Domenici and Skeen meet with locals this week

Lincoln County's congressional representatives will be in Carrizozo and Alamogordo this week during their break from Washington.

U.S. Rep. Joe Skeen (R-NM) will meet at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday with county officials and village officials from around the county, at the commission meeting room of the county courthouse in Carrizozo. The meeting is open to the public.

Skeen also will be at the Corona Schools at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday to meet with Corona Supt. Bob Richardson, talk to the student body and have lunch with them.

U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici (R-NM) will attend a Character Counts luncheon for Otero and Lincoln county participants at noon Saturday at the Alamogordo Holiday Inn on White Sands Boulevard.

Oklahoma parents killed in accident

An Oklahoma couple was killed and their children injured early Saturday when their pickup truck struck a semi.

Andres Flores, 30, of Clinton, Okla., died at the scene of the accident on U.S. 54, about 15 miles south of Carrizozo.

Hilda Lopez, 22, died at about 2 p.m. Monday at University Hospital in Albuquerque.

State Police Officer Ricky Virden said Flores' 1989 Chevrolet pickup was headed south when it veered into the path of a 1996 Freight Line semi-truck heading north and driven by Harry Campbell, 48, of Grand Rapids, Mich.

Campbell attempted to avoid the pickup, but Flores hit the left front wheel of the tractor and struck the trailer, Virden said.

Sandy Flores, 4, was stabilized at Gerald Champion Memorial Hospital in Alamogordo and transferred to the University of New Mexico Hospital in Albuquerque.

She was listed in serious condition Monday, according to a hospital official.

Andres Flores Jr., 3, received minor injuries, was treated and released, Virden said.

Campbell and his passenger, Janice Spoehr, 56, were not injured.

Liquor was not involved in the accident and seat belts were not in use, according to Virden.

Williams bill changed to keep meetings open

Public tells him not to close hospital meetings

Rep. Dub Williams has backed down on a bill that would have closed Lincoln County Medical Center board meetings.

The bill would have changed the Open Meetings Act to exempt boards of privately operated county hospitals from the act. Williams (R-Glencoe) said he has amended the bill to just exempt Presbyterian Healthcare Services board meetings, not meetings of the individual county hospital boards. Presbyterian runs Lincoln County's hospital and others.

Williams said he has received numerous calls from people who are worried the bill will close meetings of the hospital board, which Williams has chaired for at least six years.

"People are concerned, they're asking, 'Is this going to close the meetings?' No. They'll be exactly the same, exactly as they have always been as long as I've been on the board," Williams said. He said he has been on the board for 16 to 17 years.

Pat Rogers, a lobbyist for the New Mexico Press Association, said Tuesday he has been working with Williams and a lobbyist for Presbyterian to draft an amendment that ensures the local meetings stay open.

"We're still tinkering with the language," Rogers said. The intent of the amendment would be to exempt from the Open Meetings Law any private corporation running a public hospital "as long as there is a local board which is subject to the Open

Meetings Law," he said. "I believe that we're going to be able to work something out," Rogers said.

Williams said the bill as originally written was too broad.

"It painted with too broad a brush across the state," Williams said.

Tom Horan, a lobbyist for Presbyterian, said lawyers for the company are concerned the private corporation's meetings might be subject to the Open Meetings Law because it operates a public hospital.

"With a very broad interpretation, they could say that since the corporate board makes some decisions that affect the hospital...they could extrapolate that we are still a county hospital," he said.

Horan said the issue was raised by the company's lawyers.

"We're not trying to hide anything. We're just trying to make sure we don't run into any unexpected legal problems. We don't want the attorney general mad at us," he said.

Bob Johnson of the Foundation for Open Government said his group supports the amendment.

"Big outfits, like Presbyterian... probably should not be required to open their private corporation meetings and records but, when they run a local public hospital, (the local board) should be subject," Johnson said. "As long as the local public hospital boards are subject to the act, I think that's all we can expect."

The House Voters and Elections Committee last week endorsed the bill and sent it to the House Judiciary Committee.

Campos once again dubbed 'King of Pork'

Fellow state senators give him pink pig puppet

Ruidoso's senator has once again been given the dubious distinction of being the "King of Pork" by fellow senators, but he says he doesn't mind carrying the title because it represents the needs of his district.

Sen. Pete Campos (D-Santa Rosa), a Democrat whose expansive district encompasses San Miguel, Guadalupe, De Baca and Lincoln counties, repeatedly earns the King of Pork moniker because he usually sponsors a record number of local capital improvement projects — projects like senior citizen centers or bal-

fields that are often called "pork."

"I can't shake the title," Campos said with a smile that meant he is not unhappy with his pork-heavy reputation. "It comes from peoples' needs, the tremendous needs of rural New Mexico communities. It is our lifeblood. These things are needed to upgrade our infrastructure."

Local power company offers electricity from around U.S.

PUC hears plan this week

Customers of Texas-New Mexico Power will choose their own power providers under the state's first electric deregulation proposal, if it is approved by the state Public Utility Commission.

That means customers could even choose providers based on what kind of power they prefer, from solar to wind to coal to nuclear.

And for the next three years, their electric bills would freeze at a rate 3% lower than they paid in December 1996. Then they could start buying power from various providers.

A hearing before the Public Utility Commission is planned for Thursday. The commission's approval is the last step before the plan can be implemented in phases over the next three years.

The electric company serves about 10,160 customers in Lincoln County, the majority in the Ruidoso area.

TNP does not produce power in New Mexico. It buys and distributes power to customers. The

company voluntarily submitted the proposal called "Community Choice" to the PUC, because company officials anticipate a restructuring of the power industry and want to be in the lead, said Dave Warren, PUC executive director.

About eight to 10 states are engaged in some form of restructuring for a competitive market, Warren said.

A similar approach initiated in New Hampshire has yielded an average of 15% lower electric bills for about 17,000 customers in that state, he said.

Legislation for competitive suppliers in California and Maine mandate a 10% reduction. TNP has projected a 9% savings in New Mexico, Warren said.

If the plan is approved, the average local customer using 505 kilowatt hours a month during the three-year freeze period would see bills drop by \$1.28 from \$43.84 to \$42.56, according to Valerie Smith of TNP's Texas office.

"TNP submitted their plan to us close to a year ago. We started serious negotiations last fall when the (PUC) said sit down at the table and see if you can work something out," Warren said.

Already signing off on the stip-

ulation are the PUC staff, the New Mexico attorney general, New Mexico Industrial Energy Consumers and two of the power company's largest New Mexico customers, the city of Alamogordo and the Cobre Mining Co.

"We are trying to meet the needs of our New Mexico communities by moving our plan for competition forward with the PUC," said TNP Chairman and CEO Kevern Joyce.

TNP has 218,000 customers, with about 43,000 customers in southern New Mexico and the rest in Texas. The company submitted a customer choice plan in Texas, too, but failed to reach agreement. Talks recently have started up again, Warren said.

"Three years from the date of PUC approval, the entire service territory will be available for customer choice," he said.

"We'll probably see names like Pacific Gas and Electric out of California and a lot of other power marketers spring up as they see the market become available. They will have to pass a financial test and we're going to have reliability contracts so the lights won't go out.

"There will be a lot of customer protection, because there will be companies out there forming right and left."

Explaining the purchasing process, Warren said, "You can't track electrons as you can a phone call from beginning to end. We're connected to the entire western power grid. Marketers buy power and take the risk. They will put it into the grid somewhere and TNP will deliver it to customers.

"If a customer wants to pay more, maybe to get better service or an alternate method of generating power, such as the wind (or nuclear), that will be their option."

TNP will remain the source of power delivery, but the company

won't have a lock on negotiating power contracts for all of its customers. The customer will be able to go out and shop around for the best price, Warren said.

That prospect may be intimidating for many people, he acknowledged.

"We will have a huge education campaign ahead of us so that customers can form choices," Warren said.

Initially, TNP envisioned towns negotiating for their residents in a block, but since New Mexico municipalities don't regulate electric rates as they do in Texas, the plan includes individual customers.

"Nothing would preempt an individual from shopping on their own, but we believe residents will go through an aggregator," Warren said. An aggregator would gather groups of residents and companies by advertising and signing them up in a fashion similar to long distance telephone companies, he said.

Also, customers will have the choice of allowing TNP to continue to buy for them even at the end of the three-year period, he said.

"TNP will go out to the market

and on behalf of what I predict will be a fairly larger percentage initially, 50-75%," Warren said. "Those people are going to want to feel out this whole thing before they go out.

So TNP will have a fairly good (customer base) to go out and bid to the market, the same as they're doing now, buying their power on contract."

'Dirty' power must be offset by 'clean' stuff

Companies that purchase power from a dirty coal generator to save a penny will have to offset that emission with clean power or some other environmental offset, under the electric power deregulation plan.

Parties must agree to work toward a goal of 25% or greater reduction in atmospheric emissions, while retaining a substantial majority of the economic benefits to customers.

"We have to work out how compliance will be handled," New Mexico Public Utilities Commission Director Dave Warren said.

Other elements in the proposed agreement include:

— TNP will be required to restructure so that its transmission and distribution function is sepa-

rate from its power supply function;

— TNP will develop a program within one year to allow small commercial customers a chance to choose energy suppliers in an experimental program for both sides to gain some experience and learn before the three-year period is up;

"We've written in a lot of checks and balances," he said.

— and there will be no earnings cap for TNP.

Consumers shouldn't worry about that last provision, because it is based on a rate freeze for three years at 3% below the rate in December, Warren said.

If the company becomes more efficient during that period and reduces its operating costs, it will be able to keep its increased profit, he said.

Boy, 11, lost in Hale Lake area

A search was launched Tuesday evening for an 11-year-old boy who became separated from his father while hiking in the Hale Lake area a few miles southeast of Ruidoso Downs.

Information about the boy was sketchy Tuesday night. New Mexico State Police only knew the boy's first name, Robert, and the undersheriff said he may be from Louisiana.

The boy was described as being 5 feet tall and weighing 80 pounds. He was dressed in a green water-proof military jacket and was carrying food and water. He also was traveling with a dog, according to information from the Ruidoso Downs Police Department.

The boy was reported missing at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, about five hours after he was last seen by his father, law enforcement officials said.

Officers from the Downs, Ruidoso, sheriff's office and State Police were involved in the search Tuesday night in steady rain.

Commissioner has second thoughts about law change

After listening to the experts in Santa Fe Friday, Lincoln County Commissioner Wilton Howell has changed his mind about the state's 1995 Subdivision Act.

It's too late for a quick fix to undo the law in the current New Mexico state legislative session, the commissioner said. Besides, the act has more flexibility and allows more local control than he originally thought, Howell said.

The revelation came during a meeting of commissioners from all over the state at the Association of Counties. Howell came armed with a resolution urging the immediate modification of the subdivision act, with the backing of many local real estate agents.

"The proposals (one by the state association of home builders) to modify the subdivision law were worse than the original 1995 bill," Howell said. "The association is not going to support any change this year."

Howell said the association's opinion that it's too late to try to force a change in the law this year has the backing of commissioners William Schwettmann, L. Ray Nunley and Chairman Monroy Montes.

With an assembly of lawyers at the association session, including one from the attorney general's office, the meeting became an educational process, he said.

"We do have some tools in the current law to leave some autonomy to counties, more than I realized," Howell said. "It's not one shoe fits all, as I originally thought. We need to explore ways to make this law friendly for our people."

If modifications are to be made, the work should start now for next year, or the year after, he said.

Tuesday was Lincoln Co. War's 119th anniversary

Tuesday marked the 119th anniversary of the start of the Lincoln County War, and the 118th anniversary of the final murder of the War.

On Feb. 18, 1878 at approximately 5 p.m., John Tunstall was shot dead near present-day Glencoe. His death marked the start of the Lincoln County War.

Exactly one year to the day later, on Feb. 18, 1879, lawyer Huston Chapman was shot dead in the street in Lincoln. His death was the last official fatality of the most famous range war the Old West ever knew.

Campos was the object of a little ceremony in the Senate, in which he was given a fuzzy pink hand-puppet — a pig — to designate his "royal" status.

"May the pork be with you," Senate President Pro Tem Manny Aragon reportedly told Campos, playing on the frequently-invoked phrase from the movie "Star Wars."

At last count, Campos has introduced 69 bills calling for \$54 million in appropriations to pay for projects in "every small community" within his district.

For Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs alone, Campos has introduced at least six projects: a ballfield, youth center, water system and fire sta-

tion for Ruidoso; and a ballfield and sewer system for Ruidoso Downs.

Campos said he knows he won't get all the money he's requesting for all the projects, but it helps "establish a record of need in rural New Mexico." The bills involve not just state money but other funding sources, he added.

"My intent is to help smaller communities," Campos said. "We want to show the general public some of the unemployment figures in these sparsely populated areas, that the integrity of these small communities needs to be protected." In Ruidoso, for example, the racing industry is in jeopardy, Campos said.

State financial experts estimate there will be \$63 million available

for capital projects from severance tax revenues — those that come from the oil and gas and mining industries. They estimate there will

be another \$130 million for capital projects spending from the general fund, the budget for ongoing state expenses.







Public input sought by members of Solid Waste Authority

Ruidoso residents will have a chance next month to air complaints and praise for garbage collection in the village.

The governing board of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority voted unanimously Tuesday to allow its member entities to ask their residents for feedback.

The results of public hearings or surveys are to be brought back to the authority at its meeting March 18. Only Ruidoso officials indicated they definitely would hold a hearing.

The board consists of representatives of the county and its five municipalities. Ruidoso is the most heavily populated town in the authority and has the most members on the 11-member board. The group has come under fire in the past few years by some Ruidoso residents who contend the collec-

tion system has deteriorated.

Jim Miller, administrator of the Ruidoso campus of Eastern New Mexico University and consultant to the authority, questioned the timing of the hearing. He is compiling a study on the authority's operation, the type of services residents want and options for obtaining those goals.

It's important that the authority members show a united front to receive a \$183,000 loan from the state to pay off equipment debts and ease its financial situation, Miller said.

Ruidoso Village Councilor Robert Donaldson, who serves on the authority, said if residents want the village to collect its own garbage, that doesn't mean it would pull out of the authority or not use its landfill in Alamogordo.



EDITORIAL

Sometimes one must wonder about 'modern' education

A bit removed from the legislative lever that balances precariously on the Roundhouse in Santa Fe, it is difficult to fathom just what's going on with something called Senate Bill 155.

The sponsor, Sen. Pauline Eisenstadt, a Corrales Democrat, said she introduced the bill because the state Board of Education hadn't done its job. The job undone, it appears, was a board decision not to adopt National Academy of Science standards for the teaching of science in the state's public schools.

Those standards include the teaching of evolution in biology classes, something that presumably was settled once and for all in the public consciousness with the Scopes monkey trial of the 1920s.

Not so in New Mexico, apparently. In the Senate, the bill was approved by a 24-17 vote and sent along to the House of Representatives. What might happen in the august lower house is anybody's guess, but since the Senate historically in New Mexico has been more of a zoo than the House, presumably that body will give the bill a quick and unanimous passage and send it on to the governor.

If evolution remains an issue as the 20th Century stumbles into a new millennium, everybody in the country needs to look hard at public education. It obviously has lost its way. Not teach the glories of growth and change and adapting to change that has let *homo sapiens* raise his sights to the point he can walk on the Moon and reach for the stars? Not recognize that evolving brain power was a factor in Handel's "Messiah" as well as Einstein's theory of relativity?

Turn back the clock and the spirit of man to an age of superstition and dread?

The shock to us was that the Senate vote was along party lines; so political that President Pro Tem Manny Aragon had to ask whether Jesus Christ was a conservative or liberal (and nobody had an answer).

It's time to wake up, Santa Fe. Or maybe former Gov. Toney Anaya was right when he concluded a bit bitterly one time that New Mexico was a "banana republic."





STARDATE Signs of spring's approach are everywhere. Lengthening days and lingering twilight delay our skywatching until later in the evening, so the seasonal turning of the constellations seems to quicken. Orion marches westward. He looks smaller now that he's at his highest. In fact anything in the sky looks smaller when it's high up than when near the horizon. Most people are familiar with this effect in the case of the full moon, which seems to loom big when low and shrink when high.







State wrestling tourney bound to mature Warriors

Beavers pins down District 3AAA laurels

Senior heavyweight Brad Beavers of Ruidoso spinned and pinned his way to the District 3AAA title at the district tourney hosted by New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell Saturday.

Beavers improved to 21-5 overall by posting a 3-0 record Saturday. The Warrior recorded two pins on the way to the district championship.

The day wasn't as successful for the rest

of the Warriors. As a team, the young Ruidosoans finished fourth in the round robin event, going 0-4 in dual matches with NMMI, Santa Teresa, Cobre and Silver. Cobre's Indians outdistanced the rest of the competition to claim the District 3AAA team title with a 4-0 record. Silver was second at 3-1, while NMMI was third.

"I'm more excited than disappointed, just to know what we have coming back in the next two and three years," Ruidoso coach Jerrett Perry said. "We had some very inexperienced kids come through (this year)."

One of those inexperienced wrestlers is junior Johnny Adams, who is in his first

year of wrestling. It didn't slow him Saturday when he finished as the district runnerup in the 215-pound weight class.

"He's been a tremendous asset to us this year," Perry said of Adams.

Beavers and his teammates now focus their attention on the Class AAA State Wrestling Meet, which begins Friday at the Tingley Coliseum in Albuquerque.

Ruidoso leaves for the Duke City at 9 a.m. Thursday. Perry will attend a seeding meeting at noon, and the Warriors will practice at 6 p.m. Then, at 9:30 a.m. Friday, the two-day event begins.

Perry thinks Beavers should be seeded in the top three of the heavyweight divi-

sion. "Brad has a fantastic opportunity to place in the top three at state. If he plays his cards right, we feel he can be a state champion," Perry said.

Beavers played his cards right at the district meet. In his first match of the day against, Beavers avenged a previous loss to Santa Teresa's entry with a pin at the 1:25 mark of the first period. Beavers circled the Desert Warrior, setting him for one of Beavers' lateral drops. Beavers got the drop and then pinned the Santa Teresa wrestler.

Hot Springs dumps mistake-prone Warriors

The Warriors were their own worst enemy Friday in Truth or Consequences, committing 37 turnovers and shooting just 22% from the field. District 3AAA's second-place Hot Springs took advantage of the Ruidoso miscues and misfirings, and improved to 5-2 in the district with a 55-31 win.

Ruidoso's girls basketball team fell to 5-15 overall and 2-5 in the 3AAA.

"We didn't rebound well. We didn't shoot well. We just didn't perform," said Warrior coach Dwayne Rogers.

Rogers has the statistics to prove it.

The Warriors' leading scorers, Althea Palmer and Mandi Lewallen, had a mere six points each. Their leading rebounder was Jana Morris, a guard, with

four boards.

"The enemy is us, and that's easy to fix. It wasn't so much them, it was us. We just had way too many turnovers," Rogers said. "We just need to be the aggressor, and not wait to see what the other team will do to us."

Ruidoso has one more regular season game - Saturday at home versus Hot Springs - before beginning the District 3AAA tourney next week. As it looks now, the Warriors will finish in either third or fourth place, behind or ahead of Santa Teresa. A fourth-place finish means they travel to Desert Warriors. A third-place finish results in a first-round district tourney home game.

But before the Warriors look to the district tourney, they have plenty to do this week.

"I have a laundry list of things we need to do - work on our passing, head fakes, ball fakes. We telegraph everything. You can see it from the sidelines," Rogers said.

Ruidoso was on a roll of sorts in January. The Warriors were playing .500 basketball, picking up a pair of district wins. But since the start of February, it's been a different story.

"Right now it seems the girls are mentally tired. We need to get focused," Rogers said. "We're going to have some workouts this week and find out where our hearts are."

Second-place Grizzlies secure home court

For the first time in five years, Carrizozo's Grizzlies will be playing their first two district tourney games at home.

Gerald Horacek's boys clinched second place in the District 3A and the home court advantage with a 49-39 victory over Corona's basketball squad Thursday.

Fort Sumner finished the 3A campaign with an unblemished mark of 8-0 after downing the Grizzlies 55-44 on Valentine's Day.

Carrizozo, which has gone 6-6 since the new year, ends the regular season 9-12 overall and 5-3 in the 3A.

District tournament play begins at 6 p.m. Tuesday. Carrizozo welcomes Lincoln County cousin Corona, which finished 1-7 in the 3A.

Even though they already have a pair of victories over the Cardinals, Tuesday won't be easy, said Horacek.

If the Grizzlies win Tuesday, they will play the winner of Mountainair (4-4 in 3A) and Vaughn (2-6 in 3A) at 6 p.m. Thursday. Horacek described Mountainair as "one of the better teams around" when it's hot.

Horacek hopes the home court will give the Grizzlies an advantage both Tuesday and Thursday.

"We needed to get the home court if we want to get in the regionals," Horacek said.

The top two district 3A teams play in the Region D tournament.

The Grizzlies enter Tuesday's game coming off a loss to the Foxes. Fort Sumner held just a 48-42 lead with two minutes to go before pulling away and winning 55-44.

Grizzlies senior Willie Silva emerged from a four-game slump with 25 points to lead Carrizozo.

"The players sure would appreciate a good fan turnout Tuesday and Thursday," Horacek added.

The Capitan boys basketball team executed its game plan to perfection, and then executed a 79-69 victory over District 6AA powerhouse Tularosa Friday at the Wildcats' home court.

Junior Kris Davis scored 22 points and senior Cody Turnbow chipped in 21 to lead Capitan past Tularosa for the first time since both schools started playing Class AA ball.

Gerald Montes' Tigers outscored the ninth-ranked Wildcats 24-10 in the third quarter and hit 11 of 13 free throws in the final eight minutes to secure the upset victory.





How Not to Read

When reading, you should be seated at a desk in a comfortable chair, not lying on your stomach or your side. This is why reading in bed, a favorite pastime for millions, is almost never a good idea. Your back should have a normal curve of the spine, and not be scrunched or propped up with one arm. If continued long enough, especially by children, the reading position in bed becomes the normal one and sitting in a chair at a desk becomes normal. The visual system gets used to operating from a distorted perspective.

Now that we've got you in a chair, let's consider what kind it should be. It should permit the feet to be flat on the floor. If your feet do not touch, use a phone book under them. The lower back should be supported. The desk or table should be at waist level when the person is seated. Working at a surface that is too high gives a distorted view, much like you would get from watching a movie from the front row or far side. And we all know how uncomfortable that can be on your eyes. 


