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Nunley defends deputy hiring allegation

For the second time since becoming a Lincoln County Commissioner six years ago, L. Ray Nunley has called on the district attorney to look into allegations against him.

Nunley announced at a special commission meeting Friday that he's asked 12th Judicial District Attorney Scot Key to look into his involvement in the hiring of a deputy.

"On Thursday evening, Commissioner (Wilton) Howell called me quite upset about me going to a meeting about the future of the county's DWI program," the commission chairman said.

"In the course of conversation, (Howell) accused me of improprieties in the hiring of a

sheriff's deputy about a year ago," Nunley said. "He (Howell) remembers I made a motion to hire the husband of one of my pharmacists. But the motion I made was to hire a deputy for Corona and that's not where he lives. They also were not married at the time."

"(Howell) accused me of something that wasn't true," Nunley said. "Instead of me standing up and saying I'm not guilty, I just turned it over to the DA and the sheriff's office. I believe they will clear me, because I didn't do anything wrong."

"I believe it will stop after they examine the sheriff's records."

Sheriff Tom Sullivan was out of town Tuesday and could not be reached for comment.

Magistrate Judge William Butts has accused Howell and Commissioner Monroy

Montes of playing politics in the appointment of the new DWI director. The judge says the new director and his assistant, Montes' brother, are not qualified. He refuses to work with them and wants the village of Ruidoso to take over the \$177,000 grant program.

Howell serves on the community board that oversees the DWI project and Montes was a member of the selection committee that interviewed applicants for the coordinator's position. The commissioners have pointed out acting county manager Martha Guevara, not the commission, hired the new DWI director. He then hired Johnny Montes as his assistant. State officials have said the hirings were legal.

"They weren't allegations," Howell said of his conversation with Nunley. "I was upset because I serve on the DWI board, yet I wasn't

told or invited to either the meeting with Judge Butts or another meeting the same day with Martha and Commissioner Rex Wilson about the program. You'd think a person who lobbied for the program would have been told (about the meetings). How do you make a determination unless you have all the players and the facts?"

"I think the commission should start doing business in public and not in a back room."

Howell said in talking with Nunley, he pointed out that if the chairman had a problem with the recent hiring, there were some past hirings that bothered Howell and the commission should look at all of them.

"For example, we said while putting together the budget last year that we wouldn't include

U.S. 70 work could start today

Bumpy, pothole-marked U.S. 70 heading east to Wal-Mart will receive some immediate repair while waiting for major reworking of the road as part of a six-mile project set to start Aug. 13.

The outside lanes of U.S. 70 will be overlaid to smooth out the ride until major construction begins, Sam Grasmick of Meadow Valley Contractors Inc. said Monday during a public briefing session on the \$7.64 million project. Work on the potholes could begin today or start next week, he said.

The Phoenix, Ariz.-based company also is handling road reconstruction and improvements projects at the north end of Ruidoso and out to Ski Run Road.

Grasmick told 50 people at the meeting in Ruidoso Downs that the project, six years in planning, is scheduled to take one year to complete. But he hopes to persuade the state to approve a short-cut that could slice four months off construction.

"To get better, it has to get worse," he said. But under the same system being used on Mechem Drive by subcontractors Brown & Brown of Kansas, the company is proposing to remove four to six inches of material from each lane instead of two feet that would include the heavy clay soil beneath the old asphalt, he said.

"Instead (of removing the two feet and having to haul more material back in), we pulverize the lime material to stabilize the soil," Grasmick said. "It enhances the value of the soil four to five times. It makes bad soil a good soil. It's the exact same process we're using on other side of town and could cut four to five months of inconvenience."

If the proposal is rejected, the company will begin tearing up the road surfaces right away to meet the 12 month deadline. However, no work will be done in front of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track until after Labor Day, he said.

If the proposal is approved by the state, the crushing work will begin in late February or early March, Grasmick said.

Lodgings are booked solid this summer Area visitors increase in number

Lodgings are full, water usage is up, and streets seem fuller on weekdays this summer, say Ruidoso business people and city employees.

"The number of nights (booked) is up 38.9 percent from last year," said Cindy Clayton, owner of Condotel, which is filling 104 homes in the area every day of the week. "Typically, in years past, every July weekend is sold out, so if we're up 38.9 percent, that means it's Sunday through Thursday night stays."

Kelly Junge, office manager of Story Book Cabins, said all weekdays have been full since the first of July. Usually, she said, the 18 larger cabins don't all get rented during the week, but this year July has been busier than last year and most have been filled.

"It's a lot busier this year than last year," said Donna Jones White, owner of Ruidoso Central Reservations. "Within the last seven days it's been incredible with reservations. You can't get any in Upper Canyon—even during

the week. All of a sudden people were just everywhere, and it happened with the Art Festival, people were coming in and maybe they're staying. A lot of people want to come in and can't get in, so they'll rearrange their dates."

Margaret Vaughn, owner of Mountain Air Cabins said she sees a 15 percent increase in occupancy rates from last year. She chalks it up to hot weather in Texas.

The Holiday Inn Express had to do an early spring cleaning because of constant full occupancy, said Reggie Turner, a reservation clerk.

"We're full every night," said Clark Carpenter of Dan Dee Cabins. That's normal, he said, but this year the phone's ringing off the hook, "so we're not hustling anymore." Clark attributes the rush to the heat wave: "It's so hot in Texas that it reminds me of a woman shoeing flies out of a kitchen with an apron."

The Enchantment Inn usually has a 70 percent occupancy during the summer weeks, but lately it's been about 98 percent, said Leon Roulier, head of Anchor Limited that manages

the hotel.

"We are totally full," said Linda Pechstedt of Noisy Water Lodge. "This whole month has been that way during the week. We just know there's more people because our business has been full for the whole month of July."

Referring to increased water usage, Village Manger Allen Briley said, "We've got more of a weekend crowd in the middle of the week."

In the summer Ruidoso uses around 2.3 million gallons of water on weekdays, and about 1.8 million gallons during off-tourist times. Now, Briley said, the village is in the 2.6 million gallon range during the week. Water usage for the Fourth of July weekend was between three and three and a half million gallons per day.

Dewayne Goar, in charge of the village Traffic Unit, said the number of traffic tickets issued has been on a "gradual upcline, but I don't know where we stand this year, we've been so shorthanded." No one's counting cars right now, he said, "but it does seem that there's more traffic in town during the week than in past years."

Jail meeting attracts few from Ruidoso

Carrizozo residents turn out in force to keep the new center

One by one, Carrizozo residents came to the podium in Ruidoso Friday to knock down each obstacle in the way of their town being home to Lincoln County's new detention center.

They drove to Ruidoso to ensure county commissioners didn't forget their offer of free land, free water and sewer service for 15 years and free utility extensions. They also were there to hear any counter offers from Ruidoso.

But no incentives were offered by Ruidoso officials — only the commitment to talk about the purchase or lease of village land, if the commission chooses a site owned by Ruidoso. That offer came from Village Attorney H. John Underwood. Neither the mayor nor councilors attended.

Although the room was crowded, just a few people from Ruidoso stepped forward.

Jerry Fugere of Ruidoso said he wants to see a comparison of the cost to him in tax dollars of a site in Carrizozo versus Ruidoso for the jail, which may contain 100 beds. The existing jail in Carrizozo has 47 beds.

"I'm for the cheapest," he said. "That's my only concern. Will it cost more to transport prisoners all the way down there (Carrizozo) in the long run, or would all the freebies Carrizozo is going to give us be cheaper?"

Frank Sayer of Ruidoso suggested building on the Fort Stanton Reservation supervised by the Bureau of Land Management, about 12 miles northeast of Ruidoso. The fort already is a women's prison. Male juvenile offenders are kept nearby at Camp Sierra Blanca. The area is closer to Ruidoso than Carrizozo, good highway connections are available and Sierra Blanca Regional Airport is within a few miles, he said. Being north of Ruidoso also would fit with the movement of the population.

Ruidoso resident Al Junge, a member of the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission, said no matter what commissioners decide, "50 percent will be pleased and 50 percent



Former police officer faces new burglary charge

A warrant was issued Tuesday for the arrest of former Ruidoso police officer Luis Torres on a charge of aggravated burglary, a second-degree felony.

The 49-year-old Torres has been under house arrest at his parents' home in Belen since he was released from Otero County jail last month after being charged with embezzlement. He was fired from his position of corporal July 15.

Torres spent five years with the local police department, most recently working the graveyard shift. Before that, he served as chief of police in Belen for two years until he was demoted to sergeant and resigned.

Torres is expected to turn himself into police today and to be arraigned in Ruidoso Magistrate Court, where bail will be set at \$100,000, according to Detective Lieutenant Wolfgang Born, who filed the affidavit with Ruidoso Magistrate Judge William Butts for the warrant.

The charge is aggravated burglary, because Torres is accused of carrying a gun. The incident occurred June 8, according to the affidavit.

Born reported that he received a call June 9 from Christie Ward, owner of Cowboys, Indians and Outlaws at 2609 Sudderth Drive. She told Born she woke up about 2:30 a.m. June 8, because of a noise in the back of her store. She thought at the time, the blinds on a back window were rattling.

She saw a man with a flashlight halfway through the window and turned a work light on him, asking, "Who are you. What do you want?" according to the affidavit.

By then, she had armed herself. The intruder, who was

wearing a pair of grayish-cream colored gloves, kept saying, "Your window's open," she told Born.

At that point, Ward noticed a Ruidoso Police Department patch on the man, but she said he never identified himself as an officer or gave his name.

She asked him how he got through the window and he said he climbed the fence and that was how burglars entered.

The man left and never asked who Ward was or what she was doing at the business, Born stated in the affidavit. Ward called the police dispatch and described the officer to the dispatcher, who told her the description fit Torres, the officer on duty.

Born reported that Torres did not enter the incident on the radio log and investigating officers found no reference by Torres that he would be out of his unit checking buildings or that he had found any window on any business open during

his shift that day. He also didn't advise dispatch he would be entering any building, records reflect.

In the warrant, Born said Torres entered the business while armed and wearing gloves. To gain entry, he scaled a six-foot iron gate.

The previous fourth-degree felony embezzlement charge against the former officer was connected to the theft of money from a purse turned into Torres, but apparently never reported by the officer.

Torres was hired to the Ruidoso Police Department by former police chief Richard Swenor in April 1993 and worked initially with the narcotics task force.

Torres also served with the Belen Police Department first in 1986 and then as chief starting in March 1990.

He was demoted to sergeant in July 1992, and resigned in December of that year.

any new deputies, because we didn't have the money," Howell said. "Three weeks later, Mr. Nunley put it on the agenda and at that time, changed his vote to create a position."

The new position opened a spot for a state police officer who was going to be transferred out of the area and

allowed him to stay in the county with the sheriff's office, Howell said.

"There's a lot of coincidences there," Howell said. "I merely stated facts I was aware of. I made no allegations. As far as turning himself in to the district attorney, where there's smoke, usually there's fire."

"I have a problem with outside influences in hiring and dismissing of employees. My

feeling is we have that effort now on a couple of men hired properly."

Nunley's first request for an investigation by the DA was sparked last year by an unannounced meeting that occurred with a county auditor and three commissioners at the end of an annual audit. The commissioners had been advised by then county manager Frank Potter and the audi-

tor that such a session was legal, but didn't consult County Attorney Alan Morel.

Key concluded the meeting violated the state's open meeting act, but said the commissioners were acting on incorrect advice and had not deliberately violated the law. He said the focus of the act is to ensure compliance, but that he would react differently if a second similar violation occurred.

will want to form a hangman's party. You can't win on this."

He suggested hiring out-of-state consultants with no connection to the prison construction industry to study the situation and offer an unbiased opinion. Commissioners already have contracted with a Roswell and Albuquerque-based coalition of consultants who are preparing a report.

Charles Rennick, assistant Ruidoso village attorney, said the situation shouldn't be Carrizozo versus Ruidoso.

"I don't think that's the right way to characterize this," he said. "The function of this commission is to gather the information and makes a decision that's best for Lincoln County, which consists of a great deal more than a single municipality," he said.

Commissioners should look at other aspects than just cost, and they may not hear that information until the consultant's study is concluded, Rennick said.

The argument that a jail doesn't belong in a resort town also was rejected by Rennick, who pointed out many resort towns have large jails and that doesn't deter tourism.

Attorney Gary Mitchell,

chairman of the county jail advisory committee, said the county has been lucky to operate the jail inexpensively for 20 years with the help of former administrator Wayland Hill, who suffered a stroke last year.

He warned that with public support for increased penalties and prison time, jails are becoming a major industry that don't generate revenue, but drain counties struggling to operate them.

All of these public hearings, the people responsible for sentencing (judges) and legislators responsible for passing laws, don't attend," he said. "Bottom line, they're not the ones who have to figure out the complicated way to pay for it. The tough decisions fall upon you."

"The cost of building is not the major thing. The cost of operation is."

Despite the fact that some of my friends in Carrizozo despise what I have to say, I'm sorry, but someone has to stand up and say it," Mitchell said. "I don't want to keep Carrizozo from thriving. Ruidoso doesn't

need it. That's not the problem. We're forced to build one. I suggest we wait and see what the consultants say."

Sheriff Tom Sullivan said, "Pardon the cliché, but the town of Carrizozo has made you an offer you can't refuse. The district court is there, the sheriff's office and the courthouse. It's the only place that makes sense. I think it ought to remain where it is."

Area resident John Tate said land in Ruidoso is capable of generating much more revenue, through taxes or business ventures, than land in Carrizozo. But the town doesn't have water to spare like Carrizozo and a 100-bed jail would require a lot of water, he said.

Former jail administrator Wayland Hill told commissioners that the transport budget while he was in charge was only \$7,000 a year and that the county footed the bill most of the time to transport prisoners from Ruidoso.

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WORK: Road officials say conditions will get worse before they get better

Ernest Sanchez, project manager for the state Highway and Transportation Department, said Grasmick should have an answer from the state by Aug. 15, but possibly as early as the end of this week.

Work will continue on the project during the winter. A crew will stay on site to take advantage of periods between snowstorms, working eight to 10 hours a time, Grasmick said. Company officials have learned on the Mechem project that after July 1, rain shuts down any consistent construction for more than a month, he said. During the winter, utility installation and underground work will continue; curb, driveway and sidewalk work can be done.

The project consists of four-lane reconstruction from the junction of State Road 48 (Sudderth Drive) east through Ruidoso Downs to the end of the existing four-lane section. The median strip will be removed, except in front of Wal-Mart.

Four 12-foot driving lanes with a center left-turn lane will be constructed with new curbs, gutters and sidewalks in urban areas, but those accessories will

end just west of Wal-Mart. New lighting and storm drains are part of the design.

The first phase will run east of the SR 48 intersection to west of Wal-Mart. Phase two will continue east to Zia Gas Co. in Ruidoso Downs and phase three will go east from Zia Gas to the end of the existing four-lane section.

Al Oulman, project manager for Meadow Valley, said by summer, new asphalt should be installed and signals and new signs should be going up to complete the transformation of the highway, possibly as early as July 1, 1999.

"We'll tear out the entire road from one end to the other and give it a completely new look," he said, adding, "The way the road looks now, anything would be better."

Rain still could cause unanticipated delays, but Grasmick told gallery, owner Tom McMahon that the company faces a \$1,500-a-day penalty if it misses the deadline.

People who have questions about drainage work around their property, should stop by the project office behind Ruidoso Village Hall on Crea Meadows Drive and check out a project map, said Paul Zagone, technical support engineer for the state. While the project does

not correct old drainage problems, it's not supposed to cause new ones, he said.

One business owner asked that construction barrels be weighed down more to prevent them from rolling into other lanes, if they are hit by vehicles.

Sanchez said the state can't make them too heavy, because someone then might be injured if their car struck one.

"Nothing would make us happier than to put concrete in those barrels and let people hit them for fun," Grasmick said. "We do put on double ring (weights) to keep the center of gravity toward the ground. Our traffic control supervisor looks at it every day. I realize it can be dangerous, because if one rolls into an adjoining lane, drivers have no place to go."

McMahon and several other people also asked for a lower speed limit during construction and after the road is finished.

"If you want people to walk on the sidewalks," the limit needs to go down," said Don Nason, owner of Cigarette Alley.

Ruidoso Downs Police Chief David Hightower said nearly everyone driving through his town violates the 40 mph speed limit. Grasmick said he'd welcome an officer stationed in the construction area to write tickets. Speeders pose a big danger

to road construction workers, he said.

"With the support of the community, we can do that (lower the speed limit)," said Mohammad H. Moabed, state district engineer. "With a better road, people will go faster. We have to consider what needs to be done. The department is committed to fixing it."

Nason also asked if businesses will have continual access from the highway during construction.

"This (project) needs to be done and we're willing to sacrifice as long as we can function," he said after the meeting.


The answer from project representatives was that access should always be provided, although one may serve several businesses.

"You have to be notified 24 hours in advance if there is any change in access," Zagone said.

Moabed said the three-phase project is a partnership between the state and the communities served by the road.

"Please give us a chance," he said. "Call us if something doesn't look right and give us a chance to resolve the issue or find the answers."

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State, contractor get together to talk it out, not fight it

Odds improve on Mechem work

State officials and road contractors spent two days in a seminar last week resulting in a partnership agreement designed to smooth problems.

As soon as it is available, Virginia Lorenz said she wants to submit a photograph to the media of a group of state officials and road contractors together to "show people we are working together even though there is a rumor out there that we are at odds."

Lorenz, a district construction engineer with the New Mexico Highway and Transportation Department, said that after several months of hitches and slowdowns in the \$8 million project to widen Ruidoso's Mechem Drive (State Road 48), state highway officials, including herself, spent two days last week with construction contractors in a seminar on how to avoid conflicts and complete the project the best way possible.

"To facilitate getting solutions in a timely manner (benefits) everybody in the project," Lorenz said.

"We worked on conflict resolution — how to prevent everything ranging from fights to arguments and claims," said Bill Loomis, a project manager for Meadow Valley Contractors, the Phoenix-based company hired by the state for Mechem and three other road construction projects in the Ruidoso area.

Since April, the company has been at work widening about 4 miles of Mechem Drive from the intersection of Sudderth. The company also has a \$1 million contract to repave Ski Run Road, a \$7.6 million contract to repave 6 miles of U.S. Highway 70 and a \$7.6 million contract to widen 2.6 miles of Mechem from White Mountain Drive to Ski Run Road.

Besides the usual impediments to road work, such as weather, the 4-month-old Mechem project has run into one obstacle after another.

"I think on this project it has become extremely complicated because of some issues about design and hot mix (pavement

mixture)," Lorenz said. State officials, in reviewing hot mix proposals and soil samples, slowed the project to ensure the materials were of the appropriate quality. However, the slowdowns concerned the contractor, who wants to finish the job in a timely and cost-efficient manner, she said.

"So the workshop allowed us to discuss certain issues," Lorenz said.

When Meadow Valley started the project, Loomis announced the company's intention of finishing it before winter. Now, says Loomis, the project won't be completed until next year.

Has the Mechem project has been tougher than most? Loomis began laughing.

"I've lost lots and lots of sleep," he said. "It's one of the most detailed and toughest I've ever been involved in."

Lorenz on Thursday predicted that work will progress smoother following the seminar on "partnering" held Tuesday and Wednesday at the Best Western Swiss Chalet.

A Meadow Valley executive, Sam Grammick, traveled from Nevada to attend the session; and the state's district engineer, Mohammad Moabed, came in from Roswell. In all, about 40 people participated in the seminar conducted by corporate consultant Sherman Tingey.

The cost of the workshop, which was not immediately available, was to be split between Meadow Valley and the state, Loomis said.

"We really had an excellent workshop," Lorenz said. "The idea is for everyone in the project to work together as a team and achieve the goal, which is to have a good, quality project as well as minimal problems ..."

"We went over all of the issues we expected to be troublesome and then (worked through the problems) with all of the people involved in the project from the construction area to the materials lab out of the district," Loomis said.

Lorenz said the seminar was more effective than similar workshops she's attended for other projects.

"From almost the beginning of the workshop everybody had a commitment to make it work," she said.

More help available for developmentally disabled

SANTA FE — More developmentally disabled New Mexicans have been added to a list that will allow them to receive benefits sooner.

According to the New Mexico Department of Health, the ability to deliver "developmental disabilities waiver" services to an additional 156 individuals comes from the Legislature

and Gov. Gary Johnson, through a \$3 million budget item. It leverages about \$8 million in federal Medicaid dollars, for a total of \$11 million for the program as of July 1.

But 1,700 individuals remain on the waiting list, and the number is growing at about 3% annually.

Rafaela Flores-Lopez, the

department's long-term services division director, said it was a significant movement on the waiting list, but a challenge remains to make major strides in moving the developmentally disabled from the waiting list into service.

A 3-year plan calls for funding at a feasible maximum level of 2900 individuals.

The price of efficiency

Once upon a time, people in Ruidoso didn't bother to lock their doors; most didn't even lock their cars. It was part of the "code of the West" that kids grew up with, and lived by, and still survives in many small towns in the Southwest.

No more in Ruidoso. Today, locked homes are the standard, only the thoughtless leave a vehicle unlocked, and few women dare leave a purse visible on a car seat, whether the car's locked or not.

So, why should Ruidoso's residents be surprised that Mayor Robert Donaldson has ordered installation of a lock-out system in Village Hall that controls access to almost all departments with offices in the building?

It seems pretty reasonable; lots of businesses hire receptionists to direct traffic, fend off unwanted visitors and present an image of efficiency to the world at large. A good many courthouses, state and federal, have security systems designed to protect the good guys—like judges and lawyers—from the bad ones.

Village Manager Alan Briley, similarly, invoked "security" for the steps taken at Village Hall; theft has occurred. Some tickets to the race track disappeared recently from the mayor's office. Briley's own office was hit sometime ago. He also noted that during council meetings in the building (considerably larger after an addition was completed earlier this year), people do wander through. He's had only two complaints about the new procedure, Briley said last week.

Dave Parks, a life-long observer of the Ruidoso scene, thinks it's "a little sad that it has gotten to that point." Parks also suggests that the lock-down might have been in response to people who abuse the privilege and waste people's time. (Yes, every community has a few "gadflies" who sometimes irritate by insistence upon being heard, but they're citizens, and taxpayers, too.)

Frank Sayner, a former village councilor, agreed with Parks. He also is concerned about the image of the village administration might be projecting: "Behind the locked doors, are they doing the people's business, or are they giving the people the business?"

And that is the hang-up. The mayor campaigned on a platform pledging greater openness in government. But almost immediately after taking office, rules for addressing the council in public sessions were severely tightened, in the name of efficiency. The mayor appointed two new council members, sidestepping the more traditional approach of appointing the losing candidate who received the most votes. (True, it's much more logical to appoint people you think will support you rather than oppose you; it's certainly more efficient.) And now, in the name of security, Ruidoso's seat of government has been made a little bit less accessible.

The emerging image, unfortunately, is one of a village administration seeking maximum efficiency, no surprises, and absolute control.

Of public access to local government

The mayor's plan to streamline and improve the relationship between the citizens of Ruidoso and the administration has met with strange and unexpected results.

Why this is happening provides some interesting conclusions. Over the years it was a simple task for the citizen to get placed on the agenda (meeting) agenda to discuss any subject with the administration. All that was necessary was that the request be made before the agenda was printed. If the print time was missed, one could still appear before the council at a time designated for those who had been unable to secure a place on the agenda. Very simple.

Now, in order to be on the agenda one must prepare a letter of intent giving name, address, and the subject to be discussed, with details. The letter must be in the hands of the village clerk by 10 a.m. on Wednesday prior to the council meeting on the following Tuesday. There are no exceptions.

This rule is understandable, except for the fact it sets up an impediment for some who want to be on the agenda. It does not help public relations. In contrast, the county commission meetings allow time for speakers who do not appear on their agendas. This may account for the fact that county meetings are well attended.

With this in mind, consider my recent experience in an

effort to appear before the village council. Prior to recent rains, we faced an extremely serious forest fire problem. As a former member of the village council, it occurred to me that the fire problem was being ignored by both the council and the (Ruidoso) News. In former years, before the fire problem became acute, the News, radio, television, the council, and other sources set up a plan which recognized the problem and set actions to help in prevention and evacuation in the case of a serious fire. I composed a list of suggestions widely used in the past when forest fires were eminent.

I missed the agenda deadline and went directly to the regular council meeting. I attempted to explain to the chairman, (Mayor Robert) Donaldson, that my remarks were of an emergency and asked to be allowed to speak. He refused, saying that "rules had to be followed." Fortunately, my remarks did not cover a bomb in Village Hall—so I left the meeting. My remarks were published in the News on July 1 and fortunately the rains came shortly thereafter. The agenda participation still exists.

The village council meetings and subjects discussed are controlled by an agenda listing the subjects to be discussed along with other matters.

A portion of the regular agenda items is shown as "consent agenda." The consent items are items that don't require open discussion in an open council meeting, such as approving minutes of a previous meeting.

Items requiring open meeting discussion should not be separated from the regular agenda items.

Normally, a small number

of the regular items become consent agenda items, but no more than 10 to 20 percent of the regular items.

This brings us to the village council agenda for the July 28 meeting. The total agenda items are 14, of which 11 are shown as consent agenda items. This means that only three items are to be discussed in an open meeting, and 11 items are to be approved en bloc by the council.

Since the consent items have been approved in sessions not open to the public, it might be well to examine these consent items.

Four items appear as not belonging in the consent group. These are: 1., renewal of the village attorney's contract; 2., ratification of firefighters union contract; 3., approval of travel for the mayor; 4., approval of travel for the chief of police.

All of these items cover the spending of tax money and should be discussed in an open meeting. Too many consent items appear on this agenda.

And finally: In view of the council's interest in improving


relations with the public, recent changes in the public access to the Village Hall are very strange. As you enter the building, to the left is the P & Z Department, to the right is the Water Department. This is as far as one can go.

All of the other offices and operations are restricted by locks on both hallway doors. To visit these offices, one is compelled to visit the information desk in the main lobby, where you are asked for your name and who you wish to see. If your request is approved you proceed through the hallway door, which is unlocked for your visit. This is an unnecessary delay.

For some of us who just like to walk through the Village Hall, this is an imposition. The Village Hall, built with tax dollars, belongs to its citizens. If safety is a concern, individual office doors could be locked, not an entire hallway.

There are many ways to improve relations with the citizens.

This is not one of them.

Ground broken for fourth post office in Downs' history

Shirlene Roberts, postmaster, and other postal employees broke ground Monday for the fourth post office in the history of Ruidoso Downs.

Coffee and doughnuts were served in the present post office to celebrate.

Construction is expected to be completed by Dec. 1, said Ed Norris of Bowers-Norris Development, the Albuquerque contractor that also owns the land.

"We're trying to get it done before Christmas but it may not happen. If we don't get in there by early December we won't get in there until January," Norris said.

Not enough post office boxes for new residents and not enough parking spaces were cited as the major problems with the old building. The pre-

sent post office has more than 1800 post office boxes and the new one will have more than 3000. The new post office will face U. S. Hwy. 70, with the parking area in front.

Roberts became postmaster in 1978.

"It's going to be a lot of work to move from one office to another," she said, "but I just think it's going to be a piece of cake."

When Roberts first came to the area in 1960, the post office was in a little grocery store that opened in 1947 and Dorothy Parnell was the first postmaster. The second post office opened in 1961 across the street, a block from the first on Hwy. 70.

"We moved into the present (third) one in 1968 because we were overcrowded," Roberts said. "I don't expect to be here for the fifth post office."

This is the tenth installment in an ongoing educational column to help inform residents how they can be prepared in case disaster strikes. This is part of a county-wide effort to keep residents and visitors as prepared as they possibly can if a natural disaster occurs.

This column will focus on heat waves, the heat injuries that can occur because of them, and what people can do to prevent those injuries.

Heat can affect anyone. However, it is more likely to affect young children, elderly people, and people with health problems.

For instance, people with a medical condition that causes poor blood circulation, and those who take medications to get rid of water from the body (diuretics) or for certain skin conditions, may be more susceptible.

Consult with a physician if you have any questions about how your medication may affect your ability to tolerate heat.

You should know what these terms mean:

Heat wave: prolonged period of excessive heat and humidity.

The National Weather Service steps up its procedures to alert the public during these periods of excessive heat and humidity.

Heat index: A number in degrees Fahrenheit that tells how hot it really feels when relative humidity is added to the actual air temperature.

The Disaster Report

Exposure to full sunshine can increase the heat index by 15 degrees.

Heat cramps: Heat cramps are muscular pains and spasms due to heavy exertion. They usually involve the abdominal muscles or legs.

It is generally thought that the loss of water from heavy sweating causes the cramps.

Get the person to a cooler place and have him or her rest in a comfortable position. Lightly stretch the affected muscles and replenish fluids. Give a half a glass of cool water every 15 minutes.

As with any heat injury, do not give liquids containing alcohol or caffeine in them, as they can make the conditions worse.

Heat exhaustion: Heat exhaustion typically occurs when people exercise heavily or work in a warm humid place where bodily fluids are lost through heavy sweating.

Blood flow to the skin increases, causing blood flow to decrease to the vital organs. This results in a form of mild shock.

If not treated, the victim's condition will worsen.

Body temperature will keep rising and the victim may suffer heat stroke.

Get the person out of the heat and into a cooler place. Remove or loosen tight clothing and apply cool, wet cloths, such as towels or sheets.

If the person is conscious, give cool water to drink. Make sure the person drinks slowly.

Give a half glass of cool water every 15 minutes.

Let the victim rest in a comfortable position and watch carefully for changes in his or her condition.

Heat stroke: Heat stroke is life threatening. The victim's temperature control system, which produces sweating to cool the body, stops working. The body temperature can rise so high that brain damage and death may result if the body is not cooled quickly.

Help is needed fast. Call 9-1-1 and move the person to a cooler place. Quickly cool the body. Immerse the victim in a cool bath, or wrap wet sheets around the body and fan it. Watch for signals of breathing problems.

Keep the person lying down and continue to cool the body any way you can. If the victim refuses water, is vomiting, or there are changes in the level of consciousness, do not give anything to eat or drink.

The information in this column was provided by the American Red Cross.

This ongoing column also includes a Disaster Supplies Calendar, which is intended to help prepare for disasters before they happen.

Using the calendar, people can assemble a disaster supplies kit in small steps over a five-month period.

Remember to change and replace perishable supplies (such as food and water) every six months.

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

Polo season thundered into action Saturday and Sunday at the San Patricio Polo grounds.



United Blood Services searches for Rh negative donors

ROSWELL — In response to the requests from doctors and hospitals in New Mexico, United Blood Services has increased the use of a special filter used in order to produce Leukocyte-Reduced Red Blood Cells (LRBCs) from blood donations.

Individuals such as newborns, burn victims, and patients receiving radiation treatments usually have a less functioning immune system and may need transfusions that have had the leukocytes or white blood cells filtered out. LRBCs are requested for these patients because fewer post-transfusion reactions occur —

such as extremely high fevers, hives or shock.

In order to meet the need for these types of blood components, United Blood Services needs to increase the number of blood donations from individuals with blood types "A negative" and "O negative."

"Only 15 percent of the population has Rh negative blood and only five percent of the eligible donors actually give blood, so it is very difficult to collect enough of these blood types to fill the hospital requests for this special type of blood component," said Clarissa Gonzalez, community relations representative with United Blood Services. "We really need new blood donors to help us ensure enough LRBCs are available for patients in our hospitals."

Every day in New Mexico about 240 pints of blood donations are essential to provide enough blood for patients in the state's hospitals.

To meet those needs, United Blood Services, along with volunteer coordinators, host blood drives and open the community blood center three times a week to collect blood from volunteer donors.

The organizations also conducts several blood drives throughout Ruidoso during the

year.

"The need for blood is constant. Sometimes we need more than 240 pints a day, so when we have one big blood drive, it only helps for that day or week," Gonzalez said.

Gonzalez also pointed out that blood has a shelf life of only 42 days.

"However, it is transfused well before the expiration date," she said. "That is why there is a constant need for new blood every day."

Lincoln County to receive funds for land use

Lincoln County will receive an estimated \$33,910 as its share of revenue generated by land-use fees and sale of resources in national forests within its boundaries.

Twenty-two of New Mexico's 33 counties receive proceeds, from a high of \$151,644 in Rio Arriba County to a low of \$3,366 in Chaves County. Lincoln ranks eighth from the top with a large segment of the Lincoln National Forest and a small portion of the Cibola

National Forest within its borders.

The U.S. Forest Service reported that 41 states and Puerto Rico shared estimated payments of more than \$219.5 million as their portion of national forest receipts collected in fiscal 1998, ending June 30.

New Mexico will receive about \$786,356 and Arizona will get \$2,141,984, said Forest Service Chief Mike Dombeck. Receipts are collected from

land-use fees and sale of resources on 191 million acres of national forests and grasslands. The money must be used for public schools and roads.

Providing advance estimates of the state payments helps local budget planners complete their work, Dombeck said in a release from the Service last week.

Interim payments that equal 75 percent of the estimated state share will be made in October. The balance will be

paid in December, when final revenue figures are available.

Counties in some of the states also share in national grasslands and land utilization project receipts that are based on a calendar year and will be paid in March.

Nationally, states received more than \$234.5 million as their share of 1997 national forest revenues. Counties participating in the national grassland program received \$6 million from land use fees.

Where's the beef? It's in education

A new education tool for this country's middle school science teachers is helping to improve nutrition skills by capturing the imagination of children, according to Dina Reitzel, executive director of the New Mexico Beef Council.

The "Fueled for Flight" video education kit, created with "checkoff" funding in part from Lincoln County beef producers, uses the exciting world of space travel to deliver a message about good nutrition and the role of beef in a healthful diet to fifth and sixth graders locally.

Checkoff money is paid by ranchers in the state and comes from \$1 per beef animal sold.

"Fueled for Flight" is effective, because it uses space travel and science - two subjects that fascinate children - to deliver a nutrition message, Reitzel said.

"It's a simple message in a fun, informational package,"

she said. "By using astronauts Mark Lee and Jan Davis, as well as NASA food and fitness experts, we can provide interesting facts to students that leave lasting impressions. Astronauts and scientists are excellent role models for children."

Among the messages the kit sends is that variety and moderation are the most important things to remember when eating for good health.

In addition, it recognizes that beef can be a part of a healthful diet and provides protein and vitamins for energy and building muscle, Reitzel said.

"The kit includes a 20-minute video, a 20-page teacher guide, 16 activity masters for duplication, and a pre-and post-test," she said.

"Fueled for Flight" was developed by the Education Department of National Cattlemen's Beef Association, which has been creating and distributing valued education

materials to teachers for more than 70 years.

Beef producers in New Mexico and across the U.S. continue to be committed to providing the best in education information to tomorrow's consumer, Reitzel said.

A recent direct-mail campaign to promote the "Fueled for Flight" kit generated a 20 percent response rate from teachers - a tremendous return for this kind of tool.

About 10,000 kits are already in use, and additional kits will be available after school begins this fall.

During the 1997 school year, more than 100,000 teachers in the United States from preschool through high school asked for checkoff-funded audiovisual kits and posters carrying positive messages about beef.

These materials have the potential to reach 5.2 million children during their first year of use alone, she said.

A Ruidoso couple battles for medical rights

Rick Garrett landed on his back after falling 12 feet from a scaffold in 1984 doing masonry work at the then new Ruidoso High School.

In a daze, he struggled to his feet and started walking away. But after a few steps, the entire scaffold collapsed on top of him.

"I don't remember any of it," Rick said during a recent interview at his bedside in Ruidoso.

When he became coherent a few days later in a Roswell hospital, Garrett was told the falling debris hit him in the back of the neck, pulverizing one area of his spinal cord and cracking another vertebrae in five different places.

The next 14 years strengthened the faith of Rick, now 50, and his wife, Sarah, and taught them to be fighters, not only in his personal battle for recovery, but in defending his medical rights.

"We felt other couples should hear what has happened to us," Sarah said. "The advice we would give anyone having similar problems is to document everything. Copy it, keep a record of every call, every doctor's report and all of your research."

That thoroughness is what Sarah credits for their recent victory in a lawsuit brought against them by an insurance company that bought out the original carrier of their worker's compensation coverage.

With the help of Home Health Services of Lincoln County and Dr. Arlene Brown, the cooperation of the first insurance company and the

determination of her husband, Sarah was able to keep Rick out of the hospital despite conditions that normally plague someone with his disability.

Even when he's healthy, his medical expenses run about \$100,000 annually, including \$1,000 a month for medication. But that's reasonable compared to other quadriplegics who often end up with lengthy hospital stays and can run up a quarter of a million dollars in a year, the couple say.

When the new insurance company took over, the Garretts

tried to cooperate, but they say company mandates sent Rick to the hospital and resulted in his confinement to bed, taking away the active life he was leading.

The couple asked that the name of the insurance company not be used, because they will be dealing with the firm for many years. Instead of castigating a particular company, they wanted to let other families know how to combat what they consider unreasonable mandates.

"They're not used to being fought," Sarah said. "You have to make lots of telephone calls and document them with follow up letters. Our documentation is what led to our success in the lawsuit, because it was more complete than the insurance company's."

"I feel sorry for the elderly people who flat do not know," Rick said. "They're used to paying premiums and just rolling over. This company bumped up against two people who won't roll."

Recovery

Rick had been X-rayed at the Ruidoso hospital after the early morning accident in 1984, then was transferred to Dr. Paul Turner, a neurosurgeon in Roswell. But the news wasn't good. After the physician stabilized Garrett, he met with his wife.

"He told me if he makes it through the night, he'll be paralyzed for the rest of his life," Sarah said. "It was pretty traumatic."

"A couple of days into this, he had a surprise for me," she said, tearing from the memory. "I was called to the room. It scared me to death. I walked in and he held out his arm. From then on, return (of function) started back like gang busters."

Turner didn't believe in rushing into surgery. He thought the body should have time to heal itself. Rick stayed in the hospital 28 days in a fully automated bed with an apparatus on his head and weights to hold his neck immobile. The doctor drilled holes in his skull and stabilized his neck with a brace before transferring Rick to the New Mexico Rehabilitation Center.

"He met a precious lady named Mary Kay Church," Sarah said. "She was little bitty and she pushed him."

"I would cuss her as we rolled to therapy," Rick said. "She would get me two times a day. The lady had no mercy. Her goal was to get me up and active, because with the severity of the damage, there's a 98 percent mortality rate. The lungs fill, kidneys fail. Mary Kay just flat beat me into the parallel bars. If it hadn't been for her, I'd probably not be here now."

The battle begins

"It's been an uphill battle, but (the original insurance company and its local agent), thank God, saw the benefits, if they paid the claim and backed us," Rick said. "We had a real good relationship. If I needed anything I called them and said, 'If I had this, I could do that.' Through 12 years, they backed me completely on maintenance care after asking questions of the doctors and doing some research. By maintaining the care, I was only in the hospital one stay since the accident and prior to the buy-out by the other insurance company."

He stayed at the rehab center for four months. Sarah was trained to care for him and that training was continued by home health when they returned. When problems with Rick's health occurred, "We'd always call (home health) in first rather than just check into a hospital," Sarah said. Physical therapy was handled through the Lincoln County Medical Center.

Although the second insur-

ance company sued the Garretts, claiming Rick had received excessive care, the judgment handed down in Albuquerque largely favored the Ruidoso couple and set a minimum standard of care to which the company must adhere, according to court documents provided by the Garretts.

During the course of the lawsuit, Rick was ordered by the company to undergo two medical evaluations. On the first in 1996, the Dallas doctors sent him home after two days, because they thought his maintenance program was excellent and Rick was thriving, the couple said. The doctors had a few suggestions on the second trip in 1997, including buying a power wheelchair and switching to aquatic therapy from weight lifting (because his shoulder rotators were wearing).

The couple contends the last trip to humid and hot Dallas caused an ulcerated sore to develop that keeps Rick out of his wheelchair or braces.

He used to do the laundry and household chores while Sarah taught at Sierra Vista Primary, but he now is confined to bed.

"This has set me back three

to five years," Rick said. "But the company doesn't care."

Sarah thinks that for the insurance companies, it's a matter of showing that they're in control.

"The corporate has come aboard and they are mandating where we get our prescriptions and our supplies," she said. But Rick still tries to find the least expensive options and present them, as he did with the electric wheelchair that he was able to buy locally for \$6,000 less than the supplier first proposed by the insurance company.

The couple is waiting for lawyers to work out the details of the judgment, but they still have trouble understanding why the insurance company took actions that ended up costing it much more money, when they were trying to provide Rick's care at a minimum cost.

"The care he received before kept him healthy and happy," Sarah said. "The insurance company's bill probably has tripled what it was, plus the cost of the litigation. Look at what they've paid and what they've done to our lives. It makes no sense."

South would have been a far better contract, but the way the bidding went, South would

up at five diamonds. North would have done better to bid three hearts over three clubs in an effort to sound out the possibility of game in notrump. Had he done this, South would have been able to bid three notrump to arrive at the best contract.

West led the queen of hearts against five diamonds and South had to play very carefully to get home safely. Eleven tricks were far from certain when dummy first appeared. The danger was that East would win a club trick at some point and shift to a spade, defeating the contract if West had the ace of spades.

Faced with this threat, declarer did all he could to avert it. He won the heart in dummy and cashed the king and ace of diamonds. He then led a low club and finessed the queen, hoping it would lose to the king — but it didn't.

If South had now cashed

the ace of clubs in the hope of catching the king, he would have gone down one. But he realized there was a chance of making the contract even if East had started with three clubs to the king.

Accordingly, he entered dummy with a heart and led another low club. When East followed with the nine, South ducked, and was rewarded for his care when West was forced to win the trick with the ten.

West cash now do no better than cash his ace of spades, and South made five diamonds as a result.

It is interesting to note that West could have defeated the contract by dropping the ten of clubs on the queen the first time clubs were led, but this play, it should be stated, is much easier to make on paper than at the table.

Everybody's Favorite Hey There, Koala Bear!

Unusual baby

A big surprise with a little pink nose, little pink eyes and white fur popped out of its mother's pouch last spring at the San Diego Zoo.

The zoo is famous for the largest colony of koalas outside of Australia. New arrivals are not unusual. But this one was. The baby was an albino. It does not have the pigment, or coloring, that koalas usually have. While a gray koala is cute, a white one is simply adorable.


Like all albinos, Onya-Birri is sensitive to light. Since he sunburns easily, he will always be in the shade.

Other than his unusual color and his need for special care, Onya-Birri is like other koalas.

Marsupials

While we call koalas "bears," they are not. Koalas are marsupials (mar-SOOP-uh). Marsupial moms raise babies in their pouches.

When a koala is born, it is hairless and weighs less than an ounce. It is about the size of a jelly bean. After birth, the baby crawls into its mother's pouch, where it attaches itself to one of her two nipples and nurses for about five months. When it comes out of the pouch, it is fully developed.



Mom and baby rest in the fork of a tree. Koala moms don't pick up their babies with their front paws, but they do let them grab ahold and ride along. He will be with his mom for about a year.

Koala babies must eat some of their mom's droppings while they are very young. These "pap" droppings have certain bacteria that enable the koala to digest the special food it eats for the rest of its life.

Picky eaters

Koalas have long claws on both their front and back paws. They are excellent at climbing and biting leaves off branches.

Koalas eat only the tender leaves and bark of certain kinds of eucalyptus (yoo-kuh-LIHP-tuss) trees. Many kinds of these trees grow in Australia, but koalas are picky about the ones they will eat. They also must bite the leaves off the branches themselves.

Since there is so much moisture in the leaves, koalas drink very little water. They also may eat dirt when they come down to the ground to move from tree to tree. The dirt may help their digestion.

Their diet of about a pound of eucalyptus leaves a day does not supply them much energy. They spend as much as 18 hours a day asleep in their treetop homes. Koalas are most likely to be awake at dawn and at dusk.

Up a tree, at home alone

Koalas are hard to see, even in Australia. Most visitors see them only in zoos. Koalas usually sleep during the day and are so high up in trees they can't be seen easily.

Koalas live in the branches of eucalyptus trees. They are solitary animals that prefer to be alone.


Koala ... the very mention of the name makes people smile and get a warm, fuzzy feeling.

Koalas are a favorite animal with people all around the world. Many tourists put them at the top of their "must-see" list when they visit Australia. The interest in koalas brings money to the country. These lovable animals are often used as symbols of Australia.

Koala problems

As important as they are, koalas are in trouble. While it is against the law to kill a koala in Australia, it is not against the law to cut down the trees that are the koalas' homes and food sources. People are cutting down trees and clearing the land to make way for homes and shopping centers. Today, experts think that only about 20 percent of the original population of koalas are left.

The early settlers killed them for their skins. In 1924, as many as 2 million koala pelts, or skins, were shipped out of the country.



A sign warns drivers to watch out for the koalas who live in nearby trees. Many are run over by cars.




Scientists mark trees that are homes to koalas. They can tell by the bark scratches and by the droppings on the ground.

The Australian Koala Foundation and the San Diego Zoo are working to save the animal. With the aid of computers, they are taking a very careful count to mark koala homes. The koalas are not evenly spread all over the country. Their forests are near the eastern coast in an area where people want to live, too.

People have pets that pose a threat to koalas. Dogs are the main threat.

The koala foundation is encouraging builders to think about the koalas before they start clearing the land.

POOP SCOOP

A new campaign of the Humane Society of the United States aims to end the pain of laboratory animals by the year 2020.

About 20 million vertebrate animals are used annually in biomedical research, testing and education in the United States. The number is declining, but still is staggering.

HSUS officials are encouraging different approaches in biomedical research that don't require pain as part of the formula.

An article published in the Summer 1998 issue of HSUS News, details the society's objectives and methods.

The writer, Martin L. Stephens, HSUS vice president of animal research issues, writes that if the society's goal is met, "Animal protectionists, sympathetic scientists and others then would be free to concentrate on eliminating the use of animals in laboratories altogether or at least in procedures that would result in injury or death."

Even sympathetic scientists and lab personnel who support the issue sometimes have been slow to translate that support into action, he wrote.

"Only in the past decade has the use of painkillers in laboratory rodents become accepted prac-

tice, and animal distress that is not the result of pain still is not assessed or quantified," he said. The scientific community needs to identify what procedures cause either pain or distress and to what degree, the HSUS contends. That will allow the society to concentrate on the most urgent cases first.

One of the first projects is to have a committee of experts produce a technical report on what is currently known about pain and distress in lab animals. It will contain definitions, how to recognize, assess and alleviate the pain, how to pinpoint the capacity of lab animal species to experience pain and distress, identifying the procedures that cause significant pain and distress and how to replace them with more humane methods.

Letters have been sent to the institutional animal care and use committee (IACUCs) of several hundred research institutions to encourage their adoption of the campaign's 2020 goal.

Federal agencies, including the US Department of Agriculture, which enforces the Animal Welfare Act, are being encouraged to implement policies and guidelines that foster the campaign's goals.



Q: My friend is convinced that Connie Sellecca played Charlie, the fifth sister on *Sisters*. I am sure she is wrong, isn't she? -Tikanya Foster via e-mail.

A: Actress Jo Anderson joined the cast in 1994, and was later replaced by Sheila Kelley, as half sister Dr. Charlotte "Charlie" Bennett.

Q: I remember watching as a kid a TV show about a drifter on a motorcycle. I think it was *Then Came Bronson*. Who was the actor, and whatever became of him? -Sonny and Sandra Hernandez via e-mail.



The Practice holds session on new night

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The Practice has another trial to endure. The acclaimed legal drama from executive producer David E. Kelley is moving to a new night for the third time in its two-year history.

Beginning Aug. 9 with a special two-hour rebroadcast of last season's episodes "The Trial" and "Cloudy With a Chance of Membranes," Bobby Donnell (Dylan McDermott) and company bring their courtroom theatrics to ABC's Sunday lineup.

In "The Trial," a young woman is slain in a brutal fashion, and Assistant District Attorney Helen Gamble (Lara Flynn Boyle) is assigned to the case.

Helen and her office investigate the crime and find a prime suspect: a well-respected doctor who was having an affair with the murdered woman.

After the doctor is arrested, Bobby agrees to represent him, knowing full well that it will threaten his budding romance with Helen, whom he will now have to face in court.

The case concludes in "Cloudy With a Chance of Membranes" with several surprising twists and turns — and an

ending viewers have to see to believe.

The move to Sundays comes after a momentous year for the series. Last fall, *The Practice* was placed in a dead-by-Saturday lineup, and the general consensus was the program would die there. But viewers tuned in, attracted by the show's excellent writing and sharp ensemble cast.

Though the show could hardly qualify as a smashing success, it survived. And after the end of the football season, ABC moved *The Practice* to Monday, where it handily beat its dramatic competition.

The show now faces a new challenge, as its Sunday competition includes many prestigious TV movies and miniseries. ABC Entertainment Chairman Stuart Bloomberg says *The Practice* will do fine.

"I see big opportunities for us. It's the only series in that time slot. When NBC put *Law & Order* on (there), it did well. I think there is a good flow from (Fox's) *The X-Files* into that. ... They're going to get a good audience."

As to whether Bloomberg is right, the jury is still out.

After Pope Pius X declared the tango a sin (1912), performance of the dance became a misdemeanor offense in Boston.

Discovery isn't afraid to swim with the sharks all week long

Sharks have an image problem. Often described as perfect killing machines and vilified by Steven Spielberg, they are now being slaughtered at a rate of 30 to 100 million per year.

The Discovery Channel would like to help. Discovery's latest Shark Week lineup, airing Aug. 9-15, takes a scholarly, sympathetic-advocacy approach.

"People are fascinated more and more by science, less by the sensational, gory aspects of sharks. They've seen the shows about attacks; they're well-versed on that, and it's time to move on to other aspects about sharks — and there's a lot of them," says Jeff Kurr, a wildlife filmmaker and shark expert who wrote, created and directed three of the eight Shark Week specials: *Sharks of the Atlantic*, *Great White: In Search of the Giants* and *Shark Attack Files II*.

Although Shark Week does feature the usual footage of partially maimed shark-attack victims, as well as dramatic re-enactments of attacks, the emphasis is on conservation and insight into the shark's habits and condition. For example, *Great White*, premiering Sunday, Aug. 9, tempers its discussion of a huge shark that attacked fishing boats off the coast of South Africa with an exploration of the reasons the enormous white sharks of the past are so infrequently seen today.

Viewers unaccustomed to lamenting the paucity of great whites in their vicinity may find themselves feeling an unfamiliar pang as experts describe the difficulty of finding sharks over 14 feet long.

"In the past, nobody wanted to save sharks," Kurr says. "Dolphins and seals and whales are so cute and cuddly, and everybody wants to save them. But sharks didn't get a lot of sympathy because of the way they look and the way they've been misperceived and portrayed in the media."

While presenting a balanced perspective, the specials often begin like traditional sensationalized shark films. For instance, the narrator of *Hammerheads: Nomads of the Sea*, premiering Wednesday, Aug. 12, intones, "They call it the perfect predator, a solitary, efficient killer. It takes but one shark to

infest an ocean with fear. To witness a sea of sharks is beyond our worst imaginings."

However, after this ominous start, the show goes on to explore hammerheads' mysterious gatherings in the Pacific and to discuss fascinating research involving this species' ability to navigate enormous distances using the magnetic ridges in the ocean's floor.

Likewise, *Zambezi Shark*, premiering Monday, Aug. 10, begins, "Sharks strike more fear in the heart of man than all the rest of the Earth's creatures. The shark is the predator supreme."

The program then presents an admiring profile of the Zambezi river shark, the only shark known to swim up rivers, sometimes hundreds of miles into fresh water. The film investigates the Zambezi's incredible electroreceptors, which allow it to sense electric fields as low as one-millionth of a volt.

Kurr says educating the public about how to avoid shark attacks, as well as demythologizing the danger of sharks, is one of the purposes of *Shark Attack Files II*, airing Saturday, Aug. 15.

"The odds against being attacked are astronomical," he says. "Millions of people go in the water worldwide, and only a handful of attacks occur."

Prefhistoric Sharks, premiering Sunday, does not feature any shark attack footage for obvious reasons. The sharks it profiles have all been dead for millions of years. *Prefhistoric* focuses, as the show's illustrator, Ray Troll, puts it, on "exposure to some of the stranger, weirder sharks."

Troll helped produce illustrations and computer animation that bring to life ancient sharks, including the Carcharodon megalodon, a predator that fed on whales and was as long as a city bus, and the swift *Iniopterygians*.

"Sharks are in trouble," Troll says, voicing his opinion that contemporary sharks are just as extraordinary as the ancient species and may soon become just as rare outside of museums.

Discovery shares Troll's concern, and its efforts to improve shark public relations do not end with Shark Week. The channel also will air public service announcements for the Ocean Wildlife Campaign, an organization devoted to keeping sharks and other large fish in the oceans, where they belong.

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

"Being a couple makes it a lot easier for us during those love scenes," Ripa adds. "My favorite scenes are the ones when we make love in the shower."

Many actors say it's hard to make a love scene look authentic.

"We would clear the set of all nonessential people before doing a love scene," says James DePaiwa (Max,

OLTL) of his passionate interludes with former co-star Fiona Hutchison (Gabrielle). "I have to, at that moment, believe I am in love with the person I'm making love to, or it won't work. A love scene is what separates a soap opera couple from everyone else."

Other *OLTL* couples in the special include doomed lovers Jake and Megan (Joe Lando, Jessica Tuck) and fun lovers Bo and Nora (Robert S. Woods, Hillary Bailey Smith).

The *GH* contingent includes second-chance lovers Luke and Laura (Anthony Geary, Genie Francis) and tragic lovers Robin and Jason (Kimberly McCullough, Steve Burton).




