Mescalero Tribe gets \$12.6 million to help repair fire, flood damage

The Mescalero Apache Tribe will get \$12.6 million from the federal government to help restore land damaged by fires and floods last year. Mescalero funding includes \$6 million for the Bureau of Indian Affairs for emergency stabilization of two dams, emergency road repair, and other flood-related emergency expenditures. Another \$6.6 million is available to address damage on the reservation caused by flood and also to restore Indian lands damaged by fire.

The Fish and Wildlife Service will use an additional \$600,000 for fire recovery efforts at the Bosque del Apache.

U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici (R-NM) said the money was released as a result of President Clinton signing an emergency declaration late last week.

"I am pleased the president has issued this declaration and that the Mescalero Reservation and the bosque will have resources to recover from the natural disasters we experienced last summer," Domenici said. "The work to be done with these funds will be good for the overall ecological health of the region."

Domenici, a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, requested the Mescalero funding as part of the 1997 Omnibus Appropriations Bill. The bill was signed into law last September. However, the money could not be released without a declaration from the president.

New district court clerk hours

The operating hours of the Lincoln County District Court Clerk's office at the county courthouse in Carrizozo have been changed.

The office now opens at 8 a.m. and stays open through the noon hour. The doors close at 4 p.m.

The staff will continue working through 5 p.m., but will not receive any filings or answer the phone after 4 p.m.

The office used to be open 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., and closed during the lunch hour.

The change was to bring the office more in line with the hours of 12th Judicial District offices in Otero County.

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Voters like bond issues, but not incumbents

Expenditures for bond improvements approved; all but one of incumbent Lincoln County school board members lose seats in Tuesday election

Lincoln County voters were in a generous mood Tuesday, passing two school bond issues and renewing two special taxes for school equipment and repair.

But they ousted all the incumbents in Ruidoso, Carrizozo and Capitan, and returned two former school board members to their seats in Capitan.

Voter turnout ranged from a high of 37.9% in Carrizozo to a low of 12% in Ruidoso.

Bond issues for school improvements were passed in Ruidoso and Hondo. Ruidoso's was much larger, \$8.5 million, and it passed by a narrower margin than Hondo's. It will go toward eight categories projects, including classrooms, gyms, computers, a lecture hall/cultural center, re-roofing projects, land purchase, a primary school kitchen and intermediate school expansion.

"I'm a little shocked how close it was," said newly elected board member Jackie Branum of the bond issue.

Branum beat her friend, incumbent Jimmy Varnadore, by a narrow margin, too.

"Most times, bonds pass easier," Branum said. "This means the school board and administration are going to have to work

harder next time to make it pass." If it had not passed, classroom space would be tight in the district, board president James Paxton said.

"Everything in the bond issue is so important," said Paxton, who won an unopposed second term with a clean 606 votes. "If we weren't careful, we'd have to use portable classrooms again, particularly at White Mountain School."

Branum was with her opponent Jimmy Varnadore at the Ruidoso Convention Center when she learned she won by a mere 18 votes.

"I'm just flabbergasted, really," Branum said of her victory. "For one thing, it was very, very close. So close, that absentees would have really made a difference."

"Jimmy congratulated me and laughed," Branum chuckled. "Then someone said he should be the one congratulated!"

Varnadore almost agreed. "I'm a little disappointed in a way," Varnadore said of the outcome, "but in a way I'm relieved."

At times he's had to juggle personal scheduling conflicts with the board and events his son participates in at school, he explained.

"But, it's been a good four years, and I look forward to being involved in the school and helping when I can," Varnadore said.

Branum will be a good addition to the board, he added.

"She's very interested in the schools, helps a lot, and will be a very good board member," he said.

Paxton agreed, saying, "Jackie was a very successful and professional, popular teacher, and I'm sure she'll do the same kind of job in this position."

Chino calls on Legislature to approve gambling compacts

Mescalero Apache Tribe President Wendell Chino chastised gambling opponents Tuesday, saying anti-gambling groups have no suggestions for replacing gambling revenues.

Chino, interrupted several times by applause from the mostly Indian audience in the public seating over the New Mexico House chambers, was one of five tribal leaders who spoke to lawmakers for American Indian Day at the state Legislature.

"Our adversaries, our opponents, they have one failing, all of them, whether they are from the economic forum or from the churches... not a single person or body has offered to the Indian tribes what they would provide if Indian gambling is taken away," Chino said.

The state cannot afford to provide Indian tribes with basic services, Chino said, but the tribes can do it themselves if they are allowed to develop their economies with gambling.

"For years and years, we have known poverty, lack of employment, lack of improvements. This has been the law but as you have already heard, Indian gaming has provided some assets... so some of these adverse conditions can be confronted and ultimately eliminated," he said.

The U.S. Congress approved Indian gaming to give tribes a road to economic development and the Legislature should work with tribes to resolve the issue.

"The New Mexico Legislature should not per-

petuate the wrongs that have been done to the Indian people of not in this Indian country," he said. "We trust that you will consider the total welfare of your fellow Indian citizens of this state when they are attempting to improve the total welfare of life for themselves, for their children and for their children's children."

Chino said the 10th Circuit Court of Appeals decision not to shut down the reservation casinos even though the judges found them illegal was a signal for the state lawmakers to find a gambling solution.

The court upheld a lower court decision that the casinos are illegal because Johnson signed agreements with the tribes without legislative approval.

"That's what the stay of the circuit court is all about," Chino said.

Gambling opponents need to recognize Indian gambling is widely supported throughout the state, Chino said, and gamblers do not want to be told how to spend their money.

A gas station attendant who spoke to Chino at a stop on his way to Santa Fe told him, "I have worked hard and I have made my money. I am the one who determines how I spend the money I have made. It's my business. I don't want other people telling me how to spend my money."

Church associations who are concerned about gambling have a simple solution, the Mescalero president said.

"Tell your members, 'Just put your money in the offering plate, not in the slot machines,'" Chino said.

Chino was the last speaker during Tuesday's special event for Native Americans and joked with Thomas Atcity, the Navajo Nation vice president who spoke first, after his formal comments.

"I told him, 'You kick the door open and I'll slam it,'" Chino said.

Bill would give fort and camp to county gov't

Camp Sierra Blanca wasn't in first state offer

Legislation has been drafted that would authorize the state of New Mexico to transfer or lease Fort Stanton to the Lincoln County Commission.

Members of Fort Stanton Inc. hope the bill will be introduced by the county's two legislators (Rep. Dub Williams and Sen. Pete Campos) and co-sponsored by several other legislators who have expressed interest in the group's plan for a living museum at the historic fort 12 miles northeast of Ruidoso.

The proposed bill includes nearby Camp Sierra Blanca as part of the Fort Stanton "campus." In all, it includes 1,324 acres with 86 buildings at the fort and 12 buildings at the camp. The fort is currently being used as a minimum security women's prison. The fort is being leased by the state Department of Corrections for a two-year period ending in late 1998, although that lease may be extended.

The camp is scheduled to be used as a juvenile offender environmental detention center.

Juveniles were supposed to move into the camp late last year to

relieve overcrowding at other sites, but that plan has been delayed while the Legislature is in session so lawmakers can agree on a comprehensive plan for juvenile prisoners. In the meantime, some of the more violent juveniles have been moved.

"We believe the (fort and camp) facilities must be linked. Because of the shared infrastructure and proximity of the two campuses, a common administrator would be most beneficial," wrote Louis Higgins, director of the state General Services Department (GSD) property control division, in a letter to Lincoln County Manager Frank Potter.

The proposed legislation has been submitted to the Legislative Council Service for final bill drafting. GSD public information officer Carolyn Jackson said Tuesday. The service has recommended some changes in the original draft, but details were not available, she said.

In the discussion draft, if the campus is sold or exchanged, the amount received must not be less than the value of the property established by the state Taxation and Revenue Department. In previous discussions between Lincoln County and state officials, the state offered to give the fort to the county for \$1.

Her teaching experience will help her to quickly catch on to board issues, Paxton added.

Branum said she'll encourage the public to speak out at meetings about agenda items.

"I definitely think the public needs to have comments aired," she said. "If the public really feels strongly about something I think the only way to get the feel of how the community feels, is to hear it."

Hondo School voters approve bond issue, too

Hondo voters with a turnout of 28% approved a \$325,000 bond issue by a strong 73% approval. The money will go toward renovation of buildings and the purchase of computer equipment.

They also strongly supported a three-year special property tax levy for building repair with 76% of the vote.

Former board members return to Capitan

Jack King and Tom Trost, who both stepped down from the Capitan Board two years ago after serving four and 10 years, respectively, were re-elected. King won over two opponents,

Rudy Saiz and Jody Roberts, with 49% of the vote. Trost soundly defeated incumbent Russell Shearer with 79% of the vote.

Supt. Diana Billingsley said before the election it was too bad Shearer and Trost were running against each other, because both men had proven themselves valuable board members.

Capitan Board President Beverly Payne said she's looking forward to working with King and Trost again.

"They were good solid board members," she said. "They put the children first and I'm sure they'll do a good job for the district."

Trost was at a meeting and King also was unavailable for comment Tuesday evening.

Payne said she wasn't surprised by the strong 74% support shown in her district for the renewal of a two-mill property tax levy.

"I've seen Capitan support our bond issues and tax levies before, and I felt confident they would pass again, especially because it didn't represent an increase in taxes," Payne said.

Carrizozo ousts incumbents

Voters in Carrizozo rejected the re-election bids of Mario Lee Roy Zamora in Position #1 and Nick Serna in Position #3, who

got 43% and 25% of the vote respectively.

Steve Harkey, Gray Galache, Lisa Shivers and Eldon Olson won the four Carrizozo seats. The third time was a charm for Harkey, in his attempt to unseat an incumbent. It was Harkey's third try to be elected to the board.

"I think it's great," he said. "I'm happy to be in there and I hope I can do some good."

Several of the people elected appear to have similar views on issues, he said.

"I feel an extra effort was made as a group. We're all pretty well thinking the same," Harkey said. "I don't know if the community was dissatisfied with the incumbents, but maybe."

He listed improved communication among students, teachers, parents and administration as a major goal, as well as cutting down the number of children who live in Carrizozo but attend school in other districts.

Corona is lone district to hold on to incumbent

Thirty-six percent of the eligible voters in the Corona School District turned out to re-elect incumbent Pete Gnatkowski over Theresa Barajas in Corona.

"I have respect for everyone on the school board and there is nothing that was being hotly contested," Gnatkowski said.

Trapper run over by truck

A 51-year-old federal trapper was killed Friday northwest of Carrizozo when his pickup truck slipped out of gear and ran over him.

Authorities speculate that a labrador-mix pup in the cab of the GMC pickup may have hit the gear shift while Lane Jones was outside setting a trap, and Jones was killed when he tried to stop it.

The government truck also recently was worked on for transmission problems and may have slipped spontaneously "out of gear," said Lincoln County Undersheriff Cliff Macsas.

The sheriff's office was notified at 7 p.m. by rancher and former county commissioner Sterling Spencer that Lane was dead.

Lane's family called the Spencers' Bar W ranch when the trapper did not return home on schedule. Spencer searched the Bar W ranch where the trapper was supposed to be working and found Lane's body. The four-wheel drive truck, with its engine still running, was at the bottom of a three-foot-deep arroyo with the puppy still inside, Macsas said.

"We're not able to pinpoint the time of the death," he said. "But the truck lights weren't on and there were spectators who saw the accident Saturday morning and could find no signs of foul play."

"We're satisfied it was an accident, just one of those things that happens, a fatal accident," Macsas said. "He apparently got out of the truck to set a trap and left the motor running. The truck began moving toward the arroyo. He may have tried to get back in. The truck went off into the arroyo and ran over him."

Lane was employed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Macsas said he and Lane's brother, Travis Johnson, walked the scene of the accident Saturday morning.

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Auditor uncovers solid waste problems

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority employees violated state purchasing law last year and repeated mistakes already cited by auditors for years.

In his report to the authority for the year ending June 30, 1996, Auditor Dan Austin said the authority has not developed an adequate system of internal accounting controls, even though the lack of such controls was pointed out in last year's audit.

Management also failed to follow state purchasing laws and failed to require additional security from banks on deposits over \$100,000, Austin said.

Austin noted a lack of accountability and documentation in accounts receivable.

By not having a proper computer program, the finance officer doesn't have a paper trail to track transactions, making it difficult to keep an accurate list of those who owe back bills to the authority, he said.

The authority should invest in an adequate accounts receivable system, he said.

Authority Finance Officer Beverly Foote said her office is able to track overdue bills, but it's a time-consuming process that doesn't show how long a bill is overdue.

"It's a word processing program and it takes a long time, but we can track customers," she said. "The

program doesn't break down the time, but I can tell by the dollar amount since we bill quarterly."

Ruidoso Village Manager Gary Jackson, who represents the village on the authority board, said he's discouraged to see a repeat of the same audit criticism.

"He gave in microcom a reflection of what we have seen over and over," Jackson added. "We asked staff to bring back at the next meeting, a definitive answer how these issues will be corrected in the timetable so that we won't be facing these things again."

Each auditor for several years has recommended the authority purchase new computers and software to handle the situation, Jackson said.

"It's discouraging each year we feel like it's going to be addressed and it's reported as such, but we find it again the next year."

Authority Chairman Frank Cummins said, "We're in the process of updating in conjunction with the auditor."

He attributed delays in securing a good accounts receivable computer program to management changes. The authority went through three different managers last year.

Questionable purchases

In his audit report, Austin said

management complied with state laws governing purchases on significant purchases, "but in some cases did not document how the regulations were complied with relating to purchases of less than \$5,000 and small purchases of less than \$500."

State law requires that three telephone bids be obtained on purchases of \$500 or less and that informal competitive bids be solicited for purchases of \$5,000 to \$500.

Noncompliance is a violation of state law, he noted. He recommended employees be educated on state statutes.

"When a truck breaks down, the employees at the (garbage) transfer station look for parts, they don't think about getting three telephone bids," manager Jerry Wright said. "But we have policies in place to cover that now. I think the situation is pretty well taken care of. Beverly (Foote, finance officer) and I went to school on this. I think the problem was lack of knowledge."

No bank deposit insurance

Austin also criticized the management for continuing to keep more than \$100,000 in financial institutions without additional security.

The authority violated state statute by not requiring banks to pledge some type of security when

the amount of money they hold for the authority exceeds \$100,000, the limit insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

In his response to the criticisms, Wright said policies have been put in place to insure compliance with state statutes, and bank pledging requirements were met as of June 30, 1996.

Still in the black

In his financial breakdown, Austin listed total assets of the authority at \$1.8 million and liabilities at \$1.4 million. He noted that uncollected accounts hit \$36,453.

Operating revenues ran \$1,558,276, but exceeded operating expenses of \$1,505,868. The non-operation side also showed a positive balance of \$119,568.

However, Austin pointed out that the authority spent \$20,631 more than it budgeted for the 1995-96 fiscal year.

Cash on hand at the end of year was \$139,224.

The authority is a coalition of Lincoln County and its five municipalities, formed six years ago to collect and dispose of garbage countywide. The 11-member board is composed of representatives from the six government entities.

"The financial picture seemed in a better mode," Cummins said. "I'm very optimistic."

Some county officials oppose latest changes in state's subdivision law

A movement in the state to repeal a 1995 subdivision lot split law was given some fuel last week by Lincoln County Commissioner Wilton Howell.

At a county commission affiliate meeting of the New Mexico Association of Counties, several commissioners began complaining about the cost and delays caused by

the law, which went into effect July 1, 1996.

"I told them I agreed 100%," Howell said. "I made the motion that we meet again in two weeks and ask the Legislature to repeal or modify the law so it's not so expensive and burdensome."

"It passed unanimously."

The 1995 Subdivision Act was written to handle problems in two or three of the fastest growing

counties in the state, Howell contended.

"It was the one-shoe-fits-all approach, but it doesn't," he said. "Some counties are 90% federal land."

The law redefines subdivisions to include any split of land into two parcels or more, and requires owners to follow subdivision regulations except in the case of 19 exceptions. It requires developers to

meet county standards on roads, to compile disclosure statements on services and conditions for potential buyers, and to provide central water or prove the availability of water.

Howell said he would like to see more input from real estate agents and developers.

To that end, he is speaking today (Wednesday) to the local Board of Realtors. He hopes com-

missioners in other counties will do the same.

And if water is the real issue, Howell said developers should be required to prove there's enough to serve the maximum number of lots that could be created, no matter what number is being proposed.

He also would like to see the law expanded to ban developers from

using domestic wells for each lot, thereby allowing them to sell water rights already attached to the land.

The 13 exceptions to the subdivision act's requirements include parcels of 35 acres or larger sold within a 12-month period, court-ordered subdivisions, the division of land for grazing or farm purposes, and the division of land to sell or give it to an immediate family member.

This, especially, must be 'The Year of the Child'

Joseph Geronimo focused on it last week with a long run to Santa Fe, and Gov. Gary Jackson certified it with a proclamation.

This is, officially, The Year of the Child in New Mexico. It is worth extra emphasis this year, because events nationally and locally represent a change, not necessarily a positive one, in the way our society responds to the needs of its children.

Welfare reform has shifted the responsibility from federal to state government in caring for children born in poverty. Republicans and Democrats have agreed that the cost of federal welfare programs was a burden that had to be eased. They also agree that a prime and divisive issue remains: How to care for the child without rewarding the parents for being irresponsible.

Whole generations of families have grown up in New Mexico under the "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" (AFDC) program. And, yes, some families have made a career of AFDC support.

That system clearly had to change. But the question remains: What of the children, the innocent ones, the victims of that ill-advised system?

Of course parents should be responsible, but we in our governmental wisdom over many decades have undermined that idea. Now we must care for the innocent and somehow re-educate those parents.

It's as simple as making sure the youngest are inoculated against diseases that damage and kill. It's as complicated as developing new ways to care for the innocent. Should the state fail, then it is up to the counties and towns and neighborhoods.

In Ruidoso, happily, awareness is growing and planning has started.

This month, Ruidoso Rotarians are pushing for vaccination of pre-school youngsters against infectious diseases. It's a free service at the county health office; nevertheless, more than half the pre-school-age children in Ruidoso haven't had their required shots.

And planning has started to establish a child development center that not only will serve and protect the child but educate the parent.

Our society acknowledges responsibility for children, and must accept it. We must save the children, and give them the opportunity to flower in the Third Millennium.

Mayor, former councilor debate hotel issue

The Ruidoso Village Council's decision to extend the Hubbard hotel lease for several additional months gives pause for a question: Why it has taken about seven years for this council and others to do whatever is necessary to plan and construct this very important adjunct to the convention center?

The question of the contract extension was originally on the council's agenda at the council meeting and was rescheduled in a special meeting on Nov. 28. In this meeting, Mayor Jerry Shaw refused to allow any comments regarding the background of the lease, along with an up-to-date explanation of the problems encountered during the past years of consideration. The mayor's off-the-cuff comments were that she had received two requests concerning the construction of a hotel, that she had answered both inquiries, and that neither had responded to her letters.

At this point no one on the council or the newspaper asked the mayor for an explanation. How and why did the mayor, as an individual, handle the inquiries without referring them to someone or some group whose responsibility was for the hotel search? Denying a constituent the right to comment at a special meeting should have been challenged by the village council as a point of order.

Who is in charge and responsible for the construction of a convention center/hotel? We would like to know.

Why is the hotel so important to the operation of the convention center? When the old Ruidoso airport was closed in order to construct a golf course, a hotel, and a civic center it was an accepted fact that like a three-legged stool, each phase of construction depended on the other two phases. The golf

course was completed and later construction was completed on the convention center. With two legs of the stool in place it was attempting to stand alone. An impossible task to say the least.

The golf course and convention center could not stand alone with the hotel missing in the three-phase concept.

There were, in the beginning, operating lodging facilities who were not in favor of the hotel in competition to their own interests; however, as time has passed it has become evident that a hotel is mandatory if losses in operations of the convention center are to be controlled.

Without hotel facilities nearby, the center cannot accommodate conventions which are life's blood to the operation. As the result of not having the nearby hotel, the center since inception has an operating loss amounting to more than \$1 million. A large part of this loss would have been eliminated with convention business at a nearby hotel.

A loss of \$392,000 is planned for the fiscal year. And for years to come, or until a hotel is built, the failure to construct a hotel is not to be construed as a fault of the Hubbard Group. Mr. Hubbard is a successful businessman who, in his judgment, decided not to build the hotel.

His decision should not have precluded a vigorous effort on the part of the council with the help of others to secure this important hotel. This delay may be explained in another way. Perhaps we, as citizens/taxpayers, are expecting too much from our elected officials. After voting for our officials, we pay very little attention to the future actions of those officials. Only 14% of us voted in the last village council election — pitiful! To keep abreast of the future growth of

...Mr. Junge infers that the Village of Ruidoso Council has taken seven years to plan and construct a hotel. No member of this council was on the council, including myself, in 1989 when the first lease was signed. However, Mr. Junge was a member of the council in 1989, when the first lease was signed...and Mr. Junge voted in favor of the lease with SWD. Later, SWD could not get financing and was ready to pull out of the lease when R. D. Hubbard, trying to save the hotel lease, joined in as a partner. Also, in 1989, Mr. Junge voted to approve the architects and the design for the convention center. But in June of 1990, Mr. Junge voted "aye" to fire the same architect he had voted to approve, at a cost of about \$60,000. That same year, he blasted The Ruidoso News saying the council did not need their help in the construction...And now, he uses The

Ruidoso News to vent his views on that same convention center.

...Mr. Junge chastised me about not being allowed to speak on the lease extension at a meeting (in which) the subject was tabled to another date. I told Mr. Junge he could address the council at that meeting, which was to be held in a few days. I did allow Mr. Junge to speak at the special meeting, in which he prefaced his speech with his intention to educate the council. I warned him to stay on the subject of the hotel lease, but when he wandered to the golf course lease, I cut him off. I do not think that this governing body needs to be educated on the subject in a meeting. ...I do have some background in village government. But I do pride myself in not being on the council in 1990-1992, when the Lincoln County Solid Waste was formed and which continues to be a nightmare...Mr. Junge was there and was part of the creation.

As to my "off the cuff" remarks...I announced that two different people had visited with me about the hotel. A couple who had read in The Ruidoso News about the lease came to see me. I gave them a copy...and that was the first and last time I saw them. During

the highly successful Municipal League conference, which was deemed to be the best ever held, I approached a councilor from Carlsbad who happens to be in the hotel business about how we needed the hotel to complete our plans and make conventions even more successful. He was interested, so I mailed him a copy of the lease. Since I had not heard back from him about his interest and plans, I called him before the regular council meeting...and he seemed confident he was going to be able to put a group together. Therefore, I advised the council of the conversation and they decided to postpone the subject to a date the next week. I informed the councilor of what we had done, advised him of the future date, but did not receive any word...not in person or by letter. Therefore, at the special meeting, it was decided to grant the extension—after all, "a bird in hand."

...Mr. Junge says no one on the council or the newspaper asked. I informed the council at the meeting the newspaper had inquired and I told...exactly what I had just related. And why did I not refer to some group whose responsibility is the hotel search? There is no group. We have a lease for the hotel.

I did not deny Mr. Junge to speak at that meeting and the council did not call a point of order because I only cut (him) off when (he) left the subject of the meeting!

...The person who is responsible for the construction (of the hotel) is the lease holder.

...We get to the projected loss of \$392,000 for this fiscal year in operation of the convention center, and how the hotel is going to cure that. If we leased the...center every day (365 days at \$600 a day) that would only create revenue of \$219,000 a year. The convention center was not built to

break even or make money. It was built because of the impact of dollars turned over by the convention. In the last quarterly report from the CVB (Convention and Visitors Bureau) which is operated by the Chamber of Commerce...it was reported that the convention center bookings that quarter had a total dollar impact on the village of \$3,771,173. The convention center will always cost the village to operate. It is the dollar turnover that is created...that makes it important to our economy.

If Mr. Hubbard has decided not to build the hotel why did he ask for an extension?

...Although I agree the hotel is the most important piece of economic development that this village faces, I wonder who is in charge of economic development? We had an economic development corporation funded by the village to the tune of \$40,000 a year during Mr. Junge's term as councilor. They never seemed to be interested in the tourism aspect of economic development. The Chamber of Commerce...(was) going to take it over with a committee. That committee informed me when I asked...that (it was) only charged with helping after a business chose to locate here.

Village government is very busy taking care of infrastructure needs (especially water) to run all over the country looking for a hotel person if we did not have a lease. And it would be at our expense because there are no funds in government to even take someone to lunch for any purpose.

The last election was only for three councilors. ...I'm sure the 1998 election will bring more people out to run and since I hear (Mr. Junge) will be running for mayor...let's get started, because I intend to give...a run that will bring out the voters.

Local Rotary seeks shots for students

□ Fewer than half of Ruidoso students have shots to prevent diseases

For Ed Fleck, it was a shot in the arm to discover that fewer than half the preschool-age children in Ruidoso have been vaccinated against childhood diseases.

Fleck, president of the Ruidoso Rotary Club, decided to do something about it. He started gathering information, inviting health professionals like Millie Aroda and Theresa Luna (the district and county health nurses) to address the club, and lining up a planning committee.

The result will be visible all during February as Rotarians launch an inoculation awareness campaign aimed at parents of preschoolers.

The Rotary committee has arranged for distribution of vaccination awareness posters to major local employers, day care centers and the schools next week.

Rotary International has supported a worldwide immunization effort for more than a decade.

Dr. Evan Nelson of Roswell, the district health officer under the state Department of Health, helped launch the local effort last week. He told Rotarians that while most children receive shots by the time they enter kindergarten, it takes only a small pocket of unimmunized

people to start a deadly epidemic. "Any parent who's seen what whooping cough does to an infant can understand the urgency," Nelson said.

He reminded his listeners that inoculation against smallpox over the years eliminated it worldwide by 1977.

Polio, the "infantile paralysis" that was a national scourge as late as the early 1950s, has been eliminated from North and South America since 1982.

The 50 or 60 years of proven ef-

fectiveness is wonderful," Nelson said. "But because of that effectiveness, it's hard to convince parents that young children must be immunized."

The State Health Department recommends six series of inoculations against diseases during the first two years of a child's life, including diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, polio, measles, mumps, rubella, influenza, hemophilus and hepatitis B.

Hepatitis B vaccine should be given at birth. Most others should

begin at two months; some series of shots run until 15 months, and three of them should be repeated after four years of age.

The Rotary committee is headed by Tom Battin and includes Jim Miller, Larry Corbin and Keith Green.

Fleck and Battin reminded parents of preschoolers that inoculations are available from their own doctors, and are free at the Lincoln County Health Department office in the county government sub-office at 105 Kansas City Road, behind Ruidoso Village Hall.

New Ruidoso police gang prevention unit gets first case at White Mountain school

After a 13-year-old Ruidoso Downs boy was penning gang graffiti on his notebook Monday, a teacher sent him to the principal's office.

"He told the principal (Sergio Castanon) he was a gang member," Ruidoso detective Wolfgang Born said. "So (Castanon) searched him and found a pocket knife."

The graffiti the boy was scrawling was DSK — Downs South Kings, Born said.

The boy was arrested at the Ruidoso Middle School office and charged with a fourth-degree felony, carrying a deadly weapon on school grounds. He was later released to his parents, Born said. School officials will decide Tuesday whether to suspend him.

But the episode doesn't stop there. The new Ruidoso police gang

intervention unit was called in to investigate the situation and educate staff about gang activity, police Chief Lanny Maddox said.

"There's just a few kids we're dealing with on a gang level," Maddox said. "The majority are law-abiding citizens, and it's unfortunate that it just takes a handful to take the learning environment in school and turn it around to something we have to deal with."

The middle school knife incident is the first for the unit. Maddox just assigned the extra duty to officers Art Nelson, Doug Babcock, Eric Woods and Ignacio Lopez last week. The four officers had volunteered for the added duty, and were selected from among seven officers who had submitted assignment requests to Maddox.

The men were selected "based on their prior performance in the department, and self-motivation

skills," Maddox said.

The purpose of the unit is to gather information and try to prevent gang activities, which appear to be taking seed in the Ruidoso area with recent violent juvenile crimes, Maddox said.

"They'll attempt to identify every gang-affiliated member in Lincoln County," Maddox said of the unit's mission.

Police have already been working with school officials, but this work will be more focused.

"Six years ago we saw the first initiation of a gang situation at the middle school," Maddox said. "It's still one of the focal points where their activity gets a foot off the ground, so to speak."

To counter that activity, officers will be working more closely with the schools to intervene in the spread of gang behaviors, he said.

Officers will develop a file on who is suspected of writing graffiti, for instance, and translations of what groups the graffiti identifies, Born said.

The department is now working on procedures for responding to gang-related incidents and setting up extra training, Maddox said.

On Feb. 18-20, Albuquerque Police Department gang unit officers will come to Ruidoso to train the officers how to identify and respond to gang problems. Later, the officers will become members of the New Mexico Gang Task Force, Maddox said.

Down the road, the unit will train school faculty and students. The training also will reach out to parents if the school board chooses, Maddox said. Officers also will train with other local law enforcement agencies, Maddox added.



The Warriors put away Coble with a solid third quarter, outscoring the Indians 15-5.



Legislature committed to helping education, Campos says

Improving the quality of New Mexico's schools remains the legislature's top priority, Senator Pete Campos (D-Las Vegas) said Monday.

Work has already begun to increase the amount of money spent on public schools, hold school officials more accountable for student progress and make schools safer, said Campos, who represents Lincoln County in the Senate.

Campos notes that several legislative committees are already working on public school issues. The House Education Committee, chaired by Rep. Sam Vigil (D-Las Vegas), and the Senate Education Committee, chaired by Sen. Cynthia Nava (D-Dona Ana), held hearings last week to gather general information on school issues.

"I'm not surprised that education's share of the state budget has slipped in recent years, given the rapidly escalating cost of the state's Medicaid budget," Campos said.

"We must work to properly balance the needs of schoolchildren with the medical needs of elderly and disabled New Mexicans, with

"We must work to properly balance the needs of schoolchildren with the medical needs of elderly and disabled New Mexicans, with our needs for more prisons and safer streets, and with our needs to hold down overall spending."

our needs for more prisons and safer streets, and with our need to hold down overall spending. None of this will be easy, but all of it can be accomplished by working together," Campos said.

Campos said education spending has increased more than 75% from \$682 million to \$1.2 billion, over the last 10 years, and that there are now more teachers per student than there were 10 years ago.

The foundation of New Mexico's education budget is the public school funding formula, a law that ensures that money for schools is divided fairly, regardless of local district wealth, Campos said.

"Properly funding our schools is important, but it takes more than

money to make children be good students," Campos added. "We should consider how we might hold teachers and administrators more accountable for their students' success. And we should think of ways to make classrooms safer for kids who want to learn."

"It is also important for parent teacher organizations, civic organizations and local governments to take a year-round enthusiastic interest by participating in parents' night, academic and athletic competitions and other activities that promote school pride and motivate our youth to learn."

The 1997 legislative session began Jan. 21 and will adjourn March 22.

On Feb. 6 Venus, Jupiter, Mercury and the moon buddle near each other at dawn. The moon is the barest of crescents, and stands just above and to the left of Venus and Jupiter. Mercury is higher than the other two planets, but not as bright.
