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Mescaleros to vote for Chino or Peso as president

Mescalero voters will go to the polls Tuesday to decide who they want to lead their tribe for the next two years, President Wendell Chino or former Vice President Frederick Peso.

Chino, 72, has headed the Mescalero for 40 years. Peso lost his first bid for the top post two years ago. They faced no opposition in the

primary.

Fred Kaydahzinne, who is on leave as housing director during the campaign, is running for vice president after taking the most votes in the Sept. 30 primary out of the five candidates. He faces Paul Ortega, a member of the tribal council. The two knocked out three other opponents in the primary.

Incumbent vice president Keith Miller did not seek re-election.

Eight candidates, who took the

most primary votes out of a field of 12, will vie for four seats on the eight-member tribal council.

The eight are:

- Former council member Larry Pebeashy.
- Incumbent Fred Chino Sr.
- Incumbent Oliver Enjady, an artist.
- Former vice presidential candidate Harlyn Geronimo.
- Incumbent councilor Raymond Kirgan, who works as a forestry fire

management officer for the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

- BIA road department employee Christie La Paz Jr.
- Lillian Blake Lester of BIA social services.
- And incumbent Beryl Kanseah of the BIA forestry branch.

The only polling place is the community center in Mescalero. It will be open for voting from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Results will be posted throughout the community Wednesday.

Capitan sees jump in students

Classrooms maxed out, superintendent says

Enrollment in the Capitan School District exceeded projections by 40 students this year, which could mean as much as \$150,000 more money from the state.

But no one is smiling at the 647-student figure, because classrooms and space are maxed out.

Superintendent Diana Billingsley has told school board members the district needs to come up with a five-year plan to accommodate the phenomenal 33 percent growth rate since the 1990-91 school year.

Seven years ago, the total enrollment was 487 and no middle school existed. Students in sixth grade were moved from the elementary school and those in seventh and eighth grade were shifted from the high school in 1994-95 to attend a new middle school and lighten the load on the other two buildings.


Today district enrollment is 160 students higher than in 1990-91, more than the total number attending the middle school.

School board members already have adopted a policy to not accept students who live outside the Capitan district, although they will allow students who have attended in previous years to finish their schooling in Capitan.

"We're going to continue to grow," Billingsley said Thursday. "The elementary school is growing at a class-

'Outfit' is shooting up the old ranch

Cramped into a small corral east of Carrizozo, the crew filming "The Outfitters" scrambles between takes to check sound, lighting and camera angles.

They were shooting a scene Wednesday between two brothers in the film played by Danny Nucci and Del Zamora. The story is described as a high-spirited and sexy romantic comedy about the adventures of the two brothers and the women they love.

Writer/director Reverage Anselmo chose the small ranch of Fred LaMay as the setting for the scene. For the duration of the filming on the ranch, LaMay has been moved to the Smokey Bear Motel in Capitan.

Filming began Oct. 15 at Santa Rita Catholic Church in Carrizozo and will continue until mid-November in locations throughout the county.

"This is where I set the story, in the chaparral basins and wooded mountains," Anselmo said. "This place gave the plots for many Westerns, but 'The Outfitters' is the first to actually be filmed here."

Independent filmmaker Penny Fearon, known in the business for her documentaries, is producing "The Outfitters."

Anselmo and Fearon started their association 10 years ago just after he completed his first draft manuscript of his novel, "The Cadillac of Six-By's," based on his wartime experience as a U.S. Marine in Beirut.

Wednesday, Nucci spent his time off camera reading the novel, which was published this year by Harper Collins. He seemed impressed.

Nucci brings more than a decade of experience to his interpretation of P.D. Mitjans, the main character who returns to his family ranch carrying his father's

Split lot spurs look at law

• About 3,000 lots in Ruidoso could be divided under the current law, a village leader says.

Ruidoso councilors settled a long neighborhood dispute this week when they allowed a landowner in the Town & Country Estates to split his lot in two.

They also raised a concern for the entire village.

"If you substantially increase that (lot divisions), that could require fairly substantial improvements to accommodate those additional lots," said Cleo Richards, director of Ruidoso's planning department.

Ruidoso has about 3,000 lots that could be split.

"Which effectively doubles the amount of available lots in Ruidoso," Richards said.

The primary concern, based on councilors' comments, is being able to provide water to additional lots without a significant strain on existing homes nearby.

Richards told the council that infrastructure is constructed in a subdivision based on the original number of lots. But many subdivisions in Ruidoso have large lots which qualify for subdivision under village law.

Any lot that has a minimum of 10,000 square feet and a 75-foot frontage is large enough to meet village regulations.

Even if a subdivision has covenants prohibiting lot division, the council cannot deny a request to divide a lot that meets all the village requirements.

"The village doesn't and cannot enforce the covenants on private property," Richards said. "If those property owners feel that they have been infringed, then that's a civil action for them to take."

Richardson, though, asked the council to initiate a study to possibly change the ordinance because of the possible consequences if lot divisions become a

Felon arrested with 22 guns will undergo mental exam

• Thomas Papantony had 22 weapons in his room at a Ruidoso hotel and claimed that Clinton's Nazi death squads were after him.

Thomas Papantony is missed by his former employer.

"He was here for four years, and he is a good man," said Grace Aycock, owner of the Arrowhead Motel. "And there

is nothing wrong with him, no matter what they say."

What they say is Papantony, 63, is mentally incompetent to stand trial on multiple charges of being an armed felon, according to his Ruidoso attorney Robert Beauvais.

This spring, Ruidoso police

recovered 22 guns from Papantony's room at the motel where he was caretaker. Papantony, who had a prior felony conviction, is firing a gun at a building, is not legally allowed to own weapons.

Adding to questions of his competency, Papantony distrib-

uted fake court documents in Alamogordo in which he rambles about President Clinton's Nazi death squads, of finding Montezuma's treasure of gold, and of Clinton being a serial killer and not legally president.

After reviewing an extensive psychological evaluation on Papantony, federal Judge John Conway recently contacted both Beauvais and prosecutors in the case to ask if a competency hearing was really necessary.

"It's kind of unusual for us to hear from the judge: 'Hey, what are we going to do with this guy?'" Beauvais said.

Conway waived the hearing, which the prosecutors didn't challenge, and last week he ordered the second phase of Papantony's competency issue. Beauvais said.

Now the issue is "Whether he can be treated to competen-






A glimpse into Lincoln County's past, compiled from local newspapers by Polly E. Chavez.

Ruidoso News
Oct. 31, 1947

There are four elementary schools located on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation. A one-teacher school at Carrizo, 16 miles from the Mescalero Agency; a two-teacher school at Elk-Silver, 25 miles from Mescalero; a two-teacher school at Mescalero; and a one-

teacher school at Whitetail, 26 miles from the Agency. The total school enrollment is 250 pupils. The education division, as well as all other reservation activities, is under the supervision of Mohn O. Crow.

Each school has a bus driver who also acts as school laborer and janitor; and a cook who prepares the noon meal. The education program is directed at encouraging and teaching Indian people to live on their farming assignments and earn a livelihood in farming, supplemented by livestock income.

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Downs police group seeks better benefits

Only three people are members of the Ruidoso Downs Police Association, but if Ruidoso Downs signs a contract with the group, then employees villagewide will benefit, a proponent says.

"We are looking for better benefits and we are looking for defined policies," said Corky Condon, president of the association and a Downs police officer for five years.

If granted, the improved benefits are likely to become standard villagewide, he added.

Earlier this week, the Ruidoso Village Council reviewed the proposed contract between the association and village in a closed session for almost two hours. The council took no action, but intends to continue negotiating with the association, said Downs Village Attorney Dan Bryant.

"What we did is just review the contract from front to back," Bryant said.

The council may consider the contract "two or three more times before we get down to the final language," he added.

The contract, Condon said, would give members of the Police Department a 10 percent increase in benefits next

year. It would also provide incentive and longevity pay to members of the Police Department to encourage officer training and long term employment. In the past, said Condon, many officers considered the Downs a stepping-stone to large police departments.

"We want the good officers to stay with the department and that's one of the reasons we are asking for better benefits," Condon said.

Though the association actually organized about 18 months ago, it didn't begin negotiations with the village until January, Condon said. It has three active members and two proposed members, Condon said. The department has 12 full-time employees and three part-time employees.

The contract the association is asking for is a standardized document used by many police organizations, and many parts of it are already covered by the village.

One deviation is the requirement for more defined policies.

Condon said policies for the Police Department were initially written a long time ago and have become somewhat hazy in interpretation. For example, the length of time in which a rookie officer is on probation with the department, Condon said he's heard three different time periods, ranging from three to 18 months.

Condon said certain portions of the contract may not be approved by the council, but that the document would be a benefit to Ruidoso Downs.

"I don't see how the contract can hurt the village," he said.

room a year. It will need another classroom next year and there's no space left."

Kindergarten students were moved to the administration building to create more space for elementary grades, she said.

Board members are working with teachers to develop a strategy, Billingsley said.

The teachers have been asked to list what the district needs in coming years in curriculum facilities, if money was no obstacle, she said.

Options for the future could include remodeling, addi-

tions or building a new school.

Meanwhile, the 647-student enrollment is expected to be reimbursed by the state at \$2,175 per student this school year.

That's more than the \$2,129 last year, but less than the \$2,200 quoted by the state when the district was putting its budget together, Billingsley said.

A final figure won't be released by the state until January, after special education students are counted in December.

Other students are counted on the 40th day after the beginning of a new school year.

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Photographer says filming here is challenge because of outdoors

Hauling gear into remote areas and working with the vagaries of weather are challenges that Joey Forsythe has been beating for more than a decade.

As director of photography on "The Outfitters," a movie being shot around Carrizozo, Forsythe said the tradeoff for spectacular scenery is worth the effort.

Earlier this year, she filmed a movie in Montana in an area that didn't even have telephone service.

"New Mexico is not nearly as isolated," she said. "It becomes a budgetary problem. You really have to bring everything. If you're shooting in Los Angeles, you can rent something for a few days and return it. Here, you have to plan ahead and make sure you brought all the things that you can't get locally."

The challenge of this particular film has become the weather, because about 80 percent is being filmed outside, she said.

"And that's a lot," Forsythe said. "Many films have a greater proportion of interiors shots where they have lot more control, but at the same time, we're shooting amazingly beautiful surroundings and that's exciting. It far outweighs any headaches with the weather and less and less daylight."

The crew also has been pleased with the friendly reception from local residents, who are willing to cooperate, yet respecting the requirements of filming, she said.

Forsythe came by her interest in photography naturally and at an early age. Her father is an engineer and photographer and her mother is involved in the arts.

"So I kind of grew up in a darkroom," she said.

She turned toward motion pictures in her teens, then met some people in college who were interested in film making.

"And they encouraged me to go to New York University, where I went to film school," she said.

At that time, Forsythe was one of two women in the area interested in shooting films.

"It was pretty rare at the time," she said.

When she graduated in 1978, she joined the union as an electrician, also one of the first in New York to work on feature films.

She juggled the dual career — electrician and cinematographer on small projects — until about 11 years ago when she went full time as a director of photography.

Her first feature in charge behind the camera was called "New Year's Day." It also was David Duchovny's first movie. Duchovny went on to become co-star of "The X Files" television series.

Forsythe likes the whole process of film making.

"It's a collaboration between a lot of different people and that's very exciting — between the director, the actors and the production designer," she said. "And in addition to that, there is the collaboration with the crew I work with, the camera, grip and electric crew."

"And it's also using visual images to tell a story that I find really interesting."

Being a woman in the motion picture business has created some problems, but also some advantages, she said.

"I think if you ask any woman in this business if they've had problems (they would say yes)," Forsythe said. "There are jobs I didn't get, because I was female, but there

are more and more jobs I get. I think people are interested in the fact that a woman is shooting."

"I'm not the only one. There are a number of us, but not a lot of us. I think at the end of the day, it all balances out."

The process of filming is very technical, she said.

"It's very dependent on things that are not always under your control from generators to the weather to the sun going down," Forsythe said. "So there's a bit of fretting that goes on. And then there's a creative side and you're always trying to make sure you're artistically doing something interesting and appropriate."

"There are a lot of things that can go wrong and it's really kind of amazing how much and how often things go right."

In the past year, Forsythe has directed the photography on four movies and has a total of 14 to her credit. The best known was called "Naked in New York" with Martin Scorsese as executive producer.


"I did five features in New York before moving to Los Angeles eight years ago," she said.

Although her parents initially were worried about their daughter's choice of career, as her assignments have increased in number and prestige, they have started to relax and enjoy her success.

"This is a profession that allows me to talk shop with both of them," she said, noting her father's background in photography and her mother's in the arts.

Forsythe said she has no directorial ambitions, although she has produced a few projects.

"I enjoyed it," she said. "But I primarily think of myself as a director of photography."

ashes, after spending 10 years in Mexico. He hopes to rekindle his relationship with Cat Bonfaim, portrayed by Dana Delany.

Delany found fame in the critically acclaimed series "China Beach," which garnered her four Emmy nominations and two Emmy awards for Best Actress. Her recent films include "Exit to Eden" and "Tombstone."

But before Nucci's character can pursue that dream, he must confront his luckless brother, A.J. Mitjans, played by Del Zamora, about their inheritance.

"As a kid I always lived in a fantasy," Nucci said Wednesday. "I was running around as Robin the Wonder Boy with a towel around my neck."

He was born in Austria, grew up in a small town outside Venice, Italy, and then

moved to the United States with his family when he was 7. He learned to speak English in Queens and three years later the family settled down in San Fernando Valley.

The first time he stepped on stage for real was in junior high school, appearing in the musical "Westside Story."

"The first time I got a laugh, I was hooked," Nucci said.

He landed a day job on "General Hospital," at the age of 14 and made his feature film debut as Spider Bomboni, the coolest in the group of young buddies, in New Line Cinema's "Book of Love," a coming-of-age story.

Other notable films followed, including "Alive," "Blind Justice," "Crimson Tide," "Eraser," "The Rock," and "That Old Feeling," with Bette Midler.

Just days after finishing a feature role as the idealistic

best friend of Leonardo DiCaprio in James Cameron's "Titanic," he reported to work in New Mexico.

Nucci made his biggest impression on industry leaders and the movie-going public as Petty Officer Rivetti in Tony Scott's box office biggie, "Crimson Tide."

He was noticed sufficiently by producer Jerry Bruckheimer to be cast as the Navy SEAL assigned to guard Sean Connery in "The Rock."

He was cited as having "sexy star power," in Daily Variety's critique of one of his more recent movies, "The Big Squeeze."

But before Lincoln County women start planning ways to access the set, be warned. Nucci is a married man of two years who says his time off screen is split between his wife and playing the saxophone and writing and recording music in his four-track studio.

Rural medical service

Few states are more rural than New Mexico, and nobody is more vulnerable in a medical emergency than people living far from medical facilities.

Thirty or 40 years ago, rural "ambulance service" was a volunteer willing at all hours to drive miles to take a suddenly ill or injured person to the nearest hospital, whatever the distance. Often as not the "ambulance" was a station wagon with the back seats replaced with a mattress. (Ford Motor Company for a while even produced such a vehicle with a big Thunderbird engine and a side-opening rear door and called it an "Amblewagon.")

Happily, times have changed. Trained emergency medical technicians (EMTs) working in teams with well-equipped "amblevans" have made a huge difference in the survival rate for those suddenly in need of care while at remote villages or ranches.

But in rural New Mexico, "volunteer" remains part of the lexicon. These volunteers, unlike the old days, have undergone much training on how to care for and stabilize an ill or injured person. Many ambulances have the communications facilities to reach doctors or hospitals while at the scene or on the way to a hospital.

Lincoln County's commissioners pushed a hot button a few months ago when they decided to contract with Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services (or EMS) to provide service in the area from Alto to Sierra Blanca Airport along with some other scattered rural pockets around Ruidoso.

Controversial with some Alto people at the time, the new rural service — according to the commissioners — has left a good impression. So good, in fact, that they're considering putting all the Lincoln County EMS under the supervision of the Ruidoso service, which is affiliated with Lincoln County Medical Center.

But some doubts remain, one of them being the cost to the county. Another, as expressed by Commissioner L. Ray Nunley, is "what happens to the people we already have." He said, and we agree, that it's an emotional issue for the volunteers; they took the training to benefit the people around them.

Jim Stover, who heads the paid professional service in Ruidoso, told the commission last week that once the (Alto) volunteers saw they weren't to be replaced by paid Ruidoso EMTs, "they welcomed the additional support from the hospital." And most wanted more training.

Stover also cited the efficiency of having a central coordinating agency. To, he advocates paying volunteers for "on call" hours, rather than a per-trip fee as now provided.

Nevertheless, Chairman Monroy Montes wants the commission to hear directly from the volunteers.

So the commission will look at the cost to taxpayers, and at the impact on those volunteers, and then decide. The goal, of course, should be to develop a county-wide emergency medical service that is technically good, and enthusiastically supported by the people who make it work.

Village council moves closer to approving impact fees

Ruidoso this week moved a step closer to establishing impact fees.

On Tuesday the Ruidoso Village Council unanimously approved a state prerequisite for creating impact, or development, fees.

The land use assumptions study basically projects the village's growth in the next five years. Those numbers will be used to determine the village's infrastructure needs.

According to the study, prepared by James Duffan and Associates, Ruidoso's seasonal peak population will be 15,000 in the year 2002. There also will be 7,540 homes and almost 2 million square feet of commercial buildings in five years, the study said.

Councillor Robert Donaldson voiced the most objections to the study, saying its projections also didn't account for many factors, such as vacation homes turning into year-round homes, or homes being built on divided lots. The low numbers may even be "setting Ruidoso

up" for a low count in the 2000 U.S. Census, Donaldson said.

Village administrators said the study would not affect the Census and that the numbers in the study could be changed as more information becomes available.

Cleatus Richards of the Planning Department said the study's numbers are supported by local school enrollments, though there is a 3 to 4 percent point margin of error.

"It's not a one shot — that we can never go back and look at it again," said Village Manager Gary Jackson.

According to state law, a city may assess a development fee to pay for increased infrastructure demands. But the law requires several prerequisites, including a professional study on the impact of new construction on infrastructure — the land use assumptions — and the creation of an advisory committee. By law, at least 40 percent of the committee must be from the industries most affected, such as development, construction and real estate.

The council created the Capital Improvements Plan Advisory Committee this

spring. Several members resigned from the committee in June, objecting to a possible impact fee of more than \$4,000 a lot.

Jackson at the time said no amount, if any, had been predetermined.

The committee's membership was reduced from seven to five members, and the Ruidoso Village Council appointed one new member.

The new committee approved the land use assumptions document in September and sent it to the Ruidoso Village Council.

Bridge at Willow, River Trail will be down for repairs

Ruidoso street crews are taking down the bridge at River Trail and Willow Road this week for repairs, an official said.

It will be down for about 45 days or longer, depending on weather conditions.

An alternate route is available where River Trail exits into the free parking lot west of the Ruidoso State Bank.

cy or whether a civil action needs to take place," he said.

Papantony has been moved to a federal facility in Leavenworth, Kan., for the evaluations, Beauvais said. Doctors there will determine whether or not Papantony represents a danger to himself or others.

Based on their evaluations, Papantony will either be confined to a mental hospital until

he is no longer a threat, or released into a half-way house situation, Beauvais said.

"And I suspect that the guy needs to be institutionalized," he said.

Aycock disagrees, saying that Papantony was a smart and kind man who worked hard while under her employ.

"All they had was that he had too many guns, and they all weren't his — he had brought some back for his son,"

Aycock said.

"He shouldn't have written those things," she added. But, "He wouldn't be dangerous. He wouldn't hurt a fly. And I'll back him all the way."

Beauvais said he was impressed by the extensiveness of the evaluation conducted on Papantony regarding his competency. Even his family members and former employers had been contacted during the evaluation, he said.

trend.

The issue came before the council after a group of homeowners in Town & Country Estates repeatedly fought another landowner's request to divide his lot into two lots.

Nancy Horn objected, saying the lot division would decrease the haphazard water pressure she has now.

"Last year, we didn't have

any water," Horn said. "When I ran the washing machine, I couldn't run the dishwasher."

After a long battle through the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission, which advises the council, the homeowners came out on top. The commission denied the request from Beulah Shaffer, even though the it met village requirements.

But village councillors, with one exception, approved

the subdivision because it met all the village requirements.

The village, several councillors said, could become subject to a lawsuit by denying the request.


Councillor Robert Donaldson voted against overturning the commission's decision, saying the lot division could be denied if it represented a hazard — such as not having enough water pressure to handle a fire in the area.

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Corona ram experiment effort benefits area's sheep ranchers

CORONA - Genetic tracking is nothing new in Lincoln County.

Each year sheep producers enter about five to 10 of their highest quality ram lambs in a testing program at New Mexico State University's Corona Range and Livestock Research Center.

This year on Oct. 10, producers taking part in the test conducted by the university's Cooperative Extension Service and Agricultural Experiment Station picked up rams that had been studied for the past year and dropped off a new set of test subjects at the research center 12 miles northeast of Corona.

Lincoln, Chaves and McKinley counties are the top sheep producers in the state. Sheep and lamb production was valued at \$9.2 million in 1995, while the value of wool production hit \$3.5 million, according to the state's Agricultural Statistics Service.

"This test gives producers a benchmark for where their sheep flocks are in terms of growth and wool production and quality," said Tim Ross, sheep scientist with the experi-

ment station. "It also helps them identify genetically superior rams for selection purposes."

Sheep ranchers are looking for rams that grow the biggest and produce the most and best quality wool.

Every 45 days throughout the test year, the rams are gathered from the range. Measurements are taken to keep track of weight gain and wool production and quality.

"This really is a unique performance test that very few other places in the world do," said Bobby Rankin, university animal and range sciences department head.

Pam and Tom Runyan, who run 2,500 head of sheep near Piñon, are pleased with the way the test mimics range conditions on their land. However, the Runyans decided not to enter their best sheep in the tests.

"We're trying to find out where we're going with our range rams," Pam Runyan said.

"We didn't pick the biggest or the finest, because we already knew they had the qualities we wanted. We picked representatives of the rams we're putting out in the pasture."

The pickup day this year coincided with a center field day. Rams from the test just completed and rams for the new test were on display to give producers a chance to see the contrast and what happens over a year's time at the research center, said Ron Parker, extension animal sciences department head.

The field day also gave the 170 area producers attending a chance to find out about other research projects at the 28,000-acre research center established eight years ago.


Much of the work at the center focuses on optimizing supplemental feeding of range cattle and sheep.

"We have faculty and graduate students from campus who do some rather extensive studies of supplementing both yearling and two-year-old cattle to affect their reproductive rates," Rankin said.

Producers are concerned about supplemental feeding because it's one of the major costs to both cattle and sheep operations in the state.

Not all of the scientists who take the 180 mile trek to conduct the studies at the Corona research center are animal scientists.

Other projects deal with range management and brush and mule deer control.

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Ex-Olympian tells Mescalero students his 'secret'

Former Olympian Billy Mills came to Mescalero on Wednesday and challenged students to live their lives as warriors.

By warriors Mills didn't mean physically strong and mean. Rather, he asked to students to be brave, strong and to chase their dreams.

And Mills spoke from his heart. The only American to win a gold medal in the 10,000-meter run (at the 1964 Olympic Games in Tokyo), he knows a lot about strength and chasing dreams.

A Lakota Sioux born on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota, Mills was 7 when his mother died and 12 when his father died. He overcame that early obstacle and earned an athletic scholarship to the University of Kansas. In 1960, Mills tried to make the U.S. Olympic team, but failed. Determined to succeed, he trained 75 to 100 miles a week for four years and made the 1964 team. Making the team led to his crowning achievement - winning the gold medal in a race that is still referred to as one of the greatest in Olympic history.

But Mills told Mescalero students that winning that race isn't what has mattered most to him in his life. He said the race was "many, many, many years and 36 pounds ago," and that

he's put the gold medal in its place.

The moment when he knew just how important, or unimportant the medal was, came at the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona. Retelling a story he called the most "beautiful and painful way" to put the medal in its place, Mills spoke of a conversation he overheard. Talking about that year's exciting 10,000-meter race, the 1964 race came up and started the group of American journalists wondering whatever happened to that "Indian guy who won."

One journalist spoke up and said, "I'll tell you what happened to him. He's like all the rest of Indian people; he's an alcoholic, he's a drug addict, he might have won a race, but like all the other Indian people he quit when it counted."

That moment was a defining one for Mills - a moment when he reaffirmed his commitment to sharing "the secret" with Native American youth.

The secret, Mills promised the youth gathered in the Mescalero Schools gymnasium, "will help your dreams come true."

The secret? "You include yourself on your terms with your support system and you control the power," Mills said. "You find the positive desires within you. With positive desires comes self-motivation, with self-motivation

comes work and with work comes success." He said the secret first came to him while he was in college in a beginning psychology class. While perusing one of his textbooks, Mills said, he ran across a paragraph that changed his life.

"Your subconscious mind cannot tell the difference between reality and imagination. Your subconscious mind will react equally to both."

Putting that in simpler terms, Mills said that passage told him "you are what you think."

He challenged each student to live life as a warrior. A warrior, Mills said, possesses four characteristics - self-responsibility, humility, respect and spirituality.

He also challenged students to stay drug- and alcohol-free.

"Good people drink; good people take drugs," Mills said. "It's what these good people do

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"Good people drink; good people take drugs," Mills said. "It's what these good people do

(when they drink or do drugs) that's bad. I challenge you to be drug-free."

The message was at the core of the week's festivities in Mescalero, where the school was celebrating Red Ribbon Week.

Mills' speech was also part of a new program at the Mescalero school - a program that brings in one Native American motivational speaker a month.

"It's extremely important to let our kids know, as Indian people, we can set high goals for ourselves," said Superintendent Gerald Gray of the program. "It's very important for our kids to see."

In closing, Mills showed a short videotape of Olympians, including himself, that had overcome adversity to achieve their dreams. The tape ended with Jesse Owens' famous quote that "everyone should have a dream."

"I'm challenging you to have a dream," Mills said.

It bodes well for next year. The Warriors lose seniors Scott Sebastian, Tobias Sommer, Fernando Bonilla Cruz, Zack Carey and Gerald Gomez, but return

Ruidoso gridders not spooked by their mission

Two teams headed in opposite directions meet face-to-face on the football field tonight at W.D. Horton Stadium.

They share the same amount of victories (three each) and equally tough schedules, but that's where the similarities end between Ruidoso and Cobre.

The Warriors, 3-5 overall and 1-1 in the 3AAA, are coming off an idle week after claiming a moral victory over Silver two weeks ago. Ruidoso needs to win its final two district games to make the playoffs for the third time in four years — a goal well within the reach of Les Carter's Warriors.

After a good start, the 3-6 Cobre Indians find themselves reeling with two straight losses in district play, including last week's 33-12 drubbing by Hot Springs.

Each team's coach tells the story.

Thursday, Carter was almost matter-of-fact about the game.

"We just need to win the next two. Take care of our business and don't worry about what anybody's else is doing," he said.

Two days ago, Cobre coach Brian Miller was still seeking answers.

"We just keep working, and keep the faith, I guess. Just try to find a way to get the spark going," Miller said. "There's some things you just don't know. Being flat emotionally, I don't understand that. I mean, I understand that, but what you do to keep that from happening again, you just prepare as well as you can and talk to the kids about responding and being mentally ready." The ease in which Hot Springs beat Cobre caught the Indians by surprise.

"We certainly didn't overlook Hot Springs," Miller said. "From a coaching standpoint, I knew Hot Springs was going to keep getting better ... we knew would have to play well to win."

"But hopefully from the kids' aspects, if there's a lesson to be learned here, you've got to respect everybody you play and you've got to prepare to compete."

Can the Indians pull an ambush on the Warriors?

Carter doesn't think so. "We have to prepare for everybody just the same way. We will prepare for Cobre the way we have for everybody else all year," Carter said.

changing coaches. I've seen them play some tough games, against Socorro, people like that," he said. "They're a team we'll have to prepare for."

Of concern to Miller and the Indians is the Warriors' triple option, featuring junior quarterback Corey Saenz, backs Adrian Herrera, Brett Meyer and Juan Warner and receivers Josh Varnadore and Garvin Grant.

Cobre's best defense might be its offense. The Indians will try to control the ball with its running game.

"We're going to try to mix it up as much as we can — just be patient offensively and try to take advantage of some of the strengths that we have," Miller said. "We're not going to abandon the running game, because that's been what's got us where we are, good or bad. We're just going to try to mix it up and put in few new wrinkles."

Carter is confident in his troops.

"I think the team is well focused," he said. "They're bigger than we are, but I think we'll make up for it in heart."

Bald eagles fly south (as in the Ruidoso area) for the winter

Now is the time to be on the lookout for our most famous endangered species, the bald eagle (*Haliaeetus leucocephalus*).

The eagles are making their way back to spend the winter with us.

Since the early '70s, the bald eagle has been observed using our local lakes and mountains as winter roosting areas. The most common areas where eagles can be seen are Bonito Lake, Alto Lake, Grindstone Reservoir, Mescalero Lake and the Arabella region. Historically, the bald eagle has used two sites in Jicarilla Mountains, the Patos Mountains, Carrizo Peak, the Tucson Mountains and the Capitan Mountains.

The bald eagle doesn't nest here, but only spends the winter. They arrive in late November and leave again in March. They've come from as far as Oregon, Washington, Minnesota, Wisconsin, the Great Lakes area, Canada and even Alaska where they breed. After the breeding season

and after their young have fledged, the bald eagles migrate south as far as Baja.

The bald eagle returns each year to our area lakes because of the roosting attributes around the lakes, such as trees that are easily accessible. The trees generally have good visibility and are large and tall with strong open branching structure near the water. The trees tend to be in areas protected from prevailing winds.

Water is a critical attribute for a roosting habitat since the majority of the bald eagle's diet consists of fish (alive or dead). The rest of its diet consists of waterfowl and some mammals such as rabbits and rats. A bald

eagle will feed on carrion as well. A bald eagle that ingests waterfowl wounded by a hunter's lead shot will suffer lead poisoning. This is one of the main reasons the bald eagle was first listed as endangered by the U.S. First and Wildlife Services in 1973.

Pesticides such as DDT contributed to the bald eagle's decline in numbers as well. Farmers used the chemical on crops. The chemical killed the insects, then birds ate the contaminated insects and then the bald eagles would eat the birds, creating a deadly food chain. The chemical bioaccumulation in the birds resulted in a poisonous levels in the bald eagle. Those levels made the egg shells from a bald eagle's clutch weak and unable to support the weight of a bald eagle for incubation. Since DDT's ban in 1972, eagle populations, as well as other bird numbers, have grown.

Human disturbance such as log-

ging, mining and construction has contributed to the declining eagle populations.

Destruction and disturbance of bald eagles is a federal offense. The sale of bald eagle feathers is prohibited, except for Native American Indian religious and ceremonial purposes.

In 1995 the bald eagle was removed from the Federal Endangered Species list, but New Mexico still classifies the bald eagle as endangered.

Keep in mind while looking for this majestic bird that there is another eagle that lives in this area, the golden eagle (*Aquila chrysaetos*). These eagles often are confused with the immature bald eagle because the bald eagle doesn't mature into its adult plumage (white head and tail feathers) until after its fourth year.

Eagle-eyed volunteers needed
The Smokey Bear Ranger District

needs volunteers to survey for bald eagles in the Ruidoso vicinity. Areas to be surveyed include Bonito, Alto, Grindstone and Mescalero lakes.

Surveys will be conducted Tuesdays and Thursdays beginning Nov. 11, and ending in the middle of March 1998. Scheduled times for these surveys will be in the morning as well as afternoon. If you're interested in volunteering, call the Smokey Bear Ranger District at 257-4095.

VIPS seeking commitment from local businesses allowing employees to spend time at Ruidoso schools.

Program asks for an hour a month

Compared to the National Guard, Volunteers in Public Schools isn't asking for much.

The Guard asks employers to free up their employees to serve one weekend a month; in contrast VIPS is asking for only an hour.

VIPS is working with the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce on a campaign to involve all local businesses in a partnership with Ruidoso schools. The thrust is simple - sign a contract and commit to letting parents of school-age children have one hour a month to volunteer at their child's school.

Becky Nichols, VIPS coordinator, said the current program is a revital-

ization of a program started in 1993. The idea began in the 1993-94 school year with Youth Empowered for Success. Spearheaded by Nob Hill Early Childhood Center Principal Roger Sowder, that effort netted the support of 120 local businesses.

But the goal is much higher this year. Ron Anderson, president of the chamber, said he's shooting for 100 percent participation.

"It's important to get all the businesses in town just be aware (of the program) and to sign this document," he said. "The chamber has 600-plus members. If we could get just chamber members to sign this, we'd be way ahead of the game. But we don't want to stop there."

Nichols said the agreement can benefit everyone involved - children,

parents and employers.

"It's extremely important for parents to be involved," she said. "It gives children a great deal of satisfaction and pride to see their parents involved at school. We just think it's critical parents are involved in their children's education. Everyone benefits. There's a sense of pride and accomplishment in knowing you're doing something to help the children of our community."

Joan Bailey, executive director of the chamber, agreed.

"In a community the size of ours and to an extent the size of our county, we're very limited in terms of our resources. Most often we think of buildings or revenues, but the most critical ingredient to all of this are well-intended and well-motivated

individuals," she said. "So often when you look, time and time again, at so many projects in our area, it all goes back to volunteer efforts."

Nichols said support for the program has been great, and she reminds everyone that an hour a month isn't that much time at all.

"Everyone gets at least an hour off for lunch. Even if they just use the time to come and have lunch with their kids once a week, once a month - it makes a difference," she said.

And in 10 or 20 years, Anderson said, that one hour a month won't add up to much compared to the memories it can make.

"This program is so important because time goes by. Kids are in school and then all of a sudden they're not," he said. "Time goes by."

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


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
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A classic wave of fashion

Octogenarian artist John Meigs is honored for his Hawaiian designs

Artist-collector John Meigs will be winging his way to Hawaii next month to attend the opening of an exhibition of Hawaiian Aloha shirts.

Most people don't know it, but long before the versatile Meigs arrived in San Patricio, he created more than 100 designs used in the colorful shirts that became synonymous with Hawaii and places like Waikiki Beach.

"In a sense, it (the shirts) put Hawaii on the map for people all over the country who had heard of Hawaii, but had no idea of what anybody was doing there that was unique," said the 81-year-old former gallery owner.

Ironically, Meigs no longer has any of the now-valuable shirts.

"I never did save any of them," he said. "I brought some with me to New Mexico, but I always thought they never worked too well with a cowboy hat."

When Meigs arrived in Hawaii before World War II, he was a reporter first for the Honolulu Star Bulletin and later the Honolulu Advertiser.

"In those days, everybody did triple and quadruple things, because it was a comparatively small community," he said.

Someone came up with the idea of creating brightly colored shirts that would appeal to the native Hawaiian population and four or five local garment manufacturers jumped on the idea. Meigs was one of the people they asked to come up with fabric designs.

"I thought nothing is so Hawaiian as an ancient Tapa," Meigs said. "So I

went to the Bishop Museum. The director was a friend of mine and I asked him to take me to the basement to see some of the pre-Capt. James Cooke designs."

Tapa cloth originally was made from the inner bark of certain trees in Hawaii and was used for sleeping coverings and clothing, created by layering the beaten bark and dyeing it.

Four or five people contributed designs during the next 10 years, he said. The manufacturers were mostly local such as the Kamehameha Garment Co. Ltd., although some of the shirts were made in the United States mainland and shipped back.

Meigs served in the Navy in the South Pacific after the war was declared against the Japanese. When he returned, New York manufacturers were jumping on the bandwagon, Meigs said.

"This was the new thing," he said. "Up to then, no one thought much about it."

He designed from 130 to 140 patterns for four or five different manufacturers.

"A lot of kooky things were designed, but I always tried to be a purist when it came to using motifs from Hawaiian sources," Meigs said.

"Most of those buying at the time I was designing were Hawaiians and the people coming over on the Lurline, the great tourist ship, which was the way to get there in those times," he said. "The first thing people did when they arrived was make a beeline for a department store to buy one."

Eventually the use of the colorful

designs spread to draperies, wall coverings and other forms of decoration.

Recognition of the unique and usable art form was arranged by collector Ed Eskanizi of Seattle, Meigs said.

"I sold my collection to some people in Pennsylvania who came to visit me in San Patricio. It appealed to them and they bought everything I had left," he said.

Eskanizi bought out their collection and began contacting Meigs about any other items he might have. Then he connected with the Honolulu Academy of Arts about giving the show. Meigs' name was well-known at the academy. Eight years ago, he judged a show there and he previously hung an one-man exhibition of his own work there.

The show begins Nov. 19 and will run through Dec. 15. Meigs will stay two weeks in the islands with friends who still live there. He also will meet with designers of today's Hawaiian shirts and will be lecturing, which is sure to be a treat because Meigs has a colorful story for every subject and a sure-fire memory.

Not one to sit idle, Meigs also just finished an exhibit of 110 items, about one-third of his art collection, in all mediums and featuring work by Peter Hurd, Henriette Wyeth, N.C. Wyeth and Andrew Wyeth. The show closed

last week in the university in Las Cruces.

"They said it was the most successful exhibition they've had since they opened," Meigs said. "It was beautifully installed."

He has a close spot in his heart for Las Cruces, having renovated

a historic restaurant there for oilman Robert O. Anderson and designing portions of the Holiday Inn.

But that's another chapter in the lengthy and varied life story of John Meigs.

New director offers her vision

Team work brings good theater to Spencer

The art of a good theater is more than what audiences see on stage.

Just ask Theta Smith, new director of the Spencer Theater for the Performing Arts.

"The people here, the little ones — all of the people who never get interviewed," Smith said, are the secret to Spencer's success. "If you talk to performers after a performance or even a rehearsal for a performance, the people most important to them are all the people helping them backstage. I know we need glue (to hold it all together). I like to think of myself as that glue.

"This is not a one-person operation. There's no way in the world any of this would happen with only one person."

So what makes good glue?

Smith, who replaced Rand Harmon after he was fired by the Spencer board Oct. 7, said it's part spirit, part soul and part selflessness.

"Confidence in yourself and the

people on your staff, high self-esteem and a strong work ethic, not just lip service," were a few components of glue that Smith listed. "I won't ask anybody to do anything I wouldn't do myself.

"I feel very strongly about motivational books and tapes that keep you in a positive frame of mind and attitude, and keep you humble."

Smith, 56, has been in management for more than 20 years. In that time she has run an executive head-hunting firm in Dallas and managed a dental office in Ruidoso. At the heart of her management philosophy are people.

"I hate this phrase because it's so overworked, so overused, but I really do mean it — team effort," Smith said. "This is not an individual sport and we all have to play together. In business and in management, I've always felt that was of tremendous importance."

Also of importance for Smith, and Spencer, are quality performers and a comfortable feeling. Plans for the summer season at Spencer are under way, and Smith said she and the staff are seeking

only the best.

"I guess quality says it all. If it's less than first class, we probably wouldn't be interested," Smith said. "Quality is not indicative of price, price is not indicative of quality. There are quality performers to be found in places you probably wouldn't think to look."

She said she plans to continue the concert series and family series at the Spencer, along with bringing in a theater series such as Broadway or off-Broadway productions, more music like piano and jazz and maybe even some country and Western. But mostly, Smith said, she wants to choose acts that the community wants to see.

"Everyone asks me what our plans are for programming. I'd like to know what Ruidoso wants and the surrounding area wants."

Catering to the customer, is what Smith is aiming for as director. A goal not much different than the Spencer's overall goal.

"My vision has not changed at all from the original vision, the vision Jackie Spencer had, the vision we adopted — making this theater, the performing arts available to everyone and every age group," she said. "I want everyone when they walk through that door to feel a sense of comfort.

"That's what we're about here. We're a people business — everyone is our guest and everyone is important."

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
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

rough edges are ground and shaped with belts and wheels and finally polished to a silver sheen by hand.

Deanna Graham, owner of Creative Design at 917 New York, will be displaying the work of Karma Magers. Karma first came to New Mexico in 1976 while in the Air Force and has been a resident of Alamogordo for over 20 years. She produces the majority of her work in oil paints and pastels, but occasionally experiments with watercolors and other media. She prefers to paint representational landscapes and avoids labeling her work as strictly expressionism or impressionism in nature. Her goal is to reach an emotionally satisfying mix of color, light and contrast using the brighter pallet that represents the Southwest.

Many things have been put to the test in an effort to breath some life back into the coffee scene including theme nights and increased hours to give people a place to go at night, but success has been minimal until now.

There is something about live music that seems to draw in the masses. Fortunately for local coffee shops, there are plenty of locals just looking for an open mic.

The Galloping Tortoise, a coffee house, deli and antique shop is at the forefront of the oncoming trend and now offers a variety of live music Thursday through Sunday nights beginning at 6 p.m. and lasting until the crowd dies down. These jams feature local and visiting musicians with a wide variety of styles from blues to folk to country. Surely other local businesses will realize the practicality of including live music to their lists of special events, and see how much business may be potentially gained by having live music.

Another plus to coffee houses offering live music is the fact that anyone is welcome, whatever their age. For those who aren't of drinking age, Ruidoso

has not been the ideal place to spend weekends. Let's just face it, unless you're 21, you're not welcome in most businesses after 10 p.m., especially on weekends. The Galloping Tortoise has even devoted Saturday nights to younger musicians and patrons, and hopes that minors will find themselves well catered to.

Ruidoso might not have much of a night life, but live music anywhere where everyone is welcome is a very prospective idea. There are also many problems that may be solved by offering people somewhere to go on the weekends, including less "teen-age hoodlums" congregating on the street corners and bar crowds spilling out all over Mid-Town in drunken stupor. While sitting at the coffee house enjoying good music for a couple of hours might not sound that exciting, who can really say that much exciting happens here? For young people many of the most exciting things are the exact things their parents do not want them to be doing, and what parent can object to spending the evening at the coffee house?

Music is also beginning to show up at restaurants. The Texas House started Sunday afternoon blues shows from 3 to 6, and will sponsor blues shows at The Castle beginning in late November. These larger shows may also increase the possibility of getting some known bands interested in the Ruidoso music scene.

With winter setting in, there is somewhere to go when outdoor activities are not practical. So even if coffee is not your drink of choice, which is not uncommon, local jams and open mic nights are the perfect way to meet people, ease the weekend boredom, and get a taste of the sounds of some of Ruidoso's best musicians.

There are many hands where declarer has the worst of the luck, as the cards happen to be dealt, and yet can overcome his misfortune through the use of skill. These are the hands that generally appeal most to the student of the game as well as the dilettante.

Consider this deal where South is in six clubs. At first blush, the contract seems to depend on whether East was dealt one or both of the missing diamond honors.

The automatic procedure appears to be to draw trumps and take two diamond finesses through East, hoping he was dealt the king, or queen, or both. As can be seen, this method would result in the loss of the slam.

But, promising as this line of play is, it is not the right way to play the hand. Even though declarer is a three-to-one favorite to make the contract in this manner,

he should not stake the outcome solely on the luck of the deal.

He can increase his chances substantially by attempting an elimination play to cover the possibility of bad luck. After winning the spade lead with the ace, he promptly trumps a spade.

Two rounds of trumps are then drawn, ending in dummy. At this point, having found the clubs divided evenly, declarer can feel 100 percent sure of the contract. He ruffs the queen of spades and cashes three hearts, discarding a diamond from his hand.

He now leads the jack of diamonds and passes it. West wins, but has no safe return. Dummy's remaining four cards are two diamonds and two clubs. South has three diamonds and one club. West must lead a diamond or give declarer a ruff and discard; either way, the slam is home.



Butch and The Kid

This is the first of two parts about "The Wild Bunch."

In the Academy Award winning 1969 film "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid," the majority of the American public was introduced to the two personable outlaws for the first time.

Of course, anyone interested in the Old West was already familiar with the pair, as well as their "associates," collectively known as "The Wild Bunch."

This group of outlaws was portrayed as being amiable, charming and, in certain cases, intelligent.

It is amazing how Hollywood feeds us this information and for the most part, it is accepted without question by the American public. But for once, at least as far as characterizations went, I've got no argument with Tinsel Town.

Butch Cassidy's robberies were always carefully thought out. He paid careful attention to detail and tried to avoid violence whenever possible. In addition, Butch *really* was so personable that even his wanted posters described him as "cheery and affable."

Beginnings

Born in Beaver, Utah, in 1866, Robert Leroy Parker was the grandson of a Mormon bishop. Despite some jail time for horse theft, young Robert Leroy Parker never did fit into the "hardened criminal" mode. All who knew him liked him.

As a youth Robert fell in with a local outlaw named Mike Cassidy, who taught him the ins and outs of being on the wrong side of the law. Eventually, young Parker would take Cassidy's name, partially out of respect for his mentor and partially to spare his family the embarrassment.

A brief stint working at a butcher's shop earned him the nickname of Butch, and lo and behold, Butch Cassidy came into existence.

Harry Longabaugh was a native of Pennsylvania. It is known that he was born in the spring of 1867, but records are incomplete as to the exact day and place of Harry's birth. By 1870 the Longabaugh family was living in Port Providence, Pa. The census lists their youngest son as being Harry, age 3.

Apparently, the Longabaughs were not exactly rolling in money. By 1880, the census takers listed

young Harry, now 13, as a hired servant boarding with a family in West Vincent, Pa.

The youth was not, like many of his time and circumstances, illiterate. We know this, because on Jan 31, 1882, the boy who would one day be infamous as the Sundance Kid was issued a library card.

In 1884, the Longabaughs moved to Cortez, Colo., where they raised horses. Actually, Cortez was not really a town yet, and the Longabaughs were living where the town would one day be located. In the immediate area were some other young men, all of whom would make young Harry's acquaintance, and some of whom would become famous, or rather, infamous, in their own right.

Among them was, of course, Butch Cassidy. There was also the McCarty brothers and Matt Warner, all of whom would one day be high-profile members of the Wild Bunch.

Talk about convenient. The Longabaughs were in the business of raising horses, and horses were something in which any self-respecting outlaw of the period had an avid interest. Good horseflesh was the key to any successful get-away.

Several other things probably made young Longabaugh attractive as a possible gang member: He had a happy and carefree nature, and in his spare time he had become very, very proficient with weapons.

On Feb. 27, 1887, young Longabaugh absconded with a light gray horse, a pistol and a saddle from the VVV Ranch and headed for Miles City, Mont. By April 8 of the same year he was in the custody of Sheriff James Ryan.

Ryan elected to transport the youthful culprit to jail by train, which turned out to be a mistake. While the sheriff was using the bathroom, Longabaugh picked the locks of his shackles and leapt to freedom from the moving train.

Then, rather foolishly returning to the vicinity of Miles City, Longabaugh was recaptured. He tried to escape again but this time they were ready for him. In no time at all he was incarcerated in the jail in Sundance, Wyo.

It was there that Longabaugh received the famous nickname that would stay with him for the rest of his life: The Sundance Kid.

In 1889, Gov. Thomas Moonlight gave the young man a full pardon, noting that "He is still under 21 years of age, and his behavior has been good since confinement, showing an earnest desire to reform." And then, according to legend, the governor actually made the young miscreant "promise to be a good boy."

In light of later events, it is a

pretty good bet that Sundance had his fingers crossed if he ever made such a promise.

Telluride

On Monday morning, June 24, 1889, four men dressed as "dude" cowboys rode slowly into Telluride, Colo. Their destination was the bank. The men were Tom McCarty, Matt Warner, Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid.

Quietly and efficiently, the four miscreants emptied the bank of somewhere in the vicinity of \$20,000. Unfortunately for them, they were recognized and were forever after branded as outlaws, although there has always been some doubt as to whether or not Sundance was involved. In the long run, of course, it doesn't really make any difference.

One thing that the film "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid" had wildly wrong was the character of Harvey Logan. In the film, he is played as a huge, none-too-bright gang member who tries unsuccessfully to usurp Butch's authority.

In real life, it was Logan, also known as "Kid Curry" that was the much-dreaded man-killer — not Sundance.

Kid Curry may have killed 11 men — and possibly more. He was known as the "Tiger of the Wild Bunch," and nearly every shooting credited to the Wild Bunch involves him. If the Pinkertons were to be believed, Kid Curry would kill you as soon as look at you. On the other hand, historically speaking, it is not always wise to believe what the Pinkertons had to say.

At any rate, the point is that it was Kid Curry and not the Sundance

Kid who was the cold-blooded killer. Until he went to South America, there is considerable doubt that the Sundance Kid ever killed anyone.

Hole-In-The-Wall

The Wild Bunch's favorite hideout, and one that Hollywood has made much use of, was known as Hole-In-The-Wall.

Unlike the places usually represented in the movies, there never really was an actual hole in a wall. There was however, a notch in the canyon wall that cattle could be driven through. The reason the place was a good hideout was because from the top of the canyon wall, you could see for miles in every direction. Butch Cassidy is said to have made the claim that a dozen men could hold off 100 men from the walls of the canyon.

In these days of drive-by shootings and serial killers, it is interesting to note that for Thanksgiving of 1895, the Wild Bunch, most particularly Butch and Sundance, played host to neighboring families, serving up what was, by all accounts, a sumptuous feast.

According to the guests, both Butch and Sundance, wearing aprons, served up an elegant meal. The festivities lasted well into the night and one of the female guests, Ann Bassett, wrote to a friend that the Sundance Kid was tall, blonde, handsome and that all the young ladies present were quite taken with him.

Family Matters

Throughout their lives, both Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid attempted to stay in touch and

keep on good terms with their respective families. In this, Butch was more successful than Sundance.

The Parkers, Butch's family, apparently felt that no matter what Robert (Butch) did, he was still family. Butch's sister, Lula, was particularly loyal to him.

Sundance was not so successful in his attempts to keep harmonious relations with his family. Many of his relations felt that he was an embarrassment to the family and at least one of his sisters actually changed the spelling of her name in an attempt to disassociate herself from her infamous brother.

Etta

It is almost impossible to discuss Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid without the name of Etta Place coming up. While there are photos of her in existence, she still resides in the shadowlands of history. We're not even sure about her name. It might have been Etta. It might have been Ethel. Her last name was almost certainly not Place. If it was, it sure was a big coincidence — Sundance's mother's maiden name was Place. Therefore, it's a pretty good bet that she took the name "Place" as an alias.

One thing is certain, though, she was a beautiful woman by the standards of her own or any time.

Unfortunately for history, that is about all we know of her. That, and the fact that she accompanied Butch and Sundance to South America.

In fact, the vanishing act she did from down there was quite remarkable. After she left her two outlaw cronies, she seems to have disappeared like a wisp of smoke.
