waterman if he was Simmler, he replied that he was not, that the Simmlers were vacationing, but that he was a clerk in the bank, and asked if he could help them. The voice outside replied that he certainly could, if he would only open the door.

As soon as Waterman did open the door, he found himself looking down the business end of a cocked revolver.

In the company of Goss, Dunn, and the two Browns, Waterman walked down to the bank. Isom, who was unarmed — there weren't enough guns to go around — had remained with the carriage. He was the getaway driver.

Just before they reached the bank, Jap Brown stopped and would go no further. He said his huge bulk was so noticeable that the people of Cayucos would recognize him. Jap remained in the street while Waterman and

the other three robbers, Bill Brown, Ed Goss and Charles Dunn, entered the bank.

Once inside the bank, the bandits lit a lamp and Waterman opened the safe. It was empty, of course, but the outlaws never got the chance to find that out. As the vault door creaked open, the two deputies entered the room, shotguns leveled.

Violence flares

"Halt, throw up your hands!" shouted deputy McLeod, sounding weirdly like a stage-coach bandit himself. Far from the following this order, Bill Brown whirled and snapped off a shot from his revolver

in the direction of the deputies. Banks returned fire and a charge of buckshot slammed into Brown's left arm and shoulder, spinning him around and sending him crashing to the floor.

At the same time, a mysterious shot sounded from the street. The lawmen were never able to ascertain who fired the shot, but two deputies fired at the muzzle flash and the firing ceased. They theorized later that it might have been an over zealous citizen. In any case, no one was hurt in the exchange.

However, the gunfire outside had a demoralizing effect on the already wounded Bill Brown. Intending to end it all, he placed the muzzle of his pistol to his head and pulled the trigger. But it just wasn't Bill's day. The bullet glanced off the side of his head and ricocheted across the room, embedding itself harmlessly in the wall. In other words, he missed!

At the same moment, Ed Goss and Bill Dunn hastily departed the bank. As they raced up the street, the deputies held their fire, fearing they would hit the wrong man in the darkness. They watched in amazement as Jap Brown, the Fat Boy of San Luis, moved up the street at a speed that would make modern-day track star Carl Lewis envious. Piling into the wagon, the outlaws, with the exception of Charles Dunn, who raced along behind on foot, clattered out of town. Considering the situation, it's a good bet Dunn was intentionally somewhat less than speedy.

Back inside the bank, Bill Brown was begging the deputies not to shoot him again. As McLeod moved compassionately forward to assist the wounded outlaw, Brown suddenly raised his pistol and snapped off another shot. Brown's arm had not improved in the last few moments and he missed again. However, the bullet ricocheted back into McLeod, wounding him slightly. One of the other deputies lunged forward and snatched the weapon from Brown's hand.

John Isom

The outlaws disappear

When the lawman raced out into the street, the outlaws had vanished.

John Isom, the fifth, unarmed outlaw had watched the entire fiasco from the wagon and it had definitely occurred to him that someone had informed. It was difficult for him not to notice this, as the entire population of Cayucos had spilled into the street within moments of the first shots.

As Isom looked over at Jap Brown while they rode away, he decided the portly Jap was the guilty one. Grabbing Goss' pistol, Isom informed Jap that he was about to be blasted across the River Styx for his traitorous behavior. But Jap was ready, and the two sat for several tense moments with pistols pointed at each other's heads. It was a Mexican standoff.

Finally, some distance from Cayucos, Goss and Isom jumped from the wagon and Brown continued on alone.

Back in Cayucos, Bill Brown breathed his last, to virtually no one's dismay.

Jap Brown, who had betrayed his own brother, and Charles Dunn were never charged with any crime, as they had been working with the authorities all along.

John Isom, the unarmed bandit, remained at large for nearly three years before being captured in Sacramento in 1895.

And Ed Goss, the man who had "masterminded" the entire affair, was never heard from again.

There was probably never another incident in the Old West where a bank robbery had such a huge audience. So much for keeping secrets...

There is an old joke that goes like this — Question: "What makes God laugh?" Answer: "a plan."
