## Armed robber gets cash at airport

*An employee was bound with duct tape after a gun was held to his head, and the unidentified bandit made off with some \$300.*

A man reportedly held a gun to the head of an airport employee Monday night during a robbery in which less than \$300 was taken, Ruidoso police said.

Roger Marshall, a village employee, was alone at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport at about 7:30 p.m. Monday when the robbery occurred, said Lt. Wolf Born.

Marshall had just left a hangar and was walking through the airport's main building when a man came up behind him and put a gun to the back of his neck, Born said.

"He assumed that's what it was because he heard the click," Born said of the weapon.

A man then told Marshall to walk to the office where his mouth was covered with duct tape and his hands were taped behind him, Born said.

"The next thing he heard was the front door closing."

Marshall managed to call 911 on the phone by using his nose, Born said.

Money had been taken from a reg-

ister, from a deposit bag in the office and from Marshall himself, police said. The total amount stolen was less than \$300, police said.

Born said the department is following up leads in its investigation of the robbery.

#### Antiques recovered



Most of the antique collection of a Lincoln woman is back where it belongs after the arrest of a local

restaurant worker.

Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan said an apartment full of antiques, including clocks, furniture, picture frames, jewelry boxes and oil lamps was burglarized Nov. 9 while the owner, Priscilla Roberson, was in Tucson with her daughter. The estimated value of the items was \$50,000.

Deputy Angelo Vega tracked down Johnny Gomez, 34, who was living in an apartment nearby and worked at the Wortley Hotel, Sullivan said. He left Lincoln after the burglary and was arrested for the theft in Truth or

## Property tax cap proposed

Lincoln County Commissioner Wilton Howell wants to hear from the public about a proposal to cap annual increases of taxable value on existing homes and businesses in New Mexico.

The item is on the agenda of the commission meeting scheduled at 9 a.m. Friday in the Ruidoso Convention Center.

"I would like to see legislation that would limit to 5 percent any property tax increase in one year on an existing property or limit it to whatever is needed to meet a taxing entity's budgetary needs, whichever is lower," Howell said Tuesday. "We already have the mechanism for a cap on the average (for a county). But I don't think a person should be penalized for an adjacent property being sold or improved and driving up their taxes. Nor should they be penalized for improving their own property."

"The value of existing property has nothing to do with putting a strain on the county's infrastructure. Adding on and improving doesn't strain the sheriff's office any more. The only thing that strains is new construction, new subdivisions."

The taxable values of existing homes should stay the same until they are sold and at that time, they can be brought up to market value, he said. New construction and new property would be put on the property tax roll at full market value, Howell said.

"I intend to invite State Sen. Pete Campos (D-Las Vegas) and State Rep. Dub Williams (R-Glencoe) to attend the December commission meeting, if we can come up with some legislation," Howell said. "And I'll ask them to sponsor it and to ask the governor to enter it into his call (the list of issues for the state legislative session that starts in January)."

#### Long agenda

Commissioners face a 31-item agenda Friday, including several issues that are expected to involve lengthy discussions. They are:

- Selection of a new chairman.

## Noted actress gets a good look at Lincoln County 'The Outfitters' star shines

Trying to stay warm in the chilly New Mexico wind, Dana Delany hugs a heavy coat tightly to her body, adjusts her sunglasses and checks out a crossword puzzle while waiting for her next scene.

The actress who won two Emmys for her portrayal of Army nurse Colleen McMurphy in the China Beach television series, is starring in "The Outfitters," a film being shot in Lincoln County by writer/director Reverge Anselmo.

During one of the breaks between scenes filmed northeast of Capitan, she took time out to answer a few questions.

Delany said she was intrigued by Anselmo's script, because "It was a world and characters that I had never seen on film before. Reverge's voice is very unique."

She particularly was drawn to the part of Cat Bonfaim, the former

babysitter of the Mitjans brothers who caused a scandal years earlier when she became physically involved with one of her younger charges.

"I like the fact that she has a lot of opposites going on," Delany said. "She's strong, yet vulnerable, sexy yet capable."

Delany likes to play strong people, who go through some external or internal event that causes them to evolve.

"I don't like to play perfect people," she said.

Her favorite role remains McMurphy of China Beach.

"It was the most three-dimensional character," she said.

But from her movie credits, the character she played in "Light Sleeper" is her favorite. She portrayed a troubled woman, who rejects a former lover in an attempt to avoid falling into destructive patterns, but ends up back on drugs.

Unlike most little girls, Delany didn't progress through a list of

potential careers as she grew up. She knew from the age of three that she wanted to be an actress.

"There was nothing else I wanted to do," she said. No one else in her family came from the theater. In fact, growing up in Stamford, Conn., the norm was to hold in feelings, she said. Delany was the exception.

"I liked putting on shows," she said. "It probably originally was a way to get attention from my parents."

"Of course, now I have a more professional approach," she said grinning. "I'm just lucky it worked out."

Her parents probably were embarrassed by their demonstrative child at first, she said. But with each success, they relaxed more and learned to enjoy their daughter's accomplishments. Her father is gone now, but her mother still is a strong supporter.

"I was clear about what I wanted

## Looking for solutions at LCSWA

They can do it the hard way or the easy way, Joe Lewandowski told members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority on Tuesday.

The easy way to proceed would be to hire a consultant who knows its history and how it works, has consulted with several other authorities and is on good footing with the state Environment Department, he said. And he fits that bill, having been the authority manager for two years and a consultant to other counties for several more.

The hard way could be trying to figure out the steps to separate Ruidoso from the authority's collection system on their own.

Board member Frank Cummins of Ruidoso, in agreement with other members, told Lewandowski to wait until the county appoints its member to a committee formed to map out the separation route and let committee members decide whether they want professional guidance.

"Since we designated the committee, that's where the idea should come from," he said.

Lewandowski passed out rate comparison sheets from across the state and a summary of his success in securing grants for other counties.

Out of eight grant applications from six entities he put together, \$4.2 million was received in grants, averaging \$523,688 per application. That compares to 63 other requests submitted at the same time and a total award of \$5.7 million for an average of \$90,579 per submittal.

Lincoln is putting together an application for \$265,000 due Dec. 5, to buy new equipment, but it lost its last bid in part because of the uncertainty of remaining viable if Ruidoso leaves the collection operation.

Lewandowski said the authority will survive well without Ruidoso.

"When I left, the county was making \$80,000 a year and chose not to raise it rates and not to require the authority to make it annual payments for equipment (purchased from the county at its inception)," he said. "Capitan was making \$4,000 a year but that wasn't enough, Ruidoso Downs was losing \$32,000 a year and adjusted its rates and Ruidoso was







from the start," Delany said. She spent lots of time watching Doris Day movies and musicals.

She was active in high school and college theater, graduating in the first co-educational class at Phillips Andover Academy and later from Wesleyan University, where she majored in theater.

She moved to New York and spent the next 10 years in theater there, on and off Broadway, plus some stints doing soap commercials and soap operas.

Her starring role in Nicholas Kazan's play, "Bloodwar," in New York led to her move to Hollywood where she appeared in the West Coast production of the play.

From there, she won roles in series such as "Moonlighting," with her long-time friend Bruce Willis, and in "Magnum P.I."

Then came "China Beach." "I just auditioned for it," Delany said, adding it was a matter of luck, timing and clicking with the series creators.

The role brought her four Emmy nominations and two wins as Best Actress.

And while she has transitioned successfully to film with roles in such widely diverse films as "Exit to Eden," "Moon Over Parador," "Fly Away Home" and "Tombstone," she has continued to accept solid roles on television productions.

She won critical acclaim in

Although she has been in Lincoln County for six weeks, most of her scenes didn't fall into the shooting schedule until last week. She's used the extra time to get to know her surroundings, with trips to White Sands and the historic settlement of Lincoln.

"I've really enjoyed myself," Delany said. "I've eaten the famous chili cheeseburger at The Outpost (in Carrizozo). I've been to the White Oaks (Saloon) for a shot of tequila and I've eaten at some great restaurants. The (Village) Buttery (in Ruidoso) is my mainstay. They take good care of me."

She's even visited the new Wal-Mart Super Center that opened last month.

One of the off-set aspects of the film she like the best is that the actors are staying together at a bed and breakfast in Nogal, where they enjoy great cooking by owner Jane Baker, and a home-like atmosphere.

"It's unusual for the entire cast to be staying together like this," Delany said. "It's been delightful. It's made us sort of a family."

"Patty Hearst," "Choices of the Heart," and "True Women."

"I've been lucky," Delany said. "I like to do both film and television. For a woman my age, television is a great place to work, because the roles are more interesting."

"I think T.V. is more of a female medium and movies are more for males."

Single and 41, Delany spends much of her time traveling away from home on location.

Although she found it difficult to describe herself, Delany

said, "I bet people would be surprised to know how much time I spend alone."

Much of the "alone" time occurs at her West Coast house. "I love my home," she said. "It's really my refuge. It's quite modern and filled with tons of light. It's very simple."

What's she looking for in her life? "Just to be happy, and I'll do whatever it takes to get me there," she said.

When it comes to men, Delany said, "I look for intelligence first and then a sense of humor."

### Ruidoso News Nov. 21, 1947

The latest addition to Lincoln County school facilities, the new Ruidoso High School building, prompted The News to dig up a few facts concerning the past history of the schools in Ruidoso Valley.

When Billy the Kid and his "compadres" named this part of the country it is possible that they (camped) along the river

near where the new school has been erected. Perhaps on one of their forays into this valley, or perhaps before or after the Blazer Mill incident, they stamped out a campfire near the present school site.

But the demise of the Kid came along about the time that more settlers were discovering the rich soil and abundant water of Ruidoso Valley, and with the coming of law and order and the influx of more and more law-abiding citizens the establishment of schools was in the natural course of events. But they didn't come easy.

Diet medication brings on reaction

Eddie Parker, director of the Hurd Gallery in San Patricio and a long-time teacher, was back at home Tuesday night after treatment for a psychotic episode brought on by a reaction to diet medication, his wife, Donna Parker said.

She had called police from a neighbor's house after Parker became violent upon awakening at about 1 a.m. Saturday.

Parker was taken to LCMC where doctors told police the medication Parker was taking had caused an inadvertent amphetamine psychosis, and that Parker didn't know what he was saying or doing during the episode. He had been taking the medication since Nov. 11 and had not been sleeping well, his wife told police.

Parker initially was charged with a count of felony aggravated battery, felony battery of a police officer, and one misdemeanor count of assault on a police officer.

Donna Parker said Tuesday night she will not bring charges against her husband.

He was transferred Saturday to the Kaseman Presbyterian Hospital in Albuquerque where he was treated for a chemical imbalance brought on by the medication, his wife said.

losing \$200,000 a year and adjusted its rates. "Maybe it's time to rethink the situation." He's interested in the authority's survival because he spent two years as manager and doesn't want to see it come apart, Lewandowski said. Authority Chairman Joe Hayhurst said he received a "Ruidoso position paper" on the

restructuring of the authority from Ruidoso Councilor and authority member Robert Donaldson. "This is the first time I've seen it," said Cummins, who also serves on the village council. "Maybe we should retitile it the Robert Donaldson position paper." Contacted later, Donaldson explained that the sheets summarized his view of positions discussed among members of

Ruidoso's ad hoc committee on garbage collection. Before sending it to Hayhurst, he ran it past the village staff and attorney to make sure his thoughts were in line, Donaldson said. "It's not an official paper, but it's to provoke some thought," he said. "When I go into the committee as a representative of Ruidoso, I must have an understanding in tune with everyone else."

**A touch of interstate pride**

Granted, Ruidoso's sports fans by upbringing and ancestry tend to have a Texas bias when it comes to football; consider "them Cowboys" (maybe this year, after all) and SMU, TCU, UTEP and Rice.

So pardon us a moment as we speak for poor old New Mexico (University of), and brag a little: The UNM Lobos beat Brigham Young University last Saturday afternoon in a very chilly University Stadium in Albuquerque.

It was the first time in 16 years a New Mexico team was able to win one, and only the second time in 26 years. That's lots of trying, folks.

Lobo fans took down the goal posts and took home the joy of that 38-28 victory with the realization that for the first time ever they're atop the Western Athletic Conference (at least, the Mountain Division of same, about which more later) with a legitimate shot at a bowl bid for the first time in 36 years. If they beat Tulsa University next Saturday they'll play the Pacific Division champ (probably Colorado State or Air Force) at Las Vegas in the WAC championship game. The winner goes to the Holiday Bowl in San Diego.

The Lobos right now are 8-2 for the year and 5-2 in the Mountain Division, which now includes — you heard us right — Southern Methodist, Texas Christian and Rice University as well as the University of Texas-El Paso. So, you see, the heart of Texas now is part of New Mexico, as Ruidoso folks have known all along.

It really is politically correct, you relocated Texans, to cheer for the Lobos; they've proved themselves in a conference that now includes some of Texas's best teams. (And Coach Dennis Franchione came to New Mexico six years ago from Southwest Texas State, so it's OK if you want to argue that he brought from Texas what New Mexico needed to win.)

Come on, Ruidoso, all together now: "Go Lobos!"

**Surveys and kids**

About all we have to quibble with in the just-reported result of a survey of "student life attitudes and behaviors" in Ruidoso is the language the conclusion is couched in, that:

Ruidoso youth "are responsible and demonstrate intrinsic assets while also searching for quality time from others, positive adult role models, worksite mentorship, and the opportunity to demonstrate competence with the assurance of a safety net." That's about as impenetrable a statement of socio-scholastic gobbledegook as we've heard in a long time.

We much prefer the summary given by Paul Wirth, the district's director of instructional support: "Our kids are feeling pretty good about themselves and they want to show that to the community. ... But (some) feel that they're not welcome in the community. ..."

So maybe that movement in the county to do more in providing recreation and vocational project funding will give the kids another "asset" (along with such assets as self-esteem, integrity and family support) that will bring them to a higher level of ... what? Apparently the more assets, as defined, the less likelihood kids will engage in risky behavior such as drug and alcohol use and violence, and so will be more likely to succeed in life.

We agree with Wirth that the survey is a "good snapshot, not just for the schools, but for the entire community."

Then we got out a magnifying glass and reviewed the school district's 1997-98 accountability report published Friday and found that Ruidoso teacher pay ranks it 5th among 89 districts in the state. But the mean ACT (American College Testing) scores for college-bound students remains marginally below the national and state average.

Maybe that's what Terrie Gillespie, the district health coordinator, meant when she told the board that the student attitude survey here shouldn't be compared to others across the state or country.

# Long-time Capitan representative sees problems ahead Reimann quits LCSWA board

Capitan representative to the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority resigned his place on the board Tuesday. Bernhard Reimann, who has served on the board nearly every year since the authority was formed in 1991, said he worked hard to save taxpayer money and keep the coalition of the county and its five municipalities together. Using his credentials as a biologist, he has performed studies and dealt with the state Environment Department on the closing of the Capitan debris landfill among other free services.

But in reading the minutes of the last authority meeting, Reimann said people who claim to be knowledgeable in solid waste matters seem to be dismissing the original mission and past efforts of members by talking about Ruidoso breaking off on its own. "I believe this will cause serious problems for the smaller communities and the county, and possibly Ruidoso as well," Reimann said. The issue should be resolved with some simple changes, rewording or amendments to the joint power agreements signed by the members of the authority, he said. It should not end up in court.

Authority board members voted to enter a statement of appreciation for Reimann's work into the minutes on a motion by Ruidoso representative Ross Dingman. Chairman Joe Hayhurst said he wished Reimann would reconsider. After Reimann walked out of the meeting, authority manager Jerry Wright said he was unsure about the status of work being performed by Reimann for the closing of the Capitan landfill, but will check and report back to the board. "We may have to hire an engineer (to finish them)," he said.

### Man carries gun into bars Stolen car recovered.

Police arrested a man last week for pointing a gun at a woman and then carrying the gun into two bars on Sudderth Drive, Ruidoso police said. Dwayne Nelson Dunagan walked into both Win, Place and Show and the Winner's Circle on Nov. 11 with a black semi-automatic pistol. The pistol had a bullet in its chamber and had four more rounds in the magazine when police recovered it, police said.

Dunagan reportedly pointed the gun at the face of a woman standing outside Win, Place and Show before putting it in his pocket and entering the bar.

He later went across to the Winner's Circle. Officers Doug Babcock and Eric Woods, acting on a call from Win, Place and Show, found Dunagan at the bar and asked him to step outside.

The officers then asked Dunagan to put his hands on his head. When Dunagan instead reached inside his coveralls, officers drew their guns and ordered him to raise his hands. Officer Babcock reached inside Dunagan's sleeve and removed the pistol.

Dunagan, who tested positively for intoxication, has been charged with two counts of the unlawful carrying of a firearm into a licensed liquor establishment and aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

A 20-year-old Texas man was arrested last week in connection with a car taken from the parking lot of McDonald's restaurant, Ruidoso police said. Henry McGinty was arrested by Ruidoso Downs police officers on Nov. 13 while driving a 1983 Subaru pickup truck that had been stolen a day earlier, police said.

Ruidoso Downs Officer Ken Arther arrested McGinty on charges of driving while intoxicated. McGinty was charged later with receiving stolen property. Bond was set for McGinty at \$10,000.

### Drug arrest at cabin

Police, on a call of a reported break-in at a cabin on Duff Street, ended up arresting a man Friday on methamphetamine charges, Ruidoso police said.

A woman at the house told police she rented the cabin and had been away for about a month. Her keys didn't work, so she broke a window to get in, she said. She was accompanied by a man and a child.

Officers contacted the Lincoln County Narcotic Enforcement Unit because the woman's name was on a list of people the unit wanted to question.

County Deputy Gilbert Sambrano, a member of the unit, found a syringe and a spoon in his pocket of the man,

Johnny W. Farmer. After Farmer was arrested and placed in a police car, officers found a plastic bag under the car seat containing methamphetamine. Farmer has been charged with possession of a controlled substance as well as possession of drug paraphernalia.

### Storage unit burglarized

Sports equipment was taken last weekend from a storage unit at 1107 Mechem Drive, Ruidoso police said.

James Scott Miller told police he had not been to the storage unit for about two weeks when he discovered the burglary. He came out to the unit on Sunday and noticed the lock missing from the door. Among the items stolen were golf clubs, snowboards, bindings, skis, ski boots and more, police said.

### Condos burglarized

Three condominiums on Granite Drive were broken into and burglarized sometime between June and August, Ruidoso police said.

Stolen items include four televisions, a computer system, a microwave oven, a sofa, various pieces of furniture and a washer and dryer, police said.

Two of the condominiums showed evidence of forced entry, police said. The apartments are owned by the Ruidoso State Bank.

## Attempt to save five puppies makes a point

Five heeler/Dalmatian mix puppies apparently lived in a culvert for a day or two before attracting the attention of members of the Lincoln County Humane Society. Someone put a blanket, food and water inside the culvert in an attempt to keep them from starving or freezing, but until Janet LaRosa spotted the puppies playing around the culvert entrance at Hull and Willie Horton drives last Sunday, no one had alerted Ruidoso's impound officer, Peggy Williams.

Unable to round up the three-month-old puppies herself, LaRosa contacted Jane and Ross England, the couple who prepares the humane society's newsletters.

"We had just settled down with a good movie," Jane England said. Shelter workers, cleaning up the organization's booth at the Christmas Jubilee, couldn't be reached. Williams doesn't work on Sunday except in emergencies.

So the Englands and society member Dawn Matthews

met LaRosa and her son at the culvert, armed with dog biscuits, food, ropes and gloves.

In chilly temperatures and intermittent snowfall, they tried to coax the puppies out of their temporary home, but they escaped by running back into the pipe.

Ross England finally managed to lasso two pups by placing the rope over the end of the pipe and drawing it quickly when they poked out their heads. Although one struggled and whined, it settled down immediately when stroked and calmed with kind words, Jane England said.

The group gave up temporarily on the other three pups. They didn't want to leave, but darkness made it impossible to continue. The next morning, Jane England contacted Williams, who went out that afternoon. She crawled on her stomach through the pipe full of mud, rocks and puppy droppings to miss the dogs out the other end of the culvert and into the waiting arms of a police officer.

"It was a wonderful effort by officer Williams and the society members," said Jim

Riggins, administrator of the animal shelter on Gavilan Canyon Road. "Unfortunately, the puppies were infected with Parvo (a usually fatal viral infection) and had to be euthanized.

"If they had been left in the culvert, they would have died a painful and slower death. This could have been avoided if the owner of the litter had brought the pups to the shelter while they were healthy. We would have vaccinated them, made sure they were fed and warm and they would have had a good chance at adoption."

The shelter has drop-off cages for people who can't get away during the day. Owners are not charged for bringing in litters, although the village has a mandatory spay and neuter law for all animals over six months.

"It's such a cruel thing to take pups out and dump them when the shelter will take them," said Ross England.

Jane England said the incident points up the need to have an officer on duty over the weekends. "Something is missing (in coverage) after 5 p.m. and on Sunday," she said.

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# Texico ends Tigers' Class A title quest

In a game that, according to head football coach Ed Davis, "Should have been played on Saturday," the Capitan Tigers ended their season by dropping a 33-8 decision to the top-ranked Texico Wolverines on Sunday.

The game was scheduled for Saturday at 1 p.m., but the weekend snowstorm that swept through New Mexico caused Capitan and Texico officials to reschedule the game for Monday at 1 p.m. Everyone seemed to agree with the change except the New Mexico Activities Association (NMAA).

Davis was informed by NMAA officials at 9 p.m. on Saturday that the game would be played on Sunday and not Monday, a school day. Davis then had to locate his team — some of whom had gone hunting — and his coaches. Apparently, the NMAA's position is to avoid scheduling sporting events when it impacts on school time which the Monday game time would have done.

Davis's comment about the NMAA's decision: "I don't want to get into the politics of that decision. I do think the game should have been played on Saturday, but there's no sense crying over spilled milk. On that day, they beat us," Davis said.

Despite the short notice and confusion, at gametime, the Tigers appeared ready to draw first blood when Raymond Harris broke a 60-yard run, putting the ball on the Texico 16 yard line. But there the drive fizzled.

Texico proceeded to drive the ball deep into Tiger territory and scored on Toby Askew's run. Pecos Chumley kicked the PAT and Texico led 7-0.

Then disaster struck the Tigers. Following their TD, Texico regained possession after a Capitan back fumbled on the Tiger 5 yard line. Though the Tigers made the Wolverines work for their touchdown by stopping them three times, on 4th down Texico scored on Pecos Chumley's 1 yard plunge. The kick failed and Texico now led 13-0.

In the 2nd quarter, Texico mounted another drive that resulted in another Toby Askew touchdown run. The Wolverines now led 19-0.

But, according to coach Davis, the death knell came just before halftime. With 1 second remaining on the stadium clock, Texico QB Mel Askew found back Toby Askew open and connected on a 50 yard touchdown pass. Pecos Chumley added the PAT kick and the stunned Tigers found themselves on the short end of a 26-0 halftime score.

But Capitan had no intention of throwing in the towel:

In the 3rd quarter the two teams held each other scoreless. Then early in the 4th period, Tiger quarterback Justin Joiner broke an 82 yard touchdown run that put Capitan on the scoreboard. Raymond Harris ran in the 2 point conversion and the Tigers now trailed 26-8.

But not for long. The Wolverines mounted a last

drive that resulted in Toby Askew's 4th quarter TD run. Pecos Chumley ended the scoring with his PAT kick and Texico was ahead to stay, 33-8.

Despite the loss, Davis was far from downcast on Monday, "I feel as though the best two teams in the state played last Sunday. Our kids could have quit in the second half, but they didn't do that. You could say we beat them (8-7) in the second half. We recovered three fumbles and in terms of

overall offense they had 379 yards to our 291. It was alot closer than the score indicated."

Davis continued, "I can't say enough about these young men. They've overcome obstacles the entire year. They could've checked it in after we lost 4 games in a row, but they didn't."

"They could have given up after we lost nine players after the Reserve game because of

ineligibility, but they didn't."

After the long season, Coach Davis has some ideas about how he will spend his leisure moments, now that he has more time on his hands:

"We came one game short of our goal, which was to win the state championship. And let me tell you another thing, our off-season strength training program begins next Wednesday. We're already preparing for our first game next year, Hatch."

# Cross country runners finish year on disappointing note

After finishing the season as the District 3AAA champion, Ruidoso cross country coach Ron Maskew had high expectations for the state meet. And then... "We wasted our time going," Maskew said on Monday. "All week I thought if we ran well, the boys could be in the top 5. We didn't even make it to the top 10."

Maskew told the Ruidoso News that overall, pending the receipt of the official results, he thought the boys finished 12th or 13th and the girls team placed about 14th or 15th.

"They're a very good group of kids, the kind of kids you enjoy being around. We came so far this season and then just did nothing at the state meet. I just can't understand why we didn't do any better," the coach said.

Did the weather or the condition of the course (Red Rock State Park in Gallup) play a role in the Warriors subpar performance?

Maskew said, "The course was fine, they had to blade off some snow but I thought I thought that would help us run better."

Coach Maskew reflected, "Well, I knew we had done the physical work. Our strategy was to get out in front and stay there. We got out well but we didn't run well after that."

We just didn't seem to make the effort. If they're not going to listen to me and run

like they're coached, then maybe we need a coaching change."

Despite a disappointing team effort, junior Erica Romero ranked highest among all Ruidoso runners placing 29th with a time of 22:41. Sophomore Dabert Comanche, who won the District 3AAA individual title, led the Warrior boys squad with a time of 18:41 and a 34th place finish overall.

Though Maskew was not happy with his group as a collective, he did cite the efforts of 8th graders Ben Smith and Josh Romero, "Those boys ran hard."

He was also quick to point out many of the positive aspects of his team, "In terms of improvement this season, I felt as though Jessica Daniels and Felicia Frizzell worked very hard. Kyle Sparks probably improved as much or more than anybody this season."

The coach was also emphatic about his philosophy toward winning, "Winning isn't as important as making the effort to win. I've always said that if we give it our best shot then winning will take care of itself. It doesn't bother me if you don't score well, but you ought to run as well as you can run... at the state meet that didn't happen."

All indication are that Ruidoso will be a force to be reckoned with next year. Maskew agrees, "I feel that they can be one of the best teams in the state next year, but not like we ran last Saturday."

# RHS handles St. Pius; advances to quarterfinals

For the first time this season, head football coach Les Carter's Warriors are playing better than .500 football after handling the six-ranked St. Pius Sartans 28-13 last Saturday in Albuquerque.

Ruidoso will take its 6-5 record to Artesia this Saturday to do battle with the top-ranked Bulldogs at 1 p.m.

Carter said of his victory, "The kids played well. You always worry about staying focused when you go out of town and stay in a motel overnight. But the kids kept their focus. I was also pleased with the Albuquerque school system for taking the time to clean the snow from Wilson Stadium for our game."

Like Ruidoso, St. Pius is a young team that will return the balance of the players next season. Carter remarked, "St. Pius is going to be alright, their running back (Morris) is tough. He ran hard and low to the ground and, at times, he we didn't wrap up well with him."

Offensively, fullback Adrian Herrera led the attack and had his best day of the year rambling for 148 yards and two touchdowns. Split end Josh Varnadore helped the Warrior cause by burning the St. Pius secondary for a 55-yard touchdown pass from Quarterback Corey Saenz in the first half.

Although the Warriors were highly offensive, coordinator Rodney Webb's defense — which held St. Pius to single TD — was particularly nasty. Indeed, Ruidoso's defense more resembled Louisiana State's famed Chinese Bandits as they spent the afternoon recovering fumbles and stealing passes. Overall, the Warriors recovered two Sartan fumbles, one resulting in Brett Meyer's 1 yard TD run, and intercepted three St. Pius passes. Linebacker Garvin Grant forced one fumble and defenders T. J. Montoya, Juan Warner, and Grant each pirated a pass which ended St. Pius drives. Though Carter was generally pleased with his

defense, he chose to single out linebacker Arthur Miller, "Arthur had about 20 tackles, and 11 of those were unassisted; that's outstanding."

Carter also had good words for back-up quarterback Frizzell Frizzell who led the Warriors throughout the second half after starter Corey Saenz left the game with an injury.

Carter said, "Frizzell handled it real well. On a couple of keeps he kept the ball and turned it up for some good gainers."

Saenz left the St. Pius game just before halftime due to an injured fingernail. Carter said, "A fingernail on his throwing hand got mashed and it was very painful. But he's fine, he'll be ready for the Artesia game."

St. Pius moved the ball on their first possession but had to settle for a Jeff Grady field goal 6:06 in the 1st quarter.

The Warriors came back with Adrian Herrera's 18 yard run with 3:47 left in the 1st period. Brett Meyer's PAT kick was blocked and the Warriors led 6-3.

Early in the 2nd quarter Corey Saenz hit receiver Josh Varnadore on a 55-yard scoring strike. Saenz ran in the PAT, upping the Ruidoso lead, 14-3.

With 7:53 in the 3rd quarter, Adrian Herrera scored his second TD when he broke a 39 yard run. Brett Meyer's PAT was good, and Ruidoso now led, 21-3.

The Warriors nailed the coffin shut when they recovered a St. Pius fumble on the ensuing kickoff which resulted in Brett Meyer's 1-yard plunge for the TD. Meyer converted the PAT kick and Ruidoso took a commanding 28-3 lead.

Later in the 3rd period, Sartan Stan Gray scored on a 10 yard run. Mike Trevizo's PAT kick put St. Pius in double digits, 28-10.

St. Pius scored again with 7:37 left in the 4th quarter on Jeff Grady's 36 yard field goal ending the scoring, 28-13.

Forest land graziers given 5-month reprieve on rules

Ranchers grazing cattle on U.S. Forest Service land can breathe easier, at least for the next five months.

A provision authored by U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-NM, to stop the Forest Service from evicting ranchers who have grazing permits was signed into law Friday as part of the 1998 Interior Appropriations Bill.

Some 10 grazing allotments in Lincoln County are among 50 identified by the Forest Service as being at greatest risk of cancellation for not conforming with conditions set by a court-ordered management plan.

A member of the Interior Appropriations Subcommittee, Domenici wrote the language that directs the Forest Service to keep in place current operating plans on grazing permits until next season when the service usually implements new annual plans. The date is expected to be in March.

"This amendment does nothing more than give the Forest Service time to implement new grazing regulations in an orderly fashion," Domenici said in a news release. "It is

only fair that New Mexico residents with current grazing permits not be affected until next season."

Domenici served on the conference committee that reached a consensus on the Forest Service as part of its work to reconcile differences in the House and Senate versions of the bill. At issue was whether the Forest Service must retroactively apply standards and guidelines from a new forest plan to projects and activities that existed before the new plans were adopted in June 1996.

Forest Service evaluations of grazing allotments in New Mexico and Arizona national forests indicate that a large percentage of the present allotments would be in violation of the new forest plan standards and guidelines.

A Ninth Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals injunction in the case titled Forest Guardians v. Mike Dombeck, could have been used to compel the Forest Service to force many New Mexico cattle growers, who already hold legal permits, to cease grazing in some areas.

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## What to do about those pesky pine needles

**Q:** Our home in the Southeast has a long deck in the backyard with several large pine trees in the vicinity. When the pine needles begin to fall, they wedge in between the deck's floor boards. The deck can also become quite slippery because the needles retain moisture. We considered installing an outdoor green turf-like carpet, but it will only have to be swept or vacuumed. Can you suggest a preventive method to combat these pine needles?

**A:** I am very familiar with pesky, falling pine needles. They sure can become a nuisance and I'm sure you and many others out there would like to cut them down, if it were not for their natural beauty.

There are ways to combat this mess. Begin by using an old, serrated bread knife and remove the pine needles in a push and pull motion. The needles should either come to the surface or just drop beneath the deck. Now, thoroughly sweep the deck with a stiff bristled shop broom.

In order to prevent the deck boards from rotting, I would suggest using a good, outdoor latex caulk between the joints. Ask your hardware dealer for a quality brand, made especially for filling joints, if you have not yet power washed and used a wooden deck sealer.

I also suggest you do that. After your deck is fully dried, apply a bead of caulk wide enough to fill the entire joint between the boards.

Treating your deck annually with a good sealer will prohibit wood rot. The caulk between the floor board joints will prevent the pine needles from accumulating and will allow you to simply sweep them off your deck with just a broom.

### Fall tips:

\* Make sure you clean out your gutters of leaves and other debris before the cold of winter comes.


\* Thatching your lawn of dead grass will allow the grass to breathe and make for a healthier lawn in the spring.

\* Finish any last-minute outdoor painting now.

\* Make sure your chimney or furnace stack is completely clear of any foreign objects of nests.

## Feeding the hungry, one family at a time

Hunger is not prominent in Ruidoso and Lincoln County, but it's here.

Betsy Seiler, secretary for the non-profit group that operates the Lincoln County Food Bank, said the group organized 11 years ago to combat hunger for all county residents.

"We recognized there was a real problem," she said. "Poverty isn't as visible here."

When the food bank opened in July 1986, the purpose was to fill a gap between the time families applied for food stamps and when they actually received them. That gap can be as short as a week or as long as 30 days.

Since 1986, Seiler said, the efforts to feed families have grown into a success.

"It's taken on a life of its own," she said. "The people in Lincoln County have just been wonderful with their donations."

Funded solely by contributions and staffed by 14 volunteers, in addition to the eight-member volunteer board, the food bank feeds an estimated 60 to 90 people a month.

Bob Whiteley, volunteer coordinator for the food bank, said community members, churches and civic clubs are

key players in keeping about 30 families fed a week.

And though you won't find many perishable items like milk, cheese and produce stocked on the food bank shelves, Whiteley said there are plenty of mainstays.

"We buy beans and rice in bulk and sack it for people," he said. "We buy lots of food and what we do buy is really just the essentials."

Those essentials include canned foods, crackers, macaroni and cheese, and powdered milk.

"We try to have peanut butter for the kids," Whiteley added.

Sometimes the food bank will get bakery items from a local grocery store or produce from a farmer who's had a bumper crop. But most times its donations from food drives by clubs, community members who've cleaned out their cupboards, and churches who've taken collections, that keep the food bank in staples.

"Most of the food comes from churches, the Alto Post Office, civic clubs," Whiteley said. "The churches

particularly."

The volunteers allow the food bank to be open three days a week, for four hours a day, Whiteley said. From noon to 4 p.m. every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, four volunteers work two-hour shifts at the food distribution center.

The generosity of local churches also has kept a roof over the food bank. Right now, St. Eleanor's Catholic Church is home to the center. In the past it's been in another local church and the Social Services office, Seiler said.

Whiteley said having the space provided helps keep expenses down.

"Our only expense is telephone," he said. "The Catholic Church donates the facility, pays for the lights."

Churches can also serve as a link between the food bank and the community.

"A lot of people don't know we're

## 'Tree of Life' hopes to light holiday season with loving memories

Only 36 shopping days left until Christmas.

But amid the hustle and bustle of finding the right gift and decorating the tree, the holidays also can bring hard times. Families that have lost loved ones are more likely to feel the loss during the holidays, said Jennifer Chadwick, Hospice of Lincoln County director.

"Holidays are family time and when one of your key family members is gone, it's not the same," she said. "Holidays can reactivate the grief of missing someone."

But at this year's Festival of Trees Dec. 5 and 6, families and friends can help their loved ones' memories live on in lights. Hospice of Lincoln

County will sponsor a "Tree of Life" at the Festival. The white lights will sell for \$1 each, and Chadwick and Hospice volunteer Betty Phillips hope to see the tree blazing in a glow of unforgotten love.

"It's a memorial to those that have passed on," Phillips said. "We've all been touched (by death) in some way."

"Trees of Life are common at hospices across the South," Phillips said. And though the lights are often more expensive than the \$1 being charged by Hospice of Lincoln County, she said it's a good starting point.

Chadwick agreed that \$1 is a good price for the first tree. "We want to keep it affordable, so even a child can do it," she said.

Chadwick said people try to get through the holidays by denying the loss they feel. "A lot of people deal with

grief by pretending it's not there," she said. "Sometimes just doing something can help. Lighting a light is a symbol. It really symbolizes that the memory of that person is still dear."

Phillips said the idea is "that their spirit still lives on in each person that is alive."

The Tree of Life is one of four annual fund-raisers for Hospice of Lincoln County, which opened in March. In addition to the \$1 lights, Hospice is seeking corporate sponsors.

"Our reimbursement from Medicare and insurance is so low, we really rely on volunteers and contributions," Chad-

wick said. "We visit, whether or not we get paid."

The service is not only for patients and their families who are grappling with terminal illness; hospice also provides bereavement counseling for families and friends of dying patients or any community member who has lost a loved one.

Two sessions on coping with grief over the holidays will be held Dec. 9 and 16 at First Christian Church, 1211 Hull Road, to help people deal with the grief of death and the loss felt at Christmas. Counselor Margaret Parkins will lead the groups, sponsored by Hospice

of Lincoln County and Frontier Medical Hospice, which will meet at 1 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. Parkins also will lead a grief support group starting Jan. 6, 1998. People are free to attend one or all of the groups.

The season typically known for its joy and good will can take its toll, Chadwick said, but it's not the only time of year that can make those empty chairs seem haunting.

"Every holiday brings up those memories, whether it's a parent, a grandparent, a friend," she said.

Phillips, a volunteer at hospices in Missouri, Texas and New Mexico for 12 years, said the organizations may ease the pain, even a little bit.

"Sometimes I feel and I can see where I help," she said. "That doesn't mean that the she doesn't cry, though; at Hospice of Lincoln County it's not

here," Whiteley said. "People that need food, need to see their minister to get a food slip."

Those slips are also available at the human resources office.

And with the holidays fast approaching, both Seiler and Whiteley urged the community to be generous with both time and money.

"We could always use volunteers," Whiteley said. "We need all the people in town to help."

Seiler said, "Everybody who works at the food bank is very busy in their everyday life. But we need volunteers."

And food is needed to keep families fed until government assistance kicks in or until they can get on their feet.

"Groceries just last so long," Seiler said.

But perhaps Elinor Dayley, who volunteers at the food bank with her husband Ron, summed up the importance of the program best.

"We never send anybody away hungry," she said. "It really makes you thankful for what you have."

against the rules. "The tears we shed - it's OK to cry with the family," she said.

And Chadwick said coping with the grief is not easy, nor consistent for everyone, but it is important.

"The bottom line is we're all going to die," she said. "It's how we deal with it that makes the difference."

Ruidoso Middle School Math, Engineering, Science and Engineering (MESA) members may have headed to the Fall Design competition...

The team of 10 middle school students traveled to Roswell on Nov. 8 to compete in the regional event. They traveled back with an overall third-place finish.

The competition featured 13 schools from Southern New Mexico matching wits in areas like impromptu speaking, on-site design and Information Station Quest.

"We had one team missing," said MESA advisor and middle school science teacher Carla Burns. "We had to skip one competition. If we had been complete, we might have

come in first or second overall."

Burns admits that she was anxious about the competition when she learned the team would be two members short. But team members said it didn't faze them, and they were proud of the showing they had.

"Considering this is our first competition, out of 13 schools for us to place third is pretty good," said Kyle Storey, who competed in impromptu speaking.

And the strong finish came without the aid of studying.

"You can't really study," said Fletcher Hall, who mastered Information Station Quest with partner Nick Spence. "You never know what it's going to be about."

Herring and Spence had to apply their problem-solving skills in math, science and engineering in the Quest competition. They had 5 minutes to complete 10 stations, where they determined things like

density, volume and area.

The difficulty of the questions, Herring said, was "in the middle - not easy, not hard." Storey and Kourtney Hodges also were undaunted by the task of impromptu speaking. In the competition, they were given a subject, given five minutes to prepare and then were asked to give a two-minute speech - twice. Storey and Hodges spoke on the DWI hotline and welfare in America.

Without the benefit of researching their topics or having hours or even weeks to prepare, Storey and Hodges did achieve a fifth-place finish.

Alexa Beier, Rachel Warren and Billy Jean Wieland also had to use their quick wits to explain a topic in on-site writing.

The two were asked to write a paper on an environmental issue, which they narrowed down to air pollution. Wieland said "we just had to

write down what we knew about it and had to be as creative as possible.

In the on-site design competition Munral Davidson, Jocelyn Smith and Erica Hoff put their heads together to design a paper airplane that could fly the farthest. Davidson said at first the team experimented with unusual designs and materials, but found that the old stand-by was lighter and flew the farthest.

The competition, all said, was exciting, though waiting for the results to get posted was a bit nerve-racking. Burns said competition is one of the fun parts of being involved in MESA, which also takes field trips and other outings.

The club is aimed at fostering interest in the sciences and continues through middle school to students' senior year

in high school. But Storey said there's more to it than just equations and experiments.

"At the end of high school you earn \$1,000 for college," she said. "MESA helps a lot with math and science."

And as for skills to use for the rest of her life, Storey said MESA provides those too.

"It gives us an experience with teamwork," she said.

Not to mention the head start it can give students on careers. Hodges plans to be an actress and said the impromptu speaking is a good lesson on performing in front of a crowd, and ad-libbing. Spence wants to be a doctor, Storey wants to go into business and marketing, and other students pointed to science or engineering as possible jobs - all areas where MESA may pay off.



"Lassie Come-Home" deals with the love of a boy for a dog, and the love of the dog for a boy. No hardships or meanness can keep them separated.


### Advice for kids
