"I'm done right now the way it is," said Kopacka, co-owner of Roxanne's Bakery. "It just doesn't seem right. I'm going to go out of business through no fault of my

• A list of stipulations by the Carrizozo Village Council this week may or may not tie up Ruidoso's exit from the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, an official

When Ruidoso finally does split from the Lincoln County Solid Waste, Authority, the village will operate its own garbage collection services.

The Ruidoso Village Council on Tuesday voted not to look for a contractor to provide the basic garbage collections services, said Village Clerk

Tammie Maddox. The action did not require a "pure" majority of the council, staff said. Three councilors were unable to the Tuesday session, which left three to vote on some issues and continue others such as ordinance adoptions.

By electing to provide garbage collection services internally, Ruidoso will be able to take over the service more quickly from the authority than if the village were to go through the process of seeking a contractor, said Village Manager Alan Briley

For months, the authority, a consortium of local governments, has been in the process of dissolving its 1991 joint powers agreement to allow Ruidoso separate garbage collection services. Initiating the move were numerous complaints from Ruidoso residents about the services provided by the authority as well as how it maintained the garbage transfer station where trash is collected before being taken to the Otero/Lincoln County Landfill.

All of the government entities with the exception of Ruidoso have agreed to a new joint powers agreement and joint resolution for the reformation of the authority. Ruidoso was to vote on the agreement Tuesday. The agreement was one of the items the council could not vote on without a majority, Village Clerk Tammie Maddox said. The issue was continued to the council's May 12

Though Carrizozo approved the new agreement on April 14, a letter dated April 28 from Carrizozo's attorney to the authority's attorney said Carrizozo's agreement was contingent

on numerous stipulations. If the stipulations in the three-page letter were not agreed to, then it is implied that Carrizozo's agreement would be void.

Don Dutton, attorney for the authority, passed out copies of the letter from Carrizozo Village Attornev David Stevens to Ruidoso village councilors during Tuesday's council session.

One of Carrizozo's contingencies specified that profits from the landfill would be dispersed among authority members and Ruidoso equally, as opposed to proportionately.

Another was in regard to how Ruidoso would charge authority members for use of the transfer station. Under the agreement, Ruidoso assumes management and operation of the transfer station.

Carrizozo village officials could not be reached Thursday afternoon regarding the letter.

It is not known if the village's official motion to pass the agreement included the list of contingencies; however, in the letter's opening paragraphs, Stevens writes: "... the mayor of the town of Carrizozo has agreed, upon my advice, to execute the signature page for the joint resolution joint powers agreement based only upon assurances made from your as follows:


As soon as the agreement is finalized, then Ruidoso may move ahead with equipping a garbage collection staff, Briley said.

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Downs mayor disputes dismissal of employee by council

Ruidoso Downs trustees say

an employee was fired this Ruidoso Downs Mayor Joe

Hayhurst says that employee is going to work on Monday.

Tm just waiting to see what. happens and where it goes from here," said the employee in question, Cathy Olshaskie.

Three days after the Ruidoso Downs Village Council fired Olshaskie on Monday, she received a call at home from Hayhurst telling her to come back to work, she said.

Hayhurst, who walked out the council's Monday closed session on whether to dismiss Olshaskie, said the council overstepped its authority. He is refusing to sign Olshaskie's termination notice.

'I told them I wouldn't have

any part in dismissing an employee on the wrong grounds that our attorney had advised them wrong and they were acting wrong," Hayhurst said.

According to village personnel policy, the supervisor of an probationary employee must first recommend a dismissal before the council may take action. Hayhurst said, Olshaskie, hired Nov. 11, is two weeks away from ending her six month probationary period with

the village. "Well, it was not brought to the village body by the her supervisor. In fact, her supervisor was there to keep her from being fired," he said.

And I'm going to reinstate her if I'm right. And I'm sure I'm right," Hayhurst added. "I think as long as I don't sign the (termination) release, then according to the merit system, she's not fired ... That's when it's final."

Clerk/Treasurer Leann Weihbrecht is Olshaskie's supervisor. She said the issue was put on the agenda at the request of Downs trustees Ray Hayhurst, the mayor's brother, and Margie Morales.

Morales declined to comment Thursday, saying the issue yas not settled yet. Say Hayhurst said Thursday that he was unaware of the mayor's statement, that council had violated personnel policy. he reason he and Morales brought up the issuare because we had so many complaints on her," he said. The complaints focused on her being uncooperative with people requesting information from village hall, he

Downs Village Attorney Dan Bryant was in the process of moving his law office to a new location on Thursday and could not be reached for comment.

Olshaskie, whose husband is a Downs police officer, said she knew of one written complaint filed against her. When asked why the complaint was filed, she said: "More than likely because I enforced the rules that were put forth."

In Ruidoso, Olshaskie worked previously at Wal-Mart. In Regenix, before moving here, she i had jobs in accounts payable, accounts receivable and other office work.

"I'm more than qualified for the jobs she said. "And my test

scores were the highest and that's why they had to hire me."

She said a few Downs trustees were against hiring her from the beginning, based on the fact that her husband is a village


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

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Regional ambulance service looks to county for a fiscal shot in the arm

Management of Lincoln County's volunteer ambulance services by Ruidoso EMS for the past six weeks already has resulted in improvements.

But with improved service also comes an increased subsidy.

According to the 1997-98 budget, emergency medical services expenses for the tounty (excluding Ruidoso and its isoverage area) were listed as \$51,741. Revenue was estimated at \$32,500, leaving a \$19,242 deficit for the county to absorb.

Tuesday, Jim Stover, director of Ruidoso EMS, presented a proposed operational budget of \$158,400 for 1998-99. He

projected revenues of \$98,800 based on a 70 percent collection rate, leaving a potential county subsidy of \$61,800.

In addition, Stover submitted a request for \$155,000 in capital outlay purchases, including an ambulance bay at Hondo and a four-wheel drive ambulance.

He anticipates selling soffic outdated ambulances for about \$55,000, fesulting in a needed capital subsidy of \$100,000. am

County Commissioners lifet year decided to contract with Ruidoso EMS to provide ambid lance service to the Alto/Sierra Blanca Airport Road area.

When that arrangement appeared to be working well, commissioners asked Stover to manage the rest of the volunteer groups. Ruidoso EMS falls under the jurisdiction of the

Lincoln County Medical Center, which is managed by Presbyterian HealthCare Systems. Commissioners pay \$24,000 for the supervision of their volunteer EMS groups.

Stover's capital request was cut by commissioners during a budget workshop Tuesday, along with all other capital outlay requests. But the action probably is temporary. Once commissioners have a better handle on the budget, some of the capital outlay may be reinstated, commissioners said.

During the budget session, Commissioner Wilton Howell pointed out that the county tentatively budgeted \$200,000

Summarizing some of the improvements since taking over, Stover said repeaters, which provide radio reception

for units on the road, have been repaired and replaced, eliminating most communication

"dead" spots. "Until you start tearing things apart, you can't see all of what needs to be done," Stover said, adding that the repeater work cost about \$6,000.

Older vehicles require extensive maintenance to keep them in shape, he said. Once he catches up on maintenance, the cost for each vehicle per mile for maintenance and fuel will go down, but right now it sits at about 75 cents, he said.

An inventory of equipment been conducted and instead of individual ambulance units hording supplies, because of the uncertainty of when more might be delivered. Stover has established a system of sharing. If something is

needed, volunteers know they'll receive the supplies quickly, he

Although members of the county EMS units are volunteers, they are paid for the hours they spend responding to calls.

However, some were not earning minimum wage and Stover said he brought them up to that standard in the new budget. (Ruidoso's EMTs and paramedics are paid employ-

Instead of using medically uncertified drivers on ambulances, emergency medical technicians (EMTs) will be driving ambulances more frequently, Stover said.

Ambulances need to be better equipped for related emergencies and will be outfitted with some fire gear and helmets, he said.

Once units are properly equipped, the cost should drop, because the expense will be only for occasional replacement of damaged gear.

Training of personnel already has increased, Stover said. Money budgeted for training in 1998-99 went up to \$33,000 from \$20,000 this year.

One EMT drives to Corona twice a week for classes in an equipped unit that could respond to a medical emergency and also can be used at rodeos and other events.

"The big battle is to get more and more people involved,: Stover said. "If Corona is any indication, we'll be getting that enthusiasm as we move on to Hondo next and then other communities."

State Legislature looks at drive-up liquor sales, budget issues in special session

Eighteen bills were introduced on the House side of the New Mexico State Legislature during the first half-day of a special session that started Wednesday.

The dominant issue seems to be how to deal with drive-up liquor sales, said state Rep. Dub Williams. Nine bills were introduced on the issue, the Glencoe Republican said Thursday.

"I'm sure there will be a resolution of that problem," he said. "Right now, more than likely there will be a local option outcome (on whether to close them). Personally, when it comes to taxes or any changes, I like local folks to have a say."

However, one of the nine bills calls for limiting impact on the drive-up windows to Albuseems to be centered. Williams

"In the rural areas, it's not a problem," he said. "I think there are only 12 of them (outside Albuquerque) across the state." Hearings on drive-up liquor

sales started Thursday morning. The first bill introduced by both the House and Senate was what Williams called "the feed bill," allocating \$373,000 to run

Pain at the courthouse

Remember a couple of years ago when the heat was on our long-suffering county commissioners about all that unspent money sitting in bank accounts?

The ideological argument was that a county government shouldn't have excess funds; that if they did, taxes should come down or services should be increased.

Commissioners.to the applause of every incorporated village in Lincoln County, you might recall even split \$150,000 among the villages for enhanced youth recreation.

My, how times change.

At last Tuesday's county budget review (the first of what might be several) commissioners took a look at projected revenues and examined departmental requests and came to the decision that major revisions were in order, not the least because the state requires that every county must maintain a cash reserve representing three months of budgeted expenses in the general fund and one month in the road department.

So, until they could get a handle on the situation, the commissioners ordered an across-the-board reduction in

every department's budget.

Especially hard hit was Sheriff Tom Sullivan, who had counted on an additional deputy and some new vehicles. Commissioner William Schwettmann said the department was thereby "cannibalized." The sheriff was angry enough to abruptly leave the session after some pointed comments.

Well...it appears the county would be OK, but it did obligate \$1 million to the expansion of Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso, which the county owns.

And the commission has ordered an audit of the facilities fund, wondering where that money went this year.

Stay tuned; things might change, but at this point austerity appears to be the name of the game.

rew Mexico is well known for its part in the history of atomic energy. The atomic bomb was built at a top-secret laboratory in Los Alamos and first tested at Trinity Site on the White Sands bombing range on July 13, 1945, and the scientific community here has continued to lead the world in discovering and applying new scientific principles. New Mexico also had a part

in the theft of some of those principles and their delivery to the Soviet Union.

Hitler's big mistake

Adolf Hitler made the same mistake in World War II that Napoleon had made in 1812: he invaded Russia, and didn't finish the job before winter. arrived.

The result was disaster both times. In 1941, the addition of yet another front in Russia sealed the Germans' fate. The Soviet Union was praised by the other Allies for its sacrifice and stamina. Hollywood produced movies glorifying the country.

But that didn't last. As Germany fell, it became clear that the Soviet leader, Joseph Stalin, intended to absorb as much of Hitler's tattered empire as he could. Even before Japan surrendered, the Soviet Union had become the greatest adversary of the United States and Europe in the minds of the leaders of those countries.

There was great fear that the Soviets were developing atomic weapons of their own. In September, 1949, President Truman announced that they had indeed done so. As physicist Harold C.

Urey put it, "There is only one thing worse than one nation having the atomic bombthat's two nations having it." This news and the new fear

of Soviet hegemony provided a fertile field for an obscure, alcoholic, Republican senator from Wisconsin who was looking for an issue.

The public had been fascinated with the pathetic story of Alger Hiss, a Harvard Law School graduate who was a rising star in the Democratic Party and the Roosevelt administration.

In a spectacular trial, Hiss was found to have lied about passing information to the Soviet Union many years before. That Republican sena-tor, Joseph McCarthy, had his issue: communist infiltration of the government.

The saga of Joe McCarthy

is a sordid one. He ruined the reputations and careers of many people and seriously threatened the First Amendment to the Constitution. But, although he didn't know it and probably didn't care, there was some truth in what he said.

Gold in Albuquerque

In September of 1945, just days after the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, a man named Harry Gold knocked on the upstairs apartment door at 209 North High Street in Albuquerque.
"Julius sent me," he said to

the occupants, a young soldier who was stationed at Los Alamos and his pregnant wife. Gold presented half the top of a box of Jell-O, and the young man matched it to the other half, which his brother-in-law had given him.

The soldier, David Greenglass, then gave Gold copies he had made at Los Alamos of Schematic drawings of an explosive "lens." In return, Gold gave him \$500 in cash.

A fission bomb like the ones exploded at Trinity Site and over the two Japanese cities is theoretically simple. All you have to do is bring two big enough pieces of the right kind of "uranium "or plutonium together, and a chain reaction

But actually doing this is quite a bit harder. No one wants to be anywhere nearby when the bomb goes off, so bringing the two halves of the critical mass together must be done mechanically and from a great distance. And the bomb must remain safe until the trigger is pulled.

The explosive "lenses" that the Los Alamos scientists invented allowed the two parts of the bomb to be brought together by remote control. Just as a glass lens focuses light, these explosive lenses, when ignited, would slam one part of the uranium into the

There is no question that the information Greenglass passed to Gold was a windfall to the Soviets. Five years later the world would learn of this treason and the United States would exact punishment for it.

Next week: The Rosenbergs pay the price.

Elsewhere: In 1945, while Gold and Greenglass were matching Jell-O box tops, James Thurber published "The Carnival" Thurber Rodgers and Hammerstein produced the musical comedy 'Carousel."

The size of White Oaks

A recent article on White Oaks in the Vámonos section of the Ruidoso News states that 5,000 people once mined for gold there. Another column by Keith Green places the figure at 2,500. The new book "Ghostown of White Oaks" by Bill Rakocy varies between 2,000 and 3,000.

One wonders where they come up with these wild-eyed figures. One thing is clear. All of these figures can't be right, but they can be and are

In the interest of historical

incredible amount of misinformation out there, let me give you the facts.

White Oaks reached a peak population of 1,500 around 1895 and experienced a decline thereafter (until recently).

How do I know? My family ame to White Oaks in the 880s and many of the men in answers to their questions; have any family, including my ether, my grandfather and several uncles and cousins were involved in mining there over long periods of time, extending from 1886 to 1951.

> How many of you are aware that we have a census every 10 years in this country, and have since 1790? It is required by the Constitution of the United States to apportion representation in the U. S. House of Representatives.

Almost a half-century ago, while still a boy, I obtained the population figures for White Oaks and other towns in New Mexico from 1900-1950, as recorded by the U.S. Census Bureau.

In 1900, a few years after reaching its peak, White Oaks had a population of 804.

I do not have the figures for 1890, but according to the White Oaks Eagle, there were 900 people in the town proper and 300 in the environs, for a total of 1,200.

Father wanted to build a

table listening. In the middle of fire to thaw his partner out, but North Pole Olson said "Have no fear, and they pushed on. They arrived in mid-afternoon on the day of my birth, Oct. 27, 1909.

About 1920 father started working as a petroleum geologist for the Sun Oil Company. The attitude of the company was: "If Lynn wants to retire, he will have to come to us; we are not going to him.

Father's attitude was much the same: "If the company wants me to retire, they will have to come to me; I am not going to them."



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
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

A fistful of computer experts lends a 'hand'

They are a group of Ruidosoarea women in direct sales, but don't expect to purchase makeup or cleaning products from

Five women are representatives of the international firm Hand Technologies, and they offer a different way of buying a computer.

We eliminate the fear factor," said Michelle Volk, one of

By working in person with each customer, these sales representatives can help buyers pick a computer that fits their needs and has the right software to go with it, Volk said.

The company offers prices competitive with computer marketers such as Best Buy and Gateway, said Mary Weaver, who organized the group earlier this year.

They order the computer equipment, often over the Internet from a laptop computer with the customer watching. Within two to 10 days, a computer arrives. The delivery is free, Weaver said.

"And we set it up for them," said Volk. "We can set up Internet access and get them online. And we can show them how to begin and start using it."

Weaver said the representatives in her group will spend from an hour to 90 minutes providing instructions before they leave. "We call it a tour," Weaver

From that point on, customers have a representative to call whenever they want more equipment, software or additional training, which is then paid for by the hour.

On-line training also is available over the Internet, which costs \$59 a year for unlimited access, or is provided free for three months with the purchase of a computer system.

The women also can create web pages — even interactive web pages — for customers, and host those pages, Weaver said.

They can provide custombuilt computers, upgrades, credit sales, leases, warranties everything offered by the big computer stores, with one excep-

"We don't sell Macintosh," Volk said.

Because of their varying backgrounds in computers, the women offer different areas of expertise, said Rosemary Harrison, another member

Kimberlee Smith, for example, also works as a business consultant for organization development. She spent seven years in that work while in Washington, D.C.

Genevieve Phelan has been involved with personal computers for years.

"I also taught classès in DOS and word processing, and¹¹ helped people streamline their businesses," Phelan said.

Everybody here in Ruidoso^{ol} has to wear a couple of hats to make it. And the more you carlo increase the bottom line, the bet ter off you are. I believe firmly that computers do that --- they simplify it. I really like the idea

of helping people here."

Weaver teaches computer classes at Eastern New Mexico University. She is the one who enlisted the others as representatives for Hand Technologies. Weaver knew Sandy Stambaugh, for instance, because she works in the school's bookstore. Stambaugh always was solving computer problems for the bookstore, and wasn't afraid of digging in and learning things computer systems, Weaver said.

Weaver herself first learned about the company from an article in a computer magazine. She made some calls, and joined the company in December, 1996.

I thought it would make a very interesting way to get into the computer business," Weaver

About a year later she began adding partners, starting with Stambaugh.

Earlier this year, about two months ago, she brought in Smith, Volk, Harrison and Genevieve. Unlike other direct

All of the representatives have other jobs, Weaver said.



A: I've been in Ruidoso seven years. I worked at



Camp Sierra Blanca as a case worker. I also was a case worker for community corrections in Carlsbad and started a new community corrections program in Alamogordo for Otero County.

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




BRIDGETACTICS



The best that can be said for arriving at a shaky contract is that it frequently presents declarer with a challenge during the play. That was the case in this deal where South stretched his values somewhat to bid a doubtful slam. However, he then justified his rosy assessment by finding a way to bring home 12 tricks.

When dummy came down, prospects were not too good. To begin with, there was at least one

trump loser, and on top of that there was either a diamond or a club loser, depending on what South discarded on dummy's third heart.

The slam was not hopeless, though, since there were still two chances to make it. Accordingly, after winning the heart lead in dummy, declarer led the jack of spades and took East's queen with the ace as West followed low.

Next came two more heart winners, South discarding a club, followed by the A-K of clubs and a club ruff, on which West discarded a diamond. Had the clubs turned out to be divided 3-3 instead of 4-2, declarer would have had the slam in the bag at this point since dummy's fourth club would provide a parking place for South's potential diamond loser.

But even with the situation as it was, the battle was not yet lost. South still had one last chance, so he exited with a trump in the hope of finding West with both the king of spades and king of diamonds.

It was certainly a good thought, and it became a full-fledged reality when the hope materialized. West won the trump lead with the king and was forced to return a diamond or a heart, handing declarer the slam.














Batman' returns

While the name Masterson was invariably linked to law enforcement on the frontier, it did not necessarily mean that any of the Masterson brothers – Bat, Ed and Jim had discernible halos. And the event that involved Bat in the summer of 1880 is a good case in point. (Actually, I take that back – Ed did have a discernible halo by the summer of 1880, having relocated to his new and permanent home – Dodge City's Boot Hill in the aftermath of some unpleasantness in April of 1878.)

On June 26 of that year, Billy Thompson, younger brother of one on the deadliest gunman to ever live (Ben) - managed to get himself into some serious trouble in Ogailala, Nebraska. This was not an uncommon situation for Billy to find himself the only thing that made it different from any other situation involving the Thompson brothers was the presence of Bat Masterson.

Bad Billy

Billy Thompson had always been eager to follow in brother Ben's murderous footsteps. Back in 1873, he had gunned down Ellsworth, Kansas Sherrif C.B. Whitney. While Ben had been involved in a gunfight with a man possessing the unlikely name of Happy Jack Morco, Billy had no one to shoot at, and it frustrated him. When Sheriff Whitney arrived on the scene, Billy was relieved. He had someone to shoot.

For no apparent reason, Billy killed the sheriff with a shotgun blast (It may actually have been accidental, but Billy was such a psycho that he would rather stand trial for murder than admit to discharging a weapon accidentally.) When Ben turned on him and demanded to know why he had "shot our best friend," the charming Billy replied, "I would've shot if it had been Jesus Christ." Hopefully that lovely little story will establish the character, or rather, the lack of character that Billy possessed.

The trouble that Billy found himself dealing with in Ogallala that June was similar in the sense that both incidents involved copious amounts of liquor and unwise – in the extreme – use of firearms.

Billy and another Texan by the name of Jim Tucker had a disagreement that both felt could only be resolved by one or the other of them taking leave of the planet. Both of them went for their guns, and when the gunsmoke cleared, Billy lay on the saloon (where else?) floor with no less than five bullet holes in him. None of those wounds proved to be fatal, and the citizens of Ogallala were terribly disappointed. Many of them began to hint that they would rectify the situation as soon as Billy's health improved enough for them to kill

him with a rope.

When Ben Thompson got wind of Billy's situation, he wisely realized that if he were to show up in Ogallala, it might just turn out to be a double hanging. Casting about for a confederate to come to the assistance of his little brother, Ben found friend Bat Masterson ready to go to Nebraska and save the worthless Billy's neck. Bat, unlike Ben Thompson, was unknown in Ogallala.

Escape from Nebraska

Many people, then and now, wish to escape from Nebraska. Billy Thompson was no exception - in fact, you might say that he was a little more anxious than most. When Bat arrived in early July - incognito, of course - he assessed the situation and took action. First, he had a fight started as a distraction for the local authorities. Then, with the aid of of a male nurse who had been attending the multi-perforated Billy, he managed to spirit the wounded miscreant out of Ogallala. It is interesting to note another conspirator in the escape of Billy Thompson was none other than Buffalo Bill Cody, of all people. It was about the middle of July when Bat and the fully recovered and greatly relieved Billy Thompson rumbled into Dodge City in a wagon. It is not recorded exactly how Ben Thompson greeted his younger brother, but he certainly should have smacked Billy up the side of the head.


The Travels of Bat

In February of 1881, at the behest of old friend Wyatt Earp, Bat left Dodge City for Tombstone, Ariz. Joining Wyatt, the other Earp brothers and Doc Holliday in that place, Bat secured employment as faro dealer in the Oriental Saloon.

The following month, he was a member of a posse that included Wyatt, Virgil and Morgan Earp. They were in pursuit of some outlaws that had attempted to rob a stage-coach.

Despite all the fun to be had in Tombstone, Bat left in April. His younger brother Jim had become involved in a potentially violent feud back in Dodge City. Undoubtedly remembering that older brother Ed had been killed in that place, Bat hot-footed it back to Kansas. He didn't have to wait long upon his arrival in Dodge for something to happen. In fact, he didn't have to wait at all.

As Bat stepped off the train, he was

immediately confronted by his brother's two worst enemies: A.J. Peacock and Al Updegraff.

Wasting no time, all three men began shooting. Updegraff was the only one hit in this little altercation, and, although his wound was severe, it was not fatal. In the classic frontier fashion, because there were no fatalities, Bat was fined eight whole dollars. Then, the former sheriff was ordered out of Dodge City.

About a year later, in 1882, Bat was in Trinidad, Colorado, where he was appointed city marshal. It was while he was serving in that capacity that he came to the rescue of Doc Holliday. The authorities back in Arizona were most anxious to have Doc come back to them and face charges of murder related to Wyatt Earp's famous vendetta after the death of brother Morgan.

Bat had a trumped up bunco charge leveled at Doc, which effectively prevented him from leaving the state. Bat did not do this out of any affection for the tubercular dentist. He did it because Wyatt Earp asked him to – and that was more than enough reason for Bat Masterson to go to anyone's aid.

The following April, Bat was defeated in his bid for re-election in Trinidad and wandered back to Dodge City, where the feeling against him had cooled. He was one of the "Dodge City Peace Commission" that included Wyatt Earp and Luke Short, among others. Actually they weren't really a "peace commission."

That was just the humorous name they gave themselves after Luke Short had put out a distress call to his gunman buddies. It seems that certain of the city Fathers felt that Luke was bad for business – their business, specifically. When they found that their saloon couldn't compete with Luke's, they tried, through legal maneuvering, to run him out of town.

Shortly after that, Luke's dangerous friends – Bat among them – began to show up in Dodge, all looking quite solemn and grave. Luke's enemies felt that this was an ominous situation indeed, and his opposition quickly melted away.

The Newspaperman

Noting that most people in Dodge seemed to like having him around, Bat remained, and in Nov. 1, 1884 he put out a newspaper called "Vox Populi." The paper's main purpose was to rail against Bat's political enemies, and it only lasted one issue. But it whetted Bat's appetite for journalism.

On Independence Day of 1885, Bat was voted the most popular man in Dodge and the citizens presented him with a goldheaded cane. The following year found him in trouble again, however. In Denver, Colorado, Bat ran afoul of a man named Spencer who was married to a lady named Nellie McMahon, described as a "variety hall singer." Feeling that Nellie would be better off with him, Bat began beating Spencer over the head with the same goldheaded cane he was awarded for being so popular. Nellie eventually divorced Spencer and left with Bat, but not before Bat managed to get himself shot in the leg by a friend of Spencer's. Ah, the romance of the Old West.

Over the years, Bat's reputation as a "sportsman" or gambler, began to eclipse his rep as a gunman. In 1891, he "married" (no record of the wedding has ever been found) a variety hall performer named Emma Walters. Regardless of legalities, the pair lived together as man and wife for the rest of Bat's life.

In 1896, Bat was hired to protect the stakes of a heavyweight bout sponsored by Judge Roy Bean near his Jersy Lily Saloon in Langtry, Texas. By 1900, he was writing regular boxing news for a Denver newspaper.

Unfortunately, after several unpleasant incidents too lengthy to describe in the confines of this column, Bat was asked to leave Denver for good. He headed for New York City, where he was employed by the Morning-Telegraph to write a regular boxing column. Eventually, he was recognized as one of the nation's authorities on boxing.

It was at his desk at the Telegraph on Oct. 25, 1921, that the end finally came. After composing his last column, the old gunman, who had handed so many notched pistols out to admirers in New York that he could have opened a sporting goods store with them, clutched at his chest and slumped across his desk.

Despite the dangers of his professions in the Old West – lawman and gambler – Bat Masterson died of natural causes a long, long way from the frontier. He was a month short of his 68th birthday. He is buried in New York's Woodlawn Cemetery.
