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## Fireworks, open flames banned in county and village

Some families traditionally celebrate the Fourth of July with fireworks, but in Lincoln County, with its extremely dry conditions, don't touch a match even to a sparkler.

"We'd like everyone to be aware of the danger of fire now and year after year at this time," said County Commission Chairman L. Ray Nunley. "It's not a question of if we'll have a major fire, but when. Even grassland can burn at a rate of 50 mph with a little wind behind it."

In response to the high fire risk,

commissioners passed a "no open flame" law that they said Monday includes fireworks and fire crackers.

The only legal fireworks for the holiday will be a display put on by the Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department at the lake on the community golf course about 35 miles northwest of Ruidoso.

Before the display, which will start at dark, children and adults who have fireworks can come to the staging area and light them under the supervision of the fire fighters.

But in the villages of Ruidoso, Capitan and Ruidoso Downs, and in the unincorporated portions of the

county, fire crackers and fireworks are illegal.

No open flames of any kind are allowed and cigarette ashes should be kept indoors or inside a car, not flicked out the window or patio, say officials representing those towns and the county.

If caught violating the laws passed to protect the towns and county from fires during the drought, a person could be fined up to \$500 per incident and sentenced to up to 90 days in jail.

Ruidoso code enforcement officer Thomas Chavez asked residents and visitors to report violators to the police

department.

Fireworks and fire crackers always are prohibited in the Lincoln National Forest, which surrounds Ruidoso. The danger of wildfire is so high this year, no campfires are allowed.

Fireworks also are prohibited on state forest lands controlled by the Public Land Office.

Gas grills that use propane, kerosene and similar fuels, however, are exceptions to the laws.

### ► Fire Restrictions

These include:

- No open flames or campfires
- Smoking prohibited in any public park or open forest
- Absolutely no fireworks
- No charcoal briquets (this includes public and private land)

## Two million gallons lost in line break

• Ruidoso's water conservation law jumps from its least restrictive level to serious condition level.

A main water line in Alto broke Monday night, spilling about two million gallons of treated water down the stream along Gavilan Canyon, Ruidoso Village Manager Alan Briley said Tuesday.

The loss of water from Ruidoso's two 5-million-gallon Alto tanks, which Briley said supply 60 to 75 percent of the village, comes just before the July 4 weekend.

The timing, said Briley, is terrible.

"It's the worst time (possible) except for two days before Jan. 1 (the peak water usage of the year for Ruidoso). This is our second or third highest usage weekend during the year," Briley said, adding that Labor Day is the other peak weekend.

Effective immediately, the village is going from Phase 1, the least restrictive level of its water conservation regulations, to Phase 3, when water resources are categorized as serious and outdoor watering is limited to four hours a week.

Under the plan, odd-numbered addresses may water 5-9 p.m. on Tuesdays. Even-numbered addresses may water 5-9 p.m. on Thursdays. Potted plants

Phase 3 — Serious conditions

Outdoor watering will be allowed only as follows:

- Odd-numbered addresses may water 5-9 p.m. on Tuesdays.
- Even-numbered addresses may water 5-9 p.m. on Thursdays.
- Potted plants may be watered by container at any time.
- Warnings will be given once, then citations will be issued.

## Donaldson announces mortgage broker as village council nominee

• Linda Flack, owner of Mortgage Pro, is up for council confirmation July 14.

Saying he never anticipated having to make two council appointments, Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson Tuesday night named Linda Flack, a local mortgage broker, as his choice to replace Ovella Estes on the council.

Estes, elected by a huge margin in March, died May 25 from complications of breast cancer.

On July 14, Flack's nomination will be up for confirmation by the Ruidoso Village Council.

"Of course, I knew that I would have to fill my seat, so I'd already given a lot of consideration to that event," Donaldson told the council.

"Ron (Anderson) has worked out better than I could have ever imagined. Now, because of the loss of Ovella Estes, I must go through the process again."

Donaldson said he chose Flack, owner of Mortgage Pro on Mechem Drive, because as the only female member of the council, she would represent the female constituency. Additionally, Flack has a connection to the community and has served Ruidoso both on village boards and in civic organizations, Donaldson said.

"Most of all, I want someone whose personal success is tied to Ruidoso's success," he said.

Flack, during a break in the council meeting, said Tuesday she was honored by the appointment.

"Ovella was a personal friend of mine as well as a business associate," Flack said. "And I can't replace her — she was one-of-a-kind."

However, she looked forward to working with the council, Flack said,

## Hearings on location of new county detention center will be this month

Hearings on selection of a site for a new Lincoln County jail will be conducted in Carrizozo and Ruidoso later this month.

The first will be at 6:30 p.m., Friday, July 24, in the commission room at the county courthouse in Carrizozo and the second at 6:30 p.m., Friday, July 31, at the Ruidoso Convention Center.

Carrizozo Mayor Manuel Hernandez reminded commissioners during a special meeting Monday of an offer from his town last March to give the commission a tract in the community's industrial park for the jail and court complex free and to provide water and sewer service, plus additional land for expansion and employee housing, if necessary.

Town officials also pledged to create a work release program and ensure that continuing education classes would be offered.

Hernandez pointed out it's important for the jail to be close to the sheriff's office and health clinic in Carrizozo in case of crises.

"Economically, Carrizozo is the only realistic choice for the benefit of taxpayers in Lincoln County," he said to applause from about two dozen people in the audience.

The chairman of a county jail advisory committee recommended a site closer to Ruidoso where most of the crime in the county occurs and to save transportation costs.

Chairman L. Ray Nunley said county attorney Alan Morel is preparing a response to the state fire inspector's recommendation that the existing 42-bed jail in Carrizozo be closed down.







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# Mescalero man drowns in Jose Second Lake

A 31-year-old Mescalero man drowned Saturday while partying with some friends and then attempting to swim twice across Jose Second Lake on the reservation.

The body of Rueben Dane Evans was recovered at 12:23 p.m. Sunday in about 12 feet of

water by a New Mexico State Police dive team.

Evans had been partying with friends at the lake two miles west of the Inn of the Mountain Gods resort when he decided about 9 p.m. to swim 125 yards across the lake, according to a report filed by

Sgt. Danny Kiper of the dive team out of Roswell.

When Evans reached the other side and got out, he decided to swim back, his friends said. About half way across, he disappeared beneath the water.

Apparently Evans was

overcome by the exertion and the effects of alcohol, Kiper reported.

The Mescalero Police requested help from the dive team, which arrived at the reservation about 8 a.m. Sunday.

# Judge says no paycheck for fired Downs clerk

Cathy Olshaskie had been working at Ruidoso Downs Village Hall since May without a paycheck. As of Monday, she stopped.

A district court judge on Friday ruled the village did not have to pay Olshaskie for the time she's put in since she was fired by the Ruidoso Downs Village Council in early May.

Though fired, she continued working because Mayor Joe Hayhurst filed a lawsuit against the council on May 8 and was trying to reinstate her, said a local attorney involved with the case.

Hayhurst, in the lawsuit contends the dismissal isn't valid because, he said, the council

did not follow proper policy. The lawsuit basically asks for a judge's opinion about whether the council properly dismissed Olshaskie.

It was to be heard May 22 in the 12th District Court of Karen Parsons. However, Parson had to excuse herself because she is the former law partner of Dan Bryant, Ruidoso Downs' village attorney.

Though Bryant gave village trustees legal advice during Olshaskie's dismissal, he is not representing either Hayhurst or the council in the lawsuit. To do so, he has said, would be a conflict of interest because he works for both the mayor and the council. Jeff Rhodes, an Alamogordo attorney, will represent the council, Bryant said. Rhodes could not be reached for comment Tuesday.

Robert Beauvais, Hayhurst's attorney, said he doesn't expect the trial to come to court anytime soon.

Because of the delay, Beauvais filed a motion for injunctive relief — basically to push the village into paying Olshaskie for time worked. Beauvais said the village would probably be compelled to pay her, especially if a judge eventually rules in favor of Hayhurst's suit.

On Friday, District Court Judge Jerry Ritter in Alamogordo ruled against the motion. His decision was based in part on the testimony from village trustees that Olshaskie's position did not have to be filled during the summer months, Beauvais said.

Trustees Margie Morales and Judy Miller said the staff at

village hall could operate adequately without someone in Olshaskie's position.

On Monday, Olshaskie did not come into work, a village employee said.

The council first fired her on April 27. However, the mayor, who had walked out of the closed session, refused to sign her termination notice the next day, saying the council had not followed village personnel policy.

The policy states that an probationary employee's supervisor first must recommend the dismissal, Hayhurst said. Village Clerk/Treasurer Leann Weibrecht, Olshaskie's supervisor, did not make that recommendation, he said.

The Downs council again fired Olshaskie on May 6, after first directing Weibrecht to recommend her dismissal.

adding that she would do her best to serve the community.

This is the second time Donaldson skipped over Ross Dingman as an appointee to the council. Dingman, a candidate in the March 3 elections, missed being elected by only a handful of votes.

Donaldson, during a break in Tuesday's council session, said he didn't select Dingman for the reasons he gave earlier for appointing Flack — that his choice was someone who would give the council a well-rounded representation of the community.

"There are a lot of different

opinions (about whom should be selected). One is that you take the next person in an election," Donaldson said, adding that he understood that perspective even though he didn't agree with it.

He supports Dingman, a retired college professor who with his wife Ginny Dingman attends virtually every council session and workshop, Donaldson said.

"That's one of the reasons I appointed Ross to the (Ruidoso) Planning and Zoning Commission," he said, adding that the commission is only just a step below the council and will serve to advance Dingman in the eye of the public.

Max Roberson, a friend of

Dingman's who is equally as active in the community, said he didn't know Flack and wasn't criticizing her appointment, but thought Donaldson should have selected Dingman.

"I called the mayor and told him I thought Ross should be considered," Roberson said. "He gave me the same reasons he gave tonight ... I can respect those but I still think Ross should have been the No. 1 consideration ... He is not in business and is not concerned with anything else but the welfare of Ruidoso."

Donaldson, during council session, urged residents to contact themselves or village councilors at Ruidoso Village Hall with comments about Flack's

appointment.

Flack moved to Ruidoso in 1978 and was owner/operator of Horseshoe Courts Motel until 1981, when she went into real estate. In 1986, she moved to El Paso to become a relocation director for several real estate companies, Donaldson said. She moved back to Ruidoso in 1994 to manage Mortgage Plus, and in 1995 became owner of Mortgage Pro. She has held positions with Boy Scouts of America, the Ruidoso Lodgers Tax Committee and the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission. She is a member of the Ruidoso Rotary Club, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Ruidoso Realtors Association.

may be watered at any time provided a hose is not used, Briley said.

The most restrictive level of Ruidoso's five-step water contingency plan prohibits any outside watering.

Briley said village police and fire fighters this week will travel neighborhoods and hand out brochures at home and businesses where people are watering to explain the restrictions.

According to the ordinance, first time offenders will receive warnings. Citations will be issued to repeat offenders. Mayor Robert Donaldson said village employees will be allowed to use their discretion in informing residents about the Phase 3 restrictions.

Donaldson echoed Briley's earlier comments, saying the line break happened at a very inopportune time, considering

both the holiday weekend and the extreme fire danger Ruidoso is under.

"It would take two days of no usage to bring us back to where we were. And, of course, that's not going to happen," Donaldson said.

If water lines need to be tapped to fight fires over the weekend, then residents will experience more drops in water pressure, Donaldson said.

Adding to the water shortage Tuesday, five smaller water lines in the village also broke, causing a loss of several thousands of gallons, Briley said.

One resident completely lost water Tuesday because of the main line's break, and residents at higher elevations complained about low water pressure, Briley said. No other homes than the one were expected to completely lose water, he said.

Nothing other than old age caused the Alto line to break,

Briley said.

Because the line runs water from the Alto water treatment plant to the two tanks, the plant was expected to be shut down for about 24 hours while the line was repaired, Briley said.

The line was fixed once at about noon Tuesday, but because of a leak had to be repaired again, Briley said.

The line should be completely repaired and the treatment plant was to be back on line by sometime Tuesday evening, he said.

"We've had welders out there since 2 (a.m.) last night and we still haven't fixed it," Briley told village councilors at 7 p.m. Tuesday.

Briley said the tanks should refill within two weeks following the holiday weekend. As of Tuesday evening, the tanks, which are still providing water to residents, were down to 18 feet, a trigger condition

for the village to go to Phase 5 in the water contingency plan, Briley said.

By enacting Phase 3 of the water contingency plan, village leaders said they hope the tank's water levels will rise enough today and Thursday to provide adequate water through the holiday weekend.

About two weeks ago, Alto Lake dropped to 3 feet below the Phase 3 benchmark line, Briley said.

Grindstone Lake is almost at Phase 3 conditions — 15 feet below the spillway, he said.

"Hopefully, we can get back to a Level 2 (water contingency plan) in the next week or the next two weeks at least," Briley said. "And, hopefully, we can go back to Level 1 if the monsoons hit."

Briley, addressing a rumor, stressed that the line break was mechanical and not a ruse by village leaders to conserve water for the holiday weekend.

# JAIL: Lincoln County could pay \$50 per day per prisoner to Otero County

A state inspector had cited several deficiencies at the jail and recommended it be closed within 30 days if they are not corrected. Nunley is trying to work out an arrangement with State Fire Marshal George Chavez whereby the county can compensate for some of the areas of noncompliance with fire codes until the new jail is completed in a year or two.

Meanwhile, Commissioners Wilton Howell and Monroy Montes met with Otero County Commissioner Richard Zierlein to arrange a price for that county to accept Lincoln County inmates, if the jail is closed.

He came up with \$50 a day per prisoner if Lincoln County guaranteed Otero County 25 beds would be filled for one year.

"My question is then what

happens to our facility here?" Montes said. "This is only one option I want to point out before we scare the people in Carrizozo."

Montes pointed out that Otero spent \$6 million for a jail with 250 beds and now it can't afford the staff or other expenses to operate the new jail.

"We have to be careful when we build not to over-build," Montes said.

Howell agreed, saying Otero opened its new jail just 30 days ago. Before the new jail was there, Otero was housing 93 inmates on average, but already the number from Otero had gone up to 141 inmates and only 20 being paid for by other counties.

"They have increased their non-paying population by 25 percent," Howell said. "The more beds, the more the judges will fill."

Howell said he would like to see judges become part of the

solution in developing work release programs and other options to keep the jail population under control. He said he would also like to see judges attend county budget workshops so that they could better understand the problem. Lincoln County's budget tripled in one year to nearly \$800,000.

Howell said judges also should show up in front of the state Legislature to ask for more money to pay for probation and parole violators in county jail. Instead of letting them sit for 30 days in county jail, they should be sent to the state prison.

Howell said he's tired of trying to solve the jail problem through budget adjustments at the expense of roads, senior citizens and children's recreation programs.

Updates on the consulting work being done on the jail for the county was postponed when no one from either Ray

Mitcham's office in Roswell or Parr Development in Albuquerque showed up for the meeting.

Although Chairman L. Ray Nunley wanted to table signing a contract with architect Mitcham as head of the consulting group on the jail's design, operation, construction and siting, a motion to sign by Commissioner Monroy Montes passed unanimously.

The approval is contingent on the consultants agreement to accept \$10,000, about half of what they originally discussed with the commission.

The next regular commission meeting will be 9 a.m. Tuesday, July 14, in Ruidoso Village Hall.

A special meeting for several hearings including projects for a Community Development Block Grant, will start at 9 a.m. Wednesday, July 23 also in village hall.

# The rites of womanhood live on in Mescalero traditions

Five Mescalero Apache maidens will go through their rite of passage into womanhood Thursday through Sunday at the ceremonial grounds in Mescalero as part of the community's Fourth of July celebration.

The puberty ceremony is one of the most enduring traditions of the Mescalero Apache Tribe.

Preparations begin months in advance and include the harvesting and roasting of the mescal plant from which the tribe received its name.

The mashed soft parts of the plant, which produces a fibrous, but sweet pulp, will be one of the dishes offered during the evening feasts put on by the families and sponsors of the young girls.

Much of the ceremony is private, starting with the confinement of the girls, but over the holiday weekend, the public is invited to join in the celebration, to receive a blessing, to watch portions of the ceremony, to enjoy dancers and partake of the feast.

However, cameras usually are not allowed on ceremonial grounds.

Holiday activities also include a parade at 10 a.m. Saturday from the road below the ceremonial grounds, along U.S. 70 to the community center, and a rodeo after the parade.

Participating in the puberty ceremony this year are:

• Mamie "Leicha" Carrillo, 14, the daughter of Johnny and Linda Carrillo Sr. The eighth grader at Ruidoso Middle-School has three brothers, Adam, John and Niko Carrillo.

Her maternal grandparents are Martin and Alva Her-

rera. Paternal grandparents are Lucas and Inez Carrillo Sr., all of Mescalero.

She is the great-granddaughter of Ismael and Teddy Beltran of Tularosa and of the late Roscoe Tortilla and Mamie LaPaz Tortilla, and the late Luke Carrillo and Martina Martinez. She is a descendant of San Juan.

Her hobbies are reading and making dream catchers. She is involved in the Indian Club and she plans on becoming a veterinarian.

• Gladys Marie Scott, 12, the daughter of Ross and Renalda Scott, who are sponsoring her. She is Mescalero, Lipan and Chiricahua Apache and attends Ruidoso Middle School in seventh grade, where her favorite subject is mathematics.

She wants to finish school, graduate from college and enter graduate school to become a physician.

She enjoys school and being with her family as well as playing basketball and going horseback riding with her two brothers and little sister.

Her maternal grandparents are the late John Zua Zua Sr. and Delphine Yahnahkie. Her paternal grandparents are the late Merle Scott and Myrtle Botella Scott. Her great-grandmothers are Helen Scott and Ethel Moskean and relatives Walter Scott and Cynthia Enjady. Her medicine woman is Zelda Yazza and her medicine man is Gary Comanche. Leon Botella's dance group will perform in her honor.

• Margaret Jane Shanta, 15, the daughter of David Shanta and Myra LaPaz. She was named after her grandmother, the late Margaret Jane Shanta. She is the granddaughter of the late Christie LaPaz and Elizabeth Guy-

delkon LaPaz. She is the great-great-granddaughter of Shanta Boy.

She has three sisters and one brother and is a sophomore at Ruidoso High School, where she has a 3.3 grade point average, has received the President's Award and has won a certificate of appliance award in speech. She plans to attend Arizona State University to study engineering.

• Rayleen Jeree Comanche, 12, the daughter of Sharon Kirgan and Wade Comanche. She has one brother, Waycey Comanche, and is in seventh grade at Mescalero Middle School.

Her grandparents are Raymond and Beverly Kirgan and the late Jerry and Marietta (Sago) Comanche. Her great-grandmothers are Bunch Pellman and Edna "Teepah" Comanche. Her sponsors will be Sherman Blaks and Lorraine Evans.

• Anjuana Enjady, 13, the daughter of Tommy and Angelita Enjady. The eighth-grade student at Mescalero Middle School enjoys roller hockey, football and basketball.

She is the granddaughter of Louis and Maxine Morgan and Stathan and Nancy Kiuzhuma. She is the great-granddaughter of Kenneth and Bertha Morgan Sr. and she is a descendant of Naiche.

A description of the coming of age ceremony given many years ago by Evelyn Pellman Breuninger, a member of the Mescalero Tribe, included the following information:

By tradition, the ceremony honoring the maidens begins at early dawn.

On the south side of the feast grounds, teepees have been put up for each of the maidens. They're flanked by a long arbor of oak brush, where cooking fires are kept burning

by the families of the girls.

The day before the ceremony, men of the families go into the forest to cut poles for the teepees. Medicine men go with them to bless the trees.

They continue to ask for the blessing of the Great Spirits on the girls, on the teepees and the friends, family members and other visitors.

The first four poles of the teepee, about 25 to 30 feet tall, still bear evergreen branches. They represent the four corners of the world.

Once the teepee is up and a pit has been dug for a fire, mothers and grandmothers come from the arbor and place canvasses, blankets and buckskins on the ground in front of the entrance.

The maidens come from their tents through the arbor and kneel on the buckskins facing their medicine men with their mothers/godmothers at their side.

In some instances, the girls and their mothers and sisters make the heavy ceremonial garment. Some may borrow from other families or relatives.

Pollen used in the ceremony for blessings will have been gathered from water plants,

not an easy task in the Southwest. After reciprocal blessings with the pollen by the godmothers of the girls and the girls to the godmothers, others may pass through the line for a blessing.

During the ceremony, the maidens are considered the embodiment of White Painted Woman, who gave the Apaches virtues, pleasant aspects of life and longevity.

While the blessing occurs, medicine men sing and shake rattles made from the hooves of deer. A ritual of massage follows for the girls.

Then the runs begin, but with each passing day, they become more difficult, because the maidens also have been dancing throughout the night. By the fourth day, the maidens usually are exhausted.

A medicine basket is placed in the area in front of the teepee.

It contains among other items eagle feathers, grama grass, pollen, red and white clay, all symbols that are important in Native American beliefs. A signal is given and the maiden runs toward the basket, around it and back.

The basket is moved to the east and then two more times

with runs. Then the maiden picks up the buckskin on which she has kneeled, shakes it toward the sun in a gesture of driving away evil spirits that may be near and to frighten off supernatural bearers of illness.

After one last shake, the maidens toss fruit, candies and other treats to the crowd while their friends also throw items to the crowd.

On the fourth day when the girls are painted, they mark their attendants and the medicine men.

Another blessing is given and another set of runs occur, but on the last run, instead of returning to the teepee, each girl grabs a feather from the basket and sprints eastward off the grounds.

The teepees are dismantled. Baskets of candy, fruit and other items are scattered among the crown and the feast is started.

Although for spectators the ceremony has ended, the girls must follow a strict regimen, wear their buckskin and avoid water for at least four more days to prove their worthiness of the privilege of womanhood.

His life spanned dramatic changes from horse and wagon transportation, dry land farming, and outdoor plumbing to


modern time of telephones and television.

## What to do in the heat of the moment

Don't, please, use the expression "hot as blazes" in Ruidoso for the foreseeable future.

The very idea, much less the fact, is frightening in this summer of soaring temperatures, high and dry winds, and people who just don't understand.

We've already recorded day after day of temperatures in the high 90s, flirting with 100, thanks to a huge area of high atmospheric pressure stalled over the Southwest.

Forget about the "cool pines of Ruidoso" for now; label those towering Ponderosas as the kindling for disaster, and the brittle grass beneath as the tinder to light the kindling.

A lighted cigarette tossed from a car window could start a firestorm that within hours might destroy most of Ruidoso, Alto and the Downs and the people in them.

If you're a new arrival, resident or visitor, be aware that some 7,000 acres of the neighboring Mescalero Apache Reservation was destroyed by fire two summers ago. Be aware that dozens of fires already have lit up New Mexico's forest this summer. Hundreds of residents and vacationers had to evacuate the threatened Angel Fire resort in northern New Mexico last week.

The July 4 holiday is coming, but there'll be no traditional fireworks in Lincoln County; all are forbidden, even the most innocuous. No open flames in the forest, and that includes the use of charcoal grills.

...And a potential water shortage hanging as a threat.

Such is the price we pay for living in a beautiful forest. Diligence must be the watchword for all who live in or visit our canyons and ridge-tops in the summer of '98, a season already expected to be one of the driest on record.

The U. S. Weather Bureau, delving deep into the mysteries of El Niño's cold-hearted sister, La Niña, has concluded that the monsoons that usually cool our homes (and tempers) in July and August could be delayed this year.

It doesn't help that most Ruidoso homes depend on cool breezes, not swamp coolers, to keep temperatures bearable. When the thermometer reads 96 degrees at 9 p.m., you know some folks will be losing their cool.

It doesn't help, either, that the miles of road construction that has turned Mechem Drive into an obstacle course could turn some sweating drivers into road warriors. (The cartoon on this page isn't all that far-fetched in Ruidoso right now.)

Please, everybody — resident, vacationer, July 4 holiday visitor — do something very important in the days ahead:

Think.

#### Fire alert important

To the editor:

Most of us in Ruidoso look forward to July 4 when the monsoon rains are due to arrive saving our parched lawns and eliminating the ever present danger of a forest fire.

However, all bets are off! The National Weather Bureau has recently stated that

the monsoon rains will probably be delayed. This delay means that we will face the possibility of a forest fire beyond July 4 for days, and perhaps weeks, to come.

This brings to bear an apparent failure of those responsible to wage an all-out campaign to warn our citizens and in, in particular, our visitors of the danger of a fire in the mountains. All it takes is one instance of a lighted cigarette thrown carelessly from an automobile or the use of fireworks.

Over the years and prior to the July 4 weekends everyone was made aware of the danger of a fire in Ruidoso. The Upper Canyon, with its high growth of pine trees, was pointed out as an example of how devastating a fire could be to the area and to the village itself. One can only imagine the time in years it would take to recover from a canyon fire.

Certain actions were taken in the past by the Village Administration, the Ruidoso News, television and radio, all pointing out the danger of a fire and its prevention.

Consider these causes of actions in the previous years:

1. Ruidoso fire department — a check of all fire hydrants to confirm availability of water and its pressure.
2. Maintain all storage tanks at maximum pressure

and capacity.

3. Ask Ruidoso homeowners to attach garden hoses to outside facets in case of need.

4. Investigate accumulation of trash, particularly in the Upper Canyon area.

5. Run ads in local newspaper, television, and radio regarding fire danger — continue, until rains arrive.

6. Village Administration to publish and restate ordinances regarding fire hazards with emphasis on fireworks.

7. Ask cabin operators to cover fire restrictions with each guest who may bring fireworks from Texas where they are allowed in some towns. Explain our law: *No fireworks!*

8. Since there appears to be only one exit, excluding Main Road, out of the Upper Canyon area, in the case of a fire, a map should be published showing the only exit if Main Road is not available for exit. *This is important!*

With fires raging in New Mexico, Florida, and Texas, federal help for Ruidoso in case of a fire may not be available.

*Fire prevention is a must!*  
Time is short — Action is needed now.

## It's time to resuscitate our healthcare system

Starting with a year of nursing, then a medic as draftee with some trimesters of what we would call "pre-med" in between, concluded by some time in a POW hospital, followed with a formal education in medical technology, work in laboratories for food, nutrition and drug surveillance and research, back to the school bank to get involved in microbiological things, concluded with a doctorate in natural sciences (biology and geology), followed by a time of teaching pharmacy students in pharmacognosy, and finally an invitation to establish an electron microscopy laboratory at Scripps Oceanography and then another in El Paso at William Beaumont Army Medical Center (20+ years)...

These are the credentials. Work in hospitals and laboratories abroad, teaching ultrastructural biology, and later in ultrastructural pathology in American universities and hospitals, teaching pathology residents in my field at the army hospital and the Texas Tech campus in El Paso, being exposed to the unreserved collegiality of my fellow physicians to the unlimited dedication of those whom I can proud-

ly call my colleagues...

This is my experience. Why all this? With all my experience I have the right to claim that what we are doing presently to healthcare in my beloved country is immoral and a fraud on the people. The whole system that was once based on the Hippocratic oath and the desire to heal and soothe the pain of the fellow man has been replaced by a system in which the physician is degraded to a "health care provider" who works under the curatelle of profit making.

Six years ago we were told by those who now cream off the profits from what they call "managed care" that in socialized medicine we would not have the choice of the doctor whom we like or trust. So, how is that now? We don't have socialized medicine and have managed care instead with still no choice of a physician to whom we can go.

Insurance companies try to divert patients from their trusted doctors and encourage the use of "preferred" physicians or to drop board certified physicians for lesser educated personnel. The physician, him or herself, is not anymore the trusted friend that we expect him/her to be but essentially an employee of those who suck out profits from those who are ill,

who need compassion instead.

The few physicians who have maintained their independence are true heroes today together with those who — despite everything — maintain their independent diagnostic and therapeutic decisions, opposing the corporate restrictions. Of course, they are in continuous danger to loose their income.

It is time for the American public, that is us, to take a hard look at what corporate America is doing to our healthcare system, which has been claimed to be the best in the world. We can do that quite soon at the next

elections. Let's get rid of those who brought us into that mess and elect those who are willing to establish a not-for-profit healthcare system.

There is a price to be paid: in doing so it will be necessary not to go with every minor problem to a doctor, or, if we must go, to carry the expenses ourselves. Major and catastrophic events should be carried by our insurance. The not-for-profit insurance system is — as I see it — the only way to regain the free professional healthcare intercourse between physician and patient.

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# County commission to stick with solid waste authority, for now

Although County Commissioner Mouroy Montes for the second time suggested the county should pull out of the Lincoln Solid Waste Authority, so far he hasn't received any support from other commissioners.

"We should consider Lincoln County collecting the garbage with a three-man crew of our own manpower," Montes said Monday during a special commission meeting. "It would be a money-maker for the county. If we don't, the revenue will go into the solid waste authority (to help support collection in small villages)."

Even if the authority collapses, it served an important function by making the county and its five municipalities partners in a regional landfill south of Alamogordo, he said. That resulted in lower dumping fees.

"We've shown over and over that the only part of the authority making money was the county," Montes said. "I asked the general manager to come up with a plan for after Ruidoso's departure, which is proposed for Sept. 1."

General Manager Jerry Wright told commissioners

when Ruidoso leaves, it will take 50 percent of the authority's revenues with it, but it also will relieve the authority of 72 percent of its expenses.

He's been told that 75 cents proposed to be collected for recycling from Ruidoso residents would be passed to the authority to keep its recycling program viable, Wright said.

That would only raise about \$32,000 a year, not nearly enough to cover the \$55,000 annual cost above revenues the authority pays to operate a recycling program, Wright said. He based the figure on 3,500 Ruidoso customers.

After Ruidoso leaves, he may recommend purchasing front end loaders, which also can serve polycarts used in Capitan and Ruidoso Downs, Wright said. One could be purchased with grant money, and another through the regular budget, Wright said.

He also pointed out that the authority serves land owned by the city of Alamogordo, the U.S. Forest Service and the Ruidoso Downs Racetrack.

Wright said he would be interested in using labor from county jail as is done in San Juan County to help keep costs down and improve

dumpster sites.

In other business, commissioners:

- Approved accepting \$50,000 from the state Legislature for bleachers, restrooms and other improvements at the county fairgrounds in Capitan, \$50,000 for other improvements to the fairgrounds, and \$25,000 for improvements to the Glencoe Rural Events Center.

- Tabled action on a joint powers agreement with the village of Ruidoso to house its prisoners in county jail until similar agreements can be presented for renewal from other villages. Commissioner Wilton Howell pointed out a jailer has the right to refuse to accept any inmate and suggested to keep the jail population at safe levels that probation violators be sent to Otero County and the bill for their care be sent to the state.

- Approved a plat (development design) already reviewed by the county planner and county attorney submitted by Wayne and Marion B. Stevens, who want to split a six-acre tract into four parcels on property near Ken Nosker on the way to Hondo Valley.

# The Disaster Report

*This is the fifth installment in an ongoing educational column to help inform residents how they can be prepared in case disaster strikes.*

Fire prevention, especially this time of year, should be on everyone's mind.

According to the National Interagency Fire Center, every year many families throughout the country unnecessarily lose their homes and possessions to wildland fire.

These losses can be minimized if homeowners take the time and trouble to become aware of safety measures to help protect their homes.

Some tips to help protect your home include maintaining a "defensible space:"

- Clean roof surfaces and gutters regularly to avoid accumulation of flammable materials.

- Remove portions of any tree extending within 10 feet of the flue opening of any stove or chimney.

- Maintain a screen constructed of non-flammable material over the flue opening of every chimney or stovepipe. Mesh openings of the screen should not exceed 1/2 inch.

- Shrubs should be spaced at least 15 feet apart.

- A fuel break should be maintained around all structures.

- Dispose of stove or fireplace ashes and charcoal briquettes only after soaking them in a metal pail of water for 24 hours.

- Store gasoline in an approved safety can away from occupied buildings.

- Propane tanks should be far enough away from buildings for valves to be shut off in case of fire. Keep area clear of flammable material.

- Garden hoses should be connected to outlets.

- Have fire tools handy such as: a ladder long enough to reach the roof, shovel, rake and bucket for water.

- Each home should have at least two different entrance and exit routes.

Some other tips include installing smoke detectors on each level of your home, especially near bedrooms. These should be tested monthly and batteries changed twice a year.

Teach family members how to use the fire extinguisher and show them where it is kept.

Wildfires often begin unnoticed. They spread quickly, igniting brush, trees and homes. Reduce your risk now - before wildfire strikes. Meet with your family to decide what to do and where to go if wildfires threaten the area.

Residents can practice wildfire safety by doing the following:

- Contact your local fire department, health department or forestry office for information on fire laws. Make sure that fire vehicles can get to your home. Clearly mark all driveway entrances and display your name and address.

- Report hazardous conditions that could cause a wildfire.

- Teach children about fire safety. Keep matches out of their reach.

- Post fire emergency telephone numbers.

- Plan several escape routes away from your home - by car and by foot.

- Talk to your neighbors about wildfire safety. Plan how the neighborhood could work together after a wildfire. Make a list of your neighbors' skills such as medical or technical. Create a network and consider those who have special needs such as the elderly or disabled or children who may be on their own if parents can't get home.

If you are warned that a wildfire is threatening your area, listen to your battery-operated radio for reports and evacuation information.

According to emergency management, back your car into the garage or park it in an open space facing the direction of escape. Shut doors and roll up windows. Leave the key in the ignition. Close garage doors and windows but leave them unlocked. Disconnect automobile garage door openers.

Confine pets to one room. Make plans to care for your pets in case you must evacuate.

Arrange temporary housing at a friend or relative's home outside the threatened area.

If advised to evacuate, do so immediately.

Wear protective clothing - sturdy shoes, cotton or woolen clothing, long pants, a long-sleeved shirt, gloves and handkerchief to protect your face.

Lock your doors and tell someone when you left and where you are going.

Choose a route away from the fire hazard. Watch for changes in the speed and direction of fire and smoke.

This ongoing column also has included a Disaster Supplies Calendar, which is intended to help prepare for disasters before they happen.

Using the calendar, people can assemble a disaster supplies kit in small steps over a five-month period. Check off items you gather each week. Remember to change and replace perishable supplies (such as food and water) every six months.

Set Insight, trained by Mac Millar, earned \$6,000 for the win and pushed his career earnings over the \$82,000 mark.



## County approves EMS/hospital contract

Reaffirming their satisfaction with the management of county volunteer ambulance services, Lincoln County Commissioners Monday voted to approve a new and consolidated contract with the Ruidoso EMS and Presbyterian Health-Care Services, which operates the county hospital in Ruidoso.

Commissioner Rex Wilson cast the only negative vote. After the meeting, he said he was uncomfortable approving a contract without confirming the exact amount of money involved. The agreement includes a \$24,000 management fee, but also provides that the county may have to pick up as much as \$61,000 in expenses if revenues from patient collections fall short of expenses.

Presbyterian officials may have seen the two consolidated contracts, but have not approved it yet, said Jim Stover, who heads Ruidoso EMS. One of the original contracts signed in June 1997 dealt with providing service to Alto and the other signed six months later with the supervision of all other volunteer

ambulance groups in unincorporated portions of the county and Corona. The previous agreements expired June 30.

Commissioner Monroy Montes offered the motion to approve the contract and send it back to Presbyterian.

Stover said his group will be responsible for maintaining equipment. Part of the equipment update will be included in the \$85,000 awarded by the commission for capital outlay in the 1998-99 budget. He had requested \$100,000.

The Ruidoso EMS covers Mesalero under a separate agreement, not under the county contract, he said. But the service would respond into Torrance County, Socorro County or Otero County if called. However, the hospital would bill for the service rendered, Stover said.

"We don't want to get into a situation where we say that's the county line and we don't go over it," he said.

Reporting on what he has accomplished since taking over, Stover said six people have graduated from the emergency medical technician program that was taken to the Corona community instead of requir-

ing participants to drive to another town to take the course. The county instead of participants also now pays for the program.

"We have a good group," Stover said. "Instead of Vaughn having to help us all the time, we'll be able to help them."

With Sheriff Tom Sullivan's permission, he also had an expert with Advanced Communication, a Motorola group based in Albuquerque, check the radio equipment in dispatch.

In a related matter, commissioners in a 3-2 vote decided to reappoint Kathy Williams, who works at the Carrizozo Health Clinic, to the Eastern New Mexico EMS Region III Board of Directors.

Commissioner Wilton Howell proposed appointing Stover, because he is coordinator of all county ambulance services and would be in a better position to know what was needed in the county. But Commissioner Rex Wilson said Williams has done a good job securing grants for the county through the board. He was supported by Commissioner William Schwettmann and Chairman L. Ray Nunley.

#### Candidates for DWI program selected

Four candidates for Lincoln County DWI program coordinator have been selected to be interviewed for the job out of 11 applicants.

Acting county manager Martha Guevara, who will make the hiring decision, said Tuesday the interviews were expected to be conducted that evening in the Ruidoso office of county attorney Alan Morel. She'd like to have a new director on board right away since the new grant period starts today.

- The finalists were:
- Glen Leonig from Alamogordo, who has a bachelors in human resources, has operated a therapy center and worked on contract in community corrections in Otero County.
  - Richard Kloepfel, a two-term former state legislator, who attended the University of New Mexico and currently is a jockey agent in Ruidoso.
  - Lawrence Wimbrow from Ruidoso, who has a bachelor's in sociology and two years of study in criminal justice.

Charlie White, who has served as director of the DWI program since it was created, but was criticized when he and probation supervisor Terry Gammage accepted more pay than budgeted, causing the program to run out of money early. However, they received permission from the labor department to work out the remainder of the contract year, which ended June 30, without pay.

White previously was Carrizozo police chief, he has 13 years in computer science and more than 1,200 hours of study in criminal justice.

#### Construction concrete could be sold to county

Piles of broken concrete left behind as the state tears up roads leading into Ruidoso may be purchased by the Lincoln County road department to be recycled into a surfacing material.

Commissioner Wilton Howell suggested during a special meeting Monday that road foreman Albert Hernandez check on the material price, transportation and storage costs.

Hernandez said when older asphalt is ground up it works better than newer material. It may be useful for patching holes on Gavilan Canyon Road, he said.

The state would sell the material for \$4 a ton, which is less expensive than buying the base course usually applied by the county.

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
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

A page in the life of a lover of books who happens to have a store

Instead of a television, Dick Thompson has 15,000 books.

"There are very few of these books that I have not read once, twice, thrice or quattro," said Thompson, who often can be seen sitting, even on winter days, in front of his store with a book in hand.

The owner of the Quartermaster Rare Book Store, Thompson has no interest in television, he hasn't had one in 20 years, and doesn't even want a telephone.

Books and the occasional visitor are enough for him, says Thompson, a former Texas business owner who moved to Ruidoso about five years ago. He lives in back of the store on Sudderth Drive, located one building away from the Ruidoso State Bank.

Though he's only had a book store for a few years, Thompson has been in the book buying and selling business for about 45 years, though not for financial gain.

"Nobody makes a living selling books, nobody," said Thompson.

He purchased most of his books not with an eye to merchandising but because he wanted to read them, Thompson said.

In fact, as a collector, he has spent as much as \$1,000 on a book if the attraction was strong enough, as was the case with a 1935 non-fiction accounting of a 19th Century military action in Texas.

"And I thought it was a tremendous buy," Thompson said. "A collector, if he or she finds what they want, they will pay any price."

Dick Thomas, bookstore owner, was able to purchase the books he wanted, sometimes at the chagrin of his four former wives, because he had several sources of income.

"Well, I had several businesses," Thompson said. "I was in the wholesale tire business for many, many years in San Antonio (Texas). And I was in

the oil business."

He used the historical books he purchased as references for his own.

Thompson, who has a degree in history as well as master's degrees in both physics and biochemistry, has published four books, all of which are non-fiction historical accountings.

His favorite, which took him eight years to write, is "Crossing the Border with the Fourth Cavalry: Mackenzie's Raid into Mexico."

The book was published in 1986 and is now out of publication, but Thompson has a few copies left that he would be willing to part with at \$75 each, he said.


After spending decades collecting books and military artifacts, Thompson is ready to "get rid of it all," he said. He parted with the majority of his collection of military artifacts, though a few pieces remain, he said.

Not too long ago he even sold a book he had held onto for 20 years — a 1739 first edition of John Milton's "Paradise Lost." Thompson declined to say how much he sold the book for, only that he didn't sell it locally. Valuable books aren't valuable unless there's a buyer. Many people don't seem to understand that, he said.

"So many people bring in a book that was great-granddaddy's and great-grandmother's and it's not worth 10 cents," Thompson said.

"Most people don't recognize what a rare book is," he said. "It's predicted by four things. Number one, is it a first edition? Number two, is it out of print? Number three, of course, there has to be a demand for it. And number four, it has to be in pristine condition."

He's happy to assess a book's value, but he will charge

Dean's List students have earned between a 3.5 and 3.99 GPA and were enrolled in a minimum of 12 hours with no grade lower than a C.

**Taos County woman third case of plague in New Mexico**

The Scientific Laboratory Division of the New Mexico Department of Health has confirmed plague in a 40-year-old woman from Taos County. The patient, who is the third confirmed case of the disease in New Mexico this year, is doing well and is expected to recover completely.

"Even though she wasn't as ill as would be expected, this patient had plague bacteria in the bloodstream and had findings suggestive of pneumonic plague," said Dr. David Keller, director of the Department of Health's Infectious Disease Epidemiology Program.

"Because of the possibility of transmission of the bacteria to others through coughing, we have recommended that people we identified as having close

contact with this patient take antibiotics to prevent plague."

The source of the patient's infection is unclear at present, but exposure to infected rodents or their fleas is suspected.

An investigation at the home of the patient is being conducted by the Vector Control Program of the New Mexico Environment Department. Because of large numbers of rodents in the state this summer, health officials are braced for more cases of the plague.

"There continues to be a large plague outbreak going on in rodent populations over a large geographic area of northern New Mexico, and this is reflected in the fact that we have already had 25 confirmed cases in cats and three in

dogs," said Public Health Veterinarian Dr. Paul Ettestad. He noted that animal cases have occurred in San Juan, Rio Arriba and Santa Fe Counties and have all been in pets that are allowed to roam and hunt.

Plague, a bacterial disease of rodents, is general transmitted to humans through the bites of infected fleas, but can also be transmitted by direct contact with infected animals, including rodents, wildlife and pets.

Most people become ill two to seven days after being infected with the plague bacteria.

Plague symptoms in humans include fever, painful swollen lymph nodes in the groin, armpit or neck areas, chills and sometimes headache,

vomiting and diarrhea.

Symptoms in cats are similar with fever, lethargy, not eating, and swollen lymph nodes (usually in the neck area) being the most common signs.

With prompt diagnosis and appropriate antibiotic treatment, the fatality rate in people and pets can be greatly reduced.

To prevent further cases of plague, both the Department of Health and the New Mexico Environment Department recommend avoiding sick or dead rodents, not allowing children to play near rodent nests or burrows, regular flea treatment for pets by dusting with an effective flea powder, wearing gloves when skinning animals, cleaning up areas near the house where rodents could

live, and preventing pets from roaming and hunting whenever possible. People with sick outdoor pets - particularly cats - should have those animals examined promptly by a veterinarian.

The first two cases of human plague this year were in a 45-year-old and a 60-year-old woman, both from different locations in Santa Fe; both recovered.

There were no human cases of plague in New Mexico last year but in 1996 there were two cases from Bernalillo County; both patients recovered from their infections after treatment with antibiotics.

The last plague fatality in New Mexico was in 1994 in an 8-year-old boy from Rio Arriba County.

**4-H'ers learn the art of horse racing**

For the first time in its 17-year history, the New Mexico State 4-H Club's annual horsemanship symposium included a segment on the sport of horse racing.

The Suzanne Norton Jones 4-H Horse School, named after one of the nation's most respected equestrian teachers, invited Scott Wells, former race horse trainer and director of public relations at the Museum of the Horse, to instruct three classes in the art of horse racing.

It was Suzanne Jones herself, a member of one of New Mexico's most successful racing families, who suggested the addition to the curriculum. The 190 youths who attended the two-day program as representatives of their local clubs were accompanied by 40 adult instructors and chaperones.

The event is held annually

at the New Mexico State Fairgrounds in Albuquerque. Various levels and styles of riding were taught at the workshops, as well as skills such as halter making, packing pack saddles, horse nutrition, and horseback games for the youngsters.

"We teach horsemanship at the school, not competition," Jones said. "The kids spend a good part of the year competing against each other in horse shows and rodeos, so we think it's important to get them to take some time to get back to the basics. I've had parents tell me that they can look out in a pasture and spot their children who have attended this school as opposed to the ones who haven't just by the way they ride. We thought it was about time that our youngsters realized that the sport and business of horse racing is just as dependent upon good solid

horsemanship as any other equestrian event."

During the seminars, Wells, a member of the AQHA Racing/Youth Joint Task Force, explained early race horse schooling, leg care, comparative conformation analysis, racing equipment and various training techniques.

He also distributed posters, pamphlets, conformation charts and study materials supplied by the AQHA.

"I never had so much fun," Wells said. "The kids were so attentive and so sharp it was amazing. The questions they asked showed just how well-schooled they already are in terms of their general horsemanship. And some of them had a pretty impressive backlog of knowledge about horse racing."

Mendez is one of more than 5,000 sailors and marines aboard the ship, which departed its base of Yokosuka, Japan in February to lead the USS Independence Battle Group. Mendez's ship was deployed to

the Arabian Gulf to support Operation Southern Watch, enforcing U.N. sanctions levied against Iraq after the Gulf War.

The 1993 graduate of Ruidoso High School joined the Navy in September 1993.

**Ruidoso resident completes Navy training**

Navy Fireman Apprentice Austin C. Hampton, a 1997 graduate of Ruidoso High School, recently completed Navy basic training at Recruit Training Command, Great Lakes, Ill.

# All About Gulls

When we go to the beach or visit a harbor, we often see many "sea" gulls. There are about 45 different kinds of gulls. There are herring gulls, California gulls and ring-billed gulls, to name a few.

Even though gulls have webbed feet and can swim well, they rarely go far out to sea. Many might follow boats in hopes of getting food, but most of these birds don't fly out very far.

Gulls can also be found inland near rivers and lakes. The number of gulls is growing because many have discovered that garbage dumps are very good sources of food!



The adult ring-billed gull has a black ring on its yellow bill. This gull is very common, especially inland.



### Flying

Gulls may fly more than 100 miles a day while going between their feeding and nesting sites. They depend on their long wings to catch drafts. They also glide a lot.

Large flocks of gulls have become a problem when they've roosted near airports and crashed into planes.

### Feeding

Gulls usually follow the coastal shores in search of food.

Often they pick up an oyster or clam, fly up high, and drop the shell to the ground to smash it open.

Gulls catch much of their own food, such as fish, clams and worms. They will eat animals such as rats and rabbits. Often gulls eat the eggs and young of other birds.

You might have seen gulls eating picnic scraps or pieces of bread people have tossed into the air. Many gulls follow

farmers as they plow the fields. Gulls eat the worms, insects and mice the plow brings up. They will eat wheat and grain.

They also find food by scavenging, or eating dead fish and scraps. This ability to scavenge is why they have adjusted so well to dumps and waste sites.

Gulls help humans and the environment by cleaning up dead animals and garbage.

Gulls can drink salt water as well as fresh. They have special glands in their heads to get rid of the extra salt.

# Gull Family Members

### Nesting

Most gulls build their nests on the ground near water. Some build nests on cliffs or in trees. A few even build on rooftops and chimney stacks.

Both parents help hatch the eggs and feed the chicks. Females usually lay two or three eggs once a year.

After the breeding season, each mate goes its own way until it is again ready to breed. Gulls often meet their same mates and breed at the same nesting spot every year.

Gulls do not have nests when they are not breeding, but roost near food sources on offshore islands or sandbars.

### The Utah state bird

In 1848, groups of settlers in what is now Utah had just planted their first crops. They had little food left and

were hundreds of miles from any place they could buy more. They desperately needed the food from their new crops.

Then a real-life nightmare struck. Millions of grasshoppers swarmed onto their fields and began destroying their crops.

Just in time, a huge flock of gulls flew from the Great Salt Lake and ate the insects. The gulls saved the settlers' food, and probably their lives. The settlers believed the coming of the gulls was a miracle.

The sea gull is the state bird of Utah. It is honored by a monument in Salt Lake City.

### Meet the tern

Terns are close relatives of gulls.


Terns are generally smaller and slimmer than gulls. Terns fly with their bills and heads pointed down. Gulls fly with their bills pointed forward.

Terns are more graceful than gulls. They are called "sea swallows."

Terns eat only the fish they catch. They are not the scavengers that gulls are.

Terns dive for their food. Gulls usually land on the water to feed.

Some terns have forked tails. Most gulls do not.



The common tern has a black-tipped orange bill, a split tail and a black cap.

### Meet the pelican

Pelicans are distant cousins of gulls. They have long bills and sagging

throats. They are excellent fliers. Some fly hundreds of miles a day in search of food.

Pelicans eat mostly fish. They use their throat pouches as nets. They can scoop up as much as two gallons of water. They swallow the fish soon after they catch them.

Pelicans like to be together. They fly, roost, feed and breed in groups. When pelicans fly in a group, they will follow the leader in a line.

Pelicans can live long lives of up to 25 years. One pelican in a zoo lived to be 54 years old!





During 1993, a hantavirus was identified in New Mexico and throughout the United States. The virus causes Hantavirus Pulmonary Syndrome (HPS) and is transmitted by the Deer Mouse, the Cotton Rat, and other rodents. While the chances of people getting this disease are very low, the consequences of the disease are very serious. Major symptoms may not appear until the illness becomes life threatening, and more than 50 percent of the patients who have gotten the disease have died. There is no specific treatment or vaccination available. Doctors and other scientific experts discuss the most up-to-date facts known about the disease, including symptoms, transmission, risk factors, treatment, and prevention. Produced by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, the program also suggests that because of El Nino, the number of rodents will increase this year, thus increasing the number of cases. The prevention steps outlined in this program are considered the best remedy for avoiding the deadly disease.

## Real-life Airport somewhere between comedy and disaster

It probably arrived in the United States via a flight from Heathrow.

That's one of the ironies of *Airport*, a summer-light three-part documentary scheduled for arrival on PBS Thursdays beginning July 9 (check local listings). Produced in 1996 by the BBC, the film's broadcast "master" copy for PBS' use in the United States was most likely shipped through London's Heathrow Airport, the world's busiest international terminus.

A lot of other things pass through Heathrow, too: a daily shipment of live eels, for example. Drug smuggling is a popular sport, and customs officers Cath Hall and Garth Powell spend their days checking for contraband.

Then there is the human freight. From the Queen and Mick Jagger to the humblest commoner, most pass through Heathrow on their way to somewhere else. Only the plainly drunk or disoriented are turned away.

The camera tags along as Anita Newcourt ushers the world's royalty through the airport's VIP entrance.

Newcourt attends to every detail, from tea and faxes to squishy red carpets on wet tarmac.

President Clinton, the Duchess of York and the Sultan of Brunei merit Newcourt's attentions, while rock stars and archbishops go through the main terminal.

They are greeted by Fleet Street paparazzo Dennis Stone, on hand with flash strobe at any hour, doing a job even he seems to despise.

Heathrow's trouble-shooters include policeman Dave Kidd, security agent Jean-Marie Lavaillard and dispatcher Viv Eggins. Each is a study in patience as passengers vent their frustrations with flight delays, lost relatives, stuck elevators and the like.

*Airport* also follows the progress of 14 flight-attendant trainees and a group attending a "fear of flying" course.

The realism is nerve-jangling at times, but *Airport* gives a faithful rendering of events from the intersection of pathos and folly — the exact spot where the mundane task meets the photo opportunity. Then, like everything else at Heathrow, it moves on.

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

## Linkletter reveals how he got kids to say darndest things

Bill Cosby may be the current host of the CBS Friday hit *Kids Say the Darndest Things*, but Art Linkletter first made that discovery more than half a century ago after recording a chat with his then-little son, Jack.

In the late 1930s, Linkletter, at the time the host of a big-band radio program, played a recording of a conversation with Jack for his listeners. The switchboard lit up with calls.

As the 85-year-old TV personality remembers it, "I told my wife, 'Honey, I'm the star and you're the producer.' Four kids later, we turned to the public school system."

The schools Linkletter refers to were the source of the children who appeared on *Art Linkletter's House Party*, the CBS hit that aired from 1952 to 1969.

The program featured a short daily segment in which the host chatted with children from Los Angeles schools.

"I wouldn't ask the teachers for their best or their smartest students," Linkletter says with a chuckle. "I would tell them to give me the student from whom they would love a few blessed hours of relief."

Even the chattiest kids could be intimidated by the lights, cameras and audience, Linkletter explains. "And a kid who is kind of shy would be under the chair entirely. So we went with the children who almost couldn't shut up."

Linkletter's show would send a stretch limousine to pick up the children and bring them to the studio.

En route, a school chaperon would eavesdrop on the conversation and try to scribble notes for Linkletter, such as, "Billy recently got a new dog."

Even so, the kids were unpredictable on camera.

"Sometimes I'd ask that kid, 'So, any new animals in your life?' and he'd look blank and go, 'No.' Either he forgot or didn't want to talk about it or he had just made the story up in

the car," Linkletter recalls.

One thing he learned very quickly was never to ask a child a question that could be answered with a simple yes or no, because usually that's all you would get, Linkletter says. "It was better to ask questions like 'What do you think about this?' or 'What kind of animal would you like to be, and why?'"

One little girl answered Linkletter's animal question by saying she wanted to be an octopus, so she could grab all the bad boys in the class with her "testicles" (she meant tentacles).

"I asked one little boy what he had done over the summer, and he said he had been in the hospital," Linkletter recalls. "I said, 'I'm sorry. What was wrong?' The little boy replied, 'Oh, I got circumcised.'"

Linkletter says today's children, starting at about age 8, are more sophisticated than earlier generations, but youngsters of 5 and 6 retain the simple perspective they've always had.

"Their world is their family, and they have the most wonderful way of expressing themselves," he says. "A little boy once asked me how old I was. I told him, and he asked, 'How high do you want to go?'"

"That's what I mean," the octogenarian concludes. "And they say things like that all the time."


