



Cable system adds channels after big investment

• The cable system's recently installed fiber optic system will be capable of offering dozens of more channels, starting with seven new stations in the "preferred pack" tier.

Lincoln Cablevision's recently upgraded system on

June 15 will offer subscribers a second tier of channels, a company official said.

Fox Sports Southwest, ESPN 2, Outdoor Life, the History Channel, Arts and Entertainment, Turner Classic Movies and CNBC compose the local cable service's first foray into a second tier of cable services, said Leon Eggleston, Lincoln Cablevision office manager.

The cable service's current 7,195 subscribers may watch the seven new channels free of charge until July 1, when the second tier will cost an additional \$5.95 per month. The tier, called the "preferred pack," is actually \$4.95 per month, but it requires the installation of a special box at \$1 per month.

The total price, including

\$26.95 for basic service, will be \$32.90 for both tiers. However, rates for premium (channels) are not going to change, Eggleston said.

Making the additional tier possible is Lincoln Cablevision's improved technology, started in 1995, Eggleston said. "We've gone to fiber optics, which allows us to put on more channels," he said.

"And it should be a clearer picture once we get all the bugs worked out."

Officials with the cable service's Denver-based parent company, Rifkin & Associates, Inc., said the company has invested millions in the past few years to upgrade the system's capabilities.

Volunteers can play a role Forest clean-up pushed

• Thoughtless national forest users will face fences and gates in some areas, as help is asked to clean up their messes.

Sparkling bits of broken glass crunch beneath his feet as Jerry Hawkes walks from a bullet-ridden abandoned couch to a line of trees sawed off by a spray of bullets.

What should be a peaceful meadow in the Lincoln National Forest along Hale Lake Road has turned into a amateur firing range and trash dumping ground.

That abuse is about to end, said Hawkes, Smokey Bear District forest ranger. The site will be cleaned, then fenced and gated. Volunteer help would be welcomed.

It's a shame, he said, pointing to the licensed firing range of a gun club less than a quarter mile away.

"It costs \$25 a year and they could go there and shoot safely and without a mess like this," Hawkes said, shaking his head. "They could even shoot here, if they used boxes and cleaned up afterwards. But when they shoot glass bottles, it's nearly impossible to clean. That glass lies there and when elk, deer or other animals walk through they can hurt up their feet."

Hawkes would like to see more convenient alternatives for people who want to dump their old appliances and furniture than hauling it to the garbage transfer station during set hours and for a charge.

"I think the Solid Waste Authority has made a lot of people (dump illegally), because there are no alternatives," said Barry Majjala, law enforcement officer in the Smokey Bear district. "They either don't want to pay to dump or there is no place to dump on Sunday, the only day they may be free to do the work."

But Jerry Wright, manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority said state environment department regulations require drop-off stations such as those suggested by Hawkes to be manned and that's not possible under the authority's current budget.

"They (state officials) want waste screening at such sites," he said. "Otherwise there's nothing to prevent someone from dumping oil or batteries." Right now, no containers are available anyway, he said.

State environmental personnel are worried that the illegal dumping will spill into the county's waterways, Wright said. An environmental specialist from the Roswell office was in Ruidoso Monday

checking a creek bed along Gavilan Canyon near Ruidoso High School and recently shut down an illegal dump east of Carrizozo, Wright said.

For those apprehended, illegal dumping in the national forest carries a \$100 fine and can include a mandatory appearance before a judge.

Majjala is stepping up his efforts to catch violators in the forest. People who see illegal dumping should copy down license plate numbers and the type of vehicle and report the incident.

"It's just as illegal to dump on private land as it is public land. I think the majority of people know that and it's just a few chronic offenders or some who don't know any better that are causing the problem," he said.

Meanwhile, volunteers are needed to help with the Hale Lake Road clean-up and can call 257-4095 to sign up, Hawkes said.

Discarded furniture may be dumped now at the transfer station on Gavilan Canyon Road for \$6 a pickup load from noon to 3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Appliances may be discarded free from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday at the recycling center in Ruidoso Downs.

In a celebration and continuation of their tribal traditions, six Apache maidens will perform their rites of passage this weekend.

The four-day ritual acknowledging the young girls'

transformation into women begins Thursday and runs through Sunday at the ceremonial grounds in Mescalero.

Trini Dallas, 13, Sevina Kinzhuma, 13, Carla Shanta, 14, Kerlinda Valdez, 15, Petra Valdez, 13, and Rebekah Vic-

Franchise renewal asked early

Though Lincoln Cablevision's contract with the village of Ruidoso doesn't expire until 2002, the cable service has asked for early renewal of its 15-year franchise contract.

The request from the cable service's parent company, Rifkin & Associates, Inc., comes as the company completes a multi-million dollar upgrade to fiber optics technology.

"In order to make an investment of this magnitude, we need a degree of certainty that the community is as committed to us as we are in delivering them the capital-intensive infrastructure needed to provide a wide range of communication services," said Paul Bambei, vice president of operations at Rifkin.

Work on the advanced system began in late 1995. Its fiber optics provide the cable company with the technology to offer even more programming choices besides the seven-channel tier being added, Bambei said. Also, the system in the future may offer internet access and high-speed data transmission, he said.

"We will be conducting research to find out how our customers would like to use the extensive capability of our network," Bambei said.

Rep. Skeen plans to represent district into the next century

His movements are slower, but Parkinson's Disease hasn't dulled U.S. Rep. Joe Skeen's memory, his grasp of the intricacies of federal government or his sense of humor.

Skeen, who represents New Mexico's second congressional district that includes Lincoln County, was in Ruidoso Friday to shake hands with senior citizens at the local center and its neighbor in Ruidoso Downs.

The congressman was diagnosed last March with Parkinson's, a progressive disease that affects some motor skills, but Skeen repeated Friday that he plans to run for reelection in 1998.

"We got our budget pretty well lined up before we left

(Washington)," Skeen said of the week-long holiday break. "We gave the President something to chew on."

Reveling in New Mexico's first all-Republican, U.S. House delegation in at least seven decades, or possibly ever, Skeen said it feels good to have Bill Redmond on board in the Third Congressional District. Redmond replaced Democrat Bill Richardson, who resigned to become United Nations ambassador.

"We kept him up to 4 o'clock in the morning for the final vote on the thing (budget) and he was one of the two deciding votes for it to pass," Skeen said of Redmond.

Tourism remains a top priority for federal dollars filtering down to New Mexico, Skeen said.

"We're trying to put together the state's tourism by putting


up research money to educate our kids at New Mexico State University to run tourist attractions, to handle hotel management and related enterprises," he said.

The congressman dislikes how the Endangered Species Act has been applied to shut down timber operations in the state. He said a recent study by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) points to flawed assumptions being used in the act's application.

"I think it's application to crack," he said. "One of the biggest money-making deals are these associations for self-appointed saviators."

Other federal action New Mexicans should watch include the downsizing of the Bureau of Land Management and the





tor, 13, at points during the ceremony will offer their blessing to guests, a special honor as the girls are considered in a sanctified state throughout the rite. Their families and sponsors will prepare meals for those who come to watch.

Traditionally, the first day ceremony begins at dawn. It's already taken several days to prepare for the celebration on the ceremonial grounds. For some families, gathering the necessary ritual ingredients, the proper dress and the resources required to feed hundreds of people has taken more than a year.

On the south side of the feast grounds, teepees and long arbors of oak brush are built. Inside the arbors, the families of the maidens prepare the food, according to a detailed account from the Mescalero Cultural Center. The timber for the teepees will have been cut the day before by the men of the family after it has been blessed by a medicine man. His blessing song will continue as the teepees go up with evergreen branches on top.

The first four poles represent the four corners of the world. When the teepee is finished a pit is dug for a fire, oak brush is placed against the teepee walls and at the sides of the entrance.

After buckskin and blankets are laid on the ground in front of the entrance, the maidens come from their tents through the arbor and kneel behind their medicine men with their mothers or godmothers at their sides.

The godmothers dig pollen, painstakingly gathered from water plants, and from a bag between thumb and forefinger and raise it to the four directions. The pollen is placed on the shoulder, chest, back and across the noses of the girls, who then mark their godmothers and medicine men with pollen.

A line forms at the right of the girls, who are facing the sun, as people seek their blessing and are marked with

pollen. When they are finished, the medicine man sings another song during which the girls stretch out on the buckskin face down and attendants massage them from head to toe, praying that the girls always may have strong bodies, arms and legs. The first ritual ends.

Next comes a ritual in which the girls make four runs around baskets containing eagle feathers, gramma grass, pollen, red and white clay, among other things, all important as symbols.

More blessings, meals and rituals follow. But even when all of the teepee poles are brought down on the fourth day and the ceremony has ended for spectators, the girls must follow a strict regime. They wear buckskin and avoid water for at least four days, proving their worthiness of the privilege of womanhood.

This weekend, the six girls participating are:

• Trini Dallas, sponsored by Trudy Treas. She attends the seventh grade at Mescalero Middle School and her favorite

subject is physical education. She would like to be a teacher.

• Kerlina Valdez, sponsored by her father, Larry Valdez. Her mother is Burlinda Chino. She attends eighth grade at Mescalero High School and her favorite subject is Apache language. She wants to be a teacher.

• Petra Valdez, also sponsored by her father Larry Valdez. She is in the eighth grade at Mescalero High School. Her favorite subject is language arts and she would like to be a writer.

• Carla Marie Shanta, the daughter of the late Edward Shanta and Velda Garcia. She is the granddaughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Vicenti and Sadie Mendez and the late Anne Via and Roscoe Tortilla.

She is sponsored by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Garcia Sr., and Loreño and Rosie Saenz. She has two sisters and three brothers.

Carla is in the eighth grade at Ruidoso Middle School. She's active in basketball and ran cross country for the high

school team. She also enjoys sewing and hanging out with friends.

After graduating from high school, she plans to attend the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque.

• Sevina Kinzhuma, the daughter of Virginia Daklugie, a Mescalero Apache and Michael Cooper, who is Mescalero and Sioux. She is in the seventh grade at Mescalero High School. She enjoys sports, such as basketball, soccer and football.

• Rebekah Victor, the daughter of the late Lamar Victor Sr., a San Carlos Apache, and Willymae Victor John, of Mescalero and Navajo descent.

The seventh-grader at Ruidoso Middle School will be attended during her debut by Ginger Montoya and Gabriel Ortega, her medicine man. The Kevin Yuzos dance group will perform for the festivities.

Rebekah enjoys sports such as track, basketball and swimming. She has participated in the "Blessing Run," since its inception.

One capability will be access to three pay-for-view channels. With the intelli-unit, a cable box accompanying the second tier, subscribers may call a toll-free number to order

movies and special events programming at a specific charge for each order.

Also, the cable box eventually will allow the company to add or delete channels without having to send an employee to a subscriber's home, Eggleston

said.

Only Cinemax 2 is currently addressable in this manner, but the company intends to have all its pay channels on "remote addressability" by the beginning of next year, he said. Subscribers with Cinemax

1 may receive the second Cinemax channel free with rental of the cable box, Eggleston said.

The box, usually placed on top of the television sets, also will allow parents to lock out some channels.

Delays likely on easing of Mid-Town parking

An amendment to eliminate Mid-Town parking lot requirements goes to Ruidoso village councilors with a recommendation they hold off on final approval until a law controlling street vendors accompanies it.

With an eye to potential problems, the Ruidoso Planning Commission Tuesday passed an amendment to Mid-Town parking lot requirements with three recommendations.

One recommendation asks the Ruidoso Village Council to hold off on final approval of the amendment until a law controlling street vendors may accompany it. The commission's concern is the amendment will invite a proliferation of street vendors, and the village has no law other than the present parking space require-

ments to regulate street vendors.

A second recommendation, as made in the motion by commission member Bill Hirschfeld, asks that the Council create a public parking authority to advise the Council about future parking issues.

A third recommendation asks that the Mainstreet Master Plan, as established by the village in 1991, be amended to coordinate with the proposed parking lot amendment.

If the Council adheres to the commission's recommendations, the amendment will be postponed from becoming law until August, according to village staff. Otherwise, the law could go into effect as soon as mid-July following a public hearing on the issue by the Council.

The amendment, expedited through the village planning department at the request of

the Council last month, is intended to make the Mid-Town area a more feasible location for retail "anchors" such as restaurants. A group of village merchants, called the Spirit of Ruidoso, said Mid-Town stores cannot keep shoppers in the area at night unless more restaurants move in.

The Planning and Zoning Commission approved the amendment Tuesday afternoon with the recommendations after a 90-minute public hearing. About a dozen Mid-Town merchants attended the hearing, with some going before the commission to speak as many as five times.

While many of the merchants offered various proposals on how to ensure future available parking in the Mid-Town area, only one merchant objected to the proposal. Neal Germain, owner of the Mid-Town restaurant Cafe Rio, said

he was happy with current regulations that require businesses to provide a certain number of parking spaces based on their nature and size.

"I'm here to speak vehemently against this," Germain said. The amendment would create an uneven playing field of competition because businesses moving in after the amendment became law would not have the same costs tied to providing parking spaces, he said.

Currently, restaurants in the Mid-Town area are required to provide one parking space for every three seats, or one parking space for every three occupants, said village officials. Retail stores in the three-block Mid-Town area must allow one parking lot space for every 250 square feet of store area.

"In essence, we've provided the hardware; our customers will influence our software decisions."

Franchise contracts with the village of Ruidoso as well as Ruidoso Downs allows the company to use village rights-of-ways in exchange for a percentage of Lincoln Cablevision's revenues.

The Ruidoso Downs village trustees approved the contract at a May 26 meeting. Ruidoso village councilors probably will consider the contract in early July, said Village Attorney John Underwood.

Ruidoso Village Councilor Leon Eggleston, who is also office manager at the cable service, said he would abstain from voting on the contract to avoid any perception of a conflict of interest.

Under the existing and proposed contracts, the villages receive 3% of the service's revenues in exchange for use of village rights-of-ways. That revenue share amounts to an average of \$4,000 a month, or \$48,000 a year for Ruidoso, and an average of \$650 a month, or \$6,600 a year for Ruidoso Downs, Eggleston said.

Since 1995, the rate for basic cable service has increased by about 15% — from \$23.45 to the present rate of \$26.95. Rates usually increase about once a year, Eggleston said. In March, the rate increased by \$2.

Because of the cable service's local competition, primarily from satellite dish providers, Lincoln Cablevision is not subject to rate oversight by the village of Ruidoso, according to an official with Federal Communication Commission.

Mike Perko, FCC director of governmental affairs, said cable providers who have at least 50% of their market area available to competitors or who have at least 15% of potential subscribers using competitor services are not subject to local government regulation of basic rate service.

Nor is the company obliged to provide its subscribers with a "bare bones" basic service, a low-cost tier comprised of local network affiliates, public access stations and a public broadcast channel, Perko said. Several larger cable systems do have agreements with the FCC to provide a bare bones basic service, but the Rifkin cable network is not among them, he said.

Rifkin, a Denver-based firm, owns about 70 cable systems, with only two west of the Mississippi River — one in Hawaii and Lincoln Cablevision. Most of Rifkin's companies are in the Southeast, said Dave Eck, communications director.

Until June 15, Lincoln Cablevision offers subscribers 41 non-premium channels, seven of which were added in the past year.

DENIED IN A SPLIT VOTE — A motion to hold a public hearing on whether village councilors should continue to receive village health insur-

ance coverage. Councilors Leon Eggleston and Bill Chance voted for the motion, councilors Bob Storch, Robert Donaldson, Joe Gomez and Frank Cummins voted against the motion.

APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY — A motion to throw out an amendment to village laws regulating hillside construction. In the motion, the Council asked that the village's Planning and Zoning Commission make the regulations apply less restrictively for home builders.

DISCUSSED — Applying existing village nuisance laws to enforce how and where residents may maintain large animals within village limits. Councilor Gomez questioned whether the village needed to create an animal control ordinance because none currently exists. Village Manager Gary Jackson suggested instead the village

try to control intrusive livestock smells and problems through nuisance laws.

APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY —

An amendment to village laws regulating the construction of driveways. Under the amendment, homeowners are responsible for ensuring their driveways don't wash gravel and other debris into village roads.

APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY — A zone map amendment to two lots in the White Mountain Estates subdivision. The lots are located at 113-115 Racquet Dr. The amendment changes the lots zoning from high density, such as required by apartments, to multi-family zoning.

APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY — A low bid of \$26,626 from Elwood Power Equipment for a horizontal aerator attachment for the regional sewage treatment plant.

APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY — A \$7,350 bid from Justice Systems, Inc., for computer operations software to be used in the Municipal Court.

APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY —

A request for out-of-state travel from Robby Hall, the village's assistant fire chief, to attend a "Train the Trainer" course sponsored by the U.S. Forest Service in Marana, Ariz. All expenses for the trip will be paid by the state Forestry Division, with the only expense to the village the time off for Hall.

APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY — The scheduling of a public hearing June 10 to ratify an ordinance that annexed about 80 acres of the Mountain View subdivision. Though the land was annexed officially on Nov. 28, 1978, village staff cannot find the actual ordinance, Jackson said.

Second the motion

When traditional systems are uprooted, it's only human nature for people to put on the brakes and think hard about where those changes might lead. Especially so, if it's a change in established medical service.

Such is the case for some Alto residents, and others in the area, who weren't thrilled with the Lincoln County Commission's decision to enter into a contract with Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services to provide ambulance service. Not just an ambulance, of course; first response medical helpers will ride along—trained emergency medical technicians (EMTs).

In the case of Alto, emergency services heretofore have been tied to volunteer EMTs. Those volunteers have done an excellent job over the years, by all reports.

But commissioners last week gave every indication that they had not decided lightly to spend \$20,000 of taxpayers' money with Ruidoso EMS. They unanimously approved the move after reaching a consensus that the result would be better service to all those residents in Alto, the growing Airport Road area, Nogal Hill and Eagle Creek, plus some county land along Cedar Creek, Carrizo Canyon and scattered other areas.

That, of course, is the role of an elected body—to provide the best service possible to its constituency with the funds available. We make the assumption that the decision was not a part of any sort of hidden agenda, and with such an assumption it appears to be a good move.

Ruidoso EMS has proved its capability over an extended period, and its association with Lincoln County Medical Center clearly contributes to the center's standing as one of the nation's finest hospitals.

To those observers who have decided it is the first step toward bringing Alto into the Ruidoso village boundaries, about all we can say is...Well, who can say? That's up to the residents who would have to vote for any such action.

The Ruidoso Village Council next meets on June 10, and ratification of the county's move to merge emergency services might be on the agenda.

When it does get consideration, objectors who ask in advance for time will have a chance to state their case. Regardless of your position on Ruidoso EMS services for Alto, attendance would be worthwhile.

And as an ultimate safety valve, the proposed contract also has a 60-day cancellation clause.

Victim won't file charges

Five men reportedly beat up a 30-year-old San Patricio man last week at a house in the 100 block of Grant Drive, according to Ruidoso police reports.

Robert Dutchover, a rancher, said he was lying on a couch late Thursday evening when five men came in and began hitting him.

A witness, though, said Dutchover had been fighting all day with a 38-year-old Hondo woman at the house when neighbors came over to ask if everything was all right. The witness, a 37-year-old Ruidoso woman, said Dutchover ran to a bedroom closet after the men came in. The men apparently followed him, pulled him out of the closet and began beating him about the face, according to police reports. The door to the closet had been pulled off its hinges, and blood spattered the bed and walls, police said.

Dutchover did not file charges against his assailants for fear that they would hurt his mother in reprisal, police reports said.

Youth rolls vehicle

A 17-year-old Mescalero boy rolled the car he was driving early Sunday morning on U.S. Highway 70 about 12 miles west of Ruidoso, said Capt. Alfred La Paz with the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs.

The youth, whose name is being withheld until the accident may be investigated, was not seriously injured and was not taken to the hospital, La Paz said.

The boy had just dropped off a friend and was on his way home, driving west on Hwy. 70, at about 6 a.m. Sunday when the accident occurred, La Paz said.

The youth lost control of his car, a gray Subaru station wagon owned by his father, went off the road, over-compensated and rolled the car, La Paz said.

"Apparently, he had been up all night and just went to sleep," La Paz said.

Quilts taken from unit

Two quilts, one valued at \$500, were taken sometime in May from a storage unit at Alpine Village Road and Olympia Road, police reports said.

George Hutchins, 35, of Ruidoso told police two quilts and one comforter had been taken from the storage unit. The unit, which showed no signs of forced entry, may have had its lock picked by the burglar or burglars, reports said. Hutchins estimated the value of the stolen items at \$630.

Third school burglary

In the third burglary of Ruidoso schools in a week, a burglar or burglars broke into a building located at 200 Horton Circle sometime between Thursday midnight and 6 a.m. Friday, police said.

Mike Gladden, superintendent of Ruidoso schools, told police a money bag containing \$99.25 was taken. The burglars, who forced open a door to enter the building, also tried

to open two vending machines in the teachers' lounge, police reports said. Damage to the two vending machines and door was estimated at \$650.

Burglars of the Ruidoso Middle School escaped with more than \$2,000 in cash sometime between 3:45 p.m. Thursday and 7 a.m. Friday, police reports said.

A custodian and a secretary at the school reported the theft, in which burglars entered the school by apparently breaking a window to the principal's office, police said. Glenn Marshall and Barbara Graham, both of Ruidoso Downs, told police the burglars took three money bags containing more than \$2,000 in cash. School officials also told police that two graffiti markings of "Juaritos B" and "J" had not been there when staff left the building the night before the burglary.

Reported in an earlier edition, burglars on May 21 made off with two computers from the Ruidoso High School.

Insurance company hit

A police officer checking businesses early Thursday morning found the outside door to an insurance company unlocked, police reports said.

Officer Luis Torres then discovered the inner door to the Greg Carey Agency, 510 Mechem Dr., had been taken off its hinges. Torres called for back up, and he and two other officers searched the building. They did not find anyone in the building, nor could the owner, Greg Carey, find anything missing from the business.

Police believe the burglar or burglars may have been scared off.

Saddles stolen

A woman who listed her home for sale and moved out in September discovered recently someone had taken many of her personal belongings, police reports said.

Carla Dee Briggs told police she had discovered about \$3,400 worth of missing items from the home, located in the 100 block of Socorro Circle. Two saddles, with a combined value of \$1,750, had been taken from a storage space under the house. Also taken were lamps, numerous paintings, a printer, a hand-made bedroom set (quilts, pillows, etc.), bathroom scales and plants from her backyard, police reports said.

Fight in intersection

A Mescalero man reportedly punched his girlfriend in the nose Wednesday night in the middle of the intersection of Sudderth and Mechem drives, police reports said.

The boyfriend, 26, apparently did not want to go home when his girlfriend did, reports said. So, he pulled his girlfriend, a 30-year-old Mescalero woman, out of the car and struck her in the face. The man reportedly began running up the street when the woman started calling for police, reports said. The woman refused to be taken to the hospital for treatment of her injuries. As of Monday, she had not filed charges, police said.

Unlicensed fishing brings fines

This year's long Memorial Day weekend was a busy time for New Mexico conservation officers.

In southeastern New Mexico 15 officers were afield in both marked and unmarked vehicles checking for fishing violations. Violations resulted in 77 citations being issued by officers of the Southeast Area of the Department of Game and Fish.

Patrols were carried out on waters in the Ruidoso, Hobbs, Carlsbad, Artesia, Roswell, Fort Sumner and Santa Rosa areas.

The most common violation encountered, the department said, was people fishing

without having a license. In all, 69 citations were issued for this violation with 25 going to people visiting from out of state and 39 going to anglers that reside in New Mexico. Other law violations included littering and fishing with two poles in trout waters.

Penalty assessments for fishing without a license include a \$75 fine and purchase of a fishing license which means that residents pay \$98.50 for the violation. Those from out of state pay \$120. Once cited these people can then return to fishing. The cost of a fishing license for residents is \$18.50 and for nonresidents is \$39.

It's 'Small Business Week' for '97



- approved the creation of a committee to review the crowding situation at the county jail and come up with recommendations. Serving on the committee will be District Attorney Scot Key, detention center administrator Wayland Hill, attorney Gary Mitchell, Commissioner William Schwettmann, Potter and District Judge Karen Parsons.

In all, 1997 so far has been quite a triumph for women who enjoy sweating, running, jumping, dribbling or whatever. We've witnessed these events in the last five months.

The conclusion of the ABL's first season. Average attendance ran a couple hundred better than expected at the ABL franchise cities. The league signed several college superstars for next year's season, including Stanford standout Kate Starbird and, signaling the viability of the league.

Sports Illustrated magazine, the standard by which many sports writers measure themselves, launches Women | Sport magazine this spring. If the next issues are as uncompromising as the premier issue, then sports fans are in for a treat. The next issue won't hit the newsstands until September, but after reading through the first edition, I can't wait.

Another record in terms of unprecedented participation in athletics by girls. Each year the numbers keep growing and growing — all because of Title IX.

Football coaches may curse Title IX, as Women | Sport suggests. For all of us who ever just wanted a fair shot, we celebrate Title IX.

We can thank the women of the 1996 Summer Olympics who set the stage for this year. American women dominated, from the U.S.A. softball team, to the soccer team, to the women's basketball team which sailed untouched to the gold. Women delivered the gutsiest individual performances — in gymnastics, in the pool, on the track.

You could say the Olympians delivered the opening tip to 1997. The tip to the second half of the year falls on the shoulders of the WNBA and its players.

I think they're ready. More important, so is America.

Some wonder if two women's basketball leagues are too much. Americans aren't ready for that much women's basketball, they argue.

I guess we'll find out soon enough. What matters is that our best women's basketball players now can play at home, in front of Americans. They're willing to give up the big bucks abroad to play on the homeland.

That, in and of itself, will sell tickets. Regardless of what happens, two leagues are better than none.

Final Frontier proves best in Fine Loom Handicap

Racing four-wide most of the trip of the 870-yard Fine Loom Handicap, Final Frontier still had plenty left in the stretch to mow down the favored Noblesse Six and Ive Been Blessed in Saturday's feature race.

Nearing the far turn, Alan Haddad sent favored Acrylic — last year's Governor's Cup winner — after the leader and was only a half-length off after three quarters. From the head of the stretch to the wire the two engaged in a rousing stretch battle with neither combatant willing to succumb.

Breaking from the eight post in the field of eight, Final Frontier came away from the gate running and engaged in a four-way battle on the front end with Ive Been Blessed, Noblesse Six and longshot Corporate King.

When Acrylic got on even terms with Slamming the latter dug in and repulsed his rival's challenge to prevail by a neck. It was another 8-1/2 lengths back to second favorite Tiffy Go Home in third.

Turning for home Final Frontier was fanned five-wide, but once jockey Tanya Laib got the 6-year-old gelded son of Phone Trick straightened away for the drive, he outran his opposition.

Coming out of a Sunland Park allowance sprint in which he cut out a blistering half-mile in 44-4/5 before ultimately trying to finish second, the Simon Buechler-trainee figured to be the early leader.

Winning trainer Ray Ashford succinctly conveyed his pleasure following the outcome saying, "a good horse, good owners, and a good ride."

Owners Margaret V. Bloss and Margaret O. DuPont were proud of the way their homebred gamely held on.

"We raised this horse. Most of the horses we have are homebreds. We've always had more luck with the ones that we've bred ourselves," DuPont said.

In spite of being assigned high-weight of 123 pounds for the thoroughbred and quarter horse event, and also being installed as the 6-5 morning-line choice, Final Frontier got no respect at the windows and went off as the fourth choice in the wagering at 7-1.

That may have been because of the naming of Ruidoso newcomer, Tanya Laib, to handle the reins aboard the Ashford trainee. A late replacement for jockey Dusty Means, Laib picked up the mount just an hour before post time. (See related story.)

Missed flight nets jockey first Ruidoso win

* Accomplished Arizona rider latest addition to local jockey colony.

When jockey Dusty Means missed his flight to New Mexico to ride Fine Loom Handicap favorite Final Frontier, Tanya Laib picked up the mount on the morning-line favorite. For Laib, who moved her tack from Arizona this season, it was her first win at Ruidoso Downs.

Getting few opportunities to ply her trade since arriving, the talented journeyman made the most of her ride in the Saturday feature.

"I'm going to send Dusty a thank you card," Laib said. "It was a great way to break my maiden here. I really appreciate Ray Ashford giving me the opportunity to ride this horse since this is my first season here."

Although her visit to the

Ruidoso Downs winner's circle Saturday was her first locally, winning feature races has been a fairly regular experience for the 26-year-old Prescott, Ariz. native.

In 1990 at the age of 19, Laib began her riding career at Prescott Downs in Arizona. Two weeks into the meet she won her first race aboard the quarter horse filly, Rejuvenation.

"It was Father's Day, and I told my dad before I left for the track that I was going to win a race for him," she said, recalling her first career win. Her maiden win aboard the 3-year-old first-time starter came on just her fifth career mount.

Laib made the trek east to New Mexico this summer because she "needed a change of scenery."

"And John Bassett, who I rode first-call for in Arizona, encouraged me to come," she said.

Her experience in Ruidoso

thus far has been a positive one.

"People here are very kind. Everyone says, 'Good morning,'" she said of those she sees daily at the racetrack. "Ruidoso reminds me a little of home — the small town atmosphere and the pines."

Though life on the racetrack means galloping horses every morning and riding on race days, Laib is working toward other goals also. The 3.7 g.p.a. student has completed 60 credit hours toward a bachelor's degree in biology. Beyond that degree she plans to attend graduate school to earn a master's degree in physical therapy.

In the years following her first season at Prescott, Laib continued to ride in Arizona. Competing at Turf Paradise, Rillito Park and at all of the county fair tracks, she has won numerous races of significance in the Copper State. Her resume includes titles in the

Southwest Derby, AQRA Turf Paradise Futurity, Kingman Futurity (twice), Hualapai Futurity (twice), Holbrook Futurity, Arizona Stallion Owners Association Futurity (twice), Safford Derby and the Lassie Futurity Consolation.

Her biggest career win though, came in 1993, when she piloted Dr. Mark Et Al to victory in the Grade-3 Prescott Futurity.

Even though the Prescott Futurity was the richest race she has won, Laib names another quarter horse runner as her favorite.

"I'd have to say that Rocky Ohs is my favorite horse of all those I've ridden. Not because of the horse though, because of his owner, Ted Sparks," she said.

Rocky Ohs, described by Laib as short, ugly and with a big scar on his leg, teamed with her to win the 1996 Arizona Owners Association Futurity at Prescott Downs.

"Ted Sparks always wanted to win a futurity. It was his lifelong dream. He bought Rocky Ohs right before the Prescott meet opened, hoping to win a futurity with him."

"We had a big celebration after he qualified (as the sec-

ond-fastest qualifier), and another big celebration after he won the final. I felt really good for Ted," she recalled.

A short time later, Sparks died. In Laib's words, "after he won his futurity and realized his dream."

Projects spark science excitement

Ruidoso High School science teacher Richard Overdorf and his students have added some energy to final exams.

One man's garbage is another man's treasure, or rather another boy or girl's science project.

Students in Richard Overdorf's Ruidoso High School General Physical Science classes turned pieces of styrofoam, plastic pop bottles, rubber bands, potatoes and more into projects this semester as part of their study of energy and energy transfers. Designing and building the solar-powered cars, the potato-powered lights, and the other projects took the place of a final written exam for the freshmen.

Overdorf said this is the first year he has assigned the projects in place of a final.

"I felt a written final wasn't appropriate for these students ... I felt we could learn more from hands-on and applying some creative thinking," he said. "The whole purpose was to use an application for energy and determine the transfer of energy."

The students spent the semester studying physics and the concepts of energy, force motion and velocity and then spent the final two weeks coming up with a project that put those concepts into motion. The classroom at RHS was transformed into a workshop, while Overdorf, teachers Bill Morris and Ester Espinosa, and the students from the four freshman science classes started piecing-together their "tests."


The result of those two weeks is a classroom filled with a variety of takes on how energy works.

"We probably got 20 tons of stuff," Overdorf said. "These kids really worked hard."

One project was a bow made out of pieces of wood and rubber bands. What makes the bow, built by student Sujey Rubio, unusual is the bow itself doesn't bend to create energy; rather it stores energy in rubber bands. "The nice thing about this bow is you can add more power by adding more rubber bands," Overdorf said.

The students were as satisfied as their teacher with both their projects and the exercise as a whole.

"It was much better than taking a test," said student Christina Knight, who paired

up with partner Lara Clabaugh to split water molecules into their components of hydrogen and oxygen. They were quick to point out that hydrogen is a clean-burning, pollution-free source of fuel. "It was much better than taking a test; at least we used what we learned."

Clabaugh echoed her project partner's sentiment.

"It really reinforced what we learned," she said. "Better than just words. We actually got to see how it works instead of just hearing about it."

Other students had those same feelings about building the projects.

"It was easier to learn what all the stuff was actually doing," said Tiffany Skinner, who turned Barbie's pink corvette into a solar-powered machine.

Partners Ashley Burris and Rebekah Wimbrow said they gleaned inspiration for their potato-powered light from a cartoon. The girls said they started with a lemon first,

moved on to a lemon and a potato, then two potatoes, and so on until they discovered that it took four potatoes to power the small bulb. And rotten potatoes lose power, the team added.

"It was fun; a lot better than a final," Wimbrow said. "I feel that I learned more from the projects than I would have learned reading about it in a book."

Burris also thought building the project was better than a final, especially, she said, since Mr. Overdorf is known to give "horrendous" exams.

Even the in-depth write-ups Overdorf asked the students to do explaining their work and their results didn't dull the excitement.

And though not every project worked like it was supposed to, or worked at all, Overdorf gave the hands-on final exam an A-plus.

"The concepts were the important part," he said. "Some people learn more by failing than others do by succeeding."

Sierra Vista Primary awarded \$18,000 for Title I reading program improvement

Pulling students out of their reading ruts has been a goal at Sierra Vista Primary School since the doors were opened three years ago.

Now with a Title I reading program in place, Sierra Vista is getting \$18,000 from the state to help keep the road to better reading and writing smooth all the way from first-grade to graduation. The additional grant money from the State Department of Education will go toward purchasing new computers, software and teacher training.

"Title I is a federally funded program aimed at helping students who need a little boost, a little more energy," said Principal Danny Flores.

The money is funneled from the federal level and distributed by state education departments. Traditionally, Flores explained, Title I funds are used to boost reading scores in the first and second grades and expanded to include language arts, math and science as students advance to higher grades.

The grant money came in two installments after Flores and Sierra Vista staff heard there was about \$56,000 left in this year's state allotment of Title I money. Originally, Sierra Vista asked for \$14,000, which was cut to \$12,000 when the first award was given.

► Summer stimulation

Sierra Vista Primary is offering a summer reading program for first and second graders. The program, which started Monday, provides three hours of remedial language arts and reading instruction from 9 a.m. to noon Monday through Thursday. The program runs through June 26 and is free for all students. Principal Danny Flores

said students must provide their own transportation.

He also stressed the importance of keep those brain cells working over the summer. "During the summer months, Mom and Dad need to keep (kids) reading ... keep them stimulated mentally."

Then a little initiative led to the writing of another grant and the award of another \$6,000.

Title I reading teacher Allyson Whitaker and Flores are both pleased about the money and said it will help them accomplish their goal of raising all Sierra Vista students' reading scores.

"What we do is take students in the lowest (reading score) percentile, put them in remediation and pull them up to grade level," Whitaker said. "We see lots of success with these kids ..."

For those children, success may be hard to come by without the boost provided by the Title I program. Flores said often they struggle in school and fall behind, and mentally begin dropping out by the first or second grade. By helping them succeed early, the program can help build their self-esteem, confidence and propel them toward future successes.

"A lot of the kids I see come in and won't even look you in the eye ... The first time they

see a big shiny sticker and 100% on their page, they think 'golly, I really can do this.'"

For those students who need improved reading skills, Whitaker said a program called "Writing to Read," which will be purchased with the grant money, will be a big help. And for students who may excel at reading, a program called "Accelerated Reader" can help them continue to build on whatever base they may have.

"Accelerated Reader" focuses on reading comprehension, and provides immediate feedback for the teacher about any problem areas or if a child may be reading below potential. "For every 100 points earned in 'Accelerated Reader,' students go up one grade level in reading scores," Whitaker said.

But Whitaker and Flores see a potential to reach more students.

"We're just fortunate to receive the \$18,000 to give us a shot in the arm to help our kids," Flores said.



Sherry Shade of Ruidoso was inducted into the New Mexico State University Sam Steel Society on May 16.


The society honors the memory of Sam Steel, who would have been the university's first graduate if he hadn't been killed just months before his graduation in 1893.
