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State Fire Marshal's Office moves to shut down jail

Unless Lincoln County Commissioners can show the State Fire Marshal's office how they intend to comply with fire safety standards, they may be asked to shut down the county jail in Carrizozo within the next 30 days.

State Fire Marshal George Chavez said Monday he can't allow the county jail to continue in noncompliance with fire safety standards without some assurances corrections will be completed.

"I did a code review yesterday and based on that, I wrote a memo to (Chavez) recommending a cease and desist order be issued within 30 calendar days (because of the) substantial life safe-

ty risk to occupants, staff and general public," state fire code inspector Paul Linville said Tuesday. "And I recommended it remain closed until it is in compliance."

The letter was sent by registered mail Tuesday to acting county manager Martha Guevara, he said. The county has 30 days to appeal the recommendation.

Commission Chairman L. Ray Nunley said he plans to drive to Santa Fe today to begin negotiations with Chavez.

"I want to see if we can extend this thing," Nunley said Tuesday. "Martha (Guevara) is putting together a record of most of the things we have done toward trying to build a new jail or taking care of the old one - to show out intent. We've already said we're trying to fast track this

thing. I'm hoping I can buy a little more time. "I don't want to rely on other counties' facilities to house our inmates."

Linville said the county's May 18 response sent by jail administrator Mike Borrego should have indicated a decision to renovate the old jail or build a new one, and asked the agency to help in compliance during the interim.

"Since this company (Correctional Systems Inc.) has been running it, major changes in the facility have occurred we've never had before, such as fire evacuation plans, changing the type of locks, putting in emergency lighting, and a new fire alarm system," Linville said. "A great deal of work has been done, but the bottom line is the county has to make a decision to renovate or build a new jail and that's what should have

been in the (May 18 county response to a Jan. 28 inspection by Linville and Juan Baca).


"You can't just say, 'We can't comply, end of story.' That's no resolution. Based on my evaluation of noncompliance with codes, I have no choice but to recommend they close the doors."

Linville said he performed a code review Monday at the direction of the fire board after it received Borrego's reply to 23 areas of concern noted in the life safety code evaluation of the jail he prepared in February.

Borrego's response received by the state May 18, identified some corrections, but on many points simply stated, "Cannot comply without major construction and renovation projects."

Water, garbage rates to increase

Roughly about the cost of a small cheese pizza, the combined increase to 6,400 Ruidoso residents' water and garbage bills becomes effective in five days and should show up on the next statement.

Ruidoso Village councilors Tuesday night unanimously approved increasing residential water rates by \$5.62 a month and garbage collection rates by \$2.75 for a total of \$8.37.

A handful of people protested the rate increases before the council's vote following the dual public hearings Tuesday night.

Bill Denney, a vacation homeowner, objected to the fact that homeowners would subsidize the cost of commercial garbage collection by a ration of 60 to 40 percent as stated at the hearing by Village Manager Alan Briley. Ruidoso businesses should pay proportionately for the service they receive, he said.

"So, when you increase my rates by \$3, you should increase theirs by \$6," he said. "I have a real problem with this. I'm here five months a year and I pay for 12 months a year," he said.

Residential garbage rates will be

\$10.25, which includes the base rate of \$7.50, \$2 for yard waste collection and 75 cents for a recycling program. The increase to commercial collection rates is \$3.75 for businesses, from \$19 to \$22.75 for dumpsters picked up once a week.

The commercial collection rate won't become effective until Sept. 1, as voted on by the council. The money would otherwise be collected and kept by the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority which currently provides the collection service.

Mayor Robert Donaldson told Denney the village intends to increase commercial rates, but only after an analysis can be done to gauge how much garbage a particular business creates. Then, rates can be assessed on an average volume of garbage rather than by dumpster.

"We will, in the end, raise commercial rates," he said. "We are going to make sure it is done right the first time. It's been done the wrong way for the past five or six years."

A flat rate increase for commercial collection would be the simplistic solution and one destined to fail, he said.

Ruidoso wants code enforcement of ETZ

• If county commissioners don't agree, then Ruidoso may pull out of the Extra-Territorial Commission, mayor says.

An ordinance that governs development within a 1-mile radius of Ruidoso is outdated, ineffective and increasingly expensive for the village, Mayor Robert Donaldson said recently.

"What the problem is that so many things aren't even addressed in the ordinance today because it is so old," Donaldson said. "It doesn't even talk about RVs ... It just doesn't work."

Interpretation of the outdated ordinance is a constant requirement, and the burden of researching issues has increasingly fallen to Ruidoso's village attorneys, he said.

"It's ridiculous to have a \$60 an hour or more attorney taking care of this when it can be handled in-house," he told the council.

The Ruidoso Village Council recently endorsed Donaldson's proposal to draft a new ordinance. Because it would be a shared ordinance with the county, Lincoln County Commissioners would also have to approve it.

The new ordinance, said Donaldson, should be regulated by the village planning department.

"The only way to take care of this is if Ruidoso takes over code enforcement," he told the council.

An extra-territorial ordinance, as brought out by Ruidoso Councilor Bob Sterchi, is allowed by state law. The basis of the ordinance is that a municipality should have some say about development

Highway construction update

Four-way stop sign at Cree Meadow intersection

The Ruidoso Street Department has placed a four-way stop sign at Cree Meadows where it intersects with Heath and Royal drives, a street department spokesperson said.

Police were stopping motorists who ignored the stop signs Tuesday to warn them that citations would be issued beginning Thursday for those who continued to run the stop signs.

Ski Run Road closed

Starting this week, Ski Run Road will be closed to all through traffic for two weeks while construction crews resurface the road, a project manager said this week.

Also called State Road 532, Ski Run Road will be open just past the Eagle Creek Sports Complex, said Bill Loomis with Meadow Valley Contractors, Inc.

Construction on the road will be seven days a week from dawn until dark, he said. The completion date is to be July 2.

By late next week, most of the

trucks should be paving beyond where homes are located on the road, he said.

Because of 25 large trucks on the road as well as heavy equipment, motorists who are not traveling to jobs or homes are asked to avoid the road.

Besides the \$1 million state contract to re-pave Ski Run Road, the company is widening about 4 miles of Mechem Drive. The Ski Run Road contract does not include repair to guardrails or efforts to widen the road, Loomis said.

Intersection work shifts

Starting this week, road construction crews will shift from the northwest corner of Sudderth and Mechem to the northeast corner, a project manager said this week.

Bill Loomis, with Meadow Valley Contractors, Inc., said the final phase of work at the intersection is to begin next week and should be finished by July 3 at 5 p.m.

"That's a little close," Loomis said, referring to the Fourth of July holiday. "But we hope to compress it (the work schedule)."

When the road crews shift, cur-

rent turning restrictions at the intersection will be lifted for motorists in cars and smaller trucks. However, larger trucks and vehicles traveling west on Sudderth will not be allowed to turn north onto Mechem because of the sharpness of the turn, Loomis said.

Instead, trucks will be asked to turn around at the "loop" and then return to the intersection traveling east. Trucks may then turn north, officials said.

Access to the Allsup's store will be through the parking lot of the adjacent shopping strip, Loomis said.

Mechem Construction

Road crews working on Mechem Drive will shift from the east side of the road to the west side in August, a project manager said last week.

The entire 4-mile project to widen Mechem Drive is scheduled to be finished in the late fall, possibly in November, said Bill Loomis with Meadow Valleys Contractors, Inc.



in areas likely to be annexed. The local Extra-Territorial Commission is composed of seven members, three from the village, three from the county and one chosen by the other members. The commission hears requests on issues, such as changes to zoning in the extra-territorial area, and makes recommendations to the Extra-Territorial Authority.

The authority has the final decision on issues. It is composed of three members—currently, Commissioner Wilton Howell, Commissioner Monroy Montes and Donaldson. Howell said last week he would oppose the new ordinance if it duplicated current village planning laws.

"I'm not sure the people in the extra-territorial area are bad enough to deserve Cleatus Richards (Ruidoso planning director) and the planning department," Howell said, referring to a perception held by some that village planning ordinances are overly restrictive and the department difficult to work with.

"There needs to be a good blend," said Howell, who unsuccessfully filed a lawsuit against the village regarding code restrictions for signs.

"The county is extremely the other way—an 'anything goes' attitude. But until we come up with some middle ground, I don't think the village ordinance as it is today fits the extra-territorial zone."

Lincoln County's only land use ordinance, other than state mandated zoning laws, is for subdivision development. Howell said both he and Montes represent the commission's minority in favor of more county zoning regulations.

If an effective extra-territorial ordinance is to be created,

then Ruidoso needs to spend more time and money drafting it, Donaldson said.

"We have probably spent \$10,000 so far on the ordinance," he said.

Before the village spends more money, Lincoln County commissioners should agree to a letter of understanding confirming that they would approve the new ordinance, he said.

"If we can't get some consensus, I don't know if we should continue (to participate in the Extra-Territorial Commission)," Donaldson told the council. Meanwhile, the village shoulders the majority of the current administrative costs tied to the extra-territorial commission, he said.

"The county is not going to spend a penny ... I'm amazed that we even have this," he said of the existing extra-territorial laws.

Howell said the extra-territorial ordinance was created to protect the village.

"So it shouldn't be alarming to anyone that the majority of the money spent enforcing it should be spent by the village of Ruidoso," he said.

Howell said the subject of revising the ordinance was brought up at the authority about eight months ago. At the time, he supported a revision, provided it did not vary too much from the current ordinance, he said. He said he has not seen any proposed revisions.

If county commissioners block the new ordinance, then 25 percent of the voters within the 1-mile radius may petition for an extra-territorial ordinance, said Chay Rennick, an attorney for the village.

Even though the village's planning department would increase its workload under the new ordinance, the village would probably save money because of the savings in legal costs, Donaldson said.

Briley said the analysis of commercial waste should be finished and a new schedule of rates ready by March 1999.

The \$2.75 increase to residential collection rates will be used by the village until Sept. 1 to get the department on its feet, adding that it would otherwise be impossible to start collection on that date. The \$2.75 increase is expected to raise about \$17,000 before Sept. 1, Briley said.

The water rate increases are expected to raise an additional \$545,000 a year for operation of the water system as well as about \$150,000 for repairs to the system, village leaders said.

Without the water rate increase, sewer revenues would subsidize the water system by about \$237,000, Briley has said.

The new water rate for

homes will be \$18.12 a month for up to 4,000 gallons of water. After 4,000 gallons, an incremental fee of \$1.75 will be charged for every 1,000 gallons up to 25,000. After 25,000 gallons, the fee per 1,000 gallons increases from \$2.25 to \$18 based on the amount of water used.

Bill Smith, a longtime Ruidoso resident, was one of a couple people who opposed to the water rate increases.

"I want to object to the 31 percent increase to water rates for people on fixed incomes ...," he said.

Smith also cited past wasted expenditures on the water system and the increase to property taxes.

Donaldson said the base rate of \$18.12 paid more for the transportation system, the ability to turn on the tap and have water come out, rather than the gallons of water used.

Briley this week asked Loomis to replace stop signs on the streets that feed into Mechem Drive. The signs had been removed because the west lane was extended.

Loomis said the signs, possibly on temporary posts, would be put back up.

Road equipment vandalized, stolen

In less than an hour, 35 orange road barrels were destroyed by a vandal early one morning last week, a construction manager said.

Vandalism and theft of traffic devices have cost Meadow Valley Contractors, Inc., about \$15,000 since the project started, said Bill Loomis, project manager.

Signs, vehicles as well as barrels have been defaced with graffiti, he said.

"It's not fun and somebody is going to get hurt," Loomis said, referring to accidents that could occur when traffic devices are removed or destroyed.

The company has employees monitoring the area 24-hours a day, he said.

The company will prosecute anyone caught vandalizing or destroying construction or road equipment, he said.

White Oaks Eagle

June 28, 1900

Rev. C.C. Waller told a Herald man this morning: "There is no lack of valuable minerals in the White Oaks mining district. All that is necessary now is a means of transportation and that is soon to be secured. A party is now survey-

ing a line for Carrizozo on the E.P. & N.E. to Liberal, Kansas, where it will connect with the Rock Island route. This road if completed, and it certainly will be, will give to White Oaks it's long needed railroad and to the mines a direct line over which to transport their products to market. This means a boom for White Oaks. White Oaks stand probably the best chance to secure the college, on account of building stone quarries, coal mines, and other inducements."

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DA calls medical neglect allegations at jail civil not criminal

Allegations about medical neglect of inmates and other abuses in Lincoln County's jail are civil, not criminal issues, say 12th Judicial District Attorney Scot Key. He received a copy of allegations presented last week to the county commission by Ruidoso resident Hollyce Johnson, whose husband Ivan

is in the Carrizozo jail, because of a violation of probation on a domestic violence case.

"I read it and I'd be happy to talk to the lady, but most aren't criminal issues," Key said Friday. "If they are as she alleges, they are civil liberties type violations and not within my realm."

Commissioners have directed County Attorney Alan Morel to investigate the

complaints about the operation of the jail by Correctional Systems Inc. The county last week signed a six-month management contract with the firm that has run the 48-bed center since the beginning of the year.

Johnson had called for the firing of the jail administrator and for commissioners not to sign with CSI for another six months. Officials with the company have denied that

any inmates have been denied health care, but Johnson contends she has added more names of inmates similarly treated to the list she gave commissioners last week.

Johnson contends jailers also failed to administer required medication in a timely manner to inmates and questions the legality of jail officials monitoring calls between inmates and their attorneys or their wives.

County may pay more for gas if jail is built in Carrizozo

If Lincoln County Commissioners select a new jail site within the town limits of Carrizozo, the county may have to pay more for natural gas to serve the proposed 100-bed detention center.

In a letter to Commission Chairman L. Ray Nunley, June 12, Zia President David Hamilton pitched natural gas as a less expensive source of energy to operate the jail and then he suggested his company as the supplier.

"Zia has more than adequate capacity to provide reliable service to a new facility if it located within our service territory, which includes Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and other locations in Lincoln County adjacent to our pipeline, except at least for the present time, within the

municipal boundaries of Capitan or Carrizozo," Hamilton wrote.

He contended Zia's rates currently are about 30 percent lower than Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas, and that the municipal gas company's rates will increase in the year 2001, when the existing transportation contract with Zia expires.

He also said the municipal system may not be equipped to serve a new jail.

"Our engineering department has determined that the two-inch pipeline through which Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas provides gas service to Carrizozo may be at maximum capacity at its current operating pressure and could be inadequate to supply a large complex during peak use periods," Hamilton wrote the county.

Carrizozo Mayor Manuel

Hernandez disagreed with Hamilton's assessment of the gas service situation and that municipal rates are 30 percent higher than Zia's.

The municipal company could serve the jail at a rate competitive with Zia, he said.

"I know Zia would like a franchise in Carrizozo, but I'm not willing to give them one," Hernandez said Tuesday. "As mayor, I'm a member of the board of the natural gas company and it's fulfilling the needs of the area."

For the past few years, Zia and the municipal company have been tangled in lawsuits and in disputes before the state Public Utilities Commission.

"We are in no way attempting to disparage the town of Carrizozo or any of the other energy service providers in Lincoln County," Hamilton wrote in his letter

to the commission. "However, we do believe that consideration should be given not only to the initial construction costs of a new facility, but to the future operating costs and reliability of its heating, cooling and cooking sources."

In an attempt to keep the county jail in its area, Carrizozo town officials have offered a free jail/court complex site to the county at its industrial park. But commissioners also are looking at alternate sites closer to Ruidoso/Ruidoso Downs, from which the majority of crime cases originate.

The county's existing jail in Carrizozo is crowded and fails to meet fire codes. Commissioners are working with a consultant to decide what they want in a new jail and how it will be financed.

"About three or four referred to the sheriff's office (which shares the building with the jail) and already are taken care of," Linville said. "The biggest thing is the occupant load of the facility. We can't maintain 60 square feet (of space) per inmate without major construction. (The current requirement is 120 square feet of gross floor area per occupant).

One of the cell block areas had padded material, but that's been removed and corrected.

The jail has a new fire alarm system, which is partial compliance, Linville said.

Other areas cited by Linville to which Borrego failed to respond satisfactorily included:

of egress - the doors don't meet the new codes.

• Too many vertical openings exist in the facility that would allow rapid spread of fire and smoke.

• No smoke detectors in the duct work or dampers to prevent smoke and heat from traveling through the ventilation system.

• The bullpen area can't be divided with smoke barriers.

• The building doesn't have an automatic sprinkler system.

• The electrical system needs to be redone.

• The kitchen has no fire suppression system nor a sufficient ventilation system.

• The county has no capacity to evacuate inmates to a secure area 50 feet away from the building.

The jail also doesn't meet

Americans with Disabilities Act requirement for the handicapped.

"We had to relocate incapacitated inmates to other facilities in the past," Linville said.

The state has been generous in working with the county, Linville said.

"When the basic discrepancies were identified (in February), we talked to county administration officials and (Frank) Potter, who was manager at the time and they informed us a decision would be made whether to renovate the jail or build a new one," he said. "We said we'd like to have a response to the evaluation and gave them some time. They hired CSI and we immediately saw major improvements at the jail and gave them more time to make decisions about what they were going to do."

Chavez said the state essentially has written the county saying its response is unacceptable and they must achieve compliance.

"They have 30 days to

indicate where they can comply and what points we need to negotiate," Chavez said. "If we don't get an appropriate response within 30 days, we give them seven days notice, saying your response was inappropriate and inadequate and you have seven days to comply. At the conclusion of that time, if they still have not complied, a cease and desist order is issued asking them to close or achieve compliance."

Appeals can be filed with Chavez or the state fire board, which is made up of state corporation commissioners.

"I can allow a variance on my discretion," Chavez said. "But we are statutorily charged with enforcement of the public occupancy and life safety codes that took effect June 2 of last year."

More jail woes

The Lincoln County Detention Center situation just seems to get worse and worse and those in charge of dealing with it seem to be simply spinning their wheels.

Just in the last week only there have been serious allegations leveled against Correctional Systems Inc., which runs the jail, including medical negligence and the violation of basic civil rights.

Now, nobody is saying that jails are supposed to be hotels and but basic care should not only be expected but is only humane.

While these allegations have been made, it must be pointed out that none of them have been proven. Like the inmates within the jail, CSI should be considered innocent until proven guilty and none of the allegations, according to District Attorney Scott Key, warrant criminal charges.

Then, the county learned that heating, cooling, and cooking within the new jail could cost more if the new jail were to stay in Carrizozo.

David Hamilton, president of Zia Natural Gas Company, indicated that his company could provide natural gas at a less expensive price than Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas.

Of course Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas disputes the claim but it certainly adds fuel to the fire regarding where the new jail should be located, which already is pretty hot.

And finally, the county learned that violations of state fire safety regulations pointed out by the State Fire Marshal's Office could lead to the shut down of the current facility.


George Chavez, the state fire marshal, gave a long list of violations to the county this week.

Such an arrogant response as 'we can't comply, end of story,' which is basically what the state received from jail authorities, is unacceptable.

The immediacy of shortfalls, such as the facility not having an automatic sprinkler system, the electrical system needing to be revamped and the kitchen lacking a fire suppression system, makes the great debate over where to put the new jail pale in comparison.

Being sentenced to the Lincoln County Detention Center should not be a death sentence.

But, according to the State Fire Marshal's Office, lives could be lost if rectifying these violations aren't corrected.

PLANNING AND ZONING

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission took the following actions/last week:

• Tabled an application from Bob Adams for a commercial site development permit.

Adams, who wants to move his bear carving operation to the Ruidoso State Bank free parking lot, is to submit a conditional use permit to the commission.

Following about an hour-long discussion, the commission decided the conditional use permit is more applicable to the business.

• Approved a variance request from Randy Bennett for two lots in the Ponderosa Heights subdivision at 215 Maple Drive.

The variance allows her to keep a deck that is 1 foot, 9 inches from the rear lot line. Standard setback is 3 feet, according to planning staff members.

• Approved a variance request from Shirley Daugherty for a lot in the Glen Grove subdivision at 105 Hobart Drive.

The variance allows construction of a 10-foot by 17-

foot addition to within 13 feet, 4 inches of the rear lot line. Standard setback for a structure is 20 feet from a rear property line, staff said.

• Approved variance requests from Mike Torres for a lot in the Paradise Canyon subdivision at 126 Lois Circle.

The variance allows construction of a home on an existing foundation.

The former house was destroyed by fire.

The home, its fireplace, porch and side deck will encroach into standard setbacks. The porch, 5 feet from the front lot line, requires the largest variance of the four requests.

• Approved a replat request from Mike Torres to combine two lots at Lois Circle and Paradise Canyon Drive.

The planned house, to be built on an existing foundation, crosses the two lot lines.

• Approved a variance request from Wallace D. Whiteley for a lot in the Town and Country North subdivision at 204 Chaves Road.

The variance allows construction of a carport within

1.74 feet of the front property line. Standard setback is 20 feet. Whiteley said he needed the carport closer at that particular location on the lot because it would be more accessible.

• Approved a commercial site development application from Lupe Randolph to build a walk-up Mexican food restaurant in the Skyland subdivision at 305 Carrizo Canyon Road — close to the intersection with Evergreen.

Because the site is within the 100-year flood plain, Randolph will also need state approval.

The village commission's approval came with the conditions that Randolph provide seven parking spaces at the restaurant and remove an existing horse corral at the site.

• Approved a conditional use application from Larry D. Strain for a tract in the Camelot subdivision at 103 Camelot Drive.

The permit allows Strain to convert a 714-square-foot commercial building with an attached porch and tennis courts into a residence.

Bear carver has some land owners growling

Bob Adams wants to carve and sell wooden bears from Ruidoso State Bank's free parking lot on Sudderth.

George and Loyce Watts don't mind if Adams sells the popular bears. Owners of adjacent property, the Watts just don't want Adams using a chain saw. For about an hour last week, Adams, the Watts and their attorney Ray Sharbutt presented arguments about the proposed commercial venture before the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission.

"It seems like the major objection would be the noise," said Tim Collins, a local surveyor and an agent for Adams.

Another concern, expressed by opponents, centered on the potential of sawdust flying across the river and oil-soaked wood chips dropping into the river.

The commission tabled a vote on Adams' application for a commercial site development permit, and asked Adams to submit a more suitable application, this time for a conditional use permit.

Adams is being asked to detail in writing how he would

keep wood chips from entering the Ruidoso River, located directly behind his business, as well as what days and hours he would use a chain saw. Adams' application is to also show plans for a three-sided enclosure that would keep sawdust from flying across the river. Adams, during the commission meeting, offered to make the changes to his business plans.

Much of the discussion on the issue focused on defining Adams' business based on village planning codes. Is it an artist's retail business or an industrial venture? Is it a permanent business or a temporary vendor? Chay Rennick, an attorney for the village and an adviser to the commission, said he interpreted the business as both an industrial use and as a temporary vendor. The lot is not zoned for industrial zone but for commercial retail. It's temporary, he said, because it doesn't have what he said was a permanent structure.

Adams, who has an agreement with Ruidoso State Bank for use at the lot, said the business fell under the C-2 zoning as an artist's retail business, such as Dave McGary and Candace Garrett, both of whom have studios in the immediate area of the parking lot.

The business would set on the back portion of the lot, Collins said. It would include a 160-square-foot tool shed and a handicap accessible bathroom. Adams originally told the commission he would spend about two and a half hours a day using the chain saw at the site. At Alto Lake, where nine wood carvers share a vendor space, the noise is much higher, he said. But he would be the only carver at the bank's free parking lot, Adams said.

Sharbutt said wood chips saturated with oil from the chain saw would end up in the Ruidoso River, contaminating the water. It would be impossible to ensure that wood chips are picked up daily, he said.

Dick Wisner, president of the Ruidoso River Association, said he had no problem with Adams' business, provided the river was kept clean.

When asked if he could "rough out" the logs before they were brought to the lot, thus eliminating the need for a chain saw at the site, Adams said he could, but that carving was an important aspect of marketing his product. Adams said if he had to, he would not use the chain saw at the site — just the electric tools used to finish a carving.

The Lincoln County Commission will look at the use of staff by the county's administration office to possibly reorganize personal and redistribute work loads more equitably.

Problems with some staff members being overworked and having too many responsibilities versus others with time on their hands were brought to the attention of the commission by county planner Patsy Sanchez.

She had been criticized earlier in the meeting by a member of the county road review committee for not sup-

plying enough information on a case the group was reviewing.

Sanchez pointed out that she supplied the committee with papers tracing the creation of the town site and the passage of ownership of surrounding property, but that she could not supply a legal opinion on whether it is a county road, because that is beyond her expertise.

Sanchez was placed on the agenda Friday by County Commissioner Wilton Howell, because of a letter she wrote to Acting County Manager Martha Guevara asking that other less work-loaded employees in the office

help her with minor secretarial chores.

Sanchez said she never expected the letter to end up being discussed in a public meeting.

"But I strongly believe if I witness a crime and don't say something, I share in the guilt," she said. "Taking a pay check and not working is a crime."

"It was a good letter," Howell said. "I think her plow's too deep in the ground and some in the manager's office don't have their plow deep enough. We need to reorganize so everyone is about the same."

Sanchez said she makes

mistakes because she has too many duties - rural addressing, county planning, preparing road review background are some, as well as typing and copying several board agendas and letters.

"It affects the services the public receives," Sanchez told commissioners.

Howell suggested the commission consider removing payroll responsibilities from the finance office to free up one employee or having Emergency Management Coordinator Connie Hopper help Sanchez, because she no longer supervises county emergency medical services.

But Hopper said she has plenty to do attending and coordinating disaster exercises, and overseeing volunteer fire departments in the county.

"When I handled EMS, I was overwhelmed at times and had no one to even make copies for me, so I know what Patsy means," Hopper said.

Commissioner Monroy Montes said if specific employees are to be discussed, it must be done in a closed-to-the-public executive session.

"I think this shows a need to define jobs or restructure," he said, but Hopper said each employee already has a job description.

Septic solutions salvage lost lots

New septic tank technology gives viability to land previously thought of as impossible to develop.

It costs more, but a new technology of septic tank, called aerobic, has the ability to turn impossible to develop land into construction sites.

Land close to a stream or river, land with little soil on top of a rock bed, land with particular clays soils or land on top of a shallow water table—none have been developable in the past because none have had the proper topography or room for a traditional septic tank system.

The benefit is that aerobic systems can work with smaller leach fields, say those in the industry.

"The newest good option is to add an aerobic treatment to your tank," said Jace Ensor, who a year ago became Lincoln County's only manufacturer of septic tanks. "It pumps air into the septic tank through a very small air pump. It's like a sewer treatment plant. It purifies the liquid better."

Ruidoso, where at least half the homes now are on septic systems, has many undeveloped lots considered "marginal," in that they would be difficult to build on, village and state officials say.

In many cases, the lots don't have enough room or soil depth for the larger, traditional septic system leach fields, which allow affluent to filter into the ground.

State and federal laws set specifications for leach fields.

Carl Stubbs, a supervisor with the New Mexico Environment Department, permits between 200 and 250 area septic systems a year.

He said his office has conducted several studies about the need for sewer line extensions because of the lack developable lots.

A 1991 study of the Town and Country North subdivision showed 66 undeveloped lots, 73 percent of which could be approved for traditional septic tanks.

One Cedar Creek lot,

which had been considered marginal because of a nearby stream, recently became a home site because of the installation of an aerobic system called a Fast Wastewater Treatment System, manufactured by Bio-Microbics in Kansas.

There are between four and five of the Fast systems in the state right now, with two of them being in the Ruidoso area, Stubbs said. The system is recommended by the state agency, he said.

"We (the state environment department) really like the Fast system," he said. "It requires less maintenance because it has fewer moving parts."

Ensor said there are other types of aerobic systems produced by several manufacturers.

"They are real popular in places like Abilene, Texas, and in Louisiana ... so they install them in the thousands in those areas," Ensor said.

Aerobic systems are about three times the cost of a traditional system, said Stubbs and local businessman Bruce Haynes, who has installed both Fast systems in the Ruidoso area.

Haynes said the purchase and installation of a regular system would be about \$2,500, compared to about \$9,500 for the purchase and installation of an aerobic system.

Haynes said the Fast system is still "a research project, more or less," for New Mexico. State officials will be monitoring the Cedar Creek's systems for effectiveness by taking samples from the leach fields.

The second Fast system was installed in late May for a home in Mescalero.

The lot needed an aerobic system, Haynes said, because the water table is close to the surface in that area.

Stubbs said the Fast system's leach field will probably last twice as long as a traditional field, but added that a traditional field could be replaced for less than the cost of the Fast aerobic system.

Stubbs said a new leach field costs between \$1,000 and \$1,500.


Traditional leach fields, depending on the amount of use a septic system, last between five and 30 years.

The way to know when a leach field is no longer working is when sewage seeps through the ground, he said.

Also, when a septic tank is cleaned of solids, which the New Mexico Environment Department recommends done every three years, the field can be inspected for effectiveness at that time, officials said.

Stubbs said odor coming up from sinks and drains is not necessarily an indication that a septic system is in need of maintenance.

Septic systems are just that — septic, he said.

Ruidoso Valley Orchards

In other words, the fruit blossoms came out unusually well in their annual battles with the late spring frosts.

The next question is how far the river is running down through the valley. Rufino said the river is running well enough to irrigate his orchard, which is made up mostly of the favorite variety of apples. These include: Double Red Delicious, Winesap, Jonathan, Red Gold, and Rome Beauty, plus Golden Delicious and an old favorite of the earlier days — the Black Twig.

Fifty or 100 years ago there were 100 favorite varieties of apples in the United States. Today there are maybe 20 or 30.

Let us hope that the fruit picture remains this promising through the summer and fall.

Septic solutions salvage lost lots

New septic tank technology gives viability to land previously thought of as impossible to develop.

It costs more, but a new technology of septic tank, called aerobic, has the ability to turn impossible to develop land into construction sites.

Land close to a stream or river, land with little soil on top of a rock bed, land with particular clays soils or land on top of a shallow water table — none have been developable in the past because none have had the proper topography or room for a traditional septic tank system.

The benefit is that aerobic systems can work with smaller leach fields, say those in the industry.

"The newest good option is to add an aerobic treatment to your tank," said Jace Ensor, who a year ago became Lincoln County's only manufacturer of septic tanks. "It pumps air into the septic tank through a very small air pump. It's like a sewer treatment plant. It purifies the liquid better."

Ruidoso, where at least half the homes now are on septic systems, has many undeveloped lots considered "marginal," in that they would be difficult to build on, village and state officials say.

In many cases, the lots don't have enough room or soil depth for the larger, traditional septic system leach fields, which allow effluent to filter into the ground.

State and federal laws set specifications for leach fields.

Carl Stubbs, a supervisor with the New Mexico Environment Department, permits between 200 and 250 area septic systems a year.

He said his office has conducted several studies about the need for sewer line extensions because of the lack developable lots.

A 1991 study of the Town and Country North subdivision showed 66 undeveloped lots, 73 percent of which could be approved for traditional septic tanks.

One Cedar Creek lot,

which had been considered marginal because of a nearby stream, recently became a home site because of the installation of an aerobic system called a Fast Wastewater Treatment System, manufactured by Bio-Microbics in Kansas.

There are between four and five of the Fast systems in the state right now, with two of them being in the Ruidoso area, Stubbs said. The system is recommended by the state agency, he said.

"We (the state environment department) really like the Fast system," he said. "It requires less maintenance because it has fewer moving parts."

Ensor said there are other types of aerobic systems produced by several manufacturers.

"They are real popular in places like Abilene, Texas, and in Louisiana ... so they install them in the thousands in those areas," Ensor said.

Aerobic systems are about three times the cost of a traditional system, said Stubbs and local businessman Bruce Haynes, who has installed both Fast systems in the Ruidoso area.

Haynes said the purchase and installation of a regular system would be about \$2,500, compared to about \$9,500 for the purchase and installation of an aerobic system.

Haynes said the Fast system is still "a research project, more or less," for New Mexico. State officials will be monitoring the Cedar Creek's systems for effectiveness by taking samples from the leach fields.

The second Fast system was installed in late May for a home in Mescalero.

The lot needed an aerobic system, Haynes said, because the water table is close to the surface in that area.

Stubbs said the Fast system's leach field will probably last twice as long as a traditional field, but added that a traditional field could be replaced for less than the cost of the Fast aerobic system.

Stubbs said a new leach field costs between \$1,000 and \$1,500.


Traditional leach fields, depending on the amount of use a septic system, last between five and 30 years.

The way to know when a leach field is no longer working is when sewage seeps through the ground, he said.

Also, when a septic tank is cleaned of solids, which the New Mexico Environment Department recommends done every three years, the field can be inspected for effectiveness at that time, officials said.

Stubbs said odor coming up from sinks and drains is not necessarily an indication that a septic system is in need of maintenance.

Septic systems are just that — septic, he said.

The Washington Monument

We celebrate the birthday of our country on July Fourth. On that day in 1776, 222 years ago, the founding fathers of our country adopted the Declaration of Independence.


This July Fourth will also mark the 150th birthday of a monument to the father of our country, George Washington.

A ceremony called the "laying of the cornerstone" is held to celebrate the start of some buildings. The laying of the Washington Monument's cornerstone took place on July 4, 1848.

Congressman Abraham Lincoln was among the guests who attended the laying of the cornerstone.



Fireworks with the monument in the background make a beautiful picture. The July Fourth celebration is watched by thousands on the grounds and by millions on TV.



The Washington Monument is in our nation's capital. It is made of many stones that get thinner at the top.

Washington was born on Feb 22, 1732. He died in December 1799. The monument in his honor was started 49 years later.

He served as commander of the American forces during our fight for independence. He was president of the convention that wrote our Constitution.



A statue inside the monument shows Washington as a gentleman farmer, with his hand on the coat, placed on top of wheat and with a plow at the back.

Obelisk

The monument is an obelisk. An obelisk has four sides that slope up to a point. It might be called a tall, slim pyramid because there is a small one at the top.


The ancient Egyptians were very good at building obelisks.

Obelisks are approximately 10 times higher than the width across the square base. For example, the Washington Monument measures 55 feet at the base. It is 555 feet high.

Building

The monument is based on this design. The fancy base at the bottom was never built, but the simple obelisk in the middle was.

Visiting

The monument is on a hill, in the middle of a big lawn. Fifty flags, one for each state, are at the base. There are also seats to rest on while you wait your turn to go to the top. The National Park Service runs the monument.

Fixing it up

The Washington Monument is most unusual. It is the largest freestanding stone building in the world. While most buildings need mortar or a building glue to hold the bricks or stones together, the Washington Monument does not. It would stand up just fine without anything to hold the stones in place. However, water does seep through the cracks. After many years, the monument is getting a good cleaning and fix-up. The observation room and bookstore will be redone. Workers will put up scaffolding, or ladders with landings, all the way to the top.

Because of money problems and the Civil War, work was stopped at about 150 feet. For almost 25 years it looked like the picture at the left. The grounds were used for cattle and as a training ground for Union troops.

It's about a one-minute ride to the top in the monument's one elevator that holds about 25 people. There are 897 steps to the top.

The windows have wooden stools for kids to stand on so they can see the view. There is also a small bookstore one floor below.

Tourists get a great view of Washington's big attractions from the eight windows at the top.

The monument will have an interesting look while it is being spruced up. The scaffolding will be outlined in a blue-net cover that will enable us to see what is going on. The money to do this work was raised by a department store chain and other big businesses.

Building started again in 1878. Because of the long wait, different stone from another quarry had to be used. This causes a slight "ring" around the monument. The stones were hoisted inside to the top by ropes and pulleys. The stones are thicker at the bottom than at the top. The monument was opened to the public in 1888.



POOP SCOOP

The Humane Society of the United States, in connection with National Dog Bite Week earlier this month, offered some advice for people on how to avoid confrontations and how to react if one occurs.

Never approach a strange dog, especially one that's tied or confined behind a fence or in a car.

Don't pet a dog - even your own - without letting him see and sniff you first. Never turn your back to a dog and run away. A dog's natural instinct will be to chase you.

Don't disturb a dog while it's sleeping or eating, chewing on a toy or caring for puppies.

Be cautious around strange dogs. Always assume that a dog who doesn't know you may see you as an intruder or as a threat.

If you're approached by a dog who is being aggressive, remain motionless, hands at your sides and avoid eye contact. Once the dog loses interest in you, slowly back away until he is out of sight.

If the dog attacks, "feed" him your jacket, purse, bicycle or anything that you can put between yourself and the dog.

If you fall or are knocked to the ground, curl into a ball with your hands over your ears and remain motionless. Try not to

scream or roll around.

If you're bitten, immediately wash the wound thoroughly with soap and warm water, contact your physician for additional care and advice and report the bite to your local animal control agency.

Safety training of children is important, humane officials say. The most important lessons for children to learn are not to chase or tease dogs they know and to avoid dogs they don't know.

If your dog bites someone, confine it immediately and check on the victim. If necessary, seek medical help.

Provide the victim with pertinent information, such as the date of your dog's last rabies vaccination.

Cooperate with the animal control official. Your dog may have to be quarantined. Ask if it can be confined within your home or at your veterinarian's hospital.

Seek professional help to prevent your dog from biting again.

If your dog's dangerous behavior can't be controlled, don't give it to someone without carefully evaluating their ability to protect it and prevent it from biting.

Don't give your dog to someone who wants a dangerous dog. "Mean" dogs often are forced to live miserable, isolated lives, and become more likely to attack someone.

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But screening is not complete eye care. It cannot examine the total health of the eye to identify vision abnormalities. It takes a complete optometric examination to check eye coordination, side vision, tracking and other visual skills. Eye charts may help the school find those who are nearsighted, but not how nearsighted. Farsightedness and astigmatism are not checked at all. Some screenings for senior citizens do check for glaucoma, but may overlook any other eye disease present.

Chilling *Midsomer Murders* helps mystery buffs beat heat

Mystery buffs searching for a chill in sultry July should check out *Midsomer Murders*, a first-rate series of new movie mysteries adapted from the "Inspector Barnaby" books of Caroline Graham.

The first entry, "The Killings at Badger's Drift," premieres Sunday, June 28, on A&E Network.

While the show's title suggests a shrewd programming strategy, *Midsomer* is, in fact, the name of the rural English county created by Graham.

In keeping with mystery tradition, the villages of *Midsomer* look postcard pretty, but they have some of the highest homicide rates this side of *Pulp Fiction*.

Chief Inspector Tom Barnaby (John Nettles) is an immediately likable protagonist, an investigator who combines the keen intuitive insight of Sherlock Holmes with the affable lifestyle of Dr. Watson.

"Assisting" him in his rounds is the hapless Sgt. Gavin Troy (Daniel Casey), a handsome but clueless young

man who invariably says the wrong thing at the worst conceivable moment.

Barnaby's first case takes him to the quiet village of Badger's Drift, where an elderly homebody has been murdered.

As the inspector and Troy investigate the eccentric locals and their secrets, a second, more gruesome double murder muddies the deductive waters.

Graham's tightly plotted stories are packed with an array of interesting characters and false trails for the viewer. The productions are equal to other A&E mystery presentations and come with an added dollop of kinkiness that would give Jane Marple a conniption, at least based on "Badger's Drift" and the upcoming July 5 entry, "Written in Blood."


The latter, which boasts a tour de force by Anna Massey (actor Raymond's daughter) should be on any mystery fan's "don't miss" list.

In short, *Midsomer Murders* is a glittering addition to A&E's already golden mystery lineup. Three more Inspector Barnaby movies will air during the 1998-99 TV season.



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

Teens changing the face of women's Wimbledon

The big story at Wimbledon (airing weekdays on HBO and weekends on NBC) this week is the blossoming of four teen-agers who are changing the face of women's tennis.

Defending champion Martina Hingis, 17, while defeated by Monica Seles at this year's French Open, remains in the driver's seat. But analysts Chris Evert, Mary Carillo and Tracy Austin expect determined challenges from American sisters Venus and Serena Williams and Russian Anna Kournikova.

Evert, who will join Dick Enberg and John McEnroe for NBC's traditional live "Breakfast at Wimbledon" coverage next weekend, correctly picked Hingis to oust an improving Venus Williams on clay in the French Open quarterfinals in Paris earlier this month.

Evert says Venus has a better shot at Wimbledon than she had in Paris. "Grass favors the great athlete and power," she explains. "Venus lost in the first round at Wimbledon last year. She didn't have the footing and slid all over the place. And Hingis knows how to play on grass."

Evert calls Hingis and the older Williams sister "the best two in the world now."

"Hingis has that refreshing smile. Kournikova is confident and hip with sex appeal," she says. "And the Williams sisters came out of the ghetto, are self-taught and bring a new set of fans."

While she says the teens inject needed charisma into the sport, Evert warns against dismissing veterans such as Seles, Jana Novotna and French Open winner Arantxa Sanchez Vicario.

"They haven't been forgotten. The teen-agers can't do it alone, but there's no question they've brought depth," she says.

"Venus boasts she and 16-year-old Serena have brought much more, claiming that by next year she'll be No. 1 and Serena No. 2," Evert adds. "I don't think that's crazy anymore, but that was youth speaking out. Hingis won't be out of the top two."

Carillo, who is working with Wimbledon greats Billie Jean King and Martina Navratilova on HBO's 24th year of weekday Wimbledon coverage, says,

"Every one of the four teen-agers is for real," Kournikova especially merits watching, Carillo says, because the teen reached the Wimbledon semifinals last year. "She also beat four of the world's top 10 players in the Lipton Cup before losing to Venus in the final," she adds.

As for the Williams sisters, Carillo calls them "incredible presences on the tour" and says she is sure Venus will advance much farther at Wimbledon this time.

USA Network commentator Austin believes the pressure is now on Hingis with so many nipping at her heels. "Hingis is versatile and smart, still has an edge and can think her way out of a bad day," she says.

As a former teen tennis star herself, Austin doesn't expect this generation of young players to experience the burnout that she did. "These girls are so tall and strong, and they thrive on pressure," she says.

Austin may surprise some with her opinion that Serena, who blew a huge lead to Sanchez Vicario in Paris, will eventually emerge as the stronger of the Williams sisters. "Venus probably moves better, but in the end Serena might be more powerful. Both will be a huge force," she says. "One thing that impresses me is the two sisters are so close. They seem to care about each other so much. They're very supportive of each other. There's no jealousy."


Evert notes that Serena lacks experience, yet ranks her "right behind Venus in ability and stronger than Kournikova. But Martina (Hingis) is still No. 1."
