Road workers drill through water main

• While drilling holes to set explosives, road construction crews on the north part of Mechem punctured a main water line Monday morning.

A plume of water about 100 feet high sprouted Monday morning north of Ruidoso when road construction crews accidentally punctured a main water line for the village, a water official said.

"The sub (subcontractor for Meadow Valley Construction, Inc.) up there was drilling the blasting holes and they drilled into that main line that feeds Ruidoso," Richard Sanchez, director of the village water department, said Tuesday.

Sanchez said he was notified about the line break at 8 a.m. It took village crews about 90 minutes to turn off the valves that fed into the line. About 1 million gallons of treated water were lost in that time, Sanchez estimated. The water is

pipled from Ruidoso's two primary water tanks in Alto, which hold about 5 million gallons each.

Homes and businesses along Mechem Drive, in the Upper Canyon and in the Town and Country and Ponderosa Heights subdivisions lost water pressure or water altogether at times Monday because of the break, Sanchez said.

Crews started to restore water service to the affected areas at about 12:20 p.m. Monday, Sanchez said. Some homes in the Upper Canyon didn't have water until 5 p.m. because of the number of pressure zones that had to be reset, he said.

The problem is one that may recur because the main water line for the village runs through three proposed blast areas for the road construction project underway on the northern part of Mechem, Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson said Tuesday.

Work on part of Mechem to stop during winter

Road work along the first 4 miles of Mechem Drive is scheduled to shut down in November for the winter, and as many concrete barriers will be removed as possible, a project manager said recently.

"We are trying to basically let people have the whole width of the road," said Bill Loomis, with Meadow Valley Contractors, Inc.

Loomis said the plan is to "button up" road work from Sudderth to White Mountain Drive. Earth work on the second section, from White Mountain Drive to Ski Run Road, is to continue through the winter, he said.

The work schedule for the first section was set back several months when soil under the road was discovered to be less stable than previously thought, Loomis said. A treatment, in which lime was mixed with the soil to stabilize it, has recently been completed.

Paving of the east lane of the road has been additionally delayed recently by heavy rains, Loomis said. Also, the paving cannot be done until curbs are put in and the "curbing hasn't gone as quickly as we would have liked," he said.

The goal is to start paving the road within a couple of weeks, Loomis

Downs could face another lawsuit

• A woman claims an animal control officer entered her home while she was out.

A Ruidoso Downs woman isn't too upset that she received a citation for having barking dogs.

Cecelia Garcia is upset that the citation was left, as she claims, inside her home on Sept. 9 while she was out, said her attorney this week.

"He (an animal control officer) allegedly broke into my client's house," said Charles Hawthorne, Garcia's attorney.

Village Animal Control Officer Tom Armstrong on Tuesday disputed Garcia's claim regarding the actions of his part-time assistant, Jason Kinnick.

"Well, I looked into the issue and I felt like there was no problem," Armstrong said. "I was there and I saw what went on. And I saw no problem in the way it was handled."

Kinnick did not go into the house to leave the notice, Armstrong said.

Village Attorney Dan Bryant could not be reached for comment Tuesday about the lawsuit.

Hawthorne on Sept. 22 sent the village of Ruidoso Downs a tort claim notice, which basically informs the village of a possible lawsuit. Tort claim notices must, by law, be filed within 90 days of the incident being complained about.

The notice states that Kinnick went into Garcia's house without her consent and that "Since that date, the Ruidoso Downs Police Department has been harassing and intimidating Ms. Garcia."

"They had a report of barking dogs so they went up to the house," Hawthorne said. "When my client got home there was a notice ... And the notice was inside the house and the house was locked."

The citation, or "red tag," had been left on a counter, a location it could not have possibly reached if it had been slipped under a door, he said.

As a result of the actions by village personnel, "Ms. Garcia has suffered physical and mental pain which

she would not have had to endure," the tort claim notice states.

Garcia's complaint joins a flurry of legal notices and actions filed against Ruidoso Downs in recent months. This is the first to be directed at animal control officers.

Most of the lawsuits recently filed against the village are in regard to purported actions by the Ruidoso Downs Police Department.

In Garcia's complaint, Hawthorne said neighbors told his client that there had been two animal control officers looking around her house and peering in windows on Sept. 9. Both of her two dogs are kept outside, he said.

She pleaded guilty to the citation for barking dogs on Sept. 21 and paid a \$50 fine, Hawthorne said.

"She didn't know whether her dogs were barking or not because they don't bark when she's there," he said of the citation. "But they (an animal control officer) did break into the house somehow. And they are not allowed to do that unless they see a crime being committed or something like that."

Mescalero primary election sets tribal council ballot

Eight candidates will vie for four seat on the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council in the Nov. 3 general election.

The eight came out on top of 15 candidates in a primary election last week on the Reservation.

Of the estimated 1,800 eligible voters, 545 or 30 percent, cast their ballots Sept. 30, according to a tribal spokesman. Three ballots were declared invalid and no absentee ballots were submitted.

Of the eight candidates with the most votes, three are incumbents. Based on results released by the tribal election board, the eight are:

- Silas Cochise Sr. with 372 votes
- Arthur "Butch" Blazer with 368
- Harlyn Geronimo Sr. with 311

- Lewis LaPaz, incumbent, with 297

- Raymond Kirgan with 280

- Dorlyn Simmons, incumbent, with 276

- Virginia Klinekole, incumbent, with 273

- Glenda Brusuelas with 259

One incumbent, Raphael Mendez, lost his bid for re-election with 238 votes.

The other six eliminated in the primary are:

- Glenda Brusuelas with 259 votes

- Mason Guydelkon with 248

- Clifton Perkins with 214

- Beryl Kanseah with 207

- Peggy L. Vigil with 166




Oct./Nov. phases of the moon

Highway accident leaves injuries, snarls traffic

Two people were injured and traffic was held up for about two hours early Tuesday morning after an "almost complete head-on with a semi," Ruidoso Downs police reported. A Toyota pickup driven by

Larry Trujillo, 25, of Ruidoso was driving eastbound about 5:42 a.m. and crossed into the westbound traffic lane as an 18-wheeler driven by Carlos Gallegos, 41, of El Paso, was approaching, said Officer Grant Lipscomb. Gallegos turned the semi-truck to the right to avoid collision and the pickup hit it underneath the

cab door of the truck and along the side of the trailer. Trujillo and his passenger, Jim Vernon, 17, of Ruidoso, were both taken to Lincoln County Medical Center and are in favorable condition, according to Suzanne Leland, director of nursing. Gallegos was not injured. Ruidoso Downs police re-

sponded to the call at 5:42 a.m. until New Mexico State Police could take over, as the accident occurred on Highway 70 outside of Ruidoso Downs at mile marker 263 1/2.

Specific damage to the vehicles could not be determined Tuesday, although a wrecker was dispatched, according to state police.

Road construction to start on Highway 70

Final surveying work is to begin this week on a \$7.6 million project to repave 6 miles of U.S. Highway 70, a contractor representative said recently.

Actual road construction could start in November, pending state approval on a proposal to expedite the project's time line, said Al Oulman, a project manager for Meadow Valley

Contractors, Inc. Meadow Valley is a Phoenix-based firm with four contracts with the state for road projects in the Ruidoso area.

The project starts at Sudderth Drive and ends on the other side of Ruidoso Downs, where the four-lane highway narrows to two lanes.

Oulman said subcontractors will next start installing underground electrical lines for a street light system.

Currently, street lights are in the median of the highway through Ruidoso Downs. Those lights will continue to be used until the new roadside lights are completed, Oulman said. About a third of the project is slated for street lights, he said. "We are trying to have all the lights up as soon as possible," Oulman said, adding that an exact completion date was difficult to set. During construction, which

is slated to continue through the winter, traffic in each direction will be diverted to one lane, he said.

His office in Ruidoso Downs is to open this week in a building at 309 Harris, just behind the Village Hall, Oulman said. The telephone number to the office is not yet confirmed, he said. His office in Alamogordo can be reached at (505) 437-9311.

"This is something that we brought out to the public last week — that we have a major problem on the north end of the project," he said. "For whatever reason, the designers of the project failed to pay much attention to the fact that the major water line is running through (the areas where explosives will be used)."

Donaldson called the problem substantial, and said that's why it was brought up during last week's council session.

"We wanted to say that this sort of thing may start happening," he said. "It's obviously not the contractor's fault, but somewhere between the state and the (project) designers,

somebody dropped the ball."

Meadow Valley, hired by the state for several road construction projects in the area, is at work realigning a 3-mile stretch of Mechem Drive, from White Mountain Drive to Ski Run Road. The \$7.6 million project requires some blasting to remove rock bed in the path of the new roadway. It was discovered only recently that the village's main water line is next to the blast areas.

On Monday, a subcontractor for Meadow Valley was drilling holes where explosives would be placed later. Sanchez said the water line puncture should never have happened in that process.

"It was marked right," Sanchez said of the water line's location. "I don't know why

they did it ... they shouldn't have drilled into it."

Bill Loomis, project manager for Meadow Valley, said last week his company has submitted proposals on how to complete that blasting without damaging the pipeline. Sanchez said he had received those proposals on Monday, but did not have time to review them because of the water line break.

Sanchez said his crews were delayed some Monday in their efforts to turn off water above the break because dirt had covered some of the valves.

He did not foresee the village having to step up its water conservation plan because of the water line break. Sanchez said both of the water tanks were full and above the 50-foot

mark after the line broke. The village doesn't begin restricting water usage until the tank levels fall below the 50-foot mark.

Sanchez said it was too early to say whether the village will seek compensation from either the contractor or the state for the line break.

"I really need to put a pencil to it and see what the water loss was and what it cost us," he said.

Loomis last week said the plan was to begin blasting this week, pending state approvals. Before blasting can start, the subcontractor needs to receive approval from both insurance officials and state highway officials, Loomis said.

"And it will be in the form of test shots, so it will be pretty minor," Loomis said.

said. The contractor has proposals before state highway officials on how to "button up" sections of road with significant elevation differences between the current and future roadway,

Loomis said.

Ski Run Road construction over

A \$1 million project to repave Ski Run Road is believed to be finished, Loomis said.

"Everything is completed on Ski Run road except for the final striping as far as I am aware of," Loomis said.

He added that a final inspection on the work by state highway officials had yet not been done. Completion of the project is subject to final inspection, he said.

World War II troop carrier veterans to share memories in Ruidoso

War II veterans of troop carrier squadrons will be gathering in Ruidoso Thursday through Sunday at the Swiss Chalet Inn for what is for most of them the first reunion since the war.

Col. and Mrs. G.E. Stover (Mabel and Smokey) of Ruidoso will be greeting about 40 of their fellow veterans from the Pacific, North African and European theaters. The veterans and their wives come from 16 states and range in age from 70 to 85.

These veterans were in troop carrier units throughout the war, flying transport aircraft with personnel, equipment, ammunition, supplies, and, most importantly, flying paratroopers and tow-gliders behind the enemy lines to support major landings by amphibious forces. They evacuated wounded soldiers and provided transportation support for Gen. Douglas MacArthur's armies in his drive back to the Philippines and to Japan.

Stover was one of the pilots on board the convoy of ships that left

Pearl Harbor seven days before the Japanese attacked. Mabel Stover served at General Eisenhower's headquarters, her duties involved with the liberation of concentration camps. Col. Stover flew the first planeload of camp prisoners out of Buchenwald and met some of these pilots

Originally the troop carrier squadron was headed for the Philippines for training, but after the war started, they were sent to Australia where they assembled P-40 fighter aircraft and A-24 dive-bombers from

the ships and obtained ancient transport aircraft from various sources, setting up the troop carrier organization in Brisbane, Australia. From there they transported military personnel, supplies and equipment throughout Australia, Java and New Guinea.

Some of these senior pilots became squadron and group commanders training others for the invasion of Normandy and the Mediterranean and other parts of Europe.

Moving supplies to the front to supply Gen. George Patton's third army as he raced toward Germany was a large part of their operation. They also assisted in the Battle of the

Bulge, where they supplied glider loads of artillery ammunition to the Airborne Division when it was surrounded by German forces at Bastogne.

Their final mission was to evacuate prisoners of war and prisoners in concentration camps, flying them to the rear so they could be sent home. In one day alone, aircraft evacuated 46,000 military and civilian prisoners.

These veterans played a vital role in World War II. At least one of them was in the Southwest Pacific Troop Carrier Force from December 1941 until the end of the war with Japan.

Tourism chief visits here

John Garcia, state tourism secretary, comes out laughing and good-natured humor doesn't stop until he's ready to sit down.

Members of the Lincoln County Republican Club saw one of his performances Monday during their monthly dinner meeting when Garcia described the importance of tourism in New Mexico and his long time friendship with Gov. Gary Johnson.

Parts of his speech dealt with the \$4 billion tourist industry in New Mexico, which he said is one of the largest employers in the state next to oil and gas.

About 13 years ago, the state started promoting New Mexico as a tourist destination, following the lead of neighboring Arizona, he said. The state handles the promotion, because it owns the destination and has a great product, he said. The tourism industry employees 66,000 people and brings in \$400 million in taxes.

"We have \$5 million (annual budget) to promote the state," Garcia said. "That's small, but we're proud of what we do."

He's had to improve efficiency with fewer employees in line with Johnson's cut in state employees. Despite that, the state has maintained its market share of tourists, he said.

Ruidoso is one of the tourism hubs in the state, the secretary said. Construction of the convention center went a long way toward drawing larger groups to the area.

The community's top market draw is from Texas, Garcia said. Other states whose residents contribute to New Mexico tourism in big numbers are Oklahoma, California, New Jersey and specifically, Chicago, Ill.

Mexico and Germany are number one and two in the foreign market, he said. He and members of the state tourism commission will be traveling to Spain next year to try to develop that market, he said.

Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan asked Garcia when the governor is going to give Fort Stanton to the county to allow it to benefit from tourism dollars that could be spent there.

"Let's come up with a plan to do something with it," Garcia said. "Let's see how we can make it work."

OUR OPINION

A new power base installed in New Mexico

Seldom has so many known so little about so few, to paraphrase Winston Churchill.

The subject here, however, is regulation of the New Mexico business community in the next millennium instead of the survival of Great Britain in World War II.

But that is the situation facing New Mexico's voters now, as they prepare to go to the polls to pick five people who will be the first members of the New Mexico Public Regulatory Commission (PRC). Each of the five will represent a district; in Lincoln County's case, District 5, which stretches from south of Santa Fe to include Turrance, Lincoln, Doña Ana and all of southwestern New Mexico.

Either Democrat Jack Valencia Jr. or Republican Tony Schaefer will represent us on the new commission, which will have under its wing all the regulatory functions formerly presided over by the State Corporation Commission and the Public Utility Commission.

The new board will regulate six very large industries in the state—electricity, natural gas, water, telecommunications, transportation and trucking, and insurance. That, besides overseeing the state Fire Marshal and registering and keeping track of corporations doing business in the state.


Suedeen Kelly, a former PUC commissioner and now a law professor at the University New Mexico, helped draft the enabling legislation for the new PRC. An article she wrote for the New Mexico Rural Electric Cooperative Association this month puts the power of the new PRC in some sort of perspective.

Those five people will oversee companies that did some \$3 billion in state business last year—a figure about equal to the entire state budget. They won't answer to the governor, because they are elected directly. Adding to their authority is the fact that everything they do (except overseeing the Fire Marshal) is set forth in the state constitution.

It appears that some protective language was built into the legislation creating the PRC, in response to reported shenanigans in the former commissions; for example, PRC members can accept nothing from anybody they regulate, including a free lunch, unless everybody can dine. And they can accept no more than \$500 from anybody for campaign purposes.

By the way, only four people will be elected. The District 2 seat will be occupied by Republican Bill Popé, a former SCC member. No Democrat filed to seek the job.

Hang on, New Mexico. It's going to be an interesting ride into unknown territory, led by regulators few know doing many, possibly new, things.

the Colorado River north of Flagstaff, Ariz.

The good people of the Third World climbed the bamboo and emerged in the Fourth, where Spider Grandmother and Yawpa, the mockingbird, were there to greet them.

"You will be a Paiute and speak the Paiute language," Yawpa told one. "You will be a Hopi," he told another. As each person climbed through the hole, the mockingbird (who speaks many languages him-

self) gave him his identity: Navajo, Zuni, Sioux, Ute, Pima. Some of the people were told they were Bahanas — White men.

The surface of the new world was undifferentiated mud. Pokanghoya and Polongahoya saw this and decided to change it. They began to play a game with sticks and a leather ball, running all over the countryside. Wherever their feet

touch the mud, it turned to solid ground. They piled some of the mud in huge mounds, which became mountains, and wherever they had passed, trees and grass began to grow.

But the new world was still imperfect. Light and heat were needed. Instructed by Spider Grandmother, the people made a leather disk on a wooden frame and painted it white with black specks. They placed it on a shawl held at the four corners and hurled it into the air. Then the people sang, and the magic of their singing kept the disk rising until it could no longer be seen. But soon it rose in the east. The painted disk had become the moon.

The earth was still not warm enough to grow corn, so Spider Grandmother had the people fashion another disk — this one gold with a face painted on it in black and red. It was sung to the sky and became the sun.

That night, Coyote came looking for food. All he found were the pots of paint and the other objects the people had used to make the disks. In frustration he threw the paint in all directions and the other objects into the sky. The paint

colored the land and the other things became stars.

It was time for the various tribes of people to leave the sipapuni and travel to the many places they would live. Yawpa gathered them together and displayed ears of many different kinds of corn, explaining the way of life each one represented and the direction it signified. Each tribe was to choose an ear of corn and the life it symbolized.

The Hopis were the last to choose, and all that remained was a short ear of blue corn. Yawpa told them it represented a long but hard life, and that, the Hopis say, is what they have had since. If in their travels they went to a land where the short blue corn would not grow, it was a sign to them to turn back.

Before the tribes began their journeys, Spider Grandmother covered the sipapuni with water, making it look like a simple pond, and on the next morning the people left to fulfill their

Spa developers say complaints against project are 'sour grapes'

The complaints made against a proposed spa to be developed on village-controlled land are just "sour grapes," representatives of the planned business said Monday.

"They just tossed us their sour grapes," Mary Ratchford, president of M. York Inc., which is based in Alto and has developed the project, said of Charles Rennick and Brady R. Baxter.

Rennick, through attorney Don Dutton, and Baxter, complained to the Village Council last week about the proposed spa, which will be called Cloud 9. Dutton said the village would be competing with private enterprise, although Ratchford is quick to point out that there is no similar business in Ruidoso to compete with at this time.

Rennick has been working on a spa project for a number of years but nothing has come to fruition.

Dutton also questioned the financial plan proposed by M. York. Ratchford said the numbers used by the company were confidential, to be reviewed by the village council only, so Dutton should not have been privy to those numbers anyway.

Baxter, who was represented by real estate agent Rose Peebles, also complained about the appraised value of the land where the project will be developed, which was ultimately approved by the village council.

'Something positive'

"This is going to be something positive for Ruidoso," Ratchford said. "Something like this is necessary for Ruidoso to maintain its resort status."

The land where Cloud 9 will be built is located on Highway 48 just before the turn-offs to Ski Run Road and Alto Lakes Country Club, immediately south of High Country Lodge. The land is on a hillside overlooking Alto Lake, situated among the ponderosa pines, cedars and aspens.

Cloud 9 is being designed to be a "showcase property," Ratchford said. It will initially employ 23 people from the area and will offer massage therapy, saunas, outdoor hot tubs, herbal wraps, salt baths and facials. The landscaping will include the natural mountain setting with featured waterfalls along paths leading to the private tubs in a Japanese garden style. Ratchford said each hot tub will have its own unique design and will feature state-of-the-art water purification systems to assure the cleanest water possible, she said.

The general contractor on the project will be Gerald Dietz of Loma Vista in Alto, and the general manager will be Diana "Dede" Dietz.

Ratchford praised Craig M. Rawlings, president of Warp Speed in Ruidoso Downs, as her business development manager who did the initial work on the project. Rawlings found the land where Cloud 9 will be located, and he discovered that it was owned by the village and was "leasable," thus saving the company hundreds of thousands of dollars in up front costs. Ratchford said Rawlings acquired a copy of the lease for the Snow Play area and the format of that was copied and unanimously accepted by the Village Council.

Village agrees to lease

The village, with a few changes proposed primarily by Mayor Robert Donaldson, agreed to lease the 7.5 acres for a total amount of \$24,375, slightly under the \$25,000 threshold that requires a referendum before the village could dispose of or lease the property.

The value was based on a January appraisal that came up with a value of \$3,250 per acre. The annual base lease will be \$3,000 per year plus 10 percent of gross revenue exceeding \$410,000. At the meeting Ratchford agreed to lower the gross earnings figure

from \$600,000 to \$410,000.

"We've heard 10,000 Waves (a spa in Santa Fe) does \$5 million a year," Ratchford said. "If we do even 40 percent of that we're going to be handing the village a lot of money and nothing would make us happier."

The project must still get approval from the Eagle Creek water association, which will meet Oct. 14, and the ETZ Commission, which will meet Oct. 16.

DOWNNS COUNCIL

The Ruidoso Downs Village Council took the following actions last week:

- Approved publication of some amendments to the village's new ordinance for permits for temporary and seasonal businesses. Village Clerk Leann Weibrecht said the amendments, to be voted on at the council's Oct. 12 meeting, would change the requirement that all the permits go before the council for approval. The amended ordinance would allow merchants to obtain their permits through village hall, she said.

- Heard a presentation from Ron Andrews, coordinator of the Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally. Weibrecht said Andrews thanked the council for village support of the September event. Weibrecht said the village supported the rally with about \$2,500 in lodger's tax revenues.

- Adopted a resolution approving an amended joint powers agreement with the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority. The resolution allows the village of Ruidoso to have separate garbage collection services.

- Approved the purchase of

- four radios for the fire department as requested by Fire Chief Nick Herrera. The Kenwood radios, purchased from Key Communications located just outside of Ruidoso Downs, cost a total of \$2,100.

- Adopted Resolution No. 98-14, an Infrastructural Capital Improvements Plan. Specifics of the plan will be examined at the Oct. 12 meeting, Weibrecht said. The three-year, \$1.5 million plan will target improvements to the village's water storage system, water lines, sewer lines

and streets, she said.

- Purchased a hydraulic lift for cars for use by the maintenance department. The lift cost \$4,650 and was purchased from NAPA, Weibrecht said.

- Bought ammunition for the police department from Ultramax, a vendor for police departments, for \$1,455.

- A scheduled presentation from David Powers regarding penalties on late water bills was canceled, Weibrecht said. Powers did not attend the meeting, she said.



Warriors clip Eagles' wings

• The Warriors win one - the game - and lose one - a broken leg sidelines starting fullback Adrian Herrera for six weeks.

Ruidoso put together its most complete football game of the season in a 44-8 romp over visiting Hobbs Friday. The Warriors ran their record to 5-1 overall and extended their winning streak to four games.

But the easy victory was marred by an injury to senior fullback Adrian Herrera. Herrera, the team's second leading rusher, broke his fibula when a Hobbs defender tackled and landed on the Warrior running back, snapping the fibula. The fibula is the outer and smaller of two bones that make up the lower leg.

"I was running the ball and my left leg just like slipped and my ankle turned to the inside and when the guy tackled me he rolled over it," Herrera said Tuesday. "It was up against the ground and it had nowhere else to go."

When it first happened, Herrera thought he had sprained his ankle.

"It hurt, but it really didn't hurt that bad," Herrera said. But one look at the ankle made Herrera realize he had injured the ankle worse.

Ruidoso coach Les Carter said Herrera didn't incur any ligament damage, which means the senior back could return to action in six weeks. Herrera underwent surgery Saturday morning, and was expected to return to classes Thursday.

"They put in six screws and a metal plate," Herrera said.

Of the defensive player's hit on Herrera, Carter said, "It was clean. It was one of those, kind of freak deals."

Despite the injury to one of

their offensive leaders, the warrior didn't miss a beat in the second half.

"Naturally they were disturbed by losing a teammate, but they all realized that they were in there for a purpose and went on and played very well," Carter said. "It was probably the best team effort that we've had all year. Our defense did a great job."

Ruidoso expanded a 21-0 halftime lead to 37-0 after three quarters.

The Warrior defense didn't let the Eagles (3-3 overall) on the scoreboard until the fourth quarter. It also limited the Class AAAA's leading rusher in Walter Taylor to 71 yards of total offense. In all, the Warriors yielded just 138 yards of total offense to Hobbs.

The Ruidoso defense also got in on the scoring act when a blitzing Brett Meyer wrapped up the Hobbs quarterback in the end zone. The Eagles' signal caller threw the ball away and was flagged for intentional grounding, resulting in an automatic safety.

Warriors Reny Reidhead and Joe McGill each picked off the Hobbs quarterback as well, further stifling the Eagle attack.

Ruidoso's offense established both a running game and passing game from the outset. The Warriors marched down the field after taking the opening kickoff and scored.


"We looked up and we had scored 15 points in the first quarter and there was still nine minutes left in the quarter," Carter said.

Friend's dare spurs blind roper back into ring

Jerry Long, one of the Sunday competitors in the Wrangler Celebrity Roping at the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium, has won eight belt buckles and two saddles in the last few years.

What makes his feat so remarkable is that Jerry Long is blind. The accomplished team roper ties bells to the tails of the steers and ropes by sound.

"I've been diabetic since college and when I was in my mid-40s I developed some serious health problems and lost my kidneys," Long said. "In the process, I also lost my vision. I'm totally blind in one eye and can just tell the difference between daylight and dark in the other."

Born in Roswell and raised on ranches in Lincoln and Otero counties, Long was a competitive cowboy all through school, and was the president of the rodeo associations at both South Plains College and later at New Mexico State University.

After he took up his profession as a teacher, the health problems and loss of sight kept him out of the saddle for years. After a kidney transplant improved his health, he remained blind and considered himself unable to ride until an unusual conversation with a friend.

"My wife and I had gone to a roping where Delbert McKenzie, a very good friend of mine, missed a steer and came back grumbling about it. I was giving him a hard time, which is just the way we do with each other," Long recalled. "I told him that even a fat old blind man ought to be able to rope a steer... all I'd have to do would be to tie some bells on his tail. Of course, I was just aggravating him."

Planning commission recommends against building permit refunds

• Village council members will have the final say on fee refunds, however.

After a short public hearing Tuesday afternoon, the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission voted unanimously against returning application fees to people whose building requests are denied. The commission's recommenda-

tion will go before the Ruidoso Village Council, which will have the final decision on the issue.

Besides returning building application fees, the proposal also would refund the \$40 fee to appeal a commission's decision to the council if the council decided against the appeal.

Two people in the development industry spoke out against returning the fees during the Tuesday public hearing.

"I would like to go on the record

as being opposed to this because I think it is a dangerous thing," said Tim Hoyt, a builder.

The danger, he said, is that the Planning and Zoning Commission would be under more pressure to approve applications because of the potential loss of revenue.

Tim Collins, a local surveyor, said many of his clients come to him with ideas for construction projects that are in violation of village codes.

The cost of the application fees prompt people to rethink their ideas

rather than submit proposals that would need considerable variances.

He recommended the commission raise the cost of building applications, instead.

"If you make this a freebie, everybody is going to be wanting to put their garages in front of their houses," Collins told the commission.

Additionally, if application fees are returned when building requests are denied, then the village planning department would become inundated with frivolous applications, he

added. Bill Hirschfeld, a commission member, at one point asked village staff who had made the proposal in the first place.

"It was a council committee," said Cleatus Richards, director of the Ruidoso Planning Department.

"Was it before a council election?" Hirschfeld responded.

Rick Silva, another commission member, said he had been for the proposal until he studied the issue more.

"A few days later, he and his wife invited us over for hamburgers and after dinner, they saddled up some horses to rope. Delbert came over to me and put these harness bells in my hand and said, 'There's the steers, there's old Trace (the horse), and here's your bells.'"

What transpired was little short of miraculous. Acting on a dare, Long got the bells on the tails of some steers and mounted a horse for the first time in years.

"My heart was pounding and I was scared to death just to be on a horse," he said. "I couldn't see the horse and I couldn't see the ground. But he's as gentle a horse as there is and I knew I was gonna have to listen to him and he'd pretty much put me where I needed to be to throw a loop."

"Delbert turned seven steers for me and I managed to catch two by one foot. The main thing was that I was having fun doing something I loved to do but which I thought I'd lost

forever. I never dreamed at the time that I could ever compete.

"But I began practicing way harder than I'd ever practiced when I was sighted, and I began to catch both hind feet pretty often. Finally, they convinced me to try an oldtimer's roping and I actually won a little money and by October, I'd qualified for their finals and after that, I was back in it all the way. I immediately bought a horse and a trailer, and now we have nine horses and about 15 head of practice steers," he said.

"It's serious now and I work hard at it. I guess if I'd ever practiced this hard when I was sighted I might have been a world champion."

Jerry Long is considered a champion by many, including

his students at the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Disabled, where he has served as transition coordinator for years.

"I plan on retiring from my job in the next couple of years. We have a lot of fun going to ropings and I'm going to enjoy it while I can. We're really looking forward to the Ruidoso trip. We've heard about the Lincoln

County Cowboy Symposium since it started and we're honored to be part of the entertainment," he said.

The Wrangler Celebrity Roping is included in the regular Sunday admission fee of \$10 (\$5 for Museum of the Horse or LCCS members). The performance will be part of a full day's activities at the Glencoe Rural Events Center, locat-

ed 12 miles east of Ruidoso Downs on U.S. Highway 70. The Joe Skeen Arena will feature activities throughout the day, with a cavalry performance at 1 p.m. The roping will begin at approximately 2 p.m.




When a hospital gets intensive care

Valerie Miller reminisces about her time at LCMC

They call her "the queen," but her management style is anything but autocratic.

Valerie Miller is credited with turning around the Lincoln County Medical Center when it was a financially unstable hospital, but she says the plaudits should go to the staff who, once they saw a goal and understood the financial changes that had to be made, committed their energies and attitudes to the job.

She decided to take the challenge eight years ago, "because of the people," Valerie said Monday during an interview at the 2,738-square-foot home she and husband Don Miller designed and built in White Mountain Meadows. "They wanted to do well. There was no struggle in convincing them of the need to change and focus on some things. Throughout the eight years, they (the hospital board, the medical staff, hospital staff and the auxiliary) have constantly been willing to accept change."

Valerie's last day as hospital administrator was Friday. The tearful goodbye to her long career and successes was precipitated by a debilitating spinal condition.

"When I came, the whole thing was in disarray. A bunch of physician had left the previous fall. Financially, they finished the fiscal year in March 1990 with a \$650,000 loss. By March 1991, the hospital had a \$276,000 gain. That's a \$770,000 turn around and for a 38-bed hospital, that's phenomenal," Valerie said. "Everybody buckled down. They were willing to take short hours. When they got named to the top 100 hospitals, it was based on 1993 data. So in less than three years, they had gone from losing money to being named one of the top 20 rural hospitals in the country."

"I don't face the kind of issues my colleagues have faced, because there's a lot of pride here. I have tried to give them a sense of ownership over the facility. If Jimmy in maintenance says he can do something better another way, I say, 'Well, do it.'"

Don offered his opinion. "She's a hands-on administrator, she likes the challenge of being in there and rolling up her sleeves and turning it around," he said. "She started as a nurse, but learned every function at the hospital and that helped."

Becoming a nurse

Valerie grew up in London and attended nursing school

there, but decided to spend a year in America. After visiting a cousin in Vermont, she loved what she saw - until she flew in August to Dallas and walked off the plane.

"I thought 'What have I done,'" she said.

But she stayed there as a night nurse in intensive care for eight years, then moved to Trinity University Hospital in San Antonio, Texas.

"I probably would have stayed as a nurse all my life, because I really enjoyed it and that was the thing I was good at," Valerie said. But she had to give up bedside nursing after she injured her back trying to comfort a frightened 11-year-old boy who had been left alone in intensive care by his parents.

Part of her master's program at Trinity was to put in a one-year residency, which brought her to Presbyterian Hospital in Albuquerque. Although she could have accepted a six-month waiver because of her experience, she stayed the full year to learn more about hospital administration and departments. Half way through, Presbyterian

offered her a job. Without knowing the specifics, she accepted, turning down a job as head of a long-term care facility in Dallas.

From 1975 to 1989, she worked in various capacities, then tried the corporate office, but "that wasn't my thing," Valerie said.

She met Don on a blind date in 1987. He is a third-generation Albuquerque resident, who attended the University of New Mexico, and has extensive real estate and property management background, including operating his own business in Albuquerque with his daughter until a few years ago.

Presbyterian took over management of the Ruidoso hospital in 1972 after the county failed to keep it in the black. But it never posted a consistent history of financial success until Valerie's arrival.

When Presbyterian first approached Valerie, the assignment was to last for 90 to 120 days.

"I asked the (LCMC) board at the first meeting if they wanted me to be a caretaker or to turn things around while I was here and they said go ahead," Valerie said.

He also is on the national faculty of the Institute of Real Estate Management, the only person in the state.

They were married in January 1988. Don's first wife, Cynthia, died in an airplane crash in 1985.

"(Valerie) just seemed to be someone who would be a best friend first and that's the way it's always been," Don said. "We sort of clicked. She was a professional working full time and I was too. We'd come home at night and exchange stories about the day and help each other out."

Although she had been warned she probably would have to fire some of the managers, Valerie never did. Instead, she developed goals and reviewed financial data with the staff to show them how their actions affected the bottom line.

"They developed the attitude that it isn't just a job, it's a career," Don said.

To illustrate, Valerie recalled a 10-day snow period over the Christmas holiday when everyone showed up despite long commutes. On-call staff in intensive care and obstetrics slept at the hospital rather than take a chance they wouldn't be able to respond in time to a call.

"When it snowed in Albuquerque, I'd be at (Presbyterian Kaseman Hospital) and nobody would show up," she said. "It's never an issue here."

"Your best asset is your employees. If you treat them with respect, they'll go to the end of the world for you. It isn't all about salary increases, it's about the little things too."

Don made the decision to stay at the Ruidoso hospital easier by commuting to his business in Albuquerque for 2 1/2 years, then taking over as director of Ruidoso's Main Street project that improved sidewalks, added handicap railings and ramps, planted trees and developed designated parking.

He retired three years ago, helping his daughter establish her own company. Now he's looking forward to spending more time with his wife and to traveling. But retirement wasn't an easy decision for Valerie. Her health and doctors made the decision for her. Valerie suffers from tethered cord syndrome, which means her spinal cord doesn't move. The situation is aggravated due to another chronic condition involving inflammation of the lining around the spinal cord and nerve roots.

Surgery two years ago couldn't free the cord and

Valerie developed another condition that puts constant pressure on nerve roots, causing a great deal of pain as the blood supply diminished to those roots. While dealing with her back, doctors also discovered and later operated on a brain tumor. She started a pain management program this past summer.

"My hope is that if I'm not pushing it like I was, I can get off some of the pain medication," she said. "My slide from last November was a dramatic drop. (Doctors) think if I won't push it, it will still continue, but at much more gradual decline. I use a wheelchair and don't want to be in it all the time."

"The most frustrating thing is that my mind is fine, but you can't do that job on a part-time basis. I'm out of energy. Physically I was ready (to retire), but mentally I probably wasn't. I've always managed it very well myself, but I can't do that any more. The thought is if I stop pushing, I may get some recovery, get off of some of the drugs and attain some greater mobility, but I think mobility is a dream."

The Millers plan on buying a large RV by next spring in the hope that Valerie can travel better having a bed and the ability to move around.

They plan to keep their home, where Valerie gardens. She also plans to try needlepoint after a 20-year lapse and get back to reading, which she's always enjoyed. On good days, she may act as cart driver for Don on his golf games.

But as usual, Valerie already has volunteered to help on hospital projects that she can manage from a laptop personal computer given to her by the hospital board.

"But it's my intent to let whoever takes my place, take my place," she said. "I plan to be real low key, because it could be hard with the previous administrator hanging around."

careful declarer will burrow beneath to see whether a particular distribution of the adverse cards will permit the hand to be made. There may be no solution in some cases, but declarer is duty-bound to look for one. Here is an illustration. He got to four spades and West led the queen of clubs. Apparently, two spades, two diamonds and possible a heart had to be lost.

He ruffed the club in dummy and finessed the queen of hearts. When the queen held, he ruffed another club and finessed the jack of hearts. He then cashed the ace of hearts and ruffed his last club, the ace. Now he led dummy's established heart.

Students 'tune in and turn on' - televisions and computers, that is

Kids are watching a lot of television these days at school and 10-year-olds are learning keyboarding and software programs like WordPerfect, Microsoft Word and Claris Works.

Computers, satellite and closed-circuit TV have come to students at Sierra Vista Primary and White Mountain Elementary and Intermediate Schools.

Some of them are tracking Hurricane Georges daily, some of them are acquiring reading skills and learning words, some are watching educational television programs, while others are interacting with instructional CDs. Each classroom has a 32-inch color television monitor mounted on the wall connected to a teacher's computer that can bring up websites, CDs, distance-learning programs from the Los Angeles school system or

Eastern New Mexico University - Portales.

Students can communicate with other schools live and via videos (thanks to the new satellite dish on the roof of White Mountain Intermediate School), and receive all 56 channels provided by Lincoln Cablevision.

They can watch live science experiments that they don't have the lab equipment to perform in their classrooms, and they can call up and ask questions of the people doing the experiments. The new system also makes work easier for teachers who have computers and modems at home. They can prepare their lesson plans and do research with dial-up access that ties into the system.

"This system would cost hundreds of thousands of dollars if not for local partners and grants from the Hubbard Foundation, the Museum of the Horse, OnTrack, Inc. (producers of Channel 11), the (ENMU)

campus here and in Portales, and the National Science Foundation," said Paul Wirth, director of instructional support for the Ruidoso Municipal Schools.

A federal grant from the Technology, Literacy, Challenge Fund and partnership with ENMU-Portales helped get the satellite services, so the schools only had to buy the dish, Wirth said.

A partnership with Lincoln Cablevision also made this amazing system possible, and employees Dan Sherrell, Dan Frances, Monte Edwards, and Bill Watrous received Warrior cups and passes to athletic events for giving up their own time to wire the buildings.

The "computer and cable guy," Mark Hamilton, hired by the school district to help set up the system, said they'd blocked out all the pay channels and put in their own instead. They also installed an automatic screening program called the Screen Door

that blocks access to inappropriate websites and updates itself daily.


Because the system requires extensive staff development and training, special classes are held every semester at ENMU to train teachers in the use of this technology, Wirth said.

Leigh Carter is a teacher at the two computer labs at White Mountain Intermediate School. Each lab has 25 computers and a wall monitor.

"This year I have a super 'carrot,' he said, referring to built-in incentives for students to learn their way around the Internet. "I give them a 30-minute assignment to find Garfield on the net."

In Deanna Wright's Resource Room for Instructional Support, five different levels of readers use the wall monitor for learning to read and for writing and illustrating books.

"After writing a couple of drafts they can do it on the com-

puter and illustrate it," she said. Studying "old places" is "pretty cool," said students in Waynta Wirth's class studying Mesopotamia with a CD on ancient civilizations. Phyllis Parker's sixth grade

computer lab is learning to do image processing. Sue Keeton's fifth graders are using a website SETI put together to calculate how long it would take to get to Alpha Satari in search of extraterrestrials.









The Great Dutch Artist

Vincent van Gogh



"Self-Portrait as an Artist" (1888) shows van Gogh at his easel, holding brushes and a palette loaded with bright colors. Van Gogh's brush marks are always very visible. He drew with the brush, as well as using brush marks to apply color and create textures.

Sometimes we might look at a painting and just see a picture the artist painted.

Other times we might react to the picture. We might feel the way the artist wanted us to feel. The artist might touch us in some way.

Vincent van Gogh is such an artist. His paintings sincerely express his feelings. He had a human touch that makes viewers relate or feel "at home" with his works.

Vincent van Gogh had intense, or strong, feelings. He used color and light and the strokes of his brush to create the masterpieces that remain among the most popular in the world. He ranks as one of the world's greatest artists.

In the Netherlands



"The Potato Eaters" is a large painting of Dutch peasants drinking coffee and eating a simple meal of boiled potatoes. This is van Gogh's earliest masterpiece, painted in 1865. He had been painting for only a few years. He considered this to be his best painting ever.

A busy artist

Van Gogh was a man with lots of energy. Although his career as an artist lasted less than 10 years, he created about 2,000 paintings and drawings that exist today.

He also found time to write letters, mostly to his younger brother, Theo. More than 750 of his letters are still around. He was an intelligent man who could write in and speak French and English, as well as his native Dutch.

His art was ahead of its time. While he did have people who admired his paintings, they did not begin to sell until after his death.

His early years

Vincent van Gogh was born in 1853 in a small town in the Netherlands. His father was a preacher.

At 16, he took his first job, that of an art dealer. He was not a success. He then became a teacher, and then a missionary. None of these jobs worked out.

At 27, he decided to become an artist. He had no idea whether he had the talent or not.

In the French countryside

WHY NOT TRY DRAWING YOUR SHOES?

"A Pair of Shoes," painted in 1885, shows that van Gogh was able to give us a sense that these boots had traveled many miles.

YOU CAN SEE WHY VAN GOGH WAS VERY PROUD OF THIS PAINTING.

"The Harvest" was painted after van Gogh tired of Paris and moved to Arles, a small town in the south of France. He painted peasants at work in the cornfields with the mountains in the background. (1888)

Van Gogh in Paris

Van Gogh moved to Paris to live with his younger brother in 1886, six years after he began painting. Theo was an art dealer who believed in Vincent and supported him. Vincent, in turn, sent him many of his paintings.

Theo introduced van Gogh to a group of painters called the "Impressionists." They used fresh, bright colors to give impressions of what they saw. They often painted out of doors.

NOTICE THAT THE SHADES ARE MUCH LIGHTER.

Yellow is a favorite van Gogh color. While he painted happy pictures, he was a very troubled man.

"The Bedroom" features the artist's own room painted in a simple, cozy way. (1888)

It was painted when van Gogh was expecting a visit from Paul Gauguin, another artist. Van Gogh hoped that Gauguin and other artists would settle nearby and form an artists' colony. Gauguin was hard to get along with. They quarreled a great deal. After an argument, van Gogh cut off his own ear in a fit of rage.

Vegetable Gardens and the Moulin de Blute-Finon-Montmartre" (1887) is a view of Paris many years ago when there were gardens and windmills.

The Mini Page thanks Dr. Phillip Conisbee, senior curator of European painting, National Gallery of Art, for help with this issue.

Next week, The Mini Page looks at some healthy choices.

"Almond Blossom" (1890) was painted as a gift to Theo after the birth of Theo's son. Van Gogh painted it while he was in a mental asylum. He took his own life at the age of 37, in 1890.

"Portrait of Camille Roulin" (1888) is of the son of a local postman. The postman was one of the few friends van Gogh made in the small town.

The exhibit "Van Gogh's Van Goghs" will be on display at the National Gallery of Art, Washington, D.C., from Oct. 4, 1998 through Jan. 3, 1999. It will travel to the Los Angeles County Museum and be on display from Jan. 17 through April 4, 1999.







POOP SCOOP

As promised, listed below are some of the top 10 traveling tips included in "Pets Welcome: A Guide to Hotels, Inns and Resorts That Welcome You and Your Pet."

I'll complete the list in next week's column.

Touted by the Humane Society of the United States, the book focuses more on interesting places to stay in a community, but doesn't attempt to list all of the motels that also may accept pets. The authors, Kathleen and Robert Fish, have written many others books on travel and on pets.

This edition deals with the lower 48 states.

The first five tips are:

1. Bring your pet's own food, dishes, litter and litter box, leash, and a bottle of water, a first-aid kit and a towel for home.

The extra effort will help your pet feel more at home and prevent stomach aches from drinking new water.

The authors also recommend maintaining as nearly as normal feeding and walking schedules.

The suggest bringing old bath towels in case of accidents and plastic bags to use for the pet's waste.

It's also a good idea to bring a photograph of the pet in case you

become separated.

2. Always bring the animal's vaccination records. If traveling outside of your home state, also bring a health certificate. If you plan to board the pet on the trip at any time, call ahead to reserve space and to find out if the owner requires anything else.

3. To maintain the "at home" feeling as much as possible, bring your pet's favorite toys, leash, grooming supplies, medications, bedding and waste removal supplies, as well as an old blanket from home to place over the hotel's bedding, or to protect car seats.

4. Tape the address of where you're staying on the back of your pet's ID tag or add a laminated card or new ID tag to the collar. Another option is to put on a second collar with a friend or family member's phone number.

"It's always a good idea to have a second contact person on your pet's collar in case of a natural disaster so that someone out of your area can be contacted if you and your pet become separated," the authors write.

5. Don't leave a pet unattended in a hotel room. Because it's unfamiliar surroundings, he may become destructive or upset, or bark excessively, even if that is not normal behavior. The animal also might escape if a maid opens the door, or even attack the intruder.

Holodeck high jinks, Borg baby in new season of *Voyager*

Star Trek: Voyager is upping the stakes as its fifth season launches Wednesday, Oct. 14, on UPN.

The popular sci-fi series promises a more cinematic tone and a deepening of crew relationships as the 24th-century starship struggles to find its way back to the Alpha Quadrant.

Voyager, the third series to be based on Gene Roddenberry's original *Star Trek*, chronicles the adventures of the U.S.S. *Voyager* led by Capt. Kathryn Janeway (Kate Mulgrew).

In keeping with Roddenberry's initial goals, this *Star Trek* crew also places priority on the "prime directive": not interfering with the integrity of the life forms they encounter. However, in the season premiere, *Voyager* meets a new species that won't survive without the crew's intervention.

Co-executive producer Brannon Braga says this season is going to be an interesting one. No new permanent characters will be created, but last year's addition of the Borg-turned-human, Seven of Nine (Jeri Ryan), continues to gener-

ate interest and plot twists. In an upcoming episode, a mysterious fusion of her Borg nanoprobe technology and the Doctor's (Robert Picardo) mobile emitter creates a male Borg drone who awaits instruction from the insidious Borg Collective.

The season also marks the debut of *The Adventures of Captain Proton*, Tom Paris' (Robert Duncan McNeill) retro-holodeck program that fashions him as a space hero from the 1930s.

"We'll have one whole *Captain Proton* story, which means the whole episode will be in black and white, our science-fiction equivalent of *Scream* in the horror picture genre," Braga says. "Every sci-fi cliché is imminent."

The show's writers "continually want to keep the audience on their toes," he continues, "so every week is something new and fresh, expansive and ambitious."

Countering persistent rumors, Braga says he "highly doubts" this season will finally bring *Voyager* home, thus ending the series. But maintaining an edge of mystery, he adds, "We've certainly talked more about it this season than earlier. No decision has been made."

Vietnam: The Soldiers' Story

offers firsthand history

The Vietnam War was the longest conflict in U.S. history, and for many, it remains the least understood. To commemorate the 15th anniversary of the dedication of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C., The Learning Channel attempts to shed light on the conflict with *Vietnam: The Soldiers' Story*, a six-part documentary airing Sunday, Oct. 11, through Tuesday, Oct. 13.

ABC correspondent Jack Smith hosts the series, which was co-produced by ABC News Productions. Smith is an especially appropriate host. He earned a Bronze Star and a Purple Heart in the battle at Ia Drang, where a North Vietnamese soldier, presuming he was dead, used him as a sandbag for a machine gun.

The participants tell their war stories starkly, with unflinching detail. Occasionally, their voices crack as they remember how friends died. Most of the time, however, they talk calmly and deliberately, aware they are preserving for history their particular take on a war fraught with ambiguity.

They tell of sliding on grass slippery with the blood of their fallen comrades and how they didn't think there could be any more gunfire after a night of relentless siege.

As 1st Lt. Larry Gwin, a Vietnamese-speaking graduate of Yale's ROTC program, says plainly, "There is no glory in war. War sucks."

The men's stories are naturally compelling.

"We never got to know the names of the patients," Army medic Carey Spearman recalls. "We knew them by the wounds." He remembers how the injured just kept coming, by helicopter, by stretcher and sometimes just limping in.

The documentary is divided into six parts. Sunday night begins with "Ambush: The Battle of Ia Drang," and continues with "Under Siege at Khe Sanh." Monday details the infamous lunar new year offensive in "Tet: The Battle for Hearts and Minds," and a Vietnam icon, the helicopter, is the focus of "War in the Skies." During this installment, Sen. John McCain, who was shot down by a missile over Hanoi in 1967, tells his story. McCain was held until 1973 at Wah

Lo Prison (the "Hanoi Hilton"), where he and his fellow POWs communicated by tapping out messages in Morse code while in solitary confinement.

The final two parts air Tuesday night. "Secret War, Secret Men" chronicles the efforts of intelligence officers and the clandestine war of counterinsurgency. Firsthand accounts of the war's end finish the series in "Last Chopper Out: The Fall of Saigon."

The sharing of these personal stories, Smith says, is part of an attempt to depoliticize the war. "There's a lot of mythology about the Vietnam War by the media and by the people who used to be called left-wing, and I wanted to make sure that didn't creep into it," he explains.

The documentary first shows the veterans as they were: fresh-faced soldiers — youngsters, really. Then the screen fills with the faces of middle-aged men who recall horrid details from parts of their youth spent in faraway jungles.

From farm boys to Bronx Bombers, they open up about a war that few understood then and most still don't.

And that's the problem with this documentary: It doesn't explain enough. Showing a map quickly is not enough to put this war in context. A couple of minutes of footage of President Lyndon Johnson announcing his decision to not seek re-election doesn't do it either.

It's wonderful that ABC held on to this footage and that Smith is such a capable reporter. But not everyone can cite the various battles or even why we were there in the first place. Some historical and political context is necessary. Without it, the documentary seems made exclusively for those who already have knowledge of Vietnam.

Still, *Vietnam: The Soldiers' Story* is worth watching. For those old enough to remember World War II, these soldiers prove bravery shines through regardless of the enemy. For those who grew up with Vietnam on the nightly news, the documentary recalls the soldiers whose lives were shaped by this war. And for those not yet born when magazines and newspapers ran endless lists of slain U.S. troops, this is history they must learn.

The black-and-white footage seems far away and almost innocent — until you remember this is not an old movie. This was real.

Survivalists, take note. There's a creature who can go five months without food if he has to, hunt when it's 30 degrees below zero, swim a hundred miles with barely a rest, and likes it just fine when there's no neighbor in sight. There's much to learn about him; but he's not especially fond of being watched. He is among the hardest, strongest, and fiercest of all mammals, and perhaps the most solitary. He is the polar bear.

Nature launches its 17th season this fall with "Great White Bear," a film that spans thousands of miles to compile an intimate portrait of this singular creature, with images never before brought to the screen.

Polar bears, as noted, lead an extraordinary harsh existence. Food is almost always scarce and the weather is bleak much of the year. When the brief summer brings improvement, melting some of the ice and opening ocean channels, the bears must travel vast distances in pursuit of their most common prey — ringed seals — which are also on the move.

Ranging from Canada to Norway and the islands and seas in between, "Great White Bear" follows both male and female bears through the changing seasons and across shifting land and seascapes.

Just when you think it might be safe to go in the water, here come 870 other hungry species as Nature presents "Sharks and Rays: Killer Cousins."

Sharks and their biological cousins, the fearsome rays, are among the highest-profile denizens of the deep, thanks to the popularity of books and films that have cast them in leading roles — as antagonist, not protagonist.

The kinship between rays and sharks is not readily apparent. The family resemblance is under the skin — both have skeletons and cartilage rather than bone. In the rays' long evolutionary development, their fins and body merged into one flat surface, and their mouth and gills — in most species — migrated to their underside.

Of the more than 370 species of sharks, most have escaped the notoriety — and public awareness — that surrounds the great white, the tiger, and a few others. Whether high or low profile, sharks all have their roles to play in the complex ecosystem of the seas. "Sharks and Rays: Killer Cousins" explores the fascinating variety of these creatures, while dispelling some of the myths that envelop them.

Like sharks, the even more numerous rays — more than 500 species in all — display variety in both their looks and lifestyles. And one species, the stingray, actually poses greater danger to humans than do its more feared cousins. In fact, stingrays cause more injuries to people than do all other rays and sharks combined.

Two NBC dramas portray family struggles

There's more than geography separating the McCallister family of New York's Hell's Kitchen and the Connolly clan of Hawaii, as viewers will see when two new dramas, the meaty *Trinity* and the fluffy *Wind on Water*, debut this week on NBC.

Trinity, about the tensions and troubles of five grown Irish-Catholic siblings, premieres Friday, Oct. 16. The ensemble cast is headed by Tate Donovan as Kevin, a priest.

Also starring are Bonnie Root as Amanda, a schoolteacher; Charlotte Ross as Fiona, a stockbroker; Sam

Trammell as Liam, a hustling union organizer; Justin Louis as Bobby, a police officer; and Kim Raver as Bobby's wife, Clarissa. Jill Clayburgh and John Spencer make occasional appearances as parents Eileen and Sigon.

Acknowledging the glut of Irish-American characters on the tube today, executive producer John Wells, who shepherded the hit series *ER* for the past few years, is philosophical.

"You're always going to find (producers coming) up with the same general notion at the same time," he says. "We're all looking at the same group of market indicators, trying to find something that will fit into that in an interesting way."

In *Trinity*, Wells says he wants to capture "the basic conflict and dynamic which is driving the American family. I think an Irish family, because of the influence of the church, and a heritage which requires that you remain close, is a good place to examine that tension."

Series creator Matthew McNair Carnahan purposely gave the characters careers that would generate differing points of view and shifting allegiances.

"I really wanted to pit as diverse a group against or with one another as possible ... and (yet) ultimately express that they're family," Carnahan says.

That's a lot to bite off, and the *Trinity* pilot is an overburdened hour.

NBC has not succeeded with a family-centered melodrama in recent years, and the expanding *Dateline* franchise has left few time slots unclaimed.

"My assumption is the show will get off to a slow start," Wells says, conceding the target audience on Fridays is "a group of people who plan to go Saturday, Sept. 17."

Six time zones from New York, the Connollys of Hawaii try to hold onto their piece of paradise. Concocted by soft-porn impresario Zalman King and

professional surfer Matt George, the coming-of-age drama is long on looks, with Bo Derek as an unmatronly out but never quite make it."

For those still on the couch 24 hours later, there's *Wind on Water*, debuting mother. William Gregory Lee and Brian Gross play her sons, extreme-sports gladiators who spend much of the pilot engaged in a chest-thumping surf contest with a local rival (Shawn Christian).

Lee Horsley (*Matt Houston*) is wasted in his first bad-guy role, as a land-grabbing snake of a neighbor. Jacinda Barrett, who broke into show business on MTV's *The Real World*, plays his turncoat daughter.

More conversation piece than story, *Wind on Water* should have been billed as a limited series, for that's just what it will be: an eye-dazzling Hawaiian vacation of six weeks ... or shorter.

Landing roles is child's play for Stabile

There is life beyond soaps, and Nick Stabile (*ex-Mark, Sunset Beach*) is making the most of it.

Before *Gunsmoke*, he co-starred on TV's *Ripcord*, appeared in such movie hits as *Mister Roberts*, *The Alamo* and

The Searchers, and did guest shots on TV shows including *Wagon Train* and *Rawhide*. Curtis also provided a voice in Walt Disney's animated *Robin Hood*. By the way, he appeared as four different characters (including Festus) on *Gunsmoke* before becoming a regular in 1964.

A: Neither. The actress, who has never been married, was born Diane Hall — hence the last name of her Oscar-winning alter ego, Annie Hall. The actor's real name is Michael Keaton Douglas.






