Ruidoso post office boxes now have new zip code

Most Ruidoso residents will have to start filling out a pile of change-of-address forms if they want their zip codes to be accurate.

Effective this week, everyone who has a post office box also has a new zip code: 88355. The reason: Ruidoso is getting bigger. "I know change is hard, but it's a good sign of growth," Ruidoso Postmaster John Quemada said.

Ruidoso residents and second-home owners rent approximately 4,900 post office boxes. Another 3,000 people get mail delivered to cluster boxes near their homes; they get to keep the old zip code of 88345.

Ruidoso is running out of "plus four" numbers to use at the end of its lone zip code, and that is creating a problem for the Postal Service's automated sorting systems, Quemada explained. Thus, the need for a second zip code.

Ironically, oldtimers tell Quemada the new zip code isn't exactly new; 88355 once was the zip code for the now-defunct community of Hollywood. That area now is encompassed by Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, but the name has stayed alive in the name of the Ruidoso Post Office branch along U.S. Highway 70 West.

While it's a hassle to inform collectors and friends of a change of address, Quemada has some good news to go along with the bad: even if a long-lost friend writes you a decade from now and uses the old zip code, her letter will be delivered.

Commission extends Open Meetings Act to all organizations under its wing

All private or public organizations that use Lincoln County buildings and accept public money have to conduct their meetings in public and follow state rules for purchases.

That includes the county's senior citizens groups and volunteer fire departments.

In a special meeting Saturday, county commissioners unanimously approved a new law that requires compliance with the New Mexico Open Meetings Act. The law will take effect in 30 days.

Commissioners set the meeting on Saturday to accommodate State Rep. Dub Williams' schedule during the current legislative session, but the Republican from Glencoe did not attend the hearing in Ruidoso. Commissioners wanted him there to answer why he had not consulted them before introducing a bill that would exempt from the Open Meetings Act the local community board of the Lincoln County Medical Center and other similar boards. The hospital in Ruidoso is owned by the county and managed by Presbyterian HealthCare Systems based in Albuquerque.

Williams said early last week that he would not attend the meeting.

After Williams was criticized for introducing the exemption amendment to the Open Meetings Act, he narrowed the scope to the corporate board of

to abide by the act since the state attorney general's ruling last year that boards of public hospitals managed by private firms fall under the act's provisions. But she said board members find themselves squeezed between two laws, the Open Meetings Act and another law that requires them to keep confidential peer reviews of physicians and of employee performance evaluations.

Williams was in his office Tuesday afternoon, but his secretary said he was unavailable to talk to a reporter.

Commenting during the hearing Saturday were:

— Dr. W. Ray Seidel of Capitan, who said he has a problem with the idea of closing any of the meetings.

"I have a problem with that when my money is being used to run the operation," he said. "I should be allowed to go to the meetings." Williams should not have introduced such legislation, since he sits on both the local hospital board and the Presbyterian's corporate board in Albuquerque, Seidel said. No reason exists to keep people in the dark, he said. The county's three-year contract with Presbyterian expires in April, he said. It can be canceled with 180 days notice without penalties.

— Charlie Engle of Capitan, who said that any time public money is spent, the public should be included.

"I can understand exempting personnel issues, but the public should be involved if they are spending our money," he said.

— Paul Vordermann of Ruidoso, who supported the need for a local ordinance. He said the public isn't aware of some problems at the hospital, because the issues haven't been discussed in public by board members.


— E.J. Fouratt of Capitan, who pointed out voters approved more than \$1 million in special property taxes for the hospital last year and the commission agreed to come up with \$1.2 million for a hospital expansion project.

"The problem is that Dub Williams tried to slip this through the state Legislature and not let us know," Fouratt said. "Obviously, this is a Presbyterian bill and not a Lincoln County bill."

He suggested that Williams should not serve on the two hospital-related boards.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said members of the community hospital board are selected by vote of the center's board based on recommendations from the hospital administration. The

Businesses battle it out over property line dispute

A fight over a 20-foot section of land has twisted into a strange tale of parking rights and violence.

An ongoing saga since December, 1996, the slice of land has divided two local business owners as sharply as it divides their businesses. The parking area between The Ruidoso Store, 2501 Sudderth Drive, and Ruidoso Ski Rental, 2511 Sudderth Drive, is not only the root of a property line dispute, but also has led to alleged verbal and physical confrontations popping from the heated corn matts.

The heart of the matter lies in a mobile vending permit issued in March, 1994 to the corn roasting business, which allows the vendors to set up shop in the parking lot between the businesses. Village Planning Director Cleatus Richards said the permit was approved by the Planning and Zoning Commission after the existing use and the proposed use of the land was reviewed.

The latest chapter of the story starts Dec. 29, 1996, when roasted corn vendors Sheri O'Neill, 35, and Kevin O'Neill, 33, and Debi Jeter, 44, accused Ski Rental co-owner Joseph "Buddy" Carter, 65, of harassment.

The next turn in the tale took place Jan. 16, when corn vendor Sheri O'Neill filed harassment charges against Carter and harass-

ment and assault charges against Ruidoso Ski Rental manager Robert Houston, 42.

In a signed statement made to police, O'Neill said Carter had intimidated her by sitting in his running vehicle and shining his bright headlights on her while she stood in the lot. She further accused Houston of verbally threatening her. She claimed the entire incident caused her "emotional distress."

But charges filed that fateful day in January didn't stop there.

Another corn roaster employee, William Kelly, 29, is facing an assault and battery charge filed by Houston. Houston told police he was leaving the parking lot when Kelly rushed at his Jeep and punched him in the face through the open window.

Houston wound up facing more charges of his own before the day was over, though. The ski store

manager is charged with aggravated battery with a deadly weapon (his car). Kelly told police he was standing on the sidewalk near the parking lot exit when Houston struck him with his Jeep. Detective Wolfgang Born said Kelly may have been treated at Lincoln County Medical Center. A hospital spokesperson did confirm that Kelly was treated and released, but would not reveal the nature or severity of his injuries.

Adding yet another chapter, Houston is now in Lincoln County Jail awaiting a bond hearing on a felony charge of witness intimidation. The latest accusation stems from an alleged Feb. 25 confrontation between Houston and Kelly in the parking lot. Kelly told police that Houston repeatedly uttered the phrases "every dog has its day" and "I'm going to get you." The

Hospital board rejects closed meetings

Members of the Lincoln County Medical Center went on record last week that they did not lobby to be exempt from New Mexico's Open Meeting Act.

In a letter to the Lincoln County Commission, eight board members said they wanted to "alleviate fears we would not comply with the Act."

"First, we did not suggest, request nor lobby for any amendment to the act," the members said. They noted that several months ago after hearing from the state attorney general, they passed a resolution that meetings would be open to comply with the act, although they stated at the time they did not agree with his decision.

"Our meetings are open and we diligently strive to comply

with the act," the members said. "We invite all our citizens and you as commissioners to our meetings. We know, respect and request all our citizens input, insight and assistance."

When State Rep. Dub Williams (R-Glencoe) heard that board members did not want the exemption, he amended the bill he introduced so that it would exempt only corporate boards of firms managing hospitals or other public facilities, center board members noted.

"This board long ago realized that open meetings foster good communication and that good communication is the cornerstone or problem solving," the members wrote.

Commissioners rejected a separate invitation Saturday from Roger

Beechie of the hospital board for two commissioners to meet with three hospital board members to discuss the situation. Without a quorum from either board, the meeting would not fall under the requirements to be open to the public, Commission Chairman

Monroy Montes pointed out.

Commissioners said any such discussion should be in public. They said they would invite hospital board members to attend the next regular meeting or would call a special meeting.

commission used to name one commissioner as a member, but they "were not made to feel welcome," Montes said.

Nunley added that if commissioners become too aggressive on the board, Presbyterian has the option of dissolving the community board.

"Some very good people sit on

the board," Nunley said. "The public is not excluded from meetings. The problem is that items can be discussed in closed sessions."

Commissioners asked Morel for a complete list of all groups that fall under the new county law so that notices can be sent to the members.

face-off reportedly occurred the same day Houston appeared before Judge William Butts on the aggravated battery with a deadly weapon charge and was bound over for a district court hearing.

Judge gets a call

The yarn doesn't quit spinning there, though.

At 6:30 p.m. Feb. 25, the phone rang at Butts' home. When his wife answered she was greeted by the message "Rocki, I hope you realize you are living with a piece of (expletive)." Rocki Butts reportedly recognized the caller as Houston. A telephone harassment charge has been filed against Houston by the district attorney's office.

Houston and Bob Beauvais, attorney for C&C Sports, the parent of Ruidoso Ski Rental, said the whole mess started because of poor

surveying. Beauvais explained that over the years, the land at Sudderth and Eagle drives has been surveyed from different reference points.

"It lies on the edge of an old subdivision," he said. "It was originally platted to come all the way down to Sudderth as a street."

Parking problem

The squabble boils down to shared parking.

"The problem is whether those parking spaces count toward Morgan's parking or Buddy's parking," Beauvais said. "The Morgans count those spaces to get the corn kiosk... Buddy needs the parking because there is no on-the-street parking."

Beauvais said the nature of the ski rental business requires easy access for customers toting skis, poles and boots.

Susan Carter, who co-owns Ruidoso Ski Rental with her father

Joseph, said she is just sad to see the matter taken to such extremes.

"This just needs to be settled in court, either by the lawyers or by city officials. A mobile vending permit should have never been approved. Do you see any other mobile vendors? There's just not enough parking spaces there... It's just too bad it's gotten to this point."

Another key to the dispute is the orange cones the corn vendors have been placing in Ruidoso Ski Rental parking spots. Susan Carter said the corn sellers are using the cones to control the parking at her business, which was never authorized by the mobile vending permit.

Wayne Morgan would not comment.

The Carters may have few legal avenues to dispute the permit itself. Richards said they were given an opportunity to object when the permit was approved in March and did not. As far as the ongoing property dispute, Richards said the matter

is best left to litigation.

The book is far from closed, though.

Beauvais has vowed he and Houston will fight the aggravated assault charge and that the civil action over the property line will continue. One point of contention for Beauvais is that a conviction of aggravated assault requires specific intent to do bodily harm, which he asserts Houston did not have.

"We fully intend to defend the charges in district court," he said, adding that plea bargains will not be part of the plot in the story's continuation.

The tale will continue Wednesday in Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean Jr.'s courtroom in Carrizozo. Houston will appear before Dean for a preliminary hearing on the witness intimidation charge. Butts has excused himself from the proceedings because of the phone call allegedly made to his home.

County seeks grants for Glencoe Center

The next phase of construction at the Lincoln County Rural Events Center in Glencoe may be a major investment for federal and local governments.

The county commission Saturday voted 3-2 to apply for a \$1,034,000 grant from the federal Rural Business Enterprise grant program.

The county already received \$250,000 from the New Mexico Legislature to acquire the former horse sales barn about 12 miles east of Ruidoso. Another \$40,000 was allocated for improvements at the same time, about three years ago. Last year, a \$130,000 grant was awarded to the county for construction of an outdoor arena.

County Manager Frank Potter said a covered arena has been planned for the center since it was purchased.

County Commissioner Bill Schwettmann, who opposes the

Glencoe project and spending county money on an enterprise that may be in competition with private arenas, questioned center manager Linda Wallace on how the county expects to fulfill a required \$414,000 match for the grant.

The match is mostly a paper exchange, Wallace said. Potter broke down what the county could offer as a match as: \$100,000 in site preparation with county road department equipment, the land's value, the last \$130,000 grant, \$20,000 in equipment, a \$40,000 reserve that many never be used for contingencies and a \$50,000 reserve for miscellaneous expenses. The only real up-front cash will be spent on architectural fees for the project, he said.

"If we apply and don't like what we get or the terms, we can reject it," Chairman Monroy Montes said. But he didn't convince Schwettmann and Commissioner Rex Wilson, who voted against the grant application.

In other business Saturday at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center, commissioners:

- followed a recommendation from the planning and zoning board by denying a request to remove a plat restriction on shared wells requested by four affected lot owners in Magado Creek Estates.

- split 2-2 on a request by Ranches of Sonterra Subdivision to move an intersection of Santiago Drive and Tierra Nueva Drive and grant a variance on the steepness of the roads as they approach the intersection. Schwettmann abstained because he surveyed for the project.

- awarded a construction con-

tract for expansion of the Carrizozo Health Clinic to White Sands Construction Co. of Alamogordo for \$466,000, the low bid out of 12 submissions.

- approved the low bid of \$83,855 from Sullivan Dental of Albuquerque for the Carrizozo Health Clinic's dental equipment.

- and voted unanimously to transfer a new \$65,000 ambulance from the Alto emergency medical site to Carrizozo in exchange for an older unit from Carrizozo. The Alto group says the new ambulance doesn't fit well in the building where it stays between calls, among other problems, Commissioner L. Ray Nunley related.

D.A. supports prisoners in homes

District Attorney Scot Key urged Lincoln County commissioners Saturday to lighten the load at the county jail by letting inmates stay at home with ankle monitors.

Commissioners told county detention center administrator Wayland Hill to come back with a breakdown and recommendation March 11 on the program best suited to the county.

Although the 48-capacity jail in Carrizozo has been running 90% full, local judges have pinpointed only three people as eligible, Hill said.

But Key said the program, which uses a radio monitoring device attached to an offender's ankle, could be effective with some juveniles, DWI offenders and others convicted of non-violent crimes. He demonstrated the equipment for commissioners and said one person would be needed to handle about 10 inmates.

"Wayland couldn't do it," Key said. "He has too many things to do and so do the people on jail duty. But you don't need a certified police officer and you probably have somebody available who could get at a low cost."

The system is used in nearly every county in the state, he said. Key wants to offer input about criteria and requirements for eligibility. The program saves money by not having to care for some inmates in jail and by avoiding costly lawsuits filed by disgruntled jail inmates, he said.

Those being monitored are expected to pay some of the

expense, he said. Otero County, which has used the program for the past two years, has saved \$284,000 (in the cost of jail care) over expenses and has collected \$12,000 from the offenders, Key said.

While a local person is necessary to verify the location of offenders' bases as far away as California can back up monitor an offender for \$5 to \$7 a day and notify the county if the radio signal is interrupted or coming from outside the prisoner's home.

Dora married Leland Cullen Fellows of Stillwater, Okla. in 1925. Along with the Lewis family they moved to Roswell to open the Roswell Cotton Oil

Mill, Lewis as manager and Fellows as bookkeeper.

Dora married a second time on March 22, 1936, to Thomas Truman Sanders of Donna, Texas. Truman was a practicing attorney in Donna. At the onset of World War II, Mrs. Sanders moved the family to Roswell. The couple divorced in 1968.

On Nov. 22, 1970, Dora was married to Brig. General John Perrill McKnight (Ret), a lawyer from Auburn, Neb. They divided their time between Auburn, Key Biscayne, Fla., and Ruidoso. He died Sept. 1, 1979.

But not all ceiling fans are reversible and not all reversible fans are made for winter use. Inexpensive fans may look good when new, but after continued use will become noisy, wobbly and quickly wear out.

Questions you always want to ask when purchasing a ceiling fan is the motor size. A large motor makes for longer life, greater efficiency and better air circulation. Also important is the pitch of the blades, the angle of the blades is also an indicator of the quality. The greater the pitch the more powerful the motor. Just because the blades spin fast does not mean there is great air movement.

When shopping for a fan most will visit many home centers and showrooms before making a decision. Always try the product you're interested in before buying it. Turn it on, feel the air movement on all speeds. If you can't feel the air movement, don't buy it. Try before trying it. After all, you would never buy a car before you test drove it. A ceiling fan too is an investment, and if you choose a good one it will last a lifetime. 



EDITORIAL

Let's go for some old-fashioned participatory democracy in March

Civic concerns ranging from water to garbage to term limits for appointed boards and commissions will be up for public discussion this month, as Ruidoso's Village Council invites residents to sound off at a series of public meetings.

First up, next Monday at 6 p.m., will be a session at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center focusing on a messy problem — the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority and how it functions, or doesn't.

The issue is not simply one of "throw the rascals out" because the SWA is a multi-headed entity serving the county and all the villages in it. But almost every SWA board member is an elected municipal or county official or hired hand from one village or another, which may be at the root of the problem. Politicians are expected (as they used to say on the Grand Ole Opry) "to dance with them as brung 'em." And Ruidoso has the most board members, but doesn't have a majority vote.

Complicating the issue, of course, is federally mandated rules, and the expensive solution we live with—hauling the whole county's solid waste to a single site near Orogrande, south of Alamogordo in Otero County. Original bylaws also may be a problem.

Ruidoso has a valuable resource in its population of experts (perhaps retired, but nevertheless, experts), and somebody just might come up with some credible solutions. We need them.

Something similar might be said about hearings scheduled on March 25 as part of the Village Council meeting beginning at 6:30 p.m.

A conflict in two water rules will be considered, and perhaps resolved. The issue is that it's OK to credit water bills when leaks have been discovered and fixed — but not during a water shortage. Despite the view from your living room window, water conservation rules remain in effect.

The other hearing will concern limiting terms for appointed civic boards and commissions for the sake of uniformity. Two terms of two years, maximum, has been suggested as a standard. But with such things as planning and zoning, it sometimes takes years to figure out the ordinances. Expect some discussion.

So here are three issues that will benefit from some major citizen input, which is what democracy is all about.

POLICY

Pull together for LCSWA

TO THE EDITOR:

I was elected to the Lincoln County Commission in 1988 and served one two-year term. I am partly responsible for the establishment of the present Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority and believe there is great hope in the system. However, it is based on the concept of "we're in this together" so I wish Ruidoso would use their controlling power to promote better service for all of Lincoln County.

When we took office, Ruidoso was operating a landfill on Airport Road. The county owned the land, but had given it to Ruidoso to operate a landfill where Ruidoso, the county, and anyone else could deposit trash. Less than six months after our election, a new federal law came to New Mexico regarding landfills. Basically, the law stated that anyone who was operating a landfill could be responsible for millions of dollars unless they closed within 30 days, and all landfills operating after that had to be licensed and regulated... another major expense.

Ruidoso's response to the new law was, "Lincoln County, here's your land back, we're out of here. We're hauling our trash to Roswell." Capitan was devastated. Carrizozo was being "raped" by a private company. And without a landfill, the county had no place to take the trash from Corona, Hondo, Alto, etc. We were all in a quandary. The sud-

den change in law was going to place prohibitive costs on garbage collection and disposal, especially to rural communities and counties like Lincoln where the population is sparse but the land is plentiful!

After 16 months of concerted effort and great deliberation, we determined that the solution to the problem was a "united effort." We had to own a landfill or be at the mercy of someone else, which was potentially very scary! Thus, the joint efforts of Lincoln County and Otero County and the common ownership of a landfill. To my knowledge this has worked well, and our profitable ownership of the landfill may help offset losses in collection service revenues. OUR landfill serves Holloman, Alamogordo, Tularosa, Lincoln County, etc. and our dumping costs are nothing.

The LCSWA also receives all revenues from collection services. So if revenues are down in one area, they may be up in the other. However, the LCSWA means "all of Lincoln County." The revenues supporting the "Authority" are based on the entire population of Lincoln County. Without the whole county, the expense of operating trash collection may be too great for any one entity and only the LCSWA receives the benefits of ownership in the landfill. To my knowledge, no one municipality or entity may receive free dumping — just the LCSWA.

Since Ruidoso was "paying out the ying-yang" for hauling trash to Roswell while the costs

of dumping kept rising, and since all of the rural areas surrounding Ruidoso were looking at paying private companies to haul and deposit the trash, LCSWA was established to keep Lincoln County working together and in control of costs. Let's do it!

Ex-teacher Williams brings education to legislative floor

As the New Mexico Legislature convened this session, Rep. Dub Williams (R-Glencoe) put the Santa Fe spotlight on some Lincoln County school districts.

Williams, a retired teacher, sponsored a slew of bills aimed at education this term, with at least six of them pointed at the pocket-books of Ruidoso, Corona, Carrizozo, Capitan and Hondo Valley schools.

Ruidoso

If one of Williams' bills passes, the Ruidoso School District could find itself on the receiving end of \$150,000. Williams has targeted \$50,000 to go to the district's Parents as Teachers program and \$100,000 to go to the Gavilan Adolescent Day Treatment Center.

Ruidoso Superintendent Mike Gladden said the Parents as Teachers program can jump start a child's education. The 2-year-old program sends a teacher to the homes of local children before they enroll in school. The visits provide parents with games and activities that stimulate their child's intellectual development and model parenting skills. Gladden said the bill's passage would "allow us to do it the way

it's supposed be done and really enhance our (Parents as Teachers) program."

The Gavilan Adolescent Day Treatment Center, founded three years ago, strives to help students' transition to the educational environment. Gladden said the center serves students with special needs, such as drug and alcohol or behavioral problems, who "do not fit, at that time, in the regular education program."

"Sometimes, their situations really limit their ability to cope with the regular education environment," he said. "The center, hopefully, will redirect where they're going."

Corona

In Corona, Williams is asking lawmakers to issue \$433,450 in bonds for the design and construction of a new gymnasium, and furnishings for that new facility, and a new vehicle to transport students to and from activities. Corona Superintendent Bob Richardson could not be reached for comment on the bill or the project.

Carrizozo

Traveling to the county seat, \$103,000 in bonds is on Williams' agenda for improvements and remodeling of the

Carrizozo schools library and multi-purpose room.

Carrizozo Superintendent Paula Papponi said the library is used by students ranging in age from pre-kindergarten to high school seniors, as well as the entire Carrizozo community. One of the top priorities, she said, is bringing the library technology into step.

"Our library is very antiquated," Papponi said. "We're still using the old card catalogs."

By bringing the library technology up to date, Papponi said the school can better prepare students for success in college libraries. The money also would help pay for furniture, basic site improvements, and of course, books.

The multi-purpose room also is used by students and community members of all ages. Papponi said the room plays host to a variety of activities, ranging from private dance classes to science fairs, and also offers a warm place for students to come in from the cold before the school day begins.

In her opinion, both projects are seriously overdue. "Neither one of these rooms has been addressed in 30 years," Papponi added.

Carrizozo also is hoping the seeds Williams has planted for its

garden project will blossom with \$10,000 in state funding. The project would create an outdoor classroom made up of various gardens. She also said the garden project would help beautify the community. The garden idea has grown with the help of grants and in-kind contributions, but Papponi said a start-up budget from the state will help it flourish.

Hondo Valley

Hondo Valley schools also are part of Williams' attention in the Legislature. He is asking for \$103,000 in bonds for repairs to the schools' heating system. Hondo Valley Superintendent Barbara Casey said the heating systems are in serious need of repair.

"It's been here since we rebuilt the school after the fire in 1982," she said. "We have virtually no air conditioning in the summer; in the winter the thermostats don't work so it's either extremely hot or extremely cold."

Capitan

Keeping Capitan school computers current also caught Williams' eye. The state lawmaker is asking his fellow legislators to approve \$200,000 in bonds to help upgrade the schools' old

computers and buy new ones, as well as pay for training. The bill is a sweeping measure meant not only to buy new computers, but to upgrade existing computers and network them together, explained Capitan Superintendent Diana Billingsley. She said the goal is to put a computer on every teacher's desk and to train the staff on how to use them effectively.

"This is a comprehensive bill, it's not just buying computers," Billingsley said.

But Billingsley isn't confident that the bill is high on the lawmakers' list. She said she was in Santa Fe last Thursday when the matter was tabled. "I got the impression it's not going to be a high priority," she said.

Williams did not return phone calls made to his office.





Money matters: How much, for whom?

Here's a breakdown of what Rep. Dub Williams is hoping to achieve for Lincoln County school districts. As of Monday, all the bills were under review by the House Tax and Revenue Committee.

House Bill 230 — The bill seeks \$150,000 in appropriations from the state education department's 1998 fund for the Ruidoso School District's Parents as Teachers program (\$50,000) and the Gavilan Adolescent Day Treatment Center (\$100,000).

HB 232 — Williams also has asked legislators to approve \$120,000 in severance tax bonds to install lighting at the Ruidoso recreation complex. The rec area is a collaborative effort of the school district and the village, which is funded by a \$1 million bond issue approved by voters in August, 1995. Superintendent Mike Gladden said the bonds were not enough to pay for lighting on fields, so the money is being sought at the state level. The recreation complex is currently under construction and is slated for an April 1 grand opening and dedication.

HB 423 — The bill seeks \$433,450 in severance tax bonds

for the design, construction and furnishing of a new gymnasium for Corona schools. Five thousand dollars is slated for the purchase of satellite television equipment, \$402,700 for the design and construction of the gym complete with showers, and \$27,500 for the purchase of a vehicle to take students to and from activities.

HB 738 — The bill seeks \$10,000 in severance tax bonds for the Carrizozo School District's garden project.

HB 417 — The bill seeks \$103,000 in severance tax bonds for revamping of the Carrizozo schools library and multi-purpose room. Of that \$103,000, \$85,000 is targeted for furnishing, equipping, remodeling and improving the gym, and \$18,000 is allotted for the multi-purpose room.

HB 415 — The bill seeks \$100,500 in severance tax bonds for repairs and improvements to the Hondo Valley Schools heating systems.

HB 228 — The bill seeks \$200,000 in tax severance bonds for computer purchases, upgrades and training for the Capitan School District.

Eagles fly to District 5A title

With seven seconds left in the District 5A title game and his best free-throw shooter stepping to the line, Hondo coach Omar Barragan could smile - finally.

The Hondo Eagles put away a never-say-die Hagerman Bobcat team for the District 5A title Saturday in Hondo, but not after building a 27-point lead and then squandering it all in a matter of two quarters.

The win means the Hondo Eagles play host to the Region D Boys Basketball Tournament for the first time in the school's history, this Friday and Saturday.

"We came out just a little flat, a little tired in the third quarter, but I felt confident all the way that we would hold them off," Barragan said.


Barragan's facial expressions throughout the second half seemed to contradict his post-game confidence, however.

It wasn't until sophomore Josh Candeleria pushed the Eagle lead to 75-66 with seven seconds left that Barragan cleared his bench, and the celebration in the valley began.

As they have all season, the Hondo fans embraced the Eagles after the victory and joined the team on the floor for the championship trophy presentation.

It looked as though officials could have made the trophy presentation at halftime after Hondo outscored the Bobcats 31-7 in the second quarter for a 43-20 half-time advantage.

"We basically just turned it loose. Jared DeBaca took the lead, and we were playing good team ball," Barragan said of the

Eagles' outburst in the second quarter.

Hondo bumped the lead to 27 to open the third quarter, but then the Bobcats started lighting it up from the outside and tightening it up on the defensive side.

Hagerman pressed full court, and hit three-pointer after three-pointer to cut the lead. Hondo led 50-32 with 4:22 left in the third quarter. Back-to-back three-pointers, a old-fashioned three-point play by Eddie Peralta, and yet another Isaac Acosta three-point bomb trimmed the advantage to 54-45 in just three minutes. The Bobcats pulled within seven points on Peralta's bucket.

DeBaca's two free throws with a minute left in the quarter

stopped the Hagerman run. And the senior point guard went on a run of his own in the final minute, nailing a three-pointer and two of three charity shots. That pushed the Eagle lead back to double digits, 61-48, as the two teams headed into the final eight minutes.

Hondo maintained at least a seven-point lead throughout the fourth quarter. The Bobcats had a chance when DeBaca - Hondo's best ballhandler - fouled out with three minutes to go. But Hagerman couldn't capitalize, in part because the Eagles' Adam Herrera and Candeleria stepped up, Barragan said.

All of which contributed to Barragan's smile at the end.

Tiger senior's twist could affect team's fate in regionals

Capitan's hopes to advance to the Class AA Boys State Basketball Tournament took a turn for the worse Sunday when senior Cody Turnbow twisted his ankle in a pick-up basketball game.

The Tigers might have to play without their leading scorer on the floor when they face Lordsburg in the semifinals of the Region G Tournament Friday in Tularosa. The top two teams from the region advance to the state tournament.

"He said he's going to play, but I doubt it," Capitan coach Gerald Montes said. Turnbow missed school Monday because of the injury, and showed up on crutches Tuesday.

The mishap has Montes tinkering with his lineup. He and assistant coach Chad Ghormley have three days to figure out who is going to play where.

Any one of three players could move into the starting rotation if Turnbow can't play Friday. Junior Jason Montes, sopho-

more Raymond Harris and freshman James Robinson could get the call to fill Turnbow's shoes. Sophomore point guard Garydon Silva might find himself filling Turnbow's wing position should Robinson get the nod at point guard.

"I don't know if we can absorb his 14 or 15 points. We're going to play it by ear," Montes said of Turnbow's contribution.

The potential loss of Turnbow makes the play of Kris Davis the center of attention. The 6-foot, 6-inch junior center must have a big night offensively and defensively against Lordsburg.

"The big thing is, Kris Davis has to have a big game against their big kid (Michael Ellwood). He is a genuine post player. He's a senior and he knows how to play it."

But Ellwood has a tendency to go for blocked shots, and he gets in foul trouble, Montes said.

Be assured that the Tigers' Davis will spend the week of practice faking the ball to the hole.

Capitan must contain Ellwood and Ruben Mendoza, a 6-2 forward, to have a chance, even with Turnbow, Montes said. Ellwood averages 20.5 points a game, while Mendoza scores at a 19.5 clip.

Lordsburg defeated Animas 65-51 to win the District 5AA crown. Coach Rick McBroom's crew favors "in your face" man-to-man defense. Lordsburg will play some 1-3-1 zone also.

Before Turnbow's twist of fate, Montes felt confident of his team's chances against the District 5AA champ because of the results from a common opponent, Hatch Valley. Lordsburg lost to Hatch Valley by four points earlier in the season. Capitan has defeated Hatch two of three times this season.

Now the question remains if the young Tigers can handle the potential loss of their floor leader.

"That's the biggest concern. You know he always throws the ball in for us and he's one of our best ballhandlers," Montes said of Turnbow. Turnbow says that won't be necessary. He'll play Friday. "He won't be 100%, but I'd take him 75% or 80%," Montes said. "If he's ready Friday, he's ready. If not, the Tigers still have to come ready to play."

Capitan will have a couple of advantages Friday. It's used to the Tularosa gym, and it's only an hour drive for the Tigers. Lordsburg will have a 3.5 hour drive to Tulle.

Still, the Tigers' fate lays firmly in their own hands, Montes believes. "Are we going to show up, or are we not going to show up," Montes said. "That's the question."





or other similar entity, the legal rate shall be quoted separately than that for routine legal services. The complex litigation fee shall include but is not limited to hourly rate for legal services, para legal, mileage for out-of-town travel, not to exceed the municipal utility's per diem rate without the approval of the Board of Directors.

With consideration to the above, the sealed proposals shall set forth the following:
1. The hourly rate for routine legal services for attorney, together with hourly charges for complex legal services, including charges for fractional portions of an hour.
2. A detailed description of the firm's experience in local government and state regulatory boards, and knowledge of the natural gas industry, if any, and identification of the person or persons within the firm who will be primarily responsible for Captain-Carrizo Natural Gas representation and that person's relevant experience in government, if any.
3. A detailed description of office facilities and support staff resources.
4. A sample contract the applicant would offer to Captain-Carrizo Natural Gas in the event applicant is the successful proposal.
5. List of references that the municipal utility would be free to contact. (minimum of three).
6. Acknowledgement of receipt of any and/or all attachments.

All proposals will be evaluated on a 100 point scale as follows:
25 points allowed for hourly rate of routine legal services as outlined above.
25 points allowed for rate of complex legal services as outline above.
30 points allowed for experience as legal counsel for local government and knowledge of natural gas industry.
20 points allowed for office facilities and support staff.

All applicants must be licensed to practice law in the State of New Mexico.

The Captain-Carrizo Natural Gas reserves the right to reject any and all proposals and waive any formalities as deemed in the best interest of the municipal utility.

The Captain-Carrizo Natural Gas reserves the right to analyze and propose the proposals for thirty (30) days in which time the municipal utility may negotiate terms with attorneys who submit proposals.

The contract period will be for one year. This contract shall be subject to renewal annually for a period of three (3) years unless terminated by either party by giving thirty (30) days written notice.
