## Donaldson new mayor; voters reject bond tax

With 51 percent of the vote Tuesday night, Robert Donaldson said he was relieved with the results of Ruidoso's three-way race for mayor.

"But I'm really concerned about the bond issue," Donaldson added. "It looks like the taxes failed but the bonds passed by a 2-to-1 margin."

Voters had to answer "yes" to both questions for the \$4.6 million water bond issue to pass.


While 880 to 476 voters supported the bonds, 688 to 661 voters opposed the tax.

"I think that you can infer then that there was some confusion on how they were interrelated," Donaldson said of the split question on the bonds. "It's very important to Ruidoso in terms of water."

In the race for three seats on the Ruidoso Village Council, political newcomer Ovella Estes took the lion's share, with 846 votes. Incumbents Bill Chance and Leon Eggleston held on to their places on the council with 746 votes and 591 votes, respectively.

Challenger Ross Dingman came close to upsetting Eggleston with only a 24-vote difference.

Ruidoso Village Deputy Clerk Irma Nava said 1,433 people voted in Ruidoso's municipal elections Tuesday out of 5,064 registered voters — a 30 percent turnout.

## Hernandez convicted of voluntary manslaughter

After four hours of deliberation, a Lincoln County jury returned a voluntary manslaughter conviction against Steve Hernandez in the sledgehammer death of horse trainer Jim Hare.

Jurors interviewed Monday said they ruled out self-defense within the first 10 minutes of discussion. Several members of the five-woman, seven-man jury pushed for a second-degree murder conviction, but eventually agreed on manslaughter, because Hare may have given Hernandez some provocation, they said.

Defense attorney Gary Mitchell was noncommittal about whether he will appeal the decision. Hernandez

will remain free without bond until sentencing.

"On behalf of the family, since the original charge was first degree murder, we were pleased it wasn't first degree murder and certainly pleased, it wasn't second degree murder," Mitchell said. "Obviously, we thought it should be a not guilty verdict, but the jury worked hard, listened attentively and we appreciate that. We appreciate the behavior of everyone in the courtroom. It was as congenial as possible for a murder trial. They are both good families. This was a real tragedy. We will await a presentencing report by adult probation and parole and then sentencing.

"It's a highly unusual case,

## Camelot to transform into fortress

Don Miner's the first who'll say it's a shame to turn the Castle Theater into mini-storage units.

But that's the intentions of Miner, owner of the former venue for the Ruidoso Little Theater and the Miner's Mountain Music Theater.

"I've owned this thing for nine years without making

any profit whatsoever," Miner said.

On Tuesday, the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission approved Miner's commercial site development plan for the storage unit project, which will be called The Fortress, according to documentation.

The units will be built in the same style as the castle, which overlooks U.S. Highway 70 slightly west of Sudderth Drive. Miner said

the construction will take place in five stages, with the first being conversion of the theater itself into about seven storage units. Three of those will big enough to park RV vehicles in, one possible use of the units, Miner said.

He intends to build about 30 more mini-storage units in a half-circle around the castle, with a block of five more in a building on the other side of Camelot Drive. A driving area will be left

between the theater and the mini-storage units.

Miner, at the request of the commission, agreed to not build several units bordering the property to comply with village regulations, said Darrell Bremner, a village planner.

Miner did receive permission to install a chain link fence on the property, Bremner said. "Basically, they approved what he wanted to do," he said.

## Downs shooting victim satisfactory

Nine-year-old Jesse James Del Rio was upgraded earlier this week from critical to satisfactory condition at an Albuquerque hospital, hospital staff said.

The Downs boys suffered a gunshot wound to his temple on Feb. 21. He was found at 10 p.m. lying in a bedroom of his home with a .22-caliber pistol lying near him. Police and family members are unsure of the time of the shooting. The pistol belongs to a 19-year-old brother of the boy.

Del Rio was airlifted to University of New Mexico Hospital during the

early morning hours of Feb. 22, officials have said.

No statement has been made yet regarding Del Rio's chances for recuperation. Del Rio, though unconscious, was reportedly responding to pain stimuli last week.

Ruidoso Downs police continue to investigate the shooting as either a possible suicide attempt, an accident or a homicide attempt, investigators have said.

An account, No. 000470813, has been set up at Ruidoso State Bank to assist Del Rio's family.

## Downs family finds home after fire

Friends, associates, and churches have offered assistance to a Ruidoso Downs family of six since Feb. 20 when a house fire turned them out of their home, said the mom.

"We really have just been lucky," Beth Miller said. "The children are fine. The structure of the house is fine. We have a roof over our heads and we have food on the table."

The fire and smoke damaged home is being repaired.

Many of the family's expenses are being covered by her home owners insurance, Miller said. But the community also has jumped in with numerous offers of assistance as well.

"I've had a lot of phone calls and people have been very concerned and they want to make sure everything is all right," Miller said.

She was at work and one child home sick from school when a fire started in an upstairs bedroom of her Downs home. The child was not injured in the

fire.

"I just wanted to let you know that there are many people who have been just really good," Miller said. "Nick Herrera and his fire department, and Corky Condon (a corporal with the police department who was among the first to start fighting the fire). I think he was the person who saved the house."

She and her family are staying in a rental home of H.E. Graham in Carrizo Canyon while her home is being repaired.

Just about every church in the Ruidoso area has called with offers to help, Miller said. Cheri LaCount, with Eastern New Mexico University, has also assisted the family by applying for emergency funding.

"And my friends have just kept up with me, and that's the most important thing," Miller said. "I know that there are a lot of people praying for us."





## TRIAL: Hernandez simply reacted

because neither the victim nor Steve had ever been involved in any criminal activities either party is aware of. Both sides are good people."

The maximum sentence is nine years for voluntary manslaughter, if aggravating circumstances exist.

"But there are none in this case," Mitchell said. "So six years would be the maximum."

Everyone at The Espuela Roping Arena in Hondo Valley the night of Oct. 5, 1996 agreed the confrontation between the two men lasted a matter of minutes. But it was time enough to end Hare's life and to alter the futures of Hernandez and both men's wives, children and parents.

In her closing statements to the jury, prosecutor Roxe Anne Matisse pointed out testimony from witnesses that:

- Hare was on his hands and knees when he was struck on his back and the back of his head with the sledgehammer.

- Hare was unarmed when he was struck.

- Hare told an emergency medical technician as he was being stabilized for transport to the hospital that he had been hit in the back with a sledgehammer and didn't see it coming.

She told jurors they must decide whether Hare showing off his training ability on a horse and possibly, questioning the horse training ability of Mexicans in general, was sufficient provocation for Hernandez to pull Hare off the horse. They must decide if the fact that Hernandez ended up getting the worse of the fight he started by grabbing Hare was enough provocation for Hernandez to pick up a sledgehammer and approach Hare again, Matisse said.

She discounted testimony from the defendant and his brother, Jim Hernandez, saying many of their observations were inconsistent with other witnesses. And she revisited testimony by two horse experts that if Hernandez had felt threatened by the way Hare was handling the horse, he could have walked away.

Ranch hand Jonathan Coleman and arena owners Ralph and Lindy Montes are

the only witnesses without a stake in the outcome of the case, she said. They all testified that the sledgehammer used by Hernandez was leaning against a fence by the tackroom and was not in the vicinity where Hernandez said he was attacked by Hare with a board. Hernandez said he blacked out and doesn't remember how he ended up with the sledgehammer.

But Mitchell put another spin on the incident.

Using personal experiences, common human reactions and the Hispanic history of New Mexico, he contended Hare was the aggressor from the start. He said the victim insulted Hernandez' ethnic heritage and recklessly wielded a horse as a 1,200 pound threatening weapon against Hernandez, who was on foot. At the time, Hare's blood alcohol level was too high for him to have legally driven a car, Mitchell noted.

Hernandez acted defensively in pulling Hare off the horse. Although he is taller and weighed more than Hare, he didn't attempt to fight back as he was punched in the face five times. He was dazed and on his way to his brother's pickup when Hare hit him with a 2x6-inch board and started the fight again, Mitchell said.

"I guarantee if I hit you upside the head with this board, you'd be in fear of your life," Mitchell told jurors while holding up a board similar to the one used by Hare.

Reflecting back to the fist fight, he added with increasing tempo and volume, "Most of us wouldn't get up from that. Yet the state has the unmitigated gall to tell us Steve had no right to defend himself. That's stupid."

Hernandez' reaction was like jerking a car steering wheel to avoid a deer, he said.

"You react," he said. Mitchell also cautioned jurors not to try to solve the case.

"The state wants you to go out and solve this case, to figure out what must have happened" Mitchell said. "But nowhere in the jury instructions (from District Judge Karen Parsons) does it say that your duty is anything but to judge the state's case against Steve Hernandez and whether or not you have a

reasonable doubt and if they have met their burden of proof."

Jurors contacted after the verdict Friday were critical about the lack of immediate investigation of the incident, although they were understanding about one officer trying to handle everything by himself and not knowing initially that a death would result.

"As a whole, the jury was upset with the lack of investigation, but we could understand under the circumstances (that night), but not why someone didn't go out Sunday (the day after the incident) and tape it off," said one woman juror, who asked not to be identified.

She thought a second-degree murder conviction was warranted, but many other jurors were unsure whether Hare might have sufficiently provoked Hernandez to justify voluntary manslaughter, she said.

"Some felt the first fight was sufficient provocation," the juror said. "I said for another fist fight yes, but to kill a man, no. We all said when a person picks up a sledgehammer, there's intent to do great bodily harm."

Most of the jurors did not believe the testimony of Hernandez and his brother, because their versions were at

odds with other witnesses, some of their statements differed from interviews right after the crime and because they claimed they could not remember many key points, two jurors said.

The jury did not seriously consider the racial issue brought up by Hernandez and Mitchell, they said.

If photographs of Hare's injuries had been shown to verify that Hernandez delivered two separate strikes and not one as he claimed, some jurors might have considered second-degree murder as warranted, the woman juror said. The state also should have brought in the medical report on Hernandez to determine how extensive his injuries really were, she said.

A male juror, who asked that his name not be used, because of strong feelings in the community on both side of the case, said deliberations became heated several times as a few jurors wanted to stick with second-degree murder, including himself.

"But by my own conversations, I swayed myself to voluntary manslaughter," he said. "The issue of sufficient provocation is a gray area. How could we know how provoked (Hernandez) was. But he was provoked or this would not have happened."

# VOTERS: the other municipalities of Lincoln County seemed to be looking beyond issues to management styles

Jerry Shaw, mayor of Ruidoso since 1993, lost her bid for re-election with only 10 percent

of the vote. "It's harder to take when you lose by that margin, when I haven't done anything wrong," Shaw said of the elec-

tion's results. "The only thing I've heard is that people wanted change ... I think the Wal-Mart issue hurt me — I got blamed for that, but the mayor

is not responsible for everything that happens." She said "no comment" when asked if she had words of advice for Donaldson. "He's been the one making the decisions on the council. They wanted change, they got it ... I'm not devastated."

Donaldson said his other opponent and fellow councilor Bob Sterchi ran a good race for Mayor. "And Jerry, all I can say is that Jerry has given many years to the council ... I hope we can use her expertise in the future."

Because of the split vote the \$4.6 million water bond issue, Donaldson said it may be something the village will try to put before voters again, but in a simplified form. "This is too good of a method to pay for the larger projects," he said.

Sterchi said he did what he set out to: "All we wanted to do was give the voters a choice ... And I give Robert all my support."

Ruidoso will continue to

make improvements to its water system despite the bond failure, Donaldson said, adding that the village has alternative methods to pay for the purchase of Eagle Creek water rights.

Estes also expressed concern about the outcome of the bond issue.

"I suspect that a lot of people were confused, and I regret that, I regret that," Estes said. "Water is very important for Ruidoso."

Estes, who will have to resign her position with the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission, attributed her strong showing at the polls to her time and involvement in the community.

"I am really humbled by it," Estes said of voters' endorsement. "I have a lot of friends out there and let's hope they remember that when it comes time to make hard decisions."

Leon Eggleston said he was never worried about the election's possible results. "My feeling is I was going to support the village of Ruidoso whether I won or lost. But it's nice to win," Eggleston said.

Chance said he was surprised to receive the second highest number of votes in the council race. "I'm not particularly well known in the general public," he said. "I was very surprised and appreciative of that vote of confidence."

Ruidoso Downs Despite six opponents, Ruidoso Downs incumbents Ray Hayhurst and Margie Morales retained their positions on the Ruidoso Downs Village Council.

Hayhurst led the race with 100 votes. Morales with 73 votes barely won the second position from contender Bonnie Richardson, who had 72, according to the final tally presented by Downs Village Clerk/Treasurer Leann Weihbrecht.

Weihbrecht said 181 Downs residents voted out of 900 registered voters. In the elections two years ago, 175 voted out of 779 registered voters, she said.

Hayhurst, who returned stay in an Albuquerque hospital, said he was glad of the results because of the present council's ability to work together as a team.

"Just like I campaigned, I want continuous harmony," Hayhurst said. "We make a good team and we'll do the people right."

Morales said her win over Richardson was "too close for comfort, actually." Downs residents put the incumbents back

in office because: "I think, generally, people like we were doing a good job," Morales said.

Everybody has made an issue of Ruidoso Downs' significant increase in gross receipts revenues, Morales said. However, voters know she and Hayhurst will spend the money for the village in a prudent manner, she said.

"Actually, I'm really excited, and I hope to continue in the direction we are going, and hopefully make some changes down here."

Other municipal elections In other municipal elections were low-key and not issue oriented. Voters were looking at different management styles and personalities.

Incumbent Carrizozo mayor Cecilia Kuhnel was defeated by former mayor and trustee Manuel Hernandez with 115 votes to his 285. The village also boasted the highest voter turnout of Lincoln County's five municipalities with 68 percent.

Hernandez attributed his win to "just good, honest hard work." Every night after work he would "do some politicking" wherever he could find people.

The mayor-elect isn't a stranger to town government. He previously served four years as mayor and worked two years as manager of the municipal golf course.

Kuhnel was on her way back from a meeting in Santa Fe concerning the Carrizozo-Capitan Natural Gas Co. and was unavailable for comment Tuesday evening.

Carrizozo Town Clerk Carol Schlarb said she was surprised and pleased with the turnout of 68 percent from the 687 registered voters.

"This is a lot higher turnout than I've seen in the last six years," she said.

The mayors in Capitan and Corona faced no opposition for new terms, but Norm Renfro still received 282 votes in Capitan and Ernest Lueras pulled 44 votes in Corona.

Business woman and water activist Debra Ingle came out on top with 166 votes.

Village Clerk Deborah Cummins said 336 of the 877 registered voters turned out for a 38 percent response. Thirty-six absentee ballots were cast.

### Yard waste

Ruidoso won't be considering yard waste collection services, soon.

Two businesses recently presented proposals to village advisory board for yard waste collection. However, it was the recommendation of the board that the village hold off considering the service so that it might be incorporated into a total solid waste collection service.

Village Manager Gary Jackson said the village started considering a separate yard waste

collection service back in the summer, when it was still uncertain whether Ruidoso would stay a member of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority. Now that the village is splitting from the consortium, Ruidoso should "look at solid waste as an overall picture," Jackson said.

He added that the businesses who submitted proposals for yard waste services should still be involved in the final bids for complete solid waste services.

The village is slated to separate from LCSWA sometime

after July 1.

### Judge's salary

Ruidoso's municipal judge's yearly salary will jump to \$30,000 from \$18,000 beginning this month.

Michael Line, who is running unopposed for the position, requested the salary increase from the Ruidoso Village Council during last year's budget workshops. His case load has increased 160 percent in less than four years, he said, which has required more of his time. However, Line, an attorney, also needed to make a living and had

less time in which to do that.

With the salary increase comes a requirement that the village's municipal judge works in the 30 hours a week at the court. The salary increase, which takes effect with the new four-year term beginning this month, was included by the council in its 1997-1998 budget. The ordinance making the increase official was approved by the council last week.

### Sign Ordinance Revisited

A 6-month-old ordinance regulating the use of signs within Ruidoso will be reviewed by the Village Council in a public hearing on March 31.

Part of the ordinance required a review of the amended law. In addition, David Goodman, owner of the Cree Manor, last week asked that village councilors consider further amendments, especially in regard to grandfather clauses. After the new sign law was put into effect, Goodman was notified that his 30-year-old sign at Sudderth Drive and Paradise Canyon Road was out of compliance for several reasons and was not eligible to apply for variances.

He was to go before Ruidoso Municipal Judge Michael Line on Feb. 25 regarding the violations, but had his court date postponed until after the public hearing on the sign law.

**OUR OPINION****A plan that's working**

Emergency planning has been getting close attention in Lincoln County recently, to everybody's credit. It's just icing on the cake when you can point to the value of that planning.

A little history: About 15 years ago, in 1983, late-winter snow was plentiful (courtesy of that year's substantial El Niño phenomenon in the southern Pacific), and suddenly a warm rain rolled across the Sacramentos. All that snow-melt and rainwater hit Mescalero Lake at the same time, and over the spillway of the dam across Carrizo Creek roared lots of water.

Soon thereafter substantial chunks of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs real estate were under water.

Fast-forward to the winter of 1997-98, and another even more powerful El Niño again upset the atmospheric averages. Snow pounded ranches and killed livestock across southern New Mexico, even as ski area operators in the Sacramentos crowded over the best snow conditions in a very long time. Across the slopes off Sierra Blanca and its slightly less imposing neighbors lay thousands of acres of snow ... just waiting for the sun to shine.

It's been a long, cold winter as Lincoln County winters go, but it did begin to ease a bit in mid-February, and some observant people responsible for the Mescalero Apache Reservation noted an inexorable rise in the water level on the face of that dam.

Then, because of planning that had gone before, the water level got no closer to the top of the spillway than 8 inches.

It was appropriate that Curtis Williams, of the tribe's Office of Environmental Protection, was able to announce at a meeting of the Lincoln County Local Emergency Planning Commission (LEPC) early last week that a valve had been opened releasing water into the Carrizo drainage at a steady, non-flooding rate. By last Thursday the water level had dropped two feet and there was no likelihood of flooding. The runoff valve was to remain open until the water level was 5 feet below the spillway.

Ruidoso's emergency planner, Chet Southard, commended Williams and the tribe's officials for their actions — especially because they notified both state and village officials when the problem was discovered, and for the continued monitoring.

The Lincoln County LEPC was cranked up last fall to develop plans for handling (or avoiding) disasters, whether fire, flood or toxic waste spills. At the time, the potential for flooding from Mescalero Lake was high on the discussion agenda.

So it's a pleasure to commend everybody for a plan that already has demonstrated its value.

**THE DREAMER****Long winter, late spring in the mountain land**

Here we are on the first day of March. The temperature went down to 12 degrees above zero early in the morning and now at noon it has crept up to 40, although the sun is shining. The wind is straight out of the north, blowing from the 60- below and 6 feet of snow in North Dakota left by the Alaska Cannon Ball, the biggest blizzard of the year.

From Seattle, Wash., to Portland, Me., spring is late; the same for our mountain land.

As we say, the apricot fruit buds, first to bloom of all the fruit trees, have not even begun to swell. They usually start to blossom out about Feb. 15 or 20. Of course, the extra winter weather is good news for the orchards, which should have a good crop of fruit this year.

**The snow-melt on high**

Even with all the cold weather, the river began running snow-melt water bank-full

on Feb. 25, and every day the flowing tide from off the White Mountain grows higher. There is abundant water in the stream for early irrigation in the valleys.

The young chipmunk is the first one who came into the house. He arrived just before the birthday of our brother Joe, Feb. 28, so I think I will call him Chipper Joe.

**GUEST COMMENTARY****Should Ruidoso water-users continue to subsidize builders?**

By a four to one majority, (the Ruidoso) Capital Improvements Advisory Committee has recommended against imposing an economic impact fee upon new building construction. I respectfully dissent from the committee's recommendation ...

Under present arrangements, every purchaser of a newly constructed home receives a quiet under-the-table welfare package with a value of about \$4,000, an involuntary wealth transfer to the new buyer from the residents who have over the years paid water bills and taxes to build the infrastructure of our water and wastewater networks.

Our water utility is now capitalized at about \$4,000 per existing connection. That figure is the cost of the system less depreciation and debt divided by the number of connections. It is a highly critical number that can't be permitted to drop below a certain level for two reasons. First, there must be enough vacant capacity in the system to provide water and sewer service when a new home is built. Second, a complex water and sewage system needs some slack for contingencies.

There are inevitable downtime requirements to maintain, repair, and replace treatment plants, tanks, pumps, and lines.

If the system doesn't have a certain amount of redundancy, normal maintenance jobs will shut down portions of the system and cause loss of service to customers.

Our present waterworks capitalization of around \$4,000 per connection is probably lower than it ought to be, but current practice drives it ever lower. Every new connection adds to the burden while adding nothing to the capitalization. Every ratepayer's equity in the system is eroded away as new connections dilute the value we have accumulated.

A consequence of our present arrangement is that Ruidoso lurches from crisis to crisis as water demand approaches capacity and new money must be found to keep the taps flowing.

The long-term purpose of a development fee is to fund utility expansion up front and provide a financial cushion that expands at roughly the same rate as new demands on the system. The new home buyer who pays the fee gets immediate and full value for his money, all of which must go into a system expansion fund. Not one dime benefits holders of existing connections; the fund can't be used for repairs or for upgrading existing subdivision lines or facilities.

Additionally, an economic impact fee is sorely needed to restore reason and equity to a

system that clearly lacks both.

Based on the 1990 census, Ruidoso's dwelling occupancy rate was only 28.4%. The result of this low fraction is that something like 70% of the construction we now subsidize will be vacation homes. Our vacation home owners are a blessing and a bounty, but of all people, they need welfare least. Until we impose an impact fee, this kind of absurd and perverse non-policy will continue to deplete the utility's capital and thwart all efforts to achieve the robust water system that Ruidoso so desperately needs.

The 1990 census reveals another pernicious facet of the construction subsidy. About 23 percent of Ruidoso's dwellings were mobile or modular homes; i.e., they were built somewhere else and hauled in here. Some vendor in Roswell or Alamogordo or Albuquerque gets the money, and Chaves or Otero or Bernalillo County get the gross receipts tax. Ruidoso's builders and builder suppliers are shut out, and the village loses thousands of dollars of tax revenue. Does it make any sense to subsidize this kind of transaction?

I urge the Council to see the present scheme for what it is — a banquet of untargeted and pointless subsidies that squanders the capital of our water utility and defeats long-term planning. I hope the Council will recognize the impact fee as a giant step toward breaking the

cycle of debt dependency and crisis. I ask the Council to think hard and envisage the water system we want in the future — stable, robust, resistant to drought, accommodating to growth. Is this dream likely to become a reality without positive action by the Council to make it happen? I believe that the requisite action is a full impact fee imposed now and preferably phased in over four years.

The author cast the only dissenting vote on the fee issue.





**Warriors begin playoff march**

Ruidoso's Warriors embark on their quest for a state basketball tournament berth, when they host Santa Teresa in a District 3AAA playoff game at 7 p.m. today in the RHS gym.

The Desert Warriors, fresh from a 48-47 win over Hot Springs Monday, invade Ruidoso with, perhaps, the best offensive weapon in the district.

Senior Eric Rojas, though slight at 6-foot, 3-inches for a post player, plays big in the paint for the Desert Warriors.

Not only does Rojas possess the physical skills, but he also has the fire burning inside.

"He was disappointed last year that we didn't advance out of district to state, and that's been a goal of his," Santa Teresa coach Donald Dotson said. "He's really pumped as well the other guys."

Rojas epitomizes Santa Teresa's strength, which is quickness.

Ruidoso coach Gary Grahn has seen it three times this year. Santa Teresa has won two of those against RHS.

"Defensively, they just pester you to death," Grahn said. "They are just so dang quick. They end up stripping you and picking off passes. They create turnovers and get easy layups."

Hence the emphasis on funda-

mentals in practice Monday for the Warriors. Grahn said the Warriors must take care of the ball if they are to continue the season.

Turnovers doomed Ruidoso's hopes to take the shortcut district finals and the state tournament. The Warriors entered their final two games of the regular season needing just one of two wins. They came up empty both times, losing to Cobre 64-53 on Friday, and falling to Silver 50-47 on Saturday.

The setbacks dropped the Warriors to third place in the district behind regular season champ Silver and second-place Cobre and in front of No. 4-seed Santa Teresa and No. 5-seed.

Despite a questionable technical foul called in the Cobre game and a lopsided officiating effort in the Silver game, Grahn blamed the losses on the Warriors' inability to limit their miscues.

"Officials did not cost us the game. Our turnovers cost us the game," Grahn said.

Ballhandling and Santa Teresa's quickness have influenced Grahn's choice for a starting lineup. Freshman point guard Solomon Barnett will direct the Warrior offense. Joining him in the backcourt will be seniors Matt Blank and Scott Sebastian.

Anchoring the paint for the Warriors will be Adam Windham (6-4) and Tyler Cluff (6-3).

"I think it's a little better passing lineup, more than anything," Grahn said.

Windham and Cluff draw the night's toughest defensive assignment in Rojas, described by Grahn as a legitimate "go-to man."

"We have to contain Rojas. He can't be allowed to score. We have to take care of the basketball. It's a simple game: pass and catch the ball and play good defense and you win," Grahn said.

Santa Teresa's Dotson has his keys to game as well.

"You can teach the Xs and Os and how to play, but we're getting down to the part of the season where the mental aspect is most important. I'm just worried about them being mentally ready to play," said the fifth-year Desert Warrior coach.

"Ruidoso plays the best man to man of any of the teams in our district. We have to be real sharp. We can't be lackadaisical ... We have to be very conscious of their tough defense," Dotson said.

The night advances to Friday's 7 p.m. semifinal contest against Cobre in Bayard.

Jane Terrell, the owner of the flower shop at 353 Suderth Drive, said the idea of an auction for the program came as a result of the high demand for the plush toys.

The stuffed animals are so extremely popular that Terrell said she has a four-page waiting list with requests from both local and out-of-state customers.

The Beanie Babies, which are displayed on a Christmas Tree in the flower shop, come in a wide array of different animals, including bears, rabbits, lizards, and birds.

What is unique about Beanie Babies, which are produced by Ty Inc., is that some new ones are introduced each year as others are retired. While the stuffed animals retail around \$5 to \$10, they can be worth thousands of dollars after they are taken out of production.

Terrell said there is no way of knowing which Beanie Baby will be retired.

She said the idea of a Crimestoppers auction came up when she ordered one of the latest Beanie Babies version, "Princess," and received 24 of

them but had an overwhelming demand.

"I thought the only fair way to do it would be to have an auction and give the profits to Crimestoppers," Terrell said.

Through the auction, the Ruidoso Flower Shop raised \$1,819.48, Terrell said.

Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox said he had no idea of the auction and was surprised when Terrell called him and told him the good news.

"I thought, 'This is fantastic,'" Maddox said, adding that the money will go to the working fund of Crimestoppers.

The chief said the Ruidoso/Lincoln County Crimestoppers, which was established in 1983, has solved more than 1,000 crimes, has paid out more than \$40,000 in cash rewards, and has been responsible for the recovery of more than \$2 million in stolen property and more than \$400,000 in narcotics confiscated.

These cases, according to records provided by the Ruidoso Police Department, include six homicides, eight rapes, 11 armed robberies, 195 burglaries and 381 narcotics violations.

"The community supports Crimestoppers because Crimestoppers is for the community," Maddox said.

# Playing fields get bulk of county money

Ruidoso will use the largest chunk of a county recreational fund to improve youth playing fields.

With three exceptions, the Ruidoso Village Council last week approved an advisory board plan to disperse about \$68,000 of a grant from Lincoln County for recreation.

Because Ruidoso will be able to pay for three of the eight projects recommend by the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Board, remote-controlled lighting at the Eagle Creek Sports Complex

will be added.

Village Manager Gary Jackson said a \$150,000 state grant now may be used for recreational projects at the White Mountain Recreation Complex.

The village has successfully lobbied the Legislature to remove a restriction from the grant, received two years ago, that mandated its use for the design of a recreational center.

Now, \$8,500 of the state grant may be spent to irrigate a piece of land at the complex as a soccer, baseball or football field. The grant also will pay for portable baseball backstops at the complex at an estimated cost

of \$6,430, as well as a perimeter security fence.

The remaining projects will be funded by the county recreational fund.

A baseball diamond for T-ball and Pee Wee Ruidoso Little League games will be built at the village's North Park, and a skateboarding park located there will be improved with \$25,000.

Restrooms and storage rooms at the Gavilan Canyon Ball Field will be improved with \$15,000.

Another \$4,200 will go to flexible fencing for the softball fields at the Eagle Creek Sports Complex.

Ruidoso Little League Basketball will receive \$3,000 for portable basketball goals.

The Lincoln County Boxing Club will receive \$500 for a boxing bag.

About \$2,000 of the \$68,000 was not allocated and will be held for contingencies.

Alternates are Bernhard Reimann, Al Cano, Don Dutton, Pat Ortiz, Marc Prelo, Ray Sharbutt, Jenny Dingman, Genevieve Duncan, Margaret Cano, Tony Cherry, Thelma Stephens and Sarah Mayes.

At the county meeting, Jimmy McTeigue, of Arabella, said he is running for the County Commission District 5 position. Capitan's Robert Goddard said he will run for the District 4 commission seat.

Attorneys Patricia Ortiz and Don Dutton will seek a District 12 judgeship now filled by the appointed Karen Parsons, who must run for the position in the general election.

The filing date for candidates seeking state and county offices is March 10.

Members at the meeting also spoke on behalf of candidates E. Shirley Baca, for Congress, and Gary King, for governor.

The state convention will determine candidate positions.

## Regular pumping keeps septic tanks working

"Out of sight, out of mind" may describe some homeowners' attitudes about their septic systems. Unless something goes wrong, they usually don't think about the importance of pumping the tank to keep it working properly.

A septic system has two components - the tank and the drain field.

"The tank receives waste water from the home, allows solids to settle out and treats the water before sending it on to the drain field," said Marsha Wright, water quality specialist with New Mexico State University's Cooperative Extension Service in a press release. "It acts like the strainer in a

kitchen sink, keeping solids from plugging the pipes of the drain field."

When the tank accumulates too much sludge, it may not have enough room to treat the water and remove all solids before draining to the drain field.

"This can cause unpleasant odors and puddles of untreated water on the surface drain field," Wright said.

Once the drain field becomes clogged, it may never recover. A full tank also could cause sewage to back up through the system into the home.

Untreated waste water exposes people and pets to

organisms that cause a variety of diseases including cholera, typhoid and hepatitis.

To avoid problems, Wright recommends homeowners have their septic systems professionally pumped every three years.

"If there are a number of people in the home the tank may need pumping more frequently," Wright said.

Using a garbage disposal also adds to the amount of solids that enter the tank.

Additives such as enzymes won't help clean out the clogged areas, she said.

"Regular pumping is the best way to keep septic systems working properly."

## 190 RVs congregate for major rally

He and about 190 other RV owners congregated at Circle B campground and three other campgrounds east of the Ruidoso Downs area Monday in preparation for a rally Tuesday in Las Cruces.

Wells, a former television weather man, thrives on the gathering of people with similar interests and knows many by

their first names, although they come from all over the United States.

Many will caravan Tuesday to attend the Family Motor Coach Association Rally, but on Monday they were enjoying ice cream sundaes and wandering through some of the latest Safari International models. The Safari models are distinguished easily from the outside, because most sport murals of wild animals.

Dealers show up at the rallies to promote the latest equipment and models, Wells said.

# Reaching through the bars

Volunteers and prisoners learn more about themselves as they learn about art

Frances Jones paused in the doorway and turned around.

Talking to four or five females impassively watching daytime television, Jones asked if they knew about her drawing lessons.

The Fort Stanton inmates looked up.

Yes, she said, and explained the class with the kind of enthusiasm usually heard at Tupperware parties. Furthermore, the class soon will tackle a challenge.

"We are going to paint a mural," Jones said.

For a year, Jones has been a volunteer at the state's minimum security prison housed at historic Fort Stanton. She and two friends — Emma Lou Griffin and Margaret Bohanon — teach classes there once a week and have established relationships with several inmates.

Besides painting classes, they coordinate a crocheting and quilting effort to supply nursing homes with lap robes. So far, the women in their classes have produced more than 400 lap robes.

"The problem in finding good volunteers — and all volunteers are good — but good volunteers from an administrative viewpoint are those who know what the rules are, who understand what our security concerns are, who adhere to those and who also require that the inmates adhere to them," Warden Sandra McFadin, who runs the Fort Stanton facility, said.

"That's the hard part — finding folks who can actually work around the ... obstacles we place to ensure security."

Deputy Warden Lynn Baade also expressed how hard it is to keep "good volunteers."

"These ladies are among the survivors," Baade said of the trio of volunteers.

Altogether, the prison has about 70 volunteers, a 1-to-1 ratio to the prison's current 70 inmates, according to prison officials. While many of the volunteers are involved with religious ministries, a majority of those at Fort Stanton offer programs such as training on computers, in electronics, in plumbing as well as in craft skills, Baade said.

Even though the skills that the trio teach probably won't help inmates earn a livelihood upon their release, the classes benefit the women in other ways, McFadin said.

"For people who are incarcerated, this is the only world they are allowed to see. And pretty soon they are in this little, tiny space in their room and they don't think about the big world — this becomes their world," she said.

Making lap robes for nursing home residents allows them to reach out of their confined world, and it allows them to assist others, McFadin said.


Additionally, "They get to communicate with people like this," she said, indicating Jones, Griffin and Bohanon. "They come in and set an example for them."

The three women said they, too, benefit from the interaction.

"I think we gain a lot more than we give," Jones said. "Also, we see that we are no different."

People tend to think they are better than prison inmates, but that opinion changes when they get to know the inmates, she said.

"They don't seem like criminals to us. They just seem like ordinary people for the most part," said Bohanon.

Carol Schroth, who has made 14 lap robes in the project, said she has enjoyed the work. "It gives me a sense of belonging to the community, a sense of contributing to a community outside of this institution."

Carla Joe said she likes the project because it helps the time go by fast and "I love doing stuff for old folks."

The three volunteers would like to see more women involved in their projects. Jones said between two and 10 inmates show up for her weekly classes.

They would also like to find more resources for the projects. They have never sought to publicize their work with the prison until recently, and only now because they are seeking supplies — yarn, oil paint,

brushes, palette knives, sewing needles, paper palates and more are needed.

Griffin rations out every inch of yarn donated to the lap robe project, she said. Much of the donations so far have come from members of the First Presbyterian Church in Ruidoso, which all three attend.

It was through the church that the three became involved. Several women in the church read an inmate's letter to the editor in the *Ruidoso News* and wanted

to reach out to the inmates, they said. The inmate's letter was in response to a politician's criticism of the prison's relocation to Fort Stanton. The inmate apologized for the prison but added that the inmates are grateful for being allowed in the community, McFadin said.

One woman, Susan Hovland, was a proponent of getting involved at the prison, Jones said. Hovland, though, died early last year in a tragic horseback accident.

"Had she lived, I think she would have had us working on this, but more of us," Jones said.

Out of the group of women

who began their volunteer work at the prison in honor of Hovland, calling it "Susan's Project," only the three remain, Jones said.

Baade calls the women unsung heroes. "We don't say that enough, that we appreciate them, and how much they serve because the inmates certainly look forward to their visits," he said.




**Boats ...**

was used in several ways by the Egyptians to help them make the most of scarce water when the Nile flooded.




**Jewelry ...**

are often used as a symbol of Egypt. These grow along the Nile River.




**Pyramids ...**

are the preserved bodies of dead persons. The ancient Egyptians believed that a body had to be preserved if the person was to enjoy life after death.




**Nile River ...**

**Temples ...**  
built by the ancient Egyptians to honor their dead pharaohs are wonderful examples of stone architecture. Some are still standing today.



**Underworld ...**  
was the world after life on Earth was over. The Egyptians believed there was life after death. Osiris was the god of farming. He later became the god of the underworld who judged the dead souls.



**Valley of the Kings ...**  
is the desert area where King Tut's tomb, as well as 63 other tombs, was discovered.
