## Ruidoso gets serious about planning future

• A series of strategic planning meetings and surveys will soon ask residents what they want Ruidoso's future to be.

"What price beauty?" That is a question village leaders may soon ask residents. The Village of Ruidoso is gearing up for a series of "visioning" meetings to shape Ruidoso's future, Village Manager Gary Jackson said Tuesday. "I would hope that we would have some kind of kick-off meeting within

the next two weeks," Jackson said. "And I expect that Ruidoso's appearance would be a great concern to the businesses and community alike."

The Ruidoso Village Council will determine a schedule for the "visioning" process, Jackson said.

Besides aesthetics, Ruidoso must determine how to pay for needed improvements to its water and sewer systems. Ruidoso already has one of the state's highest debt rates, village officials say.

Myles Rademan, a consultant to mountain resort towns with growth pains, met and spoke with village offi-

cial last week about initiating the process of strategic planning.

In a community presentation, Rademan said his hometown of Park City, Utah, preserved and enhanced the town's aesthetics and infrastructure by charging high fees on new development.

"If you are going to build a new home in Park City, you are going to pay an impact fee anywhere from \$12,000 to \$20,000," Rademan said, adding that he was not recommending that Ruidoso charge the same.

The issue of development impact fees in Ruidoso, and what those fees

might be, if any, has recently attracted criticism.

In March, the Ruidoso Village Council created the Capital Improvements Advisory Committee to study the possibility of charging fees on new development.

Three of the seven people appointed to that committee resigned two weeks ago in protest of development, or so-called "impact," fees.

Rademan, during his presentation to the community, emphasized that each town should decide for them-

### FAMILY OF PATRIOTS

## The Stuart-Hights united by seven stars

• Alto came alive last weekend for a very special reunion marked by some very special stars.

Seven stars lit up the night in Alto Thursday, but they weren't in the sky. These stars were blue and sewn securely on a World War II service flag, and they were reminders of the approaching Independence Day holiday.

The stars, marking seven children in the Stuart-Hight family who served in World War II, and the flag they are attached to, were the focal point of this year's Stuart-Hight family reunion — a reunion marking the homecoming of four generations of kin to the birthplace of the family's long and rich history.

The flag belongs to the matriarch of the Stuart-Hight clan, Ella (Hight) Stuart. As was custom during World War II, she proudly hung it on her porch to keep the six sons and one daughter who fought overseas close in mind and in heart. Unlike so many other families who sent sons and daughters to fight in Europe and the Pacific, Ella never had to take down a blue star and replace it with a gold


one. The gold stars only came out when a life was lost in battle, a tragedy that never befell the Stuart family in the battles that raged from 1939 to 1945.

"Up until recently all seven stars were alive," said Joanne Wimberly, the oldest granddaughter of Austin and Ella Stuart. Three of the soldiers have died, but not in battle.

Of the early years of her life, Wimberly recalls her grandmother Ella flying the flag proudly, her grandfather's send off for each soldier and a funny little dog named Skipper. She said her grandfather Austin was a pianist and every time a family member was sent overseas, he would gather the family around his piano and they would all sing "God Be With You 'Till We Meet Again" before sending the soldier off to the train station.

Having so many soldiers in the family also instilled a strong sense of patriotism in each member from the youngest to the oldest, and even their pets. Skipper was the dog of Michael Bob Stuart, the last member of the clan to be sent to war. And that little dog knew what it meant to be respectful and proud of his country and its soldiers, according to

## Congressman Joe Skeen comes home for birthday

As a prelude to celebrating his 70th birthday on his family's ranch in Picacho, U.S. Rep. Joe Skeen (R-Dist. 2) spent the morning at the Museum of the Horse getting a sneak preview of a new exhibit called the Ruidoso Downs Race Horse Hall of Fame.

The congressman got the jump on the public, which won't be able to see the exhibit until its official opening from 5 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

But his first stop in the museum was the already open "Saddle Up! A Cinch to Amaze" exhibition of saddles from around the world and throughout the ages assembled by curator Rick Rotert.

Special reverence was reserved for four saddles on loan from The Smithsonian Institute, two used by

Gen. John Joseph "Blackjack" Pershing, who at one time was stationed at nearby Fort Stanton. One of the general's saddles is a 1920 French riding saddle and the other a 1904 McClellan from Nebraska with "Pershing" on the outside of the cantle. The third, a custom-made officer's saddle, was used by Gen. William Tecumseh Sherman and was donated by Sherman granddaughter to the Smithsonian. The fourth, a McClellan saddle, was seized at the Battle of the Little Big Horn by Sioux and modified for their use, but the mark of the Seventh Cavalry still can be seen.

On the lower floor of the museum, Scott Wells, director of publicity, has taken on the role of curator for the Race Horse Hall of Fame exhibit, which includes Savannah Junior, one

## Petitioners seeking open LCMC bids

A petition urging a request for proposals on a new contract to operate Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) has started to circulate in the county.

The Ruidoso hospital facility, owned by Lincoln County, now is operated under a contract with Presbyterian Health Care Services of Albuquerque. Presbyterian has asked the Lincoln County Commission for an early 10-year renewal of its contract, which is due to expire on Jan. 18, 1998.

Circulating the petition is a group dubbed "Concerned Voting Citizens of Lincoln County." Dr. Roy Seidel, a Roswell family practitioner who has "guest" staff privileges at LCMC, acknowledges that he is a member of the



## REUNION: Many wars, one fatality

Wimberly. She said the whole family would stand whenever the "Star Spangled Banner" came on the radio, and it wasn't long until Skipper also came to attention whenever the familiar strains lifted over the airwaves.

That sense of patriotism has stuck with the family throughout the years. Dating back to the Revolutionary War are documented cases of at least one Stuart serving in the military in every war, Wimberly said. Two members of the family are keeping the tradition alive today with active duty in the armed forces, bringing the total of military men and woman of Stuart descent to 50-plus.

The luck of those seven stars seems to have stuck through the generations. Of the more than 50 who have fought and served their country, only one was killed in action—William P. Rollins, a helicopter pilot in the Vietnam War.

In tribute to Rollins, who won many medals in combat including a Bronze Star, a Purple Heart and a Distinguished Flying Cross, a flag Rep. Joe Skeen, R-NM, had flown over the capitol in Washington last week to commemorate the reunion will be presented to Rollins' mother.

Similar to the family's sense of patriotism, their roots also run deep.

"We are all truly native New Mexicans," Wimberly said of the Stuart-Hight children, grandchildren, great grandchildren and so on. "My great

grandfather John Austin Stuart was New Mexico's first US land commissioner after we became a state."

And though the family may have scattered to the north, south, east and west, settling as far away as Alaska, Hawaii, California, and Okinawa, Japan, the heart of the family still beats in southern New Mexico. It's not all that surprising, though, for a family that had 10 of Austin and Ella's children graduate from Artesia High School—benchmark the city itself recognized with inscribed silver serving pieces.

Wimberly noted that 10 high school graduates in the economically depressed 1940s was a feat in itself. Cousin James Stuart Jr. added that most of those children have since gone on to get college degrees and advanced degrees.

Keeping their kids educated was all part of Austin and Ella's pride, according to Stuart.

"This family may not have ever had a lot of money, but they always had plenty to eat, clean clothes and always went to school," he said.

With the homecoming last weekend, the spirit of the Stuarts was passed on to the next generation. The 135 family members gathered at Alto Alpi (the youngest 2, the oldest 86) got a feel for their New Mexico roots during the four-day gathering.

"We (were) trying to show our young people the New Mexico culture and the heritage they came from," Wimberly said.

selves how to fund improvements, whether through fees or other taxes.

Solutions need to be reached collectively by going through the "processes" of municipal government, he said.

Attendance at the presentation last week was described as good.

The "visioning" program comes against a background of rapid growth for the village—some 13% in the past five years—and continued development of subdivisions.

Rapidly growing Ranches of Sonterra and the nearby Spencer Theater have become symbolic of that growth.

group circulating the petition. The petition states:

"We, the undersigned, ask the Lincoln County Commissioners to follow the intent of state statute and the needs of county residents by opening the medical services contract for the Lincoln County Medical Center to Request for Proposals (RFP). This contract is due to expire January 18, 1998 and the current provider, Presbyterian Health Care Services, has indicated they expect an automatic ten year renewal.

"Only by a fair and open process can we be assured of the best health care possible for our communities. We

ask that the County Commissioners hold a public hearing on the medical services contract, with details of each proposal made public and ample time for all concerned citizens to speak.

"Our lives are at stake.

"By signing this petition, I state that I am a registered voter in Lincoln County."

Presbyterian has operated the hospital since 1988, most of that period with Valerie Miller as administrator. The hospital recently received a 98% rating from the Joint Commission on Hospital Accreditation, a national organization that examines and rates hospitals.

### Safe be the Fourth

When the furor is over after all the alien-hunters leave Roswell, after the weekend horse races, after the miscellaneous Fourth of July fireworks displays, parades, rodeos—then will be the time to count the bodies.

If you're shocked, don't be. Monday, halfway through 1997, Lincoln County already has tallied eight deaths on its federal highways this year, three in a period of a week. It's true, apparently, that only one of those deaths can be traced to drunken driving. But hot weather, heavy traffic and winding two-lane ribbons of blacktop are potent enough ingredients for tragedy all by themselves.

It's not as if the problem isn't recognized. Any number of lobbyists, like the National Association of Independent Insurers, keep a tally on highway deaths. That organization cites New Mexico's poorly maintained bridges and roads as a contributor, with the advice that 485 people died on state highways in 1995—145 because of road and bridge conditions.

Few people remember now that some 40 years ago a famous rodeo cowboy named Bob Crosby (they called him the King of the Cowboys) was killed on a bridge across the Pecos River on U. S. 70 east of Roswell; the bridge that replaced the fatal one now bears Crosby's name.

The Federal Highway Administration has determined that bad roads are responsible for 30 percent of all highway fatalities, notes the insurers' group. They were making a pitch for more federal highway funding.

Meanwhile, on Monday, a new organization called the Ruidoso Safe Communities Planning Council called its first meeting. It's no accident that Charlie White, who runs Lincoln County's DWI grant program, is the coordinator. Ruidoso is one of the first to organize under the program because it has one of the highest accident/injury rates in the state.

Which brings us back to the huge Fourth of July/Roswell Incident weekend:

Please, please be careful on the highways, because many other drivers just won't be.

Be a holiday celebrant, not a statistic.

### Public needs to air whole hospital issue

To the editor:

I am writing to request the Lincoln County Commission to follow the intent of New Mexico state law and open the Lincoln County contract for hospital services to proposals from competing health care organizations. I further ask that as part of this process there be a thorough review of the services performed to date by Presbyterian Health Care Services and that this review include a public hearing.

There is no question that Presbyterian has greatly improved the finances of the Lincoln County Medical Center and has provided many benefits to the community. But I and many other citizens are concerned about the company's management and about certain of its practices. I have the following reasons:

First, Presbyterian consistently pressures its doctors to deal only with hospital-recruited doctors and Presbyterian services. For example, patients needing specialized care are referred to physicians at Presbyterian in Albuquerque, never to equally or better qualified specialists in El Paso, Lubbock or Roswell. Dr. Arlene Brown's successful lawsuit, in which she demonstrated that Presbyterian had illegally conspired to keep her from practicing obstetrics at the hospital, was only the tip of the iceberg.

Presbyterian only refers patients to the in-house Presbyterian physicals. Although the staff is very dedicated, the hospital physical therapy department until recently had not one single piece of the standard equipment used throughout country for physical therapy. Furthermore, the newly acquired piece of equipment was paid for not by Presbyterian, but by hospital volunteers. Presbyterian's tactics have driven several licensed therapists

out of the area and exposed doctors, the county and Presbyterian to the potential of lawsuits.

Presbyterian's refusal to hire emergency physicians jeopardizes everyone's health care. There are frequent times when a doctor must be called in to respond to an emergency. During the busy tourist months, emergencies are a heavy load for the few doctors who are paid to be on call. Are you really comfortable with the fact that your life may depend upon an exhausted doctor who has to drive to the hospital after being pulled from his bed in the middle of the night?

Alto residents remain deeply concerned about the role played by Presbyterian in the recent cancellation of our volunteer ambulance service. There seems to be no question that we will have slower response times when we need an ambulance... that is if the drivers can even find our addresses. No one in Alto has yet received a reasonable explanation for the cancellation and it seems like one more example of Presbyterian stifling the competition.

On balance, the management style of Presbyterian has been autocratic and not suited to a public facility. Our community has lost the valuable services of a number of good doctors because of this. There is virtually no community input into hospital policies because board members are appointed at the recommendation of Presbyterian and because the nearly powerless board can be dissolved by the administration at any time.

We think it is time for a change. It is my understanding under the New Mexico General Powers of Counties, Section 1-1-11, that the county has no authority to automatically extend the contract for another ten years. Upon expiration, it becomes a new contract and the county is

required to solicit competitive sealed proposals when it procures professional services. (Sec. 13-1-11, N.M.S.A. 1978) Professional services include services of medical arts practitioners. (Sec. 13-1-76, N.M.S.A. 1978). In a similar situation, the attorney general has ruled that a county must solicit competitive sealed proposals before it can contract with a private for-profit group to provide an outpatient clinic in the county. (1987 Opinions of the Attorney General 97-74.)

Please do what is right to make this an open, fair and competitive process. Let's see if another health care provider can do a better job at a cheaper price. Let's hear the complaints against Presbyterian in public. Let's bring an end to public hospital administration with no public oversight. Our lives depend on it.

### Remembering Jim Hine

The death of Jim Hine recently opens up... facts possibly unknown to many Ruidoso citizens.

Mr. Hine was a friend, and our relationship began in 1975. To imagine anyone handling the job as village manager for more than 25 years defies the imagination. Demands by citizens, reasonable or not, along with the usual political atmosphere often demands periodic change of managers.

Not so with Mr. Hine. He weathered the storms very well. In fact, his quiet demeanor and reluctance to fiery discussions was his real strength.

With the approval of councils, many accomplishments came about during his time as manager. Here are a few of his accomplishments:

Construction of a village hall. Previously meetings had been in the library.



Construction of a municipal court complex.

Construction of a village shop/bar to maintain equipment formerly performed under a shade tree. Purchase of the slide for the swimming pool. Thought to be expensive, it has proven to be a very wise investment.

Purchase of a lay down machine to pave streets in lieu of a method of oil/gravel practiced over the years resulting in a dust problem.

Purchase of a hot mix plant to furnish hot asphalt to the laydown machine, saving the need to buy hot mix out of town.

Planning and construction of Grindstone Dam to alleviate water shortages.

Constructed the Solid Waste Compactor/Transfer station. Concerning the station, I had a very interesting conversation with Jim in the middle '80s. In his village hall office I asked him the question, "Why are four or five garbage trucks

driving over the mountain to the landfill and back instead of one large truck?" His answer was simple: "We need a large truck." That was the start of the idea involving the use of a solid waste compactor transfer system. After trips to Dallas, Ft. Worth, Amarillo and El Paso we discussed plans to build a transfer station. Being very conservative, Mr. Hine questioned the cost; however, as everyone knows, the transfer system was installed and has proven to be a valuable cost-cutting idea. The idea was that of Jim Hine.

We will miss Jim, who managed in an era unlike today. The pace of living was slower; there was less pressure when it did not take endless wasted time to seek a permit to open a business, when the public showed an interest in politics and the attendance at council meetings was high, when we held public debates at election time, when the voters turned out in larger numbers

to vote; when all of us had one thought in mind—Ruidoso is a great place to live and we can make it better.

How well would Jim Hine have done under the present environment? Very well, I would wager.

### Deactivated alarm may have stopped burglary

### Swerving driver arrested on abuse, DWI counts

A Roswell man stopped Saturday night by police has been charged with felony child abuse for reportedly driving while intoxicated, according to police reports.

Patrol Officer T. A. Ash pulled over the gray van being driven by Gary L. Morris, 33, at about 8:30 p.m. Saturday after watching the van make an illegal turn and swerve on Sudderth, reports said.

A caller from the Cattle Baron Restaurant had told police a man in a gray van was driving drunk with a child in the car.

Morris, who at first denied having anything to drink, was reportedly unable to stand without swaying, could not pass a coordination test and slurred his words, police said.

Officers found two bottles of whiskey in Morris's car. One bottle, on the floor of the passenger side, was almost empty

and the other, found under the driver's seat, was half empty, police said.

In the bar with Morris was his 7-year-old daughter. Police contacted the girl's grandmother, who picked the child up.

At the police station, Morris reportedly agreed to take a breath test for alcohol, but then did not exhale into the device, Ash said in his report.

Morris, who has two past DWI charges, was charged Saturday with aggravated DWI, an automatic felony on the third offense. Morris was also cited for two traffic violations. Bond was set at \$5,000 on the child abuse charge and \$1,500 on the DWI charge, police said.

A Ruidoso woman told police Saturday her purse had been stolen out of her car in the Wal-Mart parking lot, according to reports.

## COUNCIL ACTION

The Ruidoso Village Council took the following actions last week:

**APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY** - A request from the

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce to pave the parking lot at the recently renovated building at a cost of about \$4,500 in materials in addition to the use of village equipment and personnel for two days.

**APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY** - A request for a beer and wine license transfer involving Pizza Rio, Inc. and Cafe Rio, at 2547 Sudderth Dr.

**APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY** - A two-week bond extension for the Country Club subdivision development, provided the owner removes a foundation from the site.

# Watchful neighbors, alarms best resources for preventing burglaries

This is one of a continuing series of reports on burglaries in Ruidoso. Not since October 1995, when police arrested a team of burglars, has Ruidoso had as many reported break-ins.

Ruidoso Chief Lanny Maddox makes it plain: "If a person wants to break into a house and that house is unoccupied that person is going to break into that house."

"The trick is to make your house as unappealing to burglars as possible," say law enforcement officials and security experts.

This past May, Ruidoso had more burglaries reported since a rash of break-ins occurred two years ago in October, said Police Detective Wolf Born. Both Lincoln County and Ruidoso Downs had more burglaries reported this May than a year ago, as well.

Ruidoso insurance agent Frank Sawyer said his company in the past few months has

received a record number of burglary claims — more than in the past five years, cumulatively.

Despite the increase in burglaries, the Alto area was relatively unaffected. Officials say this is because Alto has both a strong neighborhood association that acts like a neighborhood crime watch group, as well as the predominance of homes with effective alarm systems.

Ruidoso doesn't have official neighborhood watch programs, but it does have Crimestoppers, Maddox said. Typically, because of the amount of time people have to put in to maintain neighborhood watch programs, the programs have a short life span, Maddox said. Crimestoppers, however, can act as a village-wide neighborhood watch program, he added. Anyone who sees something suspicious can call the Crimestoppers number at 257-4545.

"I don't recommend bars on windows and doors for safety factors when there's a fire," Maddox said. "Alarm systems, when they are quality systems — they are a big deterrent."

"The village has laws that impact audio alarm systems. One aspect of that law requires a 'keyholder,' some-

one who will know when the alarm is triggered and has a key to get into the house.

Otherwise, dysfunctional alarms or triggered alarms can go on interminably, disturbing entire neighborhoods," Maddox said.

By law, police cannot break into a home unless

there is an obvious indication of a break-in or someone is perceived to be in danger. So, the village law states that someone needs to be able to turn off an alarm, to alert police to the alarm and to let them in to investigate.

Jack Halbrooks, owner of a local alarm company, said a professionally installed alarm system will cost the owner of mid-size home about \$400. That system should include triggers on doors, a motion sensor, a key pad and an outside siren.

The upper end of alarm systems, for a home of 3,000 square feet, cost about \$1,800-\$2,000, he said. Those systems should include the same as above as well as more motion detectors and alarm triggers for ground level windows.

Monitoring services usually cost about \$20 a month, Halbrooks said. To have a service that will go out to a home and wait for police will cost

about \$35 a month. Halbrooks urges anyone shopping for alarm systems to check that the service is bonded, licensed and has its own liability insurance.

That way a homeowner is protected if a worker slides off the roof when installing a system. Also, he urged that buyers comparison shop and do the math on the various systems.

Halbrooks also urges that "keyholders" don't investigate burglary alarms themselves, but that they always wait for police to arrive before trying to enter a home at which the alarm has been triggered.

Officials say permanent homes usually don't require as many deterrents as seasonal homes, but they should have deadbolt locks, windows and sensor lights.

Born also recommends dogs as burglary deterrents, adding that small dogs are best because they tend to make more noise than larger dogs.

in Roswell closed in 1995, as part of the county's agreement to remodel ENMMC.

St. Joseph Healthcare is the only Catholic-sponsored hospital system in New Mexico.

## It's an early 'Christmas' for cowboys, cowgirls

Mescalero's Fourth of July celebration begins with four full days of riding, bucking and roping at the Mescalero rodeo grounds Thursday through Sunday.

Local rodeo fans will have the opportunity to watch the hometown cowboys and cowgirls vie for hundreds of dollars in prize money against competitors from across the Southwest in the Mescalero Rodeo.

"It's been around a long time. We get quite a few (competitors) from Colorado, Arizona, Texas, and even as far as Oklahoma," said Freddy Chino, arena director.

"In a day's performance I usually get about 200 (competitors) and that goes on for four days," he added.

If they aren't in Mescalero, then the cowboys and cowgirls can be found in Capitán.

"This is what we call a 'cowboy Christmas.' A lot of them come down because they can hit two shows," said Chino, refer-

ring the Smokey Bear Stampede. The two rodeos end up complementing each other, Chino added, because cowboys and cowgirls will head to Mescalero for the afternoon competition and then to Capitán for the evening rodeo.

The events open each day at 1:30 p.m. in Mescalero. Admission is \$5 for adults and \$2 for children 12 and under.

Those wanting to compete for top honors can sign up the day of the competition at the Mescalero Community Center. The books will open from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. Cost to enter is: \$60 for either bareback riding, bull riding and calf roping; \$150 per team for team roping; and \$30 for barrel racing.

Each day added money will bolster the prize purses. For bull riding, calf roping and team roping another \$250 for each event will be added. For bareback riding another \$150 will be added every day and for barrel racing \$100 will be put in the pot. Casper Baca of Grants will provide the stock. (See 4B for Capitán rodeo information.)

## July Fourth starts with a bang - Thursday's Master Salls race

Four days of racing begins Thursday at Ruidoso Downs with the hotly contested Master Salls Handicap.

With the first three finishers from the Fine Loom Handicap returning and a new cast of invaders from Remington Park, Los Alamos and Santa Fe, Thursday's \$10,000 Master Salls Handicap has shaped up to be a competitive way to kick off the Fourth of July racing festivities at Ruidoso Downs.

The 870-yard feature for 3-year-olds and up, thoroughbred and quarter horse runners highlights the special holiday weekend card, and should offer fans a challenging handicapping riddle to solve.

Likely to go postward as the favorite in the Master Salls is the Mc Curr Partnership's Final Frontier. The 6-year-old gelded son of Phone Trick earned a 95 Speed Index when he won the Fine Loom Handicap here in 45.81 seconds for the 870 yards.

Breaking from post eight in the Fine Loom, the Ray Ashford-trained was fanned five-wide turning for home, but once straightened away, blew by the front runners to win by an open length in an impressive effort. Jockey Tanya Laib, who got her first Ruidoso Downs victory aboard Final Frontier in the Fine Loom, will be aboard again Thursday.

A pair of runners that also bear watching in the Master Salls are Steve Chavez's I've Been Blessed and Noblesse Six.

I've Been Blessed hit the eighth pole with a half-length advantage in the Fine Loom Handicap, but could not hold

off Final Frontier down the stretch and finished second in his 1997 debut. More recently, the Rudy Ramirez-trained First Down Dash gelding won the San Marcos Handicap at Retama Park in sloppy going.

Noblesse Six is another that started in the Fine Loom Handicap. The 1994 All American Futurity winner was making his first start since finishing second to Final Frontier in the Juarez Handicap at Sunland Park on Feb. 1.

The now 5-year-old Streakin Six gelding finished third in the Fine Loom, beaten 1-1/2 lengths, and was wheeled right back into an allowance race at the same distance at Santa Fe on June 21. Noblesse Six finished third in that race, beaten by another Master Salls starter, Ze Moon Chick.

The most serious threat among the newcomers though seems likely to come from Bob Putt's and Sandy Erwin's Featurin Creole. The 4-year-old Creole Dancer gelding was a 1-3/4-length winner last out of the Grade-3 Paul Valley Handicap at Remington Park.

Jim Brock trains the Texas-bred that has won two of four 1997 starts and banked \$26,285 thus far this season, more than any other Master Salls starter this year.

## RHS athletics score 5% budget increase

Using last year's numbers as a basis, the Ruidoso schools athletic department plans to build a healthy program with a slight increase in funding.

The Ruidoso School Board approved a tentative budget for the 1997-98 school year at a special meeting June 19, with \$245,296 penciled in for athletics.

Broken down, the total includes \$149,506 for salaries, benefits and other personnel expenses; \$35,000 for supplies and materials; \$35,000 for employee and student travel and training; and \$25,790 for contract services and other charges.

Overall, the \$245,296 is up from last year's \$233,089, a 5% increase district athletic director Les Carter said is standard because of increasing equipment costs and

general inflation. Gate receipts and concession sales will also fill out the athletics bottom line, with an estimated revenue of between \$30,000 to \$35,000.

With the sum equated, Carter and athletic staff will break out amounts for each sport based on last year's spending. And within each sport, the coaches will prioritize what their program's biggest needs are.

Booster clubs will have some new guidelines to follow next year. A new fundraising policy about who can raise money, how and for what goes into effect in 1997-98. Carter said he doesn't think the new policy will hurt the athletic programs, but will help him keep a tighter rein on the money being sought from the business community.

"It gives us more control," Carter said of the fundraising policy. "That's good. I think we need that."

The new rules revolve around the who and how of money gathering. Prompted by concerns from business owners who felt

they were being bombarded by requests for donations, Carter, superintendent Mike Gladden and RHS principal Ron Hodges drafted the policy which requires all fundraising projects receive written approval and offer a product or service in exchange for money. Additionally, no person or group can represent themselves as an agent of RHS without written authorization.

"All we're going to do is say you've got to supply a product or a service," Carter said. "It gets the kids more actively involved. They have to actively participate and be more involved, rather than just ask for money. We want the businesses of Ruidoso to know we appreciate everything they do for us."

And the outlook, in Carter's opinion, is bright for sports in 1997-98.

"Nobody should end up broke," he said. "As far as meeting the needs and all the requirements for all the sports, we really have a good budget."

"Of course we're human, though, we always want more," Carter added.





Two longtime ranchers and horsemen, Grady Eldridge and Fletcher Hall, will ride into the arena as grand marshalls of the Smokey Bear Stampede over the July 4th holiday weekend.

It will be a fitting tribute to the two, who helped organize the event 42 years ago and to develop the Lincoln County Fairgrounds at Capitan, where the stampede rodeo is staged.

The four-day dust beater breaks loose at 7 p.m. Thursday through Saturday, but starts earlier Sunday, at 3 p.m.

Casper Baca is supplying the stock. Buckles for event winners are being donated by Brewer Oil Co. The saddle for the All-Around winner was crafted by Dave Pope of Capitan. Smokey Bear, representing the U.S. Forest Service, will be on hand to hand out buckles for the Smokey Bear Calf Scramble.

Other events include bareback, bull riding, team roping, saddle bronc, calf roping, breakaway and barrel racing.

Don't worry about dull afternoons while waiting for the stampede to begin. The 5th Annual Old West Ranch Rodeo, highlighting the skills cowboys

needed to operate a ranch, swings into action at noon Friday and Saturday with team penning, team branding, team tying, horse catching and wild cow milking.

The two-step and twirl will give couples plenty to enjoy in the evenings after the rodeos. For \$5 per person, the Lincoln County Band will play from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.

If your energy runs low with all of the excitement, try the \$5 barbecue at 11:30 a.m. Friday prepared by members of the Carrizozo Masonic Lodge at the Lincoln County Fair Building.

## Marshalls are shining examples of the cowboy spirit

Growing up, Grady Eldridge moved with his large family from ranches to oil fields to farms.

A cowboy job brought young Eldridge to the Block Ranch near Capitan when he was 17. During his time there, he married his wife of more than 50 years, Margie Eldridge, whose father owned a ranch near the Block.

Besides inheriting part of his father-in-law's ranch, Eldridge built a one-man sawmill to manufacture the lumber to build his house, barns and corrals.

At 85, Eldridge today is a successful rancher, running about 300 head of cattle on the Bridle Bit Ranch.

"I always wanted to be remembered as a cowboy," Eldridge said. "That's the real life."

Eldridge met Fletcher Hall and became a team as the founding fathers of the Capitan Rodeo Association. Together, they competed, flagged and judged rodeos for more than 30 years before retiring.

Hall said he didn't know what he was going to do as a young man, but he wanted to live close to nature, ranches, horses and the outdoors.

He did just that while living in Capitan.

Born north of the small village in 1915, Hall has been a

rancher most of his life, with a stint as a first lieutenant in World War II. He also has been a city councilor, mayor and served a term on the local school board.

Hall was first chairman of the fair board and was arena director for 30 years.

For the last 10 years, starting when he was 72, racing has become a big factor in Hall's life. He has chalked up 32 feature race trophies and 35 blankets. His greatest thrill was winning the Breeder's Thoroughbred Derby in Albuquerque in 1991 with Mount Capitan.

Hall was first chairman of the fair board and was arena director for 30 years.





## What July Fourth is All About The Declaration of Independence



Jefferson stood 6 feet, 2 1/2 inches tall. He had red hair and was very thin. He was a man of great knowledge and many interests. He was 33 years old at the time he wrote the Declaration.


When you were born, your parents were given a very important document on special paper. It's your birth certificate.

The event we remember each July Fourth is the adopting of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. It has been called our country's birth certificate.

When the members of the Continental Congress meeting in Philadelphia adopted, or agreed to, this document, our country was born.

In the Declaration of Independence, men from 13 colonies made it very clear why they wanted to be independent from England.

Thomas Jefferson was the man who wrote it.



Thomas Jefferson, Roger Sherman, Benjamin Franklin, Robert R. Livingston and John Adams were the members of the committee appointed to write the Declaration. Jefferson presented his version to the Congress on June 20. Congress debated it from July 1 to July 4.

*All Declarations by the Representatives of the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA in General Congress assembled.*

*When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for a people to dissolve the political bonds which have connected them with one another ...*

This is a small part of the original rough draft of the Declaration of Independence. In Thomas Jefferson's handwriting. The final four pages have all the corrections made in his handwriting. The committee made 47 changes. Congress made 39 more. Most of them were not very big ones. Can you read this sample?

Jefferson wrote the Declaration of Independence by hand on one piece of paper folded to make four pages.

This draft of the Declaration of Independence is on display in the Rotunda of the Library of Congress, July 31 at the Thomas Jefferson Building.

Many of the delegates stayed at City Tavern, a very popular inn. Since he wanted a quieter place, Jefferson:

When getting down to work on the Declaration, Jefferson:
