Deputy Vega plea bargain in works

Lincoln County Deputy Angelo Vega is negotiating a plea bargain to drop his felony charge to a misdemeanor, which would allow him to remain as a deputy.

Police officers cannot have a felony conviction.

A plea hearing on the extortion-intimidation charges against Vega was postponed Tuesday when the state prosecutor called in ill.

A spokesman for the office of Attorney Gen. Tom Udall acknowledged that a plea bargain is being negotiated, but refused to release details.

"The terms won't be public until the rescheduled hearing," spokesperson Kay Bird said. Attorney Richard Klein is handling the case for Udall and no new date has been set for a hearing.

County Attorney Alan Morel said newly installed Sheriff Tom Sullivan cannot fire a deputy without just cause. Conviction on a misdemeanor may not be sufficient cause, he added.

Vega, whose family includes a former sheriff and an investigator for the district attorney, was indicted by a grand jury last year. He was accused of coercing two women into becoming drug informants by keeping them in jail after charges against them had been dismissed.

The jury in his July trial failed to reach a unanimous verdict. A settlement for a yet-undisclosed amount was reached last month in one of two civil suits brought against Vega and the sheriff's office over the incident.

Village hires legislative lobbyist

When legislators divvy up money for New Mexico communities early this year, there will be an extra voice pitching projects for Ruidoso.

Councilors Tuesday approved a \$5,341 contract with Village Attorney John Underwood to be a lobbyist during the legislative session.

During the 60-day session, which begins Jan. 21, Underwood will lobby for \$1.5 million in village requests. That wish list includes \$1 million for water system improvements, \$250,000 for a fire station in the Upper Canyon and \$250,000 for the next phase of the MainStreet improvement program.

Underwood also will lobby to keep a 1% supplemental gross receipts tax for Ruidoso and Raton for water-related projects.

Worker killed in bizarre Ruidoso Downs accident

A Tularosa man was killed in a bizarre accident Friday along U.S. Highway 70 in Ruidoso Downs.

Mark Anthony Telles, 30, was cut in half by a half-inch-wide guide cable laying across the highway, when it was whipped into the air by passing vehicles, Ruidoso Downs Police Chief David Hightower said.

Telles' brother Jon and Anthony Sanchez of Tularosa were working with Telles and witnessed the accident next to the Downs Texaco station, Hightower said.

The state Occupational Health and Safety Bureau was scheduled to investigate the scene Monday, but was delayed because of snow. Officials hope to arrive late this week, but it will take 6-8 weeks for them to reach a conclusion about whether Telles' employer was at fault, said Karen Wade, program manager of the agency's compliance section. The agency issues citations and fines to companies that have improper work practices, but she wouldn't say if it is proper to lay phone wires across roads.

Wade said she has never heard of a worker being cut in half by a cable. The last similar accident in

New Mexico happened five or six years ago when a scrap metal worker in Albuquerque was cut in half by a "guillotine sheaf," she said.

Telles worked for Sierra Telcom, which has an office in Ruidoso Downs. The company is laying wire as a GTE telephone contractor, Hightower said.


Police were called to the accident at 12:22 p.m. Friday. A pickup truck driver, Dan Reeves of Capitan, told police he thought he heard the cable kick up under his front tire and catch on his pickup frame. The guide cable then smacked against the windshield of a recreational vehicle driven

by Daniel Hendricks of Tularosa, shattering it and two side windows. Some members of the Hendricks family were treated at the hospital for cuts and have been released from the hospital, Hightower said.

The cable also apparently caught on a semi truck, but the driver kept going and was probably unaware of the incident, Hightower said.

Telles was high on a telephone pole when the vehicles caught the cable, which then hit Telles.

Guide cables are laid out before phone cables to guide the latter from pole to pole with pulleys before the guide wire is taken down, Hightower said.

Court rules against casinos

Slot machines at Casino Apache are still ringing, but they may be on borrowed time.

The 10th Circuit Court of Appeals ruled Friday gambling is illegal at the state's nine pueblo casinos, following the same rationale as lower courts: the Legislature didn't ratify the governor's compacts with state tribes.

But the court also put a stay (delay) on its ruling until the pueblos exhaust their appeals. It's up to the U.S. Supreme Court whether to hear the final potential appeal; if the court says it won't hear the case, the casinos must then close in 15 days under an agreement signed by the pueblos.

But that agreement stated the casinos would close within 15 days of the Court of Appeals ruling against them, creating some confusion about the issue. The U.S. attorney will seek clarification, a spokesman said.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe agreed to follow the same 15-day closure agreement, even though it is involved in a separate case that has not yet been heard by the Court of Appeals. The Mescalero gambling compact is essentially the same as the pueblos'.

The nine pueblos have not decided whether to appeal the ruling in the "Santa Ana" case to the U.S. Supreme Court, the pueblos' attorney said.

"Obviously, if the Legislature acted in a way to resolve the problem satisfactorily, there would not really be a need to" appeal, attorney Richard Hughes added.

In its ruling, the Court of Appeals seemed to suggest that state officials should solve the issue.

"We are acutely aware that while we have reached a decision

in this case, as we must, we have by no means solved an extremely difficult and sensitive problem facing tribe members, citizens, and legislators in New Mexico," the court said.

"It is time for the yakkity-yak on gaming to stop."

"The only hope for a satisfactory solution is through dialogue and good faith negotiation between all involved parties."

The Legislature, which has been split over a variety of gambling issues for its past two sessions, convenes Jan. 21.

"We remain hopeful" that the issue will be resolved by the Legislature, Hughes said. "I think there's a better chance than there was last year. We will see."

Mescalero Apache President Wendell Chino called Saturday for the Legislature to solve the gaming issue.

Utah tribe agrees to store nuke waste

A coalition of 11 nuclear power utilities has leased 40 acres in western Utah from the Skull Valley Band of the Goshute tribe for a temporary nuclear waste storage site.

The utility group is the same consortium that failed to reach agreement for a similar facility last year on the Mescalero Apache Reservation abutting Ruidoso.

Construction could begin in the year 2000 and the storage plant may be operational by mid-2002, said Mary Heimstead, a Northern States power media representative. The utilities hope to file a safety analysis, environmental report and other technical data with the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) this summer, she said.

Tribal officials could not be reached for comment Tuesday. Northern's Heimstead would not say what the tribe will receive in exchange for housing the nuclear waste. Northern States is the lead company in the consortium called Private Fuel Storage.

In April 1996, the Mescalero turned down an offer of \$3 million per year for 20 years. The Mescalero tribe has 3,600 members, while the Goshute has 118.

The Mescalero reservation encompasses 460,741 acres, while the Goshute covers 17,000.

The Goshute reservation is remotely situated in the desert about 65 miles southwest of Salt Lake City near Grantsville.

State opposes storage

The agreement was signed Dec. 27, but the project is opposed by Utah Gov. Mike Leavitt.

"We support the governor's position and that is 'Over my dead body,'" said Bill Sinclair, Utah state director of radiation control.

What tactic the state will use to oppose the plan is not definite, he said.

"This is so new we haven't had a chance to strategize over that, but we certainly will look into the transportation situation," Sinclair said Tuesday. "It took us by surprise. I didn't know a lease was being signed until three days before hand. The utilities never contacted us."

Utah already is doing its share to help the nation by storing and incinerating low-level radioactive waste in the same county where the Goshute are located, he said.

Both Indian tribes started negotiations with gov't first

Private utilities began negotiating with Native American groups two years ago, after the federal government's efforts to create a 40-year temporary storage site for spent radioactive fuel rods failed.

The reservations of the tribes and bands are considered sovereign nations and not subject to some of the legal hurdles a government or private facility would face.

Approval still must be granted by the NRC, which oversees the storage and transportation of nuclear waste from power plants. The review process is expected to take several years.

Critics of the temporary storage plan say a temporary site would remove the incentive for the federal government to complete an underground permanent storage facility, now proposed for Yucca Mountain, Nev. That project is several years behind schedule.

The Department of Energy has notified utilities that it will not accept their nuclear waste by Jan. 31, 1998.

The notification appears to be in opposition to a U.S. Appeals Court ruling on the government's contract with the utilities.

The Clinton administration remains opposed to interim storage until it further studies the Yucca Mountain site, DOE officials said.

But many of the power plants in the consortium are running out of storage space for the waste at their power plants. Most subject to the spent rods in pools of water.

Goshute tribal officials in November 1994 signed a cooperative agreement with the now defunct federal nuclear regulator's office to come up with a plan to negotiate for a temporary nuclear waste storage site. When that office was disbanded in 1995, the tribe began talking to private utilities, according to Leon Bear, economic development director for the Goshute band.

The Mescalero went through a similar process.

The lack of storage space for high-level radioactive waste is an Eastern problem and shipping it out to the West is no fair solution, he said.

Wendy Palmer, Grantsville's city manager, said the 4,500 residents of her town haven't taken an official position on the proposal.

"I don't know if enough information has been put out to have an opinion," Palmer said Tuesday. "I don't know if we are convinced yet it will happen. We're just waiting and seeing."

Bear said last year that although the concept initially was frightening to some members of the band, most became convinced the existing technology can safely handle the waste in temporary storage.

"We're ready to do it," Bear said last year. "The major portion of our interest is the economic benefit for at least 40 years. That would take most of us to retirement."

"We've been to other countries

and looked at their temporary storage and they're very comfortable with it. It's really a benign industry."

Mary Olson, who works for a watchdog publication called The Nuclear Monitor, said she received confirmation Tuesday that the lease had been signed.

An environmental study will be needed for the project to move forward, she said.

It's clear to her that Northern States and its partners have been using Native American groups to convince their state legislatures they will have storage alternatives, she said.

The plan being pursued by the utilities is to seal the spent fuel in heavy steel tubes at the power plants, according to printed reports. The tubes would be sealed in shipping casks and sent by train to a point near Rowley Junction where Skull Valley Road meets Interstate 80. From there, the casks would be taken by truck to the reservation's storage plant.

Area already toxic

Living around toxic substances would be nothing new for the Goshute, Bear said.

Within a radius of a few hundred miles of the reservation are located three toxic waste dumps, a government testing ground for diseases such as anthrax, an Army base that stores 43% of the nation's chemical warfare ingredients, a magnesium plant that spews hydrochloric acid into the atmosphere and a privately run low-level radioactive waste disposal facility.

Other partners of the Private Fuel Storage coalition are Indiana Michigan Power Co., Boston Edison, Consolidated Edison of New York, Dairyland Power Cooperative, GPU Nuclear Corp., Illinois Power, Pacific Gas and Electric, Southern California Edison, Southern Nuclear Operating Co. and Wisconsin Electric Power.

Chino attacks attitude of Indian gambling opponents

Gambling opponents charged Friday's 10th Circuit Court of Appeals decision on Indian gaming with "disproportionate zeal."

Mescalero President Wendell Chino said in their 32-page decision the three appellate judges said the state Supreme Court in July 1995 "unambiguously held that the government lacked the authority to ban the sale of the crop."

Chino said in a press release Saturday, "How can our religious opponents condone the return of poverty to our reservations? It is time for persecution."

It is religious, minority or other wise, to be eliminated. All these Indian gaming forces have already spoken out against Indian gaming. But none of these opponents to gaming have expressed concern for our front-line realistic suggestions to how the tribes can gain recompense for their losses from the capital expenditures, taxes or financial obligations, school and health care, and the like.

Chino added that people are not forced to participate in these forms of entertainment or casino. The Inn of the Mountain Gods and the Casino Apache employ about 450 people. The resort is 1.5 miles from Ruidoso Statewide, about 4,275 people are employed at Indian casinos. Indian Gaming Association officials said.

The court said in its ruling "while we appreciate the economic costs, both economic and human, which the tribes will incur if they must now close gaming facilities they currently operate under these contracts, the tribes must bear some responsibility for their dilemma because as they conceded at oral argument, most of their commenced gaming well before these contracts were signed."

Casino Apache was closed Sept. 24 following the U.S. attorney's threat to seize gambling assets. It was reopened Nov. 22 after signing of a settlement by the appeals court ruling in this Santa Ana case.

"Opponents and proponents must accept and understand that the 10th Circuit Court ruling provides the Legislature of the State of New Mexico the opportunity and the obligation to settle the issue," Chino said in a press release. "I respect the Legislature and fully expect that they will accomplish the task of passing a gaming bill fair to all parties - the tribes, the State, the tracks and charitable, fraternal and veteran organizations."

"It is time for the yakkity-yak on gaming to stop. It is time for the Legislature to act affirmatively for Indian gaming."

Court delay surprising

Hughes said he was "extremely surprised" by the court's stay.

"It's unusual to have appended to a court of appeals decision," Hughes said. "It's unusual to do on their own without a motion filed."

The stay postpones closure for at least 90 days — the period of time the pueblos have to file an appeal. If it is filed, more time will be granted as the pueblos wait for the Supreme Court to decide whether or not to take the case, Hughes said.

But exactly what the court's "pending final resolution either in this court or the U.S. Supreme

Court" statement means is unclear to U.S. Attorney John Kelly, who plans this week to ask the court for a clarification, said his spokesman Ron Lopez.

"The bottom line is, we don't know yet what the court is saying," said Lopez, when summarizing a press conference Kelly held Friday. "Mr. Kelly will be asking the court for a clarification. Until we know that clarification from the court on its mandate, the clock will not start ticking on the stay."

As of Tuesday, Kelly had not yet asked for the clarification, but he will later this week, Lopez said.

Real restrooms on the way downtown after Ruidoso council approves funds

Visitors to Main Street Ruidoso should have real public restrooms by May.

Councilors Tuesday awarded a \$57,000 contract for the restroom construction to Roberts Construction Company of Alamogordo.

With taxes, the project will cost \$69,000, Assistant Village Manager Alan Briley said. The

award is contingent upon a budget transfer of \$7,000 from the Parks and Recreation Department. Councilors will consider that transfer at their Jan. 28 meeting.

The cinder-block restrooms will have three stalls for separate men's and women's rooms. Currently, only portable public restrooms are available downtown.

Work should begin in February and be completed by late April, officials said.

The building will be constructed on the south side of Sudderth Drive, across from Eagle Drive.

The restrooms are the final touch to the first phase of the Main Street rehabilitation program, which was started in 1994.

NOTICE OF PROPERTY TAX REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

Property which was valued in 1996 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1997 or subsequent years, Except for:

1. mobile homes
2. livestock, and
3. land used for agricultural purposes

If, for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's office.

All nongovernmental entities (property owners) which claimed to be exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1997 if the exemption was not claimed in 1996.

Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land use for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by nongovernmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February.

If you made improvements to your real property and:

1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and
2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued;

you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by that assessor.

If you believe your property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report, on forms provided by the assessor, a signed statement which:

1. describes the property affected,
2. states the cause and nature of decrease in value, and
3. state the amount you contend the value has decreased.

This statement must be filled with the county assessor no later than the last day of February.

If the veterans exemption was claimed and allowed in 1996 no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1996 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

If the head-of-family exemption was claimed and allowed in 1996 no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. Beginning in the 1982 tax year, taxpayers are responsible for declaring their property classification to the assessor, as residential or nonresidential. When the declaration is accepted by the assessor, it shall remain as such and need not be made in the subsequent years unless the classification changes. If a taxpayer has not declared their property to be residential in 1996 and desires that classification for 1997 they must complete a declaration of residential classification and return the signed declaration to the county assessor's office by the last day of February, 1997.

Certain mineral property and personal property of contractors operating in more than one county are required to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division of the State of New Mexico in Santa Fe. Information about property to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division can be obtained from the county assessor or the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division, Central Assessment Bureau, P.O. Box 630, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87509. Phone: (505) 827-0893.

Teen pleads no contest to shooting

A Ruidoso teen pleaded no contest Friday to charges of shooting a Ruidoso Downs man in the head on New Year's Eve.

Danielle Marcello Silva, 16, was cited as an Alleged Victim hold by the Ruidoso Downs police on the night of the shooting.

Silva will be sentenced to a year in jail for the shooting, which occurred in front of the family's home on Monday.

Silva was originally charged with attempted first-degree murder and/or aggravated battery with a deadly weapon, Rhodes said. Silva pleaded no contest to the lesser, third-degree felony charge of ag-

gravated battery, which carries a maximum four-year jail for adults. The attempted murder charge carries a maximum 15 years in jail for adults.

Silva also pleaded no contest to possession of a firearm, a fourth-degree felony for possession of the gun in Ruidoso after shooting 30-year-old Scott Downs outside a Ruidoso Downs store.

The gun hasn't been found, police said.

A plea of no contest means the defendant is not fighting the action against him, but it is not an admission of guilt. However, with the plea he agrees to waive his constitutional rights to a trial, and his plea is treated the same as a guilty plea by the court.

However, a plea of no contest protects the defendant from assumed guilt if a civil action is ever filed against him. Therefore, the plaintiff would have to prove the defendant's guilt.

After his mental evaluation, Silva will return to Alamosa.

juvenile jail and wait for his sentencing hearing, Rhodes said.

Silva admitted to Ruidoso Downs police Jan. 7 that he shot Scott with a .22-caliber pistol, police said. Silva told police he did it because of "personal problems" between the two, Detective Chris Gordon said.

Scott, a Ruidoso Downs resident, survived the shooting and was treated at the hospital and released the same day.

Both Silva and Scott are known gang members, police said.

Generally, Ruidoso Downs gang members are part of the "south side" gang, while those in Ruidoso are part of the "east side" and "west side," Gordon said last week.

Because of the seriousness of the charges against Silva, the state could have requested Silva be tried as an adult. But Rhodes weighed various criteria, including Silva's cooperation with police, and rejected that option, she said.

"He was charged as a juvenile and will be sentenced as a juvenile," Rhodes said.

Two face marijuana charges in Downs

Two Ruidoso Downs residents were arrested this month on marijuana charges.

Christina Ferguson, 19, and Anthony Cardone, 18, are both charged with distribution of marijuana, contributing to the delinquency of a minor, possession of marijuana, and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Lincoln County Sheriff's Office and Ruidoso Downs police, through

their joint drug enforcement unit, worked the case together. When they didn't detect pot growing lights after receiving a tip, officers decided to simply walk up to his trailer at #18 Willow Trailer Park and ask if they could search it. It worked. The two allowed the search without a warrant, Lincoln County Narcotic Enforcement Unit agent Frank Hooper said.

Officers found nearly an ounce of marijuana and approximately 10

items to smoke it, including water pipes and pipes, Hooper said.

Ferguson and Cardone admitted to smoking marijuana with a 15-year-old boy in the house, Hooper said, resulting in the distribution of marijuana and contributing to the delinquency of a minor charges.

Fellow narcotics agents Milton Romans (from the sheriff's office) and Alex Hinson (from the Ruidoso Downs Police Department) assisted with the arrests.

What price legislation as the stakes go up?

It's a done deal now, or it isn't. Either the Ruidoso Village Council agreed Tuesday night to pay former legislator John Underwood some \$5,300 to lobby for them in this year's 60-day session which starts on Jan. 21, or they didn't.

We suspect a knowledgeable ex-representative who's a lawyer besides (he's the village's attorney) with the time and resources to concentrate 100% on Ruidoso needs would be useful in going after \$1.5 million in state money the village needs.

But this isn't about whether extra help is needed beyond that offered by Sen. Pete Campos and Rep. Dub Williams. (They're the ones we elected to represent our interests, and—yes—lobby to shift as much state cash as possible to local projects.)

This is about the high price all of us in New Mexico pay to keep that tax money flowing from the capitol in Santa Fe to courthouses and city halls around the state. Our elected legislators, of course, don't get more than per diem expenses; no salary, not even minimum wage for the hours they spend. Certainly far short of \$5,000 for two months spent navigating the corridors of our most confusing Roundhouse.

Meanwhile, just about every one of those ubiquitous "special interest groups" we keep hearing about are shelling out big bucks to pay people to bend the ears of those elected representatives in order to tip the dollar balance in their favor. Grocers, druggists, horse tracks, big businesses, veterans' groups, the Association of Counties, the Municipal League—just about every organized entity in the state.

And we're not talking peanuts here, folks. Experience has shown all too often that you get what you pay for in Santa Fe as well as Washington. So it's a given in the 1990s that supplemental help from hired guns is about the only way to have a chance at a share of the pie.

Not that we'll be certain of getting it, anyway. We keep hearing that a shortage of funds is going to put a squeeze on the state's purse-strings once again. There's even talk that the Johnson administration will try to shift some road upkeep to the counties.

Oh, well. Lincoln County is one of those gambling counties, after all. You have to roll the dice to have a chance.

Chino attacks 'overblown' response to court ruling

Wendell Chino, President of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, finds it amusing that Indian gaming opponents are showing such disproportionate zeal in reaction to last week's Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals ruling.

In a news release, he was quoted as saying that "along with their over-reaction, they are misconstruing what the Court said in its stay. I believe the ruling gives Indian Tribes ample opportunity to use the appeal processes afforded them, and all Americans, under the law. The ruling includes a stay. This stay must be recognized by all parties, whether they are pro or anti-Indian gaming. The stay should be understood in its proper context."

His statement in full:
Gaming opponents have invoked religion as an angle from

which to attack Indian gaming. The presumption that one religious belief has moral superiority and authority over another is offensive. It assumes that tribal religious practices and the more conventional churches located on or near our reservations are to be ignored, or are also our opponents. Neither is true. How can our "religious" opponents condone the return of poverty to our reservations? Does this factor into their thinking of moral equivalent? It is time for persecution, be it religious, minority or otherwise, to be eliminated.

All these Indian gaming forces have already spoken out against Indian gaming, but none of these opponents to gaming have expressed concern for, or put forth realistic suggestions for

how the Tribes can gain recompense for their losses from the capital expenditures made or financial obligations entered into for new schools, infrastructure and the like. Nor do they offer reasonable alternatives for income that has been used to benefit the economy both on the reservations and in surrounding non-Indian communities.

Have our opponents forgotten that freedom and freedom of choice are invaluable and important to this country? New Mexicans and visitors alike are afforded the opportunity to gamble at racetracks, the State-run lottery, pull tabs and the like. People are not forced to participate in these forms of entertainment. Yet our zealous opponents want to take away freedom of

choice for the Indians, their supporters, employees and customers on moral grounds. Why? Because they think they can.

Opponents and proponents must accept and understand that the Tenth-Circuit Court ruling provides the legislature of the State of New Mexico the opportunity and the obligation to settle the issue. Fair play, justice, mutual understanding and equity between the state and the tribes must govern the debate. I respect the legislature and fully expect that they will accomplish the task of passing a gaming bill fair to all parties—the tribes, the State, the tracks and charitable, fraternal and veteran organizations.

It is time for the yakkity-yak on gaming to stop. It is time for the legislature to act affirmatively for Indian gaming.

Group seeks fire alarms in every home

When a majority of young children in a Nob Hill Primary School class said they didn't have a smoke detector at home, Ruidoso fire officials were shocked.

But thanks to the firefighters association, local Village Hardware store and school officials, many of those children and others in the village will now have donated alarms installed in their homes for free.

Before there is fire, there is smoke, said Ruidoso Firefighters Association representative Paul Hart, so it is vital there is at least one working smoke detector in every home.

Since 1992, all new homes are required by law to have a smoke detector in every room. However, many owners of older homes neglect or ignore this safety precaution and have no smoke detectors, firefighters said.

When Hart and department fire prevention officer Loretta Kirk recently spoke about holiday safety with Nob Hill students, they learned just how rampant the lack of alarms is.

"More than half the class didn't raise their hand," Hart said. "We thought, 'What's going on here?'"

After leaving the class, Hart and Kirk hatched a plan to get smoke detectors into those children's homes, they said.

The duo met with Ruidoso school principals in December, asking them to have teachers compile a list of students who don't have at least one smoke detector in their homes.

Right before the Christmas break, the fire department received a list with 55 names back from the schools. They then purchased 62 smoke detectors offered at cost from Village Hardware Store, using \$200 donated by the Ruidoso Firefighters Association and \$50 of unused fire prevention week funds.

Hart had asked hardware store owner Larry Langford if he would participate in the plan, and Langford agreed.

"What it boils down to is, I'm doing this because I was asked and believe it is right," said Langford, who's been active in the community for the last 19 years.

Langford is even going one step further than asked. He plans to erect a sign at his store notifying customers that if they'd like to make a donation of \$4, he'll give the fire department a smoke detector, which usually costs about \$8.

An account also has been set up

at Pioneer Savings Bank for the program, and Wal-Mart manager Mike Daulton has said he'd like to participate.

Village residents lacking smoke detectors, especially the elderly, are encouraged to contact the fire department at 257-4116.

Horsemen hope 'educated' Legislature makes gaming decision

New Mexico's horse racing industry hopes three times will be a charm when the state Legislature opens its 60-day session Jan. 21.

The state horsemen's association will again lead lobbying efforts to win legislative approval of video gambling at race tracks.

"We feel like the Legislature will deal with the issue. Last year there were a lot of uncertainties with the Native American gaming. We feel like the public said to do something," horsemen's association president Mike Weatherly said.

The 10th Circuit Court of Appeals even has ruled in a Jan. 10 ruling that the Legislature should resolve gambling issues.

Friday, the court upheld a lower court's ruling that Indian gambling in New Mexico is illegal because the Legislature did not ratify the gambling compacts signed by the governor. The court granted the casinos a stay (delay) in their closure, however, until the appeals process is complete.

"I was surprised by the stay, but not surprised by the ruling," Weatherly said.

"There ceases to be a problem if it's addressed legislatively."

Ruidoso Downs Race Track general manager Rich Baugh was surprised as well, but for a different reason.

"I was kind of surprised at the timing. As far as the outcome, I'm not sure," Baugh said Tuesday.

"Once again they've just thrown it back to the Legislature to resolve it."

Weatherly said the horse racing industry will lobby for video slot machines at the race tracks, essentially what advocates hoped last year's session would produce. The video slot machines would generate year-round revenue for the tracks. Racing industry officials said they would use the money to supplement racing purses.

But last year's short legislative session didn't produce approval, marking the second time in as many years that the tracks failed to win expanded gambling. The House killed a bill approved by the Senate.

"I really feel that the legislators are focused on the issue and that they believe in the horse racing industry," Weatherly said. "I think they are convinced of the true plight that we are in and the vulnera-

bility we are in."

Both Baugh and Weatherly like their chances of gaining video slot machines this time around.

"We've made the public aware, notified the legislators and now it's time to go to work for everyone," Baugh said.

Education could be the difference this year, Baugh added.

"We needed to complete the educational process to everyone involved," he said.

"I'm going to give us a 60% in favor of, and we haven't even started yet," Baugh predicted. "They've got the tools in order to repair it."

Baugh and Weatherly both reiterated that video slots are necessary to save horse racing, a \$550 million industry.

"Bottom line, period, no bull — it's all about enhancing horse racing," Baugh said.

If legislators don't approve video gambling at the tracks, Ruidoso Downs will ask for essentially the same race meet as last year — a 49-day meet starting Memorial Day weekend, Baugh said.

The host Warriors rebounded from Friday's upset at the hands of Desert Christian to pound Santa Teresa, 70-54, for third place.


"I was real disappointed with our loss in the second game. I think the team did a little bit of soul searching between Friday and Saturday," Ruidoso coach Ben Sanchez said.

Reopened casino affected track's Sports Theater

Wagering at Ruidoso Downs Sports Theater increased by an average \$5,000 a day when Casino Apache was closed for nearly two months this fall, the Ruidoso Downs Race Track manager said.

"It's still not enough, general manager Rick Baugh said.

"Given the ups and downs, we still need help," Baugh said. "It's costing us more to make less."

On a typical September weekend, the Sports Theater averaged \$21,000 a day in handle, Baugh said. The casino closed Sept. 27, and the daily average handle increased to \$26,000 in October. A month after the casino reopened Nov. 15, that figure fell to a \$22,000 average.

Tatum's Coyotes will be expecting another fight from the Tigers, Lewis said.

"We need to get busy early," Lewis said. "They're not going to be waiting on us; they're going to be ready for us."

The Tigers are beginning to mesh as a team, the first-year coach added.

Capitan received solid play from everyone throughout the three-day tournament, Lewis said.

The ever-steady Wood played tough under the basket for the Tigers and earned all-tournament honors for her efforts. Sophomore K'rin Autrey, who hit key three-pointers all weekend, also made the all-tourney team.

"Everybody did an excellent job. I can't single anyone out."


