



Extended commercial zoning north along SR 48 likely

Property zoning along State Road 48 on a one-mile stretch north of Ruidoso may change in coming months.

The Extraterritorial Zoning Commission will look at establishing commercial zoning for lots on each side of the highway leading from the Alto Lakes entrance south past Ski Run Road entrance to Snowflake Ridge and the Ruidoso village limits just north of the Swiss Chalet.

Although the rezoning may be accomplished in one massive effort, the board will look at each lot to determine the depth of the rezoning and if it is appropriate.

The move is an acknowledgement by ETZ

commission members that improvement of the road will bring more commercial development. The ETZ Commission is responsible for reviewing development in a one-mile-deep area around the village, because it impacts adjoining land and may someday be annexed.

One of the issues will be how far off the highway to apply the commercial zoning, because lots range from 75 feet deep to 400 feet, said Charles Rennick, ETZ attorney.

The final decision will affect people like Karen Tillman, who Monday asked the Commission to rezone three of her residential lots because they abut a corner lot that already was changed. She contends the highest and best use of the land would be commercial.

However, an 83-foot lot lies between the

Tillman property and SR 48, also known as Mechem Drive. The Tillman lots front on South Road, which is partly developed, comes up behind the Alto Store and intersects SR 48, said Lincoln County planner Patsy Sanchez.

Rennick told members they could approve the petition or postpone it until after they review the potential for a massive rezoning of frontage lots along the highway. If the entire area is changed, then the action would not be spot zoning, he said. The concept of spot zoning is rejected by state and Ruidoso law, because it creates conflicts in land use.

"The comprehensive plan also requires commercial access from commercial streets and South Road is not that type of street," Rennick said.

Because Tillman has no immediate plans for

the lots, a delay shouldn't impact her, he said.

While she may contend that commercial zoning is proper, because the lot next to her land was rezoned, "at some point, you have to cut it off and your job is to make that as painless a transition as possible," Rennick told board members.


Tillman agreed to postpone her petition until after the review.

Although Ruidoso has zoning and the county does not, the ETZ zone is a special area within which state law specifically provides for a separate jurisdiction, Rennick explained Tuesday. The area and its zoning were set up by agreement between the county and the village in 1984.

"Its zoning is nothing like Ruidoso's," Rennick

Company makes pitch for LCMC

A representative of Community Health Systems briefed the Lincoln County Commission Thursday about how the company would run the Lincoln County Medical Center, if the county sold the hospital.

After the presentation, commissioners were noncommittal, pointing out they already have a 10-year management contract with Presbyterian HealthCare Systems, but also noting either side can exit that agreement upon 180 days' notice.

Community owns the hospitals in Roswell and Deming, said Brian Dunn. The for-profit company specializes in acquiring full service hospitals in non-urban areas, he said. He pointed out that former U. S. senators Sam Nunn and Robert Dole both serve on the company's board of directors.

He told commissioners services would not be reduced, that physician recruitment would be aggressive and that the company would not need the special tax levy now paid each year by county property owners. The tax generates slightly less than \$1 million

with the majority going to the hospital and a smaller portion to a county health clinic in Carrizozo.

But Gary Mitchell, chairman of the community board that oversees the operation of the county hospital, was skeptical Monday.

"I know what for-profit hospitals do throughout the nation," Mitchell said. "The general scheme is that they go into an area and buy the largest hospital, then branch out so hospitals in smaller communities can be feeder routes to the main hospital. In this case, it would be Roswell.

"Typically, they then cut back services in those smaller hospitals. They become clinics or critical care stabilization centers before a patient is shipped off to Roswell. They make promises to the public that it won't change the quality of health care, but it does. After all, they're in it for the money."

Presbyterian is a not-for-profit company that came into the county at a time when the hospital was broke and close to folding, said Mitchell, who has served on the board 21 years. Within the last few years, LCMC has

Former CEO of Texas hospital gets nod from hospital board

James Gibson, former chief executive officer of Madison St. Joseph Health Center in Madisonville, Texas, is the new administrator of the Lincoln County Medical Center.

His selection by the county-owned hospital's board of trustees was announced Monday.

Gibson already is in town selecting a place to live, but doesn't officially report for duty until March 1. He could not be reached for comment.

During his 25 years of experience in health care administration, Gibson served in different administrative capacities at Madison County Hospital, with the U. S. Army Medical Service Corps at Fort Sill, Okla., with Hospital Management Professionals in Edinburg, Texas, and with the McAllen Medical Center in

McAllen, Texas, according to information from the board.

He earned a master's in business administration from the University of Texas in Edinburg.

"We are pleased to have the opportunity to work with someone of Mr. Gibson's caliber," said board president Gary Mitchell. "We are excited about the contribution he will make to LCMC."

Julie Sterchi, who was acting administrator during the board's nationwide search for person to head the hospital, will stay on as assistant administrator. She and Gibson were the two candidates for the job in the final round of consideration. The vacancy in administration occurred when

Disaster warning system tests planned at seven locations

Emergency sirens to sound off

Ruidoso residents will hear something this week they haven't heard in six years, village officials said Monday.

Emergency sirens in seven areas of Ruidoso will occasionally sound for 10- to 15-second intervals starting this week and continuing over the next several weeks. Emergency and fire personnel are expanding the long-dormant system and bringing it back on line.

"We will begin testing the sirens this week," Thomas Chavez, emergency coordinator for the village, said Monday. "We need to be sure they are in working condition."

Ruidoso has five emergency sirens that have not been used for years. A year ago, the village council approved spending \$21,500 to revive and expand Ruidoso's emergency warning system. Village officials have purchased two new sirens and a cluster of three used sirens from Albuquerque,

equipping Ruidoso for a total of eight siren locations.

"And down the road, we don't know when, we are going to put one on top of Alto Hill," Ruidoso Fire Chief Virgil Reynolds said.

All the sirens will be connected to a system that allows them to be triggered by either dispatchers with the Ruidoso Police Department or fire officials, Reynolds said.

"And the nice thing is we can set one of them off at a time if we need to," Chavez said.

The sirens will be used to warn residents of fires, floods and other disasters such as tornadoes, which could possibly sweep into the area. Fires, however, are a more probable threat, especially in light of forecasts for a dry spring following the current dry winter, he said.

When the sirens signal an emergency, they will not quit after a few seconds as with the tests, but will be continuous, fire officials said. When that happens, residents should turn to KBUY, at 93.5 FM for instructions. Residents with Cablevision service

also may turn to Channel 11 for information on the emergency.

After the system is installed, fire officials intend to test the sirens once every two weeks, Reynolds said. The tests, in which the sirens will sound for about 10 seconds, will be on Monday afternoons.

"We are also going to go into schools and teach what the different sounds mean and who to contact," said Loretta Kirk, a fire prevention officer and an assistant emergency manager.

Fire officials recently acquired an encoder/decoder which allows them to break into the KBUY radio broadcast with a 2-minute emergency message, Kirk said. The message would be preceded by the tone signaling the National Emergency Broadcast System, she said.

Kirk said when the sirens sound this week, it will be the first time for them to be tested in six years.

"We have been really fortunate, I think," Kirk said, referring to the fact that Ruidoso hasn't needed the sirens during the hiatus.





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Track fire causes remain undetermined

• A race track official says he isn't convinced that the Jan. 8 horse barn fire or a subsequent grass fire on Feb. 14 were acts of intentional arson.

Rick Baugh doesn't think two recent fires at Ruidoso Downs Race Track add up to a single arsonist with bad intentions.

"The one fire that happened a few weeks ago — yes, that looked suspicious somewhat," Baugh, general manager at the track, said Tuesday.

"If it was anything, and I use the big 'if,' then I would think it was kids. But I am under no impression that we have someone out there trying for some reason to 'get back at' or cause trouble for the track."

On Jan. 8, fire destroyed about a third of an unoccupied horse barn at the track. A track official put the cost of damage at about \$100,000. Ruidoso Downs Fire Chief Nick Herrera called the fire an arson based on evidence that a gasoline-type

product had been splashed on the barn.

"It's definitely arson. This was not an accidental fire," Herrera said at the time.

About a month later, on Feb. 14, Ruidoso Downs firefighters responded to a grass fire at the track, Herrera said. Fire had been set to a slash pile near a grassy part of track grounds, he said. Firefighters spent two to three hours controlling the fire.

Herrera believes both fires were set intentionally and may be connected. "But that's all we know," he said.

Rather than referring the arson to the New Mexico State Fire Marshal's Office, Herrera has conducted the investigation himself. So far, he has no leads on the fires, but believes increased security at the track may change that.

"We are hoping that will help us and we can come up with some leads," Herrera said.

Baugh said the track's insurance company also sent a fire investigator to the burnt barn, but he has not yet received a report on that investigation. He added that increased security at the track was not in response to the fires, but because of

the casino currently being built there.

"All the security measures that we are taking now were going to happen anyway," Baugh said. "We had full intention of doing this because we have so many parts and pieces of the casino out there right now."

Baugh added that a track official's earlier statement that 100 horses died in a barn fire at the track in the 1970s was based on bad information. He researched the statement and questioned people who have been associated with the track for many years, he said.

"And nobody could confirm that that had happened. The most people could confirm was that there was a barn fire here in 1958, and no animals were hurt," Baugh said.

Once the insurance company's investigation is completed, the track intends to tear down the 30 damaged stalls, rebuild them and continue with renovation of the barn, he said.

The track will not be inconvenienced if the barn, located near U.S. Highway 70, is not available when the racing season starts this spring, Baugh concluded.

Former police dispatcher going to court

Jury trial scheduled in Downs discrimination/harassment suit

A federal judge has set Sept. 7 for the jury trial in a sexual harassment/discrimination lawsuit brought by a former police dispatcher against Ruidoso Downs, attorneys in the case said this week.

Randy Clark, Roswell, the attorney representing Karen Denise Briggs, said her lawsuit contends supervisors in the Downs police department conspired to keep Briggs from being promoted to an officer. One supervisor also is accused of sexually harassing Briggs by making offensive statements and watching sexually explicit videos in Briggs' work area.

The lawsuit was filed in U.S. District Court, Albuquerque, in July, 1998. Marcia Lubar, representing the village in the lawsuit, said Monday a settlement conference has been set for May.

The conference, standard in federal civil lawsuits, had been postponed from an earlier date, Lubar said, because potential witnesses had been

unable to attend previously scheduled depositions because of a snow storm and Lubar had an illness in her family, she said.

Last week, attorneys took depositions of Briggs, village officials and police department officials, Clark said. The deadline for gathering evidence, called the discovery phase, is March 29.

Dan Bryant, attorney for Ruidoso Downs, said Lubar appeared "very up-beat" following the depositions.

Village officials previously have said there is no basis for Briggs' allegations.

The lawsuit names the village as a defendant as well as Police Chief David Hightower and Sgt. Dana Terlecky, the supervisor directly under Hightower.

Briggs, who was with the department from 1993 to 1996, took the test for patrol officer four times. Her lawsuit claims Hightower and Terlecky did not follow established policies and procedures during the tests and treated Briggs differently from the male candidates.

been recognized nationally for its operation and recently hired a new administrator, James Gibson.

"Eliminating the tax might be appealing. To make up for that tax, we'd pay the extra cost," Mitchell said. "The poor and elderly have Medicare and Medicaid. It would be the middle class that would bear the burden."

"My great fear is that the commission to solve the county's economic problems might sell its finest asset, the hospital, although we render care better and cheaper than for-profit (hospitals) and we take care of our employees."

CORRECTIONS

While Lincoln County Commissioner Wilton Howell was the only commissioner Thursday to refuse to sign a salary settlement agreement between the board and other elected county officials, all five commissioners will not receive any money. Four current commissioners and former commissioner Monory Montes did not sign the second signature page of the agreement, which means they will not receive the lump sum settlement for rescinded raises dating back to 1995, that will be collected by the county sheriff, treasurer, clerk, assessor and probate judge. Commissioner Rick Simpson took office in January and was not part of the financial settlement. An article published Feb. 19, said otherwise.

"The heart of any community is its schools, its hospital and its churches," he said. "If we want to continue having our babies here, care for our elderly and our children, we must keep this hospital. Let this be fair warning, that as long as I'm alive in this county, I will fight to save this hospital."

But Bond said no one has to fight.

"If you don't want us, we don't want to be here," he told commissioners Thursday.

Community began operations in 1985 and now owns 42 acute care hospitals from California to Pennsylvania and as far south as Florida, Dunn said. Eighty-five percent of the hospitals are sole providers, the only hospital in a town or county, he said.

The company, with headquarters in Nashville, Tenn., owns \$1.9 billion in assets and is projected to earn \$1 billion in net revenues this year, he said. Its parent company is Forstman Little, an arrangement struck to avoid a take-over by some of the giant hospital conglomerates, he said.

By selling to Community, the hospital would begin paying property and sales taxes, he pointed out.

"We have a commitment to keep health care local," he said.

said.

To guide ETZ members Monday in making decisions about the lots, on a motion by Glen Barrow, they adopted four policies laid out in Ruidoso's master plan. They are to:

- Develop and implement site design standards that emphasize efficient entry and exit, provide sufficient parking, incorporate landscape treatment, provide a buffer and improve aesthetics, as well as adhere to an architectural theme.

- Encourage retail sales and services to develop in concentrated centers as opposed to "strip" developments that result in multiple access points and traffic congestion.

- Develop programs and laws that can be used to maintain and improve linear-oriented commercial areas reducing blighting influences and putting emphasis on landscaping and sign control.

- Allow commercial development only on arterial streets where increased traffic can be accommodated. Commercial development shall not be allowed on residential streets.

"The problem facing us here is that we have no guidance," Barrow said before the 5-1 vote. Member Wayne Townsend voted against the motion. Member Van Patten was absent. Voting for the motion were Barrow, Chairman Leroy Nowell, Al Junge, John Ashcraft and Phyllis Barnett.

"I think we're not here to follow (Ruidoso's) comprehensive plan," Townsend said. "If we had that, we could just turn (jurisdiction) over to Cleatus Richards (head of Ruidoso's Planning and Zoning Department)."

But Rennick pointed out Mechem in the one-mile area should be in harmony with the village.

If the board decides on commercial zoning for a lot, the next decision is what type — regular commercial or planned unit development — Rennick said.

Nowell said he needs to see maps of the one-mile stretch. Sanchez was gathering those maps Tuesday.

In other action, the commission:

- Postponed action on a petition by Bruce Kernodle for approval of plans for Tract A of Sleepy Hollow Subdivision for cabins. Rennick said he would contact the surveyor who is working for Kernodle, to let him know what elements should be included in a site plan for the land, including the width of the access road.

(Kernodle said the proposal is a way to maintain the rustic atmosphere of the area across Main Road from Story Book Cabins, which he also owns. The 50-foot tract in the late 1970s was zoned to take 32 separate condominiums, multi-unit homes or 13 single homes or a hotel.)

- Recommended approval to the ETZ Authority of a variance for a rear setback from 30 feet to 20.5 feet on a 4.6 acre lot in Homestead Acres owned by Dave Griffin.

he said. "We believe they should act on their own. We provide the services."

The hospital emergency room would be staffed with physicians, he said, either through a contractual service or with local doctors moonlighting.

Barbara Casey, superintendent of the Hondo School District, a resident of Roswell and a former state legislature, cautioned commissioners to talk to counties where Community owns hospitals.

"I'm asking you not to make the same mistake Roswell did," she said, claiming that some fees went up immediately after Community took over and that the hospital now is understaffed. The money for the company's profits comes from its patients' pockets, she said.

Dunn disputed her statement and asked commissioners "to look at the facts."

He was unprepared to discuss a management fee as an alternative to purchasing the hospital, he said.

Commission Chairman Rex Wilson said he's encountered a great deal of loyalty toward Presbyterian in the community, as well as some dissenters.

"I suppose that's normal," he said.

The 38-bed hospital is managed by Presbyterian Healthcare Systems, the state's largest, not-for-profit healthcare delivery system. The hospital provides emer-

gency room care, diagnostic services and surgical care.

Presbyterian also manages the county's health center in Carrizozo, which offer dental and medical services, and medical services in Corona.

County hands Glencoe center management to the Hondo schools

The Hondo School District will use the Glencoe Rural Events Center for its educational programs and manage the center for events staged by other groups.

After an hour of debate on the issue, commissioners Thursday stood by a previous vote to draft an agreement with the school board.

Commissioner L. Ray Nuneley included in his motion that in exchange for managing the property on U.S. 70 about 13 miles east of Ruidoso, the school district will be paid \$19,500 per year.

Commissioners wanted the amount to be the same paid annually to the Capitan Fair Board to manage the county fairgrounds in that community northeast of Ruidoso, but were high by \$500. Capitan can ask for the difference, they said.

The motion also stated that an advisory board will be creat-

ed to work with Hondo and the county on use of the building. The agreement will be for five years, but contains a 30-day exit clause that mirrors the fair board contract.

Commissioners made it clear that Hondo controls the daily operation and the appointed board is advisory. The agreement also contains a clause that the center must continue to be used for rural economic development, because federal money for that purpose was involved in construction of an arena and other improvements.

The debate started last month when commissioners were about to sign with Hondo, and a new offer was laid in front of them. The new proposal for a group to stage calf roping events and establish a roping hall of fame was backed by Commissioner Rick Simpson, who was not on the board in November when the pact with Hondo was approved.

Simpson read a statement

Thursday saying with the right management, the center could be very successful. The right management in his opinion was a board similar to the fair board, where members invested their muscle and time into efforts to improve the grounds and to stage events.

"Before I got here, other commissioners were working on other directions," he said. With Hondo school meeting only four days a week, that would leave the center open for weekends, holidays and summer events, the peak tourist times. But he saw the center managed by an appointed board, with either Hondo representatives as members or with Hondo School Superintendent Barbara Casey working "under" the board.

Casey, whose district contains 165 students, was adamant that she needed a decision Thursday.

She contended that in a meeting with Simpson a few days earlier, she was given the

impression that commissioners all agreed to go with a board instead of the school district.

"Commissioner Simpson, whom I'm sure is an honorable man, said it was a done deal and not to go to the meeting," Casey said. "Is the agreement with the school or are you going to change your mind and rescind your vote? I've already put a lot of time into (getting together a workable plan) and I need the vacillating to stop. I need to know right now if you stand by your November decision or are changing your mind."

She pointed to her success at Hondo, bringing in \$1.4 million of additional money in 2 1/2 years.

"I'm sure I can do the same thing for (GREC) if its under the guidance of Hondo," she said.

Commission Chairman Rex Wilson said as he remembered, the November vote was to have the attorney draft an agreement for action the next month,

and that the discussion centered then on a lease arrangement. The county didn't pursue the lease and now is talking management. In the meantime the other offer surfaced.

"I think we need a board willing to put in sweat equity, because that's what makes it work," Wilson said.

Simpson said he talked to commissioners on the phone, but no pledges were made.

"I gave them my ideas to think about, as I did with Casey," Simpson said. "It was no strong arm. I'd like to pattern it after the fairgrounds. Instead of fighting, they try to figure out how to do something, instead of how not. They're all focused on the same goal."

As the discussion progressed, the majority of commissioners leaned toward staying with Hondo and possibly appointing a five-member board.

Commissioner Bill Schwetmann said although he was

interested in Simpson's proposal, he would stand by the agreement to deal with Hondo, but wanted to ensure the contract could be eliminated if either side was dissatisfied.

"I was more than delighted when we had anyone interested in taking over," he said, adding that he considered Simpson's proposed use of the center more palatable, and likely to generate more participation.

The commission will continue to have ultimate control over and responsibility for the center. A one-time \$25,000 capital outlay contribution also will be given by the county. The money comes from the state Legislature and may only be spent for previously approved improvements.

The center was purchased in 1994 with \$250,000 from the state Legislature. Primarily federal money went into improvements, such as an outdoor arena.

The spirit of county commission cooperation?

The spirit of cooperation that resounded throughout the Courthouse in January flew out the window at last Thursday's commission meeting over something as simple as the consent agenda.

The consent agenda is a list of "routine" items that a governing body can pass with one motion without having to discuss each individual item.

The word "consent" implies the consensus of the members of the governmental body. If one member disagrees then the governmental body no longer has a "consent" agenda.

Commissioner Wilton Howell wanted to remove an item that had to do with the overspending on budgets regarding base course for road improvements as well as overspending in operating the jail.

Perhaps the road improvements overspending should have been on the consent agenda, but anything regarding the jail situation, an emergency situation as declared by the county commission itself, should be discussed in a public meeting.

Even if it had not been as crucial as it was, Commissioner Howell should have the right to remove an item from the consent agenda without the backlash of his counterparts. Instead, they suggested he have a secret meeting with the county manager to get answers to the questions regarding the jail.

The vote against a commissioner's request to remove an item from the consent agenda is rude and unprofessional. It insults not only that commissioner but the public as well.

The commission has an obligation to discuss and the county residents have the right to hear any topic that could potentially cripple the county, which includes the detention center.

We know that none of the county commissioners have that "we-could-get-a-lot-done-around-here-if-it-wasn't-for-those-peaky-county-residents" attitude.

But sometimes, when commissioners fight over something as simple as a consent agenda and then encourage private meetings with the county manager, we have to wonder.

Government does have a duty to protect against wildfires

On Feb. 17, a meeting of most of the fire managers in New Mexico took place in Albuquerque. Strategies to defend our state from wildfire in the coming fire season were planned... On the same day, George Duda, New Mexico State urban forester, spoke at a workshop in Ruidoso. He discussed at length the fiduciary

duty of governments to protect the safety and welfare of the community from hazards and dangers imposed by trees on public lands.

Most important, he covered the legal ramifications resulting from failure to provide this protection. For example, a \$6 million judgment was imposed against the city of Albuquerque recently, resulting from a hazard tree that killed a young child. The city's insurance paid for less than 5 percent, requir-

ing city taxpayers to pay almost \$6 million. Duda pointed out that there are now attorneys who specialize in tree litigation.

The forester expressed the need for our village to have an urban forester. Salaried or contracted, the forester would create and oversee the application of immediate and long-range planning for forest health and public safety in tree and fire-related matters. "The cost of even a single liability litigation would pay for this position many times over," Duda said. Also, money and manpower is available to assist forested communities. The community must be willing to apply for either or both. According to Duda, "there is state money begging to be applied for."

The workshop, sponsored by the Forest Health Coalition of Lincoln County, was attended by 20 people, including the Ruidoso fire chief, the county emergency management planning officer, village planning officer, one village councilor and representatives from public utilities. Sadly lacking was representation by our elected and appointed officials. While some did respond to invitations with regrets, it seems a better representation could have occurred.

Responses given by those attending verify there is a lack of understanding on the issues of right-of-way responsibilities and liabilities. The issues of utility easements, associated hazard tree removal and liabilities are very muddled.

This month, California's

largest utility settled a lawsuit in Northern California after being charged with starting a forest fire in 1990. The charges consisted of starting a fire due to negligence in trimming and not removing a dead tree. The utility settled for more than \$8 million.

Ruidoso has many hazard trees and the problem will only become worse with the current dry period. ...Ruidoso dodged a bullet during the damaging wind storm of Jan. 26. How long can our luck hold? When will our leaders acknowledge the reality of the dangers imposed by an overgrown forest of diseased, dead and dying trees? Where is the leadership required to unite the entire community in addressing and solving these long-ignored problems?

Is this organization crying wolf, or are we, with professional guidance, calling attention to the dangers we all face in another dry year while living in a forested community? We all know there are risks involved in living in this beautiful area. Consider what is at risk for residents and our business community.

It seems very unwise to refuse to undertake every reasonable effort to reduce the risk of wildfire, loss of property, and loss of life with resulting litigation. All of us, residents and visitors, deserve protection from wildfire and hazard trees.

We are also entitled to a positive management program that assures a future with a healthy and vibrant forest.

This is reality, not fantasy.

Family Crisis Center sees change in personnel

Birgit La Mothe turned over the weekly support group for victims of domestic violence she's facilitated for 11 years to social worker Diane Harmon at noon Monday.

The support group formed as one of the services of the Family Crisis Center, which La Mothe facilitated. She also provided free counseling to victims of domestic violence.

Now, La Mothe is "semi-retiring" from both.

"To me it has been a very rewarding and satisfying thing to do," La Mothe said. "I saw the need 12 years ago and have stuck with having that weekly free group as a community service and we have helped a great number of people."

The group has varied in size from a few to seven or eight in attendance, she said, and participants have come from Mescalero as well as from Ruidoso.

"The beauty of the group has been that there were people at different stages represented in every meeting, some that just realized the abuse that went on at home ... and some who had worked their way out by setting limits."

La Mothe, who has been in practice in the area for 16 years, said she can't handle the paperwork of clients with insurance and has given up much of her practice.

"My feeling is that it will be perhaps more appropriate to have a younger person lead these groups. I'm 81," La Mothe said. "Call it semi-retirement. I have other plans for the future

and this will free me up."

She said she will be do contract work with New Horizons doing clinical evaluations. She also will work with the newly-formed New Mexico Responsible Gaming Committee, as counseling for gambling was her other specialty.

La Mothe also will be a distributor of Nikken magnetic technology wellness products, "assisting people in improving the quality of their lives by reducing stress and increasing energy," she said.

Her retirement also frees her to do more traveling, and she would like to return to Southeast Asia and Europe, she said.

"It's been a wonderful service to the community and we're sorry to see her semi-retirement," said Arlene Brown, M.D., chairman of the Family Crisis Center.

Stepping into La Mothe's position will be Dianne Harmon.

"We are excited that Diane Harmon, who's also an R.N., master of social work and licensed counselor, is going to be taking over the group and will be taking over some of the counseling that Dr. La Mothe used to do. Diane is extremely well qualified."

Harmon has attended recent support group meetings to make the transition smooth, Brown said.

Harmon, who said La Mothe's are "big shoes to fill," said she has been counseling at Mirasol in the Lincoln Tower for two and a half years and facilitated groups in Albuquerque for four years before moving to Ruidoso. She is also starting a caregivers' support

group.

Harmon has had considerable experience with domestic violence, she said, "because it's everywhere. Every client you meet. It's too prevalent, at the workplace, at home, dating."

She expects the group members will teach her a lot and she has a good mentor in La Mothe.

Paul Vordermann presented La Mothe with a plaque Monday from the Family Crisis Center in gratitude for 11 years of service to the community, and the group celebrated her semi-retirement and their last meeting with her with pizza and chocolate.

Several members have been attending since 1987 and said they don't know why more people don't attend. One suggested it was because this is a small town and people may not want their domestic life known, even though participants agree to keep everything confidential.

"What goes on in here stays in here," La Mothe said.

The group is important, said one member of the group, "to your self-worth! Because of being victimized, it's so diminished. It turns into death or life."

"It gives me tools to cope with old patterns and cycles," said another. "It's a safe place to go."

Two others spoke at once: "It's a safe place to go."

The domestic violence support group will meet at noon Tuesdays instead of Mondays, starting March 9, and will be in the second floor conference room of the Lincoln Tower. There will be no support group meetings for the next two weeks, Harmon said.

Council proposes 'stand-by fees'

Owners of vacant lots in Ruidoso may pay a total annual fee of \$66.96 per standard lot starting this summer.

On Tuesday, a stand-by fee for vacant lots was presented to the Ruidoso Village Council as one of several changes proposed to the village's water ordinance. Ruidoso councilors are to vote on the revised ordinance March 30 following a public hearing.

"The reality is these people aren't paying anything until they build a structure," Mayor Robert Donaldson said of vacant lot owners.

The fees, he said following Tuesday's council session, are the fulfillment of "my promise that the costs of upgrading

our infrastructure would be spread out so that everybody pays their fair share."

Though undeveloped, vacant lots still have water lines available to them as well as fire protection. The cost of those lines and their maintenance has to be paid for as well as the anticipated burden on the water treatment plant, Donaldson said.

Streets, even the dirt streets, accessing those lots are maintained by the village, he said.

If approved, the stand-by fees wouldn't become effective until after July, according to the proposed ordinance. The village probably would assess the fees on either an annual or quarterly basis, Donaldson said.

The stand-by fees are the

last element in the village's three-prong plan to provide financing for the maintenance and expansion of Ruidoso's infrastructure, he said. Last year, the village enacted an increase in water rates and the creation of impact fees on new development.

Under the proposed guidelines, owners of several smaller sized lots would not have to pay the fee for each lot, nor would they need to replat their property to avoid multiple fees, Donaldson said.

"We have mechanisms for people with multiple standard lots in a row," he said.

Other components of the proposed water ordinance include a simplified plan for restricting water use during droughts and changes to deposits for water customers.

Y2K problem forum tentatively scheduled

Ruidoso Downs leaders on Monday set March 25 or 26 for a village public forum about the Y2K bug and the potential problems it could raise for Downs' residents.

An exact date for the forum, which is scheduled to begin at 6:30 p.m. at the Ruidoso Downs Senior Citizens Center, will be set as soon as village leaders can confirm which day is more convenient for speakers.

"And we need to invite the public because the public is who we really need to reach," Mayor Joe Hayhurst said. "We

need to tell people what may happen and what they need to do to be prepared."

Hayhurst said one of the worst scenarios of the Y2K bug, in which computer systems may possibly malfunction on Jan. 1, 2000, is the loss of electricity.

Trustees earmark lodgers tax funds

Ruidoso Downs village leaders approved dividing slightly more than \$5,000 in lodgers tax revenues for three projects.

The Special Events Resource Group received

\$2,500 to promote the Southwest Wine Competition/Connoisseur Classic.

Ruidoso Downs also will contribute \$2,000 in lodgers tax revenues to a cooperative advertisement in the Gateway New Mexico magazine, which comes out six times a year. The village of Ruidoso, Lincoln County and the Ruidoso Downs Race Track are also contributing to the two-page advertisement, which touts the attractions of the entire area. The \$2,000 will pay for the village of Ruidoso Downs' contribution.

Ruidoso Downs also will be spending \$750 in lodgers tax on an Easter egg hunt, which will be March 7.

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




Gillespie led the Ruidoso efforts on the boards with five while Herrera, Garvin Grant and Josh Varnadore each had four rebounds.

Just as the Capitan boys basketball coaches feared, their Tigers' overtime loss to District 6AA leader Tularosa on Feb. 5 only served to wake a slumbering bear.

The undefeated Wildcats made sure Capitan didn't fancy itself on the same level of Class AA's No. 1 ranked team with a 78-35 whitewashing of the Tigers.

"They came out on fire which I kind of expected," said Tiger coach Royce Brown. "I figured they would come out and make a big run at us."

The loss dropped Capitan to 10-12 overall. The Tigers finished 3-3 in District 6AA play with the same mark as Dexter. Two Wildcats reached double figures in Friday's win over Capitan compared with zero for the Tigers. Capitan's Anthony Garcia scored nine points to lead the home team in scoring.

The Tigers found out the hard way that the Wildcats are balanced.

"We were concentrating on trying to shut down (Cody) May and everybody else picked it up for them," Brown said.

May finished with 12 points. David Prelo paced Tularosa with 15 points. David Jaramillo had nine and David Voorbach chipped in eight.

"They're playing really well right now," Brown said about the Wildcats. "If one is having an off night, coach May has two or three more who can step it up. They just come at you in waves."

Unlike the last time the two teams met, the Wildcats hit their opening shots, while the Tigers struggled shooting from the field.

"We started trying too hard," Brown said. The Tigers were "completely out of sync" by halftime.

Now that its first District 6AA girls basketball championship trophy is tucked safely away, Capitan sets its sights on an earning a trip to the Class AA Girls State Basketball Tournament.

To do that, the Tigers must find a way past a team that twice has beaten them this season.

Bryan Massé's Tigers, 13-9 overall and District 6AA champions, play the first of two Region G semifinals Friday in Animas. "We just played as bad as we could play, and we were in the ball game," he said.

The Tigers shot a frigid 15 percent from the field that night and 29 percent from the free-throw line. And still, Massé said, Capitan had its chances to win.

All of which gives the Tiger coach confidence heading into Friday's semifinal.

"We're not going to play that bad again. If we play hard and smart, we'll win," Massé said. "But if we get frustrated and don't hit our shots and don't listen to the coaches, then we'll get beat."

Massé doesn't want to be overconfident, either, because of the Bears' tradition.


"Hatch and Animas seem to always play their best ball in regionals. They know how to prepare for it," he said.

Local Libertarian leader calls for 'restoration of Constitution'

The head of Lincoln County's Libertarian Party is circulating a petition calling for the restoration of the United States Constitution.

Libertarian Tony Seno challenged Lincoln County Commissioners Thursday to sign the document as a show of their patriotism.

"I appreciate you speaking your piece," Commissioner Wilton Howell said, adding that he supports the effort except for some of the accusations against the federal government.

"I would sign it to support the Constitution and protect our rights, but not that the federal government is destructive. I do believe in the system," Howell said.

The opening paragraph of the petition reads that, "Certain elements of the Federal Government have become destructive to the very principles upon which this nation was founded and now operate unlawfully, outside of and contrary to the Constitution."

Seno told commissioners, "We ask for a plan to be put in place to secure our States Rights and prevent the federal government from continuing the repeated abuses and injuries to the people of our state."

Commission Chairman Rex Wilson defended the board.

"This commission has taken very strong stands in the past," he said. "We address the issues as they come and have put the organi-

zation in place (to respond)."

The county created the Public Land Use Advisory Council, which tracks Western and states' rights issues.

"The Constitution is like everything else," said Commissioner Rick Simpson. "It's never quite perfect and its been amended a number of times."

All but the first 10 amendments have been approved illegally, Seno contended, adding that restoring the Constitution means removing all

of the other amendments.

Seno specifically was critical of the government maintaining a standing army in times of peace, for "multiplying laws beyond reason...subverting both the words and intent of our Constitution and Bill of Rights," and for allowing its agencies to engage "in an escalating pattern of terror, looting and wholesale seizure of private wealth to feed the appetite of arrogant and rapacious bureaucracies."

Portion of Highway 70 to be diverted for work

Motorists on U.S. Highway 70 may feel as if they are driving on the wrong side of the road today.

Southbound traffic is tentatively scheduled to be shifted across the median into one of two northbound lanes today, said Joe Schulthess, manager of the \$7.6 million highway construction project to repave 6.1 miles of the highway.

Crews are expected to work on the south lane of the highway through the first of May, at which time traffic will be moved to the south lanes and work started on the north lanes, said Schulthess, who is with Meadow Valley Contractors Inc., the firm contracted by the state for the work.

Contractor seeks help in filling jobs

With all the highway construction projects in the region, a local contractor is experiencing a shortage of trained people to fill local job openings, Joe Schulthess with Meadow Valley Contractors Inc., said Monday.

Schulthess oversees the project to repave about 6 miles of U.S. Highway 70.

"We need some people who are either experienced equipment operators or who are willing to learn how to operate equipment," Schulthess said. "We are trying to hire local people."

Candidates for the positions should apply in person at Meadow Valley offices at 309 Harris Lane, Schulthess said.

Commissioners accept roads in portion of Sonterra development

The next heavy equipment residents of units one and two of Ranches of Sonterra see on their roads will belong to Lincoln County.

The county commission Thursday accepted the second section of the subdivision's roads still under the wing of

the developer, Properties of the Southwest. Portions of the development's third unit still are in private hands.

Commissioners complimented general manager Lonnie Phillips on a doing a good job that met or exceeded county requirements. The 500-lot development on Sierra Blanca Airport Road sold out in less than five years.

It was built on 4,800 acres

of a ranch purchase in late 1993. The first lot was sold in the summer of 1994 and about 50 houses are either under construction or completed.

The request for road acceptance Thursday covered three miles in unit two. The county previously accepted more than seven miles of roads in unit one.

"We appreciate you working with us on extending the

time period (for acceptance), Commissioner Wilton Howell said. "We weren't trying to hurt the development, but were trying to protect residents of the county who live inside and outside the subdivision."

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said Phillips "got beaten up a few times," but he was never argumentative with commissioners.

Phillips said the subdivi-

sion is 100 percent sold out.

In another development issue, commissioners scheduled a special meeting for 5 p.m. Monday, March 1, in the Ruidoso Convention Center. Three hearings are scheduled to begin at 6 p.m., including one dealing with changes to the county subdivision ordinance to reflect state rules for domestic wells.

Moving from a 5,000-square-foot home into a structure one-tenth that size demanded imagination and creative juggling, but Jane and Don Baker completed the transition with style.

They turned a bare bones, stuccoed straw bale house in Nogal Canyon into a comfortable, spacious-feeling home.

Jane Kretchman Baker moved to Lincoln County from Maine, where she managed an inn. last July, and then the work began. Two months passed before they could live comfortably in the house.


"It was the best decision I ever made," Jane said. "I was working myself to death. Don is 60 and he didn't want to work that hard. It was a drain financially and on our time. Now my life is free and I can live on (the money from the sale of the inn)."

A porch was added to the front of the house and she still is landscaping, including erecting a wall that will frame a garden with fountain and sconces put together with pottery by White Oaks artist Ivy Heyman.

Inside, an area to the right of the front door became their bedroom, accented by decorative wood beams created by local artists Mike and Georgia Lagg, but painted by the Bakers. The Lags also designed a graceful bathroom mirror frame and bath cabinets that set the tone of that room. A water heater was framed by John Markli, who ensured the piece was functional by including shelves for towels.

Jane hand-tiled the outside of a preformed shower that already was installed, tying in the colors with the counter she also tiled and with stained glass interior windows by artist Sandy Hartley. She also tiled the kitchen and created a mosaic on the floor, using material from Mexico.

"John Markli, who did all

the cabinets in the kitchen, suggested cutting out the top of the bathroom wall, which gives a more open feeling with the light coming from the bathroom window," Jane said.

Instead of a barrier, the wall was transformed into a decorating opportunity and creates the backdrop for part of the kitchen and sleeping nook. The Bakers cook in a full-facility kitchen with plenty of cupboard storage.

"Our heat comes from a wood-burning stove and it costs us less than \$100 a month to live here," Jane said. The thick 2-foot by 4-foot plaster-covered straw bale walls retain the heat. A fire put out

in the evening will keep the room toasty for the couple when they rise in the morning, she said.

Even without the stove, the walls are naturally insulating.

"There's a 25 degree difference between the inside and outside," she said. "If it's 20 degrees outside, it would be 45-50 degrees in here. If it's 100 outside, it will be 75 degrees inside."

Most mornings, they eat breakfast on the porch, enjoying the view and playing with Lady, a border collie adopted by Jane when the dog's owner had to leave Nogal.

"I had just lost a dog and I really didn't want another one, but when I heard she was named Lady, like my last dog, I figured it was meant to be," Jane said. "Then we end up moving here, which is just across the road from her old home."

Jane has added several personal touches, such as paintings she collected over the years, some antique pieces, and rugs she bought in Turkey.

To date, she's invested about \$20,000 into her new home and plans eventually to add another room built in the same style. Gary Myers help with some of the work.

During a wind storm last month, the structure was tested and did just fine, Jane said.

It's thick straw bale walls didn't tremble. Most of the straw bales she added to the house came from her friend, Scott Wells, who lives just outside of Nogal in a large straw bale house and works for the Hubbard Museum of the American West.

Jane used some of the bales to create a dog house on the front porch. She often finds one of her cats curled up in the warm shelter right next to Lady.

"I'm so glad I scaled down my life," Jane said. "Everything I have here fits in place so perfectly."

Escape From Slavery

Harriet Tubman

One hundred fifty years ago, Harriet Tubman escaped from slavery. But her own freedom wasn't enough. She risked her life 19 more times to rescue other slaves.

She became the most famous conductor on the Underground Railroad, leading about 300 people to freedom.

Life as a slave

Harriet Tubman was born a slave in Bucktown, Md., in about 1820. She was named Araminta, but called herself

Harriet in honor of her mother. Her parents, Harriet Green and Benjamin Ross, had 10 other children.

The young Harriet hated housework. On the plantation most of her work was outdoors, chopping wood or laboring in the fields. This hard work made her very strong.

When she was about 12, a slave tried to escape. The overseer ordered her to help tie up the runaway so he could be whipped. Harriet refused to move.

The overseer was so angry he hit her in the head with a two-pound weight. Harriet never fully recovered.

For the rest of her life she had very bad headaches. She had spells that put her deeply asleep without warning. She could not be awakened until the episode was over.



Harriet Tubman was an amazing woman. Not only did she free hundreds of slaves, she also helped the Union Army, and worked for women's rights, the elderly, and for schools for black children.

Growing fears



When she was about 29, Harriet's master died. She heard she was going to be sold to a plantation further south. This had already happened to some of her sisters.

The further south slaves were sent, the more unfriendly territory they would have to cross to escape to the free North.

Also, Harriet was scared of the trip. When slaves were sent south they were often chained together. She was afraid she would be struck by one of her sleeping spells. If this happened, she might be shot so she wouldn't slow down the rest of the chained slaves.

The escape

Harriet tried to persuade her husband, John Tubman, a free man, to go north with her. He refused.

She talked three of her brothers into escaping with her. But before they had gone very far, they became frightened and made her return to the plantation with them.

In 1849, Harriet decided to escape on her own. Her father had taught her how to survive in the woods. She had heard about sympathetic people, good hiding places and the best route to take. She was ready to take the risk.

She had to travel about 90 miles, but she made it. She reached the free state of Pennsylvania and continued on to Canada.

Moses of her people

Not one single person Harriet Tubman led was recaptured or killed. Everyone trusted her strength of character to get them through the journey.

If even one person became frightened and turned back, everyone else would be in much greater danger. To keep everyone safe, she threatened to shoot anyone who tried to go back.

Slave owners feared her so much that they put out a reward of \$40,000 for her capture.

She became known as the "Moses of her people." Moses was a man from the Bible who led his people out of slavery to freedom.

Harriet Tubman usually made her trips south in the fall and the spring. She spent the summers working odd jobs such as cook or dishwasher to earn money for her rescue missions.


She brought several of her family members to freedom. On one trip back, she found that her husband had remarried.

In 1857, she was finally able to bring her parents to freedom. She saved enough to buy an old horse and wagon to carry them. Before, she had only been able to bring out strong, young people who could handle the hard trip.

The Underground Railroad

The Underground Railroad was a system of secret routes and hiding places used by runaway slaves escaping from the South to freedom in the North. There were many brave, caring people who helped runaway slaves escape to freedom.

- Agents were people who helped the fugitives.
- Conductors led fugitives from one hiding place to another.
- Stations were places to hide along the way.



In many different ways, Harriet Tubman worked all her life for people in need.

Soldier for the Union

Harriet Tubman served the Union Army as a:

- nurse • guide • spy
- cook • scout • soldier

In 1869 she married a soldier who had served in the black regiments in the Union Army, Nelson Davis.

He died of tuberculosis in 1888, when he was only 44. She was about 68.

Harriet Tubman tried for about 30 years to obtain an army pension. Finally, she was awarded \$20 a month.



Union soldiers called Harriet Tubman "General Tubman." She was paid nothing for her war work, although she did receive food.

Life in Auburn

After freeing her parents, Harriet Tubman moved to Auburn, N.Y., with them. She had been worried about how they would handle the freezing Canadian winters.

Many of her powerful friends, such as New York senator William Seward, lived in Auburn, so she felt it was a reasonably safe place to live.

Sen. Seward helped her make arrangements to buy a house. She shared it with people in need, the sick, aged and homeless.

A teacher in Auburn, Sarah Bradford, wrote about Harriet Tubman's life. The author gave the money from the book sales to Harriet.

With this money, she was able to pay on her mortgage and also buy 26 acres of land.

In 1903, she gave buildings and the 26 acres to the A.M.E. Zion Church to be used as a home for the aged.



"Cider with Rosie"

One of the most beautifully written memoirs of English rural life comes to Masterpiece Theatre in an adaptation of "Cider with Rosie," Laurie Lee's luminous tale of his Cotswold boyhood.

Set in 1918, the film conjures up a world of earthy warmth and beauty as it follows Lee's renowned tale from childhood to adolescence and the awakening of manhood. Published in 1959, *Cider with Rosie* has sold six million copies and immortalized Slad Valley, the Cotswold Hills district that has become part of the English literary landscape, much like Thomas Hardy's Wessex or Wordsworth's Lake District.

Juliet Stevenson heads the cast as Laurie's "disordered, hysterical, loving" mother, Annie. Emily Mortimer portrays the eerie Miss Flynn, a local beauty tortured by her promiscuity and by messages from her dead mother. The screenplay is by Mortimer's father, John Mortimer (*Mystery! "Rumpole of the Bailey"*), who draws on a wealth of Lee's singularly memorable characters, including the warring grannies, Miss Crabby the schoolmarm, the shell-shocked soldier, the eccentric uncles, and the cider-dispensing siren, Rosie.

Lee himself provides narration — recorded before his death at age 82 in 1997 — featuring observations about village festivals, the first day of school, a church outing, a hushed-up murder, the first kiss, and other ordinary and extraordinary incidents.

Set in the years immediately after World War I, "Cider with Rosie" captures a vanished era. "I belonged to that generation which saw, by chance, the end of a thousand years' life," wrote Lee of his upbringing with eight siblings and a single mother in a semi-feudal world of candlelight, horse carts, and profound solitude.

Lee's father was expected to return at war's end or from his civil service job in London. But he never went back. "Mother struggled to keep us clothed and fed, and found it pretty hard going," wrote Lee. But she kept going and going, with an oddball spirit that makes her one of the most endearing figures in print. "Deserted, debt-ridden, flurried, bewildered, doomed by ambitions that never came off, yet our Mother possessed an indestructible gaiety which welled up like a thermal spring."

The two-hour presentation of "Cider with Rosie" on Masterpiece Theatre airs Sunday, February 28th at 9:00 p.m. Masterpiece Theatre repeats Fridays at 11:00 p.m.

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Family, pop royalty join Shania Twain in CBS special

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There's quite a difference between the snow-covered bush of northern Ontario and the sandy beaches of Miami. It's almost as great as the one between Shania Twain's impoverished childhood in Timmins, Ontario, and her current status as an international superstar and six-time Grammy nominee.

These contrasts are reflected in *Shania Twain's Winter Break*, airing on CBS Wednesday, March 3.

The special, featuring guest stars Elton John and the Backstreet Boys, was taped at two special outdoor Miami concerts.

The program also includes footage of Twain taped in her Ontario hometown in January. Twain uses these chilly Canadian segments to reflect on her roots and to introduce her guests.

The Timmins tapings gave Twain a chance to look up old friends and visit with her younger sister and two brothers. Twain cared for her siblings for three years after their parents died in a 1987 car accident.

"Going back was great," says the 33-year-old singer, who now shares a Florida home with her husband, music producer Jeff Lange.

In addition to her visit home, what sets the show apart is Twain's choice of guest stars. John has been one of her idols since she was a child, she explains.

"I've just wanted to sing with him and meet him and just be with him for a long, long time," she says. "So much of my listening time has been to his records."

John and Twain swap hit singles in a duet performance of his "The Way You Look Tonight" and her "You're Still the One."

Twain's other guests, the Backstreet Boys, are always, in a way, part of her tour.

"They just give me a lot of energy, and I listen to them a lot before I go onstage to get me all pumped up," she adds.

Twain should get pumped just keeping track of her phenomenal record

sales. Her 1995 album *The Woman in Me* and her 1997 release *Come On Over* have both gone multiplatinum.

At last count, *The Woman in Me* had topped 11 million in sales, a figure only three other women have achieved with a single album: Whitney Houston and two of Twain's Canadian compatriots, Celine Dion and Alanis Morissette.

Twain says she loves the fact that Canadian female singers have been so successful internationally, and it doesn't surprise her.

"I never thought that being Canadian was ever going to stop me. Sure, when you come from another country ... there's always a period of breaking through," she says. "Canadian artists should have no anxiety about that. You have just as good a chance as anybody else to make it in another country if you want to become an international artist."

In fact, Twain's down-home Canadian roots have proven something of an asset in the United States. The media seem enchanted by the notion of a sexy chanteuse who knows how to plant trees, handle a chain saw and jump-start a car.

Twain says she's used to bucking stereotypes, including those that assume because she presents a sexy, navel-baring image onstage and in videos, she is more sizzle than steak.

"You don't have to mask your femininity just because you're capable of doing a lot of other things," she says.

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

Fox's tomb-opening special is 'not your mother's Egypt'

"Show me the mummy!"

That seems to be the driving philosophy behind *Opening the Lost Tombs: Live From Egypt*, a two-hour special premiering Tuesday, March 2, on Fox.

Originating from Cairo at 3 a.m. Egypt time, the special presents the exploration of a tomb in a small pyramid that had been undisturbed for more than 4,000 years. Maury Povich is the host.

"Only 15 percent of the Giza Plateau has ever been excavated," executive producer Peter Isacksen says, "so there's 85 percent (still) beneath the sands. We are going into a tomb that Dr. (Zahi) Hawass' team is excavating."

Hawass, undersecretary of state for Egypt's Giza Plateau, says he fully briefs any camera crew members before entering such tomb areas, and he hopes to limit the number of crewmen who will actually enter the tomb.

"(I) tell them, 'Don't touch. Don't make a big flashlighting on any paint-

ing,'" Hawass explains. "We are going to be very careful in trying to enter sites like this."

Questions of taste, of course, hover around the project, which Isacksen characterizes as "not your mother's Egypt."

"We're going to show it in a really new, inventive, Foxlike way," he says. "You can do it with graphics, with tone ... with music. It's not dry. We're passionate about this thing, and we're going to do it that way."

Supervising producer Nancy Stern cuts to the chase: "We want to find a sarcophagus that has a mummy in it!"

Another Egyptologist, Dr. Emily Teeter, who is working on an upcoming Discovery Channel special about Cleopatra, says viewers shouldn't hold their breath for anything exotic.

"The premise of (the Fox) show is quite curious," Teeter says. "The monument that they're opening has stood and has been available for several thousand years. So from an academic point of view, we don't have a lot of faith that this is going to be particularly interesting."
