

Oct./Nov. phases of the moon



White Oaks Eagle Oct. 11, 1900

fundamental differences with commissioners on these items, then I think we need to negotiate with them or re-evaluate having the ETZ altogether."

Donaldson will give commissioners a formal list of what village officials think

need to be changed, added or deleted to make the extra-territorial zoning concept work.

"We'll go from there," he said. "I don't necessarily expect a decision tomorrow. They may need to have some hearings. But we need to know at least if we're on the same page. If we're fundamentally headed in different direc-

tions, we need to have some discussions before (a draft is put together)."

The mayor also will stay for the commission discussion of an oversight committee to monitor the county narcotics investigation unit and the sharing of proceeds from items seized during drug investigations and later sold.

The 44-item agenda lists several other issues, including another in a series of discussions about starting an independent county indigent fund, debate over the future of the Glencoe Rural Events Center on U.S. 70 and a discussion of the legislative package from the Association of Counties.

miss her," she said.

Calaway said three board members "more or less had me with a voting block and they told me that." She spoke of conflicts of interest and said she had been on the board for six years to serve the interests of the school and the community,

not to represent special interests or make deals for the "good ol' boys' political game."

"This is an extremely critical time for the school with the school bond issue coming up and the building (expansion) and everything," she said. "That was one of the most difficult things for me - to resign - because I didn't want anything

that would cast a shadow on the school at all, but the way they put it to me, it was just something I won't deal with."

She said she hoped that people would watch what's going on and that concerned people who have the best interests of the school and community in mind would decide to run for election to the school

board in December for the election in February.

"I hope my decision to resign from the board will shed light on their actions and they will rethink their ways of performing school board business. I left the school board with a heavy heart and a clear conscience," she said.

tives with constructive ideas would be welcome.

Contacting the state Monuments Division of the New Museum State Museum to see if the state would be interested in taking over responsibility for operating the two properties. The monuments division already manages several other properties in the settlement.

Forming a community trust that could acquire the properties and run them, if the Heritage Trust dissolves, and possibly could result in a more unified effort of the entire community with less factional fighting.

Calling for the resignation of current Trust board members, asking for a new mission for the Trust and for more community input and involvement.

Asking the state Attorney General and possibly the Internal Revenue Service to take a look at the operation and to determine what happened to the original endowment and money generated from the sale of other property owned by the Trust.

Asking the Trust board and the state to consider going back to a one-ticket approach for the town's museums and historical buildings.

Neil Caldwell, a Texas judge who also has a home in Lincoln, recently resigned from the Trust board, as did Charlotte Lee. Caldwell was out of town Monday, but Lee said they both were appointed in May and resigned at about the same time.

She and Caldwell, who was chairman of the board, were surprised when the motion to close the museum came up during the meeting Thursday, Lee said.

"It was a surprise to both of us," she said. "I was astonished. I didn't vote I was so surprised."

Several other things were bothering her that she declined to specify Monday, but Lee said the vote to close the museum for six months was the break point for her.

The board put the Wortley Hotel up for sale last June after having trouble with the previous management, the trustee said. Although national newsman Sam Donaldson, who owns two ranches in eastern Lincoln County and attended the military academy in Roswell, was interested in buying the restaurant, he was not selected, the trustee said.

People at the meeting Thursday said the Trust board voted instead to sell the hotel to a local man for a reported

When several at the meeting questioned how the board legally could accept anything but the lowest bid, they were told by Gary Miller, who helped with the restoration and revitalization of the town as trust director two decades ago, the organization is strictly private. Federal money that went into the work carried the stipulation that for 10 years it must be operated as a museum, but that time requirement has passed, he said. They are not bound by laws governing boards using public money, he said.

"Maybe they don't have to have public meetings, but it would be beneficial if everyone knew about it," Dunlap said.

"That's the attitude (not being open) that has prompted many of us to pull back," said Virginia Vigil, owner of The Ellis Store Country Inn. "They haven't wanted us as partners."

Cille Dickinson said a woman she knows would be willing to put money into the Trust, but only if the current board resigned.

Miller said one of the main errors in the running of the Trust has been to rely on Anderson's contribution and not go out and find younger board members and other sources of private and public money. If a

new board is appointed, it should be a working board, he said.

But many state agencies, like some of the Lincoln County commissioners, are leery of becoming involved with Lincoln's problems, because the town is known for its divisiveness and in-fighting by different groups, said several people at the meeting and the trustee.

Long time resident Betty Shrecengost said the four men who founded the Trust, including the later Peter Hurd and her father, never envisioned this happening. Someone should be held accountable for how the money has been spent, she said.

Miller said he finds it sad to hear talk about going to the attorney general. He's confident that trustees like Frances "Dede" Freeman have the best intentions and that she has tried on several occasions to do more for the people in the town, he said.

"Somehow or other we need to form a bond of the three entities to work together," Miller said. "I think the mission of the Trust is largely completed."

A new mission is needed and a board that will focus on accomplishing it, he said, adding, "I don't think the way to resolve this is to play hardball."

Jail study draws 2-year-old conclusions

Some Lincoln County Commissioners didn't put much faith in conclusions contained in a study they commissioned on construction of a new county jail, but many of the statements there echo prior input from jail construction consultant Tommy Warren.

In bold black letters, authors of the study stated that the major costs of a detention facility are not in building one, but in operating it. Warren, who built several correctional facilities in Texas, said much the same thing about two years ago when he offered suggestions to the county.

Commissioners, in a 4-1 vote last month with Commissioner Wilton Howell choosing to see more input, decided to build a new jail in Carrizozo. They sought short-term savings through free land, utility availability and road access, over possible long-term savings by building closer to Ruidoso, the population center and the source of most of the criminal cases in the county.

"Nobody ever took a look at the cost long-term," Gary Mitchell, chairman of a county-appointed jail committee, said Tuesday. "I've been telling everybody all along this will affect the county for 30 years and we need to take more than a little look."

Tommy Warren came in and basically told them what it would cost and the jail committee did too. The three groups in the business told them the same thing, you can build it cheaper in Carrizozo, but long term it will cost a whole lot more."

Figures compiled by the consultants show the county and village of Ruidoso would save nearly \$5.9 million over 20 years, if the jail was built close enough to the village to elimi-

nate the need for 72-hour holding cells in Ruidoso and to cancel the need for much transportation.

Specific size, method of financing and design have not been chosen by commissioners, but they appear to have rejected the idea of consolidating services (such as radio dispatch) and haven't endorsed or rejected courtrooms in the jail complex to reduce prisoner transportation costs.

Put together by Ray Mitcham Associates, P2RS Group Inc., Gerald A. Martin Ltd., Toby Michael Enterprises and Municipal Capital Markets Group Inc., the study recommended building a 100-bed jail and initiating plans for alternative sentencing to eliminate future jail additions.

"We incarcerate too many individuals on a 24-hour-a-day basis that could easily be made to contribute to society in some more meaningful manner while helping to reduce the cost to the taxpayers of their incarceration without being 'soft on crime,'" the consultants wrote.

Those who should be in jail are people who might flee, who represent a danger to the community and people accused of violent felonies, according to the study. The latter category shouldn't be kept in a county jail, such prisoners should be sent to maximum security facilities for close keeping, the authors wrote.

Many of the inmates in county jail don't require a single-person cell and could be in less costly larger cells with several other inmates, they wrote.

"Some might even be qualified under the right program to be released several hours a day to perform some useful service to society," the consultants suggested.

They recommended the creation of a county coordinator of Alternative Sentencing Programs. The person hired would identify, establish, implement and monitor a range of programs.

"Such an effort can only suc-

ceed if county officials take the lead in bringing together all segments of the criminal justice system in the county and having all agree to support such an initiative," they wrote.

Programs could include releasing people waiting for trial on their own recognizance and on bonds; and those already convicted to be put on electric monitors, allowing them to leave the jail during the day on work release or to do community service. A judge might determine that society and the defendant might both gain from a suspended sentence that includes mandatory attendance at educational classes and at substance abuse treatment programs. Enlisting the cooperation of district judges in expediting the hearings of individuals picked up for probation violations would help reduce the cost to the county of their incarceration, the authors wrote.

"Nobody ever took a look at the cost long-term," Gary Mitchell, study committee chair, said. "We are convinced that a well-run facility can operate at 85 percent or better occupancy and thus reduce the costs of debt service and operations for (taxpayers)," they wrote.

Marijuana grower pleads guilty

A Ruidoso woman accused in February of growing 400 marijuana plants in her home, pleaded guilty in federal district court Thursday to a charge of possession with intent to distribute more than 100 marijuana plants.

No date has been set for her sentencing, but court officials in Las Cruces said it would be at least 70 days.

Hubbard faces a maximum possible sentence of five to 40 years imprisonment, not less than four years of supervised probation and not more than a

\$16,000 savings.

Operational costs including jail personnel required for a jail reach a threshold based on economy of scale at 75 inmates, the consultants wrote. Carrying that figure up to 100 inmates doesn't significantly increase the cost in labor, but decreases the cost in overhead per inmate.

They estimated that operating costs for a county jail average \$30 to \$32 per inmate, per day. If the county used 50 beds and leased 50 at \$52 per day to other entities, it would realize an annual revenue of \$365,000, based on the assumption that the beds were kept filled. If the county charged \$70 a day, the revenue gained would hit \$693,500 in excess of the actual expense of keeping the prisoners, the consultants projected.

"We are convinced that a well-run facility can operate at 85 percent or better occupancy and thus reduce the costs of debt service and operations for (taxpayers)," they wrote.

At the grand opening, customers will have a chance to win a \$100 shopping spree, a color television, a tool chest and cabinet and a Kenmore upright vacuum cleaner, according to a company press release.

Refreshments will be served during the grand opening celebration, Varnadore said. And most merchandise in the store will be on sale, according to the release.

The 10,000-square-foot store, projected earlier to

cost about \$300,000, will offer electronics, appliances, tools and lawn and garden equipment, according to earlier statements by Varnadore. The store does not sell clothing items or accessories.

"We're very excited to open a Sears store right here in Ruidoso Downs," Varnadore said in the release.

"Local customers can expect excellent customer service, a great selection of quality merchandise and the same national pricing as the Sears mall stores."

The store will have a small ribbon cutting on Oct. 22, which will be attended by Sears officials, Varnadore said.

Construction of the store took about two and a half months, beginning in July, Varnadore said. The groundbreaking was held in May.

The store will also offer repair service on all brands of appliances and consumer electronics.

A small matter of trust

One burdensome item (No. 29) on the five-page agenda of the Lincoln County Commission meeting coming up Friday in the Ruidoso Village Council chambers has to do with naming an oversight committee to keep track of money received by the sheriff's department as a result of drug busts around the county.

It's an issue raised by Ruidoso's Commissioner Wilton Howell, following a controversy over the purchase of an "undercover vehicle" and the accounting of something like \$33,000 in funds received by the sheriff's department through the county.

Sheriff Tom Sullivan doesn't like it; says it's nobody's business but his, since it's money resulting from a special state law. He says he has no problem with Treasurer Joan Park handling the money, but he doesn't want the county finance office (that works for the county manager) touching it. Sullivan says he doesn't trust that office.

Howell has proposed a citizens' committee to be a watchdog over the drug money on the public's behalf.

The problem with this and so many other similar "oversight" proposals is that it shifts responsibility away from the people we elect to solve the problems.

If Commissioner Howell had, instead, proposed an ordinance giving the newly hired county manager some assurance that he won't be fired for doing his job anytime three of five elected commissioners got mad at him—now there's something that might solve a good many of the problems agitating county government right now.

Archaeological gold at Orogrande

Clovis and Folsom are New Mexico place names, but they are also household words to archaeologists and anthropologists.

Until recently, scientists believed that distinctive stone spearheads

found near Clovis, dated as being about 11,500 years old, were the first evidence of human habitation in the Americas.

These people came from Asia, it is believed, crossing about 50 miles of what is now ocean in the Bering Strait between Siberia and Alaska, at a time, during an ice age, when it was dry land.

The Clovis people were followed here in warmer times by Paleo-Indians we call Folsom, named after the little town east of Raton near where their first site was found. They lived 10,000 to 11,000 years ago, and their unusual grooved arrowheads are found across the state.

New Mexico's dry climate provides a unique repository for the artifacts of these prehistoric cultures, so scientists around the world are familiar with the words Clovis and Folsom, and with other New Mexico place names like Sandia, Mimbres and Mogollon, where later sites have been un-

covered.

Now another New Mexico place is becoming a common word in the scientific vocabulary, although many are skeptical of the evidence it provides. The place is Orogrande, where "big gold" was discovered early in this century. The town, located south of the Sacramento Mountains between Alamogordo and El Paso, Texas, had a brief heyday until the gold ran out.

But in May, 1991, archaeologist Richard MacNeish announced the discovery of a cave near the town that he says indicates human habitation as early as 40,000 years ago.

MacNeish found stones that appear to have been chipped by humans that he dates back 38,000 years. A 26,000-year-old toe-bone of a horse was also found — with a spear point embedded in it. And the remains of a clay fire-place, with human fingerprints intact, has been dated at 28,000 years.

Later MacNeish found human hairs embedded in the cave floor. A piece of charcoal from the same layer was dated at over 20,000 years.

"It looks like I'm going to win this one by a hair," MacNeish joked, but some of his colleagues weren't amused. His discovery, if verified, will help shatter the tidy picture of human migration to the Americas that scientists have constructed since the artifacts of the Clovis people were found. Scientists are reluctant to change their theories.

Luckily for MacNeish, his discovery was not made in a vacuum. In recent years a number of sites have been found that appear to push the arrival of humans here back thousands of years.

In Pennsylvania, a fragment of a woven bark mat or basket was dated at 19,600 years. In the Yukon, a carved caribou bone was found that is believed to be almost 25,000 years old. And in Brazil, artifacts have been dated as old as 47,000 years.

It will be interesting to see how soon these discoveries will be accepted, and how the theory of the land-bridge between Asia and North America will be changed. What these finds seem to indicate is that a number of migrations occurred over thousands of years.

Another area of study may

be of help. Languages change slowly, and scientists who might be called "linguistic archaeologists" are studying the existing tongues of the Native American people. In doing so, they find evidence of ancient interactions between groups, and some have claimed that evidence indicates a 40,000-year evolution of speech.

Whatever the outcome of these findings, it is clear that we in New Mexico walk the same land that has been home to humans for millennia. In every corner of the state, the next rock you see might be a message left by someone who lived when mammoths and prehistoric horses and camels walked the same trails.

Downs equipment yard meets opposition

More than a dozen people met with success Monday night after they protested a proposed relocation of the village of Ruidoso Downs' heavy equipment yard from in front of village hall to the Agua Fria water utility on South Spring Road.

"Those of us who live up above the juncture of Spring Road are very concerned about the equipment yard that is planned (next to the Agua Fria water utility)," said Jake Harris, who presented the council with a 13-point list of reasons why the yard shouldn't be relocated to the proposed site.

"For one reason, it will devalue our property," Harris said, adding that the road to the proposed yard was too narrow for two cars to pass, let alone heavy equipment.

Another reason residents gave against moving the equipment yard was that oil spills and leaks from the equipment could contaminate the water.

"It just angers me because nobody (from the village) contacted us about it," said Mariella Levinson.

After listening to residents' objections to the proposed equipment yard, Ruidoso Downs Mayor Joe Hayhurst interjected to say: "If I may: There won't be any heavy equipment put up there."

Hayhurst told the residents that the village had proposed moving the equipment yard because of "thousands of complaints" about its present location, which is next to U.S. Highway 70 and in front of village hall.

"We just thought everybody would be so happy," he said of the proposed relocation. "The reason we did this is because we don't have anywhere else to put it."

Another site for the yard had not been researched because village leaders were not aware that people opposed the proposed site on South Spring

Hayhurst said.

Responding to questions from residents, Hayhurst and Village Clerk Leann Wehbrecht said the village cannot use a segment of the All American Park to store the equipment because the state will not allow it.

Nor could the village use part of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority's recycling yard, which, said Hayhurst, didn't have enough room for its own equipment, much less village equipment.

"I'll sell you a piece of land right up the street," Harris told the mayor at one point.

Under questioning from Hayhurst, Harris said the property was in a subdivision, which, said the mayor, may meet with equal disapproval from neighbors.

Hayhurst said even though the equipment yard is no longer considered for Spring Road, the village still intends to widen the road and provide better maintenance, such as snow removal in the winter.

LCMC continues search for administrator

The community-based board that oversees the operation of the Lincoln County Medical Center is in no hurry to find a replacement for Valerie Miller, who resigned earlier this month after eight years at the helm of the hospital in Ruidoso.

"We're comfortable with the team in place now," board chairman Gary

Mitchell said Tuesday. "We have plenty of time to do a good search."

Mitchell said even if it takes several months to find Miller's replacement, "we're not in a big hurry."

Julie Sterchi is interim administrator of the 38-bed hospital.


The board is using a national search system







With the first nine weeks of the school year nearing its end, what grade has the Ruidoso football team earned according to its head coach Les Carter? "B plus," answered Carter Tuesday. "We've had definitely an above average pre-district schedule."

Carter rated the Warriors as B-plus across the board, which included the offensive backfield, offensive line, defensive line, linebackers and defensive secondary.

The Ruidoso special teams unit received a solid "B" for its coverage on kickoffs, returns on kickoffs, field goals and

point after kicks. Kicker Brad Davidson is one of the Warriors' special teams player who helps the unit make the grade. Davidson has missed just one extra point and is perfect from field goal range. He has kicked two field goals from 40 yards or beyond, and, according to Carter, loves playing his part — a part which makes Davidson a hero or a goat depending on the accuracy of his leg.

"He likes the pressure of it (field goal kicking). That's the good feeling," Carter said.

The Warriors own a 6-1 record heading into a bye week. There's a chance Ruidoso (rated No. 3 last week) will move up a spot in the AP Top 10 Poll as well. The Warriors whipped Santa Teresa, 58-28, Friday. The No. 2 Lovington Wildcats lost their first of the year to Class AAAA Clovis. It's anyone's guess whether or not

pollsters will penalize Lovington for the loss.

Despite the good grades, Ruidoso needs to turn it up a notch when it returns to action Oct. 23 against No. 1 Artesia.

"It's time to change gears and hopefully we'll play 'A ball,'" Carter said.

About the only subject the Warriors to improve upon is in "psychology."

Sometimes against less worthy opponents the Warriors start slowly, Carter said. For example, Ruidoso was a bit lackluster in the opening quarter of the Albuquerque Academy game. The Warriors went on to blow away the Chargers, 35-0, Sept. 26.


On the up side of those situations, Carter said the Warriors wake up quickly and



explosively, especially on offense.

The Warriors have two weeks to prepare for the portion of their schedule that counts the most - districts. It starts with Artesia in the Bulldog Bowl on Oct. 23 and finishes up with back-to-back home games against Portales Oct. 30 and Lovington Nov. 6.

"We probably have the best district schedule of anybody in the district," Carter said. "Artesia has to prepare for us and then Lovington."

The Warriors have Portales sandwiched between Artesia and Lovington. The Rams are no pushover, but this year, they aren't the caliber of the other three teams in the AAAA.

The bye week means shorter practices for the Warriors. Carter said Ruidoso will alternate between defensive and offensive practices.

"We'll cut our practice time down," he said.

Carter and his staff will also spend the time looking for someone to fill the slotback position. That spot was vacated when Brett Meyer moved to the fullback's position to replace the injured Adrian Herrera.

Sophomore Ben Lundquist and Davidson seem the likely candidates to claim that spot, but Carter is considering moving a quicker second-team lineman to the position which is

mainly a blocking position.

Not much has changed with the Warrior defensive unit. Reny Reidhead, Keith Bassett and Brett Meyer will continue to rotate play-by-play in the linebacker positions, which affords one of them a breather.

So what does Carter suggest his Warriors do this week-end?

"They need to rest and relax, and go watch the volleyball team and do some things like that," he answered.

Ruidoso 53, Santa Teresa 28

After two quarters of play, the score of the Ruidoso/Santa Teresa game, 36-22, was more reminiscent of a six-man football shoot-out than an 11-man game.

"There was a lot of offense in the first half," Carter said. Not so for Santa Teresa in the second half of play.

It's a sooty business but someone has to do it

• Chimney sweeps say anyone can clean a chimney, but they know how to spot potential safety problems, too.

The most commonly asked question of chimney sweeps is how often should a chimney be swept.

"That kind of depends on how often you burn, but you need to inspect it annually," said Dave Buchanan, a chimney sweep and owner of The Fireplace.

With the first frost of the fall already come and gone, many people are stocking up on firewood and thinking about igniting that first fire, if they haven't already. One consideration before that match is lit — what's in the chimney?

Besides a dangerous build-up of creosote, or soot, which can lead to a chimney fire and possibly a house fire, chimneys should be checked for birds nests or even raccoons, Buchanan said.

Todd Blue, owner of Lincoln County Chimney Sweeps and a member of the national chimney sweep guild, said the rule of thumb is to clean chimneys once a year, though some may need to be swept only once every several years.

Rob Propsner, owner of A Basic Service, thinks a sweeping once every five years is adequate for most chimneys.

"But there are some chimneys that need to be cleaned every year if not twice a year," he said.

The cost of hiring a chimney sweep locally runs between \$50 and \$75, depending on who is called, the difficulty of the job and how many chimneys a home has, say Buchanan, Blue and Propsner. In the summer, the price is discounted, Blue said.

They agree that people don't have to hire a professional to clean their chimneys.

"There's nothing wrong with being a do-it-yourselfer," said Blue, who left the real estate business to become a chimney sweep. "But it can be a mess. And sometimes people don't know what they are getting into."

For instance, a sweep can tell someone if their chimney has structural problems that could lead to a fire — such as

metal components next to a home's wooden frame.

And most people wouldn't recognize signs of a previous chimney fire, Blue.

"It's usually not the first chimney fire that gets you — it's the second or third," he said, adding that the creosote can work its way through brick in the first fire, then ignite later in the framework.

Sometimes the creosote cannot be scrubbed off — it has to be softened first with chemicals.

Propsner, who has been cleaning chimneys since 1981, said a professional will be able to look for safety factors. "A sweep also knows to clean the smoke shelf, the frame that supports the flue, he said. Soot and ash tend to build up on the smoke shelf. The material can become deep enough that it will push the damper closed, Propsner said.

Someone cleaning their own chimney should start by shining a strong flashlight up into the fireplace to see what's up there, Buchanan said.

Then they should make sure they have sufficiently sealed their fireplace before cleaning, he said. Otherwise, soot will fill a home. Buchanan said if a fireplace doesn't have glass doors, then a plastic film should be taped around the fireplace. He uses masking tape. If a fireplace has glass doors, then tape the junctures to seal it.

Access to the roof is important, since that is where the cleaning takes place. The cap to the chimney is removed and the soot is brushed down into the fireplace using a brush attached to a long pole. The cap should be cleaned of soot as well so the fire will draw well.

Buchanan sells chimney brushes at his store at 202 Mechem Drive; a 6-inch brush is \$25 and a 10-inch brush is \$32. Rods, which are connected to the brushes to extend down into the chimneys, range from \$10 to \$20, he said.

Buchanan has heard about people using rock salt to clean a chimney, but has doubts about it being very effective. The idea is to throw rock salt on a burning fire and the salt causes soot to fall from the chimney. But Buchanan believes it would, at most, only soften the soot so that it could be scrubbed away easier.

Propsner said he has heard of people using pine branches to clean their chimneys, especially the smoke shelf. They trim two or three bottom branches from a tree and tie a rope to the limbs. He has heard of tying a rock to the other end of the rope and then dropping it down a chimney, but cautioned that most flues are ceramic and could be broken by dropping heavy things down the chimney.

Once the soot has been brushed down the chimney, the fireplace is unsealed and the soot scooped up into a container to be hauled away.

Blue wears a respirator during this part of the job as well as the next, when he cleans the smoke shelf using a brush about the length of a toilet bowl brush. Inhalation of soot is dangerous and over time can cause black lung and cause cancer, he said.

Do not try a vacuum up the soot with a household vacuum cleaner, Propsner cautioned. The particles in soot are so fine that they will escape most vacuums as well as clog the engines, he said. Sweepers have vacuums manufactured specifically for soot, said Blue and Propsner.

And the do-it-yourselfer should be prepared to get dirty.

"Oh yeah. That's not even an option. It just comes with the job," Buchanan said.

Propsner said people pay sweeps to do the work for three reasons — they have the special vacuums, they can spot safety problems and they are the ones who get dirty.

"It's a real dirty job. But then I could have been a plumber," Blue said.

► Chimney sweep tips

Some of these tips seem like common sense, people still ignore them:

- Make sure your chimney has a cap to keep rain and snow out. Water can rust metal components.
- Check your chimney for nesting animals before lighting the first fire of the season.
- Use a screen while burning.
- Place a fire resistant rug in front of the fireplace to catch sparks that get past the screen.
- Don't burn pine because it leaves a heavy build-up of soot in the chimney. Burn cedar, apple, juniper, oak and piñon.

BRIDGE TACTICS

The one and only way to play

South dealer
Both sides vulnerable

To play good bridge, certain good habits have to be developed. One of the most important of these is to count winners when playing a notrump contract.

Consider South's approach to this deal. He won the spade lead with dummy's queen and led a club, taking East's queen with the ace. Declarer then conceded a club to West's king, and back came a second spade to dummy's ace.

Although the clubs were not established, declarer had only eight tricks he could cash: four clubs, two spades and two hearts. When he later led a diamond, East took the ace and returned a spade to chalk up a one-trick set.

When South's method of play is analyzed, it becomes clear that his approach could never have succeeded in making the contract. He had to

lose a club and a diamond before he could score nine tricks, and since he also had to lose at least three spades after surrendering the lead twice, he was bound to fail.

If declarer realizes this at trick one, he should then appreciate the great advantage of leading a low diamond

from dummy at trick two. In the actual case, if East goes up with the ace, declarer acquires four diamond tricks and easily makes the contract. So let's say East plays the nine and South's king wins the trick.

Having "stolen" a diamond trick, declarer can next play the ace and another club. West wins and returns a spade to establish his suit, but his cause is already lost since South now has nine tricks consisting of four clubs, a diamond, two hearts and two spades.

Of course, if West happens to have the ace of diamonds, this line of play fails. But leading a diamond at trick two at least offers a reasonable chance for the contract, while tackling clubs first offers no chance at all.


Star-struck students get astronomical lesson on the constellations

Star Lab "agents" Kayla Scarafiotti and Frank Walston led 289 children and 65 adults through the constellations Monday through Thursday.

Star Lab is an inflatable planetarium that travels around to schools in New Mexico, on loan from the International Space Center in Alamogordo, explained Scarafiotti, a parent and volunteer with Action for Children and Teachers, who was trained, along with 14 teachers, last spring. Action for Children and Teachers paid for the rental of the Star Lab.

"You crawl in the entrance tube and sit down on your bottom, inside, and it's pitch black in there, and the projector sits right in the middle," Scarafiotti said. "They loved it, the instant they got in there, they were amazed at how many stars there were and the size of some of the stars. There's a dot that pictures so they could actually see what the Greeks or the Navajos were seeing."

"You can change the constellations (of) hand-punched film that give impressions of the stars. Some are larger in size, some are blue (the) hottest

stars), some are yellow; red are the coolest stars," she said.

Scarafiotti led 17 classrooms for the elementary school, Walston led five for the high school, and Scarafiotti also took three groups of adults on a journey to the stars on parent night.

The library put out books on the constellations and stars and designed a webquest that presents students with a problem and gives them addresses on the web to find the answers.

"Parents were amazed also," Scarafiotti said. "Crawling into it was a challenge, and sitting on the hard concrete floor was a challenge. We were really amazed by the detail that was provided by this planetarium."

"They looked at stars of the northern hemisphere and the constellations of different cultures and discussed the Hubbell Telescope and the observatories in New Mexico.

Second graders asked incredible questions, she said, like: How far away are the stars? Why do people use stars? How can they tell directions by the stars?"

Thursday afternoon, Scarafiotti deflated and packed up the planetarium into a duffel bag and three boxes, ready for the United Parcel Service to pick up; the company donated the shipping, so kids could see

Star Lab, she said.

The Space Center has three Star Labs they rent out to schools all over the state. The Hall of Fame Foundation purchased the first portable planetarium through a grant, said Victoria Wiggins, public programs manager for the Education Department at the Space Center.

"There are only four permanent-site planetariums in the state of New Mexico, so (for) schools that wanted to do astronomy programming, it was very difficult for them."

The first Star Lab was such a success, they had to purchase

another within two years, she said, and soon realized they couldn't fill all the requests.

"That's when we started training the teachers," Wiggins said.

The training Scarafiotti participated in was held at White Mountain Elementary School in Ruidoso, she said, and they were trained to set up the planetarium, use the equipment, and given lesson plans developed by Lawrence Hall of Science in California, and some instruction in basic astronomy concepts.

"We have over 150 teachers trained in New Mexico as Star Lab agents," she said.

Father David Berg of Santa Rita Catholic Church in Carrizozo will give the blessing. Everyone is invited regardless of denomination. Free Polaroid photographs will be taken of animals with Santa Claus, or you can bring your own camera.

Awards will be handed out. All types of pets are welcome, but be sure to keep them on a leash or under restraint.

More traveling hints

As promised, I'll finish the last five of 10 traveling hints contained in "Pets Welcome, a Guide to Hotels, Inns and Resorts."

The new book, written by Kathleen and Robert Fish, is published by Bon Vivant Press and sells for \$19.95.

I covered the first five traveling tips last week and here are the other five:

1. The whole experience is easier if your pet has been trained to accept being in a crate. It's handy for plane and car travel, or if a pet is left in a motel room. The crate eliminates the possibility of a pet escaping if a maid enters the room.

The authors wrote to be sure the

crate has enough room for the pet to stand comfortably and to turn around inside. Trim the pet's nails to prevent them from being caught in the crate door or ventilation holes.

Never take a pet with you if it will have to remain in the car. Temperatures skyrocket within minutes in a car, even with windows lowered for circulation.

2. The best way to give pets in a crate water is to freeze it in a cup that hooks onto the door of the crate. They'll have needed moisture without water splashing all over the crate. Freezing water in a bowl also works for car trips, the authors said.

3. Bring along your pet's favorite toys and bedding in the crate, which should be labeled with the word "Live Animal" and "This End Up," plus your address and phone number, those of your destination and an emergency contact person.

4. Book the most direct flight, if traveling by plane. The fewer transfers for your pet, the less chance of becoming separated. If the weather is hot or cold, a shorter trip is better for a pet waiting in the cargo hold of a plane. Check with the airlines about the type of crate they will accept.

5. Don't feed your pet before traveling. It will reduce the chance of an accident in the car. The authors also remind owners that pets need rest stops just as their owners do, to stretch their legs and relieve themselves. If your pet doesn't ride in the car much, start taking him for short rides a few weeks ahead of a trip, lengthening the time in the car as the date for the trip gets closer.



Caulking is a valuable yet easy household task most homeowners can perform.

Here is some basic "caulk talk" with tips from Ace Hardware:

Why you should caulk. Caulking prevents damage in areas that are exposed to water. The seal created by caulking stops leaks, but after time, this seal breaks down and needs to be replaced.

Types of caulking. There are two standard types of caulking: wet and dry. When caulking around areas that are exposed to water, be sure to use caulk that is formulated specifically for use in wet environments. The seal

will not secure properly if the wrong type of caulk is used.

Where you should caulk. Areas that come in direct contact with water or moisture should be caulked to prevent water damage. These areas include:

- The bathroom where the bathtub meets the tile wall or where the tub surround meets bathroom walls.
- Where the kitchen or bathroom sink meets the countertop or vanity.
- In a shower stall where the drain meets the shower floor, the shower door meets the walls and the shower walls meet surrounding walls.
- Anywhere soap dishes, shower seat or shelves meet the shower wall surface.


How to caulk. Start by removing the old caulk. This can be done easily with a chemical caulk remover and a knife or scraping instrument. After all caulk is removed, clean the surface thoroughly to eliminate mildew and soap scum.

When applying caulk, be sure to use even pressure. If you can avoid it, don't stop until you reach a corner. If the caulk comes out lumpy and uneven, smooth it with your finger.

"When caulking around the bathtub, the most important thing to remember is to fill it with water before you begin," adds Paula Thomas, consumer affairs manager at Ace Hardware Corp. "This will prevent the caulk from cracking under the additional weight of the water. Also, if the area you are caulking is small, such as a soap dish, use caulk in a small tube rather than a caulking gun."



Africans in America fills the information gap

Viewers who tune into PBS' *Africans in America* this week will be rewarded with a memorable journey.

Rich in sound, word and image, the nonfiction miniseries airs in four 90-minute installments from Monday, Oct. 19, through Thursday, Oct. 22 (check local listings). Spanning the years from the Jamestown colony in 1607 to the post-Civil War era, it adds a missing dimension of black experience to the story of the nation's founding.

Part 1 of the series, *The Terrible Transformation*, explains how the indentured servitude of both whites and blacks was used to build the North American colonies. When the first Africans arrived by chance on the Virginia coast in 1619, they were put to work alongside white indentured laborers.

"In 1619," notes historical novelist Charles Johnson (*Middle Passage*), "people were not categorized in terms of races."

Changes came "law by law," as the film's narrative puts it, first in Virginia and later in such colonies as Carolina, which had institutionalized slavery from its founding.

While landowners amassed fortunes using slave labor on one side of the ocean, black-on-black wars rained terror on the other shore. These simultaneous events decimated the population in Africa.

Part 2, *Revolution*, uses individual stories of slaves and masters — including Virginia planter George Washington — to explore the tension between the colonists' desire to free themselves from tyranny and their continued suppression of the rights of thousands in their midst. In 1776, all were "created equal" as long as they weren't Africans, American Indians, women or children.

"There's a way of life that is driving the continuation of slavery," Johnson explains. "More than anything else, that is what's hard to give up."

The tension continued after the Revolution. Concessions were made to slavery as an expedient for ratifying the Constitution, yet eventually, Johnson

says, "Our presence forces the founders to live up to their own ideals."

Parts 3 and 4, *Brotherly Love* and *Judgment Day*, chronicle the slave rebellions and abolitionist movement. More laws are passed, compelling the return of escaped slaves to their masters. This new legislation forces every citizen to become involved on a moral level.

Africans in America personalizes the epic of slavery through the memoirs of literate black Americans of the time who took care to record their individual odysseys. Readers include actors Andre Braugher and William Hurt. Angela Bassett is the series' narrator.

Viewers learn of John Brown's raid on Harpers Ferry and feel the terror of runaway slaves rounded up and herded onto southbound trains, much like the Jews of World War II Europe. In Part 3, genealogist Karen Hughes White reads out the names of her ancestors from a document recording the sale of Thomas Jefferson's slaves.

Executive producer Orlando Bagwell is optimistic about the impact *Africans in America* will have on those who invest the time to see it.

"Through a clear and constructive understanding of our past, there is the opportunity for growth and healing," Bagwell says.

"This is not a black history or a white history, but a story that explores how white and black slavery and freedom are connected at the hip."

THE QUEEN'S HOUSE: A Social History of Buckingham Palace, by Edna Healey (Carroll & Graf: \$27.95). Ironically, both George Washington and his War of Independence opposite, King George III, bequeathed to their nations more than just that fratricidal revolution. Washington, "Father of his country," never lived in the White House, but he did participate in the cornerstone laying of what came to symbolize the presidency. Earlier, George III, affectionately known to his subjects as "Farmer George," bought for his new bride a London mansion that would become associated with the British monarchy — Buckingham Palace. The British royals before and since have had other residences, but as Edna Healey notes, "...the palace has endured. Neither harsh words nor enemy bombs have destroyed it, because it has fulfilled a deep-seated need — to have a focus, above party

politics, which can in time of crisis or celebration unite the country." One instance she cites was last year's outpouring of people and tributes before Buckingham's gates following the death of Princess Diana. George III and his adoring wife, with whom he had 15 children, loved the palace and adorned it with taste. Not all his heirs shared his enthusiasm. Victoria lost her zest for life and left Buckingham for years after her beloved Prince Albert died. Edward VIII resided there only briefly before he abdicated to marry his American love. The palace could speak volumes, but the author, wife of a former British cabinet member, brightly and informatively details in a single tome much of how the German-derived royal family over the years took a "heap of living" to make Buckingham a home representative of England.

The Italian Americans II: A Beautiful Song

Africans in America

How did America build a new nation based on principles of liberty and equality while justifying the existence of slavery? *Africans in America* addresses this tough question in a new four-hour documentary series.

In "The Terrible Transformation," the series premiere challenges popular misconceptions about the origins of slavery in America. Racial slavery did not arrive full-blown with the first Africans to set foot on Virginia soil in 1619 — it evolved over several decades, one law at a time.

"Revolution," the second episode, examines how the colonies' struggle for sovereignty called into question the institution of American slavery.

"Brotherly Love" examines the new nation's first 40 years through events in Philadelphia. There, the promise of liberty became real for some of the city's citizens and fleeting for others.

"Judgment Day," the series finale, focuses on the final years before the Civil War and the eventual, bloody end to the institution of slavery. As the nation expanded westward and thousands of slaves from the South were marched into the new territories, American citizens were forced to decide whether the nation would be slave or free.





Kerns gets what she wants in optimistic *Emma's Wish*

It's not every week there's a movie about a couple of elderly ladies who've taken up residence in a nursing home without losing interest in life.

Della Reese and Joanna Kerns play the geriatric roommates in *Emma's Wish*, airing Sunday, Oct. 18, on CBS.

Kerns, who starred in *Growing Pains* from 1985 to 1992, plays 75-year-old Emma Bridges, who blows out her birthday candles with a wish that she might come to the aid of her daughter (Harley Jane Kozak), who is trying to raise two children, start a business and deal with a marriage in crisis.

As Emma's irrepressible pal, Mona, Reese gives the film a welcome injection of attitude.

Undeniably a "woman's movie," with a sentiment-soaked message about forgiveness of self and others, *Emma's Wish* asks considerable suspension of disbelief as Emma first becomes young through the magic of her wish, then gets hired, *Mrs. Doubtfire*-style, as her daughter's housekeeper. Calling herself Mame (an anagram of

Emma - get it?), she encounters only the most perfunctory trial period before shifting into mother-confessor mode - and all this time her daughter still does not recognize her.

Back at the nursing home, Mona is doing her best to cover for her friend.

With *Wish*, Kerns takes a risk portraying a much older woman, but remains more convincing as Mame, the radiant 40-year-old zipping around Southern California in a vintage Volkswagen convertible.

Kozak's performance as stressed-out daughter Joy is easy to overlook alongside Kerns' star aura, but viewers will appreciate the realism of her pain.

As Joy's soiled-white-knight husband, William R. Moses is more than equal to the light labors set for him in Cynthia Whitcomb's script. And Stephanie Niznik lends comic relief as the ambitious nursing-home director who nearly spoils everything.

The sum of these parts isn't perfect alchemy, but a little magic is enough to make *Emma's Wish* satisfying viewing.

The Keeping Room: The Family Gathering Place

— The kids are home from school and doing their homework, dinner is on the stove, Mom is telecommuting the last project of the day, and Dad has returned from work and is tending to the baby in her playpen. EXTENSION CORDS

- Only use extension cords that have been listed by a recognized certification organization.

- Check that the amperage ratings for extension cords are higher than the electrical products they are used with. To find this information, check owner's manuals and electrical labels.

- Do not plug one extension cord into another.

- Remember only to use extension cords on a temporary basis; they are not safe as permanent household wiring. Also, check that the cord is not wrapped around itself or another object.

- Always check that the cord you have selected meets its intended use. You can verify this by checking the electrical rating on both appliance and extension cord.

- Keep cords out of your path or work area. When using electrical equipment outside, use only weather-resistant, heavy-gauge extension cords marked for outdoor use.

ELECTRICAL CORDS

- Don't run electrical cords underneath rugs or carpets, and don't place heavy objects or furniture on cords. Walking on cords and heavy weight can break wiring and possibly cause a fire.

- All electrical cords should be kept out of reach to keep children or pets from pulling appliances off tables or counters.

- Turn off electrical products if the cord overheats.

UNPLUGGING YOUR PRODUCTS

- Keep all electrical products and cords, like radios, hair dryers or curling irons, away from water while plugged in.

- Never use a knife or fork to remove a stuck slice of bread or bagel while the toaster or toaster oven is still plugged in.

- Never reach into water to retrieve an appliance that has fallen in

without first unplugging the appliance.

- During electrical storms, small appliances, like hair dryers, curling irons or toasters, can be potentially dangerous if left plugged in.

PLUGS

- Never remove the third prong of a three-pronged plug because it can protect you from electrical shock. Convert two-pronged outlets to fit three-pronged plugs using an adapter with a grounding tab.




