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Census 2000 – counting people means more jobs

The first step in the Census 2000 population count in Lincoln County will be a physical check of every address possible starting this year.

That assignment will create 46 local jobs paying from \$7.25 to \$8.75 an hour to attract applicants knowledgeable enough about the county to put together a realistic population figure, says Joseph Sandoval of the U.S. Census Bureau.

The count is important because it will determine eligibility for grants and impact the amount of money the county receives for numerous programs including senior citizens groups, he told county commissioners Tuesday.

"We're starting the census now by doing

address listings," Sandoval said. "In 1990, New Mexico was the state with (the worst) undercount. We're hiring locals to physically drive the roads in the county to ensure that doesn't happen again."

All but the northern section of the county, which is sparsely populated, will be covered. The bureau can't afford to physically cover that large area with so few homes, he said.

After the data is collected, it will be reviewed with the county to make sure the bureau has included the major subdivisions and growth areas, Sandoval said. The group also will be working with the post offices.

"And for the first time, someone can call and respond to the census," he said. "Forms also will be available around the county at senior citizen centers, the hospital, convenience stores and the commission office in Carrizozo."

Or they can be mailed in. Staff also will be available to help answer questions about properly filling out the forms, he said.

"We're going to be able to catch duplications with our new technology," Sandoval said.

To fill the 46 jobs, he doesn't want seasonal residents or newcomers.

"I want those who are invested in the county," he said. "You need to get your people out there. People who realize the impact. It's your base for the next 10 years. The better the house count, the better the census."

Those hired also will be paid 31 cents a mile, Sandoval said. Three or four crew leaders will receive the higher hourly amount of \$8.75. He asked for the commission's help in finding people to fill the jobs and for commissioners to set aside space for them to be trained.

"Start sending them now to the local employ-

ment office or they can call 1-888-325-7733," he said.

He'd like to see retired road or water department workers on the "complete count committee" that would oversee this initial effort and come up with plans on how to implement the 2000 count and mount campaigns to urge people to respond. Committee members and the coordinator – the liaison and central contact point – would be unpaid volunteers, Sandoval said.

Commissioner William Schwettmann suggested using a senior citizens group or an organization such as Rotary or the Lions to head the project.

Sandoval said areas where low counts have hurt the county in the past are:

County responds to jail hazards

Lincoln County Commissioners hope their response to a warning about fire and safety code hazards at the existing county jail in Carrizozo will keep the detention center open until a new jail is built.

They unanimously approved a 12-page unanimous assembly by County Attorney Alan Morel Tuesday. State Fire Marshal George Chavez gave the county until July 22 to answer why the commission has failed to comply with about 20 life safety codes.

Chairman L. Ray Nunley said Chavez was irritated when he arrived at the state office in Santa Fe last week with Commissioner Rex Wilson, because the county had not responded to a similar letter sent nearly a year ago.

Nunley said he was unaware of any previous letter, but Commissioner William Schwettmann said he saw a response that was to be sent to the state at that time.

One of the issues raised by Chavez was that all potential fire ignition points must be eliminated. That might mean the jail kitchen would have to be closed, Nunley said. If that happens, he has arranged with the Zia Senior Citizens Center to use that kitchen to cook meals, he said.

The biggest hit – about \$100,000 a year – could be a requirement for a minimum of three employees in the jail at all times.

In the response, Morel outlined staff added during the last year by the county and asked Chavez to consider a new audio-video surveillance system recently installed at the jail when setting the minimum number.

The response also contains steps the county has taken toward building a new jail with an estimated completion date of Dec. 31, 1999.

Nunley noted that the date is not a guarantee, but a projection. Commissioners haven't yet selected a site, but have hired a consulting firm.

In a related matter, commissioners approved agreements with the villages of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan and Carrizozo to house their prisoners for \$50 a day in the jail on a space available basis.

Reflections on the tragedy

Assessing the real cost of arson

• *Causing more than fire and smoke damage, the arson fire at Ruidoso High School took from students their artwork and their opportunities for art education, community members say.*

Karen Reeder carefully aligned a pencil drawing in the paper cutter before trimming away one of three scorched sides.

"It's a mystery to me," said the petite art teacher at Ruidoso High School, lifting the arm of the paper cutter and reaching for another burned piece of artwork.

Standing on the soot-covered floor of an art classroom that still reeked of smoke, Reeder last week worked to save some of her students' artwork damaged in the arson fire set June 10.

While trimming the pieces, some of which were to be entered in the state fair in September, Reeder ruminated about why someone would enter the school's fine arts building, force open the door to her classroom, force open

the door to her storage room, and pour linseed oil about the room before igniting it.

"I've thought about it a lot," Reeder said. "I feel like it had to be somebody who knew what was in there because they went to so much trouble to break in."

The storage room is where Reeder kept 20 years of student artwork as well as her own work. She also kept valuable equipment in the room, such as a month-old computer printer and copier machine. None of the equipment was taken, though it was destroyed by the fire. Because nothing was taken, police investigators say a student is probably not the arsonist.

Reeder's statements echoed investigators' conclusions.

"I don't know of any student that is that angry with me," Reeder said with a rueful laugh. "But if it's someone that I failed, most of them know that they failed 'cause they just didn't do anything. You really have to work hard to fail art. And I can't think that it's anyone that I just made angry."

The storage room door was closed

after the fire was started and flames contained to the single room, but smoke filled the entire building, causing damage that is estimated to cost hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Principal Ron Hodges last week said damage from the fire could reach the \$700,000 mark cited earlier by fire officials depending on whether the smoke-permeated ceiling tiles and floor coverings could be cleaned or would have to be replaced.

Ruidoso police Lt. Wolf Born this week said evidence from the fire had been collected and is being processed. Depending on the outcome, an arrest warrant soon may be issued for a suspect in the arson, he said.

Reeder said the school's insurance company has been very cooperative and is replacing equipment and school property. Her own insurance company, through a homeowners policy, will cover some of her personal items kept in the storage room.

"So that part is going really good. It's things like the students art work

Restrictions on water at lowest level

• *Homes and businesses may water outside on alternate days.*

Ruidoso's water conservation ordinance on Tuesday dropped to its lowest level of restrictions, Village Manager Alan Briley said.

Under the Phase 1 of Ruidoso water contingency plan, homes and businesses may water outside on alternate days — odd-numbered days for people with odd-numbered addresses, and even-numbered days for people with even-numbered addresses.

Two weeks ago, the village went to Phase 3 of the water contingency plan, which is triggered when water supplies reach serious conditions. One gauge of those conditions is the water level in the village's two 5-million-gallon tanks in Alto.

Briley said as of Tuesday water in the tanks, which provide water to the majority of residents and businesses, had risen to 51 feet. Based on village law, at least 50 feet of water must be in the two Alto tanks before the village may go to Phase 1.

The tanks' water level had dropped to 18 feet in late June when a main water line between the Alto water processing plant and the tanks broke, village officials said.

The tanks have since recovered, largely because people haven't been watering outside, village officials have said. Outside watering has been unnecessary because of almost daily rainfall since July 2.

Mayor Robert Donaldson recently said officials think the main water line may have been leaking for some time before it broke completely at about 7:30 p.m. on June 29. That reasoning, said Donaldson, is based on the speed at which the Alto water tanks recovered after the line was repaired despite the July 4th weekend — one of the heaviest water usage weekends of the year.

Briley said water levels in both Alto and Grindstone lakes, which are also used as gauges of the village's water resources, continue to drop. Last week, Briley said Alto Lake was down two feet from the Phase 1 benchmark.



"Most of all, I want someone whose personal success is tied to Ruidoso's success," Donaldson said in June.

Flack moved to Ruidoso in 1978.

Ruidoso mayor pushes for changes in ETZ

Before more money and time is spent by Ruidoso to update the law governing a one-mile extra-territorial district around Ruidoso, Lincoln County Commissioners need to agree in concept with five key points, Mayor Robert Donaldson said Tuesday.

"If we can get an O.K. on these major points, we can go ahead with a draft," he told commissioners during a county meeting in village hall.

The points include that the village staff would be responsible for code enforcement and that the process of handling applications would be simplified. The county has no zoning

law and no code enforcement officer, although it does have a planning board and subdivision regulations. The revised ordinance essentially would be a watered down version of the village's zoning law, Donaldson said.

The extra-territorial zoning district (ETZ) was formed to give Ruidoso input on developments that may someday be annexed into the village. The ETZ Commission has seven members, three each from the county and village and one chosen by the other members. The board makes recommendations to the ETZ Authority on changes in zoning and related issues. The authority is composed of two county commissioners

(currently Commissioners Wilton Howell and Monroy Montes) and one village council representative (Donaldson).

One of the points for consensus would limit ETZ Authority involvement to appeals of disputed decisions by the ETZ Commission. Otherwise, decisions of the ETZ Commission would be final.

Once the village has an agreement with the county commission, the county can schedule a hearing for public input, something Howell insisted should be done.

"We get our direction from the people," he said. "If you need to get that direction, fine, but the village doesn't have to do that until there is a draft," Donaldson said.

County Attorney Alan

Morel agreed a hearing should be conducted only after there is a proposed ordinance for people to react to and suggest changes.

"Going down the same track as we are now is not an alternative," Donaldson said, adding that if the county isn't interested in gaining control of the area, it may be time to break up the ETZ arrangement.

The existing ordinance was written in 1982 and is outdated. It doesn't refer to situations that are common today, such as parking of recreational vehicles. The two boards spend most of their time trying to avoid lawsuits instead of protecting the county and village, Donaldson said.

Commission to look for new county manager

Lincoln County needs more than just a new county manager. It needs a purchasing agent to centralize buying and to track orders and payments, county commissioners said Tuesday.

Chairman L. Ray Nunley said it's time for the county to look for a new manager, although he commended acting manager Martha Guevara for handling the job so well since the former manager was fired last April.

Commissioner Monroy Montes pointed out that last May, commissioners agreed a purchasing agent was needed to avoid being cited every year in

the annual audit for purchasing problems.

"I'd like to consider two separate employees," Montes said. "The last two managers have proven the manager can't be asked to be both."

A purchasing agent probably would save the county more money than the salary he or she collects, Nunley said, but he added the position should carry more responsibilities than just purchases.

County Attorney Alan Morel said he could combine job descriptions for a purchasing agent and a director of personnel, but added that normally the manager is personnel director.

"We've had enough of 'normally,'" Commissioner Wilton

Howell said.

Commissioner Rex Wilson said he'd prefer to hire a county manager and then discuss a job description for a purchasing agent or other duties the new manager may need to have filled.

But Montes offered a motion to advertise for applicants for the two positions for 30 days and if no one applied, to hire one.

"We don't have to hire anyone," Nunley said.

"Let's just see what's out there," Howell agreed.

Morel said a county manager serves at the will of the commissioners, but a purchasing agent and personnel manager probably would have to be a "classified" employee subject to

county rules on hiring and firing.

"We could call it a special projects coordinator and keep it unclassified," Montes said.

No salary figures were specified for the two positions, but Nunley said he's thinking about \$28,000 for the purchasing agent and \$38,000 for a county manager.

Capitan resident Ed J. Fouratt said the county should offer \$65,000 to \$70,000 if commissioners want a professional manager who can do the job.

He also warned that putting someone on contract may mean they will later have to buy out part of the term if the arrangement doesn't work.

Museum of the Horse makes bid to run Glencoe Events Center

Only one management proposal was received by the Lincoln County Commission for the Rural Events Center at Glencoe on U.S. 70.

And that one was for too much money and too long a contract, commissioners said.

But three commissioners thought the proposal from the Museum of the Horse was interesting enough to at least meet with museum director Bruce Eldredge and discuss some options and a more moderate figure than \$447,750 over three years.

Commissioners William Schwettmann and Rex Wilson voted against the motion to negotiate with the museum.

"When I first saw this, I thought it was ludicrous what they were asking us to do," Schwettmann said. He also criticized the commission for not advertising for a longer period than two weeks.

"As we have in the past, we rushed the advertising and we'll suffer the consequences later," he said. "The specifications asked for were not available until Tuesday of last week. (Acting county manager Martha Guevara) mailed out six packets Tuesday and that's not close to being adequate time.

"These people (the museum, which is involved in the annual Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium staged at the center) already knew the facility. I'm shocked that we'd even consider starting to negotiate at this level."

He pointed out museum representatives want a three year agreement with an option for two more years.

The county spent about \$78,000 this year on the operation and management of the center, Montes said. The museum's proposal is for \$146,450 the first year, \$155,350 the second and \$145,950 the third. The fee would cover management, maintenance, operations and some capital expenses.

Howell asked Schwettmann what he would like to see happen at the rural events center, if he doesn't want a private group managing it.

"I'd like to see it run by volunteers (in the same approach as the county fairground in Capitan is managed by the Lincoln County Fair Association), Schwettmann said. "It could be padlocked between functions. We don't need a staff there full time."

If that's not successful, the county should sell it, he said.

But Howell reminded Schwettmann he didn't support a motion more than a year ago

by Howell to sell the events center and return the \$250,000 to the Legislature.

Wilson said he didn't think the center's manager position should be abolished until the commission was sure it wants to hire a management group and has an agreement. But Montes' motion to negotiate with the museum included abolition of the position.

Wilson also objected to paying a full-time staff at the center for a much higher amount of money than commissioners were willing to pay Linda Wallace, who has been manager since the rural events center was purchased with money from the state Legislature. She guided its expansion, applied for grants and lobbied for additional state and federal money that built a new arena and attracted more events.

The manager under the museum is proposed to start at \$37,500 plus \$11,259 in benefits and increase to \$40,500 and \$2,150 in the third year. Wallace was paid about \$21,000, Commissioner Wilton Howell said.

Chairman L. Ray Nunley said aside from the money, he liked the proposal and thought the non-profit museum was backed well enough financially to handle the job and had professionals on staff.

In his proposal, Eldredge

specified that:

Glen Barrow, a licensed general contractor, chairman of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission and past director of the cowboy symposium, would be assigned as a full time manager.

The museum staff will handle paperwork and receive phone calls when he's not available. Along with the museum, the center will use the professional services of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track for all of its accounting needs.

If revenues generated result in a deficit of more than 10 percent of the contract in a single year, the museum will seek to renegotiate the terms.

A community advisory group would include members of similar operating groups in the county such as the fair association.

An outside marketing firm would be put on contract with county approval, and packages will be developed with local lodgers.

The proposal also included economic projections of the impact of activities at the center in terms of lodging and other spending. Direct rental and admission income was listed as \$9,000 the first year, \$15,000 the second year and \$59,000 the third year.

Undocumented workers. "You need someone who has their trust and can talk to employers to ensure they don't tell the workers not to respond

to the census," Sandoval said.

Out of the way cabins with year-round residents and second residences, where renters are living more than six months out of the year and should be counted.

Other problems in the

county include identifying dual language areas and identifying dangerous spots where militia operate and could pose a threat.

A contact needs to be arranged in those areas.

He also hopes to encourage

people to report enumerators who perform poorly.

Commissioner Monroy Montes said the county should be the lead agency on the effort, otherwise it could become fragmented among the different villages.

Magistrate dismisses charges from alcohol sting

Magistrate Judge William Butts recently dismissed petty misdemeanor charges against six people cited in a mid-December state police sting. Six months have passed since the defendants, all of whom contested allegations that they knowingly or negligently sold alcohol to a minor, were first charged in mid-December. In New Mexico, magistrate court defendants must be tried within six

months. The three local attorneys representing the defendants, two per attorney, filed motions with Butts' court to dismiss the charges because the six-month period had lapsed. In the state police sting operation, an 18-year-old woman working with police was sent into 17 Ruidoso area establishments on Dec. 13 to purchase alcohol. Six establishments reportedly sold alcohol to the woman. The establishments received notices from the agency and charges against

the individuals who reportedly served the alcohol were filed the following week in Butts' court. Todd Griffin, the state police officer who conducted the sting operation, asked to prosecute the defendants himself rather than going through the 12th District Attorney's Office, according to court records. Griffin said this week that he did so because of miscommunication between his office and that of the district attorney's office.

Griffin said he and an associate showed up twice at Butts' court on two previous court dates only to find out that the trials had been continued. Griffin himself asked for a continuation of a April 9 trial date, saying he had a schedule conflict, Butts said. Griffin did not contact the court to reschedule the trial, Butts said. As required by state statute, Butts dismissed the charges with prejudice, meaning they cannot be brought back up.

Accused Roswell church arsonist to stand trial

Vastly different portraits were painted by the prosecutor and defense attorney July 8 of the man accused of burning a Roswell Mormon church June 28 and damaging several others, including one in Lincoln County. In U.S. Magistrate Court in Albuquerque, Assistant U.S. Attorney Norman Bay contended Walter Gene Grassie, 49, is a danger to the community. He said Grassie knew he was being investigated last

May for acts of vandalism to area Mormon churches and acts of intimidation to a former lover who had broken off an eight year affair. But the acts of violence against the church with which the lover was associated continued to escalate, he said. Defense attorney Michael Stout of Roswell countered that his client is a prime candidate for pre-trial release, because of his 25 years as a Church of Christ minister, because he has

no criminal record and he is being treated by a psychiatrist for depression. But U.S. Magistrate Judge Don Svet rejected an offer by Grassie's father to put up his \$200,000 Dexter farm as collateral on a bond. The judge said he would reconsider if Stout was able to show the community would be safe, if Grassie was released. Until then, the competitive yodeler and farmer will remain in jail. Svet found there was

enough evidence presented by the prosecution to set the case for trial. Grassie is charged with arson and violation of a federal hate crime statute in connection with a fire at the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints that caused \$2.5 million in damage. He also is a suspect in damage to Mormon churches in Artesia, Alamogordo and Alto on May 25-26.

... she said. That collection represented the "best of the best" of students' work over the years, she said.

Past winning pieces were lost as well as potential future winners. The pieces being sent to this year's state fair had already been matted and labeled in preparation.

A local artist, Teri Sodd, has offered to remat the student artwork that came through the fire with minimal damage, Reeder said.

Reeder, who also taught college art courses for Eastern New Mexico University at the high school classroom, said university students' work and supplies were lost in the fire as well.

Emily Ruch, a 17-year-old art student, said she had pencil drawings in the fire that had taken her months to complete.

She and fellow student,

Rebecca Wimbrow, said they at first couldn't credit word-of-mouth reports about the fire.

"I heard a friend talking about it and I didn't believe him," Wimbrow said. "And then I read about it in the paper."

Reeder met last week with Wimbrow, Ruch and members of the Ruidoso Arts Commission subcommittee on arts education to discuss what could be done to put the classroom back together before school starts.

Mary Maxson, an arts commissioner, pointed out that the fire also affected other art courses at the school, including band and choir classes, as well as the entire school and the community itself.

"I think it makes everybody feel violated," Maxson said.

"It's also really scary to think that there's an arsonist in town," added Margaret Lahey, a member of the subcommittee.

Maxson said the school's arts programs were hard pressed enough for resources before the fire occurred.

It is her hope, she said, that the fire acts as an impetus for the community to support its school art programs as well as to emphasize the importance of arts education.

Among the items to be replaced are pieces of artwork

for Reeder to use as examples for her classes.

She also used props, such as masks, stuffed animals and a human skeleton. Those items won't be replaced by the insurance, she said.

Fortunately, the art supplies she ordered for the coming school year hadn't arrived before the fire, Reeder said.

Arsonists are truly the scum of the earth

The world is full of people who deserve particular scorn; but none, say we, is more deserving of scorn than an arsonist.

Arsonists belong at the bottom of the heap of garbage along with such brain-bereft humans as vandals, serial killers, rapists and pedophiles. Call it a reward for scraping up some of the scum of the earth and disposing of it.

But in this day of gee-whiz electronics and never-ending scams to make (or save) money, it's not bad advice. Ask the folks at Ruidoso Downs Race Track who received "telephone company repair" calls, asking them to key in a two-digit number, presumably to test the phone circuits. (That combination gave the the caller access to the track's long distance service, complete with computer billing access.)

With such access, unlimited phone calls could have been made worldwide, and billed to a track number.

That's just one of a variety of ways phone service can be "stolen."

A couple of rules apply to avoid such rip-offs:

1. Examine every phone bill promptly and contact the provider about questionable items.
2. Don't respond to any sort of unusual question when you don't know, personally, who's calling.

This has been yet another sore spot touched and possibly irritated, but hopefully healed...



The Disaster Report

This is the seventh installment in an ongoing educational column to help inform residents how they can be prepared in case disaster strikes.

It is part of an ongoing effort by the Lincoln County Emergency Management Committee - Public Information Subcommittee, which is made up of a variety of agencies throughout the area.

This column is dedicated to an overview of the American Red Cross Disaster Service, which is one of the primary organizations that takes charge in a disaster and offers some relief.

The mission of the American Red Cross Disaster Service is to ensure nationwide disaster planning, preparedness, community disaster education, mitigation, and response that will provide the American people with quality services in a uniform, consistent and responsive manner.

The American Red Cross responds to disasters such as hurricanes, floods, earthquakes and fires, or other situations that cause human suffering or create human needs that those affected cannot alle-

viate without assistance. It is an independent, humanitarian, voluntary organization, not a government agency.

On the local and national level, the Red Cross works together with government, business, labor unions, religious and community organizations as well as other voluntary agencies.

Identifying resources and roles, sharing information, and finding ways to ensure a coordinated and efficient response to any disaster that strikes.

The Red Cross also is a member of the National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster.

Long before a disaster strikes, the Red Cross plans what it will do. A disaster response plan identifies what it will take to respond to various disasters, what resources are needed, and how they will be coordinated and used. As part of the planning process, Red Cross chapters also practice by participating in drills and exercises. Such planning enables chapters to respond efficiently and effectively.

Every Red Cross chapter works continuously to be ready

to respond by coordinating and collaborating with its disaster partners. As part of this process, chapters identify places to set up shelter and service centers, make arrangements with vendors for needed supplies, and work with local merchants.

The ability to respond also depends on having people who are trained and ready. Each year the people who can then provide consistent, quality services to people affected by disasters.

The American Red Cross offers several training courses throughout the year in Ruidoso as well as in Roswell. The Ruidoso News will keep its readers informed when these classes come up.

This ongoing column also includes a Disaster Supplies Calendar, which is intended to help prepare for disasters before they happen.

Using the calendar, people can assemble a disaster supplies kit in small steps over a five-month period. Remember to change and replace perishable supplies (such as food and water) every six months.

Courtroom security to get top review

•Gene E. Franchini, the chief justice of the Supreme Court of New Mexico, has announced the selection of Lawrence Siegel, of Columbia, Md., to complete a comprehensive assessment of security issues in courts statewide, and to recommend improved security—the first such survey ever attempted. The following New Mexico Supreme Court statement defines the project.

There has been an increasing number of life threatening incidents in courtrooms across the country. While New Mexico has yet to be visited by the violence plaguing other states, there is a great demand by the public to feel secure in their courts. Unfortunately, workplace violence and crime are becoming all too common place in our society. The New Mexico judiciary is no exception. At one time, court security was considered only during high-risk or controversial trials. However, in the past ten years or so, court security has become a daily concern of the judiciary.

In New Mexico, there are no uniform, consistent, or standardized security protocols, policies, procedures, or budgets applicable to the various levels of jurisdiction in the state's judiciary. It is for this reason that a statewide assessment of the state courts' security needs to be conducted, and a strategic action plan for implementing and budgeting security initiatives must be developed.

Approaches to court security must be defined in terms of initiatives that require people versus those that require technological or architectural remedies. Based on the statewide court security assessment, the strategic action plan will determine the most practical methodology for implementing a comprehensive security program in New Mexico's courts. The goal of the program will be protecting the safety of jurors, litigants, court personnel, witnesses, and other members of the public in court facilities.

As Lawrence Siegel commented, "I strongly believe that people should feel safe in their courthouses, whether they are attending court or working there, and that the integrity

of the courts should not be compromised by threats or inappropriate behavior. By setting up this statewide program, the New Mexico Supreme Court and the Administrative Office of the Courts have taken a leading position among the states in showing their commitment to safeguarding the administration of justice."

This project will examine the current state of security in courts statewide, and provide recommendations which address the need for safety, yet respect open access to the courts.

Concentrating on Magistrate and District Courts, Siegel's firm will partner with representatives from New Mexico courts and the Administrative Office of the Courts. Operations and security procedures will be observed during on-site visits to various court facilities throughout New Mexico. All courts will be surveyed by mail to assess information about security operations and needs. The comprehensive study with recommendations will be presented in the spring of 1999.

Lawrence Siegel has been active in court security operations and facility planning throughout the United States for more than 25 years. A senior fellow of the American University School of Public Affairs, Siegel is the author of "The Image of Justice." He has a master's degree in electrical engineering from New York University. Siegel has consulted on projects in more than 30 states and has served as faculty for the National Judicial College. His team includes Beverly Bright, a former administrator and elected county clerk from Washington State, and James F. Klopp, chief deputy sheriff of Milwaukee County, Wisc., where he was in charge of court security for a number of years.

Funding for the study is provided by a grant of \$40,000 from the State Justice Institute, located in Virginia, and \$36,661 from the State of New Mexico. For more information contact Robert Klein, management analyst for the Administrative Office of the Courts at (SOS) 827-4808.

Track's surface holds up

In the horse racing world, jockeys, trainers and owners can be skeptical. They'll believe it when they see it.

Ruidoso Downs Race Track has a new surface on its quarter horse strip, and jockeys and trainers are beginning to believe all of the surface's hype.

The new strip is designed to withstand rain and remain even from starting gate to finish line. Management has been singing its praises but up until now, others have reserved their judgment.

With the arrival of Ruidoso's torrential monsoons, the new racing surface has received its first test. Three and half inches of rain fell Wednesday and Thursday at the track - days before the 17 scheduled Rainbow Futurity trials. Friday, sprinters in the first race ran on a track listed as wet/fast. However, by the second race, the track condition was changed to fast.

"The track dried up and stayed in the shape it was in because of the stabilizer" said Ruidoso Downs General Manager Rick Baugh. Stabilizer is a byproduct. It looks like brown cornmeal and can hold 60 times its weight per granule of water.

In conjunction with the stabilizer, a sports grid also was added. The sports grid is about 1 1/2 inches long, looks like fiberglass, and has a spring like an accordion. Together, the sports grid and stabilizer keep the track, "live and kind with less kick-back."

John Bassett trains Hes My Dasher, one of two horses that share the fastest qualifying time for the Rainbow Futurity Finals. "I have never seen a racetrack take on as much water as it did and still be good. They never had to water it for the trials and it stayed even. I think it is a good racetrack," Bassett said.

Some of Ruidoso's regular riders, Chris Zamora and Nancy Summers, agree. "I was comfortable with the racetrack, and figured it would dry out because of all the fibers in it," Zamora said.

Nancy Summers, jockey for Rainbow Derby Finalist Honor Ease, added, "The track handled the rain very well. It is kind to the horses. There seems to be a lot less leg problems."

The new surface is living up to Baugh's expectations. "I feel it's more forgiving on horses, wet or dry, period," he said.

Track owners supplement purses again

Ruidoso Downs Race Track owners R. D. Hubbard and Ed Allred have upped the ante again.

The track's general manager Rick Baugh announced last week that Hubbard and Allred have kicked in an additional purse increase of 10%, bringing the total increase for the race meet to 35% effective Sunday.

"The purse supplement of \$350,000 before the meet opened has drawn more quality horses resulting in more full fields and a more viable product for live racing fans as well as simulcast fans to enjoy watching and wagering on," said Baugh, explaining the reason for the increase.

Ruidoso Downs municipal budget grows nearly one-third

Ruidoso Downs' current budget grew by about 30 percent, or \$1 million, from last year.

The Downs village council on Monday night approved a \$3.28 million expenditure budget for the 1998-99 fiscal year, a village trustee said. The council also approved a revenue-side

budget of about \$3.14 million.

Village Clerk Treasurer Leana Weibrecht said earlier that the budget amount was inflated with about \$1 million in state and federal grant money. While the 1997-98 budget also included about \$1 million in grants, it totaled about \$2.2 million.

The reason for this year's budget increase is largely attributed to the relocation last fall of the Wal-Mart Super Center into

Ruidoso Downs. Gross receipts taxes, (sales taxes) from the store have boosted the village's revenues by several hundred thousand dollars a year.

Village Trustee Margie Morales said a minor adjustment was made to the budget prior to its final approval Monday night.

The 1998-99 budget was adjusted upward by about \$22,000 to add a new employee to the street department.

Previous additions to the budget include new cars for the police department, street repairs, an across-the-board employee raise, complete health coverage for employees and payments on large equipment purchases.

Other actions taken by the council Monday night include the following:

- Approval of an annual \$900 contract with the South-eastern New Mexico Economic

Development District, which provides the village with economic services and consultant work.

- Discussion about the village's Park Committee and its on-going mission. Morales said the committee, formed to research a possible basketball gymnasium at the All American Park, is still active.

- Trustees Jackie Branum and Judy Miller have joined the committee and intend to work

on removing street repair supplies from the park, Morales said.

Supplies should be stored elsewhere so the park does not resemble an industrial area, she said.

- Approval of seeking bids for a new roller, equipment used for street repair.

- Discussed, in closed session, personnel matters as well as the possible purchase of land or water rights.

Commissioners act to correct smoky Arabela firehouse issue

After a half hour executive session Tuesday, Lincoln County Commissioners directed County Attorney Alan Morel to try to resolve a ticklish situation with the Arabela fire substation that could result in the loss of its annual state funding.

A representative of the state fire marshal's office last week said if his office learned the county did not have control of the land on which the \$20,000 substation was built, the \$10,091 allocated for its operation would be eliminated by the state.

He said the county shouldn't have built the station with-

out having a deed in hand.

Commissioner Monroy Montes said Tuesday the board instructed Morel to meet with Fernando Montoya and his family, owners of the small parcel on which the station was built about a year ago.

"They have a legitimate gripe," Montes said. "The fire station has not been properly equipped, but we already have applied for a loan from the New Mexico Finance Authority (through the Hondo Volunteer Fire Department) to buy a new pumper to station there. But we are in a catch-up mode."

Montoya confirmed last week that he has not signed any document turning the property over to the county.

"Someone dropped the ball," Hondo Fire Chief Modesto Chavez said Tuesday during a break in the regular commission meeting. Hondo operates the Arabela substation, which is in part of its coverage district.

He defended the fire department's use of volunteers from Hondo to respond to fires around remote Arabela, about 15 miles north of U.S. 70. As long as a pumper and other heavy equipment is at the substation, it doesn't take volunteers long to reach the area, he said, responding to the state official's admonition that a minimum crew of two must be maintained in Arabela to keep the substation viable.

Midtown speed monitor damaged; reward offered

A \$500 reward is being offered to find out who damaged a midtown speed monitor.

Police Chief Lanny Maddox said Tuesday the \$10,000 monitor, which shows motorists their speed as they enter the midtown area, was inoperable after someone cut its wires on Saturday.

The monitor was purchased by the village following

the death of a Roswell woman who was struck by a motorist on May 22 as she was crossing Sudderth Drive.

Maddox expects to have the monitor working again this week; he has asked a Texas manufacturer to express deliver parts to repair it.

It was the second time the monitor as been purposely damaged since it placed in the midtown in June, Maddox said.

"I have had more positive phone calls about that speed monitor being not only an

enhancement to the safety factor for that area but also that it has helped people realize how fast they are going," Maddox said.

Ruidoso/Lincoln County Crimestoppers will pay \$500 cash for information leading to the arrest and magistrate court bind over or grand jury indictment of the person or persons responsible for damaging the monitor. The 24-hour Crimestoppers number is 257-4545. Callers are not asked to leave their names.

Fund-raising bikers stop in Carrizozo

A group of 28 bicycling fraternity brothers spent one night in Carrizozo last week on a cross-country ride to raise money for disabled people.

Brent Grunig with the Journey of Hope Cycling Team said the group is one of two making the 10th anniversary trip this year from California to Washington, D.C. Together, there are 67 members of the Pi Kappa Phi fraternity pedaling across the nation this summer, Grunig said.

Money raised will go to Push America, the fraternity's benevolence organization, to assist disabled people and to increase awareness of issues for the disabled, Grunig said. The group expects to raise more than \$300,000 this year with the 63-day bicycling trip.

The ride is expected to end on Aug. 15, when the two groups, one traveling through the north and another through the south, merge and ride into Washington together.

The group's stop in Carrizozo Thursday night marked the 28th day of the trip, Grunig said. The bicyclists, all college-age men, average about 75

miles a day, he said. Besides the benevolence work done by the fraternity's non-profit organization, the

effort creates good publicity and helps dispel the negative image fraternities have, Grunig added.

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Ruidoso-based video production company sold to national media group

• OTI's new owner intends to expand services at the video production company, a company official said.

A national firm recently purchased On Track, Inc., the Ruidoso-based video production firm locally referred to as OTI, a company official said.

Cy Leland, OTI founder and president, said Trident Media Group, Inc. intends to expand the reach and services

offered by OTI, though no immediate modifications are planned.

"There are no major staffing changes here in Ruidoso or in our other New Mexico and Texas offices," Leland said. "I will be remaining with On Track in the capacity as regional manager."

"I have known the principals of Trident Media for several years now and I am very happy to be working with them."

Trident Media, a multi-million company based in Califor-

nia, finalized its purchase of OTI on June 24, according to a press release.

Leland, OTI's major stockholder, declined to release the terms of the company's sale to Trident Media.

OTI currently offers advertising services, racetrack broadcasting, surveillance services and production of public access channels among its operations.

Leland said OTI has a total of 30 employees, 12 of which work at the Ruidoso office. The company also has offices in Los

Lunas and Albuquerque as well as field agents in Southern New Mexico and West Texas, he said.

Though Trident Media provides video production services at Churchill Downs in Kentucky, home of the Kentucky Derby, the company's primary business strength is in satellite transmission, Leland said.

"Trident Media is bringing its considerable expertise in satellite television transmission and reception to the mix," Leland said of the OTI purchase.

Leland said OTI's strength is in the advertising services it provides to 17 cable outlets, including some in Colorado, New Mexico and West Texas. OTI has exclusive contracts with numerous cable systems in New Mexico to provide cable advertising and advertising insertion services, according to a release from Trident.

Trident Media's expansion plans for OTI include providing photography, timing systems, event photography and closed circuit television services, the press release said. Leland said

the company will expand its service area to include more of the Southwest.

Leland said he personally expects to market more services to racetracks in the state because of the gambling legislation that allows tracks to have slot machines. Profits from those machines must be put back into the race purses, and are expected to revive tracks that are now dormant, Leland said.

"I think you are going to see more tracks open by 1999," Leland said.

PLANNING AND ZONING

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission took the following actions last week:

• Denied unanimously a conditional use application from Wendy Clark to open an adult video store at 1509 Sudderth Drive. The commissioners did not give a reason for the denial; however, about 35 people attended the meeting to oppose the store. The commission is not required to give a reason for denying a conditional use application, according to village staff.

• Denied, in a split vote, a conditional use application from Bob Adams to operate a wood carving business in the Ruidoso State Bank free parking lot on Sudderth Drive. Though three of the five commissioners present voted for Adams' application, two voted against it. By village law, a conditional use application must have a two-thirds majority to pass. Opponents to the application said the use of a chain saw at the lot would disturb neighbors.

• Approved unanimously a request from the Crocker-Davis estate to vacate the 14-acre Country Club tract, across from the Cree Meadows Country Club, so that a church may be built at the site. The land had been platted so it could be developed with townhomes. Dwight Andrews told the commission the First Baptist Church intended to build on the tract at 270 Country Club Drive, but probably not for a couple of years, yet. Jane Houghton, a neighbor of the proposed church, told the commission she was concerned about increased traffic on Country Club Drive when the church

is built.

• Approved unanimously a conditional use permit and a commercial site development permit from Johnny Durham and Norman Smith to build a car wash at the corner of Porr and Mechem drives. The 1.3-acre site will be on the northwest corner of the intersection. Durham and Smith agreed to limit the drive-through car wash hours of operation to 7 a.m.-10 p.m. They additionally told the commission a water recycling system will be installed as soon as the proper technology becomes available.

• Approved unanimously a request from Gilliam T. Byrom for a vacation of right-of-way in the Town and Country North subdivision. Byrom wants a 1,067 square-foot triangular area of the San Juan Road right-of-way as a remedy to encroachments into the right-of-way by his driveway and an elevated deck.

• Approved unanimously a variance request from William E. Querin to allow a covered entry for a proposed townhome at 551 White Mountain Meadows Drive. The entry will be 15 feet, 6 inches from the front lot line. Standard setback is 20 feet.

• Approved unanimously a variance request from Wayne Edwards to allow an existing home at 139 Carrizo Canyon Road to remain 7 inches from one side lot line, and 2 feet, 10 inches from another side lot line.

Because of a replat, the standard setback is 10 feet, according to planning department staff. So, the variances are 9 feet, 5 inches, and 7 feet, 2 inches,

respectively.

Another variance allows the home's carport to remain 1 foot, 7 inches from the east side lot line. The standard setback is 3 feet, staff said.

• Approved a variance request from Sierra Cleaners at 102 Texas St. to keep a recently installed driveway 52 feet wide.

It was originally approved by planning staff for a width of 83 feet. Wyatt Sparks, speaking on behalf of the business, said he didn't know why the contractor decided to make the entrance to the cleaners larger than had been planned. But, he said, it really wasn't significant enough to impact motorists' safety.

Cleatus Richards, director of the planning department, recommended against the variance, saying people pulling out of the cleaner's parking lot may not be able to see traffic in a timely manner because the wider driveway shortened the length of road between the entrance and the corner of the road.

• Approved a variance request from Walter E. Whitehead to build a deck at his house at 100 Fox Drive. The open deck will be 5 feet from the front lot line. Standard setback is 10 feet, village planning staff said. Whitehead also received permission from the commission to build two sets of steps to the front lot line, representing a 100-percent variance, staff said.

Once again, the Wyeth House beckons visitors to rest and relax within its friendly confines

For decades, they welcomed visitors far and near to share the peacefulness, the beauty, the sounds of their Sentinel Ranch.

Peter Hurd and Henriette Wyeth Hurd were the consummate American painters, and equally complete entertainers. Visitors to their adobe, Spanish-style home included famous actresses such as Helen Hayes and Linda Darnell, or fellow artists, or neighbors from the nearby ranches.

The Sentinel Ranch's lush, almost tropical, surroundings, the gurgling of its running acequia produced an atmosphere of creativity where Peter and Henriette thrived - and so did their children, family and friends.

But the deaths of Peter Hurd (1984) and Henriette Wyeth (April, 1997) brought a temporary end to those days of visits in the grand sala or discussions on the front terrace.

The youngest son of Peter and Henriette has changed that. In June, artist Michael Hurd opened one wing of the hacienda as a guest house for those seeking the solace of the ranch. Henriette stayed in this portion of the house during her final years.

Eddie Parker, director of the Hurd-LaRinconada Gallery and the guest homes, explains:

"After she died, Michael had the first option to buy the house. We already have guest homes on the ranch. We decided to open up a portion of it and eventually open up the rest for a retreat space."

Adds assistant director Renee Yocum:

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Fifth case of plague in New Mexico identified

The Scientific Laboratory Division of the New Mexico Department of Health has confirmed plague in a 14-year-old boy from southern Santa Fe County, according to a release by the state Department of Health.

The patient, who is the fourth confirmed case of the disease in New Mexico this year, is hospitalized but is expected to recover fully.

The source of the patient's infection is unclear at present, but health officials suspect that he was exposed to infected rodents or their fleas. An investigation at the home of the patient is being conducted by the Vector Control Program of the New Mexico Environment Department.

"There continues to be a large plague outbreak going on in rodent populations over a large geographic area of northern New Mexico, and this is reflective in the fact that we have already had 32 confirmed cases in cats and three in dogs," said Public Veterinarian Dr. Paul Ettestad. He noted that animal cases have occurred in San Juan, Rio Arriba, Bernalillo and Santa Fe Counties and have all been in pets that are allowed to roam and hunt. "With the summer

monsoon rains starting, our rodent populations may likely remain high for the rest of the summer, so people need to continue to take precautions to prevent exposure to plague."

Plague, a bacterial disease of rodents, is generally transmitted to humans through bites of infected fleas, but also can be transmitted by direct contact with infected animals, including rodents, wildlife and pets.

Most people become ill two to seven days after being infected with the plague bacteria. Plague symptoms in humans include fever, painful swollen lymph nodes in the groin, armpit or neck areas; chills; and sometimes headache, vomiting and diarrhea. Symptoms in cats are similar with fever, lethargy, not eating, and swollen lymph nodes (usually in the neck area) being the most common signs. With prompt diagnosis and appropriate antibiotic treatment, the fatality rate in people and pets can be greatly reduced.

To prevent further cases of plague, both the Department of Health and the New Mexico Environment Department, recommend avoiding sick or dead rodents, not allowing children

to play near rodent nests or burrows, spraying or dusting pets regularly with an effective flea powder, wearing gloves when skinning animals, cleaning up areas near the house where rodents could live, and preventing pets from roaming and hunting whenever possible. People with sick outdoor pets - particularly cats - should have those animals examined promptly by a veterinarian.

The first two cases of human plague this year were in a 45-year-old woman and a 60-year-old woman, both from different locations in Santa Fe County, both recovered.

The third case was in a 40-year-old woman from Taos who also recovered.

There were no human cases of plague in New Mexico last year.

The fiesta dance twirls into the sunset from 8:30 p.m. to 1 a.m. with music by Darren Cordova at The Old Nike, a former dance hall and now an auction house on U.S. 380. Advance tickets are \$20. The charge at the door is \$25 and all attending must be 21 or older.

"Michael wanted people to enjoy the atmosphere. It's so unique."

(Michael Hurd was unavailable for comment for this story; he was finishing a painting for his show in August.)

Building renovations included some rock work in the patio area, new lighting in the courtyard and repairs to the kitchen floor. New furniture was brought in because most of the original pieces in the estate went to Henriette's three children.

The Wyeth House includes a kitchen with a dining area, a sitting/living room with a sleeper/sofa, a full bath and a master bedroom with adjoining sun room.

"We wanted to keep the integrity of the house, but we wanted to make it functional for people staying there," Parker said.

The courtyard features the original cast-iron chairs Henriette used on the terrace. A huge, weather-worn, carved wood Mexican credenza sits under the eaves, a testament of time. Polo mallets hang on a wall, and dozens of peacock feathers sit in a woven basket.

The grounds remain much the same as when Henriette and Peter enjoyed them. Water delivered by the acequia (the irrigation ditch) nourishes the towering cottonwoods, apple trees and various vines, ground covers and flowers.

Next on the renovation list is the grand sala; many guests were entertained in the high-ceilinged room. Michael Hurd and Parker envision that room as a retreat space.


Some day, the hope is to open Peter Hurd's studio as well as Henriette's studio, the guest wing and maybe even the old commissary. The sprawling home also has an indoor pool and a 1 1/2 story greenhouse.

Given her noted hospitality, it seems to make perfect sense to open Henriette's house to guests.

"She was one of these ladies that if you met her, she made a lasting impression," Renee says. "Opening her house was a way to share her."

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

Mollusks with one shell


Most of the mollusks are the types that have one spiral shell. They are also called "univalves."

Univalve shells




Mollusks with two shells



Chitons

These oval-shaped animals have shells made of eight plates. They usually fasten themselves to a rock with one large foot. They will roll up in a ball if made to let go.

Making the shells

The shells are made by a skin-like part of the animals called the mantle. The tiny tubes in the mantle quickly build and repair shells. Some mantles have eyes that give the shell color. Roman ladies wore purple robes dyed with mollusk shells.

Oysters

If you were to find pearl in an oyster you are eating, it is probably of little value. The valuable pearls come from special pearl oysters that grow in the South Pacific. Real pearls are formed when something like a grain of sand gets inside an oyster shell. The oyster creates a special juice that begins to cover the grain, layer after layer. Oysters do not move around. When they are very young, they cement themselves to rocks and stay there for the rest of their lives.

There are more mollusks than any other water animal.

Tusk shells

Tusk shells (or tooth shells, as they are sometimes called) have an opening at both ends. Their foot sticks out from the wider end and digs for food. The other end sticks up in the water and passes water in and out.

Many scholarships ready and waiting at ENMU-Ruidoso

Only one-third of more than 140 available scholarships are awarded every year at the Ruidoso Center of Eastern New Mexico University, they'd like to change that.

Thousands of dollars in scholarship money go untapped every year at the Ruidoso Center of Eastern New Mexico University, a school official said this week.

"There's a lot of 18- to 20-year-old kids who could go to college but don't. Well, here's the money to go," said Jim Miller, center administrator, about the more than 140 scholarships available at the school.

Only about one-third of those scholarships are applied for every year, Miller said.

"So, that means about two-thirds of them go unawarded."

The deadline to apply for scholarships for the fall semester is Aug. 1, only two weeks away, Miller said. The scholarship application deadline for the spring semester is Dec. 15, he said.

A list of the scholarships, which range from \$100 to more than \$1,200, may be obtained at the center, located in the Sierra Mall on Mechem Drive. Miller said the combined scholarship list/application form also will be available at the Ruidoso Public Library, located next to Ruidoso Village Hall off of Cree Meadows Drive.

"And there are several of us at the office who would be

happy to sit down and help people with the applications," Miller said.

The scholarships may be used by a wide range of people, from high school graduates to continuing college students; from working adults to senior citizens, Miller said. There are scholarships for full-time or part-time students. Some require a 2.5 grade point average and a few require a 3.0, but others don't list grades as a factor.

Some scholarships apply to more specific groups, such as 12 for county employees. There are about 15 scholarships for people who took the GED, the high school graduation equivalency test, as well as 15 scholarships for emergency medical training volunteers, Miller said.

There are scholarships specifically for working women, for the parents of children in college, for people with disabilities, and for the children of Wal-Mart employees.

Miller said new scholarships at the center include four for people working on upper division level courses via instructional television.

Besides the list of locally-provided scholarships, ongoing students may apply for the New Mexico Lottery Success Scholarships, Miller said.

They are available to New Mexico high school graduates who go on to college and make at least a 2.5 grade point average during their first semester. The scholarships become available to second semester, full-time students.

Registration under way at campus

Fall registration began Monday at Eastern New Mexico University's Ruidoso center for credit, upper division television and community education courses. Classes start Aug. 19.

Financial aid and academic counseling appointments are available. The math-English-

reading placement test is also available. Interested students may register for fall classes in person at the college at 709 Mechem Drive by phone, fax, mail or purchase order. For more information, contact the ENMU office at 257-2120 or (800)934-3668.

GED test available in Ruidoso monthly

They're thinning the trail's trees to save the forest, right next door

Clumps of small trees axed near their base are scattered throughout the exercise trail on Cedar Creek Road, just past the Smokey Bear Ranger District.

Some of the joggers and walkers this week wondered aloud what had happened along the 1.25 mile trail at the edge of the Lincoln National Forest.

"It's part of our demonstration area in the wildland interface area," said District Ranger Jerry Hawkes.

In the absence of the ability to burn portions of the forest to thin the trees and create more open space, trees must

be cut, he said. The goal is to space the trees to eliminate competition for water and soil nutrients to produce a healthier forest—and to eliminate fuel for any wildfire that might threaten the town.

But why were smaller trees targeted when some of the larger Ponderosa pines don't look too healthy and keep the sunlight from reaching trees beneath them?

For a practical, if short-term, reason, Hawkes said.

"We weren't able to use chain saws, because of the restrictions (related to prohibiting anything that might start a fire during the dry period that ended two days before July 4th), so we did the smaller trees with an ax," he said. "We

had some Hot Shots (firefighters) here and wanted to use them while we could. We'll cut anywhere it's thick. There were just thousands of little trees. We've been allowing people to take them for planting, but that doesn't eliminate enough."

With the ban on chain saws now lifted because of recent and steady rain, foresters will go back into the exercise tract and take down some of the unhealthy larger trees, Hawkes said. The demonstration area is part of a band around Ruidoso where it abuts the forest and is part of the Service's attempt to lessen the danger to the community from wildfire.

There's only one right play

Many contracts that fail are often attributed to bad luck. In all too many of these cases, though, the true fault lies in the way declarer played his cards.

Consider South's sad story in today's deal. He arrived at three notrump after East had overcalled with one spade, and won East's ten of spades with the king at trick one.

With only eight sure tricks in view, declarer cashed the ace of diamonds, crossed to dummy with a heart, and led a low diamond. When East followed low, the jack of diamonds was finessed, losing to the queen. Back came a spade, trapping dummy's queen and East happily ran off four spade tricks for down one.

South lamented his misfortune in losing the diamond finesse, especially when he learned that he could have dropped West's doubleton queen by playing the A-K instead of finessing.

We don't contend that declarer should have known the queen would fall, but the contract should have been made nevertheless. The diamond finesse posed an unnecessary risk which might cost the declarer his contract, and did in the actual case.

South should reason that a finesse is not the only way to score a trick with the jack of diamonds if East happens to hold the queen. The jack can also be converted into a trick by cashing the A-K first, then leading up to the J-4 if the

queen hasn't already appeared. If East does have the queen of diamonds, he can take it, but is then unable to attack dummy's queen of spades, so the contract is safe.

The one thing declarer cannot afford to do is to lose a trick unnecessarily to the queen of diamonds in the West hand. If West started with three or more diamonds including the queen, the cause is hopeless regardless of how South plays. By cashing the A-K, though, South gives himself the additional chance of dropping the doubleton queen offside, and it costs him virtually nothing to make this play.





POOP SCOOP

The National Wildlife Federation is asking for support to fight a move to remove wolves reintroduced into Yellowstone National Park in 1995.

Although the organization is conducting its own petition campaign, everyone is encouraged to send letters expressing an opinion.

The petitions being sent by the federation are aimed at Dean Kleckner, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, which initiated the suit that led to the order to remove the wolves, and at Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt, who has said no wolves will be removed on his watch.

Ben McNitt, communications manager for the wildlife federation, said since 40 wolves were reintroduced in Yellowstone, their population has increased to 73. The program is considered the most successful wildlife reintroduction ever undertaken in the United States.

But U.S. District Court Judge William Downes ruled on Dec. 12, 1997, they must be removed.

"The crux of his decision, which he said he reached reluctantly, is that naturally occurring wolves that might stray into the reintroduction area might lose some of their protection as an endangered species, because those reintroduced wolves are listed only as threatened," McNitt said

Monday. But the judge also warned the farm bureau and ranchers to watch out. What they wish for may backfire, because if all of the wolves are endangered, they are fully protected by federal law while the reintroduced population is called a non-essential experimental population. Under certain circumstances they can be relocated, or in cases of severe predation, even killed. However, McNitt noted predation of livestock has not been a major problem.

Letters are needed now, because the appeal filed by the federation and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is under review by 10th Circuit Court of Appeals.

"We filed our brief last week to keep the wolves in Yellowstone," he said. "If people give this an honest chance to work, we can have successful introduction of wolves without serious harm to people, livestock and ranchers."

New Mexico Veterans of World War II

Tony Hillerman, speaking publicly for the first time of his experiences as an infantryman in Europe, is one of 12 people interviewed in the 90-minute special **In Their Own Words: New Mexico Veterans of World War II**.

The veterans come from Albuquerque, Bayard, Belen, Clovis, Crystal, Isleta Pueblo, Las Vegas, and Santa Fe. They include a Navajo "Code Talker," a survivor of the Bataan Death March, a B-17 gunner, a witness to the Dachau concentration camp, a fighter pilot, a submariner, and a paratrooper.

The program was originally intended as a local oral history archive designed to honor New Mexico veterans and give students a sense of history. "These veterans look back 50 years with tremendous honesty and lack of bitterness, capturing the youthful excitement but without glorifying war," said Ingrid Vollonhofer of the New Mexico State Library. "... this belongs in every U.S. library. Nearly 500 copies of the videotape have been donated to New Mexico Schools, libraries, and video stores for free rental.

TBS keeps Goodwill Games afloat in New York

Gilligan's Island has been a longtime staple of TBS. Now the cable channel would like to keep you stranded on Giuliani's island - Manhattan - for the next two weeks.

Beginning Sunday, July 19, TBS broadcasts the Goodwill Games from New York

"The city has hosted a number of major, internationally recognized sport events," says New York Mayor Rudolph Giuliani, "but the Goodwill Games will be the first international, world-class, multisport event held here."

Jim Lampley will host the TBS coverage from a yacht to be moored at various locations in New York Harbor.

The games, which end August 2, will air at various times on TBS, HBO and CBS (check local listings). They are the brainchild of Ted Turner, founder of TBS and CNN and vice chairman of Time Warner Inc.

Turner launched his games to provide a politics-free competitive stage for the United States and the former Soviet Union after the U.S. boycott of the 1980 Summer Olympics in Moscow and the USSR's retaliatory boycott of the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles.

Turner planned the Goodwill Games to be held alternately in the United States and the USSR.

The first three Goodwill Games lost more than \$100 million. And since the breakup of the Soviet Union, Turner's games have been "goodwill" hunting for a post-Cold War mission.

"The fact the games now benefit children makes the purpose of these games even more meaningful," Turner says in reference to newly formed charitable partnerships with the Boys & Girls Clubs of America, as well as UNICEF.

In addition to benefiting worthy causes, the 1998 Goodwill Games will feature two age-old missions: winning and acquiring riches.

Previous Goodwill Games - St. Petersburg, Russia, in 1994, Seattle in 1990 and Moscow in 1986 - abided by

the Olympic spirit of not offering money. For New York's Goodwill Games, there will be a \$5 million purse for prizes, as well as incentives for records and performance.

Two-time 1996 Olympic gold medalist Michael Johnson headlines this year's field of approximately 1,500 athletes from more than 60 countries competing in 15 sports.

"It is great to compete against the top runners in the world while having the home-court advantage," says Johnson, a Dallas native who is scheduled to run in the 200m and 400m. "A special energy that comes from the crowd spurs you on ... and the addition of prize money will ensure (the runners) turning in top-level performances."

As for Lampley, his mission may be to get through his telecasts without incident. In 1996, he was ringside for HBO when a riot broke out at a Riddick Bowe-Andrew Golota bout, and he was on the air for NBC's late-night Olympic show when the bomb exploded in Atlanta's Centennial Olympic Park.

Referring to his extended ad-libs during catastrophes, Lampley, a former newscaster at KCBS in Los Angeles, says, "I've been in that kind of situation dozens of times. I had earthquakes, fires, hostages. I've seen murders, plane crashes."

The Goodwill Games, though, should be smooth sailing for Lampley - as long as his floating anchor desk off Giuliani's island doesn't sink.





Savage Earth shakes off summer doldrums

When we lay the foundations of colleges, cathedrals, concert halls and custom homes in the Earth's crust, we tend to think of the planet itself as settled, civilized and reliable. It's not.

Savage Earth, airing Sunday and Monday, July 19 and 20, on PBS (check local listings), shows how what lies beneath your feet can end up in your face.

The sequel to 1996's *Savage Skies*, this four-hour documentary gets up close and personal with volcanoes, earthquakes and tsunamis. *Savage Earth* begins and ends in the Seattle area, which is prone to all three events.

Usually, the terrible forces unleashed at the surface come from deep within Earth's core, where red-hot magma is on rolling boil.

The first hour, titled *Hell's Crust*, serves as a reintroduction to dear old Mother Earth, starting with true stories from survivors of the Mount St. Helens blast in 1980. Then the program follows an invisible but very real stress line from the Pacific Northwest to

Italy, where the earth shook hard six months after St. Helens blew. In another eyewitness account, an airline passenger tells of taking a 12-minute free fall when volcanic dust clogged all four engines in a trans-Pacific jumbo jet.

The second hour, *The Restless Planet*, focuses on earthquakes, especially the temblors of the last two decades in California, Mexico and Japan. Too bad there is nothing about the massive 1811 New Madrid, Mo., quake that changed the course of the Mississippi River, or about the very erratic effects of a quake's passing.

Monday's episode, *Out of the Inferno/Waves of Destruction*, deals with volcanoes, which can strike with amazing speed and thoroughness, and tsunamis, the destructive waves that can cause devastation thousands of miles from their source. Evidently, production was complete before the devastating volcanic outburst on Montserrat.

Perhaps the lesson to be learned is that when it comes to upheaval on the Earth's surface, there never will be a final event.


