



Fatal crash claims two in Hondo

Two Hondo residents died Sunday in a car crash on U.S. 70 not far from their homes.

Louisa M. Salas, 75, and Carlos M. Sanchez, 78, died a few hours after colliding with another vehicle in the Hondo Valley area, according to a report filed by State Police Officer Chris Rutten.

Salas was listed as the driver of a 1984 Subaru heading east on U.S. 70. Sanchez was her passenger.

Terry Haley, 43, of Roswell, driving a 1991 Oldsmobile, also was going east, Rutten wrote.

Salas slowed for a left-hand turn. Haley, who was behind Salas, apparently did not see her car before it struck the back of Salas's vehicle, the officer stated.

No liquor was involved in the accident and seat belts were in use, the report indicated.

Alto petitioners seek retention of volunteer EMS

County's plan to contract with Ruidoso emergency services unit draws fire

Some Alto residents are circulating petitions asking the Lincoln County Commission to reconsider its decision to switch from a local volunteer medical emergency group to a service based in Ruidoso.

Alto resident Elizabeth Babcock said she and others have been walking house-to-house asking residents to sign the petition. In two days, 244 signatures were collected.

At issue is the response time to emergency calls for life-threatening conditions such as heart attacks, Babcock said.

"There's no other basis," she said. "I have no disagreement (with Ruidoso emergency medical services). I'm sure the Ruidoso EMS is good."

If commissioners station an emergency medical technician in Alto as an adjunct to the volunteer fire department that would satisfy her, Babcock said.

"All we're doing is trying to get help for people," she said. "This is mainly a community of older people. If there is someone close, I'd have no objection and I don't think the people who have signed the petition would either."

Commissioners are scheduled Thursday to review a proposed contract with Ruidoso EMS, managed through the Lincoln County Medical Center by Presbyterian Health Care

Services.

The meeting, which begins at 9 a.m. at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center, will replace the commission's regular meeting in June.

Commissioners have said a paid service would ensure a more consistent response to emergency calls. Volunteers have jobs or other pursuits that might delay or prevent them from responding to calls, commissioners contend.

Connie Hopper, director of county emergency services, presented figures that indicated Alto volunteers were responding to fewer than half of the calls received. As back up, the Ruidoso EMS ends up taking those calls, she said.

Volunteers have disputed the figures, saying they responded to 97% of the calls.

"I didn't base my decision on the figures presented by (Hopper), but because I believe it will provide better service," said Commissioner Wilton Howell.

Jim Stover, director of the Ruidoso EMS, said it would cost the county \$20,000 for his group to cover Alto and pockets of county land around the village.

But volunteers say the price tag will be much higher.

In fliers handed out to Alto residents, they contended that besides the \$20,000, the county would lose \$5,000 in state

County officials' pay on Thursday agenda

• The public will have one last shot to express opinions on raises for elected Lincoln County officials.

The issue of raises for Lincoln County elected officials has been placed on the agenda of the County Commission meeting at 9 a.m. Thursday in Carrizozo.

"I had it pulled out of the budget to be considered separately," Commissioner Wilton Howell said Monday.

"I don't feel comfortable giving raises to elected officials when we will be ending the year with less money to carry forward

than anticipated," he said. "I consider that a deficit."

"Commissioners passed a resolution earlier this month asking the state Department of Finance and Administration to approve the lowest possible tax rate (because of a county-wide re-evaluation that increased the taxable property value by 20%), and then we bring up a budget with 10% raises for elected officials."

"If people are alarmed at a bunch of elected officials voting themselves raises, they should show up for the meeting. The item is one of the first on the agenda."

The increase would mean \$1,000 extra a year for commissioners, who are paid \$10,500, and about \$3,000 for other elected officials, who earn from \$30,130 to

\$31,510 a year. It would be the first raise for officials in about seven years and would include increases for their chief deputies, who earn 87% of their bosses' salaries. The increase would fall below the maximum of \$5,007 allowed under the county's new classification, which is pinned to its higher taxable property values.

The cost to the county for raises for elected officials and their chief deputies would be \$33,687.

County Clerk Martha Proctor has pointed out that, although elected officials knew what their salaries were when they ran for offices, most people would expect a raise if they stay in a position eight years and think they have done a good job.

Ruidoso councilor, brother of victim, gets close view of McVeigh trial

• Ruidoso Village Councilor Frank Cummins says he and his family are comforted by the strong case against the defendant.

Before the Timothy McVeigh trial even began, the chief prosecutor assured Frank Cummins that McVeigh would be found guilty.

That assurance from prosecutor Joseph Hartzler has been a comfort to Cummins, whose younger brother Richard was killed in the explosion two years ago in Oklahoma City.

"And this was a year ago that he told me this," said Cummins, a Ruidoso village councilor.

As a family member of one of the bombing's victims, Cummins has observed the live telecast of the Denver trial of McVeigh from a special courtroom in Oklahoma City.

"There were so many families who wanted to go," Cummins said.

The Denver courtroom has

only 24 seats available each day. Despite a drawing which has allowed certain family members to attend portions of the trial, many more wanted to view the proceedings, he said.

The solution, an Oklahoma City extension of the Denver courthouse, allows up to 300 family members of the victims to view the trial from a big screen television, Cummins said.

The rules are the same as if they were at the Denver trial. For instance, everyone stands when the jury gets up to leave the room, he said.

He has been to the Oklahoma City courtroom twice and was watching when Jennifer McVeigh testified, providing a motive for McVeigh to blow up the federal building.

Cummins also was watching when his brother's boss testified, saying he had just completed a meeting with Richard Cummins when the bomb eradicated all but a few feet of his office.

Richard Cummins, 55, was a senior inspector for the U.S. Department of Agriculture, where he had worked for 33

years. He spent most of his time either working out of his home or visiting farms, and usually only went into the office on Fridays, Cummins said. The week of the bombing, though, Richard Cummins went in to work on Wednesday, probably because he would be traveling to Ruidoso later in the week, Cummins said.

"In fact, he was supposed to come down here for a reunion when he was killed I had reservations for him."

His brother was reportedly on his way out of the building when the explosion occurred, Cummins said. The family wasn't certain he had been in the building at the time. It was only when his brother's son found Richard Cummins' car in the building's parking lot that they realized he may have been a victim, Cummins said.

Even so, the family thought Richard Cummins may be one of those to be pulled out alive from the rubble.

"We still had hope because they were finding survivors







money and \$30,000 for revenue collected from their volunteer group handling the calls.

They also noted that for the \$20,000, the Ruidoso EMS will:

- respond from the hospital area to Alto as they do it called now;
- still rely on volunteers to provide first response to calls, similar to the existing system, except residents will have to wait for the Ruidoso ambulance to arrive to transport the patient;
- and will bill Alto residents for its service at Ruidoso's fee structure, not the county's.

In the fleet, they also contend Ruidoso will not station an ambulance in the Alto area or decrease response time to Alto.

"The commissioners are citing that this is an attempt to provide 'better managed care' for the Alto area," they wrote. "It appears to be the 'status quo.'"

In a separate position statement prepared by the volunteers, they also pointed out that while they respond from nearby Sun Valley Fire Station, the Ruidoso EMS would come from the hospital in Ruidoso; that the new system would mean the dissolution of the volunteer group; and that a first responder may not have the training of an emergency medical technician (EMT) and cannot transport a patient.

In contrast, the volunteers wrote that Alto EMTs stabilize a patient on the scene and then transport them to the hospital, unless advance life support is needed. Then they arrange to transfer a patient to the Ruidoso ambulance enroute.

LCMC's parent extends its reach

Presbyterian moves to acquire health maintenance organization serving 58,000 members.

Presbyterian Healthcare Services and California-based PacifiCare Health Systems Inc. signed an agreement last week to develop and operate PacifiCare's HMO, Secure Horizons, in New Mexico and El Paso, Texas.

Presbyterian, which manages the Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso, will acquire FHP of New Mexico from PacifiCare, and will provide managed care services for its 58,000 commercial and Medicare members.

The transaction is subject to the approvals of several federal and state regulatory agencies and is expected to be final

within the next 90 days.

"We look forward to offering Secure Horizons to Medicare beneficiaries throughout New Mexico," said Jim Hinton, president and chief executive officer of Presbyterian. "We are impressed with the success of Secure Horizons in Massachusetts."

The acquisition will allow Presbyterian to deliver a broader range of services to its customers, he said. The agreement will increase health care choices for FHP members without requiring a change in benefits, physicians or hospitals, he said.

FHP of New Mexico employs 160 people and Presbyterian has about 6,000 employees. FHP positions previously shifted from New Mexico to Colorado Springs will come back to New Mexico, Hinton said.

Presbyterian is the state's largest private, not-for-profit health care organization providing New Mexicans with health insurance, home care, rehabilitation and primary, acute and long-term care. Its statewide delivery system includes 10 hospitals, some outpatient centers and integrated physician groups.

Presbyterian Health/Plan, the organization's managed care company, covers more than 165,000 individuals in all 33 New Mexico counties. It has contracts with 1,519 physicians, more than half of all licensed physicians in the state. It contracts with most of the state's 32 hospitals.

PacifiCare is one of the nation's leading managed health care services companies, serving 4 million members in 14 states and Guam.

three days afterwards," Cummins said.

Richard Cummins' body wasn't recovered, though, until more than a week after the explosion on April 19, 1995, Cummins said.

Richards Cummins left a wife, Frances, two daughters and a son.

Now the family and Cummins take comfort in the belief that McVeigh will be found guilty. His mother, who lives in Tucson, was concerned for some time that McVeigh's trial would be another repeat of the Simpson trial.

"But I really feel confident that they are going to get him.

And I think it's the just thing to do," Cummins said.

Cummins said he and his mother would like to see McVeigh receive the death penalty, which is an uncharacteristic opinion for either of them because neither is a proponent of the death penalty. But the crime, which included the destruction of a nursery, was so heinous that it justifies the death penalty, he said.

Other victim's families feel the same. He has sat with between 100-200 of them at the Oklahoma City courtroom watching the trial. Some of them cry while watching the

trial, he said. And some of them are at the trial everyday, such as his brother's wife, Frances.

Cummins said he was amazed at the number of people in Oklahoma City who are not family members of the bombing victims, yet feel that their lives were harmed by the bombing.

Twice when talking about the trial, the bombing and his brother, Cummins becomes choked up and has to stop to compose himself.

"He was one of the best people you would ever meet."



Village approves austere 1997-98 budget

The Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday night approved a 1997-98 budget of \$20.8 million, a reduction of about 22% from the current budget.

No tax increases accompany the new budget. To accommodate the squeeze, the budget has been trimmed of capital purchases in departments where revenue sources are not designated.

"I think this is going to be a very critical year. And I think that we have made some cuts now, but...there are more cuts that need to be made," said Village Manager Gary Jackson.

"We have a fundamental

difference between our needs and where our revenues are. We have to reassess the expenditures..."

Though about 20 people attended the hearing on the village's budget, only one man spoke. Ruidoso resident Al Junge applauded the Council and village staff on their work. He also encouraged them to consider attrition as another way to reduce the budget.

An anticipated drop in gross receipts (sales tax) revenue is the primary reason for the shrunken budget. Gross receipts revenue represents 55.5% of the village's revenue.

Despite the recently increased property values about the county, Ruidoso's res-

idents overall will not be paying more taxes at the current village property tax rate because of a state formula. The yield control formula limits the amount of revenue that an entity may generate from higher property values.

The village's current operation portion of the property tax rate is 6.368 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value, but would drop to an estimated 4.893 cents for homes and 5.577 for businesses, village officials said.

The debt portion of the village property tax rate is 0.31 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value, but would drop to an estimated 8.2 cents, officials said.



OUR OPINION

Quality comes first

If the Lincoln County Commission chooses to ask for fresh proposals for the operation of Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) beginning next year, so be it. But let us hope that process will be undertaken with the same dedication and knowledge that the present management, Presbyterian Medical Services and administrator Valerie Miller, has brought to the operation of the county-owned facility in the past decade. Our elected county commissioners, and the people of Lincoln County, should not forget that LCMC under Miller's direction has in less than 10 years been brought from the brink of bankruptcy to recognition as one of the best 100 hospitals in the United States, regardless of size. That is an almost miraculous performance for a small hospital in a small community. Nor can that status be blown off as an adjunct to Presbyterian, a state-wide player in community health care with many facilities and a major presence in the medical field. None of the other Presbyterian facilities has approached the quality of LCMC. Yes, "Pres" in Albuquerque has an outstanding cardiac center. Other hospitals around the state serve their communities well; they have quality management and good community support.

But none except LCMC are listed among the elite in the nation for service and patient care. And that must be a critical consideration our county commissioners must examine as they move toward next Jan. 1 when a new 10-year contract period begins.

Occasionally in the past few years this newspaper has taken issue with LCMC's board and some of its policies. But never has there been a question about the hospital's basic operation and quality of care.

Quality of service and patient care should be the hallmark of every hospital. Not county politics; not internal dissension between administrators and staff members. Not some perceived criticism resulting from a law suit. It is part of the American system that success must be measured within the rule of law, and in that context, LCMC has been a roaring success.

If LCMC has new management under a new contract in 1998, it should be after a clear demonstration that a new team could do a better job.

And that, indeed, would be very hard to do.

Crosswinds blowing fair

Sometimes it's a crosswind that blows good.

That's the case with Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, as word comes down in the face of a tight municipal budget that the facility will be gaining a crosswind runway with the help of a Federal Aviation Administration grant of \$1 million.

The new 6,500-foot northwest-southeast runway, when complete, will give a safer option to light aircraft seeking to put down at Sierra Blanca in rough weather.

The primary east-west runway, 8,100 feet long, can handle larger aircraft in most weather conditions. Bigger planes simply handle better in crosswinds; what their pilots have to watch carefully is air speed and altimeter settings in unseasonably hot weather.

As Ruidoso grows, and as such venues as the new Spencer Theater add to visitor appeal, the demand on airport facilities will grow.

Lucky Ruidoso, with \$1 million more to meet that demand, and another work project to start in the months ahead.

Invest time for children in need of friendship

Crime, violence and drug abuse sometimes seems to be out of control among young people. Fortunately, in Lincoln County, we have an opportunity to help our young people stay out of trouble and give them a sense of hope through Big Brothers/Big Sisters.

A recent study of youth who participated in Big Brothers/Big Sisters nationwide, found that little brothers and sisters who met with their "Bigs" regularly for about a year were 46% less likely to start using illegal drugs than their peers, 27% less likely to start drinking, 52% less likely to skip a day of school and 37% less likely to skip a class than were their peers.

It doesn't cost any money and it takes very little time, approximately two to four times a month of flexible hours. Out of about 720 hours in a month, four of those can be spent helping a kid find something they are good at, feeling a sense of accomplishment and giving a child a feeling that they are important.

All that is required is

someone who wants to make a difference in the life of a child, have fun, laugh, joke and go places. So many times, as adults, we forget to do things like go to ball games, go fishing, hiking, plant flowers, cook, play games, play in the yard, roller skate, play miniature golf...

Being a Big Brother or Big Sister can give adults a good reason to play while at the same time giving a child that extra incentive to take an interest in themselves and develop more positive interests in their lives.

FAS is characterized by growth deficiencies, facial abnormalities, heart defects, developmental delays and behavioral problems. This birth defect is totally preventable; the damage is permanent.

Babies can also be born with other alcohol-related birth defects (ARBD). Some babies may not have severe physical birth defects and as a result diagnosis might not occur until much later when it is discovered that the child is develop-

ing at a much slower rate. The child also may experience learning and behavioral problems...

We as a community must work together to educate others on the risks of drinking while pregnant. Lincoln and Otero Counties have formed a prevention committee called Pregnant Pause. In the championship game, Flamingos surprised McMillan, hitting the softball anywhere and everywhere for a 23-11 victory. McMillan, a class C team, had to spot the Flamingos a five-run equalizer, but it wouldn't have mattered.

The run-rule pounding awoke McMillan, which scored a 17-13 win in the "if" game and ended the Flamingo ride.

The Flamingos' Francine LaMay earned Most Valuable Defensive Play-

er honors for the tourney. Shelley Neils of McMillan was named Most Valuable Offensive Player. McMillan also captured the Sportsmanship Award.

Quick Moon Sign arrived in Ruidoso two weeks ago as the nation's leading 2-year-old quarter horse.

After a scintillating performance before the opening day crowd at Ruidoso Downs Friday, the Jim Brooks trainee only solidified her standing atop the 2-year-old rankings, while stamping herself as the favorite and fastest qualifier for the final of the Ruidoso Quarter Horse Sales Futurity.

Until the gates sprung open for the 11th trial heat, winning times for the first 10 trials were in a fairly tight range. The first 10 trials saw winners complete the 350-yard distance in 17.56 seconds (Showcase Six, race 4) to 17.90 (Remember That Bikini, race 9).

Jesus and Sandra Soto's fleet filly crossed the wire, an easy 1-1/2 length winner of the 11th trial heat, and the range grew considerably. After scorching the 350-yard distance in 17.36 seconds, the Oklahoma-bred daughter of Royal Quick Dash established a mark that was not to be eclipsed.

Quick Moon Sign broke cleanly and quickly sprinted clear of her eight rivals, establishing a lead of 1-1/2 lengths and maintaining that margin in a gate-to-wire score. For rider G. R. Carter it was his fifth win on the opening day card.

Quick Moon Sign now figures to be a heavy favorite to win the final on June 8. The final will carry a purse of \$278,143.77.

The Road Runner was the first victory of 1997 for the 3-year-old Tilt The Odds gelding, and was worth \$7,980 to owner Fred Van Winkle of Ruidoso. The public choice returned \$5.60 to win and topped a trifecta worth \$2,487.

Sunday's crowd of 4,325 wagered a total of \$236,842 on the nine race card, a seven-percent increase over the same

day in 1996. The total of all handle sources reached \$295,161 on Ruidoso races, a 3 percent increase over last year.

Twin trifecta and pick-six hit

Earlier on the card, the first five-figure winning twin trifecta payout was pulled down by one lucky patron.

After the first half of the twin trifecta was completed there were eight exchanges to go after the two-day carryover. One of those eight tickets contained the correct combination of 14-1 longshot winner Bullidn Powder, 13-1 runner-up Kick In The Cash, and 4-1 third place-finisher Cash N Glass in the fourth race for a cool \$11,343.

Another Ruidoso bettor shared in the massive Hollywood pick-six pool. The anonymous patron left Ruidoso Downs Sunday with an extra \$53,827.40 in his pocket after selecting the winning pick-six combination at Hollywood Park. The pick-six swelled to more than \$1-million after bettors jumped in to chase more than \$600,000 carryover.
