

CAPITAN: Not the only failed issue

This isn't the only bond issue to fail in the last eight years, Trost said. The first time the board sought bonds to build a middle school, voters rejected the idea, because it included an auditorium, he said. "About a year later, we went back, but this time with a bare bones design," Trost said. "Now I wish we'd done more, because we're running out of class rooms."

Both Trost and Crossno said there was no organized effort against the bonds in the community.

"We had lots of good people working for it," Trost said. "Diana and the task force really worked hard and we need to thank them. Then we need to sit down and look and talk and see what our options are. We need to look at another bond issue or portable buildings, although I hate those things."

"One of the main things that concerns me is the safety with traffic in middle of the school (complex). We have to look at that no matter what. It's very disappointing."

\$4.1 million for high school

The district was asking for \$4.1 million to build a new high school. The remainder of the bond issue would have covered maintenance projects, furnished classrooms, paved a road and purchased playground equipment.

In Carrizozo, three incumbents were returned to office as 26 percent of the 1,137 voters showed up at the polls. Steve Harkey won over Paul Baca for position one with 231 to 125 votes; Lisa Shivers was unopposed for position two

with 267 votes and Mario "Lee Roy" Zamora was unopposed for position three with 271 votes.

Renewal of a special tax levy for small capital outlay projects and equipment was approved by 224 to 72 votes.

Corona approves issue

Corona managed to pass its school bond issue by 102 votes to 81. The \$650,000 may be used to build a new school or add onto existing buildings, buy computers, improve or purchase school grounds.

With a 62 percent turnout, 163 of the district's 262 eligible voters came to the polls. Two candidates were unopposed in the school board race. Ernest Lueras Jr. won seat three with 128 votes and Richard Gage won seat two with 128 votes.

In the contested seat one race, incumbent Catherine Muniz lost her bid for re-election with 41 votes to Denise Byrd's 89 votes. Also losing in that race were Rosetta Lynn Gilmore with four votes and William G. Bryan with 45.

No Hondo contests

In Hondo where no one was opposed, only 5 percent, or 29 of the 555 voters showed up for the election. They returned Lucinda Loveless to position one with 25 votes, Jimmy Aragon to position two with 22 votes, Braulio Alvarado Sr. to position three with 17 votes, Curtis P. McTeigue to position four with 23 votes and put Jimmy McTeigue in position five with 23 votes.

Sayner, two incumbents win Ruidoso seats; mill levy passes

With the lowest turnout of five school systems in Lincoln County, voters in the Ruidoso County District Tuesday returned two incumbent school board members to their seats and approved the continuation of a special property tax levy.

"It's not as close a vote as we've had in past years," Ruidoso School Superintendent Mike Gladden said of the vote for the levy that will generate about \$400,000 a year. "It's good for our kids."

The special tax that will run for four years passed with 358 votes to 248. The money can be used to maintain buildings and buy equipment, but not for staff salaries.

Only 8.6 percent, or 621 of the 7,186 registered voters appeared at the Ruidoso Convention Center to express their opinions in the voting booths.

In the race for position one, incumbent Susan Lutterman retained her seat with 334 votes to attorney Rob Lewis' 257. Lewis ran into problems in the last week when he was arrested for failing to appear in court on driving offenses.

His only comment Tuesday evening was, "That was the result of the election."

Lutterman said she was pleased with the outcome.

"I'm ready to start four more years and I just appreciate everyone's support," she said Tuesday evening.

For position two, Frank Sayner beat Mike Lynch with 348 votes to 248.

Sayner was in meetings all evening and learned about his win from a friend calling on a cellular telephone.

"Obviously, I'm pleased," he said. "But I believe in my race, the public would have been well served with either Mike or myself on the board. I will try to do the very best I can."

Lynch was equally complimentary of his opponent, saying Sayner "is a good man" and that he planned to call and congratulate Sayner on the win.

Incumbent Ronnie Hemphill, who was unopposed for re-election, received 486 votes in position three.

Understanding, we can't spend money without getting something in return.

Despite his argument, commissioners voted 3-1 to go into executive session. Howell voted against the motion and Commissioner L. Ray Nunley was absent because of a family medical matter.


When the commission re-

turned to open session, Chairman Rex Wilson said the county will continue to seek a resolution to the elected officials salary situation.

The conflict - which has been tried in district court and then appealed to the state Supreme Court - affects elected officials who received raises in the middle of their terms, which violates the state Constitution. That provision conflicts with a state law that requires equity in pay for people doing similar jobs.

The board proceeded to canvass the election returns of precincts held therein January

Glencoe Rural Events Center suddenly has two major suitors

For the past year, the Lincoln County Commission couldn't even give away the Glencoe Rural Events Center, but now two groups are vying for the building, arena and land package on U.S. 70 about 14 miles east of Ruidoso.

When it became obvious that the center would not be self-supporting for years—and then only with an aggressive marketing program beyond the economic scope of the county—commissioners looked for someone to take over management. They even discussed giving it away, before they found out restrictions tied to federal grants used to improve the property probably would prohibit that move.

Two months ago, the Hondo School District, represented by Superintendent Barbara Casey, stepped forward to offer to manage the center in order to expand school activities and programs there, as well as community functions and commercial events.

But as the commission prepared Monday to sign an agreement with Casey and Hondo, a new element was injected into the mix.

A group that includes Roy Cooper and Jim Millar, who owns a business in Ruidoso, and country singer George Strait, is interested in staging major rodeos and developing a National Roping Hall of Fame there.

Millar told commissioners that with the clout of Strait and Cooper, a rodeo professional who qualified 30 times as a finalist for the national rodeo, they could generate \$5,000 to \$6,000 a month from events and establish the hall of fame. They also may be able to help

find money to enclose the arena, which would be essential to draw major competitions, he said.

Commissioners said they would consider the information while their attorney Alan Morel continues to negotiate the fine points of a management agreement with Hondo.

"I don't see why they couldn't work with the Hondo district as the manager," said Commissioner Wilton Howell. "Most of the activities they're talking about would be on the weekend."

"This is the best use for the facility," Millar said. "I don't know what the school would put there that would draw 100,000 people to this county. We'd like to put our proposal in front of you and if it's the best, move forward."

The type of events proposed wouldn't work at the Capitan fairground, he said, stressing that they would not negatively impact that community.

The group doesn't want to work under another entity, he said, adding, "We want to do this ourselves."

The Hall of Fame would take up the entire existing building, he said.

Commission Chairman Rex Wilson asked when the threesome first became interested in the center, a former horse sale barn, bought in 1994 with money from the state Legislature.

"When we heard it was going to be left for nothing," Millar said. "That's not the reason it's there."

"This offer would have been better coming to us earlier in the year when we went out for requests for proposals," Wilson said.

Wilson suggested as a first step the Millar group meet

with the community advisory board that oversees the center. The manager's position was eliminated from the county budget in July and the center has been open only for events already booked, with little attempt to draw new functions.

"The school has come forward with a proposal and the community still has strong feelings about the facility," Wilson said, referring to opposition to the Glencoe center from some Capitan, Carrizozo and Corona residents who worry about the future of the county fairground and arena in Capitan.

Casey said the Hondo district is willing to work with any groups interested in using the center, and pointed out that commissioners last month voted to enter an agreement with Hondo. That part of the equation already has been settled, she said.

County solid waste unit charged with Open Meetings Act violation

An open meetings violation complaint was filed last week with District Attorney Scot Key against the governing board of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

Attorney J. Robert Beauvais filed the complaint on behalf of his client, Calvin Griffin, who contends the board violated the state's law requiring public business to be conducted in public.

"They went into executive session (Thursday) for limited personnel matters and came out and (board member) Debra Ingle said, 'I suggest that the changes we talked about be-

made effective the next pay day.' That was the end of it," Beauvais said. "Limited personnel matters doesn't give the board the basis to take final action except in accordance with Open Meetings Act..."

General Manager Jerry Wright said the board's attorney, Don Dutton, attended the executive session and advised the board about what to say when back in open session.

"No decision was made that required a motion during that meeting," Wright said. "Giving raising is an administrative matter and I make those decisions. Raises are in the budget and it's the prerogative of the manager. No vote of the board was required, Don Dutton said."



Few people living in Ruidoso will forget that mid-Tuesday wind last week. It uprooted and shattered tall trees, knocked over signs, smashed windows, lifted building roofs, ripped shingles. Power was out for hours in some areas, leaving grocery clerks and housewives scrambling to handle thawing food in suddenly useless refrigerators.

Had it happened in coastal Florida, it would have been a hurricane; in Kansas, something approaching a cyclone, if not a twister.

In Ruidoso it was close to four hours of pure, unmitigated luck.

- No deaths or serious injuries, although flying sheet metal could have decapitated someone.
- No power-failure fatalities at the hospital.
- No head-on collisions, although some vehicles were severely bent.

And while at it, everybody should give thanks to the firefighters who kept downed power lines from starting forest fires; for the police (state and local) and sheriff's deputies who somehow kept traffic moving safely through Ruidoso's narrow corridors; to the power company, telephone and television cable crews who worked non-stop to restore service.

Now, all together: Aren't we lucky to live in Ruidoso?



Another close call for Ruidoso's people

On Jan. 26...Ruidoso received a strong reminder of the consequences of not taking care of one of our major resources. The trees blown onto power lines, homes, businesses, cars and roads showed the stresses of a forest being subjected to lack of moisture, overcrowding, soil compaction, paving and construction activity. These stresses, coupled with poor judgment in forest management, led to weak, dry, diseased and dying trees that are commonly known as hazard trees.

Strong winds proved the hazards are real. Residents...dodged another bullet when numerous fires were started by downed electrical lines. These fires easily could have turned into an uncontrolled disaster. Thanks to ground moisture from the prior week's snow and good efforts of many firefighters, a disaster was avoided.

It has been a year since the

Ruidoso News published its editorial, "Wildfires are real threats"; and it has been more than two years since forest professionals suggested that "Ruidoso is the most fire endangered community in the United States."

In response to a Forest Health Coalition letter to Gov. (Gary) Johnson, cabinet secretary Jennifer Salsbury responded on March 16, 1998:

"The New Mexico Forestry Division...and the U. S. Forest Service have worked with the Village of Ruidoso since the early '70s to bring recognition to the potential of a catastrophic wildland fire in Ruidoso. Even though the Village of Ruidoso has been made aware of the potential for a catastrophe, not enough has been done to address issues such as urban sprawl, ingress and egress in the upper canyon, tree hazards, forest health and building standards. These issues need to be addressed to prevent Ruidoso from becoming a disaster statistic."

The *Ruidoso News* editorial of Feb. 6, 1998, stated:

"The village, by law, has a duty to protect the general health, safety and welfare of the people who live here. There would be no excuses, only costly lawsuits, if lives and property were to be lost because a situation that should have been remedied was simply ignored."

So what's been done by county and village officials since these warnings to alleviate the risk of a catastrophic fire in our community? Sadly to say, not much!

Forest professionals have documented that we are in the midst of losing our forest to disease, insects and parasite infestations caused by overcrowding of trees and lack of forest management. A fire driven by strong winds would certainly hasten this process. Unless an intelligent, tough, common-sense approach to properly care for our great resource is initiated immediately, Ruidoso may not have the forest we depend upon to attract visitors to our commu-

nity. We may lose our homes and our forest we all enjoy so much!

Local leaders have been told by forest experts on many occasions that they need to address concerns, including hazard trees and escape routes for canyon residents. Those entrusted with the authority to govern must set aside their egos, misconceptions and pressures from certain segments of the business community and initiate the important actions necessary to protect the health, safety and welfare of the citizens and communities they represent. To continue to do nothing invites a fire to visit our communities, leaving only the hope and prayer that something will be left.

The *Ruidoso News* has agreed to publish a series of articles that will provide for homeowners and elected officials steps that must be initiated if we are to avoid a catastrophe. These actions should have been initiated years ago. At some point luck will run out.

A quiet man with a mission meets a violent death

Richard Wetherill was a quiet man. He said what he needed to say without embellishment. Those who heard him at first were surprised by the high pitch of his speech. He had been raised in a Quaker family, and sometimes he used the "thee" and "thou" that grammarians call "familiar" but to modern ears are anything but.

In photographs, he is seldom seen smiling, but it's hard to tell because his mouth was all but concealed by a large, bushy mustache. In a portrait taken in 1904 at the St. Louis Fair, when he was about 46, his chin is so close to the mustache it looks as if he had no teeth. If that was the case, it was certainly not uncommon in those days.

He was an avid reader among people who were mostly illiterate. He read the novels of Mark Twain and Dickens and Conan Doyle as well as the archeological publications of the time. He even subscribed to *Scientific American*.

He was an excellent horseman and a crack shot with a rifle, and he had no use for maps.

"Maps were for people who didn't know how to get around," his wife Marietta said

years after his death. "If Mr. Wetherill went one hundred miles out of his way it didn't matter to him. He would just see something new of interest."

Marietta Wetherill was also a Quaker, and she always referred to and addressed her husband as "Mr. Wetherill." This was considered proper among Quakers, and indicated no lack of affection. He was apparently a good husband and father to their five children.

Richard Wetherill's success in exploring the ruins of Mesa Verde in his youth was dependent in part on his ability to get along with the Ute Indians who lived in the area. When he shifted his focus to Chaco Canyon, he enjoyed a similar relationship with the Navajos. He employed them to work in his excavations and later helped them develop their trade with the rest of the world.

But not all his acquaintances were friends. To those who knew him well, he was considered a careful scientist and a fair trader. To some, though, he was a pillager and a thief.

In 1903, a man named William T. Shelton was appointed to serve as superintendent of the Navajo agency in Shiprock. His jurisdiction didn't include Chaco Canyon at first, but he soon became aware of Wetherill and seems to have disliked him from the first.

Whether Shelton was jealous of Wetherill's intimate relationship with the Navajos or

truly thought him to be mistreating them, he began to work against him. He sent reports to his superiors alleging all kinds of misdeeds on Wetherill's part, most of which had no basis in fact.

"(He) has robbed them of thousands of dollars worth of property," Shelton reported. "He has not hesitated to assault and abuse them when they displeased him. He has had, for some time, some thirty families of Indians herding sheep for him on the shares, and the Indians claim that when the time comes to divide the wool and the increases in the sheep, that Mr. Wetherill gets all, always claiming that they are indebted to him."

In 1908, with Shelton's approval, a man named Samuel Stacher was appointed superintendent of a new Navajo jurisdiction. He established his headquarters at Chaco Canyon, in a house he rented from Wetherill. The two men seem to have gotten along with each other at first, but that didn't last. Stacher and his family moved early in 1910 to a place he named Crownpoint, where he wished to establish a school for Navajo children. By that time Stacher was openly hostile to Wetherill.

Most of the Navajos who traded with Wetherill, and with all the trading post owners, made purchases on credit. One of them, a man about 40 years old named Chis-chilling-begay, had marked up a rather large account with Wetherill, and took offense when he was

asked to make partial payment.

Stacher and his employees have been accused of planting the idea in the minds of the Chaco Navajos that if Wetherill were forced to leave, all their debts to him would be gone as well. Whether they did or not, Chis-chilling-begay developed a resentment against the trading post owner.

In June, 1910, one of Wetherill's hired hands, Bill Finn, had pursued a Navajo man who had stolen Wetherill's daughter's horse and ridden it almost to death. Finn beat the man when he caught him and returned to the ranch with the horse, which died on the way.

Later that day, Wetherill and Finn were herding cattle when they met a group of Navajos. Chis-chilling-begay was one of them, and he was holding an old rifle. When he waved the rifle threateningly at Wetherill, Wetherill grabbed it and beat it to pieces against a post. He and Finn went riding off, Richard still holding what was left of the barrel. It was the only weapon either man carried.

A few hours later, at a turn in the canyon, a shot rang out. The bullet, aimed at Finn, missed. The next one hit Wetherill. He fell dead from his horse.

Upgraded county jail wins reprieve

Lincoln County's jail passed six more hurdles in the county commission's effort to keep the 30-year-old structure open while a new detention center is built in Carrizozo.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley, who was commission chairman when the State Fire Marshall threatened to close the jail if changes and improvements weren't completed, said he's elated to see the good review.

Nunley, who left town over

the weekend because his daughter underwent surgery, had received a letter dated Jan. 27 from Fire Protection Specialist Paul M. Linville.

The jail had been inspected earlier that month and Linville stated it was in full compliance with a life safety written agreement signed by the state and county on Sept. 11, 1998. The jail also is in compliance with fire hazard requirements, fuel control, occupant protection, detection and suppression activities and planning and training.

Linville, however, recom-

mended that the county should:

- Install two additional emergency lights in the "bull pen" (or common gathering area).

- Remove the wire from the portable fire extinguishers as a security issue.

- Maintain monthly inspection reports of the fire extinguishers in the administration area.

- Enter all fire drills into a daily log.

- Conduct an evacuation drill including all emergency response agencies sometime

within the next few months.

"The Detention Center staff has done an outstanding job in the areas of fire prevention practices and life safety requirements," Linville wrote Nunley.

To keep the jail open, the commission had to reduce its population, because space requirements for inmates have changed over the last three decades. The jail is managed for the county by Correctional Systems Inc. The county is scheduled to seek requests for proposals to build and possibly manage a new jail by March.

Arabela gets a fire house

Arabela is on its way to becoming a full-fledged fire district.

The Lincoln County Commission Monday approved an agreement negotiated by new Commissioner Rick Simpson with Fernando Montoya, who owns the land where the county previously built a fire station.

Members of the Montoya family signed a quit claim deed with a reverter clause that if the land ceases to be used for a fire station, it will come back to the family.

If that termination occurs within 18 months because the district can't secure state funding, the land will go to the Montoyas, but the building will have to be removed by the county. However, if the county abandons the fire station sometime after a year has passed, both the structure and the land will go to the Montoyas, Simpson said.

The county through the Hondo Fire District erred two years ago by building the structure to be used as a substation for Hondo on the Montoya land without first obtaining a deed or lease.

A disagreement over the way the substation should be equipped prompted Montoya to refuse to execute either a lease or deed. In September, a group of firefighters from Arabela, about 18 miles north of Hondo and U.S. 70, formally left the Hondo District to try to set up their own community operation with Montoya as chief. Having a fire station is a major step in that direction. The state and county also must approve district lines for the new group.

Commissioner Wilton Howell commended Simpson on being able to cut through past disputes and personality conflicts to work out an agreement on the land. County Attorney Alan Morel said he drafted the agreement and it would be filed with the deed for future reference.

Hospital asks state reimbursement for indigent patients

The interim administrator of Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso hopes to see more money come back to the facility this year to cover indigent care.

Julie Sterchi told county commissioners Monday that the state has \$6 million more available this year for counties seeking reimbursement for medical care given to people who cannot pay their bills.

Since 1994, the amount paid by the hospital to cover indigent and charity cases has increased steadily, she said. However, the payment back to the hospital from the state has not gone up proportion-

ately, she said.

This year, the state lifted the cap on what a sole provider such as Lincoln County Medical Center — the only hospital in the county — can request.

The hospital is asking for \$829,306 in reimbursement, a sharp increase from the \$356,202 it received last year. The center gives away more than \$1 million in unpaid medical care each year, according to former administrator Valerie Miller, who retired last year.

"You don't get it if you don't ask," Sterchi said. "Other hospitals in the state tra-

ditionally requested as much or three times that. The worse they can say is 'no.' In any case, we may get \$20,000 more (than the \$300,000 figure)."

The hospital uses some of the proceeds from a special property tax levy designated for its operation, to pay the county's required contribution to the state's indigent fund.

However, commissioners are considering establishing a separate indigent fund, because hospital officials say they can't continue that financial burden.




"We have two things we have to work on," Perry said. "We have got to be more mentally prepared. We have to be able to go three periods; we can't just pin someone in the first.

Coach becomes history teacher for a day

Before his girls basketball team could gloat about its 20-point win over Tularosa Jan. 26, Capitan coach Bryan Massé delivered a brief history lesson to his team.

The Tigers took note and passed their exam - a game with rival Cloudcroft - with straight A's.

Capitan took its time to pull away from the Bears, but pull away it did, posting a 59-38 win Friday. The victory improved the Tigers to 9-8 overall and 2-0 in District 6AA.

Two arrested on drug counts

Police arrested two men on Main Road in Upper Canyon Tuesday on drug-related charges.

Frank Hooper of the Lincoln County Narcotics Unit said Randall Stiles, about 37, of Chaparral was charged with distribution of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia.

James C. Sublette Jr., about 49, of Ruidoso, was charged with possession of cocaine, possession of drug paraphernalia, manufacturing drug paraphernalia, and possession of marijuana.

Police seized a little more than 16 pounds of marijuana, Hooper said, with a street value of about \$16,000. They also seized a vehicle and \$300 in cash.

District Court Judge William Butts posted bond at \$20,000 for each suspect.

Stiles had rented a cabin in Ruidoso for the last couple of months, Hooper said.

"He would just pop in. He didn't live there. His main residence is Chaparral," he said.

Four members of the Lincoln County Narcotics Unit and deputies from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, the New Mexico State Police, and the Criminal Investigation Division of the Ruidoso Police Department participated.

Hooper said the bust started at about 8 a.m. Tuesday by getting a warrant and doing surveillance on the cabin to make sure there would be somebody home. Once they had the search warrant, it took three to four hours to search the house and tag everything. The arrests were made at 12:30 p.m.

The majority of the votes, 214, elected Emmett Reese, Ruidoso businessman, to the six year term vacated when W.D. Crosby's term expired and he chose not to run again.

Mrs. Ida H. Bloodworth, other candidate on the ballot polled 98 votes with one write-in for Dr. D.E. Snyder and three votes incorrectly marked became invalid.

Feb. 6, 1959

Driest January In 14 Years Recorded Here

January of 1959 was the driest in 14 years of weather records here, according to Charles Culver, co-operative weather observer for the U.S. Department of Commerce Weather Bureau. Moisture measured only .04 of an inch.

Feb. 7, 1969

Ruidoso Downs Seeks 200 Low Rent Housing Units

When the Village of Ruidoso Downs adopted a "workable program" for community improvement recently, it was a step forward to its goal of 200 federally financed low-rent housing units.

Chilean exchange student makes the adjustment to 'small-town' America

This 16-year-old goes to discotheques and parties and stays out until four in the morning on weekends.

"And that's early, because at my age people stay out a lot longer," said Anamaria Gutierrez, an exchange student from Santiago, Chile.

Older people go out every night of the week, she said, and the discos have four different kinds of music to appeal to every age and taste.

Anamaria has been in Ruidoso for only two weeks. And adjusting to small-town culture is more radical for her than adjusting to North American culture. Santiago, the capital of Chile, has more people than the entire state of New Mexico.

"In Chile, I'm always doing something different," she said. "Here there are not so many parts you can go. There is only one theater."

"Which is more than there was when I moved here six years ago," interjected Betty Wilcox, her American mother.

Betty and Ben Wilcox are experienced "foreign parents." They have hosted four other exchange students before Anamaria, one each from Germany, Australia, Uruguay and Ecuador, through Youth for Understanding (YFU).

"They all come scared and anxious and it usually takes about a couple of months to fit in," Betty said, "but the worst thing is when they go home, because it's like losing one of your kids."

Anamaria said she decided to be an exchange student "to have a new experience, to learn English and to live in another culture, and to be more independent of my family."

She has four sisters and one brother back home and she's already called her family four times, but Wilcox's son, Waylon, is going to teach her to send them e-mail.

The Wilcoxes raised three children of their own, and treat their exchange children in the same way. Anamaria appreciates their warmth and respect.

"I think they give me my space," she said. "I feel very comfortable."

Betty and Ben own the True Value Hardware store, so meals are often thrown-together affairs, Betty

said, but this doesn't seem to bother Anamaria.

What's harder to get used to, she said, is the meal times.

"We eat lunch between 2:30 and 3 o'clock," she said, "and we eat supper at 8 or 9."

Fast-foods and frozen dinners have made their way to South America, so she doesn't find them strange, although she said many people do their own cooking from scratch in Chile.

"One thing she doesn't like," said Ben, "is potato salad. I made some especially for her and she wouldn't eat it."

The natural beauty of the forests and mountains in the Ruidoso area impresses her the most here, and, as an apartment dweller, she's amazed to see deer and other animals.

She skis Tuesday afternoons with other students, but that's not too unusual. She skis in Chile.

Anamaria is in her last year at school in Chile. School is organized in three-month terms, so she'll only miss the March through July term, and in November will leave school to study for college entrance exams.

She hopes to qualify for one of the two traditional universities in Santiago where she will study architecture, she said.

At Ruidoso High School, she is taking "fun" classes: drama, culinary skills, marketing, art, U.S. history, humanities and drafting.

She said the first classes she attended she understood less than half

of what the teachers said, but in most classes the teachers talk to students individually, rather than lecture-style, which she finds easier to understand.

"In English, there are many words I don't understand," Anamaria said, "and people speak too fast."

But she has almost as much difficulty with the Spanish spoken here as she does with English because of the abundant, but different, slang words. "There are many words that aren't in a dictionary," she said, "so I have to speak very correctly, and no slang words."

One difference she noticed between school in Ruidoso and school in Santiago is that teachers have more books in their classrooms, while in Chile most reference books are in the library. Another difference is the frequency and timing of classes.

"You have all the same classes, all the days," she said. "In Chile we have different classes on different days, and it changes what time of day we have a class. For example, an

English class could meet first period Monday and sixth period Tuesday and not (at all) on Wednesday."

Anamaria likes dressing casually for school here. At school in Chile she has to wear a uniform—skirt, blue blouse and tie.

Greeting styles tend to throw her, though. "In Chile when you say hi you kiss the person and here you say hi but you don't get close to anybody."

Anamaria didn't notice many differences in television shows—since many of them are the same as those made and shown here, but with Spanish subtitles—and she and the Wilcoxes often spend evenings watching television together.

They haven't had time yet to do much sightseeing, but Ben is determined to take her camping (something she hasn't done). In addition, YFU offers trips to Carlsbad at the end of February and to the Grand Canyon during Memorial Day weekend.

Forestry workshop lights students' fire

High school students swapped reading, writing and arithmetic for "bugs, crud and other stuff" at a State Forestry workshop hosted by Ruidoso High School on Jan. 26.

More than 200 students from all over the state spent the day and attended workshops sponsored by the New Mexico Department of Forestry in Capitan and by the U.S. Forest Service. The forest practicum was designed to give students an opportunity to learn forestry skills, said Mike Gaines, RHS agriculture and metals teacher.

The skills will enable them to compete in district, regional and statewide FFA competitions in forestry.

The turnout exceeded Gaines' expectations. Similar events in recent years resulted in lower-than-expected participation.

"We were expecting about 60 and 200 signed up," Gaines said.

The six ongoing workshops started at 8 a.m. and concluded at 3 p.m. so students could attend each one. Other workshops included "Bored Feet (Tree Measurement)," "Lost in the Woods (Compass and Pacing)," and "To Cut or Not To Cut (Silviculture)."

Students came from as far away as Raton and Kirtland, said Lynn Hutchison of New Mexico State Forestry, who coordinated the event.

But it wasn't just the students who came to learn about the forest ecosystem. Teachers who attended the event were in the learning mode, too, Gaines said. "Lots of us didn't have forestry preparation in college when we were getting ready to teach agriculture."

Agriculture teacher Alice Velasquez brought 13 students from Santa Rosa, where the state's northeast plains begin to dominate the landscape. She wanted them to learn about the forestry industry and careers in forestry wildlife.

"We want them to develop a few marketable skills so even if they don't go to a four-year college, they'll learn skills here," Velasquez said.

"It's basically a starting point. We teach it in class and compete in local, state and district levels, but the main thing is as a career focus."

Velasquez said the advantage of workshops like this is that teachers and students can talk to other chapters and exchange ideas.

Justin O'Bryant, a student from Truth or Consequences, said his favorite workshop was "Name that Tree," or tree identification. He plans to work for the Forest Service this summer in the Gila area.

Steven Bair of Kirtland didn't know what forestry was about, so he came to find out. Because he's interested in machinery, he found "Parts is Parts, Chainsaw Anatomy" the most interesting.

The State Department of Education organized the state forestry clinics to encourage high school students to consider forestry and agriculture as career choices. Vocational and agricultural students can go on to compete in statewide contest hosted by New Mexico State

University in Las Cruces. This year's contest will be March 24.

"There may be several schools that'll host other contests between now and then so the teams can practice," Gaines said.

At the final competition the students will solve problems based on what they learned in Ruidoso and at other forestry clinics.

Teacher Pam Valdes brought seven students from Santa Fe. She hoped the experience would give her students an edge up on the competition at state.

"We've competed in all the forestry competitions with a little bit of knowledge," she said. "Now we'll do it with more."

Sun, moon and stars




Ancient people looked to the sky to tell time. The sun told the days. The moon told the months. The ancient Babylonians divided the day into 24 parts, or hours.

Sundials




People noticed that trees and rocks cast shadows that moved from side to side as the sun moved from east to west. The ancient Egyptians probably were the first to make sundials.

Fire




The ancient Chinese measured time by burning a damp rope that was knotted at regular intervals. Later, people noted how long it took a candle or the oil in a lamp to burn.

Sand flows at an even rate from one glass bulb to another. For many years, sailors carried these time pieces to sea. They are even used in kitchens today. We still use them as egg timers.


Mechanical clocks, 1300s



The first mechanical clocks ran by using weights to drive the wheels that made the clock run.



Sea clocks, 1700s



Electric clocks, early 1800s



Batteries were used to power the first electric clocks. Today, we often plug the clock into the electric current that flows into our home.

Quartz clocks, 1929



Quartz is a mineral that vibrates 32,768 times a second when an electric current is passed through it. Today, most clocks have a quartz crystal. Many are digital, or use numbers instead of a clock face.

Atomic clocks, 1949


Atomic clocks are the most accurate. These clocks will not lose or gain a second in 370,000 years! Atomic clocks are based on the vibrations of the cesium atom. Cesium atoms vibrate at the rate of 9,192,631,770 times each second.



The official time in the United States is kept by the U.S. Naval Observatory in Washington, D.C. On the grounds, the Observatory has about 30 cesium atomic clocks and 10 other clocks that steer a single master clock. Atomic clocks aboard 24 satellites orbiting the Earth help to keep our official clocks and those of other nations accurate, too.





exhibit behaviors common in both separation anxiety and canine cognitive dysfunction."

That behavior may include excessive barking, howling and destruction of the home.

"But this alone doesn't mean the dog has a disorder or will be helped by this drug," Sinclair said. The HSUS encourages dog owners to find a professional with background in behavior therapy for their dog's undesirable behaviors, but to expect to play an integral role in resolving those behaviors.

A complete physical examination and thorough history of the dog help in diagnosing the cause and the formulating a treatment plan.

"Millions of dogs are relinquished by their owners annually in the U.S., too often due to behavioral problems," said Martha Armstrong, HSUS vice president for companion animals and equine protection. "The best remedy of all is an owner who is committed to providing the time, exercise, training, love and attention that every dog needs."

"Drug therapy alone, without the other components of a treatment plan, is rarely effective and never appropriate," Sinclair said.

Two new drugs on the market for dogs who appear to be suffering from separation anxiety or canine cognitive dysfunction aren't cure-alls, warns the Humane Society of the United States.

Although approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, they won't provide a "quick fix" for behavioral problems in dogs, said Dr. Leslie Sinclair, director of veterinary issues for companion animals at the HSUS.

The drugs, called Clomicalm and Anipryl, will provide relief for some dogs, but not every dog who exhibits the symptoms of those two disorders actually is suffering from them, Sinclair said.

The problems may be rooted in lack of care,

"True medical disorders also may be the underlying cause of 'misbehavior' in dogs," Sinclair said. "An elderly dog who has lost her housetraining behavior for example, actually may be suffering from a bladder infection or a hormonal condition causing her to lose control of her bladder. A dog who is not getting enough exercise, training and care will



"In the past, (the shows) often were sealed up so pacing really looked very weird. So now we break everything outside of our prime-time movie."



Night Ride Home addresses worst fear of parents

She once horrified audiences as the wicked nanny in *The Hand That Rocks the Cradle*. But now, actress Rebecca De Mornay is taking on a more sympathetic maternal role.

As Nora Mahler, De Mornay portrays a mother who loses a child in an accident in *Night Ride Home*, a film based on the novel by Barbara Esstman.

Airing Sunday, Feb. 7, on CBS, the story of love, loss and survival was filmed on location near Portland, Ore., and teams De Mornay with Academy Award winners Keith Carradine and Ellen Burstyn.

Both De Mornay and Carradine, who plays Nora's husband, Neal, say that in order to relate to their characters, they borrowed from their own family experiences, but the emotional journey they travel is especially intense because of the difficult subject matter of losing a son.

"I was just blown away with how incredibly heavy this movie is," says De Mornay, who committed to the role several months after giving birth to her first child.

In this 200th Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation, audiences get to see the motherly side of De Mornay, whose roles usually have edgier elements to them. Future films, for example, include two black comedies; in one, she portrays an ex-stripper.

"I wouldn't have been able to play Nora had I not given birth to my daughter," the 37-year-old actress says. "It's a whole different world once you have a child, but being a mother made the role incredibly torturous because losing a child is every mother's worst nightmare."

The film also explores the strained relationship between Nora and Neal, who have been married for nearly 20 years.

"Nora has been in a marriage in which she's had an equal part in letting it fall apart," De Mornay says. "Somehow she's fallen out of love with him."

The film also illustrates the healing of a family stricken with grief. Carra-

dine says his character goes through a harsh transformation but becomes stronger.

"He allows himself to be dominated through his marriage," he says. "He comes to the point where he has to reclaim himself, and that's certainly different than any character I've played before."

As a parent of three children and someone who has had difficult moments in relationships, Carradine, 49, says his role paralleled his life to some degree.

"I'm a parent, and I had a marriage that didn't work," says the actor, who's currently going through a divorce after 12 years of marriage. "All of those issues in the movie were very close to me. I wasn't trying to create an elaborate group of memories."

Although Carradine's character has passive traits, he gradually becomes stronger in order to help his family survive the loss.

"It's a family in deep crises," he says. "But one is left with a sense of hope, not resolution. Everyone has to go through hardships, but the strength of the human spirit must go on and heal."

In the end, the film's message is that hope can survive the very difficult experience of losing a family member.

"Everyone of us has to experience the loss of a loved one," De Mornay concludes. "Hopefully not of a child, but there's a way through it even though your life is never the same."

But PBS offers a timely confection. *Cincinnati Pops Holiday: Love Is in the Air*. The hourlong salute to amour airs Wednesday, Feb. 10 (check local listings). This is the latest in a series of holiday concerts by Erich Kunzel, conductor of the Cincinnati Pops Orchestra.

Having done a big-band New Year's, a "spooktacular" for Halloween and a Christmas show, Kunzel is already gearing up for the next concert, though he's mum on which holiday it will be. However, he has much to say from a hotel room in Toronto on the importance of such shows.

"With the NEA (National Endowment for the Arts) almost a nonexistent entity, TV is not artistic-minded," Kunzel says. "If it isn't sitcoms, it's a sports event. The arts have suffered greatly. All those wonderful programs are gone.

PBS is the last bastion of presentism in all its forms in television."

Kunzel squeezes many of those programs into this show. Besides his own, there's soprano Harolyn Blackwell, pop singer Peabo Bryson, aerialist Alexander Streltsov, ballet dancer Alexander Reznik and Alexei Kremnev, and ensemble VocalEase.

Quite the showman, the 63-year-old conductor commands the stage. The venerable Cincinnati Music Hall follows first clues to just what sort of show is in immediate: The stage is lit in lavender lights. Glittery headdresses and red chiffon abound, and the conductor (and Kunzel) are clad in red.

Kunzel picked the eclectic music selections, which range from Debussy to Gounod. There's Elton John's "You Feel the Love Tonight" from *Lion King* and Leonard Bernstein's "Tonight" from *West Side Story*.

Kunzel does love Valentine's Day, he says. But come next Sunday, he'll be in Austria. Maestro, please go to Austria. Maestro, please.


