



# Capitan family terrorized

Their 12 dogs are missing and feared dead in the latest incident by a suspected but unknown stalker

A Capitan woman returned home to her isolated ranch Tuesday to find her back door forcibly opened, blood on her porch and her 12 dogs missing. The possibly deadly incident is the latest in a series of attacks against the family in the past eight months.

But Romy Lowrance is ready to fight to bring to justice whoever may have shot her 12 dogs and removed

them from her 10-acre ranch in the subdivision outside of Capitan. The former Arizona police officer isn't about to sit back and let someone capable of such violence walk around free, she said.

She is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person and a friend is putting posters around the county asking for help.

Lowrance and her husband, Ron, own The Alto Store at the intersection of Gavilan Canyon and State Road

48. They moved to Capitan two years ago. The first year was quiet, but by the start of the second year things began happening, she said.

"In November, I came home and one of my dogs was real sick and I discovered later someone had exchanged their water for antifreeze," Lowrance said. "When I'm gone, I have half of them out and half of them in, because some of them are old and get along just fine in the house and the others fight with them, so I keep them separated."

One of the dogs died from the poisoning.

"About two weeks before that, I had interrupted somebody in my yard late at night, somebody wearing a hanging key chain on their belt," Lowrance said. "They were doing something back there and I let my dogs out and they chased somebody out of the yard."

About three months after the

# Association of Counties heads to Ruidoso

No sooner will alpaca owners and tradesmen be packed up after their annual convention Sunday than the advance crew for the 62nd Annual Conference of the Association of Counties will arrive in Lincoln County.

"Our preregistration sits right now at 775 people and I'm sure we'll hit 800 by the time we're finished," said Mary DeLorenzo, convention director for the association. "It under represents the numbers a little bit. The ones not involved in educational programs probably are not registered and they're the ones who will hit the town with their credit cards."

"We'll move in on Monday and out on Friday, so we will fill up lot of hotels during the mid week business period."

The county was designated a few years ago as the meeting place for the conference after submitting a proposal. County Commissioner William Schwettmann served on the association's governing board at the time. Since then, Kelly Orrick has taken over as executive director of the association.

"Typically, a convention costs tens of thousands of dollars and we try to spend as much as possible locally," DeLorenzo said. "We use local caterers and purchase a lot of local supplies like pastries and fruit and that kind of thing."

Although several functions involve meals, plenty of other chances will be open for those attending the conference to cruise the town looking for restaurants and shopping, she said.

The main guest speaker for the convention will be Gov. Gary Johnson, at the Thursday luncheon in the Ruidoso Convention Center. Reggie Todd, National Association of Counties legislative director, will bring everyone up to pace on the Year 2000 computer glitch problem.

The get-together that will draw officials from counties all over the state will kick off with a reception Tuesday at the Museum of the Horse. A golf tournament at Cree Meadows is set for Wednesday morning about the same time meetings begin at the convention center.

The opening general session will be at the Spencer Theater with a one-man show on The Lincoln County War by Boyd Barrett.

The affiliates - groups representing different sections of county government - will meet Wednesday afternoon at the convention center and at White Mountain Elementary School.

Breakfast Thursday is at Ruidoso Downs Race Track. More affiliate and education meetings are scheduled at the convention center and school, while the guest tour ambles over to the historic settlement of Lincoln and Capitan.

After the Thursday luncheon at the convention center, affiliates will wrap up their meetings and legislative resolution preparation, and attend a Wild West Dinner and Dance.

# Stop signs proposed for Sudderth intersections

Possibly as soon as next week, four-way stop signs will go up at two intersections in midtown Ruidoso. Those stop signs, at Center and Country Club, may be replaced as soon as mid-July with traffic lights, Police Chief Lanny Maddox said Tuesday.

Both timelines are based on "best case scenarios," Maddox said. Speaking before the Ruidoso Village Council, Maddox Tuesday said he and other village leaders have been talking with state highway officials about eliminating all midtown crosswalks that are not at a stoplight.

Though pedestrian safety in midtown has been a reoccurring issue for the village, the death of a Roswell woman last month prompted village officials to expedite a plan to make crosswalks less hazardous.

"We are using this to the advantage of other potential victims," Maddox said about village attempts to cut through the state bureaucracy involved with acquiring traffic lights. Usually, it would take at least a year to acquire a stoplight, he said.

Crosswalks without stoplights create a "false sense of security" for pedestrians, said both Maddox and Mayor Robert Donaldson. The woman who died May 22 was in a crosswalk when she was struck by a car.

The village has offered to pay for the stoplights rather than the state, Donaldson said. The stoplights are expected to cost \$150,000 a piece, village officials said.

Road crews are to re-stripe the crosswalks at Eagle, Center and Country Club next week, Village Manager Alan Briley said. Other crosswalks will not be re-painted, he said.

A state highway traffic survey will be conducted in the midtown late this week to gather data for the proposed stoplights, Maddox said.


# Man pleads guilty in starved horse case

More than a year after Roy Eugene Henson's neighbors tried to save his emaciated horse, the former Ruidoso businessman pled guilty to misdemeanor charges of cruelty to animals, court officials said.

Magistrate Judge William Butts said Thursday Henson came to court May 19 for a trial, but instead made a plea agreement. Several previous trial dates for Henson had been postponed because his attorney, Gary Mitchell, had conflicting schedules.

As part of his plea agreement Henson, who operated The Barn on U.S. Highway 70, paid \$300 to the Humane Society of Lincoln County, Butts said. Henson also paid \$41 in court costs. Neither Mitchell nor Henson, who has reportedly moved out of state, could be reached for comment Thursday.



November incident, someone arranged for her pot bellied pig to be killed.

"I had her in her own pen in the back yard with no possible access into the dog yard and somebody removed her from her pen and put her in the dog yard," Lowrance said. "The dogs attacked and killed her."

Lowrance said she can't recall any negative experiences with customers or neighbors that might have prompted some type of retaliation. Her closest neighbor has a few dogs of his own. Her dogs are kept inside at night and have not been the focus of any complaints about noise, she said.

When outside, the dogs were kept on one-third of an acre, surrounded by an electric fence flanked by chicken wire.

"My husband and I both feel someone has been in the house," Lowrance said. "We've heard the back door closing. I can't stand leaving my drawers ajar - it's a thing with me - but I've come home and they've been ajar. Just little things - we've both felt someone has been in there."

But nothing has been taken that they can determine, she said.

Tuesday, she left the store about 2:30 p.m. As she drove up the drive to her property, she was struck by the absence of her dogs running to greet her.

"When I pulled in, the back door was wide open and the chain was broken that holds the door from being blown by the wind," Lowrance said.

Someone had backed into the fence around the dog enclosure, bending over the reinforced steel bars used to hold the fence up. It appeared to Lowrance that a horse trailer or some type of other trailer was used, because the portion knocked down was much wider than a pickup truck.

The area is hard packed gravel so no tire tracks were left.

"As I walked up to the porch, there was blood all over it," she said. "I walked in the back door and no one was there. I thought maybe the door had come open and the dogs had gotten into the house."

But the house was empty and nothing was disturbed.

"I walked around (outside) the house and in the back, someone had removed the hose from where I keep it by the horse pen and dragged it across the yard and there was a blood trail out in the middle of the yard. It looked like maybe they had used it to corral the dogs. I don't know," she said. "There also was blood in the driveway."

She walked to the base of her long drive and talked to a neighbor who said she hadn't noticed anything.

When the Capitan Police responded, another neighbor

was questioned, who said he heard a 22 caliber go off about three or four times a couple hours before that, Lowrance said.

She didn't stay around to see what happened after that. Fearing for the safety of her six-month-old son, Lowrance is staying in Arizona with family.

Capitan Police Chief Carrol Durham said Thursday he had not talked to the officer who is investigating the incident, but had noticed the reward posters around Capitan.

Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan said he had not heard about what may be a mass slaughter of animals that Lowrance has rescued from the roadside and shelters over the years.

"I saw the reward poster and thought why would someone want to steal 12 dogs," he said Thursday. "I thought maybe they were purebred and valuable, but this is really sick and I will look into it."

Lt. William Bower of the New Mexico State Police based in Alamogordo said he will offer an officer to help in the investigation.

Lowrance said people in the area should be concerned, because someone capable of such violence against animals could be violent toward humans. Many studies have shown a strong connection between animal abuse and violence against humans.

"They ought to be afraid, because this is one really sick person," Lowrance said. "It was a direct assault on either me or the dogs. I don't know."

"If they wanted them dead, I don't know why they didn't just leave them there, unless they were trying to protect me from seeing it. It's weird. It has to be somebody local to have been there that many times."

"These are all rescued dogs," she said. "I got one off the side of the road where it had been hit by a car. Another was saved by a veterinarian who was spaying its mother and I bottle fed and raised him from day one."

The 12 missing dogs are:

- Shawnee, a Schnauzer with one eye who is taking medicine to prevent seizures.
- Clarence, a gray poodle mix, who's cross eyed and nine years old.
- Jenny, a tri-color border collie mix, 12 years old and on thyroid medication.
- Clementine, a 12-year-old cocker spaniel.
- Cody, a red heeler.
- Cowhoy, a five-year-old Siberian Husky/shepherd mix on medication to prevent seizures.
- Josephine, a four-year-old red and white part heeler.
- Scout, a blue-eyed gray and white Siberian husky.
- Wyatt, a red Siberian with one blue eye and one amber eye.
- Sequota, a three-year-old Samoyed.
- Pecos, a large white and brindle hound mix.
- Mogi, a dark brown chow/Malamute mix with a black tongue.

Mechem speed limit drops to 25 mph

Road construction along four miles of Mechem Drive has picked up considerably in the past week as crews began work on the east side of the road.

Because of road hazards from construction work, the speed limit for the area was dropped to 25 mph, Police Chief Lanny Maddox said.

A project manager said motorists entering Mechem from roads and driveways on the west side of the road should be extremely cautious.

Traffic has been shifted over to the west side, or south-bound lane, said Bill Loomis with Meadow Valley Contractors, Inc.

The former space, or buffer, between Mechem and west roads and driveways is no longer there.

Motorists intending to enter Mechem from the west may easily find themselves in the path of on-coming traffic, Loomis said.

Mayor Robert Donaldson on Tuesday urged people to use alternate routes during this phase of construction whenever possible.

"If you thought it was congested before ... the real construction is beginning now," he said.

Visioning meeting canceled

A committee appointed by the Ruidoso Villages Council to formulate questions for a survey on the village's strategic planning process won't hold a hearing on economic issues.

Village Manager Alan Briley said the meeting was to be Monday, but was canceled because of a lack of a quorum of committee members.

Briley also said no residents showed up at the meeting, scheduled to take place at 6 p.m. Monday in Ruidoso Village Hall.

"So, I guess it's time to start putting together the questions," Briley said.

The Ruidoso Visioning Ad Hoc Steering Committee has held about four public hearings on different aspects of the village, such as recreational and infrastructure issues.

Based on that input, the committee is to formulate questions for a survey, called "2020 - Share the Vision." Responses from the survey will

be used by village leaders to create a plan for future growth.

Ad contract approved

Ruidoso village councilors this week approved a \$200,000 contract with Grindstone Graphics to provide advertising and marketing services for the village.

The Ruidoso company was one of eight firms to submit bids on the three-year contract.

The company's work will be reviewed annually and its budget replenished, village leaders said.

Councilor Bill Chance, who was on the council sub-committee that selected Grindstone Graphics, said the company "stood out head and shoulders above the rest."

Details about the company's proposal were not released before the council's vote, because information in it could be considered proprietary, Briley said.

The contract formerly had been provided by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, which was awarded a \$74,170 contract Tuesday to operate a visitors center.

Vehicular homicide case goes to district court

The vehicular homicide case of Rene Lerma, charged in the death of his 17-year-old brother, is being sent to district court in Carrizozo for trial.

After a two-hour preliminary hearing Tuesday, Ruidoso Magistrate Judge William Butts ordered Lerma, a Mexican national in the country illegally, to remain in county jail unless he can put up \$100,000.

The judge did not allow a 10 percent bond.

"The jail called Friday or Saturday and asked if I would release (Lerma) so that he could attend his brother's funeral Monday," Butts said Wednesday.

"But he's here illegally and I said the only way I would allow that is if a detention officer goes with him to the funeral. He didn't go, but I understand it was the family that objected, not the jail."

"I felt the same way on the bond. He's here illegally and he could be in Mexico within a few hours and we'd never get him back."

Butts ruled that prosecutor David Ceballos presented

enough evidence for probable cause to be found that Lerma was driving and under the influence of alcohol early on the morning of May 29 when the vehicle flipped near Arabela on the east side of the county. Lerma's brother, Mauro Lerma, was killed.

Lerma's parents, who work for ABC news personality Sari Donaldson on the ranch he owns near Arabela, attended the Tuesday hearing.

Court appointed attorney Richard Branch from Alamogordo handled Lerma's defense.

Arrangements are by LaGrone Funeral Chapel of Ruidoso.

Admirably, the MCT group announced the cast list while everyone was sitting in the audience so no one felt singled out.


Projects such as this, as pointed out by one of MCT's directors, can establish an appreciation for theater early on in children as well as teach discipline and cooperation.

## The murder of Gov. Bent

the populace and educate its children evaporated.

It is not surprising that priests were among those who longed for the return of the Mexican government and worked to foster revolt.

Kearny was a busy man. He took Santa Fe on August 18th and left on September 25th for California, where he first met the Mexicans in combat and where, later, he became governor.

In his brief stay in Santa Fe he managed to erect an adobe fort on the hill north of the plaza, which he named Fort Marcy in honor of Secretary of War William L. Marcy; he led a scouting expedition to the lower Rio Grande; he issued a set of laws, later referred to as the Kearny Code, that governed New Mexico until it became a U.S. territory; and he installed military and civilian officials.

Kearny's original force was about 1,500 men. By the time he left for California, reinforcements had doubled that number.

Kearny took some soldiers with him, ordered others to proceed south towards Chihuahua, and left the rest in Santa Fe under Col. Sterling Price as military governor. Price later became governor of Missouri.

The government Kearny established gave ultimate power to the military. There was a civilian government as well, but its actions had to be

approved by the military governor. It was an awkward plan, but it continued for years.

Kearny picked Charles Bent, the fur trader, as civilian governor. For a while, things went well and it looked as though the occupation would succeed without opposition.

But dissension was growing. A group of Mexican patriots, Catholic priests, disgruntled Indians and others who resented the U.S. occupation for one reason or another began to plot revolution.

The uprising this group planned for December was discovered, thanks to La Doña Tules Barcelona, the proprietress of a Santa Fe gambling house, who heard of the plan and passed word of it to the civilian secretary of state, Donaciano Vigil. Some of the suspected ringleaders escaped; some were arrested, but they were soon released.

Rumors of new plots were heard but discounted. Gov. Bent ignored them when he left Santa Fe on January 14, 1847, to travel to his home in Taos to bring his family back to the capital.

He arrived on the 18th; early the next morning a band of Mexicans, along with some Taos Indians, attacked his home.

The governor and two of his friends were murdered. His native wife and her sister, the wife of Kit Carson, and

We've noted occasionally in this column that Ruidoso, New Mexico, is something like New Mexico, to the United States.

people may have heard of it, but don't know exactly where or what it is.

The official New Mexico Magazine has run a back-of-the-book feature for many years, titled "One of Our 50 is Missing." It is a collection of encounters New Mexicans have had with people, usually from back east, who don't know that ours is a state that honestly came by its own star in the American flag; that, no, it is not a foreign country and you don't need a passport to visit if your own home is in one of the other 49.

Neighbors south of the border, who do need a passport, or at least a tourist permit, do know Ruidoso, and should be commended. West Texans, actually are much more familiar with Ruidoso than are people from places like Farmington, Gallup and Santa Fe; they know it's in New Mexico and that they don't need a passport to get here for a long weekend.

This, despite the years of promotion by Joan Bailey and those who preceded her at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. It's not a terrible sin to be so ignorant of our own state's geography; something on the order of not knowing a third cousin's name.

But it sure is nice to know something about it ... especially if you're a reporter for an Albuquerque newspaper. We saw one report last week advising everybody that Balen had the first Wal-Mart SuperCenter in the state.

Now, those big-city reporters might not know about Ruidoso, or car, but surely they know about Wal-Mart.

another woman in the house were allowed to escape.

Five months after Kearny's bloodless conquest, blood was spilled.

The Taos revolt was followed by other uprisings, at Arroyo Hondo and Mora, but retaliation was swift.

Gov. Price authorized a volunteer force to be assembled under the leadership of Ceran St. Vrain, Gov. Bent's former partner in the fur trade. A total of 353 regular soldiers and volunteers left for Taos on January 23rd.

By February 4th, the uprising was over. Seven soldiers were killed and 45 were wounded, but 150 of the rebels were killed.

A similar fate awaited the insurrectionists in Mora. When the battle was over, that town of 2,000 people had been completely destroyed. New Mexico was firmly in the control of the U.S. government.

Elsewhere, in 1847, the inventor Thomas Alva Edison was born. He died in 1931.


But freedom of religion was meant as an individual right, and no protection was given to the church itself. For over 350 years, the priests of Spain had marched with the soldiers of Spain, and later Mexico, taking the word of God to the new citizens of the Empire. They represented the state religion, and their control over the daily lives of everyone, from the king to the newest Indian subject, was immense.

Along came Kearny. The priests were allowed to hold their regular worship services, but their influence in the government and their rights to collect money from

According to GTE, most customers want the convenience of one bill for their telecommunication services.



## Intervention center for drugs, alcohol considered for county

An intervention center for people who have multiple drug and alcohol abuse-related offenses or domestic violence episodes is being considered by the Lincoln County Commission after a presentation by Dr. D.R. Blanks.

About \$20,000 would be needed for the first three months of operation and then the program will generate enough from client fees to be self-supporting, Blanks told commissioners Friday. He based

his statements on other programs he has started in several states, he said.

Ten referrals a month would be needed from the courts for the program to generate \$11,000 a month. The organization operating the program would be non-profit, Blanks said. The charge to the client is \$6 per hour of professional service.

The county's existing DWI program is aimed more at first-time offenders, he said.

But Capitán resident E.J.

Fourratt questioned how many programs the county needs. The county already provide a visit-

ing nurse at the jail. Better Days Counseling and the DWI program.



**Teen-ager discovers the perfect ride**

While other teen-agers are caught in a myopic world of figuring out who they are, 14-year-old Nate Wierwille already has a good idea.

Wierwille is a mountain biker. "I'll stay with this forever," he said of his sport/hobby.

The two-year veteran of racing rides if not every day, at least every other day.

Wierwille credits dad, Tim, for getting him hooked into biking. But dad prefers road riding - not Nate.

"I've been on dirt all my life," said Nate, explaining he likes that mountain biking offers the unexpected.

"There's obstacles instead of just straight uphill and downhill," he said. For the first time in two

years of racing, Wierwille will have the opportunity to race in front of the home crowd. He'll be one of the participants in Sunday's Billy the Kid Cup, the first race of its-kind in Lincoln County.

He's looking forward to the "home course" advantage. "It will be different. Your friends will show up. You don't have to drive anywhere. You can sleep in your own bed," he said.

Wierwille is coming off a sixth-place finish in Albuquerque's Watermelon Classic raced June 7. His best finish this season is third. Twice he has accomplished that - at the High Altitude Classic in Cloudcroft and at the Coyote Classic in El Paso.

Sunday's Billy the Kid Cup is race No. 4 in the New Mexico Offroad Series. Riders accumulate points for competing and placing in each race. Wier-

wille plans on racing the rest of the series.

Wierwille has ridden the Billy loop several times, and he will ride it twice more before Sunday.

The key to the race is pacing yourself, Wierwille added. That and riding free of accidents and mechanical breakdowns. Flat tires are just another obstacle in a mountain bike race. Wierwille will carry a small backpack with two liters of water, a tire patch repair kit and some other essential bike tools.

"During the race if you are close to the finish you probably want to ride a flat in," Wierwille said. "But if it's early in the race you'll want to fix it."

Come Sunday, Wierwille hopes he can ride like another Ruidoso cyclist, his idol Bart Bowen of Team Saturn. As it stands now, it looks like he's headed down the right path.

**Krause offers little traffic, big views**

**Krause Canyon**


Krause Canyon can be hiked from either the bottom or the top, but is most easily reached from the top via the Monjeau Peak Road. The lower trail can be accessed from USFS Road 5617 off of Ski Run Road, but USFS Road 5617 is unmarked and a high-clearance vehicle is required to navigate it.

The trailhead along Monjeau Peak Road is unmarked but is easy enough to find. The Krause Trail leaves the trailhead in a south-westerly direction across a large meadow. Over your left shoulder, Monjeau Peak fills the northern skyline. After proceeding for about 300 yards, the trail reaches a saddle and appears to turn east up onto a knob.

At this point leave what looks like the trail and turn due south down into the tree-studded, grassy bowl of upper Krause Canyon just as the topo map shows. There is no trail visible for the first 200 yards or so but stick to the canyon bottom and the trail will appear as the canyon begins to narrow. The trail is faint and slightly overgrown in places, but is almost always within 10 yards of the canyon bottom.

The grade is steepest over the next 1/2 mile and then flattens as you continue down the canyon. A series of seeps and small springs is present along the trail which might provide a drink but would be difficult to impossible to fill a canteen. Other than the seeps, running water is absent during most seasons.

Just below the spring indicated on the topo map, the trail merges with an old jeep road. Continue down the trail another 1/2 mile and the canyon opens up where Hubbard Canyon comes in. You will intersect USFS Road 5617 here which continues up Hubbard Canyon. Turn around and pay attention to the return view as you need to recognize this turn on the return hike. Otherwise, you'll end up in Hubbard Canyon.





# CINDERELLA ARRIVES

By the time this year's season is complete, the Missoula Children's Theater will have produced shows in 800 communities, spanning four countries, and cast more than 50,000 children for local productions.

The mission of the MCT's founder, executive director Jim Caron, is to reach rural America through drama and theater. Caron, along with tour artistic director Don Kukla and music director Michael McGill supervise intense, three-week training periods for "tour teams." The two-person tour teams then take the show on the road. The Caron-Kukla-McGill triumvirate also created the 13 original musicals that tour teams use, including "Cinderella."

MCT tour actor/directors Christine Lynam, a native of Iowa, and Brad Price, who calls St. Louis home, started their summer tour in Ruidoso. They will zig-zag, north and south across country over the next 11 weeks, producing shows in Texas, North Dakota, Illinois, North Carolina, Kentucky, Michigan and Connecticut.

SIDE BAR

Missoula Children's Theater director/actor Brad Price sized up his "beggars," rubbed his goatee and paused as if knowing that it could be his last moment of contemplation for the day. The children meanwhile, ranging in age from 13-16, milled about the lit stage, waiting for direction.

Price then leapt into action, explaining to the 10 novice actors what would be on the morning agenda: entering and exiting the stage, getting into their beggar formation (or "picture" to use a theatrical term), and of course learning the songs and their lines.

Welcome to "Day Two" for Price and fellow director/actor Christine Lynam. In another four days, a fully choreographed, original musical adaptation of "Cinderella" will take center stage at Spencer Theater. With all of 45 years between them, Price, 24, and Lynam, 21, are in charge of pulling it off.

And for the 56 area children in the play, the experience of their relatively short lifetimes will culminate when the curtain rises for those two shows Saturday.

#### The auditions

The week started with 140 children at the two-hour, Monday morning audition. That number was pared down to 56 by the afternoon.

The philosophy of the Missoula Children's Theater is firmly planted in its audition process. MCT's mission is to build children's self esteem and life skills through theater.

"MCT interested me because their attitude toward kids fits so well with mine," Lynam said. "They learn discipline and cooperation."

Auditions seem rather simple: the child says his or her name and age in several different ways, sings "Row, Row, Row Your Boat," and performs some basic movement exercises.

There are reasons for the lack of complexity.

"We use their name and age so they don't have to remember a line," Price explained. "It's really an advantage to them because we keep it in their comfort zone."

"The audition may be the only theater experience they ever have - we want to make it positive."

As with the Ruidoso audition, for the 56 cast in parts, there were more the 80 turned away. That's why the cast list is announced while everyone is sitting in the audience.

"We try not to separate the cast from everybody else," Lynam explained. "What was really nice about this audition was that everybody was real supportive."

#### Practice, practice, practice

Rehearsals started Monday afternoon and continued in four-hour increments each day, or two-hour time blocks for the youngest actors. The children are expected to learn their lines at home, which gives Lynam and Price the opportunity to teach the songs, choreography and every-



thing else in between.

Lynam's and Price's teaching technique uses single-word cues. Economy of language is the emphasis, Lynam said. The children tend to pick up direction faster than adults.

It's not too difficult to pull emotion from kids, either.

"They haven't been told 'don't'," Price added. "Their imagination is 10-fold to what ours (adults) is."

The youngsters are free of other adult attitudes, such as egotism.

When in doubt, show a child what you want, said Price, adding that you won't be stepping on his artistic interpretation of a line or song.

#### The show

The week's worth of work culminates with two shows Saturday at 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. Either Lynam or Price will be on the stage at all times. That's because Lynam plays the Fairy Godmother and Price plays the Prince.

"We keep one of the tour actors on stage at all times because if anything goes wrong they can handle it," Lynam said.

The other tour actor manages the back stage.

"You've got to learn the show, every part, frontwards and backwards," Price added.

When curtain falls Saturday night, it marks the end for the children in the production, but for Price and Lynam it signifies the start of another.

They'll pack up everything - sets, costumes, personal belongings, into their Ford Ranger pickup with a topper and drive 10 hours to Canton, Texas beginning early Sunday morning, which should give Price and Lynam plenty of time to contemplate.

# Shedding light on the gifted

Alice Bryant and Linda Seebach authors of "Opening to the Infinite (Human Multidimensional Potential)" will sign copies of their book from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday at Candle Power, 2605 Sudderth Dr.

Bryant and Seebach, a mother-daughter team, have co-authored the book, which is about "multidimensionally aware" people — those who have experienced advanced levels of telepathy and have unusual psychic abilities and who feel from an early age that they are living in more than one world.

Published in January by Wild Flower Press, the book has a forward by Ingo Swann, an advocate of "the superpower of the human biomind." He has also been closely involved with "remote viewing," a systematic attempt to view distant places and times by psychic means. It was developed at the Stanford Research Institute during the 1970s, and has been used by the U.S. military against the former U.S.S.R.

The authors begin with the premise that many people labeled mentally ill in our society are actually misdiagnosed and severely misunderstood. Bryant and Seebach see many of these individuals as "multidimensionally aware." They say that they are the trailblazers of the next step in human evolution, and their gifts should be recognized and nurtured.

These gifted people, they say, have always been among us as shamans, sages, visionaries and psychics, and they believe that increasing numbers of children have been born in recent years with an already highly developed awareness of their gifts and their purposes in life.

In sharing the stories of several of these individuals, the authors attempt to shed some light on the real-life struggles these "gifted" people often experience, after citing the experience and philosophies of some trailblazers.

Seebach said Bryant met Swann while she was on tour, and he shared some of his personal research with her. Bryant has authored "The Message of the Crystal Skull," and co-authored "Healing Shattered Reality" in 1991 with her daughter. The latter book was about the alien abductee phenomenon. She has also traveled extensively in the United States and Mexico to visit ancient monuments and sacred sites.

Seebach, who was born in Roswell, earned her bachelor of arts degree from the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology and a master's in social work from the University of Denver. She began working with Vietnam veterans with post-traumatic stress disorder in 1984.

She is a longtime student of metaphysics and New Age concepts, and she incorporated empowerment methodologies in her counseling. Seebach said she utilized her therapist skills and New Age philosophy while co-authoring the book. She also recently became an ordained minister. Bryant has been a Ruidoso resident for 13 years. Seebach came here two years ago to write the book.







## HOT WHEELS







# THE YOUNGERS

COLE YOUNGER WAS A NATURAL LEADER. ONE OF 14 CHILDREN BORN TO A PROSPEROUS MISSOURI LANDHOLDER AND POLITICIAN, HE WAS NOT THE ONLY ONE OF THE YOUNGER BROOD TO END UP SPENDING A GOOD DEAL OF TIME RELIEVING BANKS AND TRAINS OF VARIOUS SUMS OF MONEY.

**T**he James Gang. The name conjures images of midnight rides and derailed trains. Jesse James is the most famous bandit the Old West ever produced, but the fact is, the gang that eventually bore his name was already in existence when Jesse joined. Initially, it was formed by Jesse's big brother Frank and Cole Younger, who, along with Frank, rode under the Black Flag of Quantrill's guerrillas.

The Civil War lasted longer in Missouri than anywhere else. The Missouri-Kansas border was wracked with violence as far back as the 1850s. In 1865, with the end of the hostilities, men who had fought as guerrillas for the south — commonly known as “bushwhackers” — were branded as outlaws. Of course, their northern counterparts, the Kansas “Redlegs” were treated as heroes.

It was difficult for the men of Missouri throughout the war. There was no real Confederate force in Missouri other than the guerrillas, so if anyone wanted to fight for the south, their choices were limited.

Many joined Quantrill. To Missourians, Quantrill, a former school teacher, was a hero — the man who had finally taken the war back to the Kansans. It was Quantrill's guerrillas who attacked that hotbed of abolitionism, Lawrence, Kansas, in August of 1863.

Quantrill attacked at dawn, and when he and his men rode out later that morning, they left somewhere in the vicinity of 150 men and boys dead in the smoldering ruins. Among Quantrill's men that day were Frank James and Cole Younger.

### A Learning Experience

Cole Younger was a natural leader. One of 14 children born to a prosperous Missouri landholder and politician, he was not the only one of the Younger brood to end up spending a good deal of time relieving banks and trains of various sums of money. But he was the one that the others looked to for leadership. Eventually, he would lead brothers Jim, Bob and John down the owlhoot trail.

But that was later. During the Civil War, Younger's abilities were recognized by Quantrill and he was made one of the guerrilla leader's chief lieutenants. It was remembered later that Cole was instrumental in saving the lives of more than a few Yankee prisoners. This was a fairly amazing feat. At the beginning of the war, prisoners were regularly taken and exchanged. But as the war progressed, fewer and fewer prisoners were taken. And fewer and fewer guerrillas were inclined to take

them. It was easier — and undoubtedly more satisfying — to just kill them. For Cole Younger to intercede on the behalf of any Yankee was a dangerous undertaking at best. Many of his fellow guerrillas would likely be inclined to not only kill Yankees, but anyone trying to protect them as well.

All of the Youngers had some axes to grind where Yankees were concerned. During the war, their father was murdered by Yankees and one of their sisters was molested by a Yankee soldier.

Aside from his guerrilla service, Cole also served with the regular Confederate forces. Various assignments took him to Texas, Colorado, Mexico and California, which was where he was when the war finally ended in April of 1865.

### Return to Missouri

When Cole returned to Missouri, the state was in a shambles. Ravaged by a decade of war, much of it was known as the “Burnt District.” Shortly after arriving in his home state, Cole ran into an old comrade from the days with Quantrill: Frank James. While comparing notes on the atrocities visited on their respective families, Cole learned that Frank's younger brother Jesse had been shot, almost fatally, in the chest while trying to surrender. Jesse was holding a white flag at the time. But Jesse had ridden with “Bloody Bill” Anderson, one of the more bloodthirsty of the guerrilla leaders, and there was no surrendering, no forgetting.

It wasn't long before the two former guerrillas began to plan ways to put their “training” with Quantrill to use in civilian life.

### Liberty, Missouri

It was cold in Liberty, Missouri on February 13, 1866. There was a frigid, biting wind that kept most of the residents indoors on that fateful day. Many of them would later be thankful that the weather had prevented them from being out on the streets of Liberty.

In October of 1864, Confederate forces had looted the bank in St. Albans, Vermont. Until February 13, 1866, it never even occurred to anyone that such a thing could happen again. Rob a bank during business hours? It was unheard of.

When a dozen or so heavily armed men rode slowly into Liberty a little after eight that morning, no one took any particular notice. There were many hard and dangerous men abroad in those perilous times and people simply looked the other way until the men were gone. It was normally a wise course of action, but on this particular morning, the men were not going to just leave. They had some business to conduct first.

A few minutes before nine two of the riders, possibly Frank James and Cole Younger, dismounted and entered the bank. They were about to make a historic withdrawal.

Upon entering the building one of the men approached the wood stove to warm himself. The other stepped up to the teller's cage. He asked for change for a \$10 bill. Then, almost as an afterthought, he requested all the money in the bank.

### Incredulous Birds

The teller, a man named Greenup Bird, was stunned. No one, no one, had ever said that or anything like it to an employee in a bank before. As Bird gaped, the two men drew heavy revolvers and suggested that he move quickly. "Make a noise and we'll shoot you down" they announced as they hurdled the counter.

Neither Greenup Bird or his son William, the other teller in the bank that day, were fools. Both did exactly as they were told. One of the bandits shoved young William toward the vault with the words "Damn you, be quick!" And quick is exactly what William was. As fast as he could, the young teller poured gold and silver coins into a grain sack that the robber had obligingly produced.

The other bandit positioned himself at the desk of Greenup Bird and casually asked where the paper money was. "In the box" replied Bird as he pointed to a large tin container lying on a nearby table. The bandit strolled over and began stuffing banknotes, bonds, currency and sheets of revenue stamps into a sack of his own.

Both Greenup and William Bird were forced into the vault and the door was slammed shut. "Stay in there!" shouted one of the bandits, "You know all Birds should be caged!" Obviously, the jokester was familiar with the bank's employees. The bandits had done their homework.

But the lock on the vault did not catch. Waiting until they heard the front door slam, the two Birds cautiously peered out of the vault. Seeing that they were alone in the bank, the two exited their would-be prison and headed for a window to shout for help. Before they could do this, however, they saw a terrible thing.

### The Death of George "Jolly" Wymore

George Wymore was 19 years old on February 13, 1866, the last day of his life. On that day, he and a friend happened to be in the square in Liberty at precisely the wrong moment. As the bandits began firing their guns to keep people off of the street, Wymore's companion ran for cover. But "Jolly" stood transfixed by the spectacle before him. As the mounted men thundered past him, he was roused from his trance and attempted to flee. But it was too late.

One of the riders fired four times and Wymore fell dead on the frozen ground. When his body was examined later, it was discovered that any one of the four bullets would have been fatal. Clearly, whoever the killer was, he had some experience firing a pistol while mounted on a horse. It was one of the things that the "bushwhackers" were known for — the best of them were said to be able to ride with their reins in their teeth, leaving both hands free to fire pistols.

A posse was hurriedly formed and townsmen took off in pursuit. They discovered some scraps of bank paper at a country church where the bandits had paused to divide the spoils. The trail then led to a ferry crossing on the Missouri, but it had begun to snow so heavily that the posse was forced to turn back. Eventually the pursuit was pressed westward into Kansas, but the bandits had not gone that far.

They were local boys. The James-Younger gang had just come dramatically into existence.
